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FIRST DAY.

TERRITORY OF DAKOTA, HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, / YANKTON, Monday, Dec. 5, 1870.

On the 5th day of December, A. D. 1870, it being the day provided by law for the convening of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Dakota, the members of the House of said assembly met in the Hall of the House of Representatives at Yankton, the capital, at 12 o'clock M., and proceeded to a temporary organization, in the following order, to-wit:

The House was called to order by George I. Foster, former Chief Clerk, who called the roll of members.

The following named gentlemen responded to their names: Union County, First Legislative District—Charles Allen, V. R. L. Barnes, C. P. Dow, H. A. Jerauld, John C. Sinclair and Sterling L. Parker.

Clay County—F. J. Cross, A. J. Mills, Randolph Mostow, A. F. Shaw, Philip Sherman and Noah Wherry.

Yankton County—A. P. Hammon, Geo. H. Hand, Nelson Learned, Ephraim Miner and Ole Sampson.

Bon Homme County—James Keegan.

Charles Mix and Buffalo Counties—Joseph LaRoche.

Pembina County—Not Represented.

The prescribed oath of office was then administered to the above named members by Associate Justice, W. W. Brookings.

TEMPORARY ORGANIZATION.

Mr. Geo. H. Hand, of Yankton county, then nominated Mr. Amos F. Shaw of Clay county, for temporary Speaker, and Mr. Joseph LaRoche, of Charles Mix county, nominated Mr. Philip Sherman, of Clay county, for the same office, and the vote being called,

Mr. Shaw received 14 votes, as follows:

Those voting for Mr. Shaw, were

Messrs. Allen, Barnes, Cross, Dow, Hammon, Hand, Iverson. Jerauld, Learned, Mills, Mostow, Parker, Samson and Sinclair.

Mr. La. LaRoche voted for Mr. Sherman, and

Mr. Sherman voted for Mr. LaRoche.

Mr. Shaw voted for Mr. Hand.

Messrs. Keegan and Wherry not voting.

It appearing that Mr. Shaw had received a majority of all the votes cast, he was declared duly elected temporary Speaker of the House.

Mr. Hammon nominated Geo. I. Foster, for temporary Clerk, and no other nomination being made, and a vote being taken, Mr. Foster was declared dulyelected temporary Chief Clerk of the House.

ADJOURNMENT.

On motion of Mr. Hammon, the House adjourned until tomorrow at 12 o'clock, M.

SECOND DAY.

House of Representatives, Tuesday, Dec. 6, 1870.

House met pursuant to adjournment, and was called to order by

The Speaker in the chair.

Roll called.

Absent, Mr. Hancock.

Mr. Hobrough, member elect from Charles Mix and Buffalo counties, and Mr. Wall, member elect from Bon Homme county, being present, came forward and took the oath of office, as members of this House, which oath was administered by Associate Justice W. W. Brookings.

The Journal of the preceding day was then read and approved.

PERMANENT ORGANIZATION.

The Speaker pro-tem then announced as the order of business, the election of a permanent Speaker of the House; whereupon

Mr. Miner nominated Mr. Geo. H. Hand for Speaker of the House.

Mr. Mostow nominated Mr. Amos F. Shaw.

Mr. Keegan nominated Mr. Phillip Sherman.

Mr. Barnes nominated Mr. Sterling L. Parker for the same position.

And a vote being taken

Mr. Hand received 6 votes.

Mr. Shaw received 7 votes.

Mr. Parker received 5 votes, and

Mr. Sherman received 2 votes, as follows:

Those voting for Mr. Hand, were

Messrs. Allen, Hammon, Iverson, Learned, Miner and Sampson.

Those voting for Mr. Shaw, were

Messrs. Cross, Hobrough, Mills, Mostow, Parker, Wall and Wherry.

Those voting for Mr. Parker, were

Messrs. Barnes, Dow, Jerauld, Sinclair and the Speaker, pro tem.

Those voting for Mr. Sherman, were

Messrs. Keegan and La Roche.

