1 A BILL for an Act providing an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of 2 human services; to create and enact subdivision aa of subsection 1 of section 50-09-29 and a 3 new section to chapter 50-24.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to temporary 4 assistance for needy families benefits and to the monthly maintenance needs allowance; to 5 authorize the department of human services to convey land in Walsh County; to create and 6 enact a new section to chapter 50-06 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to a 7 behavioral health services quarterly report; to amend and reenact sections 6-09-47, 50-06-16, 8 50-06-32.1, and 50-06-37, and subsection 1 of section 50-09-29, of the North Dakota Century 9 Code, relating to the medical facility infrastructure loan fund, rulemaking authority, the expiration 10 date on the autism spectrum disorder voucher program pilot project, and the assessment used 11 for the developmental disabilities system reimbursement project; to repeal section 3 of 12 chapter 84 of the 2013 Session Laws, relating to the medical facility infrastructure fund balance 13 transfer; to provide an exemption for exemptions; to provide a limitation relating to the program 14 of all inclusive care for the elderly; to provide payments to counties out of enhanced federal 15 payment; to provide advance payments to select enrolled providers; to provide statements of 16 legislative intent; to provide reports to the legislative management; to provide for a legislative 17 management study studies; to provide an appropriation to the legislative council; to provide an-18 effective datedates; and to declare an emergency.

19 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the department of human services for the purpose of defraying the expenses of its various divisions, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017, as

SECTION 3. FUNDING TRANSFERS - EXCEPTION - AUTHORIZATION. Notwithstanding

2 biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

4 section 54-16-04, the department of human services may transfer appropriation authority 5 between line items within each subdivision of section 1 of this Act and between subdivisions 6 within section 1 of this Act for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. 7 The department shall notify the office of management and budget and the legislative council of 8 any transfer made pursuant to this section. The department shall report to the budget section 9 after June 30, 2016, any transfers made in excess of \$50,000 and to the appropriations 10 committees of the sixty-fifth legislative assembly regarding any transfers made pursuant to this 11 section. 12 **SECTION 4. EXEMPTION.** The amount appropriated for the replacement of the medicaid 13 management information system and related projects in chapter 50 of the 2007 Session Laws 14 and chapter 38 of the 2011 Session Laws is not subject to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11. 15 Any unexpended funds from these appropriations approved under section 54-44.1-11 for 16 continuation into the 2009-11 biennium and then the 2011-13 biennium and then the 2013-15 17 biennium are available for the completion of the medicaid management information system and 18 related projects during the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. 19 **SECTION 5. EXEMPTION.** The amount appropriated for the modification of the 20 department's eligibility systems in chapter 578 of the 2011 Special Session Laws is not subject 21 to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11. Any unexpended funds from this appropriation approved 22 under section 54-44.1-11 for continuation into the 2013-15 biennium are available for the 23 completion of the modification of the eligibility systems project during the biennium beginning 24 July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. 25 SECTION 6. CONVEYANCE OF LAND AUTHORIZED. The state of North Dakota by and 26 through the department of human services may convey real property associated with the life 27 skills and transition center in Grafton. The department may convey the Prairieview building and 28 the real property on which the building is located on the terms and conditions determined 29 appropriate by the department and the attorney general. Section 54-01-05.2 and 54-01-05.5 do 30 not apply to this conveyance.

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SECTION 7. EXEMPTION - LEISURE, RECREATIONAL, AND EDUCATIONAL

PROGRAMS. The grants line item in subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act includes \$150,000 for
providing grants for services to provide leisure, recreational, and educational programs for
individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities in the northeast and southeast human
service regions. The requirements of chapter 54-44.4 do not apply to the selection of a grantee,
the grant award, or payments made under this section. The department of human services'
oversight for these services is limited to receiving information only relating to annual attendance
numbers and the expenditure of appropriated funds for these services.

