## Journal of the House

#### **Twenty-first Legislative Assembly**

#### FIRST DAY

#### House of Representatives, Bismarck, North Dakota, January 8, 1929.

At the hour of twelve o'clock, meridian, the eighth day of January, 1929, being the day and hour designated by law for the convening of the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, the members-elect of the House of Representatives of the Twenty-first Session of the Legislative Assembly assembled in the House Chamber at the Capitol at Bismarck, North Dakota, and were called to order by C. R. Verry, Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives of the Twentieth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota.

The session was opened with prayer by Rev. Paul Wright of the First Presbyterian Church of Bismarck.

The following communication being the qualified list of members as certified to by the Secretary of State was read.

So a quorum was declared present.

The Chief Clerk appointed a committee of two, consisting of Mr. Halcrow and Mr. Levin to escort Justice Neussle of the Supreme Court to the rostrum, where he was introduced to the members. Justice Nuessle gave a short talk on the responsibilities of the members of the legislature, after which he administered the oath of office to the members present.

The Chief Clerk announced that the next order of business would be the nomination for the office of Speaker for this session, and that nominations were in order.

President Carr introduced the retiring governor, Walter Maddock, in the following words:

President Carr: "I have the privilege at this time of introducing to the Joint Assembly and to the citizens of North Dakota who are gathered here, the first native-born son of North Dakota who has become the governor of this state. It is a privilege which I esteem very highly, in view of the fact that I have known the retiring governor for many years as a member of this legislature, as a hard and tireless worker, and one who has endeared himself to his associates. He hardly needs an introduction.

"At this time I introduce to you Governor Walter Maddock."

### GOVERNOR MADDOCK'S ADDRESS

To the Members of the Twenty-First Legislative Assembly:

In compliance with the provisions of our State Constitution, and in accordance with established custom, I appear before you today to give voice to my conclusions and recommendations arrived at during my very short term in office as Governor of the State of North Dakota, embracing a period of slightly more than four months. During this brief period I have not had contact with governmental affairs pertaining to the State to place me in a position to give you detailed information relating to the various activities in which the State is interested; but upon these matters with which I have had contact and upon which I have had opportunity to form definite opinions based on actual contact, I wish to lay before you some definite information and recommendations.

## JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE

#### GOVERNOR A. G. SORLIE

The State was called upon to mourn the death of its Governor, the Honorable A. G. Sorlie, on August 28, 1928. His death occurred at the Executive Mansion after a month's illness. While the people of the State knew of his illness it was not anticipated that his death was impending. His death was a great shock and was sincerely mourned by the people of the State irrespective of party alignments. This is the of the State irrespective of party alignments. This is the second time within our history that we have been called upon to mourn the death of a Governor while in office. The death of Governor Sorlie evoked a more heartfelt feeling of personal loss than probably any event that has ever transpired in the history of the State. This was particularly noticeable as the funeral train moved across the State from Bismarck to Grand Forks, people standing at salute with bared heads as the train passed by; railway employes, teamsters, boys herding cattle, plowmen in the fields, crowds gathered at railway crossings and in the towns through which the train passed, people in all walks of life gave evidence of their sincere affection for their Governor and their sorrow at his passing. It is my conviction that no event has transpired in North Dakota to create in the minds of the people greater respect than this evidence of their respect for government, as typified by their regard for their chief executive. The memory of that funeral train and the respect of the people will not soon fade.

#### OATH OF OFFICE

Pursuant to constitutional provisions I immediately qualified as Governor and entered upon the duties of the office on August 28, 1928.

#### FORMER SENATOR LADD

In Statuary Hall of the United States Capitol at Washington there are placed a large number of statues from the several States, honoring the memory of deceased citizens from within their borders. The State of North Dakota is not yet represented although every State has been invited to place two statues in the Hall. I wish to present for your consideration the name of our deceased Senator Edwin F. Ladd. It would be quite appropriate for the Legislative Assembly through a joint resolution to name former Senator Ladd as the one for whom a statue shall be placed in Statuary Hall and to name a Commission to have charge of the raising of funds for that purpose and to have charge of the work of placing the statue in position.

#### HIGHWAY DEVELOPMENT

The automobile, whether passenger or truck, has wrought a tremendous change in transportation methods. It has resulted in a nationwide demand for better roads as speedily as they can be built and within our financial ability to provide them. The situation in the nation is reflected in our State. Despite the fact that during the past few years we have built over half of our State Highway System and early next year will have completed 4,000 miles of earth grading of which 2,-400 miles are gravel surfaced out of a total of 7,500 miles, the State Highway Commission has on file applications for the improvement of over 1,300 miles. No doubt the requests would be even larger were the State Highway Commission more capable of keeping pace with the requests already on file. As these applications are made by boards of county commissioners and in response to the pressure of their constituents, it must be apparent to all that the people are insistent in their demands for better highways. It also reflects their readiness to tax themselves liberally for this purpose.

In 1920 we spent in round figures some eight million dollars for the improvement of our state, county and township roads and in 1928, nine years later, our expenditures for the same purposes are not very much greater, but in the meantime car registration has increased ninety per cent. To conserve this tremendous investment in motor vehicles as well as to provide a safe, economical and continuous means of travel and transportation, good roads are essential. Consequently, any expenditures for this purpose may be regarded as an investment rather than expense, especially since the car owner is spared the expense and delay incurred in traversing a Therefore, since he receives an especial benefit poor road. it would seem no more than fair that motor vehicles should contribute more generously to construction and upkeep of roads than the average taxpaver.

The financial resources of the State Highway Commission at present are derived wholly from automobile license tax and from a two cent tax on gasoline employed in motor vehicles. The cost of upkeep of our present improved state highways must increase due in part to obsolescence and in part to greater traffic. Also, as new roads are built, the total cost of upkeep or maintenance will grow at a faster pace than the income of the Commission. Ultimately the State Highway Commission will find itself in no position to build new highways or certainly, incapable of meeting the road demand.

In view of these facts, I recommend to your serious consideration an increase in the gasoline tax to provide the State Highway Commission with additional revenue.

### TAXATION

The property tax in North Dakota is not applied as a measure of individual ability to pay taxes. It is a tax based on ownership of property. It is measured by the sale value of property. The amount of tax paid by any individual depends upon the value of the property to which he has title, and does not depend upon his equity in the property or upon his net worth. The property tax is based entirely upon the market value of the property and in no way depends upon the tax paying ability of the owner. All property taxes become a charge against the earnings from the particular piece of property. When property has no earning ability the tax results in a confiscation of capital values.

If farm taxes in North Dakota were based on the earning power of farm lands and of farm property, the tax bill of North Dakota would be appreciably lessened. Our present laws do not permit assessors or boards of equalization to consider the earning capacity of property in determining true cash value. Under conditions that have existed for a number of years, the market value of farm lands has been impossible to determine because of the absence of any market for farm lands.

In the cause of justice and in the interest of distributing the tax burden on the basis of ability to pay, I recommend that legislation be enacted which will require the state board of equalization to take into consideration in equalizing land values, not only the market price or usual selling price of such property, but shall also require said board to consider the average earning capacity of such property in this state and that shall require that both factors be given equal weight.

I call your attention to suggested legislation proposed by Tax Commissioner Thoresen:

(1) Changing the present system of assessment by local assessors to a county assessment plan.

(2) Assessing wholesale and retail merchants on the average inventory during the year previous to assessment date, or such lesser term as they may have been engaged in business.

(3) Making the county treasurer the treasurer of all taxing districts and abolishing the office of city treasurer, village treasurer and school treasurer.

(4) Prescribing a budget system for school districts.

(5) Providing legislative authorty for taxation of all public utilities.

(6) Taxing natural resources withdrawn from the soil.

#### MISSOURI RIVER DIVERSION PROJECT

It is within the mission of this Legislature to sincerely urge the Missouri River Diversion Project. North Dakota stands a great, neglected inland empire, capable of almost unlimited agricultural production and with great power and manufacturing possibilities. With proper development of our State we can support and employ a population several times the present number. The proper diversion of the Missouri River would be one of the greatest boons to North Dakota and the Nation.

Engineers tell us that in a general way the most practical solution is to pump water over the Coteau. That in turn requires a source of very abundant and very cheap power. Our State Engineer Department has endorsed the suggestion of placing a dam in the Missouri River with one cr more smaller dams in Montana. This will provide abundant power as a by-product and will tie our problem up with the National problem of Missouri River Navigation and Flood Control. The cost will probably not exceed fifty million dollars and is decidedly cheaper than trying to revet the banks and straighten the channel throughout its length. Moreover there is no other way whereby June's water can be made to flow in September and October. The water is there in abundance but not at the right time.

An analgous situation has recently come to what is hoped to be a successfal fruition on the Colorado River where Congress passed with hardly a ripple of opposition the Boulder Dam Bill for a dam to cost three times what this one will cost. You will remember that one of the potent forces behind that bill was the need of Los Angeles of a source of abundant and cheap power to pump water over the mountains from the Colorado River to that city.

The entire cost of this project would be no more than the cos. of two or three modern battleships, construction of which we could easily dispense with. We may well direct our cfforts toward building for humanity's welfare and happiness rather than for destruction.

The possibilities of development in our State, especially in the Western half ar almost unlimited. The great lignite beds, the possibilities of water power development, and the prospects of the discovery of great pools of crude oil, which many eminent geologists greatly encourage, opens a picture of future development which is difficult to comprehend. The fact that capital is now interested in the development of a north and south railroad through the western part of our State indicates . mediate possibilities of development.

## COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENTS

Since the World War, when all our efforts were bent toward increased agricultural production vast changes have occurred in our entire economic structure. Greater attention must now be paid to problems of marketing and reduced cost of production. In this connection I would call the attention of our rural population to the constructive educational service that is available through the county agents employed through the co-operation of our Agricultural Colle , the Department of Agriculture of the Federal Government and various counties. These joint representatives are in a position to render extremely valuable service in pointing out means of reducing our production costs, and furnishing economic information on which sound market programs may be based.

During the past year, representative farmers and farm women have co-operated with the Agricultural College and county agents in participating in a series of conferences designated to point out a sound agricultural program for the state, having in mind our possibilities as compared with other areas, and the general economic situation as it relates to agriculture. This fundamental work should continue, and the recommendations of such conferences should se... as a guide to our agricultural development.

I would also point out the far reaching and valuable effects of the work that is being carried on with our boys and girls through the 4H Club work, and the work of the Homemakers Clubs. I would urge that our rural people take advantage of all these educational activities for themselves and their children, as a means of sound and progressive agricultural improvement.

### PUBLIC SAFETY AND TRAFFIC REGULATION

About two years ago, through the interest and efforts of Governor Sorlie, and at his direction, the first State Safety Conference held in the United States convened in Bismarck. There had previously been two national conferences, but North Dakota was the first state to take hold of the problem of public safety and traffic regulation in earnest. As a result of that conference the North Dakota Safety Council was organized and is doing a splendid work to promote public safety in this state.

The Council was largely instrumental in securing the passage of Chapter 162, Session Laws of 1927, known as "The Rules of the Road Act." Which was one of the so-called Hoover Vehicular Code. We now have on our statute books a comprehensive regulation of all traffic on our roads. This law has already had a very salutary effect and when more fully understood and more thoroughly enforced, should do much to reduce the accident and death toll due to careless and wreckless driving on our roads.

### PENAL LEGISLATION

A problem confronts us which demands careful consideration and proper legislation. The grave danger in confining youthful offenders of the laws of the state in the penitentiary for considerable periods of time, where they come in contact with hardened and vicious criminals, is noticeably apparent. We must find means for taking care of these young offenders in a better and more intelligent manner.

It has been suggested upon good authority that a workable plan would be to incarcerate such young criminals in the State penitentiary for a period of a few days, making provision for parole or suspension of sentence for the remainder of the term. A valuable lesson is learned by such youths from a few days confinement in prison.

#### CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

I wish to advise against any reversion to barbarism by a return to capital punishment in this state. In a well regulated state where the public has every opportunity to confine criminals in safe confinement for as long a period as may be necessary, there is no occasion for resorting to the barbarous method of capital punishment.

### PARDON BOARD SECRETARY

Under our present laws the secretary to the governor is ex-officio secretary of the Board of Pardons. When such legislation was adopted there was no need for any other provision to properly handle the work of the Pardon Board. To anyone who is at all familiar with the volume of work that now comes before this board and the almost constant demands upon the secretary, it is apparent that a change in the law is necessary and advisable, and that provision should now be made for the development of a full time secretary for this department of state government.

In addition to handling the clerical work of the board the secretary should become parole officer for the state, and should act in an advisory capacity to prisoners. The work of such officer in the rehabilitation and reinstatement of prisoners who have served their sentences, would in a great many instances prevent a repetition of criminal acts and would prove an economic saving to the state. The time has come when we must give consideration to the prevention of crime for the protection of our citizens.

### STATE INSURANCE

The so-called state industries or enterprises occupy an important place in the economic life of our State, and it would seem proper that some mention should be made of the progress and present status of that part of such program which falls under the head of insurance and is administered by the Insurance Department.

A few of the outstanding facts and figures taken from the last reports of the various branches of that Department as of 1927 are very interesting and instructive. The State Fire & Tornado Fund was created by legislative act in '1919 for the purpose of insuring against fire and tornado any and all public property of the State. The sum of \$478,017.61 has been paid out for reinsurance in accordance with the provisions of the statute while \$60,303.24 has been recovered under such protection. Had no reinsurance been placed whatsoever, then in that case the Department would have approximately \$417,000 more in the fund than it has today. For the payment of this volume of premium the Department has received approximately \$9,000,000 fire and tornado protection on the larger risks throughout the State for the greater part of the Department's existence.

The net insurance in force December 31, 1927, was \$20,-088,791 fire and \$19,190,431 tornado; present amount in hands of State Treasurer, over one million dollars. The records of the Department show that losses paid during the entire period of ten years operation amount to only \$500,000 or an average loss ratio of \$50,000 per year, and that almost an equal amount has been spent for reinsurance with private companies.

I recommend the amendment of the law to read: "Whenever the earned premiums in the Fire and Tornado Fund shall equal \$2,000,000 that all earned premiums in excess thereof shall be paid back to the political subdivisions in proportion to the sums paid by the political subdivisions into the Fire and Tornado Fund." This will necessitate the collecting of premiums each year but will ever be a safeguard to the Fund in the event of excess losses.

A penny saved is a penny earned. In consideration of this surplus, the exceedingly low fire loss ratio of 28% established over a period of ten years, together with the anticipated cycle of better times, I therefore also urge the repeal of the reinsurance clause in the statute governing this fund in order that still greater savings may be effected for the benefit of our tax payers.

The State Bonding Department has served the State very well in two ways, first, by being a financial success thereby saving the taxpayer; second, by making uniform and stabilizing the rates on bonds for public officials. Had not the department been in existence during the past few years of financial distress it is reasonable to assume that the rates on public officials' bonds would be so high as to make such bonds almost prohibitive.

The gross premiums received by the Department for the entire period since 1919 is \$423,763. In addition to this, and practically the only other income, is that received from interest on the accumulated fund and equals at the end of 1927 \$38,072. The largest source of disbursement has been the losses paid which is in the sum of \$135,775.31, or a general average to the gross income of 29%.

The Bonding Law, like the Fire and Tornado act provides for excess or reinsurance on certain risks. The sum of \$38,-592.25 has been paid to private companies in the form of reinsurance, and it is significant to note that no losses have occurred on any such risks during the entire period. I urgently recommend the discontinuance of this reinsurance feature. The net surplus of, this fund as of December 31, 1927, was \$201,702 over all liabilities.

### STATE HAIL INSURANCE

From comparisons made of rates charged by the private companies compared to the rates that have been charged by the Hail Department, it is shown that if the same amount of insurance had been carried with the private companies during the ten years of operation as was carried with the Department, the saving by the Department to the farmers in lower premium rates would amount to not less than thirty million dollars or approximately three million dollars a year on average. Since the 1928 losses were very severe, the saving in this respect would naturally be very much less than the average, but even so, very close to three hundred thousand dollars would be considered saved to the farmers on this item alone.

Besides being able to pay the indemnities for losses, the Department has also been able to create a permanent surplus within the fund, such surplus being accrued from the flat tax levy. The surplus within the fund now having reached the limit set by law, namely four million dollars, no further flat tax needs to be levied for such purpose and, therefore, such flat tax is discontinued. It is very encouraging to know that the Department is on a very firm foundation and will in the future be able to pay all its obligations promptly and without any interest charges either to the Department or to the farmers who have suffered the losses and are entitled to indemnity for same.

An institution of the magnitude of the Hail Insurance Department naturally has a great many difficult problems to solve. The most difficult one to overcome arises from the fact that mortgages take advantage of the fact that in many instances mortgage liens are superior to the hail indemnity taxes. In such event the courts have held that general taxes may be paid without the inclusion of the hail indemnity tax. The Hail Fund is thus deprived of a great many thousand dollars of indemnity tax every year which it morally is entitled to:

There is perhaps only one real solution to this problem, but it would help materially to reduce the amount of premiums lost if institutions of the nature of the Bank of North Dakota co-operated to the extent of paying hail indemnity taxes even though its mortgage was superior to such tax. Since lands taken on foreclosure of mortgage are later resold for a price covering at least the actual cost to the institution, no one would be loser. This is perhaps a problem for the Industrial Commission, and it is hoped careful consideration be given.

It is hoped that a Department that has shown itself to be so signally successful and beneficial to the people of the State may receive from the Legislature the fullest measure of co-operation.

#### THE BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA

The healthy public sentiment regarding the bank is one of the best assets the bank has. Total footings in the statement of the Bank of North Dakota shows over \$50,000,000 and the vast deposits placed in the Bank voluntarily by depositors is an evidence of the confidence reposed in the institution and the facilities it affords. The earnings of the Bank since it opened for business July 28, 1919, including \$100,000 that was turned over to the State Treasury, amounts now to \$1,149,000, which is better than fifty-seven per cent or six per cent per annum for nine and one-half years, including the period of organization when banks or any other best earnings. However, while the Bank has earned through its operations better than six per cent for nine and one-half years, that does not show fully the vast benefit the Bank has been to the citizens of North Dakota. A saving to the mortgagors of around two and one-quarter per cent per annum on nearly \$30,000,000 in farm loans placed through the bank and the saving on the vast volume of other farm loans on which a better rate of interest has been obtained by the borrower on account of the influence of the Bank of North Dakota, which avings repeats itself from year to year during the life of the loan, has been made available to North Dakota citizens.

There will be some losses but they will be negligible as compared with the vast earnings and the splendid services rendered and to be rendered. Funds deposited by treasurers in local banks prior to the organization of the Bank of North Dakota which banks have now closed and from which the Bank of North Dakota was never able to withdraw the deposit placed therein by these treasurers, will result in some loss. The amounts thereof cannot be definitely ascertained until after the receiver has wound up the affairs of these banks and until after it is determined to what extent the Depositors Guaranty Fund will be able to repay depositors. These losses when ascertained will have to be charged off. They are not, however, the result of the operations of the Bank but are the result of local banks being unable to pay deposits placed therein by treasurers of public funds. The soundness of the Bank is accepted as a fact by the people. Criticism of its operations is not heard and if this healthy, public sentiment continues the Bank is bound to continue in successful operation.

#### THE STATE MILL AND ELEVATOR

Great interest has been manifested in the relations of the Governor to the State Mill and Elevator and it seems proper to give that matter consideration. The State Mill and Elevator is not a new thing. The people have been discussing it and legislatures have been taking action thereon at almost each session during the past 36 years. The first bill to create a terminal elevator to be owned by the State was enacted by the Legislative Assembly of 1893 and of course there had been considerable discussion of the subject prior to that time, otherwise the Legislative Assembly would not have then taken action thereon. The need for a State owned terminal elevator was keenly felt. Away back through all that long time several constitutional amendments were adopted from time to time, finally culminating in the erection of a terminal elevator at Grand Forks, beginning in 1919 and completed in 1923.

The law enacted in 1919 providing for the erection of a State owned mill and elevator placed the enterprise under the management and control of the Industrial Commission. In 1923 the law was amended transferring the management and control from the Industrial Commission to the Governor. Some people think that the operation of a State owned mill and elevator is not a governmental function. However, the language of the Federal Courts, District and Supreme, alleging that when the people of the State undertake such activities as include the operations of a State mill and elevator that such action is within the province of the people and thereby such action makes the operation of the State mill and Elevator a governmental function. With all due respect for the opinion of those individuals who claim that the operation of the State mill and elevator is not a governmental function, we have on the other hand the voice of the people who have by their votes determined that in this case the operation of the State mill and elevator shall be a governmental function, which determination is affirmed by the highest courts in the land.

While the people who believe that the operation of the State mill and elevator ought not to be a governmental function should have and do have a perfect right to argue and to use their influence against the continuance of a program which includes the operation of a State mill and elevator as one of the governmental functions, nevertheless, such people should realize that these Institutions are now a fixture and that they belong to the State and that they are entitled to the support and sustenance that is afforded to any State Institution.

Approaching the question from that direction the question arises and it has already been raised as to whether the Governor should remain in charge of the management and operation of the State Mill and elevator.

As a purely agricultural State our greatest loss has occurred through the lack of an orderly marketing system. Any method through which the loss to our people can be reduced will be a benefit to practically all of our people and tends to carry out the Constitutional injunction "to promote the general welfare." In my judgment no act that a Governor can do can more largely promote the general welfare than that one act of reducing loss through agricultural activities within our State and if I am correct in this estimate of the Governor's duties, then by all means the Governor should be left in charge of the operations of the State mill and elevator at this time. There should not be a divided responsibility. That thing that may be made to re-act to the greatest good of the most citizens of the State should be retained as one of the chief duties of the leading State official.

The management of the mill and elevator should rest squarely upon the Governor, that people may know whom to hold responsible. Any shifting of management is too likely to bring mismanagement and confusion of responsibility.

A great deal of the credit for the improved condition of the State Mill and Elevator must be given to the work of the Fact Finding Committee. The general public had a very false impression of the business of the Mill and Elevator until the report of the Fact Finding Committee was made public. That report definitely established in the public mind the benefits that the State was deriving from the operation of the mill and elevator. Public opinion and public confidence has a great bearing upon the success of the institution. The Fact Finding Committee has performed a valuable public service.

I do not consider that the management of the Mill and Elevator has reached anything like perfection, but great improvements have been made and more can be made, and now, with a better public appreciation of the work being done it will be much easier to accomplish all that the institution was intended to accomplish. There are handicaps in public or state ownership of any industrial plant that are hard to overcome and we may look to a bright future when a farmerowned co-operative organization, such as the Farmers' Union has developed to a degree capable of taking over the operation of the Mill and Elevator with proper State control.

## STATE LABQRATORY

The importance of the state laboratory is reflected in the fact that within the past few years similar laboratories have been established in nine states. 'Some idea of the usefulness of our state laboratory to the producers of grain may be gleaned from the increase in the number of samples tested during the past five years. For the crop year from July 1, 1923, to July 1, 1924, the state laboratory tested 5,960 samples of grain. For the crop year from July 1, 1927, to July 1, 1928, the number of samples tested was 13,158, and the number is constantly increasing.

#### THE NORTH DAKOTA TERMINAL

The Supreme Court of North Dakota has defined the North Dakota Terminal thus: "When we speak of Duluth or Minneapolis as being terminals we do not understand that it is every street and alley and portion of the city, but that portion where the facilities, the equipment, the mills and elevators are, without requiring them to be congregated in any special section." Thus we have the North Dakota Terminal, which means all the facilities, the equipment and mills and elevators for the handling of grain in and around the city of The North Dakota Terminal embraces the Grand Forks. North Dakota Terminal Exchange, which is a private corporation organized and beginning operation in 1925, under the laws of the state of North Dakota. It has 27 members consisting of grain dealers and has its offices at the North Dakota Terminal. The North Dakota Terminal Elevator, which is the state owned elevator and a federal warehouse, is also embraced in this definition. Then we have the North Dakota State Laboratory and the Loomis Laboratory located the city of Grand Forks and devoted to the testing of in protein and gluten content; the state owned mill and other private mills, elevators and warehouses used in the handling of grain. From this statement you will see that quite extensive milling and grain merchandising interests have been developed at the North Dakota Terminal, not all of which are state owned.

The definite success and future outlook of the North Dakota Terminal at Grand Forks has aroused great interest in other cities of the state, and it is altogether probable that efforts will be made within a very short time to establish other terminals within the state.

### ORDERLY MARKETING

The State Mill has afforded great benefits through demonstrating the value of North Dakota wheat, and therein lies the great value of the State mill to the citizens of the State, consumers and producers alike. That angle of the situation has been pretty well taken care of through the State mill. The other angle, however, is woefully lacking, in that there is not adequate storage facilities within the state. More storage, either public or private, is necessary to orderly mark-This Legislative Assembly should enact measures to eting. provide an increase in storage facilities in the state. It seems reasonable that grain shippers along the Northern Pacific Railroad, main line and branches, and also along the south branches of the Soo Line, should be afforded storage facilities equal to the facilities now afforded at Grand Forks to shippers along the Great Northern and along the northern branches of the Soo Line.

Control of our marketing must be accomplished either by state or federal action, or by a nearly perfect farmers' cooperative organization assisted by state and federal laws. The Canadian government has accomplished this. But an essential part of a program for orderly marketing requires provisions for ample storage facilities, which if not furnished by private interests ought to be furnished, at least in part, by the state.

