ı	A concurrent resolution diging the rederal Communications Commission to make substantive
2	changes to the National Broadband Plan so that the plan does not limit the future economic
3	livelihood and social well-being of rural consumers.
4	WHEREAS, North Dakotans living in rural areas deserve and expect the same high-quality,
5	affordable communications services that are available to their urban neighbors; and
6	WHEREAS, rural businesses, farmers, and ranchers compete in the global marketplace
7	and depend on affordable access to robust broadband services to market and sell products
8	around the world, similar to businesses in urban areas; and
9	WHEREAS, children living in rural areas should have the same educational opportunities as
10	their urban counterparts and high-speed Internet access is absolutely necessary to allow these
11	students opportunities for advanced learning through distance education; and
12	WHEREAS, residents living in rural areas face unique health care challenges because of
13	the distances that must be traveled to seek basic and advanced medical care and telemedicine,
14	and telehealth delivered via broadband networks can improve the health of rural residents by
15	reducing the time and travel needed for high-quality health care; and
16	WHEREAS, many rural areas encounter significant challenges in pursuing and sustaining
17	economic development plans that bring quality, higher-paying jobs to their communities, and
18	insufficient robust broadband speeds will further hamper the economic development needs of
19	many rural communities; and
20	WHEREAS, the United States Department of Agriculture rightfully has placed significant
21	importance on the need for broadband access in rural America to improve the quality of life and
22	economic development; and
23	WHEREAS, communications providers that serve this state's small towns and rural areas

have done an outstanding job of ensuring their consumers have access to affordable, reliable

1 broadband services through the assistance of the federal universal service fund and the United 2 States Department of Agriculture Rural Utilities Service loan and grant programs; and 3 WHEREAS, contrary to the success many small, rural communications providers have had 4 in deploying broadband, the Federal Communications Commission is embarking on a National 5 Broadband Plan that will negatively impact the ability of rural North Dakotans to realize the true 6 benefits of access to robust broadband speeds by limiting support to four megabits per second 7 in rural, high-cost areas of the country, while calling for 100 million urban homes to have access 8 to broadband speeds at 100 megabits per second by 2020; and 9 WHEREAS, the National Broadband Plan runs counter to the federal policy of universal 10 service which ensures access to comparable communications services at roughly similar costs 11 regardless of the location of the consumer; 12 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF 13 NORTH DAKOTA, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN: 14 That the Sixty-second Legislative Assembly of North Dakota urges the Federal 15 Communications Commission to make substantive changes to the National Broadband Plan so 16 that the plan does not limit the future economic livelihood and social well-being of rural 17 consumers; and 18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Sixty-second Legislative Assembly of North Dakota 19 encourages the North Dakota Congressional Delegation to work with the Federal 20 Communications Commission to ensure the understanding of the importance of a robust 21 broadband development to rural North Dakota and how the current draft of the National 22 Broadband Plan needs to be dramatically altered to ensure quality broadband services 23 availability throughout this state; and 24 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Secretary of State forward copies of this resolution 25 to the Federal Communications Commission and to each member of the North Dakota 26 Congressional Delegation.
