WHEREAS, Those who were privileged to know him either as a public official or as an individual, most deeply appreciate his many qualities, and his services to the state; now,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED BY THIS JOINT LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY, That in the passing of this former member our state has lost one of its outstanding younger citizens, and

BE IS RESOLVED, That we do hereby express our deep feeling of sorrow at the passing of the Honorable Arnold Sandlie, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of these resolutions be enrolled and forwarded by the Chief Clerk of the House to the surviving members of the family of the deceased."

So the roll was called and there were 112 members present, Representative F. J. Shurr of Bottineau County being absent, so a quorum was declared present.

The Chief Clerk appointed Representatives Aljets, Traynor and Twichell to escort Chief Justice Burke to the rostrum.

Chief Justice Burke was escorted to the rostrum by the Committee.

The oath of office was administered to the 112 members by Chief Justice Burke.

Rev. Father Robert A. Feehan of Bismarck, North Dakota, offered prayer.

The Chief Clerk announced that the first order of business would be the election of a Speaker to preside over the House during the session, and that nominations were now in order.

Representative Hill: I have a member in mind that I am happy to recommend as the Speaker of this House, a man who has always taken a very deep interest in the affairs of the common people of this state, a man that has always had to fight for his rights and worked himself up to a position where he has been recognized by the people in his home county as a man capable and honest and willing and efficient in every way to represent them, and a man who merits your consideration as Speaker. I know him personally for many years; have been brought up not so far from the community where he lives. The gentleman I wish to present for your consideration is Mr. William Crockett from Cavalier County.

Representative Godwin: I rise to second the nomination of Mr. Crockett as Speaker of this House. I never knew Mr. Crockett until six years ago when he first came to Bismarck, a new member. During the time he has been here he has been tireless in his efforts in behalf of legislation in which he is interested, and in his championship at all times of progressive legislation before this body, which recommends him to me as a man eminently well qualified to hold this position and I take great pleasure in seconding the nomination.

Mr. Erickson (of McKenzie): At this time I would like to offer a candidate for the office of Speaker of this House, and the man I am about to mention has been a legislator here for the past five sessions, and the man I have in mind is Mr. George Aljets. He is a member from the 33rd District and the fact that he has been returned here by his

people back home for five successive years is evidence of where he stands with the folks back home. He has always been progressive in the movement for progressive legislation at all times, and has been at all times a man with certain convictions and the courage to stand up for them. There are certain qualifications that any man should have to fill the position of Speaker and I think George Aljets has the ability in every way, and the qualifications to fulfill the duties of the office of Speaker. I take great pleasure in presenting the name of George Aljets for Speaker.

Representative Gilbertson: Members of this Assembly, it is indeed a great pleasure to me today to second the motion nominating George Aljets for Speaker of this House, for several reasons. I know George very well, have worked with him in the session two years ago. Anyone that has ever worked with George knows that he is the fellow that bears a big load upon his shoulders at any session. You would always find George in the early hours of the morning, after the rest of us had all quit, doing his work. It was always "Let George do it," and I am sure that George will be favorable to almost every one that is here. I don't think there is anyone that has anything to say but that George would make a wonderful Speaker and would be right with everybody. So it gives me great pleasure in seconding the motion of George Aljets for Speaker of the House.

Mr. Savre: I second the nomination of Mr. Crockett for Speaker. I have served with Mr. Crockett these last two sessions and I have always found him working for the people.

Mr. Traynor: I wish to second the nomination of my good friend George Aljets for Speaker. In the five sessions during which he has served the people of the State of North Dakota and his district, it has been my privilege to serve also, and in those ten years I have had a pretty good opportunity to observe him, and I know that he is a man of great ability, a man of industry, and a man of an agreeable disposition; that he has been popular, not only with his own faction but with all of us, and in the problems that are confronting us in this session, I feel that a man of Mr. Aljets' ability, and his personality is eligible for this position; that he will set this House on such a basis that it will be better able to accomplish for the people of the State of North Dakota those things which they are crying loudly that they be accomplished, and so it is with pleasure that I second his nomination and urge that you all support him.

Mr. Thompson: I take great pleasure in seconding the nomination of George Aljets for Speaker. I have worked with him since 1925 and he has been a man you could go to at any time and talk with. We haven't always agreed on political questions but we could talk things over and not have any hard feelings, and he has been that way with every member of the House. He is a man of agreeable dis-

position, a man that if elected will serve the State of North Dakota to the best of his ability, a man that I think all factions—that I know all factions—would receive fair treatment from, and this is a time when people should forget their politics and vote for the interest of the State. There are some big problems before the State of North Dakota at this time—the biggest we have ever had. From the personal acquaintance I have had with George Aljets and from what I know of him, it gives me great pleasure to second his nomination for the position of Speaker.

Mr. Scholl: I want to rise to second the nomination of William Crockett for Speaker of this House. I have served with Mr. Crockett in the past two sessions and know something of his ability, something of his efforts, and became very well acquainted with Mr. Crockett in the work of this body. Mr. Crockett, to my knowledge, is one of the members of the Republican party, and believes in the principles of the Republican party, but I know from my association with him that he will be fair in his treatment, fair in his deliberations, and will render unbiased service to this House as Speaker, regardless of political affiliations, and it gives me a great deal of pleasure, as the ranking member of the legislature from the 46th district, to urge your support of William Crockett for Speaker.

Mr. Stray: As a new member it is perhaps not proper for me to say very much, but I know that is true of William Crockett. I know both men. I am pleased to know and understand that the other faction also endorse him. I understand only two factions here, that is the Democratic and the Republican, and as we are Republicans and both of these men are Republicans, as I know both of them, and am well acquainted with both of them, I will endorse William Crockett as a representative from Mountrail County, and ask you to support him if he is elected.

Mr. Cunningham: As a new member this session, and as a Democrat it gives me great pleasure to second the nomination of George Aljets. I think this Assembly has forgotten one thing. Mr. Aljets was chairman of the State Affairs Committee and carried the greatest load of any man during the past session. There was bill after bill brought into his committee, rereferred to his committee, there was a tremendous amount of work and Mr. Aljets carried that burden. I think with due respect to Mr. Aljets that he should be considered for Speaker, for which position I take great pleasure in seconding his nomination.

State of North Dakota-Supreme Court

Bismarck, North Dakota, January 9, 1935.

To the Honorable

The House of Representatives of the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota.

Gentlemen:

The Supreme Court begs to acknowledge the receipt of a copy of your Resolution of January 8, 1935, touching the litigation involving the right of Thomas H. Moodie to hold the office of Governor of the State of North Dakota. As a communication from a co-ordinate branch of the government the court has given it earnest consideration. I am authorized to say that the court appreciates the gravity and importance of this case and the desirability of its early determination. To that end the court has done, and is doing, everything possible to expedite its disposition.

This proceeding is by information in the nature of quo warranto. Ordinarily writs of quo warranto are not granted to try the title of an official to an office until the term has commenced and he has proceeded to act. But because of the necessity for a speedy determination of this case, with consent of counsel and under and by virtue of the declaratory judgment act, we took jurisdiction before the installation of Mr. Moodie in office.

The case involves a question of fact properly triable to a jury. Section 87 of the Constitution says "no jury trial shall be allowed in said supreme court." But the same section provides that "in proper cases questions of fact may be sent by said court to a district court for trial."

On January 2, at a hearing at which both parties were represented by counsel, this court announced and entered an order holding: "** that the issue involved is one to which the parties are of right entitled to a jury trial; that historically this is the general procedure and hence in a quo warranto proceeding in this Court an issue of fact should be referred to the District Court for trial unless the parties waive a trial by jury; that in this case because of the agreement of the parties the Court has the right to hear and determine the issue of fact itself; but a majority of the Court are of the opinion that orderly procedure requires otherwise and therefore this court will require the issue of fact in dispute to be submitted to a district court for trial."

Thereafter counsel in the case stipulated that it should be tried before Judge Buttz of the Second Judicial District. Accordingly an order was entered sending the case to the County of Ramsey for trial of the issue of fact. The court in that behalf ordered on January 7, that "The trial court is directed to proceed with the trial of the case as expeditiously as possible and upon the completion of the trial to forthwith certify to this court the verdict or findings as the case may be and a transcript of all proceedings had, including a transcript of the evidence."

You may rest assured that this court will do everything possible to secure an early orderly determination of the case.

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota:

WHEREAS, Rumors, charges and statements have been, and are being made and circulated to the effect that the Hon. Thomas H. Moodie and the Hon. Walter Welford were both born on foreign soil and are at present subjects of foreign governments—and that neither has complied with the Constitution and Laws of the United States relating to naturalization of citizens of foreign birth: And

WHEREAS: Such charges, if true, would, by virtue of constitutional provisions of this state, prevent their holding public office in North Dakota: And

WHEREAS: Public interests demands that such charges be disproved with the utmost speed, to the end that the public business of the state may be conducted in a legal and orderly manner:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: By the House of Representatives of the Twenty-fourth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, that such matter be brought to the attention of both parties named, and that they, and each of them be, and they are hereby, requested and required to file with the Clerk of this body due proof of their citizenship, and that such proof be filed forthwith, unless good reason be shown for failure to comply with this request.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That a copy of this resolution be served upon each of the parties named, and that due proof of such service be filed with the Clerk.

Mr. Godwin moved the resolution be printed in the Journal, and that it receive the immediate consideration of the House.

MESSAGE TO THE LEGISLATURE By

Ole H. Olson Acting Governor

Twenty-fourth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota 1935

MESSAGE

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

As outgoing Acting-Governor, it devolves upon me to appear before you to give you a short outline of the affairs of State at this time, together with a few recommendations that might be of assistance to you in enacting laws to promote the general welfare of the people of our State.

Four years ago the Legislature found it necessary to replace the old Capitol building destroyed by fire with a new structure which we are meeting in for the first time. We are all agreed that we have a structure which is a credit to the State, and it is being recognized as one of the most modern, practical, up-to-date architectural designs in the country. May this building be an inspiration and an ideal by which we can well be guided, even in the art of law making.

TAXES

Section 208 of our Constitution makes it the settled policy of the State to preserve to the families the homes they occupy. I believe it to be proper and necessary that we have a system of taxation based upon what is commonly known as the graduated land tax principle, that is, that certain exemptions be granted to owners of homes and farms in possession of and using their property as such and shifting some of this burden to those who hold for speculation more land than they can use. Furthermore, I believe that the only title to ownership of land belongs to the men and women who live on and till the soil.

THE DISTRIBUTION OF PUBLIC UTILITY TAX REVENUES

I recommend that the distribution of public utility taxes be so changed that tax revenues from such properties will be more equitably distributed to the various political subdivisions.

STATE CARE FOR INSANE, FEEBLE-MINDED AND TUBERCULAR

I believe that the State as a whole should assume all responsibility for the care of the insane, feeble-minded, and tubercular in state institutions in the same manner as the penitentiary is financed, and relieve the counties of this burden.

STATE SUPPORT OF LOCAL EDUCATION

It is the duty of the State to its citizens to see that they have equal opportunities to secure an education, regardless of location, and in the measure the state should assist financially those who are unable to give that required training. This applies particularly to rural schools.

THE OLD AGE INSURANCE OR PENSION SYSTEM

Realizing the necessity of security in old age, the 1933 Legislative Session enacted an old age pension law. The income which this law provided proved to be inadequate to take care of the 4,000 persons who have been approved as entitled to old age pensions. I urge your serious consideration in correcting this condition in order to make the law more effective.

STATE EMERGENCY RELIEF OF UNEMPLOYED

Because of the extraordinary critical situation brought on by the drought, the Federal Government has financed the relief of the needy people of our State. Because of the very grave situation, I would urge that we draw upon all of the resources of our State to protect our people—that even the issuance of bonds be considered to assist our people in carrying on.