Mr Sherman voted for Mr. LaRoche.

Mr. Hand voted for Mr. Hammon.

It appearing that no choice of a Speaker had been made, the Speaker *pro tem* ordered that the House again proceed to vote for Speaker, pending which

Mr. Hammon moved that the House adjourn until half-past two o'clock P. M.

Which motion was agreed to.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

House met pursuant to adjournment.

The Speaker in the chair.

Roll called.

Absent, Mr. Hancock.

On motion of Mr. Hammon,

The reading of the Journal of the morning session was dispensed with.

The Speaker pro tem then announced as the order of business the election of a permanent Speaker of the House, and ordered that the Clerk pro tem proceed to call the roll, and

A vote being taken

Mr. Hand received 7 votes.

Mr. Shaw received 7 votes.

Mr. Parker received 3 votes, and

Mr. Sherman received 2 votes, as follows:

Those voting for Mr. Hand, were

Messrs. Allen, Hammon, Iverson, Jerauld, Learned, Miner and Sampson.

Those voting for Mr. Shaw, were

Messrs. Cross, Hobrough, Mills, Mostow, Parker, Wall and Wherry.

Those voting for Mr. Parker, were

Messrs. Barnes, Dow and Sinclair.

Those voting for Mr. Sherman, were

Messrs. Keegan and LaRoche.

Mr. Hand and the Speaker pro tem voted for Mr. Hammon.

Mr. Sherman voted for Mr. LaRoche.

It appearing that no choice of a Speaker had been made, the Speaker pro tem ordered that the Clerk pro tem again proceed to call the roll, pending which

Mr. Hammon moved that the House take a recess for one hour.

Which motion was agreed to.

AFTER RECESS.

At the expiration of the hour of recess,

The Speaker pro tem resumed the chair, and called

The House to order, and

Ordered, that the House proceed to the election of a Speaker, and a vote being taken

Mr. Hand recived 18 votes.

Mr. Sherman received 2 votes, as follows:

Those voting for Mr. Hand, were

Messrs. Allen, Barnes, Cross, Dow, Hammon, Hobrough, Iverson, Jerauld, Learned, Mills, Miner, Mostow, Parker, Samson, Sinclair, Wall, Wherry and Mr. Speaker protem.

Messrs. Hand and Sherman not voting.

It appearing that Mr. Hand had received a majority of all the votes cast, he was declared duly elected Speaker of the House.

On motion of Mr. Hammon,

A committee of three was appointed by the Chair to wait upon the Speaker elect to the Chair.

Messrs. Hammon, Cross and Parker were appointed as such committee.

The committee having discharged their duty, the Speaker took the Chair and said:

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives:-

Allow me on assuming the duties of this Chair, to express to you my sincere thanks for the distinguished honor you

have conferred upon me, in electing me to preside over your deliberations as Speaker of this House.

Distrusting as I do my own ability to properly discharge the important duties which you have imposed upon me, I feel that I shall fail to meet your approbation unless I should receive from you that kindly co operation and assistance which it is in your power to extend.

Hoping that I may receive this, and that all our proceedings may be characterized by harmony and good feeling, having in view the single purpose of adopting such measures as shall tend to advance the material interests and develop the great resources of our growing Territory, I again thank you for the honor you have conferred upon me.

Mr. Sloan received four votes, as follows:

The vote being taken

Mr. Case received 4 votes, as follows:

Mr. Hammon moved that the Rules of the last House be adopted for the government of this House, until otherwise ordered.

Which motion was agreed to.

USE OF HALL GRANTED.

On motion of Mr. Hammon,

The use of Representative Hall was granted to Mr. A. J. Sweetzer, proprietor of the St. Charles hotel, for the purpose of holding a Telegraph Ball on Wednesday evening, Dec. 7, 1870.

On motion of Mr. Shaw,

The use of Representative Hall was granted to Charles F. Rossteuscher, for the purpose of holding a German Ball on Christmas evening, Dec. 24th, 1870.

