REPORT OF DELAYED BILLS COMMITTEE

MR. PRESIDENT: Your **Delayed Bills Committee (Sen. Klein, Chairman)** has cast a vote of 3 YEAS, 2 NAYS, 0 ABSENT AND NOT VOTING in favor of rejecting the introduction of a concurrent resolution urging Congress to enact comprehensive immigration reform that provides for earned legalization with a path to citizenship; updating future immigration of families and workers; and improving immigration enforcement and border security that is consistent with our nation's values.

The department of human services for foster care licenses and <u>approvals</u> under chapter 50-11, appointments of legal guardians under chapter 50-11.3, and petitions for adoptions under chapter 50-12, except that the criminal history record investigation must be conducted in accordance with those chapters. A criminal history record investigation completed under chapter 50-11, 50-11.3, or 50-12 may be used to satisfy the requirements of a criminal history record investigation under either of the other two chapters."

SECTION 16. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - ELECTRONIC HEALTH RECORDS. Because the electronic health records system is needed for the state hospital to maintain accreditation, the removal of the funding in the information technology division does not preclude the department of human services from procuring an electronic health records system if the department can initiate the project within its 2013-15 biennium appropriation for the information technology division or field services division.

SECTION 17. APPROPRIATION - DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$100,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, and from special funds, derived from private gifts and grants, the sum of \$150,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of commerce for the purpose of funding the activities of the health care consortium under section 18 of this Act, as part of the North Dakota 2020 and beyond initiative, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015. The department of commerce may spend funding from the general fund only to the extent special funds from private gifts and grants are received on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

SECTION 18. HEALTH CARE CONSORTIUM - REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNOR.

- The governor shall appoint a consortium that includes a broad scope of 1. private sector stakeholders, members of the senate and the house of representatives, and representation from the statewide vision and strategy partnership for a healthier North Dakota and the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences advisory council. The consortium shall receive and review information provided by the statewide vision and strategy partnership for a healthier North Dakota and the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences advisory council, including the second annual report of the council. The consortium shall provide direct input to the legislative management interim committee that conducts the study provided for under House Bill No. 1034, as approved by the sixty-third legislative assembly. The consortium shall focus its efforts on addressing the immediate needs and challenges of the North Dakota health care delivery system, implementing the healthy North Dakota initiative, examining medicaid reform, and developing a plan for a private health care model that will comply with federal health care reform in a manner that will provide high quality, accessible, and affordable care for North Dakota citizens.
- 2. In developing the model health care system, the health care consortium shall:
 - Consider population shifts, facility needs, personnel needs, rural access, regulatory public health functions, and vulnerable populations.
 - b. Determine the scope of the weaknesses in the current health care system and the scope of the model health care system.
 - c. Take into account the ongoing impact that federal health care reform under the federal Affordable Care Act is having on state delivery of health care and on state delivery of medicaid.
 - Work to forge partnerships with federal payers and regulators in order to work toward addressing medical reimbursement system reform.

- 3. The department of commerce shall contract with a consultant to assist the health care consortium in developing a model health care system as required under subsection 2.
- 4. The health care consortium shall report to the budget section of the legislative management on the status of funding available and anticipated uses of the funding for the consortium during the 2013-14 interim. Before June 1, 2014, the health care consortium shall report to the governor and to the legislative management on the status of the development of the model health care system as well as any recommendations.

SECTION 19. APPROPRIATION - DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$146,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of human services for the purpose of defraying the expenses relating to the treatment of individuals addicted to controlled substances, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015."

SECTION 16. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - ELECTRONIC HEALTH RECORDS.

Because the electronic health records system is needed for the state hospital to maintain accreditation, the removal of the funding in the information technology division does not preclude the department of human services from procuring an electronic health records system if the department can initiate the project within its

2013-15 biennium appropriation for the information technology division or field services division.

SECTION 17. APPROPRIATION - DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$100,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, and from special funds, derived from private gifts and grants, the sum of \$150,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of commerce for the purpose of funding the activities of the health care consortium under section 18 of this Act, as part of the North Dakota 2020 and beyond initiative, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015. The department of commerce may spend funding from the general fund only to the extent special funds from private gifts and grants are received on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

SECTION 18. HEALTH CARE CONSORTIUM - REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNOR.

- The governor shall appoint a consortium that includes a broad scope of 1. private sector stakeholders, members of the senate and the house of representatives, and representation from the statewide vision and strategy partnership for a healthier North Dakota and the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences advisory council. The consortium shall receive and review information provided by the statewide vision and strategy partnership for a healthier North Dakota and the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences advisory council, including the second annual report of the council. The consortium shall provide direct input to the legislative management interim committee that conducts the study provided for under House Bill No. 1034, as approved by the sixty-third legislative assembly. The consortium shall focus its efforts on addressing the immediate needs and challenges of the North Dakota health care delivery system, implementing the healthy North Dakota initiative, examining medicaid reform, and developing a plan for a private health care model that will comply with federal health care reform in a manner that will provide high quality, accessible, and affordable care for North Dakota citizens.
- 2. In developing the model health care system, the health care consortium shall:
 - Consider population shifts, facility needs, personnel needs, rural access, regulatory public health functions, and vulnerable populations.
 - b. Determine the scope of the weaknesses in the current health care system and the scope of the model health care system.
 - c. Take into account the ongoing impact that federal health care reform under the federal Affordable Care Act is having on state delivery of health care and on state delivery of medicaid.
 - d. Work to forge partnerships with federal payers and regulators in order to work toward addressing medical reimbursement system reform.
- 3. The department of commerce shall contract with a consultant to assist the health care consortium in developing a model health care system as required under subsection 2.
- 4. The health care consortium shall report to the budget section of the legislative management on the status of funding available and anticipated uses of the funding for the consortium during the 2013-14 interim. Before June 1, 2014, the health care consortium shall report to the governor and to the legislative management on the status of the development of the model health care system as well as any recommendations.

SECTION 19. APPROPRIATION. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$1,100,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, and from federal funds the sum of \$1,100,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of human services for the purpose of defraying operating expenses departmentwide and at the human service centers, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015.

SECTION 20. APPROPRIATION. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$1,243,082, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, the sum of \$159,349,321, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of human services for the purpose of funding the following initiatives, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015. The department of human services is authorized four full-time equivalent positions.