9 **SECTION 8. DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES - PROGRAM OF ALL INCLUSIVE** 10 **CARE FOR THE ELDERLY - LIMITATION.** The department of human services may not expand 11 the program of all inclusive care for the elderly during the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and 12 ending June 30, 2017, into a community that is not operating a program site on August 1, 2015. 13 SECTION 9. ADVANCE PAYMENTS - ADJUSTMENTS - EXEMPTION. The department of 14 human services may provide advance payments to select enrolled providers related to the 15 implementation of the new Medicaid management information system for the period beginning 16 with the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 2015. The department may spend funds 17 appropriated from the general fund in its grants - medical assistance line item in subdivision 2 of 18 section 1 of this Act for making these advance payments if sufficient funding from the general 19 fund is not available from the department's 2013-15 biennium appropriation. The department 20 shall adjust 2015-17 biennium payments to the enrolled providers to recoup the advance 21 payments. The amount appropriated from special funds in the grants - medical assistance line 22 item in subdivision 2 of section 1 of chapter 12 of the 2013 Session Laws is not subject to 23 section 54-44.1-11, and any unspent funds relating to the federal funds share of any advance 24 payments may be continued and used for paying the federal share of medical assistance 25 payments for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. 26 SECTION 10. AMENDMENT. Section 6-09-47 of the North Dakota Century Code is 27 amended and reenacted as follows: 28 6-09-47. (Effective through July 31, 2017) Medical facility infrastructure loan 29 programfund - Continuing appropriation - Audit and costs of administration.

The Bank of North Dakota shall administer a loan program to provide loans to medical
 facilities to conduct construction that improves the health care infrastructure in the

1		state or improves access to existing nonprofit health care providers in the state. The
2		construction project may include land purchases and may include purchase, lease,
3		erection, or improvement of any structure or facility to the extent the governing board
4		of the health care facility has the authority to authorize such activity.
5	2.	In order to be eligible under this loan program, the applicant must be the governing
6		board of the health care facility which shall submit an application to the Bank. The
7		application must:
8		a. Detail the proposed construction project, which must be a project of at least one
9		million dollars and which is expected to be utilized for at least thirty years;
10		b. Demonstrate the need and long-term viability of the construction project; and
11		c. Include financial information as the Bank may determine appropriate to determine
12		eligibility, such as whether there are alternative financing methods.
13	3.	The governor shall establish a task force to review loan applications under this section
14		and to make recommendations to the Bank on the loan applications. The task force
15		must include representation of medical providers and medical facilities from the
16		oil-producing counties in the state. The task force shall work with the Bank to establish
17		criteria for eligibility for a loan under the program. The criteria established by the task
18		force and the Bank must give priority to applicants that are located in oil-producing
19		counties.
20	4.	A loan provided under this section:
21		a. May not exceed the lesser of fifteen million dollars or seventy-five percent of the
22		actual cost of the project;
23		b. Must have an interest rate equal to one percent; and
24		c. Must provide a repayment schedule of no longer than twenty-five years.
25	5.	A recipient of a loan under this section shall complete the financed construction project
26		within twenty-four months of approval of the loan. Failure to comply with this
27		subsection may result in forfeiture of the entire loan received under this section.
28	6.	The medical facility infrastructure fund is a special fund in the state treasury. This fund
29		is a revolving fund. All moneys intransferred into the medical facility infrastructure fund,
30		interest on moneys in the fund, and collections of principal and interest on loans from

1		the fund are appropriated to the Bank on a continuing basis for the purpose of
2		providing loans under this section.
3	7.	Funds in the medical facility infrastructure fund may be used for loans as provided
4		under this section and to pay the costs of administration of the fund. Annually, the
5		Bank may deduct a service fee for administering the medical facility infrastructure fund
6		maintained under this section.
7	8.	The medical facility infrastructure fund must be audited in accordance with section
8		6-09-29. The cost of the audit and any other actual costs incurred by the Bank on
9		behalf of the fund must be paid from the fund.
10	9.	The Bank shall deposit loan repayment funds in the medical facility infrastructure fund.
11		After deduction of fees and costs as provided in this section, the Bank shall make an
12		annual transfer of repayment funds deposited in the medical facility infrastructure fund-
13		to the state treasurer for deposit in the strategic investment and improvements fund.
14	(Eff	ective August 1, 2017, through July 31, 2043) Medical facility infrastructure loan

16	1	The Bank of North Dakota shall service loans made under the medical facility
17		infrastructure loan program. The repayment schedule of these loans may not exceed
18		twenty-five years.
19	2.	Funds in the medical facility infrastructure fund may be used for loans as provided
20		under this section and to pay the costs of administration of the fund. Annually, the
21		Bank may deduct a service fee for administering the medical facility infrastructure fund-
22		maintained under this section.
23	3 .	The medical facility infrastructure fund must be audited in accordance with section
24		6-09-29. The cost of the audit and any other actual costs incurred by the Bank on