ADJOURNMENT.

On motion of Mr. Shaw, the House adjourned.

Mr. Hammon submitted the following resolution, which was read, considered and agreed to.

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to draft rules for the government of this House, and that said committee be instructed to confer with a similar committee on the part of the Council to draft joint rules.

Messrs. Hammon, Keegan and Iverson were named as such committee.

Mr. Shaw moved that the House take a recess of one hour. Which motion was agreed to.

The journal of yesterday was then read and approved.

The committee appointed to conduct the Council now retire, and after a brief absence, announced the Honorable Council and conducted the members to seats within the body of the House.

THE JOINT CONVENTION.

The Speaker of the House presiding, called the Joint Convention to order.

On motion of Mr. Hammon, the Secretary of the Council and Assistant Clerk of the House were instructed to act as Clerks of the Joint Convention.

The roll was called, and the following gentlemen answered to their names:

MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE.—Messrs. Allen, Barnes, Cross, Dow, Hammon, Hancock, Hobrough, Iverson, Jerauld, Keegan, LaRoche, Mills, Miner, Mostow, Parker, Shaw, Sherman, Sinclair, Wall, Wherry and Mr. Speaker.

Absent, Messrs Learned and Samson.

A quorum of each house being present, the Chair proclaimed the Joint Convention fully organized, and ready for the business for which it was convened, whereupon

Mr. Turner moved that a committee of three, to consist of one member of the Council and two from the House, be appointed to wait upon His Excellency, the Governor, and inform him that the two houses have assembled in Joint Convention, and await his pleasure, which motion was agreed to.

Messrs. Turner, Miner and Jerauld were named as such committee.

After a brief absence, the committee returned accompanied by His Excellency, the Governor, the Chief Justice and Associate Justices, and the Territorial officers of Dakota, and reported as follows:

MR. CHAIRMAN.—Your committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency, the Governor, and to inform him that the Joint Convention of the Legislative Assembly is in session, and await his pleasure, have discharged that duty, and have the honor to present His Excellency, the Governor.

His Excellency was then invited to the Speaker's stand where he delivered his first bi-ennial message.

His Excellency having retired, on motion of Mr. Hammon, the Joint Convention dissolved, whereupon the Speaker called the House to order.

RESOLUTION.

Mr. Shaw submitted the following resolution, which was read, considered and agreed to:

Resolved, That two thousand copies of the Governor's Message be ordered printed for the use of the House.

On motion of Mr. Hammon,

The Governor's Message was made the special order for Saturday next, at 11 o'clock, A. M.

On motion of Mr. Miner, the House adjourned.

House of Representatives, Friday, Dec. 9, 1870.

House met pursuant to adjournment, and was called to order by

The Speaker in the chair.

Prayer by the Chaplain.

Roll called.

Absent, Messrs. Learned and Sherman.

The Journal of the preceding day was then read and approved.

ELECTION OF ENROLLING CLERK.

The hour having arrived designated as the time for the con-

sideration of the special order, the Speaker announced that the election of an Enrolling Clerk was then in order.

Whereupon, Mr. Cross nominated Mr. Ole B. Larson for Enrolling Clerk, and

No other nomination being made, and a vote being taken, Mr. Larson was declared duly elected Enrolling Clerk of the House.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTION.

Mr. Hammon submitted the following resolution which was read, considered and agreed to:

Resolved, That a committee consisting of one member from each county, be appointed as a select committee on Apportionment, to whom shall be referred all matters pertaining to districting and apportioning the Territory for purposes of representation in the Legislative Assembly.

Mr. Hancock submitted the following resolution which was read, considered and ageed to:

Resolved, That there be printed in French, 250 copies additional of the Governor's Message; Provided, It can be done in this Territory, and at a cost not exceeding the usual price of printing in English.

COMMUNICATION FROM THE COUNCIL.