The removal of the full-time equivalent position in the administration and support division does not preclude the department of human services from employing a deputy director. The department may use an existing full-time equivalent position for the purpose of a deputy director position.

SECTION 16. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - ELECTRONIC HEALTH RECORDS.

Because the electronic health records system is needed for the state hospital to maintain accreditation, the removal of the funding in the information technology division does not preclude the department of human services from procuring an electronic health records system if the department can initiate the project within its 2013-15 biennium appropriation for the information technology division or field services division.

SECTION 17. APPROPRIATION - DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$100,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, and from special funds, derived from private gifts and grants, the sum of \$150,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of commerce for the purpose of funding the activities of the health care consortium under section 18 of this Act, as part of the North Dakota 2020 and beyond initiative, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015. The department of commerce may spend funding from the general fund only to the extent special funds from private gifts and grants are received on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

SECTION 18. HEALTH CARE CONSORTIUM - REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNOR.

- 1. The governor shall appoint a consortium that includes a broad scope of private sector stakeholders, members of the senate and the house of representatives, and representation from the statewide vision and strategy partnership for a healthier North Dakota and the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences advisory council. The consortium shall receive and review information provided by the statewide vision and strategy partnership for a healthier North Dakota and the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences advisory council, including the second annual report of the council. The consortium shall provide direct input to the legislative management interim committee that conducts the study provided for under House Bill No. 1034, as approved by the sixty-third legislative assembly. The consortium shall focus its efforts on addressing the immediate needs and challenges of the North Dakota health care delivery system, implementing the healthy North Dakota initiative, examining medicaid reform, and developing a plan for a private health care model that will comply with federal health care reform in a manner that will provide high quality, accessible, and affordable care for North Dakota citizens.
- 2. In developing the model health care system, the health care consortium shall:
 - Consider population shifts, facility needs, personnel needs, rural access, regulatory public health functions, and vulnerable populations.
 - b. Determine the scope of the weaknesses in the current health care system and the scope of the model health care system.
 - c. Take into account the ongoing impact that federal health care reform under the federal Affordable Care Act is having on state delivery of health care and on state delivery of medicaid.
 - d. Work to forge partnerships with federal payers and regulators in order to work toward addressing medical reimbursement system reform.
- 3. The department of commerce shall contract with a consultant to assist the health care consortium in developing a model health care system as required under subsection 2.
- 4. The health care consortium shall report to the budget section of the legislative management on the status of funding available and anticipated uses of the funding for the consortium during the 2013-14 interim. Before June 1, 2014, the health care consortium shall report to the governor and to the legislative management on the status of the development of the model health care system as well as any recommendations.

SECTION 19. APPROPRIATION - DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE -STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the strategic investment and improvements fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$6,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of commerce for the purpose of administering a grant program for nursing homes, basic care facilities, and providers that serve individuals with developmental disabilities located in oil-producing counties to address the effects of oil and gas and related economic development activities, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015. The department of commerce shall allocate funding in January of each year of the biennium, based on the number of full-time equivalent positions of each nursing home, facility, or provider as determined by the department of human services. The annual allocation for each full-time equivalent position may not exceed \$90 per month. When setting rates for the entities receiving grants under this section, the department of human services shall exclude grant income received under this section as an offset to costs. This funding is considered one-time funding for the

2013-15 biennium. The department of commerce shall report to the legislative management during the 2013-14 interim and to the appropriations committees of the sixty-fourth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding. For purposes of this section, an "oil-producing county" means a county that received an allocation of funding under section 57-51-15 for the preceding state fiscal year.

SECTION 20. APPROPRIATION - DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES -STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the strategic investment and improvements fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$10,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of human services for the purpose of administering a grant program for critical access hospitals in oil-producing counties and in counties contiguous to an oil-producing county to address the effects of oil and gas and related economic development activities, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015. The department of human services shall develop policies and procedures for the disbursement of the grant funding and may not award more than \$5,000,000 during each year of the biennium. The department of human services shall allocate funding in January of each year of the biennium. This funding is considered one-time funding for the 2013-15 biennium. The department of human services shall report to the legislative management during the 2013-14 interim and to the appropriations committees of the sixty-fourth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding. For the purposes of this section, an "oil-producing county" means a county that received an allocation of funding under section 57-51-15 of more than \$500,000 for the preceding state fiscal year.

Flakoll, a native of Forbes, ND was first elected to the Senate in 1998. Flakoll has served on the Senate Education committee for 8 sessions including service as Chairman and Vice-chair. He chaired the Senate Agriculture committee for 10 years.

In the interim, Flakoll has served on Legislative Management and many interim committees including the Governor's Commission on Education Improvement and the Roundtable for Higher Education which have produced legacy legislation which garnered national awards. He has served as either commissioner or on the executive committee of the Midwestern Higher Education Compact for the past 14 years.

Flakoll has sponsored 246 bills with more than 150 individual legislators in his 8 sessions. Those bills include landmark legislation in education, agriculture and community safety. He is a visionary and transformational leader who is considered by many to be North Dakota's foremost expert on P-20 education. He has a passion for education and a reputation for understanding how to successfully move policies forward. He has earned teaching and advising awards in higher education and has authored or co-authored more than 70 publications.

Flakoll currently serves as co-chair of the Council of State Governments Midwest Agriculture and Natural Resources committee and is the President Elect of that organization. He has been an inclusive and consensus building leader who has held more than 30 offices with various community, state and national organizations.

Professionally Senator Flakoll has served on the NDSU faculty, was VP and General Manager of the Fargo Moorhead Red Hawks minor league baseball team and has successfully served as Provost for Tri-College University for the past six years.

SEN. TRIPLETT: Mr. President, I move the nomination of Senator Phil Murphy as interim President Pro Tem. Sen. Murphy was appointed in December 2010 to fill a vacancy in the Senate position from District 20. He was elected for a full four-year term in November 2012 and is now serving in his second session. He has proven himself to be an exceptionally well-qualified legislator.

Sen. Murphy brings a wealth of experience to the Senate. He is a high school teacher in his home district of Mayville-Portland-Clifford-Galesburg, where he teaches a variety of civics and social studies classes, which means he knows quite a bit about how legislation should be made, and now he's learning first-hand how it really works.