STATE MILL AND ELEVATOR AT GRAND FORKS

Having been interested in the cooperative movement for the past quarter of a century, it was my pleasure, together with the other members of the Industrial Commission, upon assuming my duties as Chairman of the Industrial Commission, to recognize and turn over the grain marketing business of the Mill and Elevator to the agency established as the Farmers National Grain Corporation, which has rendered us a most valuable and efficient service.

The Mill and Elevator at Grand Forks was originally promoted for the purpose of demonstrating the high quality of North Dakota Hard Spring Wheat and supplying the State with its products made from this wheat at a reasonable cost. It was also hoped that the institution would

operate at a profit that would meet the operating expenses, and in addition set up a fund to eventually pay the construction costs of the plant.

I believe the people of the state have realized considerable benefits in reasonable flour prices and also in wheat prices, due to the operations of the Mill and Elevator during the past twelve years, but all our hopes for these benefits have not been fully realized. In my opinion, the greatest obstacle in the way of successful operation of the Mill and Elevator has been the influence of political turmoil the business has encountered from time to time. This obstacle, or disadvantage, was recognized in the earliest operations of the plan, and legislation was passed from time to time, with the view of correcting this condition.

At the outset, the Mill and Elevator was managed by the State Industrial Commission, organized as the State Mill and Elevator Association. To remove the institution from politics, the Mill and Elevator Law was amended, providing for the placing of the management of the Mill and Elevator in the hands of a Board of Managers, consisting of five members. This arrangement resulted only in adding five more politicians to the Mill and Elevator management.

To correct this condition, the next Legislature amended the Mill and Elevator Act by giving the Governor full and complete management of the State Mill and Elevator.

In 1931 the Law was again amended, providing that the management be placed in the hands of three persons to be appointed by the Governor.

The Mill and Elevator law was again amended by the Legislature of 1933, re-establishing the Mill and Elevator association, consisting of the State Industrial Commission, which leaves the management in the same position as the original law under which the plant was built and started operations. In other words, we have made the rounds of all these plans to take the Mill out of politics and now we are back where we started.

I have come to the conclusion that the Mill and Elevator is in politics only as far as it is put in by its management in charge. I believe that we should benefit from our past experiences gained from the changes and leave the Mill and Elevator management in the hands of the Industrial Commission as originally planned. The Mill and Elevator will be in politics to the extent it is put in, and responsibility can then be centered in the Commission of elected officials.

When I became a member of the Industrial Commission, one of the first moves made was to reduce the amount of wheat required at the Mill in exchange for a barrel of our Dakota Maid Flour from seven to six bushels, in this way saving farmers a bushel of wheat for each barrel of flour they consume. About 27,000 barrels of flour have been exchanged for wheat by the State Mill since this rule was put into effect about August 1. This meant a saving during

this time of about \$27,000 to the people who dealt with the State Mill. The other flour mills of the State generally followed suit, which means that several times this amount was saved by all the farmers of the State. The price of flour sold for cash in the State has been kept down to a reasonable margin of profit during this time.

The compilation of the financial results of the operation of the Mill for the month of December, 1934, has not been completed and is not available at this time. The statement of affairs as compiled by the Mill Accountant and presented to the Industrial Commission for the period from August 1 to November 30, 1934, shows an operating profit for the period of \$88,854.99, or about \$22,000.00 per month. This is the profit before taking into account charges for depreciation and bond interest. The previous period of the year, January 1 to July 31, 1934, as compiled by the State Board of Auditors, shows an operating loss of \$16,519.39 before considering bond interest and depreciation.

The report from the Mill shows 240,314 barrels of flour manufactured during the four months from August 1 through November 30, 1934, or an average of over 60,000 barrels per month, which is one of the best showings in the history of the Mill. We have made considerable progress toward the use of the Mill and Elevator for service to our people and not for profit and despite expectations by some, have found this to be the best financial policy as well.

This was done with the high quality of our Pure Northern Spring Wheat flour as the only sales argument, which leads me to continue believing that the results of the operations of the State Mill and Elevator could be made to fulfill all our expectations if it is operated on a sound service and business basis and kept out of factional politics.

The employment of a competent and qualified manager, free from political influence and with a free hand of business policies, is the most important factor in the successful operation of the Mill.

BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA

The Bank of North Dakota has been conducted with a view to efficient and profitable administration. An operating profit of approximately \$300,000 was made during the current year.

The Industrial Commission ordered the payment of \$4,000, 000 of North Dakota bonds not yet due, which made a total payment and cancellation of \$5,000,000.

The experience of the Bank of North Dakota in collecting interest on farm loans clearly indicates that funds for interest must be obtained from other sources. The past year \$1,100,000 was transferred from the Motor Vehicle Registration Fund. Unless another source of income is found for the Real Estate Interest Fund, it might be well to renew the law again, transferring a part of the Motor Vehicle Registration fees.

This institution has been of immeasurable service to the people of our State.

BUDGETS

I urge your serious consideration of the budgets as submitted by the Budget Board. Of course, we realize that it is necessary to keep expenses down as much as possible, but we must not go so far as to cripple the successful operations of the state departments. The Budget Board has tried as near as possible to keep within the limits recommended by the last Legislature, and I believe the vetoing of items passed by the Legislature was a serious mistake and not in line with good business policy.

GOVERNOR'S OFFICE

On July 20, 1934, when the affairs of that office came into my hands, I found that the appropriation supposed to last until July 1, 1935, was practically exhausted. In order to secure the assistance needed to carry on the efficient work of the office, I appointed C. Liebert Crum as Grain Storage Commissioner, and as the duties of that position are now light, he loyally and ably devoted practically all of his time to problems of the moratorium and other legal business concerning the Governor's office, and in cooperation with others in the office whose loyalty and assistance I value highly, relieved me of the burden of many troublesome and important matters. I estimate that something over 3,000 cases involving the moratorium have been handled during the past six months.

In general, I may say that the many serious problems that today confront our people cause them to apply more and more to the governor's office for guidance, assistance, and advice, and unless this demand is to be ignored, or lessens, provisions must be made for an increased staff of more than ordinary training and ability for that office.

GENERAL POLITICAL CONDITIONS

I believe we all admit that for some time in North Dakota we have experienced a hectic and unsettled political situation. There have been charges and counter-changes, great surges of human passion have swept over the prairie, and have found bitter expression. We face the New Year for which I have great hope. Let us not be discouraged. Let us remember that such situations have occurred before. Let us not, however, forget the lessons we have learned. These United States themselves were founded amid turmoil and in its infancy the Father of our Country, George Washington, our first President, discussed a similar situation in the following words. I quote from his farewell address, delivered in 1796.

"The alternate domination of one faction over another, sharpened by the spirit of revenge natural to party dispension, which in different ages and countries has perpetrated the most horrid enormities, is itself a frightful despotism.

But this leads at length to a more formal and permanent despotism. The disorders and miseries which result gradually incline the minds of men to seek security and repose in the absolute power of an individual; and sooner or later, the chief of some prevailing faction, more able or more fortunate than his competitors, turns this disposition to the purposes of his own elevation, on the ruins of public liberty.

"It serves always to distract the public councils and enfeeble the public administration. It agitates the community with ill-founded jealousies and false alarms, kindles animosity of one part against another, foments occasional riot and insurrection. It opens the doors to foreign influence and corruption."

I sincerely feel that the warning and advice uttered by the father of our country nearly 139 years ago as the essence of an unselfish wisdom distilled from long experience in public life have been confirmed over and over again and that one must be unworthy indeed to refuse to profit by our recent demonstrations of the soundness of such remarks.

MORATORIUM

I earnestly recommend that serious consideration be given to the question of the moratorium by the Legislature that we may have a legal moratorium and thus take this responsibility off of the shoulders of the Chief Executive.

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP

I feel that the trend of our national government is and should be toward an extension of the practice of public ownership, of public utilities, and I believe that the state should encourage, in a practical way, municipal ownership and operation of public utilities, and that cooperative groups of farmers should be assisted to set up a system of storage, distribution, and marketing of their products.

CONCLUSION

Too long have we had a tendency to classify all suggested solutions of our economic and social problems by labeling them socialism, capitalism, or some other "ism." Such tactics have in the past taken the place of thinking and have retarded progress. I trust that this legislature will face its problems free from such prejudice and as free as possible from party prejudices and examine each issue presented in the manner of one sincerely working for the common good.

In closing, may I thank the officers and employees of the State for the courtesy and consideration that has been shown me. To the gentleman who succeeds me, I sincerely extend my best wishes and may he bring the people of North Dakota peace, progress, prosperity, and rain.

In retiring from the responsibilities which circumstances thrust unexpectedly upon me, I feel that despite my personal shortcomings, I have honestly done my duty as it

came to me. I have tried to be unafraid and sincere, and I now leave you with my conscience clear and without regrets and may God guide you in shaping the destinies of the State toward better things and times.

MESSAGE

To the Members of the Twenty-fourth Legislative Assembly:

I have the honor to submit to you, in accordance with constitutional provisions, a message as the incoming Governor of the State of North Dakota.

May I assure you at the outset of an honest and sincere desire to cooperate with the members of this legislature, which meets at a time when it must face and intelligently dispose of many grave problems touching the welfare of North Dakota.

May we together approach these problems, not in the spirit of political opponents, but as servants of the state elected by the people and charged with great responsibility.

In that spirit may we recognize and manfully face the fact that 250,000 of our people, or more, in approximately 50,000 families, at this time are upon federal relief rolls. May we recognize that these are times of social and economic crises, not only in North Dakota, but throughout the nation, which demand the most unselfish service, the most kindly consideration of the plight of the unfortunate, the keenest and closest analysis, and vision and planning which will fit the needs of the times and the condition in which approximately one-third of the people of North Dakota find themselves.

May we hope that as we honestly and resourcefully face this great human problem we shall have the support and cooperation of all the people and that splendid spirit they have ever demonstrated. May we be guided by the principle that the welfare of the people must be the first concern of the state. Upon the honor and integrity of the individual, and upon his individual resourcefulness, much depends at this time in North Dakota.

The relief situation in North Dakota is largely the result of forces which the people cannot control, such as continued drouth, crop failure, low prices for agricultural products, to gether with unemployment, which finds upon our registered unemployed lists more than 30,000 people in the state's towns and cities.

The results of these conditions are pitiful in the extreme. They are a challenge to co-operation which should submerge all merely partisan considerations and invoke not only sympathy but constructive action, since the social and moral consequences of these conditions are clearly evident all about us.

May the same splendid spirit which has sustained the people through continuing years of crises inspire the officers of the state to the highest sense of duty, to a realization that political situations should never rank above human considerations, and that as North Dakotans we must resolutely go forward to better days and to the honest and constructive solution of the many vexed matters with which we are now confronted.

I am confident we shall have this co-operation, and for my part I cheerfully pledge it to the members of this legislature and to the people of the state.

North Dakota is an agricultural state with a fixed destiny. Basic to the prosperity of every interest in this state is the interest and the welfare of the North Dakota farmer. May this fact always be borne in mind in the shaping and passage of economic legislation by our legislature. I stand firmly for the co-operation of the state in assisting farm co-operatives, in disseminating education which will make available to our people the tremendous recent results of scientific re-

search. So far as it is within the province of the state to do so, it should continue to take an active interest in the farmers' marketing problem, and to support very well-considered measure which will safeguard his interests in the field of marketing.

There has recently been created under federal supervision, and is now functioning, a state planning board. It is directing study to intelligent and co-ordinated plans for the fullest development of all the state's resources. It is my understanding that it will give special attention to a land use program which I am convinced is the place of beginning for the solution of many of our agricultural problems. May I hope for the fullest co-operation from the legislature for this body and its work.

In addition to the land use program it will give special attention, I am informed, to the subject of water conservation which has become of outstanding interest in North Dakota. The planning board will also take up many others matters within its legitimate field.

The theory under which it is organized and work which it is undertaking follows like action in other states which has already had splendidly constructive results.

From my limited opportunity to become familiar with the financial situation of the state I am convinced that the most important matter which will come before this legislature is consideration of our taxation problem.

