Agency Mission Statement

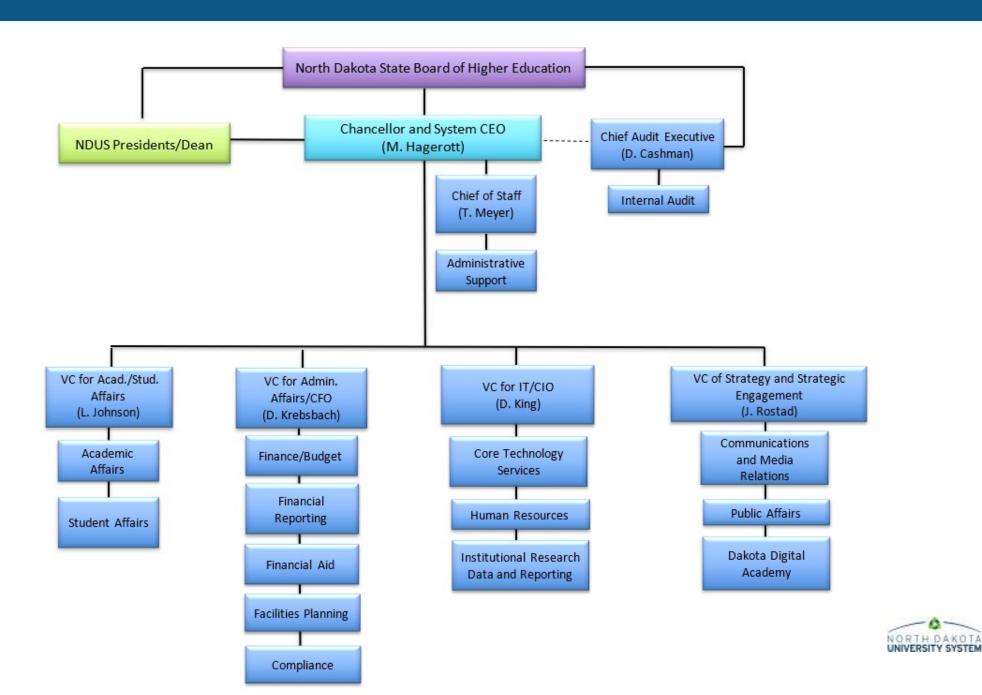
The mission of the NDUS is to enhance economic growth, social vitality, and quality of life for North Dakota through the discovery, sharing, and application of knowledge. The Chancellor's Office supports the SBHE in developing public policy for the governance of the NDUS and in advocating on behalf of the System.

Agency Description

The North Dakota State Board of Higher Education (SBHE), established in 1939 by the voters of North Dakota, is the governing body for the state's 11 publicly funded institutions which comprise the North Dakota University System (NDUS). The SBHE carries out its constitutional responsibilities through a comprehensive set of policies. The Chancellor serves as the NDUS' chief executive officer. The Chancellor and the system office staff support the SBHE in developing public policy for the NDUS, in advocating on its behalf, and fostering shared leadership throughout the system.

Agency Major Accomplishments

- 1. Conducted three successful presidential searches at WSC, NDSU, and NDSCS
- 2. Created more than 325 new certificate programs at both the undergraduate and graduate levels
- 3. Emerging use of stackable certificates leading to associate and/or baccalaureate degrees
- 4. Implemented advanced security protection to more than 16,000 computing endpoints across the NDUS
- 5. Implemented a single sign-on portal for NDUS applications
- 6. Provided centralized secure wireless networking for the campuses
- 7. MiSU became the third NDUS institution to receive NSA designation of Center of Academic Excellence in Cyber Defense
- 8. Maintained the ND Career Builders scholarship and loan forgiveness program, in conjunction with multiple state agencies and private-sector partners, to address the State's workforce needs
- 9. Passage of board policy to discontinue the submission of standardized tests for the purpose of admission
- 10. Rebuilt SBHE Dashboards to reflect updated goals, objectives, outcomes and metrics
- 11. Continued support of the Dakota Digital Academy, which has resulted in numerous grant-funded digital outcomes
- 12. Deployed a Security Operations Center to prevent, detect, investigate, and respond to NDUS security incidents
- 13. Collaborated with Department of Health and others to assist in the rollout of a new vaccination campaign
- 14. Conducted extensive research on behalf of DPI for House Bill 1013 (COVID-era learning loss)
- 15. Collaborated with NDIT and SLDS to include ND Post-Secondary Outcomes on NDInsights, the state's official source for information about public education
- 16. Implemented NDUS data governance committee and project to ensure data is appropriately used while protected
- 17. Launched a systemwide online, self-service performance evaluation system
- 18. Implemented technical and student-facing upgrades to Campus Connection
- 19. Continued migration of selected services to the Cloud
- 20. Updated availability of Student Voting Certificate in Campus Connection



