Chair Sorvaag, members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to submit my support of House Bill No. 1018. My name is Patrick Kirby and a small business owner from District 13, with over 20 years of experience working with nonprofit organizations across North Dakota and the Midwest. I've had the privilege of helping communities leverage opportunities like this matching grant specifically allocated for the Fargo Theatre in conjunction with it's upcoming 100th year celebration, to transform their most beloved spaces into thriving hubs of culture, history, and economic vitality.

The matching grant proposed in House Bill No. 1018 is a proven strategy that creates momentum, inspires generosity, and energizes campaigns like the Fargo Theatre's Centennial Capital Campaign. A the 1:2 match requirement (that is specified in the last sentence of section 6) ensures that the Fargo Theatre requires a great deal of effort into the campaign as well.

From restoring landmarks to funding cultural assets, you have recognized the value these projects bring to our communities. The Fargo Theatre is no exception. Its presence in downtown Fargo has been a cornerstone of our state's cultural identity for nearly a century.
