#### FIRST DAY

#### House of Representatives, Bismarck, North Dakota, January 4, 1927.

At the hour of twelve o'clock, meridian, the fourth day of January, 1927, being the day and hour designated by law for the convening of the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, the members-elect of the House of Representatives of the Twentieth session of the Legislative Assembly assembled in the House Chamber at the capitol at Bismarck. North Dakota, and were called to order by J. C. Miller, Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives of the Nineteenth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota.

The session was opened with prayer by Rev. F. H. Davenport, St. George's Episcopal Church.

The joint session was then led in prayer by Rev. Wright of the First Presbyterian Church of Bismarck.

The presiding officer Lieutenant Governor Maddock, in a few well chosen remarks, introduced Honorable A. G. Sorlie, Governor, who delivered the following message:

#### MESSAGE

### Governor Arthur G. Sorlie

To the Members of the Legislative Assembly, and

The Stockholders of the Public Service Corporation, North Dakota:

As chairman of your Board of Directors of the great public service corporation, North Dakota, it is with real and sincere pleasure that I greet you to-day. Let me express my sincere appreciation of the splendid cooperation you have given the administration during the past two years, and my profound gratitude for the confidence you have expressed in bestowing upon me the honor of again serving as your chairman. I have taken the oath of office fully conscious of the responsibility of my position and of my obligations to the stockholders of this great corporation. Assured of your cooperation in the work that lies before us I shall earnestly endeavor to administer the affairs of the State for the best interests of all our people.

To you, the Senators and Representatives of the Twentieth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, has been entrusted the responsible task of enacting laws for the good of the State. During the period of this session it is your duty to give your most careful, earnest and deliberate attention to all matters presented for your consideration. What you do here must be for the good of our State and for the happiness and well-being of our fellow-citizens.

The reports of the various department, boards, commissions and state agencies will present for your consideration matters relating to the administration of the business of the State. From these reports you will be able to secure information that will be helpful in determining the most necessary changes and adjustments to be made.

I recommend that the various committees to which these reports shall be referred, examine very carefully into the merits of all recommended changes. I would like to take these recommendations up in detail in this message but they would take too long, and since the reports are all available you will be able to secure more complete information directly from the reports.

I submit the following recommendations for your consideration.

#### State Industries

Several industrial departments have been created by law in North Dakota that the other states in this great agricultural section of the United States are not yet fortunate enough to have. Included in the state industrial program we have the following:

(1) The State Twine Plant, operated in connection with the State Penitentiary. This plant manufactured and delivered 5,000,000 pounds of twine during the year 1925, and in 1926 about 6,500,000 pounds, of which there remains undelivered about 2,000,000 pounds because of the poor crops in some sections of the state.

(2) The State Bonding Department is being conducted in a very satisfactory way.

(3) The Hail, Fire and Tornado Insurance Departments are all functioning splendidly.

(4) The Workmen's Compensation Bureau is becoming well established and is being so conducted that it is now performing the service for which it was established. The functions of this bureau will soon be fully appreciated by all the people of the state.

(5) The Bank of North Dakota, operating as a Rural Credit Bank, has during the past two years disposed of \$6,000,000 in Rural Credit Bonds. Through the bank it has also been made possible for the Industrial Commission to lower the interest rate on North Dakota bonds to  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. If it had not been for the splendid work accomplished by the Bank of North Dakota our bonds would still be begging for a market at 5 and  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. North Dakota Rural Credit Bonds are now considered among the best bonds in the United States and are selling at about 4-35/100 to investors.

(6) The State Mill and Elevator, now becoming better known as a State Laboratory for our basic product, hard spring wheat, while not paying interest on the investment of \$4,500,000 showed an operating profit of \$143,000 for the year 1925, amounting to about 3-1/8 per cent on the capital invested. It is too early to make any report for 1926. This industry is working out in a splendid way by helping to

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merchandise our grain. North Dakota has an almost exclusive product in its hard spring wheat. Through the state laboratory we are able to sell this superior quality wheat to the mills east of us by demonstrating to them that the excellent flour made from all North Dakota hard spring wheat, high in protein content, is what they want for bread purposes. We hope in the near future to have our tariffs so adjusted that North Dakota Millers' Mix of 100 per cent hard spring wheat, 12½ per cent protein, can be delivered direct from the North Dakota Terminal. When this is accomplished the people throughout the country will be able to get one hundred per cent hard spring wheat flour.

#### **Taxation and Finance**

The State Tax Commissioner supervises the equalization of all taxes, and it is through his department that all property which has for any reason escaped taxation can be reached. The general property taxes of the state were reduced \$369,-483.06 in 1925, and for the year 1926 the reduction amounted to \$371,651.68. North Dakota is one of only eight states in the Union to show any reduction in taxes.

In passing permit me to call attention to the fact that the State has no control over taxes levied by local subdivisions of the state, or other bodies, and can in no way be held responsible for existing high taxes in certain localities.

I believe that all affairs of the state should be handled in the most efficient and businesslike manner in keeping with the best established methods, and to that end I recommend the following changes in our laws relating to taxation and public finance:

(1) That the County Treasurer be made the treasurer for all public funds of his county, except for cities having a population of 4000 or more. Under our present system there are approximately 4000 treasurers acting in various capacities in the state. Many of these officers handle large sums of public funds without having the facilities or opportunity to give such work the necessary care and attention. The County Treasurer, with but little additional expense, could take over the work of all local treasurers of his county. This would, I believe, result in a more businesslike and efficient handling of public funds with considerable saving in expense to the local taxing districts.

To reduce the expenditures of our state government we need to concentrate activities and eliminate all unnecessary duplication of work.

(2) Under our present system of assessment and taxation the assessment of real and tangible personal property is made by local assessors. The assessment of property for taxation purposes is a very important work of government and should receive the most serious attention of all citizens. Inequality of assessment causes inequality of taxation, and every citizen who is not receiving the same consideration as his fellowcitizen has just cause for complaint. There are approximately 1800 assessors in the state assessing a billion dollars worth of property. Because the assessment period is short and comes at a season when men of ability are over-laden with their own work, and also due to the fact that this compensation allowed is small, it is almost impossible to secure men with the qualifications necessary to handle this very important work, consequently the position of assessor is filled by whatever person may be available.

Therefore, I recommend the enactment of a law creating the office of County Assessor. Such law should provide adequate compensation and a term sufficiently long so that men of ability and good judgment may be enlisted for this work. The result to my mind will be a saving of expense to the State and a better and more businesslike administration of this important branch of state government.

(3) Under our present laws every taxing district has a procedure and methods of its own for raising revenue through the issuance of bonds. This tends to confusion and unnecessary expense. One law and one procedure should be sufficient for all taxing districts of the state.

I recommend the enactment of a uniform bonding law for all taxing districts. Such a law would tend to eliminate uncertainty of the legality of these bonds, consequently a better market would be available and a saving in expense to the state would result.

(4) Under existing laws only one taxing district remains which levies and disburses public money of considerable proportion with no provision for a budget system. We have adopted a system of budgets for the state, county and city, but as yet no such system has been provided for school districts. I recommend that the present law be extended so as to apply also to the school districts of the state.

#### Banking

Banking is one of the major problems for all states in the agricultural section at the present time, because of deflation due to the fact that the agricultural industry has not operated on a paying basis. The great difficulty at this time is that confidence in banks has been destroyed. We must use our best efforts to restore that confidence. Banks are public service institutions and should be regulated to make them as safe as possible in the performance of the service for which they are intended. I submit the following recommendations for adjustments in our present banking laws:

(1) That 50 per cent of the net earnings of banks be placed in a Surplus Fund until such fund shall equal the capital stock of the bank. This surplus fund should be free from taxation since it is for the purpose of safe-guarding depositors, and it should be carried for that purpose only.

(2) That the minimum capital stock of banks be increased from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

(3) That the State Banking Board be empowered to control the issuance of all bank charters. Many of the banking difficulties experienced in this state have been caused by the fact that too many banks have attempted to render banking service in one community.

(4) That all banks be required to carry 20 per cent of their total deposits in United States, State or Municipal bonds.

(5) Under our present law the State Banking Board has only partial control over Building and Loan Associations. Some revision of this law should be made whereby all such associations in the state may be controlled and supervised in a more businesslike way.

(6) In the past we have had some very unpleasant experiences in cases where stockholders, finding their bank to be in a weak condition, managed to transfer their stock to some "straw-man", and then kept the bank open for a period of one year, at the expiration of which period the original stockholder could not be held for the 100 per cent liability provided by our law. To prevent a continuance of such practice I recommend that a provision be included in the law making it illegal to transfer stock in any bank without the approval of the State Banking Board.

#### **Closed Banks**

When a bank is closed by order of the State Banking Board for lack of sufficient reserve, the only persons really interested in the affairs of the bank are its depositors. Some arrangement should be made by law so that such depositors could control any remaining assets. For instance, a group representing 80 per cent of the total deposits of the bank should be permitted to call a meeting to elect from their group five directors who should be placed in control of the affairs of such closed bank, under the supervision of the State Banking Board. These directors would be better able to look after the collections and affairs of the bank than anybody else because of their interest in the bank. Since they represent the majority of money in the bank they should have a voice in its management after closing.

#### Highway Department

The Highway Department is rapidly becoming one of the most important departments in this state as well as in others, but North Dakota has not kept up to the pace set by other states. Our highways are all paid for; we do not owe a penny for state highways. In order to build our state highways in a more efficient and economical way the designation of locations and the entire handling of projects should be placed in charge of the State Highway Commission so as to do away with the present haphazard method of construction. Because of the inefficiency of our present laws relating to highways the cost of construction runs higher than it should.

#### State Safety Conference

The growing number of deaths and serious injuries by reason of automobile accidents has aroused the nation to grapple with this problem. Two national conferences have been held to devise means to remedy this appalling condition. The second National Conference on Street and Highway Safety, held at Washington this year, recommended the adoption of a uniform vehicular code by all the state with the view that such legislation might not only control careless driving but also make car ownership more secure.

Last April upon my invitation representative citizens and public officials met at Bismarck for the first State Safety Conference held in this country, and which has since been used as a model for similar gatherings in other states. Two days were spent by the delegates to consider and devise means to make life safer in this state. The conference endorsed in principle the Uniform Vehicular Code recommended by the Washington gathering. Let me submit these suggested laws to your serious examination with the recommendation that so much thereof as may fit our peculiar needs be made part of our-statutes. This should be done not only with the view of adequate safety and highway legislation, but also to secure that uniformity of legislation by the different states which all concede is so very desirable. Likewise, to prevent a multitude of laws, that you repeal existing statutes dealing with the same subject matter.

The State Safety Conference, recognizing that the best results can only be obtained by continuous effort, created the North Dakota Safety Council, a volunteer body to promote safety "at work, on the streets and highways, and in the home." This body naturally can function in a small degree through donations and volunteer contributions, but as the scope of its work reaches and benefits everyone in the state, it should be placed on a firmer and more effective basis. Accordingly, let me recommend that you appropriate ten cents from each license fee received from the registration of automobiles as a fund for safety work, to be expend in cooperation with the Safety Council upon such basis and in such manner as you may deem wise.

In view of the fact that the total automobile casualties this year will total 23,500 deaths and about 700,000 persons injured, without any allowance for the tremendous property loss, the need for and the probable value of safety work cannot be over estimated.

#### Agriculture

The solution of the agricultural problem is uppermost in the minds of our senators and representatives in Congress. This problem has been given deep study during the past two years or more. From such study it has developed that the greatest need of agriculture is proper marketing of its commodities. That is all we have needed in North Dakota at any time. This great agricultural state is the masterpiece of the Creator. To us He has given sufficient rainfall, abundant sunshine and the most wonderful soil in the world. We have long days of warm sunshine during the growing season, and crisp winters. Because of this combination in climate we produce the best products in the United States. Given this wonderful natural endowment it is up to us, the people of North Dakota, to give careful study to our particular problems and work them out to our own best advantage. If we fail to do this we have no cause to blame any one but ourselves.

We are fortunate in having flour mills, packing plants, creameries and other manufacturing establishments that can serve as laboratories for the products of our state. We should cooperate to the fullest extent with all these establishments so that we may be able to manufacture and sell our highly superior products at their real value and prevent such products from being mixed with inferior products.

There are two essentials for human life,—air and nourishment. Because agriculture supplies one of these essentials it is the basic industry of the world. No other industry can compare with agriculture in magnitude; but this great fundamental industry has not yet worked out its problems as other industries have. I believe the solution of this problem can be accomplished through cooperation, and I am sure that this is particularly true of North Dakota's agricultural problems.

Our products are exclusive in that they are superior to all similar products produced by the states east and south of us. I hope that Congress will be able to solve this important problem in a way satisfactory to the entire agricultural section, but I believe that we are in a better position to work out the solution of our problems than other states are.

The time will come before long when other industries, such as manufacturing, banking and merchandising, will realize that unless agriculture is placed on a higher and sounder foundation than it is now these industries must also suffer. Such industries are now beginning to realize that the problems of the agricultural industry are their problems also and that they must cooperate with the farmer and others engaged in agricultural lines in working out these problems.

#### Horticulture

We have a private organization of men and women intensely interested in horticultural study as applied to North Dakota's needs. This group has developed a splendid organization and has financed their work through the assessment of dues sufficient to provide for the publication of a circular or pamphlet from time to time. The work of horticulture in this state has grown so large that the people in this organization now find it impossible to carry on the work to the extent it should be conducted. The organization has done and is still doing splendid work by showing what can be done to encourage the cultivation of flowers and shrubbery in the state.

I believe the time has come when this legislative body should make proper provision for horticultural work in North Dakota and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to make it possible to carry on the work in the state to the best advantage and also to publish bulletins at regular intervals for distribution throughout the state.

#### Certified Seeds

There are also certain private organizations in the state that are marketing certified seeds. These organizations should be given recognition and cooperation by passing a law providing a standard for certified seeds in North Dakota. Such legislation should also provide for the appointment of some properly qualified person with authority to certify all seeds in this state, and should make provision for the proper facilities for conducting this important work. I believe proper arrangements could be made through the agency of the State Agricultural College and the County Agents of the state.

#### Pure Foods

Our statute provides that all manufacturers of foodstuffs shall label their products to show the contents. I believe this law should be extended to provide that all flour sold in the state should bear a label on the sack stating the kind of wheat from which it is made, whether hard spring wheat, soft wheat or winter wheat, giving the percentage of each, and that such label should also show the protein content of the wheat from which the flour was ground.

#### **Penal Institutions**

Our penal institutions are now over crowded. The inmates in these institutions must be kept busy at proper occupations. The twine plant and the farm operated in connection with the State Penitentiary are no longer large enough to provide employment for all the men confined in the prison. Would it not be well to install machinery at the penitentiary to manufacture automobile license plates and road markers for use in the state? Warden Lee is making a thorough investigation of this plan by personally visiting three of the state prisons now making such plates and markers. He will submit his report of such investigation for your consideration during this session.

The State Training School at Mandan is over crowded. Some arrangement should be made to segregate the boys and girls in this institution. The present equipment will be adequate to take care of all the boys in this school if some arrangement is made to provide a building for the girls, on the same farm but located west of the present buildings.

#### Sterilization Law

If we paid some needed attention to the human family there would not be so many people confined in our State Hospital for the Insane and State School for the Feeble Minded. I recommend that our present Sterilization laws be made constitutional and usable, and I suggest for your consideration the laws adopted by the state of Michigan. If every state passed such laws and enforced them there would be fewer criminal, insane and feeble-minded people to deal with.

#### Life Imprisonment

I recommend the enactment of a law making the crime of first degree robbery punishable by life imprisonment. I further recommend that our laws provide that all persons convicted of third penitentiary offenses, whether the previous sentences have been served in the North Dakota State Penitentiary or elsewhere shall be sentenced to life imprisonment.

#### **Board of Pardons**

I recommend that a clear line of demarcation be drawn between the powers and duties of the Board of Administration and those of the Board of Pardons with relation to prescribing rules and regulations governing inmates of our penal institutions, now imposed by law upon both boards, to the end that confusion and conflict may be avoided in the fulfillment or exercise of any powers or duties of these respective boards.

I also recommend that paragraph 1 of Section 11230, Compiled Laws, be repealed so as not to conflict with Section 11110-a-1, in so far as it provides that no person convicted of murder in the first degree shall be eligible to parole until after he has been confined in the state penitentiary for at least fifty per cent of the time of his life expectancy.

I further recommend that Section 11103, Compiled Laws for 1913, be amended to provide that the Board of Pardons shall hold four regular meetings each year instead of two as now provided. This will do away with the frequent special meetings that are now necessary, and no special meetings shall be held except in cases of emergency.

#### State Secret Service Officer

In private corporations the president, or the person at the head of the organization, is indirectly responsible for every-body employed in the corporation. So that he may keep closely informed regarding all business of the corporation, and particularly so that he may have information that could not be obtained through an audit or any rules or regulations, such officer is provided with a fund by means of which he is able to employ a secret service officer. In other words, he is able to "lock the door before the horse is stolen." The state is larger than any private corporation and there are matters connected with state administration concerning which it is impossible to secure information through the ordinary channels. If it is good business for a private corporation to have the information that can be obtained through secret service, is it not equally good business for the state to make such provision? Why should not the chairman of your board of directors be provided with a fund to employ a secret service officer in case of necessity?

#### Soldiers' Bonus

The Legislative Assembly of 1919 enacted the Soldiers' Bonus law, the object of which was to furnish a sum of money to all residents of North Dakota who were in the armed forces of the United States during the World War. North Dakota was the first state to enact such legislation and blazed the trail for other states in this respect. The Adjutant General was given general supervision and authority to carry out the provisions of the law. Under this law 25,790 claims have been filed to date, and final and complete payment has been called up to No. 21,600.

On July 1, 1927, beneficiaries under this statute will have had eight years in which to file their claims. This is a much more extended period than other states have given. I recommend that steps be taken to end the filing of claims against the Soldiers' Bonus Fund, and suggest the enactment of a law providing that no claims for bonus under the returned soldiers' statute shall be received or filed on or after July 1, 1927.

#### **Roosevelt National Park**

For several years we have been working for the creation of Roosevelt National Park in the Badlands. In order to create such a park it will be necessary, the Department of the Interior informs us, to have all public lands in that section of the state transferred to the Federal Government. I suggest that, if possible, all school lands and other public lands in that particular section belonging to the State be put in shape so that title thereto can be transferred to the Department of the Interior for the establishment of Roosevelt National Park.

#### Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Tidewater Project

The Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Deep Waterway project has been L-fore the people for some time. Twenty-one states in the agricultural section have created state commissions and appropriated funds to defray the expenses of such commissions. No appropriation was made for this purpose by this State and so it was necessary for the Emergency Board to allow the sum of \$500.00 to cover the expense of a survey for the state showing the benefits to be derived by North Dakota from this waterway. This survey was made under the direction of the North Dakota State Commission of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Tidewater project.

I hope this legislature will see fit to appropriate a sufficient amount to enable the State of North Dakota to do her part to bring this deep waterway to a successful conclusion.

#### George Washington Bicentennial

The two hundredth anniversary of the birth of George Washington will be observed on February 22, 1932. In order to insure cooperation by all states the Congressional Commission, created by act of Congress, requests the adoption of a resolution by the North Dakota Legislative Assembly providing for the appointment of a State Commission to act in conjunction with the Congressional Commission in the formulation of proper plans for a nation-wide celebration of this anniversary. Pursuant to this request I recommend that this matter be referred to the proper legislative committee.

#### Uniform State Laws Commission

By virtue of the authority vested in the Governor a State Commission on Uniform State Laws has been appointed and

is now serving without compensation. I believe that some appropriation should be made and proper legislation enacted so that the State Commission may be able to work more efficiently in cooperation with similar commissions of other states.

#### Industrial Commission

In years past the work of the State Industrial Commission required the undivided attention of a secretary, but the work of the commission has now become so light that it could easily be taken over by some other department. In the interests of economy in the administration of state affairs I recommend that this change be made.

#### United States Senator

Nearly all the states have passed laws relating to the appointment of a United States Senator in case a vacancy might occur in that office.

For the sake of uniformity, so that things may be more clearly understood, and to avoid any possible misunderstanding in the future, our statutes should be made to conform to those of the other states in this respect.

#### Radio Broadcasting Station

I wish to call your attention again to the splendid service that could be rendered by a State Broadcasting Station. I sincerely hope that you will make some provision for the establishment of such a station to be used in telling people outside the state about the many opportunities North Dakota offers home-seekers.

#### Building Program

In the course of time it will become necessary to erect a new Capitol Building. A proper building program should be visualized now. There is available at the present time in the Building Fund the sum of \$250,000. I recommend the erection of a building opposite the Memorial Building, and of similar architectural design, as a background for Sixth Street. This building should be named the Agricultural Building and could be used to house several state departments that are now overcrowded.

Following that in two years the building program should provide for the erection of another similar building, and then in the next legislative period the fourth building could be erected. Upon completion of these buildings all departments of the state would be properly housed and we could then turn our attention to the erection of a Capitol Building, of sufficient size to provide adequately for the Senate and House and the Executive Department.

A building program such as this would take care of all departmental needs and avoid unnecessary over-crowding. The utmost care should be taken in adopting a building program to adequately provide for the future needs of the state.

#### **Budget Board Recommendations**

The Budget Board has worked faithfully, sincerely and carefully in the preparation of its report, so that you may know where you can best invest approximately \$8,000,000 of state funds that will be available. The report of the Budget Board will also recommend other investments that should be made. You, of course, will •:e your own wise discretion in making such investments if you find arrangements can be made for the additional money.

#### **Obsolete** Laws

Our statute books are glutted with laws. To correct this I suggest that any legislator who has a law to present for enactment also ask for the repeal of some law that has become unnecessary and obsolcte.

#### Conclusion

As legislators you have assembled here to work out the problems of North Dakota in a sane and sensible way. You will give careful study not only to the new laws to be enacted, but to needed revision of laws already upon our statute books.

I again call your attention to the importance of disposing of the budget in the first twenty-five days of the session, and I earnestly request that until the necessary appropriations have been disposed of no other legislation be considered. If you will act in cooperation with this request you will have taken a big step in advance of the usual procedure.