It is my belief that the system of taxation under which we are operating no longer fits the times nor the needs of the state of North Dakota.

Evidence that our present taxation system has broken down is plentiful in the figures covering delinquent taxation, in foreclosures under which our people have lost their homes or their property, in the plight of the state educational system, and in the abuses which have grown up as a result of these conditions. The state must continue to function; it must continue to pay its bills; it must continue to support an adequate educational system; it must discharge its duties to the aged and indigent; it must continue to care for those who, because of mental affliction or physical limitation, are unable to take care of themselves.

It is most evident that many appealing plans for social betterment already under way in other states must await better times and more ability on the part of the people to support them than is now evident in North Dakota.

I believe consideration of the taxation problem is a matter which should be gotten under way, at the earliest possible moment, by the committees on taxation of the House and the Senate, to the end that as soon as possible the legislature may have available for debate and consideration a revised system of taxation which will meet the vexed conditions with which we are confronted in this field today.

It is also most evident that there must be the most rigid economy in the conduct of all the departments of the state. We have too often in the past promised economy without effecting it. There is a distinct and emphatic challenge in present conditions to make economy in the administration of state affairs a reality rather than a campaign promise or a party shibboleth.

To this end it is possible that the interests of the state may be well served by a survey of all its departments made by competent authorities to the end that duplications be avoided, that a consolidation of duties be effected within departments and that systems of operation be developed which will reduce operating expenses to a minimum which will still insure the utmost efficiency.

I hope this session of the state's legislature will again go on record in support of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Waterway, and also for a resurvey of the Missouri River Diversion project which I am convinced has been dismissed without the consideration it merits from the federal government at a time when it is most apparent, because of unemployment and general conditions, that large unit water conservation projects of practical utility are most necessary in the new national economy.

The harassing experiences of the past few years have caused grave concern among our people concerning their homes. I am continuing the moratorium of Governor Ole Olson during the preesnt emergency conditions, since I believe that it is of paramount importance that our people shall be assured they shall not lose their homes at a time when they are handicapped by drouth, low prices for agricultural products, the pitiful results of unemployment and other factors which enter into the distress situation of these times. I am opposed to and shall oppose moratorium by executive order except in cases of the gravest emergency. I shall favor and advocate a moratorium law which will protect our homeowners, our businessmen who are suffering the reaction of general farm conditions, and all honest interests which now find themselves in financial difficulties which are the result of an emergency situation. I hope for the passage of a moratorium law embodying the feature of judicial determination which will meet the needs now so clearly in evidence in the field it is designed to cover.

I am unalterably opposed to the practice which has grown up within our state of collecting campaign funds from either state of federal employees on a percentage of salary basis. It is my belief that this system has resulted in much corruption, in rewards for inefficiency, in vitiated morale among state employees, and in a train of evils that should give all friends of clean and honest government the greatest concern. I favor civil service for all state employees in classifications to be determined in accordance with the civil service system as it has been successfully demonstrated in other states.

The need for economy in conducting the affairs of the state is so evident that I hope the legislature may find time and

opportunity to consider the advisability of adopting certain measures to effect it. May I suggest as worthy of consideration to the end of effecting economies:

- 1. The abolition of the preferential presidential primary.
- 2. The election of state officers for terms of six years, no officer to be eligible for re-election after having served a six years' term.
- 3. Investigation of the economies which may be effected by the abolition of minor political subdivisions, which have not the ability to meet current tax levies; consolidation of counties and school districts.
 - 4. Consideration for the unicameral legislative system.

I do not deem it a duty of an incoming governor to discuss in detail the affairs of state departments. These are before the legislature in reports of state officers with much fidelity to detail. I commend them to the careful investigation of the members of the house and senate.

I conclusion may I reaffirm a pledge that I will co-operate in every way possible along sound and constructive lines to make the present session of the legislature constructive and effective in dealing with all the problems of the state.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RULES

Mr. Speaker: Your House Committee on Rules makes the following unanimous report:

We recommend that the House Rules in force, as printed, in the 23rd Legislative Assembly, be adopted as the permanent rules of the House for the 24th Legislative Assembly, with the following changes:

I.

That rule five be amended to read as follows:

"5. The Speaker shall vote on all questions taken by ayes and nays (except on appeals from the Speaker's decision) and in all elections or decisions called for by any member."

II.

That rule seven thereof be amended to read as follows:

"7. Every member, previous to his speaking, shall rise from his seat and respectfully address the Speaker as such, and remain standing in his place before proceeding to speak, until he is recognized by the chair."

III.

That rule 17 be amended to read as follows:

"17. Petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the House shall be presented by the Speaker or by a member in the Speaker's place."

IV.

That rule 26 be amended to read as follows:

"26. Every bill, memorial, order or resolution, requiring the approval of the Governor, or a change in the Constitution of the State of North Dakota, shall, after first reading, be referred to its proper committee, and if reported without amendment, shall pass to its second reading, unless otherwise ordered, and when amended it shall go to the committee of the Whole House."

My dear Mr. Burke:

I have your letter of January 11th, asking for an opinion upon the following questions: (1) In what manner, if at all, can the pending court proceedings attacking the qualifications of Thomas H. Moodie to hold the office of Governor

of the State affect the official acts of the Legislative Assembly?; (2) Does the presumptive uncertainty which may be said to exist as to Mr. Moodie's future status in any way affect the legality of his acts as Governor of this State? I shall answer your second question first.

At the election in the State on November 6, 1934, Thomas H. Moodie received the highest vote cast for Governor. Thereafter in due course the State Canvassing Board met and canvassed the vote and thereupon issued to Thomas H. Moodie a certificate of election to the office of Governor, he having received the highest vote cast for that office. Thereafter Mr. Moodie filed his Oath of Office in the office of the Secretary of State and on January 7, 1935, entered upon the discharge of his duties as such.

An action is now pending in the Supreme Court in which Mr. Moodie's right to hold the office of Governor is challenged on the grounds that he is not eligible under Section 73 of the Constitution.

Mr. Moodie having received his certificate of election, filed his Oath of Office, and entered upon the discharge of the duties of said office has a prima facie right to the office and in any event is an officer de facto. The general rule of law is that a person will be held to be a de facto officer when he has possession, and is exercising the duties of the office or when he has at least a fair color or right or title to the office or has acted as an officer for such a length of time as to afford a presumption of appointment or election. 46 C. J. 1053. See also 22 Ruling Case Law p. 588.

The law is also that the acts of a de facto officer are to be upheld as valid so far as they involve the interests of the public and of third persons, or until his title to the office is adjudged insufficient. The practical effect of the rule is that there is no difference between the acts of a de facto and a de jure officer so far as the public and third persons are concerned. Third persons have the right to assume that officials apparently qualified and in office are legally such, even though a contest is pending.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that any official act performed by Mr. Moodie as Governor during the pendency of the action referred to is legal and valid notwithstanding a subsequent decision that he is disqualified.

The same reasoning applies to your first question and it follows logically that the pending court action cannot in any way affect the official acts of the legislative assembly. See Chandler vs. Starling et al, 19 N. D. 144. State of North Dakota ex rel William Langer vs. McDonald, 41 N. D. 389.

# State of North Dakota OFFICE OF ATTORNEY GENERAL

Dear Mr. Tunell:

Replying to your letter of the 22nd inst. relative to salaries of officers and employees of the Senate.

Section 34 C. L. enumerates the officers and employees of the Senate and of the House of Representatives and fixes the compensation which each one of the officers named shall receive for their services. This law has not been amended since 1907 and fixes the maximum salary which each of those officers may receive, and no branch of the legislative assembly may legally increase the salary of any of those officers without the concurrence of the other branch of the assembly through legislative enactment properly adopted.

"A legislative enactment expressing the legislative power of the legislative assembly pursuant to express constitutional provisions concerning the employees of each house and its expenses is paramount to the independent action of each house without the concurrence of the other." State ex rel Wattam vs. Poindexter, 48 N. Dak. 135, 183 N. W. 852.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that neither the House nor the Senate can by separate action order the payment of any salary to any of the officers named in Section 34 C. L. higher than that provided by that law, without amending by proper legislative action the section cited, and until the section cited is amended no branch of the legislative assembly may by separate action order the payment of any salary to those officers higher than the ones therein provided.

# Affidavit of Mrs. Samuel A. McElmurry of Brookings, S. D.

My name is Mrs. Samuel A. McElmurry and I am and have been for 54 years last past a resident and citizen of Brookings County, South Dakota, having homesteaded on land approximately three miles north and two miles east of the city of Brookings in 1879.

Thomas Hilliard Moodie is my son, having been born in Ontario in 1878.

After the death of his father, my son, Thomas Hilliard Moodie went to live with his grandparents. Upon my marriage to Mr. McElmurry, I came with him to South Dakota and have lived here continuously ever since.

I make this formal statement that there may be no question as to my own citizenship or that of my son, Thomas Hilliard Moodie.

The United States of America To All to whom these presents shall come, greeting: Homestead Certificate No. 901 Application 10,154.

Whereas, there has been deposited in the general land office of the United States a certificate of the register of the land office at Watertown, Dakota Territory, whereby it appears that, pursuant to the act of congress approved 20th May, 1862, "To secure homesteads to actual settlers on the public domain" and the acts supplemental thereto, the claim of Samuel A. McElmurry has been established and duly consummated in conformity to law for the southwest quarter of section ten in township 110 north of range 49 west of the fifth principal meridian in Dakota territory, containing 160 acres, according to the official plat of the survey of the said land returned to the general land office by the surveyor general.

Now, know ye, that there is, therefore granted by the United States unto the said Samuel A. McElmurry the tract of land above described, to have and to hold the said tract of land with the appurtenances thereof, unto the said Samuel A. McElmurry and to his heirs and assigns forever; subject to any vested and accrued water rights for mining, agricultural, manufacturing or other purposes, and rights to ditches and reservoirs used in connection with such water rights, as may be recognized and acknowledged by the local customs, laws and decisions of the courts, and also subject to the right of a proprietor of a vein or lode to extract and remove his ore therefrom, should the same be found to penetrate or intersect the premises hereby granted, as provided by law.

In testimony whereof I, Chester A. Arthur, president of the United States of America, have caused these letters to be made patent and the seal of the general land office to be hereunto affixed. Given under my hand at the city of Washington, the fourteenth day of June in the year of our Lord 1884 and of the Independent of the United States the one, hundred and eighth.

Kidder, PRESIDING JUDGE OF THE DISTRICT COURT in and for the COUNTY OF BROOKINGS, FOURTH JUDICIAL DISTRICT Territory aforesaid, Samuel A. McElmurrey an alien born, above the age of twenty-one years, and applied in open court to be admitted to become a naturalized citizen of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, pursuant to the several acts of Congress heretofore passed on that subject. And the said Samuel A. McElmurrey having thereupon produced to the Court record testimony showing that he had heretofore reported himself and filed his declaration of his intention to become a citizen of the United States, according to the provisions of several said acts of Congress, and the Court being satisfied, as well from the oath of the said Samuel A. McElmurrey as from the testimony of V. W. Norton and J. O. Walker who are known to be citizens of the United States; that the said Samuel A. McElmurrey has resided within the limits and under the jurisdiction of the

UNITED STATES, for at least five years last past, and at least one year last past in the TERRITORY OF DAKOTA, and during the whole of that time he has behaved himself as a man of good moral character, attached to the principles contained in the Constitution of the UNITED STATES, and well disposed to the good order, well being and happiness of the same; and two years and upward have elapsed since the said Samuel A. McElmurrey reported himself, and filed his DECLARATION OF INTENTION as aforesaid.

IT WAS ORDERED, That the said Samuel A. McElmurrey be permitted to take the oath to support the CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES, and the usual oath whereby he renounces allegiance and fidelity to every Foreign Prince, Potentate, State or Sovereignty whatever and more particularly to Victoria Queen of Great Britain whereof he was heretofore a subject which said oath having been administered to the said Samuel A. McElmurrey by the Clerk of said Court, it was ordered by the Court that the said Samuel A. McElmurrey be admitted to all and singular the rights, privileges and immunities of a NATURALIZED CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES and that the same be certified by the Clerk of this Court, under the seal of said Court which is done accordingly.