In an effort to bring about orderly marketing and the control of markets by the producers, I wish to strongly recommend to this Assembly the farm storage features embodied in Senate Bill No. 47 of the 18th Legislative Assembly (1925). That bill, introduced by Senator Hamilton, embodies all the main features of a workable farm storage law. Other states, notably Iowa and Nebraska, have placed similar legislation on their statute books; but those laws were seriously lacking in some respects which made them unworkable. There is no serious reason why such legislation cannot be enacted by this legislative assembly and made entirely workable and practical.

The great value of farm storage legislation would be to relieve the necessity for costly storage facilities at terminals. Such legislation would also establish in the minds of farmers that there was a surplus of grain on hand and that acreage should be curtailed. This would all tend to create better farming methods and would interest every farmer in controling his own market.

#### GRAIN STORAGE FINANCE

I wish to strongly recommend to you the following plan for financing grain storage. From the national government as well as statesmen from all over this nation has come the challenge to the agricultural people of the Northwest that the only solution for the present day agricultural depression is that farmers must learn to help themselves. While such statements sound reasonable and simple, yet history teaches us that whenever the agricultural people have attempted to assist themselves in solving their problems, they have met with strenuous opposition, sufficient to quell any such movement.

The one and paramount thing which is necessary for the farmer to help himself is finance. In this one particular the farmers of North Dakota are especially handicapped. They must rely upon finances furnished them by outside sources, which places such a burden upon the farmers that it frustrates any attempt to solve their economic problems.

The first step, then, in any solution of agricultural problems of North Dakota is that of providing adequate and cheap money for use to those who till the soil. The program which we are encouraging calls for adequate storage facilities on the farm, in the local elevators and at the state terminals, in order that the surplus crop may be taken off the market, and that the products of the farm may be marketed in a reasonable and orderly manner. To do this requires money.

We have upon our statute books a law known as the "Grain Tax Law." As it has been administered in the past it is of very little value. I, therefore, recommend that the present grain tax law be repealed and that in place thereof this legislature pass a Grain Sales Tax Law, placing a sales tax of five mills upon every bushel of grain of whatever nature, kind and description that may be sold in the state of North Dakota.

This tax is easy of administration and is paid by the producers of the grain in the state. Such a tax of five mills on each bushel would in the course of an average year in North Dakota produce a fund of approximately \$700,000. The tax so collected by the elevators from the vendors of grain should be directed into the state treasury and set aside by legislative enactment as a special fund to be known as the "Farmers' Marketing Fund." This fund should not be used for any general purpose of the state, but for the purpose of furnishing money so that the farmers might borrow upon their storage tickets at the lowest rate of interest, which under this plan should not be more than three per cent.

In addition to furnishing money for loans upon storage tickets, it would also be used to make loans to farmers' cooperative elevator companies with which to build local storage elevators and also, if the needs demanded, to erect further state terminal elevators. The combined purpose of such storage facilities would be to handle all of the grain in the state of North Dakota.

This money should be placed in the Bank of North Dakota without interest, and the Bank of North Dakota in making loans to individual farmers and to farmers' co-operative elevator companies, or for the purpose of erecting state terminal elevators, would be permitted to charge only sufficient to take care of the actual cost of handling the money. This fund should be in charge of a committee designated by the legislature.

By means of this fund growing to tremendous proportions, as it will within a few years, farmers would in truth and in fact become able to help themselves, and would become financially independent in taking care of their own marketing problems.

No one may criticize such a tax but the farmer who sells his grain. The greatest handicap in the past which the farmers have had in solving their own problems has been the opposition and agitation by those who have very little, if any interest in the farmers problem in North Dakota.

#### FARM PROBLEM

The farm problem is the most serious problem that confronts the nation at the present time, and it is necessary for us to adopt proper methods to stabilize marketing.

Whenever in a nation the farmer and middle class prosper, the nation at large prospers. Whenever these two classes are economically unsound the nation suffers.

We are going through a process of agricultural evolution. Larger and larger investments are continually needed in agricultural production. Scientific methods are replacing the old crude methods of grain and livestock production, and modern complicated machinery is replacing the crude machinery upon the farms of the pre-war period. In this process of evolution great numbers of our farmers will be financially crushed while others with greater financial resources and more executive ability will succeed. Undoubtedly in the future we shall be able to produce greater volume at lower cost.

The average American farmer will be unable to adjust himself to this rapid change that is taking place without very serious consequences to himself and his dependents. In fact, the American farm home as we know it today, the rugged family unit that has made our country the greatest nation in the history of the world, is in grave danger of destruction. It is the mission of the state and nation to use every reasonable method to stablize production and marketing so that the American farmer may be able to adjust himself to these rapidly changing conditions. Our neighbor on the north, the Canadian government, and Canadian capital has given agriculture a great deal of assistance and encouragement that has not been given to our American farmers by our state or nation. The result is that Canada has taken from our state within the past few years more than a hundred thousand of our better and more ambitious citizens. This has been a great economic loss to our state. It is a condition that should be remedied without delay. North Dakota soil and climate offer every advantage that can be found elsewhere, and we should
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#### make every effort to keep our people in North Dakota, and encourage more people to come to our state.

#### PUBLIC POLICY

Any discussion of our state owned industries immediately brings forth the well advertised bugaboo of socialism. There should be no great difference of opinion or misunderstanding in our American political life in regard to this subject. Misunderstandings, however, have been promoted by publications backed by selfish interests inimical to the interests of the general public. This has been carried to such an extent that sound thinking people have an altogether erroneous view of the duties of government. The thought or idea of communism, or complete socialism, is extremely repugnant to American traditions, and particularly is such idea repugnant to the American farmer.

The right to private property precedes the rights of state or national government. Wherever private enterprise can serve the general good as well, or nearly as well, it should not be threatened by public ownership. However, our complicated civilization demands more and more complicated government. This naturally involves public ownership and public control of vast enterprises. Modern government is compelled to adopt public ownership to some degree. As a modern, progressive people we should not be constantly quarreling over principle when there is no principle involved.

#### CONCLUSION

As American citizens we recognize the right of the majority to rule. We also recognize the rights of the minority, but obstructive and destructive tactics aimed against the majority's right to rule are not within the province of the minority's rights. As the minority we can maintain our political dignity and self-respect without resorting to destructive or obstructive tactics.

One of the most serious features noticeable in the destructive tactics heretofore practiced in our state legislative assembly has been playing politics with the appropriations for the various governmenta' departments and the state institutions. There can be no excuse for any employment of such tactics in this legislative assembly.

Mr. Shafer, as the head of the .ncoming administration, deserves the loyal co-operation of every citizen in the State in promoting the general welfare of our state. We may differ strenuously on matters of political principle and policies of government, but when those principles and collicies have been settled there should be nothing but harmony and good will, without any sacrifice of either principle or rights of the minority.

#### APPRECIATION OF OUR BLESSINGS

Our praise and thankfulness are due to Almighty God in that during the past two years no epidemic, catastrophe or devastation has affected our State, but we have been permitted to enjoy those things that add to the health, comfort, peace and happiness of the citizens of a great Commonwealth.

President Carr: "As the presiding officer of the Joint Assembly, on this occasion there comes to me a distinction today that has never come to any other presiding officer on a similar occasion, and one which in the nature of things will never come again. That is the privilege of presenting to this Joint Assembly and the audience gathered here the first native-born son of this great state that has been elected by the people of the state to the high office of governor.

I introduce to you the incoming governor, Honorable George F. Shafer."

#### GOVERNOR SHAFER'S ADDRESS

#### Members of the Legislature:

Agreeable to the mandates of the state constitution and according to a custom long established, the members of this, the Twenty-first Session of the Legislative Assembly, have met in joint session to witness the public inauguration of the state officials recently elected, and to receive a message from both the outgoing and incoming Governor. In so doing, we are all, I am sure, conscious of the solemn character of the occasion, fully appreciative of the great responsibility that rests upon each of us, and sensible of the high degree of confidence reposed in us by our constituents and our duty to discharge our official trust in the spirit of the constitutional oath today taken by each executive officer and legislative member in this presence. We meet at the threshold of another biennial period in the governmental history of the state, a period which offers to us as public servants, the opportunity and privilege of rendering valuable service to our state and country.

The Session of the Legislature is confronted with the responsibility of dealing in an intelligent way, with many important matters pertaining to the adminstration of the state government; a government which has steadily grown, enlarged and expanded over nearly forty years of statehood. The whole structure of this government includes several hundred local municipalities and political subdivisions, and a central state body which is over and inclusive of all of its subordinate parts. It is the province of your state executive officers to execute and administer laws relating to the conduct of the central government; but the province and responsibility of the legislature is much broader; it must enact the laws under which, not only the central government, but also the hundreds of townships, school districts, counties, villages and cities must be governed. Your legislative actions during this session will, therefore, intimately touch and affect, directly and indirectly, the property, civil rights, economic and social welfare, liberty and lives of more than 640,000 people, residents of North Dakota; and it will influence the future relationship of our state in the political and economic structure of the Northwest. The range of subjects that you will be called upon to consider will be altogether too great for me to cover in detail within the time allotted for this address; hence, I shall limit this communication to a brief, and, I hope, clear statement of the more essential facts pertaining to the condition of our state affairs, some specific, as well as general recommendations for your consideration, and give expression to a few fundamental principles which I think should guide your legislative deliberations.

## APPROPRIATIONS

One of the most important tasks that will engage your serious attention is that of making the regular biennial appropriations for the maintenance and requirements of all state departments and institutions, and for other purposes. In discharging this duty, you will have before you for your assistance, the report of the budget board, which board has considered all budget requests submitted to it as required by law, and which, after a very general and necessarily hasty review of them, has given its preliminary conclusions thereon. As usual the total amount of these budget requests exceed the probably available revenues of the state under existing revenue laws, several millions of dollars. The budget board has pared these requests down to a figure which will bring the total amount recommended within the present available revenues for the biennium. An effort will. no doubt, be made from many quarters to induce the legislature to increase these appropiations above the grand total ap-proved by the budget board. If this is done, I urge you to not, under any circumstance, permit the allowance of ap-propriations in excess of the present income of the state. Should this be done, it would be incumbent upon you to either create new sources of revenue, or increase the present high rate of property taxation. In my opinion neither is justified under present conditions. Rather than increase the present rate of property taxation, you should, if possible, wherever it can be done without impairing the efficiency and functions of the government, make reductions consistent with sound principles of business and economy. I realize, of course, that large reductions in the regular appropriations for state purposes connot be made at this session, owing to the necessary maintenance requirements of existing institutions and departments long established, without a radical reorganization of the entire state system of government. This cannot, in the nature of things, be accomplished abruptly; but we, nevertheless, owe it to the taxpayers of the state to do that which is within our power: namely, protect the taxpayers against any further increase in real estate and personal property taxes.

#### PUBLIC DEBT

Closely related to the subject of appropriations is that per-

taining to the public debt. In ten years our state debt has risen from \$412,000 in 1918 to \$35,157,500 in 1928. The annual bond interest charge has come up during this period from \$20,000 to over \$1,500,000. The entire present bonded debt of the state was created entirely for the establishment and operation of the so-called industrial program upon which the state embarked in 1919. It includes \$2,000,000 to provide capital for the Bank of North Dakota; \$4,500,000 for the con-struction and operation of the State Mill and Elevator; and \$28,657,500 to provide funds for the operation of the Farm Loan Department of the Bank of North Dakota. The last named class of bonds is secured by first mortgages on farm lands held in trust by the State Treasurer. The annual interest on these bonds is largely paid from interest collections derived from such mortgages. However, it has occasionally happened that such mortgage interest collections have been insufficient to cover the total annual bond interest, and in such cases tax levies have been resorted to to provide the necessary funds to make up the dificiencies. For this purpose nearly a million dollars have been levied since 1920. Nearly all of the interest falling due on the bank capital and Mill and Elevator bonds has been paid from taxation, together with sinking funds established to retire the principal of such bonds upon maturity. These various bond obligations, most of which is interest, have heretofore been reflected in the annual state tax levies, and exceed the sum of \$6,000,000. For the past several years the average annual amount included in the general state tax levy for these purposes has been about three-quarters of a million dollars. This fact accounts for one difficulty which has in the past, and now stands in the way of reducing state levies for some years in the future.

Added to the state bonded indebtedness is also to be considered the outstanding municipal bonded indebtedness. This amount has likewise increased from approximately \$11,000,-000 in 1913 to over \$25,000,000 in 1925. The interest and principal charges thus incurred by local subdivisions has added much to the tax burden of our people during the last ten years. The state and municipal bonded indebtedness of North Dakota combined is in excess of \$60,000,000. Unless this rising tide of public debt is stemmed, is is obvious that it will be exceedingly difficult to either reduce property taxes, or prevent substantial increases in the future. Further increases in the public debt, whether created by the state or its political subdivisions, will not only add considerably to the annual tax charges, but generally impair the credit of the state. I, therefore, recommend that the legislature reject all proposals to add to the state debt for any purpose except a limited amount to permit the continued operation of the Farm Loan Department of the Bank of North Dakota; and, that no further authority be granted to local sub-divisions and municipalities to bond for any purpose whatsoever. As a further protection against possible increases in the public debt of the state, I would suggest the repeal of all laws now on the books designed to authorize the issuance of state bonds for any purpose other than rural credit purposes and that further restrictions be adopted limiting the purposes and amounts for which municipal bonds may be issued.

## TAXATION AND COST OF GOVERNMENT

This brings us to the consideration of the all important subject of taxation and cost of government. For many years, everyone have been keenly appreciative of the great burden which both agriculture and business has been obliged to carry in the form of constantly increasing governmental costs and higher property taxes. This burden has been particularly heavy upon the owners of farm lands in this state; a burden which has had the effect of substantially reducing the net earnings of farm property in recent years. Between the years of 1915 and 1921, the annual property tax levy for state and local purposes combined increased from approximately \$15,000,000 in 1915, to over \$31,000,000 in 1921, not including special assessments. During the seven years since 1921, the total annual levy for the same pur-poses fluctuated between \$28,000,000 and \$30,000,000-the total levy for 1927 being slightly over \$30,000,000. Of this total annual tax charge upon real and personal property, less than 15% was levied for state purposes; the remaindermore than 85%, is to meet the requirements of the various political subdivisions and municipalities.

It is a consoling, though not an encouraging fact, to know that a similar increase in property taxes and in governmental costs has taken place in most of our neighboring states. This comparison with other states, however, does not make the tax burden any easier to carry for the taxpayers of North Dakota; nor lessen our duty to prevent further increases as a public necessity, or to make reductions if possible.

The general causes for this rapid and remarkable increase in the cost of both local and state government are twofold: First, it is a result of the marked increase in the cost of materials and labor which the government must purchase in competition with all private business; and, second, it is a result of a rapid and extensive expansion in the functions of the government, both state and local, which has occurred during the past fifteen years. During the last ten years we have experienced a perfect mani. for governmental experiments and expansion in this country, and the certain consequences of it all has been, larger public expenditures, greater public debt, and higher tax levies extending throughout the entire structure of government from the lowest to the highest unit. This condition has been exceptionally severe in this state in view of the fact that the number of taxpayers has not increased in recent years; and the further fact that our state, in common with all agricultural states, suffered the strain of a nation-wide economic depression, the shock of which was great and far-reaching; but from the results of which, I am happy to say, we have made and are making sure and steady recovery.

From the burden of these heavy taxes the people of our state are entitled to be delivered if it is within the power and genius of the government officials, state and local, to accomplish it.

In view of these elementary facts, it is apparent that any program of tax reduction, in order to be substantial and effective, must not be confined to the structure of the state government only, which, as I have said before, consumes less than 15% of the annual property tax levies; but it must also apply with equal force, to the expenditures and functions of all political subdivisions of the state, which consume the remaining 85% of the annual tax payments. It involves a comprehensive program of reconstruction and readjustment in our whole system of government from top to bottom, on a basis which will include the elimination of unnecessary governmental functions, the consolidation of departments and offices, the improvement of governmental machinery and methods, the curtailment of some, and the elimination of other government in North Dakota; because it is not within the power of the government labor which the government must purchase at public expense. Such a program should contemplate the strengthening, not the weakening of our governmental processes, the introduction of more efficiency in the entire system, and the elimination of waste and unnecessary expenditures throughout the whole structure.

This problem is not an easy one to solve, nor an inviting one to approach, and its proper solution calls for the exercise of care and deliberation, and a high degree of intelligence and courage on the part of both the legislators and administrators dealing with it. I believe that the task is by no means hopless and that we should at this session give serious consideration to it. I realize, however, that with the many and varied legislative matters requiring your attention, it will not be possible for you to undertake such a comprehensive program at this session. I, therefore, re-commend that you provide for the appointment of either an interim legislative committee, or a competent commission with full power to study the whole subject and report its findings and recommendations to the next session of the legislature. Such interim committee or commission should be provided with a small appropriation, sufficient to defray its necessary expenses and reasonable compensation for its members. This matter is of tremendous importance to the future welfare of the state, and I trust that you will give it earnest and careful consideration.

#### BANKING LAWS

I also wish to direct your attention to the condition of the laws of the state relating to the organization and operation of state banks, saving banks, trust and investment companies. Depositors and investors in banks have passed thru a very sad experience in North Dakota recently, an experience which has taught us that our laws relating to these associa-

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tions, which are of a quasi-public character, are not adequate, nor entirely appropriate for the full protection of the depositing and investing public. Perhaps no banking system or set of laws could have withstood the shock of the post-war deflation, but certain it seems that these laws require modification and alteration to meet the changed and changing economic condition of the times, in order to prevent speculative use of depositors' funds in banks and other investments companies, and to encourage safer and sounder management of these institutions in the future.

This too, is a problem which should not be dealt with hastly, but with care and deliberation. Accordingly, I recommend the appointment of a select interim legislative committee, or a commission to study this subject, and to make report to the next legislative session. While this may seem like delaying action on this important subject too long; yet, I believs we should proceed with extreme care and throughness in such matters, for if our work in this field is well and wisely done, it will, in all probability, stand without modification, for many years.

# SECURITY FOR PUBLIC DEPOSITS

There is, however, one piece of the bank legislation that might well be considered at this session. As you know, under present laws both state and national banks are entitled to be designated as depositaries for all public funds, except state furnish funds, and when so designated, are required to either personal or surety company bonds as security for Under the unusual conditions which such public deposits. have prevailed in the banking field in recent years, personal bonds have proven entirely unsafe, and surety bonds either too expensive, or difficult to obtain, with the result that many local banks in good condition do not qualify as public depositaries. I think this unsatisfactory situation may be remedied by adopting a law which will authorize banks to purchase and pledge government bonds, state or national, as security for public deposits in lieu of personal or surety company bonds. I believe it is good public policy for the political subdivisions to keep a large share of their public funds on deposit in local state and national banks, but only under conditions which will absolutely protect such public deposits against loss in case of bank insolvency.

# BUILDING AND LOAN ASSOCIATIONS

I would also suggest that at this session you revise the laws pertaining to the organization and operation of building and loan associations. Owing to the recent difficulties in the banking business, many investors are putting large sums of money into the stock and securities of these organizations. It is, therefore, desirable that the supervisory authority of the State Banking Department over these institutions be broadened and that certain restrictive provisions be adopted which will tend to prevent the organization and operation of this class of investment companies on a promotion or speculative basis.

# TEACHERS' INSURANCE AND RETIREMENT FUND

I wish to direct your attention to the necessity of revising the Teachers' Insurance and Retirement Fund Law. This law was orgiginally enacted in 1913 and has been in operation ever since. A recent actuarial survey of the schedule of rates upon which this fund is founded, discloses that such rate schedule is altogether inadequate to maintain the solvency of the fund, and that remedial legislation is now imperative to protect its future existence and usefulness.

#### STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The State Highway Department has recently become one of the most important departments in the whole state government. Its growth in the past five years has been phenomenal. It is now engaged in the gigantic task of constructing and maintaining a 7,400 mile state highway system under the Federal Aid Plan, and in the course of this construction and maintenance work, it is now annually expending between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000 of public funds. These funds are derived from the gasoline tax, motor vehicle license fees and federal aid appropriations. This department has so far constructed some 3,905 miles of this state high-way system, of which 2,164 miles have been gravelled. As this highway mileage construction increases, the maintenance cost also increase, thus rapidly reducing the margin of funds available for new road construction purposes. It is now estimated that this rapidly growing maintenance cost will soon consume all of the highway revenue income under existing laws, leaving no funds with which to complete the construction of the remainder of the state road system. It would, therefore, seem certain that additional highway revenues will soon be required to complete this big building program. Whether it will be necessary to provide for such additional income at this session of the legislature, I am not now prepared to advise. I submit that question to your judgment without recommendation. I am, however, opposed to the idea of issuing bonds for road or bridge construction purposes as a source of revenue. Bonds mean interest charges over a long period of time, and I think we have quite a sufficiency of that sort of liabilities now. I believe in a pay-as-we-go-policy in this matter. Should additional highway income be required it should be obtained by increasing the gasoline tax and motor vehicle license fees.  $\mathbf{If}$ it seems desirable to increase the gasoline tax rate and motor vehicle fees at this session, I would suggest that two matters be considered in connection therewith. First, consider the advisibility of providing additional revenue for the use of the counties for the development of the county or marketing road system; and, second, study the possibility of eliminating, or reducing property levies usually made for local road purposes and replacing that source of road taxes with gasoline and motor vehicle taxes. These suggestions are prompted by the thought that we must soon improve our local or marketing road system, and the desire to see farm property relieved of the burden of road and bridge levies.

Considerable corrective legislation is also needed to

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facilitate the business-like and efficient conduct of this department, the details of which will be brought to your attention by the officials of the highway commission.

#### DEPARTMENT REPORTS

The laws of the state require every department of the state government to make and file written reports either annually or biennially giving the condition and progress of the work of such departments, and in many cases, suggesting desirable as well as necessary changes in the laws relating to the administration of the public business. These reports are too numerous, and also, too voluminous to be studied by each member of the legislature; but, nevertheless, they contain much vital and important information touching the business of the state. Neither space nor time will allow me to refer in detail to the subject matter of these several reports, nor deal specifically with the recommendations contained therein, although I know that most of these recommendations are of sufficient importance to command your interest and attention. I, therefore, recommend that each body of the legislature create a special committee charged with the duty of examining those official reports and studying the recommendations therein contained. I urge this procedure as a means of facilitating contact between the legislature and the various state departments, and in the interest of better coordination between the legislative and executive branches of the government.

# BUREAU OF CRIMINAL IDENTIFICATION AND APPREHENSION

The report of the Committee on Criminal Law approved by the State Bar Association at its annual meeting last year, contains some recommendations dealing with the subject of criminal justice, which merit your thoughtful consideration. I refer particularly to the Committee's recommendation favoring the establishment of a State Bureau of Criminal Identification and Apprehension. During the past several years North Dakota and neighboring states have been subjected to the depredations of the professional robber class of the country. In the year just closed, several successful bank robberies and burglaries were committed by these transient criminals, who wander at will all over the American Continent with automobiles, making profitable and safe use of our im-proved highway system. In nearly all cases, these raiders have escaped arrest. This is due largely to the ease with which they can travel thru the country from their rendezvous in the large cities with high-powered cars, and the utter inadequacy of our ancient local police system to deal with this baffling problem. I have become convinced that this condition can only be successfully met by the coordinated efforts of the several states, aided by the Federal Government. Such coordination, can only be had thru the medium of central state agencies empowered to co-operate with other like agencies in other states in hunting down and apprehending this ever increasing class of fugitives. While I hesitate to suggest adding to our already numerous state agencies, yet

I believe that it is one of the primary duties of the state government to protect its citizens and their property from the ravages of professional criminals who constantly invade our state with but little fear of interference from the law.

# FOUR YEAR TERMS FOR STATE AND COUNTY OFFICERS

In the interest of both economy and efficiency in government, I believe that the terms of all county and state officers, whose terms are now two years, should be made four years. I have long felt that such a change would be very desirable in North Dakota. Under our present election laws, two elections are held every other year, thus compelling several hundred county officers and all state officers who are candidates for reelection, to campaign almost continuously for the better part of each even numbered years. This results in a flagrant waste of time and money for both the candidates and the taxpayers; it interferes with the efficient conduct of public business and subjects the people to the shock and disturbance of frequent political controversies. The two year term system was established long before primary elections were provided for, at a time when nominations for all public offices were made by the convention method. Under the convention system only one campaign and one election every two years was necessary.

The constitution provides that any official who proves to be inefficient or corrupt can be recalled at any time by the voters. Most public officials are efficient and worthy and are rewarded frequently by re-election as a matter of course. Four year terms for state and county officers would not only result in a great saving of expense to candidates and taxpayers, but would introduce more stability into our whole system of government, state and local.

It is true that biennial elections would still be necessary to choose members of Congress, and perhaps, members of the legislature; but that is no reason why the state and county governments should be regularly disrupted by the effects of a campaign lasting several months each even-numbered year.

#### TERMS OF SUPREME COURT JUDGES

In this connection, I would also invite your consideration of the advisibility of increasing the terms of the members of the Supreme Court. Under the present laws every six years a majority of the Court is required to be elected. This circumstance seriously hampers the judicial work of the Court and threatens the stability of that extremely important branch of the state government.

