1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of

2 public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf, and the North Dakota vision

3 services - school for the blind; and to provide exemptions.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

5 SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds 6 as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state 7 treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and 8 other income, to the department of public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf, 9 and North Dakota vision services - school for the blind for the purpose of defraying the 10 expenses of those agencies, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 11 2021, as follows:

12	SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION - TUITION APP	PORTIONMENT. The s	sum of \$305,546,905,

included in the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, is
from the state tuition fund in the state treasury. Any additional amount in the state tuition fund
that becomes available for distribution to public schools is appropriated to the department of
public instruction for that purpose for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30,

18 SECTION 4. APPROPRIATION - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND. The

19 estimated income line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes \$110,000,000 from

20 the foundation aid stabilization fund in the state treasury for integrated formula payments for the

biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.

22 SECTION 5. INTEGRATED FORMULA PAYMENTS AND SPECIAL EDUCATION

23 **CONTRACTS EXPENDITURE AUTHORITY.** The superintendent of public instruction may

- 24 expend funds included in the integrated formula payments and grants special education
- 25 contracts line items in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act for paying grants for educational
- services that were due in the 2017-19 biennium but which were not filed, claimed, or properly
- 27 supported by the education provider until after June 30, 2019. To be reimbursed under this
- 28 section, claims must be properly supported and filed with the superintendent of public
- instruction by June 30, 2020.

30 SECTION 6. GIFTED AND TALENTED PROGRAM - MEDICAID MATCHING FUNDING 31 DISTRIBUTION.

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1	1.	The	sum of \$800,000, included in the integrated formula payments line item in
2		subd	livision 1 of section 1 of this Act, must be distributed to reimburse school districts
3		or sp	pecial education units for gifted and talented programs upon the submission of an
4		appli	cation that is approved in accordance with guidelines adopted by the
5		supe	rintendent of public instruction. The superintendent of public instruction shall
6		enco	urage cooperative efforts for gifted and talented programs among school districts
7		and	special education units.
8	2.	State	e school aid payments for special education must be reduced by the amount of
9		mato	hing funds required to be paid by school districts or special education units for
10		stude	ents participating in the Medicaid program. Special education funds equal to the
11		amo	unt of the matching funds required to be paid by the school district or special
12		educ	ation unit must be paid by the superintendent of public instruction to the
13		depa	rtment of human services on behalf of the school district or unit.
14	SEC	CTION	7. TRANSPORTATION GRANTS - DISTRIBUTION.
15	1.	Durir	ng each year of the 2019-21 biennium, the superintendent of public instruction
16		shall	calculate the payment to which each school district is entitled based on the state
17		trans	portation formula as it existed on June 30, 2001, except that the superintendent
18		shall	provide reimbursement at the rate of:
19		a.	One dollar and eleven cents per mile for school buses having a capacity of ten or
20			more passengers;
21		b.	Fifty-two cents per mile for vehicles having a capacity of nine or fewer
22			passengers;
23		C.	Fifty cents per mile, provided;
24			(1) The student being transported is a student with a disability, as defined in
25			chapter 15.1-32;
26			(2) The student's individualized education program plan requires that the
27			student attend a public or a nonpublic school located outside the student's
28			school district of residence;
29			(3) The student is transported by an adult member of the student's family;
30			(4) The student is transported in a vehicle furnished by the student's parents;
31			(5) The student's transportation is paid for by the student's parents; and

1			(6)	The reimbursement does not exceed two round trips daily between the
2				student's home and school.
3		d.	Fifty	y cents per mile, one way, provided:

1 If any of the amount appropriated for this purpose remains after the superintendent of 2. 2 public instruction has awarded grants to all eligible recipients, the superintendent shall 3 distribute that amount as an additional per student payment on a prorated basis, 4 according to the latest available average daily membership of each school district. 5 SECTION 9. PASSTHROUGH GRANTS - APPLICATION - DISTRIBUTION -6 **REPORTING.** The grants - passthrough grants line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act 7 includes \$2,100,000 for passthrough grants for writing projects, an entrepreneur program, and a 8 mentoring program. The superintendent of public instruction shall determine the manner in 9 which each passthrough grant is distributed. Grantees, as a condition of receiving the grant, 10 must establish performance measures to be reviewed by the superintendent of public 11 instruction. Grantees shall report to the superintendent of public instruction regarding 12 performance based on the measures before October 1, 2020. The superintendent of public 13 instruction shall report to the appropriations committees of the sixty-seventh legislative 14 assembly regarding funds granted, performance measures established for each grantee, and 15 whether grantees met performance expectations. 16 SECTION 10. REGIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATIONS - GRANTS- DISTRIBUTION. 17 The integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes 18 \$500,000 from the general fund for the purpose of providing annual grants to regional education 19 associations for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. An annual 20 grant of \$31,250 is provided to each regional education association that exists as of July 1, 21 2019. Regional education associations that merge during the 2019-21 biennium are entitled to 22 the annual grants that would have been paid to each of the member associations. 23 SECTION 11. EXEMPTION - INDIRECT COST ALLOCATION. Notwithstanding section 24 54-44.1-15, the department of public instruction may deposit indirect cost recoveries in its 25 operating account. 26 SECTION 12. STATE AID TO PUBLIC LIBRARIES. The grants line item in subdivision 2 of 27 section 1 of this Act includes \$1,737,528 for aid to public libraries, of which no more than one-28 half may be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020. 29 SECTION 13. EXEMPTION - SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF - HIGHER EDUCATION 30 **INTERPRETER GRANT PROGRAM DISTRIBUTION.** The grants line item in subdivision 3 of 31 section 1 of this Act is for the purpose of providing grants to assist institutions under the control

1	of the state board of higher education with the cost of interpreters and real-time captioning for				
2	students who are deaf or hard of hearing, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending				
3	June 30,	2021. Moneys appropriated for this program are not subject to section 54-44.1-11.			
4	Funds m	nust be distributed pursuant to the provisions of this section:			
5	1.	The school for the deaf shall develop a formula to determine the grant amount for			
6		which an institution is eligible. The formula must be based on an uniform hourly			
7		reimbursement.			
8	2.	To obtain a grant under this section, an institution shall submit to the school for the			
9		deaf, at the time and in the manner directed by the school, invoices showing the			
10		amount expended for interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf			
11		or hard of hearing.			
12	3.	The school for the deaf may not distribute more than fifty percent of the amount			
13		appropriated during the first year of the biennium.			
14	4.	If any grant moneys remain undistributed at the end of the biennium, the school for the			
15		deaf shall provide additional prorated grants to institutions that incurred, during the			
16		biennium, hourly expenses in excess of the formula reimbursement level.			
17	5.	At the request of an institution under the control of the state board of higher education,			
18		the school for the deaf shall consult with the institution and provide advice regarding			
19		the provision of services most appropriate to meet a student's needs.			
20	SEC	TION 14. FEES DEPOSITED IN NORTH DAKOTA VISION SERVICES - SCHOOL			
21	FOR TH	E BLIND OPERATING FUND. Any moneys included in the estimated income line item			
22	in subdiv	vision 4 of section 1 of this Act, collected for subscription fees or braille fees, must be			
23	deposite	d in the North Dakota vision services - school for the blind operating fund in the state			
24	treasury	and may be spent subject to appropriation by the legislative assembly.
