- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact sections 57-02-27.1, 57-02-27.2, 57-02-38, 57-12-09,
- 2 subsection 4 of section 57-14-08, and section 57-20-03 of the North Dakota Century Code,
- 3 relating to property valuation by townships, the deletion of obsolete dates and references for the
- 4 purposes of valuation and assessment of agricultural lands, assessment of unplatted,
- 5 undeveloped and non-agricultural real property located outside of a city, and notice
- 6 requirements for increased property tax assessments; and to provide an effective date.

## 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

8 **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 57-02-27.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is 9 amended and reenacted as follows:

10 57-02-27.1. Property to be valued at true and full value. Beginning with the year 11 1981, all All assessors and boards of equalization shall place the values of all items of taxable 12 property at the true and full value of the property except as otherwise specifically provided by 13 law, and the amount of taxes that may be levied on such property for the year 1981 and each 14 year thereafter must be limited as provided in this chapter. For the purposes of sections 15 57-02-27, 57-02-27.1, 57-02-27.2, and 57-55-04, the term "true and full value" has the same 16 meaning as provided in subsection 15 of section 57-02-01, except that "true and full value" of 17 agricultural lands must be as determined pursuant to section 57-02-27.2.

18 The governing body of the city <u>or township</u> may establish valuations that recognize the 19 supply of vacant lots available for sale.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 57-02-27.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

"True and full value" of agricultural lands must be their agricultural value for the
 purposes of sections 57-02-27, 57-02-27.1, 57-02-27.2, and 57-55-04. Agricultural
 value is defined as the "capitalized average annual gross return", except for

- inundated agricultural land. The "annual gross return" must be determined from
   crop share rent, cash rent, or a combination thereof reduced by estimated property
   taxes and crop marketing expenses incurred by farmland owners renting their
   lands on a cash or crop share basis.
- 5 2. For purposes of this section, "annual gross return" for cropland used for growing 6 crops other than sugar beets and potatoes means thirty percent of annual gross 7 income produced, "annual gross return" for cropland used for growing sugar beets 8 and potatoes means twenty percent of annual gross income produced, and "annual 9 gross return" for land used for grazing farm animals means twenty-five percent of 10 an amount determined by the agricultural economics department of agribusiness 11 and applied economics of North Dakota state university to represent the annual 12 gross income potential of the land based upon the animal unit carrying capacity of 13 the land.
- 14 3. The "average annual gross return" for each county must be determined as follows:
- 15a.Total the annual gross returns for the ten years immediately preceding the16current year for which data is available and discard the highest and lowest17annual gross returns of the ten.
- 18 b. The agricultural economics department of agribusiness and applied 19 economics of North Dakota state university shall establish a base year index 20 of prices paid by farmers using annual statistics on that topic compiled by the 21 national agricultural statistics service for the seven-year period ending in 22 1995, discarding the highest and lowest years' indexes, and averaging the 23 remaining five years' indexes. The agricultural economics department of 24 agribusiness and applied economics shall gather the national agricultural 25 statistics service annual index of prices paid by farmers for the ten years 26 ending with the most recent year used under subdivision a, discard the 27 highest and lowest years' indexes, average the remaining eight years' 28 indexes, and divide the resulting amount by the base year index of prices paid 29 by farmers. This amount must be divided into the amount determined under 30 subdivision a.
- 31 c. Divide the figure arrived at in subdivision b by eight.

1 4. To find the "capitalized average annual gross return", the average annual gross 2 return must be capitalized by a rate that is a ten-year average of the gross 3 agribank mortgage rate of interest for North Dakota, but the rate used for 4 capitalization under this section may not be less than eight and nine-tenths percent 5 for taxable year 2005 and eight and three-tenths percent for taxable years after 6 2005. The ten-year average must be computed from the twelve years ending with 7 the most recent year used under subdivision a of subsection 3, discarding the 8 highest and lowest years, and the gross agribank mortgage rate of interest for each 9 year must be determined in the manner provided in section 20.2032A-4(e)(1) of the 10 United States treasury department regulations for valuing farm real property for 11 federal estate tax purposes, except that the interest rate may not be adjusted as 12 provided in section 20.2032A-4(e)(2).