The following communication was received from the Council:

MR. SPEAKER.—I am instructed to inform your Hon. body that the Council has passed C. B. No. 1, A memorial to Congress asking for a repeal of the law passed July 14, 1870, requiring pre-emption claimants to make proof and payment for their lands before the 14th day of July, 1871; also

Council File No. 2, A memorial to the Congress of the United States, asking that the 9th session of the Legislature of Dakota be extended to sixty days, which are herewith respectfully submitted.

Mr. Shaw gave notice that he will on to-morrow or some subsequent day of the session, ask leave to introduce a bill to encourage the planting of fruit trees.

Mr. Mills gave notice that he will on to-morrow or some subsequent day of the session, ask leave to introduce a bill regulating the rates of toll to be taken by custom flouring mills.

Mr. Hancock gave notice that he will on to-morrow or some subsequent day of the session, ask leave to introduce bills and memorials entitled as follows:

A bill to restore to, and increase the representation of Pembina county.

A bill constituting the county of Pembina a judicial district and for other purposes.

A memorial to the Congress of the United States asking an appropriation to construct a military road from Fort Abercrombie to Fort Pembina in the Territory of Dakota; also

A memorial to the President to remove the Pembina or Chippewa Indians to their agency in White Earth.

Mr. Allen gave notice that he will on to-morrow or some subsequent day of the session, ask leave to introduce a bill legalizing the official acts of certain county officers of Minnehaha county.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

Mr. Iverson introduced H. F. No. 1, entitled A bill to prevent the importation of Texas or Cherokee cattle into the Territory of Dakota and for other purposes; read a first time and ordered to a second reading.

THIRD READING OF COUNCIL BILLS.

C. B. No. 1, entitled A memorial to Congress asking for a repeal of the law passed July 14, 1870, requiring pre-emption claimants to make proof and payment for their lands before the 14th day of July, 1871.

Was then taken up and read a first time, and.

On motion of Mr. Shaw,

The rules were suspended, and under the operation thereof the bill was

Read second time.

Mr. Hammon moved the rules be suspended, and under the operation thereof, the bill be read a third time.

Pending which, Mr. Shaw submitted the following amendment which was agreed to:

Insert after the word repeal, in line 23rd of printed bill, the following words: "Or extend the time for which said payment shall be made, for two years from the 14th day of July, 1871."

The question then recurring upon the motion of Mr. Hammon, it was agreed to and the bill read a third time.

The question then being on its passage, and it being put, "shall the bill pass?"

It was decided in the affirmative,

On motion of Mr. Hancock,

The rules were suspended and under the operation thereof the memorial was read a third time.

The question then being upon its passage, and it being put, "shall the bill pass?"

It was decided in the affirmative.

Those voting in the affirmative, were

Messrs. Allen, Barnes, Cross, Dow, Hammon, Hancock, Hobrough, Iverson, Jerauld, LaRoche, Mills, Miner, Mostow, Parker, Shaw, Sherman, Sinclair, Wherry and Mr. Speaker—20.

None voted in the negative, so the bill passed.

The question then being on agreeing to its title, and the question being put, the title was agreed to.

Ordered that the Chief Clerk acquaint the Council therewith and request its concurrence therein.

H. B. No. 5, A bill to amend an act entitled an act to organize the county of Pembina and for other purposes, was then taken up and read a second time, whereupon

Mr. Hancock moved that the rules be suspended, which motion was agreed to.

Mr. Hancock then submitted the following amendment to the bill, and moved its adoption:

That section 5 of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

The county of Pembina shall hereafter be entitled to two Representatives in the House, and one member of Council who shall be elected at the election to be held on the second Tuesday of October, A. D. 1871.

Mr. Hammon moved to indefinitely postpone the amendment, pending which

Mr. Miner moved the previous question which was seconded. The question then being on the adoption of the amendment.

COMMUNICATION FROM THE GOVERNOR.

The following communication from the Governor was announced by William Pound, Private Secretary:

EXECUTIVE OFFICE, Yankton, D. T., Dec. 9, 1870.

