1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the state water 2 commission; to provide exemptions; to create and enact three new sections to chapter 61-02 of 3 the North Dakota Century Code, relating to a Bank of North Dakota line of credit, to the state 4 water commission cost-share policy, and to North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grants and cost-5 share; to amend and reenact section 54-35-02.7 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to 6 the water topics overview committee; to repeal section 61-02-78 of the North Dakota Century 7 Code, relating to the infrastructure revolving loan fund; to provide legislative intent; to allocate 8 funding; to provide contingent allocations; to provide for reports to the legislative assembly; to 9 provide for legislative management reports; and to provide for a legislative management state 10 water commission study; and to declare an emergency.

11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the state water commission for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the state water commission, for the bienniumperiod beginning July 1, 2015 with the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 2017, as follows:

SECTION 3. SOVEREIGN LANDS ENFORCEMENT GRANT. The administrative and
 support services line item in section 1 of this Act includes \$135,000 from the resources trust
 fund the state water commission shall provide as a grant to the game and fish department for
 law enforcement activities on sovereign lands in the state, for the biennium beginning July 1,
 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

SECTION 4. SOVEREIGN LANDS RECREATION USE GRANT. The water and
atmospheric resources line item in section 1 of this Act includes \$1,000,000 from the resources
trust fund which the state water commission shall provide as a grant to the parks and recreation
department for developing recreation opportunities on sovereign lands in the state, for the
biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

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SECTION 5. ADDITIONAL INCOME - APPROPRIATION - BUDGET SECTION

APPROVAL. In addition to the amounts included in the estimated income line item in section 1
of this Act, any additional amounts in the resources trust fund and water development trust fund
which become available are appropriated, subject to budget section approval, to the state water

- 1 commission for the purpose of defraying the expenses of that agency, for the biennium
- 2 beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

3 SECTION 6. GRANTS - WATER-RELATED PROJECTS - CARRYOVER AUTHORITY. 4 Section 54-44.1-11 does not apply to funding for grants or water-related projects included in the 5 water and atmospheric resources line item in section 1 of this Act. However, this exclusion is 6 only in effect for two years after June 30, 2017. Any unexpended funds appropriated from the 7 resources trust fund after that period has expired must be transferred to the resources trust fund 8 and any unexpended funds appropriated from the water development trust fund after that period 9 has expired must be transferred to the water development trust fund. 10 SECTION 7. BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA LOAN - BOND PAYMENTS. The state water

commission shall obtain a loan from the Bank of North Dakota in an amount that may not
exceed \$56,000,000 for the purpose of paying off or defeasing outstanding bond issues, for the
period beginning with the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 2017.

SECTION 8. FARGO FLOOD CONTROL PROJECT FUNDING. Funds designated by the sixty-first legislative assembly, the sixty-second legislative assembly, the sixty-third legislative assembly, and the sixty-fourth legislative assembly for Fargo flood control are available only for levee and dike protection until the Fargo flood control project receives federal authorization, a project partnership agreement is executed, a federal appropriation is provided for project construction, and the budget for the Fargo flood control project is approved by the state water commission.

SECTION 9. FARGO FLOOD CONTROL PROJECT FUNDING AGREEMENT. Prior to the
 state water commission expending any state cost-sharing funds, an advance funding
 agreement between the United States army corps of engineers and the local Fargo flood control
 sponsor must precede any state funding used to advance construction work considered to be a
 federal responsibility.
 SECTION 10. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - FARGO FLOOD CONTROL PROJECT FUNDING.
 It is the intent of the sixty-fourth legislative assembly that the state provide one-half of the local

cost-share of constructing a federally authorized Fargo flood control project and that total Fargo
 flood control project funding to be provided by the state not exceed \$450,000,000. It is further
 the intent of the sixty-fourth legislative assembly that state funding of \$120,000,000 be provided
 for Fargo interior flood control projects and that any funds spent for Fargo interior flood control