13 5. The agricultural economics department of agribusiness and applied economics of 14 North Dakota state university shall compute annually an estimate of the average 15 agricultural value per acre [.40 hectare] of agricultural lands on a statewide and on 16 a countywide basis; shall compute the average agricultural value per acre [.40 17 hectare] for cropland, noncropland, and inundated agricultural land for each 18 county; and shall provide the tax commissioner with this information by December 19 first of each year. Fifty percent of the annual gross income from irrigated cropland 20 must be considered additional expense of production and may not be included in 21 computation of the average agricultural value per acre [.40 hectare] for cropland for 22 the county as determined by the agricultural economics department of 23 agribusiness and applied economics. Before January first of each year, the tax 24 commissioner shall provide to each county director of tax equalization these 25 estimates of agricultural value for each county.

6. For purposes of this section, "inundated agricultural land" means property
classified as agricultural property containing a minimum of ten contiguous acres if
the value of the inundated land exceeds ten percent of the average agricultural
value of noncropland for the county, which is inundated to an extent making it
unsuitable for growing crops or grazing farm animals for two consecutive growing
seasons or more, and which produced revenue from any source in the most recent

1 prior year which is less than the county average revenue per acre for noncropland 2 calculated by the agricultural economics department of agribusiness and applied 3 economics of North Dakota state university. Application for classification as 4 inundated agricultural land must be made in writing to the township assessor or 5 county director of tax equalization by March thirty-first of each year. Before all or 6 part of a parcel of property may be classified as inundated agricultural land, the 7 board of county commissioners must approve that classification for that property 8 for the taxable year. The agricultural value of inundated agricultural lands for 9 purposes of this section must be determined by the agricultural economics 10 department of agribusiness and applied economics of North Dakota state 11 university to be ten percent of the average agricultural value of noncropland for the 12 county as determined under this section. Valuation of individual parcels of 13 inundated agricultural land may recognize the probability that the property will be 14 suitable for agricultural production as cropland or for grazing farm animals in the 15 future. Determinations made under this subsection may be appealed through the 16 informal equalization process and formal abatement process provided for in this 17 title.

18 7. Before February first of each year, the county director of tax equalization in each 19 county shall provide to all assessors within the county an estimate of the average 20 agricultural value of agricultural lands within each assessment district. The 21 estimate must be based upon the average agricultural value for the county 22 adjusted by the relative values of lands within each assessment district compared 23 to the county average. In determining the relative value of lands for each 24 assessment district compared to the county average, the county director of tax 25 equalization shall use soil type and soil classification data from detailed and 26 general soil surveys.

Each local assessor shall determine the relative value of each assessment parcel
 within the assessor's jurisdiction and shall determine the agricultural value of each
 assessment parcel by adjusting the agricultural value estimate for the assessment
 district by the relative value of the parcel. Each parcel must then be assessed
 according to section 57-02-27. If either a local assessor or a township board of

1		equalization develops an agricultural value for the lands in its assessment district
2		differing substantially from the estimate provided by the county director of tax
3		equalization, written evidence to support the change must be provided to the
4		county director of tax equalization. In determining the relative value of each
5		assessment parcel, the local assessor shall apply the following considerations,
6		which are listed in descending order of significance to the assessment
7		determination:
8		a. Soil type and soil classification data from detailed or general soil surveys.
9		b. The schedule of modifiers that must be used to adjust agricultural property
10		assessments within the county as approved by the state supervisor of
11		assessments under subsection 9.
12		c. Actual use of the property for cropland or noncropland purposes by the owner
13		of the parcel.
14	9.	Before February first of each year, the county director of tax equalization in each
15		county shall provide to all assessors of agricultural property within the county a
16		schedule of modifiers that must be used to adjust agricultural property
17		assessments within the county and directions regarding how those modifiers must
18		be applied by assessors. Before the schedule of modifiers is provided to
19		assessors within the county, the county director of tax equalization shall obtain the
20		approval of the state supervisor of assessments for use of the schedule within the
21		county.
22	10.	For any county that has not fully implemented use of soil type and soil classification
23		data from detailed or general soil surveys for any taxable year after 2009, the tax
24		commissioner shall direct the state treasurer to withhold five percent of that
25		county's allocation each month from the state aid distribution fund under section
26		57-39.2-26.1 until that county has fully implemented use of soil type or soil
27		classification data from detailed and general soil surveys. The amount withheld
28		from the allocation must be withheld entirely from the portion of the allocation
29		which may be retained by the county and may not reduce allocations to any
30		political subdivisions within the county.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 57-02-38 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

