#### **ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL NO. 1003**

(At the request of the Governor)

1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the North Dakota 2 university system; to create and enact six new sections to chapter 15-10, chapters 15-62.4 and 3 15-62.5, and a new section to chapter 54-10 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to a 4 unified workforce, vocational, and technical education program system, the workforce education 5 advisory council, the required use of electronic mail, file server administration, database 6 administration, application server, and hosting services, capital project budget requests, audits 7 of higher education computer systems, annual reports regarding scholarships, the student 8 financial assistance program, the scholars program, and higher education audits; to amend and 9 reenact section 15-10-12.1, subsection 3 of section 15-10-17, sections 15-18.2-02, 15-18.2-03, 10 15-18.2-04, 15-18.2-05, 15.1-21-02.6, 54-12-08, and 54-44.1-04, subsection 4 of section 11 54-44.1-06, and section 54-44.1-11 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to campus 12 building projects and maintenance, legislative authority to set tuition and fees at institutions of 13 higher education, state aid to institutions, career and technical education scholarships, 14 attorneys hired by the state board of higher education, budget requests submitted to the office 15 of the budget, preparation of budget data, and the cancellation of unexpended appropriations; 16 to repeal chapter 15-62.2 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the student financial 17 assistance program and the scholars program; to provide for the transfer of funds; to 18 reauthorize projects for North Dakota state university and Minot state university: to provide for 19 budget section reports; to provide for reports to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly; to provide for 20 legislative management reports and studies; to provide an appropriation to the state auditor; to 21 provide an appropriation to the attorney general; to provide a contingent appropriation to the 22 state board of higher education; to provide exemptions; and to declare an emergency.

#### SECTION 3. CONTINGENT APPROPRIATION - LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT REPORT.

19 There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise 20 appropriated, the sum of \$50,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the state 21 board of higher education for the unified workforce, vocational, and technical education program 22 system, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. The funding 23 provided in this section is available only if the state board of higher education certifies to the 24 office of management and budget that a unified workforce, vocational, and technical program 25 system has been established. The board shall provide reports to the legislative management on 26 the status of the development of the unified system.

SECTION 4. APPROPRIATION - STATE AUDITOR. There is appropriated out of any
 moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of
 \$1,221,914, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the state auditor for the purpose of
 conducting audits of institutions and entities under the control of the state board of higher

1 education, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. The state 2 auditor is authorized six full-time equivalent positions for higher education audit purposes. 3 SECTION 5. APPROPRIATION - ATTORNEY GENERAL. There is appropriated out of any 4 moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of 5 \$1,604,500, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the attorney general for the 6 purpose of providing legal services for the state board of higher education and institutions and 7 entities under the control of the board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending 8 June 30, 2017. The attorney general is authorized six full-time equivalent positions for the 9 purpose of providing legal services to the state board of higher education and institutions and 10 entities under the control of the board. 11 SECTION 6. AMENDMENT. Section 15-10-12.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is 12 amended and reenacted as follows: 13 15-10-12.1. Acceptance of buildings and campus improvements - Legislative 14 approval. 15 The state board of higher education may authorize campus improvements and building 16 maintenance on land under the control of the board which are financed by donations, gifts, 17 grants, and bequests if the cost of the improvement or building maintenance is not more than 18 three hundred eighty-five thousand dollars. The consent of the legislative assembly is required 19 for the construction, purchase, or receipt of any building financed by donations, gifts, grants, 20 and bequests and for campus improvements or building maintenance financed by donations, 21 gifts, grants, and bequests if the cost or estimated cost of the building, improvements, or 22 maintenance is more than three hundred eighty-five thousand dollars. During the time the 23 legislative assembly is not in session, except for the six months preceding the convening of a 24 regular session and the three months following the close of a regular session, and unless 25 otherwise restricted by previous legislative action or other law, the state board of higher 26 education, with the approval of the budget section of the legislative management, may authorize 27 the use of land under the control of the board and construct buildings financed by donations, 28 gifts, grants, and bequests construction, purchase, or receipt of any building and may authorize 29 campus improvements and building maintenance financed by donations, gifts, grants, and 30 bequests and if the cost or estimated cost of the building, improvement, or maintenance is more

31 than three hundred eighty-five thousand dollars. The budget section approval must include a