1 projects after July 1, 2017, require fifty percent matching funds from the F-M area diversion 2 authority. It is further the intent of the sixty-fourth legislative assembly that the 3 \$206,000,000\$266,000,000 yet to be designated by the state for the Fargo flood control 4 project projects be made available in equal installments over the next three bienniums. 5 **SECTION 11. APPROPRIATION - FARGO INTERIOR FLOOD PROTECTION - STATE** 6 **DISASTER RELIEF FUND - FUNDING REQUIREMENTS.** There is appropriated out of any 7 moneys in the state disaster relief fund in the state treasury, the sum of \$30,000,000, or so 8 much of the sum as may be necessary, for the purpose of providing funding for flood protection 9 projects within city limits of Fargo for the period beginning with the effective date of this Act and 10 ending June 30, 2017. The city of Fargo must apply for flood protection funding, but the state 11 water commission may not deny an application unless the funds are not intended to be used in 12 accordance with provisions of this section. The city of Fargo may use the funds for costs directly 13 associated with completion of interior flood protection projects within its city limits, including 14 engineering and legal fees, right-of-way acquisition costs, land purchases, home buyouts, and 15 construction costs. Funds may not be used for general operations or administrative costs. Any 16 funds designated by the sixty-fourth legislative assembly for Fargo interior flood control projects 17 may be expended only for Fargo interior flood control projects, including levees and dikes until a 18 federal appropriation is provided for project construction for the Fargo flood control project at 19 which time it may be used for a federally authorized Fargo flood control project. 20 SECTION 12. FARGO FLOOD CONTROL PROJECT FUNDING - EXEMPTION. Of the 21 funds appropriated in the water and atmospheric resources line item in section 1 of this Act. 22 \$69,000,000 is for Fargo flood control projects, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and 23 ending June 30, 2017. Any funds not spent by June 30, 2017, are not subject to 24 section 54-44.1-11 and must be continued into the next or subsequent bienniums and may be 25 expended only for Fargo flood control projects, including levees and dikes. Except as otherwise 26 provided, these funds may be used only for land purchases and construction, including 27 right-of-way acquisition costs and may not be used for the purchase of dwellings. No more than 28 ten percent of these funds may be used for engineering, legal, planning, or other similar 29 purposes. The city of Fargo, Cass County, and the Cass County joint water resource district 30 must approve any expenditures made under this section. Costs incurred by nonstate entities for

- 1 dwellings or other real property which are not paid by state funds are eligible for application by
- 2 the nonstate entity for cost-sharing with the state.

3 SECTION 14. GRANTS - WESTERN AREA WATER SUPPLY - INCREMENTAL FUNDING 4 **AND RESTRICTIONS.** Funds specified for western area water supply authority projects in the 5 water and atmospheric resources line item in section 1 of this Act must be distributed as grants-6 from the resources trust fund. The funds must be awarded in increments of up to \$10,000,000-7 upon determination by the state water commission that sufficient domestic demand has been 8 demonstrated for the project for which the funds are requested. Funds may not be used solely-9 to construct industrial water infrastructure or to provide industrial water for exploration or-10 development of the oil and gas industry. The western area water supply authority may request 11 funds, in increments of up to \$10,000,000, through individual applications to the commission up-12 to the amount specified in this Act for the western area water supply authority.

13 SECTION 13. RED RIVER VALLEY WATER SUPPLY PROJECT FUNDING. The 2013-15 14 unobligated funding of \$7,359,000 designated by the state water commission for the Red River 15 valley water supply project in the water and atmospheric resources line item in section 1 of this 16 Act and an additional \$5,000,000 in the water and atmospheric resources line item in section 1 17 of this Act is designated for a grant to the Garrison diversion conservancy district to plan and 18 design the Red River valley water supply project for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and 19 ending June 30, 2017. The Garrison diversion conservancy district shall report on a regular 20 basis to the legislative management's water topics overview committee to review its progress in 21 planning and designing the Red River valley water supply project.

