FIRST DAY

House of Representatives, Bismarck, North Dakota, January 6, 1925.

ROBERT BYRNE, Secretary of State. The Chief Clerk appointed a committee of three consisting of Messrs. Halcrow, Divet and Hardy to escort the Chief Justice to the Chair.

The oath of office was administered to the members by the Hon. A. M. Christianson, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, who subscribed the same in his presence.

The House then proceeded to organization.

Mr. Vogel, of McLean, nominated Mr. B. C. Larkin of Brantford, for speaker.

SECOND DAY

House of Representatives. Bismarck, North Dakota. January 7, 1925.

The House assembled at two o'clock pursuant to adjournment, the Speaker presiding.

Prayer by the chaplain, Rev. H. C. Postlethwaite.

Roll call, all members present. Mr. Cart moved that the speaker appoint a committee to inform the Senate that the House was ready for the joint session, which motion prevailed. The Speaker appointed session, which motion prevailed. Messrs. Cart, Bollinger and Ferris.

Mr. Hempel moved that a committee be appointed to escort ex-Speakers Twitchell and Stair to the rostrum as a courtesy during this session. Motion prevailed, and the speaker appointed Messrs. Hempel and Halcrow.

JOINT SESSION

Call to order by the Lieutenant Governor. Roll call of senators, all senators present.

Roll call of representatives, all representatives present. Senator Carey moved the appointment of a committee of three to wait upon the Supreme Court and to ask it to attend the session, and escort the Court to the rostrum, which motion prevailed, and the Lieutenant Governor appointed Sen-

ators Carey, Olson of Burleigh, and Representative Craig. Representative Burkhart moved the appointment of a committee of three to invite the state officers to attend the joint session, and to escort them to the rosrtum, which motion prevailed, and the Lieutenant Governor appointed Senator Ploy-

har, and Representatives Burkhart and Sanford.

Senator Lynch moved the appointment of a committee of three to invite the outgoing and incoming governors to attend the joint session and to escort them to the rostrum, which motion prevailed, and the Lieutenant Governor appointed Senators Lynch and Whitman, and Representative Sanderson.

The various committees then reported, escorting the Supreme Court, the State Officers, and the outgoing and in-

coming governors to the rostrum.

Prayer by the chaplain, Rev. A. T. Cory of Edgeley.

The Lieutenant Governor introduced the retiring Governor, Hon. R. A. Nestos, with a few appropriate remarks.

The retiring Governor, Hon. R. A. Nestos, then delivered his message to the joint assembly.

MESSAGE

Ladies and Gentlemen of the Nineteenth Legislative Assembly:

Section 75 of the Constitution provides that the Governor shall, at the commencement of each session, communicate to the Legislative Assembly, by message, information as to the condition of the state, and shall recommend such measures as

he may deem expedient.

It has become the custom, upon a change of administration, not only for the Governor who is to be inaugurated, but also for the Governor about to relinquish the reins of government, to deliver a message to the Legislature. It seems to me, however, that each message has a special function. The incoming Governor will of necessity deal with the general legislative program he desires enacted in furtherance of his economic and political views, and for the maintenance of the institutions and government of the state; the outgoing Governor should make his message more in the nature of a report of the administrative and legislative activities of his official term and an analysis of the present economic and financial condition of the state. To this he might, with propriety, add recommendations for such legislation as may be in harmony with prior messages, together with such suggestions as his administrative experience may deem advisable for the most efficient conduct of the business of the state.

I am sure we may congratulate ourselves upon the general improvement in the financial condition of our state and people. Good crops and excellent prices this fall, added to the progress already made, have greatly increased the payment of taxes and debts, revived business and improved the financial condition of our banks and other business institutions. Much of this will not be reflected in our statistics for another couple of months, but even now the funds in the office of the State Treasurer are \$4,800,511.20 as compared with \$2,397,712.69 on December 31, 1921, the footings of the Bank of North Dakota \$18,682,565.98 as compared with \$9,506,237.20 and the deposits \$16,393,010.39 as compared with \$6,824,078.98

at the close of 1921.

Mill and Elevator at Grand Forks

When we took office on November 23, 1921, we endeavored to secure accurate estimates of the probable cost of completing the mill and elevator at Grand Forks, and equipping it for efficient service. The contracts for erecting the buildings and installing the machinery and most of the contracts for manufacturing the machinery had been let by the former administration. Only minor contracts remained to be made by the new administration. We concluded that about three million dollars would be required to complete the project, and the mortgage to be executed as a basis for the bonds to be issued was drawn to secure that amount. When the construction work was com-

pleted, however, in accordance with the plans, specifications, and contracts for buildings and machinery, we discovered that the total cost exceeded the anticipated three millions, and \$48,590 has been borrowed from the Bank of North Dakota to complete payment. While a supplemental mortgage might have been filed and additional bonds issued, we thought it wiser not to do so but rather to absorb that portion of the cost now. The buildings and machinery are first class and as a whole constitute as efficient a milling and elevator plant as can be found anywhere. In proportion to capacity, however, the inglorious fact remains that it is one of the costliest in existence. A comparison with the cost of other plants of the same capacity indicates that we have invested more than double the average amount.

One of the problems confronting us was to provide operating capital. No statute authorized the sale of bonds for this purpose. The Bank of North Dakota aided to the utmost, but under the financial conditions then existing was rather definitely limited.

On my recommendation the Legislature of 1923 enacted a law permitting the sale of bonds for the purpose of purchasing wheat for the mill. The Legislature placed the maximum Under the constitutional amendment at two million dollars. of 1919 and the law enacted in pursuance thereof, an inventory and appraisement of wheat and wheat products must be made showing a proper valuation as security before any bonds can be issued. Under such appraisals, we have been able to issue \$1,500,000 of bonds up to the present time. The first million of these bonds, maturing in from five to ten years, were sold in the East and the Industrial Commission believe that with the million of permanent capital thus provided any additional bonds issued should be sold to the Bank of North Dakota rather than in the bond markets, so that the bank might have the interest on the funds invested when money is plentiful and still be able to use the bonds as collateral for obtaining additional funds in midsummer when tax receipts are slight or in midwinter when wheat purchasing for the mill is If, after experimenting with the mill a couple at the peak. of years more the people of the state should conclude to end the experiment of state ownership and operation of mills, we would then be able to retire these bonds and thus not be constrained to pay interest for the full fifteen-year period till these bonds mature.

An investigation as to the working capital available for other mills of the same size in the spring wheat belt, outside of the twin cities, indicates that our mill is amply provided with working capital and that it would be folly to sell any long time bonds in a market where they could not be recalled for retirement whenever desired. According to figures prepared by the Federal Trade Commission for four mills in the spring wheat region, outside of the large cities, of a total capacity of 14,200 barrels shows an average working capital of \$594,000 for mills of three thousand barrel capacity. While it is conceded that a state-owned mill needs more capital, yet it must be apparent that the capital provided is now ample.

During the past while the manager has been developing and perfecting his organization in the mill, elevator and office,

training his sales force, and developing a market for the flour and other mill products, it was inevitable that losses should occur. In view of these facts and the further fact that milling conditions were such that more than 50 per cent of the capacity of the mills in Minneapolis stood idle during the past year, I do not believe that the operating loss suffered is materially larger than might reasonably be expected. These losses since the beginning of operations and until June 30, 1924, according to the state audit, have been as follows:

The accuracy of the last three items, however, is subject to audit. This indicates a total interest loss of more than \$533,484.24, and a total operating loss of about \$151,306.74.

I had expected that with the experience of 1923 and with a perfected and efficiently functioning organization inside and outside of the mill, we would have been able to make slightly more than operating expenses in 1924, but present indications are that the final figures for the year will indicate a small operating loss, although I am glad to note the operating gain

of \$58,027.07 for the past five months.

With the preliminary work done, the organization may now be simplified by the consolidation of some positions and thus make possible a reduction in expenses. It ought not to be difficult, therefore, in the coming years to make at least operating expenses. I have contended and fully believe that by exercising care and using good business judgment the mill will pay operating expenses and in all probability a small additional amount to apply on interest. For the purpose of insuring such results for 1925, the Bank of North Dakota has gone the very limit this fall in providing money with which to purchase milling wheat so as to avoid the larger premiums that unquestionably will be exacted in the spring and summer. This amount has varied greatly, reaching at one time \$749,-176.52.

I am glad to know that my successor believes that he can make the mill pay. He will have my very best wishes in his effort to do so. To make it pay will mean that in addition to earning operating expenses, which should not be difficult now when the milling, office, and sales force has been fully organized and a market for our flour well developed, he will also have to make enough more to pay about a third of a million per year in interest, taxes and depreciation. No business man—my successor is a business man—would begin to claim profits until these charges have all been met. While

I have not believed it was possible to make the mill a paying institution in this, the only proper sense of the term, I am anxiously awaiting, as I am sure every other citizen is, the results of the administration of this institution by my successor in the hope that he may be able to do so. He pledged himself, without reservation, to put the mill on a paying basis; that means to meet from its earnings all the charges I have enumerated and to make it a real asset to the people of this state. He has laid upon himself a task from which more timid souls might well shrink. We may be assured that he will spare no effort to show a profit. If he successfully performs this herculean labor, he will be entitled to all glory. Every good citizen will wish him God-speed. May he make it pay greatly.

While the excessive losses on the small plant at Drake during the period of its management by the former administration were greatly reduced during our management in 1922 and 1923 by the exercise of rigid economy, we nevertheless failed even then to make operating expenses. We therefore decided to close the mill as had been recommended in the report of the Equitable Audit Company in 1921, and to dispose of the flour and other products that had accumulated therein. The board of managers have made an effort to sell the mill as provided by a law enacted in 1923 but have not

received any bid sufficiently high to justify a sale.

On my recommendation, a law was enacted creating a board of managers. I am confident that the best method of operating the mill and elevator is through a board of managers acting in the same capacity as a board of directors of a private corporation. With proper co-operation from the general manager and other officers, this plan offers the best promise of success. By this method you can secure men who possess or have the time to gain a knowledge of the milling business and who can give the required time and energy to the management of the business, neither of which is likely to be true of the members of an Industrial Commission of elected officials who have a multitude of other important duties to perform three hundred miles distant from the plant.

I earnestly recommend that you make no change in this The board of managers named by us, in a desire to give the new Industrial Commission, of which the Governor will be the chairman, the chance to fully determine the management of the institution, have tendered their resignations so that the Industrial Commission of 1925 may have the opportunity to appoint such board as it may desire. been informed by the Attorney General Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor that they propose to follow very largely the counsel of the incoming Governor in the management of the mill and to concur in any request he may make or program he may propose that is fair and reasonable and that does not jeopardize the welfare of the state, to the end that he may have every opportunity to redeem his campaign promises.

Home Building Association

The actual work of building homes under the law of 1919 both began and ended with the old administration. The entire business of the association was in utter chaos

In only one case did we find when we took office. the written agreement which the law specifies should have been in existence covering each of the fifty-three houses erected by the Home Building Association. We felt that as soon as possible we must secure contracts for these houses to comply with the law, but upon approaching the various owners we discovered such a mass of misunderstanding and so many conflicts that it was apparent that we would have to have disputed questions settled in court. This was done and a basis for settlement secured. As none of the members of the Industrial Commission were architects or builders, we concluded that we would have an appraisal of all of these homes made by men who were experts on values, and secure a fair appraisement as a basis for our negotiations. did, with the result that at the present time we have completed settlements for nearly all of the houses. In the case of forty houses we have secured amortization mortgages running for ten or fifteen years in the amount of \$146,926.94. We are the owners of four houses appraised at \$21,800.00. There are now in litigation, or in process of settlement, six houses, appraised at \$37,100.00. The matter will be closed in a few days.

Bank of North Dakota

When we took charge of the Bank of North Dakota we discovered that there had been deposited by the former administration in various banks of the state amounts ranging from a few dollars up to about \$442,000, and aggregating \$3,996,807. Apparently most of the banks so favored were among the weakest and most inefficiently managed banks in the state. The moneys so loaned and redeposited belonged to the taxpayers. They were intended to be used to run the state and local government, state institutions, and as a revolving fund for mill and elevator construction and the farm loan business. We found that a large number of these banks had closed already with \$1,-590,986.20 of these tax moneys tied up in them. Most of the others were in shaky condition and upon investigation we became satisfied that if an immediate payment were demanded not only would we secure but little, but that they would be constrained to close their doors, while if given time most of them would have a fair chance of working out of their difficulties. So we concluded that the wiser policy was to nurse them along and give them a chance to repay these funds and to pay them gradually, as crops and conditions per-During our administration, under the management of C. R. Green, we have collected \$1,580,903.52 of this amount, leaving only \$213,016.74 in the open banks, but with \$2,125,-940.96 still in the banks that were closed before November 23, 1921, or that were too far gone to be able to recover and were therefore constrained to close their doors since, of which amount \$1,406,998.86 is in the form of Receivers proofs of

During the recall campaign and again in the campaigns of 1922, we promised the people that we would not permit any more tax moneys to become frozen in the banks; that our policy would be to keep these funds where they would at all times be readily available for the purposes intended; to-wit,

to keep the departments of state and state institutions open and serving the people, and also as a revolving fund for the mill and elevator at Grand Forks, and for the making of farm loans, then so badly needed. This promise we have kept faithfully, and restrained all selfish endeavors that sought to deflect us from this obviously wise, sound and honorable course

The experience of the past three years convinces me that the present bank policy and management should be continued as serving the highest interest of the state officially and in a sound and business-like manner.

Farm Loans

·Upon investigation of the farm loan business of the razier administration we found that but 755 loans aggregating \$2,760,331.83 had been made, that many of the loans had been made in excessive amounts, one as high as \$25,000, had been made to many who were not actual farmers, and in about one hundred cases apparently for more than the land was worth. We also found that the great majority had paid no part of interest and principal and that the owners in many cases had abandoned the land and some had even We discovered that the reason for this apleft the state. palling condition was the fact that appraisals had been carelessly made, that political favoritism had been shown, and that loans had been concentrated in a few counties-Bottineau, while no loans whatsoever had been made in six counties, and Burleigh and Renville alone having received \$748,015.71, an average of less than \$5,000 each loaned in twenty counties containing more than half the population of the statethus failing to do justice or to secure a proper distribution of risks, which is always desirable in the conduct of such a business. We determined to bring about a general distribution of risks, establish approximate justice between counties, loan to actual farmers only, make the loans reasonable in amount, eliminate as far as humanly possible political or factional considerations in making the loans, and to build a sound, conservative and business-like Loan Department for the state.

On my recommendation, the legislature in 1923 made provision for the establishment of a collection branch of the Farm Loan Department. It was our desire to give every man who was living on his land, acting in good faith, and trying to work his way out a chance to do so, but where a man had abandoned the land or showed no interest whatever in paying his obligations or in farming the land, we felt that in justice to the taxpayers of the state who ultimately will have to stand any losses suffered, we should start foreclosure proceedings without delay and thus reduce and keep losses at the minimum amount.

Despite an aggressive but fair collection policy since the spring of 1923, we find that on December fifth there was still \$258,402 of delinquent interest outstanding on the old loans. Foreclosure sales have been had on 191 of these and sheriff's deed secured in 64 cases aggregating 22,180 acres, and sheriff's certificate in 127 additional cases aggregating 36.

890 acres. The principal sum involved in these foreclosures

is \$867,700.

In no county of the state has the present administration loaned less than \$92,000 or approximately what the Frazier administration loaned in twenty counties, and in only one county (McLean) have we loaned over \$700,000. No factional or political considerations have been permitted to influence the conduct of this business. As illustrative of the efficient administration of this department, I might add that, though the 5274 loans made aggregate \$15,803,791.12, there is now only \$189,225 outstanding in interest, and in only seven out of the 5274 loans made by us have we been constrained to commence foreclosure. More than \$6,000,000 of these loans have been made during the past year. Not only have we completed this large number of loans but 3,101 additional loans have already been appraised and approved by the finance committee in the total sum of \$9,154,458.88 thus leaving a large block of business practically finished ready for the new officials to complete at the very beginning of the administration.

While it thus appears that the Farm Loan Department of the bank has made a splendid record during the past three years, our experience has convinced us that the business could be still more expeditiously and economically done if our laws were so changed that we might issue the farm loan bonds in advance of making the loan, as is now done in South Dakota and Minnesota, and thus avoid the danger that during the period when the bond market is weak we should be forced to choose between the alternative of suspending loan operations or selling the bonds at a high rate of interest. Whenever we use public funds deposited in the Bank for any industrial purpose the time eventually comes when such funds must be replaced or the public business suffer. In such a contingency bonds would have to be sold regardless of the condition of the market. This could be avoided by selling the bonds in advance of making the loans.

The old bonded debt of the state has been paid and there now remains outstanding only the industrial bonds issued since July 1, 1919, as capital stock for the Bank of North Dakota, for the erection of the mill and elevator, for the purchase of milling wheat, and for the state farm loan business. These bonds are as follows:

On the bonds issued to date, there is a total annual interest charge on the farm loan bonds of \$986,972.50 most of which, however, with good crops and fair prices will be paid by the mortgagors; also an annual interest charge of \$349,625, on the other bonds, practically all of which will have to be met by an annual levy upon the taxable property of the state.

Where the former administration in September and November, 1921, sold farm loan and mill and elevator bonds drawing 5% per cent and 6 per cent at par or discount and tied our hands at a great loss to the state by selling not only what they needed to finance work already done but also for the administrative work for which we had just been elected, the credit of the state has nevertheless so improved during our administration that though all the farm loan and mill and elevator bonds we have issued and sold draw only from 5 per cent to 5½ per cent interest, we have received \$362,983 in cash premium on the bonds.

Closed Banks

The administration of closed banks is always difficult, and seldom satisfactory. The only thing any administration can do is to exercise good business judgment in the handling of the affairs; curtail expenses, conserve assets, make settlements and collections, and wind up the affairs as efficiently, economically and speedily as possible. When I took office, these banks were handled by individual receivers, receiving ten dollars a day each. Of the fifty-nine Thirty-seven receivers banks closed, nine had re-opened. and nine special deputies were in charge of the fifty banks. I found that during 1921 the cost of doing business had been greater than the receipts and that the former method was so inefficient and so expensive that it resulted in gross waste of the assets of the closed banks. I sought counsel immediately to ascertain whether it was possible to bring the receivership of all the banks which were closed under one head, or at least under two or three, but discovered that under the law then

existing this was not possible. The best that could be done was to group the banks. We therefore planned a fairly satisfactory grouping system, making nine groups with from four to seven banks in each. By this method we saved about \$76,000 annually in expenses and greatly increased the efficiency of the receivership system. Nevertheless, it was not all that I had hoped to accomplish and so in 1923 we enacted a law which permitted the grouping of all the banks under one receiver with the result that expenses have been greatly reduced and efficiency increased. The expenses, for instance, of the 129 banks that first closed, during a period of fourteen months under the old system, were \$42,175.66 per month, while during a similar period under a single receivership these expenses have been cut to \$15,824.95 per month and the force employed reduced from 175 to 69. The total expenses for legal aid in managing the affairs of all the closed banks of the state during the single receivership system has been less than the cost during a similar period under the Frazier administration for just three of the small banks in the Slope country. Total collections reported to the Receiver by the close of the year is \$1,375,375.52.

After lengthy negotiations the receiver and banking board were also able to arrange with the holders of the collateral of these closed banks, where there had been foreclosure of such collateral, to return the balance after paying the amount due them and the expenses, to the receiver. It was very important to secure such an arrangement in anticipation of the greatly increased collections of this fall and winter. The arrangement is fair to the banks holding the collateral and at the same time very advantageous to those interested in the assets of the closed banks and will save them hundreds of

thousands of dollars.

The present system is efficient and economical. Since it is unlikely that the administration of the closed banks can be terminated by July 1, 1926, when the system ends under the present law, I would suggest that you so amend the law as to continue the present system for an additional two years.

As all the receivership proceedings are brought in Burleigh county, it will involve an accumulation of voluminous records that will need to be referred to for several years. The clerk of court of Burleigh county is hardly in a position to handle these, and I would suggest the enactment of a law transferring these records when the cases are completed to the bank examiner's office. I also believe that greater efficiency and economy could be secured if creditors and stockholders of insolvent banks acting in conjunction with the Receiver and the Court were given the power to provide for the appointment of trustees in whom could be vested the title to the assets of such bank, thus facilitating collections, greatly reducing expenses, and bettering results.