HON. GEO. H. HAND,

Speaker of the House of Representatives:

SIR:—I have the honor to communicate for the information of your Honorable body, and for such action as may be deemed proper, a copy of a letter addressed to His Excellency, the Governor of Iowa, on the 30th ultimo and of his reply thereto in regard to the practicability of making a contract for the confinement of criminals from this Territory in the Penitentiary of that State. Owing to the fact that the laws

of the Territory contain no provision for cases of this kind and as I am informed that there is at this time a criminal confined in the Jail in Yankton county, who is under conviction, but upon whom sentence has not yet been passed, I deem it important that some action should be taken by the Legislature looking to this end, either in the manner indicated in the correspondence, or in such other way as may be deemed best.

SIR:—I have the honor to request that you will inform me whether a contract may be entered into by which such criminals as may be convicted of Penitentiary offences in this Territory, may be confined in the State Prison of your State, until such time as suitable provision can be made for their confinement at home, and if so, upon what terms. At present, the Territory has no suitable Prison, and no provision has yet been made for the erection of one. The number of criminals for whom it would be necessary to provide, would be quite small, there being at present but one person under conviction.

In reply thereto I take pleasure in stating that such a contract may be made at any time the authorities of the Territory wish to do so, the terms of the contract being the same as in all similar ones heretofore made with the U. S., and other States and Territories, viz: The payment to the State of Iowa, of the sum of fifty cents per day for each convict from the Territory, confined under the contract.

If the terms should prove satisfactory, be pleased to inform me in order that I may advise the Warden of the Penitentiary of the same.

Roll called.

Absent, Messrs. Keegan, LaRoche and Learned.

By unanimous consent the order for reading of the journal of the 12th inst. was placed at the foot of the calendar.

REPORT OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. Hammon from committee on Judicary submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker—The committee on Judiciary to which was referred that portion of the Executive message relating to the custody of State prison convicts, has had the same under consideration, and have instructed me to report the accompanying bill, and reccommend its passage.

A. P. HAMMON.

On motion of Mr. Shaw, the report was adopted.

Mr. Hammon, from select committee on Rules for the Government of the House, submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker.—Your select committee on Rules has agreed upon the following House Rules, and has instructed me to report the same, and recommend that they be adopted:

RULES OF THE HOUSE.

- 1. The Speaker shall take the chair at the time to which the house stands adjourned, and the house shall then be called to order, and the roll of the members called, and the names of the absentees shall be entered upon the journal of the house.
 - 2. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the

preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistake therein may be corrected by the house.

- 3. Any four members shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members.
- 4. The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum, and shall decide questions of order subject to an appeal to the house.
- 5. The Speaker shall vote on all questions taken by year and nays, (except on appeals of his own decisions) and in all elections or divisions called for by any member.
- 6. When the house adjourns, the members shall keep their seats until the Speaker announces the adjournment.
- 7. Every member previous to his speaking shall rise from his seat and respectfully address the Speaker, and remain standing in his place before proceeding to speak until he is recognized by the chair.
- 8. When two or more members rise at once, the Speaker shall designate the member who is first to speak; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the chair shall speak first.
- 9. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the house, nor more than once until every member choosing to speak on the question pending shall have spoken.
- 10. No motion shall be debated or put, unless the same be seconded; it shall be stated by the Speaker before debate, and any such motion shall be reduced to writing, if the Speaker or any member desire it.
- 11. After a motion shall be stated by the Speaker, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the House, but may be withdrawn at any time before amendment or decision; but all motions, resolutions or amendments shall be entered on the journal, whether they are rejected or adopted.
- 12. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, to commit or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged; and a call of the House may be had upon the demand of two members.

