- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact sections 57-38-01.26 and 57-38.5-02 of the North
- 2 Dakota Century Code, relating to investments in qualified businesses for purposes of the angel
- 3 fund investment tax credit and publication of a list of qualified businesses; and to provide an
- 4 effective date.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 57-38-01.26 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

57-38-01.26. Angel fund investment tax credit.

- 1. A taxpayer is entitled to a credit against state income tax liability under section 57-38-30 or 57-38-30.3 for an investment made in an angel fund that is a domestic organization created under the laws of this state. The amount of the credit to which a taxpayer is entitled is forty-five percent of the amount remitted by the taxpayer to an angel fund during the taxable year. The aggregate annual credit for which a taxpayer may obtain a tax credit is not more than forty-five thousand dollars. The aggregate lifetime credits under this section that may be obtained by an individual, married couple, passthrough entity and its affiliates, or other taxpayer is five hundred thousand dollars. The investment used to calculate the credit under this section may not be used to calculate any other income tax deduction or credit allowed by law.
- 2. To be eligible for the credit, the investment must be at risk in the angel fund for at least three years and invested by the angel fund in a qualified business within three years. For purposes of this section, "qualified business" has the meaning provided in section 57-38.5-01. An investment made in a qualified business from the assets of a retirement plan is deemed to be the retirement plan participant's investment for the purpose of this section if a separate account is maintained for the plan participant and

the participant directly controls where the account assets are invested. Investments placed in escrow do not qualify for the credit. The credit must be claimed in the taxable year in which the investment in the angel fund was received by the angel fund. The credit allowed may not exceed the liability for tax under this chapter. If the amount of credit determined under this section exceeds the liability for tax under this chapter, the excess may be carried forward to each of the seven succeeding taxable years. A taxpayer claiming a credit under this section may not claim any credit available to the taxpayer as a result of an investment made by the angel fund in a qualified business under chapter 57-38.5 or 57-38.6.

3. An angel fund must:

- a. Be a partnership, limited partnership, corporation, limited liability company, limited liability partnership, limited liability limited partnership, trust, or estate organized on a for-profit basis which is headquartered in this state.
- b. Be organized for the purpose of investing in a portfolio of at least three primary-sector companies that are early-stage and mid-stage private, nonpublicly traded enterprises with strong growth potential. For purposes of this section, an early-stage entity means an entity with annual revenues of up to two million dollars and a mid-stage entity means an entity with annual revenues over two-million dollars not to exceed ten million dollarsqualified businesses. Investments in real estate or real estate holding companies are not eligible investments by certified angel funds. Any angel fund certified before January 1, 2013, which has invested in real estate or a real estate holding company is not eligible for recertification.
- c. Consist of at least six accredited investors as defined by securities and exchange commission regulation D, rule 501.
- d. Not have more than twenty-five percent of its capitalized investment assets owned by an individual investor.
- e. Have at least five hundred thousand dollars in commitments from accredited investors and that capital must be subject to call to be invested over an unspecified number of years to build a portfolio of investments in enterprisesqualified businesses.

1 Be member-managed or a manager-managed limited liability company and the 2 investor members or a designated board that includes investor members must 3 make decisions as a group on which enterprises gualified businesses are worthy 4 of investments. 5 Be certified as an angel fund that meets the requirements of this section by the g. 6 department of commerce. 7 Be in compliance with the securities laws of this state. h. 8 i. Within thirty days after the date on which an investment in an angel fund is made. 9 the angel fund shall file with the tax commissioner and provide to the investor 10 completed forms prescribed by the tax commissioner which show as to each 11 investment in the angel fund the following: 12 The name, address, and social security number or federal employer 13 identification number of the taxpayer or passthrough entity that made the 14 investment: 15 (2) The dollar amount remitted by the taxpayer or passthrough entity; and 16 The date the payment was received by the angel fund for the investment. 17 Within thirty days after the end of a calendar year, the angel fund shall file with j. 18 the tax commissioner a report showing the name and principal place of business 19 of each enterprise qualified business in which the angel fund has an investment, 20 the date the investment was received by the qualified business, and the amount 21 of each investment. 22 Within three years after receiving an investment that qualified for a credit under k. 23 this section the angel fund shall file with the tax commissioner a report that 24 shows the investment received by the angel fund was invested in a qualified 25 business. 26 4. The tax commissioner may disclose to the legislative management the reported 27 information described under paragraphs 2 and 3 of subdivision i of subsection 3 and 28 the reported information described under subdivision j of subsection 3. 29 5. Angel fund investors may be actively involved in the enterprises qualified businesses in 30 which the angel fund invests but the angel fund may not invest in any 31 enterprise qualified business if any one angel fund investor owns directly or indirectly