He has served as the president of his school district education association so he knows a something about negotiating teacher contracts. He has been a township officer for 20 years which means he understands the importance of road maintenance. He is a volunteer firefighter so he knows the strains that are placed on volunteer systems when all of the volunteers are also trying to earn a living. He and his delightful wife, Michelle, have three grown children so he understands the cost of a college education.

Did I mention that Sen. Murphy is also the golf coach for the Mayport-CG school system? Being good at golfing is an important attribute for a state legislator. I know that because I don't golf and it has proven to be quite a handicap, Mr. President. We are discussing the election of an interim President Pro Tem, to serve during the off season. Sen. Murphy is especially well-suited for this position because he doesn't teach over summer. So he will always be available for special sessions in the summers if only he can get out of his hammock. Sen. Murphy hosted the first-ever Senate Democrat caucus book club meeting, which proves beyond a shadow of a doubt that he is exceedingly well-read. Mr. President, being able to read is a bona fide occupational qualification for serving as President Pro Tem of this august body. I can assure the body that Sen. Murphy can read. Something else you should know about Sen. Murphy is that he is a wonderful chef. I don't believe that being a wonderful chef is actually a requirement for this job, but in honor of Sen. Murphy's real chef's jacket.

Finally, Mr. President, Sen. Murphy is a master of delivering puns on the Senate floor with a perfect dead-pan expression. We have all come to appreciate your own brand of self-deprecating humor, Mr. President, as you preside over the Senate, and if elected, I believe that Senator Murphy will carry on your tradition.

That feeling of honor is only heightened by the remarks of my friend, Senator Triplett, as I know of no finer mind in this body of distinguished public servants. Seeing as how the tradition of each candidate voting for the opponent does not extend to each caucus member voting for the other side's candidate, I hereby move to cast a unanimous ballot for my Agriculture Committee chairman from last session. A man who knows how to move a meeting along, Senator Flakoll of District 44, for Interim President Pro Tempore.

REMARKS OF PRESIDENT PRO TEMPORE FLAKOLL

Mr. President, Senator Murphy, fellow Senators, friends at the front desk, friend Renae Doan in the Leader's office and friends in the back of the chamber and watching on line. Thank you Senator Grindberg for your kind words of nomination. I am greatly honored at this once in a lifetime opportunity to serve as your President Pro Tempore. Likewise it is my honor to have served the great residents of north Fargo since 1998. I would also like to acknowledge some of my long-time friends who are here today to witness this celebratory event.

1)Governor Dalrymple - former President of Senate

2)My former colleagues Rep. Don Clark (wife Judi) who is in the balcony I served many years. Rep. Blair Thoreson from District 44 is currently acting on important legislation on the floor of the House at this time.

3)Former Senator and current Public Service Commissioner Randy Christmann

I am richly blessed to have members of my family here. My Mother Wilma, Father Alden from Forbes, ND and Sister Joan Eliason who flew up from Grand Island, Nebraska to be with us. Throughout my life, my family has always been there for me and we celebrate together on days like today, we fight fights together against cancer and other challenges and we mourn together, like at the death of my brother Paul, who lost his cancer battle during Christmas time in 2005. This for me is an opportunity to say thanks to you and those who have helped

shape my life and helped me to be here.

In addition to my family, I think of three people whose impact has led me to the Senate and this position. Like my grade school and high school teacher, Mrs. Ruth Redlin, who taught me to not fear to try anything. In a school with 34 kids in high school everyone had to participate if we wanted to have a team, a school play or other activities. To Mr. Mark Thielges, who was my baseball coach for many years and helped instill in me the drive to do my best. For him, it did not matter if you were the best on your team, or in the league, or in the state if you were not your best and were not reaching your full potential. I also think of the late Mr. Merle Light, my college advisor and professor, who helped me believe in myself and the value of having people respect you as a professional.

Who a person is, often reflects a person's genetics and environment and I received a double dose of goodness from my family. They all have a history of being engaged in activities to better their communities. There are many things I admire about my father, but two I will mention are his honesty and his positive approach to people. As a youngster my Mom told me the story about Dad, who had bought the family a three-wheeler. When reconciling his checkbook he found out he had inadvertently made the check out for \$6.43 instead of \$643. The dealership, who oddly enough was called Honest John's, did not catch the mistake and processed the check, so they were surprised when Dad came to them to explain the error and offer a check for the remaining difference. We sometimes think kids aren't paying attention to their roll models, but that example reminds me that they are.

The second thing about Dad is that for all of the years I have known him, has never spoke ill of any person. Regardless what that person has said or done. Of course we all know the real test would be what he might say after getting out of a conference committee with the House.

My Mom arranged to have the flowers in the chamber today to brighten the chamber, just like she brightens every room that she is in. From my Mom, I think I got her sense of humor and her competitive drive. Last night Mom told me if I told a story about her she was going to get up and run out of the chamber. Well, Senator Miller get ready, you might get run over again.

Our family lived with the philosophy that you don't take a fall when playing a game because that cheapens the victory for the kids or anyone else. To share a quick story, in August of 1997, my Mom was scheduled to have open heart surgery in Fargo so the family gathered at my house the night before the surgery. The night before the surgery we played cards because that is something we all enjoy. That night Mom had an incredibly hot hand and was not only winning every game of whist, but also seemingly every hand. That next morning we were all at the hospital for this somber event. We all recognized that with open heart surgery they have to stop the heart for the surgery and restart it, and a certain percentage of these surgeries are fatal. We progressed from check-in to surgery prep to the point where we were all standing by Mom's surgery gurney outside the double doors leading to the surgery room. Truly a time when you struggle with words as you share expressions of love. There was a short period of silence, when suddenly Mom broke the silence with a glare and a pointed question. She looked us firmly in the eyes and said "you didn't just let me win last night because I was having heart surgery today did you?" That explains her competitive spirit. She was so competitive that she did not like anyone taking a dive for her even though it might be her last day on earth. She wanted to win, as she always wants to win, but she wanted to win straight up without anyone taking a fall. True to tradition no one had let her win.

My sister Joan is, in my eyes, a reflection of all of the best parts of Mom and Dad. She has a photographic-like memory and if she ever met you, she will likely be able to tell you what you wore that day, where you sat and maybe what you ate if it was over a meal. She is a wonderful mother and the type of person everyone would like to hire. You only have to ask her to do something once and never have to worry about it not getting done in a timely and quality manner. By the way, if my sister asks, please say "yes Tim's desk area is always as clean and organized as it is today."