- 13. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except when a member is addressing the Chair, or a vote is being taken; that, and the motion to lay upon the table, shall be decided without debate.
- 14. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring the House to a direct vote upon the amendments reported by a committee, if any, upon pending amendments and then upon the main question. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to the seconding of the same, a call of the House shall be in order; but after a majority shall have seconded such motion, no call shall be in order prior to decision of the main question.
- 15. When the previous question is decided in the negative, it shall leave the main question under debate for the residue of the sitting, unless sooner disposed of by taking the question, or in some other manner.
- 16. All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question during the pending of such motion, or after the House shall have determined that the main question shall be now put, shall be decided, whether on appeal, or otherwise, without debate.
- 17. Petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the House, shall be presented by the Speaker, or by a member in his place.
- 18. Every member who shall be present before the vote is declared from the chair, and no other, shall vote for or against the same, unless the house shall excuse him, or unless he is immediately interested in the question, in which case he shall not vote.
- 19. When the Speaker is putting the question, no member shall walk out or across the House; nor when a member is speaking shall any person entertain any private discourse, or pass between him and the chair.
- 20. If the question in debate contains several points, any member may have the same divided.
- 21. A member called to order shall immediately sit down, unless permitted to explain, and the House, if appealed to,

shall decide the case. If there be no appeal, the decision of the chair shall be submitted to. On an appeal, no member shall speak more than once without leave of the House, except when a member is called to order for offensive language, in which case there shall be no debate.

- 22. Every bill shall be introduced by a motion for leave, or by an order of the House on a report of a committee; and one day's notice at least shall be given of a motion for leave to bring in a bill, unless two-thirds of the members present shall vote in favor of its being brought in without such previous notice. Every notice of a motion for leave to bring in a bill, shall be in writing, and shall contain the title of the bill.
- 23. Every bill, before being introduced, shall have endorsed thereon the title of the same; and every bill or resolution shall have thereon the name of the member introducing it; and when ordered by a committee, the name of such committee shall be endorsed thereon.
- 24. All bills, memorials or joint resolutions, shall be read the first time for information, and if opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "shall this bill be rejected?" If no opposition be made, or if the motion to reject be lost, the bill shall go to its second reading without a question.
- 25. All bills, memorials, or joint resolutions, on their secon reading, shall be read at length, and the question taken upon their commitment, amendment or engrossment for a third reading.
- 26. All bills, memorials, or joint resolutions, on their third reading, shall be read by their title, and no amendment shall be in order except by unanimous consent of the House.
- 27. Every bill shall be read on three different days, unless in case of urgency two-thirds of the House shall deem it expedient to dispense with this rule, and no bill shall be passed unless it shall have been read once at length.
- 28. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment; no bill or resolution shall at any time be amended by annexing thereto, or incorporating therewith, any other bill or resolution pending before the House.
- 29. In forming committee of the whole House, the Speaker shall appoint a chairman to preside.

- 30. Bills committed to the committee of the whole House, shall, in committee of the Whole thereon, be first read through, unless the committee shall otherwise order, and then read and debated by sections, leaving the title to be last considered; all amendments shall be noted in writing, and reported to the House by the chairman.
- 31. All questions whether in committee, or in the House, shall be put in the order they are moved, except in cases of privileged questions, and in filling up blanks the largest sum and the longest time shall first be put.
- 32. A similar mode of proceeding shall be observed with bills which have originated in and passed the Council, as with bills originating in the House except that they shall not be printed.
- 33. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order unless on the same or the day following that on which the decision proposed to be reconsidered took place, nor unless one of the majority shall move a reconsideration.
- 34. When notice of the intention to move the reconsideration of any bill or joint resolution shall be given by a member, the clerk of the House shall retain the said bill or joint resolution until after the time during which the said motion can be made, unless the same can previously be disposed of.
- 35. Any member who votes on that side of a question which prevailed, may be at liberty to move a reconsideration, and a motion for a reconsideration shall be decided by a majority of votes.
- 36. The rules of the House shall be observed in committee of the whole House, so far as may be applicable, except that the yeas and nays shall not be called, the previous question enforced, nor the time of speaking limited.
- 37. A motion that the committee rise, shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.
- 38. Standing committees shall be appointed on the following subjects:
 - 1. Ways and Means, consisting of five members.
 - 2. Judiciary, five members.
 - 3. Railroads, seven members.
 - 4. Public Lands, three members.