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2	The department of human services shall publish a quarterly report of all behavioral health
	services provided by or supported by the department. The report must include each type of
4	behavioral health service, the number of clients served for each service, and the amount of
5	state and federal funds budgeted and spent for each service. Data must be identified for
6	behavioral health services by human service region and by mental health services provided to
7	children, mental health services provided to adults, and substance abuse services.
8	SECTION 12. AMENDMENT. Section 50-06-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is
9	amended and reenacted as follows:
10	50-06-16. Rulemaking authority.
11	The department may adopt rules necessary to carry out the responsibilities of the
12	department in conformity with any statute administered or enforced by the department. All rules
13	adopted must be published in the North Dakota Administrative Code. Rules adopted by
14	agencies prior to January 1, 1982, which relate to functions or agencies covered by this chapter
15	remain in effect until such time as they are specifically amended or repealed. The department is
16	not required to adopt rules to establish the process for the administration of funds appropriated
17	to the department in an appropriation identified by the legislative assembly as a one-time
18	funding item.
19	SECTION 13. AMENDMENT. Section 50-06-32.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is
20	amended and reenacted as follows:
21	50-06-32.1. (Effective through June 30, 2015) Autism spectrum disorder voucher
22	program pilot project - Legislative management report - Appeal.
23	1. The department of human services shall establish a voucher program pilot project
24	beginning July 1, 2014, to assist in funding equipment and general educational needs
25	related to autism spectrum disorder for individuals below two hundred percent of the
26	federal poverty level from age three to under age eighteen who have been diagnosed
27	with autism spectrum disorder. The program may include funding for assistive
28	technology; video modeling videos or equipment; language-generating devices;
29	training and educational material for parents; parenting education; sensory equipment;
30	tutors; safety equipment; travel tools; self-care equipment; timers; visual
31	representation systems; respite care; specialized daycare; language comprehension
5.	

- equipment; and registration and related expenses for workshops and training to
 improve independent living skills, employment opportunities, and other executive or
 social skills.
- 4 2. The department shall adopt rules addressing management of this voucher program 5 pilot project and establishing the eligibility requirements and exclusions for this 6 voucher program pilot project. The program may not provide a voucher for early 7 intensive behavioral intervention, including applied behavioral analysis, intensive early 8 interventional behavioral therapy, intensive behavioral intervention, the Lovaas 9 method, the Denver model, LEAP (learning experiences - an alternative program for 10 preschoolers and parents), TEACCH (treatment and education of autistic and related 11 communication handicapped children), pivotal response training, or discrete trial 12 training.
- A decision on a voucher application which is issued by the department under this
 section may be appealed as provided under chapter 28-32.
- 15 4. The department of human services shall report to the legislative management
 16 regarding the autism spectrum disorder program pilot project.
- SECTION 14. AMENDMENT. Section 50-06-37 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

50-06-37. Developmental disabilities system reimbursement project.

The department of human services, in conjunction with developmental disabilities service providers, shall develop a prospective or related payment system with an independent rate model utilizing the support intensity scale.

- The department shall establish a steering committee consisting of representatives
 from all interested providers and department representatives. The steering committee
 shall guide the development of the new payment system including assisting a
 consultant to conceptualize, develop, design, implement, and evaluate a new payment
 system.
- The department shall contract with a consultant by September 1, 2011, to develop, in
 collaboration with the steering committee, the payment system and the resource
 allocation model tying funding to support intensity scale assessed needs of clients

1		aged sixteen and older and to a state-approved assessment that assesses needs of
2		clients younger than sixteen years of age.
3	3.	After the prospective or related payment system rates are developed, the new rates
4		must be tested on a sampling of clients and providers, the sample to be determined by
5		the steering committee, allowing sufficient time to capture provider cost, client-realized
6		need, and service provision data. The consultant shall provide the appropriate
7		sampling number to sufficiently test the rates, types of services, and needs of clients
8		with the intent to include as many providers as fiscally feasible.
9	4.	The department shall contract with a team of support intensity scale assessors by
10		September 1, 2011. The team shall begin assessing immediately the identified client
11		pilot group identified by the consultant contracted in subsection 2.
12	5.	Once testing is complete, the data must be analyzed by the consultant and the
13		consultant shall make any needed rate adjustments, resource allocation modifications,
14		or process assumptions.
15	6.	Beginning in June 2012, the department and the steering committee shall report
16		development activities and status information to an interim legislative committee.
17	7.	Implementation of any system developed under this chapter may not occur before the
18		implementation of the department's new medicaid management information system.
19		TION 9. Subdivision aa of subsection 1 of section 50-09-29 the North Dakota Century