Of course our family cannot gather on a day like today without thinking of my late brother Paul. My brother is my hero and has been the person I always wanted to be just like. Paul was a leader's leader and one of the brightest people you would have ever met. He was said to be one of the top ten clinical nutritionists in the World. In addition to his leadership at Vanderbilt University and Iowa State he was a consultant for many organizations including Major League Baseball, National Basketball Association, National Hockey League and the U.S. Marines as well as companies in Italy and Japan. He was a research reviewer for numerous organizations and publications, including the National Institute of Health and the American Journal of Physiology. His research has resulted in the betterment of life for aging and diseased human adults. While he was off the chart brilliant, I liked the fact that he wore his intelligence like a watch. Not for public display, but for his own use. While the world misses him as a professional, I miss him as a person.

Two events early on in my Senate career led me to think that I would like this place. In my first few days of my first term, one of my colleagues on the Education committee lost their wife. Based on the profession and focused way he managed that, along with his Senate duties and the way fellow Senators came together to support him, I knew this place was filled with people who had their heart in the right place.

The second event was after a hearing in the Education committee. Chairman Layton Freborg, the "Old Master", walked up to me as we left the Missouri River room and put his arm on my shoulder and said "Flak" you might not want to vote for that last bill. It is not good for the people you represent. Now I knew that Senator Freborg wanted the bill to pass, but for him to protect me from making a freshman blunder, forever endured him to me.

While the duties of the position are not onerous, all of you know that I will look forward to my work on the select committee that filters applicants both new and existing, to the Board of Higher Education.

The people who have elected us are expecting great things this session and I know that with the collective wisdom of this group of Senators we can deliver.

Thank you again for this honor that you have bestowed on me and to my family for joining me today. May God continue to bless this chamber and the State of North Dakota.

- A section added by the House to provide that total Fargo flood control project funding to be provided by the state not exceed \$325 million.
- Sections added by the House directing the State Water Commission to study the use of ring dikes as part of a flood protection plan for the city of Fargo and water supply needs in the Red River Valley.
- A section added by the House to require the State Water Commission to adopt policies regarding project development and financing.
- A section added by the House which increases the membership of the Water-Related Topics Overview Committee and directs the committee to prepare a water project priority schedule to be included in the committee's final report to the Legislative Management.
- A section added by the House to require the State Water Commission to move information technology hardware to the Information Technology Department secure data center.
- A section added by the House to require the State Water Commission to report to the Budget Section within 90 days of any changes made to the water project priority list presented to the Legislative Assembly in 2013.
- The requirement that the State Water Commission receive Budget Section approval prior to spending any additional funds that may become available in the resources trust fund or water development trust fund during the 2013-15 biennium.

In addition, this amendment:

Adds a section to provide for a \$40 million loan from the Bank of North Dakota to the

Western Area Water Supply Authority for construction of the project, which is declared an emergency measure.

- Adds a section to provide that funds designated by the Legislative Assembly for Fargo flood control are available only for levee and dike protection until the project receives federal authorization, a project partnership agreement is executed, and there is a federal appropriation for construction. In addition, the budget for the Fargo flood control project must be approved by the State Water Commission.
- Adds a section of legislative intent that the state provide one-half of the local costshare of constructing a federally authorized Fargo flood control project and that total Fargo flood control project funding not exceed \$450 million.
- Adds a section requiring the Fargo-Moorhead Area Diversion Authority reports to the Budget Section.
- Amends guidelines for Fargo flood control project expenditures included in a section added by the House to designate \$100 million for Fargo flood control projects. The guidelines are amended to match the guidelines approved by the 62nd and 61st Legislative Assemblies and to include levees and dikes.
- Allows the State Water Commission to use funding in the resources trust fund to pay off or defease outstanding bond issues when the balance in the resources trust fund exceeds \$287 million rather than \$515 million, as provided in the executive recommendation.

 - c. The extent to which completion of the project will provide a benefit to the state or regions within the state.
- 3. The commission shall approve projects and loans from the infrastructure loan fund, and the Bank of North Dakota shall manage and administer loans from the infrastructure loan fund and individual accounts in the fund. The commission may adopt policies for the review and approval of loans under this section. Loans made under this section must be made at an interest rate of one and one-half percent.
- 4. <u>Annually the Bank of North Dakota may deduct a service fee of one-half</u> of one percent for administering the infrastructure loan fund.

5. Projects not eligible for the state revolving fund will be given priority for these funds."

The legislative assembly declares that many areas and localities in western North Dakota do not enjoy adequate guantities of high-guality drinking water; that other areas and localities in western North Dakota do not have sufficient quantities of water to ensure a dependable, long-term domestic or industrial water supply; that greater economic security and the protection of health and property benefits the land, natural resources, and water resources of this state; and that the promotion of the prosperity and general welfare of all of the people of this state depend on the effective development and utilization of the land and water resources of this state and necessitates and requires the exercise of the sovereign powers of this state and concern a public purpose. To accomplish this public purpose, it is declared necessary that a water authority to treat, store, and distribute water to western North Dakota be established to provide for the supply and distribution of water to the people of western North Dakota for purposes, including domestic, rural water, municipal, livestock, industrial, oil and gas development, and other uses, and provide for the future economic welfare and prosperity of the people of this state, and particularly the people of western North Dakota, by the creation and development of a western area water supply project for beneficial and public uses. The western area water supply authority may acquire, construct, improve, develop, and own water supply infrastructure and may enter water supply contracts with member cities, water districts, and private users, such as oil and gas producers, for the sale of water for use within or outside the authority boundaries or the state. The western area water supply authority shall consider in the process of locating industrial water depots the location of private water sellers so as to minimize the impact on private water sellers. The independent water providers shall consider in the process of locating industrial water depots the location of private water sellers so as to minimize the impact on private water sellers.

SECTION 14. AMENDMENT. Section 61-40-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

61-40-02. Western area water supply authority.