- more than forty-nine percent of the ownership interests in the enterprisequalified

 business. The angel fund may not invest in an enterprisea qualified business if any

 one partner, shareholder, or member of a passthrough entity that directly or indirectly

 owns more than forty-nine percent of the ownership interests in the enterprisequalified

 business.
 - 6. Investors in one angel fund may not receive more than five million dollars in aggregate credits under this section during the life of the angel fund but this provision may not be interpreted to limit additional investments in that angel fund.
 - 7. a. A passthrough entity entitled to the credit under this section must be considered to be the taxpayer for purposes of this section, and the amount of the credit allowed must be determined at the passthrough entity level.
 - b. For the first two taxable years beginning after December 31, 2010, if a passthrough entity does not elect to sell, transfer, or assign the credit as provided under this subsection and subsection 8, the amount of the total credit determined at the entity level must be passed through to the partners, shareholders, or members in proportion to their respective interests in the passthrough entity.
 - e. For the first two taxable years beginning after December 31, 2010, if a passthrough entity elects to sell, transfer, or assign a credit as provided under this subsection and subsection 8, the passthrough entity shall make an irrevocable election to sell, transfer, or assign the credit on the return filed by the entity for the taxable year in which the credit was earned. A passthrough entity that makes a valid election to sell, transfer, or assign a credit shall sell one hundred percent of the credit earned, may sell the credit to only one purchaser, and shall comply with the requirements of this subsection and subsection 8.
 - 8. For the first two taxable years beginning after December 31, 2010, a taxpayer may elect to sell, transfer, or assign all of the earned or excess tax credit earned under this section for investment in an angel fund established after July 31, 2011, subject to the following:
 - a. A taxpayer's total credit sale, transfer, or assignment under this section may not exceed one hundred thousand dollars over any combination of taxable years.

 The cumulative credits transferred by all investors in an angel fund may not

- 1 exceed fifty percent of the aggregate credits under this section during the life of the angel fund under subsection 6.
 - b. If the taxpayer elects to sell, assign, or transfer a credit under this subsection, the tax credit transferor and the tax credit purchaser jointly shall file with the tax commissioner a copy of the purchase agreement and a statement containing the names, addresses, and taxpayer identification numbers of the parties to the transfer, the amount of the credit being transferred, the gross proceeds received by the transferor, and the taxable year or years for which the credit may be claimed. The taxpayer and the purchaser also shall file a document allowing the tax commissioner to disclose tax information to either party for the purpose of verifying the correctness of the transferred tax credit. The purchase agreement, supporting statement, and waiver must be filed within thirty days after the date the purchase agreement is fully executed.
 - c. The purchaser of the tax credit shall claim the credit beginning with the taxable year in which the credit purchase agreement was fully executed by the parties. A purchaser of a tax credit under this section has only such rights to claim and use the credit under the terms that would have applied to the tax credit transferor.

 This subsection does not limit the ability of the tax credit purchaser to reduce the tax liability of the purchaser, regardless of the actual tax liability of the tax credit transferor.
 - d. A sale, assignment, or transfer of a tax credit under this section is irrevocable and the purchaser of the tax credit may not sell, assign, or otherwise transfer the credit.
 - e. If the amount of the credit available under this section is changed as a result of an amended return filed by the transferor, or as the result of an audit conducted by the internal revenue service or the tax commissioner, the transferor shall report to the purchaser the adjusted credit amount within thirty days of the amended return or within thirty days of the final determination made by the internal revenue service or the tax commissioner. The tax credit purchaser shall file amended returns reporting the additional tax due or claiming a refund as provided in section 57-38-38 or 57-38-40, and the tax commissioner may audit

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1 these returns and assess or issue refunds, even though other time periods 2 prescribed in these sections may have expired for the purchaser. 3 Gross proceeds received by the tax credit transferor must be assigned to North-4 Dakota. The amount assigned under this subsection cannot be reduced by the 5 taxpayer's income apportioned to North Dakota or any North Dakota net-6 operating loss of the taxpayer. 7 The tax commissioner has four years after the date of the credit assignment to q. 8 audit the returns of the credit transferor and the purchaser to verify the 9 correctness of the amount of the transferred credit and if necessary assess the 10 eredit purchaser if additional tax is found due. This subdivision does not limit or-11 restrict any other time period prescribed in this chapter for the assessment of tax. 12 The tax commissioner may adopt rules to establish necessary administrative h. 13 provisions for the credit under this section, including provisions to permit-14 verification of the validity and timeliness of the transferred tax credit. 15 SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 57-38.5-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is 16 amended and reenacted as follows: 17 57-38.5-02. Certification - Investment reporting by qualified businesses - Maximum 18 investments in qualified businesses. 19 The director shall certify whether a business that has requested to become a qualified 20 business meets the requirements of subsection 5 of section 57-38.5-01. The director 21 shall make publicly available a list of all businesses certified or recertified as a 22 qualified business and shall update the list on a monthly basis. The director shall 23 establish the necessary forms and procedures for certifying qualified businesses. 24 A qualified business may apply to the director for a recertification. Only one 25 recertification is available to a qualified business. The application for recertification 26 must be filed with the director within ninety days before the original certification expiry 27 date. The recertification issued by the director must comply with the provisions of 28 subsection 3. 29 A certification letter must be issued by the director to the qualified business. The 30 certification letter must include:

The certification effective date.

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1 The certification expiry date. The expiry date may not be more than four years 2 from the certification effective date. 3 4. The maximum aggregate amount of qualified investments a qualified business may 4 receive for all tax years is limited to five hundred thousand dollars under this chapter. 5 The tax credit allowed on qualified investments in a qualified business must be 6 allowed to taxpayers in the chronological order of the taxpayer's qualified investments 7 as determined from the forms filed under section 57-38.5-07. The limitation on 8 investments under this subsection may not be interpreted to limit additional investment 9 by a taxpayer for which that taxpayer is not applying for a credit. 10 **SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE.** This Act is effective for taxable years after December 31,
