1 A BILL for an Act

2 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 3 **SECTION 1.** Section 4.1-01-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted
- 4 as follows:
- 5 **4.1-01-01. Definitions.**
- 6 <u>As used in this title, unless otherwise provided:</u>
- 7 <u>1. "Commissioner" means the agriculture commissioner or the designee or authorized</u> 8 <u>representative of the commissioner.</u>
- 9 <u>2. "Department" means the North Dakota department of agriculture.</u>
- SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 4-01-21 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 12 4-01-214.1-01-02. Salary of agriculture commissioner.
- The annual salary of the agriculture commissioner is one hundred five thousand four
- 14 hundred ninety-one dollars through June 30, 2016, and one hundred eight thousand six
- 15 hundred fifty-six dollars thereafter after that date.
- SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 4-01-15 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 4-01-154.1-01-03. Compelling attendance of witnesses and production of books and papers.
- The agriculture commissioner may compel the attendance of persons at hearings before the
- 21 commissioner, and the production of books and papers. The commissioner may examine
- 22 witnesses under oath and may administer oaths in the performance of the commissioner's
- 23 duties. Any The commissioner's office must file and preserve any testimony taken by the
- 24 commissioner must be filed and preserved in the commissioner's office.

 - **SECTION 6. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-17.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
 - 4-01-17.24.1-01-06. Expenditures authorized Who to approve vouchers Qualifications of hunters and trappers hired When bounties not payable.

The agriculture commissioner may make suchauthorize expenditures from funds available for equipment, supplies, and other expenses, including expenditures for personal services of hunters and trappers, as may be necessary to execute the functions imposed uponof the agriculture commissioner byunder section 4-01-17.14.1-01-05. Hunters and trappers employed under section 4-01-17.14.1-01-05 must be state residents, but. Hunters and trappers employed under section 4.1-01-05 are not entitled to bounty provided by state laws for the killing or extermination of these birds and animals under that section. All vouchers for expenditures made by the agriculture commissioner under this section must be approved as to correctness by the duly authorized agent of the animal and plant health inspection service or other appropriate federal agency.

SECTION 7. AMENDMENT. Section 4-01-17.3 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

4-01-17.34.1-01-07. Disposition of proceeds of furs, skins, and specimens taken.

All furs, skins, and specimens taken by hunters and trappers paid out of funds appropriated to carry out section 4-01-17.14.1-01-05 must be disposed of in a manner the agriculture-commissioner determines is in the state's best interests interest of the state. If furs, skins, or specimens are sold, the net proceeds of the sales, up to fifteen thousand dollars per biennium,

- 1 must be used by the United States department of agriculture wildlife services to fund its-
- 2 program activities that benefit benefitting the state's livestock producers.
- 3 **SECTION 8. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-19 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended
- 4 and reenacted as follows:
- 5 **4-01-194.1-01-08**. Marketing bureau.
- The agriculture commissioner shall establish and maintain a marketing bureau for the
- 7 <u>purpose of gatheringto gather</u> and <u>disseminating disseminate</u> statistical information on <u>any</u>
- 8 agricultural marketing problems of the state and engagingto engage in marketing services of
- 9 agricultural products. Any moneys received or generated by the pride of Dakota program must
- 10 be deposited in the agriculture department operating fund in the state treasury.
- 11 **SECTION 9. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-20 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended
- 12 and reenacted as follows:
- 13 4-01-20. Commissioner to preserve records of commissioner of immigration.
- 14 All papers, writings, documents, books, records, files, and all other papers of whatever
- 15 nature, used by or in connection with the office of commissioner of immigration, must be
- 16 preserved by the agriculture commissioner.
 - **NOTE:** This section was a product of an effort in the 1920s to promote North Dakota in an attempt to convince people to immigrate to the state. According to the Department of Agriculture, all records associated with this section were destroyed and no new records have been kept. This section is likely obsolete and can be repealed.
- 17 **SECTION 10. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-22 of the North Dakota Century Code is
- 18 amended and reenacted as follows:
- 19 **4-01-224.1-01-09**. Certified beef program.
- The agriculture commissioner may collaborate with the state board of animal health, the
- 21 North Dakota stockmen's association, North Dakota state university beef systems, and the
- 22 United States secretary of agriculture to develop a source-verified and process-verified beef
- 23 marketing program known as the certified beef program.
- 24 **SECTION 11. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-23 of the North Dakota Century Code is
- 25 amended and reenacted as follows:
- 26 4-01-234.1-01-10. Sustainably grown in North Dakota Application Logo Promotion
- 27 of commodities.
- 28 1. The agriculture commissioner may implement a program to promote agricultural
- 29 commodities that are sustainably grown in North Dakota.

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- 2. If a program referenced inunder subsection 1 is implemented, the program must require that a producer file an application with the commissioner. If thea producer demonstrates that the producer's growing practices with respect to a particular commodity meet the commissioner's established criteria for sustainability, the commissioner shall authorize the producer to label and market the commodity as being sustainably grown in North Dakota.
 - 3. The commissioner may develop, and make available for the use of by authorized producers, a logo indicating that the commodity is sustainably grown in North Dakota. The commissioner may actively support and promote the sale and use of products identified as sustainably grown in North Dakota.
 - 4. The commissioner may establish and charge producers a fee for participating in the program. The commissioner shall forward all fees collected under this section to the state treasurer for deposit in the general fund.
 - The agriculture commissioner may engage in research and provide educationtoeducate members of the public regarding agricultural commodities that are sustainably grown in this state.
 - 6. For purposes of this section, "sustainably grown" means that a crop is grown using research-based practices that resultresulting in:
 - a. Increased efficiencies in soil and nutrient preservation;
 - b. Decreased reliance on tillage and other soil-depleting practices;
 - c. Increased efficiencies in the use of water;
- d. Increased efficiencies in the use of other necessary and measurable agricultural inputs;
 - e. Increased yield efficiencies; and
 - Greater economic benefit to producers.
- 26 **SECTION 12. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-24 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