Rep. E. J. Marks, Bismarck, North Dakota. Dear Sir:

I herewith send you a letter concerning the Feed Relief proposition in Burke County.

I will not write about my neighbors, I only give you an account of my own true experience, which happened here on my own farm.

We had (12) twelve head of cattle, four (4) hogs, (4) four head of horses and 80 poultry. We have been asking feed for this stock, and have been refused feed relief every time.

I have written about this to E. A. Willson of Bismarck, but no results, so at this time there are only (10) ten head of cattle, (2) two head of horses, (1) one hog and 16 poultry.

All this stock is deliberately being starved to death or in other words absolutely being murdered by this clique of chiselers in Bowbells by refusing to give me a feed loan. This stock is starving from lack of feed, while there is half million tons of feed standing on the track in Powers Lake.

I hope you will use this letter in a place where it will do some good to others as well as myself, as my stock is in such a poor condition, that if they do not get immediate feed, it perhaps will be of no use.

I am writing to you because I have tried every imaginable way to obtain feed, but have been unsuccessful, and I am sure you can be of help. I hope you will defend the constitution of the State of North Dakota with your life.

WHEREAS, The Twenty-third Legislative Assembly of North Dakota found it necessary to make severely drastic reductions in the salary appropriations for the employees of our state institutions, because of existing economic conditions and consequent limited revenues of the state; and

WHEREAS, It was generally agreed that such extreme limitations in salary allowances were to be considered as only temporary, during the severity of our financial depression, and that adequate remuneration should be provided for these public servants whenever improved conditions would make it feasible to do so.

BE IT RESOLVED: 1. That we express to the highly trained professional employees and all classes of workers in these institutions our sense of appreciation for the useful services that they are rendering to our state in the present emegency; and we hereby renew this expression of hope that, with economic improvement on the part of our people and the adoption of more equitable ways of raising revenues, the state may provide more adequate and proper compensation for their services.

2. That any amounts that may be appropriated by the Twenty-fourth Legislative Assembly for salary adjustments are intended to provide the needed funds to pay salaries of additional employees required at some institutions by reason of increased enrollments or population, and to increase the salaries of the employees who may be enduring the most hardship by reason of the present low scale of salaries. In alloting such salary increases, none should be considered who are now receiving fifteen hundred dollars a year or over.

2. Commencing with the word "and" in line 32 strike out the balance of the line and strike out the semi-colon after the word "results" and place in lieu thereof a period. Also strike out the word "results" in line 33.

All fees collected by the Commission under the provisions of this act necessary in administering and enforcing this act, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby appropriated to the use of said Cmmissioners and shall be paid into the State Treasury monthly and shall be credited to the said "Livestock Weighing and Grading Fund" to the use of the Commission and shall be paid out upon proper voucher and audit by the State Auditing Board for the expenses of said Commission in administering and enforcing the provisions of this Act; it being the intention of this Act to relieve the General Fund of the State from any and all cost in connection with the administration of the provisions hereof; provided, however, that there is appropriated out of the

#### CONSERVATION OF WATER

The House of Representatives, 24th Legislative Assembly, Bismarck, North Dakota.

#### Gentlemen:

Water being of great importance to the welfare of our State, and having become very scarce during the last few years, it is imperative that this problem be given some thought and consideration to the end that "Conservation of Water" may be made compulsory in certain instances.

The Government is spending thousands of dollars in building dams throughout the State of North Dakota to conserve water. While on the other hand the Townships, Counties and the State are spending a like amount or more annually in building bridges to let water pass on unhindered and unobstructed. This water more precious than gold "is helped" on and on, to the Gulf of Mexico where it is not needed

Why not keep some of this water that falls on our land where it will do that land some good. Why not build our bridges wherever feasible to do so, in such a way that part of this water will be held back and not lost. A bridge serving two purposes to the common good of all the people. A bridge for traffic to cross over on, and to act as a dam. It can be done. And it would cost but very little more than a bridge alone would cost. It would tend to hold back or check floods, and it would create a body of water from a dry gulch, or a small lake from a dry creek bed. What a difference this would make in a semi-arid region. If there was a dam at every bridge, there would still be an abundance of water throughout the state, even after a dry summer as we had this last year.

The western half of our State is covered with thousands of so-called "dry creeks," creeks that run bank full of water after a heavy rain, but are dry within forty-eight hours thereafter. This water is lost forever. What better way would there be to hold it back than by constructing the bridges on such creeks to serve also as a dam, not only on these dry creeks, but the hundreds of creeks throughout the State of North Dakota that has water in them the year around. What a splendid accomplishment for the State if some law could

be drafted and passed, whereby every new bridge would be constructed as a dam, with a spillway to take care of the surplus water. In time this would mean thousands of reservoirs for storing water, which never again would be scarce.

# BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

Section 1. FUND LEVIED. HOW. There shall be levied and collected in each year, beginning with the year 1935, an annual tax of six-one-hundredths of a mill for each taxable dollar of the total equalized assessed valuation of all taxable property in the State of North Dakota as of the preceding year, for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Pension Fund for the blind, the proceeds of which levy shall be set apart in a separate fund for the payment of relief to the Blind, and nearly Blind persons, as hereinafter provided; such tax shall be collected in the same manner as is now provided, for the collection of other taxes, and when so collected shall be paid into the State Treasury, to the credit of the Pension Fund for the Blind. The fund shall be cumulative and any surplus remaining after each year shall be available for disbursement, according to this law for each succeeding year. If the amount

produced by the levy herein shall not be sufficient to pay the full amount of all claims allowed and authorized to be paid under this Act the said amount shall be divided proportionately among the various claimants.

- Section 2. PENSION ALLOWED TO WHOM. An allowance from said pension fund shall not exceed the sum of \$25.00 per month for any one month and said amount shall be paid to the following persons who must be citizens of the United States and have resided in the State of North Dakota for five years immediately preceeding such application and shall have reached the age of 16 years.
  - 1. The blind who are without adequate means of support.
- 2. The nearly blind, who because of said conditions are unable to earn a livelihood.

No one shall receive a pension hereinunder during the time he or she is an inmate of any State Charitable Institution or is receiving help by way of pension or otherwise from the United States government, the State of North Dakota or any of its subdivisions. Provided, however, that the County Commissioners may supplement out of said pension fund, any allowance so received from the United States government, the State of North Dakota, or any of its municipal subdivisions for any of the persons qualified hereinunder so that the same does not, added together, total more than \$25.00 per month.

Section 3. APPLICATION FOR PENSION, HOW MADE. Each person claiming to be entitled to a pension under this Act, shall, in the manner and form prescribed by the State Board of Administration, file a claim therefor with the Board of County Commissioners of the County of the residence of the claimant, which claim shall be verified by oath of affirmation of the claimant to the effect that the contents of his or her claim is true, in every material particular, and the same shall be supported by the affidavit of the County Health Physician of said county to the effect, among other things, that the applicant, in his judgment, is blind or has only slight vision, and cannot earn a livelihood because of said affliction. The Board of County Commissioners shall immediately set a date of hearing, at which time the claimant shall appear in support of his or her claim for such pension and the same shall be allowed or rejected by said Board as permitted by this law. If same is allowed, the pension shall be paid by the State Treasurer out of the State Pension Fund as hereinmentioned upon order of the chairman of the Board of County Commissioners of said county. In case such blind person, subsequent to the granting of such pension regains his or her eyesight such pension shall cease. The Board of County Commissioners of each county are hereby given authority, and it shall be their duty, from time to time, to investigate any violations of the provisions of

Mr. Speaker: The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 122. A Bill for an Act to Provide for Pensions for the Blind, Creating a Pension Fund, Providing for the Levy of Annual Tax, Prescribing Persons to be Pensioned, and Penalties for the Violation Thereof.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Strike out everything after the words "A Bill" and insert in lieu thereof the following:

House Bill No. 122. A Bill for an Act to Provide for Pensions for the Blind, Creating a Pension Fund, Therefor, Providing for the Levy of an Annual Tax, Prescribing Persons to Be Pensioned.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. FUND LEVIED. HOW. There shall be levied and collected in each year, beginning with the year 1935, an annual tax of six-one-hundredths of a mill for each taxable dollar of the total equalized assessed valuation of all taxable property in the State of North Dakota as of the preceding year, for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Pension Fund for the blind, the proceeds of which levy shall be set apart in a separate fund for the payment of relief to the Blind, and nearly Blind persons, as hereinafter provided; such tax shall be collected in the same manner as is now provided, for the collection of other taxes, and when so collected shall be paid into the State Treasury, to the credit of the Pension Fund for the Blind. The fund shall be cumulative and any surplus remaining after each year shall be available for disbursement, according to this law for each succeeding year. If the amount produced by the levy herein shall not be sufficient to pay the full amount of all claims allowed and authorized to be paid under this Act the said amount shall be divided proportionately among the various claimants.

Section 2. PENSION ALLOWED TO WHOM. An allowance from said pension fund shall not exceed the sum of \$25.00 per month for any one month and said amount shall be paid to the following persons who must be citizens of the United States and have resided in the State of North Dakota for five years immediately preceding such application and shall have reached the age of 16 years.

- 1. The blind who are without adequate means of support.
- 2. The nearly blind, who because of said conditions are unable to earn a livelihood.

No one shall receive a pension hereinunder during the time he or she is an inmate of any State Charitable Institution or is receiving help by way of pension or otherwise from the United States government, the State of North Dakota or any of its subdivisions. Provided, however, that the County Commissioners may supplement out of said pension fund, any allowance so received from the United States government, the State of North Dakota, or any of

its municipal subdivisions for any of the persons qualified hereinunder so that the same does not, added together, total more than \$25.00 per month.

Section 3. APPLICATION FOR PENSION, HOW MADE. Each person claiming to be entitled to a pension under this Act, shall, in the manner and form prescribed by the State Board of Administration, file a claim therefor with the Board of County Commissioners of the County of the residence of the claimant, which claim shall be verified by oath of affirmation of the claimant to the effect that the contents of his or her claim is true, in every material particular, and the same shall be supported by the affidavit of the County Health Physician of said county to the effect, among other things, that the applicant, in his judgment, is blind or has only slight vision, and cannot earn a livelihood because of said affliction. The Board of County Commissioners shall immediately set a date of hearing, at which time the claimant shall appear in support of his or her claim for such pension and the same shall be allowed or rejected by said Board as permitted by this law. If same is allowed, the pension shall be paid by the State Treasurer out of the State Pension Fund as herein mentioned upon order of the chairman of the Board of County Commissioners of said county. In case such blind person, subsequent to the granting of such pension regains his or her eyesight such pension shall cease. The Board of County Commissioners of each county are hereby given authority, and it shall be their duty, from time to time, to investigate any violations of the provisions of this Act.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In line 6 of the printed bill, after the word "schools," strike out the word "and" and insert in lieu therof the word "any."

In line 7 of the printed bill after the word "state," strike out the comma and insert in lieu thereof a period.

At the end of line 7 beginning with the word "provided," strike out line 8 and all lines to and including line 21 of the printed bill.

In line 22 strike out the words "lignite coal" and insert in lieu thereof the word "fuel."

At the conclusion of the bill insert the following clause: "(Emergency. This act is declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in effect from and after its passage and approval."

And the further amendment:

Strike out that portion of the Standing Committee amendment which reads "At the end of line 7 beginning with the word "provided" strike out line 8 and all lines to and including line 21 of the printed bill.

In line 16 strike out the words "does not" and insert the words "is less."

In line 17 strike out the word "exceed" and insert in lieu thereof the word "than."

In line 18 strike out the word "within."

In line 21 strike out the third and fourth words "lignite coal" and insert in lieu thereof the words "native fuel."