NDUS Plans, Goals, and Challenges

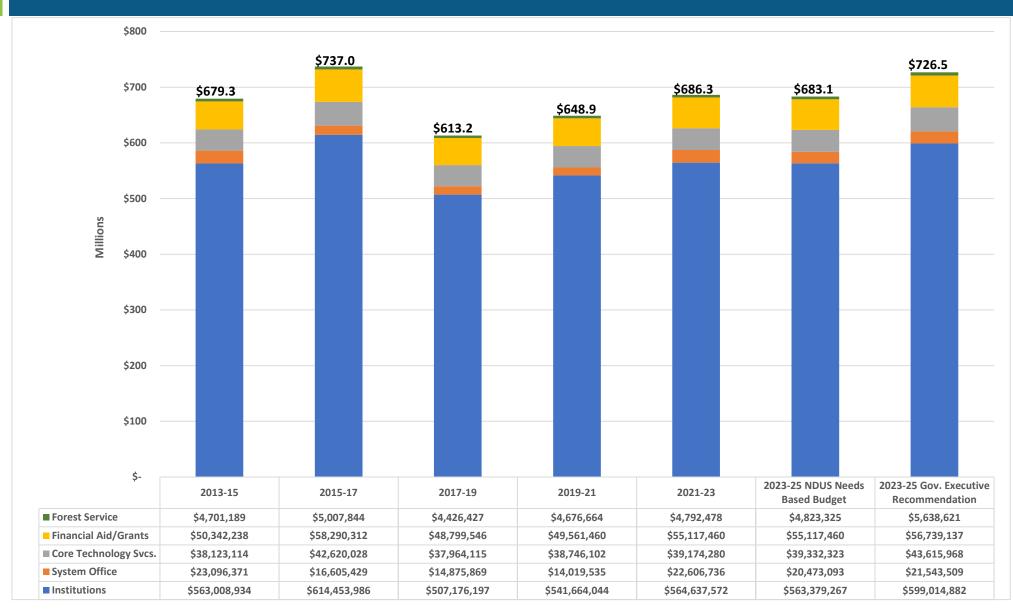
The NDUS has continued to offer regionally-competitive tuition rates, affordable student housing, and reduced student textbook costs through increased availability of Open Educational Resources. Through the implementation of more types of inter-campus and system-wide shared services, operations have and will continue to become more cost effective toward the goal of providing a quality education for students.

Critical issues related to those goals are:

- Meeting student course delivery needs by implementing a dynamic enrollment environment;
- Maintaining and increasing enrollment and retention through new programs and educational pathways;
- Addressing challenges in talent recruitment and retention for faculty and staff in changing inflationary conditions;
- Anticipating and meeting technological transformation and the digitization of society;
- Lingering impact of the COVID-19 pandemic;
- Continuing to address the near- and long-term workforce needs of the state;
- Furthering development and access to IT capabilities to maximize student success and systemwide collaboration;
- Sustaining and increasing efforts to consolidate IT systems and business services that are cost effective and provide value.

