DAKOTA'S LEGISLATURE.

The Press and Dakotaian's Report of the Proceedings of the Council and House of Representatives.

Fourteenth Session-16th Day.

Council.

Wednesday, January 26.—The council met at 10 a. m., and was called to order by President Walsh.

Prayer by the chaplain.

Roll call showed members all present, except Mr. Day.
Minutes read and approved.

TERRITORIAL INSANE.

The president laid before the council the following communication from the trustees of the territorial insane asylum:

To the Council and House of Representatives of Dakota Territory—Gentlemen:—The trustees of the Dakota hespital for the insane would draw your attention to the immediate need of increased facilities to care for the insane of our territory.

men.—Ane trustees of the Dakota hospital for the insane would draw your attention to the immediate need of increased facilities to care for the insane of our territory.

Your own recent investigation of the hospital showed how inadequate are the accommodations forthose already admitted. Others that ought to be received at once are kept away because we have no room for them, thus greatly diminishing the chances for their recovery.

We, therefore, ask that you consider the suggestions of Governor Ordway in his message to your body, and that you authorize the incoming board of trustees to erect a brick building (that shall subsequently be the wing of a larger structure), capable of properly carring for at least seventy-five patients. Before such a building could be erected it would be necessary to have a careful plan made of the grounds as they will be when all needed buildings are erected. Larger outlay for drainage and ventilation will also be called for than the building now contemplated would require, if it were to be the only one.

We however, estimate that the grounds can be laid out, the building properly erected, furnished and prepared for use for the sum of forty thousand dollars. We therefore recommend the passage of an act directing the trustees of the Dakota hospital for the insane to erect such a building, at the same time authorizing the issue of the bonds of the territory in the sum of forty thousand dollars, in denominations of not less than five hundred dollars each, to bear interest at the rate of six per ceut. per annum payable semi-annually in New York funds. These bonds should run for twenty years payable at the same time authorizing the issue of the bonds should be placed in the territorial treasury subject to the order of the board of trustees for the Dakota hospital for the insane, to be drawn by them as they may need at any time after five years, and should be sold at not less than pay value. The proceeds of the bonds should undershing of the building or laying out the grounds.

Mr. Gamble, from the committee or judiciary, reported back and recommended the passage of council bill No. 27, amending section 94 of chapter 21, of the political code, which bill was read a third time and passed.

RECONSIDERED.

On motion of Mr. Gamble, the vote by which house memorial praying for a division of the territory the admission of South Dakota was lost, was reconsidered.

The members generally expressed themselves in favor of a memorial for a division of the territory and the admission of the southern portion as a state, but were opposed to the language and style of the one which had been under consideration, and in order to have one prepared which would meet approval the matter was referred to the committee on judiciary, with instructions to report not later than Friday next. Mr. Shaw was, on motion, added to the judiciary committee for the purpose of aiding in the preparation of a memorial.

The council then adjourned until 10 a. m. to-morrow.

COUNCIL BILLS.

Council bills thirteen and twenty-four had their first reading. Council bill two, for the location and

construction of a penitentiary at Sioux Falls, came up for its third reading, and passage, but upon motion of Mr. French action was suspended pending report of committee on engrossment.

Council bill four, to amend the revenue act, and council bill twelve, to'amend section seven of the justice's code, were passed by unanimous vote.

Council bill six, providing extra co pensation for the judge of the first judi-cial district, passed by a vote of twenty ts four Messrs Ellefson, Hale, Nomland and Thompson voting in the negative.

HOUSE BILLS.

House file thirty-four had its second reading and was referred to the committee on territorial affairs. It provides for the protection of stock.

House file thirty-six, limiting county commissioners to twenty-four days official work in each year, came up for a second reading.

Mr. McBratney moved that further consideration of the bill be indefinitely postponed.

On motion of Mr. Baynes, the motion to postpone was laid on the table.

On motion of Mr. Ellefson, the bill was referred to the committee on counties and townships.

House file thirty-eight, authorizing

Hutchinson county to fund its indebted-

ness, etc., was referred to the com mittee on insurance, banks and banking. House file cleven, legalizing the acts of the trustees of Dell Rapids, and for other purposes, was passed by unanimous vote.

House file twenty-one, regulating the burning of prairies in the Black Hills counties, was passed by unanimous vote. House file twenty-six, to provide for labor on the highways, was bassed, Mr. Thorne voting in the negative and all the rest in the affirmative.

House file twenty-seven, providing for the herding and driving of stock, was passed by unanimous vote.

House file thirty-two, to amend section 101 of the justices code, was passed by a vote of twenty-two to two, Messrs. French and Landman voting in the negative.

House file twelve, reported adversely this morning from the judiciary committee was put upon its passage and lost, Mr. Nomland voting for it and all the rest against it.
