- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 16.1-11 of the North Dakota
- 2 Century Code, relating to filing of petitions or certificates of endorsement by legislative
- 3 candidates; and to amend and reenact sections 16.1-11-06 and 16.1-11-11, subsection 5 of
- 4 section 16.1-11-18, subsection 4 of section 16.1-12-02.2, subsection 2 of section 16.1-12-04,
- 5 and section 16.1-12-06 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to filing of petitions or
- 6 certificates of endorsement by legislative candidates.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 16.1-11-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 16.1-11-06. State candidate's petition or political party certificate of endorsement required to get name on ballot Contents Filing.
 - 1. Every candidate for United States senator, United States representative, a state office, including except the office of state senator or state representative, and judges of the supreme and district courts shall present to the secretary of state, between the first date candidates may begin circulating nominating petitions according to this chapter and before four p.m. of the sixty-fourth day before any primary election, either:
 - a. The certificate of endorsement signed by the state chairman of any legally recognized political party containing the candidate's name, post-office address, and telephone number, the title of the office to which the candidate aspires, and the party which the candidate represents; or
 - b. The nominating petition containing the following:
 - (1) The candidate's name, post-office address, and telephone number, and the title of the office to which the candidate aspires, the appropriate district

10				However, no more than three hundred signatures may be required.	
11			(b)	If there was no candidate of a party for a position at the preceding	
12				general election, at least three hundred signatures.	
13			(c)	If the office is under the no-party designation, at least three hundred	
14				signatures.	
15			(d)	If the office is a legislative office, the signatures of at least one percent	
16				of the total resident population of the legislative district as determined	
17				by the most recent federal decennial census.

25	amended and reenacted as follows:

27	Every candidate for a county or legislative district office shall present, between the first date				
28	candidates may begin circulating nominating petitions according to this chapter and before

The signatures of qualified electors, the number of which must be determined as <u>C.</u> 13 follows: 14 (1) If the office is a county office, the signatures of not less than two percent a. 15 and not more than five percent of the total vote cast for the office at the 16 most recent general election at which the office was voted upon. 17 <u>(2)</u> If the office is a county office and multiple candidates were elected to the b. 18 office at the preceding general election at which the office was voted upon, 19 the signatures of not less than two percent and not more than five percent 20 of the votes cast for all candidates divided by the number of candidates that 21 were to be elected to that office. 22 If the office is a county office and no candidate was elected or no votes (3) C. 23 were cast for the office at any general election, the number of signers equal 24 to the percentage as provided in paragraph 1 applied to the total average 25 vote cast for the offices of sheriff and county auditor at the most recent 26 general election at which those officers were elected in the petitioner's 27 county. This average must be determined by dividing by two the total vote 28 cast for those offices. 29 If the office is a legislative office, the signatures of a least one percent of the d. (4) 30 total resident population of the legislative district as determined by the most 31 recent federal decennial census.

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- 1 (5) In no case may more than three hundred signatures be required.
- 3. d. The residential address, mailing address (if different from residential address),
 and date of signing for each signer. A post office box does not qualify as a
 residential address. In those areas of the state where street addresses are not
 available, a description of where the residential address is located shall be used.

If the petition or certificate of endorsement is mailed, it must be in the possession of the county auditor before four p.m. on the sixty-fourth day before the primary election.

- **SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 5 of section 16.1-11-18 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
 - If a vacancy occurs in a slate of legislative candidates after the candidates have been nominated at the primary election, the proper district executive committee may fill the vacancy by filing a certificate of nomination with the secretary of state county auditor of the new nominee's county of residence. The chairman and secretary of the committee shall make and file with the secretary of state county auditor of the new nominee's county of residence a certificate setting forth the cause of the vacancy, the name of the personindividual for whom the new nominee is to be substituted, the fact that the committee was authorized to fill vacancies, and any further information as may be required to be given in an original certificate of nomination. When the certificate is filed, the secretary of state county auditor of the new nominee's county of residence shall certify the new nomination to the various county auditors affected by the change and to the secretary of state by forwarding to them the name of the personindividual who has been nominated to fill the vacancy in place of the original nominee. The certification must include the name and address of the new nominee, the office the new nominee is nominated for, the party or political principle the new nominee represents, and the name of the personindividual for whom the new nominee is substituting. Failure to publish the name of a new nominee does not invalidate the election.

SECTION 4. A new section to chapter 16.1-11 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

1	Filing petition or certificate of endorsement when legislative district composed of

3	When a legislative district is composed of more than one county, the certificate of					
4	endorsement or the petition provided for in section 16.1-11-11 must be filed with the county					
5	auditor of the county in which the candidate resides, and that county auditor shall certify to the					
6	county auditors of the other counties comprising the legislative district the names and					
7	addresses of the candidates filing the petitions or certificates. At the same time, the county					
8	auditor shall certify to the secretary of state the names and addresses of all legislative					
9	candidates nominated in the county under this chapter.					
10	SEC	CTION 5. AMENDMENT. Subsection 4 of section 16.1-12-02.2 of the North Dakota				
11	Century	Code is amended and reenacted as follows:				
12	4.	An individual who intends to be a write-in candidate for any legislative district office				
13		shall file a certificate of write-in candidacy with the secretary of stateelection officer				
14		with whom the candidate would otherwise file to have the candidate's name placed on				
15		the ballot. The certificate must contain the name, address, and signature of the				
16		candidate. Certificates must be filed by four p.m. on the fourth day before the election.				
17		When the candidate files a certificate, the candidate also shall file the contribution				
18		statement provided for under section 16.1-08.1-02 complete through the day of the				
19		filing of the certificate.				
20	SECTION 6. AMENDMENT. Subsection 2 of section 16.1-12-04 of the North Dakota					
21	Century	Code is amended and reenacted as follows:				
22	2.	Certificates of nomination for nominees for county and legislative offices must be filed				
23		with the county auditor of the county in which the candidate resides. The county				
24		auditor shall certify the names and addresses of legislative candidates filing				
25		certificates of nomination under this chapter to the secretary of state. When a				
26		legislative district is composed of more than one county, the county auditor shall certify				
27		to the county auditors of the other counties comprising the legislative district the				
28		names and addresses of the candidates filing certificates of nomination.				
29	SECTION 7. AMENDMENT. Section 16.1-12-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is					
30	amended and reenacted as follows:					

1 16.1-12-06. PersonIndividual nominated by more than one party - Column in which 2 name placed.

When one personindividual has been nominated for the same office by more than one body of electors qualified to make nominations for public office, the nominee shall file with the secretary of stateproper officer designated in this chapter or before the last day fixed by law for filing certificates of nomination for the office, a signed statement designating the column on the official ballot in which the nominee desires the nominee's name to appear. The column so designated must be the column allotted to one of the bodies of electors by whom the personindividual was nominated. In the absence of a timely written designation as provided by this section, the secretary of stateappropriate officer shall place the person's individual's name in the column allotted to the body of electors from which was first received notice of the person's individual's nomination.