4	MEDICALLY FRAGILE INTENSIVE CARE FACILITY. It is the intent of the sixty-fourth-
5	legislative assembly that the department of human services develop a plan for a medically
6	fragile intensive care facility for certain individuals transitioning from the life skills and transition
7	center during the 2015-16 interim. It is further the intent of the legislative assembly that the plan
8	consider the resident's and their family's preferences regarding the location of the facility and
9	that the department include funding for the facility in its 2017-19 biennium budget request.
10	SECTION 15. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES CASE
11	MANAGEMENT. It is the intent of the sixty-fourth legislative assembly that the department of
12	human services provide case management services for individuals with a developmental
13	disability within the ratio provided pursuant to North Dakota Administrative Code for the
14	biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. If case management services for
15	individuals with a developmental disability exceed the ratio requirement provided in the North
16	Dakota Administrative Code, the department may hire temporary staff or the department may
17	propose a change to North Dakota Administrative Code to meet the ratio requirement.
18	SECTION 16. ROBINSON RECOVERY CENTER FUNDING. Notwithstanding the
19	designation of funding for the Robinson recovery center in the appropriation for the department
20	of human services in section 1 of this Act, the department may reprocure the contract for
21	methamphetamine treatment services if the current contractor is unable to provide the full
22	capacity of services anticipated under the current contract for the biennium beginning July 1,
23	2015, and ending June 30, 2017. Funding otherwise designated for the Robinson recovery
24	center may be used to support the costs of the reprocured contract.
25	SECTION 17. PAYMENTS TO THE COUNTY FOR LOCAL EXPENSES OF
26	ADMINISTRATION OF THE MEDICAID PROGRAM. Within the limits of legislative
27	appropriation, the department may reimburse counties for part of the local expenses of
28	administration for determining eligibility for services under chapter 50-24.1, an amount that
29	represents all or part of an increase in payments from the federal government to the department
30	for administration of the medicaid program.

SECTION 18. APPROPRIATION. Special funds derived from federal funds and other
 income, are appropriated to the department of human services for the purpose of reimbursing
 counties under section 4017 of this Act for part of the local expenses of administration of the
 medicaid program under chapters 50-01.2 and 50-24.1, for the biennium beginning July 1,
 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

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SECTION 19. GRANTS - EXEMPTION - REPORTS TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT.

7 The grants line item in subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act includes \$205,000\$75,000 from the 8 general fund for a grant to a statewide family-controlled parent-to-parent support organization 9 with at least fifty percent of its board of directors consisting of members whose primary daily 10 responsibilities include caring for a child with a mental health disorder, for the biennium 11 beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. Funds awarded must be used for providing 12 services to children with emotional, behavioral, or mental health needs. The organization 13 receiving a grant under this section shall provide a report to the legislative management during 14 the 2015-16 interim on the use of grant funds. The requirements of chapter 54-44.4 do not 15 apply to the selection of a grantee, the grant award, or payments made under this section.

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SECTION 20. GRANTS - EXEMPTION - REPORTS TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT.

17 The grants line item in subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act includes \$205,000\$75,000 from the 18 general fund for a grant to a statewide family-to-family health information and education 19 organization which provides parent-to-parent support for families and is located in a county with 20 a population of less than 6,000 based on the 2010 decennial census, for the biennium 21 beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. Funds awarded must be used for family-22 related information and education services. The organization receiving a grant under this 23 section shall provide a report to the legislative management during the 2015-16 interim on the 24 use of grant funds. The requirements of chapter 54-44.4 do not apply to the selection of a 25 grantee, the grant award, or payments made under this section.