In North Dakota as in other states we have political parties with different viewpoints as to what is deemed the solution of our problems. This is as it should be, since free and honest discussion is the surest way for arriving at sane and sound remedy. Put no party, be it ever so strong, should lose sight that, above everything else, we are all working for the State of North Dakota and that our common aim and nurpose at all times is the welfare of our state and the happiness of our people. It will be a splendid thing when we, the people of North Dakota, of city and farm, are able to view ourselves as closely related, thereby creating a mutual, helpful interdependence all along the line. Actuated by that spirit and motive our state will advance rapidly along all lines of human endeavor, and you as members of the House and Senate and I as your chief executive will more promptly, wisely and faithfully serve all the interests of all our people.

Senator Murphy moved that a committee of six be appointed to draft suitable memorial resolutions for the deceased Ex-Members: John L. Cashel, L. A. Simpson, A. L. Martin and Fred Frank, Adam Bollinger of Stutsman County and Albert G. Lowe, of Pierce County, which motion prevailed, and the President appointed Senators Murphy, Baird and Wog, and Representatives Muus, Levin and McCay.

Senator Hamilton moved that the joint session do now dissolve, which motion prevailed.

Mr. McCay moved that the House do now adjourn, which motion prevailed.

### REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Mr. Speaker: Your House Committee on Rules makes the following report:

We recommend that the rules of the House, as in force in the Eighteenth Legislative Assembly, be adopted, with the following changes:

#### That rule 14 be amended to read as follows:

"14. The previous question shall be in this form: 'Shall the main question be now put?' It shall be admitted only when demanded by two-thirds of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring the House to a direct vote upon the amendments reported by a committee, if any, upon the pending amendments and then upon the main question. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to the seconding of the same, a call of the House shall be in order, but after two-thirds shall have seconded such motion, no call shall be in order prior to decision of the main question."

That rule 23 of the Eighteenth Legislative Assembly be amended to read as follows:

"Every bill or resolution for amendment of the Constitution shall be in typewritten form and shall be introduced in quintuple and have endorsed thereon its title and the name of the member or the committee introducing the same. One of such quintuples shall be delivered to the chairman of the committee to which it is referred, one shall remain in the custody- of the Chief Clerk until otherwise directed by the House, (and the two shall be for the use of the newspaper men reporting the proceedings of the Legislature.)"

That rule 42 of the Eighteenth Session be amended to read as follows:

"The committee on the introduction of delayed bills shall receive from the chief clerk all bills offered for introduction after the time for introduction as heretofore limited, and shall, on the same or the next day after receiving such bills, report to the House its conclusion whether the introduction thereof should be allowed, and if a majority of such committee is in favor of the introduction thereof the bill shall be thereupon deemed duly introduced."

We recommend that the members of the several House committees be made up of the same number of members as in the Eighteenth Legislative Assembly, except that The Committee of Agriculture consist of seventeen members;

The Committee on Drainage and Irrigation consist of eleven members;

The Committee on Federal Relations consist of seven members;

The Committee on Cities and Muncipal Corporations consist of eleven members, and

The Committee on railroads consist of thirteen members.

We further recommend that a committee of nine members be named by the Speaker on Public Safety.

We recommend that the various rules be properly entitled so as to enable the members to readily find any matter in question.

### RULES OF THE HOUSE

## HOUSE CALLED TO ORDER

1. The Speaker shall take the chair at the time to which the House stands adjourned, and the House shall then be called to order, and the roll of members called and the name of the absentees entered upon the Journal of the House.

## **CORRECTION OF THE JOURNAL**

2. Upon the appearance of a quorum the Journal of the preceding day shall be referred to the Committee on Revision and Correction. Any mistakes therein shall be corrected by the committee and reported to the House for action.

### CALL OF HOUSE

Thirty-six members of the House may order a call of the House and cause absent members to be sent for, but a call must not be made while a vote is being taken. The call being moved, the Speaker shall require those desiring the call to rise, and if thirty-six or more members shall rise the call shall be ordered. The call being ordered, the sergeant-at-arms shall close the door and allow no member to leave the room. The clerk shall then call the roll and furnish the sergeant-at-arms with a list of those members absent without leave, and that officer must proceed forthwith to find and bring in such absentees. While the House is under call no business can be transacted except to receive and act upon the report of the sergeant-at-arms and no motion is in order except a motion to suspend further proceedings under the call, and said motion shall not be adopted unless a majority of all members-elect vote in favor thereof. Upon a report of the sergeant-at-arms showing that all members who were absent without leave, naming them, are present, the call shall be at an end, and the doors shall be opened, and the business pending at the time the call was made be proceeded with.

### POINTS OF ORDER

4. The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum and decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the House.

#### FRIDAY, JANUARY 7, 1927

## SPEAKER VOTES, WHEN

5. The Speaker shall vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays (except on appeals from his own decisions) and in all elections or decisions called for by any member.

# RETAIN SEATS UNTIL ADJOURNMENT ANNOUNCED

6. When the House adjourns the members shall keep their seats until the Speaker announces the adjournment.

## **RECOGNITION BY CHAIR**

7. Every member previous to his speaking shall rise from his seat and respectfully address "Mr. Speaker," and remain standing in his place before proceeding to speak until he is recognized by the chair.

## WHO RECOGNIZED

8. When two or more members rise at the same time to speak, the Speaker must designate the member who is to speak, but in all cases the member who shall rise first and address the chair may speak first.

# RULES AS TO SPEAKING, NUMBER OF TIMES AND DURATION

9. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the House, nor more than once until every member choosing to speak on the subject pending shall have spoken, nor shall any member occupy more than ten minutes at the first time, nor more than five minutes at the second time, without unanimous consent of the House.

# MOTIONS TO BE SECONDED AND STATED BEFORE DEBATE

10. No motion shall be debated or put unless the same be seconded. It must then be stated by the Speaker before the debate and any such motion must be reduced to writing if the Speaker or any member desires it.

## MOTION MAY BE WITHDRAWN

11. After the motion shall be stated by the Speaker, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the House, but may be withdrawn at any time before amendment or decision,

### JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE

but all motions, resolutions or amendments must be entered on the Journal, whether rejected or adopted.

# MOTIONS ON DEBATE, AND PROCEDURE THEREOF

12. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone to a day certain, to commit or amend, to postpone indefinitely—which several motions shall have precedence in the order which they stand arranged.

### MOTION TO ADJOURN, IN ORDER WHEN

13. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except when a member is addressing the chair or a vote is being taken; that, and the motion to lay upon the table, shall be decided without debate.

### **PREVIOUS QUESTION**

14. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall be admitted only when demanded by two-thirds of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring the House to a direct vote upon the amendments reported by a committee, if any, upon the pending amendments and then upon the main question. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to the seconding of the same, a call of the House shall be in order, but after two-thirds shall have seconded such motion, no call shall be in order prior to decision of the main question.

### PREVIOUS QUESTION DECIDED IN NEGATIVE

15. When the previous question is decided in the negative it shall leave the main question under debate for the remainder of the sitting unless sooner disposed of in some other manner.

# INCIDENTAL QUESTION AFTER MOTION FOR PREVIOUS QUESTION

16. All incidental questions of order arising after motion is made for the previous question, during the pendency of such motion, or after the House shall have determined that the main question shall be now put shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise without debate.

### PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS, ETC.

17. Petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to

the House shall be presented by the Speaker or by a member in his place.

## MEMBERS MUST VOTE, WHEN

18. Every member who is present, before the vote is declared from the chair, must vote for or against the question before the House, unless the House excuse him or unless he is immediately interested in the question, in which case he must not vote.

## DECORUM

19. When the Speaker is putting the question, no member shall walk out of, or across the House, nor when a member is speaking, shall any person entertain any private discourse, or pass between the person speaking and the chair.

### **QUESTION DIVIDED, WHEN**

20. If a question in debate contains several propositions, any member may have the same divided.

### MEMBER OUT OF ORDER

21. A member called to order must immediately sit down unless permitted to explain, and the House, if appealed to, must decide the case. If there be no appeal, the decision of the chair shall stand. On appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the House. When a member is called to order for offensive language there shall be no debate.

### BILLS INTRODUCED, HOW

22. A bill can only be introduced on the report of a committee or on a call for bills, or by a motion for leave.

## FORM OF BILLS, NUMBER OF COPIES

23. Every bill or resolution for amendment of the Constitution shall be in typewritten form and shall be introduced in quintuple and have endorsed thereon its title and the name of the member or the committee introducing the same. One of such quintuples shall be delivered to the chairman of the committee to which it is referred, one shall remain in the custody of the Chief Clerk until otherwise directed by the House, (and the two shall be for the use of the newspaper men reporting the proceedings of the Legislature.)

### **DISPOSITION OF MEASURES**

24. Every bill or resolution referred to a committee, ex-

cept appropriation bills, must be returned to the House with the committee's report thereon not later than the 7th day after its reference, unless upon application by the committee an extension of time is granted within which to consider it. And in case the same is not so reported on the 7th day after its reference and such time is not extended, it shall go automatically on to the Calendar of Bills for consideration by the Committee of the Whole.

## **BILLS INTRODUCED, WHEN**

25. No appropriation bill shall be introduced, except upon the unanimous request of the Committee on Introduction of Delayed Bills, after the 25th day of the session; and, no other bill or resolution for amendment of the Constitution shall be introduced without such request of such committee, after the 35th day of the session.

# **REFERENCE TO COMMITTEE**

26. Every bill, memorial, order and resolution, requiring the approval of the Governor, or a change in the Constitution of the State of North Dakota, shall, after second reading, be referred to its appropriate committee, and if reported without amendment, shall pass to its third reading, unless otherwise ordered, and when amended it shall go to Committee of the Whole House.

### ENGROSSMENT

27. All bills shall be properly engrossed before their final passage.

### AMENDMENT ON THIRD READING

28. No amendment shall be received on the third reading, except to fill blanks, without unanimous consent of the House, but all bills and resolutions may be committed at any time previous to their passage. If any amendment be reported on such commitment by any other than a committee of the whole, it shall be read a second time, and the question of third reading and passage put.

# DIFFERENT SUBJECT MATTER NOT TO BE INCLUDED BY AMENDMENT

-29. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted, under color of amendment; no bill or resolution shall at any time be amended by annexing thereto, or incorporating therewith, any other bill or resolution pending before the House.

### FRIDAY, JANUARY 7, 1927

## **COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE**

30. In forming a committee of the whole House the Speaker shall appoint a chairman to preside.

## PROCEDURE IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

31. Bills committed to the committee of the whole House shall be read, be open to amendment, and debated by sections, unless otherwise ordered, leaving the title to be last considered; all amendments shall be noted in writing and reported to the House by the chairman.

# ORDER IN WHICH QUESTIONS PUT, BLANKS HOW FILLED

32. All questions, whether in committee, or in the House, shall be put in the order in which they are moved, except in the case of privileged questions, and in filling blanks the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

## PROCEDURE ON SENATE BILLS

33. A similar mode of procedure shall be observed with bills which have originated in and passed the Senate as with bills which have originated in the House except that they shall not be printed nor engrossed or enrolled.

## **RECONSIDERATION, WHEN**

34. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order unless on the same day or the day following that on which the decision proposed to be reconsidered took place, nor unless one of the majority shall move a reconsideration.

### NOTICE OF INTENTION TO RECONSIDER

35. When notice of intention to move the reconsideration of any bill or joint resolution shall be given by a member, the clerk of the House shall retain the said bills or joint resolution until after the time during which the said motion can be made unless the same can previously be disposed of.

## WHO MAY MOVE RECONSIDERATION

36. Any member who votes on the majority side of a question may move a reconsideration of the same, which motion shall be decided by a majority vote.

## JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE

## HOUSE RULES OBTAIN IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE, EXCEPTIONS

. 37. The rules of the House shall be observed in committee of the whole House so far as may be applicable except that the ayes and nays shall not be called, the previous question enforced nor the time of speaking limited.

## MOTION TO ARISE ALWAYS IN ORDER

38. A motion that the committee rise shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.

#### THIRD READING, WHEN

39. No bill reported from standing or select committees or from the committee of the whole shall come up for a third reading until the first day after such report unless the House by a two-thirds vote otherwise orders.

## STANDING COMMITTEES AND NUMBER OF MEMBERS

Section 40. Standing committees shall be appointed on the following subjects:

On Agriculture to consist of seventeen members.

On Appropriations to consist of nineteen members.

On Apportionment to consist of a member from each senatorial district.

On Banking to consist of thirteen members.

On Counties to consist of nine members.

On Corporations other than municipal to consist of nine members.

On Mines and Mining to consist of nine members.

On Delayed Bills to consist of five members.

On Drainage and Irrigation to consist of eleven members.

On Education to consist of seventeen members.

On Election and Election Privileges to consist of fifteen members.

On Engrossment and Enrollment to consist of nine members.

On Federal Relations to consist of seven members.

On Game and Fish to consist of nine members.

On Highways and Bridges to consist of seventeen members.

On Insurance to consist of thirteen members.

On Rules to consist of nine members.

On Judiciary to consist of nineteen members.

On Live Stock to consist of nine members.

On Cities and Municipal corporations to consist of eleven members.

On Military Affairs to consist of nine members.

On Mileage and Per Diem to consist of three members.

On Public Health to consist of nine members.

On Public Debt to consist of eleven members.

On Public Printing to consist of nine members.

On Revision and Correction of the House Journal to consist of seven members.

On Railroads to consist of thirteen members.

On School and Public Lands to consist of nine members.

On State Affairs to consist of nineteen members.

On Temperance to consist of fifteen members.

On Tax and Tax Laws to consist of seventeen members.

On Warehouse and Grain Grading to consist of fifteen members.

On Ways and Means to consist of fifteen members.

On Public Safety to consist of nine members.

#### JOINT COMMITTEES

Also joint committees on the following subjects: Charitable Institutions to consist of seven members. Educational Institutions to consist of seven members. Penal Institutions to consist of seven members. Insurance to consist of seven members. Labor to consist of seven members. Public Buildings to consist of seven members. Joint Rules to consist of seven members. State Library to consist of seven members.

## COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN

41. The chairman of the committee on introduction of delayed bills shall be selected by the members of the com-

mittee. On all other committees the first-named member shall be the chairman, and, in his absence or being excused by the House, the next member named, and so on as often as the case shall happen, shall act as chairman.

## **DELAYED BILLS**

42. The committee on the introduction of delayed bills shall receive from the chief clerk all bills offered for introduction after the time for introduction as heretofore limited, and shall, on the same or the next day after receiving such bills, report to the House its conclusion whether the introduction thereof should be allowed, and if a majority of such committee is in favor of the introduction thereof the bill shall be thereupon deemed duly introduced.

### ENGROSSMENT

43. The committee on engrossment shall examine all bills after they are engrossed and report the same to the House correctly engrossed before their third reading; said committee may report at any time.

### ENROLLMENT

44. The committee on enrollment shall examine all House bills and memorials which have passed the two Houses, and when reported correctly enrolled, they shall be presented to the presiding officers of the House and Senate for their signatures, and when so signed, presented to the Governor for his approval; said committee may report at any time.

## **REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEE**

45. Select committees to whom reference shall have been made, must, in all cases, report a state of facts and their opinion to the House.

## NAME OF MOVING MEMBER ENTERED IN JOURNAL

46. In all cases where a bill, order or resolution, or motion shall be entered upon the Journal of the House, the name of the member moving the same shall be entered on the Journal.

# **COURTESY OF THE FLOOR**

47. No person shall be admitted within the bar of the House except the executive, members of the Senate, state officers, judges of the supreme court and district courts, members of Congress, ex-members of the Legislative Assembly, delegates to the state constitutional convention, all federal officers of the state and reporters for newspapers, except by card of the Speaker. Any person lobbying on the floor of the House shall forfeit the privilege granted by this rule.

### ORDER OF BUSINESS

48. After calling the House to order the order of busi- . ness for the day shall be as follows:

1. Prayer by the chaplain.

2. Calling the roll.

3. Reference to the Journal.

4. Presentation of petitions and communications.

5. Reports of standing committees.

## **REPORT DIVIDED**

49. Whenever the report of any committee of conference contains several modifications or amendments, any member may have the same divided, and the question of concurrence taken separately upon each modifications or amendment.

### **GENERAL ORDERS**

50. When the House has arrived at the "general orders of the day," it shall go into committee of the whole upon such orders or a particular order designated by a vote of the House, and no other business shall be in order until the whole are considered or passed, or the committee rise; and unless a particular bill is ordered up the committee of the whole shall consider, act upon, or pass the general order, according to the order of reference.

## **MEMBER TO PRESIDE IN PLACE OF SPEAKER**

51. The Speaker may leave the chair, and appoint a member to preside, but not for a longer time than one day, except by leave of the Houes.

## U. S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES RULES TO GOVERN

52. The rules of parliamentary practice adopted by the House of Representative of the United States shall govern the House in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the House, and the joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

### SUSPENSION OF RULES

53. No rule of the House shall be suspended, altered or amended without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members of the whole House.

### HOUR OF MEETING

54. The hour of the daily meeting of the House shall be 2 o'clock in the afternoon, until the House directs otherwise.

## ONE-SIXTH MAY REQUIRE AYE AND NAY VOTE

55. The ayes and nays shall not be ordered unless demanded by one-sixth of the members present except on the final passage of bills, concurrent resolutions to amend the Constitution, and memorials, in which case ayes and nays shall be had without demand.

## DIVIDED COMMITTEE REPORT

56. In case of all the members of any committee, required or entitled to report on any subject referred to them cannot agree upon any report the majority and minority may each make a special report, and any member dissenting in whole or in part, from the reasonings and conclusions of both the majority and minority may also present to the House a statement of his reasonings and conclusions; and all reports, if decorus in language, and respectful to the House, shall be entered at length on the Journal.

### SMOKING

57. No smoking shall be allowed in the House while in session.

## **DURING ROLL CALL, DECORUM**

58. No member or any other person shall remain by the clerk's desk when the ayes and nays are being called.

### DISTURBANCE IN LOBBY OR GALLERY

59. In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby or gallery, the Speaker or chairman of the committee of the whole shall have power to order the same to be cleared.

## ABSENCE FROM HOUSE, PENALTY

60. No member or officer of the Houes, unless he, from illness or other cause shall be unable to attend, shall absent himself from a session of the House during an entire day without first having obtained leave of absence, and no one shall be entitled to draw pay while absent more than one day without leave.

# BILLS, RECORDS, ETC., TO BE RETAINED BY DESK OFFICIALS

61. Neither the chief clerk nor his assistant shall permit any records or papers belonging to the House to be taken out of their custody otherwise than in the regular course of business. The chief clerk shall report all missing bills, resolutions and papers to the Speaker; shall have general supervision of all clerical duties appertaining to the business of the House, shall perform under the direction of the Speaker, all duties pertaining to the office, and shall also keep a book showing the situation and progress of all the bills, memorials and joint resolutions.

## **EXPENDITURE OF MONEY, NOTICES**

62. At least one day's notice shall be given of the introduction of any motion or resolution calling for or involving the expenditure of any money.

### NOTICE OF COMMITTEE MEETINGS

63. The chairman of the different standing committees shall send to the chief clerk's desk, to be read previous to adjournment, notice of the time and place of meeting of such committee.

## MEASURES PRINTED

64. All bills and resolutions for amendments of the Constitution shall be printed unless otherwise ordered.

# BIENNIAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PARDONS

#### From January 1, 1925 to December 31, 1926

Pursuant to the powers conferred by Chapter 263, Compiled Laws of 1913, the Board of Pardons has performed functions as a parole board in addition to its constitutional and statutory powers as a Board of Pardons since July 1, 1923. During the period from January 1, 1925 to December 31, 1926, four regular meetings and thirty-five special and emergency meetings have been held. During that period 504 applications were presented by inmates of the State Penitentiary seeking clemency through the action of the Board of Pardons, such as pardon, commutation of sentence, restoration of citizenship, parole, or fixing determinate sentences in cases where sentences of indeterminate length had been imposed by the Court, such as, for instance, a term of from three to five years.

The total number of applications presented includes applications and re-applications by the same inmate at regular and special meetings held for the consideration of deferred applications or on account of some emergency situation. This consideration is granted under the rule permitting prisoners to file applications once each year, and the further rule permitting additional hearings upon the consent of two members of the board.

The Board has made disposition of the 504 applications as follows:

Citizenship restored, in some cases where the applicant had served the full term of sentence, or where sentences had been commuted, upon the required proof that the applicants had proven themselves worthy of having their citizenship restored .....

# A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

# Introduced by Mr. Burkhart

#### Requesting Congress to Enact Legislation for Stabilization of the Price of Agricultural Products, Thereby Placing Agriculture on an equal basis with Other Industries.

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota, the Senate Concurring:

Whereas, agriculture is the basic industry of this nation;

and,

Whereas, we believe the stability and prosperity of agriculture is essential to the prosperity and general welfare of the people of this nation; and,

Whereas, agricultural products are being sold below cost of production, which condition is bankrupting farmers, causing heavy decrease in farm population, failure of banks and adversely affecting other business; and,

Whereas, the American farmers are under present conditions placed upon a competitive basis with cheaper labor of foreign countries which is contrary to the recognized policy of the United States;

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota, the Senate concurring, most respectfully urge upon the Congress of the United States, the early enactment of the McNary-Haugen Bill.

And Be It Further Resolved: That the Secretary of State of the State of North Dakota be and is hereby instructed to forward a duly authenticated copy of this resolution to the President of the United States, the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives and to each Representative of the State of North Dakota in the United States Senate and House of Representatives.

Mr. Burkhart moved that resolution No. 32 be adopted and that same be printed in the Journal.

Which motion prevailed.

Mr. Kelly stated that there were two prominent Indians of the Mandan Tribe present and moved that the Speaker appoint a committee to escort them, together with Major Welch, to the rostrum.

Which motion prevailed.

The Speaker appointed the following as such committee: Mr. Kelly and Mr. Svingen.

The three visitors were escorted to the rostrum and after Speaker John W. Carr had presented Major A. B. Welch of Mandan, he asked that the major present the two Indian visitors, which he did. Their names being "Shoot Holy" and "His Road." The Indians were dressed in their war paint and feathers with many beads and other trimmings.