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Section 1. That all unpaid personal property taxes in the various counties of the State of North Dakota assessed during the year 1931, and all years prior thereto, may be cancelled upon payment of the following amounts, to-wit:

For the year 1930 and years prior thereto upon payment of 40% of the original tax, all interest, penalty and costs for said years to be discharged and considered paid.

For the year 1931 upon payment of 50% of the original tax, all interest, penalty and costs to be discharged and considered paid for said year.

The various county auditors and county treasurers are hereby directed to carry out the provisions of this Act by making the necessary changes upon the records in their offices. Section 2. EMERGENCY.) Whereas, a large amount of personal property sorely needed for the support of the owners and their families is in danger of being lost by reason of inability to pay said delinquent personal property taxes, this act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and the same shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval."

Mr. Clarke: I wish at this time to explain my vote and have my explanation recorded in the Journal. In spite of the fact I have been threatened in this House by a prominent member if I voted "no" my Normal School, of which I am a graduate, will be closed, in spite of that I vote "no." I won't trade on anything. My vote is not for sale, now or at any other time. I vote "no."

Mr. Erickson of McKenzie: I wish my remarks recorded I vote "no" for the reason that when I came down here I held up my hand to do certain things; and I believe if I voted otherwise it would be breaking my oath of office. Therefore I vote "no."

Mr. Halverson: I vote "aye" for the purpose of re-consideration.

Mr. Oglesby: I vote "no" for the reason that I have every respect for our high courts. They found this man guilty; and I don't think we should come here in defiance of our Supreme Court and put him back in again. I vote "no."

Mr. Traynor: I vote "no" on this bill, because regardless of whether Governor Olson's order rescinding the call for a special session was valid or not, there never was a special session because the Senate never organized and never had a quorum. A quorum in the House of Representatives does not constitute a Legislative Assembly.

Mr. Twichell: I vote "no," for the reasons that while a special session of the Legislature was legally called by de facto Governor Langer, it was legally cancelled by Acting Governor Olson; that no special session of the Legislature was ever legally convened, the Senate not having legally convened; and that the House alone could not legally sit as a Legislature as a Court of Impeachment.

### GENERAL ORDERS

Mr. Solberg moved that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of general orders.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

Section 1. APPOINTMENT OF PROCUREMENT OF-FICER.) The Governor is hereby authorized and directed to appoint an employee of the State Historical Society of the State of North Dakota as Procurement Officer to perform such duties as may be required of him under the rules and regulations of the Act of Congress known as the Emergency Conservation Work Act for such term as the services of said officer may be required and needed under said Act of Congress. Said Procurement Officer shall be removable at the pleasure of the Governor. The said Procurement Officer may also appoint an Assistant who shall under his direction and during his pleasure, perform such duties as may be required by said Procurement Officer and who shall be known as Assistant Procurement Officer, and may also be an employee of the State Historical Society of the State of North Da-kota. The salary herein provided shall be paid said Procurement Officer and his Assistant in addition to any other salary or compensation which either of them may otherwise receive for his services as an employee of the said State Historical Society.

Section 2. SALARY. APPROPRIATION.) The said Procurement Officer shall receive a salary not exceeding Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per month, and his said assistant a salary not exceeding Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) per month, and there is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$1,800.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary therefor, out of which appropriation the salary of said Procurement Officer and Assistant Procurement Officer shall be paid in the same manner that salaries of State officers are paid, the said appropriation to remain in froce for the period extending from the effective date of this act to the 30th day of June, 1937.

Section 3. REPEAL.) All Acts or parts of Acts in Conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. EMERGENCY.) The establishment by the Federal Government of CCC camps through the State under the provisions of the Act of Congress known as the Emergency Conservation Work Act having proven to be most beneficial to this State, and their continuance being to a large extent dependent upon the immediate appointment of a Procurement Officer as herein provided, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, and shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendment as follows:

Amendments made on Senate amendments as printed in Senate Journal, page 8, January 30th.

Page 8, amendments to title of bill, after the word "officer" and before the word "as."

Line 4, insert the following "for State Park Emergency Conservation work."

A Bill for an Act Providing for the Protection of the Public Health and Prevention of Fraud and Deception by Prohibiting the Purchase of Cream or Milk Unfit for Buttermaking Purposes; Establishing Grades for Cream and Providing for the Purchase of Cream on the Basis of Grade; Providing for the Necessary Licensing; Regulating the Purchase of Milk or Cream on a Butterfat Basis, Regulating the Maintenance and Operation of Creameries and Cream Stations, and for Other Purposes.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

On page 1 of the printed bill, strike out everything after the words, "A Bill," and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"For an Act providing for the protection of the public health and prevention of fraud and deception by prohibiting the purchase of cream or milk unfit for buttermaking purposes; establishing grades for cream and providing for the purchase of cream on the basis of grade; providing for the necessary licensing, regulating the maintenance and operation of creameries and cream stations, and for other purposes; repealing all acts in conflict herewith and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakot:a

Section 1. That the following Act shall be cited as "The Cream Grading Law."

Section 2. DEFINITION OF TERMS.) As used in this Act, unless the context otherwise indicates.

(a) The term "person" includes individual, partnership, corporation or association.

- (b) The term "cream station" means any place other than a creamery, where deliveries of milk or cream are weighed, sampled or tested for purchase on a butterfat basis.
- (c) The term "Creamery" means any place where milk or cream, delivered by two or more persons, is churned into butter for commercial purposes.
- (d) The term "Babcock test" means the official Babbock test for milk and for cream as set forth in the latest edition or supplement thereto of the "Methods of Analysis" of the Association of Official Agricultural Chemists."
- (e) Term of "sweet cream grade" means cream that is sweet in taste, clean and sound, free from undesirable flavor and odor, and free from extraneous matter which makes it unfit for human consumption. It contains not less than 25% butterfat and its acidity does not exceed 0.25% calculated as lactic acid.
- (f) The term "grade 1 cream" means cream that is clean to the taste and smell; its acidity does not exceed 0.7% calculated as lactic acid; it contains less than 25% butterfat and is free from lumps, mold, dirt and other foreign matter, which makes it unfit for human consumption.
- (g) The term "grade 2 cream" is cream that will produce butter which will score not less than 88, as determined by the official scoring method for butter adopted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It may have an undesirable flavor or odor but is free from mold, dirt or other foreign matter which makes it unfit for human consumption.
- (h) The term "unlawful or reject cream" means cream which contains any dirt, filth, mold or other foreign matter, or is stale, rancid, putrid, decomposed or actively foaming, in any amount or degree that makes it unfit for human consumption.
- Section 3. GRADE PURCHASE: PRICE DIFFERENTIALS: WHEN.) All purchases or receipts of cream for buttermaking purposes shall be on the basis of the following grades: (a) sweet cream, (b) grade one, (c) grade two. Providing that nothing herein centained shall require a person to purchase other than the grade or grades desired and provided further, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as prohibiting any person from purchasing sweet cream at grade one price. Every person buying or receiving cream shall maintain a price differential between contiguous grades of not less than 1c per pound butterfat, and shall post in a prominent place in each cream station or creamery controlled, owned, or operated by him, the grades upon which he is buying cream and the current prices paid for butterfat, and the price differential shall apply only to the grades so posted.
- Section 4. LICENSED BUYERS.) A licensed cream buyer, duly qualified to grade and test cream, shall be main-

tained in each creamery and in each station where cream is purchased for buttermaking purposes. A grading license shall be issued by the Dairy Department to such person who shall have passed a satisfactory examination in person and shall have proven by actual demonstration before an inspector or authorized agent of the Department that he is competent and qualified to grade cream and that he is fully conversant with all the requirements of this Act. Every such license, unless revoked, shall be valid for one year after date of issue and shall not be transferable. The fee for such annual license shall be three dollars (\$3.00) and shall be paid to the Dairy Department or its agent before such license or renewal thereof is issued. The examination which a buyer must pass in order to obtain a grading license shall cover (a) ability to grade cream, (b) knowledge of sanitary regulations, (c) knowledge of records required, tagging requirements and reports to Dairy Commissioner, and (d) such further subjects not inconsistent with this Act as shall be determined by the Dairy Commissioner and approved by the head of the Department of Dairying of the Agricultural College.

Section 5. DUTIES OF CREAM GRADER.) Each licensed grader shall promptly grade each lot of cream delivered to or received by him. Wherever cream is graded, whether at the cream station or creamery, the cream grader shall keep a true record of each lot of cream received and graded. The record shall show the name of the producer or owner of the cream, the date of delivery, the quantity delivered, the grade or grades assigned and the price paid. As soon as the cream is graded it shall be placed in clean containers or shipping cans. Each shipping can containing graded cream must have a label or tag firmly attached which shall designate the grade of the cream contained and the name and address of the cream station or creamery where it was received. All licensed cream buyers shall affix to the container of unlawful or rejected cream, tags provided by the State Dairy Department at cost. These tags must be in triplicate, one to be affixed to the container of unlawful or rejected cream, one to be mailed to the Dairy Department, and one to be retained by the buyer for inspection by the Dairy or Food Inspectors.

These tags must contain the following information: Date of rejection, name and address of owner, name and address of buyer, and reasons for rejection. The Dairy Department shall keep a complete record of all rejection tags issued, and rejections reported.

Section 6. REVOKATION OF LICENSE.) The Dairy Commissioner shall have authority to revoke any license issued under the provisions of Section 5. Evidence that the licensee has violated any of the provisions of this Act shall be sufficient cause for such revocation. The Dairy Commissioner shall notify the licensee that his license is to be revoked and shall give such licensee an opportunity to appear before the Dairy Commissioner or his authorized agent within five days, at a time and place designated by the

Dairy Commissioner, to show cause why such license should not be cancelled. The licensee may appear in person or be represented by an attorney or other person, or may submit a statement in writing. If licensee fails to show cause on or before the date of the hearing, why the license should not be revoked, the Dairy Commissioner shall notify licensee that the revocation of the license will become effective at the expiration of ten days from date of such notice.

SANITATION OF CREAMERY AND CREAM Section 7. STATION.) No creamery or cream station shall be permitted to be operated in unclean, insanitary or disorderly surroundings. Every licensed creamery or cream station shall maintain a separate room or rooms to be exclusively for the handling and sorting of cream or dairy products. Walls and ceilings must be tight and kept clean and free from dust. The floor shall be tight, frequently scrubbed and kept clean at all times. The room shall be well lighted, adequately ventilated and of suitable size to properly handle the volume of business done, and all windows, doors and other openings shall be properly screened. Every creamery or cream station shall have an adequate supply of hot and cold water. Suitable can racks shall be maintained inside the creamery or cream station on which cream cans, when empty, shall be kept inverted with lids removed at all times and all cans shall be thoroughly washed before being used for milk or All empty cans shall be thoroughly washed and sterilized and shall be thoroughly dry before lids are affixed.

There shall be no windows, doors or other openings into other rooms unless to a room kept in a clean and sanitary condition. The station must have cooling facilities of sufficient capacity for all cream received in one day's business; and adequate facilities for heating plenty of water.

Section 8. VIOLATIONS.) The following Acts are hereby prohibited:

- (1) The purchase or receipt of cream for butter making purposes except on the basis of grades as provided in Section 3.
- (2) The failure to maintain a price differential between cream grades or the failure to post in a cream station or creamery the current prices paid for butter fat.
- (3) The grading of any lot of cream by an unlicensed grader.
- (4) The improper or incorrect grading of any lot of cream by a licensed grader.
- (5) The acceptance, purchase or possession by any creamery or cream station of unlawful or reject cream.
- (6) The failure on the part of any licensed cream grader to keep such records as are required in Section 5.
- (7) The possession by a cream station or creamery of any graded cream unlabeled or falsely labeled as to grade.

or the shipment or delivery or consignment for shipment or delivery by any licensed buyer of graded cream unlabeled or falsely labeled as to grade.