Guaranty Fund

There has been some criticism — based largely on ignorance and misinformation — because payments for the guaranty fund have not been made earlier. When we took office we found that the Frazier administration had made no payments to depositors after August 2, 1920. Just what their reasons were I cannot say. We also found that

there was doubt and uncertainty as to the meaning of the law and we became satisfied that it was unwise to make payments until the various provisions of the law had been interpreted by the courts. Through one of the cases started against the commission, we found the opportunity to have a sufficient number of the legal issues settled so that it would be safe to begin making payments. We have declared a ten per cent dividend on guaranteed deposits of the fifty-eight banks that closed before July 1, 1923, paying in full about 8,000 of the small claims, as we deemed it unwise to make part payments of these minor claims. When the payments now under way are finally completed, as they will be in a short time, about \$600,000 will have been paid to depositors, leaving a balance which will be distributed to another group of banks that closed after July 1, 1923. Payment has already been made to depositors of eleven banks owning claims, admittedly guaranteed.

It should be noted in passing that notwithstanding the accumulation over a period of years in the Guaranty Fund and the large aggregate amount now distributed by us, the payment amounts to only a ten per cent dividend. It should not be necessary to suggest to persons who have no desire or motive other than to pass an honest judgment on the merits of the work of the Commission, that ordering or paying a smaller dividend than ten per cent is neither sound business nor good sense. The cost becomes entirely out of all proportion to the money paid. That is the reason why the rule in the United States courts in bankruptcy cases is that a dividend of less than ten per cent, excepting a final dividend,

may not ordinarily be paid.

Fortunately good crops and excellent prices came this fall, greatly increasing our collections and improving the assets. This will make it easier to deal with this whole problem. At this time these collections from the assets of closed banks

aggregate nearly a million and a half.

I hope that the present legislature may discover some sound and satisfactory method of dealing with the whole problem of depositors in closed banks and evolve some plan that will be just and fair alike to depositors, stockholders, and taxpayers. For the purpose of facilitating a wise consideration of the question, we have been making audits to ascertain the exact amount of admittedly guaranteed deposits of all the closed banks; also the amount on which there is questionable liability. The exact payments to be required in the last mentioned cases can not, of course, be accurately ascertained until after hearings and a decision in the matter by the Guaranty Fund Commission. With a fairly complete information as to the amount that is in question, however, the Commission will be able to arrive more accurately at the total amount with which the fund ultimately will be charged and the legislature therefore also better prepared to analyze, wisely redraft and enact into law one of the many proposed measures, now in prospect.

University and School Lands

When the newly elected attorney general and I first met with the Board of University and School Lands in November, 1921, we found that there was unpaid on bonds bought more than two million dollars, and more than one million dollars in additional applications for bonds on hand, to build schoolhouses. There were also applications for a large number of farm loans. These loans could not be made for lack of funds, and there was no money on hand or in prospect with which to pay for the bonds. soon as we could make a change in the office of Land Commissioner and secure a man who would obtain and prepare adequate and reliable information for us, we discovered that millions in interest and principal were delinquent on land contracts and large sums of money in interest on bonds and mortgages; in a very large number of cases buildings and fences on school lands were rapidly disappearing or going to waste, and that for many years there had been the slackest kind of management of this very large business. We found, for instance, that in December, 1922, about 400 land contracts were delinquent from five to twelve years. We inaugurated a campaign to eliminate these delinquencies, to conserve the property, to collect the sums due us and to put the work of the board upon a sound, satisfactory, and business-like basis as early as possible. While there is still much to be done, great progress has been made. More than \$7,000,000 has been collected, of which over \$3,000,000 has been invested in bonds and mortgages, over \$3,000,000 transmitted to the common schools and state institutuions. At the present time every bond issue requested and every mortgage applicaon hand in the funds under the supervision of the Board of University and School Lands. It is estimated that the total value of the holdings is about fifty million dollars. That is the largest business investment of the state and it is wisdom to treat it as such and to handle it in the most businesslike way. I would recommend that provision be made for a farm superintendent who would conserve the property, secure increased revenues from the land and assist in collecting delinquent interest.

When on September 1, 1923, John J. Lee became warden of the state penitentiary and our administration took charge of the institution, we discovered that the season had closed with over two million pounds of their twine unsold, and that at the close of that season there was still outstanding and uncollected a total sum of \$105.279.46 of twine money. Under the splendid administration of Warden Lee we not only had an excellent manufacturing record during 1924 both as to quantity and quality of the product, but we disposed of all of the twine manufactured this year and 1,417,950 pounds of the twine left over by the former administration. The balance, together with all that can be manufactured during this season, has already been sold by mail for delivery next summer. So successful has the warden also been in making his collections, that for the twine sold by him only \$2,379.86 is outstanding, and \$28,917.53 also collected of what the former administration had outstanding.

You are all familiar with the excessive discounts exacted from the holders of the hail warrants during the fall of 1921 and the improved conditions established in financing the same on the initiative of the Industrial Commission. In executing the plan, we had the co-operation of S. A. Olsness, the Com-

missioner of Insurance. After we took office in November, 1921, and in 1922 these warrants were financed in such a way that but slight discounts had to be paid and in 1923 no discount at all, although at some cost to the fund, while in the fall of 1924 we paid every hail warrant in cash at the time of its presentation, without exhausting the fund.

This year we have also been able to make arrangements for financing the soldiers' bonus claims. Nearly 14,000 of these have already been paid in numerical order as money became available, but as the payment of the balance will require four or five years we have for two years been seeking to devise a plan of financing the bonus claims in such a way that a holder who might desire to do so could dispose of his claim at a discount that would be just and reasonable, considering the length of time before the claim would be reached for payment. During the past summer we were able to perfect arrangements for a loan, so that these bonus claims can be sold to the state at reasonable discounts. The discount represents the estimate of the actual cost of handling the business plus the interest on the notes till they fall due. The result is that the service man who needs to cash his bonus claim now is able to do so on the basis of a fair rate of interest while those who do not need the money can, of course, wait until their turn of payment comes.

A somewhat larger discount, especially on the claims that must wait for years for payment, was inevitable in the case of the bonus as compared with the hail warrants for the reason that the bonus claims bear no interest whatever. It was well known, however, in many instances that soldiers who needed immediate cash were constrained to assign their claim at a rate of discount that seemed unfairly large although the Adjutant General has done much to safeguard the men against discounts that were grossly unfair. The arrangement we made obviates this sacrifice by the ex-service man, and enables him to dispose of his claim at its fair and actual value. Nearly a million dollars' worth of these claims have already been purchased.

Some Boards and Commissions

The standards of efficiency have been greatly raised in other lines of business in which this state is interested. Take, for instance, the game and fish board. At the time we assumed office, there seemed to be no system of bookkeeping, scarcely a record to be found, money uncollected, land investments recklessly made, the license moneys squandered and the greatest of confusion existing throughout the department. In the businesslike administration of the board, which I appointed a couple of years ago, this has already been corrected, books are splendidly kept, the moneys collected properly accounted for and safeguarded, and the investments made of such a character as to comply with the letter and spirit of the law, and serving the highest interest of our people and state in propagating and protecting game and fish in North Dakota. We need, however, to invoke and secure a closer co-operation of police officials as the state is too large to make it possible for the game wardens alone to give the desired protection. I have already entered upon negotiations looking toward the establishment of a series of game preserves along the Missouri river to some point between Coleharbor and Sanish and from there across to Canada, and I trust that something may be done by the coming administration to carry out this plan.

During my administration our state has also, for the first time, had a full-time health officer. Dr. A. A. Whittemore had practiced in our state for a number of years before accepting this office. We were not in the registration area of the nation, either on births or deaths. While we have been organized under the new law for but eighteen months, splendid progress has been made. We have had a fine spirit of co-operation from doctors, nurses, local officials and public-spirited citizens, and we have already been admitted to the registration area on both births and deaths; an unusually fine record for so short a time. Not only has this and much additional work been accomplished, but the foundation has been laid for the co-ordination of all health activities conducted by the state, and the Budget Board has recommended unity of administration and consolidation of appropriations.

The Children's Code Commission did a splendid work before the last legislative session and most of the laws drafted by them were adopted. A few, however, failed to pass and I recommend that the progress already made in safeguarding childhood and the future citizen be continued and strengthened by the adoption of other laws recommended by the Commission, especially the law making it possible for the people of the various counties to organize therein children's welfare organizations. Such bodies can do much for the growing childhood of this country. The population at our training school has grown so rapidly that some method must be found for permitting the discharge of children on probation after being confined twelve or eighteen months in the school. Overcrowding may thus be avoided, and the state relieved of the necessity of expending large sums for additional buildings. This can be safely done only when there is a child welfare body in the community that will take an interest in and look after the conduct of these young people when released.

The Workmen's Compensation Bureau had been organized and functioning for several years before our administration, but many rates were excessive, the business handled in a slipshod manner, and evidence of needed reorganization and increased efficiency everywhere present. As soon as possible, I appointed efficient men on the board, who, together with those who continued thereon, introduced economies, revised rates, credited some who had been paying excessive rates with substantial dividends, and established an efficient and well functioning business organization. I believe it unwise to establish monopolies where the state engages in competition with private business and since the affairs of the Workmen's Compensation Bureau are now well organized, I would recommend that the law be amended to permit employers to purchase their workmen's compensation either from the state or from any strong private concern. Provision should also be made for the permanent investment of the greater portion of its funds.

As a people, we are believers in good roads. We need them; we believe that the building of good roads when efficiently and economically done is a wise investment and does much to increase the comfort and happiness of life in town and country. We want work done so efficiently, so economically and so in keeping with the conditions existing in our state, however, that a hundred cents' worth of road may be secured for each dollar invested. This has been accomplished, I believe, during the past two years. A fair comparison of the record made by W. G. Black with the record of his predecessor in the number of miles of road built or gravelled, in increased efficiency and reduced cost per mile, will show a great improvement indeed.

For the purpose of building these roads additional taxes might well be levied upon motor vehicles or gasoline. In the state of North Dakota we have a tax of one cent per gallon, while a number of states have a tax of two and even three cents per gallon. I believe it would be a wise policy to increase the gasoline tax another cent per gallon. Those who would pay this tax are, in the main, those who give the roads the most constant use.

During 1922 it became apparent that in the work of inspecting foods, feeds, beverages and drugs and in the testing of oils and paints, there was much duplication, confusion and resulting waste. Legislation was therefore enacted providing for the reorganization of this department under the supervision of a state food commissioner and chemist, resulting in decreased expense, increased revenue and added efficiency.

Similar improvements and increased economies and efficiency have also been secured in the work of some of the examining boards and other agencies, where slipshod methods had previously been in vogue.

Under the direction of ex-Governor J. M. Devine, the immigration work of the state, the counties and the railroads have been splendidly co-ordinated and a fine progress made in spite of the small appropriation. The general program of state development for which we have labored these three years, making the most of the great natural resources of the state and developing every section agriculturally and industrially, should be continued. The threatened increase in the rates on lignite coal will greatly diminish the area which we can supply with lignite in competition with eastern soft coal. I believe the time has come when we should concentrate our thoughts and efforts on the problem of manufacturing electricity at the mines and distributing the current by a network of lines over the widest practicable area. The fact that our state is as yet sparsely settled will make it impracticable to serve every community, but I believe that even with the present population great development along this line is pos-It is a trite but true saying that this is an electrical sible. age and that we stand at the threshold of a new world of electrical phenomena, devices and uses. No matter what the new appliances, the current will be required and we may confidently turn our energies to the manufacturing of added horsepowers knowing that the demand will and must come. Such development will give added impetus to manufacturing projects and will bring also a stronger tide of immigration of those who are seeking a home and opportunity.

Our state is making splendid progress in the enforcement of law. Reports of state and federal officials having to do with law enforcement in North Dakota show that violations of the eighteenth amendment are steadily decreasing. I feel that we should continually renew and increase our devotion to constitutions, to law and order and that we should aid officials charged with the enforcement of these laws to the end that all laws upon statute books may be enforced without fear and without favor.

During the past year I appointed a number of tax studying commissions for the purpose of looking into the general problem of local and state taxation and to make recommendations to the legislature of such changes as seemed desirable in accomplishing efficiency and economy. The reports of several of these are now on file for your consideration. Among these commissions was also one recommended in my last message and provided for by you, namely, a commission of five to study the problem of school finance and administration. This commission has made a careful study of this problem, their report is on file and I am sure that you will find it of great value in your labors. In a government of the people, such as ours, it is absolutely essential that we should have universal education; increasing the knowledge, developing the mental powers and implanting in the minds and hearts of our people those ideals of personal virtue and civic righteousness which lie at the foundation of the development of individual character and national strength. While we need to curtail expenditures and eliminate all waste and needless expense the economy we exercise must be sound and constructive, and nothing must be eliminated that is essential in developing the right kind of citizenship for the future.

We have endeavored to economize, to curtail expenditures, reduce appropriations and equalize assessments. The increase in appropriations during a number of years was continuous and tremendous. Let us examine the record of the last five biennial legislative sessions and we will find that the amounts appropriated from the general fund have varied as follows:

As the amount that must be levied to pay interest and a part of the principal of the industrial bonds is steadily growing, there is need of continuing the economy we have initiated and to curtail expenditures in the state and in every political subdivision. The economy, however, while rigorous must be constructive, not destructive, in character. We must not destroy institutions or services really useful to our people merely to cut expenses. We should insist that every dollar spent bring at least a hundred cents of value in improved social and economic conditions or in the development of a stronger and finer citizenship. A close and careful estimate made after conference with the tax commissioner, and other state officials shows that the available revenues in the general

fund for the next biennium will be approximately \$7,744,000. You should be guided thereby in making your appropriations.

Throughout my administration I have sought earnestly and sincerely to initiate or join in the furtherance of every sound plan or project that seemed to give promise of promoting the welfare of the state and its people. In this as well as in all other labors for the prosperity of the state and the happiness of its people, I have enjoyed the loyal co-operation of thousands of the best men and women of the state, and for this I shall ever be profoundly grateful.

In the process of improving the state's business, it seemed essential to change the attitude of outside people toward the state. Our credit was all but gone. Ridicule and disrespect seemed to be the lot of our citizenship wherever they went. I was confident that this could be changed, and felt that it must be changed before the welfare of our citizenship could be secured. So I took advantage of opportunities to address influential business and investment groups in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan and New York, and feel that by reaching these groups and through them and the publicity obtained, influencing public opinion, much has been accomplished in regaining respect and good will for our people, restoring confidence in the state, and re-establishing its credit.

Such somewhat briefly summarizes the record of three years's efforts to serve the people of this state. May I emphasize the fact that the period of service is only three years and one month. Without vainglory, but with full confidence and no regrets, we submit this record to you, and to the people and to the fair and unbiased judgment of the future. We were confronted with difficult problems of reconstruction and we did our best to meet and solve them in such a way as to promote the welfare of the whole people.

In my message two years ago, I recommended to you that the Constitution be so amended as to provide for the election of the officials of the state and the various political subdivisions for a period of four years instead of biennially. I am confident that this would tend to reduce expenses, increase efficiency, and would promote the better administration of all the affairs of the state and its various local subdivisions. I therefore renew my recommendation.

The last legislature wisely provided that the voter who was unable to mark his own ballot might have the assistance of certain relatives therein designated, but in order to make the law so enacted wholly satisfactory it should be amended so as to provide that when there are no relative of that degree of consanguinity, or no relatives able to assist in marking the ballot, then the voter should have a right to call upon the judges of election to assist him in marking his ballot

We are still awaiting the decision of the United States Supreme Court on the grain grading law and if such decision should not be handed down before the close of this legislative session I believe that a wisely drawn grain grading law should be enacted before you adjourn so as to protect the

grain growers of the state.

The opening of the deep waterway from the Great Lakes to the sea is, in my opinion, of the utmost importance to the state of North Dakota, and the early completion of this project should be sought. This I have stressed on many occasions. Conditions at the present time are unusually favorable, and I have requested the governors of the other sixteen states particularly interested in this project to urge upon the legislative bodies of their states the adoption of resolutions urging Congress to enact legislation that will insure actual work upon the project this year. I hope that you will adopt such resolution during the early days of this session.

Some years ago the late Andrew Carnegie, at the request of the board that then had control of certain educational institutions of this state, advanced \$35,000 for the building of a library in connection with the Industrial School at Ellendale. The courts have held—and I think properly so—that there is no legal obligation to repay this money, but neither can there be any question but that there is a moral obligation to do so since we now own and use this building, and I am confident that the people of this state will not leave any moral obligation undischarged. I would therefore recommend that you appropriate the necessary amount to pay this money advanced for the erection of a necessary building at one of our state institutions.

Ever since statehood we have emphasized the necessity of implanting in the minds and hearts of the young the love of those simple virtues which are essential to the forming of the right kind of character, and indispensable in building a strong citizenship. We need to renew the emphasis on moral instruction in our public schools. We must also aid in bringing to every child possible a greater opportunity of religious instruction. The Sunday school, the parochial school, the work of the pastors preparing the young for confirmation, and the summer schools for religious instruction, are all doing splendid work, but the time given to these important subjects is altogether inadequate. I believe a law should be enacted that will set aside three hours a week out of the school time for the purpose of enabling the parents and the various denominations, either singly or in groups, to make arrangements for the giving of further religious instruction without public expense.

Bond issues are frequently larger than the needs and strength of the community warrant. It seems to me that it would be well to give some board authority, upon complaint from local taxpayers, to pass upon the necessity for and amount of these bond issues in order to avoid needless or excessive bonding. Since there is much difficulty in insuring a proper maintenanie of sinking funds, I believe that our laws should also be so changed as to make possible the issuance of the bonds serially, maturing in from one to twenty years, so that a portion of the bonds may be retired rather than to keep the money accumulating in a sinking fund. I am informed by bond dealers that this plan would not hurt or affect the saleability of the bonds, and it would certainly promote a gradual liquidation of the bonded debt.

There has been no compilation of our laws since 1913, since when we have had five regular and two special sessions of the legislature and innumerable changes have been made in our laws, creating uncertainty and much confusion among those desirous of ascertaining what the law on any given subject is. I would recommend that you provide at this legislative session for either a compilation of all our laws or for a compilation of a supplement to the Compiled Laws for 1913.

The budget board has arranged for the drafting of all the budget board bills and we have encouraged the early drafting of other bills that are to be introduced in this legislature, to the end that you may be able to commence the consideration of proposed legislation without delay. I trust that you will enter upon your work actively and conscientiously, study all bills carefully and pass meritorious acts promptly. This will make it possible for you to complete your labors and by adjourning early save yourselves time and the state much expense.

In your labors as a legislative body, in the acts of the new administration and in the efforts of all citizens to promote the welfare of the state and prosperity and happiness of our people, may Divine Providence, through whose help and guidance alone whatever success has been achieved in the past was made possible, give wisdom and strength for every task and continue Its protecting care of our beloved state.

The Lieutenant Governor introduced the incoming Governor, Hon. A. G. Sorlie, with a few appropriate remarks.

The incoming Governor, Hon. A. G. Sorlie, then delivered his message to the joint session.

REMARKS OF GOVERNOR SORLIE

Ladies and Gentlemen of the Nineteenth Legislative Assembly:

Before I begin the reading of my message I desire to say a few words expressing my approval of the harmonious manner in which this session of the legislature has been opened. I am glad to know that we are going to get back and stand for our selves. We are going to bury the hatchet and get away from the strife we have had in North Dakota and get back to ourselves and know ourselves. My message will not go back beyond today. We are goint to start from now. We are not going back. We have all made our mistakes. We will likely make other mistakes; show me the man or woman who has not make them. But we have passed by them and we are not going back—we are going to build on the experience we have had and profit by it.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Gentlemen and Ladies of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota:

The Governor is directed by law to communicate to you at the opening of the Session, a message giving you information as to the condition of the state, and recommending to your attention such matters as he may deem expedient.

For information as to the present condition of the State you will have before you the message of Governor Nestos, who, as Governor for the term just expired, has had the sources of such information directly under his hand. You will also have the reports and recommendations of the officials who are charged with the preparation of the budget. These papers should give you first-hand information which can be depended upon, and from a careful examination and perusal of which you should be well informed both as to the revenues which you can reasonably presume will be available for appropriation to state purposes, and the amounts of money which should be by you appropriated for the purpose of carrying on the necessary business of the commonwealth.

My official connection with the business of the state is so recent, and the sources of my information are so much less direct that I shall not presume to advise you in this connection. I suggest to you, however, that it is poor business to appropriate and spend the entire available income of the state; and that if you can and will keep your appropriations well within the anticipated revenues you will earn the approval of your constituents.