Major Welch acted as interpreter. Mr. "Shoot Holy" spoke as follows:

"I want to give my blessings to you who sit and stand here today. The winds used to blow over this country when it belonged to me, but now railways and houses are all over the country between here and the James River. We were driven across the river to the other side many years ago. There appears to be great prosperity on my land today. Everybody seems to be happy and nobody fears for his life. I think the President should do something for the old Indian whose land this was, but we get very little and we are worried more than you gentlemen appear to be worried today. In the old days we gave much to your people. We allowed you to come on our land. You put most of the things under one arm and kept it. The other things you put under the other arm and you kept most of that. I want to express to you the appreciation I have in my heart for you here today, and I hope tomorrow will be more pleasant for us than it has been in the past."

Major Welch then introduced Mr. "His Road" who said the following:

"I stand here before you today and I want to say a few words. I see they have built a fence around you and I wonder why you are in this corral. I do not know whether it is to keep bad men in or to keep bad men from getting in, but I have no fear as I stand here because the big guns I used to know are not present today. My heart is good today. My heart is warm today as I look at you here. That is all."

The Speaker, John W. Carr, then asked that Major Welch consent to say a few words and he spoke as follows:

I hardly know what to say in behalf of my good brothers, the red people. I might give you a little history of these two men. This man sitting closest to me is "Shoot Holy." The other man is called "His Road." Indians obtain their names by some act of bravery or some wonderful deed they have done. It would take too much of your time to tell how either of these men obtained his warrior's name, but it is very interesting. Their tribe is the Yankton A Tribe, which belongs to the Sioux Nation. The Sioux Nation is divided into two great divisions. One of these is called the "Esonti" and the other is called the "Teeton", meaning the "People of the Prairie." Esonti means "People who live on the holy lake." These were the first people of the Sioux Nation with whom the white people came in contact as they came in through the waterway of the Great Lakes from Quebec and Montreal about 1600.

In 1650, seven great tribes of the Dakota people, which means the "Friendly People", the word "Sioux" coming from the Chippewa, gained a firm foothold west of the Missouri River. When they obtained this foothold they found already there the Indian Tribe of the Mandans and two other tribes. These Indians lived in permanent villages and were the first corn raisers of this whole country. Immediately upon crossing the river the Sioux came in contact with the "Irogas." They have a wonderful history of their own, having come from or near the City of Mexico. They had come into contact with Alvarado in 1541, and after meeting him, this division left the parent tribe, struck out for the North and landed at the Missouri River in the vicinity of Yankton. They moved up the river as the years went by and met a tribe of the Mandans, who lived in five great villages at the mouth of the Heart River, and a war of forty years duration between the tribes ensued.

During this time another vagrant tribe (because they belonged to the Iroquois tribe), one little party had gotten into this country and founded a village on the Sheyenne River near Lisbon. They later crossed the Missouri and came into battle contact with the Dakota people. The Sheyennes were finally overcome by the Sioux and a treaty of peace was made between the two nations and the Iroquis made peace with the Sioux nation. The adoption ceremonies covered a period of three years. The first year the entire people of the Sheyennes were adopted as infants. The next year they were adopted as young people, and the third year those men who had acquired war honors in their own right were adopted as warriors of the Dakota people, and since then have been friendly allies of the Sioux Nation. You will remember that they took quite a part in the campaign which ended in the death of Custer and his men.

Colonel Leavenworth came up from Kansas and founded a village at the mouth of the river, just over the line, and near the present Standing Rock Reservation. 750 Sioux warriors took the part of the United States Government. The man in charge of the expedition which had been attacked was the Governor of Missouri, and this territory at that time was part of Missouri, in 1823. Acting upon his authority as an officer of the Territory, he gathered in all the various traders and trappers from the Missouri Fur Company and the French Company and Rocky Mountain Company, and he formed what was called the Missouri Legion and appointed officers, and in case any action should come up it would be entirely authoritative. And in that mass of traders and trappers and half breeds and full blooded Indians there were 750 Sioux warriors. The Irogas were wiped off the face of the earth. The military expedition went back down the river. The Sioux people came in and destroyed the village of the Irogas. They went back to the point where Alvarado had discovered them in 1541, and stayed seven years. After that they came back through the Bad Lands and the Mountains to where Fort Clark stands now. It was here that they were subjected to the first terrible scourge of smallpox. It is accepted history that 250,000 Indians died from that first great scourge of small pox of 1838 and 1839. The Mandans took possession of old Fort Clark and lived there until they crossed the river to the east side and settled at old Fort Berthold, a trader's post.

The Sioux history from that point you are probably fairly well acquainted with. They'are known as the greatest fighters the plains Indian has produced. They have engaged in terrific battles. In 1876 General Crook was sent to Fort Yates to take all horses belonging to the Sioux and promised money for the horses. Both of these men here today lost horses to General Crook. They have never been paid for them. These are the things that rankle in the heart of the Indian, but they are friendly to the Whites. They tell me that those people who thought they were unhappy in the old days were mistaken. They had enough to eat, the wide country to roam over, and the buffalo. These old men here today, one of them eighty years old or more, and the other about seventy-two or seventy-five, are a few of the remnants of the people who were pitifully great, both in war and in the way they have met the civilization which has overswept them. They have been trampled pretty badly, some of these people, and it is pretty hard to tell whether it is just because they are Sioux or because they did take part in wonderful expeditions against the government, a government which has tried to take from them that which they had promised would be theirs by treaty in 1876. These men wanted to come in and see how Congress made law, and they would like you who make the laws to take a little interest in their affairs. They are eating horse meat today. I am not saying this to be Bolshevik. Many of them are hungry. And it often occurs that many of the young people who have contracted tuberculosis during the winter, are so weak from malnutrition in the spring that they cannot throw off the effects of the tuberculosis.

### CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

### Introduced by Mr. McCay

### AID FOR INDIANS

Memorializing the Congress of the United States to Take Steps Towards Aid to the Indians of Standing Rock Indian Reservation in North Dakota and South Dakota.

- Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of North Dakota: The Senate Concurring:
- We, the Twentieth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, Beg Leave to Represent to Your Honorable Bodies.

### FIRST:

That there are in the western part of North Dakota, lying within the boundaries of Sioux County, North Dakota and Corson County, South Dakota, what is known as the Standing Rock Indian Reservation, hundreds of Indians in actual want, suffering from lack of nourishment and totally destitute of food and supplies. The condition among the Indians has become so desperate that the more aged Indians are dying from want of proper nourishment and the stronger ones are surviving because although the tribal council refused to use horsemeat nevertheless they have been obliged to do so.

#### SECOND:

We further call your attention to the fact that winter is but approaching; that the serious condition now existing calls for immediate aid; further, that various so called friends of the Indians have either through ignorance or through lack of knowledge of the real situation reported to the Federal Government that these Indians are not in want, whereas the real situation is as above stated, as appears fully by the testimony of the Indian Chiefs and from the Committee of the Business Men's Association of Standing Rock, North Dakota, which is composed of Indians.

#### THIRD:

We further wish to call your attention to the fact that the crop on the Standing Rock Indian Reservation was a total loss during the present crop season; that the corn furnished by the Indian agency for seeding purposes, although seeded did not yield sufficient to return the seed; that the wheat sowed was a total loss and that there has been no feed of any kind or character for any animals with the exception of the hay crop which matured sufficiently so that it could be cut late in the fall.

Further, during the last twenty-five years the Indians have never found themselves in such desperate need; never during this same period of time has there been such a total crop failure and never during the last twenty-five years has there been so much actual want, dire need, terrific suffering and slow starvation as is now existing among these people.

Now, Therefore; Be It Resolved, That a copy of this memorial be sent by the Secretary of State of North Dakota to the President of the United States, to the Secretary of the Interior, to each house of Congress, to the North Dakota Senators and Congressmen and to the Indian Commissioner, all of Washington, D. C. and that we request our Congressional delegation to use their every effort to secure the passage of a bill granting relief immediately.

Mr. Trubshaw moved the adoption of the Concurrent Resolution.

### AID FOR INDIANS

Whereas, the matter of the need of the Indians upon Standing Rock Indian Reservation, located in the states of North and South Dakota, have been brought to the attention of this body through a resolution duly introduced at the instance of a number of Indians of such reservation, and

Whereas, a hearing has been had upon said matter before the House Committee of Federal Relations, a number of Indians from such Reservation appearing before such committee and Mr. E. D. Mossman, Superintendent, also appearing at the request of such committee, and Whereas, crops upon such reservation were shown to have been practically a total loss during 1926; that tenants of Indian lands by reason of crop failure have in most instances failed to pay rents due therefor; and

Whereas, it is evident that provision must at once be made to meet resulting conditions which will entail privation and suffering for many of these Indians during this winter and until such time as another crop is harvested;

Now, Therefore, we respectfully urge upon you that provision such as is suggested in the letter of E. D. Mossman, superintendent, of date, September 15th, 1926, and directed to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Washington, D. C., and in the letter from the Tribal Business Council of such reservation, accompanying the same and addressed to the Secretary of the Interior, be at once made, that these wards of the government be insured against suffering and privation.

While this matter was brought before this Legislative body through the efforts of a number of reservation Indians, the examination of Mr. Mossman before the committee, convinced such committee and this body that his recommendations of September 15th, 1926, must be acted upon at once if privation and suffering is to be prevented.

While we realize that this is a matter in which this body properly has no voice, we respectfully urge upon you, the Secretary of Interior, and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, immediate consideration of the situation, which before spring, will be one to be deplored.

To the Commissioner of Indian Affairs at

Washington, D. C.

# MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

## Introduced by Mr. Aljets

A Concurrent Resolution to Amend and Re-enact Section 154 of Article Nine of the Constitution of the State of North Dakota, providing for Income Tax Common Schools.

#### Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota, the Senate Concurring.

That the following proposed amendment to Section 154, Article 9 of the Constitution of the State of North Dakota, is agreed to, and that the same be submitted to the qualified electors of the State for approval or rejection in accordance with the provisions of section 202 of the Constitution of the State of North Dakota as amended.

Section 1. Amendment. That section 154, Article 9, of the constitution of the State of North Dakota is hereby amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

The interest and income of this fund, and all other sums which may be added thereto by law, shall be faithfully used and applied each year for the benefit of the common schools of the state and shall be for this purpose apportioned among and between all the several common school corporations of the state in proportion to the number of children in each of school age, as may be fixed by law, and no part of the fund shall ever be diverted even temporarily, from this purpose, or used for any other purpose whatever than the maintenance of common schools for the equal benefit of all the people of the state; provided, however; that if any portion of the interest or income aforesaid be not expended during any year, said portion shall be added to and become a part of the school fund.

## CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

And Further, that during the year 1919 and 1920 the United States Government made urgent requests of the farmers and wheat growers of the United States to put forth an effort to increase and swell the volume of wheat for consumption in the United States and for export, in order that a famine situation might be averted,

And Further, that contrary to the implied promise of the United States Government that it would continue to support the market for wheat, and would maintain and guarantee that the price of wheat in 1919 and 1920 upon a price level not to be less than that which was guaranteed and maintained during the period of the actual continuance of the hostile operations of the World War,

And Further, that the Federal Government neglected to redeem its implied promise to so do,

And Further, the market price for wheat for the said years dropped considerably below the minimum price guaranteed by the Federal Government through the Federal Grain Corporation, and that by reason thereof the wheat farmers of the United States sustained tremendous losses on account of the said reduction and price.

Further, that the cost of the production of the 1919 and 1920 wheat crop was vastly enhanced in cost by reason of the scarcity of labor and the consequent high prices paid therefore and the high prices prevailing for all implements, machinery and supplies necessarily used by the wheat farmers of the United States in the production of said 1919 and 1920 crops.

And Whereas, the said United States or Federal Grain Corporation closed out and ceased its operations with a large surplus in the treasury, which said surplus represented profits realized by the said Federal Grain Corporation during the period of the war when it operated and enjoyed a complete monopoly of the wheat markets of the United States, and through said power and influence it exercised a dominant power over the markets of the world. That in justice and equity the said surplus belongs to the wheat growers of the United States of America, and to be equitably restored to them upon a basis of their actual acreage cultivated and tilled during the period of Federal control of wheat prices of the United States.

Whereas, the Federal Government after the close of the World War and termination of its contract with the manufacturers of war materials and supplies were settled with and paid tremendous sums as a remuneration for losses sustained on account of the contract relation existing between the Federal Government and the said manufacturers.,

Whereas Further, the Federal Government settled with paid claims of the railroads and transportation companies with which it had contracts either expressed or implied, for the transportation of war material, soldiers, sailors, and so forth, and that tremendous sums were paid to said transportation companies in settlement of claims which they presented to the Federal Government, many of which claims were not covered by expressed contracts, and many other of said claimants had contracts with the Federal Government where they expressly stipulated and agreed that the Government might cancel and terminate the contracts existing between said claimants and the Government upon the cessation of war, and the restoration of peace without incurring liability for damage.

Whereas, the Federal Government during the period of war by its rules and regulations assumed to dictate and control the production acreage of wheat grown in the United States during the period of actual hostilities, and for the years 1919 and 1920, being the reconstruction period after the war. And in consequence thereof an implied contract arose between the wheat growers and the Federal Government, and the wheat growers relied upon the said implied contract and in justice and right should be remunerated for their losses in a sum not less than a minimum price guaranteed by the Federal Government for wheat during the period of hostilities, and that the distribution and payment of said claims should be paid upon the basis of the actual acreage grown and harvested.

Whereas, the Federal Government realized a profit at the expense of the wheat grower and that the wheat grower in good faith complied with all the rules, regulations and requests of the Federal Government. It is the sense of the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota that in justice and equity Congress should create a commission to accurately survey the situation and receive claims from the wheat growers of the United States based upon their acreage and the losses sustained, and that a sum sufficient be appropriated out of the Treasury of the United States Government to reimburse and pay the wheat growers for their losses upon the basis as above outlined.

Further, that a copy of this resolution be prepared by the Secretary of State of the State of North Dakota and forwarded to each of the senators and congressmen of the State of North Dakota, and to the President and Vice President of the United States, and to each senate and house representatives of each and every state of the Union.

Mr. Fowler moved that the resolution be referred to its appropriate committee, which motion prevailed.

Was read the first and second times and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

A Concurrent Resolution for the Repeal of the Volstead Act was read the first and second time and referred to the Committee on Temperance.

### CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

### Repeal of Volstead Act Streich - Rabe

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate Concurring:

Whereas: The State of North Dakota became a prohibition State at the time of its admission to statehood, and

Whereas: The prohibition law was well enforced up to the time of the enactment by Congress of the Volstead Act, and

Whereas: Since the passing and taking effect of said measure, all forms of crime has increased; and the drinking of intoxicating liquor has become more prevalent, particularly among the young people of the state and nation, and

Whereas: The population of the State Penitentiary has

doubled since the enactment of the said Act, due principally to persons committing other crimes while intoxicated, with moonshine and other low-grade bootleg liquor;

Whereas: Rape and murder has been on the increase in this state since the enactment of said act, and

Whereas: The entire enforcement of law has broken down, not only in liquor cases but in all forms of criminal actions, and

Whereas: Enforcement is a farce, whereby certain members of society appear to be entirely immune to prosecution regardless of the degree of their flagrant violation of said Volstead Act, while others less influential, yet perfectly good citizens are frequently prosecuted and persecuted under the guise of upholding this nefarious law, and

Whereas: The enforcement of said Act is being attempted at a stupendous cost of many millions of dollars annually without any good results being achieved, and

Whereas: Enforcement of said Act will not and can not be accomplished at any cost; and our government is thereby losing additional millions through loss of revenue and instead the Canadian government is reaping a tremendous harvest and paying off its war debt by our citizens patronizing the Canadian liquor market; and

Whereas: The passage of said act has made the farmers and business men poorer, because of the lack of market of certain kinds of grain raised and has made bootleggers millionaires, and

Whereas: Citizens who formerly obeyed the laws are now apparently violating them, and

Whereas: Said Act has been unpopular with the masses from its inception, and becoming more unpopular since its enactment, and

Whereas: The Volstead Act is being violated daily by a large percentage of our population who are in all other matters good law abiding citizens, thereby causing them to be looked upon by some people as law breakers and criminals, and

Whereas: It has made a crime of an Act, that is neither a wrong in itself, nor a sin, nor in any way contrary to the Scriptures; and

Whereas: The Volstead Act is a farce as it can never be enforced by reason of the fact that the people of the nation and state are not universally favorable towards it, causing the same to be held in disrespect and contempt, and thereby having a tendency for our population to loose its respect for law and order generally, and

Whereas: Many school children are largely beginning to disregard law because of nearly universal disregard by their elders of the enforcement of said Volstead Act, and

Whereas: The small percentage of the violators of the

Volstead Act that are prosecuted, are usually people of either little or no means, and as a consequence such prosecutions often have the effect to burden our counties and townships with the burden of providing the necessities of life for the dependents of so-called criminals, for the term of their incarceration, and

Whereas: Our Federal Government passed this legislation primarily as a war measure, and at a time when four million of our young men were in France; and

Whereas: Corruption and graft have raised their hideous heads among the office holders, not only of this state but of the nation, and

Whereas: The United States Government apparently purposely poisons liquor which it permits to be used for various purposes as permitted by the Volstead Act, and which liquor annually causes the death of scores of persons thereby inflicting the death penalty indirectly for the violation of said Act, and

Whereas: We believe that the repeal of the Volstead Act would inure to the greatest benefit to the greatest number of people and assist largely in re-establishing respect for law and order,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring;

That: Immediate steps are taken by Congress looking toward the repeal of the said Volstead Act, and

Further: We respectfully urge that Congress, during its present session, repeal the said Volstead Act by defining liquor in such a manner that the sale of light wines and beer be allowed by law.

Further: That all denaturing of alcohol be effected by non-poisonous substances, so that all poison be eliminated from denatured alcohol that is placed in the market for sale; and

That: Copies of these resolutions be forwarded to President Coolidge, the United States Senate, and the United States House of Representatives, Senators Frazier and Nye, Representatives Burtness, Hall and Sinclair, and to Andrew Mellon, the Secretary of the United States Treasury.

# RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED BY THE STATE ASSOCIA-TION OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS AT THEIR ANNUAL MEETING AT WILLISTON, N. D., ON JANUARY 18, 19, and 20, 1927

#### To the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota.

We, as committee on resolutions beg leave to submit the following resolutions for your approval:

First: Delinquent Personal Property Tax List.

"Be It Resolved that we recommend to the Legislature to amend the law so that the delinquent personal property tax list be in the hands of the sheriff by July 1st instead of October 15th each year.

Second: Assessors.

"Be It Resolved that all Assessors in this State be authorized and instructed to collect the one dollar school poll tax from all parties that are not assessed for any real or personal property at the time the assessment is made by the assessor.

Third: Land Forfeited to County at Tax Sale.

"Be It Further Resolved that we recommend the passage of Senate Bill No. 1 in reference to land forfeited to the County at tax sale except we deem it unnecessary of the advertiseing of said tax list as specified in said bill three and two times as the advertising is very expensive and that one time at each event would be sufficient.

Fourth: Additional one cent gasoline tax.

"Be It Resolved that we recommend an additional one cent tax on gasoline for building and maintenance of state roads and that the money so collected will be distributed as under the present law.

Fifth:

"Be It Further Resolved that we are opposed to any bill providing for a County Assessor.

Sixth:

Whereas the Federal Government is contemplating to appropriate six million dollars to furnish seed and feed for the drought stricken districts,

"Therefore Be It Resolved that we are opposed to any law

whereby to bond the county for the purpose of furnishing seed and feed.

Seventh: State Highway Department.

Whereas the State Highway Departments are operating very satisfactory at the present time we wish to extend congratulations to Mr. Frahm, Mr. McKinnon and Mr. O'Neill who are present at this meeting for their cooperation with the County Commissioners, and we are not in favor of any change in operation of said department.

Eighth: Hail Insurance Law.

Whereas the present hail insurance law is not operating satisfactory.

"Therefore Be It Resolved that a change be made to the effect that no crop will be insured unless by application.

Ninth: Orphan's Home.

"Be It Further Resolved that we recommend to the Legislature that one of the Normal Schools in this State be discontinued as a Normal School and converted into an Orphan's Home.

Tenth: School Treasurer's Reports.

"Be It Further Resolved that the law providing for the publication of School Treasurer's Reports be repealed and that the posting of said report at the annual School Election be sufficient.

#### DISPOSITION OF CLAIMS IN CLOSED BANKS

From November 15, 1920 to December 31, 1924, Inclusive

In Class "A" banks, comprising the first 58 banks that closed, 16,663 claims were filed with the Commission,—of which 13,790 (or  $83\frac{3}{4}\%$ ) were admitted as eligible to guaranty and 2,873 claims (or  $17\frac{1}{4}\%$ ) were rejected for further proof of eligibility.

Of the 2,873 rejected claims, 1,773 ( $10\frac{4}{0}$ ) were abandoned by claimants through not filing Demand for Hearing. Demands for Hearing were filed on 1,100 claims (6.5%) all of which were referred to the Referee:

224 (1.3%) were reported by the Referee for Allowance;

458 (2.7%) were reported by the Referee for Disallowance;

61 (0.4%) were abandoned by claimants through non-appearance;

357 (2.1%) are not yet reported by the Referee.

84% of all claims were allowed;

11.2% of all claims were abandoned by claimants;

2.7% of all claims were Disallowed;

2.1% of all claims are pending and undetermined.

In Class "B" banks, comprising the next 23 banks that closed. 5,991 claims were filed with the Commission, of which 76% were allowed, 15.7% were abandoned by claimants through not filing Demand for Hearing; 8.3% are being held to be referred to the Referee for further proof.

In Class "C" banks, comprising the next 17 banks that closed, 3,205 claims were filed with the Commission, of which 76% were allowed; 17.3% were abandoned by claimants; 7% are being held to be referred to the Referee for further proof.

In Class "D" banks, comprising the next 27 banks that closed, 5,561 claims were filed with the Commission, of which 77.7% were allowed; 17.4% were abandoned by claimants; 5% are being held to be referred to the Referee for further proof.

Of the 1,100 claims referred to the Referee all in Class "A" banks, he has held hearings on approximately all of these claims and has reported to the Commission on 743 claims, or 67% thereof. There are 995 other claims in Classes "B", "C", and "D" banks awaiting reference to the Referee on which hearings have not yet been held.

Much of the delay in hearing and determining rejected claims arises from attorneys for claimants requesting that hearings be continued for their convenience or that the time allowed for filing briefs be further extended. There are notable offenders in this direction and the Commission anpears to be powerless to push these hearings through more rapidly to a final conclusion if claimant's interests are not to be jeopardized.