- (8) The maintenance of any cream station or creamery in violation of Section 7 or in an insanitary condition or the conduct of such cream station or creamery in a manner whereby milk, cream or butter may be contaminated within the meaning of this Act.
- (9) The wilful obstruction or hindrance to any official inspection.
- Section 9. ENFORCEMENT.) In the enforcement of this Act the Dairy Department shall be charged with the educational work necessary for a proper knowledge and appreciation among buyers and producers of the grading features of this law; the examining of applicants for license and the promoting, improving and advancing the interests of the dairy industry in the State and is authorized to otherwise enforce this Act. The State Food Commissioner and Chemist shall be charged with the sanitary inspection of all establishments concerned; analysis of dairy products and enforcement of grading provisions.
- Section 10. DISPOSITION OF FEES.) All revenues derived under the authority of this Act and all other license fees collected by the Dairy Department shall be used in the enforcement of this Act and the dairy laws of the State. Thus, all license moneys collected by the Dairy Department shall be forwarded to the State Treasurer who shall credit not less than 60% to the Dairy Department and place it in a special revolving fund to be known as the "Dairy Department Fund" and credit the remaining 40%, but not to exceed \$6000.00 per year, to the "State Regulatory Fund," out of which funds all bills and expense of whatever nature incurred in the enforcement of this Act shall by said Treasurer be paid after audit and approval by the State Auditing Board.
- Section 11. PENALTIES.) Any violation of any of the provisions of this Act is hereby declared to be a misdemeanor, and any person, whether individually, or as a member of a partnership, or as an agent or officer of a corporation, who shall be convicted of such violation either on his own behalf or in the interest of any other individual or corporation, association or partnership, shall be fined not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and such person's license may be suspended for 30 days and permanently revoked on second offense.
- Section 12. ACTS IN CONFLICT.) All acts or parts of acts in conflict or inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.
- Section 13. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE.) If any section, subdivision, sentence or clause of this Act shall, for any reason, be held void or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of any other portion of this Act.

Section 14. EMERGENCY.) Whereas, an emergency exists, this Act shall be in full force and effect from and after June 1, 1935, but the giving of examinations and grading license and issuance thereof is authorized after the passage and approval of this Act, and in advance of that date."

Those remarks were taken up and have been carried over the radio and in the newspapers, attempting to make the public believe that it was a departure from Legislative procedure.

I want to call your attention to the vote on the 15th, and again on the 18th of January, on the Committee's report on Mileage and Per Diem. The record fails to show any member of this House failing to vote for such a reason. On pages 5 and 6 of the Journal, of January 15, and pages 3 and 4 of January 18th every Member of this House voted for the passage of that bill that specifically provided for the payment of mileage they themselves would receive.

Further, as to the roll calls with reference to the employees in the House, every Member knows they come here with individuals for whom they are interested in securing employment, and personally interested. They get on the payrolls of this Legislative body, and the record will show there was a unanimous vote when we voted on the personnel of this House.

I want to say further that any bill that pertains to farming commands the interest of every farmer; every bill that pertains to the dairy industry commands the interest of every dairyman. The same thing applies also to the laws governing the professions.

## CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. A15

Introduced by Representatives Godwin, Scholl and Blaisdell.

WHEREAS, It is Necessary to Check the Flow of the Missouri River in North Dakota and South Dakota by means of a large manual controlled diversion dam; and to release the stored water as needed to maintain an average flow to the mouth of the Missouri River and to divert part of aforesaid stored water to furnish surface water for cities and villages in North Dakota and South Dakota; also part of aforesaid diverted water to be used in replenishing receding ground water tables in North Dakota and South Dakota, and

WHEREAS, Many of the shelter belts now owned by farmers are dying from lack of ground water supply, and

WHEREAS, It would be necessary to restore ground water tables before a shelter belt of such large proportions as proposed by the Government could be expected to survive, and

WHEREAS, The control of the Missouri River between limits would make it entirely possible to afford the great northwestern territory a less expensive transportation of agricultural products, and

WHEREAS, The Missouri River forms a part of one of the most dangerous flood basins, namely the Mississippi-Missouri Basin, which annually causes millions of dollars of property damage and loss of life, and

WHEREAS, The Missouri River having caused local floods by excessive water and ice jams causes thousands of

dollars of property damage and loss of life; aforesaid losses could be averted by complete Missouri River Control, and

WHEREAS, North Dakota and South Dakota were at one time one of the largest northwest breeding areas for fowl in the United States, and with the receding water table causing water holes, sloughs, ponds, et cetera to dry up, thus forcing aforementioned fowl to leave the aforesaid areas, and

WHEREAS, With the development of the Missouri River a large amount of cheap electrical energy could be produced which would act as an incentive for industrial expansion within the states of North Dakota and South Dakota, and

WHEREAS, Every year thousands of acres of North Dakota's and South Dakota's most productive land is washed away by the Missouri River at its high stages, and

WHEREAS, In view of the fact that proper development of the Missouri River very naturally comes under several different departments and /or commissions of the Federal Government, it is respectfully suggested that a Commission of five Engineers be created to properly investigate the obvious possibilities for development of the Missouri River in North Dakota and South Dakota, now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, By the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota, the Senate concurring therein, that we petition the United States Congress, now assembled, and the President of the United States, the Honorable Franklin D. Roosevelt, to appoint and instruct the aforesaid commission of five Engineers, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that aforesaid commission be selected from Civil Engineers in private life, one Engineer to be chosen from the States of North Dakota and /or South Dakota, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of State of the State of North Dakota be and is hereby instructed to forward an authenticated copy of this resolution to the President of the United States, the Honorable Franklin D. Roosevelt, to the President of the United States Senate, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives at Washington, D. C., to the two United States Senators and the two Representatives from North Dakota in Congress.

# NORTH DAKOTA WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION BUREAU

Bismarck, North Dakota, February 20, 1935.

Hon. Wm. Crockett, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Twenty-fourth Legislative Assembly. Bismarck, North Dakota. Dear Sir:

On Tuesday, February 19, 1935, during roll call on House Bill No. 44, which is the appropriation bill appropriating money for use of the Workmen's Compensation Bureau for the biennium beginning July 1, 1935, Rep. Traynor, explaining his vote on said bill said the following: "I wish to explain my vote and have my explanation recorded in the Journal. The Workmen's Compensation Bureau should have its necessary appropriation, but I vote 'no' on this bill because I consider this appropriation nothing but a steal. There has been a person from my county recently appointed on this Bureau and there are some that think I should support the measure for that reason. I would not consider a steal even though every member of the Bureau were from Ramsey County."

If a steal is being perpetrated it is evident that there must be a thief somewhere in the offing. Rep. Traynor has an opportunity to preform a public service by pointing out the thief. If the Representative fails to indicate the thief, then it seems that he might be taking advantage of the immunity of a legislator to put over a very cheap and despicable kind of political propaganda.

Mr. Traynor was a member of the legislature in 1931 when the legislature appropriated \$126,576.00 for the biennium beginning July 1, 1931, and Mr. Traynor made no protest. No one can determine at this time how much heavier the work will be in the coming biennium than it was in the biennium beginning July 1, 1931. Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Insurance to whom was referred:

House Bill No. 105. A Bill for an Act Regulating All Benevolent Corporations, Associations or Societies Operating on the Voluntary or Involuntary Assessment or Contribution Plan, and Repealing Chapter 160 of the Session Laws of 1931, and All Acts or Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Strike out all after the words "A Bill" and insert in lieu thereof the following:

For an Act regulating all Benevolent Corporations, Associations of Societies Operating on the Voluntary or Involuntary Assessment or Contribution Plan, which provide

for Protective and/or Indemnity Benefits, Excepting Benevolent Corporations as defined by Chapter 23, Compiled Laws of 1931, and for the repeal of Chapter 160 of the Session Laws of 1931, and Acts or Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. Benevolent Societies Subject to General Insurance Laws. Exceptions.) All corporations, associations or societies, either domestic or foreign, operating on the voluntary or involuntary assessment or contribution plan, providing protective and/or indemnity benefits, shall be under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Insurance of this State and shall be and remain subject to all laws, rules and regulations applicable to insurance companies transacting business within the state, except assessment benevolent societies proviiding only for a death benefit to the beneficiary of a deceased member, which shall be subject to the provisions of this Act.

Section 2. Assessment Benevolent Societies. Organization. Regulations.)

- (a) Definition.) An assessment benevolent society is hereby defined as any corporation, association or society, domestic or foreign, which operates on the voluntary assessment or contribution plan for the sole purpose of providing through assessments of its members for the payment of a death benefit to the beneficiary of a deceased member.
- (b) How Formed.) Any number of persons, not less than five, all of whom are residents of this State, may form a benevolent society in the manner hereinafter set forth.
- (c) Articles. Contents. Approval and Filing.) The articles of incorporation shall set forth the name of the society, which shall include the words "Benevolent Society," the purpose for which formed, with the plan of doing business fully and clearly defined; the location of its principal office, which must be within this state; the date for commencement and termination of its fiscal year; the term for which it is incorporated, not to exceed thirty years; and the number of its directors, not less than five nor more than nine, all of whom shall be residents of this State.

The articles of incorporation shall be submitted to the Attorney General and if found in conformity with this Act and not inconsistent with the Constitution and Laws of this State, shall be approved by him and certified to the Commissioner of Insurance, who shall also make an examination to ascertain if all requirements of laws have been met. After approval by the Attorney General and Commissioner of Insurance the articles shall be fixed with the Secretary of State, a certified copy filed with the Commissioner of Insurance and one certified copy filed with the Register of Deeds of the county where the principal office is located. Such filing with the Commissioner of Insurance shall constitute the society's authority to solicit and secure the neces-

sary preliminary members as a basis for issue of certificate of authority; the solicitation of such preliminary members to be conducted in accordance with requirements and regulation prescribed by the Commissioner.

- (d) Classification of Membership. Units.) Such society may provide for classification of its membership by one or more units, based on the age of individual members, or by the adoption of a maximum limit of one group or unit. On the organization of a new group or unit the society shall notify the Commissioner of Insurance of its proposal to so organize another unit, and the organization thereof shall be conducted in accordance with regulations and requirements prescribed by the Commissioner, the same as is herein required for the organization of a society.
- (e) Certificate of Membership. Mortuary Fund. cellation of Certificate). The certificate of membership shall fully state the conditions on which the benefit shall be paid, which shall be confined to a death benefit to the beneficiary of the deceased member, not exceeding one thousand dollars. The certificate shall provide for an assessment levy on the membership to be paid after notice and proof of death in an amount not exceeding two dollars, the proceeds of such assessment levy to be paid to the beneficiary of the deceased mem-ber, less an amount not exceeding ten per cent as an allowance for expenses, and in no event shall such death benefit exceed the maximum amount stated in the certificate. case the proceeds of one such post mortem assessment is more than sufficient to pay the death claim for which the levy was made, the balance shall be placed in a mortuary fund and be applied toward payment of the next claim within the unit from which it arose. No assessment levy shall be made unless the balance in the mortuary fund is insufficient to pay a claim on which notice and proof of death has been received. The notice of assessment shall provide that if the member does not make payment within the time named, not less than fifteen nor more than thirty days from the date of such notice, upon further notice forthwith by mail to the last known address of the member, proof of such mailing to be established on forms provided for that purpose by the United States Post Office Department, his certificate shall be cancelled if payment is not made within ten days of the mailing of such cancellation notice. The certificate together with the application therefor shall constitute the entire contract, and must be approved as to form by the commissioner of insurance prior to its issuance.
- (f) Required Provision in Certificate and Application.) Every certificate of membership and application for such certificate shall have printed thereon in red ink and in ten point bold face type: "This is an assessment benefit certificate on the voluntary contribution plan. The society will pay only the amount received from assessments levied against the members, less expenses of administration. No reserve fund is carried. This is not an insurance policy."
- (g) Preliminary Applications. Certificate of Authority.) Any such society, before any certificate of membership may be issued, must have actual applications from at least three

hundred persons upon which certificates may be simultaneously issued. Such applications shall be submitted to the commissioner of insurance, together with a certificate from a solvent bank stating that there has been deposited to the account of the society an amount which is determined by the preliminary applications presented as constituting the entire proceeds of membership fees collected. Upon submission of such preliminary applications and evidence satisfactory to the commissioner of insurance that all of the requirements of this act have been complied with, certificate of authority may be issued.

