### **ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL NO. 1122**

Introduced by

Industry, Business and Labor Committee

(At the request of the Department of Commerce)

- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact sections 54-34.4-03, 54-44.5-04, 54-60-02, 54-60-04,
- 2 54-60-16, and 54-60-25 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the state tourism policy,
- 3 division of community services, department of commerce, North Dakota economic development
- 4 foundation, North Dakota international business and trade office, and North Dakota rural
- 5 development council; to repeal sections 4-14.1-01.1 and 54-34.3-12 of the North Dakota
- 6 Century Code, relating to the definition of eligible facility and the value-added agriculture
- 7 promotion board; to provide an effective date; and to declare an emergency.

#### 8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 9 **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 54-34.4-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 11 **54-34.4-03.** State tourism policy.

- 1. The legislative assembly declares that:
  - a. This state is endowed with scenic beauty, historical sites, cultural resources, local festivals, attractions, recreational facilities, and a population whose ethnic diversity and traditions are attractive to visitors:
    - b. These human and physical resources should be preserved and nurtured, not only because they are appreciated by other Americans and by visitors from other lands, but because they are valued by the state's residents;
    - Tourism contributes to economic well-being by creating job opportunities, generating revenues for local businesses, and creating new wealth in the economy;
    - d. Tourism is an educational and informational medium for personal growth which informs residents about their state's geography and history, their political institutions, their cultural resources, their environment, and about each other;

2		residents;
3	<del>f.</del> <u>d.</u>	Tourism enhances the quality of life and well-being of the state's residents by

6		helps educate and create awareness among residents and visitors alike;

9	<del>i.</del>	Tourism engenders appreciation of the state's cultural, architectural,
10		technological, agricultural, and industrial achievements and is helpful in attracting
11		new residents;
12	<del>j.</del>	The development and promotion of tourism to and within the state is in the
13		interest of the people of this state;
14	<del>k.</del>	Tourism should develop in an orderly manner in order to provide the maximum
15		benefit to the state and its residents;
16	<del>l.</del> g.	The development of a strong and competitive state visitor industry depends upon
17		the availability of trained personnel, necessary infrastructure, and a receptive
18		climate for tourism investment; and
19	<del>m.</del> <u>h.</u>	A comprehensive tourism policy is essential if tourism in the state is to grow in an
20		orderly manner.
21	2. The	legislative assembly declares it is the policy of this state to:
22	a.	EncouragePromote and encourage the orderly growth and development of
23		tourism to, and within, the state;
24	b.	Promote the availability of public tourism training to increase the skills and
25		productivity of the tourism labor force and to broaden access to employment
26		opportunities and the visitor industry;
27	<del>C.</del>	Encourage a healthy competitiveness in the visitor industry;
28	<del>d.</del>	Promote the availability of reliable public highways and transport services
29		between the state's principal tourism destinations and the main tourism
30		generating markets;

1 Expand off-season tourism to the state and thereby increase the productivity of 2 the accommodation sector and reduce seasonal layoffs within the visitor and 3 visitor-related industries; 4 <del>f.</del>c. Promote a sense of history in the state's young people by encouraging family 5 visits to state historic sites, and promoting the preservation and restoration of 6 historic sites, trails, buildings, and districts; 7 Promote the mental, emotional, and physical well-being of the American people <del>g.</del>d. 8 by encouraging outdoor recreational activities within the state; 9 <del>h.</del> Encourage the talents and strengthen the economic independence of the state's 10 residents by encouraging the preservation of traditional craft skills, the production 11 of handicrafts and native and folk art by private artisans and crafts people, and 12 the holding of craft demonstrations: 13 Encourage an optimum of satisfaction and high quality service to visitors; 14 Promote a tourist environment that respects our visitors' rights as consumers; į. 15 <del>k.</del> Afford visitors and residents the best possible conditions of public sanitation; 16 <del>l.</del>e. Facilitate tourism to, and within, the state by developing an essential tourism 17 infrastructure, providing investment incentives to tourism businesses, and 18 encouraging city and county officials to plan for tourism needs and capitalize on 19 local tourism resources; 20 Promote a better understanding among the state's residents of the social and m. 21 economic importance of tourism through appropriate formal and informal learning-22 experiences about tourism, and foster among all citizens the capacity for 23 courtesy to visitors; 24 <del>n.</del>f. Encourage the holding of conventions, trade shows, and expositions throughout 25 the state; 26 Promote tourism in a manner that fosters visitors' understanding and respect for-27 native and religious beliefs, customs, and ethnic traditions of the state's 28 residents; 29 Monitor tourist impact on the basic human rights of the state's residents and <del>p.</del> 30 ensure equal access by visitors and residents to public recreational resources;