The western area water supply authority consists of participating political subdivisions located within McKenzie, Williams, Burke, Divide, and Mountrail Counties which enter a water supply contract with the authority. Other cities and water systems, within or outside the authority counties' boundaries, including cities or water systems in Montana, may contract with the authority for a bulk water supply. The authority is a political subdivision of the state, a governmental agency, body politic and corporate, with the authority to exercise the powers specified in this chapter, or which may be reasonably implied. Participating member entities may be required to pay dues or water sale income to the authority, as determined by the bylaws and future resolutions of the authority. Participating member entities may not withdraw from the authority or fail or refuse to pay any water sale income to the authority if the twenty-five million dollar zero interest loan from the state water-commission has not been repaiduntil the state-guaranteed loans have been repaid. The provisions of subsections 1 through 5 of section 61-35-02.1 apply if the authority's board of directors unanimously votes to convert to a water district.

SECTION 15. AMENDMENT. Section 61-40-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

61-40-03. Western area water supply authority - Board of directors.

- The initial board of directors of the western area water supply authority consists of two representatives from each of the following entities: Williams rural water district, McKenzie County water resource district, the city of Williston, BDW water system association, and R&T water supply association. The governing body of each member entity shall select two representatives to the authority board who are water users of the member entity. If a vacancy arises for a member entity, the governing body of the member entity shall select a new representative to act on its behalf on the authority board. In addition, the state engineer or designeeis a voting member on the authority's board of directors. Directors have a term of one year and may be reappointed.
- 2. Additional political subdivisions or water systems may be given membership on the board upon two-thirds majority vote of the existing board. To be eligible for membership on the board, the member entity must first contract with the authority for financial participation in the project.
- 3. A member entity may designate an alternate representative to attend meetings and to act on the member's behalf. The board may designate associate members who are nonvoting members of the board. Notwithstanding this section, except for the state engineer or designee, initial board members must be removed if they have not entered a contract with the authority, before August 1, 2013, for financial participation in the project.

SECTION 16. AMENDMENT. Section 61-40-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

61-40-04. Board of directors - Officers - Meetings.

- 1. The board of directors shall adopt such rules and bylaws for the conduct of the business affairs of the authority as it determines necessary, including the time and place of regular meetings of the board, financial participation structure for membership in the authority, and membership appointment and changes. Bylaws need to be approved by member entity boards.
- 2. The board shall elect from its members a chairman and a vice chairman. The board shall elect a secretary and a treasurer, which offices may be held by the same individual, and either or both offices may be held by an individual who is not a member of the board. Special meetings of the board may be called by the secretary on order of the chairman or upon written request of a majority of the qualified members of the board. Notice of a special meeting must be mailed to each member of the board at least six days before the meeting, provided that a special meeting may be held at any time when all members of the board are present or consent in writing.
- 3. Board members are entitled to receive as compensation an amount determined by the board not to exceed the amount per day provided members of the legislative management under section 54-35-10 and must be reimbursed for their mileage and expenses in the amount provided for by sections 44-08-04 and 54-06-09.
- 4. The initial board bylaws must direct board voting protocol. A weightedvoting structure for board members is acceptable if the voting is basedupon the volume of water purchased, the financial contributions of the stakeholder entities, or any other formula agreed by a majority of the board.
- 5. Before the bylaws become effective, the bylaws must be reviewed and approved by the attorney general.

SECTION 17. AMENDMENT. Section 61-40-05 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

61-40-05. Authority of the western area water supply authority.

In addition to authority declared under section 61-40-01, the board of directors of the western area water supply authority may:

- 1. Sue and be sued in the name of the authority.
- 2. Exercise the power of eminent domain in the manner provided by title 32 or as described in this chapter for the purpose of acquiring and securing any right, title, interest, estate, or easement necessary or proper to carry out the duties imposed by this chapter, and particularly to acquire the necessary rights in land for the construction of an entire part of any pipeline, reservoir, connection, valve, pumping installation, or other facility for the storage, transportation, or utilization of water and all other appurtenant facilities used in connection with the authority. However, if the interest sought to be acquired is a right of way for any project authorized in this chapter, the authority, after making a written offer to purchase the right of way and depositing the amount of the offer with the clerk of the district court of the county in which the right of way is located. may take immediate possession of the right of way, as authorized by section 16 of article I of the Constitution of North Dakota. Within thirty days after notice has been given in writing to the landowner by the clerk of the district court that a deposit has been made for the taking of a right of way as authorized in this subsection, the owner of the property taken may appeal to the district court by serving a notice of appeal upon the acquiring agency, and the matter must be tried at the next regular or special term of court with a jury unless a jury be waived, in the manner prescribed for trials under chapter 32-15.
- 3. Accept funds, property, services, pledges of security, or other assistance, financial or otherwise, from federal, state, and other public or private sources for the purpose of aiding and promoting the construction, maintenance, and operation of the authority. The authority may cooperate and contract with the state or federal government, or any department or agency of state or federal government, or any city, water district, or water system within the authority, in furnishing assurances and meeting local cooperation requirements of any project involving treatment, control, conservation, distribution, and use of water.
- 4. Cooperate and contract with the agencies or political subdivisions of this state or other states, in research and investigation or other activities promoting the establishment, construction, development, or operation of the authority.
- 5. Appoint and fix the compensation and reimbursement of expenses of employees as the board determines necessary to conduct the business and affairs of the authority and to procure the services of engineers and other technical experts, and to retain attorneys to assist, advise, and act for the authority in its proceedings.
- 6. Operate and manage the authority to distribute water to authority members and others within or outside the territorial boundaries of the authority and this state.
- 7. Hold, own, sell, or exchange any and all property purchased or acquired by the authority. All money received from any sale or exchange of property must be deposited to the credit of the authority and may be used to pay expenses of the authority.
- 8. Enter contracts to obtain a supply of bulk water through the purchase of infrastructure, bulk water sale or lease, which contracts may provide for payments to fund some or all of the authority's costs of acquiring,

constructing, or reconstructing one or more water supply or infrastructure.