- (h) Bonds of Officers and Agents.) After a society has been licensed by the Commissioner of Insurance the bonding of its officers and agents shall be discretionary with the Board of Directors; provided, however, that during the period between filing of articles of incorporation and issuing certificate of authority the amounts of bonds shall be fixed by the Commissioner of Insurance sufficient to guarantee return of membership fees collected in case the organization is not completed, such bonds to be placed on file with the state insurance department.
- (i) Assessments. Benefits.) It shall be the duty of the secretary, upon receipt of notice and proof of death of a member, and if the mortuary fund is insufficient to meet the claim, to levy an assessment upon the membership in accordance with the provisions of the membership certificate and subsection (e) of this act. Such notice shall contain the name and address of the deceased member, the maximum benefit to be paid, the amount of the assessment, date upon which the assessment becomes delinquent, and shall be mailed to each member at the last post office address given the secretary. Upon expiration of the period in which payment of the assessment may be made, and the further period for cancellation hereinbefore provided for, the secretary shall pay to the beneficiary of the deceased member the proceeds of the assessment then in his possession, and available for the purpose.
- (j) Funds.) The society shall maintain and keep separate two funds, viz: An Expense Fund and a Mortuary Fund. The membership fee, not less than \$1.00 and not more than \$5.00 may be used for expenses. The certificate of membership shall state the percentage of assessments, not exceeding 10 per cent, that may be used for expenses. Such expense allowance shall be credited to the Expense Fund and the balance to the Mortuary Fund. Expense Fund assessments may be levied in accordance with provisions therefor in the membership certificate, in amounts not exceeding one dollar, and not more than four such assessments may be levied in any one calendar year. In case of more than one unit of membership the Mortuary Fund shall be kept separate by units. No expenses may be paid from the Mortuary Fund.
- (k) Annual Statement. Renewal Certificate of Authority.) On or before February 1st of each year, all such societies shall file with the Commissioner of Insurance an annual statement as of December 31st next preceding, on

forms provided by the Commissioner, showing all income by sources, disbursements detailed as to nature, assets, liabilities, number of membership, and such other information as may be required, and shall pay a fee of \$10.00 for the filing of such statement. If it appears from such statement that the society has a membership at least equal in number to that required as a condition to authorization, and is otherwise qualified under the requirements of this act, renewal certificate of authority shall be issued on April 1st next succeeding, for which a fee of two dollars shall be paid.

- (1) Examinations of Societies.) The Commissioner of Insurance shall have the same power and authority over all societies to which this Act is applicable as to visitation and examination as are given to him by the statutes of this state over domestic insurance companies, the expenses of such examination to be paid by the society examined. The Commissioner may require a deposit in advance of such examination to guarantee payment of the estimated necessary expense to be incurred.
- (m) Agents Licensed.) All agents of such societies must be licensed in the same manner as agents for insurance companies and shall be residents of this state.
- (n) No Benefits Except as Provided.) No benefits on the voluntary contribution plan shall be provided for by any society, except as herein stated.
- (o) Applicability to Societies Already Doing Business.) Assessment benevolent societies organized and doing business on the effective date of this Act shall, within ninety days of such date, comply with and become subject to the provisions hereof. Any such society having a membership at least equal to that required as a condition to first authorization of a society, shall not be required to present its applications to the Commissioner of Insurance, nor to make a showing that the membership fees are intact to the society. It shall, however, be required to produce proof of the necessary membership.

Any such society already organized on the effective date of this Act, having a name which does not include the words "Benevolent Society" shall not be required to change its name to comply with subsection (c) of this Act; but its membership certificate, stationery and literature shall clearly state that it is a benevolent society.

(p) Licensing Foreign Societies. Prerequisites.) Any foreign assessments benevolent society legally organized and incorporated under the laws of its home state, shall be admitted and licensed to transact business in this state, upon filing with the Commissioner of Insurance certified copy of its articles of incorporation, financial and operating statement in the form prescribed by the commissioner, certificate of compliance from the State Insurance Commissioner or other officer of its home state, power of attorney to the commissioner for admission of service of process in any action, suit or proceeding in any court of this state and

such other evidence as the commissioner may require that it is qualified to transact business in accordance with the requirements of this Act. Upon such compliance such society shall be licensed subject to all provisions of law relating to information to and examination by the commissioner, annual reports, taxes, and other requirements applicable to foreign insurance companies.

- (q) Not Applicable to Fraternal Benefit Societies.) The Committee on Banks and Banking made the following report:

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Banks and Banking to whom was referred:

House Bill No. 86. A Bill for an Act Providing for the Organization of Credit Unions, the Incorporation Thereof, the Internal Regulation and Management of Same, Defining Their Powers and Duties, Fixing the Number of Officers and Committees, Defining Their Powers, Tenure, Compensation and Duties, Providing for the Adoption and Amendment of By-Laws, Prohibiting the Use of the Term "Credit Unions" by Other Persons, Firms, Associations or Corporations, Defining Membership Therein, Regulating the Rights of Borrowers, Interest on Loans, Capital, Reserves, Loans, Security, Dividends, Fines, Expulsion and Withdrawal of Members, Dissolution, Change of Place of Business, Taxation of Property, Providing for Reports and Examinations, and Placing the Same Under the Supervision of the State Banking Board.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

After the title, strike out the remainder of the bill and insert the following:

Be it Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. SAVINGS AND CREDIT ASSOCIATION MAY BE ORGANIZED. METHOD OF ORGANIZATION.)

Any seven residents of the state of North Dakota may apply to the State Banking Board for permission to organize a corporate co-operative association to be known as a credit union.

A credit union is organized in the following manner:

- (a) The applicants execute in duplicate a certificate of organization by the terms of which they agree to be bound. The certificate shall state:
  - 1. The name and location of the proposed credit union.
- 2. The names and addresses of the subscribers to the certificate and the number of shares subscribed by each.
- 3. The par value of the shares of the credit union which shall not exceed \$10.00, each.
- (b) They next prepare proposed by-laws for the general governance of the credit union consistent with the provisions of this Act, and execute the same in duplicate.
- (c) The certificate and the proposed by-laws, both executed in duplicate, are forwarded to the State Examiner.
- (d) The State Examiner shall, within thirty days of the receipt of said certificate and by-laws, determine whether they comply with the provisions of this Act, and whether or not the organization of the credit union in question would benefit the members of it and be consistent with the purposes of this Act.
- (e) Thereupon the said State Examiner shall notify the applicants and State Banking Board of his decision. If it is favorable said Board shall instruct the Secretary of State to issue a charter, attach to the duplicate certificate of organization and return the same, together with the duplicate by-laws to the applicants, upon payment of a filing fee of \$5.00 to the Secretary of State.
- (f) The applicants shall thereupon file the said duplicate of the certificate of organization, with the charter attached thereto with the register of deeds of the county within which the credit union shall have its place of business, who shall make a record of said certificate and return it, with his certificate of record attached thereto, to the said Secretary of State for permanent record.
- (g) Thereupon the applicants shall become and be a credit union, incorporated in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

In order to simplify the organization of credit unions the said Secretary of State shall, upon passage of this Act, cause to be prepared an approved form of certificate of organization and a form of by-laws, consistent with this Act which may be used by credit union incorporators for their guidance, and on written application of any seven residents of the state, shall supply them, without charge, with a blank certificate of organization and a copy of said form of suggested by-laws.

AMENDMENT OF BY-LAWS. APPROVAL Section 2. BY STATE BANKING BOARD.) To amend certificate of organization or by-laws whether at a general or special meeting, proposed amendments shall be fully set forth in the notice of the meeting. Any amendments to the by-laws shall be approved by three-fourths of the members then present, which number shall constitute a quorum. Any and all amendments to the certificate of organization or by-laws must be approved by the State Banking Board, before they The certificate of organization may be become operative. amended by a majority vote of the entire membership of the credit union at a meeting called for that purpose. In case such amendment is adopted the resolution containing a full text thereof and verified by its president and treasurer and approved by the State Banking Board shall be recorded in the office of the register of deeds in the county in which said credit union is located.

Section 3. USE OF CERTAIN WORDS A MISDE-MEANOR.) It shall be a misdemeanor for any person, association, co-partnership or corporation (except corporations organized in accordance with the provisions of this Act) to use the words "credit union" in their name or title.

Section 4. POWERS OF CREDIT UNION.) A credit union shall have the following powers:

- (a) To receive the savings of its members either as payment on shares or as deposits (including the right to conduct Christmas clubs, vacation clubs and other such thrift organizations within its membership.)
- (b) To make loans to members for provident or productive purposes.
- (c) To make loans to a co-operative society or other organization having membership in the credit union.
- (d) To deposit in state and national banks and trust companies and central credit unions authorized to receive deposits.
- (e) To invest in any investment legal for savings banks or for trust funds in the state.
  - (f) To borrow money as hereinafter indicated.

Section 5. MEMBERSHIP IN CREDIT UNIONS.) Credit union membership shall consist of the incorporators and such other persons as may be elected to membership and subscribe to at least one share, pay the initial installment thereon and the entrance fee. Organizations (incorporated or otherwise) composed for the most part of the same general group as the credit union membership may be members. Credit union organizations shall be limited to groups (of both large and small membership) having a common bond of occupation, or association or to groups within a well defined rural or urban district.

Section 6. TO BE UNDER STATE BANKING BOARD.) Credit unions shall be under the supervision of the State Banking Board. They shall report to the State Examiner at least twice annually, upon call of the State Examiner on blanks supplied by the said Examiner for that purpose. Additional reports may be required. Credit unions shall be examined at least annually by the said Examiner. For failure to file reports when due, unless excused for cause, the credit union shall pay to the treasurer of the state \$5.00 for each day of its delinquency. If the said Examiner determines that the credit union is violating the provisions of this act, or is insolvent, the said State Banking Board may serve notice on the credit union of his intention to revoke the charter. If, for a period of fifteen days after said notice, said violation continues, the said State Banking Board may revoke said charter and take possession of the business and property of said credit union and maintain possession until such time as they shall permit it to continue business or its affairs are finally liquidated. They may take similar action if said report remains in arrears for more than fifteen days.

The credit union shall pay the same fees to the State Examiner for examination as are now provided for building and loan associations.

Section 7. FISCAL YEAR: MEETINGS AND VOTING AT.) The fiscal year of all credit unions shall end December 31. General and special meetings may be held in the manner and for the purposes indicated in the by-laws, provided, however, that 30 days before any regular meeting and ten days before any special meeting written notice shall be mailed to each member and in the case of a special meeting the notice shall clearly state the purpose of the meeting and what matters will be considered thereat. At all meetings a member shall have but a single vote whatever his share holdings. There shall be no voting by proxy, provided, however, that any firm, society or corporation having a membership in the credit union may cast its vote by one person upon presentation by him of written authority of such firm, society or corporation.

Section 8. ANNUAL MEETINGS: ELECTION OF OF-FICERS.) At the annual meeting (the organization meeting shall be the first annual meeting) the credit union shall elect a board of directors of not less than five members, a credit committee of not less than three members and a supervisory committee of three members, all to hold office for such terms respectively as the by-laws provide and until successors qualify. A record of the names and addresses of the members of the board and committees and the officers shall be filed with the State Examiner within ten days of their election, and each director shall also deposit with said Examiner one share as a qualifying requirement.

