- 1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the agriculture
- 2 commissioner; to create and enact a new section to chapter 19-13.1 of the North Dakota
- 3 Century Code, relating to license, inspection, and registration fees; to amend and reenact
- 4 section 4-01-21 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the salary of the agriculture
- 5 commissioner; to provide for transfers; to provide for a legislative management study of the milk
- 6 marketing board; and to provide an exemption.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the agriculture commissioner for the purpose of defraying the expenses of that agency, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015, as follows:

15	MINOR USE PESTICIDE FUND. The agriculture commissioner shall transfer \$325,000 from the					
16	environment and rangeland protection fund to the minor use pesticide fund during the biennium					
17	beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015.					
18	SECTION 4. ESTIMATED INCOME - ENVIRONMENT AND RANGELAND PROTECTION					
19	FUND. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$6,122,681,					
20	or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the environment and rangeland protection					
21	fund for the purpose of defraying the expenses of various department of agriculture programs,					
22	for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015.					
23	SECTION 5. ESTIMATED INCOME - GAME AND FISH FUND. The estimated income line

1 SECTION 7. EXEMPTION - JOHNE'S DISEASE CONTROL. The amount appropriated for 2 Johne's disease control in section 1 of chapter 35 of the 2011 Session Laws is not subject to 3 section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended appropriations may be continued into the biennium 4 beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015. 5 SECTION 8. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE OFFICE LEASE - TERMINATION. The 6 agriculture commissioner shall terminate any lease of office space off of the capitol grounds if 7 sufficient office space on the capitol grounds is provided to the department of agriculture by the 8 office of management and budget for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30. 9 2015. 10 **SECTION 9. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-21 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended 11 and reenacted as follows: 12 4-01-21. Salary of agriculture commissioner. 13 The annual salary of the agriculture commissioner is ninety-two thousand eight hundred-14 twenty-sixninety-nine thousand four hundred thirty-five dollars through June 30, 20122014, and 15 ninety-five thousand six hundred tenone hundred three thousand four hundred twelve dollars 16 thereafter. 17 SECTION 10. A new section to chapter 19-13.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is 18 created and enacted as follows: 19 Deposit of fees. 20 The commissioner shall forward all inspection fees, license fees, and registration fees 21 received under this chapter to the state treasurer. The state treasurer shall deposit the fees 22 received under this chapter in the environment and rangeland protection fund. 23 SECTION 11. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - MILK MARKETING BOARD. 24 During the 2013-14 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the structure of 25 the milk marketing board; its statutory duties; the manner in which it prescribes and regulates 26 producer, distributor, and retail prices throughout the state; and the manner in which it 27 investigates and resolves concerns regarding the price and availability of milk throughout the 28 state. If conducted, the study must review any policy or regulatory changes that the board has 29 implemented in order to address pricing issues and availability of milk in the western portion of 30 this state. The study must examine whether the continued regulation of the grade A dairy 31 industry is best accomplished by the milk marketing board in its current form and operating

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- 1 under its current statutory directives, whether changes are needed to the board or its statutory
- 2 directives, and whether there are other methods by which the desired results could be
- 3 effectively and efficiently achieved. The legislative management shall report its findings and
- 4 recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to
- 5 the sixty-fourth legislative assembly.
