1	A concurrent resolution recognizing the importance of participation in census 2010 and
2	encouraging state agencies, political subdivisions, and all public officials to partner with the
3	United States census bureau in achieving an accurate and complete count in census 2010.
4	WHEREAS, because the census is the basis for allocation of federal funds relating to
5	social services and community development block grants and is the basis for redistricting of the
6	Legislative Assembly, an accurate and complete count is vital to the entire state; and
7	WHEREAS, the results of the census are used by federal, state, and local governments
8	for planning purposes, business and economic development purposes, and funding decisions;
9	and
10	WHEREAS, an accurate and complete count in census 2010 will assist public officials
11	and business leaders in making decisions relating to business development and infrastructure
12	needs; and
13	WHEREAS, census questionnaires take only a few minutes to complete and identify an
14	information provided through the questionnaire is held confidential for seventy-two years; and
15	WHEREAS, to achieve a full and complete count that includes segments of the
16	population that have been traditionally undercounted, a partnership among the census bureau
17	and the state, political subdivisions, and all public officials is vital in providing current and
18	accurate information to the census bureau with respect to address lists, jurisdictional
19	boundaries, and other geographical features:
20	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
21	OF NORTH DAKOTA, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN:
22	That the Legislative Assembly recognizes the importance of participation in census