- 9. Acquire, construct, improve, and own water supply infrastructure, office and maintenance space in phases, in any location, and at any time.
- 10. Enter contracts to provide for a bulk sale, lease, or other supply of water for beneficial use to persons within or outside the authority. The contracts may provide for payments to fund some or all of the authority's costs of acquiring, constructing, or reconstructing one or more water system projects, as well as the authority's costs of operating and maintaining one or more projects, whether the acquisition, construction, or reconstruction of any water supply project actually is completed and whether water actually is delivered pursuant to the contracts. The contracts the cities, water districts, and other entities that are members of the western area water supply authority are authorized to execute are without limitation on the term of years.
- 11. Borrow money as provided in this chapter.
- 12. Make all contracts, execute all instruments, and do all things necessary or convenient in the exercise of its powers or in the performance of its covenants or duties or in order to secure the payment of its obligations, but an encumbrance, mortgage, or other pledge of property of the authority may not be created by any contract or instrument.
- 13. Accept from any authorized state or federal agency loans or grants for the planning, construction, acquisition, lease, or other provision of a project, and enter agreements with the agency respecting the loans or grants. <u>Other than state-guaranteed loans, additional debt that may form</u> the basis of a claim for territorial or franchise protection for industrial water sales for oil and gas exploration and production may be acquired by the authority or member entities only upon approval by the industrial commission and the emergency commission.
- 14. Contract debts and borrow money, pledge property of the authority for repayment of indebtedness, and provide for payment of debts and expenses of the authority.
- 15. Operate and manage the authority to distribute water to any out-of-state cities or water systems that contract with the authority.
- 16. Accept, apply for, and hold water allocation permits.
- 17. Adopt rules concerning the planning, management, operation, maintenance, sale, and ratesetting regarding water sold by the authority. The authority may adopt a rate structure with elevated rates set for project industrial water <u>depot and lateral</u> supplies in recognition that a large component of the project expense is being incurred to meet the demands of industrial users. <u>The industrial water depot and lateral rate</u> structure must be approved in accordance with section 19 of this Act.
- 18. Develop water supply systems; store and transport water; and provide, contract for, and furnish water service for domestic, municipal, and rural water purposes; milling, manufacturing, mining, industrial, metallurgical, and any and all other beneficial uses; and fix the terms and rates therefore. The authority may acquire, construct, operate, and maintain dams, reservoirs, ground water storage areas, canals, conduits, pipelines, tunnels, and any and all treatment plants, works, facilities, improvements, and property necessary the same without any required public vote before taking action.
- 19. Contract to purchase or improve water supply infrastructure or to obtain bulk water supplies without requiring any vote of the public on the projects or contracts. In relation to the initial construction of the system

and for the purposes of entering a contract with the authority, municipalities are exempt from the public voting requirements or water contract duration limitations otherwise imposed by section 40-33-16.

20. Accept assignment by member entities of contracts that obligate member entities to provide a water supply, contracts that relate to construction of water system infrastructure, or other member entity contracts that relate to authorities transferred to the authority under this chapter.

SECTION 18. A new section to chapter 61-40 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Industrial water depot and lateral sales.

- 1. An accounting of industrial water depot and lateral sales collected and distributed by the authority must be reported to the industrial commission on a monthly basis. Participating member entities shall transfer industrial water depot and lateral sales to the authority within thirty days of receipt of the revenues. The boards of the authority and participating member entities must be notified of the sweep of revenues; however, board approval is not required. Upon the receipt of industrial water depot and lateral revenues by the authority, the authority shall apply immediately all revenues each month in the following order:
 - a. One hundred fifty thousand dollars per biennium to the industrial commission for one additional full-time equivalent position to implement this Act.
 - b. Reimburse the authority for industrial water depot capital improvements and the cost for delivery of potable or nonpotable water sold at industrial water depots and lateral lines, at a cost no greater than the participating member, or submember, if applicable, entity rate at the location of the depot or lateral line.
 - <u>c.</u> Regular payments on the participating member entity debt as described in the agreements with the authority as of March 31, 2013, and baseline 2010 industrial water sales included in the authority and participating member agreements as of March 31, 2013. Baseline 2010 industrial water sales for the city of Tioga in the year 2013 are limited to the lesser of legally permitted industrial water sales or the amount in the member agreement.
 - <u>d.</u> <u>Required monthly payments on state-guaranteed loans. The</u> required transfer must occur no later than the twentieth day of the following month.</u>
 - e. Additional principal payment on state-guaranteed loans.
 - f. Payment to the resources trust fund.
- 2. If the state-guaranteed loans have not been repaid, without the written consent of the industrial commission the authority may not sell, lease, abandon, encumber, or otherwise dispose of any part of the property used in a water system of the authority if the property is used to provide revenue. Any requirements on the state-guaranteed loans for establishment of reserve funds for operation and maintenance or debt service are waived.
- 3. The state water commission shall approve the planning, location, and water supply contracts of any authority depots, laterals, taps, turnouts, and risers for industrial sales for oil and gas exploration and production after the effective date of this Act.

SECTION 19. A new section to chapter 61-40 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Water rates.

The authority shall develop an industrial water depot and lateral retail rate and present the rate to the industrial commission for approval. Any industrial water depot and lateral rate adjustment must have approval of the industrial commission before going into effect. The authority shall develop domestic water rates that must include all costs for operation, maintenance, and operating and capital reserves, and debt repayment of all infrastructure managed or constructed by the authority, with the exception of the costs identified in section 18 of this Act which are paid for by industrial water depot and lateral sales.

SECTION 20. A new section to chapter 61-40 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Construction funding.

The authority shall follow the state water commission requirements for funding through the resources trust fund or Bank of North Dakota state-guaranteed loans and shall present the overall plan and project components to the state water commission for funding approval. Priority on project funding first is reserved for state-guaranteed loan payments if not met by industrial water depot and lateral sales, second is for full repayment of existing federal debt if 7 U.S.C. 1926(b) protection for oil and gas exploration and production industrial water sales is asserted, and third for expanding domestic water supply to areas currently not served. In accepting construction funding, the authority and participating member entities agree to not hinder or prevent depot and lateral industrial water sales for oil and gas exploration and production.

SECTION 21. AMENDMENT. Section 61-40-09 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

61-40-09. Default.

If the authority is in default in the payment of the principal of or interest on anyof the obligations of the authority under this chapter and if the budget sectiondetermines that the authority is unable to reimburse the state in the time period required by the budget section, the budget section may give written notice to the governing board of the authority that the state has taken possession and ownership of the water system of the authority and the liabilities of the authority. In addition, the state assumes the powers of the authority. The industrial commission may review the ability of water depot and lateral sales to meet expenses in subdivisions a through d of subsection 1 of section 18 of this Act, and if the industrial commission is uncertain of that ability, the industrial commission shall provide written notification to the state water commission and direct the Bank of North Dakota to consider revision of the terms of the loan repayments. If the authority is in default in the payment of the principal of or interest on the obligation to the Bank of North Dakota for a loan for which the Bank of North Dakota is the source of funds for the loan, the state water commission shall request funding from the legislative assembly to repay the principal and interest due. Upon written notice, the members of the governing board of the authority are immediately removed, and the state water commission is the governingboard from the date of notice. If the state water commission determines that governance, possession, and ownership of the water system is not necessary for the authority to be able to reimburse the state in the necessary time period, the state water commission may develop a plan to return governance, possession, and ownership to the authority, subject to approval of the plan by the budget section.