#### ROOSEVELT NATIONAL PARK PROJECT

For sometime a movement has been on foot to procure the establishment of a national park in the Bad Lands of the Little Missouri. Bills have been introduced and are pending in Congress to set aside this natural beauty spot in commemoration of Theodore Roosevelt, who in the early eighties, lived, hunted, and ranched in this region. Last July a subcommittee of the Public Lands Committee of the United States Senate, accompanied by the Director of National Parks and other government officials, inspected this project and held a hearing at Medora in connection therewith. This sub-committee and the park officials will, in due time, make a report to Congress on the feasibility and desirability of establishing a national park at this location.

I understand that never in the history of national park development in the United States has the federal government established a national park at any site however suitable, except upon the condition that the title to the land constituting the same is furnished to the government free of cost. In all previous cases this condition has been required and complied with by the states or citizens interested. I believe it is essential, therefore, that the State of North Dakota should now take the initiative in this matter, and make provision at this session of the legislature for procuring and transferring to the federal government the lands necessary for this park project. This can easily be done: First, by directing the conveyance to the United States for parks purposes of all public lands now owned by the state, of which there are several thousands acres, located within the proposed park area; and, second, by creating a park fund for the purchase of such privately owned lands as may be necessary for such park project, to be made available only in the event and at such time as Congress shall provide when creating the park. I am confident that if North Dakota will thus show its disposition to co-operate with the federal government in the same spirit and manner as other states have done and are doing, we may look forward to the early establishment of this important development with well founded confidence.

#### BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA

One of the big administrative problems now confronting the state government, to which I desire now to direct your attention, is that of the operation of the so-called industrial . or purely business institutions of the state. Foremost in importance of these, is the Bank of North Dakota.

During the past seven years, being the duration of the present management, the Bank of North Dakota has been operated primarily as a farm loan bank and as a depositary of state and municipal funds. Its banking business has been largely of a public nature, financed almost entirely with public monies on deposit therewith, except the operation of the Farm Loan Department, which, as you know, is financed entirely from proceeds of bonds issued and sold against the credit of the state. Since its organization in 1919 to the present time, the Bank of North Dakota has made real estate loans to actual resident farmers of North Dakota in the aggregate sum of \$30,750,000, all of which sum except \$2,760,-000 has been made under the direction of the present management. The bank reached the high mark of its farm loan business in 1924 when over \$6,000,000 of state funds were loaned. Since that year, the demand for this loan service has gradually diminished, reaching the low point in 1928, when only \$1,728,000 of such loans were made. The present legislative authorization to make this class of state loans is \$32,500,000, leaving a margin of less than \$2,000,000 to go on during the next biennium unless such authorization is increased by this legislature. While it is not desirable to draw too heavily upon the state's credit for this purpose, yet I feel that under the conditions, we may properly and safely add \$5,000,000 more to the present authorization, and I would so recommend.

At the time the present management took over the operation of the bank in December 1921, it was in deplorable condition. Heavy operating losses had been sustained, and many millions of public funds were tied up in frozen loans and redeposits in closed banks, much of which was either unsecured, or inadequately secured. Since January 1, 1923, the general condition of the bank has steadily improved. Between that date and October 3, 1928, the date of the last official audit, its reports show that the bank has gained over \$557,000 over operating expenses, besides establishing a reserve of more than \$600,000 for accrued interest due the State Treasurer on the bank's capital bonds.

This is, indeed, a splendid record and reflects great credit upon the judgment, integrity, and efficiency of the Director-General, Mr. C. R. Green, whose untiring and unselfish devotion to the highest welfare of the state as exemplified by his many years of faithful service as Manager of the Bank of North Dakota, stands as a monument to his loyalty and character.

There is, however, still upon the books of the bank, nearly 1,800,000 due from closed banks, a considerable portion of which is certain in the end to be a dead loss; hence, notwithstanding the marked improvement which the bank has made in recent years, it will require several years more of very careful and efficient management before it will be possible to charge off these old losses and show an actual surplus over liabilities. It has been demonstrated that under good management the institution can be operated on a self-supporting basis, providing it is kept entirely out of the field of commercial banking and most of its funds invested in nothing but farm loans and government securities.

The new administration is pledged to continue the past policy of conservative and limited operation of the bank in the interest of absolute saftey for the millions of public monies on deposit therewith.

To further insure the safe and conservative operation of this institution, I would recommend some changes in the law governing the handling and disposition of the Real Estate Bond Payment Fund which is now nearly \$2,000,000, and which will grow steadily larger from year to year. Under the existing law this fund is made up of both interest and principal payments on farm mortgages. There is no segregation of these funds, consequently principal payments as well as intérest collections may be used to pay current interest falling due on outstanding real estate bonds, thus impairing the sinking fund created for the retirement of these bonds when they mature. I believe it is essential to the preservation of the credit of the state, as well as good business, to constitute the principal payments made on these mortgages a special sinking fund absolutely protected against use for any purpose except for the retirement of maturing bond issues, or investment in state bonds of similar character.

#### STATE MILL AND ELEVATOR

We also have before us the question of the operation of the State Mill and Elevator. This institution has had a stormy career. It has passed thru six continuous years of trial, and its successful operation, from a business standpoint, is still an unsolved problem. I shall not discuss in detail the various phases of this problem, nor the different stages thru which this institution has passed; but shall be content which this institution has passed; but shall be content with referring to only a few outstanding facts as a basis for making some recommendations respecting its future operation.

This project involves an outlay of slightly over \$4,550,000 for construction and operating purposes, not including interest, all of which, except approximately \$50,000, was financed by the sale of state bonds. The annual interest on these bonds is \$258,250. From the date of the issuance of such bonds to January 1, this year, there had been paid as interest on these bonds, according to the records of the State Auditor, the sum of \$1,499,394, all of which has been paid from general property taxes, except the sum of \$109,240.58, which was covered into the State Treasury by the Mill and Elevator as a part of the \$160,000 payment made at the opening of the Special Session of the Legislature a year ago. All of the principal of these bonds are still outstanding and unmatured, except one instalment of \$250,000 which matured on July 1, 1928, and was paid from general taxation.

According to the reports of the Mill Auditor this business has during the past six years of operation to December 1, 1928, cost the state in operating losses, including as a part of its operating loss the accrued interest on the Mill and Elevator bonds and depreciation on the plant and equipment, the sum of \$1,584,313.23. This calculation is based upon the book value of its assets and liabilties. According to the same reports, calculated upon the same basis, the loss to the state for the year of 1928 to December 1, was \$158,621.30. This is a somewhat better showing than in 1927, when the loss was \$170,640.16. It is a great improvement over 1926 when the reported loss was \$429,147.51.

These figures appear to conflict with statements given out by the Mill management from time to time wherein certain operating profits have been and are elaimed. The difference, however, is more superficial than real, and the two statements are easily reconcilable. For some reason the Mill management has not since 1925, charged that business

upon its books with the annual interest on the Mill and Elevator bonds, which was \$258,250, or with depreciation upon the plant and equipment. Of course, if we relieve the business of this charge, which over a period of six years amounts to \$1,808,938.40, the records will show a so-called operating profit. My view is that such bond interest and depreciation should be included in the operating cost of this institution: First, because such interest is paid by the state solely for the account of this business; second, the Mill and Elevator Bond Law (Chap., 153, Sec 9, S. L. 1919) requires the Mill and Elevator to repay to the State Treasury such bond interest out of the profits, if any there be; and third, it is the only way by which the taxpayers can readily see the true financial status and progress of the business. By this method we can easily determine from time to time what the State Treasury is out on account of the business, and what further improvment in managment is necessary in order to completely relieve the taxpayers of all annual fixed charges incurred thru the establishment of this enterprise.

Inasmuch as the annual fixed obligation for bond interest, in the sum of \$243,875 (since the payment of \$250,000 of the principal of such bonds) must be paid for some years, regardless of whether the industry is a going concern or not; and, since from the experience of the past two years it has been demonstrated that this fixed annual charge can be substantially reduced, with good prospects of further reduction in sight under careful and efficient management, it is the part of wisdom to continue the operation of this business by the state until such times as a more satisfactory arrangement can be provided. We are no longer concerned with the political or economic wisdom of inaugurating this experiment, but rather with the present, practical problem of making its operation a financial success, if possible; and if not, to keep the losses to the state resulting from its existence, down to an absolute minimum. This, in my judgment, is now the settled opinion of a great majority of the people of the state without regard to faction, and it is the principle upon which the new administration will formulate and execute its Mill and Elevator policy.

Let me also observe in this connection that this institution should, in my opinion, be operated primarily on its merits as a business enterprise, and not as a laboratory nor an agency thought to be vested with some mysterious power to regulate the market prices of grain and flour. Our first duty, as well as immediate problem, in respect to its operation, is to put it upon a self-supporting basis; and, if possible, entirely free the taxpayers of the state from the annual tax levies heretofore found necessary for the payment of its bond obligations. To accomplish this result, it follows that it must, at all times, be operated with strict regard to established business principles in the Mill and Elevator industries, and, as free from influences of current polities as it is humanly possible for any state-owned industry to be operated.

With the view of placing this business on a sounder and more stable basis, I would recommend that its mangement be changed in form and character. Since March 1925, the authority and responsibility for the active mangement of the Mill and Elevator has been vested entirely in the Governor of the state. The result of this policy has been unfortunate, to say the least, if not a complete failure. It is obviously improper and illogical to vest the entire responsibility for the active management of any institution, much less a large industrial plant located in a distant city, in the hands of the Governor. I was elected upon the definite and specific pledge that the future operation of this enterprise should be removed from the control of the Governor and placed under a commission of three, a majority of whom should be of Nonpartisan affiliation; such commission to be created by this Legislature and vested with full and ample power to manage and operate this business, subject only to the right of he Industrial Commission to periodically audit its affairs. I earnestly recommend the enactment of this proposal. If this recommendation is adopted, I, and my official associates will pledge to such commission our complete, cordial, and effective co-operation in the administration of the business.

# HOME BUILDING ASSOCIATION

The liquidation of the defunct Building Association is just about completed. All state-owned houses but one, have been sold, and all construction contracts in controversy except one, have been adjusted. The debt of the Association due to the Bank of North Dakota, its only unpaid creditor, has been reduced to about the sum of \$66,513.14 from the proceeds of the Home Building deficit tax levy which has been in force since 1923, and from other sources. This deficit will be fully paid in 1930. The ultimate loss on account of this project will exceed \$400,000.

# DRAKE MILL

We still have the Drake Mill on our hands. After repeated efforts to sell this property, the best offer received by the Industrial Commission was \$2,500, which offer the Commission did not feel justified in accepting without special legislative sanction. There is no sale for this plant on the basis of its former value as a business. The existence of the State Mill at Grand Forks makes the re-establishment of any new flour mills in this state an impossibility. The building and machinery is rapidly depreciating from the effects of nonuse and the elements, and will soon be worthless. The Industrial Commission awaits your further direction as to the disposition of this property.

# STATE HAIL INSURANCE LAW

The State Hail Insurance Department has been operated under the direction of the Insurance Commissioner since 1919 with but few changes in either the methods or details of ope ation. This Department annually carries a very considerable amount of crop insurance in the central and western part of the state, but only a very limited amount in several eastern counties where there is a large acreage of tillable

lands. This means that a large precentage of the farmers in the counties where this insurance is not generally carried are put to the expense and inconvenience of annually drawing their lands from the operation of this law withthis law. This condition not only adds to the labor and cost of the operation of the Auditors Office in each of such counties and the State Hail Insurance Department, but it also creates a spirit of discontent and dissatisfaction among farm owners with the operation of the Hail Insurance Law. I believe, therefore, that the Hail Insurance Law should be amended to eliminate the compulsory listing requirement of crop lands in all counties where a large majority of the farmers do not regularly employ this insurance, subject, of course, to an easy and convenient .nethod of obtaining this insurance, at the option of the owners, and under conditions which will safe-guard the Department. This change would, in my judgment, not only facilitate the efficient operation of the Department, but result in more general satisfaction among those who contract this class of insurance.

I also direct your attention to the last annual report of the Hail Insurance Department which contains some recommendations that merit your consideration.

#### STATE SCHOOL LANDS

When North Dakota was admitted to the Union in 1889, it was endowed with a large land grant by the United States Government for common school and various state institutional purposes. This grant was originally 3,181,800 acres; it is now about 1,729,000 acres. The value of this vast property together with the income derived therefrom, and from land sales held in the form of bonds, real estate mortgages, land contracts and other securities, exceeds the sum of \$55,000,000, all of which is administered by the State Land Department under the supervision of the Board of University and School Lands. For some reason the problems of this important state department have received but little attention from the legislature in recent years.

A portion of the funds derived from the sale and rentals of these lands have for many years been invested in farm Something over \$9,000,000 of such funds are now mortgages. so invested. In the course of the farm loan business, a number of foreclosures have been necessary, and through this process the state has acquired title to 76,650 acres of land formerly owned by private parties. These lands, of course, are now off the tax list, and the rental income derived therefrom is less than 3 per cent of the money invested therein. Under these circumstances, it would be advisable to return such lands to private ownership as soon as possible. To accomplish this, it is necessary to authorize the private sale of such lands on a contract basis at a low rate of interest, and also provide more lenient terms of redemption from foreclosures in favor of the former owners. I recommend that appropriate legislation on this subject be adopted.

During the past two years the farm loan business of this department has been especially heavy. More than \$4,000,000

of these trust funds have been invested within that period. The method now provided by law for making these loans on a safe basis is not entirely efficient. Accordingly, I recommend that provision should be made to safeguard this loan business by authorizing the employment of a departmental appraiser to check the appraisals now made by the county appraisal bards.

Further recommendations for needed changes in this department are contained in its biennial report, to which you are referred.

#### FARM LEGISLATION

During the past eight years the subject of farm relief has held an important place in the public mind. This is a subject of peculiar interest to the people of North Dakota because of its possible effect upon the future prosperity of the state. It is now conceded by everyone informed that this problem is a national and not a local one; and that any marketing program that is expected to accomplish anything worth while must be nationwide in its scope and character. It is perfectly clear that no state legislation and that no state marketing organization can directly affect the price of wheat produced in North Dakota, for the simple reason that over 95 per cent of our total annual wheat crop is sold outside of the state for prices determined upon the basis of the grain market at Minneapolis and Duluth, the principal grain marketing centers of the Northwest. It also seems fairly certain that the federal government will soon enact legislation designed to meet this situation in its national scope.

I am of the opinion, however, that some state legislation could be adopted that would be helpful to the farmers in dealing with this perplexing problem. Such legislation could deal with the organization and operation of farmers cooperative marketing associations and farm storage.

#### COOPERATIVE ORGANIZATIONS

The extensive organization of non-political farmer-owned cooperative marketing associations is advocated by every authority on grain marketing in the country. Farmer-owned cooperative elevators, terminal warehouses, wheat pools, grain selling agencies, cooperative creameries, etc., have, in my opinion, come to stay in the United States, and the successful organization and operation of such institutions should be the concern of every citizen interested in the prosperity of agriculture.

In the development of cooperative marketing, however, we are twenty years behind our Canadian neighbors. Farmers in Canada have organized grain companies which operate hundreds of local elevators, many terminal elevators, hold seats () the grain exchanges at Winnipeg and Chicago, and conduct selling agencies in the United States and foreign countries. These farmers have, in the last two years, organized wheat pools that control the selling of as much as 40 per cent of the entire annual Canadian wheat crop.

In this country there has been much less progress in cooperative grain marketing. In North Dakota, the farmers cooperative method has been confined largely to the ownership and operation of local farmers elevators. I believe that we can profit by studying the successful methods of the Canadian farmers, and by adopting in this country, such marketing methods as their experience has proven to be practical and suited to conditions in the United States. I believe also that any national marketing program authorized by Congress will stimulate the organization and expansion of cooperative marketing companies. This seems assured. Under these circumstances. I believe it is the duty of the state government to encourage the efficient development of cooperative marketing methods. I, therefore, recommend the adoption of such legislation as will facilitate the sound development of cooperative marketing in North Dakota.

#### FARM STORAGE PLAN

It is, however, in the field of farm storage that I think the state can render the most beneficial se vice at this time. It is apparent that one serious defect in our grain marketing system is the lack of adequate storage facilities, resulting in too rapid a movement of grain onto the market centers during the fall and early winter months. While we have over 1700 local elevators i. North Dakota with a large aggregate storage capacity, yet their method of operation is not such as to actually keep the grain stored with them off the market for any considerable time. On the contrary, as grain is placed in storage with them, a large part of it moves at once to the terminal markets, and is sold to the millers and exporters for immediate consumption. Thus farmers who place grain in elevator storage because of the unsatisfactory condition of the market, are actually pulling against themselves by putting their grain into channels of trade instead of keeping it off the market. An adequate and proper storage system should operate to keep the stored grain off the market until the owner is ready to sell it. This defect is particularly apparent in our state th[;] year when we have a big crop and unsatisfactory prices.

The question is, then, how can the grain storage system be improved to meet this situation. It has been proposed that the state build and operate some more so-called terminal warehouses. I am opposed to this idea for two reasons: First, I am opposed to state ownership of private business as a matter of principle. Should the state expand its program of stateowned elevators, it would not only result in a greatly increased state debt by many millions of dollars, but it would involve the people in endless political controversy over questions of management.

If further terminal storage warehouses are needed, they should, in my opinion, be built and operated by farmers cooperative companies.

In my judgment the logical place for the original storage

of all grain not immediately intended for the market, is on the farm of the owner. I am satisfied that many thousands of farmers would, in a year like this, keep their grain in storage on the farms if some practical method could be devised whereby funds could be advanced against such farm-stored grain to enable the producers to pay their threshing and other pressing obligations. After some study of this subject, I have come to the conclusior that a practical plan for farm storage can be worked out under which certificates could be issued against grain stored on the farms under conditions that would make them as valuable for security as storage receipts issued by bonded warehouses. This idea is by no means a new one. Three years ago the State of Iowa adopted a comprehensive law establishing a system of farm storage under state supervisien. The States of Illinois and Nebraska also have similar statutes.

I believe that a workable farm storage system, if properly supervised, would prove of great benefit to the grain producers of our state, and would, if generally adopted by the other grain growing states, be very helpful as an element of stabilization in the grain markets of the c untry. It would undoubtedly aid orderly marketing, which everyone concedes is a necessary factor in any good marketing system.

While dealing with the subject of farm storage, I would also suggest that you consider the feasibility of providing for the private storage of grain by members of local wheat pools at local shipping points upon the same principle as farm storage.

# PROGRESS IN AGRICULTURE

The post-war deflation struck North Dakota, in common with all other agricultural states, with great severity in 1920 and 1921. Since our state was second among all the states in the production of wheat, the sudden collapse of the wheat market in 1920 dealt our grain farmers and al' business institutions dependent upon them, a hard and lasting financial blow. The necessities of our situation compelled the introduction of new and improved farming methods, and the trend toward diversified farming at once began. The progress made along these lines has been remarkable during the past eight years. Accordir g to our best economic experts, the following increases in the value of livestock products produced in North Dakota since 1921 is shown: Increase in dairy products, 71 per cent; increase in hogs, 205 per cent; increase in poultry, 152 per cent; increase in mutton and wool, 362 per cent; and increase in beef products, 78 per cent. In 1928, the total value of livestock products is 30 per cent of the value of all agricultural products the state. The total of all such products including produced ' grain, livestock, etc., raised in 1928 was \$370,000,000 as against \$206,000,000 in 1921. This is the highest productive value in agricultural products that the state has produced in any year since 1921, except the year of 1924. This splendid record shows a steady and sure march toward agricultural normalcy, the goal of which will be reached in the not too far distant future if there is continued improvement in production methods, and an efficient marketing system is provided. To

the accomplishment of this twofold task the best intelligence and untiring efforts of our people should be dedicated in the years immediately ahead, and in the solution of this great problem our state government should, wherever and whenever possible, contribute its part according to the opportunity afforded and the means available.

The process of improving our farm production methods includes, among other things, the production of better quality grain and livestock, the eradication of nexious weeds, such as quack grass, sow thistle, and other weeds which destroy the producing capacity of the soil and adds heavily to the dockage in the grain produced. Much of our older farmed sections in the state is no longer virgin soil, and has become seriously affected in late years with foul weeds. Also, much of our livestock, especially cattle, is low grade stock, costly to raise and not highly productive in value. While the improvement so much desired along these lines, is largely a matter of individual initiative, yet, I think that appropriate legislation dealing with these matters would be very helpful. Suitable legislation, together with the educational research facilities of the State Agricultural College and its extension agencies, and a well directed public opinion, will, I am sure, contribute much toward the development of a better agricultural condition in North Dakota.

#### INDUSTRIAL AND COMMERCIAL PROGRESS

While there have been a few bank closings during the past biennium, due principally to the trend of business from the small business centers to the larger centers, a movement which has been so marked in North Dakota of late, in general a steady improvement in the condition of our state and national banks is evident. Deposits have increased, cash reserves are higher, real estate holdings, and loans and discounts are considerably less in 1928 than at any time for some years.

Considerable expansion in industrial development has also taken place in North Dakota recently. The lignite coal industry has made great advances in production and mine development. Large power companies have built great power plants within and established electric transmission lines across the state. A million dollar briquetting plant has just been completed in Stark County. A project to import natural gas from the Montana gas fields into and across North Dakota along the route of the Northern Pacific Railway Company, is under way, and many other industrial and commercial institutions are in prospect in the near future.

For nearly forty years North Dakota has been almost entirely an agricultural state, producing huge quantities of grain and livestock, and sending it in raw condition to other states for processing, manufacturing and distribution. We are now emerging from the pioneer stage of agricultural development, and entering a period of industrial and commercial development. We are at the threshold of a time when manufacturing, mining, processing, storing and distributing industries of various kinds and character will be established and operated within the boundaries of the state. We have the resources and the opportunities suitable for a well balanced This is. agricultural, commercial and industrial development. indeed, desirable and necessary, in order to make for a sounder economic and social structure and establish our future pros-perity on a firm foundation. To hasten our industrial, as well as agricultural growth, we need more capital, and more people; . we need the confidence and assistance of the business and commercial world; we need to build up and foster the spirit of good-will and cooperation, not only among all classes and groups within the state, but likewise between the people of this state and those of other states. Economically and geograhically speaking, we are an integral part of the great northwest. We do not, and cannot live onto ourselves alone. Our welfare is deeply interwoven into and with the welfare of the people and business interests of our neighboring states, and the sooner we see and realize our basic common interests, the better we can work and plan for a prosperous future. Consistent with these principles, I urge a policy of governmental friendship and cordial cooperation with all legitimate business interests that look with favor toward North Dakota for location. Let us banish the spirit of antagonism and extend the hand of encouragement to all people and capital that would seek lodgment within our boundaries. Let us take the barbs and sharp edges out of our laws which tend to drive investors and other business interests away from the state and dis-courage industrial development. While always safeguarding the property and rights of resident citizens, can we not follow a policy of protection and encouragement to every outside interest which seeks investment in our state, a state so rich in resources and so promising in industrial and commercial opportunities. Without dealing in specific recommendations, I urge this general principle as a sound and constructive policy to be hereafter followed by both the legislative and executive departments of the government.

I have thus briefly touched on a few of the many matters which will come before you for legislative action. There are many others, such as bills relating to the public health, morals, and safety of the people, bills touching the administration of our elaborate educational system, bills relating to the state's duty to its dependent citizens, the inmates of our penal and charitable institutions, those unfortunate people, sick in mind and body, whose needs touch our sympathies and sense of social responsibility. In dealing with all these matters, you will, I am sure, be actuated by spirit of fairness, tolerance, and vision characteristic of a progressive state.

For sixty days, or thereabouts, you will take counsel together on these important issues, and from your labors, there will come forth the laws and legislative policies according to which the state will be governed during the next two years. In the course of your deliberations, special interests will, no doubt, make their appearances and cunningly seek your favor. If so, subject their applications to the test of the public welfare, and if, by that test, they fail, pass them by. Probably sectional and group interests will be in evidence, looking for advantage for the part, at the expense of the whole. If so, banish these

special demands from your councils if they conflict with your conception of the general welfare. Recall always that the highest interest of each section of the state and of each class of its citizenry, in the last analysis, lies in the general welfare of the whole state and all its people. Let us regard the interest, needs and requirements of each part of North Dakota on a basis of equality and fairness. Let us give heed to the fair claims of every business interest, whether commercial, industrial, or agricultural, and let us take notice of the proper needs of every group of society, however organized or classified, from the humblest citizen who earns his daily bread by patient toil, to those who occupy the high place in the agricultural, business and professional world.

May we also, not forget that we no longer live in the horseand-buggy days of yesterday, but rather in the automobile and airplane age of today. Recent inventions and mechanical achievements, including the popular use of automobiles, improved highways, radios, telephones, electrical and gasoline appliances, easy means of transmitting heat, light and power, have largely eliminated time and distance as measured by the standards of a generation ago, have broken down the ancient barriers which once separated peoples and communities, and have abolished in a large degree, both individual and community isolation. The effect of these modern physical forces is rapidly merging the many smaller communities into a few large ones, and soon it will make of our state one great neighborhood, within the confines of which local interests and ambitions will disappear, section rivalries will be forgotten, class sentiments will no longer be heard, and a broader, more tolerant and more far-sighted ideal of state service and state loyalty will be manifested in the minds and hearts of our people.