1 specific dollar limit for each building, campus improvement project, or maintenance project. The 2 state board of higher education may authorize the sale of any real property or buildings which 3 an institution of higher learning has received by gift or bequest. The board shall prescribe such 4 conditions for the sale of the property as it determines necessary. The conditions must include 5 requiring an appraisal and public auction or advertisement for bids, unless the gift instrument 6 requires a different process. If the state board of higher education submits a request for campus 7 improvements, building maintenance, or to construct buildings under this section to the budget 8 section for approval, the legislative council shall notify each member of the legislative assembly 9 of the date of the budget section meeting at which the request will be considered and provide a 10 copy of the meeting agenda to each member of the legislative assembly. The chairman of the 11 budget section shall allow any member of the legislative assembly an opportunity to present 12 testimony to the budget section regarding any such request. 13 SECTION 7. AMENDMENT. Subsection 3 of section 15-10-17 of the North Dakota Century 14 Code is amended and reenacted as follows: 15 3. <u>a.</u> Set<u>Charge</u> tuition and feesin the amounts established by the legislative 16 assembly. 17 Charge fees subject to any statutory limitations or requirements. <u>b.</u> 18 SECTION 8. A new section to chapter 15-10 of the North Dakota Century Code is created 19 and enacted as follows: 20 Capital project requests - Maintenance reserve account. 21 Every new building project funding request and building maintenance funding request 22 submitted for approval to the legislative assembly or to the budget section of the legislative 23 management under section 15-10-12.1 must conform to campus master plan and space 24 utilization studies completed by or for the state board of higher education. Each new building 25 project request exceeding five million dollars must include a funding request for future 26 maintenance costs equal to three percent of the project cost. The future maintenance funds 27 must be deposited in an account under the control of the state board of higher education to be 28 used only for future maintenance costs of buildings subject to this section. 29 SECTION 9. A new section to chapter 15-10 of the North Dakota Century Code is created 30 and enacted as follows:

The estimates of financial requirements for budget units under the control of the state 9 board of higher education must be made using the same forms, supporting information, and 10 documentation as other budget units. Any request for a new full-time or part-time permanent 11 position included in a budget unit's estimate of its financial requirements for the next two fiscal 12 years must include documentation justifying the need for the position. The documentation must 13 describe the circumstances resulting in the need for the position and identify the number of 14 hours the position will be involved in specific types of activities and the anticipated outcomes of 15 the activities. The estimates so submitted must bear the approval of the board or commission of 16 each budget unit for which a board or commission is constituted. The director of the budget may 17 extend the filing date for any budget unit if the director finds there is some circumstance that 18 makes it advantageous to authorize the extension. If a budget unit has not submitted its 19 estimate of financial requirements by the required date or within a period of extension set by the 20 director of the budget, the director of the budget shall prepare the budget unit's estimate of 21 financial requirements except the estimate may not exceed ninety percent of the budget unit's 22 previous biennial appropriation. The director of the budget or a subordinate officer as the 23 director shall designate shall examine the estimates and shall afford to the heads of budget 24 units reasonable opportunity for explanation in regard thereto and, when requested, shall grant 25 to the heads of budget units a hearing thereon which must be open to the public. 26 SECTION 24. AMENDMENT. Subsection 4 of section 54-44.1-06 of the North Dakota 27 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

Detailed comparative statements of expenditures and requests for appropriations by
 funds, budget units and classification of expenditures, showing the expenditures for
 the previous biennium, the first fiscal year of the present biennium, the budget of the
 current biennium, and the governor's recommendation for appropriations for each

1 budget unit for the next biennium, all distributed according to the prescribed 2 classification of expenditures. Following the lists of actual and proposed expenditures 3 of each budget unit there must be a brief explanation of the functions of the unit and 4 comments on its policies and plans and on any considerable differences among the 5 amounts recommended, with any descriptive, quantitative, comparative, and other 6 data as to work done, unit costs, and like information as may be considered necessary 7 or desirable. For capital outlay expenditures involving construction projects to be 8 completed in two or more fiscal years, there must be shown the total estimated cost of 9 each such project and the amount thereof recommended to be appropriated and 10 expended in each ensuing fiscal year until completion of the project. Capital outlay 11 needs may be projected for at least two years beyond the period covered by the 12 budget. The detailed comparative statements of budget units under the control of the 13 state board of higher education must include the same information presented for other 14 budget units.

SECTION 25. AMENDMENT. Section 54-44.1-11 of the North Dakota Century Code is

Unexpended appropriations for the North Dakota university system are not subject to 26 this section and the North Dakota university system shall report on the amounts and uses of 27 funds carried over from one biennium to the next to subsequent appropriations committees of 28 the legislative assembly. The chairmen of the appropriations committees of the senate and 29 house of representatives of the legislative assembly with the office of the budget may continue 30 appropriations or balances in force for not more than two years after the expiration of the

 SECTION 28. CAMPUS CAPITAL PROJECTS - PROJECT MANAGEMENT. During the

biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017, each capital project authorized by
the state board of higher education must have adequate project management oversight by
either an institution official or a representative of an external entity. An institution may seek
assistance from the university system office for project management oversight of a capital
project.

