REMARKS OF NORTH DAKOTA UNITED STATES SENATOR HEIDI HEITKAMP

Mr. President and Members of the Chamber:

Thank you so much for this wonderful opportunity to return home. My love of North Dakota and my love of North Dakota politics began on this side of the Statehouse. I started my interest in state government back when I was a bill status reporter in the 1977 Legislative Session. That was the beginning of computerization and I think Jack McDonald, who is an old friend, will remember the days when we sat in the chamber on the floor and were able to watch as a citizen legislature did the job for the people of their state. You may not always agree with the outcome, but we know that true democracy happens in rooms like this all across the country. So it is with some amount of sadness that I report to you that Washington doesn't quite work this way. Washington is not quite the place that the North Dakota Legislature is, where you debate, consider, and don't always agree, but you make decisions. We struggle everyday to do what you do here, almost effortlessly, which is resolve controversy and move on. I would like to give you a brief report and wish you well as you deliberate, as you consider all of the issues that are confronting the state of North Dakota. I think you know that a great deal of those issues involve partnership with the United States Government.

I would like to start by giving you a list of things that we think are important. By we, I am speaking about the entire Congressional Delegation. The great thing about North Dakota is that, regardless of party, we know how to work together to get the job done. Job number one for us in North Dakota is getting a farm bill and making sure that farm bill moves forward. It is essential to do risk mitigation in our farm policy. The good news is that we are led in the Senate by a wonderful leader by the name of Debbie Stabenow. When people ask why I have such great hope for a farm bill, I say "Have you met Debbie Stabenow, because she is someone that knows how to move this effort along". We will be marking up a farm bill, I think, sometime in April, and hopefully resolving it, voting on it and getting it crossed over to the House. What I'm hopeful about is that the House will feel the same sense of urgency that we felt in marking up the Senate farm bill and that we will be in conference. The good news for North Dakota is that I have been honored with a gavel. I am currently the Subcommittee Chair for Rural Development. If the farm bill goes to conference, I will be on the Conference Committee. I want you to know, my priorities will be: crop insurance, crop insurance, crop insurance; making sure that the conservation programs don't run over our farmers; making sure that we have an energy title that works for our state, which is all of the above in energy, and also making sure that we do not leave behind our opportunity to export and research.

The second issue I would like to talk about is the issue of energy. Most of you know that I have spent a number of years on the North Dakota Industrial Commission and before that as your State Tax Commissioner. I am well familiar with the challenges of the oil and gas industry in our state and also more concerned about the challenges looking forward in Washington, DC. The challenges for oil and gas, in Washington, nowhere compare to the challenges for our coal industry. As we look at cheaper forms of natural gas, new developments in shale production for natural gas, it is creating a challenge for our coal industry. I believe that an energy policy that represents all of the above, that includes coal, is the right decision for America. It is not an easy thing to promote in Washington, DC. You have my undying efforts in making sure that we have a policy that includes all of North Dakota's wonderful resources, including coal.

I would like to talk about Indian Country. As you debate and as you talk about all of the great riches of North Dakota, and as we move forward in terms of employment and what we can do to grow our economy and diversify our economy, I urge you to work in partnership with Tribal Governments and with the Federal Government to make sure we leave no North Dakota citizen behind, make sure that we are respectful in a government-to-government way, and that we begin to address the unique issues that we have in making sure that our state government, our local governments and our federal government are providing a true safety net and a true web of public security for people living on the reservation.

I currently serve on the Banking and Housing Committee. There are two main issues in North Dakota to solve. First is water, making sure that we take care of ourselves when we have too much, but making sure that we never be too short. I know that these are challenges for the eastern part of the state, in terms of municipal and industrial water development. We are working everyday to try and secure our rights to the Missouri River, trying to secure our rights to our future development opportunities using that great resource and using the lake that we have. If we move beyond that and we talk about the other challenge, it is in housing. We have a situation now where we are the beneficiaries in terms of a work force and what is happening across the rest of the country. I, like many of you, have visited a lot of the workers' camps and a lot of the new workers we have in oil country. As soon as the economy improves at home, I wonder where they are going to live. I wonder where they are going to go. I wonder where we are going to find the workers for the next generation, the next iteration of the Bakken, if we do not provide housing, if we do not provide community. We are not attractive as a place to locate. Senator John Hoeven and I are doing a series of meetings across the state. It has been a great partnership with Senator Hoeven, for me. We are being joined by housing and economical experts across our great state who are offering ideas. I know that you have a number of pending measures here, in housing. I urge you to consider great flexibility in those as we move forward, because without a home, without an opportunity to bring your family, we surely will suffer the consequence in terms of workforce development.

Lastly, I would like to talk about where we are with sequestration and where we are with the past commitments the federal government has made. Too often we talk about something as if it has been authorized, that the job is done, and we all know we need an appropriation. In these trying times with a budget that is almost 16 trillion dollars, a debt in this country, a deficit that is just below a trillion dollars, and all time low interest rates, yet we are still spending. The third biggest expenditure we have in the federal government is interest on our debt. We cannot afford to continue to do what we are doing. It means we are going to have to be more innovative. We are going to have to be more collaborative. I want to offer all of you the hand of friendship, the hand of cooperation, as we move forward in this work that we have to do for our great state, in making sure that the next generation will look back on all of us - whether you are a leader in this body or you are a leader in the United States Senate - with great pride - that we squared our shoulders, as Barbara Mikulski said, "Put on our lipstick", and went out and fought for our state.

Thank you so much for letting me come. Thank you so much for all the great work you do for the state of North Dakota. I appreciate this opportunity to visit with you.