As you legislate for the future of our state, be not unmindful of this phenomenal and rapid trend toward centralization in every phase of our business and social life, and frame your statutes and policies on lines which will comprehend, not only ' needs of the North Dakota of today, but the needs of North Dakota of tomorrow.

Ladies and Gentlemen of the Assembly, in the performance of your legislative labors, I desire, in behalf of myself and all my executive associates, to tender you our earnest and cordial cooperation and assistance, to the end that, together, in the spirit of utmost harmony, mutual confidence, and good will, we may render a public service to our state which will be deemed worthy, and that we may discharge the great responsibility resting jointly upon us in a manner both eminently creditable and beneficial to our state and country.

# **REPORT OF HOUSE COMMITTEE ON RULES**

Mr. Speaker:

Your House Committee on Rules makes the following unanimous report:

We recommend that the Rules of the House as in force in the 20th Legislative Assembly be adopted with the following changes:

That Rule 23 be amended to read as follows:

23.Every bill or concurrent resolution for amendment of the Constitution shall be in typewritten form and six copies thereof shall be filed with the Chief Clerk of the House. Each such bill or concurrent resolution shall have endorsed thereon its title and the name of the member or committee introducing One of such copies shall be delivered to the Chairman same. of the Committee to which the measure is referred, one shall remain in the custody of the Chief Clerk until otherwise directed by the House, one shall be delivered to the printer having the contract for the printing of bills, one shall be delivered to the printer having the contract for printing the House Journal for use in setting of bill title and two copies shall be available for newspaper representatives.

That Rule 24 be amended to read as follows:

24. Every bill or resolution referred to a committee, except appropriation bills, must be returned to the House with the committee's report thereon not later than the 10th day after its reference, unless upon application by the committee an extension of time is granted within which to consider the same. And in case the same is not so reported by the 10th day after its reference and such time is not extended, it shall go automatically on the Calendar of Bills for the consideration of the Committee of the Whole.

That Rule 25 be amended to read as follows:

25. No appropriation bill shall be introduced after the 25th day, except upon the recommendation of a majority of the Committee upon Delayed Bills; and no other bill or resolution for amerdment of the Constitution shall be introduced without such recommendation from such committee after the 35th day of the session.

Rule 40 shall be amended so as to increase the membership of the following committees:

The Committee on Banking to 17 members.

The Committee on Insurance to 17 members.

The Committee on Live Stock to 17 members.

The Committee on Warehouse and Grain Grading to 17 members.

Your House Committee on Rules also recommends to the House and especially to the members of the House Committee on Joint Rules that there be considered with the Senate Committee on Joint Rules the matter of having the rules of the House and the rules of the Senate printed in one pamphlet. the rules of the two legislative bodies to be separated by a colored sheet of paper, and that 1500 of such pamphlets be procured to be printed. Heretofore the Senate and House rules have been printed separately.

We further recommend that the various rules be properly entitled, as in the rules of the 20th legislative assembly, so as to enable the members to readily find any matter in question.

### **RULES OF THE HOUSE**

# HOUSE CALLED TO ORDER

1. The Speaker shall take the chair at the time to which the House stands adjourned, and the House shall then be called to order, and the roll of members called and the names of the absentees entered upon the Journal of the House.

### CORRECTION OF THE JOURNAL

2. Upon the appearance of a quorum the Journal of the preceding day shall be referred to the Committee on Revision and Correction. Any mistakes therein shall be corrected by the committee and reported to the House for action.

# CALL OF HOUSE

3. Thirty-six members of the House may order a call of the House and cause absent members to be sent for, but a call must not be made while a vote is being taken. The call being moved, the Speaker shall require those desiring the call to rise, and if thirty-six or more members shall rise the call shall be ordered. The call being ordered, the sergeant-at-arms shall close the door and allow no member to leave the room. The clerk shall then call the roll and furnish the sergeant-at-arms with a list of those members absent without leave, and that officer must proceed forthwith to find and bring in such absentees. While the House is under call no business can be transacted except to receive and act upon the report of the sergeant-at-arms and no motion is in order except a motion to suspend further proceedings under the call, and said motion shall not be adopted unless a majority of all members-elect vote in favor thereof. Upon a report of the sergeant-at-arms showing that all members who were absent without leave, naming them, are present, the call shall be at an end, and the doors shall be opened, and the business pending at the time the call was made be proceeded with.

### POINTS OF ORDER

4. The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum and decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the House.

#### SPEAKER VOTES, WHEN

5. The Speaker shall vote on all questions taken by ayes

# JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE

and nays (except on appeals from his own decisions) and in all elections or decisions called for by any member.

# RETAIN SEATS UNTIL ADJOURNMENT ANNOUNCED

6. When the House adjourns the members shall keep their seats until the Speaker announces the adjournment.

### **RECOGNITION BY CHAIR**

7. Every member previous to his speaking shall rise from his seat and respectfully address "Mr. Speaker," and remain standing in his place before proceeding to speak until he is recognized by the chair.

#### WHO RECOGNIZED

8. When two or more members rise at the same time to speak, the Speaker must designate the member who is to speak, but in all cases the member who shall rise first and address the chair may speak first.

# RULES AS TO SPEAKING, NUMBER OF TIMES AND DURATION

9. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the House, nor more than once until every member choosing to speak on the subject pending shall have spoken, nor shall any member occupy more than ten minutes at the first time, nor more than five minutes at the second time, without unanimous consent of the House.

### MOTIONS TO BE SECONDED AND STATED BEFORE DEBATE

10. No motion shall be debated or put unless the same be seconded. It must then be stated by the Speaker before the debate and any such motion must be reduced to writing if the Speaker or any member desires it.

### MOTION MAY BE WITHDRAWN

11. After the motion shall be stated by the Speaker, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the House, but may be withdrawn at any time before amendment or decision, but all motions, resolutions or amendments must be entered on the Journal, whether rejected or adopted.

#### MOTIONS ON DEBATE, AND PROCEDURE THEREOF

12. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone to a day certain, to commit or amend, to postpone indefinitely—which several motions shall have precedence in the order which they stand arranged.

### MOTION TO ADJOURN, IN ORDER WHEN

13. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except when  $\cdot$  a member is addressing the chair or a vote is being taken; that, and the motion to lay upon the table, shall be decided without debate.

### PREVIOUS QUESTION

14. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall be admitted only when demanded by two-thirds of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring the House to a direct vote upon the amendments reported by a committee, if any, upon the pending amendments and then upon the main question. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to the seconding of the same, a call of the House shall be in order, but after two-thirds shall have seconded such motion, no call shall be in order prior to decision of the main question.

#### PREVIOUS QUESTION DECIDED IN NEGATIVE

15. When the previous question is decided in the negative it shall leave the main question under debate for the remainder of the sitting unless sooner disposed of in some other manner.

# INCIDENTAL QUESTION AFTER MOTION FOR PREVIOUS QUESTION

16. All incidental questions of order arising after motion is made for the previous question, during the pendency of such motion, or after the House shall have determined that the main question shall be now put shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise without debate.

# PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS, ETC.

17. Petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the House shall be presented by the Speaker or by a member in his place.

### MEMBERS MUST VOTE, WHEN

18. Every member who is present, before the vote is declared from the chair, must vote for or against the question before the House, unless the House excuse him or unless he is immediately interested in the question, in which case he must not vote.

#### DECORUM

19. When the Speaker is putting the question, no member shall walk out of, or across the House, nor when a member is speaking, shall any person entertain any private discourse, or pass between the person speaking and the chair.
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#### QUESTION DIVIDED, WHEN

20. If a question in debate contains several propositions, any member may have the same divided.

### MEMBER OUT OF ORDER

21. A member called to order must immediately sit down unless permitted to explain, and the House, if appealed to, must decide the case. If there be no appeal, the decision of the chair shall stand. On appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the House. When a member is called to order for offensive language there shall be no debate.

## BILLS INTRODUCED, HOW

22. A bill can only be introduced on the report of a committee or on a call for bills, or by a motion for leave.

### FORM OF BILLS, NUMBER OF COPIES

23. Every bill or concurrent resolution for amendment of the Constitution shall be in typewritten form and six copies thereof shall be filed with the Chief Clerk of the House. Each such bill or concurrent resolution shall have endorsed thereon its title and the name of the member or committee introducing same. One of such copies shall be delivered to the Chairman of the Committee to which the measure is referred, one shall remain in the custody of the Chief Clerk until otherwise directed by the House, one shall be delivered to the printer having the contract for the printing of bills, one shall be delivered to the printer having the contract for printing the House Journal for use in setting of bill title and two copies shall be available for newspaper representatives.

### DISPOSITION OF MEASURES

24. Every bill or resolution referred to a committee, except appropriation bills, must be returned to the House with the committee's report thereon not later than the 10th day after its reference, unless upon application by the committee an extension of time is granted within which to consider the same. And in case the same is not so reported by the 10th day after its reference and such time is not extended, it shall go automatically on the Calendar of Bills for the consideration of the Committee of the Whole.

### BILLS INTRODUCED, WHEN

25. No appropriation bill shall be introduced after the 25th day, except upon the recommendation of a majority of the Committee upon Delayed Bills; and no other bill or resolution for amendment of the Constitution shall be introduced without such recommendation from such committee after the 35th day of the session.

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### REFERENCE TO COMMITTEE

26. Every bill, memorial, order and resolution, requiring the approval of the Governor, or a change in the Constitution of the State of North Dakota, shall, after second reading, be referred to its appropriate committee, and if reported without amendment, shall pass to its third reading, unless otherwise ordered, and when amended it shall go to Committee of the Whole House.

#### ENGROSSMENT

27. All bills shall be properly engrossed before their final passage.

### AMENDMENT ON THIRD READING

28. No amendment shall be received on the third reading, except to fill blanks, without unanimous consent of the House, but all bills and resolutions may be committed at any time previous to their passage. If any amendment be reported on such commitment by any other than a committee of the whole, it shall be read a second time and, the question of third reading and passage put.

#### DIFFERENT SUBJECT MATTER NOT TO BE INCLUDED BY AMENDMENT

29. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted, under color of amendment; no bill or resolution shall at any time be amended by annexing thereto, or incorporating therewith, any other bill or resolution pending before the House.

#### COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

30. In forming a committee of the whole House the Speaker shall appoint a chairman to preside.

### PROCEDURE IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

31. Bills committed to the committee of the whole House shall be read, be open to amendment, and debated by sections, unless otherwise ordered, leaving the title to be last considered; all amendments shall be noted in writing and reported to the House by the chairman.

## ORDER IN WHICH QUESTIONS PUT, BLANKS HOW FILLED

32. All questions, whether in committee, or in the House, shall be put in the order in which they are moved, except in the case of privileged questions, and in filling blanks the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

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### PROCEDURE ON SENATE BILLS

33. A similar mode of procedure shall be observed with bills which have originated in and passed the Senate as with bills which have originated in the House except that they shall not be printed nor engrossed or enrolled.

### RECONSIDERATION, WHEN

34. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order unless on the same day or the day following that on which the decision proposed to be reconsidered took place, nor unless one of the majority shall move a reconsideration.

## NOTICE OF INTENTION TO RECONSIDER

35. When notice of intention to move the reconsideration of any bill or joint resolution shall be given by a member, the clerk of the House shall retain the said bill or joint resolution until after the time during which the said motion can be made unless the same can previously be disposed of.

## WHO MAY MOVE RECONSIDERATION

36. Any member who votes on the majority side of a question may move a reconsideration of the same, which motion shall be decided by a majority vote.

## HOUSE RULES OBTAIN IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE, EXCEPTIONS

37. The rules of the House shall be observed in committee of the whole House so far as may be applicable except that the ayes and nays shall not be called, the previous question enforced nor the time of speaking limited.

## MOTION TO ARISE ALWAYS IN ORDER

38. A motion that the committee rise shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate.

#### THIRD READING, WHEN

39. No bill reported from standing or select committees or from the committee of the whole shall come up for a third reading until the first day after such report unless the House by a two-thirds vote otherwise orders.

## COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN

41. The chairman of the committee on introduction of delayed bills shall be selected by the members of the committee. On all other committees the first-named member shall be the chairman, and, in his absence or being excused by the House, the next member named, and so on as often as the case shall happen, shall act as chairman.

### DELAYED BILLS

42. The committee on the introduction of delayed bills shall receive from the chief clerk all bills offered for introduction after the time for introduction as heretofore limited, and shall, on the same or the next day after receiving such bills, report to the House its conclusion whether the introduction

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thereof should be allowed, and if a majority of such committee is in favor of the introduction thereof the bill shall be thereupon deemed duly introduced.

### ENGROSSMENT

43. The committee on engrossment shall examine all bills after they are engrossed and report the same to the House correctly engrossed before their third reading; said committee may report at any time.

## ENROLLMENT

44. The committee on enrollment shall examine all House bills and memorials which have passed the two Houses, and when reported correctly enrolled, they shall be presented to the presiding officers of the House and Senate for their signatures, and when so signed, presented to the Governor for his approval; said committee may report at any time.

### REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEE

45. Select committees to whom reference shall have been made, must, in all cases, report a state of facts and their opinion to the House.

#### NAME OF MOVING MEMBER ENTERED IN JOURNAL

46. In all cases where a bill, order or resolution, or motion shall be entered upon the Journal of the House, the name of the member moving the same shall be entered on the Journal.

## COURTESY OF THE FLOOR

47. No person shall be admitted within the bar of the House except the executive, members of the Senate, state officers, judges of the supreme court and district courts, members of Congress, ex-members of the Legislative Assembly, delegates to the state constitutional convention, all federal officers of the state and reporters for newspapers, except by card of the Speaker. Any person lobbying on the floor of the House shall forfeit the privilege granted by this rule.

### ORDER OF BUSINESS

48. After calling the House to order the order of business for the day shall be as follows:

- 1. Prayer by the chaplain.
- 2. Calling the roll.
- 3. Reference to the Journal.

4. Presentation of petitions and communications.

5. Reports of standing committees.

6. Reports of select committees.

7. Motions and resolutions.

8. Unfinished business.

9. Introduction of bills and memorials.

10. First and second readings of House bills and memorials.

11. Third reading of the same.

12. Consideration of messages from the Senate.

13. First and second readings of Senate bills and memorials.

14. Third reading of the same.

15. Consideration of general orders.

#### REPORT DIVIDED

49. Whenever the report of any committee of conference contains several modifications or amendments, any member may have the same divided, and the question of concurrence taken separately upon each modification or amendment.

#### GENERAL ORDERS

50. When the House has arrived at the "general orders of the day," it shall go into committee of the whole upon such orders or a particular order designated by a vote of the House, and no other business shall be in order until the whole are considered or passed, or the committee rise; and unless a particular bill is ordered up the committee of the whole shall consider, act upon, or pass the general order, according to the order of reference.

### MEMBER TO PRESIDE IN PLACE OF SPEAKER

51. The Speaker may leave the chair, and appoint a member to preside, but not for a longer time than one day, except by leave of the House.

# U. S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES RULES TO GOVERN

52. The rules of parliamentary practice adopted by the

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House of Representatives of the United States shall govern the House in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the House, and the joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

53. No rule of the House shall be suspended, altered or amended without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members of the whole House.

## HOUR OF MEETING

54. The hour of the daily meeting of the House shall be 2 o'clock in the afternoon, until the House directs otherwise.

#### ONE-SIXTH MAY REQUIRE AYE AND NAY VOTE

55. The ayes and nays shall not be ordered unless demanded by one-sixth of the members present except on the final passage of bills, concurrent resolutions to amend the Constitution, and memorials, in which case ayes and nays shall be had without demand.

#### DIVIDED COMMITTEE REPORT

56. In case all the members of any committee, required or entitled to report on any subject referred to them cannot agree upon any report the majority and minority may each make a special report, and any member dissenting in whole or in part, from the reasonings and conclusions of both the majority and minority may also present to the House a statement of his reasonings and conclusions; and all reports, if decorus in language, and respectful to the House, shall be entered at length on the Journal.

### SMOKING

57. No smoking shall be allowed in the House while in session.

#### DURING ROLL CALL, DECORUM

58. No member or any other person shall remain by the clerk's desk when the ayes and nays are being called.

## DISTURBANCE IN LOBBY OR GALLERY

59. In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby or gallery, the Speaker or chairman of the committee of the whole shall have power to order the same to be cleared.

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## ABSENCE FROM HOUSE, PENALTY

60. No member or officer of the House, unless he, from illness or other cause shall be unable to attend, shall absent himself from a session of the House during an entire day without first having obtained leave of absence, and no one shall be entitled to draw pay while absent more than one day without leave.

## BILLS, RECORDS, ETC., TO BE RETAINED BY DESK OFFICIALS

61. Neither the chief clerk nor his assistants shall permit any records or papers belonging to the House to be taken out of their custody otherwise than in the regular course of business. The chief clerk shall report all missing bills, resolutions and papers to the Speaker; shall have general supervision of all clerical duties appertaining to the business of the House, shall perform under the direction of the Speaker, all duties pertaining to the 'office, and shall also keep a book showing the situation and progress of all the bills, memorials and joint resolutions.

#### EXPENDITURE OF MONEY, NOTICES

62. At least one day's notice shall be given of the introduction of any motion or resolution calling for or involving the expenditure of any money.

#### NOTICE OF COMMITTEE MEETINGS

63. The chairman of the different standing committees shall send to the chief clerk's desk, to be read previous to adjournment, notice of the time and place of meeting of such committee.

#### MEASURES PRINTED

64. All bills and resolutions for amendments of the Constitution shall be printed unless otherwise ordered.

#### JOINT RULES

1. TRANSMITTING OF PAPERS: Each house shall transmit to the other all papers on which any bill or resolution shall be founded.

2. NOTICE OF REJECTION OF BILLS: When a bill or resolution which shall have passed in one House is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to the House in which the same may have passed.

3. MESSAGES: Messages from one House to the other shall be communicated by the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House of Representatives, unless the House transmitting the message shall especially direct otherwise. **4** AMENDMENTS: It shall be in the power of either House to amend any amendment made by the other to any bill or resolution.

5. CONFERENCE COMMITTEES: In every case of a difference between the two Houses upon any subject of legislation, if either House shall request a conference and appoint a committee for that purpose, and the other House shall also appoint a committee, such committees shall meet at such hour and place as shall be agreed on by the chairmen; and state to each other, verbally, or in writing, as either may choose, the reasons of their respective Houses, and confer freely thereon; and they shall be authoribed to report to their respective Houses such modifications as they think advisable.

6. RECEDING BEFORE CONFERENCE: It shall be in order for either House to recede from any subject matter of difference existing between the two houses at any time previous to a conference, whether the papers on which difference has arisen are before the House receding formally or informally, and a majority shall govern, except in cases where two-thirds are required by the Constitution, and the question having been put and lost, shall not be again put the same day, and the consideration thereof in other respects shall be regulated by the rules of the respective Houses.

7. REVIVAL OF LOST BILL: After each House has adhered to its disagreement and the bill which is the subject of difference shall be deemed lost, it shall not be again revived during the same session in either House, unless by consent of three-fourths of the members present of the House reviving it.

8. PRINTING DUPLICATE BILLS: No duplicates of any bill, which may have been introduced and printed by one House shall, upon introduction into the other House, be printed by said other House, except by a two-thirds vote of all the members present.

9. LIMITATION OF MESSAGING BILLS: Whenever a time shall have been previously fixed for an adjournment of the Legislature before the constitutional limitation thereof, no bill that shall have passed one House shall be sent for concurrence to the other on either of the last four days of the session, and in case no such time for adjournment is fixed, other than the constitutional limitation, no bill that shall have passed one House shall be sent to the other for concurrence after the 50th day of the session.

10. JOINT COMMITTEE ON ENROLLED BILLS: The committee on enrolled bills in each of the two Houses shall act jointly in the examination of all bills and resolutions before their presentation to the Governor, either as a body or by such respective sub-committees as such committees may appoint for that purpose.

11. RETURNING OF BILLS: Either House shall return

any bill or resolution called for by resolution of the other House, if the bill or resolution is yet in posession of the House called upon, and no action thereon has been had. In case action has been had, then it shall require a two-thirds vote of the House asked to return a bill or resolution called for.

12. PRINTING AND MAILING OF JOURNAL. On the opening day of the Legislative Assembly, or as soon thereafter as may be, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House shall each appoint a committee of five from their respective bodies to act as a joint committee to agree upon and formulate a plan whereby the Journals of the Senate and House, together with other public documents which may be of special interest may be mailed to the various sections of the state.

13. The names of Senators and House members; the Order of Business of the Senate and the House; the Senate and House standing committees; the Senate and House joint committees; the Senate and House rules for this legislative session; the joint rules of the Senate and House and the names of the officers and employees of the Senate and House shall be printed in one pamphlet, with a colored sheet of paper senarating those of the Senate from those of the House. One thousand of such pamphlets shall be printed. The title of the joint and separate rules shall be in bold faced type.

## MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS

Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction,

January 24, 1929.

To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House:

In compliance with the request of the Committe on Education in the House during the Special Session of 1928, that the Superintendent of Public Instruction make a survey of the actuary's report of the Teachers' Insurance and Retirement Fund and report her findings and recommendations thereon to the Twenty-first Legislative Assembly, and also ascertain the probable cost of complying with the changes recommended in said report, the following is respectfully submitted:

The report was prepared by Dr. Henry L: Reitz, University of Iowa, Iowa City, Iowa, a member of the Illinois Pension Laws Commission, and Fellow of the American Institute of Actuaries who was recommended by Howard J. Savage of the Carnegie Foundation for the advancement of Teaching, as one of two men in the U. S. best prepared to study the present law and make sound recommendations for the future.

Dr. Reitz's report is full, complete and definite. He analyzes the present system and tells wherein it is unsound and why (page 1)... depends too much on making profits from the forfeitures of contributions upon withdrawal from teaching. He enumerates the reasons why the State should enact a sound law (pages 2, 3, 4)... it makes possible the replacement of super-annuated teachers who receive the maximum salaries by younger teachers who begin at a smaller salary. ... it protects the public from the waste of an expensive school plant manned by a superannuated teacher... private industry has already recognized retirement plans as essential to good business. He states why North Dakota should enact sound Retirement Legislation (pages 4 and 5)... the present Teachers' Insurance and Retirement Fund is defective and is not at all a sound retirement fund.

He names eleven fundamental principles of a sound Retirement System (pages 5 and 6); (1) Beginners to be exempt, (2) Deposits returned in case of early retirement. (3) Disability provided for, (4) Guaranties to both teachers and public assured, (5) Death benefits included. (6) Individual accounts kept, (7) Rights under previous annuity systems safeguarded, (8) Credit for past service allowed, (9) Costs shared by both teachers and public, (10) Service and deposits concurrent, (11) Amount of deposits fixed. Items 1. 2. 4. 5, 6 and 10 are not recognized in the present law. He explains each of the eleven principles (pages 6 to 19).

He presents a new plan for a comprehensive State System of Teachers' Retirement Insurance (page 2) . . . providing that sums deposited by the teachers and by the public during the period of the annuity contract should be approximately equal. . . a deposit of 5% by the teacher and 5% by the state, . . . standard age of retirement at age 60 (page 13), modes of settlement (page 14), . . . terms of adjustment on behalf of present teachers (page 16).

He provides for the several classes of teachers now in the state (pages 16 and 17): (1) Annuitants of the superseded plan, (2) those who become members of the retirement system who were members of the superseded fund, (3) all members of the retirement system who gave service prior to the inauguration of the new system, (4) those who were members of the superseded fund who do not become members of the retirement system, and for the inauguration, maintenance, organization, and details of administration of such system.

Assembling the items requiring state support the following estimates of yearly cost (page 24) are submitted as requested:

(a) Five per cent of salaries of members .... \$175,000 (b) For disability benefits 8.750(c) To amortize the accrued liability of approximately \$1,500,000 on behalf of present teachers with 35 years, the annual requirement on a 4% interest basis will be 80.000 (d) For expense of administration ..... 10,000 Total \$273.750

From the Tax Commission of North Dakota, we learn that the total assessed valuation of the taxable property of the State for 1927 was \$1,328,751,711. From this 25% is deducted by the county auditor before applying the tax rate. This leaves \$999.188,783 to which the tax rate was applied. A one-tenth mill tax would on this basis produce slightly less than \$100,000 of revenue. Hence, the annual support necessary to put the proposed system on an adequate reserve basis in 35 years and to provide current support could be approved by a three-tenth of one mill tax. In this estimate, the \$80,-000 item for each of the 35 years is a temporary obligation. The other items would continue indefinitely. The only elements of uncertainty listed are the actual rate of interest earned and the rates of mortality experienced.

In order that members of the committee to which this matter will be referred may have matter explanatory of the foregoing, a copy of the last annual report of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Fund, and a complete copy of the report of the Actuary accompany this communication. For the further convenience of the Committee Members, a few extra copies of both the reports mentioned are prepared, and one draft of a bill covering the provisions outlined by the actuary. The copy of the bill is being sent to the House since this action was requested by the Committee in that body.

As an ex-officio member of the Board of Trustees for the Teachers' Insurance and Retirement Fund, I recommend that the matter contained herein receive the favorable attention of your honorable body, and further recommend that the Bill accompanying these records be considered by a joint meeting of the House and the Senate Committees on Education, and sincerely hope that it may be introduced as a Committee Bill. My further services are at the command of the Committees.

## PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

# MESSAGE FROM THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

# OPINION

Office of Attorney General, Bismarck, North Dakota, February 1st, 1929.

Hon. L. L. Twichell, House of Representatives, State Capitol, Bismarck, North Dakota.

Dear Sir:

In response to your request for an opinion from this Department relative to acquiring by eminent domain property for use of the state institutions, I beg to advise as follows:

Section 14 of the Constitution of the State of North Dakota provides that "private property shall not be taken or damaged for public use without just compensation having been first made to or paid into Court for the owner", etc. Independently of express authority by the Constitution, private property can be taken only for public use and the Legislature cannot authorize a taking for a strictly private use even upon making a compensation. The necessity that the use shall be public excludes the idea that property may be taken under semblance of public use and ultimately conveyed and appropriated to a private use. But this rule does not prevent property taken for public use from being resold to private persons with restrictions imposed upon them to carry out the public purpose. An ulterior public advantage may justify a comparatively insignificant taking of private property for what, in its immediate purpose, is a private use. Noble State Bank vs. Haskell, 219 U. S. 104.

No one doubts the existence in the state governments of the right of eminent domain—a right distinct from and paramount to the right of ultimate ownership. It grows out of the necessity of their being, not only out of the tenure by which lands are held. It may be exercised, though the lands are not held by grant from the Government, either mediately or immediately, and independent of the conditions whether or not they would escheat to the government in case of a failure of heirs. The right is the offspring of political necessity; and it is inseparable from sovreignity, unless denied to it by its fundamental law.

The Legislature recognized the fact that there might be some question as to whether or not the State would have the right to exercise the right of eminent domain and acquire for the use of any of the state institutions any property necessary for the maintenance and expansion thereof and therefore enacted the following statute during the 1925 Session of the Legislature, which reads as follows:

"Section 11a1 (1925 Supplement to the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for the year 1913). Acquiring by Eminent Domain Property for Use of State Institutions. The state may, by the exercise of the right of eminent domain, acquire, for the use of any of the state institutions, any property necessary to the maintenance or expansion thereof, or to the acquirement of any of the essentials of their existence or necessary to their operation or the health, safety or support of any inmates thereof or the protection or care of their property."

The Legislature, at the same Session, further provided that the proceedings for the acquirement of any such property shall be prosecuted by the Attorney General in the name of the State as plaintiff, and shall be governed by the general provisions of law applicable to condemnation proceedings.

In view of the above statutory provisions, I am of the opinion that the state may, by the exercise of the right of eminent domain, acquire for the use of any of the state institutions, any property necessary to the maintenance, expansion or use thereof under proper proceedings instituted by the Attorney General in the name of the State as plaintiff, and the provisions of Section 14 of the Constitution are complied with by paying into Court for the owner such compensation as may be awarded under the proceedings instituted.

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Warehouse and Grain Grading to whom was referred:

House Bill No. 19. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 18 of Chapter 155 of the Session Laws of the State of North Dakota for the year 1927; Providing for the Regulation of Storage and Delivery Charges of Public Warehousemen and Providing for the Form of Receipts to be Issued by Such Warehousemen.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Amend the title of the bill by inserting in Line 1 of the printed bill, after the word and figures "Section 18" and ahead of the word "of", where said word first occurs in said line, the word and figures "and Section 24."

On page 2 of the printed bill in Line 22 thereof strike out the words "one-half" and insert in lieu thereof the words "one-fourtieth."

On page 2 of the printed bill, in Line 23, strike out the word "month" and insert in lieu thereof the word "day" and in the same line and the succeeding line, after the word "thereof" strike out the words "but not to exceed five cents per bushel for one year"; and in line 25 of the same page strike out the word "thirty" and insert in lieu thereof the word "twenty."

On page 3 of the printed bill, immediately preceding the emergency clause, insert the following; as Section 2:

Section 2. That Section 24, of Chapter 155 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the year 1927 be amended and reenacted to read as follows:

Section 24. DISCRIMINATION PROHIBITED. No public warehouseman shall discriminate in the buying, selling, receiving and handling of grain or the service rendered to owners of stored grain, nor shall such warehouseman discriminate in the receiving of grain effered for sale or storage; provided, that no public warehouseman shall be required to receive for storage any grain which is heating or otherwise out of condition.

Amend the bill by inserting in same, immediately following the enacting clause, the following:

Section 1. That Section 18 of Chapter 155 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for 1927 be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

In Line 1 of Section 1 of the printed bill strike out the figure "1" following the word "Section" and insert in lieu thereof the figures "24."

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Mrs. Craig moved that the absent member be excused.

Which motion prevailed.

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Mr. Freeman moved that the Speaker appoint a committee of three members to act with a like committee from the Senate to arrange for a memorial program for Lincoln's birthday.

Which motion prevailed.

The Speaker appointed as such committee Representatives Kneeland, Lindgren and Gibbens.

Mr. Twichell moved that when the House completes its days' business it recess until 1:00 p. m. the following day.

Which motion prevailed.

Mr. Kneeland rose to the question of personal privilege and requested that his remarks be printed in the Journal. Mr. Kneeland:

Last Tuesday afternoon House Bill 58 was discussed in Committee of the Whole. The next day it was defeated on final passage. I assumed that ended the matter and was fast forgettizg it, when my attention was called to an editorial in the Mandan Pioneer discussing the bill and seriously reflecting upon myself, another member of this House and the city in which I have lived for more than a quarter of a century. The second paragraph of the editorial reads thus:

"Yet today in the North Dakota house of representatives, one finds the unique spectable of two neophytes at lawmaking, Kneeland of Stutsman, and Mau of Ransom, new members, leading the fight to repeal the law requiring city councils to publish their proceedings."

On investigation I find that a neophyte is not such a vile animal as I first feared, and like other men of my age, I feel rather flattered at anything which classes me with men of some newness and youth.

Further on is a statement alleged to have been made on the argument, by the two members, meaning of course, Mr. Mau and myself, which the writer criticises as childish puerile and asinine. (I hope I pronounce that word asinine correctly,—I want to add it to my vocabulary.)

However, it semes to me that no newspaper should publish an article of this kind without having a competent reporter on hand to report correctly the facts. That the Pioneer did not have may be assumed, for I took no part whatever in the argument on this bill, either in Committee of the Whole or on the floor of the House, and therefore the statement in the editorial as to what I said is absolutely and unqualifiedly false.

The editorial tells us that a valuable franchise was granted in Mandan a couple of years ago, without a citizen of Mandan knowing a thing about it, until the deal was closed, (which by the way would be a legal impossibility.) and then the writer insinuates, in a paragraph beginning "we wonder," that Jamestown or Lisbon has some kind of a public utility deal to put over and that Mr. Mau and myself "are attempting to lay the ground-work for it by removing the public information."

I protest against the publication of any such false and libelous insinuation. Perhaps the editor could appreciate this better if we use an illustration. Suppose in this case we should do some wondering, not actual but just hypothetical wondering. We might wonder how much the Pioneer was influenced by its hope to bring about publication of commission proceedings in Mandan to its own profit. We might wonder if the editor is really so simple as to suppose the law regarding council proceedings, if in force in Mandan, would have prevented the secrecy he says existed regarding the franchise granted there. We might wonder, if his intentions are so pure, why he does not advocate some law that would give the public advance notice that the granting of a franchise is being contemplated, at a merely nominal expense to the city, instead of the publication of what is done after it becomes history and everybody knows it anyway, but at great profit to the newspaper. We might wonder if in that case, if it came about as the Pioneer says, just what part the Pioneer had in laying the groundwork by failing to print the news. In fact, we might wonder how anything of the kind could have happened in Mandan if that city had had an honest, up-to-date, progressive, efficient and public-serving newspaper.

As far as this bill 58 is concerned, the City of Jamestown, and no resident of that city except myself, had anything to do with it. It was recommended, I am informed, I was not there, by a meeting of city officials of the state held last fall. It was handed to me with the suggestion I introduce it. I was familiar with the law and honestly believed it should be repealed and so introduced the bill without any suggestion or knowledge whatever that I should do so from any other resident or officer of Jamestown. Furthermore Jamestown has no public utility franchise now pending before its council and is not likely to have for several years. And I will challenge the Pioneer or anybody else to show an instance where any franchise has been granted by Jamestown without the public having full information and being invited in fact to cooperate with the council in looking after the interests of the city.

Every reasonable courtesy and privilege should be granted to the press by this House. But the press should confine its statements of fact regarding the proceedings here to the truth, and should refrain from malicious innuendoes, without any foundation of fact, regarding the members of this House and responsible officials of our municipalities.

## OPINION FROM THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

Office of Attorney General, Bismarck, North Dakota, January 28, 1929.

Hon. A. W. Fowler, State Senate, Capitol.

Dear Sir:

# OPINION

In response to your request for an opinion from this office relative to Senate Bill No. 5, in which you ask an opinion upon the following questions: (1) Does said Senate Bill No. 5, and particularly Subd. 2 of Sec. 4 thereof, impose any debt against, or liability upon the State of North Dakota through any action taken thereunder by the Board of Administration, and, (2) is such bill constitutional, I beg to advise as follows:

We have gone over this bill very carefully and fully, and have also considered the decision of our Supreme Court in the case of Wilder vs. Murphy, 218 NW 156, and the cases of Loomis vs. Callahan, (Wis), 220 NW 816, and McLean vs. Regent (Ore.), 265 Pac. 412, and we would advise you as follows:

First, in our opinion said Senate Bill No. 5, and particularly Subd. 2 of Sec. 4 thereof, does not to any extent or degrée whatever create a debt against or a chance upon the State of North Dakota. By Subd. 8 of Sec. 2, found on Page 4 of the printed bill, it is specifically provided that the holding company, or its successors or assigns shall accuire no right, title or interest in or to the campus site or dormitory erected thereon, or the equipment thereof, save and except the right to operate such dormitory solely for the educational purposes, in the manner and upon the terms and conditions provided in the Act. Clearly, therefore, there is no lien given against the campus site. By Subd. 2 of Sec. 4 it is specifically provided as follows:

"Such lease shall provide for the payment to such association, its successors or assigns, of a net cash annual rental of not to exceed 15% of the cost of such site, dormitory and equipment. Said net cash annual rental shall be payable and paid, solely and exclusively out of the income derived from the operation of such dormitory as herein provided, and it is hereby expressly provided that the state shall incur no liability whatever by reason of the exercise of the authority hereby granted to the said Board of Administration."

By this language it is expressly and clearly provided that the net cash annual rental to be paid by the Board of Administration to the holding association is payable and shall be paid solely and exclusively and only out of the income derived from the operation of the dormitory and from nowheres else. There is no provision for any bond issue, nor is there any provision for the levy of any tax for the payment of the rental or of any indebtedness.

Section 182 of the Constitution provides the sole and exclusive manner in which a debt may be created against the State of North Dakota. It provides in part:

"No further indebtedness shall be incurred by the state unless evidenced by a bond issue which shall be authorized by law for certain purposes to be clearly defined. Every law authorizing a bond issue shall provide for levying an annual tax, or make other provision sufficient to pay the interest semi-annually, and the principal within thirty years from the date of the issue of such bonds."

It is, therefore, clear that no debt or obligation was intended to be created against the State of North Dakota, nor is any such debt or obligation, in fact, created. If we assume that Senate Bill No. 5, and particularly Subd. 2 of Sec. 4, does create a debt or obligation (which it does not), then the Act would be unconstitutional and void after the decision of our Supreme Court in Wilder vs. Murphy. I might add that under the provision of Subd. 5 of Sec. 2, found on Page 3 of the printed bill, that just as soon as the indebtedness of the holding company against the site, dormitory and equipment is paid any lease which the Board of Administration might make under Sec. 4 would immediately become null and void and the title to the dormitory site and equipment would immediately pass to the State.

With respect to whether or not Senate Bill No. 5 is constitutional and meets the objections made by our Supreme Court in Wilder vs. Murphy to Chapter 257 and 258, Session Laws 1927, which were held unconstitutional in that decision, I would say that in my opinion Senate Bill No. 5 meets all criticisms made by our Supreme court in Wilder vs. Murphy, and is constitutional and valid. In support of this conclusion, I would cite the cases above referred to of Loomis vs. Callahan and McLean vs. Regent.

Section 2. That Section 24, of Chapter 155 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the year 1927 be amended and reenacted to read as follows:

Section 24. DISCRIMINATION PROHIBITED. No public warehouseman shall discriminate in the buying, selling, receiving and handling of grain or the service rendered to owners of stored grain, nor shall such warehouseman discriminate in the receiving of grain offered for sale or storage; provided, that no public warehouseman shall be required to receive for storage any grain which is heating or otherwise out of condition.

Amend the bill by inserting in same, immediately following the enacting clause, the following:

Section 1. That Section 18 of Chapter 155 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for 1927 be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

In Line 1 of Section 1 of the printed bill strike out the figure "1" following the word "Section" and insert in lieu thereof the figures "24".

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments except as amended. And the additional amendments.

Strike out the Emergency Clause.

In line 25, page 2, of the printed bill, change word "twenty" to "thirty".

Strike out balance of line 26, after the word "deliver," all of line 27 and the first three words of line 28.

Amend the amendments of the Standing Committee's report to read: "Section 18" instead of "Section 24."

In line 22, page 2 of the printed bill, strike out the word "per" where it occurs the first time.

House Bill No. 78. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Re-

enact Sections 2790a8, 2790a9, 2790a13, 2790a14 and 2790a18 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of the State of North Dakota for the Year 1925.

## HOUSE BILL NO. 19

### Introduced by Representatives Northridge and Hamilton

## A BILL

- For an Act to Amend and Re-enact Section 18 and Section 24 of Chapter 155 of the Session Laws of the State of North Dakota for the Year 1927; Providing for the Regulation of Storage and Delivery Charges of Public Warehousemen and Providing for the Form of Receipts to Be Issued by Such Warehousemen.
- Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. That Section 18 of Chapter 155 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for 1927 be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 18. (AMENDMENT. STORAGE AND DELIV-ERY CHARGES. TERMINAL DELIVERY.) Every public warehouseman shall receive for storage, so far as the capacity of his warehouse will permit, all grain tendered to him without discrimination of any kind, provided, that such grain is sound and in a warehouseable condition. Upon date of delivery of grain for storage a warehouse receipt shall be issued to the owner or his agent, which shall state the place and date when the grain was received, the name of the owner of the grain, the kind of grade of the grain according to the official standards established by the Secretary of Agriculture of the United States, the gross weight, dockage, and net weight of the grain as per North Dakota standard weight. All receipts shall be consecutively numbered, and no two receipts bearing the same number and series shall be issued during the same year. No receipt shall be issued except upon actual delivery of grain into such a warehouse. No warehouseman shall insert in any such receipt any language in any wise limiting or modifying his liability as imposed by the laws of this state. Such receipt shall contain either on its face or reverse side the following specific warehouse and storage contract:

"This grain is received, insured and stored subject to the following charges: One-fortieth of one cent per net bushel per day from date of delivery, or fraction thereof; provided, however, that no storage shall be charged for grain so stored for thirty days from date of delivery. Upon surrender of this receipt and payment or tender of a delivery charge per gross bushel of three cents on flax, two cents on wheat or rye, and two cents on other grains, and all other stated lawful charges accrued up to the time of said surrender of this receipt, the above amount, kind and grade of grain will be delivered to the person named above or his order as rapidly as due diligence, care and prudence will permit. At the option of the holder of this receipt, the amount, kind and grade of grain for which this receipt is issued shall, on his demand, be delivered back to him, at any terminal point customarily shipped to, or at the place where received, upon the payment of the above charges for receiving, handling, storage and insurance; and in case of terminal delivery, the payment in addition to the above, of the regular freight charges on the gross amount called for by this ticket, or in lieu thereof, a receipt issued by a bonded warehouse or elevator company doing business at such terminal point. Nothing in this receipt shall be construed to require the delivery of the identical grain specified herein, but an equal amount of grain of the same kind and grade, shall be delivered to him."

Public warehousemen may also insert in the said receipt the following provision:

"If any of the grain embraced in this receipt shall prove to be covered by a chattel mortgage or other lien, or the partial or absolute title prove to be in some other than the person to whom this receipt was issued, the same shall, if discovered before the delivery of the grain, be sufficient reason for the refusal to deliver to the holder of the receipt, or if discovered after the delivery of the grain such delivery shall be deemed an over delivery for which said holder of this receipt, to whom such delivery is made, shall be accountable."

Provided, further, that grain placed in a special bin shall be excepted from the provisions of this section.

Section 2. That Section 24 of Chapter 155 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the year 1927 be amended and reenacted to read as follows:

Section 24. DISCRIMINATION PROHIBITED. No Public warehouseman shall discriminate in the buying, selling, receiving and handling of grain or the service rendered to owners of stored grain, nor shall such warehouseman discriminate in the receiving of grain offered for sale or storage; provided, that no public warehouseman shall be required to receive for storage any grain which is heating or otherwise out of condition.

State of North Dakota, Office of the Governor, Bismarck, North Dakota, February 6, 1929.

To the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota:

I herewith return:

House Bill No. 18. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Re enact Section 2645 of the 1925 Supplement to the Compiled Laws of the State of North Dakota for the Year, 1913, as Amended by Chapter 283 of the Session Laws for the Year, 1927, Relating to Wolf, Coyote, Lynx and Bobcat Bounty.

Without my approval for the following reasons:

The purpose of this bill is to increase the state bounty on wolves and coyotes from \$3.00 each to \$5.00 for each mature wolf and coyote, \$3.00 for each wolf and coyote pup, and providing a bounty for Canadian lynx and bobcats in the sum of \$10.00 for each mature lynx, \$5.00 for each lynx pup, \$5.00for each mature bobcat and \$3.00 for each bobcat pup.

For twenty years prior to 1923, the state bounty on wolves and coyotes was \$2.50 each. In 1923, this bounty was raised to \$5.00 for mature animals and \$2.00 for pups. During the period from 1923 to 1927, the Legislature was obliged to appropriate \$80,000 to meet the deficits occurring in the wolf bounty fund, a result which, no doubt, induced the Legislative Assembly in 1927 to reduce the bounty to the present rates. This bill, if it becomes a law, will require the expenditure of funds in the sum of at least \$50,000, and perhaps, \$60,000 over and above the regular appropriation during the present biennium for state bounty purposes. It will, therefore, be incumbent upon this Legislative Assembly to make the necessary additional appropriation therefor, or a deficit will occur in the wolf bounty fund. In my judgment present conditions do not warrant the placing of such an additional burden upon the State Treasury. To do so, is not in keeping with the policy of economy in public expenditures, which I think the state should follow during the insuing biennium. This is particularly true in view of the fact that the commercial market for wolf and coyote pelts is especially good at this time. I am informed on reliable authority that wolf and coyote hides bring from \$10.00 to \$20.00 each on the present market, a price substantially above these offered in recent years, and which is in itself a considerable inducement for the increased destruction of these predatory animals.

This bill comes to me before the Legislature has acted upon the major appropriation bills before it. It is known that these bills, which are intended to provide for the necessary operation and maintenance expenses of state departments and

the state institutions, will consume all, if not more than the present available revenues of the state during the biennium. Should the appropriations exceed the available revenues, it will mean higher tax rates for the people of the state, a consequence which the public welfare requires should be avoided. if possible. Under these circumstances, I am unwilling to increase the liabilities of the state treasury, which an approval of this bill would necessitate.

Mr. Swendseid rose to a point of personal privilege and requested that his remarks be published in the journal:

Believing that the heat of the argument which took place on the floor of this House on February 5th during consideration of the final passage of Senate Bill No. 5, better known as the Dormitory Bill, has subsided, I feel we can take a sober thought of some of the unpleasantness that was injected into the arguments and the resulting newspaper comments.

One of the fundamental propositions upon which our government is founded, and upon which it must rest immovable, is the inalienable right of "freedom of speech." If our representative form of government is not to perish, this right must be held inviolate in our legislative halls.

During the short time that it has been my honor to be a member of our State Legislature, it has been my endeavor to respect this right and to, at no time, engage in personal abuse, heckling or insinuations in the debate of any issue before this body, or attempt in any way to prevent anyone from enjoying his sacred right of "freedom of speech."

As a member of this legislative body I regard it as my duty, not only to vote on every measure that may properly come before it, but to express my views on such measure when I deem it advisable and to such extent as I may, and have the right to expect and demand this privilege, and hold that when this right has been or is being interfered with by heckling, personal abuse or insinuations by any member of this House or anyone else, that not only has my right been interfered with but the fundamental proposition of "freedom of speech" has been violated.

We invite and enjoy free discussion of any issue that may come before us in our deliberations, but I resent and consider it regretable and deplorable when any member of this legislative body shall be subjected to such heckling, abuses and insinuations as was resorted to by the distinguished gentleman from Cass during the argument on the final passage of the Dormitory Bill, and the accompanying newspaper reports that were published by the Fargo Forum and the Grand Forks Herald. From these reports we are led to believe that Mr. Twichell did, in fact, sustain his charge that a child ten years old would know better than that the statements made by me were true, and that I must know that they were misleading, whereas, in truth and in fact Mr. Twichell accepted my statement that the Dormitory Bill did not limit the interest on the loan for the construction of the dormitories at 7%, and that in truth and in fact the rate of interest is left entirely to the discretion of the State Board of Adminisration.

Again I state that when such tactics as above referred to are being resorted to, that not only are our individual rights violated, but that the far greater and more important right upon which our representative form of government is founded, "freedom of speech," has been violated, and without which our free and independent form of government can not endure.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

The Committee on State Affairs made the following report:

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on State Affairs to whom was referred:

House Bill No. 92. A Bill For an Act Declaring Certain Sports and Exhibitions to be Dangerous Requiring Bonds Therefor Before the Production Thereof, Prescribing Conditions and Amounts, and Approval of Bonds; Manner of Service of Process in Actions Against Producers of Dangerous Exhibitions and Remedies for Claimants Injured.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Line one of the printed bill, after the word and figure "Section 1" the bill read as follows:

That all persons, corporations or associations operating public exhibitions, ordinarily known as shows, circuses, carnivals and like amusement and which persons, corporations or associations furnish as public exhibition, races propelled by motor power, whether auto races, motorcycle races, auto polo races, airplane exhibitions, including ferris wheels, merry-gorounds, seaplanes, caterpillars and similar exhibitions, are hereby declared to be dangerous to the public; and all persons, associations or corporations managing or promoting the same, before entering into any valid contract for any such performance within this state, shall furnish and file with the Secretary of State its written power of attorney authorizing such official in its behalf to admit legal service of summons and process in all actions and proceedings that may be brought against it within this state; and such bond shall be filed with the Secretary of State and be approved as to form and sufficienty before the filing thereof, by the Attorney General of the State.

Section 2. If any producer shall fail to comply with the terms of this Act in filing a Power of Attorney with the Secretary of State authorizing said official to admit service on any Summons or process against such producer, nevertheless, the Secretary of State shall be authorized to admit legal

service of such Summons or process as made upon such producer thereby; and upon such admission of service the Secretary of State shall immediately ascertain the address and residence of such producer and if the address and residence of such producer shall appear from the contract for such performance, or shall otherwise be obtainable, such Secretary of State shall immediately send such Summons or process by registered mail, addressed and mailed with postage prepaid, to such producer at the residence and address so obtained, and such service for all purposes of suit, shall be deemed legal and valid personal service of Summons and process, made within the State of North Dakota on such producer.

Section 3. That no assignment of any such contract for production, nor the substitution of any event or events contracted for therein, shall relieve the original contracting producer or his bondsmen from any liability covered by such bond, arising from any injuries to persons or property because of the negligent performance of the contract for said exhibition, race or sport; and that any such assignee so negligently performing such contract, shall be jointly and severally liable with the original contractor and bondsmen therefor.

Section 4. That the surety bond required by this Act shall not be less in amount than \$20,000.00 for auto races, autopolo races or airplane race or exhibition; and that in all other dangerous public exhibitions, as motorcycle races, ferris wheels, merry-go-rounds, seaplanes, caterpillars and similar exhibitions, the bond required may be less in the discretion of the Attorney General of the State; provided, however, that in any event such bond shall not be less than \$5,000.00.

Section 5. Such bond shall run to the State of North Dakota as the obligee therein; and shall be conditioned for the payment of any and all damages for injuries to persons and property resulting from or occasioned by the negligence of the producer or producers and their agents, servants and employees in the performance of such race, exhibition or entertainment or in the execution thereof; and any person or corporation suffering injuries to person or property thereby, may sue to recover the same in his or its own name, or jointly with other claimants under said bond; it being the intent that such bond shall constitute a security fund for the benefit and to indemnify all persons injured in person and property in such performance.

Section 6. This Act shall not be construced to cover horse races, bicycle races or any entertainment wherein motor power shall not be used in the production of power or speed.

Section 7. Any person, corporation or association violating any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed \$1000.00; or by imprisonment for a period of not to exceed six months or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 8. EMERGENCY: Whereas, an emergency now

exists, in that there is no law adequately protecting the public against injury as herein indemnified against, Now, Therefore, this Act shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

House Bill No. 143. A Bill For an Act to Provide for the Purchase, Sale and Distribution of a Digest of the Decisions of the Supreme Court and Making an Appropriation Therefor.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's Amendments as follows:

In line 3, Section 4 of the printed bill, strike out the words "fifteen hundred" and insert in lieu thereof the words "one thousand."