- 5. Federal Relations, three members.
- 6. Education, three members.
- 7. Towns and Counties, three members.
- 8. Military Affairs, three members.
- 9. Incorporations, three members.
- 10. Agriculture, three members.
- 11. Manufactures, three members.
- 12. Elections, five members.
- 13. Indian Affairs, three members.
- 14. Benevolent Institutions, three members.
- 15. Public Buildings, three members.
- 16. Public Printing, three members.
- 17. Highways, Ferries and Bridges, three members.
- 18. Mines and Minerals, three members.
- 19. Engrossment, three members.
- 20. Enrollment, three members.
- 39. The committee on Engrossment shall examine all bills after they are engrossed, and report the same to the House, correctly engrossed, before their third reading; said committee may report at any time.
- 40. The committee on Enrollment shall examine all House bills and joint resolutions, which have passed the two houses, and when reported correctly enrolled, they shall be presented to the presiding officers of the House and Council for their signatures, and when so signed, to the Governor for his approval; said committee may report at any time.
- 41. Select committees to whom references shall be made, shall, in all cases, report a state of facts and their opinion thereon to the House.
- 42. In all cases where a bill, order, or resolution, or motion shall be entered upon the Journals of the House, the name of the member moving the same shall be entered on the journals.
- 43. No person shall be admitted within the bar of the House but the Executive, members of the Council, Territorial Treasurer and Auditor, Judges of the Supreme and District Courts, members of Congress, those who have been members of Congress, and of the Legislative Council.
- 44. The Speaker shall cause the Clerk of the House to make a list of all bills, resolutions, reports of committees, and other

proceedings of the House, which are committed to a committee of the whole House, and which are not made the order of the day for any particular day, and to number the same, which list shall be called "the general order of the day;" and they shall be taken up in the order in which they are numbered, unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the House, and the Clerk shall also keep a book showing the situation and progress of bills.

- 45. After calling the House to order, the order of business for the day shall be as follows:
 - 1. Prayer by the Chaplain.
 - 2. Calling the roll.
 - 3. Reading the journal.
 - 4. Presentation of petitions and communications.
 - 5. Reports of standing committees.
 - 6. Reports of select committees.
 - 7. Motions and resolutions.
 - 8. Notices of bills.
 - 9. Introduction of bills, joint resolutions, and memorials.
 - 10. Consideration of messages from the council.
 - 11. First reading of council bills, joint resolutions and memorials.
 - 12. Second reading of the same.
 - 13. Third reading of the same.
 - 14. Second reading of the house bills, joint resolutions and memorials.
 - 15. Third reading of the same.
 - 16. Consideration of the general orders.
 - 17. Unfinished business.
- 43. Whenever the report of any committee of conference contains several modifications or amendments, any member may have the same divided, and the question of concurrence taken separately upon each modification or amendment.
- 47. When the house have arrived at the general orders of the day, they shall go into committee of the whole upon such orders, or a particular order designated by a vote of the house and no other business shall be in order until the whole are considered or passed, or the committee rise; and, unless a particular bill is ordered up, the committee of the Whole shall

consider, act upon or pass the general order according to the order of their reference.

- 48. The speaker may leave the chair and appoint a member to preside, but not for a longer time than one day, except by leave of the house.
- 49. The rules of parliamentary practice embraced in Cushing's Manual shall govern the house in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the house, and the joint rules and orders of the council and house of representatives.
- 50. No rules of the house shall be suspended, altered or amended, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.
- 51. The hour of the daily meeting of the house shall be half past ten o'clock in the morning, until the house direct otherwise.
- 52. The ayes and noes shall not be ordered unless demanded by two members, except upon the final passage of bills, joint resolutions and memorials in which case the ayes and noes shall be had without any demand.
- 53. All house bills of a general nature shall on their first reading be printed without a special order of the house, except bills that are rejected.