3 57-02-38. Units of real property for assessment. In all assessment books and tax 4 lists and in all proceedings for the collection of taxes and proceedings founded thereon, land 5 unplatted and undeveloped land platted before March 30, 1981, not situated within the limits of 6 an incorporated city must be described in subdivisions not exceeding guarter sections. Real 7 property in the platted portion of a city or real property platted on or after March 30, 1981, that 8 is located outside a city and is not agricultural property under the conditions set out in 9 subsection 1 of section 57-02-01, must be assessed separately as to each lot, but when . When 10 a building or structure covers two or more contiguous lots or parts of lots owned by the same 11 person the assessment may not be entered separately as to each lot or part of lot, but the tract 12 upon which the building is located must be described and assessed as one parcel. A block 13 which has not been subdivided may be described, assessed, and taxed in a unit of one block. 14 A failure to comply with the provisions of this section does not impair the validity of taxes.

SECTION 4. AMENDMENT. Section 57-12-09 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

17 57-12-09. Notice of increased assessment to real estate owner. When any 18 assessor has increased the true and full valuation of any lot or tract of land or including any 19 improvements thereon to by more than ten percent more than over the amount of the last 20 assessment, notice of the amount of increase over the last assessment and the amount of the 21 last assessment must be delivered in writing by the assessor to the property owner, mailed in 22 writing to the property owner at the property owner's last-known address, or provided to the 23 property owner by electronic mail directed with verification of receipt to an electronic mail 24 address at which the property owner has consented to receive notice. Delivery of notice to a 25 property owner under this section must be completed not fewer than fifteen days before the 26 meeting of the local equalization board. The tax commissioner shall prescribe suitable forms 27 for this notice and the notice must show the true and full value as defined by law of the 28 property, including improvements, that the assessor used in making the assessment for the 29 current year and for the year in which the last assessment was made and must also show the 30 date prescribed by law for the meeting of the local equalization board of the assessment district 31 in which the property is located and the meeting date of the county equalization board. The

1 notice must be mailed or delivered at the expense of the assessment district for which the

2 assessor is employed.

3 SECTION 5. AMENDMENT. Subsection 4 of section 57-14-08 of the North Dakota
4 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

5 When any special assessor has increased the true and full valuation of any lot or 4. 6 tract of land together with including any improvements to that lot or tract of land by 7 fifteen ten percent or more of the last assessment, written notice of the amount of 8 increase over the last assessment and the amount of the last assessment must be 9 delivered in writing by the special assessor to the property owner or, mailed in 10 writing to the property owner at the property owner's last-known address except 11 that no notice need be delivered or mailed if the true and full valuation is increased 12 by less than three thousand dollars, or provided to the property owner by electronic 13 mail directed with verification of receipt to an electronic mail address at which the 14 property owner has consented to receive notice. The tax commissioner shall 15 prescribe suitable forms for this notice and the notice must also show the true and 16 full value as defined by law of the property, including improvements, that the 17 special assessor used in making the reassessment and must also show the date 18 prescribed by law for the meeting of the special board of equalization of the 19 assessment district in which the property is located. This Delivery of notice must 20 be mailed or delivered to the property owner under this section must be completed 21 at least ten fifteen days in advance of the meeting date of the special board of 22 equalization and must be mailed or delivered at the expense of the assessment 23 district for which the special assessor is employed.

SECTION 6. AMENDMENT. Section 57-20-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

57-20-03. Form of tax list. The tax list must be made out to correspond with the assessment books as respects with respect to ownership and description of property, with columns for the valuation and for the various items of tax included in the total amount of all taxes set down opposite such description of property. The amounts of special taxes must be entered in appropriate columns, but the general taxes may be shown by entering the rate of each tax at the head of the proper column without extending the same, in which case a

- 1 schedule of the rates of such taxes must be made on the first page of each tax list. The tax lists
- 2 also must show, in a separate column, the years for which <u>a tax lien has been foreclosed upon</u>
- 3 any piece or parcel has been sold for taxes, if the same has not been redeemed or deeded for
- 4 such taxes.
- 5 SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE. Sections 3 and 4 of this Act are effective for taxable
- 6 years beginning after December 31, 2008.