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SECTION 16. GRANTS FOR MENTAL HEALTH DISORDER PREVENTION SERVICES -

EXEMPTION. The grants line item in subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act includes \$90,000
from the general fund for a grant to an organization providing mental health disorder-related
services for caregivers, and children up to age eight in the southeast human service region, for
the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. Funds awarded may be used
to assist caregivers with providing screening, assessment, development education,

- 1 relationship-based skills coaching, prevention, short-term therapy treatment, and early-2 identification services for children up to age eight experiencing behavioral or emotional-3 difficulties. The requirements of chapter 54-44.4 do not apply to the selection of a grantee, the 4 grant award, or payments made under this section. 5 SECTION 21. APPROPRIATION - 2013-15 BIENNIUM. There is appropriated out of special 6 funds derived from federal funds, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$87,000,000, or so 7 much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of human services for the purpose of 8 defraying medical assistance grant costs, for the period beginning with the effective date of this 9 Act and ending June 30, 2015. 10 SECTION 22. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - MENTAL HEALTH HOTLINE 11 **SERVICES.** During the 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the 12 various telephone contact numbers supported by state appropriations to access information 13 regarding services and programs available and determine if multiple numbers are necessary to 14 respond appropriately to the residents of the state. The legislative management shall report its 15 findings and recommendations, along with any legislation required to implement the 16 recommendations, to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly. 17 SECTION 23. REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT - ADULT PROTECTIVE 18 SERVICES PROGRAM. During the 2015-16 interim, the department of human services shall 19 report to the legislative management regarding the adult protective services program, including 20 the effectiveness of the program, information on services and outcomes, and funding by human 21 service region and in total. 22 SECTION 24. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - AUTISM SERVICES. During the 23 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying services for children with 24 autism. The study must include a review of services currently provided by the department of 25 human services, the superintendent of public instruction, and other state and local agencies, 26 and an evaluation of the effectiveness of the continuum of care, transition between programs, 27 and outcomes. The study must also identify current funding for these programs and projected 28 funding needs in future bienniums by funding source. The legislative management shall report 29 its findings and recommendations, along with any legislation required to implement the
- 30 recommendations, to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly.

1	SECTION 25. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - LIFE SKILLS AND TRANSITION
2	CENTER. During the 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the
3	use of the structures and property of the life skills and transition center to determine the best
4	and most efficient use of the properties. If conducted, the study must review the potential to
5	transfer clients from the life skills and transition center to under-utilized facilities on the state
6	hospital campus or to a community-based setting. The study must also review potential
7	alternative uses of structures on the life skills and transition center campus. The legislative
8	management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation
9	necessary to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly.
10	SECTION 26. BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES - LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT
11	REPORTS. During the 2015-16 interim, the department of human services shall present its
12	quarterly behavioral health services reports to the legislative management.
13	
14	CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL HEALTH CARE NEEDS. During the 2015-16 interim, the
15	legislative management shall consider studying the state service delivery system for children
16	with special health care needs and for children with a disability. The study must include
17	consideration of the special health care needs and disability needs of children. The scope of the
18	study must include consideration of access; availability, including number of children without
19	services; and delivery of services, including complexity of service delivery system. The study
20	must include input from stakeholders, including representatives of law enforcement, pediatric-
21	providers, tribal governments, and state and local agencies and institutions. The legislative
22	council may contract for consulting services to assist the legislative management in conducting
23	the study. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together-
24	with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-fifth legislative-
25	assembly.
26	SECTION 19. APPROPRIATION - LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL. There is appropriated out of
27	any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of
28	\$50,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the legislative council for the purpose-
29	of contracting for consulting services to assist the legislative management in conducting a study
30	of the delivery system for children with special health care needs, for the biennium beginning
31	July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

1 SECTION 27. REPEAL. Section 3 of chapter 84 of the 2013 Session Laws is repealed. 2 SECTION 28. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section 1011 of this Act becomes effective on January 1, 3 2016. 4 SECTION 29. EFFECTIVE DATE. Sections 12 and 13 17 and 18 of this Act become 5 effective on the effective date of the centers for medicare and medicaid services' certification 6 that the department's eligibility system has met the seven conditions and standards for the 7 receipt of enhanced match. 8 SECTION 30. EMERGENCY. Section 17 of this Act is The medical assistance-grants line 9 item in subdivision 2 of section 1 and sections 9 and 21 of this Act are declared to be an 10 emergency measure.
