1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of

- 2 commerce; to amend and reenact sections 6-09.18-01, 6-09.18-02, 6-09.18-03, 6-09.18-04,
- 3 6-09.18-05, 6-09.18-06, and 6-09.18-07, subsection 4 of section 21-10-13, sections 54-60-22,
- 4 <u>54-60-28, 54-60-29, 54-60-29.1, and 54-60.2-02 of the North Dakota Century Code and</u>
- 5 subsection 35 of section 1 of chapter 550 of the 2021 Special Session Session Laws, relating to
- 6 the legacy investment for technology program, the workforce enhancement council, the
- 7 administration of uncrewed aircraft system programs, workforce development grants to tribally
- 8 <u>controlled community colleges, and a North Dakota development fund grant program; to provide</u>
- 9 <u>a transfer; to provide an exemption; and to provide for a report</u>.

10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the department of commerce for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the department of commerce, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025, as follows:

The office of management and budget shall transfer 5 the sum of \$30,000,000 from strategic investment and improvements fund to the North Dakota 6 development fund for programs under chapter 10-30.5, during the biennium beginning July 1, 7 2023, and ending June 30, 2025. 8 **SECTION 6. TRANSFER - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND TO** 9 NORTH DAKOTA DEVELOPMENT FUND - FERTILIZER DEVELOPMENT ADVISORY 10 COUNCIL - EXEMPTION. 11 The office of management and budget shall transfer the sum of \$120,000,000 from the 1. 12 strategic investment and improvements fund to the North Dakota development fund 13 under chapter 10-30.5 for the purpose of a fertilizer development grant program, 14 during the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025. 15 2. Notwithstanding any other provision under chapter 10-30.5, the board of directors shall 16 distribute grant funding to entities to support the development of fertilizer plants in the 17 state based on recommendations from the fertilizer development advisory board. In 18 consultation with the advisory board, the board of directors shall develop program 19 guidelines including eligibility criteria. 20 3. To be eligible for a grant, a fertilizer development project must be located within the 21 state, and the owner of the fertilizer development project must be an entity domiciled 22 in the United States or Canada. Fifty percent of the grant awards must be designated 23 for one or more fertilizer development projects that use hydrogen produced by the 24 electrolysis of water, and fifty percent of the grant awards must be designated for one 25 or more fertilizer development projects that use natural gas or lignite resources. 26 4. The fertilizer development advisory board consists of the following members: 27 The commissioner of commerce or the commissioner's designee to serve as a. 28 chairman; 29 The agriculture commissioner or the commissioner's designee; b. 30 A representative of the soybean industry appointed by the agriculture C. 31 commissioner;

10 5	5. a.	To the extent the board of directors, fertilizer development advisory board, or
11		department of commerce determines any materials or data consist of trade
12		secrets or commercial, financial, or proprietary information of entities applying for
13		a fertilizer development grant, materials and data submitted to, made by, or
14		received by the board of directors, fertilizer development advisory board, or
15		department of commerce, are not public records subject to section 44-04-18 and
16		section 6 of article XI of the Constitution of North Dakota, but are subject to
17		section 44-04-18.4.
18	b.	A person may file a request with the board of directors, fertilizer development
19		advisory board, or department of commerce to have material designated as
20		confidential under subdivision a. The request must contain any information
21		required by the board of directors, fertilizer development advisory board, or
22		department of commerce and must include at least the following:
23		(1) A general description of the nature of the information sought to be
24		protected.
25		(2) An explanation of why the information derives independent economic value,
26		actual or potential, from not being generally known to other persons.
27		(3) An explanation of why the information is not readily ascertainable by proper
28		means of other persons.
29		(4) A general description of any person that may obtain economic value from
30		disclosure or use of the information, and how the person may obtain this
31		value.