House Bill No. 130. A Bill for an Act to Provide for the Creation of a North Dakota Governmental Survey Commission, Defining Its Powers and Duties and Making an Appropriation Therefor.

A Bill For an Act Declaring Certain Sports and Exhibitions to be Dangerous Requiring Bonds Therefor Before the Production Thereof, Prescribing Conditions and Amounts, and Approval of Bonds; Manner of Service of Process in Actions Against Producers of Dangerous Exhibitions and Remedies for Claimants Injured.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Line one of the printed bill, after the word and figure "Section 1" the bill read as follows:

That all persons, corporations or associations operating public exhibitions, ordinarily known as shows, circuses, carnivals and like amusement and which persons, corporations or associations furnish as public exhibition, races propelled by motor power, whether auto races, motorcycle races, auto polo races, airplane exhibitions, including ferris wheels, merry-gorounds, seaplanes, caterpillars and similar exhibitions, are hereby declared to be dangerous to the public; and all persons, associations or corporations managing or promoting the same, before entering into any valid contract for any such performance within this state, shall furnish and file with the Secretary of State its written power of attorney authorizing such official in its behalf to admit legal service of summons and process in all actions and proceedings that may be brought against it within this state; and such bond shall be filed with the Secretary of State and be approved as to form and sufficiency before the filing thereof, by the Attorney General of the State.

Section 2. If any producer shall fail to comply with the terms of this Act in filing a Power of Attorney with the Secretary of State authorizing said official to admit service on any Summons or process against such producer, nevertheless, the Secretary of State shall be authorized to admit legal service of such Summons or process as made upon such producer thereby; and upon such admission of service the Secretary of State shall immediately ascertain the address and residence of such producer and if the address and residence of such producer shall appear from the contract for such performance, or shall otherwise be obtainable, such Secretary of State shall immediately send such Summons or process by registered mail, addressed and mailed with postage prepaid, to such producer at the residence and address so obtained, and such service for all purposes of suit, shall be deemed legal and valid personal service of Summons and process, made within the State of North Dakota on such producer.

Section 3. That no assignment of any such contract for production, nor the substitution of any event or events contracted for therein, shall relieve the original contracting producer or his bondsmen from any liability covered by such bond, arising from any injuries to persons or property because of the negligent performance of the contract for said exhibition, race or sport; and that any such assignee so negligently performing such contract, shall be jointly and severally liable with the original contractor and bondsmen therefor.

Section 4. That the surety bond required by this Act shall not be less in amount than \$20,000.00 for auto races, autopolo races or airplane race or exhibition; and that in all other dangerous public exhibitions, as mortorcycle races, ferris wheels, merry-go-rounds, seaplanes, caterpillars and similar exhibitions, the bond required may be less in the discretion of the Attorney General of the State; provided, however, that in any event such bond shall not be less than \$5,000.00.

Section 5. Such bond shall run to the State of North Dakota as the obligee therein; and shall be conditioned for the payment of any and all damages for injuries to persons and property resulting from or occasioned by the negligence of the producer or producers and their agents, servants and employees in the performance of such race, exhibition or entertainment or in the execution thereof; and any person or corporation suffering injuries to person or property thereby, may sue to recover the same in his or its own name, or jointly with other claimants under said bond; it being the intent that such bond shall constitute a security fund for the benefit and to indemnify all persons injured in person and property in such performance.

Section 6. This Act shall not be construed to cover horse races, bicycle races or any entertainment wherein motor power shall not be used in the production of power or speed.

Section 7. Any person, corporation or association violating any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed \$1000.00; or by imprisonment for a period of not to exceed six months or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 8. EMERGENCY: Whereas, an emergency now exists, in that there is no law adequately protecting the public against injury as herein indemnified against, Now, Therefore, this Act shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval.

#### And the additional amendments:

Members of the Twenty-First Assembly: I appreciate very much indeed the courtesy you have shown me and I might say I would appreciate it a little more if you had not taken time to show me quite so much of it. Legislative members may be classified very much as the plants we grow on the farm. There are annuals, biennials and the perennials. I am glad there is a goodly scattering of perennials among you, otherwise those of us who have been away for a long time would feel lost when we come up here.

I believe the people "out in the woods" throughout the state this year are entirely satisfied with what you are doing. The reason for so thinking is that I don't hear them saying anything about you. When they are satisfied they aren't saying much.

One matter I have thought some of that might be given cognizance is the matter of farm relief. We have had an organization for some time now throughout the Northwest that is known as the Northwest Foundation—an organization of people from the states of Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota and Montana. When they appear before the Ways and Means Committee of congress on the matter of tariff adjustment on those crops in which we are particularly interested they want to be able to present a united front and not have a confliction of ideas. Their interests are much in common.

It strikes me that it would be a mighty good thing for this legislative assembly to pass a memorial backing up the work of such an organization as this Northwest Foundation, so that Congress will know that the organization has the backing of these states of Minnesota, North and South Dakota and Montana. That is the thought I have in mind.

The Board of County Commissioners is hereby empowered and directed, annually, to levy and spread upon the tax roll a sum sufficient to pay the county's share of the cost of maintenance. The State's share of such maintenance shall be five thousand dollars annually up to the first 150 students; an additional one thousand dollars for each additional 100 students, or major fraction thereof, above the first 150 as determined by the latest annual report to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The State's share of such maintenance shall not exceed seven thousand dollars in any one year. It is the intent of this act that a sum at least equal to the state's share shall be levied and paid by the county, but this shall not prevent the county from levying a greater sum for maintenance, if deemed necessary.

Be it further provided, that the Board of County Commissioners may from time to time levy and spread upon the tax roll such additional sums of money for the purchase, erection
and construction of additional buildings and improvements, or for the purchase of equipment, but levies for such purposes shall not exceed the sum of five thousand dollars in any one year, without first having been submitted to a vote of the electors of such county as provided in Section 1455. Unused portions of the equipment fund may be transferred to a building fund or to a real estate fund by the Board of County Commissioners upon the recommendation of the board of trustees of the county agricultural and training school. The board of trustees of the county agricultural and training school shall charge and collect tuition for all students from outside the county at the annual rate of fifty-four dollars, collectible in the same manner as provided by Section 1438a3 of the 1925 Supplement to the 1913 Compiled Laws of North Dakota. Provided, further, that no state appropriation shall be available until the State Superintendent of Public Instruction shall determine that above tuition has been collected.

The House assembled at 1:30 P. M. pursuant to recess taken, Speaker Edwin Traynor presiding.

The Speaker announced that the House would be on the Fifteenth Order of Business.

## GENERAL ORDERS

Mr. Kneeland moved that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of general orders; which motion prevailed, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

The Speaker called Mr. Kneeland to the Chair.

When the committee arose it submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker: The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 98. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 1456 of the Compiled Laws of the State of North Dakota for the year 1913, Relating to the Maintenance of County Agricultural and Training Schools.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

On page 1 of the printed bill, after line 3, of Section one, strike out the remainder of the bill and insert in lieu thereof, the following:

Section 1456. Joint Maintenance by County and State.) After the establishment of such a school, the maintenance thereof shall be borne jointly by such county and the state, as hereinafter provided. The Board of County Commissioners is hereby empowered and directed, annually, to levy and spread upon the tax roll a sum sufficient to pay the county's share of the cost of maintenance. The State's share of such maintenance shall be five thousand dollars annually up to the first 150 students; an additional one thousand dollars for each additional 100 students, or major fraction thereof, above the first 150 as determined by the latest annual report to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The State's share of such maintenance shall not exceed seven thousand dollars in any one year. It is the intent of this act that a sum at least equal to the state's share shall be levied and paid by the county, but this shall not prevent the county from levying a greater sum for maintenance, if deemed necessary.

Be it further provided, that the Board of County Commissioners may from time to time levy and spread upon the tax roll such additional sums of money for the purchase, erection and construction of additional buildings and improvements, or for the purchase of equipment, but levies for such purposes shall not exceed the sum of five thousand dollars in any one year, without first having been submitted to a vote of the electors of such county as provided in Section 1455. Unused portions of the equipment fund may be transferred to a building fund or to a real estate fund by the Board of County Commissioners upon the recommendation of the board of trustees of the county agricultural and training school. The board of trustees of the county agricultural and training school shall charge and collect tuition for all students from outside the county at the annual rate of fifty-four dollars, collectible in the same manner as provided by Section 1438a3 of the Supplement to the 1913 Compiled Laws of North Dakota. Provided, further, that no state appropriation shall be available until the State Superintendent of Public Instruction shall determine that above tuition has been collected.

And the additional amendments:

In line 1 of the title strike out the word "of" and insert the words "of the 1925 Supplement to"; and the same amendment in line 1, section 1.

And to further amend the amendment of the standing committee by striking out the figure "1925" of the amendment as printed in the Journal in the 4th line from the bottom.

Gentlemen:

#### OPINION

I am replying to your inquiry of February 16th, which is as follows:

"We have been authorized by the House of Representatives to request your opinion as to whether or not House Bill No. 164, being an act to provide additional compensation to reimburse members of the 21st Legislative Assembly for legitimate expenses incurred in the discharge of their work, if passed, be constitutional."

A study of House Bill No. 164 discloses that it provides for the payment of \$2.00 per day to the members of the Legislative Assembly "for the purpose of reimbursing the members of the 21st Legislative Assembly for legitimate expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties on committee work." The two outstanding features of the Bill are, first—It attempts to reimburse members for expenses connected with their work on committees and second, it applies only to members of the 21st Legislative Assembly and is not, therefore, a general law which would operate in favor of future Legislative Assemblies.

Section 45 of the Constitution of the State of North Dakota reads as follows:

"Eeach member of the Legislative Assembly shall receive as a compensation for his services for each session, \$5.00 per day, and ten cents for every mile of necessary travel in going and returning from the place of meeting of the Legislative Assembly on the most usual route."

This provision of the Constitution definitely prescribes a limit for the compensation of members of the Legislative Assembly.

It is evident to anyone having knowledge of the functions of the Legislature and its committees that there is little or no expense incurred by the members in performing their duties on committee work.

The Legislature has no right to appropriate a sum and make an allowance which would be greatly in excess of the expenses that it was ostensibly designed to cover.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that House Bill No. 164 (despite the language used in the act) provides compensation to members of the Legislative Assembly over and above the amount prescribed by Section 45 of the Constitution of the State of North Dakota, and that House Bill No. 164 is, therefore, unconstitutional.

On page 2, line 16 of the printed bill after the word "wardens," insert the words "or any one authorized by them to receive application."

Also,

House Bill No. 178. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Sections 2595 and 2606 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1913, Relating to Marking and Branding of Animals and Poultry, and Collection of Fees Therefor.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's Amendments as follows:

In title on first line after the figures "2595" strike out the word "and" in lieu thereof insert a "comma"; after the figure "2606" insert the words "and 9992"; after the word "therefore" in the last line, strike out the period and in lieu thereof insert a semi-colon and insert the following: "and providing penalties for unlawfully branding or stealing animals or poultry."

In line 2 of the title strike out the word "for" and insert the word "of".

In line 17, Section 1, of the printed bill after the word "or" insert "stenciling or tatooing, or".

After Section 2 add the following:

Section 3. AMENDMENT.) That Section 9992 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota of the year 1913, be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

"Section 9992. UNLAWFULLY BRANDING OR STEAL-ING STOCK OR POULTRY. Every person who wilfully and unlawfully marks, brands, kills or sells, or causes to be marked, branded, killed or sold, any horse, mule, cow, calf or other neat cattle, or any sheep or swine, or poultry, the property of another, is guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof, is punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary for not less than one and not exceeding 5 years, or by fine of not less than five hundred dollars and not exceeding one thousand dollars, or by both. Every person who commits grand larceny of any livestock or poultry above specified, the property of another, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than one and not exceeding ten years, or by a fine of not less than five hundred dollars, and not exceeding one thousand dollars, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

On the printed bill substitute: "Sec. 4" for "Sec. 3."

And additional amendments.

In the first line of the title strike out the word and figure "and 2606," all of section 2, and renumber Section 3 to read "Section 2" and renumber Section 4 to read "Section 3."

Also,

House Bill No. 107. A Bill For an Act Amending and

House Bill No. 123. A Bill For an Act to Limit the Rate in Mills Which May be Levied by School Districts, Providing a Method of Increasing Such Levy and Continuance or Discontinuance Thereof.

House Bill No. 97. A Bill For an Act Relating to the Manner of Making Tax Levies, Determination of the Rate of Levy, Limiting the Rate of Levy for State, County, City, Village, Township, School District, and Park District Purposes, Prescribing Duties of County Auditor in Connection with Extension of Levies, etc., and Repealing Sections 2148 and 2149 of the Compiled Laws of 1913, Section 2150 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913 as Amended by Chapter 199, Session Laws of 1927, Sections 2163a1 to 2163a6, and 2163a8 to 2163a10 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913 as Amended by Chapter 1913, and 2163a7 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913, and 2163a1 to 2163a70 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913, and 2163a70 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913, as Amended by Chapter 269, Laws of 1927.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

On page 4 of the printed bill, strike out all of lines 42 to 52 inclusive, and insert in lieu thereof, as paragraph (e) the following:

"The county auditor shall levy for road purposes a poll tax of one dollar and a half on every male person between the ages of twenty-one and fifty years not exempted by law. No property shall be exempt from the collection of such tax by distress or otherwise. Road poll taxes when collected, shall be distributed to the city, village or township in which such taxpayer resides, provided that in case of taxes collected from residents of unorganized territory said tax shall be retained in the county treasury and shall be expended by the board of county commissioners in such territory."

On page 8 of the printed bill, after paragraph 4 insert the following:

"(5) The governing body of any school district may levy taxes annually for a school building fund not in excess of one mill annually and not in excess of the limitations prescribed in this Section and Section 13, when authorized to do so by 60% of electors voting upon the question at a regular or special election. Such fund shall be used exclusively for erecting school buildings. All amounts received from such levy shall be kept in a special fund and such fund shall be known as a School Building Fund. Such fund may be used in connection with the proceeds of any bond issue made for the same purpose. It shall be illegal to use such fund or any part thereof for any purpose except for the purpose for which the fund was created. Such fund shall be subject to all requirements which now govern the sinking fund of any such school district and shall be retained by or deposited with the custodian of the sinking funds of the district. All pay-ments from such fund shall be upon warrant of the proper fiscal officer of the district for whose benefit the tax was levied. Whoever uses or authorizes to be used such fund or any part thereof for any purpose except the purpose for which the fund was created shall be liable therefor and upon his official bond. If any unexpended balance of such fund is no longer needed for the purpose for which the fund was created or the project is abandoned, such balance shall be transferred to the general fund of the municipality or to the sinking fund or funds of the municipality as directed by the governing board. No such transfer shall be made until the object of the levy is satisfied or abandoned."

The notice of election shall, in addition to the foregoing requirements, give notice of the year or years for which authorization is sought for an excess levy. If such excess levy is authorized by 60% of the electors of the district voting upon the question, the board may make such excess levy for the years for which authorization has been given. Such excess levy any at any time be discontinued by the governing body and shall be discontinued upon petition of 20% of the voters of the district.

Page 6, Section 6, Paragraph A: Add at the end thereof "and a description in general terms of the improvement which can and ought to be made therein."

Page 7, Section 6, line 1: Change the word "signature" to "signatures," and change the word "of" between the words "all" and "one copy" to "on."

Page 7, Section 8, line 1: Insert after the words "Bond of Petitioners" the following: "At the time of filing the petition, or at any time subsequent thereto, such petitioners, or one or more of them, shall file in the office of such auditor a bond running to the county, conditioned on the payment to the county of the cost of all proceedings in connection with such petition thereafter to be had in the event that such petition be denied, which bond shall be approved as to form and security by the county commissioners."

Page 10, Section 11, line 1: After the words "be accomplished by the creation of such district", insert the words "and that the property therein will be benefited by the accomplishment of such purpose or purposes."

The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 198. A Bill For an Act Providing for the Testing of Grain Offered for Storage for Protein Contents and Issuance by Public Warehousemen of "Protein Content. Certificate." Penalty. Repeal.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Section 1, lines 4 and 5 strike out the following "the state grain laboratory at Grand Forks or other" and insert in lieu thereof the word "any."

Also;

House Bill No. 220. A Bill for an Act to Prohibit the Sale

or Exchange, by any State Institution to a Private Consumer, of any Dairy Product Produced at any Such Institution; To Prohibit the Advertising of Any Dairy Product so Produced, as Being the Product of Any Such Institution; To Prohibit the Serving to the Inmates of any Such Institution of Oleomargarine or any Substitute for Butter; and to Prohibit the Serving of Separated Milk to any Inmate, of any such Institution, Under the Age of 16 Years.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Line 2 of Section 3 of the original bill insert a "comma" after the word "institution" and insert the following "other than the state penitentiary,"

#### Also,

House Bill No. 63. A Bill For an Act to Appropriate the Sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000) from Any Moneys in the State Highway Fund for the Purpose of Aiding in the Construction of a Bridge Across the Missouri River between McLean County and Mercer County, North Dakota, Under the Provisions of Chapter 73 of the Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1919 (Sections 1952a1 and 1952a2 of the 1925 Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913), as Amended and Re-enacted by Chapter 161, Laws of 1927 and Directing the State Highway Commission to Construct Such Bridge and do All Necessary Preliminary Acts.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

"For an Act to Appropriate the Sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) not Otherwise Appropriated from any Moneys in the State Highway Fund, for the Purpose of Making a Preliminary Survey and Sounding for a Bridge Site Across the Missouri River Between McLean County and Mercer County, North Dakota, on What is Known as the Big Bend South of the City of Garrison, McLean County, North Dakota; and Directing the State Highways Commission to Extend, Designate, Locate and Improve Necessary Roads Leading to Such Bridge Site.

# "BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

"Section 1. There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the State Highway Fund not otherwise appropriated, under Paragraph 2a of Section 11 of Chapter 44 of the Laws of the Special Session of the Sixteenth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, for the year 1919, (Par. C. of Section 2976T15 of the 1925 Supplement to the Compiled Laws for the year 1913), the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary between the date of the passage and approval of this Act and June 30, 1931, inclusive, for the purpose of making a preliminary survey and sounding across the Missouri River between McLean County and Mercer County, on what is known as the Big Bend, South of the City of Garrison, McLean County, North Dakota, under the Provisions of Section 1 of Chapter 73 of the Laws of North Dakota for the year 1919, as amended and re-enacted by Chapter 161 of the Session Laws for 1927 (Sections 1952a1 and 1952a2 of the 1925 Supplement to the Compiled Laws of the State of North Dakota for the year 1913).

"And, the State Highway Commission is hereby authorized and empowered to make such sounding and to have the same completed prior to January 1, 1931.

And, the State Highway Commission is further authorized and directed forthwith to extend, designate, locate and improve the necessary road or roads, as part of the state highway system leading to such bridge site, as may be determined by such sounding, so that such bridge site shall be and constitute a part of the state highway system and shall be entitled to the allotment of Federal Aid in its construction, and shall take the necessary steps to have such roads leading to such bridge site incorporated in the Federal System of this state."

#### And additional amendments:

Amend the amendments of the Standing Committee as follows: In line 7 of the title of the bill after the word "Bend" insert a comma.

In line 8, following the word "Dakota" change the semicolon to a period and strike out the balance of the title.

In line 7 of Section 1 immediately following the figure "1913" add "and other acts amendatory thereof."

Strike out the last ten lines of the bill.

Also,

House Bill No. 102. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 1 of Chapter 195, of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the year 1927, relating to the Authorization of Cities and Villages to Refund Special Improvement Warrants.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In the printed bill, line 3 of the title after the word "to" strike out the remainder of the title, and insert in lieu thereof, "issue refunding special improvement warrants, and providing means for the payment thereof."

Also, in Section 1, page two, line 14, after the comma following the word, "in", strike out the remainder of the
line, all of line 15, and all of line 16 to the semicolon, and insert in lieu thereof the following: "or by reassessment for deficiencies to be made and collected in the manner specified by Section 3712 to 3739, both inclusive, Compiled Laws of 1913 and acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto; or by the temporary use of funds produced by tax levies provided for in Section 3716 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913 as amended, such funds to be repaid by delinquent assessments as they are collected, provided, that whenever the governing body of any city or village shall determine to make such re-assessment the city auditor shall notify the chairman of the special assessment commission of the act of governing body and shall certify to him the total amount necessary to be raised by such re-assessments, and the chairman of such commission shall thereupon proceed in the same manner as in the original assessment: provided further, that no lots or parcels of land shall be assessed for more than the benefits received from such improvements."

#### Also.

House Bill No. 156. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 3716 of the 1925 Supplement to the 1913 Compiled Laws of North Dakota.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Strike out after the words "A BILL" all of the printed bill and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"For an Act to Amend and Re-enact Section 3716 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913.

"BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

"Section 1. AMENDMENT. That Section 3716 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913 be amended and reenacted to read as follows:

Section 3716. PAYMENT OF DEFICIENCIES. Whenever all special assessments collected for a specific improvement are insufficient to pay the special improvement warrants issued against such improvement with interest the city council or city commission, as the case may be, shall upon the maturity of the last special improvement warrant levy a tax upon all of the taxable property in the city for the payment of such deficiency; provided, that if at any time prior to the maturity of the last special improvement warrant a deficiency exists in such special improvement fund the city council, or city commission, as the case may be, may in its discretion levy a general tax upon all the taxable property in the city for the payment of such deficiency; provided further, that in case of a balance remaining unexpended in such special improvement fund it shall be paid over or transferred to the general funds of the municipality.

Section 2. Repeal. All acts or parts of acts in conflict with this act are hereby repealed."

"Be it Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

"Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to attempt to sell, advertise for sale, or secure orders for, any merchandise whatever, or to attempt to secure subscriptions for any magazine, newspaper or other periodical, or to obtain agents or solicitors for any such purpose, through the agency of any public school in this state, or to attempt, during school hours or at any time upon public school premises, to organize pupils of such school into clubs or contesting bodies for any such purpose. It shall also be unlawful for a teacher of any public school, and for any school officer, to promote or knowingly to permit any of the acts above mentioned by such means; provided, however, that this act shall not in any way affect or restrict the educational or extra-curricula activities of any school, or its participation in any movement for the public welfare or for any charitable purpose, if such activity or movement is not connected with, and does not contribute to, any private business.

"Section 2. Any teacher violating any provision of this act shall be subject to dismissal by the school board, and any other person violating any such provision shall be subject to a fine of not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars."

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

On page 4 of the printed bill, strike out all of lines 42 to 52 inclusive, and insert in lieu thereof, as paragraph (e) the following:

"The county auditor shall levy for road purposes a poll tax of one dollar and a half on every male person between the ages of twenty-one and fifty years not exempted by law. No property shall be exempt from the collection of such tax by distress or otherwise. Road poll taxes when collected, shall be distributed to the city, village or township in which such taxpayer resides, provided that in case of taxes collected from residents of unorganized territory said tax shall be retained in the county treasury and shall be expended by the board of county commissioners in such territory."

On page 8 of the printed bill, after paragraph 4 insert the following:

"(5) The governing body of any school district may levy taxes annually for a school building fund not in excess of one mill annually and not in excess of the limitations prescribed in this Section and Section 13, when authorized to do so by 00% of electors voting upon the question at a regular or special election. Such fund shall be used exclusively for erecting school buildings. All amounts received from such levy shall be kept in a special fund and such fund shall be known as a School Building Fund. Such fund may be used in connection with the proceeds of any bond issue made for the same purpose. It shall be illegal to use such fund or any part thereof for any purpose except for the purpose for which the fund was created. Such fund shall be subject to all requirements which now govern the sinking fund or any such school district and shall be retained by or deposited with the custodian of the sinking funds of the district. All payments from such fund shall be upon warrant of the proper fiscal officer of the district for whose benefit the tax was levied. Whoever uses or authorizes to be used such fund or any part thereof for any purpose except the purpose for which the fund was created shall be liable therefor and upon his official bond. If any unexpended balance of such fund is no longer needed for the purpose for which the fund was created or the project is abandoned, such balance shall be transferred to the general fund of the municipality or to the sinking fund or funds of the municipality as directed by the governing board. No such transfer shall be made until the object of the levy is satisfied or abandoned."

On page 8, line 27, of the printed bill, strike out the figure "5" and insert in lieu thereof the figure "6".

On page 9, line 20 of the printed bill, strike out the word and figure "four (4)" and insert in lieu thereof the word and figure "five (5)".

On page 10, line 10, Section 10 of the printed bill, strike out the word "six" and insert in lieu thereof the word "nine".

On page 10, line 12, of the printed bill, strike out the words "one-half" and insert in lieu thereof the words "three-fourths".

On page 12, line 4 of the printed bill, strike out the words "a majority" and insert in lieu thereof the following: "Sixty per cent (60%)".

On page 13, after line 37 of the printed bill, insert the following:

"The governing body of any school district shall be authorized to submit the question of authorizing an excess levy for the current year and the next succeeding year or the next two succeeding years. When the question of authorizing an excess levy for more than one year is submitted by the governing body of any school district, the form of ballot shall be varied from the form prescribed in this section in order to properly cover the question submitted. The notice of election shall, in addition to the foregoing requirements, give notice of the year or years for which authorization is sought for an excess levy. If such excess levy is authorized by 60% of the electors of the district voting upon the question, the board may make such excess levy for the years for which authorization has been given. Such excess levy may at any time be discontinued by the governing body and shall be discontinued upon petition of 20% of the voters of the district.

### THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 21, 1929

#### GENERAL ORDERS

Mr. Speaker:

The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 200. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Reenact Subdivision (b) of Section 17, Chapter 162, Session Laws of 1927, Relating to "Operating Vehicles—Rules." and Particularly to "Signals on Starting, Stopping, and Turning."

And offer the following amendments:

In lines 6 and 9 of the printed bill change the word "devise" to "device".

In line 10 of the printed bill following the semi-colon strike out balance of line 10 and all of line 11 and insert in lieu thereof "all new closed cars and trucks sold in North Dakota after January 1, 1930, shall be required to be equipped with an efficient mechanical or electrical device giving such required signals".

In line 14 of the printed bill strike out one "r" in "horizontally".

Also,

House Bill No. 132. A Bill for an Act Prohibiting Every Teacher of Public Schools, Every Member of the School Board, Every County Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the State Superintendent of Instruction, from Either Directly or Indirectly Permitting the Pupils of any School to be Organized into a Soliciting Agency for the Purpose of Selling any Publication or Commodity Whatsoever, Either by Means of Public Solicitation or Using the School House or any of the Equipment of a Public School House for the Purpose of Soliciting Subscriptions or Business of Any Kind. Penalty. For the Purpose of Preventing the Minds of the Pupils of the School to be Distracted from Educational Work and Formed into Clubs for the Purpose of Soliciting and Securing Subscriptions for Publications and Other Commodities and for Declaring the Public Policy of the State in Relation Thereto.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Strike out all of the title of the bill after the words "A bill" and insert in lieu thereof, the following:

"For an Act to Prevent the Advertising or Sale of Merchandise and the Soliciting of Subscriptions to Periodicals Through the Agency of the Public Schools, and Prescribing Penalties for Violation of the Provisions of this Act.

"Be it Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

"Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to attempt to sell, advertise for sale, or secure orders for, any merchandise whatever, or to attempt to secure subscriptions for any magazine, newspaper or other periodical, or to obtain agents or solicitors for any such purpose, through the agency of any public school in this state, or to attempt, during school hours or at any time upon public school premises, to organize pupils of such school into clubs or contesting bodies for any such purpose. It shall also be unlawful for a teacher of any public school, and for any school officer, to promote or knowingly to permit any of the acts above mentioned by such means; provided, however, that this act shall not in any way affect or restrict the educational or extra-curricula activities of any school, or its participation in any movement for the public welfare or for any charitable purpose, if such activity or movement is not connected with, and does not contribute to, any private business.

"Section 2. Any teacher violating any provision of this act shall be subject to dismissal by the school board, and any other person violating any such provision shall be subject to a fine of not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars".

Also.

House Bill No. 163. A Concurrent Resolution For an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of North Dakota Providing for the Election of State and County Officers, and Prescribing the Terms of Office and Qualifications Therefor.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's Amendments as follows:

In line 28 thereof after the comma following the word "Judge" insert the following words: "County Superintendent of Schools."

Strike out all matter in proposed measure after line 35, and add in lieu thereof the following matter: "Provided that no county treasurer, and no sheriff, shall be eligible to hold office more than two consecutive terms. Provided, further, that in event of enactment of the foregoing Amendment to the Constitution at the Primary election held in June A. D. 1930, all candidates nominated at such primary for any office, the term of which shall be by such enactment so in-

creased to four years, shall be held nominated for such four year term".

### Also,

House Bill No. 184. A Bill For an Act to Provide for the Regulation of Motor Boats not under Federal Regulations, Carrying Passengers; Providing for Inspection, Registering of Same, Registering of Operators, Specifying Equipment, etc.

Strike out all of Section 5 and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"Sec. 5. The Sheriff shall issue a license to operate any such boat to any person applying for the same, upon being satisfied as to such person having the qualifications necessary to properly and safely operate such passenger boats, and shall require the payment of a licence fee of One (\$1.00) Dollar from each such applicant. No person shall operate such boat unless such person shall be licensed under the provisions hereof."

Section 6, line 2 after the word "inspected" insert the words "or registered".

Section 6 line 3 after the word "operating" strike out the word "each" and insert in lieu thereof the words "any such".

Section 6, line 4, strike out the word "receive" and insert the word "collect".

Section 6, line 6, strike out the word "receive" and insert the word "collect".

Section 6, line 7, after the word "license", insert the following "All fees collected hereunder by the sheriff shall be

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paid into the county treasurer and the sheriff shall receive mileage for any travel hereunder at the rate provided by law."

And additional amendments.

Amend the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Strike out lines 1 and 2 of the printed bill to the word "on" and insert in lieu thereof "Section 1. Any motor or powerpropelled boat having a passenger carrying capacity of six or more persons, and carrying persons for hire".

Also, after Section 9 insert "Emergency", and strike out the word "deemed" and insert "hereby declared to be" in lieu thereof.

Senate Bill No. 19. A copy of any such survey shall be furnished to the Commissioner of Insurance of this state and to the owner of the property upon written request.

Section 2. Upon written complaint that the survey on any individual risk is not correctly made up in accordance with the standard method of rating used in this state, the Commissioner of Insurance shall have power to make a full investigation of the same in the bureau and at the location of the property involved and if after investigation and bearing he is satisfied said rating is not correctly made up, he shall order said rating to be corrected to conform to said standard method of rating. The bureau shall be furnished with a copy of any such complaint.

Section 3. No such hearing shall be had until after ten days written notice to the bureau and the owner of the property involved in said hearing. Said hearing shall be held at a place designated by the Commissioner of Insurance. During the pendency of such hearing the rate involved shall be suspended and in the event the final determination shall be that said rate is excessive, any overcharge on account of such rate found to be excessive shall be refunded to the insurer.

Section 4. There is hereby appropriated out of any money in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) or so much thereof as is needed, to pay salaries, traveling and other expenses necessarily incurred by the Commissioner of Insurance and his department in the administration of this act.

# FIRST AND SECOND READING OF HOUSE BILLS

Mr. Freeman introduced:

House Bill No. 231. A Bill for an Act Providing that Attachment Shall Lie as Against Motor Vehicles, in Case of Accidents Occasioned Through the Negligence of the Driver or Owner Thereof.

Which was read the first and second times and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

## Messrs. Hausmann and Henderson introduced:

House Bill No. 232. A Bill for an Act to Require Persons Convicted of Reckless Driving, or of Driving a Motor Vehicle While Under the Influence of Intoxicating Liquor or Narcotic Drugs, or of Failure to Stop in Event of An Accident Involving Injury or Death to a Person, to Furnish a Bond; Providing for the Inforcement of Such Act; and Providing a Penalty for the Violation Thereof.

Which was read the first and second times and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

The Committee on Delayed Bills introduced:

House Bill No. 233. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 910 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for the year 1913, Relating to the Election of Delegates to National Conventions, Presidential Electors and National Committeemen and Committeewomen.

Which was read the first and second times and referred to the Committee on Elections and Election Privileges.

Mr. Horner requested a return to the Seventh Order of Business.

Which request was granted.

Mr. Horner then moved that House Bill No. 228 be rereferred to the Committee on Judiciary. Which motion prevailed and the bill was so re-referred.

Mr. Kneeland moved that House Bill No. 219 be placed on General Orders for today.

Which motion prevailed.

## GENERAL ORDERS

Mr. Burkhart moved that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of General Orders; which motion prevailed, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

When the committee arose it submitted the following report:

The Speaker called Mr. Burkhart to the chair.

Mr. Speaker: The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 127. A Bill For an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 4 and Section 6 of the Initiated Measure Entitled, "An Act to Impose a Tax Upon the Sale of Motor Vehicle Fuels; Providing for the Collection of Said Tax, for Reports of Sales of Such Motor Fuels and for the Disposition of the Revenues Derived Therefrom; Regulating the Sale of Such Fuels and Fixing Penalties for the Violation of This Act. Repcaling all Acts or Parts of Acts in Conflict with the Provisions of this Act," and Approved at a State-wide Election held June 30th, 1926.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In line 5 of the title of the printed bill, after the "Semicolon" insert the following: "Providing for the licensing and bonding of dealers and refunding a tax on motor fuel used for other purposes than motor vehicles operated upon state highways."

On page 2, line 28 of the printed bill, strike out the word "five" and insert in lieu thereof the word "two."

On page 3, line 37 of the printed bill, after the word "auditor" insert a "comma."

On page 3, line 48 of the printed bill, strike out the following words: "the force and effect."

On page 3, line 49 of the printed bill, after the word 'license" strike out the "period" and add the following: "in full force and effect.

On page 4, line 59 of the printed bill, after the word "determine" strike out the "period" and insert in lieu thereof a "comma," and add the following: "which shall not exceed three times the amount of the state license tax on all gasoline sold by such dealer during the preceding month, and not less than \$500.00." On page 4, line 63 of the printed bill, strike out the words "the law" and insert in lieu thereof the words, "this act."

On page 4, line 73 of the printed bill, after the word "as" insert the word "herein", and in the same line strike out the two last words "by law."

On page 4, line 77 of the printed bill, strike out the word "original."

On page 4, line 78 of the printed bill, strike out the word "original" and insert in lieu thereof the word "or". In the same line following the word "ticket" strike out the "comma" and the remainder of the line.

On page 4, line 79 of the printed bill, strike out the words "the State Auditor."

On page 5, line 83 of the printed bill, correct the spelling of the word "vehicle."

On page 5, line 84 of the printed bill, after the word "charged" insert the following: "and which such invoice or ticket shall be numbered and show thereon that it is the purchaser's invoice." In the same line following the word "and," insert the words "the same."

On page 5, line 85, of the printed bill, strike out the word "original."

On page 5, line 86 of the printed bill, strike out the words "at the time of delivery."

On page 5, Section 2, line 12 of the printed bill, strike out the word "that" and insert in lieu thereof the word "than."

On page 6, line 21 of the printed bill, strike out the word "original," and in the same line after the word "or" insert the following: "ticket properly marked paid by the dealer," and in the same line strike out the words "receipt thereof."

On page 6, line 29 of the printed bill, after the word "other" insert the word "than."

On page 6, line 32 of the printed bill, strike out the word "nine" and insert the word "six" in lieu thereof.

And additional amendments.

In line 5 of the title of the printed bill and in line 5 of Section 1 of the printed bill after the word "therefrom," insert "Providing for the Licensing and Bonding of Dealers and Refunding a tax upon Motor Fund used for other purposes than motor vehicles operated upon State Highways.

Mr. Peters moved that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of General Orders; which motion prevailed, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

The Speaker called Mr. Peters to the chair.

When the committee arose it submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker:

The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 212. A Bill for an Act to Provide for Licenses for Hunting Deer and Trapping Beaver in the State of North Dakota and for the Issuance of Search Warrants.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

At the end of line 6, Section 1, strike out the "Period" and insert the following:

"and shall have attached thereto a tag in duplicate with the same number as the license. Said tag shall be detached from the license and attached to the animal killed. The tag attached to the animal killed shall give a description of the animal, place and manner of killing and how disposed of. The duplicate tag shall be filled out in the same manner as

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the original and forwarded to the Game and Fish Board, and a complete record thereof shall be kept by the Secretary of the Game and Fish Board. All licenses issued under this Act shall be void when tag or duplicate is detached from such license. The bag limit shall be one antelered deer for each person having the required license."

The above amendments refer to the printed bill.

#### And the additional amendments:

In line 3, section 4, of the printed bill, change the figures "\$25.00" to "\$50.00."

#### Also,

House Bill No. 87. A Bill For an Act Authorizing the Commissioner of Insurance to Examine Fire Rating Bureau; Forbidding Discriminatory Rates and Requiring Written Variation to be Filed; Requiring Fire Insurance Companies to Maintain or be Members of Rating Bureaus; Providing that Risks be Inspected; Requiring Rating Agreements to be Submitted to Commissioner of Insurance; also Providing for Review by Commissioner of Insurance of Rates Fixed by Bureau and Proceedings Under Appeal from Order of Commissioner; Penalty for Violation; Exempting County Mutual Companies, and Providing Appropriation for Administration Thereof.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Strike out everything after the words "A Bill" and in lieu thereof insert the following:

## A BILL

For an Act to Require Rating Bureaus to make Written Surveys of Certain Rates for Fire Insurance; to

Hearings on Complaints and a Review by the Commissioner of Insurance of the Same, and Providing an Appropriation for the Administration of this Act by the Commissioner of Insurance and his Department.

# BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

Section 1. Every rating bureau engaged in making rates or estimates for rates for fire insurance on property in this state shall inspect every risk specifically rated by it upon schedule and make a written survey of such risk. A copy of any such survey shall be furnished to the Commissioner of Insurance of this state and to the owner of the property upon written request.

Section 2. Upon written complaint that the survey on any individual risk is not correctly made up in accordance with the standard method of rating used in this state, the Commissioner of Insurance shall have power to make a full investigation of the same in the bureau and at the location of the property involved and if after investigation and bearing he is satisfied said rating is not correctly made up, he shall order said rating to be corrected to conform to said standard method of rating. The bureau shall be furnished with a copy of any such complaint.

Section 3. No such hearing shall be had until after ten days written notice to the bureau and the owner of the property involved in said hearing. Said hearing shall be held at a place designated by the Commissioner of Insurance. During the pendency of such hearing the rate involved shall be suspended and in the event the final determination shall be that said rates are excessive, any overchange on account of such rate found to be excessive shall be refunded to the insurer.

Section 4. There is hereby appropriated out of any money in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) or so much thereof as is needed, to pay salaries, traveling and other expenses necessarily incurred by the Commissioner of Insurance and his department in the administration of this act.

#### Also,

House Bill No. 226. "For an Act Providing for an Increase in the Salary of County Officials in Certain Counties having a Population not exceeding 7,000; Providing the Salary to be Paid the States Attorney in all Counties; and increasing the Maximum Salary to be Paid in Counties not Having a Population in excess of 40,000, to the Register of Deeds, Clerk of the District Court, and the County Judge in a County not having a County Court with Increased Jurisdiction.

"Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

"Section 1.) The County Auditor, County Treasurer, Sheriff, and the Superintendent of Schools in each county of the state having a population of not to exceed 7,000, shall receive an annual salary of \$1,800, payable monthly. The Register of Deeds, Clerk of the District Court, and the County Judge, in each county having a population of not to exceed 7,000 shall each receive an annual salary of \$1,600.00, payable monthly.

"Section 2.) The States Attorney in each county of the state shall receive the same salary as is now by law provided as the salary of the County Auditor of such county.

Section 3.) The salary of the County Judge in counties not having a county court with increased jurisdiction, of the Clerk of the District Court and of the Register of Deeds, in counties having a population in excess of 7,000 and not exceeding 40,000, shall be the same as that now by law provided except that the maximum salary to be paid such officials up-

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on the present population basis of salary is hereby increased from \$2,000.00 to \$2,250.00."

"Every person who owns, operates or manages a creamery or cream station, in the state of North Dakota, where butterfat is purchased from the public, shall post the price being offered for butterfat; such posting to be made in a place where it can be clearly seen from the street; and it shall be unlawful for any such person to pay for such product, a price different from that so posted."

Following the word "price" in line 8 of Section 1, insert the following: "Provided that the above requirement shall only be held to apply to cream stations or creameries purchasing such butterfat outright and for a cash price agreed upon at the time of purchase thereof."

And additional amendments.

Amend the amendments of the Standing Committee by striking out line 13 and the first two words and the semicolon in line 14.

"Section 2.) The States Attorney in each county of the

state shall receive the same salary as is now by law provided as the salary of the County Auditor of such county.

Section 3.) The salary of the County Judge in counties not having a county court with increased jurisdiction, of the Clerk of the District Court, and of the Register of Deeds, in counties havnig a population in excess of 7,000 and not exceeding 40,000, shall be the same as that now by law provided except that the maximum salary to be paid such officials up on the present population basis of salary is hereby increased from \$2,000.00 to \$2.250.00."

The question of county seat removal may be so submitted to the electors of any county at a primary election, and if more than two towns contend for the location of the county seat at such primary election and if no such contending town receive two-thirds of the vote cast thereon, then and in that event the two towns receiving the highest vote at such primary election, and these two towns only, shall be placed upon the official ballot at the first following general election. If any town receive two-thirds of the total vote cast at either such primary or general election, such town shall be designated as the county seat of such county.

The provisions as to petitions, notice, ballot, etc., now provided by law for elections for the removal of county seats, shall be applicable to primary elections, as herein provided for, as well as to such general elections.

Section 2. The receiver of a bank which passed into receivership prior to the taking effect of this act, shall, not later than September 1, 1929, prepare and mail to each person described in Section 1 hereof, a statement showing the assets and liabilities of such bank as of the date upon which said receiver took charge thereof; said receiver shall at the same time prepare and mail statements showing the true condition of the affairs of the said bank as shown by the last report submitted by the receiver to, and approved by, the court. Annually thereafter statements shall be prepared and mailed as provided in Section 1 of this act.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In line 1 of the title of the printed bill, strike out the figures "1925."

In line 3 of the title of the printed bill, after the word "Cooperative" insert the words "Corporations and".

In line 2 of Section 1 of the printed bill, strike out the

figures "1925". In the same line strike out the first word "of" and insert in lieu thereof-the word "to", and strike out the words "North Dakota for."

In line 10, Section 1, of the printed bill, strike out the semicolon following the word "notwithstanding" and insert in lieu thereof a period, and strike out the remainder of the Section, and insert in lieu thereof the following: "In such associations or corporations consisting of fifty or more stockholders, a quorum at such stockholders meeting shall consist of at least twenty-five stockholders, present in person or by proxy; provided, however, that at least fifteen stockholders must be present in person. In such associations or corporations consisting of less than fifty stockholders, a quorum at such stockholders' meeting shall consist of a majority of the stockholders, present in person or by proxy; provided, however, that at least 20 per cent of such stockholders must be present in person."

Following line 15, page 2 of the printed bill, add the following: "Section 2. Emergency. This act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

Senate Bill No. 99. A Bill for an Act Providing for the Appointment of a Committee for the Purpose of Drafting and Reporting the Inconsistencies, Contradictions, and Omissions of the School Laws of the State of North Dakota.

The license fee under this act to be paid upon a motor vehicle shall become due as soon as such vehicle shall first use the public streets or highways in this state, and upon January 1st in each year thereafter. License fees due upon January 1st shall be paid upon transfer of ownership in the vehicle, and in any event on or before May 15th, and shall be delinquent after May 15th unless paid. License fees falling due between May 15th and December 31st shall become delinquent upon the expiration of five days after the same become due.

A penalty of 10 cents per day shall be added to the license fee required under this act for each and every day such license fee shall be delinquent for not to exceed fifteen days and two (\$2.00) dollars per month thereafter for each month or fraction thereof for not to exceed five months."

This amended and revised section is declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval.

"(e)" Whenever the ownership of any motor vehicle shall pass otherwise than by voluntary transfer, the new owner may obtain a certificate of title therefor from the Department upon application therefor and payment of a fee of one dollar accompanied with such instruments or documents of authority, or certified copies thereof, as may be required by law to evidence or effect a transfer of title or interest in or to chattels in such case. The Department, when satisfied of the genuineness and regularity of such transfer, shall issue a new certificate of title to the person entitled thereto."

Penalty.

"Section 29. WHEN FEES DELINQUENT; PENALTIES.) The license fee under this act to be paid upon a motor vehicle shall become due as soon as such vehicle shall first use the public streets or highways in this state, and upon January 1st in each year thereafter. License fees due upon January 1st shall be paid upon transfer of ownership in the vehicle, and in any event on or before May 15th, and shall be delinquent after May 15th unless paid. License fees falling due between May 15th and December 31st shall become delinquent upon the expiration of five days after the same become due.

A penalty of 10 cents per day shall be added to the license fee required under this act for each and every day such license fee shall be delinquent for not to exceed fifteen days and two (\$2.00) dollars per month thereafter for each month or fraction thereof for not to exceed five months."

This amended and revised section is declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval.

The Department, when satisfied of the genuineness and regularity of such transfer, shall issue a new certificate of title to the person entitled thereto."

On page 2, strike out all of paragraph "(g)", being the emergency clause, and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"(f)" When the transferee of a motor vehicle is unable to obtain a properly assigned certificate of title for such vehicle, and makes application for a new certificate of title and presents satisfactory proof of ownership, the Department may cancel the old certificate of title and issue a new certificate of title to such transferee."

In line 9 between the words "his" and "control", insert the words and punctuation, "or its,"

In line 15 insert a "comma" between the words "State" and "to"

In line 10 page 2 insert a "comma" between the words "service" and "shall"

In line 12, page 2 insert a "comma" between the words "provided" and "shall".

In line 14 page 2 insert a "comma" between the word "exempted" and the word "shall"

Strike out all of engrossed bill after line 17, page 2, and add in lieu of the matter so stricken out, "Provided, however, that when a public corporation, the State of North Dakota, or any institution, department or agency of the State, is named as garnishee, such garnishee shall not be permitted to defend the principal action for the defendant upon the ground that the defendant is an officer, agent, or employee of such garnishee.

Service upon the State of North Dakota, or any institution, department or agency thereof as garnishee, may be made upon the State Auditor, in manner now by law provided for such service in garnishment proceedings, except that the fee to be tendered and paid the State Auditor for making affidavit of disclosure and filing same, shall be three dollars.

Any and all fees so received by the State Auditor, shall constitute a "Special Garnishment Fund" from which shall be paid by him, all extra expense incurred by his office in making disclosures in the garnishment.

Provided, further, that the right to garnishee the state of

North Dakota or any institution, department or agency of the state, shall not apply to any debt or obligation created or becoming due prior to the taking effect of this act."

## Remarks by Mr. Cox:

Mr. Speaker: One thousand years ago in June of 1930, and only 930 years after Christ, a social and political unrest among the nobility and aristocracy of Western Norway resulted in many families setting their crude boats to the west in search of a new home in a new land of freedom and opportunity. They landed on the bleak shores of Iceland, and soon displaced or absorbed the Celtic monks who had there sought seclusion for religious meditation and prayer.

These Nordic patriarchs and their familes soon sought a common protection from the enemy, social and educational advantage, and, very early associated themselves into a governmental group known as the Althing, (al-ting) the first general, national legislative assembly known to history. Thus the Althing is the patriarch of popular legislative bodies, and persists even to this day in substantially its original form. It is this millennial of the Icelandic Congress which will be celebrated in June of 1930. These pioneers of a thousand years ago sought no king. Each was lord of his own estate, and yet, the Althing most jealously guarded the rights of the mass from the dominance of the powerful individual.

History also lays the credit for the integrity of the Norse language to the sequestered sons who thus found liberty of mind and body in the volcanic island of the frozen north. The wild beauty of their new land with its fiery mountains, steaming geysers, tumbling glaciers, and flower decked valleys reflects itself in incomparable sagas and epics of their battles with living foes, destructive volcanos, crushing glaciers, and angry seas. Throughout the Icelandic literature is the tang of the ocean's breath, the flash of the warriors blade, the hush of the falling snow, the charm of the flower decked fjord (fyord) and valley. Little wonder that they defied the storm, the sea, the forest, the sun and their resolute purpose. They soon found these gods false enough, then the early influence of the Celtic monks with faith in a supreme God and a humane Christ led them to sweeping acceptance of Christianity, which they soon in turn communicated to the old Homeland in Norway.

Thus we have in a tiny government of less than 100,000 souls, the makers of constitutional government, the early masters of international trade, the molders of a classical Norse language and literature, the successful antagonists of internal physical disaster, and the masters of an external barrier of vast seas in an, as yet, uninvaded trade with distant ports and peoples.

Mr. Speaker, it is the rare son of Iceland who does not reflect in his community the superior cultural qualities in literature, language, religion and government which have made the Nordic races famous.

In 1855 a few Icelanders, who had accepted the Mormon

faith came to America and founded a settlement in Utah. In 1870 four young Icelanders came to Milwaukee and settled on Washington Island, Wisconsin, a few more joining them the next spring. This colony still exists, although it has never grown great in numbers. In 1873 about 300 came to America and settled in our own State where they set about the organization of the Icelandic Lutheran Synod of America.

The Committee on Judiciary of which I have the honor to be chairman has directed me to communicate to this legislative body some of the sentiments expressed while Concurrent Resolution "B" was under consideration. I knew full well that I have done poor justic to this direction.

Mr. Speaker, I move the adoption of Concurrent Resolution "B".

Mr. Olafson seconded the motion and presented the following communication in conjunction with his remarks.

Reykjavik, 5. February, 1929.

To the Honourable the Governor of the State of North Dakota, Bismarck, North Dakota.

#### Honourable Sir:

The presidents of the Legislative Assembly of the Kingdom of Iceland, the Althing hereby take exceptional pleasure in requesting the honour that your Government will kindly and considerately honour an occasion which marks an epoch in the history of our nation, viz. the celebration of the

#### ONE THOUSANDTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE ALTHINGI

the national parliament of Iceland, by appointing and sending a special representative to take part in this celebration on behalf of the people of the State of North Dakota. This occasion will be celebrated about the end of June, 1930, at Lingvellir, its ancient meeting place. The festivities, a program cf which will be forwarded to you later, will probably last three days. All information you may require in connection therewith, we shall be pleased to supply.

