- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact sections 15-10-37 and 15-10-38 of the North Dakota
- 2 Century Code, relating to the technology occupations student loan and teacher shortage loan
- 3 forgiveness programs; to provide a statement of legislative intent; and to provide for reports to
- 4 the legislative management.

5 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:**

6 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 15-10-37 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 7 amended and reenacted as follows:

8 **15-10-37. Technology occupations student loan program.**

- 9 1. The state board of higher education shall administer a science, technology,
- 10 engineering, and mathematics occupations student loan program that encourages
- 11 college students to pursue studies in these fields, to participate in internship programs,
- 12 and to remain in the state after graduation. The board shall adopt rules to implement
- 13 the program, including internship requirements, guidelines to determine which
- technology-related courses of study are eligible under the program, and standards foreligibility.
- Graduates of board-approved colleges may apply for the technology occupations
 student loan program. To be eligible to receive student loan grants under the program,
 the applicant:
- 19 a. Must have graduated from a board-approved college;
- 20 b. Must have successfully completed the board-approved technology-related
 21 courses;
- c. Must have maintained at least a 2.5 grade point average, based on a 4.0 grading
 system, at a board-approved college;

1		d.	Must have a student loan with the Bank of North Dakota or other participating			
2			lender;			
3		e.	Following graduation must be employed in the state in a board-approved			
4			technology occupation with a salary or equivalent hourly wage of sixty thousand			
5			dollars or less per year; and			
6		f.	Must have met and shall continue to meet any requirements established by rule.			
7	3.	The	state board of higher education shall distribute student loan grants directly to the			
8		Ban	k of North Dakota or other participating lender to repay outstanding student loan			
9		prine	cipal balances for eligible applicants. The maximum student loan grant amount for			
10		whic	ch an applicant may qualify is one thousand five hundred dollars per year and a			
11		total	l of six thousand dollars, or a lesser amount established by rule adopted by the			
12		state	e board of higher education.			
13	<u>4.</u>	<u>lf an</u>	n individual is receiving loan forgiveness under any other provision, the individual			
14		<u>may</u>	not receive loan forgiveness under this section during the same application year.			
15	SEC	CTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 15-10-38 of the North Dakota Century Code is

17	15-10-38. Loans - Teacher shortages - Loan forgiveness.					
18	1.	The	state board of higher education shall administer a student loan forgiveness			
19		prog	gram for individuals teaching at grade levels or in content areas identified as			
20		havi	ng a teacher shortage. The board shall adopt rules to implement the program.			
21	2.	The	superintendent of public instruction shall annually identify the grade levels and			
22		cont	tent areas in which a teacher shortage exists.			
23	3.	To b	e eligible for loan forgiveness under this section, an individual:			
24		a.	Must have been admitted as a full-time student in a teacher preparation program,-			
25			with the declared intention to teach at a grade level or in a content area identified			
26			by the superintendent of public instruction as one in which a teacher shortage-			
27			exists; and			
28		b.	Must have obtained a student loan.			
29	4.	An i	ndividual may receive up to one thousand dollars per year and a maximum of five-			
30		thou	isand dollars, or a lesser amount established by rule adopted by the state board of-			
31		high	er education under this section.			

1	5.	The board shall consider all applications under this section in chronological order.			
2	6.	Upon notification that the individual has completed a full year of teaching in a school			
3		district or nonpublic school in this state at a grade level or in a content area identified			
4		by the superintendent of public instruction as one in which a teacher shortage exists,			
5		the board shall distribute funds directly to the Bank of North Dakota to repay			
6		outstanding loan principal balances for eligible applicants. The state board of higher			
7		education shall administer a student loan forgiveness program for individuals teaching			
8		at grade levels, in content areas, and in geographical locations identified as having a			
9		teacher shortage or critical need. The board may approve loan forgiveness for no			
10		more than two teachers per year in a school district. The board shall adopt rules to			
11		implement the program.			
12	<u>2.</u>	The superintendent of public instruction annually shall identify grade levels, content			
13		areas, and geographical locations in which a teacher shortage or critical need exists.			
14	<u>3.</u>	To be eligible for loan forgiveness under this section, an individual:			
15		a. Must have graduated from an accredited teacher preparation program and			
16		signed a contract to teach at a grade level or in a content area and in a			
17		geographical location identified by the superintendent of public instruction as			
18		having an existing teacher shortage or critical need; and			
19		b. Must have an existing student loan.			
20	<u>4.</u>	For purposes of this section, the definitions of rural school district and remote town			
21		school district have the same meaning as the definitions under the national center for			
22		education statistics locale codes.			
23	<u>5.</u>	If an individual is receiving loan forgiveness under any other provision, the individual			
24		may not receive loan forgiveness under this section during the same application year.			
25	<u>6.</u>	An eligible individual may receive loan forgiveness under the program as follows:			
26		a. If the individual accepts one of up to five positions of critical need in a nonrural			
27		school district or nonremote town school district, the individual may receive up to			
28		three thousand dollars per year for a maximum of four years.			
29		b. If the individual accepts a position in a rural school district or remote town school			
30		district with an enrollment of fewer than one thousand students, the individual			

1			may receive up to four thousand five hundred dollars per year for a maximum of			
2			four years.			
3		<u>C.</u>	If the individual accepts one of up to five positions of critical need in a rural			
4			school district or remote town school district with an enrollment of fewer than one			
5			thousand students, the individual may receive up to six thousand five hundred			
6			dollars per year for a maximum of four years.			
7	<u>7.</u>	<u>The</u>	e superintendent of public instruction shall consider all applications under this			
8		<u>sec</u>	tion based on the number of unfilled school vacancies, prioritized by critical need			
9		anc	geographic location.			
10	<u>8.</u>	<u>Upo</u>	on notification the individual has completed a full year of teaching in a school			
11		<u>dist</u>	rict or state-supported school in this state at a grade level or in a content area and			
12		<u>in a</u>	geographical location identified by the superintendent of public instruction as one			
13		<u>in v</u>	which a teacher shortage or critical need exists, the board shall distribute funds			
14		<u>dire</u>	ectly to the lending institution of the individual to repay outstanding loan principal			
15		bala	ances on behalf of eligible applicants. The board shall terminate loan forgiveness			
16		pay	ments to eligible individuals when the loan principal balance of the eligible			
17		indi	vidual is paid in full.

19	9 intent of the sixty-fifth legislative assembly that subdivision 1 of section 1 of 2017 Senate Bill					
20	0 No. 2003 include the sum of \$2,863,393, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the					
21	general fund, for the purpose of providing funding of \$260,000 for doctorate graduate programs,					
22	\$500,000 for the technology occupations student loan program, and \$2,103,393 for the teacher					
23	shortage loan forgiveness program, with no more than one-half of that amount expended in the					
24	first year, during the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019.					
25	SECTION 4. SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION - LEGISLATIVE					
26	MANAG	SEME	ENT REPORT. During the 2017-19 biennium, the superintendent of public			
27	instruction shall provide annual reports to the legislative management regarding the use of					
28	teacher loan forgiveness funds received under this Act, including the amount distributed, the					
29	number of eligible individuals receiving funds, the recruitment and retention of individuals					
30	participating in the program, the average starting salaries of individuals participating in the					
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- 1 program, and the effectiveness of the program as determined under criteria developed by the
- 2 superintendent of public instruction.
