1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the North Dakota 2 university system; to create and enact a new chapter to title 15 and sections 15-10-48.1 and 3 15-18.2-04.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the midwestern higher education 4 compact, matching grants for the university of North Dakota school of law, and a cost of living 5 factor for state aid to institutions; to amend and reenact sections 15-10-48, 15-10-49, 15-10-50, 6 15-18.2-02, 15-18.2-05, 15-62.4-03, and 54-44.1-11 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating 7 to matching grants for institutions under the control of the state board of higher education, state 8 aid to institutions, the student financial assistance grant program, and the cancellation of 9 unexpended appropriations; to repeal section 15-10-61 of the North Dakota Century Code. 10 relating to the dual-credit instructor assistance program; to authorize the industrial commission 11 to issue and sell evidences of indebtedness for capital projects; to authorize the state board of 12 higher education to issue and sell bonds for capital projects; to provide for a transfer; to provide 13 for the conveyance of real property; to provide for report; and to declare an emergency.

# 14 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

15 **SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION.** The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds 16 as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state 17 treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and 18 other income, to the state board of higher education and to the entities and institutions under 19 the supervision of the board, for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the state board of 20 higher education and the entities and institutions under the control of the board, for the 21 biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021, as follows: 22 Subdivision 1.

17 SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION - 2017-19 BIENNIUM - WILLISTON STATE COLLEGE.

18 There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise 19 appropriated, the sum of \$491,850, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to Williston 20 state college for institution operations, for the period beginning with the effective date of this Act, 21 and ending June 30, 2019. In accordance with section 54-44.1-11, any unexpended funds from 22 this appropriation may be continued into the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending 23 June 30, 2021.

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### **SECTION 4. APPROPRIATION - 2017-19 BIENNIUM - STATE BOARD OF HIGHER**

25 **EDUCATION.** There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, 26 not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$250,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, 27 to the state board of higher education for the purpose of providing matching grants for clinical 28 legal education, including indigent legal services, and for the recruitment and retention of faculty 29 at the university of North Dakota school of law, for the period beginning with the effective date of 30 this Act, and ending June 30, 2019. In accordance with section 54-44.1-11, any unexpended

9	2019. In	accordance with section 54-44.1-11, any unexpended funds from this appropriation

11	SEC	TION 6. A new chapter to title 15 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and			
12	enacted	as follows:			
13	Midv	western regional higher education compact.			
14	The	midwestern regional higher education compact is adopted as follows:			
15		ARTICLE I - PURPOSE			
16	The purpose of the midwestern higher education compact is to provide greater higher				
17	education opportunities and services in the midwestern region, with the aim of furthering				
18	<u>regional</u>	access to, research in, and choice of higher education for the citizens residing in the			
19	states th	at are parties to this compact.			
20		ARTICLE II - THE COMMISSION			
21	<u>1.</u>	The compacting states create the midwestern higher education commission,			
22		hereinafter called the commission. The commission is a body corporate of each			
23		compacting state. The commission has all the responsibilities, powers, and duties set			
24		forth in this chapter, including the power to sue and be sued, and any additional			
25		powers conferred upon it by subsequent action of the respective legislative assemblies			
26		of the compacting states in accordance with the terms of this compact.			
27	<u>2.</u>	The commission consists of the following five resident members from each state: the			
28		governor or the governor's designee who serves during the tenure of office of the			
29		governor; two legislators, one from each house, except for Nebraska, which may			
30		appoint two legislators from its legislative assembly, who serve two-year terms and are			
31		appointed by the appropriate appointing authority in each house of the legislative			

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1		assembly; and two other at large members, at least one of whom is to be selected
2		from the field of higher education. The at large members are to be appointed as
3		provided by the laws of the appointing state. One of the two at large members initially
4		appointed in each state serves a two-year term. The other, and any regularly
5		appointed successor to either at large member, serves a four-year term. All vacancies
6		are to be filled in accordance with the laws of the appointing states. Any commissioner
7		appointed to fill a vacancy serves until the end of the incomplete term.
8	<u>3.</u>	The commission shall select annually, from among its members, a chairman, a vice
9		chairman, and a treasurer.
10	<u>4.</u>	The commission shall appoint an executive director who serves at its pleasure and
11		who is secretary to the commission. The treasurer, the executive director, and other
12		personnel as the commission determines must be bonded in the amounts required by
13		the commission.
14	<u>5.</u>	The commission shall meet at least once each calendar year. The chairman may call
15		additional meetings and upon the request of a majority of the commission members of
16		three or more compacting states, shall call additional meetings. The commission shall
17		give public notice of all meetings. All meetings must be open to the public.
18	<u>6.</u>	Each compacting state represented at any meeting of the commission is entitled to
19		one vote. A majority of the compacting states constitute a quorum for the transaction of
20		business, unless a larger quorum is required by the bylaws of the commission.
21		ARTICLE III - POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE COMMISSION
22	<u>1.</u>	The commission shall adopt bylaws governing its management and operations.
23	<u>2.</u>	Notwithstanding the laws of any compacting state, the commission shall provide for
24		the personnel policies and programs of the compact in its bylaws.
25	<u>3.</u>	The commission shall submit a budget to the governor and legislative assembly of
26		each compacting state at the time and for the period required by each state. The
27		budget must contain recommendations regarding the amount to be appropriated by
28		each compacting state.
29	<u>4.</u>	The commission shall report annually to the legislative assemblies and governors of
30		the compacting states, to the midwestern governors' conference, and to the
31		midwestern legislative conference of the council of state governments regarding the

