- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact section 54-12-33.1 of the North Dakota Century Code,
- 2 relating to human trafficking prevention training; and to provide a continuing appropriation.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 4 SECTION 1. Section 54-12-33.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted
- 5 as follows:

6 54-12-33.1. Human trafficking prevention training - Exemptions - Immunity -

9		<u>a.</u>	"Human trafficking" means human trafficking as defined in chapter 12.1-41.
10		<u>b.</u>	"Human trafficking commission" means the commission established under
11			section 54-12-33.
12		<u>C.</u>	"Lodging establishment" means any hotel, motel, resort, building, or structure that
13			is used to provide sleeping accommodations to transient guests.
14		<u>d.</u>	"Proprietor" means the person in charge of a lodging establishment and includes
15			an owner, lessee, and manager.
16	<u>2.</u>	<u>With</u>	nin ninety days of the effective date of this Act, the human trafficking commission
17		<u>shal</u>	I establish an educational training program with a focus on the accurate and
18		pror	npt identification and reporting of, or response to, suspected human trafficking. To
19		the e	extent possible, the human trafficking commission shall allow the use of existing
20		<u>train</u>	ning modules and materials. The training must include:
21		<u>a.</u>	Human trafficking awareness;
22		<u>b.</u>	How to recognize potential victims of human trafficking;
23		<u>C.</u>	How to identify activities commonly associated with human trafficking; and

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1		d. Effective responses to human trafficking situations, including how to report
2		suspected human trafficking to law enforcement.
3	<u>3.</u>	A proprietor may:
4		a. Provide each onsite employee with the training described in subsection 2.
5		b. In an employee roster or in each employee's personnel file, annually certify each
6		employee has received the training approved by the human trafficking
7		commission.
8		c. Conduct an ongoing awareness campaign for employees which addresses the
9		information described in subsection 2.
10	<u>4.</u>	A proprietor may post and maintain a poster approved and provided by the human
11		trafficking commission which contains the information described in subsection 2. The
12		poster must include the contact information for an organization that provides
13		assistance and support services to human trafficking victims. The poster may be
14		visibly displayed at the lodging establishment's check-in area, lobby, or transient guest
15		services.
16	<u>5.</u>	A proprietor or employee of a lodging establishment who acts in good faith is immune
17		from liability in any civil action for reporting suspected human trafficking activities.
18	<u>6.</u>	The human trafficking commission may seek, apply for, accept, and receive any
19		donation, gift, grant, or bequest offered or tendered from public or private sources for
20		the purpose of furthering the objectives of the human trafficking prevention training
21		and incentivizing proprietors to participate in the human trafficking prevention training.
22		All moneys received or accepted under this subsection are appropriated on a
23		continuing basis to the human trafficking commission.