In the 125 banks in Classes "A", "B", "C", and "D", being all the banks that closed prior to the end of 1924, there were 31,420 claims filed with the Commission, of which 80% were admitted to guaranty, 20% were rejected as ineligible to guaranty pending further proof; 13.5% were abandoned by claimants and 6.5% were referred or are now being held to be hereafter referred to the Referee for further proof.

The Commission is advised by the Receiver of Closed Banks, under date of January 13, 1927, that the approximate total recoveries from all Receivers of Closed Banks since 1920 up to December 31, 1926, amounts to \$6,314,340.90. Disbursements for dividends, preferred claims, expenses, redemption of collateral, taxes, payment of first liens, etc., amounts to \$5,280,873.59. Leaving a balance on hand in the Bank of North Dakota on December 31, 1926, of \$1,033,467.31. The total amount of collateral redeemed by the present Receiver up to December 31, amounts to, face value, \$7,467,405.67.

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#### AUDIT REPORT

#### OF DEPOSITORS' GUARANTY FUND

#### BISMARCK, N. D.

#### Gentlemen:

Pursuant to engagement, I have made an audit of the books, records and vouchers of the Depositors' Guaranty Fund of the State of North Dakota at Bismarck, N. D., for the period beginning November 1, 1924 and ending November 30, 1926, and I hereby certify, that in my opinion, the following statements and schedules reflect the true cash transactions during the period, and the financial condition of the Department as at close of business November 30, 1926.

On page 9 we present Balance Sheet of November 30, 1926 followed by statement of disbursements and receipts for the period, with detail and page number noted opposite each item for convenient reference to supporting details.

The Department keeps its records on a cash basis and we have set up our statements in the same manner, and have not taken into account accrued items, which, with the exception of liability to the depositors, are small.

Due to the many elements entering into the completion of the depositors' claims against the Guaranty Fund, it is impossible to determine the accurate liability of the Guaranty Fund to depositors of banks that have closed to date. Before this liability is set up, the Receiver must wind up the affairs of the bank, and make the final distribution of the receivership. All depositors claims must be properly filed, and all finally passed upon to determine whether or not they come under the Act. The liability to the depositors has not been fully determined at this time on any bank on which the general 10% dividend payment has been authorized and any attempt we might make to determine the time required to take up all the claims that might come under the Act could not be substantiated.

On the basis of information available at this time on the first one hundred fifteen banks on which a depositors' dividend of 10% has been authorized, it appears that fifty per

cent of the deposits have been admitted as guaranteed and ten per cent are in dispute pending decisions of referee and the courts. The officers of the Department estimate that a larger percentage of the later closed banks will come under the Act. Assuming that fifty-five per cent of all deposits in banks closed to date are a claim on the Depositors' Guaranty Fund, it would be safe to say that it will require over ninety years to pay off this liability on the basis of the present net income to the fund.

The oath of office and bond of the Commission and its officers were found on file as provided by Section 2 of the Guaranty of Deposits Act, with the exception of the Manager of the Bank of North Dakota who does not appear to have qualified as provided by the Guaranty of Deposits Act.

The State Examiner is the appointed and acting secretary of the Commission, as statute provides may be done. The affairs of the Depositors' Guaranty Fund Commission and the State Examiner's Department are closely associated in many ways, and this arrangement is of considerable advantage to both departments in working out their problems in connection with insolvent banks.

The records of proceedings of the Commission were found to be very explicit, covering every detail of the Commission's operations, and were recorded to date in a neat and orderly manner.

We experienced no difficulty in our verification of the financial accounts of the Departments. We found all funds coming into the hands of the Department properly accounted for, and, with the exception of a few clerical errors, not of sufficient importance to be worthy of mention, and which were taken up for correction during our examination, we consider the records well kept in all branches of the Commission.

The officers and employees of the Depositors' Guaranty Fund Commission and the State Examiner's Department afforded us every facility and assistance in the progress of our examination, for which we wish to acknowledge our appreciation.

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#### **REVIEW OF STATEMENTS AND EXAMINATION**

DUE FROM BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA \$220,937.13

The Bank of North Dakota is used for gathering and disbursing the assessment funds that have been assessed and credited by the banks over the state, as set aside for payment to depositors, and other expenditures of the Department. This represents such funds deposited with the Bank of North Dakota at date of audit.

In addition to this the bank carried a special collection account to the credit of the fund of \$11,146.48, derived from net proceeds of collections on collateral held to secure the Special Deposits of the Williams County State Bank, this had not been recorded in the books of the Commission at date of audit. In our statements we have charged the Bank of North Dakota with this account and credited the special deposits of the Williams County State Bank of Williston. This item was taken into account in the department records during our examination.

#### DUE FROM OPEN STATE BANKS ON

#### ASSESSMENTS \$247,934.62

As assessments are levied on the banks coming under the Depositors' Guaranty Act, the amount is credited to the fund on the bank's records, subject to withdrawal on demand by the Depositors' Guaranty Fund Commission. This represents the amount of assessment in the hands of the banks over the State at date of audit. Verification of the accounts was made by us by correspondence and found to agree with the records of the Department with the exception of items noted on detail as listed beginning on page 18. The differences in accounts were taken up with the banks by the Department officers during our examination.

#### DUE FROM CLOSED BANKS ON ASSESSMENT

#### ACCOUNTS \$52,800.43

This represents the amount of assessments standing to the credit of the Depositors' Guaranty Fund in insolvent banks at time of closing, and additional assessments not levied at date of closing that had not been paid by the receiver. A schedule in detail of the balances due the Depositors' Guaranty Fund was submitted to the Receiver of Closed Banks and his records were found to be in harmony with the records of the Commission on these items.

Section 16 of the Guaranty of Deposits Act provides that the amount of money standing to the credit of the Depositors' Guaranty Fund on deposit in closed banks shall be a first lien upon the assets of such institution. These credits are being paid by the Receiver of Closed Banks as fast as he has funds available and it is considered that they will all eventually be paid into the fund.

#### SPECIAL DEPOSITS WITH CLOSED BANKS \$72,339.74

Prior to period covered by this audit the Commission made special deposits from Depositors' Guaranty Funds with banks that were pressed for cash. This practice has been discontinued and no such special deposits made during this audit period. Banks that have not returned such deposits have closed. On page 31 we list the balances due and unpaid from each such bank. Some of these deposits are secured by collateral which is out for collection. A large part of this collateral is considered of questionable value and was not examined by us. A list of special deposits due from closed banks as carried on the books of the Department was submitted to the Receiver of Closed Banks and his records were found to agree with the Commission accounts. This class of deposits is considered as preferred credits and first lien on the assets of the closed institutions. It is estimated the Guaranty Fund may sustain a small loss on some of these deposits.

The Receiver of Closed Banks Department informed us he had funds on hand to be applied on these deposits. He informed us he had funds on hand to take up the account of the Clyde State Bank in full, which would be paid into the Depositors' Guaranty Fund within a few days.

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#### ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE (CLAIM ACCOUNTS) \$340.07

This represents legal expenses paid by the Commission in connection with the interests of the Guaranty Fund in recovery of collateral pledged by banks that have closed. This expense is charged to the closed banks on the books of the Commission and paid from the assets of said bank by the receiver.

#### 3% ASSESSMENT ACCOUNTS UNSETTLED \$5,850.00

This represents three per cent of the capital stock of newly organized banks paid into the Guaranty Fund as provided by Section 14 of the Guaranty of Deposits Act, that had not been adjusted at date of audit. This is carried as a credit to the banks on the Commission's records and treated so in our statements until finally settled by the Commission.

#### **DUE FIRST STATE BANK OF AMIDON \$3.30**

This represents a small balance due the First State Bank of Amidon on assessments and is due the receiver on overpayment.

## UNDISTRIBUTED SPECIAL DIVIDENDS FROM

#### **RECEIVER \$8,114.34**

When the Receiver of Closed Banks distributes a dividend from the liquidation of an insolvent institution in his charge, he pays over to the Depositors' Guaranty Commission the portion going to depositors that have had their Receivers' Certificates of Proof of Claim converted into Certificates of Indebtedness of the Depositors' Guaranty Fund. The Depositors' Guaranty Fund Commission makes the distribution of the dividend turned over to them by the receiver, to the depositor. In this way the Commission has a record of all payments to the depositors after they have taken the account over.

This represents dividends from the receivership in the process of distribution to the depositors from proceeds of the assets of banks listed on page 34 of this report.

### DEPOSITORS' GUARANTY FUND ACCOUNT \$592,768.44

This item represents the balance in the fund available for distribution to depositors as the same appeared Nov. 30, 1926.

The payment of a ten per cent dividend has been authorized by the Commission on the first one hundred twentyfive banks closed that stand unpaid.

Ten per cent dividend has been paid the depositors on the disputed claims that have been properly presented on the first one hundred fifteen of these banks. There are claims aggregating approximately four million dollars in these banks that has not been presented for payment or that are being held up by the Commission pending hearing before the referee and in litigation in the courts. This ties up four hundred thousand dollars of the fund pending proper presentation of claims and the outcome of decisions.

Payment of the ten per cent dividend on the remaining ten banks authorized is being executed as fast as the office force can do the work.

#### DEPOSITORS' GUARANTY FUND BALANCE

#### NOV. 1, 1924 - \$1,002,976.16

This item represents the Depositors' Guaranty Fund net worth as the same appears on the books of the Department at beginning of business Nov. 1, 1924, and is the figure used as the starting point for our audit for the period covered.

This figure agrees with the audit of the previous period with the exception that the 3% assessment on the date of their audit, Oct. 31, 1924, was considered as an earning and we are considering same unearned until the account has been adjusted and settled; and small adjustments amounting to \$9.38.

#### BANK ASSESSMENTS LEVIED \$405,648.58

This item represents the proceeds of assessments on banks as provided by Section 10 of Guaranty of Deposits Acts. This authorizes a levy of one regular and four additional assessments each year of one-twentieth of one per cent each on the average daily deposits of the bank. The maximum levy authorized by law has been assessed for the full period.

The assessments were compared with the verified statements filed by the banks and found to be properly computed and levied from the information the banks had furnished.

#### INTEREST RECEIVED \$15,448.23

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This represents the amount of interest collected by the department for the period covered by this audit from funds deposited in the Bank of North Dakota, the Capitol Security Bank of Bismarck, and Special Deposits in State Banks.

#### EXAMINATION FEES COLLECTED \$4,426.74

This item represents examination fees and expense refunds collected by the Commission as provided by Section 5 and 6 of the Guaranty of Deposits Act for the period covered.

#### ASSIGNMENT FEES COLLECTED \$1,801.00

A fee of one dollar is charged and collected from the de= positor for the recording of each assignment of claim transferred on the records of the Commission.

A detail record has not been kept of the income from this source. It would simplify the auditing and proving of this income to install some system that would show the date and payor of each assignment fee collected.

#### FIRST STATE BANK OF JUD RECOVERY \$97.16

The creditors of the First State Bank of Jud were paid in full during the year 1920 from the Depositors' Guaranty Fund. On March 10, 1926, the Compission received the above amount from the receiver of the Jud State Bank as recovery from assets of the bank, which is turned into the Depositors' Guaranty Fund.

## OPERATING EXPENSE FROM GUARANTY

#### FUND \$45,942.51

The administrative expenses of the Depositors' Guaranty

Fund Commission are provided in part by legislative appropriation from the State General Fund, and part from the Depositors' Guaranty Fund as provided by Section 34 of the Act, appropriating \$20,000.00 per year or as much thereof as is necessary from the Depositors' Guaranty Fund to meet the expense of the Commission.

In July 1925 and 1926, \$20,000.00 was transferred to the State Treasurer from the funds in the hands of the Commission for each year's expense and expenses of the department are paid by the State Auditors Warrant as other claims against the state are paid. Prior to July 1, 1925, expenses from the fund were paid by the Secretary of the Commission on vouchers approved by the State Auditing Board.

Expenditures from both funds were compared with the amount allowed by law and found to be well within the alloted appropriations as will be shown by details beginning on page 39.

Due to the preliminary costs of investigations, hearings, and preparation of claims under the Depositors' Guaranty Act, the expense of the Department has been high when compared with the income for the period. After the first dividend to the depositors has been made the cost of making additional payments should be comparatively small.

## 10% GENERAL DIVIDEND PAID DEPOSITORS

#### \$791,686.92

This represents the amount of a general ten per cent dividend payment to depositors that come within the Act from the Depositors' Guaranty Fund covering the first one hundred fifteen banks closed.

All original approved claims on which payment had been made, numbering about twenty-two thousand, were examined by us and found to agree with the amount paid, excepting a few small clerical errors that were corrected by the Department during our examination.

### House of Representatives, Bismarck, North Dakota, January 31, 1927.

The House was called to order promptly at 2 o'clock P. M., Speaker John W. Carr, presiding.

Prayer by the Chaplain, Rev. Fred E. Klein.

Roll call.

All members present except: Messrs. Aljets, Elken, Fettig, Jardine, Johnson of Ward, Miller, O'Neill, Traynor, Watt, and Zimmerman.

#### STATEMENT BY MRS. CRAIG

Fellow-member O'Neill has crossed the Great Divide. His lips are silenced by death. Never again will his voice be heard in this hall in response to Roll Call.

Mr. Helbling moved that all absentees be excused. Which motion prevailed.

#### STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER

#### JOHN W. CARR

Upon learning yesterday morning that Representative O'Neill had passed away, the Speaker and Chief Clerk called upon the members of the family to extend the sympathy of the members of the House, and, at the same time, to learn what arrangements they had in mind relative to the funeral. While there, we met quite a number of other members of the House and Senate. It was thought best to appoint a joint committee of the two houses to arrange for a memorial session this afternoon, after taking it up with members of the family of the deceased member and finding it met with their approval. After consulting with such members as were available a joint committee was appointed. The committee consists of the President of the Senate and Senators Benson and Hamilton and the Speaker and Representatives Butt and Burkhart.

We thought it best to go ahead with our regular order of business up to about three o'clock, and recess a little before three.

The program will consist of the opening prayer by the chaplain and a vocal number, three or four talks by some of the members of the House and by Senator Hamilton, and at that point an opportunity will be given for any other member to speak if he wishes. These remarks will be entered in the Journal. These will be followed by a resolution by Representative Swett.

Six members of the House will be appointed to escort the remains to the train tomorrow, and also an escort of two persons to accompany the remains to the home of the deceased member.

Owing to the distance to the home of the deceased member, it was thought best to appoint a brother of Mrs. O'Neill and the Deputy Sheriff of Renville County who happened to be down here, as the escort.

There will be a number by members of the Hamline College Glee Club and a prayer. After that the Houses will re-convene and immediately adjourn.

The remains of our deceased member will be at the Chapel of Webb Bros., where they may be viewed by, any members desiring to do so.

The committee also arranged to have a floral pillow made to be sent with the remains tomorrow morning. On this pillow will be the words "Twentieth Legislative Assembly."

The committee undertook to make the arrangements without consulting very many members. We consulted such as we were able to see without much difficulty.

Mr. Twichell offers the following resolution, and moves its adoption:

That Whereas, the Honorable J. W. W. O'Neill our said fellow member, be made out in the name of Mrs. J. W. O'Neill, his widow, and that the same be by the House Voucher Clerk forwarded to her at Norma, North Dakota, as issued.

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Judiciary to whom was referred:

House Bill No. 91. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 17 of Chapter 162 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1919, Known as the Workmen's Compensation Law, as Amended by the Session Laws of North Dakota for the Years 1921 and 1923.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

After the numeral "17" in line 6 of the printed bill strike out the balance of Section 17, and in lieu thereof insert the following:

The Bureau shall have full power and authority to hear and determine all questions within its jurisdiction, and its decision thereon shall be final unless an appeal be perfected therefrom within sixty (60) days of the date of entry of the Bureau's final decision, of which decision notice shall be given to all parties to the proceeding in which said final decision was rendered. Said appeal may be taken by any party to said proceeding, including the injured employee or party claiming to be an injured employee, the dependents or legal representaties of a deceased employee, the em-ployer or alleged employer of said employee, to the District Court for the county wherein the injury, accident or sick-ness was inflicted or incurred. The appealing party shall file an undertaking in the amount of Two Hundred Dol-lars (\$200.00) with sufficient security to be approved by the Clerk of the District Court of the County in which said appeal is taken to the effect that he will pay any judgment for costs which may be rendered against him. In such proceedings the state's attorney of the county in which said appeal is pending without additional compensation shall represent the Workmen's Compensation Bureau and shall be notified by the Clerk forthwith of the filing of such appeal.

Within thirty (30) days after filing the appeal, the appealing party shall prepare and serve a complaint setting forth therein his or its cause of action in the ordinary form, and further pleadings shall be had in said cause according to the rules of civil procedure in the District Court. Within twenty (20) days after the service of a copy of said notice of appeal upon the Workmen's Compensaton Bureau the Bureau shall certify the complete record in such proceeding to the District Court. Upon the trial of said cause additional proof and evidence as is material to the issues, and the Court shall be in no way bound by the findings or determination made by the Workmen's Compensation Bureau, but shall exercise his own independent judgment, both as to the facts and the law. In the event that judgment of the Court rendered in said proceedings awards compensation to the employee, he shall make specific findings as to whether the said employee has received injuries causing total disability, or temporary partial disability, or permanent partial disability; and in the event the Court finds the injury caused permanent disability he shall determne the percentage which such disability bears to the total disability,

taking into consideration the employee's age and occupation, and the aforesaid findings shall be incorporated in the judgment of the Court rendered in said proceeding and shall be binding upon the Bureau in fixing the amount of the award to said injured employee. The award so arrived at shall be paid by the Workmen's Compensation Bureau out of the Workmen's Compensation Fund or by the employer in the case of an elective claim in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

The costs of such proceedings, including a reasonable attorney's fee to the claimant's attorney, if the claimant be successful, shall be fixed by the Trial Judge and taxed against the Workmen's Compensation Fund or the employer in the case of an elective claim, as the case may be.

Each party to the said proceeding shall have the right of appeal to the Supreme Court, said appeal to be governed by existing statutes as in the case of appeals in civil cases, and a trial de novo shall be had in the Supreme Court.

It is the intent of this Act that appeals as aforesaid may be had by any party from any and all final decisions of the Workmen's Compensation Bureau.

Section 2. All acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3. Emergency. This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval.

Meeting of the Industrial Commission January 24, 1927, held in the Governor's office at 4:15 o'clock P. M.

Present: Governor A. G. Sorlie, Attorney General Geo. F. Shafer and Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor Joseph A. Kitchen.

Meeting called to order by Governor A. G Sorlie.

Mr. C. R. Green, Manager and Director General of the Bank of North Dakota, appeared before the Commission and presented the following communication:

#### January 19, 1927.

To The Industrial Commission, Capitol Building,

Bismarck, North Dakota.

Gentlemen:

We are herewith submitting to you for your consideration and attention copy of an Opinion handed down this week by the Supreme Court which very materially affects the State with reference to taxes on lands, upon which loans have been made by the Bank of North Dakota, as Agent for the State. This involves taxes on about 97000 acres of land, which is either in the process of foreclosure, or has gone to the Sheriff's Deed and title held by the State Treasurer as Trustee for the State.

This Opinion discloses that the State of North Dakota is liable for all taxes accrued and delinquent up to the time that it received Sheriff's Deed. It exempts, however, such land from further taxation so long as it is owned by the State.

Before these deeds can be filed, it will be necessary to have all taxes against the land paid. Under the Bond Act passed in 1923 (chapter 242—1923) all taxes accruing and past due on lands held under mortgages by the State of North Dakota, and which were either under foreclosure or held by deed, were to be cancelled and abated. A suit was started in Burleigh County to test out the 1923 law. The District Court held that all taxes accruing after Sheriff's Deed was obtained would be abated but that the taxes unpaid before the deed was issued would have to be paid from the State. A cross appeal was taken from this decision by the Bank of North Dakota and the County of Burleigh, and the decision of the District Court.

This leaves the State of North Dakota facing the problem of how to take care of these taxes in order to protect the land which it has obtained on these foreclosures. Since the decision of the lower court, we have served an injunction on all County Auditors restraining them from disposing of the lands affected where deeds had been called for by the holders of the tax certificates. Now that the supreme court decision has been handed down, undoubtably action will be commenced immediately to force us to dissolve the injunctions and pay the taxes, and if this is not done, the State will lose title to such lands on Tax Deeds.

Up to this time the Bank of North Dakota has protected the State's property where tax certificates were held by individuals and where we could not restrain the Auditor from selling the property. We have invested in these taxes, up to this time, \$120,000.00, and the management feels that we have about all the money invested in such taxes that we can safely advance. As you know, the Eank has no available funds, except its deposits, most of which is public money, and must not be invested in any "frozen assets" such as lands. Such funds can only safely be invested in quick liquid securities that can readily be turned into cash. As the amount required to take care of all these delinguent taxes will run into big money, we feel that the sufficient to take care of it. The amount immediately necessary, and which must be taken care of at once, will amount to approxim tely \$400.000.00 in addition to what already has been paid, and that the amount will possibly increase rather than diminish, and the payment of these taxes can only be taken care of through seles of land and profits from the crops raised on said lands. We further feel that the state itself will not lose any money, as the income from sales of land and crops should about hold this fund even and eventually retire it entirely.

We therefore suggest to your commission that the Governor present this matter to the legislature by special message and that the Industrial Commission use its best efforts to have a law passed to provide funds to take care of this unfortunate situation.

We might add, further, that the legislature passed an Act in 1923 for the purpose of taking care of this past due tax situation, and that in 1925 an attempt was made in the legislature to repeal the law. However, when properly explained, the bills were withdrawn so that as a matter of fact, two legislative sessions have seen the necessity of taking care of this tax situation, but the method provided has been annuled by the Supreme Court's decision.

Mr. Shafer suggested that in view of the recent decision by the Supreme Court, it be the sense of the Industrial Commission that the question of making provision for the payment of accrued and delinquent taxes, on lands acquired by the State through foreclosure, be made the subject of a special message by the Governor to the Legislature, and that the foregoing communication from Mr. C. R. Green, Manager and Director General of the Bank of North Dakota be transmitted with such message.

Further Action on the matter was deferred until a study could be made of the decision rendered by the Supreme Court.

