  43-58-08 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the regulation of naturopaths.for an Act
  to provide for a legislative management study regarding the regulation of midwifery.

## 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

6 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 43-58-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is 7 amended and reenacted as follows: 8 43-58-01. Definitions. 9 As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires: 10 "Approved naturopathic medical college" means a college and program granting the 11 degree of doctor of naturopathy or naturopathic medicine which must require as a 12 minimum a four-year, full-time resident program of academic and clinical study and 13 which: 14 Is accredited, or has the status of candidate for accreditation, by an organization-15 approved by the board, such as the council on naturopathic medical education; or-16 Has been approved by the board after an investigation that determines that the 17 college or program meets education standards equivalent to those established by 18 the accrediting agency under subdivision a and complies with the board's rules. 19 "Board" means the state board of integrative health care created under chapter 43-57. 20 "Homeopathic preparations" means nonprescriptive substances prepared according to 21 the official homeopathic pharmacopoeia of the United States. The term does not 22 include prescriptive drugs. 23 "Licensee" means an individual licensed by the board under this chapter.

2		superficial lacerations and abrasions; superficial lesions; the removal of foreign bodies

7	<u>6.</u>	"Naturopath" means an individual licensed to practice naturopathic health care under-
8		this chapter.
9	<del>6.<u>7.</u></del>	"Naturopathic health care", "naturopathic medicine", or "naturopathy" means a system
10		of primary health care practiced by naturopaths for the prevention, diagnosis, and
11		treatment of human health conditions, injury, and disease. The purpose of
12		naturopathic health care, naturopathic medicine, or naturopathy is to promote or
13		restore health by the support and stimulation of the individual's inherent self-healing
14		processes. This is accomplished through education of the patient by a naturopath and
15		through the use of natural therapies and therapeutic substances.
16	<del>7.<u>8.</u></del>	"Naturopathic physical application" means the therapeutic use by a naturopath of the
17		actions or devices of electrical muscle stimulation, galvanic, diathermy, ultrasound,
18		ultraviolet light, hydrotherapy, and naturopathic manipulative therapy. The term does
19		not include manipulation of the spine.
20	——SEC	CTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 43-58-08 of the North Dakota Century Code is
21	amende	d and reenacted as follows:
22	<del>43-6</del>	58-08. Practice of naturopathic health care.
23	<del>1.</del>	A naturopath may practice naturopathic medicine as a limited practice of the healing
24		arts as exempted under section 43-17-02. A naturopath may not:
25		a. Prescribe Except as authorized under subsection 4, prescribe, dispense, or
26		administer any prescription drug;
27		b. Administer ionizing radioactive substances for therapeutic purposes;
28		c. PerformExcept as authorized under subsection 5, perform a surgical procedure;

30		d. Claim to practice any licensed health care profession or system of treatment
31		other than naturonathic medicine unless holding a separate license in that

1	profession. A naturopath may not hold out to the public that the naturopath is a
2	<del>primary care provider.</del>
3	2. A naturopath may prescribe and administer for preventive and therapeutic purposes a
4	prescriptive device and the following nonprescriptive natural therapeutic substances,
5	drugs, and therapies:
6	a. Food, vitamins, minerals, dietary supplements, enzymes, botanical medicines,
7	and homeopathic preparations;
8	b. Topical drugs, health care counseling, nutritional counseling and dietary therapy,
9	naturopathic physical applications, and therapeutic devices; and
10	c. Barrier devices for contraception.
11	3. A naturopath may perform or order for diagnostic purposes a physical or orificial
12	examination, ultrasound, phlebotomy, clinical laboratory test or examination,
13	physiological function test, and any other noninvasive diagnostic procedure commonly
14	used by physicians in general practice and as authorized by the board.
15	4. A naturopath may prescribe or administer a prescription drug listed in a naturopathic
16	formulary established by a subcommittee of the board.
17	a. The subcommittee under this subsection must be made up of the following four
18	board members: the doctor of medicine or osteopathy, the naturopath, the
19	pharmacist, and the advanced practice registered nurse.
20	<u>b.</u> Except for endogenous anabolic androgenic steroids, the naturopathic formulary
21	may not include drugs classified in schedules I through IV of chapter 19-03.1.
22	5. A naturopath may perform minor office procedures.
23	6. A naturopath certified by the board for specialty practice may practice naturopathic
24	<u>childbirth attendance.</u>
25	SECTION 3. Section 43-58-11 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as
26	<del>follows:</del>
27	43-58-11. Naturopathic childbirth attendance - Requirements for certification for
28	specialty practice.
29	1. A naturopath may not practice naturopathic childbirth attendance unless certified by
30	the board for specialty practice.

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- 2. The board shall adopt rules setting forth the requirements a naturopath shall meet to qualify for certification for the specialty practice of naturopathic childbirth attendance.
- 3. To qualify for certification for the specialty practice of naturopathic childbirth attendance, a naturopath shall:
  - a. Successfully complete a three-year, didactic and clinical, certified professional midwifery curriculum approved by the board.
  - b. Successfully complete a national standardized examination in midwifery

    prescribed or endorsed by the board, such as the North American registry of midwives.
    - <u>c.</u> <u>Meet requirements established by the board by rule.</u>

SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY OF MIDWIFERY. During the 2017-18 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the feasibility and desirability of regulating the practice of midwifery by individuals who are not nurse midwives. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-sixth legislative assembly.