### 10 SECTION 29. NORTH DAKOTA STATE UNIVERSITY - MINARD HALL -

11 **REAUTHORIZATION - BUDGET SECTION REPORT.** In addition to the funds appropriated in 12 section 1 of this Act, North Dakota state university may use unspent state funding from the 13 \$5,000,000 appropriation received during the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending 14 June 30, 2009, and unspent state funding from the \$13,000,000 appropriation received during 15 the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, and ending June 30, 2011, and special funds derived from 16 insurance litigation settlement and other local institutional funds, to a total of \$23,474,300 for 17 the Minard hall project, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. 18 North Dakota state university shall report to the budget section regarding the status of the 19 Minard hall project and may request increased spending authorization from the budget section 20 for the project.

# 21 SECTION 30. MINOT STATE UNIVERSITY - FOOTBALL STADIUM PRESS BOX -

REAUTHORIZATION. Minot state university may use up to \$4,000,000 in private funds from the
 city of Minot and \$1,000,000 in local institutional funds for the completion of the football stadium
 press box during the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

SECTION 31. STUDENT LOAN TRUST FUND. Subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act
 includes the sum of \$1,004,744, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the student
 loan trust fund of which \$465,307 is for the professional student exchange program and
 \$539,437 is for connectND campus solution positions, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015,
 and ending June 30, 2017.
 SECTION 32. UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA SCHOOL OF MEDICINE AND HEALTH

31 SCIENCES OPERATIONS. The operations line item in subdivision 5 of section 1 of this Act

1 includes a funding allocation from the higher education per student credit-hour funding formula

2 attributable to inflation during the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. A

3 minimum of twenty-five percent of the allocation must be transferred by the state board of

4 higher education to the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences.

5 SECTION 33. FEDERAL, PRIVATE, AND OTHER FUNDS - APPROPRIATION. All funds, 6 in addition to those appropriated in section 1 of this Act, from federal, private, and other sources 7 for competitive grants or other funds that the legislative assembly has not indicated the intent to 8 reject, including tuition revenue, received by the institutions and entities under the control of the 9 state board of higher education are appropriated to those institutions and entities, for the 10 biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. All additional funds received under 11 the North Dakota-Minnesota reciprocity agreement during the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, 12 and ending June 30, 2017, are appropriated to the state board of higher education for 13 reimbursement to institutions under the control of the board.

SECTION 34. TRANSFER AUTHORITY. If, during the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017, the state board of higher education determines that funds allocated to operations in section 1 of this Act are needed for capital assets, the board may transfer funds from operations to capital assets. The board shall report any transfer of funds under this section to the office of management and budget.

19 SECTION 35. EXEMPTION - CONTINGENT APPROPRIATION REDUCTION. The amount 20 appropriated for the performance funding pool line item in section 1 of chapter 34 of the 2013 21 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds in this line item 22 must be canceled by the office of management and budget on the effective date of this section. 23 The office of management and budget shall reduce the general fund appropriation authority 24 included in the system governance line item contained in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act in 25 an amount equal to any appropriation used from the performance funding pool line item 26 contained in section 1 of chapter 34 of the 2013 Session Laws.

SECTION 36. EXEMPTION - TRANSFER - GRANT. The sum of \$750,000 from the general
fund is appropriated in the capital assets line item in subdivision 5 of section 1 of chapter 34 of
the 2013 Session Laws for the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health
sciences Bismarck family practice center skywalk project. Pursuant to section 54-44.1-11,
\$200,000 of the unexpended appropriation authority for the project must be continued into the

biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017, and must be transferred to the
university system office for the purpose of providing a grant to the North Dakota humanities
council for the development of elementary and secondary civics education. Any remaining
unexpended appropriation authority for the project is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and the
office of management and budget shall cancel the remaining unexpended appropriation
authority on the effective date of this section.

7 SECTION 37. STATE FLEET REIMBURSEMENT - TRANSFER. Notwithstanding any other 8 provision of law, the university of North Dakota shall transfer the sum of \$375,000 to the 9 department of transportation for costs associated with previous use by the institution of state 10 fleet services motor coaches and North Dakota state university shall transfer the sum of 11 \$375,000 to the department of transportation for costs associated with previous use by the 12 institution of state fleet services motor coaches. The university of North Dakota and North 13 Dakota state university shall transfer the funds as directed under this section to the department 14 of transportation prior to January 1, 2016.

