## **ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL NO. 1015**

- 1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of
- 2 corrections and rehabilitation; to amend and reenact subsection 5 of section 12-47-36 of the
- 3 North Dakota Century Code, relating to disclosure of confidential records; to authorize the
- 4 conveyance of real property owned by the state of North Dakota; to provide for a legislative
- 5 management study; and to provide a report; to provide for a department of corrections and
- 6 rehabilitation review committee; and to provide an exemption.

## 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

**SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION.** The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the department of corrections and rehabilitation for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the department of corrections and rehabilitation, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021, as follows:

The 2019-21 biennium one-time funding amounts are not a part of the entity's base budget for the 2021-23 biennium. The department of corrections and rehabilitation shall report to the appropriations committees of the sixty-seventh legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.

**SECTION 3. ESTIMATED INCOME - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND.** The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes \$1,468,000\$1,218,000 from the strategic investment and improvements fund for campus infrastructure studies, extraordinary repairs, an inmate tracking system, information technology upgrades, security equipment, and other one-time funding items.

**SECTION 4. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 5 of section 12-47-36 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

5. Medical, psychological, or treatment records may be disclosed without prior application to the court to a public hospital or treatment facility, the department of human services, a community behavioral health program, a vocational rehabilitation program, a transitional living facility, or to a licensed private medical or treatment facility, when necessary for the evaluation, treatment, or care of a person who is or who has been in the custody of, or is or who has been under the supervision and management of, the adult services division of the department of corrections and rehabilitation.

SECTION 5. PRETRIAL SERVICES - PILOT PROGRAM - REPORT. The appropriation in section 1 of this Act includes \$755,034 and seven full-time equivalent positions for pretrial services. The department of corrections and rehabilitation shall establish a pretrial services program as a pilot project in three judicial districts of the state during the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. The department of corrections and rehabilitation and the judicial branch shall collaborate with each other and with the commission on legal counsel for indigents and county and regional corrections to develop guidelines and procedures for the administration of pretrial services for the district courts for individuals charged with felony and misdemeanor offenses. The department of corrections and rehabilitation and the judicial branch shall provide a report regarding the process and outcome measures of the pretrial services program together with recommendations to the sixty-seventh legislative assembly.

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SECTION 6. EXEMPTION - COMMUNITY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PROGRAM. The \$7,000,000 from the general fund appropriated in the adult services line item relating to the community behavioral health program in section 1 of chapter 40 of the 2017 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from this appropriation may be used for the community behavioral health program for individuals in custody or under the supervision of the department of corrections and rehabilitation or for the continuation of programming, when necessary, for individuals no longer in custody or under the supervision of the department, during the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. SECTION 7. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS AND REHABILITATION OPERATING FUND REVENUES. Any moneys received by the department of corrections and rehabilitation from correctional supervision, electronic monitoring, and detention; reimbursements from other agencies; profits received from department of corrections and rehabilitation commissary; miscellaneous revenue, including offender fines, fees, restitution, and medical copayments; and from the common schools trust fund, may be deposited in the department of corrections and rehabilitation operating fund and expended pursuant to legislative appropriation for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. SECTION 8. CONVEYANCE OF LAND AND BUILDINGS - TOMPKINS BUILDING -**EXEMPTION.** The state of North Dakota, by and through the department of human services, shall convey ownership of building 2404, formerly known as the nursing residence building and Tompkins building, and surrounding real property on the grounds of the state hospital, to the department of corrections and rehabilitation. The provisions of chapters 48-01.1 and 54-44.7 relating to public improvement contract bids and architect, engineer, and land surveying services for construction and renovationSections 54-01-05.2 and 54-01-05.5 do not apply to this conveyance. -SECTION 10. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - DEPARTMENT OF **CORRECTIONS AND REHABILITATION.** During the 2019-20 interim, the legislativemanagement shall study the department of corrections and rehabilitation. The study mustaddress the feasibility and desirability of relocating female inmates from the Dakota women's correctional and rehabilitation center in New England to another location and the feasibility and desirability of relocating minimum security male inmates from the Missouri River correctional center in Bismarck to New England or another location. The study must include a review of:

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1	— 1. Service needs of female inmates;
2	2. Service needs of male inmates;
3	3. Services available to female inmates at the Dakota women's correctional and
4	rehabilitation center;
5	4. Services available to male inmates at the Missouri River correctional center;
6	5. Facility needs, including changes needed to continue to serve male inmates and
7	changes needed to serve female inmates, and associated costs;
8	6. The short-term and long-term costs and benefits of relocating female inmates to
9	another location;
10	7. The short-term and long-term costs and benefits of relocating minimum security male
11	inmates to New England or another location;
12	8. Available services and work release opportunities for minimum security male inmates
13	in New England and other locations; and
14	9. The feasibility and desirability of increasing regional detention and transition facilities
15	for female inmates across the state.
16	The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with
17	any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-seventh legislative-
18	assembly.
19	SECTION 9. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS
20	AND REHABILITATION REVIEW COMMITTEE - MEMBERSHIP - DUTIES.
21	1. During the 2019-20 interim, the legislative management shall study the department of
22	corrections and rehabilitation. The legislative management shall create a department
23	of corrections and rehabilitation review committee to conduct the study, consisting of
24	six members as follows:
25	a. Three members of the house of representatives selected by the majority leader of
26	the house of representatives, two of whom must represent the majority faction of
27	the house of representatives and one of whom must represent the minority
28	faction of the house of representatives; and
29	b. Three members of the senate selected by the majority leader of the senate, two
30	of whom must represent the majority faction of the senate and one of whom must
31	represent the minority faction of the senate.