SECTION 22. A new section to chapter 61-40 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Franchise protection.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, neither the authority nor its participating member entities may be required to waive the right to assert franchise protection under state or federal law with regard to water used for purposes other than industrial sales for oil and gas exploration and production." The independent water providers and the western area water supply authority shall report to the water-related topics overview committee on a regular basis and collaborate with the committee and the state water commission to monitor water usage, rates, and market share. The water-related topics overview committee shall report to the legislative management with recommendations to assure the state's ability to maintain its payment schedule. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-fourth legislative assembly."

If a previouslyregistered motor vehicle whose registered gross weight exceeds twenty thousandpounds [9071.84 kilograms] is purchased during the period the vehicle's registrationin this state is expired, the registration fee must be prorated on a monthly basis fromthe date of purchase to January first.

SECTION 21. Section 39-04-14.4 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

39-04-14.4. Renewal of registration of motor vehicles over certain weight.

Except as otherwise provided in section 39-04-14.2, the registration of a motor vehicle whose registered gross weight exceeds twenty thousand pounds [9071.84 kilograms] expires on June thirtieth of each year and must be renewed annually upon application by the owner and by payment of fees required by law for a renewal to begin on the first day of July of that year. An owner who has made proper application for renewal and registration of a vehicle before July first but who has not received the number plates, plate, or registration card for the ensuing year is entitled to operate or permit the operation of the vehicle upon the highways upon displaying thereon the number plates or plate issued for the preceding year for such time, to be prescribed by the department, as may be required for the issuance of new plates. If a previously registered motor vehicle whose registered gross weight exceeds twenty thousand pounds [9071.84 kilograms] is purchased during the period the vehicle's registration in the state is expired, the registration fee must be prorated on a monthly basis from the date of purchase to July first. The director shall provide for a one-time collection of eighteen months of registration fees for the registration period of January 1, 2014, to June 30, 2015. Beginning on July 1, 2015, the registration of motor vehicles under this section must be renewed annually.

SECTION 22. AMENDMENT. Section 27 of chapter 579 of the 2011 Special Session Session Laws is amended and reenacted as follows:

SECTION 27. CONTINGENT APPROPRIATION - STATE TREASURER - TRANSPORTATION FUNDING DISTRIBUTIONS TO NON-OIL-PRODUCING POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS. If the tax commissioner certifies that total oil and gas tax revenue collections for the period July 1, 2011, through February 29, 2012, exceed total oil and gas tax revenue collection projections for that period by at least \$48,000,000, based on legislative estimates made at the close of the 2011 regular legislative session, there is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$23,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the state treasurer for the purpose of providing transportation funding distributions, for the period beginning with the effective date of this Act and ending June 30, 2013. The funding provided in this section is considered a one-time funding item. The state treasurer shall distribute the funds provided under this section on April 1, 2012, as follows:

- 1. Six million eight hundred thousand dollars to non-oil-producing counties and cities pursuant to subsection 4 of section 54-27-19.
- One million seven hundred thousand dollars to counties and townships in non-oil-producing counties pursuant to section 54-27-19.1. Organized townships are not required to provide matching funds to receive distributions under this section.
- 3. Fourteen million five hundred thousand dollars to counties and townships in non-oil-producing counties through a distribution of \$10,000 to each organized township and a distribution of \$10,000 for each unorganized township to the county in which the unorganized township is located. If any funds remain after the distributions provided under this subsection, the state treasurer shall distribute eighty percent of the remaining funds to counties and cities pursuant to the method provided in subsection 1 of this section and shall distribute twenty percent of the remaining funds to counties and townships pursuant to the method provided in subsection 2 of this section.

For purposes of this section, a "non-oil-producing county" means a county that received no allocation of funding or a total allocation under section 57-51-15 of less than \$500,000 for state fiscal year 20112010. Any funds received by a county under this section for an unorganized township distribution must be used for roadway purposes in those unorganized townships located in the county. All funds distributed under

this section must be used for extraordinary roadway maintenance purposes.

SECTION 23. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - RAILROAD ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS. During the 2013-14 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying state railroad assistance programs. The study, if conducted, must review existing programs and funding levels and whether the existing programs and funding levels are adequate to meet current industry needs. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-fourth legislative assembly.

SECTION 24. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - TRANSPORTATION COSTS AND FUNDING. During the 2013-14 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the the long-term costs of transportation infrastructure maintenance and improvement projects and methods for funding these projects. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-fourth legislative assembly.

SECTION 25. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - RENEWABLE FUEL STANDARDS. During the 2013-14 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying potential statutory or administrative changes that could be made to assist parties in the fuel supply chain in complying with federal renewable fuel standards, including compliance with the renewable identification number credits requirements. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-fourth legislative assembly."

 - <u>Of the availability of one dollar of matching funds from private or</u> other public sources for each dollar of state funds to be distributed. <u>Matching funds must be in the form of cash and may not include</u> in-kind assets;
- 3. May not retain more than five percent of the grant award for administrative costs; and
- <u>4.</u> May not provide indirect cost reimbursement to a research university or a related research university organization of more than five percent of the amount of the grant award relating to the research university's involvement or the related research university organization's involvement."

- 4. If the amount of the credit exceeds the taxpayer's tax liability for the taxable year, the excess may be carried forward to each of the ten succeeding taxable years.
- 5. The aggregate amount of tax credits allowed to all eligible contributors is limited to fifteen million dollars per biennium. This limitation applies to all contributions for which tax credits are claimed under section 57-35.3-05 and this section.
- 6. Within thirty days after the date on which a taxpayer makes a contribution to the housing incentive fund, the housing finance agency shall file with each contributing taxpayer, and a copy with the tax commissioner, completed forms that show as to each contribution to the fund by that taxpayer the following:
 - a. The name, address, and social security number or federal employer identification number of the taxpayer that made the contribution.
 - b. The dollar amount paid for the contribution by the taxpayer.
 - c. The date the payment was received by the fund.
- 7. To receive the tax credit provided under this section, a taxpayer shall claim the credit on the taxpayer's state income or financial institutions tax return in the manner prescribed by the tax commissioner and file with the return a copy of the form issued by the housing finance agency under subsection 6.
- 8. Notwithstanding the time limitations contained in section 57-38-38, this section does not prohibit the tax commissioner from conducting an examination of the credit claimed and assessing additional tax due under section 57-38-38.