## SECTION 38. STATE BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION - EVALUATION OF

16 **EMPLOYEES.** The state board of higher education shall conduct or contract for comprehensive 17 performance evaluations of the president and each individual designated as a vice president of 18 an institution under the supervision and control of the board and of the commissioner of higher 19 education and each individual within the university system office with the title of "vice 20 chancellor". Each performance review must include participation and input from the individual's 21 subordinates, peers, supervisors, and other appropriate individuals, as well as the individual 22 being evaluated. Each performance review must include an analysis of the individual's 23 contribution and performance in leadership, teamwork, interpersonal communication, 24 management, contribution, work habits, interpersonal interaction, and accountability. 25 Notwithstanding any provision of law, any record created or collected in the conduct of a 26 performance review under this section and the report of each performance review is a public 27 record. This section does not apply to any individual who has served in their respective position 28 for less than three years as of July 1, 2015. 29 SECTION 39. STATE BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION DATA INCONSISTENCIES -

30 **REPORT TO THE SIXTY-FIFTH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.** During the biennium beginning

31 July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017, the state board of higher education shall evaluate the

- 1 following data inconsistency issues at institutions and entities under its control and develop
- 2 policies and procedures to correct the inconsistencies:
- Lack of integration of personal and demographic information among computer
   systems;
- 5 2. Lack of use of standard chart of accounts for financial reporting and standard
  6 department budget table deduction and tax override flags;
- Absence of standard business processes for recording mandatory fees and for
  changing payroll funding source information;
- 9 4. Inconsistent methods and procedures at institutions for recording high school
  10 completions, identifying student cohorts for reporting purposes, and classifying agency
  11 funds:
- Inconsistent practices and policies at institutions for awarding tuition waivers, admitting
   students, using purchasing card, charging tuition and fees, and accruing of faculty sick
   leave;
- 15 6. Inconsistent coding and naming for bad debt expense and journal entries;
- 16 7. Use of shadow accounting systems for reporting purposes; and
- Inconsistent definitions for a distance education student, a resident student for tuition
   purposes, and a full-time student for federal tax purposes.

19 The state board of higher education shall provide a report to the appropriations committees of

the sixty-fifth legislative assembly regarding the status of the inconsistencies, including policiesand procedures implemented to correct the inconsistencies.

22 SECTION 40. HIGHER EDUCATION INSTITUTION PERMANENT FUNDS - REPORT TO

23 SIXTY-FIFTH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY. The state board of higher education shall provide a

24 report to the appropriations committees of the sixty-fifth legislative assembly regarding the use

25 of funds received by institutions under its control from permanent fund income established for

26 the benefit of the institutions in section 1 of article IX of the Constitution of North Dakota.

# 27 SECTION 41. EXTRAORDINARY CAMPUS NEEDS FUNDING - REPORT TO THE

28 SIXTY-FIFTH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY. The operations line item in subdivision 4 of section 1

29 of this Act includes the sum of \$2,500,000 for extraordinary campus needs at Williston state

30 college. Williston state college shall provide a report to the appropriations committees of the

1 sixty-fifth legislative assembly regarding the use of this funding and the need to continue the

2 funding in to the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019.

3 SECTION 42. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - HIGHER EDUCATION COURSE 4 **DELIVERY METHODS.** During the 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall consider 5 studying the delivery methods of higher education courses offered by institutions under the 6 control of the state board of higher education. The study, if conducted, must include a review of 7 current methods of distance education offered by institutions, options to improve delivery 8 methods, revenue generated by each type of delivery method, and how course delivery 9 methods may affect future campus infrastructure needs. The legislative management shall 10 report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the 11 recommendations, to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly. 12 SECTION 43. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - INSTITUTION MISSIONS. During 13 the 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall study the missions of all two-year 14 institutions and the missions of any other institutions under the control of the state board of 15 higher education, as determined by the legislative management, including the feasibility and 16 desirability of the institutions offering only workforce and career and technical education 17 programs. The study must review the current missions of the institutions, current and projected 18 course and program enrollments, projected workforce needs, including how the institutions can 19 serve the needs, and options to increase operating efficiencies. The legislative management 20 shall report its findings, together with any legislation necessary to implement the findings, to the 21 sixty-fifth legislative assembly.

SECTION 44. EMERGENCY. Sections 10, 27, 35, and 36 and the capital assets,
 extraordinary repairs pool, campus security pool, and deferred maintenance pool line items in
 section 1 of this Act are declared to be an emergency measure.