On motion of Mr. Mills, The report was adopted.

The House committe on Joint Rules submitted the following report, which was adopted:

JOINT RULES.

1. In every case of disagreement between the two houses, if either house request a conference, and appoint a committee for that purpose, the other house shall appoint a committee to confer therewith upon the subject of their disagreement. They shall meet at a convenient time to be agreed upon by their chairmen, and having conferred freely, each shall report to their respective house the result of their conference.

- 2. When a message shall be sent from either house to the other, it shall be announced at the door of the house to which it is sent, by the doorkeeper thereof, and shall be respectfully communicated to the chair by the person by whom it was sent.
- 3. All messages between the two houses shall be communicated by the secretary or chief clerk, or their respective assistants.
- 4. When a bill shall have passed both houses, it shall be dully enrolled by the enrolling clerk of the house in which it originated, and the fact of its origin shall be certified by the endorsement of the secretary or clerk thereof.
- 5. When bills are enrolled they shall be examined by a joint committee of three from the council and three from the house of representatives who shall be a standing committee for that purpose, and who shall carefully compare the enrollment with the engrossed bills, as passed in the houses, correct any errors therein, and make report thereof forthwith to their respective houses.
- 6. After said report, each bill shall be signed, first by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and then by the President of the Council, in the presence of their respective house, and attested by the Secretary and Chief Clerk.
- 7. After the bill shall have been thus signed in each house, it shall be presented by said committee to the Governor for his approval, and they shall torthwith report the day and hour of presentation, which shall be entered upon the journal of the house in which the bill originated.
- 8. All joint resolutions and memorials to Congress, to the President of the United States, to the heads of departments, or to any other person or persons, after they shall have passed both houses, shall be carefully enrolled, signed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Council, attested by the Secretary and Chief Clerk, and before being transmitted to the Secretary of the Territory for safe keeping, shall be carefully copied by the Enrolling and Engrossing Clerk, and such copies after being attested by the presiding officers of each house, and the Secretary of the Council, and the Chief Clerk of the House, shall be forwarded by the presiding officer of the house in which they origin-

ated, to the President of the United States, or the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, or to the person or persons to whom they are intended to be sent.

- 9. When any bill, joint resolution, or memorial which shall have passed one house, is rejected in the other, notice of said rejection shall be given to the house which passed the same.
- 10. When a bill, resolution, or memorial which shall have passed one house, is rejected in the other, it shall not be again introduced during the session without five days notice, and leave of two-thirds of members voting thereon.
- 11. Each house shall transmit to the other, with any bill, resolution, or memorial, all papers upon which the same shall be founded.
- 12. When each house shall have adhered to their disagreement, a bill or resolution is lost.
- 13. When any bill or resolution, which may have passed one house, is ordered printed by the other, a greater number of copies shall not be printed than is necessary for the use of the house making the order. When any other bill or resolution shall be ordered printed by either house, a sufficient number of copies shall be printed for the use of both houses.
- 14. It shall be the duty of the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives, and Secretary of the Council, when any document, except bills and resolutions, is ordered to be printed in their respective houses, forthwith to communicate such order to the other house.
- 15. On all questions in joint convention of the two houses, the names of the members shall all be arranged in alphabetical order, and they shall be called upon to vote in the order in which they stand arranged.

SECRETARY'S OFFICE, D. T., Yankton, Jan. 11th, 1871.

To the Legislative Assembly of Dakota:

GENTLEMEN.—I have the honor to call your attention to the enclosed petition of Bohemian citizens, representing 308 persons, presented to me personally by about 30 of their number.

They represent themselves as in extremely needy circumstances, and ask not money but subsistence to help them through the inclement season, till they can put new crops into the ground aud maintain themselves. They came here late in the season and most of them without means. It would in my opinion be unfortunate for the prosperity of the Territory, to publish in the newspapers that want existed here, and I re-

spectfully submit their statement for such action as you may see fit to take.