A comparison of the revenues collected and expended (which, for practical purposes, can easily be ascertained from the information shown upon the face of the tax receipts issued by the County Treasurers of our respective counties), shows a condition of affairs that is shocking both to our sensibilities and to our pocketbooks. Taxes upon our lands and properties have, during the past ten years, increased one, two and sometimes three hundred per cent; so that their payment has become a tremendous burden upon our citizens; almost too grievous to be borne, and the unmarked line between legitimate taxation and unwarranted confiscation of our properties has at least been approached.

These taxes have been initiated, levied and imposed by many and various bodies, that is to say: the school districts, the civil townships, the villages and cities, the counties, and, finally, the state, has each had its share in imposing its burden. Each agency in levying more than its just and proper share has, perhaps, excused itself with the thought that, while possibly it may have exceeded its just proportion, yet its share is so small as compared with the whole amount of taxes levied, as to be almost negligible and unnoticeable in the aggregate; nevertheless, when the levies made by those several agencies have been assembled the result seldom fails to shock even those who are responsible for the condition, which all profess to deplore.

It seems that the levying and expending of taxes in large amounts has become a fad if not a fashion, and we strive to comfort ourselves with the reflection that in our neighboring cities, counties and states conditions are just as bad, and therefore, we are not personally responsible or blamable.

Our state, in common with all agricultural communities, has negotiated its way through, and is still experiencing extraordinary business conditions. Agriculture and things connected with agriculture have been abused, broken, deflated and crushed by circumstances over which we have had little control; and then, when we could least afford it, our pockets have been turned inside-out and our last penny taken by our own tax collectors, to pay taxes for which we have not assumed responsibility, individually or collectively.

It is time to call a halt. The attention of all taxing bodies in the state will be called to the necessity of stringent economy. Our citizens, as individuals, have in the past few years been obliged to deny themselves many of the comforts and most of the luxuries to which they have been accustomed. It, therefore, behooves us, who are living upon and spending the state revenues to realize the necessities of, and to practice the utmost self-denial and economy in conducting the business of the state.

You, gentlemen of the Assembly, by your action taken during the next sixty days, can do very much to relieve this oppressive situation, and I earnestly recommend that in all matters pertaining to the expenditure of public moneys you shall exercise the strictest supervision and economy. Let us, and each of us, determine not to be ashamed to be close in our dealing with public funds, or to exercise the most scrupulous economy and thrift. It is essential that we, as servants of the state, entrusted with the obligations and duties of office, should conduct public affairs with the same care and attention that we should give and do give our own personal business. We have got to be on the job as business men if we expect to conduct the state's business as it should be conducted to succeed.

It has been the custom in the past that the real budget bill, providing for vital and necessary funds for the actual operation of the business of the state, has been enacted at the expiring limits of the legislative existence without regard to the revenue available. This Legislative Assembly can remedy this procedure and should do so. I recommend that you spend the first twenty days of the session in considering and passing the necessary general appropriation bills providing for the actual necessities of the state, and that until these necessary bills have been disposed of, no other legislation of any kind be considered.

I recommend that you exercise strict economy in providing for officials, clerks and helpers in conducting the business of the session. You should have an efficient clerical force, sufficient only for the business to be performed, and there should be no place in the employ of the state for incompetents or political hangers-on. Why not make a record along these lines?

The reservation to the people of the right to recall unsatisfactory officials, which is now a part of our laws, makes biennial elections unnecessary. I, therefore, recommend that you take the necessary steps to initiate an amendment to the Constitution providing for general elections only once in four years, and for only one session of the Legislature in that period.

The various departments administering the government and business of our state, as well as of our cities, counties and school districts, have been evolved from time to time as new laws have gone into effect, so that they necessarily cannot in all things co-ordinate. This lack of co-ordination has resulted in great duplication of endeavor and waste of time, energy and material. In any business corporation this condition would not be permitted to exist, and there is no reason why such inefficient and wasteful methods should be permitted to exist in public affairs.

I, therefore, recommend that you provide for a State Efficiency Expert, to be appointed by and to act under the direction of the Governor. Such expert should devote his or her entire time and skill to this office and to the examination of such public offices, businesses or departments as the Governor may assign from time to time. He or she should be given authority to examine all matters, books and papers connected with or pertaining to the various subjects directed to examine. He or she should report to the governing board or official, as the case may be, in writing, with a duplicate report directly to the Governor, suggesting new laws, rules, methods, practices and appliances to render more efficient and economical the operation of public affairs. A sufficient salary should be provided so that a person of real ability may be employed. Such an officer should eventually attain proper co-ordination among our different departments, boards and offices, which must result in more efficient management and greater economy.

The banks of the state have heretofore been accustomed to borrow money from other banks in time of need, and to secure such loans by collateral of a face and actual value two and often three times the amount of the money borrowed. In the event of inability of the banks to pay the loans at maturity, serious losses have been sustained. I recommend this matter to your body for consideration and action, and urge the passage of such laws as in your judgment will remedy the wrong. The problems of handling our closed banks and those that may hereafter close, so as to cause the least loss and inconvenience to the depositors, is one that should engage the serious attention of the state government. Under the present and accepted method of doing business, the state government assumes to examine and control all state banks, and by permitting their operation, to advertise to the public generally that such bonds are safe depositaries for money.

When a bank fails the state authorities assume absolute control of its management, but in no manner provide any funds to assist either in the reopening or in conserving the assets of the closed bank. As a result, during the period

through which we have just passed, a vast amount of papers, equitably the property of the depositors, has been lost by reason of the inability of the failed institutions to pay back to other banks the loans obtained, prior to their failure. This has resulted in the foreclosure of pledges secured by property of vastly greater value than the amount of the debts secured. In some instances reasonably good commercial paper, well secured, of a face value three times that of the money borrowed has been pledged, and when the failure came and the failed institution had no available funds with which to redeem the pledged paper, the pledge has been foreclosed, the paper bid in for the amount of the debt or less, and the depositors have been robbed in their helplessness.

This method of handling banks has grown up through a long period of time in the state and nation. We have become used to it and, except when we have been made helpless victims of the procedure, we have not realized the enormity of the wrong done. The state, having in effect invited the depositors to place their money in these banks, is morally bound to see that such deposits are not wasted, dissipated or lost, and should at all times protect all equities that are of value and see that the assets are conserved and applied to the payment of deposits.

I recommend that you immediately appoint a committee to examine into the whole question and ascertain if the following suggestions cannot be put into practical form and effect:

Within a stated time, say ninety days after a bank has closed its doors, or sooner upon request of the State Examiner, if the bank has not been reopened, possession of all its assets should be taken by the Bank of North Dakota, which shall immediately cause a careful examination and appraisal of its assets to be made, and the net value of such assets ascertained as nearly as may be. There shall then be issued to the depositors, certificates of proof of claim for the amount of their respective deposits. The Bank of North Dakota shall make a public statement that in that particular failed bank, it will advance to the depositors upon the security of their certificates of proof of claim, a certain percentage thereof at an interest rate of six per cent, the amount so loaned to be not more than, say, seventy-five per cent of the value of such certificates, according to the said appraisal. The Bank of North Dakota should be given authority to collect, compromise, discount, sell, or in any legitimate manner realize upon the assets of such closed bank as soon as may be, and apply the proceeds as realized, first to the payment of its costs and disbursements in connection with said matter. together with such sums as will repay it for its expenses of liquidation, and second, to the payment of the certificates of It should also be made the duty of the Bank proof of claim. of North Dakota to redeem or purchase any mortgages or pledges of property where a valuable equity remains to the failed bank, and to advance such sums as are necessary there-To do this will require that the Bank of North Dakota shall advance such money, and proper provision must be made therefor, which, as to banks to close hereafter, will not be very difficult.

This suggested plan must in no way be confused with the State Guaranty of Deposits. The theory upon which this plan operates is that the Bank of North Dakota shall advance only a proportion of the actual value of the assets. All advances made should be returned with interest from the proceeds of collections. If properly administered, this plan should bring to all depositors a measure of immediate relief, should prevent waste, and do away with the tremendous cost of bank receiverships. The plan means only that the Bank of North Dakota, the instrument of the State, shall assist the depositors with the state's money and credit, all properly secured. The plan proposed is tentative only, and it is possible it can be arranged so that the state bank can purchase such certificates of proof of claim outright.

I believe, if your committee will make use of the best financial ability and counsel within and without the state, a plan and law along the general lines herein suggested can be evolved which will be of inestimable value to the commonwealth, and which will eventually be adopted by the nation to protect depositors in national banks.

The growing disrespect for our penal statutes and the law generally, especially upon the part of the younger generation, is a matter that is attracting much attention and discussion and causes alarm among those of us who are closely observing the social and moral reactions of our citizens. Disrespect for the law easily leads to disregard for and violations of those penal statutes which, without overbearing moral necessity, assume to regulate the lives and habits of our citizens; and such violations lead to others more serious until, at times, one is led to wonder if we are to become a nation of habitual law-breakers. Sociologists are continually writing and talk-ing along these lines, and many theories have been pro-pounded regarding the cause of this serious moral condition, and many remedies proposed therefor. In my judgment the fault lies very largely at the door of mistaken moral reformers who are continually asking for the passage of laws regulating the lives and habits of our citizens, and imposing penalties for the doing of acts which, in themselves, are not morally wrong. These reformers usually represent organized minorities who, by force of their organization and apparent power, and also because of the high moral plane upon which they assume to stand, impress upon our law-makers the necessity for and cause the enactment of many laws which are not approved by the great body of our citizens; and we thus find upon our statute books many laws which are not supported by a healthful public opinion, the violations of which are generally winked at, and for which a conviction in our law courts is not generally deemed a great disgrace. The passing and putting into effect of such laws is a dangerous meddling with the inalienable rights of our citizens, and while they may be held by the courts to be constitutional as an exercise of the nolice power, they not only do not accomplish the reforms their sponsors hoped for, but they lead up to a disregard for the law in general, and do inestimably more harm than good.

I suggest to the Legislature that no more such laws be put upon the statute books, and that some that are now there shall be repealed.

In this connection I call to your attention Chapters 91 and 92 of our Penal Code, as amended, making the selling of snuff and cigarettes a crime, and imposing penalties therefor. taking of snuff and the smoking of cigarettes are habits. While to some of us these habits may appear undesirable, unhealthful and filthy, yet there is nothing inherently vicious in either, which should be inhibited by law; and these statutes are not supported by an enlightened public opinion. We have only to go back to the time of the war when our ladies all over only to go back to the time of the war when our ladies all over the land were engaged in giving and sending to our soldiers in the camps and trenches vast quantities of tobaccos and cigarettes, which were distributed through the good offices of the Y. M. C. A., the Salvation Army and the Knights of Columbus. Yet, when our boys returned home after the war, they found that the purchase and sale of some of these articles, under the laws of this state, were made illegal articles, under the laws of this state, were made illegal. While it is legally possible for a person to purchase the same beyond the state, and to have them delivered by the United States mail at his door, yet it is a crime for anyone to sell or give away snuff or cigarettes, and a person who passes to a friend a package of cigarettes, or even one cigarette, is made a criminal. This condition is unhealthful and leads to disrespect for the law. It tends to make good citizens into criminals, and is a condition that should not be tolerated.

I, therefore, suggest that these statutes be repealed. Such repeal will save much cost and expense in attempting to enforce these laws, and tend toward economy in the handling of our problems of government.

In addition to this, I suggest that a law be passed imposing a reasonable stamp tax upon all snuffs and cigarettes, say five cents per package, and providing proper machinery for enforcing the same. If this is done it will provide a net revenue of perhaps \$500,000.00 per annum, which can be used in the general fund to relieve our tax burdens, or applied to some special purpose, say, for instance, the liquidation of failed banks, and making advances to depositors, to be repaid in due time out of the assets of such banks when collected, or the special fund provided for that purpose.

As a method of raising additional revenue for use in the building and repair of state highways, you may perhaps consider the imposition of an additional tax of one cent per gallon upon gasoline. This tax may be somewhat burdensome, but I believe our citizens generally, in view of the use to which it is to be put, will cheerfully pay it.

The State Hail Insurance should be continued, but arrangements should be made to, in some manner, divide the state into districts, each district to pay its just insurance rate.

Our Rural Credits have been a God-send to this agricultural section, during this deflation period, and should be continued and made effective in every way possible.

The State Grain Grading and Dockage law is now in the hands of the Supreme Court of the United States. Unless this law is favorably reported, some other law should be passed covering the same ground and put in such shape that it will become constitutional.

Also, in connection with this, there should be a law passed to put our Terminal Elevator in shape so that state warehouse receipts will become negotiable instruments similar to the national warehouse receipts.

During the past several years our state has had a very large amount of adverse advertising. Our troubles, which have been real enough (though they have not been as bad as those of some other agricultural communities), have been misrepresented and exaggerated. The idea that North Dakota has been and is in a deplorable condition has been sold to the country at large, and the damage which this has done in dollars and cents, as well as in credit and standing, it is impossible to estimate. The injury is without question so very great that as a business community we must take remedial measures to spread the truth.

Our state is a "Land of Sunshine and Flowers," a veritable "Horn of Plenty," a "Breadbasket of the World." No other state in the union can match our fertile acres and level rich loam lands. No other state can produce so great and so valuable crops as ours, with as little effort; we have no stumps to pull, no stone to pile. Our gangplows, two, three, four, five, six and seven plows wide throughout the length and breadth of our state, can turn over a whole six hundred and forty acre tract, from highway to highway, without care or attention other than such as is necessary at the end of each mile upon the turn. Our cattle and sheep excel all but a very few, and none are better. Our butter has an international reputation. None can equal the flour produced in our own State Mill from our own hard wheat. That product is unique in its super-excellence. We grow the best potatoes and garden vegetables grown anywhere in the world. Our bees produce twenty-five per cent more honey per hive than can be produced elsewhere. We have more hours of concentrated sunshine in the growing season than any state to the south of us. We are coming into our own estate in the production of corn and hogs.

Our citizens are, upon the whole, more literate and of higher intelligence than those of our neighboring states. Our climate is more invigorating and healthful than in the softer south. The beauty and social charms of our ladies is growing from year to year, so that now old Virginia and Kentucky may vainly look to their laurels. Our young men grow tall and vigorous. The cold iron of the north is inherent in their make-up. They have the pep, the vigor, the stamina, and the bulldog stick-to-it-iveness which comes to them in the very air they breathe. The north has always produced the conquering nations; and in our fair state Nature is at work as in a laboratory, producing superior types of citilenship who are now going forth, and will continue to go forth, into the business and professional world conquering and to conquer.

We are blessed with everything that is necessary to make up the greatest of states. Let us no longer hide our light under a bushel. Let us forget politics and factions and pull together, "All for one and one for all," and let us advertise our advantages as an ideal home state to the world at large, that other progressive people may come and throw in their lot with us.

To this end I recommend the establishment of a Radio Broadcasting station under state management, at Bismarck, as an advertising medium for our Immigration Department. Through it let us from day to day, without ceasing, send forth the glad tidings telling of the cheapness of our lands and the excellence of opportunities to the thousands of radio fans all over the country. Properly handled, this will be of great advertising value, and the cost will not be large.

In conclusion, I am not in favor of any additional experiments along the line of state ownership of industries at this time. We have our State Mill and Elevator, so far, I am informed, a money-losing venture. I consider it an asset of incalculable value to the state, and am firmly convinced that if I may have a free hand in controlling the business management of this industry, it can and will be made to pay satisfactory cash dividends to the state; while, if a proper terminal market is established at Grand Forks, as I am satisfied can be done when the project is properly handled, the great cash premium to which our wheat is entitled by reason of its hardness and its superior gluten content, will be paid to the men who have grown it, instead of being paid, as is now the general rule, to the middlemen living at the present wheat terminals to the South and the East.

Our state bank is an instrument of great potency and value in the establishment of our financial independence as a state. I consider it the greatest forward step of the decade along politico-economic lines. It has drawn much criticism and will continue so to do, for it threatens in time to make us economically independent of the eastern money markets. I believe our bankers, who generally were at first much opposed to its operation, in the light of the cavalier treatment they received from the eastern money men during our financial troubles, have come to something of an appreciation of what a properly handled State Bank may mean to them and to the state.

It is a comparatively simple matter to make the bank show a profit upon the balance sheet at the end of each year. I can hardly see how it can be effeciently operated and not do so. The bank should, however, stand for much more than this. When times of financial stress come to us, such as we are now passing through, the State Bank should stand in a much closer relation to the people than that of a mere money making agency. It should be ready to help to the full limit in a spirit of friendly assistance any properly operated and sound bank which, by reason of panicy conditions may be embarrassed for ready money. If such aid had been possible in the past, many banks in the state now in the hands of a receiver could have weathered the storm, and much loss might have been saved to our citizens. It is the business of the state bank to take no foolish risks, but to be ready to as-

sist, in so far as it may, any sound state enterprise with which it is permitted by law to have business relations. So far as I am aware, as at present operated, our state bank is a mere money making institution. If that is all it stands for there is no excuse for its existence.

I propose to so operate the Bank that it shall menace no one, and no business, but shall stand like a wall of rock behind the financial agencies and the banks of the state; and I believe, in addition to doing this, it can be made to pay its way and show a profit at all times. That it shall stand for SERVICE; service to the state and its citizens, and a balance sheet that will show only a reasonable profit.

I cannot do this alone. I must have the help of the legislature, the officials of the state, our citizens in general, and particularly our state banks and bankers. I ask for such assistance and will greatly appreciate constructive criticism in all public matters. I desire to give the state a real business administration, managed by those who have themselves been successful. If the business affairs of the state are well taken care of, the people who are really the stockholders, will know and appreciate it, and I care little for the good or bad opinion of those who make politics a profession.

Let us forget our factional differences and our personal disputes which have grown out of bitter partisan fights. Let us stand together for our State, its institutions, its citizens and its products. Let those who have knocked the state in the past, turn over and wake up.

Divided we have made many failures; united, we may step forward into the limelight of success. Let us all co-operate for our good, blessed state and sell our ideas to others instead of having other people sell theirs to us.

That the 19th Legislative Assembly adopt the following rules:

RULES OF THE HOUSE

- 1. ROLL CALL: The Speaker shall take the chair at the time to which the House stands adjourned, and the House shall then be called to order, and the roll of members called and the name of the absentees entered upon the Journal of the House.
- 2. CORRECTION OF THE JOURNAL: Upon the appearance of a quorum the Journal of the preceding day shall be referred to the Committee on Revision and Correction.

Any mistakes therein shall be corrected by the committee and reported to the House for action.

- CALL OF HOUSE: Thirty-six members of the House may order a call of the House and cause absent members to be sent for, but a call must not be made while a vote is being taken. The call being moved, the Speaker shall require those desiring the call to rise, and if thirty-six or more members shall rise the call shall be ordered. The call being ordered, the sergeant-at-arms shall close the door and allow no member to leave the room. The clerk shall then call the roll and furnish the sergeant-at-arms with a list of those members absent without leave, and that officer must proceed forthwith While the House is to find and bring in such absentees. under call no business can be transacted except to receive and act upon the report of the sergeant-at-arms and no motion is in order except a motion to suspend further proceedings under the call, and said motion shall not be adopted unless a majority of all members-elect vote in favor thereof. Upon a report of the sergeant-at-arms showing that all members who were absent without leave, naming them, are present, the call shall be at an end, and the doors shall be opened, and the business pending at the time the call was made be proceeded with.
- 4. POINTS OF ORDER: The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum and decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the House.
- 5. WHEN SPEAKER VOTES: The Speaker shall vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays (except on appeals from his own decisions) and in all elections or decisions called for by any member.
- 6. When the House adjourns the members shall keep their seats until the Speaker announces adjournment.
- 7. RECOGNITION BY CHAIR: Every member previous to his speaking shall rise from his seat and respectfully address "Mr. Speaker," and remain standing in his place before proceeding to speak until he is recognized by the chair.
- 8. WHO SHALL BE RECOGNIZED: When two or more members rise at the same time to speak, the Speaker must designate the member who is to speak first, the general rule being the member who shall rise first and address the chair may speak first.
- 9. NUMBER OF TIMES PERSON IS ALLOWED TO SPEAK: No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the House, nor more than once until every member choosing to speak on the subject pending shall have spoken, nor shall any member occupy more than ten minutes at the first time, nor more than five minutes at the second time, without unanimous consent of the House.
- 10. MOTION MUST BE SECONDED: No motion shall be debated or put unless the same be seconded. It must then be stated by the Speaker before the debate and any such

motion must be reduced to writing if the Speaker or any member desires it.

