ND A+, the state's one-of-a-kind comprehensive and customized assessment system, includes the statewide summative, state-provided interims, and a classroom formative that are all aligned to North Dakota state content standards.

WHAT WE DO



COMPUTER SCIENCE/CYBERSECURITY & AI

North Dakota is the first in the nation to create computer science and cybersecurity standards – which has been updated to included AI guidance – for each K-12 grade, as well as training and lessons for teachers across the state.



LEARNING SUPPORT

State law requires all teachers and principals serving K-3 students to be trained in scientifically-based reading instruction and to use "science of reading" instructional materials and approaches.



SUPPORTING SCHOOL BOARDS

The Be Legendary School Board Leadership Institute & Implementation is an intensive program designed for governing teams that are dedicated to continually sharpening and cultivating their focus on one primary objective: improving student outcomes.



CHOICE READY

Choice Ready measures a school's performance in preparing students to succeed beyond K-12. The Choice Ready rate for 2023-24 was 71%, up from 66% in 2022-23, and from 21% since the metric was adopted in 2017-18.



K-12 DATA MODERNIZATION

North Dakota is transitioning to a single enterprise system to streamline and simplify the state's K-12 data systems. The unified solution provides better integration, making data management more efficient and seamless for districts.



NETWORK FOR PERSONALIZED LEARNING

North Dakota is the first in the nation to create and recognize a learning continuum for graduation. The North Dakota NPL represents a growing group of individuals, teams, schools, and districts from across the state committed to making learning personal for all students.

Authority of the State Superintendent



- NDCC 15.1-02 outlines the duties of the superintendent of public instruction.








K-12 2025-27 BASE BUDGET BY USE

K-12 2025-27 BASE BUDGET: \$2,843,997,119






Examples of the State Superintendent's Duties


BREAKDOWN OF THE 2% NDDPI OPERATING PERCENTAGES
