8	<u>1.</u>	<u>"Allo</u>	owable amount of cannabis" means:
9		<u>a.</u>	Two and one-half-ounces of cannabis; or
0		<u>b.</u>	The quantity of cannabis products as established by department regulation;
11		<u>c.</u>	If the cardholder has a registry identification card allowing cultivation, six
2			cannabis plants; and
3		<u>d.</u>	If the cardholder has a registry identification card allowing cultivation, the amount
4			of cannabis and cannabis products which were produced from the cardholder's

6			same property where the plants were cultivated.

12		with	the department to analyze the safety and potency of cannabis.

4		department under this chapter which acquires, possesses, stores, delivers, transfers,			
5		transports, sells, supplies, or dispenses cannabis, cannabis products, paraphernalia,			
6		or related supplies and educational materials to cardholders.			
7	<u>16.</u>	"Medical cannabis establishment" means a cultivation facility, a cannabis testing			
8		facility, a cannabis product manufacturing facility, or a dispensary.

26		a. The medical use of cannabis under this chapter, if the cardholder does not

The presumption may be rebutted by evidence that 22 conduct related to cannabis was not for the purpose of treating or alleviating a 23 gualifying patient's debilitating medical condition or symptoms associated with the 24 qualifying patient's debilitating medical condition pursuant to this chapter. 25 A practitioner may not be subject to arrest, prosecution, or penalty in any manner, or 26 denied any right or privilege, including civil penalty or disciplinary action by the state 27 board of medical examiners or by any other occupational or professional licensing 28 board or bureau, solely for providing written certifications or for otherwise stating that, 29 in the practitioner's professional opinion, a patient is likely to receive therapeutic or 30 palliative benefit from the medical use of cannabis to treat or alleviate the patient's

serious or debilitating medical condition or symptoms associated with the serious or

A testing facility or testing facility agent is not subject to prosecution, search, or 14 inspection, except by the department under this chapter, seizure, or penalty in any 15 manner, and may not be denied any right or privilege, including civil penalty or 16 disciplinary action by a court or business licensing board or entity, for acting under this 17 chapter and rules authorized by this chapter to: 18 <u>a.</u> Acquire, possess, transport, and store cannabis and cannabis products obtained 19 from cardholders, nonresident cardholders, and medical cannabis 20 establishments; 21 <u>b.</u> Return the cannabis and cannabis products to the cardholders, nonresident 22 cardholders, and medical cannabis establishment from which it was obtained; 23 Test cannabis, including for potency, pesticides, mold, or contaminants; and <u>C.</u> 24 <u>d.</u> Receive compensation for those services. 25 11. A cardholder, nonresident cardholder, or the equivalent of a medical cannabis 26 establishment that is registered in another jurisdiction may sell or donate cannabis 27 seeds to cultivation facilities. 28 Any cannabis, cannabis product, cannabis paraphernalia, or other interest in or right to 12. 29 property that is possessed, owned, or used in connection with the medical use of 30 cannabis as allowed under this chapter, or acts incidental to that use, may not be 31 seized or forfeited. This chapter may not prevent the seizure or forfeiture of cannabis