Iceland was colonized during the Viking Age; and when the country had become fully settled, these independent colonists established here a republic in 930, at the same time providing for a general assembly for the whole country, the Althing, which possessed both legislative and judicial powers. From 930 onwards the Althing assembled at Lingvellir, when its meetings were temporarily suspended; but they were soon resumed in Reykjavik, the capital of Iceland, where the Althing has met ever since.

While this Invitation has been extended to the American Nation at large through its most honoured representative in the Council of the Nations, His Excellency, the President of the United States of America, we feel it incumbent upon us as a most agreeable duty to extend this Invitation to you as the chief executive of the Government and the citizens of your State, realizing as we do, that so many sons and daughters of our nation have found a permanent home within the boundaries of your State and assumed an active and influential part affecting the general welfare and legislation of your Commonwealth.

Trusting that you may see fit to honour the occasion by acceding to our request as above stated,

Mr. Speaker: A Majority of your Committee on Insurance to whom was referred:

Senate Bill No. 58. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Sections 189b5, 189b9, 189b12, 189b13, 189b15, 189b16, 189b25, 189b29 and 189b30 of the Supplement to the 1913 Compiled Laws Relating to State Hail Insurance.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Amend the title of the bill to read as follows:

"An Act to amend and re-enact Sections 189b1, 189b5, 189b9, 189b11, 189b12, 189b13, 189b15, 189b16, 189b25, 189b29, and 189b30 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913 relating to State Hail Insurance."

Strike out Section 1 of the engrossed bill and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 1. Amendment). Sections 189b1, 189b5, 189b9, 189b11, 189b12, 189b13, 189b15, 189b16, 189b25, 189b29 and 189b30 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913 are hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 189b1. DEFINITIONS). The term "cropped land" when used in this act shall mean all lands actually in such crop or intended to be planted to crop. The term "year" whenever used in this Act shall mean the calendar year."

Amend Section 189b5 to read as follows:

"Section 189b5. CROPS INSURED). The crops insured under this act shall consist of all crops grown on cultivated lands listed as actually cropped, subject to and paying the taxes herein specified or which are insured according to Section 189b25 of this act. Provided that no indemnity shall be allowed or paid for damage to any crop after it is cut, nor shall any indemnity be allowed for loss that occurs after the 15th day of September of any year except that flax shall be considered insured up to and including September 25th if not cut before such time, nor shall indemnity be allowed for loss occurring before the 1st day of June on winter rye and winter wheat, nor before the 10th day of June on other crops. Provided, further, that where for some reason crops have been abandoned there shall be no indemnity allowed for loss claimed thereon. Provided, that in counties which are "excepted counties" as defined in Section 9 of this Act, no insurance upon any crop shall take effect until application has been made therefor; provided that it shall be the duty of the assessor to show on the crop listing affidavit, in the space provided therefor, the number of acres and the kind of crop affected in the manner and form as above, provided no diagramming of such crops shall be considered necessary."

"Section 189b9. DUTY OF ASSESSOR). It shall be the duty of every county, township or district assessor in his respective district at the time of listing property for assessment to return the number of acres in crop or intended to be put into crop upon every description within his district for each year, together with the name of the person in whose name the land is taxed, as well as that of the tenant having a direct interest in such crop. The assessor shall also, if possible, note upon a diagram on the crop listing blank the location of such lands in crop or intended to be planted or sowed to crop during such year, and shall return and file same with the county auditor of his county on or before the first day of June in each year. In case the number of acres in crop as shown in the crop listing affidavit in the column provided for showing such cropped lands does not correspond with the acreage shown on the diagram on the face of the crop listing blank, the number of acres as shown in the cropped land column shall govern. Provided, further, that where the cropped land column is blank, it shall be considered that no insurance is carried and no claims for indemnity on same shall be allowed. Such assessor in addition to compensation allowed by law shall receive the sum of fifteen dollars for each full township of thirty-six sections, or at the rate of seven cents per hundred acres or fractions thereof listed.

Provided, that in "excepted counties" as defined herein, assessors shall be pail a fee of twenty-five cents for each application for hail insurance returned by him, but such compensation shall not exceed 50 per cent of the compensation allowable to assessors in other than "excepted counties". Such compensation shall be paid out of the Hail Insurance Fund on vouchers issued by the Commissioner of Insurance and approved by the State Auditing Board, provided that warrants in payment of such listing of land and making such applications shall not be issued before the County Auditor shall have filed with the Hail Insurance Department a certified statement that such assessor has listed every tract in his township or district.

Provided, however, that in any county where an average of 75 per cent or more of the land returned by the assessors as in crop, or to be sown to crop, has been withdrawn for the year 1927, 1928 and 1929, the assessors shall not make return of land in crop or to be sown to crop, except that upon request of land owners or tenants he shall take applications for indemnity hail insurance of crops growing or to be grown upon land otherwise eligible, for which such land owner or tenant, may make application, and which application shall be signed in triplicate by the party requesting such insurance and attested by the assessor, whereupon such lands shall be listed and diagrammed on the crop listing affidavit and returned as herein provided, together with the original and

one duplicate copy of such application, the remaining duplicate copy to be re-delivered to the applicant.

Such application shall show not only the total acreage but also the kinds of crops, and it shall be the duty of the assessor to solicit every farmer or owner of crops to insure his crop with the State Hail Insurance Department. Such county shall be known as an "excepted county" until the land so listed for insurance upon application as aforesaid, shall for one year exceed 25 per cent of the average acreage of land returned as in crop or to be sown to crop during the three preceding years when it shall cease to be an "excepted county" and shall no longer be subject to this proviso.

Provided, further, that in any such reinstated county, should the lands withdrawn in any subsequent three consecutive years exceed 75 per cent of the lands listed as in crop or to be sown to crop as returned by the assessor for such years, then and in that case such county shall again be classified as an "excepted county."

Provided, that anyone listing and insuring crops with the assessor or county auditor in "excepted counties" shall have all of the privileges of withdrawal and reinstatement accorded to those whose lands are listed and insured in other counties. Provided, further, that in such "excepted counties" in cases of rented lands where the tenant makes application for hail insurance, such application must be countersigned by the owner of said land or his agent.

It shall be the duty of the Insurance Commissioner each year, before the 15th day of February, to notify the auditors of the several counties whether their respective counties are "excepted counties" or otherwise, and the auditor shall thereupon cause notice of that fact to be published in the official paper once a week for four consecutive weeks and shall notify the assessors in his county thereof."

Amend Section 189b11 to read as follows:

"Section 189b11 CROP AFFIDAVIT). Every owner or his agent, or tenant or his agent, of any land subject to the provisions of this Act shall make affidavit that the land so insured is actually cultivated and in crop or intended to be cultivated and put into crop. Such affidavit shall contain a legal description of the land, together with the numbers of ocres claimed as crop land and in case of any loss by hail such owner and tenant shall be bound by said affidavit as to the number of acres cropped. Such affidavit shall be made in triplicate and shall be sworn to before the assessor. The assessor shall file the original and one duplicate of such affidavit with the county auditor on or before the 1st day of June of each year, and a copy of such affidavit shall be left with the maker and shall constitute his policy of insurance. If the owner or tenant, or their agents, be absent or refuses or neglects to furnish such affidavit, the assessor shall certify the number of acres cropped, the description of said lands, and the name of the owner and tenant, if any, and file
the same with the county auditor, and such owner and tenant shall be bound by such certificates as to the facts so certified. Provided that if any assessor shall neglect to list such lands or shall list it improperly any such owner or tenant or their respective agents, may list such land with the county auditor prior to June 10th of any year by making affidavits as above provided, the originals of such affidavits to be filed by the county auditor with the Hail Insurance Department immediately. Any assessor who shall fail or neglect to list any land in the township or district in which he is assessor, as provided in this section, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Provided, that the Hail Insurance Department shall be liable for loss only on lands listed as provided in this Act.

Provided, however, in counties defined as "excepted counties" by Section 9 of this Act, the requirements of this section shall be limited to cases in which application is made for indemnity hail insurance as in said section provided for.

Provided, further: in "excepted counties" any land owner or tenant who fails to make application for insurance to the assessor prior to June 1st of each year, or whose application therefor has for any reason been improperly made or returned, may make application for such insurance to the county auditor at any time up to and including July 25th in event he shall make and file with such auditor his affidavit that such crops have not been damaged or destroyed by hail prior to that time, and such application shall have the same effect as an application made to the assessor as hereinbefore provided, but no insurance so applied for shall take effect until twentyfour hours after the receipt and filing of such application with the County Auditor."

### RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY THE COMMITTEE ON

### APPROPRIATIONS

Whereas, this legislative assembly has appropriated moneys for the support and maintenance of indigent, expectant mothers and indigent children in certain private institutions operating under the laws of this state; and

Whereas, all such institutions are operating under the supervision of the Board of Administration, and must be licensed by such board; and such board has authority to make reasonable rules and regulations for their conduct; and

Whereas, it seems highly desirable that future legislative assemblies should be informed as fully as possible of the work of such institutions, their financial condition and the reasons which make state aid essential—all to the end that the legislative assembly may be in position to act honestly, fairly and intelligently upon future requests for appropriations for similar purposes:

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Board of Administration be and they hereby are required to provide regulations whereby any such private institution receiving any part of a state appropriation for the support of indigent, expectant mothers, or indigent.children, or both, at the time of presenting a voucher to the state auditing board for compensation_ also file a duplicate of such voucher with the executive officer (Director of Children's Bureau) employed by the Board of Administration to carry out the purposes of the various laws enacted by the legislative assembly in 1923, relating to Child Welfare; also, that there be attached to such duplicate voucher, a report stating:

1. The reasons why the case falls within the provisions of the particular act under which payment is sought.

2. What financial assistance, if any, is received from other sources, and what if any such assistance may be expected in the future.

3. The name and address of the person, or persons, legally responsible for the support of the expectant mother or child, and reasons why the expectant mother or child is not being supported by such person or persons.

4. The probable duration of time such expectant mother or child will be under the care of such institution, and a proper subject for aid under the provisions of the act, under which payment is asked.

That the State Board of Administration further require each and all of such institutions to prepare and file with the Director of the Children's Bureau, not later than August 1st, of each year an annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30th, showing:

1. The assets and liabilities of such institution.

2. A detailed statement of its income and outgo during the fiscal year.

3. Its anticipated income and outgo for the ensuing fiscal year.

4. A statement of the work performed—giving such particulars as will enable one examining it to understand as far as possible the scope of the work performed during the year.

5. A statement of the urgent needs of the institution.

That the report submitted in even numbered years in addition to the foregoing, also, contain a statement of the amount

of state aid requested, and the reasons why such aid should be given.

Mr. Speaker, Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Members of the House and Senate. We have living at Devils Lake a man that is now approaching his 94th year. He came to that country almost fifty years ago and since then, and continuously, has been one of our very best citizens. Mr. Speaker, that venerated old gentleman and the city officials of Devils Lake have got together and prepared a little present for you gentlemen on the platform. In money value it is of little worth, but if one of these presents were made to me I would not take any amount of property or money for it. They have prepared a little letter and with your permission I will read it.

Dear Sir:

The City of Devils Lake takes pleasure in joining with its most venerated and esteemed citizen, Captain Edward Edson

Heerman, in presenting to each of you a gavel which was made from the rudder of the Steamer "Minnie H", the first and largest passenger and freight boat to ply the waters of any of North Dakota's beautiful lakes.

The Steamer "Minnie H" of 200 tons burden was constructed under the careful supervision of Captain Heerman in 1882, before the railroad had reached the City of Devils Lake. Thirteen car loads of material were hauled overland from Larimore to Devils Lake for the purpose of constructing this boat, which was completed in time to make its maiden trip, with over four hundred passengers aboard, on the day that the first train reached Devils Lake, which was July 4, 1882.

As the waters of Devils Lake receded year after year, navigation became more and more difficult until finally it was necessary to beach the steamer at a point four miles from its original docking place in the City of Devils Lake. There it rested, high and dry, for many years until it was dismantled and partially taken apart.

When the Steamer was dismantled in 1909, the original rudder was preserved, as it was Captain Heerman's hope that he would have the opportunity of presenting a gavel made from the rudder of this sturdy Steamer to the first native born citizen elected to the position of Governor. Realizing that the Speaker of the House was also a native of the State and that the Lieutenant Governor came to the State at a very early age and received all of his education and training in the State, it was also the desire of Captain Heerman to have each of you gentlemen share in the gift with the Governor. It was my thought that it would be fitting and proper to have a like remembrance placed in the keeping of the State Historian, therefore, gentlemen, on behalf of Captain Heerman and every resident of the City of Devils Lake, I take pleasure in presenting each of you with this gavel made from the rudder of the good ship "Minnie H".

Though the "Minnie H" can never be rebuilt so as to navigate the waters of Devils Lake again, Captain Heerman, with thousands of other citizens of the State, hope to see the lake restored to its former size and beauty and on their behalf I wish to extend to the Nineteenth, Twentieth and Twentyfirst Legislative Assembly our thanks for the assistance you gave in the appropriation for the Missouri River diversion survey.

The citizens of Devils Lake and vicinity join with Captain Heerman in wishing that these gavels, which were made from the rudder, which guided the Steamer "Minnie H" for over a quarter of a century without a mishap may witness as smooth a voyage of the "Ship of State" under your guidance as were the voyages of the "Minnie H" under the strong guiding hand of its worthy Captain.

### Governor Shafer:

Senator Hyland, and members of this joint session: I esteem it a very high honor indeed to be the recipient of this splendid gift that now takes the form of a gavel. To me, this gavel, coming as it does, from a portion of an oak tree, reared in the soil of North Dakota spells and prophesies the spirit of endurance. This gavel, as I take it, prophesies first the enduring character of North Dakota products. The tree from which this material was taken no doubt took root in the soil of North Dakota many hundreds of years ago. Slowly through the generations and centuries of time this tree sprouted and grew and furnished this material, which in the course of time found its way into the rudder of one of North Dakota's relics, now the steamboat that once plied upon Devils Lake. In its service as part of the rudder of this steamboat it served a noble purpose. In the course of time this purpose was no longer serviceable to the people of North Dakota. Now it becomes a sort of memento, a sort of memorial, taking its place among the more enduring achievements that are creditable to North Dakota's people.

I think it is eminently fitting that the distinguished gentleman, Captain Heerman who has lived to see nearly one hundred years of lifetime, most of which has been spent in North Dakota, might have had the privilege of turning his constructive genius to turning the material that was once the rudder of his boat into the memento such as this, to be given to me and to the people, for generations to come.

On behalf of myself and the other officers here and the people of the state of North Dakota who are permitted to speak through the governor's office, I thank you Captain Heerman, the mayor of Devils Lake, and the boys of the School for the Deaf for the splendid contribution of North Dakota's progress.

# Lieutenant Governor Carr:

Mr. Speaker, Senator Hyland: In accepting this gift I do so with considerable feeling. It is one that I will long treasure as something to remember the session and the occasion by, and I will ask Senator Hyland to convey to Captain Heerman and the people of Devils Lake my appreciation of the gift.

#### Mr. Crawford:

Senator Hyland, and the Members of the Legislative Assembly: It has been said that 'man shall not live by bread alone.' We live in sentiment and the older we become the greater influence that sentiment has upon us. The governor has accepted his gavel for himself and the other members have accepted gavels for themselves.| I am here to receive this gavel for you, the members of both houses of the Legislative Assembly, for the visitors here present, and for the 650,000 citizens of the State of North Dakota and for the

80,000 visitors that come into the museum annually to see our exhibits. As the years go on, the number to come there will increase. It shall be our purpose to preserve this memento for all time to come. It will connect us not with the present but with generations that have gone and with almost a century of the life of this grand old man of the State of North Dakota, who lives in Devils Lake, a man whose history is worth much to everyone who knows anything of him and his achievements, and on behalf of these whom I mention I receive this gift. I thank you.

### Speaker Traynor:

I had hoped that it wouldn't be necessary for me to talk, but the Lieutenant Governor said, "You haven't made your little speech yet," so I must say a few words. However, I feel as the other recipients of the gavel have felt—very grateful to be the recipient of one of these gavels.

It has never been my privilege to know Captain Heerman personally, but I have seen him occasionally during the last thirty-five years. I can remember in the early days of the history of our lake region when many times I have seen the Minnie H plowing through the waters of Devils Lake and it was one of the wonderments to my childish mind. The Minnie H and her captain, for years have contributed a good deal to the history of the lake region. When it was built it plowed back and forth from Devils Lake to Fort Totten, Minnewaukan and was the principal means by which freight was carried from Devils Lake to the Fort for many years. Section 189b1. DEFINITIONS). The term "cropped land" when used in this act shall mean all lands actually in such crop or intended to be planted to crop. The term "year" whenever used in this Act shall mean the calendar year."

Amend Section 189b5 to read as follows:

"Section 189b5. CROPS INSURED). The crops insured under this act shall consist of all crops grown on cultivated lands listed as actually cropped, subject to and paying the taxes herein specified or which are insured according to Section 189b25 of this act. Provided that no indemnity shall be allowed or paid for damage to any crop after it is cut, nor shall any indemnity be allowed for loss that occurs after the 15th day of September of any year except that flax shall be considered insured up to and including September 25th if not cut before such time, nor shall indemnity be allowed for loss occurring before the 1st day of June on winter rye and winter wheat, nor before the 10th day of June on on other crops. Provided, further, that where for some reason crops have been abandoned there shall be no indemnity allowed for loss claimed thereon. Provided, that in counties which are "excepted counties" as defined in Section 9 of this Act, no insurance upon any crop shall take effect until application has been made therefor; provided that it shall be the duty of the assessor to show on the crop listing affidavit, in the space provided therefor, the number of acres and the kind of crop affected in the manner and form as above, provided no diagramming of such crops shall be considered necessary."

"Section 189b9. DUTY OF ASSESSOR). It shall be the duty of every county, township or district assessor in his respective district at the time of listing property for assessment to return the number of acres in crop or intended to be put into crop upon every description within his district for each year, together with the name of the person in whose name the land is taxed, as well as that of the tenant having a direct interest in such crop. The assessor shall also, if possible, note upon a diagram on the crop listing blank the location of such lands in crop or intended to be planted or sowed to crop during such year, and shall return and file same with the county autditor of his county on or before the first day of June in each year. In case the number of acres in crop as shown in the crop listing affidavit in the column provided for showing such cropped lands does not correspond with the acreage shown on the diagram on the face of the crop listing blank, the number of acres as shown in the cropped land column shall govern. Provided, further, that where the cropped land column is blank, it shall be considered that no insurance is carried and no claims for indemnity on same shall be allowed. Such assessor in addition to compensation allowed by law shall receive the sum of fifteen dollars for each full township of thirty-six sections, or at the rate of seven cents per hundred acres or fractions thereof listed.

Provided, that in "excepted counties" as defined herein, assessors shall be paid a fee of twenty-five cents for each application for hail insurance returned by him, but such compensation shall not exceed 50 per cent of the compensation allowable to assessors in other than "excepted counties". Such compensation shall be paid out of the Hail Insurance Fund on vouchers issued by the Commissioner of Insurance and approved by the State Auditing Board, provided that warrants in payment of such listing of land and making such applications shall not be issued before the County Auditor shall have filed with the Hail Insurance Department a certified statement that such assessor has listed every tract in his township or district.

Provided, however, that in any county where an average of 75 per cent or more of the land returned by the assessors as in crop, or to be sown to crop, has been withdrawn for the years 1927, 1928 and 1929, the assessors shall not make return of land in crop or to be sown to crop, except that upon request of land owners or tenants he shall take applications for indemnity hail insurance of crops growing or to be grown upon land otherwise eligible, for which such land owner or tenant, may make application, and which application shall be signed in triplicate by the party requesting such insurance and attested by the assessor, whereupon such lands shall be listed and diagrammed on the crop listing affidavit and returned as herein provided, together with the original and one duplicate copy of such application, the remaining duplicate copy to be re-delivered to the applicant.

Such application shall show not only the total acreage but also the kinds of crops, and it shall be the duty of the assessor to solicit every farmer or owner of crops to insure his crop with the State Hail Insurance Department. Such county shall be known as an "exceptedd county" until the land so listed for insurance upon application as aforesaid, shall for one year exceed 25 per cent of the average acreage of land returned as in crop or to be sown to crop during the three preceding years when it shall cease to be an "excepted county" and shall no longer be subject to this proviso.

Provided further, that in any such reinstated county, should the lands withdrawn in any subsequent three consecutive years exceed 75 per cent of the lands listed as in crop or to be sown to crop as returned by the assessor for such years, then and in that case such county shall again be classified as an "excepted county".

Provided, that anyone listing and insuring crops with the assessor or county auditor in "excepted counties" shall have all of the privileges of withdrawal and reinstatement accorded to those whose lands are listed and insured in other counties. Provided, further, that in such "excepted counties" in cases of rented lands where the tenant makes application for hail insurance, such application must be countersigned by the owner of said land or his agent.

It shall be the duty of the Insurance Commissioner each year, before the 15th day of February, to notify the auditors of the several counties whether their respective counties are "excepted counties" or otherwise, and the auditor shall thereupon cause notice of that fact to be published in the official paper once a week for four consecutive weeks and shall notify the assessors in his county thereof."

Amend Section 189b11 to read as follows:

"Section 189b11. CROP AFFIDAVIT). Every owner or his agent, or tenant or his agent, of any land subject to the provisions of this Act shall make affidavit that the land so insured is actually cultivated and in crop or intended to be cultivated and put into crop. Such affidavit shall contain a legal description of the land, together with the numbers of acres claimed as crop land and in case of any loss by hail such owner and tenant shall be bound by said affidavit as to the number of acres cropped. Such affidavit shall be made in triplicate and shall be sworn to before the assessor. The assessor shall file the original and one duplicate of such affidavit with the county auditor on or before the 1st day of June of each year, and a copy of such affidavit shall be left with the maker and shall constitute his policy of insurance. If the owner or tenant, or their agents, be absent or refuses or neglects to furnish such affidavit, the assessor shall lands, and the name of the owner and tenant, if any, and file

the same with the county auditor, and such owner and tenant shall be bound by such certificates as to the facts so certified. Provided that if any assessor shall neglect to list such lands or shall list it improperly any such owner or tenant or their respective agents, may list such land with the county auditor prior to June 10th of any year by making affidavits as above provided, the originals of such affidavits to be filed by the county auditor with the Hail Insurance Department immediately. Any assessor who shall fail or neglect to list any land in the township or district in which he is assessor, as provided in this section, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Provded, that the Hail Insurance Department shall be liable for loss only on lands listed as provided in this Act.

Provided, however, in counties defined as "excepted counties" by Section 9 of this Act, the requirements of this section shall be limited to cases in which application is made for indemnity hail insurance as in said section provided for.

Provided, further: in "excepted counties" any land owner or tenant who fails to make application for insurance to the assessor prior to June 1st of each year, or whose application therefor has for any reason been improperly made or returned, may make application for such insurance to the county auditor at any time up to and including July 25th in event he shall make and file with such auditor his affidavit that such crops have not been damaged or destroyed by hail prior to that time, and such application shall have the same effect as an application made to the assessor as hereinbefore provided, but no insurance so applied for shall take effect until twentyfour hours after the receipt and filing of such application with the County Auditor."

### And additional amendments:

In the engrossed bill, section 189b13, line 20, strike out the last three words of the line, lines 21, 22, 23, 24 and the first two words of line 25 up to the word "such".

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In the engrossed bill in line 3 of Section 1, strike out the figures "\$1,235,107.60" and insert in lieu thereof the figures "\$1,215,592.60."

In the engrossed bill, under the division entitled "MISCEL-LANEOUS", strike out all of item 4, all of item 5, and all of item 6.

In the engrossed bill, under the division entitled "TOTAL FOR ALL PURPOSES," which is the last line of the engrossed bill, strike out the figures "\$1,235,107.60" and insert in lieu thereof the figures "\$1,215,592.60."

To the Maternity Home shall be paid the sum of Fifteen Dollars per month toward the support and maintenance of each poor and indigent unmarried expectant mother, or mother, and Ten Dollars per month toward the support and maintenance of each poor and indigent infant or child during the time their age or physical condition necessitates their being charges in said Maternity Home, as determined by the Superintendent or Superior in charge, providing, in no case shall a mother and her child receive an allowance from the appropriation at the same time; and to said Orphanage shall be paid the sum of Ten Dollars per month toward the support and maintenance of each poor and indigent infant or child while their age or physical condition necessitates their remaining as charges in said Orphanage, as determined by the Superintendent or Superior in charge. In Section 2 of the engrossed bill, strike out the words "North Dakota Home of Mercy" and insert in lieu thereof "said Maternity Home" and strike out "St. John's" and insert the word "said" between the words "and" and "Orphanage."

In Section 3 of the engrossed bill strike out the words "North Dakota House of Mercy" and insert in lieu thereof "Said Maternity Home", and strike out the words "St. John's".

Mr. Lee explained his vote: Though Dunn County will get no benefit from the passage of this bill, I realize that I also represent the State of North Dakota. I vote "aye".

Mr. Swendseid explained his vote: I vote "no". It is my understanding that the farm boys do not require this appropriation and further as this is in the nature of establishing a precedent of appropriating money belonging to the next session of the legislature I vote "no".
