1 A BILL for an Act providing an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of

2 human services; to create and enact subdivision aa of subsection 1 of section 50-09-29 and a

3 new section to chapter 50-24.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to temporary

4 assistance for needy families benefits and to the monthly maintenance needs allowance; to

5 amend and reenact sections <u>50-06-16,</u> 50-06-32.1, 50-06-37, and subsection 1 of section

6 50-09-29, of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to <u>rulemaking authority</u>, the expiration

7 date on the autism spectrum disorder voucher program pilot project, and the assessment used

8 for the developmental disabilities system reimbursement project; to provide an exemption; to

9 provide payments to counties out of enhanced federal payment; to provide reports to the

10 legislative management; to provide for a legislative management study; to provide an

11 appropriation to the legislative council; and to provide an effective date; and to declare an

12 <u>emergency</u>.

13 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the department of human services for the purpose of defraying the expenses of its various divisions, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017, as follows:

23 committees of the sixty-fifth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the

biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

SECTION 3. FUNDING TRANSFERS - EXCEPTION - AUTHORIZATION. Notwithstanding
section 54-16-04, the department of human services may transfer appropriation authority
between line items within each subdivision of section 1 of this Act and between subdivisions
within section 1 of this Act for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.
The department shall notify the office of management and budget of any transfer made

- 30 pursuant to this section. The department shall report to the budget section after June 30, 2016,

1 any transfers made in excess of \$50,000 and to the appropriations committees of the sixty-fifth 2 legislative assembly regarding any transfers made pursuant to this section. 3 SECTION 4. EXEMPTION. The amount appropriated for the replacement of the medicaid 4 management information system and related projects in chapter 50 of the 2007 Session Laws 5 and chapter 38 of the 2011 Session Laws is not subject to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11. 6 Any unexpended funds from these appropriations approved under section 54-44.1-11 for 7 continuation into the 2009-11 biennium and then the 2011-13 biennium and then the 2013-15 8 biennium are available for the completion of the medicaid management information system and 9 related projects during the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. 10 **SECTION 5. EXEMPTION.** The amount appropriated for the modification of the 11 department's eligibility systems in chapter 578 of the 2011 Special Session Laws is not subject 12 to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11. Any unexpended funds from this appropriation approved

under section 54-44.1-11 for continuation into the 2013-15 biennium are available for the
completion of the modification of the eligibility systems project during the biennium beginning
July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

SECTION 6. AMENDMENT. Section 50-06-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is
amended and reenacted as follows:

50-06-16. Rulemaking authority.

19 The department may adopt rules necessary to carry out the responsibilities of the 20 department in conformity with any statute administered or enforced by the department. All rules 21 adopted must be published in the North Dakota Administrative Code. Rules adopted by 22 agencies prior to January 1, 1982, which relate to functions or agencies covered by this chapter 23 remain in effect until such time as they are specifically amended or repealed. The department is 24 not required to adopt rules to establish the process for the administration of funds appropriated 25 to the department in an appropriation identified by the legislative assembly as a one-time 26 funding item.

SECTION 7. AMENDMENT. Section 50-06-32.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

1 50-06-32.1. (Effective through June 30, 2015) Autism spectrum disorder voucher

2 program pilot project - Legislative management report - Appeal.

3 1. The department of human services shall establish a voucher program pilot project 4 beginning July 1, 2014, to assist in funding equipment and general educational needs 5 related to autism spectrum disorder for individuals below two hundred percent of the 6 federal poverty level from age three to under age eighteen who have been diagnosed 7 with autism spectrum disorder. The program may include funding for assistive 8 technology; video modeling videos or equipment; language-generating devices; 9 training and educational material for parents; parenting education; sensory equipment; 10 tutors; safety equipment; travel tools; self-care equipment; timers; visual 11 representation systems; respite care; specialized daycare; language comprehension 12 equipment: and registration and related expenses for workshops and training to 13 improve independent living skills, employment opportunities, and other executive or 14 social skills.