22 SECTION 14. APPROPRIATION - MISSOURI RIVER CORRECTIONAL CENTER LEVEE -23 FOX ISLAND LEVEE - STATE DISASTER RELIEF FUND. There is appropriated out of any 24 moneys in the state disaster relief fund in the state treasury, the sum of \$5,000,000, or so much 25 of the sum as may be necessary, to the state water commission, for the purpose of providing 26 funding for levee projects for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. 27 Of the funds the state water commission shall make available \$1,700,000 for a levee for the 28 Missouri River correctional center, and \$3,300,000, for a levee for Lincoln township's Fox Island 29 area.

30 SECTION 15. 2013-15 BIENNIUM CARRYOVER FUNDING - FLOOD CONTROL
 31 PROJECT FUNDING. The 2013-15 unobligated funding of \$4,543,679 designated by the state

14	SEC	CTION 19. CENTRAL DAKOTA WATER SUPPLY STUDY. The state water commission	
15	shall conduct a study on the feasibility and desirability of the central Dakota water supply project		
16	for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. The study must include a		
17	cost-benefit analysis as well as a detailed business plan for the project, including projected		
18	operatio	nal costs and projected water supply needs for the area to be served.	
19	SEC	CTION 20. CONTINGENT ALLOCATION - WATER AND ATMOSPHERIC	
20	RESOU	RCES. Of the funds appropriated in the water and atmospheric resources line item in	
21	section	1 of this Act, \$70,000,000, is designated as follows, contingent on the state water	
22	commis	sion entering into a written agreement that a fertilizer or chemical processing facility will	
23	be cons	tructed in Stutsman County:	
24	1.	\$10,000,000 for a grant and \$40,000,000 for a loan for a water reuse facility;	
25	2.	\$20,000,000 for the central Dakota water supply project.	
26	SEC	CTION 21. STUTSMAN COUNTY WATER REUSE FACILITY - EXEMPTION. For	
27	purpose	es of a project for a water reuse facility the Stutsman rural water district is granted an	
28	exempti	on from the aggregate total outstanding limit of \$50,000,000 of revenue bonds under	
29	section	61-35-15 and is instead limited to an aggregate total outstanding limit of \$100,000,000	
30	of reven	ue bonds for purposes of section 61-35-15.	

1 SECTION 22. STUTSMAN COUNTY WATER REUSE FACILITY PROJECT - USER 2 **BONDING.** Any agreement entered into by the state water commission relating to the Stutsman 3 County water reuse facility project must include requirements that the users of the water from 4 the plant are responsible for repayment of the loans or revenue bonds authorized by the 5 sixty-fourth legislative assembly for the Stutsman County water reuse facility and the users 6 must be bonded in an amount equal to each user's proportionate share of any outstanding debt 7 of the project. 8 SECTION 23. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY. During the 2015-16 interim, the 9 legislative management shall study options available for providing a sustainable water supply to 10 central and eastern North Dakota. The study must compile and review studies that have been 11 completed relating to the project options and prepare a report that evaluates each option's 12 ability to meet projected water demands to central North Dakota as well as eastern North 13 Dakota. The report must also include a cost-benefit analysis, and a feasibility analysis of the 14 options as well as a detailed business plan for the project, including projected operational costs. 15 and projected water costs to the end users. The legislative management shall report its findings 16 and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the 17 recommendations, to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly. 18 SECTION 24. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - RED RIVER VALLEY WATER SUPPLY PROJECT. 19 It is the intent of the sixty-fourth legislative assembly that the state, over the next four 20 bienniums, provide \$150,000,000 per biennium of state funds to implement the selected 21 alternative for the Red River valley water supply project. 22 SECTION 25. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - LOWER HEART RIVER, MORTON COUNTY, 23 ENHANCED FLOOD CONTROL PROJECT. It is the intent of the sixty-fourth legislative 24 assembly that state funding be provided for a share of the nonfederal or local cost for 25 construction of the lower Heart River, Morton County, flood control project. 26 SECTION 26. WESTERN AREA WATER SUPPLY AUTHORITY MEMBER ENTITIES -27 **DEBT.** A western area water supply authority member entity may incur debt as authorized by 28 law, except that an entity may not use any income from industrial water sales relating to oil and 29 gas exploration or production to repay any debt or as collateral to secure debt beginning July 1. 30 2015.