2023-25 Investment Opportunities - Optional Systemwide Initiatives

- SBHE supports Governor and Legislative Assembly providing 5% minimum annual salary increase each year of biennium; supports general funds to offset tuition portion of compensation package
- SBHE looks forward to working with Governor and Legislative Assembly to address 2021-23 inflation as part of statewide plan; consider increase in funding formula per credit hour rate for NDUS institutions
- Behavioral Health Initiative \$3.6 million
 - Provides 16 full-time, 2 part-time, 4 trainees, and 4 intern to assist students with behavioral health needs
 - Increased need due to the pandemic
 - Student wait times to see counselor can be up to 4 weeks
- Veteran Education Training program \$177,000
 - Allow program to increase staff from 1.0 to 3.0 FTE's
 - Provide higher level of services to veterans interested in degree or certificate



2023-25 Investment Opportunities - Optional Systemwide Initiatives

- Workforce Education Innovation Grant Program \$24 million
 - \$10M 2-year colleges; \$8M 4-year regional universities; \$6M NDUS research universities
 - Start-up funds for institutions to establish innovative high-demand programs to meet
 North Dakota workforce needs
 - Provides curriculum development, purchase of equipment and technology to train or certify new and existing instructors and to promote programs to respond to workforce needs of the state
- Education Scholarships for Energy Workforce \$10 million
 - Serving communities in the oil and gas sector with degrees, certificates, and new skills to fill workforce staffing needs
- Dakota Digital Academy \$450,000
 - Funding to continue providing accessible computing and cyber science education in North Dakota



2023-25 Investment Opportunities - Optional Systemwide Initiatives

- Systemwide Marketing Program \$900,000
 - Funding to market the variety of degrees and programs offered by the 11 institutions of the NDUS to prospective North Dakota students
- Forest Service: Cooperative Fire Protection Initiative \$187,000
 - Provide critical financial, technical, and educational assistance to fire departments for wildfire prevention, suppression, mitigation
- Forest Service: Forest Recreation Enhancement \$200,000
 - Provide delivery of services to meet increasing outdoor recreation demands by State Forest users.
- SBHE supports Capital Building Funds Program and funding at current (\$19M) or higher levels in tier II and tier III funds for 2023-25 biennium
 - Support reducing match requirement of extraordinary repairs tier I funds from 2:1 match to 1:1 match for all institutions except for NDSU and UND
 - Support reducing the match requirement on Tier III funds for all institutions to 1:1 match



2023-25 Investment Opportunities - Optional Systemwide Governance Initiatives

- Core Technology Services \$6.8 million
 - Increase software contract costs \$3 million
 - Security Operations Center \$1.8 million
 - NDIT charges to NDUS \$1 million
 - 2 FTE Staff and software licenses for the CTS Security Operations Center \$0.8 million
 - Maintenance and development of current longitudinal data system as outlined in ND century code 54-59-38 - \$2 million
- Assistant Vice Chancellor for Research and Workforce- \$425,000
 - This new NDUS Office position promote and expand research activities and reporting across institutions, in collaboration with SBHE Research committee



2023-25 Investment Opportunities - Optional Systemwide Governance Initiatives

- ND Academic & CTE Scholarship \$1 million (Base Funding)
 - Number of eligible students continues to increase resulting in need to increase the appropriation
- Financial Aid Systems \$1,827,534
 - Antiquated system risks failure. The NDUS in 2021-22 processed 14,248 awards to students totaling \$24.5 million.
 - Streamline processes & administrative effort, current programs managed via multiple apps, some no longer supported. Any changes are costly and cumbersome.
 - RFP solution issued to procure vendor for solution to be utilized by the NDUS.
 Vendor solution is \$1,554,354 for first year implementation and \$273,180 in ongoing annual operating costs
- SBHE supports Challenge Grant Program continuation and funding



2023-25 Investment Opportunities — Higher Ed Stabilization & Research Fund Stream

- SBHE supports legislative action to create a Higher Education Stabilization Fund
 - Fund to provide resources to limit base general fund reductions due to state revenue fluctuations; similar to K-12's "Foundation Aid Stabilization Fund" eliminating need for budget allotment (NDCC 54-44.1-12)
 - Support program resilience, faculty, staff, student success during state funding shortfalls
 - K-12 stabilization mechanisms (Foundation Aid Stabilization Fund) has proven highly beneficial in a commodity-based economy
- SBHE supports a permanent research funding stream (possible use of Legacy funds)
- Research fund to include network infrastructure funding



Other sections for Agency Appropriation Bill (in Governor's recommended budget)