#### RE-PAID TAXES

Dear Sir:

Complying with your request for additional information regarding the amount of money which will be required to pay the past due taxes on lands on which the State holds mortgages and which are now under foreclosure, or deed, beg to advise as follows:

Taxes covering the year 1919, 1920, 1921, 1922, 1923, 1924 and 1925 on foreclosed loans held by the State of North Dakota, are approximately \$520.000. \$120.000 of this amount has been paid by the Bank of North Dakota in order to protect the State's interest. Of this amount approximately 35% of the certificates and subsequent tax payments is held by individuals, or, in other words, \$182,000. The balance of 65% cf the total amount, or \$338,000 is held by counties. Basing our conclusions on past experience we estimate that under ordinary conditions it will require an additional \$200,000 to take care of the taxes for the biennium period of 1926 and 1927, and, using the same estimates as above, \$75,000 of this would be held by individuals, and \$125,000 by counties. The amount necessary, as stated in our letter of January 19, 1927, to cover taxes, deait with taxes up to and including 1925.

# JOINT HOUSE AND SENATE COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO REPORT A RESOLUTION UPON THE GREAT LAKES-ST. LAWRENCE WATERWAY SUB-MITS THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION AS ITS REPORT:

A Resolution Memorializing the President of the United States Relative to the St. Lawrence Seaway.

Whereas, a joint board of engineers representing the United States and Canada have officially and unanimously declared ship channel connection between the Great Lakes and the Atlantic by way of the St. Lawrence to be practical, and

Whereas, the St. Lawrence Commission of the United States appointed to determine the need of such a seaway has unanimously declared, in its report to the President made December 27, 1926, that:

"The construction of the shipway from the Great Lakes to the sea is imperative both for the relief and for the future development of a vast area in the interior of the continent"

### and that:

"It has been estimated that the value in a single year to the farmers alone would equal the capital cost of the waterway"

# and that:

"The economic importance of the improvement would be far greater than the savings made upon the actual tonnage transported, important though that would be"

#### and

Whereas, the extension of the commerce of the State of North Dakota, the development of her resources, her present prosperity and her future welfare all demand world trade contacts by way of direct low cost ocean transportation to and from the markets of the world, and

Whereas, the St. Lawrence seaway would give to the State of North Dakota ocean ports on the Great Lakes practically at her front door; would give direct ocean transportation with wider and lower cost of movement to world markets; would increase the demand for her products, and would thereby assure to her agriculture now depressed, and in particular to her grain, dairy and livestock producers, a marked degree of permanent relief from present excessive transportation costs and a more favorable basic price for all farm production, and

Whereas, such seaway would permanently lower her transportation charges both on exports and on imports and would thereby stimulate the development of her present industries, invite new enterprise, and would generally assure to her citizens an enlarged and abiding prosperity.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota; the Senate concurring, that we do most earnestly urge upon the President of the United States the imperative national need of the St. Lawrence seaway, and further express to him the earnest desire of this state that immediate steps be taken for the negotiation of a treaty with Canada to that end, and

Be It Further Resolved, that a duly authenticated copy of this resolution be transmited to the President of the United States, the Secretary of State, the presiding officers of the Senate and House of Representatives, the Chairman of the St. Lawrence Commission of the United States, and to each of the Senators and Representatives from the State of North Dakota in the Congress.

House Bill No. 91. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 17 of Chapter 162 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1919, Known as the Workmen's Compensation Law, as Amended by the Session Laws of North Dakota for the Years 1921 and 1923.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

After the numeral "17" in line 6 of the printed bill strike out the balance of Section 17, and in lieu thereof insert the following:

The Bureau shall have full power and authority to hear and determine all questions within its jurisdiction, and its decision thereon shall be final unless an appeal be perfected therefrom within sixty (60) days of the date of entry of the Bureau's final decision, of which decision notice shall be given to all parties to the proceeding in which said final decision was rendered. Said appeal may be taken by any party to said proceeding, including the injured employee or party claiming to be an injured employee, the dependents or legal representatives of a deceased employee, the employer or alleged employer of said employee, to the District Court for any county of the Judicial District wherein the injury, accident or sickness was inflicted or incurred. The appealing party shall file an undertaking in the amount of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) with sufficient security to be approved by the Clerk of the District Court of the County in which said appeal is taken to the effect that he will pay any judgment for costs which may be rendered against him. In such proceedings the state's attorney of the county in which said appeal is pending without additional compensation shall represent the Workmen's Compensation Bureau and shall be notified by the Clerk forthwith of the filing of such appeal.

Within thirty (30) days after filing the appeal, the appealing party shall prepare and serve a complaint setting forth therein his or its cause of action in the ordinary form, and further pleadings shall be had in said cause according to the rules of civil procedure in the District Court. Within twenty (20) days after the service of a copy of said notice of appeal upon the Workmen's Compensation Bureau the Bureau shall certify the complete record in such pro-ceeding to the District Court. Upon the trial of said cause upon appeal by the Court, either party may offer such additional proof and evidence as is material to the issues, and the Court shall be in no way bound by the findings or determination made by the Workmen's Compensation Bureau, but shall exercise his own independent judgment, both as to the facts and the law. In the event that judgment of the Court rendered in said proceedings awards compensation to the employee, he shall make specific findings as to whether the said employee has received injuries causing total disability, or temporary partial disability, or permanent partial disability; and in the event the Court finds the injury caused permanent disability he shall determine the percentage which such disability bears to the total disability, taking into consideration the employee's age and occupation, and the aforesaid findings shall be incorporated in the judgment of the Court rendered in said proceeding and shall be binding upon the Bureau in fixing the amount of the award to said injured employee. The award so arrived at shall be paid by the Workmen's Compensation Bureau out of the Workmen's Compensation fund or by the employer in the case of an elective claim in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

The cost of such proceedings, including a reasonable attorney's fee to the claimant's attorney, if the claimant be successful, shall be fixed by the Trial Judge and taxed against the Workmen's Compensation Fund or the employer in the case of an elective claim, as the case may be.

Each party to the said proceeding shall have the right of appeal to the Supreme Court, said appeal to be governed by existing statutes as in the case of appeals in civil cases, and a trial de novo shall be had in the Supreme Court.

It is the intent of this Act that appeals as aforesaid may be had by any party from any and all final decisions of the Workmen's Compensation Bureau.

Section 2. All acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3. Emergency. This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTA-TIVES of the State of North Dakota, the Senate concurring therein:

Section 1. That it is the sense of the Legislative Assembly of State of North Dakota, that the Bank of North Dakota should invest some of its surplus funds, that it now has in banks outside of this State, and in United States government and other bonds, in the purchase of tax certificates at tax sales, such purchases not to exceed sixty per cent of the total taxes sold, in any one year, in any county, and to consist of purchases of tax certificates on farm and agricultural lands only, as distinguished from city lots and city property.

Section 2. That the Bank of North Dakota be furnished with a copy of this resolution by the Secretary of State, and that also a copy be presented to each member of the Industrial Commission, by the Secretary of State.

Mr. Erickson of Kidder moved that the concurrent resolution be referred to its appropriate committee.

Which motion prevailed and the concurrent resolution was referred to the Committee on Banking.

And Further, the market price for wheat for the said years dropped considerably below the minimum price guaranteed by the Federal Government through the Federal Grain Corporation, and that by reason thereof the wheat farmers of the United States sustained tremendous losses on account of the said reduction and price.

Further, that the cost of the production of the 1919 and 1920 wheat crop was vastly enhanced by reason of the scarcity of labor and the consequent high prices paid therefcr, and the high prices prevailing for all implements, machinery and supplies necessarily used by the wheat farmers of the United States in the production of the said 1919 and 1920 crops.

And Whereas, the said United States or Federal Grain Corporation closed out and ceased its operations with a large surplus in the treasury, which said surplus represented profits realized by the said Federal Grain Corporation during the period of the war when it operated and enjoyed a complete monopoly of the wheat markets of the United States, and through said power and influence it exercised a dominant power over the markets of the world; and that in justice and equity the said surplus belongs to the wheat growers of the United States of America;

Whereas, the Federal Government after the close of the World War and the termination of its contract with the manufacturers of war materials and supplies, many such manufacturers were settled with and paid large sums as a remuneration for losses sustained on account of the contract relation existing between the Federal Government and the said manufacturers.

Whereas Further, the Federal Government settled with paid claims of the railroads and transportation companies with which it had contracts either expressed or implied, for the transportation of war material, soldiers, sailors, and so forth, and that large sums were paid to said transportation companies in settlement of claims which they presented to the Federal Government, many of which claims were not covered by express contracts.

Whereas, the Federal Government during the period of war, by its rules and regulations assumed to dictate and control the production acreage of wheat grown in the United States during the period of actual hostilities, and for the years 1919 and 1920, being the reconstruction period after the war; and in consequence thereof an implied contract arose between the wheat growers and the Federal Government, and the wheat growers relied upon the said implied contract and in justice and right should be remunerated for their losses in a sum not less than a price guaranteed by the Federal Government for wheat during the period of hostilities;

Whereas, the Federal Government realized a profit at the expense of the wheat grower and that the wheat grower in good faith complied with all the rules, regulations and requests of the Federal Governmen. It is the sense of the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota that in justice and equity Congress should take full cognizance of these millions of dollars now in the National Treasury, so retained and belonging to the Wheat Growers of the United States; that this money should be made available to use in any manner required in connection with Legislation which should be enacted at the earliest possible date, establishing for the grower of wheat in the United States, a price for his product, based upon American standards of living and cost.

Further, that a copy of this resolution be prepared by the Secretary of State of the State of North Dakota and forwarded to the President and Vice President of the United States, and to each Senator and member of the House of Representatives from the State of North Dakota.

## REPORT OF SELECT COMMITTEE

# TO SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF

# THE TWENTIETH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

The Joint Committee appointed by the Senate and House of Representatives to consider the Resolutions submitted to your Honorable Bodies by the Industrial Commission on February 1st, 1927, in reference to the matter of taxes on State lands obtained thru the foreclosure of mortgages by the Bank of North Dakota, herewith submits the following report and recommendations:

Your Joint Committee held three meetings to consider said matter which was attended by all of the members, and

also by-Mr. C. R. Green, Manager of the Bank of North Dakota and the Attorney General. After obtaining such information as was available on the subject and considering the matter from all its angles, your Joint Committee finds that approximately \$520,000.00 has accrued in taxes against about 97,000 acres of land owned by the State obtained thru the foreclosure of mortgages taken by the Bank of North Dakota; that about one-third of said amount constituted tax certificates sold to individual purchasers, of which the Bank of North Dakota has paid out of its funds to protect the title of the State, the sum of about \$120,000.00; that about \$65,-000.00 of such individual tax certificates are outstanding unpaid, and must be paid at once; that about \$338,000.00 of such unpaid taxes are in the form of tax certificates held by the Counties; and it is estimated that there will be about \$200,000.00 in such taxes accrue against said lands during the next two years, of which, on the basis of past experience, one-third will be sold to individuals and two-thirds held by the Counties.

It is further the opinion of your Joint Committee, that unless some legislation is adopted to take care of the situation, tax certificates now held by the Counties on such lands will be assigned or transferred, tax deeds may be applied for and obtained, and confusion result affecting and incumbering the State's title to such lands.

Your Joint Committee, therefore, respectfully recommends the adoption of legislation at this Session along the following lines:

First, the passage of a law authorizing and directing the Bank of North Dakota to pay all tax certificates held by individuals outstanding against said lands, and to provide an appropriation therefor out of the general funds of the State, if such funds can be made available for that purpose, and to constitute such appropriation in the amount of \$250,000.00as a revolving fund for that purpose; second, the passage of a law wholly suspending the right of the County to acquire tax deeds, or to otherwise enforce its tax liens against said lands for the period of two years ending July 1st, 1929; providing that such tax certificates shall bear interest at the rate of seven per cent (7%) per annum until paid; and prohibiting the assignment or transfer by the Counties of any tax certificates held by them upon any such lands during the period such law shall be in force.

Two bills designed to carry out these recommendations are made a part of this report and will be introduced in the House of Representatives.

## House of Representatives, Bismarck, North Dakota, February 9, 1927.

The House re-assembled at 1:00 P. M., pursuant to recess taken, Speaker John W. Carr, presiding.

The House referred to the fifteenth order of business.

## GENERAL ORDERS

Mr. Elken moved that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of general orders; which motion prevailed, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

The Speaker called Mr. Elken to the chair.

When the Committee arose it submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker: The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 185. A Bill For an Act to Permit the Use of Guide Cards in Elections, to Assist in Enabling Elector to Vote for the Candidate of His or Her Choice.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendment, as follows:

On line 6, page 2, of the printed bill, after the word "removing" insert the words "or altering." After Section 2, of the printed bill, add the following section: "Section 3. Repeal. All acts or parts of acts insofar as they may conflict herewith, are hereby repealed."

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Also, Mr. Speaker, the Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 91. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 17 of Chapter 162 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1919, Known as the Workmen's Compensation Law, as Amended by the Session Laws of North Dakota for the Years 1921 and 1923.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendment, as follows:

After the numeral "17" in line 6 of the printed bill strike out the balance of Section 17, and in lieu thereof insert the following:

The Bureau shall have the full power and authority to hear and determine all questions within its jurisdiction, and its decision thereon shall be final unless an appeal be perfected therefrom within sixty (60) days of the date of entry of the Bureau's final decision, of which decision notice shall be given to all parties to the proceeding in which said final decision was rendered. Said appeal may be taken by any party to said proceeding, including the injured employee or party claiming to be an injured employee, the dependents or legal representatives of a deceased employee, the employer or alleged employer of said employee, to the District Court for any county of the Judicial District wherein the injury, accident or sickness was inflicted or incurred. The appealing party shall file an undertaking in the amount of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) with sufficient security to be approved by the Clerk of the District Court of the County in which said appeal is taken to the effect that he will pay any judgment for costs which may be rendered against him. In such proceedings the state's attorney of the county in which said appeal is pending without additional compensa-tion shall represent the Workmen's Compensation Bureau and shall be notified by the Clerk forthwith of the filing of such appeal.

Within thirty (30) days after filing the appeal, the appealing party shall prepare and serve a complaint setting forth therein his or its cause of action in the ordinary form, and further pleadings shall be had in said cause according to the rules of civil procedure in the District Court. Within twenty (20) days after the service of a copy of said notice of appeal upon the Workmen's Compensation Bureau the Bureau shall certify the complete record in such proceeding to the District Court. Upon the trial of said cause upon appeal by the Court, either party may offer such additional proof and evidence as is material to the issues, and the Court shall be in no way bound by the findings or determination made by the Workmen's Compensation Bureau, but shall exercise his own independent judgment both as to the facts and the law. In the event that judgment of the Court rendered in said proceedings awards compensation to the employee, he shall make specific findings as to whether the said employee has received injuries causing total disability, or temporary partial disability, or permanent partial disability; and in the event the Court finds the injury caused permanent disability he shall determine the per-centage which such disability bears to the total disability, taking into consideration the employee's age and occupation, and the aforesaid findings shall be incorporated in the judgment of the Court rendered in said proceeding and shall be binding upon the Bureau in fixing the amount of the award to said injured employee. The award so arrived at shall be paid by the Workmen's Compensation Bureau out of the Workmen's Compensation fund or by the employer in the case of an elective claim in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

The cost of such proceedings, including a reasonable attorney's fee to the claimant's attorney, if the claimant be successful, shall be fixed by the Trial Judge and taxed against the Workmen's Compensation Fund or the employer in the case of an elective claim, as the case may be.

Each party to the said proceeding shall have the right of appeal to the Supreme Court, said appeal to be governed by existing statutes as in the case of appeals in civil cases, and a trial de novo shall be had in the Supreme Court.

It is the intent of this Act that appeals as aforesaid may be had by any party from any and all final decisions of the Workmen's Compensation Bureau.

Section 2. All acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3. Emergency. This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

The amount of levy to cover such appropriation together with the aggregate amount for general purposes shall be within the limitation prescribed by Section 2163a1 and 2163a6 of the supplement to the compiled laws of 1913, or acts amendatory thereof. The amount appropriated for the maintenance or employment of a band for municipal purposes shall in no case exceed four thousand dollars and shall further be subject to the following limitations:

(a) In cities or villages having a net assessed valuation not in excess of five million dollars, the amount appropriated shall not exceed one mill on the net assessed valuation of the property of the city or village.

(b) In cities or villages having a net assessed valuation of over five million dollars and not in excess of fifteen million dollars the amount appropriated shall not exceed onehalf of one mill on the net assessed valuation of the taxable property of the city or village.

(c) In cities or villages having a net assessed valuation in excess of fifteen million dollars, the amount appropriated shall not exceed one-fourth of one mill on the net assessed valuation of the taxable property of the city or village.

#### OPINION

Dear Sir:---

Your committee has asked for the opinion of this office as to the constitutionality of H. B. No. 44 if enacted into law.

In approaching this question you must bear in mind that the State Constitution is a limitation upon the Legislative power and is not a grant of power. With that in mind we refer you to Section 179 of the State Constitution as amended by Article 20. As originally enacted this section read as follows:

("All property, except as hereinafter in this section provided, shall be assessed in the county, city, township, town, village or district in which it is situated, in the manner pre-

scribed by law. The franchise, roadway, roadbed, rails and rolling stock of all railroads operated in this state shall be assessed by the state board of equalization at their actual value and such assessed valuation shall be apportioned to the counties, cities, towns, townships and districts in which said roads are located, as a basis for taxation of such property in proportion to the number of miles of railway laid in such counties, cities, towns, townships and districts.)"

At the general election in 1915 this section was amended by said Article 20 to read as follows:

"All taxable property except as hereinafter in this Section provided, shall be assessed in the county, city, township, village or district in which it is situated, in the manner prescribed by law. The property, including franchises of all railroads operated in this state, and of all express companies, freight line companies, dining car companies, sleeping car companies, car equipment companies, or private car companies, telegraph or telephone companies or corperations operating in this state and used directly or indirectly in the carrying of persons, property or messages, shall be assessed by the State Board or Equalization in a manner prescribed by such state board or commission as may be provided by law. But should any railroad allow any portion of its railway to be used for any purpose other than the operation of a railroad thereon, such portion of its railway, while so used shall be assessed in a manner provided for the assessment of other real property."

In 1918 our Supreme Court, in the case of State vs. Wetz, 40 N. D. 299, 168 N. W. 835, had occasion to construe this section as amended. Two very pertinent statements are made by the court in its opinion, namely:

"Section 179, as now amended, while retaining the pre-existing requirement of local assessment, etc." and "The effect of Section 179 is simply to provide that property which is required to be taxed for local purposes be given a situs within the district in which it is to be taxed, and that certain properties shall be assessed by the state board of equalization."

A careful reading of the entire opinion leads to the reasonable conclusion that all property which may be taxed by a local subdivision, and not exempted by Section 179, must be assessed by such subdivision. Assessed, as used in this section of the Constitution means fixing the value for the purpose of taxing.

Keeping the foregoing clearly before you, we call your attention to the last sentence in paragraph 5 of H. B. 44, which clearly provides for local taxation, that is, the making of such tax levies against the property as shall have been determined upon by the local subdivisions. This being true, under the Constitution, Section 179, the local subdivision should have the power to assess, but we find in Sections 2 and 5 of H. B. 44 that the assessment, that is, the fixing of the value for taxing purposes, is to be made by the State Board of Equalization. To thus give the local subdivision the power

to tax and take from it the power to assess would be a violation of Section 179 of the Constitution as amended.

It may be argued that the property of electric light, heat or power plants are used for carrying property, that is, electric current, and thus within the exemptions of the amendment under the words "and used directly or indirectly in the carrying of \* \* \* property, etc." This, we believe, would be a distortion of the language employed as the quoted words clearly refer back to the kind of companies or corporations which are specifically named in the section. In this connection the Supreme Court of the State of California in the case of San Francisco & S. M. Electric R. Co. vs Scott, 75 Pac. 575, has held in construing a provision similar to Section 179, that street railways and interurban lines operating in more than one county are not included in the word "railroads".

It is, therefore, the opinion of this office that H. B. 44, if enacted into law, would be in violation of Section 179 of our State Constitution, as amended by Article 20.

#### Introduced by O. C. Martin

A Resolution petitioning Congress to intercede on behalf of the People of North Dakota to oppose action on the part of the Interstate Commerce Commission authorizing the consolidation of Railroads without the consent of the People affected.

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota, the Senate Concurring:

Whereas, it is currently rumored that serious consideration is now being given to the consolidation of railway systems that are operating in North Dakota, and Whereas, the magnitude of such contemplated action, and the importance of the probable future results are such that the people affected thereby should in advance be consulted.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the Twentieth Legislative Assembly representing the people of North Dakota, respectfully protest, and hereby direct the proper procedure, to the end that the records of the North Dakota Railroad Commission and the Interstate Commerce Commission be made to show that the people of North Dakota are opposed to the consolidation of any railroad system operating in North Dakota with any other railroad system, until their consent will have been obtained through some approved method of submission to them, and,

Be It Further Resolved, That the Congress of the United States be advised of the mental attitude of the people of North Dakota regarding railway consolidation, and that the Congress be requested to direct, through proper procedure, that the Interstate Commerce Commission withhold its assent to the consolidation of any railroads or railroad system operating in Montana, until the consent of those to be affected thereby shall have been obtained, and

Be It Further Resolved, That the required consent be the result of consideration on the part of the people of North Dakota of facts and data submitted to them by the railroads contemplating consolidation, and which facts and data must indicate the probable extent of participation by those affected thereby in the benefits to be derived through the proposed railway consolidation.

Be It Further Resolved, That a copy of this memorial be forwarded to the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States and to each of the Senators and Representatives from North Dakota in Congress, and to the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, D. C.

After the word "act" in line 12 of page 14 of the printed bill insert a comma and strike out the fol-lowing: "In addition to the present officers of the law and such deputies, assistants and existing officers of the law are hereby declared to be peace officers and are hereby given bereby declared to be peace officers and are hereby given police power and authority throughout the state to arrest without writ, rule, order or process any person in the act of violating or attempting to violate in the presence of such officer any of the provisions of this act," and insert in lieu thereof the following: "and it is hereby made the duty of the sheriff the police officers and the other law enforcement officers of the various political subdivisions of the state of North Dakota to properly enforce the provisions of this act". On page 16 of the printed bill at the end of the bill add the following: "Section 25. Emergency. # NORTH DAKOTA WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION BUREAU BISMARCK, NORTH DAKOTA

February 11, 1927.