1		exceeding the amounts allowed under this chapter, nor prevent seizure or forfeiture if					
2		the basis for the action is unrelated to the cannabis that is possessed, manufactured,					
3		transferred, or used under this chapter.					
4	<u>13.</u>	Possession of, or application for, a registry identification card does not constitute					
5		probable cause or reasonable suspicion, nor may it be used to support a search of the					
6		individual or property of the individual possessing or applying for the registry					
7		identification card, or otherwise subject the individual or property of the individual to					
8		inspection by any governmental agency.					
9	<u>14.</u>	For the purposes of state law, activities related to medical cannabis must be					
10	1	considered lawful as long as the activities are in accordance with this chapter.					
11	<u> 15.</u>	A law enforcement officer employed by an agency that receives state or local					
12		government funds may not expend any state or local resources, including the officer's					
13		time, to effect any arrest or seizure of cannabis, or conduct any investigation, on the					
14		sole basis of activity the officer believes to constitute a violation of the Controlled					
15		Substances Act [21 U.S.C. 811 et seq.] if the officer has reason to believe the activity					
16		is in compliance with this chapter, nor may that officer expend any state or local					
17		resources, including the officer's time, to provide any information or logistical support					
18		related to such activity to any federal law enforcement authority or prosecuting entity.					
19	<u>19-2</u>	24-03. Limitations.					
20	<u>1.</u>	This chapter does not authorize any person to engage in, and does not prevent the					
21		imposition of any civil, criminal, or other penalties for engaging in, the following					
22		conduct:					
23		a. Undertaking any task under the influence of cannabis, when doing so would					
24		constitute negligence or professional malpractice;					
25		b. Possessing cannabis or otherwise engaging in the medical use of cannabis in					
26		any correctional facility:					
27		c. Smoking cannabis:					
28		(1) On any form of public transportation; or					
29		(2) In any public place or any place that is open to the public;					
30		c. Operating, navigating, or being in actual physical control of any motor vehicle,					
31		aircraft, train, or motorboat while under the influence of cannabis, except that a					

1 registered qualifying patient or nonresident cardholder may not be considered to 2 be under the influence of cannabis solely because of the presence of metabolites 3 or components of cannabis that appear in insufficient concentration to cause 4 impairment. 5 19-24-04. Discrimination prohibited. 6 1. A school or landlord may not refuse to enroll or lease to and may not otherwise 7 penalize an individual solely for the individual's status as a cardholder, unless failing to 8 do so would violate federal law or regulations or cause the school or landlord to lose a 9 monetary or licensing-related benefit under federal law or regulations. 10 For the purposes of medical care, including organ and tissue transplants, a registered 11 qualifying patient's use of cannabis according to this chapter is considered the 12 equivalent of the authorized use of any other medication used at the discretion of a 13 practitioner and does not constitute the use of an illicit substance or otherwise 14 disqualify a qualifying patient from necessary medical care. 15 <u>3.</u> An individual may not be denied primary residential responsibility of or parenting time 16 with a minor solely for the individual's status as a cardholder, and there may not be a 17 presumption of neglect or child endangerment for conduct allowed under this chapter, 18 unless the individual's behavior is such that it creates an unreasonable danger to the 19 safety of the minor as established by clear and convincing evidence. 20 Except as provided in this chapter, a registered qualifying patient who uses cannabis <u>4.</u> 21 for medical purposes must be afforded all the same rights under state and local law, 22 including those guaranteed under chapter 14-02.4, as the individual would be afforded 23 if the patient were solely prescribed pharmaceutical medications, as it pertains to: 24 <u>a.</u> Any interaction with a individual's employer; 25 b. Drug testing by a individual's employer; or 26 Drug testing required by any state or local law, agency, or government official. <u>C.</u> 27 <u>5.</u> The rights provided by this section do not apply to the extent the rights conflict with an 28 employer's obligations under federal law or regulations or to the extent the rights 29 would disqualify an employer from a monetary or licensing-related benefit under 30 federal law or regulations.