A partnership, subchapter S corporation, limited partnership, limited liability company, or any other passthrough entity making a contribution to the housing incentive fund under this section is considered to be the taxpayer for purposes of this section, and the amount of the credit allowed must be determined at the passthrough entity level. - Removes the requirement that up to \$2 million of the funds transferred to the Research North Dakota fund be used for Research North Dakota venture grants.
- Renames the Research North Dakota fund the Research North Dakota biotechnology fund.
- Removes a new continuing appropriation to the agricultural fuel tax fund.
- Removes a section providing a continuing appropriation to the energy conservation grant fund.
- Changes the exemption for the technology-based entrepreneurship grant program to designate that the Department of Commerce use up to \$300,000 for a grant to the Incubator for Developing Entrepreneurial Activity (IDEA) Center in Bismarck.
- Changes the exemption for base retention grants to designate that the Department of Commerce use up to \$100,000 for grants to promote the USS North Dakota.
- Reduces the amount transferred to the internship fund by \$500,000, from \$1.5 million to \$1 million.
- Removes a section providing for an Upper Great Plains Transportation Institute transportation study.
- Adds a new section for a Legislative Management study of intellectual property at research universities.
- Changes the emergency clause section to include the transfer to the housing incentive fund, the requirements for the housing incentive fund, and the continuing appropriation for the unmanned aircraft systems program.

Legislative hosting of dignitaries.

The legislative management or the chairman of the legislative management may approve the hosting of out-of-state dignitaries on behalf of the legislative assembly and may authorize the majority and minority leaders of the senate and the house of representatives or their designees to assist in the hosting of such dignitaries. An expenditure for the purchase of items to promote or to host a dignitary under this section may not be construed as a gift for purposes of section 18 of article X of the Constitution of North Dakota. An organization governed by section 527 of the Internal Revenue Code [26 U.S.C. 527], which solicits or receives contributions or makesexpenditures for political purposes, shall file a statement showing thename and mailing address of each contributor of an amount in excess oftwo hundred dollars in the aggregate for the reporting period and a listingof all expenditures of an amount in excess of two hundred dollars in the aggregate made for political purposes with the secretary of state. Thestatement must include the amount of each reportable contribution and the date the contribution was received. The statement must also include the amount of each reportable expenditure and the date the expenditurewas made.
- 2. A preelection statement must be filed no later than the twelfth day beforea primary, special, or general election and must be complete from the beginning of the calendar year through the twentieth day before the election.
- 3. A year-end statement covering the entire calendar year must be filed nolater than the thirty-first day of January of the following year.
- 4. Even if such an organization has not received any contributions or madeany expenditure in excess of two hundred dollars during the reportingperiod, the organization shall file a statement as required by this chapter.
- 5. A statement filed according to this section during the reporting periodmust show the following:

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- a. The gross total of all contributions received and expenditures made in excess of two hundred dollars;
- b. The gross total of all contributions received and expenditures made of two hundred dollars or less; and
- c. The cash on hand in the filer's account at the start and close of the reporting period.
- 6. The organization shall report the occupation, employer, and principalplace of business of each person, or the political committee if not alreadyregistered according to state or federal law, that contributed fivethousand dollars or more in the aggregate during the reporting period.
- 1. An incidental committee or political committee not otherwise covered by another section of this chapter may make a contribution to a measure committee for the purpose of promoting the passage or defeat of an initiated or referred measure or make a contribution to any other person that makes an independent expenditure. The incidental committee or political committee may make an independent expenditure for a political purpose or for the purpose of promoting passage or defeat of initiated or referred measures. The incidental committee or political committee shall file a statement disclosing a contribution for a political purpose or an independent expenditure made under this subsection with the secretary of state within forty-eight hours after making the contribution or independent expenditure. The statement filed under this subsection must include:
 - a. The full name of the incidental committee or political committee;
 - b. The complete address of the incidental committee or political committee;
 - c. The name of the recipient of the contribution or independent expenditure;
 - <u>d.</u> If the contribution or independent expenditure is related to a measure, the title of the measure and whether the contribution or independent expenditure is made in support of or opposition to the measure;
 - e. If the contribution or independent expenditure is related to a measure, the election date on which the measure appeared or will appear on the ballot;
 - <u>f.</u> <u>The amount of the contribution or independent expenditure made to</u> <u>a recipient in this state;</u>
 - g. The cumulative total of contributions and independent expenditures since the beginning of the calendar year made to recipients in this state;
 - h. The telephone number, printed name, and signature of the individual completing the report, attesting to the report being true, complete, and correct; and
 - i. The date on which the report was signed.
- 2. An incidental committee that solicits or accepts contributions for any political purpose shall file a statement in the office of the secretary of state no later than the thirty-second day before the date of any primary, special, or general election. The statement must be complete from the beginning of that calendar year through the fortieth day before the date of the primary, special, or general election. The committee shall file a complete statement for the entire calendar year no later than the

thirty-first day of January of the following year in which the committee received a reportable contribution. Even if an incidental committee has not received any contributions in excess of two hundred dollars during the reporting period, the committee shall file a statement as required under this chapter. A statement filed under this subsection during the reporting period must show the following:

- <u>a.</u> <u>The gross total of all contributions received in excess of two hundred</u> <u>dollars;</u>
- b. The name and mailing address of each contributor that contributed in excess of two hundred dollars in the aggregate to the committee during a reporting period;
- c. The gross total of all contributions received of two hundred dollars or less;
- d. The date the last reportable contribution was received;
- e. The cash on hand in the filer's account at the start and close of the reporting period; and
- <u>f.</u> The occupation, employer, and principal place of business of each person, or the political committee if not already registered according to state or federal law, which contributed five thousand dollars or more in the aggregate during the reporting period."