1 Take measures to protect wildlife and natural resources in the preservation of <del>q.</del>g. 2 geological, archaeological, and cultural treasures in tourist areas; 3 <del>r.</del>h. Encourage, assist, and coordinate when possible the tourism activities of local 4 and area promotional organizations and tribes; and 5 Provide hospitality training opportunities for frontline employees and provide <u>i.</u> 6 resources to law enforcement personnel, border security, transportation security 7 administration officials, and all state employees to assist, whenever possible, the 8 tourism industry in helping visitors enjoy their North Dakota experience; and 9 <del>S.</del>j. Ensure that the tourism interest of the state is considered fully by state agencies 10 and the legislative assembly in their deliberations; and harmonize to the 11 maximum extent possible, all state activities in support of tourism with the needs 12 of the general public, the political subdivisions of the state, and the visitor 13 industry. 14 **SECTION 2. AMENDMENT.** Section 54-44.5-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is 15 amended and reenacted as follows: 16 54-44.5-04. Division of community services - Powers and duties. 17 The division of community services shall: 18 Provide relevant information on pertinent topics and issues which relate to public 19 policy development, interpretation, modification, and implementation. 20 2. Research, analyze, and recommend public policy for the office of management and 21 budget and the executive office. 22 Coordinate public policy implementation within the state. Powers conferred upon-<del>3.</del> 23 departments, agencies, or instrumentalities of the state, counties, townships, or cities-24 by any existing state or local law may not be derogated by this duty. 25 Develop state energy conservation policy and manage federal energy conservation 26 program activities between all levels of the public and private sectors regarding the 27 prudent and efficient use of energy resources. 28 Develop, implement, and administer federal categorical and block grant programs <del>5.</del>3. 29 assigned to the division. 30 <del>6.</del>4. Advise, coordinate, and assist cities, political subdivisions, and the state in all phases 31 of state and local planning for the physical development of the state.

- 1 7.5. Render financial assistance to any government planning agency within federal law or regulation.
- 3 8.6. Advise, consult, coordinate, assist, and contract with or on behalf of the various planning agencies in developing and harmonizing planning activities of the state.
- 5 9.7. Implement a state facility energy improvement program.
- SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 54-60-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is
   amended and reenacted as follows:
- 8 **54-60-02. Department of commerce Divisions.** 
  - The North Dakota department of commerce is created. All records, materials, supplies, and equipment used by the division of community services, department of economic development and finance, and the department of tourism are transferred to the department.
  - 1. The department must consist of:
    - a. A division of community services;
      - b. A division of economic development and finance;
- 15 c. A division of tourism;
- 16 d. A division of workforce development; and
- e. Any division <u>or office</u> the commissioner determines necessary to carry out this chapter.
  - The commissioner shall appoint the director of each division of the department. Each
    director appointed by the commissioner serves at the pleasure of the commissioner
    and is entitled to receive a salary set by the commissioner within the limits of
    legislative appropriations.
  - **SECTION 4. AMENDMENT.** Section 54-60-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 54-60-04. North Dakota economic development foundation Executive committee Duties.
- The North Dakota economic development foundation is created.
- 1. The foundation is composed of a minimum of fifteen and a maximum of thirty
  members appointed by the governor for two-year terms, except the governor shall
  appoint approximately one-half of the initial foundation members to one-year terms in
  order to initiate a cycle of staggered terms. Appointment of the foundation members

The foundation shall: 11 Provide the governor advice and counsel in selecting the commissioner. a. 12 b. Serve in an advisory role to the commissioner. 13 Develop a strategic plan for economic development in the state and set C. 14 accountability standards, measurements, and benchmarks to evaluate the 15 effectiveness of the department in implementing the strategic plan. 16 Develop a strategic plan for the development of value-added agriculture in the d. 17 state. 18 e. Monitor tourism and economic development activities and initiatives of the 19 department. 20 Recommend state and federal legislation relating to strengthening the state's <del>f.</del>e. 21 economy and increasing the state's population. 22 Monitor state and federal legislation and initiatives that may impact the state's <del>g.</del>f. 23 economy and population. 24 <del>h.</del>g. Serve as a source of expertise for developing public and private initiatives to 25 strengthen the state's economy and increase the state's population. 26 SECTION 5. AMENDMENT. Section 54-60-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is