- 11. WHEN MOTION MAY BE WITHDRAWN: After the motion shall be stated by the Speaker, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the House, but may be withdrawn at any time before amendment or decision, but all motions, resolutions, or amendments must be entered on the Journal, whether rejected or adopted.
- i2. ORDER OF PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS: The undinary motions rank as follows, the lowest in rank being at the bottom and the highest at the top of the list. When any one of them is immediately pending the motions above it in the list are in order, and those below are out of order. Those marked (2-3) require a 2-3 vote for their adoption; the others require only a majority.

Fix the time to which to adjourn (when priviledged).*;

Adjourn (when priviledged).*;

Take a recess (when priviledged).*;

Raise a question of privilege.

Call for the Orders of the Day.

Lay on the table.

- 13. PREVIOUS QUESTION: The previous question shall be put in this form: "——demands the previous question. As many as favor the ordering of the previous question will say Aye. As many as are opposed will say No." On a motion for the previous question, and prior to the seconding of the same, a call of the House shall be in order, but after two-thirds of the members present shall have seconded such motion, no ca? shall be in order, prior to the decision of the main question.
- 14. PETITIONS AND MEMORIALS: Petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the House shall be presented by the Speaker or by a member in his place.
- 15. WHEN MEMBER MUST VOTE: Every member who is present, before the vote is declared from the chair, must vote for or against the question before the House, unless the House excuse him or unless he is immediately interested in the question, in which case he must not vote,
- 16. DECORUM: When the Speaker is putting the question, no member shall walk out of, or across the House, nor when a member is speaking, shall any person entertain any

private discourse, or pass between the person speaking and the chair.

- 17. DIVIDING QUESTION: If a question in debate contains several propositions, any member may have the same divided.
- 18. OUT OF ORDER: A member called to order must immediately sit down unless permitted to explain, and the House, if appealed to, must decide the case. If there be no appeal, the decision of the chair shall stand. On appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the House. When a member is called to order for the offensive language, there shall be no debate.
- 19. BILLS INTRODUCED IN QUINTUPLE FORM: Every bill or resolution for amendment of the Constitution shall be in typewritten form (and shall be introduced in quintuple form and have endorsed thereon its title and the name of the member or the committee introducing the same. One of such quintuplicates shall be delivered to the chairman of the committee to which it is referred, one shall remain in the custody of the Chief Clerk until otherwise directed by the House, (and the others shall be for the use of the newspaper men reporting the proceedings of the Legislature).
- 20. TIME OF BILL IN COMMITTEES: Every bill or resolution referred to a committee, except appopriation bills, must be returned to the House with the committee's report thereon not later than the seventh day after its reference, unless upon application by the committee an extension of time is granted within which to consider it. And in case the same is not so reported on the seventh day after its reference and such time is not extended, it shall go automatically onto the Calendar of Bills for consideration by the Committee of the Whole.
- 21. TIME OF INTRODUCING BILLS: No appropriation bill shall be introduced, except upon the request of a majority of the Committee on the Introduction of Delayed Bills after the 25th day of the Session; and no other bill or resolution for amendment of the Constitution shall be introduced without the request of a majority of such committee after the 35th day of the Session.
- 22. DISPOSITION OF BILL AFTER READING: Every bill, memorial, order and resolution, requiring the approval of the Governor, or a change in the Constitution of the State of North Dakota, shall, after second reading be referred to its appropriate committee, and if reported without amendment, shall pass to its third reading, unless otherwise ordered, and when amended it shall go to Committee of the Whole House.
- 23. ENGROSSING: All bills shall be properly engrossed before their final passage.
- 24. AMENDMENT ON THIRD READING: No amendment shall be received on the third reading, except to fill blanks, without unanimous consent of the House, but all bills

and resolutions may be committed at any time previous to their passage. If any amendment be reported on such commitment by any other than a committee of the whole, it shall be read a second time, and the question of third reading and passage put.

- 25. SUBJECTS TO BE SEPARATE: No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted, under color of amendment; no bill or resolution shall at any time be amended by annexing thereto, or incorporating therewith, any other bill or resolution pending before the House.
- 26. COMMITTEE OF WHOLE: In forming a committee of the whole House the Speaker shall appoint a chairman to preside.
- 27. COMMITTEE OF WHOLE: Bills committed to the committee of the whole House shall be read, be open to amendment, and debated by sections, unless otherwise ordered, leaving the title to be last considered; all amendments shall be noted in writing and reported to the House by the chairman.
- 28. FILLING BLANKS: All questions, whether in committee, or in the House, shall be put in the order in which they are moved, except in the case of privileged questions and, as a general rule, in filling blanks the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.
- 29. SENATE BILLS: A similar mode of procedure shall be observed with bills which have originated in and passed the Senate as with bills which have originated in the House, except that they shall not be printed nor engrossed or enrolled.
- 30. RECONSIDERATION: No motion for reconsideration shall be in order unless on the same day or the day following that on which the decision proposed to be reconsidered took place, nor unless one of the prevailing side shall move a reconsideration.
- 31. RECONSIDERATION: When notice of intention to move the reconsideration of any bill or joint resolution shall be given by a member, the clerk of the House shall retain the said bill or joint resolution until after the time during which the said motion can be made unless the same can previously be disposed of.
- 32. RECONSIDERATION: Any member who votes on the prevailing side of a question may move a reconsideration of the same, which motion shall be decided by a majority vote.
- 33. WHEN AYES AND NAYS SHALL NOT BE CALLED: The rules of the House shall be observed in committee of the whole House so far as may be applicable except that the ayes and nays shall not be called, the previous question enforced nor the time of speaking limited.
 - 34. MOTION TO ARISE ALWAYS IN ORDER: A mo-

tion that the committee rise shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.

- 35. No bill reported from standing or select committees or from the committee of the whole shall come for a third reading until the first day after such report unless the House, by a two-thirds vote, otherwise orders.
- 36. STANDING COMMITTEES: Standing committees shall be appointed on the following subjects:
 - On Agriculture to consist of thirteen members.
 - On Appropriations to consist of seventeen members.
- On Apportionment to consist of a member from each senatorial district.
 - On Banking to consist of eleven members.
 - On Counties to consist of seven members.
- On Corporations Other Than Municipal to consist of seven members.
 - On Mines and Mining to consist of seven members.
 - On Delayed Bills to consist of five members.
 - On Drainage and Irrigation to consist of eleven members.
 - On Education to consist of thirteen members.
- On Election and Election Privileges to consist of thirteen members.
- On Engrossment and Enrollment to consist of seven memhers.
 - On Federal Relations to consist of seven members.
 - On Game and Fish to consist of seven members.
 - On Industries to consist of fifteen members.
 - On Resolutions to consist of nine members.
 - On Highways and Bridges to consist of fifteen members.
 - On Insurance to consist of thirteen members.
 - On Rules to consist of five members.
 - On Judiciary to consist of seventeen members.
 - On Livestock to consist of seven members.
- On Cities and Municipal Corporations to consist of nine members.
 - On Military Affairs to consist of seven members.
 - On Mileage and Per Diem to consist of three members.
 - On Public Health to consist of nine members.
 - On Public Debt to consist of nine members.
 - On Public Printing to consist of seven members.
- On Revision and Correction of the House Journal to consist of seven members.
 - On Railroads to consist of eleven members.
 - On School and Public Lands to consist of nine members.
 - On State Affairs to consist of seventeen members.

 - On Temperance to consist of eleven members. On Taxes and Tax Laws to consist of fifteen members.
- On Warehouse and Grain Grading to consist of eleven members.
 - On Ways and Means to consist of eleven members.

JOINT COMMITTEES: Also joint committees on the following subjects:

Charitable Institutions to consist of seven members. Educational Institutions to consist of seven members. Penal Institutions to consist of seven members. Insurance to consist of seven members. Labor to consist of seven members. Public Buildings to consist of seven members. Joint Rules to consist of seven members. State Library to consist of seven members.

- 37. WHO SHALL BE CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Committee on Introduction of Delayed Bills shall be selected by the members of the committee. On all other committees the first-named member shall be the chairman, and, in his absence or being excused by the House, the next member named, and so on as often as the case shall happen shall act as chairman.
- 38. DELAYED BILLS: The Committee on the Introduction of Delayed Bills shall receive from the Chief Clerk all bills offered for introduction after the time for introduction as heretofore limited, and shall, on the same or the next day after receiving such bills, report to the House its conclusion whether the introduction thereof should be allowed, and if such report by a majority vote of the committee be in favor of the introduction thereof the bill shall be thereupon deemed duly introduced.
- 39. ENGROSSMENT: The Committee on Engrossment shall examine all bills after they are engrossed and report the same to the House correctly engrossed before their third reading. Said committee may report at any time.
- 40. ENROLLMENT: The Committee on Enrollment shall examine all House bills and memorials, which have passed the two Houses, and when reported correctly enrolled, they shall be presented to the presiding officers of the House and Senate for their signatures and when so signed, presented to the Governor for his approval. Said committee may report at any time.
- 41. SELECT COMMITTEES: Select committees to whom reference shall have been made, must, in all cases, report a state of facts and their opinion to the House.
- 42. MAKER OF MOTION: In all cases where a bill, order or resolution or motion shall be entered upon the Journal of the House, the name of the member moving the same shall be entered on the Journal.
- 43. COURTESY OF FLOOR: No person shall be admitted within the bar of the House except the executive, members of the Senate, state officers, judges of the supreme court and district courts, members of Congress, ex-members of the Legislative Assembly, delegates to the state constitutional convention, all federal officers of the state and reporters for newspapers, except by card of the Speaker. Any

person lobbying on the floor of the House shall forfeit the privileges granted by this rule.

- 44. ORDER OF BUSINESS: After calling the House to order the order of business for the day shall be as follows:
 - 1. Prayer by the Chaplain.
 - 2. Calling the roll.
 - 3. Reference to the Journal.
 - 4. Presentation of petitions and communications.
 - 5. Reports of standing committees.
 - 6. Reports of select committees.
 - 7. Motions and resolutions.
 - 8. Unfinished business.
 - 9. Introduction of bills and memorials.
- 10. First and second readings of House bills and memorials.
 - 11. Third reading of the same.
 - 12. Consideration of messages from the Senate.
- 13. First and second readings of Senate bills and memorials.
 - 14. Third reading of the same.
 - 15. Consideration of General Orders.
- 45. CONFERENCE, COMMITTEE REPORT: Whenever the report of any committee of conference contains several modifications or amendments, any member may have the same divided, and the question of concurrence taken separately upon each modification or amendment.
- 46. COMMITTEE OF WHOLE: When the House has arrived at the "General Orders of the Day" it shall go into committee of the whole upon such orders or a particular order designated by a vote of the House, and no other business shall be in order until the whole are considered or passed, or the committee rise; and unless a particular bill is ordered up the committee of the whole shall consider, act upon, or pass the general order, according to the order of reference.
- 47. MEMBER TO HOLD SPEAKER'S CHAIR: The Speaker may leave the chair, and appoint a member to preside, but not for a longer time than one day, except by leave of the House.
- 48. U. S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES RULES: The rules of parliamentary practice adopted by the House of Representatives of the United States shall govern the House in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the House, and the joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.
- 49. SUSPENSION OF RULES: No rule of the House shall be suspended, altered or amended without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members of the whole House.

- 50. HOUR OF MEETING: The hour of the daily meeting of the House shall be 2 o'clock in the afternoon, until the House directs otherwise.
- 51. ONE-SIXTH MAY DEMAND AYES AND NAYS: The ayes and nays shall not be ordered unless demanded by one-sixth of the members present except on the final passage of bills, concurrent resolutions to amend the Constitution, and memorials, in which case ayes and nays shall be had without demand.
- 52. DIVIDED REPORT: In case that all the members of any committee, required or entitled to report on any subject referred to them cannot agree upon any report the majority and minority may each make a special report, and any member dissenting in whole or in part from the reasonings and conclusions of both majority and minority may also present to the House a statement of his reasonings and conclusions; and all reports, if decorous in language and respectful to the House, shall be entered at length on the Journal.
- 53. SMOKING: No smoking shall be allowed in the House while in session.
- 54. NO PERSON TO REMAIN BY CLERK'S DESK: No member or any other person shall remain by the clerk's desk when the ayes and nays are being called.
- 55. DISORDERLY CONDUCT: In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby or gallery, the Speaker or chairman of the committee of the whole shall have power to order the same to be cleared.
- 56. ABSENT FROM HOUSE: No member or officer of the House, unless he from illness or other cause shall be unable to attend, shall absent himself from a session of the House during an entire day without first having obtained leave of absence, and no one shall be entitled to draw pay while absent more than one day without leave.
- 57. NO REMOVAL OF PAPERS: Neither the Chief Clerk nor his assistants shall permit any records or papers belonging to the House to be taken out of their custody otherwise than in the regular course of business. The Chief Clerk shall report all missing bills, resolutions, and papers to the Speaker; shall have general supervision of all clerical duties appertaining to the business of the House; shall perform, under the direction of the Speaker, all duties pertaining to the office, and shall also keep a book showing the situation and progress of all the bills, memorials and joint resolutions.
- 58. EXPENDITURE OF MONEY: At least one day's notice shall be given of the introduction of any motion or resolution calling for or involving the expenditure of any money.
- 59. MEETING OF COMMITTEES: The chairmen of the different standing committees shall send to the Chief Clerk's desk, to be read previous to adjournment, notice of the time and place of meeting of such committee.

60. AMENDING CONSTITUTION: All bills and resolutions for amendments of the Constitution shall be printed unless otherwise ordered.

Mr. Vogel moved that the above report be made a special order of business for the close of the session tomorrow.

UNITED RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE STATES SUPREME COURT TO EXPEDITE ITS DECISIONS. CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

(Introduced by Mr. W. E. Martin)

Calling upon the Supreme Court of the United States to expedite and hand down its decision in the action of The Farmers Grain Company of Embden, a corporation et al, against Geo. F. Shafer, Attorney General of the State of North Dakota, involving The North Dakota Grain Grading Act, initiated and enacted by the people of the State of North Dakota on November 7, 1922, and which became a law on December 7, 1922.

Be It Resolved, By the Senate of the State of North Dakota, the House of Representatives concurring:

Whereas, The people of the State of North Dakota initiated and enacted An Act declaring the purpose of the State of North Dakota to supervise and regulate the marketing of farm products; preventing unjust discrimination, fraud and extortion in the marketing of same; establishing a system of grading, weighing and measuring farm products; defining the scope and manner of such supervision and the powers and duties of the persons charged with same; providing for licensing buyers, solicitors, and warehouses handling such farm products, and making an appropriation therefor, on November 7, 1922, and which became a law on December 7, 1922, and known as "The North Dakota Grain Grading Act," set forth at page 549 of the Laws of North Dakota for 1923; and

Whereas, the State of North Dakota and its officials were enjoined from enforcing said Grain Grading Act by the service of papers upon them on December 9, 1922, issued out of the United States District Court at Fargo, North Dakota, in the action entitled "The Farmers Grain Company of Embden, North Dakota, a corporation, et al, v. Geo. F. Shafer, as Attorney General of the State of North Dakota, et al;" and that at the hearing thereof on January 5, 1923, at Fargo, North Dakota, a decision was rendered by the said United States District Court permanently enjoining the State of North Dakota and its officials from enforcing said Grain Grading Act; and

Whereas, the State of North Dakota and its officials took an appeal from the said decision direct to the Supreme Court of the United States immediately after the same was rendered; and that thereafter and on the 5th day of May, 1924, was advanced on the calendar of that Court, argued and fully submitted for that Court's decision to finally determine whether or not said Act was unconstitutional or any of the provisions thereof invalid, and that no decision has yet been rendered by said Court; and

Whereas, it has been a great detriment and a great loss to the grain growers of the State of North Dakota in the loss of adequate protection for the balance of the unmarketed crop during the year 1922, and all of the crop and grain for the years 1923 and 1924; and that during this period the farmers and grain growers of this State, who produce an enormous amount of grain, have lost millions of dollars through unjust regulations and discriminations through inadequate protection in the marketing and selling of their grain; and

Whereas, we are assembled in the Nineteenth Session of the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota and will be in session for a period of only sixty days from the sixth day of January, 1925, and that another Session of this Legislature will not convene again for two years, and that the great body of grain growers of our State will be without adequate protection in the marketing and selling of their grain for another two years if the United States Supreme Court should hold that the said Grain Grading Act is unconstitutional in any of its provisions and not render its decision while this Legislative Assembly is still in session, so as to enable it to pass any remedial laws to meet the requirements of said decision, if it should be so held, that the whole law is unconstitutional or any of its provisions;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the Senate of the Nineteenth Legislalitve Assembly of the State of North Dakota, the House of Representatives concurring that we do hereby memorialize the Supreme Court of the United States and respectfully petition the said Supreme Court and all of the Judges thereof, to render an immediate decision in the aforesaid action now pending before it for final determination, so that this Legislative Assembly may be enabled at once to pass any remedial legislation which may be required to meet the provisions of said decision, if any, and to give the grain growers of this State the protection to which they are entitled.

Be It Further Resolved, That the Secretary of the Senate send at once a copy of this resolution, by registered mail, to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, and the Clerk of the United States Supreme Court.

This part of the State being at this time but slightly infested with this weed, it being found in but small patches in widely distributed areas, and as we believe the present weed laws in this State are ineffective to check its spread, and that the law should be amended or remodeled to provide for an effective weed commission and a State Weed Commissioner with full regulatory powers:

Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the farmers of Barnes and LaMoure counties of the State of North Dakota assembled at Marion, North Dakota, on this 29th day of December, 1924, to consider this rapidly approaching menace;

Hon. J. G. Plath, Representative, Bismarck, N. D.

My Dear Mr. Plath:

As Secretary of the Women's Club of Casselton, I was instructed at our last meeting to write to you, and ask you to lend your efforts and support to an appropriation of \$3,000 which will be asked by the State Department of Health, in their work among maternity and infants' welfare work.

As you know, the Sheppard-Towner act comes to the assistance in this matter. The last Legislature appropriated \$1,000. The Federal Government matched this with another \$1,000, the government also gave us outright \$5,000; this made \$7,000 available.

The present Legislature will have to renew this appropriation, or work will have to be discontinued.

The allotment of this State is \$4,362.74 which would have to be matched instead of the \$1,000 they did match.

We are asking and supporting a measure giving \$3,000 for this work this year.

INTRODUCTION, FIRST AND SECOND READING OF HOUSE BILLS

Mr. Burkhart introduced:

House Bill No. 76. A Bill for an Act to Appropriate the Sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars for the Purpose of Paying Attorneys Fees, Incurred by the Special Investigating Committee Appointed by the House of Representatives of the Special Session of the Sixteenth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, in Conducting a Hearing as to the Charges Preferred Against the Library and Those in Charge of Same and Specifically the Charge that had Been Made that Certain Books Specified Were in the Circulating Library, as Authorized and Directed by Said House of Representatives.

Which was read the first and second time and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

The House returned to the Fourth Order of Business.

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

A communication and report from Frank Milhollan, President of the Board of Railroad Commissioners, was read:

Bismarck, North Dakota, January 22, 1925.

To the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota: Gentlemen: By Concurrent Resolution adopted by the Legislative Assembly on January 12th, I was directed to confer with the railroads operating in North Dakota for the purpose of determining what steps the carriers propose to take toward increasing lignite freight rates in North Dakota, and to make full report thereof to the Legislative Assembly within ten days.

Complying with your instructions, I have exchanged several telegrams with the officials of the various railroads operating in North Dakota and conferred with other representa-

tives on Monday, January 19th. The answer of the carriers may be summed up in the following language:

"It is our intention to comply with the suggestion of the Interstate Commerce Commision who have definitely stated that North Dakota lignite rates are too low and the Examiner has suggested a tentative scale which we think is too low. Our plans are indefinite but we expect to take action in accordance with the Interstate Commerce Commission's decision to secure proper rates and avoid reduction in our other coal rates both state and interstate."

In order that the Legislature may understand what is meant by "complying with the suggestion of the Interstate Commerce Commission," I deem it necessary to quote briefly from the decision rendered June 7, 1924. In this case the railroads had proposed increases in freight rates on lignite ranging from 40 to 60 per cent. The Examiner who heard the case for the Interstate Commerce Commission suggested a scale somewhat lower than was proposed by the railroads. In disposing of the matter the Interstate Commerce Commission used the following language:

"We find that respondents (the railroad companies) have not justified the schedules under suspension and an order will be entered requiring their cancellation. further find that the present rates are too low. The record is insufficient to determine specifically proper rates for the future. The examiner who heard the case has suggested to us the scale of rates set forth in appendix Without expressing our opinion as to that 2 hereof. scale we submit it to the parties for the purpose of securing their views as to that scale. The parties may deem it more desirable to confer among themselves to determine proper rates for the future-rates perhaps different from those suggested by the examiner. We will expect the parties to determine which of the two courses outlined they will pursue and to bring to our attention the conclusions they reach."