1		activities of the commission during the preceding year. The reports must include any
2		recommendations that have been adopted by the commission.
3	<u>5.</u>	The commission may borrow, accept, or contract for the services of personnel from
4		any state or from the United States, or from any subdivision or agency thereof, from
5		any interstate agency, or from any person.
6	<u>6.</u>	The commission may accept for any of its purposes and functions under the compact
7		donations and grants of money, equipment, supplies, materials, and services,
8		conditional or otherwise, from any state or the United States or from any subdivision or
9		agency thereof, from an interstate agency, or from any person, and may receive, use,
10		and dispose of the same.
11	<u>7.</u>	The commission may enter agreements with any other interstate education
12		organization or agency, with institutions of higher education located in nonmember
13		states, and with any of the various states to provide adequate programs and services
14		in higher education for the citizens of the respective compacting states. After
15		negotiations with interested institutions and interstate organizations or agencies, the
16		commission shall determine the cost of providing the programs and services in higher
17		education for use in these agreements.
18	<u>8.</u>	The commission may establish and maintain offices in one or more of the compacting
19		states.
20	<u>9.</u>	The commission may establish committees and hire staff as necessary to carry out its
21		functions.
22	<u>10.</u>	The commission may provide for actual and necessary expenses for the attendance of
23		its members at official meetings of the commission or of its designated committees.
24		<b>ARTICLE IV - ACTIVITIES OF THE COMMISSION</b>
25	<u>1.</u>	The commission shall collect data on the long-range effects of the compact on higher
26		education. By the end of the fourth year from the effective date of the compact and
27		every two years thereafter, the commission shall review its accomplishments and
28		make recommendations to the governors and legislative assemblies of the compacting
29		states regarding continuance of the compact.
30	<u>2.</u>	The commission shall study higher education issues that are of particular concern to
31		the midwestern region. The commission also shall study the need for higher education

1		programs and services in the compacting states and the resources for meeting those
2		needs. The commission shall prepare reports, on its research, for presentation to the
3		governors and legislative assemblies of the compacting states, as well as to other
4		interested parties. In conducting the studies, the commission may confer with any
5		national or regional planning body. The commission may draft and recommend to the
6		governors and legislative assemblies of the various compacting states suggested
7		legislation addressing issues in higher education.
8	<u>3.</u>	The commission shall study the need for the provision of adequate programs and
9		services in higher education, such as undergraduate, graduate, or professional
10		student exchanges in the region. If a need for exchange in a field is apparent, the
11		commission may enter agreements with any institution of higher education and with
12		any compacting state to provide programs and services in higher education for the
13		citizens of the respective compacting states. After negotiating with interested
14		institutions and the compacting states, the commission shall determine the cost of
15		providing the programs and services in higher education for use in its agreements.
16		The contracting states shall contribute funds not otherwise provided, as determined by
17		the commission, to carry out the agreements. The commission may also serve as the
18		administrative and fiscal agent in carrying out agreements for higher education
19		programs and services.
20	<u>4.</u>	The commission shall serve as a clearinghouse for information regarding higher
21		education activities among institutions and agencies.
22	<u>5.</u>	The commission may provide services and research in any other area of regional
23		concern.
24		ARTICLE V - FINANCE
25	<u>1.</u>	The compacting states will appropriate the amount necessary to finance the general
26		operations of the commission, not otherwise provided for, when authorized by their
27		respective legislative assemblies. The amount must be apportioned equally among the
28		compacting states.
29	<u>2.</u>	The commission may not incur any obligations prior to the passage of appropriations
30		adequate to meet the same; nor may the commission pledge the credit of any of the
31		compacting states, except by and with the authority of the compacting state.

	•	-
1	<u>3.</u>	The commission shall keep accurate accounts of its receipts and disbursements. The
2		receipts and disbursements of the commission are subject to the audit and accounting
3		procedures established under its bylaws. All receipts and disbursements handled by
4		the commission must be audited yearly by a certified or licensed public accountant
5		and the report of the audit must be included in and become part of the annual report of
6		the commission.
7	<u>4.</u>	The accounts of the commission must be open at any reasonable time for inspection
8		by duly authorized representatives of the compacting states and by persons
9		authorized by the commission.
10		ARTICLE VI - ELIGIBLE PARTIES AND ENTRY INTO FORCE
11	<u>1.</u>	The states of Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri,
12		Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, and Wisconsin are eligible to become
13		parties to this compact. Additional states may be eligible if approved by a majority of
14		the compacting states.