1	(5) A description of the efforts used to maintain the secrecy of the information.
2	c. Any request under subdivision b is confidential. The board of directors, fertilizer
3	development advisory board, or department of commerce shall examine the
4	request and determine whether the information is relevant to the matter at hand
5	and is a trade secret under the definition in section 44-04-18.4 or 47-25.1-01. If
6	the board of directors, fertilizer development advisory board, or department of
7	commerce determines the information is either not relevant or not a trade secret,
8	the board of directors, fertilizer development advisory board, or department of
9	commerce shall notify the requester and the requester may ask for the return of
10	the information and the request within ten days of the notice. If no return is
11	sought, the information and request are open records.
12	6. A fertilizer development grant is not a business incentive under chapter 54-60.1.
13	SECTION 7. ESTIMATED INCOME - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS
14	FUND - LEGISLATIVE INTENT. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes
15	the sum of \$98,500,000 from the strategic investment and improvements fund, of which
16	\$7,000,000 is for the rural workforce housing grant program, \$5,000,000 is for the tourism
17	marketing awareness initiative, \$25,000,000 is for the tourism destination development initiative
18	grant program, \$30,000,000 is for the beyond visual line of sight uncrewed aircraft system
19	program, \$28,000,000 is for the enhanced use lease grant program, \$2,000,000 is for new
20	Americans workforce development and training grants, and \$1,500,000 is for a workforce safety
21	grant to an organization that provides workforce safety. It is the intent of the sixty-eighth
22	legislative assembly that the department of commerce not hire a third-party consultant when
23	determining how funding for the tourism destination development initiative grant program will be
24	spent.
25	SECTION 8. RURAL WORKFORCE HOUSING GRANT PROGRAM. The grants line item
26	in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$6,500,000 from the general fund for the purpose of
27	providing rural workforce housing grants. The department of commerce shall develop guidelines
28	for the grants, including eligibility criteria, maximum grant awards, and reporting requirements.
29	Grants may be awarded to cities with a population of fewer than 10,000 residents. Grant
30	funding may be used to:

1	1. Conduct a housing study in the city to identify workforce housing needs, blighted
2	property, and vacant lots within the city;
3	2. Purchase blighted properties or vacant lots;
4	3. Remove hazards or structures from blighted properties or vacant lots; and
5	4. Provide up to \$10,000 per business for repairs or improvements if the business is
6	located in a mixed-use property that will be used for rural workforce housing.
7	SECTION 9. RURAL HEALTH CARE GRANT PROGRAM - MATCHING FUNDS
8	REQUIREMENT. The grants line item in section 1 of this Act includes \$250,000\$444,000 from
9	the general fund for providing matching funds to an organization assisting in the recruitment,
10	distribution, and supply, and enhancing the quality and efficiency of personnel providing health
11	services in rural areas of the state. The department of commerce may spend the funds
12	appropriated in this section only to the extent the organization has secured matching funds from
13	nonstate sources on a dollar-for-dollar basis.
14	SECTION 10. DISCRETIONARY FUNDS - STATE MAGAZINE. Of the funding
15	appropriated from the general fund in the discretionary funds line item in section 1 of this Act,
16	\$150,000 is designated for supporting the continuation of the North Dakota state magazine.
17	SECTION 11. WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT GRANTS TO TRIBALLY CONTROLLED
18	COMMUNITY COLLEGES - LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT REPORT. The grants line item in
19	section 1 of this Act includes \$5,000,000 from the general fund for workforce development
20	grants to tribally controlled community colleges. To be eligible for a grant under this section, a
21	tribally controlled community college must partner with at least one high school in the state for
22	programs under section 54-60.2-02. During the 2023-24 interim, each tribally controlled
23	community college receiving funding under this program shall report to the department of
24	commerce by August 1, 2024, regarding the use of grant funds and the department of
25	commerce shall provide a report to the legislative management by October 1, 2024, regarding
26	the use of grant funds.
27	SECTION 12. AMENDMENT. Section 6-09.18-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is
28	amended and reenacted as follows:
29	6-09.18-01. Definitions.

11	compensation in an amount not exceeding one hundred thirty-five dollars per day and		
12	travel and expense reimbursement as provided by law for state officers for attending		
13	meetings of the committee.		
14	4. The committee shall meet as necessary to make loan recommendations and provide		
15	ongoing review of research, development, and commercialization activities.		
16	SECTION 14. AMENDMENT. Section 6-09.18-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is		
17	amended and reenacted as follows:		
18	6-09.18-03. Innovation loan fund to support technology advancement -		
19	InnovationLegacy investment technology loan program.		
20	The department of commerce shall administer the innovationlegacy investment technology		
21	loan program in consultation with the Bank of North Dakota to provide loans for activities		
22	identified in this chapter. The department of commerce shall provide administrative support for		
23	the program, including the drafting of application forms, receiving applications, reviewing		
24	applications for completeness and compliance with committee policy, and forwarding complete		
25	applications to the committee in accordance with the guidelines established by the committee.		
26	Program guidelines relating to ownership of intellectual property, inventions, and discoveries		
27	must address activities and issues unique to technologies, patents, and companies created as a		
28	result of a legacy innovationinvestment technology loan.		
29	SECTION 15. AMENDMENT. Section 6-09.18-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is		
30	amended and reenacted as follows:

2	1.	The committee shall establish guidelines for entities to qualify for an innovationa	
3		legacy investment technology loan under this section. The committee shall consider	
4		and process applications in a timely manner that does not jeopardize an applicant's	
5		opportunity to leverage other funds.	
6	2.	In determining whether to recommend approval of an application, the committee shall	
7		consider the extent to which the proposal will:	
8		a. Deliver applied research, experimentation, or operational testing in one or more	
9		of the diversification sectors to create information or data to enhance North	
10		Dakota companies or industries or companies making investments in North	
11		Dakota;	
12		b. Lead to the commercialization or patent of an innovation technology solution; or	
13		c. Result in the development of a new company or expansion of an existing	
14		company that will diversify the state's economy through new products,	
15		investment, or skilled jobs.	
16	3.	The Bank of North Dakota shall review the business plan, financial statements, and	
17		other information necessary for the Bank to determine which applications	
18		recommended for approval by the committee will be approved by the Bank for final	
19		loan approval. The terms of the loan must include:	
20		a. Zero percent interest for the first three years of the loan;	
21		b. Two percent interest for the next two years of the loan; and	
22		c. An interest rate equal to a standard Bank of North Dakota loan for all subsequent	
23		years.

30	The innovation loan fund to support technology advancementlegacy investment for		
31	technolo	ogy fund is a special fund in the state treasury and must be administered by the	

1	department of commerce. All moneys in the fund are appropriated to the department of
2	commerce on a continuing basis for the purpose of providing innovationlegacy investment
3	technology loans and for administrative expenses. The department of commerce shall deposit in
4	the innovation loan fund to support technology advancementlegacy investment for technology
5	fund all principal and interest paid on loans made from the fund. Interest earned on moneys in
6	the fund must be credited to the fund.
7	SECTION 17. AMENDMENT. Section 6-09.18-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is
8	amended and reenacted as follows:
9	6-09.18-06. Use of loan funds.
10	Loan recipients shall use innovationlegacy investment technology loan funds to enhance
11	capacity and, to the extent possible, leverage state, federal, and private sources of funding. An
12	entity receiving a loan under this chapter may not use the funds for capital or building
13	investments or for research or other activities not identified in this chapter. The funds may not
14	be used for academic or instructive programming, workforce training, administrative costs, or to
15	supplant funding for regular operations of institutions of higher education. Unless otherwise
16	approved by the committee, loan recipients may use funding only to conduct applied research,
17	experimentation, or operational testing within the state. If an entity awarded a loan no longer
18	conducts its activities in the state, the interest rate of the loan shall default to the rate of a
19	standard Bank of North Dakota loan.
20	SECTION 18. AMENDMENT. Section 6-09.18-07 of the North Dakota Century Code is
21	amended and reenacted as follows:
22	6-09.18-07. Innovation loan fund to support technology advancement - Postaward
23	monitoring.
24	Upon completion of work performed from funding provided by a legacy investment
25	technology loan, the department of commerce shall provide an independent review of the
26	results. Evaluation criteria may include:
27	1. How the work performed has contributed to the development of a company or the
28	expansion of an existing company, has enhanced the ability of a company to make
29	investments in the state, or otherwise enticed a company to invest or move to the
30	state.

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1	2. How the work performed has led to additional economic investment of capital from
2	public and private sector entities within and outside North Dakota.
3	3. How the work performed has led to or may lead to a patent or research that is
4	commercially viable.
5	SECTION 19. AMENDMENT. Subsection 4 of section 21-10-13 of the North Dakota
6	Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
7	4. On July first of each odd-numbered year, from the amount available for appropriation
8	or transfer from the legacy earnings fund for the biennium, the state treasurer shall
9	transfer funding in the following order:
10	a. The first one hundred fifty million dollars to the legacy sinking and interest fund
11	under section 6-09.4-10.1.
12	b. The next sixty million dollars to the highway tax distribution fund for allocations
13	under section 54-27-19.
14	c. Any remaining funds for other purposes as designated by the legislative
15	assembly, including:
16	(1) Up to fifty million dollars for tax relief pursuant to appropriations or transfers