- Extend carryover authority for unexpended appropriation to be effective until July 31, 2025 (N.D.C.C. 54-44.1-11) (2021 SB2003 Sec. 15) and for capital projects authorized in Sec. 2 and 7 of SB2003 and funding authorized during 2021 special session in HB1505 and SB2345
- Update subsection 1 of section N.D.C.C. 15-10-48 to reflect new allocations for Challenge Grant awards to Institutions (2021 SB2003 Sec. 10)
- Include transfer authority for UND and UND SMHS operations line (2021 SB2003 Sec. 5)
- Include campus capital projects project management (2021 SB2003 Sec. 19)



Other Bills with Budget Impact

- <u>HB1031</u>— Student Financial Aid Grant Assistance, increase student grants from \$1,100 to \$1,600 per semester, increases appropriation by \$12 million from \$23.9 million to \$35.9 million; Academic and Career and Technical Education Scholarship, increases appropriation by \$1 million, from \$16.2 million to \$17.2 million; and Dual Credit Tuition Scholarship, appropriates \$1.5 million from BND profits
- HB1032 High Demand Certificate Programs, appropriation of \$1 million
- <u>HB1033</u> Challenge Grant Program, expand uses including new or expanding educational programs, appropriation of \$24 million
- <u>HB1034</u> Capital Building Fund, requires institutions to utilize a percentage of funds from gifts, grants, donations, the capital building fund or other local funds each capital project requested; requires facility renovation projects to reduce deferred maintenance by at least 75%; Capital projects must conform to campus master plans; limits uses to academic facilities, appropriation of \$29 million from SIIF; Extraordinary repairs(tier I) matching requirements reduced to 1:1 for all institutions except NDSU & UND
- SB2015 OMB budget \$40 million compensation equity for Higher Education
- <u>SB2161</u> Relating to the State Energy Research Center at UND, provides up to \$10 million from oil and gas gross production tax and oil extraction tax revenues
- HB1039 & HB1040 Closes the PERS defined benefit plan; requires additional contributions for current staff who are plan participants to retire the unfunded actuarial liability. PERS estimates were between 7.5% to 17.5% additional required payments annually on all staff currently in the PERS defined benefit plan
- <u>SB2025</u> Deficiency appropriation requests DCB \$99,768 and UND \$430,101

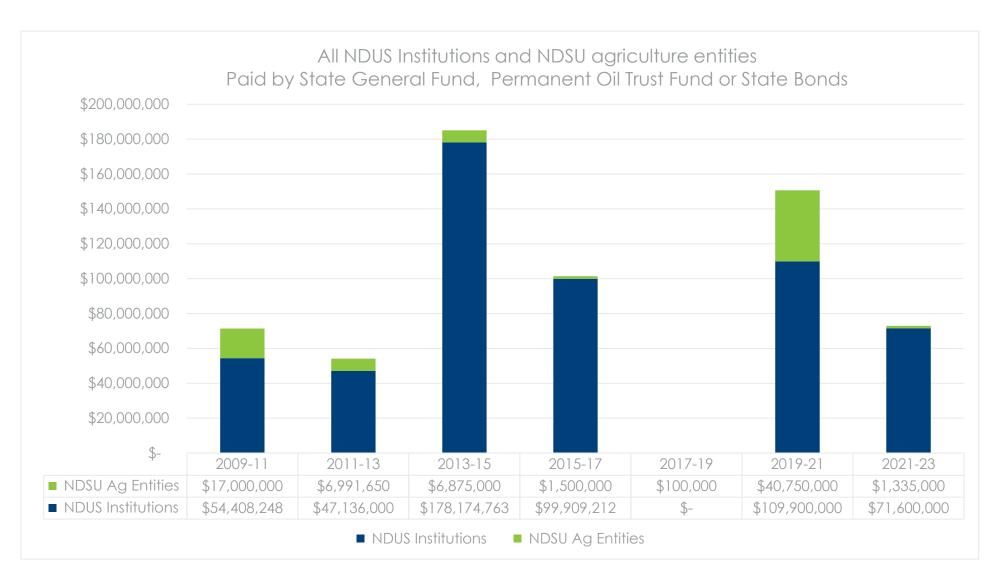


Capital Budget