To The Bismarck Tribune, and Gordon Cox, Bismarck, North Dakota.

#### Gentlemen:

In the Bismarck Tribune's issue of February 10th, 1927, in referring to a discussion on the floor of the House of Representatives, Mr. Cox is quoted as saying: "In many cases, he said, the right of appeal has been cut off by the bureau's action in granting claimant a purely nominal amount."

You and each of you are hereby notified to forthwith make satisfactory proof of the statement that this Bureau has in any claim granted a purely nominal amount for the purpose of preventing, avoiding or defeating appeal. You are further notified that upon your failure to forthwith make such proof you immediately retract the statement referred to and make proper correction.

It is apparent, Mr. Speaker, that this is nothing more than a threat against the newspapers and the members of this House, and is an endeavor to intimidate the legislators and newspaper men of this state. It is nothing more than another example of the bureaucracy of the Workmen's Compensation Bureau. I have here in my hand Claim No. 14090. Here are the official proceedings of the Bureau:

#### CLAIM NO. 14090

Claimant claims an injury to eye.

Original doctor bill about \$20. Doctor bills at Rochester, Minn., since over \$600.

Question of fradululent claim: Sight of both eyes lost, claimant 30 years old, amount involved is around \$30,000.

Numerous investigations, including trip to Minneapolis by Livdahl.

Recommendations of Commissioners, January 11, 1927:

Livdahl.—"I recommend that the claim be dismissed for the reason that there is no proof of injury, that it is a case of disease and not an injury and that such disease is not proximately caused by the employment."

Wenzel.—"We could dispose of the matter by paying Dr. Spicer's bill—but believe the fair thing is to dismiss and thus give claimant the right to appeal and have matter tried out in court."

McDonald.—"I do not believe that claimant's present disability was caused by the slight accident he had on June 29th, (if he had one); therefore, I recommend that Dr. Spicer's bill be paid in part in the amount of \$9.00, 5 treatments, and that the claim be closed."

The notations were made in the above order. The reason for McDonald's vote was given by him, to the effect that claimant would therefore be prevented from appealing and save the Bureau the cost of trial. Isn't it reasonable, if a man doubts whether there was an injury, to argue that the only decent thing to do is to dismiss so as to give the man another opportunity to be heard, rather than to cut him off with a measly \$9.00 medical bill.

I also refer to Case No. 15153 and also to the Crandall case.

I also want to read Section 9556, Compiled Laws of the State of North Dakota for 1913, in which the law of this State is set up:

"A prosecution for libel cannot be maintained against a reporter, editor, publisher, or proprietor of a newspaper, for the publication therein, of a fair and true report of any judicial, legislative, or other public and official proceeding, or of any statement, speech, argument or debate in the course of the same, without proving actual malice in making the report."

I want that to show, Mr. Speaker, because we are going to have other matters of this kind coming up.

On behalf of the newspaper men I make this request in order that they may know the true law of this State and not be intimidated by any of these Bureaus.

The Committee on Revision and Correction of the Journal made the following report:

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Revision and Correction of the Journal have carefully examined the Journal of the Thirty-seventh day after recess and Thirty-eighth day and recommend that the same be corrected as follows:

### REPORT OF SELECT COMMITTEE

Mr. Speaker: Your special Committee to examine the audit reports have examined the same and beg leave to report as follows:

From the Audit Report of the Workmen's Compensation Bureau for Period January 1, 1925 to February 28, 1926 we suggest that the following be printed:

Pages 1, 2, and 3 which is the general statement by Mr. Lund.

Hon. Robert Byrne, Hon. George F. Shafer, Hon. John Steen, Members State Board of Auditors, Bismarck, North Dakota.

Gentlemen:—Agreeable with your instructions we have made an examination and audit of the books and vouchers, and taken an account of the Assets and Liabilities of the Workmen's Compensation Bureau of the State of North Dakota from January 1, 1925, (closing date of our previous audit), to February 28, 1926, and respectfully submit herewith our report, consisting of Balance Sheet, Operating Statement, and supporting Schedules of detail, covering the Assets and Liabilities of the Bureau as the same appeared at the close of business February 28, 1926, reflecting, in my opinion, the true financial condition of the Bureau on that date.

Only the cash transactions of the Bureau are recorded in the financial records. No General Ledger is kept, and in the absence of some method of gathering all the Assets and Liabilities of the institution into permanent records, it is difficult to determine when all accounts are brought together.

The liabilities of the Workmen's Compensation Fund, like other insurance businesses, are largely estimates, based on past experience of similar problems, and the reserves set up for claims against the Bureau funds are based on the past experience of the Institution, experience tables in use by the Bureau, and estimates of the officers in charge.

The Workmen's Compensation Bureau has an average cash balance of over one and one-half million dollars which the law provides must all be deposited with the Bank of North Dakota. This fund is largely reserves and surplus that, under ordinary conditions, will not be reduced, and can be placed on long time deposits. Under the law the Workmen's Compensation Fund is wholly dependent on the interest rate offered by the Bank of North Dakota for their revenue from the investment of their funds. At the present time the Bank of North Dakota is paying only three per cent interest on time deposits, which is from one and onehalf to two per cent less revenue than was received a year or two ago, and is a lower interest rate than received by similar institutions, that are permitted to choose their investments.

The reserves for long time pension liability set up in our statements are on the basis of three and one-half per cent interest. The present interest rate received being treated in our statements as a temporary condition. In the event the legislature does not deem it advisable to permit the investing of the Workmen's Compensation Funds where they will draw higher rates of interest, it will be necessary to adjust the reserves for long term pensions accordingly.

The operating statement on Page 10 shows a net profit, for the fourteen months covered, of \$116,757.63, or a profit of approximately twenty-two per cent of gross receipts. Adding this to profits of our previous statements gives the Bureau a total net profit to surplus funds of \$755,343.10. This surplus is equal to the average losses awarded by the Bureau for a period of over two and one-half years, and should be sufficient to meet any catastrophe or emergency that might befall.

The Bureau now has the benefit of nearly seven years experience and they are working on rate adjustments based on their experience, that they hope will become more equitable to the employers of the state as time goes on, which we believe can be carried into effect without endangering the solvency of the institution.

The detail cash records of the Bureau are kept in a neat and comprehensive manner and we found no difficulty in proving same.

The officers and employees of the Workmen's Compensation Bureau afforded us every facility in making our examination and I wish to acknowledge my appreciation of same.

# AUDIT REPORT OF THE STATE

### HIGHWAY COMMISSION

Audit Report of the State Highway Commission from January 1, 1925 to May 31, 1926. Print pages 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 and we call special attention to this statement because of the great importance and the amount of money spent by this commission.

Hon. John Steen, Hon. Robert Byrne, Hon. George F. Shafer, -Members State Board of Auditors, Bismarck, N. Dak.

Gentlemen:—Pursuant to agreement, we have made an examination and audit of the accounts, books, and vouchers of the State Highway Commission for a period of seventeen months beginning with closing date of our previous audit, January 1, 1925, to May 31, 1926, and the following are statements and schedules compiled from their records reflecting the condition of the funds under their supervision as the same appeared at close of business May 31, 1926.

The State Highway Commission is an organization of considerable magnitude, collecting and disbursing over two million dollars per annum, and employing over five hundred people in all departments as shown by the list of salaries and wages paid during the month of May, found beginning on page 34.

In the statements following we divide the organization into three sub-divisions as follows:

The Highway Operating Department, covering administration of the construction and maintenance of highways. The Equipment Department, charged with handling the automobiles purchased for the use of employees, and the war materials received from the U. S. Government.

The Motor Vehicle Registration Department, charged with the collection and distribution of the motor vehicle tax, and licensing and registration of motor vehicles operated in the state.

All financial records and vouchers of expenditures and income of the State Highway Commission were examined for the period and found to be kept in a neat, comprehensive and accurate manner, with the exception of a few minor clerical errors not worthy of mention herein, and we experienced no difficulty in proving the accounts of the present audit period.

The operating expense of the Highway Commission is provided for by sub-division "B" of Section 11 of Chapter 167 of the Session Laws of 1925 which reads in part as follows:

"A sum not to exceed \$150,000.00 per annum shall be set apart to defray the expenses of the State Highway Commission in maintaining the Motor Vehicle Registration Department and in carrying out the provisions of this Act, and in carrying out the provisions and purposes of the State Highway Commission Act, and co-operating with the Federal Government under the Act of Congress approved July 11, 1916, etc."

Chapter 41 of the 1925 Session Laws appropriates \$46-325.00 per annum from the above amount for the general expenses of the Motor Vehicle Department, leaving the portion going to the Highway Department \$103,675.00, which if construed the same as the appropriations made by the Legislature for other State Departments, would be the maximum annual expense of the Highway Commission for carrying on the administrative branches of the Department. During this audit period an average of one thousand dollars per month has been used from Highway Operating funds to meet the increased expenses of the Motor Vehicle Registration Department. To make up the shortage of the Highway Operating Fund caused by payment of Motor Vehicle Registration bills, the Department is charging the administration costs of the Road Maintenance Department direct to the Highway Construction Funds. This seems to be an evasion of the intent of the appropriations made by the Legislature. For administrative cost charged direct to Gas Tax Fund see Detail 5 on page 15.

#### NORTH DAKOTA HIGHWAY BULLETIN

During the past year the Highway Commission has published a monthly bulletin, called "North Dakota Highway Bulletin". This publication has a circulation of about 2,200 made up of public officials and individuals interested in road construction.

Separate records are kept of the finances of the Bulletin. The collection and payment of the funds do not appear on the Highway Commission records or pass thru the offices of the State Auditor and State Treasurer.

The income from advertising and subscriptions has met the cost of publishing and distributing. We show statement of affairs as the same appeared May 31, 1926 on page 46.

### EQUIPMENT DEPARTMENT

The Equipment Department in charge of the surplus war materials has operated under several different managements and policies during the past seventeen months, with the final decision of the Commission to discontinue the ordering and dealing in war materials offered by the Government.

The Equipment Department as listed in our previous statements has been divided, in this report, into two sections: the War Surplus Materials and the Car Operation.

The War Surplus Materials received from the U. S. Government have been disposed of except the shop buildings, a tractor, a road roller, and a few army trucks and automobiles that are of questionable value. These items are not considered in the Balance Sheet for the reason that experience has shown the selling cost more than is received for them.

Beginning on page 50 we set up Statement of Affairs of the handling of this equipment, indicating a net loss to the State Highway Funds of \$84,928.06.

While\_in theory it has appeared attractive for the Highway Commission to receive the surplus war materials for the transportation costs, they have been unable to reimburse the state from sales and earnings for Highways Funds invested in the handling of the same, and I believe they have made a wise decision in discontinuing the business and closing that branch of their activity.

#### CAR OPERATING DEPARTMENT

A separate record is now being kept by the Highway Commission of the operation of the automobiles owned and in use by them with the view of determining whether their state owned cars can be operated as cheaply as automobiles can be hired from private parties.

We have set up a statement of affairs of the car operation for the period of this audit beginning on page 61 as the same appears by the books of the department, reflecting an operating loss to date.

Accrued accounts not on on the books on May 31st. are not taken into account in these statements. There are many cars owned and operated on which the car operations have received no mileage credit. It is also difficult to determine the proper distribution of expense between the War Surplus and Car Operations during the past period, and in the absence of the proper mileage credit the loss as shown by the records may reflect an injustice to the department. I believe however that the Commission is on the right track in the present method of handling their automobiles and are making an honest effort to reduce the excessive automobile expense that has been so apparent in our previous audits. The coming year will disclose beneficial results providing the same methods are followed for a long enough period of time to enable a comparison to be made.

The purchases and sales of all automobiles handled by the Highway Commission were gone over and all cars accounted for on the records of the department.

The automobiles are in use in all parts of the state and the list showing their location appearing on page 63 was taken from the records of the Department.

#### MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATION DEPARTMENT

The collections of the Motor Vehicle Registration Department were compared with applications on file and the funds coming into the hands of the Registrar were all found to be properly accounted for.

The license tags for 1926 are now issued in their numerical order which greatly facilitates the accounting and auditing of same. It would further simplify the accounting system to have tags for all makes of autos made up in one serial number.

The appropriations for the general expenses of the Motor Vehicle Registration Department have not been sufficient to meet the expenses incurred during the period. The deficit has been paid from the Highway Operating appropriations in the amount of \$16,784.92, as indicated on page 75. In addition to this there were unpaid bills on file for special agents salary and traveling expense amounting to \$623.19 incurred during this period.

The increase in number of motor vehicles registered in the state during the past two years has added to the work of the Department. There has also been new index records added, which requires considerable work and expense, enabling the Department to furnish prompt information to officials and the public in connection with the registered motor vehicles. Records of the office are kept up to date in a neat and comprehensive manner and the expenses incurred, althcugh they do not appear legal, appear justified, with the exception of the amount spent for special agents salaries and traveling expenses in excess of the amount appropriated for that purpose. The public or the department would not have been seriously inconvenienced if this branch of the service had been held within the legal amount alloted by the Legislature until they deemed it advisable to increase same.

The appropriation for special agents as allowed by Chap. 41 S. L. 1925 is \$1,000.00 per annum. During the past year ending May 31, 1926 the expense for this purpose has been exceeded by the amount charged to Highway Commission Operating Funds as shown on page 75 as follows:-

We find no record of authority given for transfer of funds by the State Emergency Commission, or provision of law authorizing the expenditures of the Motor Vehicle Registration Department in excess of appropriations, and assuming the division of appropriations by the Legislature has significance, the Highway Commission has exceeded their authority in these expenditures.

As stated in our previous report we believe the coming Legislature should give special attention to the needs of the Motor Vehicle Registration Department and adjust their appropriations in accordance with the increase in the volume of services they perform.

The officers and employees of all branches of the State Highwav Commission afforded us every facility during our eventiation, and we wish to acknowledge our appreciation of their hearty co-operation.

Owing to the fact that during this period there was a change in the method of keeping account of the car operating costs, the department maintains that this statement does not show the real cost. They claim that the actual cost of operating is a good deal less than this, but your committee has not examined into this matter.

Agreeable with your instructions we have made an examination and audit of the Books and Vouchers of the State Hail Insurance Department of the State of North Dakota for the year, beginning April 1st, 1925 and ending March 31st, 1926, and taken an account of the assets and liabilities of said department as provided by Chapter 143 of the Session Laws of 1923, and respectfully submit herewith report of our examination, consisting of Balance Sheet, Operating Statement, and supporting schedules, reflecting in my opinion, the true financial condition of the Department, as the same appeared at close of business March 31st 1926.

The financial records of the State Hail Insurance Department have been improved upon during the past year, kept up by bookkeeper conversant with the recording of accounts, enabling the department to make a statement of affairs from their own records. We found less difficulty in proving their accounts during this audit period than we had previously experienced.

In our previous statements we have called attention to differences in the amount of hail taxes as shown by the Hail Insurance Department, and the Counties of the State. In some cases the County is remitting taxes after the amount charged them by the Hail Department has been fully paid, in other cases the Counties are charged with amounts that are not being paid as they apparently should be. During our audit we made an investigation of Nelson and McHenry Counties to determine how the apparent discrepency in their accounts came about. Nelson County is charged on the Hail Department books with unpaid 1919 hail tax in the amount of \$5,143.60, with no tax collections to this account during the past four years. In our examination of the records of this county we found that the original 1919 hail insurance taxes, certified by the County to the State Tax Commissioner's Office, and to the State Hail Insurance Department, included sewer tax for the City of Lakota in the amount of \$4,402.50, erroneously consolidated with the hail insurance taxes as certified by the County Officers to the State Departments. Several hail taxes were also found to be abated or refunded by the County, and not reported to the State Hail Insurance Department.

In McHenry County we found their differences to arise largely from errors in reporting and remitting hail taxes to the State, which the County Officers and the Hail Department hope to bring together by going over all reports from the beginning.

The Hail Department has attempted to reconcile the tax accounts with the various counties by correspondence without material results, and as previously stated, I am still of the opinion that the hail tax accounts between the State and Counties, in many cases, can not be brought together until a representative of the State Hail Insurance Department, that is familiar with County assessment and taxation records, visits the county for the purposes of going over the accounts as they were handled by the county.

The payments for 1925 hail losses were compared by us with adjusters certificate and claims for losses and found to agree with the exception of a few clerical errors that were corrected by the department employees during the process of our audit.

The hail losses for the season of 1925 were the lowest in the history of the State Hail Insurance Department, with about eight thousand losses.

The statistics and rates of assessment were not covered in our examination, except as shown by our table of tax charges and hail losses by counties, found beginning on Page 55 of this report. A more complete detail of hail losses statistics has been prepared by the Hail Insurance Department covering this branch of the business, that will be available from their annual report.

The manager of the State Hail Insurance Department and his assistants afforded us every facility in our examination, and their co-operation is hereby acknowledged.

This statement shows the complete operating statement which is not given in the Report of the Hail Insurance Department for this same period. The Auditor's report includes the Hail Indemnity Income and deducts the Hail Losses paid, showing the Gross Profit of the 1925 Hail Business. From this amount is deducted the various Operating Expenses, leaving a balance from which are deducted the Reserves, leaving a Net Profit from 1925 Hail Business. (This is exclusive of the flat tax of one cent per acre which goes direct to the Surplus Fund.)

We recommend that a similar operating statement be given in the annual reports of the Hail Insurance Department in order to show more clearly the actual facts regarding each year's business than do the statements now furnished in said reports.

Introduced by Representative Sperry.

A Concurrent Resolution Authorizing the State Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor of the State of North Dakota to declare quarantine measures, if necessary, to prevent the introduction of the European Corn Borer into North Dakota.

Be it Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

That owing to the devastations in the eastern part of the United States due to the European Corn Borer, first reported as damaging corn in the vicinity of Boston, Massachusetts in the summer of 1917, and the spread of this pest with its damaging results and to prevent its appearance in North Dakota, the State Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor is hereby empowered and authorized to declare such quarantine measures for the State of North Dakota as he may decide to be necessary to prevent the introduction into North Dakota of this European Corn Borer.

Mr. Sperry moved that the Concurrent Resolution be referred to the appropriate committee.

Which motion prevailed.

The Concurrent Resolution was referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

Introduced by R. E. Swendseid.

A Concurrent Resolution. Be it Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota, the Senate Concurring:

Whereas, the Second Pan American Standardization Conference is to be held during 1927 in the United States of America, and

Whereas, this conference has already placed itself on record in favor of the principle of metric standardization of weights and measures for all the American republics, including the United States of America, and

Whereas, it is vital that a full and extensive discussion of metric standardization be accorded for the establishment of permanent commodity units for the United States, and all other American republics, so that our measures shall be in accord with the measures used by the vast majority of other civilized nations, and

Whereas, the State of North Dakota has already strongly expressed its stand in favor of gradual metric standardization, and has a particular interest in the establishment of world-uniform standards for agricultural and industrial commodities.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Legislature of the State of North Dakota does hereby memorialize the Inter-American High Commission, in charge of the program of the Second Pan American Standardization Conference, urging that the topic of decimal metric standardization of weights and measures have a main place on the program, and that the issue shall be brought to a vote, so that a definite decision shall be reached on this vital world i sue at the Second Pan American Standardization Conference.

That a copy of this resolution be mailed to the All-American Standards Council at San Francisco, California.

Mr. Trubshaw moved that the Concurrent Resolution be referred to the appropriate committee.

## CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

#### Introduced by Mr. Erickson of Kidder and Mr. Fowler Concurrent Resolution Memorializing the Congress of the United States to Abolish the Federal Estate Tax

Whereas, The Federal Estate (Inheritance) Tax law, as amended February 26, 1926, provides that the estate liable thereunder shall be credited with any inheritance tax paid by the beneficiaries to the state, or states, the credit not to exceed eighty per cent of the Federal Levy; and

Whereas, this amendment menaces the rights of the states, because its object is to persuade them to abandon their state inheritance tax laws in favor of statutes based on the federal law. The tax not being required for revenue at this time, its only object now must be coercion of the states; and

Whereas, the joint levy is contrary to the theory of this government, unpercedented and offensive to the independence of the legislatures of the sovereign states;

Therefore Be It Resolved, by the House, the Senate concurring, that we hereby request the present congress to repeal immediately the federal estate (inheritance) tax provisions of the revenue law effective February 26, 1926, and abandon this field of taxation in time of peace.

Be It Further Resolved, that certified copies of this concurrent resolution be forwarded to North Dakota's senators and representatives in the Congress of the United States.

Provided that such distance shall be measured from the front door of the school house to the front door of the family's residence; provided that the board at its option in lieu of such payment may

(1) Furnish vehicular transportation by public conveyance to such family, or

(2) Furnish such family the equivalent of such payment in lodging or tuition at some other public school if acceptable to the family, and when the school board or board of education by resolution, provides for such payment, transportation, lodging or tuition, the compulsory attendance law shall apply to all children of school age living not to exceed 6 miles from school and shall also apply to such children living more than six miles from school if vehicular transportation is furnished; provided further, that demand for such payment shall be made by said family before the close of the school year or same will be deemed to have been waived.

In the amendments as printed in the Journal on the last line of the schedule, strike out the words "and over" and insert in lieu thereof the words "to six miles." And immediately following that insert the following: "And for each one-fourth of one mile over and beyond such distance of six miles from such school, the further sum of five cents per day."

A Bill For an Act to Provide for the Nomination and Election of Candidates for the Offices of Presidential Electors, National Committeeman, Delegates to National Party Conventions, United States Senator, Members of Congress, Judges of the Supreme and District Courts, all Elective State and County Officers, Members of the Legislative Assembly, County Commissioners, Party Precinct Committeemen and County Official Newspaper; to Provide for Forms of Ballots and Requirements of New Parties with Reference Thereto; to Repeal All Acts or Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith, including Sections 910 to 916 inclusive, Compiled Laws 1913 and to Change the Date of Holding all General, City, Township and Village Elections.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Strike out everything in the printed bill after the words "A Bill" and insert in lieu thereof the following:

For an act to Provide for the Nomination and Election of Candidate for the Offices of Presidential Electors, National Committeeman, Delegates to National Party Conventions, and Party Precinct Committeemen; to Provide for Forms of Ballots and Requirements of New Parties with Reference Thereto; to Repeal All Acts or Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith including Sections 910 to 919 Inclusive, Commiled Laws 1913, and to Change the Date of Holding City Elections in Presidential Election Years.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF

## THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

Section 1. On the third Tuesday of March in each Presidential Election year, there shall be held an election at which the qualified electors of political parties existing within this state, as hereinafter provided, shall have opportunity to elect by their votes, from their respective voting precincts, committeemen to represent their political party.

