- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact section 43-28-25 of the North Dakota Century Code,
- 2 relating to the use of mercury in dental amalgams; and to provide a penalty.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 4 **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 43-28-25 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 6 **43-28-25. Unlawful acts Penalty.** It is a class A misdemeanor:
 - For any dentist, dental hygienist, legal entity, or unlicensed person, who owns, operates, or controls any room or office where dental work of any kind is done or contracted for, to employ, keep, or retain any unregistered dentist, dental hygienist, dental assistant, or other unregistered persons to do any dental work whatsoever, except as otherwise provided by statute or rule.
 - 2. For any dentist to help or assist any unlicensed person to perform any act or operation that is defined as the practice of dentistry.
 - For any dentist to advise or direct patients to dental laboratories or dental laboratory technicians for any dental service, or to advise or direct patients to deal directly with laboratories or dental laboratory technicians.
 - For any dentist to work or cooperate with dental laboratories that advertise for public patronage by delegating work to such laboratories in return for the reference of laboratory patrons for professional services.
 - 5. For any dentist to use the services of any person or legal entity not licensed to practice dentistry in this state, to construct, alter, repair, or duplicate any denture, plate, partial plate, bridge, splint, or orthodontic or prosthetic appliance, without first furnishing such unlicensed person a written prescription on forms prescribed by the board which must contain:

1		a.	The name and address of such unlicensed person;
2		b.	The patient's name or number and, in the event such number is used, the
3			name of the patient must be written upon the duplicate copy of such
4			prescription retained by the dentist;
5		c.	The date on which it was written;
6		d.	A prescription of the work to be done, with diagram, if necessary;
7		e.	A specification of the type and quality of materials to be used; and
8		f.	The signature of the dentist and the number of the dentist's North Dakota
9			license.
10		Suc	ch unlicensed person shall retain the original prescription and the dentist shall
11		reta	ain a duplicate copy thereof for inspection by the board or the board's agent for
12		two	years.
13	6.	For any dentist:	
14		a.	To use the service of any unlicensed persons without first having furnished
15			the unlicensed person such prescription;
16		b.	To fail to retain a duplicate copy thereof for two years; or
17		C.	To refuse to allow the board or the board's agent to inspect such prescription
18			during the two-year period of time.
19	7.	For	any unlicensed person:
20		a.	To perform any such service without first having obtained such prescription;
21		b.	To fail to retain the original thereof for two years; or
22		C.	To refuse to allow the board or the board's agent to inspect it during such
23			two-year period of time.
24	8.	For	any dentist to knowingly use dental amalgams that contain mercury.
25	<u>9.</u>	For	any person:
26		a.	To falsely claim or pretend to be a graduate from any dental college or the
27			holder of any diploma or degree from such college;
28		b.	To practice any fraud and deceit either in obtaining a license or a certificate of
29			registration;
30		c.	To falsely claim or pretend to have or hold a license or certificate of
31			registration from the board to practice dentistry; or

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1		d. To practice dentistry in this state without a license and certificate of		
2		registration.		
3	9. <u>10.</u>	For any person, except a North Dakota licensed practicing dentist, to own more		
4		than forty-nine percent of an office practice or business at which the practice of		
5		dentistry is performed. This provision does not apply to a board-approved medical		
6		clinic, hospital, or public health setting with which a dentist is associated; a		
7		board-approved nonprofit organization created to serve the dental needs of an		
8		underserved population; or the heir or personal representative of a deceased		
9		dentist. The heir or personal representative may operate an office under the name		
10		of the deceased dentist for a period of not longer than two years from the date of		
11		the dentist's death.		
12	The board	board may institute a civil action for an injunction prohibiting violations of this section		
13	without proof that anyone suffered actual damages.