1	<u>6.</u>	An employer is not required to allow the ingestion of cannabis in any workplace or to
2		allow any employee to work while under the influence of cannabis. A registered
3		qualifying patient may not be considered to be under the influence of cannabis solely
4		because of the presence of metabolites or components of cannabis that appear in
5		insufficient concentration to cause impairment.
6	<u>7.</u>	A school, landlord, or employer may not be penalized or denied any benefit under
7		state law for enrolling, leasing to, or employing a cardholder.
8	<u>19-2</u>	4-05. Addition of debilitating medical conditions.
9	<u>Any</u>	resident of the state may petition the department to add serious medical conditions or
10	the cond	lition's treatments to the list of debilitating medical conditions listed in this chapter. The
11	departm	ent shall consider petitions in the manner required by department regulation, including
12	public no	otice and hearing. The department shall approve or deny a petition within one hundred
13	eighty d	ays of its submission. The approval or denial of any petition is a final decision of the
14	departm	ent, subject to judicial review.
15	<u>19-2</u>	24-06. Acts not required - Acts not prohibited.
16	<u>1.</u>	This chapter does not require:
17	ı	a. Medial assistance or a private insurer to reimburse an individual for costs
18		associated with the medical use of cannabis; or
19		b. Any person in lawful possession of property to allow a guest, client, customer, or
20		other visitor to smoke cannabis on or in that property; or
21		c. A landlord to allow the cultivation of cannabis on the rental property.
22	<u>2.</u>	This chapter does not prohibit an employer from disciplining an employee for ingesting
23		cannabis in the workplace or for working while under the influence of cannabis.
24	<u>19-2</u>	24-07. Issuance - Denial.
25	<u>1.</u>	The department shall begin issuing registry identification cards to qualifying patients
26		no later than one hundred forty days after the effective date of this Act who submit the
27		following, in accordance with the department's regulations:

An individual who intentionally makes a false statement to a law enforcement official about any fact or circumstance relating to the medical use of cannabis to avoid arrest or prosecution is guilty of a class B misdemeanor. This penalty is in addition to any other penalties that may apply for making a false statement or for the possession, cultivation, or sale of cannabis not protected by this chapter. If an individual convicted of violating this section is a cardholder, the individual is disqualified from further participation under this chapter.
      - 5. A person that knowingly submits false records or documentation required by the department to certify a medical cannabis establishment under this chapter is guilty of a class C felony.
- A practitioner who knowingly refers patients to a medical cannabis establishment or to
  a designated caregiver, who advertises in a medical cannabis establishment, or who
  issues written certifications while holding a financial interest in a medical cannabis
  establishment must be fined up to one thousand dollars.

- 1 7. It is a class B misdemeanor for any person, including an employee or official of the
  2 department or another state agency or local government, to breach the confidentiality
  3 of information obtained pursuant to this chapter.
  - 8. A medical cannabis establishment is subject to a fine of up to one thousand dollars for any violation of this chapter, or the rules issued under this chapter if no penalty has been specified. This penalty is in addition to any other penalties applicable by law.

### 19-24-17. Suspension - Revocation.

- 1. The department may on its own motion or on complaint, after investigation and opportunity for a public hearing at which the medical cannabis establishment has been afforded an opportunity to be heard, suspend or revoke a registration certificate for multiple negligent or knowing violations or for a serious and knowing violation by the registrant or any of the registrant's agents of this chapter or any rules under this chapter.
- 2. The department shall provide notice of suspension, revocation, fine, or other sanction, as well as the required notice of the hearing, in writing to the medical cannabis establishment at the address on the registration certificate. A suspension may not be for a period longer than six months.
- 3. A medical cannabis establishment may continue to possess cannabis during a suspension but that establishment may not dispense, transfer, or sell cannabis during the suspension. A cultivation facility may continue to cultivate and possess cannabis plants during a suspension, but that cultivation facility may not dispense, transfer, or sell cannabis during the suspension.
- 4. The department immediately shall revoke the registry identification card of any
  cardholder who sells cannabis to an individual who is not allowed to possess cannabis
  for medical purposes under this chapter, and the cardholder is disqualified from further
  participation under this chapter.
- 5. The department may revoke the registry identification card of any cardholder who
  knowingly commits multiple unintentional violations or a serious knowing violation of
  this chapter.
  - 6. Revocation is a final decision of the department and is subject to judicial review.

    - Any recommended additions or revisions to the department regulations or this chapter, including relating to security, safe handling, labeling, and nomenclature; and