15 2. The department shall adopt rules addressing management of this voucher program 16 pilot project and establishing the eligibility requirements and exclusions for this 17 voucher program pilot project. The program may not provide a voucher for early 18 intensive behavioral intervention, including applied behavioral analysis, intensive early 19 interventional behavioral therapy, intensive behavioral intervention, the Lovaas 20 method, the Denver model, LEAP (learning experiences - an alternative program for 21 preschoolers and parents), TEACCH (treatment and education of autistic and related 22 communication handicapped children), pivotal response training, or discrete trial 23 training.

- A decision on a voucher application which is issued by the department under this
 section may be appealed as provided under chapter 28-32.
- 26 4. The department of human services shall report to the legislative management
 27 regarding the autism spectrum disorder program pilot project.

SECTION 8. AMENDMENT. Section 50-06-37 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:

1 50-06-37. Developmental disabilities system reimbursement project. 2 The department of human services, in conjunction with developmental disabilities service 3 providers, shall develop a prospective or related payment system with an independent rate 4 model utilizing the support intensity scale. 5 1. The department shall establish a steering committee consisting of representatives 6 from all interested providers and department representatives. The steering committee 7 shall guide the development of the new payment system including assisting a 8 consultant to conceptualize, develop, design, implement, and evaluate a new payment 9 system. 10 2. The department shall contract with a consultant by September 1, 2011, to develop, in 11 collaboration with the steering committee, the payment system and the resource 12 allocation model tying funding to support intensity scale assessed needs of clients 13 aged sixteen and older and to a state-approved assessment that assesses needs of 14 clients younger than sixteen years of age. 15 3. After the prospective or related payment system rates are developed, the new rates 16 must be tested on a sampling of clients and providers, the sample to be determined by 17 the steering committee, allowing sufficient time to capture provider cost, client-realized 18 need, and service provision data. The consultant shall provide the appropriate 19 sampling number to sufficiently test the rates, types of services, and needs of clients 20 with the intent to include as many providers as fiscally feasible. 21 4. The department shall contract with a team of support intensity scale assessors by 22 September 1, 2011. The team shall begin assessing immediately the identified client 23 pilot group identified by the consultant contracted in subsection 2. 24 5. Once testing is complete, the data must be analyzed by the consultant and the 25 consultant shall make any needed rate adjustments, resource allocation modifications, 26 or process assumptions. 27 6. Beginning in June 2012, the department and the steering committee shall report 28 development activities and status information to an interim legislative committee. 29 7. Implementation of any system developed under this chapter may not occur before the 30 implementation of the department's new medicaid management information system.

- 1 SECTION 9. Subdivision aa of subsection 1 of section 50-09-29 the North Dakota Century
- 2 Code is created and enacted as follows:
- aa. Provide an annual percentage increase in the benefit amount that is equal to the
 annual percentage increase in the consumer price index for urban consumers,
 within the limits of legislative appropriation.
- 6 SECTION 10. A new section to chapter 50-24.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is
- 7 created and enacted as follows:

8 Monthly maintenance needs allowance.

- 9 In determining eligibility for medical assistance applicants and recipients, the department of
- 10 <u>human services shall establish a monthly maintenance needs allowance for a community</u>
- 11 spouse equal to the maximum amount permitted under 42 U.S.C. 1396r-5. The department
- 12 shall provide annual increases in the monthly maintenance needs allowance equal to the
- 13 annual percentage increase in the consumer price index for urban consumers, provided,
- 14 however, that the monthly maintenance needs allowance does not exceed the amount set by
- 15 the centers for medicare and medicaid services for the year in which the increase is applied.

16 SECTION 11. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES -

17 **MEDICALLY FRAGILE INTENSIVE CARE FACILITY.** It is the intent of the sixty-fourth

- 18 legislative assembly that the department of human services develop a plan for a medically
- 19 fragile intensive care facility for certain individuals transitioning from the life skills and transition
- 20 center during the 2015-16 interim. It is further the intent of the legislative assembly that the plan
- 21 consider the resident's and their family's preferences regarding the location of the facility and
- that the department include funding for the facility in its 2017-19 biennium budget request.

23 SECTION 12. PAYMENTS TO THE COUNTY FOR LOCAL EXPENSES OF

24 **ADMINISTRATION OF THE MEDICAID PROGRAM.** Within the limits of legislative

- 25 appropriation, the department may reimburse counties for part of the local expenses of
- 26 administration for determining eligibility for services under chapter 50-24.1, an amount that
- 27 represents all or part of an increase in payments from the federal government to the department
- 28 for administration of the medicaid program.