1 SECTION 27. STATE WATER COMMISSION PRIORITY PROJECTS LIST - REPORTS TO 2 THE WATER TOPICS OVERVIEW COMMITTEE. The state water commission shall report to 3 the legislative management's water topics overview committee every six months during the 4 2015-16 interim regarding any changes made to the state water commission priority projects list 5 presented to the sixty-fourth legislative assembly for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and 6 ending June 30, 2017. 7 SECTION 28. FARGO FLOOD CONTROL - REPORTS TO THE WATER TOPICS 8 **OVERVIEW COMMITTEE.** During the 2015-16 interim, the F-M area diversion authority board 9 shall report to the legislative management's water topics overview committee biannually 10 regarding an update on congressional authorization of the diversion project and the status of 11 the self-insured crop insurance pool; mitigation efforts, alternatives, and costs; easements; and 12 the project budget. The MNDak upstream coalition shall report to the budget sectionlegislative 13 management's water topics overview committee biannually regarding an update on the impacts 14 of the Fargo flood control project and mitigation efforts, alternatives, and costs. 15 SECTION 29. INDEPENDENT WATER PROVIDERS AND WESTERN AREA WATER 16 SUPPLY AUTHORITY - REPORT TO THE WATER TOPICS OVERVIEW COMMITTEE. During

17 the 2015-16 interim, the independent water providers and the western area water supply authority shall report to the legislative management's water topics overview committee on a regular basis and collaborate with the committee and the state water commission to monitor water usage, rates, engineering contract procedures, and market share. The water topics overview committee shall report to the legislative management with recommendations to ensure western area water supply authority's ability to maintain its payment schedule of the state's loan.

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SECTION 30. REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY - SOUTHWEST PIPELINE

PROJECT. The state water commission and the southwest water authority shall continue the process of reviewing capital repayment and revenues being returned to the resources trust fund; payments necessary to meet obligations of existing bonds and other loans; ownership of land and associated facilities; existing construction documents; liabilities; contracts with cities, bulk users, companies, and other users; and other items; and shall report to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly on the actions necessary for the transfer of ownership and responsibility of the southwest pipeline project from the state water commission to the southwest water authority.

1 SECTION 31. STATE WATER COMMISSION STUDY OF FARGO DIVERSION PROJECT.

The state water commission shall contract with North Dakota state university to expand the scope of the current agricultural impacts study of the F-M area diversion project at a cost that may not exceed \$80,000. The expanded study is contingent upon hydraulic modeling performed by the diversion authority and supplied to the state water commission and North Dakota state university research team. The hydraulic modeling performed by the diversion authority is eligible for cost share by the state water commission. The expanded study must focus on:

- 8 1. The impacts in the area outside the area recognized by the United States army corps-9 of engineers for which mitigation is required and must address impacts from greater-10 than six inches of additional water, which is consistent with preliminary indications-11 from the federal emergency management agency. The area determined by hydrology 12 modeling to be affected by project conditions in excess of six inches, and outside the 13 area recognized by the army corps of engineers for which mitigation is required 14 upstream of the proposed dam, which is consistent with current floodplain designation 15 by the federal emergency management agency for the studied flood event.
- Agricultural production income impacts due to operation of the diversion project. The impacts on agricultural production income due to operation of the diversion project.
- 18 3. Agricultural production income losses resulting from a ten-year, twenty-five-year,
 19 fifty-year, one hundred-year, and five hundred-year flood event. The study must be
 20 completed by September 1, 2016.
- SECTION 32. AMENDMENT. Section 54-35-02.7 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:
- 23 **54-35-02.7.** Water topics overview committee Duties.