It is the contention of the carriers that they are bound to follow the suggestions contained in the above paragraph, and that, while they have as yet taken no definite action and their plans for the future are indefinite, they propose to take action in accordance with the suggestions of the Interstate Commerce Commission. In the event that the Interstate Commerce Commission approved a schedule of rates for interstate shipments, the carriers would then seek to justify the same rates for application on shipments within the State before the Board of Railroad Commissioners of North Dakota.

In Appendix No. 1 hereof, will be found the present rates, the rates proposed by the carriers and the rates suggested by the Examiner. Appendix 2 is a statement of lignite shipments originating on all roads in North Dakota for the year 1924. This latter statement shows the per cent of shipments moving to points wholly in North Dakota and the per cent of shipments moving to outside points.

We, the Nineteenth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, beg leave to report to General Frank T. Hines, Director of the United States Veterans' Bureau and Chairman of the Hospital Board thereof; that

Whereas, the said Nineteenth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota is advised that the Tenth District Hospital Location Committee having considered the matter of the location of hospital accommodations for tubercular veterans within the Tenth District, has recommended to the Hospital Board of the United States Veterans' Bureau that a 200-bed hospital be located at Fargo, North Dakota:

Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the House of Representatives of the Nineteenth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, the Senate concurring, that this Legislative Assembly express their appreciation of this recommendation and recognition of the need, welfare and rights of veterans of the World War afflicted with tuberculosis and residing within the State of North Dakota and the territory most convenient to a hospital so located; and this Assembly does most earnestly and respectfully petition General Frank T. Hines, Director of such Veterans' Bureau and Chairman of the Hospital Board thereof, that such recommendation be approved and complied with, and a hospital for tubercular veterans residing in this State and in the extensive territory convenient to the said city of Fargo, be located at said city of Fargo, and that the same be constructed and opened for the care of such patients at as early a date as is practical; that a copy of this Concurrent Resolution be properly engrossed, signed by the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate, and be mailed to General Hines.

We therefore, do hereby recommend that further consideration of such resolution be indefinitely postponed in the interest of the welfare of the taxpayers and the people of the state, and of the efficient work of the House.

House Bill No. 3. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Sections 6, 11, 12 16 and 17 of Chapter 44 of the Special Session Laws of North Dakota, for the Year 1919, Relating to the Registration and Licensing of Motor Vehicles, the Creation of a State Highway Fund, the Distribution of Such Fund, and Repealing All Acts and Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Strike out everything after "a bill" and insert in lieu thereof the following:

For an Act to amend and re-enact Sections 6 and 11, Chapter 44 of the Special Session Laws of North Dakota, for the Year 1919, Relating to the Registration and Licensing of Motor Vehicles, the Creation of a State Highway Fund, the Distribution of Such Fund, and Repealing all Acts and Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith.

Be it Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. AMENDMENT.) That Section 6, Chapter 44, of the Special Session Laws of the State of North Dakota for the year 1919, be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

- Section 6. AMENDMENT.) (a) Every motor vehicle shall be registered annually ,each registration certificate and set of tags being valid until the 31st day of December next following the date of registration. The fee to be paid on all motor vehicles except motorcycles and those used for commercial purposes for registration, re-registration and operation shall be based on the factory selling price in force January 1, each year to which the registration applies. The net weight and horse-power, which horsepower shall be obtained by multiplying the square of the diameter of the cylinder in inches by the number of cylinders and dividing the product by two and one-half. The basic fee shall be calculated at the rate of 5 mills per dollar of said selling price, 20 cents per 100 pounds or major portion thereof of the net weight of vehicle and 10 cents per horsepower as above determined, except electrics, which shall be charged two (\$2.00) dollars in lieu of such horsepower fee. The registration fee for motor vehicles except as hereinafter stated, in the year in which they are first purchased from the dealer, shall be the above basic fee.
- (b) The registration fee for the years subsequent from the year for which the vehicle was purchased from dealer shall be the basic fee as above determined less a 10 per cent reduction for second year, a twenty-five per cent reduction for the third year, and thereafter a forty per cent reduction from the above basic fee, provided that the fee shall at no time be less than five dollars. On motor vehicles of foreign make or of obsolete models or make, regarding which it is difficult to secure information, and on models not on the market January 1, 1919, the Registrar shall set the valuation in a manner as nearly as possible consistent with the prices prevailing January 1, of the year to which the registration applies. For motor trucks, not used for commercial freighting, in addition to the foregoing factors, the fee shall be based on its load capacity, at the rate of \$5.00 per ton for one ton truck, \$7.50 for one and one-half ton truck, \$10.00 for two ton truck, \$15.00 for two and one-half ton truck, \$20.00 for three ton truck, \$30.00 for three and one-half ton truck, \$40.00 for four ton truck, \$60.00 for five ton truck.
- (c) For motor trucks used for commercial freighting, in addition to the factors mentioned in paragraph (a) of this act, an additional fee, based on its load capacity, shall be charged on all motor trucks at the following rate: for one ton trucks \$10.00; one and one-half ton trucks \$15.00; for two ton trucks \$20.00; for two and one-half ton trucks, \$27.50; for three ton trucks \$35.00; for three and one-half ton trucks \$55.00; for four ton trucks \$70.00; for five ton trucks \$130.00; for trucks over five tons \$250.00.

(d) COMMERCIAL PASSENGER TRANSPORTATION.

In addition to the factors mentioned in paragraph (a) of this Act an additional fee shall be charged on all passenger carrying motor vehicles, at the rate of \$10.00 per passenger, carrying capacity of vehicle, seating capacity to be calculated on the seating room of 16 inches per passenger. Provided, further, that upon the installation of any new motor or the addition or change of type of any body or equipment in or upon any registered motor vehicle, the owner shall file with the Registrar a new application blank setting forth such change. All motor vehicles used for the first time during the year after September 1, shall be entitled to a fifty per cent reduction of that year's fee for such vehicle provided that the Registrar is satisfied with the proof given of such fact. The annual license fee for motorcycles shall be \$5.00.

- (e) "Commercial freighting" defined: Commercial freighting shall mean the carriage of things other than passengers, for hire, between points not wholly within the limits of the same city, village or borough; provided, that local dray lines carrying baggage or goods to or from a railroad station from or to places in the vicinity thereof shall not be construed to be engaged in commercial freighting.
- (f) "Commercial Passenger Transportation" defined: Commercial Passenger Transportation shall mean the carriage of passengers for hire between points not wholly within the limits of the same city, village or borough; provided that local bus lines carrying passengers from a railroad station from or to places in the vicinity thereof shall not be construed to be engaged in commercial passage transportation.
- Section 11. AMENDMENT.) (a) A State Highway Fund is hereby created and all moneys received into the State Treasury under the provisions of this Act or any provision of law for highway purposes, shall be expended under the supervision and direction of the State Highway Commission and Motor Vehicle Registration Department. All moneys received into the State Treasury under the provisions of this Act shall be expended in the following manner:
- (b) A sum not to exceed \$150,000.00 per annum shall be set apart to defray the expenses of the State Highway Commission in maintaining the Motor Vehicle Registration Department and in carrying out the provisions of this Act, and in carrying out the provisions and purposes of the State Highway Commission Act, and co-operating with the Federal Government under the Act of Congress approved July 11, 1916 (Public No. 156), entitled "An Act to Provide that the United States shall aid the states in the construction of rural post roads and for other purposes," and in carrying out the provisions of any other law imposing duties or conferring powers on said Commission:
- (c) A further sum not to exceed \$130,000.00 annually shall be set aside to meet the state's obligation as provided in Chapter 73, Session Laws, 1919.
- (d) The sum equal to 75 per cent of the balance following the above deductions from the above gross receipts shall be paid by the State Treasurer out of such funds upon certificate from the Motor Vehicle Registration Department, approved by the state Auditing Board to the several County Treasurers to the account of the Special Road Construction and Maintenance Fund, such funds to be used on county and township-

roads. The Registrar in behalf of the Commission shall file with the State Treasurer and the State Auditor verified quarterly statements of the amounts and sources of all moneys received into the State Treasury under this Act and the amounts to which the several counties are entitled, which funds shall be pro-rated among the counties in the same proportion as that in which the moneys are received. The expenses of maintaining the state highways in any county as directed and supervised by the Commission shall be paid from the Special Road Construction and Maintenance Fund and the remainder thereof shall be expended under the direction of the county commissioners and township supervisor on other highways within the county and townships.

(e) The remaining 25 per cent shall remain in the State Highway Fund, to be expended by the Commission in the various counties of the state in the improvement, maintenance and construction of state highways.

A communication addressed to the Nineteenth Legislative Assembly signed by 28 residents and taxpayers of Stark county requesting the passage of House Bill No. 49, was received and referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

A similar communication to the one above, signed by 122 residents and taxpayers of Dunn county, N. D., was received and referred to the Resolutions committee.

A communication signed by 181 qualified voters of Stark county petitioning the members of the Nineteenth Legislative Assembly to repeal the present cigarette law and enact a substitute measure providing for the licensing and sale of cigarettes in a legitimate way, was received and referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

THE RESOLUTIONS

Be It Resolved, That the County Commissioners of various Counties, now assembled at a convention in the city of Devils Lake, North Dakota, do hereby recommend the following measures:

Whereas, The present session of Legislature has before its consideration a number of bills pertaining to State and Federal system,

Be It Resolved, We recommend the measures as follows:

First. An increase of license fee on automobiles.

Second. That there be a levy of two cent tax per gallon on gasoline used on all motor vehicle traffic, except for farm

purposes, said money to be used exclusively for construction and maintenance of State and Federal roads.

Providing Further, That fifty per cent of money received from the automobile licenses to be reverted back to the several counties to be expended on County roads leading to the Federal or State roads.

Be It Further Resolved, That we favor the continuance of the present administration of the State Highway Department.

Be It Further Resolved, That general election be held only every four years for all County and State offices.

Be It Further Resolved, That we go on record as being opposed to any compulsory hail insurance in North Dakota.

Be it Further Resolved, That we are not in favor of adoption of the Federal amendments in the Constitution of United States controlling child labor.

Whereas, There are, in various counties of our State, courthouses and other public buildings practically all fire-proof,

Be It Resolved, That it should not be compulsory, on the part of the counties to insure said buildings for a specific amount.

Be It Further Resolved, That the bond now provided by law for public administrator, for \$10,000.00, be repealed and provisions made by law where the County Judge would have jurisdiction over the bonding of the public administrators in each particular case.

Be It Futher Resolved, That there is no change made in the tax law provided for exemptions.

Be It Further Resolved, That the law provided for the collection of taxes on personal property be amended, making it unlawful for any person to sell personal property at public auction without first obtaining a receipt showing that all personal taxes have been paid.

Be It Resolved, As it has been the experience of county officials that the statutory provisions with reference to tax judgment procedure, Chapter ——, C. L. 1913, are extremely costly, difficult to understand or follow and yield unsatisfactory results, competent attorneys are unable to construe such provisions, and we believe that same should be repealed and an entirely new procedure provided for.

Be It Further Resolved, That we extend hearty thanks to Walker Bros. & Hardy, of Fargo, North Dakota, for the furnishing, free of charge, programs and so forth, to this association and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to said company.

Be It Further Resolved, That the association extend thanks to the commissioners of Ramsey county, the Commercial club of Devils Lake and all others who so generously par-

ticipated in the entertainment of the County Commissioners while in this session of the association.

Dear Sirs: In accordance with a resolution of the Board of City Commissioners of this city, a certified copy of which is attached, I am directed to notify you that the "Street Car" franchise which the State of North Dakota holds, expired on September 30th, 1923, and to further notify you that if a renewal of the same is desired application must be filed with me not later than the 5th day of February, 1925.

The Board of City Commissioners have also instructed me to call your attention to the following part of Section 3, subdivision "a" of said franchise:

And said grantee shall keep the space between the rails and for a space of one and one-half feet on each side thereof, paved, where the street is, or may hereafter be paved, and in proper repair so as to not interfere with travel over the same, and shall at all times keep and maintain the same paved as aforesaid and in repair and in condition at its own cost and expense, subject to the approval of the street com-

missioner or city engineer as the city council may direct, and shall when notified by the street commissioner or city engineer to pave or repair the same, immediately make such repair as may be necessary.

The Board of City Commissioners request that the State Legislature pass such appropriations as may be necessary to carry out the above terms of this franchise.

Introduced in the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota by G. W. Morton.

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota, the Senate Concurring:

Whereas, A condition exists in the United States and in every state in the Union, which is causing great hardship upon the taxpayers and the citizens of the United States, and has its foundation in the Federal Aid for the building of highways, through moneys appropriated by the Congress of the United States, and that it is resulting in extravagant mismanagement and heavy taxation upon citizens and property owners, who are not financially able to bear the burden; and

Whereas, Since such Federal aid is given only when man-

aged through a State and is given only when heavy appropriations are made by State, which can only be given when heavy appropriations are made by County, that a vicious chain is created, because each state feels that it must maintain a costly and extravagant State Highway Commission in order to obtin the benefits of the Federal aid. Each County feels that in order to obtain the benefits of the Federal and State aid it must maintain an expensive, costly and extravagant machinery for the administration of such road building, and must appropriate large sums of money which its citizens are financially unable to meet, and that since the Federal aid is given, the State feels that it is going to be a heavy loser in comparison with other States unless it maintains the Highway Commission and makes the appropriation, and each County in the State feels that it will be a heavy loser as compared with other Counties unless it makes heavy appropriations, and the result is that the United States is extravagant, and is laying a burden upon its citizens; each state is extravagant, laying a burden upon its citizens; each county is extravagant, laying a burden upon its citizens, and that the result is that as long as the United States Government continues to give Federal aid there can be no lasting relief from the excessive burden of taxation imposed, and the extravagant expenditure of public moneys, and the burden of taxation upon its people without adequate return, and the expenditure of money beyond the means of the people to meet the burden in the payment of taxes; now therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, the Senate concurring: That we do hereby memorialize the Congress of the United States and respectfully urge that Congress take immediate action towards a repeal of the Federal aid for State Highways, to the end that the extravagant mismanagement and ill-advised expenditure of moneys by such State and County in the United States be eliminated, and that a more rational and sane and more carefully supervised expenditure of money be worked out by each local community;

Mr. Speaker: I would like to explain my vote on this proposition. The county agent cost Divide County \$2393.96 for nine months in 1922. For the year 1923 it cost \$3735.93. Therefore, in view of the need of a reduction of taxes I vote "aye" on this bill.

Mr. Burkhart:

Mr. Speaker: I have done considerable studying on this county agent proposition since last Saturday. I also have reason to believe that my county would not support a county agent if it came to a vote, and for the further reason that I do not believe in taxing one county to support a county agent in another county, I vote "aye."

Mr. Burns:

Mr. Speaker: Inasmuch as I am not a farmer and the members of the House have been accused of voting against the farmers I wish to vote "aye."

Mr. Ferris:

Mr. Speaker: On account of another bill being about to be introduced in regard to leaving it to the vote of the different counties as to whether they have an agent or not, I vote "aye."

Mr. Sagen:

Mr. Speaker: For the reason that I have lived in this State for 46 years and have been a farmer all the time and I confess that I do not know everything about farming and am willing to take advice from the county agent on some things, I vote "no."

Mr. Fine:

Mr. Speaker: I have several reasons why I vote "aye" on this bill. I will state two of them only. In the first place the people of my county, like the people of every county in North Dakota, are asking for a reduction in taxes. I see herein a method whereby we can bring about a large reduction in taxes. In the second place, as the gentleman to my left has just stated, we have those in the state who would instruct the farmers just what to do, and sometimes the county agents are among them; experience has proven much of this instruction is ill-advised and resented by the farmers. The farmers of the state are largely opposed to this kind of thing—they have had enough of it. I vote "aye" for this reason.

Section 2905. Examination, Analysis and Test of Seeds for C∈rtification.) Any citizen, firm or corporation of the State of North Dakota, may, in accordance with regulations prescribed by the State Seed Commissioner, prepaying the transportation charges, send a sample or samples, not exceeding ten per year, of seed to said experiment station for examination, analysis or test, and such sample or samples shall be examined, analyzed or tested and reported upon free of charge. For all samples submitted by any citizen, firm or corporation in excess of ten in number per year, a charge of of charge. 50 cents shall be paid for each purity analysis and for each germination test. Any grower of seeds of the state desiring examination, analysis or test of seeds which require for proper certification and listing an examination of the growing crops or fields or stocks of seeds held for sale, may, in accordance with regulation prescribed by the State Seed Commissioner, have such examination made upon payment to the State Seed Commissioner, the sum of \$5.00 to defray the expenses of such examination. To complete the certification of any stock of seed so examined the applicant shall pay to the State Seed Commissioner a certification fee which shall be fixed upon the following itemized scale:

For potatoes, corn, wheat, rye, oats, barley, flax, millet or other small grains or bulky seeds, 1 cent per bushel;

For alfalfa, red clover, alsike, ½ cent per pound;

For brome grass, sweet clover, timothy, wheat grass and other grass seed, ¼ cent per pound.

A minimum fee of \$1.00 shall be paid regardless of the number of bushels or pounds and the maximum fee to be paid shall be \$10.00.

The registration shipping tags including lead seals and wires shall be sold to the applicant at 3c each.

In the case of escaped real property such taxes shall, if entered between the first day of March and the date of the first publication of the tax sale list, be entered upon the most recent delinquent real property tax list; if entered between that date and March first, following such taxes shall be entered upon the current real property tax list. In either case such real property taxes shall be certified to the treasurer by the auditor and entered in the tax list by the treasurer. Taxes upon escaped property for prior years, whether upon real or personal property, shall be subject to the same penalties and collection thereof shall be enforced at the same time and by the same method as other taxes upon the lists upon which they are entered."

Mr. Burkhart moved that the Speaker withhold decision on result of passage of Senate Bill until tomorrow or until he had a chance to get counsel.

Which motion prevailed.

Mr. Brown:

Mr. Speaker: I desire to explain my vote. I am opposed to any legislation that attempts to interfere with the rights of an adult citizen to smoke in whatever form he chooses, whether it be a cigar, a pipe or a cigarette.

But I am heartily in favor of a law that will restrict the sale of tobacco, and in particular cigarettes to minors. I believe this new bill with its strong penalties will better accomplish the purpose intended. I have four boys at home, I do not want them to smoke until they become of age. I am thinking of those boys when I vote on this bill. I assume this responsibility.

Brown votes "aye."

Mr. Cart:

I vote aye on this bill because under the present law any one can ship cigarettes into this state through the United States mails, and as no attempt has been made to get the Congress of the United States to pass legislation to prohibit the carrying of cigarettes through the mails, and until we can prohibit cigarettes from coming into North Dakota, I believe we can better protect the youth of North Dakota by supervising the sale of cigarettes.

Mr. Erickson of Kidder:

Mr. Speaker: I do not use tobacco in any form, but in view of the non-enforcement of the old cigarette law, and believing that under the new law the mothers at home can at least expell the smoker from her home, and believing further that if the mothers and daughters of this state and nation would refuse to associate with smokers they could do more to stamp out cigarettes than any law. And to help them do this, I vote "aye."

Mr. Hempel:

Mr. Speaker: I wish to explain my vote. I am against the repeal of the old law only for the reason that the people in March 15, 1920, election voted 53 out of every 100 against the repeal to 47 out of every 100 for the repeal; and for the further reason that thirty-three counties voted against the repeal and only twenty for the repeal and Sheridan county

voted against the repeal.

If I were sure that we could repeal this law, I would vote for the repeal but I am informed that it requires a two-thirds vote to repeal this law, and which I see now we have not got on the vote, which we just have taken; therefore, I am going to stand by the record as left before me by the election of the people. My personal reason why I think this law should be repealed is because of the lax enforcement. The law we have now is merely "a tree with leaves" and I want it cut down, so that if the people determine that the use of cigarettes is really as harmful as we have been led to believe it is, they will unitedly arise and initiate a law with teeth in it, and at the same time put into office, a law enforcement officer, who will make an honest effort to enforce the law.

Mr. Doyle:

I have four boys, they do not smoke cigarettes, neither do I. But as long as they can get cigarettes the way they can now, with the law the way it is written. I vote "aye."

Mr. Ferris:

Mr. Speaker: Because of the penalty attached to this law, Ithink those handling cigarettes will be afraid to sell them to minors. I vote "aye."

Mr. O'Neill: Mr. Speaker: I don't use tobacco and I have raised a family who do not use tobacco and I am opposed to it in any form but since I came down here, from my observation, there is only two places here that do not handle cigarettes and that is at the Capitol and at the Court House. I vote "aye."

