

JOURNAL OF THE SENATE**Sixty-third Legislative Assembly**

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Bismarck, January 11, 2013

The Senate convened at 12:30 p.m., with President Wrigley presiding.

The prayer was offered by Reverend Larue Goetz, Revival Prayer Fellowship, Bismarck.

The roll was called and all members were present except Senators Dotzenrod, Grabinger, Grindberg, Holmberg, G. Lee, and J. Lee.

A quorum was declared by the President.

MOTION

SEN. KLEIN MOVED that a committee of two be appointed to escort Commander Douglas V. Gordon to the rostrum.

The President appointed Sens. Lyson and Robinson, which motion prevailed.

**REMARKS OF COMMANDER DOUGLAS V. GORDON
UNITED STATES NAVY, COMMANDING OFFICER, USS NORTH DAKOTA**

Mr. President, members of the Senate, and friends of the USS North Dakota. Thank you so very much for allowing me to be here and take this opportunity to address this prestigious body. I know you are busy and have a lot of things to do but I'd like to tell you a few updates on the ship.

First of all, I have had the best support that I have ever had on board a submarine from the state of North Dakota. The support the state has given to the ship has been absolutely outstanding. My crew definitely understands that the state is behind the crew and behind the ship. This is demonstrated through several examples. The state has supported us through several of the ship's functions, they have sent care packages and Christmas cards to my sailors. They have sent welcome aboard packages to the newly reporting crew members and probably most of all is the opportunity, on five different occasions, to bring members of my crew out to the North Dakota to discuss the North Dakota and to spread the good word on the good ship.

I look forward to continuing the efforts and relationship that we have built with the state, and I can not wait to go to commissioning in 2014. The USS North Dakota will be the eleventh Virginia Class ship built and it will be the first Block Three Design ship. When she is delivered in March, 2014, she will be the most technologically capable submarine in the world. She'll be able to exceed depths of 800 feet at speeds of over 25 knots. And she will do this all without having to be refueled for the lifespan of 33 years.

The ship is physically constructed in four separate modules. The bow module contains the control room and the torpedo room. The second module is the habitability module, the third is the forward injury module and lastly the stern module.

The ship is currently about 80% complete. They are taking the last, the bow section, which will be moved into place next week and welded to the rest of the ship. When the welding is complete, the ship will be pressure hold complete and the ship will actually look like a real submarine from the outside. There is still a lot of work to be done on the inside. As they pair the modules together, there are a lot of electrical cabling and mechanical systems that have to be connected across those modules. The ship is on track to be finished in March of 2014, just sixty months after beginning construction.

The crew is the lifeblood of the ship and I have some of the best crew members on board the ship that I remember having ever served on board a ship. I have 123 of my crew members that have currently reported, and over the next three or four months the rest of them will report to bring my whole compliment to 135 sailors. They really are great sailors. Some

examples are: I have had the opportunity, over the last year, to advance 45 individuals, I've conducted 15 re-enlistments, and my crew has amassed almost 1000 hours of community service. They have come from a vast variety of experience. I have about 76 sailors on board that have served on a previous submarine before and of those 15 have served on a Virginia Class.

My number one priority for the ship and the crew is to train the crew and be ready to take them to sea in January, 2014 on sea trials. In order to do this we have to train the sailors. To do this we have classroom and computer based training. Ultimately we would like to send them to sea on another submarine, preferably a Virginia Class so they get some experience standing watch on board on the ship.

The last thing I would like to leave you with is the schedule ahead for the ship. It is a very busy schedule for us and I will give you a highlight of some of the things we are going to encounter over the next year and a half. The ship will be pressure hold complete in the first week of February, we will have been doing land based steaming testing. Float off will occur in September of this year which is the first time the ship will hit the water. Shortly after that, the Christening Ceremony will take place, and I hope to see some of you there. Next will be initial criticality, the first time we take the reactor critical. As you can imagine, that is a big deal for us and will happen sometime around October. Habitability will take place in November, and we will be able to eat and sleep on board. Sea trials will take place in January of 2014 and we will go out for a week and a half and put the ship through its paces. Finally, delivery, in March of 2014. Our last big ceremony for us is the Commissioning Ceremony and will happen around June of 2014 at a location and date to be determined.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that each employee of the Sixty-third Legislative Assembly is entitled to an additional \$1 per day for each previous regular session of the Legislative Assembly during which that employee was paid for at least 45 days, as either an employee of the House or the Senate, and to receive this additional compensation, which may not exceed \$10 per day, that employee must certify to the Legislative Council the year of each regular session during which that employee was employed as required by this resolution; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that each majority and each minority leader is entitled to one administrative assistant and two staff assistants, but each majority or minority leader may hire fewer or more assistants so long as the total daily compensation for the assistants hired does not exceed the total daily amount authorized for those positions by this resolution; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the report of the Employment Committee of the respective house identify the number of employees in each position by listing every employee and the position for which employed; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that with the approval of the Employment Committee of the respective house, a position may be converted to a part-time position, with the daily compensation converted to a per hour rate of pay, and a part-time employee may hold more than one part-time position so long as the positions held do not exceed a full-time equivalent position; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that if any employee resigns, is discharged, or for other reasons terminates employment, the compensation provided by this resolution for that employee ceases effective the last day of employment.