24 The legislative management, during each interim, shall appoint a water topics overview 25 committee in the same manner as the legislative management appoints other interim 26 committees. The committee must meet quarterly and is responsible for legislative overview of 27 water topics and related matters, the Garrison diversion project, and for any necessary 28 discussions with adjacent states on water topics. The committee shall work collaboratively with 29 the state water commission to develop and review policies and update as necessary to further 30 define the state role in major flood control projects. The committee shall prepare a schedule of 31 priorities with respect to water projects. The state water commission and state engineer shall

1	assist the committee in developing the schedule of priorities, and the committee may seek input		
2	from stakeholders within the state regarding water project priorities. The committee shall report		
3	on the committee's project prioritization process, provide updates on allocated program		
4	expenditures, and report on the fund balances of projects, grants, and contracts. The committee		
5	also shall study policies regarding the development and financing of municipal projects,		
6	including water treatment plants; pipelines, including pipeline expansion, public and industrial		
7	use of water, cost analysis of future project development, and ongoing maintenance cost of		
8	current and future projects; and technology, including the use of technology for permitting and		
9	electronic metering. During the 2013-14 interim, the committee shall review water supply routes-		
10	and alternatives for the Red River valley water supply project. The legislative management shall		
11	designate the chairman of the committee. The committee shall operate according to the statutes		
12	and procedure governing the operation of other legislative management interim committees.		
13	SECTION 33. A new section to chapter 61-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is created		
14	and enacted as follows:		
15	Bank of North Dakota - Line of credit.		
16	The Bank of North Dakota shall extend a line of credit not to exceed two hundred million		
17	dollars at a rate that may not exceed one and three-quarters percent to the state water		
18	commission. The state water commission shall repay the line of credit from funds available in		
19	the resources trust fund, water development trust fund, or other funds, as appropriated by the		
20	legislative assembly. The state water commission may access the line of credit, as necessary,		
21	to provide funding as authorized by the legislative assembly up to the amounts designated for		
22	the following projects:		
23	1. Sixty-nine million dollars for Fargo flood control;		
24	2. Forty million dollars for Minot flood control;		
25	3. Ten million dollars for northwest area water supply;		
26	3. Ten million dollars for northwest area water supply:		
20	4. Three million dollars for Rice Lake flood control;

	4. Three million dollars for Rice Lake flood control;		
27	 4. Three million dollars for Rice Lake flood control; 5. Fifty million dollars for a water reuse facility in Stutsman County; 		

1	SECTION 34. A new section to chapter 61-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is created		
2	and enacted as follows:		
3	State water commission cost-share policy.		
4	The state water commission shall adopt a cost-share policy for the financing of water		
5	projects. The policy:		
6	1. Must provide a water supply project is eligible for grants up to seventy-five percent of		
7	the total project cost with the remaining cost of the project financed through loans. The		
8	commission shall set the terms of the loan at one and one-half percent interest per		
9	year for up to forty years.		
10	2. May not prioritize water supply projects based on population growth factor.		
11	3. Must provide all project costs are eligible for reimbursement except the commission		
12	may exclude operations expense and regular maintenance. The commission may		
13	require a water project sponsor to maintain a capital improvement fund from the rates		
14	charged customers for future extraordinary maintenance projects as condition of

19	SECTION 35. A new section to chapter 61-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is created		
20	and enacted as follows:		
21	North Dakota outdoor heritage fund grants - Effect on local cost-share.		
22	For projects involving the repair of an existing flood control or recreation structure, the state		
23	water commission may not deduct North Dakota outdoor heritage fund moneys provided from		
24	the cost of the project before determining the local cost-share. The state water commission shall		
25	include those provided moneys as part of the local cost-share, however, the local entity may not		
26	receive funding in excess of the total project cost.		
27	SECTION 19. REPEAL. Section 61-02-78 of the North Dakota Century Code is repealed.		
28	SECTION 36. EMERGENCY. Sections 1, 7, 11, and 17 of this Act are declared to be an		
29	emergency measure.