Mr. Sagen:

Mr. Sagen: Mr. Speaker: I have lived in this state nearly all my life. I remember the time when the law was the law and was scrupulously obeyed excepting by criminals. I am more alarmed by the attitude that is taken by the people towards the laws on our statute books and of the laxity of enforcement of the laws than I am of the cigarette. I vote "aye."

Mr. Sproul:

Mr. Speaker: I wish to explain my vote. I do not smoke cigarettes, neither do my boys, nor do I approve of the use of them. I did not come here pledged. Last spring in our legislative district this question came up in regard to the repeal of the present cigarette law.

The vote was unanimous in favor of the repeal. I vote "aye."

Mr. Twichell:

With my friend Mr. Divet I was a member of the legislature in 1913 and I voted for the present cigarette law. Since that, every measure introduced in this House trying to make the anti-cigarette law enforcible, I have worked for, and voted for, many of them I figured out. In this measure I have put in provisions that will make the penalties adequate. I have been disgusted with the non-observance of the law, we run onto every day in the week. The present law is an injury to every young man and woman growing up—it is creating an idea in the mind of every individual of the utter disregard of the laws. I don't believe any legislation was ever presented in this state which has done so much to create a general disregard for law, as the existing law.

With ample provision for enforcing the law and the penalty attached, I vote for this new law and I hope we will have better success with it ,than with the now existing law.

Mr. Vogel:

Mr. Speaker: I vote "aye" on this bill and offer no excuses and no apologies for my vote.

Mr. Watt:

Mr. Speaker: I am one of the men who originally passed the present cigarette law and I have to reluctantly confess that I have come to the conclusion that I have to vote "Aye" on this bill. The question in my mind is this: What is the best thing to do to protect the young people of the coming generation? The present cigarette law has been so utterly disregarded that I have come to the conclusion that we must

try something else. I am offering no excuses. In my opinion it is the thing to do—to vote for a law that public sentiment will get behind and enforce. Therefore I very reluctantly vote "Aye' 'on this bill.

Paul Johnson:

Mr. Speaker: I am not voting for the motive of revenue for the state out of the sale of cigarettes to adults or minors. I have lived for 46 years in this state. I served for 40 years as justice of the peace, for many years as sheriff and a number of years here and must have been a law abiding citizen or I would not be here now. The old cigarette law has seemed to me to be the flattest failure of all the laws that I know of in the state of North Dakota. I do not know of any act in the state that is being so viciously and so recklessly and so daringly and openly violated as the present cigarette law. I have some hopes that possibly the new law may work a little better. That is why I vote "aye" on it.

Senate Bill No. 62 was read the third time.

Mr. Twichell asked the unanimous consent of the House to further amend Senate Bill No. 62 on page 2 last line by striking out the "period" and add "and such funds shall be turned into the general fund of the state." Which request was granted and Senate Bill No. 62 was so amended.

A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Sections 6, 11, 12 16 and 17 of Chapter 44 of the Special Session Laws of North Dakota, for the Year 1919, Relating to the Registration and Licensing of Motor Vehicles, the Creation of a State Highway Fund, the Distribution of Such Fund, and Repealing All Acts and Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Strike out everything after "a bill" and insert in lieu thereof the following:

For an Act to Amend and Re-enact Sections 6 and 11, Chapter 44 of the Special Session Laws of North Dakota, for the Year 1919, Relating to the Registration and Licensing of Motor Vehicles, the Creation of a State Highway Fund, and the Distribution of Such Fund and Repealing all Acts and Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith.

Be it Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. Amendment.) That section 6, Chapter 44, of the Special Session Laws of the State of North Dakota for the year 1919, be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

- Section 6. Amendment.) (a) Every motor vehicle shall be registered annually each registration certificate and set of tags being valid until the 31st day of December next following the date of registration from and after January 1, 1926. The fee to be paid on all motor vehicles except motorcycles and those used for commercial purposes for registration, reregistration and operation shall be based on the factory selling price in force January 1, each year to which the registration applies. The net weight and horse-power, which horse-power shall be obtained by multiplying the square of the diameter of the cylinder in inches by the number of clyinders and dividing the product by two and one-half. The basic fee shall be calculated at the rate of ten mills per dollar of said selling price, 20 cents per 100 pounds of major portion thereof of the net weight of vehicle and 10 cents per horsepower as above determined, except electrics, which shall be charged two (\$2.00) dollars in lieu of such horsepower fee. The registration fee for motor vehicle except as hereinafter stated, in the year in which they are first purchased from the dealer, shall be above basic fee.
- The registration fee for the years subsequent from the year for which the vehicle was purchased from dealer shall be the basic fee as above determined less a 10 per cent reduction for second year, a twenty-five per cent reduction for the third year and thereafter a forty per cent reduceion from the above basic fee, provided that the fee shall at no time be less than five dollars. On motor vehicles of foreign make or of obsolete models or make, regarding which it is difficult to secure information, and on models not on the market January 1, 1919, the Registrar shall set the valuation in a manner as nearly as possible consistent with the prices pre-vailing January 1, of the year to which the registration ap-For motor trucks, not used for commercial freighting, in addition to the foregoing factors, the fee shall be based on its load capacity, at the rate of \$5.00 per ton for one ton truck, \$7.50 for one and one-half ton, \$10.00 for two ton truck, \$15.00 for two and one-half ton truck, \$20.00 for three ton truck, \$30.00 for three and one-half ton truck, \$40.00 for four ton truck, \$60.00 for five ton truck.
- (c) For motor trucks used for commercial freighting, in addition to the factors mentioned in paragraph (a) of this act, an aditional fee, based on its load capacity, shall be charged on all motor trucks at the following rate; for one ton trucks \$10.00; one and one-half ton trucks \$15.00; for two ton trucks \$20.00; for two and one-half ton trucks, \$27.50; for three ton trucks \$35.00; for three and one-half ton trucks \$55.00; for four ton trucks \$70.00; for five ton trucks \$130.00; for trucks over five tons \$250.00.

Provided, however, that there shall be no deduction made in the basic rates as provided in said subdivision "A" hereof, on motor trucks used for commercial purposes by reason of time elapsed since the original purchase thereof from the dealer.

(d) COMMERCIAL PASSENGER TRANSPORTATION

In addition to the factors mentioned in paragraph (a) of this Act an additional fee shall be charged on all passenger carrying motor vehicles, at the rate of \$10.00 per passenger, carrying capacity of vehicle, seating capacity to be calculated on the seating room of 16 inches per passenger. Provided, further, that upon the installation of any new motor or the addition or change of type of any body or equipment in or upon any registered motor vehicle, the owner shall file with the Registrar a new application blank, setting forth such change. All motor vehicles used for the first time during the year after Sept. 1, shall be entitled to a fifty per cent reduction of that vear's fee for such vehicle provided that the Registrar is satisfied with the proof given of such fact. The annual license fee for motorcycles shall be \$5.00.

- (e) "Commercial freighting" defined: Commercial freighting shall mean the carriage of things other than passengers, for hire, between points not wholly within the limits of the same city, village or borough; provided, that local dray lines carrying baggage or goods to or from a railroad station from or to places in the vicinity thereof shall not be construed to be engaged in commercial freighting.
- (f) "Commercial Passenger Transportation" defined: Commercial Passenger Transportation shall mean the carriage of passengers for hire between points not wholly within the limits of the same city, village or borough; provided that local bus lines carrying passengers from a railroad station from or to places in the vicinity thereof shall not be construed to be engaged in commercial passenger transportation.
- Section 11. Amendment.) (a) A State Highway fund is hereby created and all moneys received into the State Treasury under the provisions of this Act, or any other act, or any provision of law for highwayy purposes shall be expended under the supervision and direction of the State Highway Commission and Motor Vehicle Registration Department. All moneys received into the State Treasury under the provisions of this Act shall be expended in the following manner:
- (b) A sum not to exceed \$150,000.00 per annum shall be set apart to defray the expenses of the State Highway Commission in maintaining the Motor Vehicle Registration Department and in carrying out the provisions of this Act, and in carrying out the provisions and purposes of the State Highway Commission Act, and cooperating with the Federal Government under the Act of Congress approved July 11, 1916 (Public No. 156), entitled "An Act to Provide that the United States shall aid the states, in the construction of rural post roads and for other purposes," and in carrying out the provisions of any other law imposing duties or conferring powers on said Commission:

- (c) A further sum not to exceed \$130,000.00 annually shall be set aside to meet the state's obligation as provided in Chapter 73, Session Laws 1919.
- (d) Seventy-five per cent of the balance, following the above deductions from the above gross receipts, shall be paid by the State Treasurer out of such funds upon certificate from the Motor Vehicle Registration Department, approved by the State Auditing Board, to the several county treasurers, to the account of the county road fund such funds to be used in the construction and maintenance of highways within the county, other than state highways. The Registrar in behalf of the Commission shall file with the State Treasurer and the State Auditor verified quarterly statements of the amounts and sources of all monies received into the State treasury under this Act, and the amounts to which the several counties are entitled, which funds shall be prorated among the counties in the same proportion as that in which the monies were received. Such fund shall be expended under the direction of the county commissioners for the construction and maintnance of highways within the county and townships.
- (e) The remaining twenty-five per cent shall remain in the State highway fund, to be expended by the Commission in the various counties of the State, in the construction, reconstruction and maintenance of Federal aid and State aid roads, and in compliance with the provisions of the Act of Congress approved July 11, 1916, entitled "An Act to Provide that the United States shall Aid the States in the Construction of Rural Post Roads, and for other Purposes.

Dear Sir: You have requested of me an opinion upon the question as to whether a two-thirds vote of the members of the Legislature is necessary under the Constitution to enact Senate Bill No. 61, which purports to amend and re-enact Sections 10184 and 10185, of the Compiled Laws of 1913, as amended by Chapter 126 of the Session Laws of 1921.

In reply thereto, beg to advise you that in my opinion Senate Bill No. 61 may be constitutionally adopted by a majority vote of the Legislature as in the case of other bills. The constitutional provision under which the question arises is Article 26 of the Amendments to the Constitution of North Dakota, which Article, among other things, provides:

"No measure enacted or approved by a vote of the electors shall be repealed or amended by the Legislature except upon a yea and nay vote upon roll call of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house."

The statutes which Senate Bill No. 61 seeks to amend and re-enact, namely, Chapter 126 of the Session Laws of 1921, is an ordinary legislative act, and was neither enacted, nor approved by them upon a referendum. There was a measure touching upon the subject of cigarette selling initiated and submitted to the electors at the presidential primary held March 16, 1920, but the same was defeated; and, therefore, never having been enacted, does not come within the provisions of the Constitution requiring a two-thirds vote to amend or repeal.

You also inquire whether, if Senate Bill No. 61 is adopted with an emergency clause attached, the filing of a referendum petition will suspend its operation until it is voted upon and approved by the people.

This question is answered by the language of the same constitutional amendment above referred to which states:

"The second power referred to is the referendum. Seven thousand electors at large may, by referendum petition, suspend the operation of any measure enacted by the Legislature, except an emergency measure."

Any citizen, firm or corporation of the State of North Dakota, may, in accordance with regulations prescribed by the State Seed Commissioner, prepaying the transportation charges, send a sample or samples, not exceeding ten per year, of seed to said experiment station for examination, analysis or test and such sample or samples shall be examined, analyzed or tested and reported upon free For all samples submitted by any citizen, firm or of charge. corporation in excess of ten in number per year, a charge of 50 cents shall be paid for each purity analysis and for each germination test. Any grower of seeds of the state desiring examination, analysis or test of seeds which require for proper certification and listing an examination of the growing crops or fields or stocks of seeds held for sale, may, in accordance with regulation prescribed by the State Seed Commissioner, have such examination made upon payment to the State Seed Commissioner, the sum of \$5.00 to defray the expenses of such examination. To complete the certification penses of such examination. of any stock of seed so examined the applicant shall pay to the State Seed Commissioner a certificate fee which shall be fixed upon the following itemized scale:

For potatoes, corn, wheat, rye, oats, barley, flax, millet or other small grains or bulky seeds, 1 cent per bushel;

For alfalfa, red clover, alsike, 1/2 cent per pound;

For brome grass, sweet clover, timothy, wheat grass and other grass seed, 1/4 cent per pound.

A minimum fee of \$1.00 shall be paid regardless of the number of bushels or pounds and the maximum fee to be paid shall be \$10.00.

The registration shipping tags including lead seals and wires shall be sold to the applicant at 3c each.

Section 2. Amendment.) Section 2906 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for 1913 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

Section 2906. Upon the completion of the examination, analysis or test of seeds provided in Section 2905 of this Article, the State Seed Commissioner shall issue his certificate showing the kind and variety, grade of purity and viability of the seeds examined together with such other facts as shall have been developed by such examination, analysis or test, upon the payment to him of the sum of \$2.00, which certificate shall be accepted as presumptive evidence of the facts therein stated.

Section 3. Repeal.) Section 2910, Compiled Laws of the State of North Dakota for 1913 providing an appropriation for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Article is hereby repealed.

Section 4. Section 2910 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for 1913 is hereby re-enacted to read as follows:

It is equally true that for twenty years it has served as about the only protection for a defendant against whom there was an actual prejudice in the county in which he was charged. The manner of proving prejudice is a long and laborious undertaking entered upon by the procurement of affidavits from a sufficient number of parts of the county to make it appear that a fair jury cannot be obtained in the whole county. It is plain, therefore, that the greater the actual prejudice the more impossible it is to prove it.

For more than twenty years this has proved a satisfactory protection against that possibility of injury. It has, as has been said, been shamefully abused by some practitioners, yet in my judgment its good features so far outweigh its bad ones that I register my vote against it. In doing this I probably owe an apology to the committee because I did not give the matter consideration enough to make my decision at that time.

GENERAL ORDERS

Mrs. Craig moved that the House resolve itself into a committee of the whole for the consideration of general orders; which motion prevailed, and the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

The Speaker called Mrs. Craig to the chair.

When the committee arose it submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker: The Comittee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 149. A Bill for an Act to Create a State Board of Accountancy and Prescribing its Duties and Powers; to Provide for the Examinations of and Issuance of Certificates to Qualified Accountants, with the Designation of Certified Public Accountants; to Provide the Penalty for Violations of the Provisions Thereof; and to Repeal Sections 549, 550, 551, 552, 553, 554, 555, 556 and 557 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1913 and All Other Acts or Parts of Acts in Conflict Therewith.

And recommend that the same be amended as follows:

At the end of Section 8, add the following "All certificates to practice as a certified accountant in North Dakota heretofore issued and in force and effect under the existing laws of this state shall remain in full force and effect unless revoked in manner by this act provided."

In Section 9, line 4, after the letters "tions" add the following: "other than residence in North Dakota."

And when so amended recommend the same do pass. Also.

Mr. Speaker: The committee of the whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 3. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Sections 6, 11, 12 16 and 17 of Chapter 44 of the Special Session Laws of North Dakota, for the Year 1919, Relating to the Registration and Licensing of Motor Vehicles, the Creation of a State Highway Fund, the Distribution of Such Fund, and Repealing All Acts and Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith.

And recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Strike out everything after "A Bill" and insert in lieu thereof the following:

For an Act to Amend and Re-enact Sections 6 and 11, Chapter 44 of the Special Session Laws of North Dakota, for the Year 1919, Relating to the Registration and Licensing of Motor Vehicles, the Creation of a State Highway Fund, and the Distribution of Such Funl and Repealing all Acts and Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. Amendment.) That Section 6, Chapter 44 of the Special Session Laws of the State of North Dakota for the year 1919, be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 6. Amendment.) (a) Every motor vehicle shall be registered annually each registration cretificate and set of tags veing valid until the 31st day of December next following the date of registration from and after January 1, 1926. The fee to be paid on all motor vehicles except motorcycles and those used for commercial purposes for registration, reregistration and operation shall be based on the factory selling price in force January 1, each year to which the registration applies. The net weight and horse-power, which horsepower shall be obtained by multiplying the square of the diameter of the cylinder in inches by the number of cylinders and dividing the product by two and one half. The basic fee shall be calculated at the rate of ten mills per dollar of said selling price, 20 cents per 100 pounds of major portion thereof at the net weight of vehicle and 10 cents per horsepower as above determined, except electrics, which shall be charged two (\$2.00) dollars in lieu of such horsepower fee. The registration fee for any motor vehicle except as hereinafter stated, in the year in which they are first purchased from the dealer, shall be above basic fee. Provided, further, that upon the installation of any new motor or the addition or change of type of any body or equipment in or upon any registered motor vehicle, the owner shall file with the Registrar a new application blank, setting forth such change. All motor vehicles used for the first time during the year after Sept. 1, shall be entitled to a fifty per cent reduction of that year's fee for such vehicle provided that the Registrar is satisfied with the proof given of such fact. The annual license fee for motorcycles shall be \$5.00.

(b) The registration fee for the years subsequent from the

year for which the vehicle was purchased from dealer shall be the basic fee as above determined less a 10 per cent reduction for second year, a twenty-five per cent reduction for the third year and thereafter a forty per cent reduction from the above basic fee, provided that the fee shall at no time be less than five dollars. On motor vehicles of foreign make or of obsolete models or make, regarding which it is difficult to secure information and on models not on the market January 1, 1919, the Registrar shall set the valuation in a manner as nearly as possible consistent with the prices prevailing January 1, of the year to which the registration applies. motor trucks, not used for commercial freighting, in addition to the foregoing factors, the fee shall be based on its load capacity, at the rate of \$5.00 per ton for one ton truck. \$7:50 for one and one-half ton, \$10.00 for two ton truck, \$15.00 for two and one-half ton truck, \$20.00 for three ton truck, \$30.00 for three and one-half ton truck, \$40.00 for four ton truck, \$60.00 for five ton truck.

(c) For motor trucks used for commercial freighting, in addition to the factors mentioned in paragraph (a) of this act, an additional fee, based on its load capacity, shall be charged on all motor trucks at the following rate; for one ton trucks \$10.00; one and one-half ton trucks \$15.00; for two ton trucks \$20.00; for two and one-half ton trucks, \$27.50; for three ton trucks \$35.00; for three and one-half ton trucks \$55.00; for four ton trucks \$70.00; for five ton trucks \$130.00; for trucks over five tons \$250.00.

Provided, however, that there shall be no deduction made in the basic rates as provided in said subdivision "A" hereof, on motor trucks used for commercial purposes by reason of time elapsed since the original purchase thereof from the dealer.

- (d) Commercial Passenger Transportation.) In addition to the factors mentioned in paragraph (a) of this Act an additional fee shall be charged on all passenger carrying motor vehicles, at the rate of \$10.00 per passenger, carrying capacity of vehicle, seating capacity to be calculated on the seating room of 16 inches per passenged.
- (e)" Commercial freighting' 'defined: Commercial freighting shall mean the carriage of things other than passengers, for hire, between points not wholly within the limits of the same city, village or borough; provided, that local dray lines carrying baggage or goods to or from a railroad station from or to places in the vicinity thereof shall not be construed to be engaged in commercial freighting.
- (f) "Commercial Passenger Transportation" Defined: Commercial Passenger Transportation shall mean the carriage of passengers for hire between points not wholly within the limits of the same city, village or borough; provided that local bus lines carrying passengers from a railroad station from or to places in the vicinity thereof shall not be construed to be engaged in commercial passenger transportation.
- Section 11. Amendment.) (a) A State Highway fund is hereby created and all moneys received into the State Treasury under the provisions of this Act, or any other act, or any

provision of law for highways purposes shall be expended under the supervision and direction of the State Highway Commission and Motor Vehicle Registration Department. All moneys received into the State Treasury under the provisions of this Act shall be expended in the following manner:

- (b) A sum not to exceed \$150,000.00 per annum shall be set apart to defray the expenses of the State Highway Commission in maintaining the Motor Vehicle Registration Department and in carrying out the provisions of this Act, and in carrying out the provisions and purposes of the State Highway Commission Act, and cooperating with the Federal Government under the Act to Congress approved July 11, 1916 (Public No. 156), entitled "An Act to Provide that the United States shall aid the states, in the construction of rural postroads and for other purposes," and in carrying out the provisions of any other law imposing duties or conferring powers on said Commission:
- (c) A further sum not to exceed \$130,000.00 annually shall be set aside to meet the State's obligation as provided in Chapter 73, Session Laws 1919.
- Fifty per cent of the balance, following the above deductions from the above gross receipts, shall be paid by the State Treasurer out of such funds upon certificate from the Motor Vehicle Registration Department, approved by the State Auditing Board, to the several county treasurers, to the account of the county road funds such funds to be used in the construction and maintenance of highways within the county, other than state highways. The Registrar in behalf of the Commission shall file with the State Treasurer and the State Auditor verified quarterly statements of the amounts and sources of all monies received into the State treasury under this Act, and the amounts to which the several counties are entitled, which funds shall be prorated among the counties in the same proportion as that in which the monies were received. Such fund shall be expended under the direction of the county commissioners for the construction and maintenance of highways within the county and townships.
- (e) The remaining fifty per cent shall remain in the State highway fund, to be expended by the Commission in the various counties of the State, in the construction, reconstruction and maintenance of Federal aid and State aid roads, ane in compliance with the provisions of the Act of Congress approved July 11, 1916, entitled "An Act to Provide that the United States shall aid the States in the Construction of Rural Post Roads and for other purposes.