19	much of the sum as may be necessary, from the current earnings and accumulated undivided

An institution shall provide one dollar of matching funds from operations or other sources for
each one dollar from Bank of North Dakota profits deposited in each institution's capital building
fund. An institution may not use extraordinary repairs funding or tier III capital building fund
moneys as matching funds under this section.

11 SECTION 27. TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA PROFITS - TIER III CAPITAL 12 BUILDING FUND POOL - MATCHING FUNDS. The industrial commission shall transfer to the 13 North Dakota university system office a total of \$5,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be 14 necessary, from the current earnings and accumulated undivided profits of the Bank of North 15 Dakota during the period beginning with the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 16 2021, as requested by the commissioner of higher education. The tier III capital building fund 17 pool and estimated income line items in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act include \$5,000,000 18 from the current earnings and accumulated undivided profits of the Bank of North Dakota. The 19 tier III capital building fund pool in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act also includes \$4,000,000 20 from the general fund. Funding from the tier III capital building fund pool is to be allocated to 21 each institution as follows:

An institution shall provide one dollar of matching funds from operations or other sources for each one dollar from the tier III capital building fund pool. An institution may not use extraordinary repairs funding or tier II capital building fund moneys as matching funds under this section. Any funds transferred to an institution pursuant to this section from the tier III capital building fund pool must be placed in that institution's capital building fund line item.

9 SECTION 28. CAPITAL BUILDING FUNDS - USES - REPORTS. Subject to state board of 10 higher education approval, each institution in subdivisions 2 through 12 of section 1 of this Act 11 may use moneys from its capital building fund line item for extraordinary repairs and deferred 12 maintenance projects which do not exceed \$700,000 and do not increase the square footage of 13 a building. In addition, the following projects are authorized to use funding from the 14 corresponding institution's capital building fund line item:

The North Dakota university system shall report to the legislative management during the 2019-20 interim and to the appropriations committees of the sixty-seventh legislative assembly on the use of funding in each institutions' capital building fund line item, the source of matching funds, and each institutions' five-year plan for capital construction spending.

SECTION 29. TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA PROFITS - RESEARCH DIGITAL INITIATIVE. The industrial commission shall transfer to the university of North Dakota a total of \$2,500,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, and to North Dakota state university a total of \$2,500,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the current earnings and accumulated undivided profits of the Bank of North Dakota during the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021, as requested by the commissioner of higher education. The estimated income line items in subdivisions 5 and 6 of section 1 include

\$2,500,000 each for the university of North Dakota and North Dakota state university for thecampus research digital initiative.

- 3 SECTION 30. TUITION RATE INCREASE LIMITATION - BUDGET SECTION APPROVAL. 4 1. Except as provided in this section, notwithstanding any other provision of law, the state 5 board of higher education may not increase tuition rates for resident students 6 attending institutions of higher education under its control during the 2019-20 7 academic year by more than four percent as compared to the tuition rate in effect 8 during the 2019 spring semester unless the board receives prior budget section 9 approval. Before approving or denying the request, the budget section shall consider 10 the effect the tuition rate increase will have on current and prospective students, tuition 11 rates at comparable institutions in neighboring states, and the institution's planned use 12 of additional tuition revenue. 13 2. Except as provided in this section, notwithstanding any other provision of law, the state 14 board of higher education may not increase tuition rates for resident students 15 attending institutions of higher education under its control during the 2020-21 16 academic year by more than four percent as compared to the tuition rate in effect 17 during the 2020 spring semester unless the board receives prior budget section 18 approval. Before approving or denying the request, the budget section shall consider 19 the effect the tuition rate increase will have on current and prospective students, tuition 20 rates at comparable institutions in neighboring states, and the institution's planned use 21 of additional tuition revenue.
- This section does not apply to tuition rates charged for graduate level programs,
   including programs offered through the university of North Dakota school of medicine
   and health sciences, the university of North Dakota school of law, or the North Dakota
   state university school of pharmacy.
- This section does not apply to tuition rates for nonresident students attending
   institutions of higher education under the control of the state board of higher
   education. For purposes of this section, the residency of students for tuition purposes
   must be determined under section 15-10-19.1.

1 5. This section does not apply to tuition rates determined under tuition reciprocity 2 agreements entered into by the state board of higher education with other states or 3 state education compacts. 4 This section does not apply to differentiated tuition rates charged for higher cost 6. 5 programs. 6 7. For purposes of this section, an institution must calculate a resident tuition rate 7 increase based on the tuition rate paid by an average full-time resident student. The 8 state board of higher education may exclude adjustments to a tuition rate resulting 9 from a change in an institution's method of charging tuition, including the consolidation 10 of existing fees into tuition rates or charging tuition based on a per-credit rate, from 11 tuition rate calculations under this section. 12 SECTION 31. EMERGENCY. Sections 3, 4, 5, 18, 20, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, and 28 of this 13 Act and the tier III capital building fund pool, capital assets, and capital building fund line items 14 in section 1 of this Act are declared to be an emergency measure.