SECTION 13. APPROPRIATION. Special funds derived from federal funds and other
 income, are appropriated to the department of human services for the purpose of reimbursing
 counties under section 10 of this Act for part of the local expenses of administration of the

1 medicaid program under chapters 50-01.2 and 50-24.1, for the biennium beginning July 1,

2 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

3 SECTION 14. GRANTS - EXEMPTION - REPORTS TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT. 4 The grants line item in subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act includes \$205,000 from the general 5 fund for a grant to a statewide family-controlled parent-to-parent support organization with at 6 least fifty percent of its board of directors consisting of members whose primary daily 7 responsibilities include caring for a child with a mental health disorder, for the biennium 8 beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. Funds awarded must be used for providing 9 services to children with emotional, behavioral, or mental health needs. The organization 10 receiving a grant under this section shall provide a report to the legislative management during 11 the 2015-16 interim on the use of grant funds. The requirements of chapter 54-44.4 do not 12 apply to the selection of a grantee, the grant award, or payments made under this section. 13 SECTION 15. GRANTS - EXEMPTION - REPORTS TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT. 14 The grants line item in subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act includes \$205,000 from the general 15 fund for a grant to a statewide family-to-family health information and education organization 16 which provides parent-to-parent support for families and is located in a county with a population 17 of less than 6,000 based on the 2010 decennial census, for the biennium beginning July 1, 18 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. Funds awarded must be used for family-related information 19 and education services. The organization receiving a grant under this section shall provide a 20 report to the legislative management during the 2015-16 interim on the use of grant funds. The 21 requirements of chapter 54-44.4 do not apply to the selection of a grantee, the grant award, or 22 payments made under this section. 23 SECTION 16. GRANTS FOR MENTAL HEALTH DISORDER PREVENTION SERVICES -

EXEMPTION. The grants line item in subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act includes \$90,000 from the general fund for a grant to an organization providing mental health disorder-related services for caregivers, and children up to age eight in the southeast human service region, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. Funds awarded may be used to assist caregivers with providing screening, assessment, development education, relationship-based skills coaching, prevention, short-term therapy treatment, and early

30 identification services for children up to age eight experiencing behavioral or emotional

difficulties. The requirements of chapter 54-44.4 do not apply to the selection of a grantee, the
grant award, or payments made under this section.

SECTION 17. APPROPRIATION - 2013-15 BIENNIUM. There is appropriated out of special
funds derived from federal funds, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$87,000,000, or so
much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of human services for the purpose of
defraying medical assistance grant costs, for the period beginning with the effective date of this
Act and ending June 30, 2015.

8 **SECTION 18. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - DELIVERY SYSTEM FOR** 9 CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL HEALTH CARE NEEDS. During the 2015-16 interim, the 10 legislative management shall consider studying the state service delivery system for children 11 with special health care needs and for children with a disability. The study must include 12 consideration of the special health care needs and disability needs of children. The scope of the 13 study must include consideration of access; availability, including number of children without 14 services; and delivery of services, including complexity of service delivery system. The study 15 must include input from stakeholders, including representatives of law enforcement, pediatric 16 providers, tribal governments, and state and local agencies and institutions. The legislative 17 council may contract for consulting services to assist the legislative management in conducting 18 the study. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together 19 with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-fifth legislative 20 assembly.

SECTION 19. APPROPRIATION - LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL. There is appropriated out of
any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of
\$50,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the legislative council for the purpose
of contracting for consulting services to assist the legislative management in conducting a study
of the delivery system for children with special health care needs, for the biennium beginning
July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

SECTION 20. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section <u>910</u> of this Act becomes effective on January 1,
2016.

SECTION 21. EFFECTIVE DATE. Sections 1012 and 1113 of this Act become effective on
 the effective date of the centers for medicare and medicaid services' certification that the

1 department's eligibility system has met the seven conditions and standards for the receipt of

2 enhanced match.

SECTION 22. EMERGENCY. Section 17 of this Act is declared to be an emergency

4 measure.
