Mr. Rice led the op-position to the bill and his position was based upon the fact that the bill fixed Description to the work and designated the price for the work. Mr. Jerauld's bill to provide bounties for the killing of certain animals, speci-fies that for killing a wolf \$5 shall be re ceived; for a fox, \$3; for a pocket goph 10 cents; for a ground or gray squirrel, two cents

Mr. Jerauld's council bill No. 90 provides for the appointment by the governor of one person in each judicial dis-trict to be known as an "inspector of liquors," and any person who knowingly manufactures, sells or keeps, or offers for sale within this territory any intoxicating, spiritous or malt liquors, which have been adulterated or mixed with any deleterious or poisonous substance all, upon conviction, be imprisoned in the penitentiary not less than two years, of fined not less than \$200, or both. Section 2, provides that persons so guilty, though ignorant of the offense o ted, shall be subject to a fine of \$200 for each offense, to be collected by civil action. Mr. Dewey, to-day introduced in the