And when so amended recommend that the same do pass.

House Bill No. 148. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 3116 of Chapter 342, Session Laws of 1923, Relating to Storage Charges on Grain and Regarding Insurance on Grain Provided for Deposit of Insurance Policies and Disbursement of Funds Derived From Insurance of Stored Grain.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Strike out everything after the words "A Bill" annd insert in lieu thereof the following:

For an Act to Amend and Re-enact Section 3116 of the Compiled Laws of 1913, as amended by Chapter 342, Session Laws of 1923, Relating to Storage Charges and Insurance on Grain and Prohibiting the Transferring or Assigning of Insurance on Grain and Giving Ticket Holders the First Lien on Proceeds of Insurance and also Amending and Re-enacting Section 3114, Compiled Laws of 1913, Giving the Owners of Storage Tickets a Prior Lien on all Grain on Hand in Case of Insolvency.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. Rates of Storage.) The charges for storage and handling of grain shall not exceed the following rates: For receiving, elevating, insuring, delivering and twenty days' storage, two cents per bushel. Storage rates after the first twenty days, one-half cent per bushel for each fifteen days or fraction thereof, and not exceeding five cents per bushel for six months.

All grain, whether on storage ticket or deposit with the warehouseman, shall be kept insured at the expense of such warehouseman for the benefit of the owner. Provided, that no insurance policy covering grain in a public warehouse, elevator or flour mill shall be transferred or assigned, except insofar as the same shall cover on grain not stored, to any person for any purpose whatsoever, and the owners of storage tickets, issued by any elevator, public warehouse or flour mill shall have a first and prior lien and claim on all such insurance for any loss or injury sustained by them on account

of the destruction or injury of such grain by fire or tornado or any other cause covered by such insurance policy.

Section 2. Bailment not a Sale. Insolvency.) Whenever any grain shall be delivered to any person, association, firm or corporation doing a grain, warehouse or grain elevator business in this state and the receipt issued therefor provides for the delivery of a like amount and grade to the holder thereof in return, such delivery shall be a bailment and not a sale of the grain so delivered, and in no case shall the grain so stored be liable to seizure upon process of any court in an action against such bailee, except actions by owners of such warehouse receipts to enforce the terms thereof, but such grain shall at all times in the event of the failure or insolvency of such bailee be first applied exclusively to the redemption of outstanding warehouse receipts for grain so stored with such bailee, and in such event all grain on hand in any particular elevator or warehouse whether the same be stored or not, shall first be applied to the satisfaction of receipts issued by such warehouse.

Section 1. Amendment.) Section 3116 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for 1913, as amended and re-enacted by Chapter 342 of the Session Laws of 1923, is hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 3116. Rates of Storage.) The charges for storage and handling of grain shall not exceed the following rates: For receiving, elevating, insuring, delivering and twenty days' storage, two cents per bushel. Storage rates after the first twenty days, one-half cent per bushel for each fifteen days or fraction thereof, and not exceeding five cents per bushel for six months.

All grain, whether on storage ticket or deposit with the

warehouseman, shall be kept insured at the expense of such warehouseman for the benefit of the owner. Provided, that no insurance policy covering grain in a public warehouse, elevator or flour mill shall be transferred or assigned, except insofar as the same shall cover grain not stored, to any person for any purpose whatsoever, and the owners of storage tickets, issued by any elevator, public warehouse or flour mill shall have a first and prior lien and claim to the value of the grain at the time of destruction at the place where stored on all such insurance for any loss or injury sustained by them on account of the destruction or injury of such grain by fire or tornado or any other cause covered by such insurance policy.

Section 2. Amendment.) Section 3114 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for 1913 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

Section 3114. Bailment Not a Sale. Insolvency.) ever any grain shall be delivered to any person, association, firm or corporation doing a grain, warehouse or grain elevator business in this state and the receipt issued therefor provides for the delivery of a like amount and grade to the holder thereof in return, such delivery shall be a bailment and not a sale of the grain so delivered, and in no case shall the grain so stored be liable to seizure upon process of any court in any action against such bailee, except actions by owners or such warehouse receipts to enforce the terms thereof, but such grain shall at all times in the event of the failure or insolvency of such bailee be first applied exclusively to the redemption of outstanding warehouse receipts for grain so stored with such bailee, and in such event all grain on hand in any particular elevator or warehouse whether the same be stored or not, shall first be applied to the satisfaction of receipts issued by such warehouse.

My Dear Sir. We, the undersigned, respectfully request that you use your influence and vote to discourage the passage of any bill or bills intended to reduce the salary of the Adjutant General of the State of North Dakota, or to limit the period for which he is eligible for reappointment in any manner whatsoever, for the following reasons:

First. The efficiency of the National Guard depends upon a fixed policy extending over a period of years. Any change of Adjutant Generals will mean a corresponding change in the policy every two years which would prevent the present high state of efficiency of the State's National Guard. The Adjutant General should be eligible for reappointment as at present provided for by law, and should be reappointed except when there is conclusive evidence of inefficiency in the administration of the affairs of the office.

Second. It will be impossible to secure a man with the

training, experience and administrative ability of the present Adjutant General for less than \$3000.00 per annum. He has two assistants who have their salaries fixed by law at \$2400.00 per annum and it is ridiculous to expect the chief to work for less than his assistants.

We, therefore, earnestly request that you use your influence to kill the two bills which may be brought before your body.

I will accept another brand and Brown votes "aye."

Mr. Swett:

Mr. Speaker: I vote "aye" on this bill, but in so voting I doubt the wisdom of placing Governor Sorlie or any other one man in control of so large a business, especially when the wish of the people was that the control of the Mill and Elevator Association be vested in the Industrial Commission. It is against my better judgment, but, nevertheless, I vote "aye."

Mrs. Craig:

Mr. Speaker: I believe that two years is too short a time for any man or group of men to succeed in an undertaking like this. Especially is this true in view of the fact that poor deals and outstanding contracts of the Nestos administration, involving tremendous losses, cannot be straightened out until next July. I also believe that an Industrial Commission elected on a platform pledge to the people that they could make this project a success should be expected to keep their promise. I vote "aye" for this measure in face of these facts because this seems to be the only path now before us.

Mr. Vogel:

Mr. Speaker: I vote "aye" on this measure realizing that

two years ago the Independents in this body felt that the Industrial Commission needed the assistance of a board of managers to make it a success and further realizing that it took the Nonpartisan League to elect one man whom the Independents have agreed can make it a success.

O. E. Erickson:

Mr. Speaker: This is another case of selling a birthright for a mess of money. I realize that if this bill carries and should the enemies of the Mill and Elevator have control of both Houses two years hence they would then by a majority vote destroy this industry. Knowing all this, but in view of the fact that this is the only way Governor Sorlie can get money to make it a success while he is in office, I vote "aye."

Mr. Hempel:

Mr. Speaker: I vote "no" for the reason that I do not fully understand the numerous amendments that have been made to this bill—but, my main reason for voting "no" is that, during the three terms that I have been here on the floor of this House, I have never seen a law passed that was worth having, that was as unanimously supported as this bill is. Therefore, I vote "no."

Mr. Fine:

Mr. Speaker: I vote "aye" on this bill because it seems to be the only recourse. I believe, however, it to be a hazardous undertaking because of the possibility of the present governor's demise while in office; and also because a new governor may not have the ability to handle the business alone. I believe the management should be vested in the Industrial Commission as the people intended it should be.

I am opposed to this law that is aimed only at the safebreaker, for the reason that thousands are stolen, from the people, by the "Gentlemen hold ups" to every dollar stolen by the safe breaker. I am opposed for the further reason that the safe breaker now gets up to 30 years, although he may only steal \$1,000.00 while the other hold up—the Gentlemen kind gets away, sometimes, with only "30 days" for a \$70,000.00 hold up." Therefore, I am opposed to this bill since we failed to amend the bill (as I tried hard to amend it), to cover both classes—the same as the first law on the subject—"Thou shalt not steal."

After July 1, 1926, a second grade elementary certificate shall be granted those graduates of North Dakota high schools doing four years' standard work, including three Senior-review subjects, who have completed six weeks' work at a State Normal School, such work amounting to twelve quarter-hour credits to be assigned by the head of such Normal. After July 1st, 1927, twelve weeks of work at a State Normal School shall be required as above provided.

Sec. 2. All acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

"All moneys collected under the provisions of this Act shall be paid over to the State Treasurer and shall be appropriated and covered to the following purposes and funds: from the first moneys so received after the taking effect of this Act there shall be paid and covered into the general fund of the state the sum of Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000) dollars to be used in defraying the general expenses of the state government; annually thereafter a like sum shall be appropriated and covered into the general fund of the state from the first moneys received by the Treasurer from this tax upon gasoline, to be used for like purposes; all other moneys so collected and received by the State Treasurer from any tax upon gasoline, are hereby appropriated and covered to the State Highway Fund, to be expended by the State Highway Commission in the construction, re-construction and maintenance of Federal Aid and State Aid highways, and in compliance with the provisions of the 'Act of Congress approved July 11th, A. D. 1916, entitled 'An Act to Provide that the United

States shall aid the States in the Construction of Rural Post Roads, and for Other Purposes."

The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 8. A Bill for an Act to Establish a State Highway Commission, Prescribing its Powers and Duties, Fixing the Salaries of the Commission and the Employees Thereof, Authorizing the Engagement of Employees and Repealing All Acts and All Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith.

Mr. Sanford:

Mr. Speaker: I wish to explain my vote. This bill is not for the best interest of my district. However, I know there is a general demand throughout the state for a reduction of the number of members in the House and Senate, and for that reason I vote "aye."

Mr. Thompson of Burleigh:

Mr. Speaker: I wish to explain my vote. I am in favor of a re-apportionment and I always have been but when in everything that is brought up here if they have to inject factions into each side—if I could I would vote against both but under this consideration I will have to vote "no."

Paul Johnson:

Mr. Speaker: While I consider this a pretty good bill and not far from one that I had in mind before I even came to Bismarck, yet I have to vote "no" on this bill because I think that it needs some amendments. My ideas are that we must have 33 or 34 districts to do justice to the people but there are two parts of the state that are not getting justice under this bill. They are Grand Forks County and Grand Forks City and Walsh County and the City of Minot. In every other respect I consider it a pretty good bill but as it is I have to vote "no."

To the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

In conformity with the concurrent resolution appearing on page 358, Senate Journal, 1923, the Directors of the State-Historical Society beg leave to submit the following report, of existing and proposed State Parks.

To The Directors of the State Historical Society of the State of North Dakota:

The undersigned committee appointed by you to make a survey of, and report upon, existing, and proposed additional, State Parks, beg leave to report as follows:

The State Park System of North Dakota has been placed under the supervision of the Directors of the State Historical Society. Until 1921 no part of the appropriations made by the legislature for the Historical Society were available for the purchase of historical sites or parks, i. e., all of the funds theretofore appropriated for park purposes were available only for maintenance and improvement. The new policy—inaugurated in 1921—of making the monies appropriated available both for the purpose of acquiring park sites and maintaining available both for the purpose of acquiring park sites and maintaining and improving existing ones has, we think proved very beneficial and enabled the State Historical Society, by working in co-operation with the people adjacent

to places available for State Parks, to obtain park sites which greatly exceed in value the amount of monies expended. We recommend a continuance of this new policy.

We find that the state owns and maintains nine State Parks, having a total area of about 170 acres mostly in small tracts of land located in eight counties, to-wit: Barnes, Kidder, Stutsman, Grant, Renville, Morton, Foster and Richland. Seven historical sites commemorating the events of the Indian Wars in 1862, have, also, been acquired.

There are a number of State Park Projects, where the land is or has been acquired either by purchase or gift, but where the title is still incomplete.

We have appended to this report a list of our State Parks and Historic Sites, as well as all incomplete park projects with such data as will show the location and the approximate size of each park. Probably the most important portion of this report, however, is the appended list of proposed parks.

We sincerely hope that the Directors of the Historical Society and Members of the Legislative Assembly, who have requested a report upon State Parks will give to that subject the consideration which it deserves.

The general purpose of State Parks is to foster state pride and to save, unmarred, characteristic scenic features of our geography; also, to preserve places having historical significance. There has lately been a general awakening on the part of the people not only within this state, but elsewhere, that North Dakota has, indeed, many places of unusual natural beauty, as well as places of historical significance second to none among the western states.

Three general purposes are served by the State Park System as it has been administered so far, to-wit:

- 1. Preservation of historical sites, and such earth works, buildings and other remains thereon as are likely to be distroyed.
- 2. Outdoor museums where the native plants and animals of the State can be preserved from destruction.
 - 3. Community centers for public gatherings of every sort.

Under the regulations of the State Historical Society its Directors appoint a local Park Commission of three or five members for each park and the local commission has charge of the maintenance of each of the parks and must approve and sign all vouchers for expenditures in connection therewith.

We believe that the State Historical Society should co-operate with the State Highway Commission and with the State Game and Fish Commission; that the State Engineer should be authorized and required, so far as the same may be done without interference with any of the regular duties of his office, to have employees of his department make the necessary surveys incident to the establishment and maintenance

of State Parks without cost to the Historical Society. The location of all parks and historic sites should be noted on the road maps of the state in order that the people of the state and tourists traveling through it may visit them. The great majority of people are interested in, and would be glad to visit sites of the various Forts. Battlefields and other points of interest throughout the state. All of the State Parks ought to be refuges for birds and wild game.

It has been the policy of the Historical Society to cooperate with the cities and counties in creating community centers and in such cases to share the expense incident to the acquisition and maintenance of State Parks equally, and in certain instances donations have been obtained from public spirited citizens.

We are of the opinion that the acquisition and development of state parks ought to be continued with increased zeal as we sincerely believe that a well planned system of properly developed state parks will be an asset of immeasurable value to the State and its people.

Your committee begs leave to make the following general recommendations:

- 1. That the Directors of the State Historical Society name a State Park Commission of five members to have general charge of the State Parks, whose special duty it shall be to arrange for the acquisition of additional state parks either by gift or purchase. We further recommend that in addition the State Engineer and Chairman of the Fish and Game Commission be ex-officio members of such State Park Commission.
- 2. That the members of the State Park Commission serve without pay: but that, if possible, provision be made for the payment of the actual expenses incident to their work.
- 3. That the State Engineer be required to furnish the State Park Commission with all necessary assistance in surveying and platting park sites, without interference with the work of his department.
- 4. That the State Park Commission be required to make a report to each general legislative assembly on the progress made in the development of the State Park System.
- 5. In 1921, the Legislative Assembly adopted a resolution memoralizing Congress to create the Roosevelt National Park out of a section of the Badlands. (Laws 1921, p. 243.) The movement so inaugurated should not be abandoned. We believe that the legislative assembly new in session ought to take some appropriate action in the matter; and effort ought to be made to have a Congressional Committee, and accredited representatives of the Department of the Interior, ex-

amine the proposed National Park so that information from an impartial source may be available to Congress in dealing with the matter.

- 7. Heart River State Park, Site of Sully's camp on Heart River, wagons and emmigrant train, 1864—not to exceed 10 acres; Stark county, South line of NW 4 Sec. 10, Twp. 137, N. R., 91 W.
- 8. Fort Clark State Park, Sites of Two Mandan Villages visited by Lewis & Clark in 1804-5; Mercer county; portions of Sections 16 and 36, Twp. 144, N. R., 85 W.

- 12. Choke Cherry Island State Park; Sargent County, SW ½ Sec. 36, Twp. 132, N. R., 54 W. This proposed park is located on school land, and the state authorities ought to set aside from sale or lease such unsold land in the above named quarter section as is included within Choke Cherry Island until the State Historical Society can purchase the same. This would make a desirable bird reserve, and the land has at present little commercial value.—Not to exceed 40 acres.
- 13. Hawk's Nest State Park, Hawk's Nest Butte. Well known historic land mark. Numerous Indian earthworks and other remains. Wells county—not to exceed 40 acres.
- 14. Col. C. B. Little State Park; the site of a Mandan Indian Village in Burleigh County; NE¼ Sec. 21, Twp. 140, R. 81—about 20 acres
- 15. Killdeer Mountain Park. We believe that one of the most desirable places in this state for a State Park is in the Killdeer Mountains. Here a tract of land covering several sections ought to be acquired. The proposed Roosevelt National Park in the Badlands does not include the Killdeer Mountains.

When we took a vote on this bill before I asked for an amendment to the bill. I would like very much to see this bill amended. The fact is that this bill is not just. It is nearly the right thing, but not just as it should be.

They have tied themselves down to a narrow way of thinking. They have been following political lines.

Take for instance the City of Grand Forks and the County of Grand Forks. They have almost 29,000 people and they are entitled to a larger representation, but under this bill they will not get it because there is just a few lacking. The same is true of Ward County and the City of Minot.

For example take Pembina County. It has only 15,000 people. Ward County has almost exactly twice that number. So has Grant County. This bill is what we need but it should be amended. It is not what we want in its present form. I vote "No."

Mr. Vogel:

Mr. Speaker: I wish to explain my vote. I vote "aye" on this bill because the people of this state are demanding economy in government. By this method a saving of some \$20,000.00 in salaries alone can be made. I am voting "aye" on this bill also for the reason that they are also demanding justice in representation. THIRD READING OF HOUSE BILLS

The Speaker read the following from Robert's Rules of Order, Page 174, Rule 40:

Dilatory, Absurd, or Frivolous Motions. For the convenience of deliberative assemblies, it is necessary to allow some highly privileged motions to be renewed again and again after progress in debate or the transaction of any business, and to allow a single member, by calling for a division, to have another vote taken. If there was no provision for protecting the assembly a minority of two members could be constantly raising questions of order and appealing from every decision of the chair, and calling for a division on every every decision of the chair, and calling for a division on every vote, even when it was nearly unanimous, and moving to lay motions on the table, and to adjourn, and offering amendments that are simply frivolous or absurd. By taking advantage of parliamentary forms and methods a small minority could practically stop the business of a deliberative assembly having short sessions, if there was no provision for such contingency. Congress met it by adopting this rule: (Rule 10: Rules of House of Representatives) 'No dilatory motion shall be entertained by the Speaker.' But, without adopting any rule on the subject, every deliberative assembly has the inherent right to protect itself from being imposed has the inherent right to protect itself from being imposed upon by members using parliamentary forms to prevent it from doing the very thing for which it is in session, and which these forms were designed to assist, namely, to transact business. Therefore, whenever the chair is satisfied that members are using parliamentary forms merely to obstruct business, he should either not recognize them or else rule them out of order. After the chair has been sustaind upon an appeal, he should not entertain another appeal from the same obstructionists while they are engaged evidently in trying by that means to obstruct business. While the chair should always be courteous and fair, he should be firm in protecting the assembly from imposition, even though it be done in strict conformity with all parliamentary rules except this one, that no dilatory, absurd or frivolous motions are allowed.

"Inasmuch as the law provides that all House Bills must be passed and messaged to the other House on the 50th day, and less than three-quarters of an hour remains for the passage of these two bills, I rule that these motions are dilatory tactics. For this reason I refuse to recognize them.

Explanation of A. G. Divet on House Bill No. 279:

Mr. Roberts:

Mr. Speaker: It is not so bad to be fleeced, provided the one fleeced may know just how and why the fleecing is done.

In other words, the knowledge of how the fleecing is done

will, in a measure, mitigate the pain of fleecing.

On the other hand, a thorough understanding of the manner in which a receivership is actually handled, if such receivership is right and just to everybody, will do much to bolster up public confidence, which is, I believe, any banker's most valuable asset.

Furthermore, there is at the present time a great lack of confidence in receivership as at present provided for, particularly among the various parties having claims against closed banks, which matter is not short of a suspicion of wholesale

fleecing of the claimants.

I vote "aye" on this bill believing that a local receivership, entrusted with a full knowledge of the bank's affairs, to be composed of the rightful owners of the bank's assets, will tend to a better understanding.

