- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new chapter to title 16.1 of the North Dakota Century
- 2 Code, relating to instant runoff voting.

## 3 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:**

4 **SECTION 1.** A new chapter to title 16.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is created 5 and enacted as follows:

- 6 **Definitions.** As used in this chapter:
  - 1. "Backup choice" means any choice ranked below a first choice.
- 8 <u>2.</u> <u>"Choice" means an indication on a ballot of a voter's ranking of the various</u>
- 9 candidates for the same office in order of preference and is a potential vote that
- may be counted as a vote to elect a candidate depending on the rules for counting
  the choices provided under this chapter.
- 12 <u>3.</u> <u>"Eliminate" or "eliminated candidate" means a circumstance under which a</u>
- 13 <u>candidate has not received sufficient choices and is thereby dropped from the field</u>
   14 <u>of candidates.</u>
- 154."Exhausted ballot" means a ballot on which there are no uncounted choices for16remaining candidates and all choices made on the ballot have been counted as
- 17 potential votes for various candidates or contain choices for eliminated candidates.
- 18 <u>5.</u> "Instant runoff voting" means a system of voting through which a voter may rank
   19 candidates for the same office in order of preference, so that the voter may indicate
   20 a first choice, second choice, and continuing choices for as many candidates as
- 21 <u>are on the ballot for the office.</u>
- 22 <u>6.</u> "Last place candidate" means a candidate who has received the fewest votes
   23 among the candidates who remain at any stage.

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1	<u>7.</u>	"Next choice" means the highest ranked choice for a remaining candidate which
2		has not become a vote at that stage.
3	<u>8.</u>	"Remaining candidate" means a candidate who has not been eliminated.
4	<u>9.</u>	"Stage" means one of successive steps or rounds in counting voter choices for
5		candidates to determine whether a candidate has achieved a majority and to
6		determine which candidates are eliminated.
7	<u>10.</u>	"Vote" means a ballot choice that is counted toward election of a candidate.
8	Inst	ant runoff voting application. Instant runoff voting must be used in a general
9	election cor	ntest for any of the following offices when more than two candidates are on the ballot
10	for that office:	
11	<u>1.</u>	President and vice president of the United States.
12	<u>2.</u>	United States senator.
13	<u>3.</u>	Member of the United States house of representatives.
14	<u>4.</u>	All statewide offices, including the justices of the supreme court.

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1	<u>3.</u>	The canvassing board shall continue the process until all but one candidate has	
2		been eliminated, and that candidate is elected.	
3	<u>4.</u>	Once a ballot is exhausted, the ballot must be disregarded and no longer counted.	
4		A ballot on which a voter gives the same ranking for more than one candidate for	
5		the same office is exhausted when the duplicate choice is reached and no vote	
6		may be recorded for either of the candidates involved. If a voter skips a ranking on	
7		the voter's ballot, the next ranking below the skipped choice must be counted as	
8		though it were the rank of the skipped choice.	
9	<u>5.</u>	If a tie occurs at any stage in the counting of choices, except in the final stage, the	
10		candidate who had the fewest choices at the previous stage of tabulation must be	
11		eliminated. If the candidates were also tied at a previous stage, the candidate with	
12		the fewest choices in the subsequent stage must be eliminated.	
13	<u>6.</u>	If two or more candidates are tied at the final stage of counting, the winner must be	
14		determined as otherwise provided by law for a tie.	
15	<u>7.</u>	If all choices on all ballots have been counted and no candidate has achieved a	
16		majority, the candidate with the most votes is elected.	
17	<u>8.</u>	No votes may be counted for a candidate who has been eliminated regardless of	
18		how many backup choices might otherwise have become votes for the candidate.	
19	Application of general election laws. Any general election law under this title must		
20	be construed to be applicable to elections held under this chapter unless the provision		
21	specifically conflicts with the provisions of this chapter.