Section 2. Each political party in each voting precinct in this State shall be entitled to elect one precinct committeeman for each 100 votes or major fraction thereof, cast in such precinct at the last preceding Presidential election for the Presidential Elector of such party receiving the highest vote in the State; provided that each precinct shall be entitled to at least one precinct committeeman for each National party. All precinct Committeemen shall be electors of their precinct and shall be elected to serve for a term of four years and until their successor is elected and qualified.

Section 3. Candidates for precinct Committeemen may have their names placed on the separate party ballots of their respective parties within their respective precincts by filing with the County Auditor not more than forty nor less than twenty-five days prior to the election petitions bearing the signatures of not less than five per cent of the last vote in such precinct for the aforesaid candidate for Presidential Elector of the party to which the candidtes for Precinct Committeeman belongs. Such nominating petitions shall conform with the now existing requirements of law in all matters not specifically provided for herein. Each name on the petition shall be that of a qualified voter and be subscribed under a party heading. Each signer of a nomination paper shall sign but one such paper for the same office; he shall add his residence with the street number, if any, and the date of signing.

The names of candidates for election as pre-Section 4. cinct committeemen shall be printed on separate ballots for each political party. Such ballot shall contain only the names of candidates for Party Precinct Committeeman for whose nomination petitions have been filed with the County Auditor as is herein provided. If no nominating petitions have been filed for any candidate the ballot shall contain blank lines. and spaces on which names may be written or a sticker past-The ballot to be used for the election of candidates for ed. said offices shall be prepared for each voting precinct in the County by the County Auditor and distributed by him with other election supplies in the same manner and number for each party as is now provided by law for party primary election ballots. Such ballots shall be in the following form, namely:---

Section 5. No organization, political or otherwise, shall be entitled to a party ballot in the election herein provided for unless said organization nominated and had printed upon the ballot, at the past preceding Presidential election, the names of a set of Presidential Electors pledged to the election of the candidates of said party for President and Vice-President, and further that such candidates for Presidential electors received at least five per cent of the total vote cast for President within the State at said election.

Section 6. The candidate or candidates for Precinct Committeemen equal to the number to be elected, receiving, each for himself, the highest number of votes for such office shall be declared elected. The official returns made by the election Board from each precinct shall show the names and address of each such precinct committeeman duly elected. Upon the canvass of the returns which shall be made within seven days of the date of said election of the County Auditor shall immediately issue and mail a Certificate of Election in writing of his election to each precinct committeeman so elected, and notice of the date and place of meeting of such committeemen as hereinafter provided.

Section 7. Except as herein otherwise provided, the ballots above provided for shall be prepared, printed, distributed, voted, canvassed and returned and said election held and conducted in the manner now provided by law for Party primary elections, respectively; likewise, as to notice of election, depositing of ballots, certifying election, penalties for violation of elections laws and all other matters not specifically provided for in this act.

Section 8. The Precinct Committeemen elected as herein provided, together with the members of the Legislative Assembly of each party, shall constitute the County Committee of each party. They shall meet in the Court House at the County Seat of each County at two o'clock P. M. on the third Tuesday after such primary election and organize by selecting a chairman, a vice chairman, a secretary and a treasurer, by adopting rules and modes of procedure not in conflict with law, and by selecting an executive committee consisting of from five to eleven persons chosen from the county committee, of which executive committee the chairman and secretary shall be members.

Such county committee shall at the same time select one person who shall be a legal voter to act upon and be a member of the State Central Committee of such party in all counties consisting of one legislative district, and in counties having more than one legislative district, the precinct committeemen from each legislative district, meeting separately, shall select a legal voter from their respective legislative district to serve on such State Central Committee. When two or more counties are embraced in one legislative district, the county committee of each county shall meet as aforesaid and shall elect a committee of five of its members to meet with a similar comittee from the other county or counties comprising such legislative district, at the Court House at the county seat of the senior county of such district at two o'clock P. M. on the Tuesday following their election and proceed to elect a member of such State Central Committee from such legislative district. Each committee shall be entitled to cast the number of votes equal to the number of precinct committeemen elected in its county for such member, in such manner and for such candidate as shall be determined by the majority of such commit-tee. Each member of any committee shall be a legal voter and shall retain such position until his successor is chosen. If any member of such State Central Committee is unable to attend any meeting of such Committee, he shall be authorized to give written proxy to another legal voter of his legislative district or county. Vacancies shall be filled by a majority of the State Committee by appointment from the legislative district in which such vacancy exists. Vacancies in the office of Precinct Committeeman shall be filed by appointment from such Precinct made by the County Executive Committee of such party.

The members so elected as State Central Committeemen shall meet at the State Capitol on the second Tuesday in . May at the hour of ten o'clock A. M. and organize by selecting a chairman, a vice chairman, a secretary and a treasurer and by adopting rules and modes of procedure. The officers so elected need not be members of such committee.

Section 9. The precinct committeemen, at their organization meeting aforesaid, shall also elect delegates and alternates to a State party convention to be held as herein provided. One delegate and alternate shall be elected for each 200 votes or major fraction thereof, cast in said County at the last preceding Presidential Election for the Presidential Elector of such party receiving the highest vote in the State; provided that every county shall be entitled to at least one delegate. All delegates and alternates shall be electors of their county. If any delegate shall be unable to attend such convention, he shall designate in writing one of the alternates to attend and represent and act for him.

Said State party conventions shall be held at the State Capitol on the second Tuesday in May in each Presidential Election year and shall convene at the hour of ten o'clock A. M.

Such party conventions shall nominate the legal number of candidates for their respective parties for the offices of Presidential Electors and shall elect a National Committeeman and the required number of Delegates to the National Party Convention and a like number of alternates. The candidate or candidates for such nomination or election receiving the majority vote of the delegates elected to such convention shall be declared nominated or elected and the chairman and secretary of such convention shall issue certificates of nomination or election. If any delegate to such national convention shall be unable to attend, he shall designate in writing one of the alternate to attend and represent and act for him. Every delegate and every alternate appointed as aforesaid to act for a delegate who shall actually attend such convention shall be paid the sum of Two Hnndred Dollars by the State Treasurer to cover his traveling and other expenses thereto. The names of the candidates nominated for Presidential Electors shall be certified by the chairman and secretary of such convention to the Secretary of State to be placed upon the general election ballot as now provided by law.

Section 10. If a special election shall be called to fill a vacancy in any office requiring a party nomination, the proper party committee shall call a convention to make party nomination for such office and the precinct committeemen of the County or District shall be duly convened and shall elect the required number of delegates and alternates to such convention.

Section 11. The provisions of Chapter 129, Laws of 1911, and acts amendatory thereof relating to unfair and corrupt election practices are hereby specifically made applicable to all elections and conventions provided for in this Act. Delegates or alternates to any convention provided for herein shall not be bound by any instructions nor by any unit rule and all voting in such conventions shall be by open ballot, and shall also be by roll call of individual delegates unless twothirds of the delegates elect to such convention shall otherwise order.

Section 12. Should a vacancy occur in any nomination for any party office or in the office of National Committeeman, the proper party committee shall have authority to fill such vacancy.

Section 13. It is not the intention hereof to destroy or impair the organization of any party or principle now existing or hereafter to exist, therefore, each of such parties or principles, and each and all of the state, county, district and other committees thereof shall possess all of the power and authority heretofore established and existing by the usage and customs of such parties not inconsistent with any of the provisions hereof.

Section 14. The date of the holding of City elections in Presidential Election years is hereby changed to the third Tuesday in March in each Presidential Election year, and for the purpose of the election provided for by Section one of this Act, in all cities, villages and civil townships, the regular election officers thereof shall also act as the election officers for said election, and in unorganized townships and voting precincts outside of cities, vilages and civil townships the inspector and two judges of election, or those who have been or may be appointed to fill vacancies in such offices shall act therein as the inspector and judges of election. The per diem of such election officers and the expenses of said election shall be paid by the several counties of the State the same as for other statewide elections. The City Officers elected at such election shall have until the second Tuesday of April in which to qualify for such office.

Mr. Speaker: The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 118. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 890 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1913.

And recommend that the same be indefinitely postponed.

Also, Mr. Speaker, the Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 209. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Re-enact Section 1240 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913, Relating to Special School Districts.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendment, as follows:

In Line 43 of the printed bill, strike out the words "and one-half."

At the end of the bill add the following: "Provided further, that in Districts where vehicular transportation by public conveyance is furnished; that resident children who are in the High School Department, if such District maintains such High School Department, shall be transported in such public conveyance."

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Also, Mr. Speaker, the Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 25. A Bill For an Act to Provide for the Nomination and Election of Candidates for the Offices of Presidential Electors, National Committeeman, Deleg its to National Party Conventions, United States Senator, Members of Congress, Judges of the Supreme and District Courts, all Elective State and County Officers, Members of the Legislative Assembly, County Commissioners, Party Precinct Committeemen and County Official Newspaper; to Provide for Forms of Ballots and Requirements of New Parties with Reference Thereto; to Repeal All Acts or Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith, including Sections 910 to 916 inclusive, Compiled Laws 1913 and to Change the Date of Holding all General, City, Township and Village Elections.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendment, as follows:

Strike out everything in the printed bill after the words "A Bill" and insert in lieu thereof the following:

For an act to Provide for the Nomination and Election of Candidate for the Offices of Presidential Electors, National Committeeman, Delegates to National Party Conventions, and Party Precinct Committeemen; to Provide for Forms of Ballots and Requirements of New Parties with Reference Thereto; to Repeal All Acts or Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith including Sections 910 to 919 Inclusive, Compiled Laws 1913, and to Change the Date of Holding City Elections in Presidential Election Years.

# BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF

### THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

Section 1. On the third Tuesday of March in each Presidential Election year, there shall be held an election at which the qualified electors of political parties existing within this state, as hereinafter provided, shall have opportunity to elect by their votes, from their respective voting precincts, committeemen to represent their political party.

Section 2. Each political party in each voting precinct in this State shall be entitled to elect one precinct committeeman for each 100 votes or major fraction thereof, cast in such precinct at the last preceding Presidential election for the Presidential Elector of such party receiving the highest vote in the State; provided that each precinct shall be entitled to at least one precinct committeeman for each National party. All precinct Committeemen shall be electors of their precinct and shall be elected to serve for a term of four years and until their successor is elected and qualified.

Section 3. Candidates for precinct Committeemen may have their names placed on the separate party ballots of their respective parties within their respective precincts by filing with the County Auditor not more than forty nor less than twenty-five days prior to the election petitions bearing the signatures of not less than five per cent of the last vote in such precinct for the aforesaid candidate for Presidential Elector of the party to which the candidtes for Pre-Such nominating petitions cinct Committeeman belongs. shall conform with the now existing requirements of law in all matters not specifically provided for herein. Each name on the petition shall be that of a qualified voter and be subscribed under a party heading. Each signer of a nomination paper shall sign but one such paper for the same office; he shall add his residence with the street number, if any, and the date of signing.

Section 4. The names of candidates for election as precinct committeemen shall be printed on separate ballots for each political party. Such ballot shall contain only the names of candidates for Party Precinct Committeeman for whose nomination petitions have been filed with the County Auditor as is herein provided. If no nominating petitions have been filed for any candidate the ballot shall contain blank lines and spaces on which names may be written or a sticker pasted. The ballot to be used for the election of candidates for said offices shall be prepared for each voting precinct in the County by the County Auditor and distributed by him with other election supplies in the same manner and number for each party as is now provided by law for party primary election ballots. Such ballots shall be in the following form, namely:—

Section 5. No organization, political or otherwise, shall be entitled to a party ballot in the election herein provided for unless said organization nominated and had printed upon the ballot, at the past preceding Presidential election, the names of a set of Presidential Electors pledged to the election of the candidates of said party for President and Vice-President, and further that such candidates for Presidential electors received at least five per cent of the total vote cast for President within the State at said election.

Section 6. The candidate or candidates for Precinct Committeemen equal to the number to be elected, receiving, each for himself, the highest number of votes for such office shall be declared elected. The official returns made by the election Board from each precinct shall show the names and address of each such precinct committeeman duly elected. Upon the canvass of the returns which shall be made within seven days of the date of said election of the County Auditor shall immediately issue and mail a Certificate of Election in writing of his election to each precinct committeeman so elected, and notice of the date and place of meeting of such committeemen as hereinafter provided

Section 7. Except as herein otherwise provided, the ballots above provided for shall be prepared, printed, distributed, voted, canvassed and returned and said election held and conducted in the manner now provided by law for Party primary elections, respectively; likewise, as to notice of election, depositing of ballots, certifying election, penalties for violation of elections laws and all other matters not specifically provided for in this act.

Section 8. The Precinct Committeemen elected as herein provided, together with the members of the Legislative Assembly of each party, shall constitute the County Commit-

26

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tee of each party. They shall meet in the Court House at the County Seat of each County at two o'clock P. M. on the third Tuesday after such primary election and organize by selecting a chairman, a vice chairman, a secretary and a treasurer, by adopting rules and modes of procedure not in conflict with law, and by selecting an executive committee consisting of from five to eleven persons chosen from the county committee, of which executive committee the chairman and secretary shall be members.

Such county committee shall at the same time select one person who shall be a legal voter to act upon and be a member of the State Central Committee of such party in all counties consisting of one legislative district, and in counties having more than one legislative district, the precinct committeemen from each legislative district, meeting separately, shall select a legal voter from their respective legislative district to serve on such State Central Committee. When two or more counties are embraced in one legislative district, the county committee of each county shall meet as aforesaid and shall elect a committee of five of its members to meet with a similar comittee from the other county or counties comprising such legislative district, at the Court House at the county seat of the senior county of such district at two o'clock P. M. on the Tuesday following their election and proceed to elect a member of such State Central Committee from such legislative district. Each committee shall be entitled to cast the number of votes equal to the number of precinct committeemen elected in its county for such member, in such manner and for such candidate as shall be determined by the majority of such commit-tee. Each member of any committee shall be a legal voter and shall retain such position until his successor is chosen. If any member of such State Central Committee is unable to attend any meeting of such Commutee, he shall be auth-orized to give written proxy to another legal voter of his legislative district or county. Vacancies shall be filled by a majority of the State Committee by appointment from the legislative district in which such vacancy exists. Vacancies in the office of Precinct Committeeman shall be filed by appointment from such Precinct made by the County Executive Committee of such party.

The members so elected as State Central Committeemen shall meet at the State Capitol on the second Tuesday in May at the hour of ten o'clock A. M. and organize by selecting a chairman, a vice chairman, a secretary and a treasurer and by adopting rules and modes of procedure. The officers so elected need not be members of such committee.

Section 9. The precinct committeemen, at their organization meeting aforesaid, shall also elect delegates and alternates to a State party convention to be held as herein provided. One delegate and alternate shall be elected for each 200 votes or major fraction thereof, cast in said County at the last preceding Presidential Election for the Presidential Elector of such party receiving the highest vote in the State; provided that every county shall be entitled to at least one delegate. All delegates and alternates shall be electors of their county. If any delegate shall be unable to attend such convention, he shall designate in writing one of the alternates to attend and represent and act for him.

Said State party conventions shall be held at the State Capitol on the second Tuesday in May in each Presidential Election year and shall convene at the hour of ten o'clock A. M.

Such party conventions shall nominate the legal number of candidates for their respective parties for the offices of Presidential Electors and shall elect a National Committeeman and the required number of Delegates to the National Party Convention and a like number of alternates. The candidate or candidates for such nomination or election receiv-ing the majority vote of the delegates elected to such convention shall be declared nominated or elected and the chairman and secretary of such convention shall issue certificates of nomination or election. If any delegate to such national convention shall be unable to attend, he shall designate in writing one of the alternate to attend and represent and act for him. Every delegate and every alternate appointed as aforesaid to act for a delegate who shall actually attend such convention shall be paid the sum of Two Hundred Dollars by the State Treasurer to cover his traveling and other expenses The names of the candidates nominated for Presithereto. dential Electors shall be certified by the chairman and secretary of such convention to the Secretary of State to be placed upon the general election ballot as now provided by law.

Section 10. If a special election shall be called to fill a vacancy in any office requiring a party nomination, the proper party committee shall call a convention to make party nomination for such office and the precinct committeemen of the County or District shall be duly convened and shall elect the required number of delegates and alternates to such convention.

Section 11. The provisions of Chapter 129, Laws of 1911, and acts amendatory thereof relating to unfair and corrupt election practices are hereby specifically made applicable to all elections and conventions provided for in this Act. Delegates or alternates to any convention provided for herein shall not be bound by any instructions nor by any unit rule and all voting in such conventions shall be by open ballot, and shall also be by roll call of individual delegates unless twothirds of the delegates elect to such convention shall otherwise order.

Section 12. Should a vacancy occur in any nomination for any party office or in the office of National Committeeman, the proper party committee shall have authority to fill such vacancy.

Section 13. It is not the intention hereof to destroy or impair the organization of any party or principle now existing or hereafter to exist, therefore, each of such parties or principles, and each and all of the state, county, district and other committees thereof shall possess all of the power and authority heretofore established and existing by the usage and customs of such parties not inconsistent with any of the provisions hereof.

Section 14. The date of the holding of City elections in Presidential Election years is hereby changed to the third Tuesday in March in each Presidential Election year, and for the purpose of the election provided for by Section one of this Act, in all cities, villages and civil townships, the regular election officers thereof shall also act as the election officers for said election, and in unorganized townships and voting precincts outside of cities, vilages and civil townships the inspector and two judges of election, or those who have been or may be appointed to fill vacancies in such offices shall act therein as the inspector and judges of election. The per diem of such election officers and the expenses of said election shall be paid by the several counties of the State the same as for other statewide elections. The City Officers elected at such election shall have until the second Tuesday of April in which to qualify for such office.

Section 15. All Acts or parts of Acts, including Sections 910 to 916, and Sections 917 to 919 inclusive, Compiled Laws 1913 in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

A Bill For an Act Amending and Reenacting Chapter 107, Laws of North Dakota for the year 1925, to Provide for the Issuance of Licenses for the Sale of Snuff, Furnishing of Bonds therefor, and for the Levy, Assessment, Collection and Payment of a Tax thereon; Providing for the Regulation of the Sale thereof, and Penalties for the violation of this Act; Defining the Duties of the Attorney General, State Auditor and State Treasurer imposed Under the Provisions of this Act; and Providing that any Person Violating the Provisions of this Act shall be enjoined, and that any Building or Premises made Use of for Purposes in Violation of the Provisions of this Act shall be deemed a Nuisance and may be Abated by Injunction; and Providing for the Repeal of Chapter 91 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1913, and Acts and Parts of Acts in conflict with the Provisions of this Act.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Strike cut all of the title of the bill after the comma following the figures 1925 in Line 2 thereof, and add as the remainder of the title "Relating to the Sale of Cigarettes, and Cigarette Papers and Wrappers and Papers Used and Prepared for the Making of Cigarettes; Providing for Issuing Licenses for the Purpose of Making sales Thereof and Furnishing of Bond; Providing for the Levy, Assessment, Collection and Payment of a Tax Thereon; Providing for the Regulation of the Sales Thereof, and Penalty for Violation of this Act; and Defining the Duties of the Attorney General, State Auditor and State Treasurer Imposed Under the Provision of this Act; and Providing that Any Person Violating this Act shall be enjoined and that Any Building or Premises Made Use of for Purposes in Violation of this Act Shall be Deemed a Nuisance and Abated by Injunction; and to include Snuff within the provisions and requirements thereof."

Each package of snuff or cigarettes and each package, or book or set of papers or of tubes displayed, exhibited, stored or possessed in original cartons or containers or otherwise, within or pon the premises from which sale thereof may be made to consumers, shall be conclusively presumed to be intended for sale to the consumers and to be displayed, exhibited stored or possessed for such purpose; and each such package of snuff or cigarettes and each such package, book or set of papers or of tubes, at the time the same is so displayed, exhibited, stored or possessed upon such premises, shall have securely affixed thereto a suitable stamp, or stamps, denoting the tax thereon, which stamps shall be cancelled at the time and in the manner hereinbefore required; and the possession of any such package of snuff, cigarettes, package, book or set of cigarette papers or of tubes, within or upon any such premises except in an unbroken carton or container, shall be prima facie evidence of a sale made in violation of this Act; provided however, that such presumption and the requirements as to stamps shall not apply to wholesale dealers selling to retail dealers for resale by the latter to The premises from which such sale to consumconsumers. ers may be made shall be deemed to include basements, rooms and store rooms within and upon or adjacent and contiguous to the premises described in the permit of the person, firm or corporation owning or operating the premises described in the permit, when such basement rooms or store rooms are in the possession of or used by such person, firm or corporation."

Insert a comma after the word "business" in Line 80.

Insert a comma after the word "hereby" in Line 81.

Insert a comma after the word "state" in Line 82.

The House re-assembled at 12:30 o'clock P. M., pursuant to recess taken, Speaker John W. Carr, presiding.

The House referred to the Fifteenth Order of Business.

## GENERAL ORDERS

Mr. Roberts moved that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of general orders; which motion prevailed, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

The Speaker called Mr. Roberts to the chair.

When the Committee arose it submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker: The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 52. A Bill For an Act Amending and Reenacting Chapter 107, Laws of North Dakota for the year 1925, to Provide for the Issuance of Licenses for the Sale of Snuff, Furnishing of Bonds therefor, and for the Levy, Assessment, Collection and Payment of a Tax thereon; Providing for the Regulation of the Sale thereof, and Penalties for the violation of this Act; Defining the Duties of the Attorney General. State Auditor and State Treasurer imposed Under the Provisions of this Act; and Providing that any Person Violating the Provisions of this Act shall be enjoined, and that any Building or Premises made Use of for Purposes in Violation of the Provisions of this Act shall be deemed a Nuisance and may be Abated by Injunction; and Providing for the Repeal of Chapter 91 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1913, and Acts and Parts of Acts in conflict with the Provisions of this Act. And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendment, as follows:

Strike out all of the title of the bill after the comma following the figures 1925 in Line 2 thereof, and add as the remainder of the title "Relating to the Sale of Cigarettes, and Cigarette Papers and Wrappers and Papers Used and Prepared for the Making of Cigarettes; Providing for Issuing Licenses for the Purpose of Making sales Thereof and Furnishing of Bond; Providing for the Levy, Assessment, Collection and Payment of a Tax Thereon; Providing for the Regulation of the Sales Thereof, and Penalty for Violation of this Act; and Defining the Duties of the Attorney General, State Auditor and State Treasurer Imposed Under the Provision of this Act; and Providing that Any Person Violating this Act shall be enjoined and that Any Building or Premises Made Use of for Purposes in Violation of this Act Shall be Deemed a Nuisance and Abated by Injunction; and to include Snuff within the provision... and requirements thereof."