"The Speaker read the following from Robert's Rules of Order, page 174, Rule 40:

"DILATORY, ABSURD, OR FRIVOLOUS MOTIONS. For the convenience of deliberative assemblies, it is necessary to allow some highly privileged motions to be renewed again and again after progress in debate or the transaction of any business, and to allow a single member, by calling for a division, to have another vote taken. If there was no provision for protecting the assembly a minority of two members could be constantly raising questions of order and appealing from every decision of the chair, and calling for a division on every vote, even when it was nearly unanimous, and moving to lay motions on the table, and to adjourn, and offering amendments that are simply frivolous or absurd. By taking advantage of parliamentary forms and methods a small minority could practically stop the business of a deliberative assembly having short sessions, if there was no provision for such contingency. Congress met it by adopting this rule: (Rule 10: Rules of House of Representatives) 'No dilatory motion shall be entertained by the Speaker.' But ,without adopting any rule on the subject, every deliberative assembly has the inherent right to protect itself from being imposed than the members using parliamentary forms to provent it. upon by members using parliamentary forms to prevent it from doing the very thing for which it is in session, and which these forms were designed to assist ,namely, to transact business. Therefore, whenever the chair is satisfied that members are using parliamentary forms merely to obstruct business, he should either not recognize them or else rule them out of order. After the chair has been sustained upon an appeal, he should not entertain another appeal from the same obstructionists while they are engaged evidently in try-ing by that means to obstruct business. While the chair should always be courteous and fair, he should be firm in protecting the assembly from imposition, even though it be done in strict conformity with all parliamentary rules except this one, that no dilatory, absurd or frivolous motions are allowed.

"Inasmuch as the law provides that all House Bills must be passed and messaged to the other House on the Fiftieth day, and less than three-quarters of an hour remains for the passage of these two bills, I rule that these motions are dilatory tactics. For this reason I refuse to recognize them.

The report shall also set forth a list of all persons in the employ of the Commission, with the name of each person drawing a salary under its authority, the amount of the salary and all other emoulments received, and the fund from which drawn." "The State Examiner shall personally or through deputy examiners visit the Bank of North Dakota at least twice annually, and shall inspect and verify the assets in its possession and under its control, with sufficient thoroughness of investigation to ascertain with reasonable certainty whether the valuations are correctly carried on its books. He shall investigate its methods of operation and accounting. He shall report the results of each such examination and investigation to the Industrial Commission as soon as practicable, and to the Legislative Assembly at its next ensuing session, and as provided in paragraph numbered 5, of Section 5146 of the Civil Code, Compiled Laws 1913, to the State Banking Board."

Whereas, Section 10 of Chapter 152 of the Session Laws of 1919, provides as follows:

"The State Examiner shall personally or through deputy examiners visit the Association at least twice annually, and shall inspect and verify the assets in its possession and under its control, with sufficient thoroughness of investigation to ascertain with reasonable certainty whether the valuations are correctly carried on its books. He shall report the results of each such examination and investigation to the Industrial Commission as soon as practicable, and to the Legislative Assembly at its next ensuing session."

Whereas, the State Examiner and the Industrial Commission have failed or neglected to make the reports required to be made by them to this Legislative Assmbly in accordance with Section 6 of Chapter 151, Section 23 of Chapter 147, and Section 10 of Chapter 152, of the Session Laws of 1919; And

Whereas, It is of vital importance that the members of this Legislative Assembly and the people of this State should know the financial condition of our industrial institutions; Therefore

Be It Resolved, That the State Examiner and the Industrial Commission are requested to forthwith submit to the Legislative Assembly the reports required of them by the above mentioned sections of the Industrial Commission, Bank of North Dakota and Mill and Elevator Acts, or inform this Legislative Assembly why the provisions of these Acts have not been complied with.

Senate Bill No. 292. A Concurrent Resolution Memorializing the Congress of the United States to Take Steps Toward the Establishment of a National Park in Billings County, North Dakota, Embracing the Wonderful Petrified Forest There Located ,to be Called Roosevelt Park.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Strike out everything after the enacting clause and insert the following:

We, the Nineteenth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, beg leave to represent to your honorable bodies:

First: That there is in the western part of North Dakota, lying within the boundaries of Billings, Golden Valley, Slope and McKenzie counties, a tract of land bordering the Little Missouri river, that is marvelous in its geological formation and configuration as the result of subterranean coal fires, sinking in of the surface, and the washings and slides of the ages, the whole forming a scenic beauty alike wierd and attractive. Here are seen the stratas in many colors, of the world's progressive deposits, among which many prehistoric animal remains have been found, together with the fossils of

periods long before the time of man, the peaks, precipices, slides and washouts presenting a picture even now attracting tourists from all over the country.

Second: That in this section is found a petrified forest, the like of which, we are informed, does not exist upon the American continent, in fact that all over this region are found the remains, in petrified and crystalized form, of two distinct forests that thrived at periods probably millions of years apart, and brought to view as the surfaces are uncovered by the washings of the ages. This petrified forest lies in a region of superb, though rugged beauty, and is unlike others in that respect. Thousands of stumps are found here, some of the stumps being as large as 14 feet in diameter, and many rest on tall columns of clay, resembling the pillars of a ruined temple. It is a veritable wonderland of growths that existed in the time of the huge animal and vegetable life of the early world periods, and much of these remains will be destroyed or carried away by visitors unless properly protected.

Third: That here can even now be seen Nature continuing her work of transforming prairie land into "Bad Lands" through the burning of the coal far beneath the surface, and the dropping of the upper earth crust hundreds of feet into the great caverns created by the fires, leaving a wierd and awesome landscape. The smoke from these hidden fires creeps up through crevases and in places, far down, a dropped cartridge can be heard exploding, while everywhere great piles of red scoria tell of clay burned to a brick-like substance and furnishing a splendid roadmaking material.

Fourth: That in the valleys of this region are frequent groves of pine, quaking aspens, cedars, ash, cottonwood and box elder trees, and an abundance of wild fruits, together with a flora undiscovered elsewhere in the Northwest. The region contains many springs of fine water from which rivulets are formed that flow down the swales and valleys to the river, thus affording a good water supply for livestock or wild animals, there being deer and antelope now in that region, with capacity for feeding thousands more of these or other wild game. Flowing artesian wells can be had for the digging.

Fifth: That it was here that Theodore Roosevelt had his cattle ranches in the early days of the territory of Dakota, and where undoubtedly he imbibed many of the characteristics of those who live in the great open spaces and which gave him the broad outlook that ever characterized his later life. And it is partly in memory of him and because this region presents itself as a great natural outing place or playground for those who love Nature or seek its fantastic wonders that we respectfully memorialize you, the Congress, to set aside so much of this region as may be deemed necessary for the creation by act of Congress a national park and to make an appropriation of a sum sufficient for its purchase, and we would respectfully suggest that such park, if created, be called the Roosevelt Bad Lands National Park. And we would call attention to the fact that less than five per cent of this land is susceptible to cultivation, that considerable of it is still in government ownership and that the balance can be acquired at a very small expense.

And we further call your attention to the fact that Yellowstone trail, a great transcontinental highway, the touches this region at its southern end; that the National Parks Highway, another great transcontinental highway, passes through it, and that the Roosevelt Highway passes by its Northern end, making it easy of access by the thousands of tourists who travel back and forth through North Dakota each year. And we also call your attention to the fact that in 1924 over 2,000,000 tourists in about 75,000 cars passed over the National Parks Highway alone, hundreds of whom made the necessary detour through the proposed park region to view its beauties and the petrified forest, even taking saddle horses to reach its more inaccessible beauties. And we still further call your attention to the fact that between the Park Region of Northern Minnesota and the Yellowstone park there is no other place of national Park standard where tourists may vary their journey by a glimpse of one of Nature's most peculiar achievements.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That a copy of this memorial be sent by the secretary of State of North Dakota to the President of the United States, to the Secretary of the interior, to each house of Congress, to the North Dakota senators and congressmen and to the Director of the National Parks Service, all of Washington, D. C., and that we request our congressional delegation to use their every effort to secure passage of a bill creating said national park.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

"Sec. 1369. High School Diplomas. Diplomas from North Dakota high schools doing four years' work, granted to graduates who are at least eighteen years of age and who have had psychology, school management and methods of instruction and three senior-review subjects, shall be recognized for second grade elementary certificates, valid for two years from date of issuance; if within two years from the date of the diploma the holder has had at least eight months' successful experience in teaching, he shall be entitled to a first grade elementary certificate. After July 1, 1926, a second grade elementary certificate shall be granted those graduates of North Dakota high schools doing four years' standard work, including three senior-reviews subjects, who have completed six weeks' work at a State Normal School, such work amounting to twelve quarter-hour credits to be designed by the head of such Normal. After July 1st, 1927, twelve weeks of work at a State Normal School shall be required as above provided.

"Sec. 2. All Acts and parts of Acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed."

Mr. O. F. Anderson:

Mr. Speaker: I vote "no" on Senate Bill No. 199 for the following reason: There has never been in the history of the State any shortage of Legislative candidates, and it has not been proven that the State will suffer in years to come therefrom.

Tax reduction has been talked of for a long time, but when it is brought home in a forceful way such as a reduction or making wages stay at a figure as set, there is nothing doing.

This legislative body has had several chances to reduce salaries so as to bring this home, but each and every time such bills has been voted down. There is no reason to believe that by raising the salary of the legislative members a better class of representatives will be secured. Therefore, I vote "no."

Mr. Miller of Williams:

Mr. Speaker: If men who can command from \$25 to \$50 a day for their services on the outside of this House, and are working for \$5 in this House, then the farmer who has worked on the farm at a loss, can also work for the five dollars a day in this House. The way he has voted on many of these bills, he is not entitled to the Five. I vote "no."

Mr. Watt:

Mr. Speaker: I want to vote "aye' on this bill and I want to explain my vote. I have been a member of this legislature for five sessions and I have always felt that the members were not getting a reasonable compensation for their services. Many of the members are farmers and when they leave home they have to hire a man and pay him all the time they are here and when they get home they are in the hole. The state ought to pay as much as it costs a member to come here.

I vote "aye" on this bill. I do not expect that I will ever come back here as a member, but I want to see justice done to the men and women who do come back. This will be submitted to the people. They should be willing to pay a reasonable compensation to teh members who come here. I vote "aye."

Mr. Johnson of Pembina:

Mr. Speaker: I wish to explain my vote. I hardly think that the members of this Legislature are getting enough. It seems that the members of this House have not seen fit to take advice, which I have repeated so often to cut down the membership one-half or from 35 to 40 per cent. I do not feel like adding bigger burdens to the taxpayers of the state than they are already carrying; the expense of \$65,000 or \$70,000 that is paid out every time we come here is too much now. My idea is to cut the membership down about 40 per cent and then pay each member \$7.00 or \$7.50 per day. For these reasons I vote "no."

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Mr. Hempel:

Mr. Speaker: I wish to explain my vote and I am not ashamed to have it printed in the Journal. I am going to vote "aye" on this law for the following reasons: I feel that every member who comes down here in the interest of the

people is fully entitled to receive (for expenses and salary together) the sum of \$8 per day, and for the further reason that we are paying certain employees in certain of the state institutions as high as \$20 per day for every week day during the year, and knowing full well that this bill will first come before the people and before the people of my county before it can become a law, and if they feel that I have overstepped my duty in thus voting for this bill, they have a perfect right to say that I shall never represent them again, and that this bill shall not become a law.

Senate Bill No. 292. A Concurrent Resolution Memorializing the Congress of the United States to Take Steps Toward the Establishment of a National Park in Billings County, North Dakota, Embracing the Wonderful Petrified Forest There Located, to be Called Roosevelt Park.

And recommend that it be amended as follows: Strike out everything after the enacting clause and insert the following:

We, the Nineteenth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, beg leave to represent to your honorable bodies:

First: That there is in the western part of North Dakota, lying within the boundaries of Billings, Golden Valley, Slope and McKenzie counties, a tract of land bordering the Little Missouri river, that is marvelous in its geological formation and configuration as the result of subterranean coal fires, sinking in of the surface, and the washings and slides of the ages, the whole forming a scenic beauty alike wierd and attractive. Here are seen the stratas in many colors, of the world's progressive deposits, among which many prehistoric animal remains have been found, together with the fossils of periods long before the time of man, the peaks, precipices, slides and washouts presenting a picture even now attracting tourists from all over the country.

Second: That in this section is found a petrified forest, the like of which, we are informed, does not exist upon the American continent, in fact that all over this region are found the remains, in petrified and crystalized form, of two distinct forests that thrived at periods probably millions of years apart, and brought to view as the surfaces are uncovered by the washings of the ages. This petrified forest lies in a region of superb, though rugged beauty, and is unlike others in that respect. Thousands of stumps are found here, some of the stumps being as large as 14 feet in diameter, and many rest on tall columns of clay, resembling the pillars of a ruined temple. It is a veritable wonderland of growths that existed in the time of the huge animal and vegetable life of the early world periods, and much of these remains will be destroyed or carried away by visitors unless properly protected.

Third: That here can even now be seen Nature continuing her work of transforming prairie land into "Bad Lands" through the burning of the coal far beneath the surface, and the dropping of the upper earth crust hundreds of feet into the great caverns created by the fires, leaving a wierd and awesome landscape. The smoke from these hidden fires creeps up through crevases and in places, far down, a dropped cartridge can be heard exploding, while everywhere great piles of red scoria tell of clay burned to a brick-like substance and furnishing a splendid roadmaking material.

Fourth: That in the valleys of this region are frequent groves of pine, quaking aspens, cedars, ash, cottonwood and box elder trees, and an abundance of wild fruits, together with a flora undiscovered elsewhere in the Northwest. The region contains many springs of fine water from which rivulets are formed that flow down the swales and valleys to the river, thus affording a good water supply for livestock or wild animals, there being deer and antelope now in that region, with capacity for feeding thousands more of these or other wild game. Flowing artesian wells can be had for the digging.

That it was here that Theodore Roosevelt had his Fifth: cattle ranches in the early days of the territory of Dakota, and where undoubtedly he imbibed many of the characteristics of those who live in the great open spaces and which gave him the broad outlook that ever characterized his later life. And it is partly in memory of him and because this region presents itself as a great natural outing place or playground for those who love Nature or seek its fantastic wonders that we respectfully memorialize you, the Congress, to set aside so much of this region as may be deemed necessary for the creation by act of Congress a national park and to make an appropriation of a sum sufficient for its purchase, and we would respectfully suggest that such park, if created, be called the Roosevelt Bad Lands National Park. And we would call attention to the fact that less than five per cent of this land is susceptible to cultivation, that considerable of it is still in government ownership and that the balance can be acquired at a very small expense.

And we further call your attention to the fact that Yellowstone trail, a great transcontinental highway, touches this region at its southern end; that the National Parks Highway, another great transcontinental highway, passes through it, and that the Roosevelt Highway passes by its Northern end, making it easy of access by the thousands of tourists who travel back and forth through North Dakota each year. And we also call your attention to the fact that in 1924 over 200,000 tourists in about 75,000 cars passed over the National Parks Highway alone, hundreds of whom made the necessary detour through the proposed park region to view its beauties and the petrified forest, even taking saddle horses to reach its more inaccessible beauties. And we still further call your attention to the fact that between the Park Region of Northern Minnesota and the Yellowstone park there is no other place of national Park standard where tourists may vary their journey by a glimpse of one of Nature's most peculiar achievements.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, That a copy of this memorial be sent by the secretary of State of North Dakota to the President of the United States, to the Secretary of the interior, to each house of Congress, to the North Dakota senators and congressmen and to the Director of the National Parks Service, all of Washington, D. C., and that we request our congressional delegation to use their every effort to secure passage of a bill creating said national park.

Mr. Speaker: Your Joint Committee of the House and Senate on State Affairs to whom was referred the matter of investigation of conditions at the State Hospital for the Insane at Jamestown, North Dakota, beg leave to report that the conditions at such institution have been inquired into as this Joint Committee has been able: that this Committee has some time since suggested to the Governor that he appoint a special committee to visit the instituion here as well as certain reports and matter brought before this committee by numerous affidavits. The Governor named a special committee of three, two from the House and one from the Senate, consisting of Representatives Standley and Sanford and Senator Fredrickson; this special committee visited the institution without divulging that they were there for such purpose or as representatives of the Legislature. They have made their report to the Joint State Affairs Committee, and upon such report and investigations made by this Joint Committee and hearings had before us, we make to the House and Senate the following report:

- 1. The food furnished patients of the hospital is ample and of good quality.
- 2. All patients engaged in outdoor work are furnished with ample and sufficient clothing.
- 3. Any employee found treating an inmate roughly or brutally is immediately discharged.
- 4. The patients with whom the special committee conferred had no complaints to make as to the quantity or quality of the food furnished or the treatment received by them.
- 5. Sick wards are kept in a sanitary condition, and patients therein are well cared for and found free from bed sores.
- 6. The patients in violent wards are not placed in restraint except upon directions to do so given by an institution physician.
- 7. Tubercular patients are segregated in a separate ward and are given special and proper care.
- 8. All buildings, corridors, grounds and premises have been greatly improved in their condition during the past five years.
- 9. The exercise provided to patients by the occupational therapy department, inaugurated some years ago, appears as of great benefit to these patients. Incidentally, this department affords ready practical utilization for various items otherwise wasted, such as old garments, rags, etc.; the institution at present having some two thousand rugs and a large number of wicker-work baskets made by the patients in this department.

As a result of investigations made by the special investigating committee appointed by the Governor at the instance of this your Joint Senate and House Committee on State Affairs, and by this your Joint State Affairs Committee, we, your said Committee, are satisfied that the State Hospital for the Insane is so conducted as to best care for and maintain the inmates, that such inmates are given proper and

ample food, clean and sufficient clothing, their physical and mental condition properly supervised and cared for, that the relatives and friends of such inmates can feel that they are being well looked after and cared for in the best manner practical.

The numerous affidavits and statements submitted to this Committee have been by them duly filed with the Governor and the Board of Administration.

We would recommend that steps be taken to provide at this institution for the early erection of a separate building to house the attendants employed there.

After July 1, 1926, a second grade elementary certificate shall be granted those graduates of North Dakota high schools doing four years' standard work, including three senior-reviews subjects, who have completed six weeks' work at a state Normal School, such work amounting to twelve quarter-hour credits to be designed by the head of such Normal. After July 1st, 1927, twelve weeks of work at a State Normal School shall be required as above provided. "Sec. 2. All Acts and parts of Acts in conflict herewith

are hereby repealed."

Whereas, The weed known as perennial Sow Thistle has been by the laws of this State declared a noxious weed and a common nuisance and statutes have been enacted looking to and requiring the eradication thereof; and,

Whereas, Proper steps have not been, and are not now being taken to eradicate this Sow Thistle by any owner of premises infested therewith; and whereas, railroad companies traversing territory where Sow Thistle has appeared have failed to eradicate the same from their right-of-way and other lands; the Federal authorities having control of Indian lands, have neglected and failed to take steps to destroy this menace to the agricultural interests of a considerable portion of the State; county commissioners, weed commissioners and township officials, and others having the enforcement of these laws are not properly enforcing the same or taking steps to eradicate Sow Thistle . Now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Nineteenth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, the Senate Concurring: That these provisions of law and the necessity of the eradication of Sow Thistle, be and they are hereby called to the attention of the railroad companies operating within the State, of the Federal authorities having the care and control of all Indian and public lands with-

in the State, of the several boards of county commissioners, of weed commissioners and township boards; that these owners and custodians of land infested with Sow Thistle, and these public officials above referred to, together with the officials of the Agricultural College of North Dakota, all county agents, and all others engaged in agricultural extension work, be and they are, hereby requested and solicited to take any and all steps necessary to the eradication of such Sow Thistle upon the premises owned by them or under their custody and control, or within the county or township of which they may be respectively officials; and this legislative body would by this Concurrent Resolution call the attention of all such persons and to all parties interested in agriculture in the State of North Dakota, to the serious menace of perennial Sow Thistle and to the fact that in case of its encroachment upon agricultural land not being halted, and proper and timely steps made for its eradication, thousands upon thousands of acres of the best farming land in the State will be rendered unfit for the purposes of agriculture.

Be It Further Resolved: That copies of this Concurrent Resolution be properly engrossed and enrolled in sufficient numbers, and furnished to the Secretary of State to be by him mailed promptly to the president of every railroad company owning land or right-of-way within the State, to the Secretary of Agriculture and the Commissioner of Indian Arfairs at Washington, D. C., and to the chairman of the board of county commissioners of each county in the State.
