1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact two new sections to chapter 15-20.1, three new sections 2 to chapter 15.1-06, chapter 15.1-18.2, four new sections to chapter 15.1-21, sections 3 15.1-21-02.2, 15.1-21-02.3, 15.1-21-02.4, 15.1-21-02.5, 15.1-21-02.6, and 15.1-21-02.7, one 4 new section to chapter 15.1-27, and four new sections to chapter 15.1-37 of the North Dakota 5 Century Code, relating to school personnel, program and course requirements, assessments, 6 career development facilitation, state aid payments, and early childhood education; to amend 7 and reenact sections 15.1-06-04, 15.1-09.1-10, 15.1-21-02, 15.1-21-02.1, 15.1-27-03.1, 8 15.1-27-04, 15.1-27-07.2, 15.1-27-11, 15.1-27-19, 15.1-27-41, 15.1-32-18, and 15.1-37-01 of 9 the North Dakota Century Code and section 55 of chapter 163 of the 2007 Session Laws, 10 relating to school calendars, course requirements, state aid payments, special education, and 11 early childhood education; to provide an appropriation; to provide for teacher compensation 12 increases; to provide for the distribution of transportation grants, reorganization planning grants, 13 regional education association grants, deferred maintenance grants, and contingency 14 payments; to provide for a contingent transfer; to provide for reports to the legislative council; to 15 repeal sections 15.1-21-02.2, 15.1-27-20.1, and 15.1-38-01.2 of the North Dakota Century

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. A new section to chapter 15-20.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

If a school's calendar provides for an extension of each schoolday beyond the 9 statutorily required minimum number of hours, and if the extensions when 10 aggregated over an entire school year amount to more than eighty-four hours of 11 additional classroom instruction during the school year, the school is exempt from 12 having to make up six hours of instruction time lost as a result of weather-related 13 closure. In order to make up lost classroom instruction time beyond the six hours, 14 the school must extend its normal school calendar day by at least thirty minutes. 15 7. A school that does not qualify under the provisions of subsection 6 must extend its 16 normal schoolday by at least thirty minutes to make up classroom instruction time 17 lost as a result of weather-related closure. 18 If because of weather a school must dismiss before completing a full day of 8. 19 instruction, the school is responsible for making up only those hours and portions 20 of an hour between the time of early dismissal and the conclusion of a full day of 21 classroom instruction. 22 **SECTION 4.** A new section to chapter 15.1-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is 23 created and enacted as follows: 24 Elementary school tutors - Requirement for accreditation - Qualifications -25 Verification report. 26 Beginning with the 2010-11 school year, an elementary school seeking <u>1.</u> 27 accreditation from the superintendent of public instruction shall demonstrate that it 28 has available one full-time equivalent tutor for every four hundred students in 29 average daily membership in kindergarten through grade three. For purposes of this section, a "career advisor" means an individual who holds a 15 3. 16 certificate in career development facilitation issued by the department of career 17 and technical education under section 1 of this Act or an individual who is 18 provisionally approved by the department of career and technical education under 19 section 2 of this Act to serve as a career advisor. 20 **SECTION 6.** A new section to chapter 15.1-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is 21 created and enacted as follows: 22 Career advisor - Duties. A career advisor shall meet with students in grades seven 23 through twelve, discuss the student's academic assessments and career interest surveys, and 24 pursue with the student career development and work-planning activities. A career advisor 25 shall use computer-assisted career guidance systems and work at the direction and under the 26 supervision of the school district counseling staff. 27 SECTION 7. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-09.1-10 of the North Dakota Century Code

15.1-09.1-10. State aid - Payable to a regional education association - Obligation

- 1. The superintendent of public instruction shall forward the portion of a school district's state aid that which is payable by the superintendent under subdivision q of subsection 1 of section 15.1-27-03.1 as a result of the district's participation in a regional education association directly to the association in which the district participates. The superintendent shall forward the amount payable under this subsection at the same time and in the same manner as provided for other state aid payments under section 15.1-27-01.
  - 2. If the superintendent of public instruction determines that a school district failed to meet any contractual or statutory obligation imposed upon it as a result of the district's participation in a regional education association, the superintendent shall subtract the amount for which the district was not eligible from any future distribution of state aid to the district under section 15.1-27-01.
- **SECTION 8.** Chapter 15.1-18.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

# <u>15.1-18.2-01. Professional development plan - Adoption - Review by school district.</u>

- 1. As a condition of accreditation, each school district shall adopt a professional development plan. The plan must include a description of the professional development activities that the district offers or makes available, the district's requirements for participation by teachers, and the manner in which participation is documented.
- 2. Each school district shall review and if necessary modify its plan at least once every five years.
- 3. Each school district shall file a copy of its most recent professional development plan with the superintendent of public instruction.

<u>public instruction.</u> The superintendent of public instruction shall review each school district's professional development plan to ensure that the plan meets the requirements of section 15.1-18.2-01, is designed to improve the quality of teaching and learning in the district, and is implemented in an efficient and effective manner.

SECTION 40. CONTINGENT TRANSFER BY BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION. If during the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, and ending June 30, 2011, the superintendent of public instruction determines that, using all available sources, there are insufficient funds with which to fully reimburse school districts for the excess costs of serving the one percent of special education students statewide who require the greatest school district expenditures in order to be provided with special education and related services, the industrial commission shall transfer from the earnings and accumulated and undivided profits of the Bank of North Dakota the amount the superintendent of public instruction certifies is necessary to provide the statutorily required level of reimbursement. The superintendent of public instruction shall file for introduction legislation requesting that the sixty-second legislative assembly return any amount transferred under this section to the Bank of North Dakota.