# 54-60-16. (Effective through June 30, 2011) International business and trade office - Advisory board.

- The commissioner shall administer the international business and trade office. The purpose of the office is to assist North Dakota businesses expand exports to international markets by:
  - a. Advocating for exporters;
  - b. Offering export educational opportunities to North Dakota businesses;
- Researching and raising awareness of export opportunities, issues, and challenges impacting North Dakota businesses;
  - d. Assisting North Dakota businesses in identifying, developing, and cultivating international markets for products; and
  - e. Organizing and carrying out trade missions that seek to facilitate contact and communication between North Dakota businesses and international markets.
  - 2. The commissioner may designate a nonprofit corporation incorporated in this state that has the primary purpose of assisting North Dakota exporters or contract with a third party for the provision of services for the international business and trade office. If the commissioner designates a nonprofit corporation or contracts with a third party under this subsection, all data and data bases collected and created by the third party in performing services for the office are the property of the department and the third party.
  - 3. The department may seek and accept any gift, grant, or donation of funds, property, services, or other assistance from public or private sources for the purpose of furthering the objectives of the international business and trade office.
  - 4. The commissioner may establish an international business and trade office advisory board with which the director may consult in administering the international business and trade office. Each member of the advisory board created under this subsection is entitled to receive per diem compensation at a rate established by the director not exceeding sixty-two dollars and fifty cents and reimbursement of expenses as provided by law for state officers, while attending meetings or performing duties directly related to board membership, except that per diem compensation under this

5	<del>1.</del>	The commissioner shall administer the international business and trade office. The

17		international business and trade office. If the commissioner contracts with a third party-		
18		under this subsection, all data and data bases collected and created by the third party-		
19		in performing services for the office are the property of the department and the third-		
20		<del>party.</del>		
21	<del>3.</del>	The department may seek and accept any gift, grant, or donation of funds, property,		
22		services, or other assistance from public or private sources for the purpose of		
23		furthering the objectives of the international business and trade office.		
24	4 <del>.</del>	The commissioner may establish an international business and trade office advisory		
25		board with which the director may consult in administering the international business		
26		and trade office. Each member of the advisory board created under this subsection is		
27		entitled to receive per diem compensation at a rate established by the director not		
28		exceeding sixty-two dollars and fifty cents and reimbursement of expenses as		
29		provided by law for state officers, while attending meetings or performing duties		
30		directly related to board membership, except that per diem compensation under this		

1		section may not be paid to any member who receives compensation or calary as a

3	SECTION 6. AMENDMENT. Section 54-60-25 of the North Dakota Century Code is		
4	amended and reenacted as follows:		
5	54-60-25. North Dakota rural development council - Composition.		
6	The North Dakota rural development council is created.		
7	1.	The North Dakota rural development council is composed of a minimum of nine and a	
8		maximum of seventeen members. The commissioner is an ex officio voting member of	
9		the council. The governor shall appoint council members for two-year terms, except	
10		the governor shall appoint approximately one-half of the initial council members to	
11		one-year terms in order to initiate a cycle of staggered terms. Appointment of the	
12		council members must ensure representation from eightfour regions designated by the	
13		commissioner. Members of the council serve at the pleasure of the governor.	
14	2.	The council shall select its own officers who shall serve for a term of two years	
15		commencing on October first of each year.	
16	3.	The council shall have at least two meetings each year and such additional meetings	
17		as the chairman determines necessary at a time and place to be fixed by the	
18		chairman. Special meetings must be called by the chairman on written request of any	
19		four members. A simple majority of the council constitutes a quorum and may act upon	
20		any matter coming before the council. Members of the council are entitled to	
21		reimbursement in the same manner and at the same rate provided by law for other	
22		state officials.	
23	4.	The council, in cooperation with the rural development office, shall:	
24		a. Facilitate collaboration among federal, state, local, and tribal governments and	
25		the private and nonprofit sectors in the planning and implementation of programs	
26		and policies that have an impact on rural areas of the state;	
27		b. Monitor, report, and comment on policies and programs that address, or fail to	
28		address, the needs of the rural areas of the state; and	
29		c. Facilitate the development of strategies to reduce or eliminate conflicting or	
30		duplicative administrative or regulatory requirements of federal, state, local, and	
31		tribal governments.

- 1 **SECTION 7. REPEAL**. Sections 4-14.1-01.1 and 54-34.3-12 of the North Dakota Century
- 2 Code are repealed.
- 3 **SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.** Section 5 of this Act becomes effective on July 1, 2011.
- 4 **SECTION 9. EMERGENCY.** Sections 5 and 8 of this Act are declared to be an emergency
- 5 measure.
