1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact section s 15.1-21-02.3, 15.1-21-02.4, 15-1.21-02.5, and 2 15.1-21-02.6, two new sections to chapter 15-20.1, three new sections to chapter 15.1-06, four 3 new sections to chapter 15.1-21, one new section to chapter 15.1-27, and four new sections to 4 chapter 15.1-37 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to school personnel, program and 5 course requirements, assessments, career development facilitation, state aid payments, and 6 early childhood education; to amend and reenact sections 15.1-06-04, 15.1-09-10, 15.1-21-02, 7 15.1-21-02.1, 15.1-27-03.1, 15.1-27-04, 15.1-27-07.2, 15.1-27-11, 15.1-27-19, and 15.1-32-18 8 of the North Dakota Century Code and section 55 of chapter 163 of the 2007 Session Laws, 9 relating to school calendars, course requirements, state aid payments, special education, and 10 early childhood education; to provide for a commission on education improvement; to provide 11 for the distribution of transportation grants, reorganization planning grants, deferred 12 maintenance grants, and contingency payments; to provide for a contingent transfer; to repeal 13 sections 15.1-21-02.2 and 15.1-27-20.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to high 14 school graduation requirements and the minimum mill levy offset; and to declare an emergency.

9		additional classroom instruction during the school year, the school is exempt from
10		having to make up six hours of instruction time lost as a result of weather-related
11		closure. In order to make up lost classroom instruction time beyond the six hours,
12		the school must extend its normal school calendar day by at least thirty minutes.
13	7.	A school that does not qualify under the provisions of subsection 6 must extend its
14		normal schoolday by at least thirty minutes to make up classroom instruction time
15		lost as a result of weather-related closure.
16	8.	If because of weather a school must dismiss before completing a full day of
17		instruction, the school is responsible for making up only those hours and portions
18		of an hour between the time of early dismissal and the conclusion of a full day of
19		classroom instruction.