(Amendments are Made to the Printed Bill)

In Line 33, Page 3, of the printed bill, strike out the figure "\$10.00" and insert in lieu thereof "\$12.50".

In Line 46, Page 3, after the word "consumers" insert a "comma".

In Line 47, Page 3, strike out the words "or at".

In Line 60, Page 4, strike out the word "one cent" and insert "three cents".

In Line 66, Page 4, strike out the words "one and onefourth" and insert in lieu thereof the word "twelve."

In Line 69, after the word "affixed thereto" insert a comma and the words "in such manner as to seal the opening of the package and be destroyed by the opening thereof."

Following the word "prescribe" at the end of Line 72, Page 4, insert the following: "Provided that cigarettes or snuff so d to a consumer in cartons, rolls or other containers having more than one package or box therein, shall have affixed thereto in the manner herein provided, stamps in the amount by this Act required to be p.aced upon the several packages, boxes or receptacles, therein contained. Each package of snuff or cigarettes and each package, or book or set of papers or of tubes displayed, exhibited, stored or possessed in original cartons or containers or otherwise, within or upon the premises from which the sale thereof may be made to consumers, shall be conclusively presumed to be intended for sale to the consumers and to be displayed, exhibited, stored or possessed for such purpose; and each such package of snuff or cigarettes and each such package, book or set of papers or of tubes, at the time the same is so displayed, exhibited, stored or possessed upon such permises, shall have securely affixed thereto a suitable stamp, or

stamps, denoting the tax thereon, which stamps shall be cancelled at the time and in the manner hereinbefore required; and the possession of any such package of snuff, cigarettes, package, book or set of cigarette papers or of tubes, within or upon any such premises except in an unbroken carton or container, shall be prima facie evidence of a sale made in violation of this Act; provided however, that such presumption and the requirements as to stamps shall not apply to wholesale dealers selling to retail dealers for resale by the latter to consumers. The premises from which such sale to consumers may be made shall be deemed to include basements, rooms and store rooms within and upon or adjacent and contiguous to the premises described in the permit of the person, firm or corporation owning or operating the premises described in the permit, when such basement rooms or store rooms are in the possession of or used by such person, firm or corporation."

Strike out everything after the words "A Bill" and place in lieu thereof the following:

"For an Act providing a hearing upon claims rejected by the Depositors' Guaranty Fund Commission of the State of North Dakota, for appeals from Final Decisions Rendered by said Commission to the District Court of Burleigh County and for Appeals from said District Court to the Supreme Court, and providing for the procedure upon such hearing and appeals.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF

#### THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

Section 1. The Depositors' Guaranty Fund Commission may provide for hearing upon rejected claims, either before the Commission or any member thereof, or a referee to be appointed by the Commission, at the State Capito, or elsewhere within the State, upon majority vote of the Commission. Upon application of the attorney for the Guaranty Fund or of the claimant, the Commission or the Referee shall request the Clerk of the D strict Court of the county wherein any such hearing is to be held or of the county wherein the witness resides to issue a subpoena for any witness whose testimony is desired. Upon such request, the Clerk of said District Court shall issue such subpoena commanding him to appear at the time and place set for such hearing and answer questions. Such subpoena may be served anywhere within the State and such person, upon payment of the mileage and per diem required for witnesses in the District Courts shall attend such hearing. If any person so subpoenaed shall fail to appear or to obey such order, the Judge of the Court from which such subpoena is issued shall have authority and jurisdiction to punish such person for contempt.

Section 2. At any hearing where testimony is taken the Commission, or its Referee, shall have authority to administer oaths and may require a stenographic report to be taken and transcribed, or the testimony reduced to writing and subscribed by the witness. The Commission shall after hearing upon such rejected claims enter their order determining whether such rejected deposits shall be finally rejected or allowed as guaranteed. Upon such hearing the technical rules of evidence shall not be applied. The aim of the hear ing before the officer conducting the same shall be to ascertain the truth as to whether a claim is within the protection of the Guaranty Fund, and the extent thereof, and the officer shall exercise his sound discretion in admitting or excluding evidence with that aim in view.

If any claimant, whose claim has been rejected in whole or in part by the final action of the Commission, feels aggrieved thereby, he may within thirty days after notice of such rejection, appeal from the order of the Commission to the District Court of Burleigh County. Notice of appeal shall be served upon a member or upon the secretary of such Commission. The appealing party shall give good and sufficient bond in the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars to be approved by the Clerk of the District Court, obligating said party to pay any and all costs, not exceeding said sum, which may be awarded against him upon said appeal by the District Court or by the Supreme Court, in the event a further hearing is had in the Supreme Court. Said bond shall run to the Depositors' Guaranty Fund Commission of the State of North Dakota for the benefit of the Depositors' Guaranty Fund of said State. Such appeal shall be deemed perfected upon filing such notice of appeal and bond with the Clerk of said District Court.

The record upon said appeal to the District Court shall consist of the entire record made upon the hearing before the Referee and the Commission, including the transcript of any and all testimony taken, all exhibits or copies thereof, and any affidavits or depositions received or considered by said Referee or Commission, and also the Findings of of Fact and report of the Referee and the order of the Commission, and any other matter made a part of the record upon which the Commission has based its decision. It shall be the duty of the Commission to prepare and transmit to the Clerk of said District Court within thirty days after the perfection of such appeal such record on appeal, and upon the receipt of the same the Clerk shall forthwith place said appeal upon the calendar of said District Court for hearing at the next term thereof or at such time as the Supreme Court may by rule provide.

The District Court shall take judicial notice of the rules and regulations promulgated by the Commission relative to the manner of proof upon hearing of such claims and all proofs adduced in conformity with such rules or with this Act shall be deemed competent, but the Supreme Court shall have supervisory control over any rules promulgated by the Commission and any rule disapproved by the Supreme Court shall be deemed null and void. The Findings of the Commission upon all disputed primary facts shall have the same force and effect and be subject to the same review as the verdict of a jury in a civil action in the District Court, but the District Court upon appeal shall exercise its own independent judgment as to any ultimate facts, mixed questions of law and fact, and questions of law arising from the record an appeal. The term primary facts used herein shall be construed to mean those facts which make up the details of the transaction which is claimed to have resulted in a deposit. The terms "ultimate facts" and "mixed questions of law and fact" used herein shall be construed to mean all conclusions and deductions to be drawn from the primary facts as to the effect or result that should follow therefrom.

Upon the hearing of such appeal the District Court shall review the records and proceedings certified to its as heren provided and thereupon make its order either afirming, reversing, or modifying the order of the Commission. It the District Court shall be of the opinion that prejudicial error has been committed by the Referee or the Commission in the exclusion of evidence, the Court may return the record to the Commission with directions to have such evidence taken and new Findings of Fact made upon the entire record.

The right of appeal hereby granted shall apply only

(1) to any party whose claim has been rejected by the Commission and who has properly demanded a hearing as provided in Section One of this Act, and

(2) to any party whose claim has been finally rejected by the Commission prior to the effective date of this Act, provided that such last named party may, at any time within six (6) months after such effective date, apply to said Commission for a rehearing upon his claim and if said rehearing be denied, or if satisfactory relief be denied upon such rehearing, may appeal from the decision of the Commission within the time and in the manner herein provided.

If the claimant or the Commission feels aggrieved at the order of the said District Court, such aggrieved party may within thirty days after notice of such order make application to the Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari to review the decision and order of the said District Court and if from such application it shall appear to the Judges of the Supreme Court that there is probably reason to believe that the District Court has incorrectly decided a question of fact or has erroneously applied the law thereto they shall issue such writ directed to the District Court requiring it to certify to said Court the record on appeal together with the order of said District Court. The Supreme Court shall thereupon determine from the record whether or not there has been any error committed by the District Court in the decision of any question of fact or in the application of the law to the facts and after due consideration, shall make its order either affirming, reversing, or modifying the order of the District Court.

The Supreme Court under the exercise of its supervisory power over District Courts may designate one or more District Judges to hear and determine such appeals from the final decisions of the Commission and it may adopt such rules and regulations as to it may appear advisable for the expeditious hearing and determination of such appeals.

Section 3. Emergency. This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval. And when so amended recommend same do pass.

## MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS

Mr. Erickson of Kidder asked permission to withdraw the Concurrent Resolution introduced by him, and explained his reasons for withdrawing the Concurrent Resolution:

Mr. Speaker: I am about to ask for withdrawal of my Concurrent Resolution demanding that the Bank of North Dakota should invest some of its surplus money now outside of the State.

Before making this motion I would like permission to state why this resolution was introduced; a so why I now ask to have it withdrawn.

This resolution demanding that the Bank of North Dakota invest some of the money it now has on deposit was introduced for the following reasons:

(1) The bank has over \$8,000,000.00 outside the state drawing  $1\frac{3}{4}$ % interest.

(2) It has over 1,000,000.00 of Bank of North Dakota bonds drawing  $4\frac{1}{4}$ %.

(3) It has over \$1,000,000.00 in closed banks drawing nothing.

We contend, Mr. Speaker, that if half of the first two items was invested in tax certificates, the difference in the rate of interest would take care of the money in closed banks which will ultimately have to be charged off.

Now, Mr. Speaker, as to the reason for withdrawing this resolution: The majority faction of this Legislature will be he'd responsible for the legislation passed here this winter. We find nothing has been done to clear up or take care of the present mixup as to hail insurance taxes due. We feel we would not want to be parties to causing the Bank of North Dakota to get into possible litigation over this matter. So we ask permission to withdraw this resolution.

The House acceded to the request of Mr. Frickson of Kidder that the Concurrent Resolution be withdrawn.

## CONCURRENT RESOLUTION Introduced by R. O. Signalness and Walter Tester

Memorializing the Congress of the United States to Establish the Roosevelt National Park in Billings County, North Dakota; and to Provide for the Substitution of Pub ic Lands of the United States for the State School Lands located Within the Proposed Fark Area.

## BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTA-TIVES OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA, THE SENATE CONCURRING:

Whereas, there is now pending in the Congress of the United States a bill to establish the Roosevelt National Park in Billings County, North Dakota, introduced by Congressman Sinclair of North Dakota, December 7th, 1925, being H. R. 3942, and,

Whereas, the tract of land in such proposed park consists of the petrified forest and the famous "Badlands," lying on both sides of the Little Missouri River in Billings County, North Dakota, where Theodore Roosevelt operated his historic catte ranches and hunted wild game in the early history of Dakota territory, and which tract is admirably fitted by nature for scenic purposes, and preserves in its natural state the mountainous character and the wild unchanged condition which existed in the West fifty years ago, and which tract it is practicable and appropriate to preferve as a National Park in the honor of Theodore Roosevelt, in the interest of American scenic beauty and as a relic of the traditional pioneer conditions of the West which have all but disappeared from the North American Continent; and,

Whereas, there is included in said proposed park area approximately forty-two thousand (42 000) acres of public lands belonging to the State of North Dakota known as State School lands, which was granted to it by the United States under Sections 10 and 11 of the Enabling Act of February 22nd, 1889, to be held in trust by the State of North Dakota for the common schools, which lands, on account of its rough and barren character. cannot be sold for the minimum price of ten dollars (\$10.00) per acre as prescribed in Section 11 of said Enabling Act, and from which the State of North Dakota gets only a nominal income; and, it further appearing that it would be expedient to exchange the said State school lands located within such proposed park area, for public lands of the United States of like quality, character, and value located in the vicinity of such proposed park;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that this Twentieth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, hereby endorses said Roosevelt National Park Project, and respectfully urges the Congress of the United States to establish a National Park as provided for in said H. R. 3042; and,

Be It Further Resolved, that Congress, in furtherance of said park project, make appropriate provision for exchanging with the State of North Dakota public lands of the United States, of equal quantity, character and value for the State school lands lying within said proposed park area heretofore granted to the State of North Dakota under the Provisions of Sections 10 and 11 of the Enabling Act of February 22nd, 1889; and, Be It Further Resolved, that the Secretary of State transmit copies of this Memoriai to the President of the United States, to the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States, and to the Senators and Congressmen for the State of North Dakota.

Mr. Twichell moved the adoption of the resolution.

Mr. Signalness asked to have his remarks recorded:

For a good many years I have lived in North Dakota. When I first came out here and saw this great scenery we have in the Little Missouri Valley, I thought it was the most interesting thing I had ever seen. For years, as we went by it got to be more common and I didn't think so much about it. We heard about the great scenery they have in the southern part of the United States, in Mexico and on the western coast. In 1918 I got to thinking it wou'd be fine to see this great scenery they have out there, so I did. But I found that we have in North Dakota more interesting scenery than you can find anywhere else. And it is natural scenery. it is not built up. In the Little Missouri country we have some of the most wonderful things any man would want to look upon. I think it would be worth while for our state to establish a park there.

It would be a great agricultural development advertisement for our state to have people from the east, who have heard about our country that it is supposed to grow nothing but cactus and wild men of no account, to see what we can produce out here. We have good roads leading into this part of the country.

We placed maps on the desks showing the exact location of this park.

When I took this up with Mr. Sinclair the first snag we ran up against was the question of the school land. The lands cannot be sold for less than \$10.00 an acre. Last summer I had Mr. Sinclair out there and he came to me and wanted to know if I thought an appropriation could be gotten through, and I told him no, but I believe I have an idea.

The government has land of a similar quality. Do you think you could induce them to trade the government land for school land? He said he believed it could be done; and he has taken that step since we have been down here. They said they were more than willing to do so. And they say they have sufficient lands they will trade. The school land will, in fact, be benefited by the trade. Now we are asking Congress to sanction our proposition here and see what can be done. I believe this will be a fine thing if we can put this across. Everyone of us will be benefited.

I vote "no" because: The people spoke in March, 1924, in no uncertain terms that they did not want this measure enacted into law.

With this bill enacted into law the Progressive movement will be strangled because of unfair representation. This law is simply an attempt to bring the state under the control of ruthless political bossism. I vote "no".

## House of Representatives, Bismarck, North Dakota. February 17, 1927.

The House re-assembled at 1:00 P. M., pursuant to recess taken, the Speaker, John W. Carr, presiding.

The House referred to the Fifteenth Order of Business.

#### GENERAL ORDERS

Mr. Miller moved that the House resolve itself into a committee of the Whole for the consideration of general orders; which motion prevailed, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

The Speaker called Mr. Miller to the chair.

When the Committee arose it submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker: The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 155. A Bill For an Act Relating to Fur Bearing Animals; Regulating the Taking Thereof, and Fixing Penalties.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendment, as follows:

The following amendments refer to the printed bill.

On line 2, Section 5 strike out the words "first day of March" and insert the following: "fifteenth day of December".

On line 3, Section 5, strike out the words "fifteenth day of April" and insert "fifteenth day of February".

On line 4, Section 13, after the words "lakes" strike out the words "that this be done" and insert the following: "notice of such closing to be posted at said lake or lakes".

On line 5, Section 5, strike out the words "cut into".

And the further amendments:

In line 4 of Section 13, place a "comma" after the word "lakes".

In line 13 of Section 9, after the word "to" insert the word "knowingly".

In line 3 of Section 3, strike out the words "thirty-first day of December" and insert in lieu thereof the words "twentyeighth day of February".

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Also, Mr. Speaker, the Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 167. A Bill For an Act Providing for Appeals from Final Decisions Rendered by the Depositors' Guaranty Fund Commission of the State of North Dakota to the District Court, and Appeals from the District Court to the Supreme Court, and Providing for the Procedure upon said Appeals.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendment, as follows:

Strike out everything after the words "A Bill" and place in lieu thereof the following:

For an Act providing a hearing upon claims rejected by the Depositors' Guaranty Fund Commission of the State of North Dakota, for appeals from Final Decisions Rendered by said Commission to the District Court of Burleigh County and for Appeals from said District Court to the Supreme Court, and providing for the procedure upon such hearing and appeals.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF

# THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

Section 1. The Depositors' Guaranty Fund Commission may provide for hearing upon rejected claims, either before the Commission or any member thereof, or a referee to be appointed by the Commission, at the State Capitol, or elsewhere within the State, upon majority vote of the Commission. Upon application of the attorney for the Guaranty Fund or of the claimant, the Commission or the Referee shall request the Clerk of the District Court of the county wherein any such hearing is to be held or of the county wherein the witness resides to issue a subpoend for any witness whose testimony is desired. Upon such request, the Clerk of said District Court shall issue such subpoena commanding him to appear at the time and place set for such hearing and answer questions. Such subpoena may be served anywhere within the State and such person, upon payment of the mileage and per diem required for witnesses in the District Courts shall attend such hearing. If any person so subpoenaed shall fail to appear or to obey such order, the Judge of the Court from which such subpoena is issued shall have authority and jurisdiction to punish such person for contempt.

Section 2. At any hearing where testimony is taken the Commission, or its Referee, shall have authority to administer oaths and may require a stenographic report to be taken and transcribed, or the testimony reduced to writing and subscribed by the witness. The Commission shall after hearing upon such rejected claims enter their order determining whether such rejected deposits shall be finally rejected or allowed as guaranteed. Upon such hearing the technical rules of evidence shall not be applied. The aim of the hearing before the officer conducting the same shall be to ascertain the truth as to whether a claim is within the protection of the Guaranty Fund, and the extent thereof, and the officer shall exercise his sound discretion in admitting or excluding evidence with that aim in view.

If any claimant, whose claims has been rejected in whole or in part by the final action of the Commission, feels aggrieved thereby, he may within thirty days after notice of such rejection, appeal from the order of the Commission to the District Court of Burleigh County. Notice of appeal shall be served upon a member or upon the secretary of such Commission. The appealing party shall give good and sufficient bond in the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars to be approved by the Clerk of the District Court, obligating said party to pay any and all costs, not exceeding said sum, which may be awarded against him upon said appeal by the District Court or by the Supreme Court, in the event a further hearing is had in the Supreme Court. Said bond shall run to the Depositors' Guaranty Fund Commission of the State of North Dakota for the benefit of the Depositors' Guaranty Fund of said State. Such appeal shall be deemed perfected upon filing such notice of appeal and bond with the Clerk of said District Court.

The record upon said appeal to the District Court shall consist of the entire record made upon the hearing before the Referee and the Commission, including the transcript of any and all testimony taken, all exhibits or copies thereof, and any affidavits or depositions received or considered by said Referee or Commission, and also the Findings of of Fact and report of the Referee and the order of the Commission, and any other matter made a part of the record upon which the Commission has based its decision. It shall be the duty of the Commission to prepare and transmit to the Clerk of said District Court within thirty days after the perfection of such appeal such record on appeal, and upon the receipt of the same the Clerk shall forthwith place said appeal upon the calendar of said District Court for hearing at the next term thereof or at such time as the Supreme Court may by rule provide.

The District Court shall take judicial notice of the rules and regulations promulgated by the Commission relative

to the manner of proof upon hearing of such claims and all proofs adduced in conformity with such rules or with this Act shall be deemed competent, but the Supreme Court shall have supervisory control over any rules promulgated by the Commission and any rule disapproved by the Supreme Court shall be deemed null and void. The Findings of the Commission upon all disputed primary facts shall have the same force and effect and be subject to the same review as the verdict of a jury in a civil action in the District Court, but the District Court upon appeal shall exercise its own independent judgment as to any ultimate facts, mixed questions of law and fact, and questions of law arising from the record on appeal. The term "primary facts" used herein shall be construed to mean those facts which make up the details of the transaction which is claimed to have resulted in a de-posit. The terms "ultimate facts" and "mixed questions of law and fact" used herein shall be construed to mean all conclusions and deductions to be drawn from the primary facts as to the effect or result that should follow therefrom.

Upon hearing of such appeal the District Court shall review the records and proceedings certified to it as herein provided and thereupon make its order either affirming, reversing, or modifying the order of the Commission. If the District Court shall be of the opinion that prejudicial error has been committed by the Referee or the Commission in the exclusion of evidence, the Court may return the record to the Commission with directions to have such evidence taken and new Findings of Fact made upon the entire record.

The right of appeal hereby granted shall apply only:

(1) to any party whose claim has been rejected by the Commission and who has properly demanded a hearing as provided in Section One of this Act, and

(2) to any party whose claim has been finally rejected by the Commission prior to the effective date of this Act, provided that such last named party may, at any time within six (6) months after such effective date, apply to said Commission for a rehearing upon his claim and if said rehearing be denied, or if satisfactory relief be denied upon such rehearing, may appeal from the decision of the Commission within the time and in the manner herein provided.

If the claimant or the Commission feels aggrieved at the order of the said District Court, such aggrieved party may within thirty days after notice of such order make application to the Supreme Court for a writ of certioari to review the decision and order of the said District Court and if from such application it shall appear to the Judges of the Supreme Court that there is probably reason to believe that the District Court has incorrectly decided a question of fact or has erroneously applied the law thereto they shall issue such writ directed to the District Court requiring it to certify to said Court the record on appeal together with the order of said District Court. The Supreme Court shall thereupon determine from the record whether or not there has been any error committed by the District Court in the decision of any question of facts or in the application of the law to the facts and after due consideration, shall make its order either affirming, reversing, or modifying the order of the District Court.

The Supreme Court under the exercise of its supervisory power over District Courts may designate one or more District Judges to hear and determine such appeals from the final decisions of the Commission and it may adopt such rules and regulations as to it may appear advisable for the expeditious hearing and determination of such appeals.

Section 3. Emergency. This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Also, Mr. Speaker, the Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 249. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 6954a1 Supplement to the 1913 Compiled Laws, relating to the collection of items through banking channels and establishing the liability of collecting agencies.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendment, as follows:

The following amendments refer to the printed bill.

After the Enactment clause insert "Section 1 Amendment".

On the printed bill line 20, page 2, strike out the word "or" following the word "depositor".

At the end of bill add "Section 2. Emergency. This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect from and after its passage and approval".

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Also, Mr. Speaker, the Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 279.
