- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact the new chapter to title 54 as created by section 1 of
- 2 Senate Bill No. 2098, as approved by the sixty-ninth legislative assembly, and section 54-35-23
- 3 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to a state alert notice system and the committee on
- 4 tribal and state relations; and to provide for a report.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 54-35-23 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:
- 8 54-35-23. Committee on tribal and state relations Membership Duties.
- 9 1. The committee on tribal and state relations is composed of seven members as follows:
 - a. A chairman designated by the chairman of the legislative management;
 - b. Three members of the house of representatives, two of whom must be selected by the leader representing the majority faction of the house of representatives and one of whom must be selected by the leader representing the minority faction of the house of representatives; and
 - c. Three members of the senate, two of whom must be selected by the leader representing the majority faction of the senate and one of whom must be selected by the leader representing the minority faction of the senate.
 - The committee shall meet at such times and places as determined by the chairman.
 The legislative council shall provide staffing for the committee.
- The committee shall conduct joint meetings with the North Dakota tribal governments'
 task force to study tribal-state issues, including government-to-government relations,

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1 human services, education, corrections, and issues related to the promotion of 2 economic development and shall evaluate the feather alert notice, regarding missing 3 indigenous individuals, under section 2 of this Act. After the joint meetings have 4 concluded, the committee shall meet to prepare a report on its findings and 5 recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement those 6 recommendations, to the legislative management. 7 4. The members of the committee are entitled to compensation from the legislative 8 council for attendance at committee meetings at the rate provided for members of the 9 legislative assembly for attendance at interim committee meetings and are entitled to 10 reimbursement for expenses incurred in attending the meetings in the amounts 11 provided by law for other state officers. 12 5. The North Dakota tribal governments' task force is composed of six members as 13 follows: 14 (1) The executive director of the Indian affairs commission, or the executive 15 director's designee; 16 The chairman of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe, or the chairman's (2) 17 designee; 18 (3) The chairman of the Spirit Lake Tribe, or the chairman's designee; 19 (4) The chairman of the Three Affiliated Tribes of the Fort Berthold Reservation, 20 or the chairman's designee; 21 (5) The chairman of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Indians, or the 22 chairman's designee; and 23 The chairman of the Sisseton-Wahpeton Oyate of the Lake Traverse 24 Reservation, or the chairman's designee. 25 b. If the executive director of the Indian affairs commission or any of the tribal 26 chairmen appoint a designee to serve on the task force, only one individual may 27 serve as that designee during the biennium. A substitute designee may be 28 appointed by the executive director of the Indian affairs commission or a tribal 29 chairman in the event of the death, incapacity, resignation, or refusal to serve of

the initial designee.

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SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. The new chapter to title 54 of the North Dakota Century Code as created by section 1 of Senate Bill No. 2098, as approved by the sixty-ninth legislative 3 assembly, is amended and reenacted as follows: Definitions. 5 As used in this chapter: 6 "Amber alert notice" means an urgent bulletin using the emergency alert system to air 7 a description of a child who has been abducted. 2. "Blue alert notice" means an urgent bulletin using the emergency alert system to air a 9 description of an individual or an individual's vehicle to aid in the apprehension of an 10 individual who has threatened a law enforcement officer with a deadly weapon, used a deadly weapon against a law enforcement officer, caused a law enforcement officer to 12 suffer serious bodily injury or death, abducted a law enforcement officer, or caused a 13 law enforcement officer to go missing while on duty, and the individual has left the scene of the offense. 15 3. "Missing endangered individual" means: 16 A disabled adult or elderly vulnerable adult as defined in section 50-25.2-01 who-17 has disappeared and whose disappearance has been reported to law-18 enforcement; 19 An individual who has a developmental disability as defined in section 25-01.2-01 b. 20 who has disappeared and whose disappearance has been reported to lawenforcement; or 22 An elderly adult who has disappeared, whose disappearance has been reported 23 to law enforcement and the disappearance: Indicates the individual is believed to be in grave danger of serious bodily 25 harm or death, as determined by a law enforcement agency and either the 26 highway patrol or bureau of criminal investigation, based on a report 27 received from the missing adult's family member or an individual who has 28 significant frequent contact with the missing adult, which contains sufficient 29 evidence of the imminent risk; 30 (2) Warrants a silver alert notice activation due to the particular circumstances, as determined by a law enforcement agency and either the highway patrol8

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- or bureau of criminal investigation, based on a report received from the
 missing adult's family member or an individual who has significant frequent
 contact with the missing adult, which contains sufficient evidence that the
 particular circumstances warrant a silver alert notice activation."Feather
 alert notice" means an urgent bulletin using the emergency alert system to
 air a description of an indigenous individual who has been abducted or is
 believed to be at imminent risk of serious bodily injury or death.
 - 4. "Missing and endangered persons alert notice" means an urgent bulletin using the emergency alert system to air a description of an adult who has been abducted or is believed to be at imminent risk of serious bodily injury or death.
 - 5. "Silver alert notice" means an urgent bulletin using the emergency alert system to air a description of a missing, disabled, or elderly individual, or individual with a developmental disability, to aid in the location of that individual.

Alert notice system activation - Report.

- A law enforcement agency may request the bureau of criminal investigation or the superintendent of the highway patrol to activate an amber alert notice, a blue alert notice, a missing and endangered persons alert notice, a feather alert notice, or a silver alert notice.
- 2. The bureau of criminal investigation, in cooperation with the highway patrol and other relevant stakeholders, shall prepare an operational plan to prepare for and respond to requests for activation of an amber alert notice, a blue alert notice, a missing and endangered persons alert notice, a feather alert notice, or a silver alert notice. The plan must include the role and requirements of the division of state radio of the department of emergency services in broadcasting an alert to the public, including alerts in indigenous languages when available.
- 3. The Indian affairs commission shall serve as the primary liaison between tribal, state, and federal agencies regarding alert notices, if the missing individual is indigenous, and assist with public education, outreach, and advocacy efforts.
- 4. The bureau of criminal investigation and the highway patrol shall issue an annual
 report to the Indian affairs commission on the effectiveness and implementation of the
