- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 4.1-01 of the North Dakota
- 2 Century Code, relating to the protection of native pollinating insects in the state; to provide a
- 3 report; to provide an appropriation; and to provide an expiration date.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

5 **SECTION 1.** A new section to chapter 4.1-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

7 Pollinator health - Report.

- 1. The commissioner shall study the challenges associated with native pollinating insects, including their decline, associated ecosystems, health, and resilience.
- 10 2. The study must:

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- 11 <u>a. Identify the significance of healthy native pollinating insect communities and the</u>
 12 <u>role of native pollinating insects in supporting health ecosystems and human</u>
 13 <u>well-being;</u>
 - b. Summarize knowledge regarding native pollinator health; and
- 15 <u>c.</u> <u>Identify:</u>
 - Factors negatively affecting native pollinating insect communities;
- 17 (2) Existing projects, public-private partnerships, and funding opportunities in the state for native pollinating insect conservation;
 - (3) Any gaps in knowledge regarding native pollinating insect health, including wild bee distributions and population dynamics, native pollinator species at risk of decline, and best practices for state land managers to incentivize the creation and protection of healthy and diverse pollinator communities; and
- 23 (4) Opportunities for:

1			<u>(a)</u>	Protection and recovery efforts through the development of programs
2				that mitigate factors negatively affecting native pollinating insect
3				communities; and
4			<u>(b)</u>	The development of ecological state land management practices that
5				restore habitat functionality and provide natural climate solutions.
6	<u>3.</u>	By June 1, 2026, the commissioner shall provide a report to the legislative		
7		management of all findings and recommendations and any bill drafts necessary to		
8		implement the recommendations, including how to:		
9		<u>a.</u>	Develop a	n education and outreach program to raise awareness and public
10			engageme	ent and incentivize action to benefit native pollinating insect health;
11		<u>b.</u>	Engage a	nd work across state agencies when developing and implementing
12			policies ar	nd practices regarding native pollinating insects; and
13		<u>C.</u>	Protect na	ative pollinating insects.
14	<u>4.</u>	In conducting the study, the commissioner shall consult:		
15		<u>a.</u>	Federal a	gencies, including the United States fish and wildlife service and the
16			forest serv	vice;
17		<u>b.</u>	Independe	ent scientists and experts with expertise in pollinator health, climate
18			<u>change, e</u>	cological processes and resilience, biodiversity, native plants, and
19			<u>ecological</u>	land management; and
20		<u>C.</u>	Other stat	e agencies, including the department of transportation, the department
21			of environ	mental equality, and the department of health and human services.
22	SECTION 2. APPROPRIATION - AGRICULTURE COMMISSIONER - POLLINATOR			
23	STUDY. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not			
24	otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$25,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the			
25	agriculture commissioner for the purpose of completing the pollinator study under section 1 of			
26	this Act or contracting with a private entity to complete the study, for the biennium beginning			
27	July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025.			
28	SECTION 3. EXPIRATION DATE. Section 1 of this Act is effective through July 31, 2026,			
29	and after that date is ineffective.
