- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact sections 43-17-44 and 43-17-45 of the North Dakota
- 2 Century Code, relating to the practice of telemedicine; and to amend and reenact subsection 3
- 3 of section 26.1-14-02 and sections 43-17-01 and 43-17-02.3 of the North Dakota Century Code,
- relating to the definitions of the practice of medicine and telemedicine and the practice of 4
- 5 medicine.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 7 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Subsection 3 of section 26.1-14-02 of the North Dakota
- 8 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 9 "Practice of medicine" means the practice of medicine, surgery, and obstetrics and has 10 the same meaning specified in subsection 2 of section 43-17-01.
- 11 SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 43-17-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is
- 12 amended and reenacted as follows:
- 13 43-17-01. Definitions.
- 14 1. "Board" means the North Dakota board of medicine.
- 15 2. "Licensee" means a physician or physician assistant licensed to practice in North
- 16 Dakota.
- 17 "Physician" includes physician and surgeon (M.D.) and osteopathic physician and 3.
- 18 surgeon (D.O.).
- 19 3.4. "Practice of medicine" includes the practice of medicine, surgery, and obstetrics. The 20 following persons must be regarded as practicing medicine:
- 21 a. One who holds out to the public as being engaged within this state in the 22 diagnosis or treatment of diseases or injuries of human beings.

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- 1 One who suggests, recommends, or prescribes any form of treatment for the 2 intended relief or cure of any physical or mental ailment of any person, with the 3 intention of receiving, directly or indirectly, any fee, gift, or compensation. 4 One who maintains an office for the examination or treatment of persons afflicted C. 5 with disease or injury of the body or mind. 6 d. One who attaches the title M.D., surgeon, doctor, D.O., osteopathic physician 7 and surgeon, or any other similar word or words or abbreviation to the person's 8 name, indicating that the person is engaged in the treatment or diagnosis of the 9 diseases or injuries of human beings mustshall be held to be engaged in the 10 practice of medicine. 11 "Telemedicine" means the practice of medicine using electronic communication, <u>5.</u> 12 information technologies, or other means between a licensee in one location and a 13 patient in another location, with or without an intervening health care provider. 14 "Telemedicine" includes direct interactive patient encounters, asynchronous store-and-15 forward technologies, and remote monitoring. 16 SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 43-17-02.3 of the North Dakota Century Code is 17 amended and reenacted as follows: 18 43-17-02.3. Practice of medicine or osteopathy by holder of permanent, unrestricted 19 license - Exceptions. 20 The practice of medicine is deemed to occur in the state the patient is located. A practitioner 21 providing medical care to a patient located in this state is subject to the licensing and 22 disciplinary laws of this state and shall possess an active North Dakota license for the 23 practitioner's profession. Notwithstanding anything in this chapter to the contrary, any physician 24 who is the holder of a permanent, unrestricted license to practice medicine or osteopathy in any 25 state or territory of the United States, the District of Columbia, or a province of Canada may 26 practice medicine or osteopathy in this state without first obtaining a license from the North 27 Dakota board of medicine under one or more of the following circumstances: 28 As a member of an organ harvest team; 1.
 - 2. On board an air ambulance and as a part of its treatment team:
 - 3. To provide one-time consultation or teaching assistance for a period of not more than twenty-four hours; or

3	SEC	TION 4. Section 43-17-44 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as	
4	follows:		
5	<u>43-1</u>	7-44. Standard of care and professional ethics.	
6	A lic	ensee is held to the same standard of care and same ethical standards, whether	
7	practicin	g traditional in-person medicine or telemedicine. The following apply in the context of	
8	telemedicine:		
9	<u>1.</u>	Professional ethical standards require a practitioner to practice only in areas in which	
10		the practitioner has demonstrated competence, based on the practitioner's training,	
11		ability, and experience. In assessing a licensee's compliance with this ethical	
12		requirement, the board shall give consideration to board certifications and specialty	
13		groups' telemedicine standards.	
14	<u>2.</u>	A licensee practicing telemedicine shall establish a valid relationship with the patient	
15		before the diagnosis or treatment of a patient. A licensee practicing telemedicine shall	
16		verify the identity of the patient seeking care and shall disclose, and ensure the patient	
17		has the ability to verify, the identity and licensure status of any licensee providing	
18		medical services to the patient.	
19	<u>3.</u>	Before initially diagnosing or treating a patient for a specific illness or condition, an	
20		examination or evaluation must be performed. An examination or evaluation may be	
21		performed entirely through telemedicine, if the examination or evaluation is equivalent	
22		to an in-person examination.	
23		a. A video examination utilizing appropriate diagnostic testing and use of	
24		peripherals that would be deemed necessary in a like in-person examination or	
25		evaluation meets this standard, as does an examination conducted with an	
26		appropriately licensed intervening health care provider, practicing within the	
27		scope of the provider's profession, providing necessary physical findings to the	
28		licensee. An examination or evaluation consisting only of a static online	
29		questionnaire or an audio conversation does not meet the standard of care.	
30		b. Once a licensee conducts an acceptable examination or evaluation, whether	

in-person or by telemedicine, and establishes a patient-licensee relationship,

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- 1 subsequent followup care may be provided as deemed appropriate by the 2 licensee, or by a provider designated by the licensee to act temporarily in the 3 licensee's absence. In certain types of telemedicine utilizing asynchronous storeand-forward technology or electronic monitoring, such as teleradiology or 4 5 intensive care unit monitoring, it is not medically necessary for an independent 6 examination of the patient to be performed. 7 A licensee practicing telemedicine is subject to all North Dakota laws governing the 8
 - adequacy of medical records and the provision of medical records to the patient and other medical providers treating the patient.
 - A licensee must have the ability to make appropriate referrals of patients not amenable to diagnosis or complete treatment through a telemedicine encounter, including a patient in need of emergent care or complementary in-person care.
- 13 SECTION 5. Section 43-17-45 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as 14 follows:

43-17-45. Prescribing - Controlled substances.

- A licensee who has performed a telemedicine examination or evaluation meeting the requirements of this chapter may prescribe medications according to the licensee's professional discretion and judgment. Opioids may only be prescribed through telemedicine if prescribed as a federal food and drug administration approved medication assisted treatment for opioid use disorder. Opioids may not be prescribed through a telemedicine encounter for any other purpose.
- A licensee who, pursuant to this chapter, prescribes a controlled substance, as defined 2. by North Dakota law, shall comply with all state and federal laws regarding the prescribing of a controlled substance, and shall participate in the North Dakota prescription drug monitoring program.