Section 4-01-27 of the North Dakota Century Code is 4 amended and reenacted as follows: 5 4-01-274.1-01-13. Publicly owned land - Noxious weed control or eradication. 6 The commissioner shall attempt to arrange a noxious weed control or eradication 7 program with all state and federal agencies owning, controlling, or having jurisdiction 8 over land within the state. 9 2. Each weed control officer shall attempt to arrange a noxious weed control or 10 eradication program with political subdivisions owning or controlling public land within 11 the weed control officer's jurisdiction. 12 3. If a federal agency does not control or eradicate noxious weeds on land under theits 13 jurisdiction of the agency and does not develop a management plan for controlling or 14 eradicating the noxious weeds, the appropriate weed control office shall notify the 15 agency of the failure to control or eradicate the noxious weeds. The federal agency 16 shall provide a report to the weed control authorities detailing the methods used by the 17 federal agency and showing cause why the federal agency is not controlling or 18 eradicating the noxious weeds. The commissioner may specify the forms on which the 19 federal agency report must be submitted. 20 Upon being notified by a weed board of the federal agency's failure to control or 21 eradicate noxious weeds, the commissioner may hold a public hearing to determine 22 the reason for the failure. 23 SECTION 15. AMENDMENT. Section 4-01-28 of the North Dakota Century Code is 24 amended and reenacted as follows: 25 4-01-284.1-01-14. Equine slaughter - Establishments. 26 The agriculture commissioner shall monitor federal statutory and regulatory actions related 27 to the slaughter of horses, mules, and other equines, and in particular, those actions pertaining 28 to the establishments in which the slaughter and preparation of the carcasses may take place. 29 The agriculture commissioner may pursue or support federal legislative, regulatory, or

contractual avenues that would allowallowing for the slaughter and processing of horses, mules,

and other equines in this state, without the restriction that the slaughter or product preparation

- 1 be conducted in establishments separate from any in which cattle, sheep, swine, or goats are
- 2 slaughtered or their products are prepared.
- 3 **SECTION 16. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-29 of the North Dakota Century Code is
- 4 amended and reenacted as follows:

- The agriculture commissioner shall create and maintain an electronic database of wetland credits that are available for purchase by an agricultural landowner.
- 8 **SECTION 17. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-30 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 10 4-01-304.1-01-16. Grape and wine advisory committee Membership.
- The agriculture commissioner shall appoint a grape and wine advisory committee. The committee must include:
- 13 1. Two individuals who are grape producers;
- 14 2. One individual who is the producer of a fruit, other than grapes, used in vinification;
- 15 3. Two individuals who own wineries located in this state; and
- 16 4. One representative of the North Dakota grape and wine association.
- 17 **SECTION 18. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-31 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 4-01-314.1-01-17. Pipeline restoration and reclamation oversight pilot program
- 20 **Generally.**

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- The agriculture commissioner shall establish a pilot program that shall provideproviding technical assistance and support to surface owners and surface
 tenants on pipeline restoration and followup support to surface owners and surface
 tenants on pipeline reclamation.
- 25 2. The agriculture commissioner may contract for ombudsmen for the purposes of beingto be a resource for technical assistance and followup on pipeline issues. The ombudsmen may not investigate or assist with any pipeline installed before January 1, 2006, or regulated by the public service commission under title 49, and may not assist in easement negotiations.
 - The pilot program may provide technical education, support, and outreach on pipeline-related matters in coordination with other entities.

- b. The compensation and reimbursement of expenses, as provided for in this
 subsection, are payable by the legislative council.
- **SECTION 20. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-33 of the North Dakota Century Code is 4 amended and reenacted as follows:

- Any expenses incurred by the agriculture commissioner or by the federal
 environmental law impact review committee in meeting the requirements of section
 4-01-324.1-01-18 must be paid by the agriculture commissioner from the federal
 environmental law impact fund.
 - 2. If the attorney general elects to participate in an administrative or judicial process, pertaining to federal environmental legislation or regulations, which detrimentally impactimentally or have the potential topotentially detrimentally impactimentally the state's agricultural, energy, or oil production sectors, any expenses incurred by the attorney general in the participation must be paid by the agriculture commissioner from the federal environmental law impact review fund.
 - 3. For purposes of this section, "expenses" include administrative costs, consulting fees, research costs, expert witness fees, attorney fees, and travel costs.
- **SECTION 21. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-34 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

- The agriculture commissioner may accept gifts, grants, and donations for the purposes set forth in section 4-01-334.1-01-19, provided the commissioner posts the amount and source of any gifts, grants, and donations on the department of agriculture's department's website. Any moneys received in accordance with this section must be deposited in the federal environmental law impact review fund.
- **SECTION 22. AMENDMENT.** Section 4-01-35 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 4-01-354.1-01-21. Federal environmental law impact review fund Continuing appropriation.
 - 1. The federal environmental law impact review fund consists of:

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a. Any moneys appropriated or transferred for the purposes set forth in section
 4-01-334.1-01-19; and
 b. Any gifts, grants, and donations forwarded to the agriculture commissioner for the purposes set forth in section 4-01-334.1-01-19.
 All moneys in the federal environmental law impact review fund are appropriated to the commissioner on a continuing basis for the purposes set forth in section
 4-01-334.1-01-19.
