## **ENGROSSED HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3028**

1	A concurrent resolution urging Congress to adopt legislation prohibiting the Environmental
2	Protection Agency by any <u>legal</u> means <del>necessary</del> from regulating greenhouse emissions,
3	including, if necessary, defunding Environmental Protection Agency greenhouse gas regulatory
4	activities; imposing a moratorium on adoption on any new air quality regulations by the
5	Environmental Protection Agency by any <u>legal</u> means <u>necessary</u> , except those <u>regulations</u>
6	directly addressing an imminent health or environmental emergency, for a period of at least two
7	years, including defunding Environmental Protection Agency air quality regulatory activities; and
8	requiring the administration to undertake a study identifying all regulatory activity the
9	Environmental Protection Agency intends to undertake in furtherance of its goal of "taking action
0	on climate change and improving air quality" and specifying the cumulative effect of all these
11	regulations on the economy, jobs, and American economic competitiveness.
2	WHEREAS, the Environmental Protection Agency has proposed or is proposing numerous
13	new regulations, particularly in the area of air quality and regulation of greenhouse gases, that
4	are likely to have major effects on the economy, jobs, and United States competitiveness in
15	worldwide markets; and
16	WHEREAS, the Environmental Protection Agency's regulatory activity as to air quality and
7	greenhouse gases has become known as the "train wreck" because of the numerous and
8	overlapping requirements and because of the potentially devastating may have negative
9	consequences this regulatory activity may have on the economy; and
20	WHEREAS, concern is growing that, with cap and trade legislation having failed in
21	Congress, the Environmental Protection Agency is attempting to obtain the same results
22	through the adoption of regulations; and
23	WHEREAS, Environmental Protection Agency overregulation is driving jobs and industry

1	WHEREAS, neither the Environmental Protection Agency nor the administration has
2	undertaken any comprehensive study of what the cumulative effect of all of this new regulatory
3	activity will have on the economy, jobs, and competitiveness; and
4	WHEREAS, the Environmental Protection Agency has not performed any comprehensive
5	study of what the environmental benefits of its greenhouse gas regulation will be in terms of
6	impacts on the global climate; and
7	WHEREAS, state agencies are routinely required to identify the costs of their regulations
8	and to justify those costs in light of the benefits; and
9	WHEREAS, since the Environmental Protection Agency has identified "taking action on
10	climate change and improving air quality" as its first strategic goal for the 2011-15 time period,
11	the Environmental Protection Agency should be required to identify the specific actions it
12	intends to take to achieve these goals and to assess the total cost of all these actions together;
13	and
14	WHEREAS, the Legislative Assembly supports continuing improvement in the quality of the
15	nation's air and believes that such improvement can be made in a sensible fashion without
16	damaging the economy, provided there is a full understanding of the cost of the regulations at
17	issue; and
18	WHEREAS, the primary goal of government at the present time must be to promote
19	economic recovery and to foster a stable and predictable business environment that will lead to
20	the creation of jobs; and
21	WHEREAS, public health and welfare will suffer without significant new job creation and
22	economic improvement because people with good jobs are better able to take care of
23	themselves and their families than the unemployed and because environmental improvement is
24	only possible in a society that generates wealth;
25	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF
26	NORTH DAKOTA, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN:
27	That the Sixty-second Legislative Assembly urges Congress to adopt legislation prohibiting
28	the Environmental Protection Agency by any legal means necessary from regulating
29	greenhouse emissions, including, if necessary, defunding Environmental Protection Agency
30	greenhouse gas regulatory activities; imposing a moratorium on adoption on any new air quality
31	regulations by the Environmental Protection Agency by any means necessary, except those

1 directly addressing an imminent health or environmental emergency, for a period of at least two 2 years, including defunding Environmental Protection Agency air quality regulatory activities; and 3 requiring the administration to undertake a study identifying all regulatory activity that the 4 Environmental Protection Agency intends to undertake in furtherance of its goal of "taking action 5 on climate change and improving air quality" and specifying the cumulative effect of all these 6 regulations on the economy, jobs, and American economic competitiveness; and 7 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that this study be a multiagency study drawing on the 8 expertise of the Environmental Protection Agency and of agencies and departments having 9 expertise and responsibility for the economy and the electric system and should provide an 10 objective cost-benefit analysis of all of the Environmental Protection Agency's current and 11 planned regulation together; and 12 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Secretary of State forward copies of this resolution 13 to the President of the United States, the Majority Leader of the United States Senate, the 14 Minority Leader of the United States Senate, the Majority Leader of the United States House of 15 Representatives, the Minority Leader of the United States House of Representatives, the 16 Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the administrator of the Environmental 17 Protection Agency, the director of the federal Office of Management and Budget, and to each 18 member of the North Dakota Congressional Delegation.