Section 9. OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS.) At their first meeting the directors shall elect from their own number a president, vice president, treasurer and clerk, of whom the last two named may be the same individual. It shall be

the duty of the directors to have general management of the affairs of the credit union, particularly:

- (a) To act on applications for membership.
- (b) To determine interest rates on loans and on deposits.
- (c) To fix the amount of the surety bond which shall be required of all officers and employees handling money, subject to the approval of the State Examiner.
- (d) To declare dividends, and to transmit to the members recommended amendments to the by-laws.
- (e) To fill vacancies in the board and in the credit committee until successors are chosen and qualify.
- (f) To determine the maximum individual share holdings and the maximum individual loan which can be made with and without security.
- (g) To have charge of investments other than loans to members.
- (h) To establish a schedule of fines, in the discretion of the Board, for non-payment of interest when due.

The duties of the officers shall be as determined in the by-laws, except that the treasurer shall be the general manager. No member of the board or of either committee shall, as such, be compensated, except that reasonable compensation may be paid the treasurer, to be fixed by the board.

Section 10. CREDIT COMMITTEE TO PASS ON LOANS.) The credit committees shall have the general supervision of all loans to members. Applications for loans shall be on a form, prepared by the credit committee, and all applications shall set forth the purpose for which the loan is desired, the security, if any, offered, and such other data as may be required. Within the meaning of this section an assignment of shares or deposits or the endorsement of a note may be deemed security. No loan shall be made unless the obligation bears two responsible endorsers. At least a majority of the members of the credit committee shall pass on all loans and approval must be unanimous. The credit committee shall meet as often as may be necessary after due notice to each member.

# Section 11. DUTIES OF SUPERVISORY COMMITTEE.) The supervisory committee shall:

- (a) Make an examination of the affairs of the credit union at least quarterly, including an audit of its books and, in the event said committee feels such action to be necessary, it shall call the members together thereafter and submit to them its report.
- (b) Make an annual audit and report and submit the same at the annual meeting of the members.
  - (c) By unanimous vote, if it deem such action to be neces-

sary to the proper conduct of the credit union, suspend any officer, director or member of committee and call the members together to act on such suspension. The members of said meeting may sustain such suspension and remove such officer permanently or may reinstate said officer.

By majority vote the supervisory committee may call a special meeting of the members to consider any matter submitted to it by said committee. The said committee shall fill vacancies in its own membership.

Section 12. CAPITAL: ENTRANCE FEE.) The capital of a credit union shall consist of the payments that have been made to it by the several members thereof on shares. The credit union shall have a lien on the shares and deposits of a member for any sum due to the credit union from said member or for any loan endorsed by him. A credit union may charge an entrance fee as may be provided by the bylaws, not to exceed 50 cents.

Section 13. WHO MAY HOLD SHARES.) Shares may be issued and deposits received in the names of a minor or in trust in such manner as the by-laws may provide. The name of the beneficiary must be disclosed to the credit union.

Section 14. INTEREST RATES.) Interest rates on loans made by a credit union shall not exceed 1 percent a month on unpaid balances.

Section 15. MAY BORROW MONEY.) A credit union may borrow from any source in total sum which shall not exceed 25 per cent of its assets, unless the State Examiner shall authorize a larger amount.

Section 16. MAY LOAN MONEY.) A credit union may loan to members. Loans must be for a provident or productive purpose and are made subject to the conditions contained in the by-laws. A borrower may repay his loan in whole or in part any day the office of the credit union is open for business. No director, officer or member of committee may borrow from the credit union in which he holds office beyond the amount of his holdings in it in shares and deposits, unless approved by three-fourths of the other members of the board of directors, nor may he endorse for borrowers.

Section 17. RESERVED FUNDS.) Every credit union shall maintain a reserve fund which at all times shall be kept liquid and intact and used as a reserve against bad loans and other losses and shall not be loaned to members or used to pay expenses of the credit union or otherwise distributed except in case of liquidation. All entrance fees, fines, and each year, before the declaration of a dividend ten per cent of the gross earnings shall be set aside as a reserve fund against said bad loans and other losses until such time as such fund shall equal fifteen per cent of the assets of the credit union, and thereafter there shall be added to such fund at the end of each fiscal year such per cent of the gross earnings as will be required to maintain such fund as herein provided. There shall also be established and at all times maintained a reserve of not less than five per cent of the amount of the deposits; which shall be in cash and balances due from solvent banks. Upon recommendation of the board of directors and approval of a majority of the members present at any annual meeting, a reserve fund of not more than 5 per cent of net earnings may be set aside and used for educational, cultural and general welfare purposes.

Section 18. DIVIDENDS.) On recommendation of the directors a credit union may, at the end of the fiscal year, declare a dividend from net earnings, which dividend shall be paid on all shares outstanding at the end of the fiscal year. Shares which become fully paid up during the year shall be entitled to a proportional part of said dividend calculated from the first day of the month following such payment in full.

Section 19. EXPULSION OF MEMBERS.) A member may be expelled by two-thirds vote of the members present at a special meeting called to consider the matter or at the annual meeting, but only after a hearing. Any member may withdraw from the credit union at any time but notice of withdrawal may be required. All amounts paid on shares or as deposits of an expelled or withdrawing member, with any dividends or interest accredited thereto to the date thereof (shall, as funds become available and after deducting all amounts due from the member to the credit union, be paid to him. The credit union may require 60 days' notice of intention to withdraw shares and 30 days' notice of intention to withdraw deposits. Withdrawing or expelled members shall have no further right in the credit union but are not, by such expulsion or withdrawal, released from any remaining liability to the credit union.

Section 20. PROCESS OF VOLUNTARY DISSOLUTION.) The process of voluntary dissolution shall be as follows:

- (a) A credit union may be voluntarily liquidated after four-fifths of the entire membership shall have voted such liquidation at a special meeting called by a majority of the board of directors for that purpose, upon thirty days' mailed written notice to each member clearly stating the purpose of such special meeting. By a majority vote of the members present at such meeting, a committee of three members shall be elected to liquidate the credit union.
- (b) Immediately after such meeting and before such committee shall proceed with the liquidation, the officers of the credit union shall file with the State Examiner a certified copy of the minutes of such meeting, a written statement outlining the plan of liquidation and a verified statement in writing signed by a majority of the officers consenting to such liquidation containing the names and addresses of all officers and directors of the credit union. After the State Examiner shall by proper examination determine that such credit union is solvent, he shall issue a certificate of approval of the liquidation, which certificate shall be filed with the register of deeds in the county where such credit union is located. From and after such special meeting the credit union shall cease to do business except for purposes of liqui-

- dation. Before commencing such liquidation such committee shall execute and file with the State Examiner a bond running to the State of North Dakota for the benefit of the members and creditors of the credit union in such amount and with such sureties and in such form as shall be approved by the State Examiner conditioned for the faithful performance of all duties of its trust.
- (c). Upon filing of such certificate with the Register of Deeds, the credit union shall be deemed dissolved and its corporate existence terminated except for the purpose of discharging its debts, collecting and distributing its assets and doing all other acts required in order to liquidate. The credit union shall have a corporate existence and may sue and be sued.
- (d) If the credit union shall not be completely liquidated and its assets discharged within three years after such special meeting of the members, the State Examiner shall take possession of the books, records and assets and proceed to complete the liquidation in the manner then provided by law for the liquidation of closed banks.
- (e) Funds representing unclaimed dividends in liquidation in the hands of such liquidating committee or the State Examiner for six months after date of final dividend shall be deposited with the State Treasurer who shall within one year thereafter pay over the money so held by him to the persons respectively entitled thereto upon being furnished satisfactory evidence of their right to the same, and at the end of such year the State Treasurer shall credit all residue of such deposit to the General Fund.
- (f) Upon completion of the liquidation by such liquidating committee it shall file with the State Examiner a verified statement in writing signed by the members of such committee stating that all debts of the credit union including deposits, have been paid except unclaimed dividends, and if any such, the amount thereof, the names of the persons entitled thereto with their last known addresses, and all books and papers of the credit union shall thereupon be deposited with the State Examiner.
- Section 21. MAY CHANGE PLACE OF BUSINESS.) A credit union may change its place of business on written permission of the State Examiner.
- Section 22. SHALL BE DEEMED SAVINGS BANKS FOR TAXATION PURPOSES.) A credit union shall be deemed a consumers co-operative association for purposes of taxation.

Section 23. CONFLICTING ACTS REPEALED.) All laws and parts of laws in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

The Speaker called Mr. Aljets to the chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

The Speaker resumed the chair.

When the Committee arose it submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker: The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 86. A Bill for an Act Providing for the Organization of Credit Unions, the Incorporation Thereof, the Internal Regulation and Management of Same, Defining Their Powers and Duties, Fixing the Number of Officers and Committees, Defining Their Powers, Tenure, Compensation and Duties, Providing for the Adoption and Amendment of By-Laws, Prohibiting the Use of the Term "Credit

Unions" by Other Persons, Firms, Associations or Corporations, Defining Membership Therein, Regulating the Rights of Borrowers, Interest on Loans, Capital, Reserves, Loans, Security, Dividends, Fines, Expulsion and Withdrawal of Members, Dissolution, Change of Place of Business, Taxation of Property, Providing for Reports and Examinations, and Placing the Same Under the Supervision of the State Banking Board.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

After the title, strike out the remainder of the bill and insert the following:

Be it Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. SAVINGS AND CREDIT ASSOCIATION MAY BE ORGANIZED. METHOD OF ORGANIZATION.)

Any seven residents of the state of North Dakota may apply to the State Banking Board for permission to organize a corporate co-operative association to be known as a credit union.

A credit union is organized in the following manner:

- (a) The applicants execute in duplicate a certificate of organization by the terms of which they agree to be bound. The certificate shall state:
  - 1. The name and location of the proposed credit union.
- 2. The names and addresses of the subscribers to the certificate and the number of shares subscribed by each.
- 3. The par value of the shares of the credit union which shall not exceed \$10.00, each.
- (b) They next prepare proposed by-laws for the general governance of the credit union consistent with the provisions of this Act, and execute the same in duplicate.
- (c) The certificate and the proposed by-laws, both executed in duplicate, are forwarded to the State Examiner.
- (d) The State Examiner shall, within thirty days of the receipt of said certificate and by-laws, determine whether they comply with the provisions of this Act, and whether or not the organization of the credit union in question would benefit the members of it and be consistent with the purposes of this Act.
- (e) Thereupon the said State Examiner shall notify the applicants and State Banking Board of his decision. If it is favorable said Board shall instruct the Secretary of State to issue a charter, attach to the dpulicate certificate of organization and return the same, together with the duplicate by-laws to the applicants, upon payment of a filing fee of \$5.00 to the Secretary of State.

- (f) The applicants shall thereupon file the said duplicate of the certificate of organization, with the charter attached thereto with the register of deeds of the county within which the credit union shall have its place of business, who shall make a record of said certificate and return it, with his certificate of record attached thereto, to the said Secretary of State for permanent record.
- (g) Thereupon the applicants shall become and be a credit union, incorporated in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

In order to simplify the organization of credit unions the said Secertary of State shall, upon passage of this Act, cause to be prepared an approved form of certificate of organization and a form of by-laws, consistent with this Act which may be used by credit union incorporators for their guidance, and on written application of any seven residents of the state, shall supply them, without charge, with a blank certificate of organization and a copy of said form of suggested by-laws.

Section 2. AMENDMENT OF BY-LAWS. APPROVAL BY STATE BANKING BOARD.) To amend certificate of organization or by-laws whether at a general or special meeting, proposed amendments shall be fully set forth in the notice of the meeting. Any amendments to the by-laws shall be approved by three-fourths of the members then present, which number shall constitute a quorum. Any and all amendments to the certificate of organization or by-laws must be approved by the State Banking Board, before they become operative. The certificate of organization may be amended by a majority vote of the entire membership of the

crdit union at a meeting called for that purpose. In case such amendment is adopted the resolution containing a full text thereof and verified by its president and treasurer and approved by the State Banking Board shall be recorded in the office of the register of deeds in the county in which said credit union is located.

- Section 3. USE OF CERTAIN WORDS A MISDE-MEANOR.) It shall be a misdemeanor for any person, association, co-partnership or corporation (except corporations organized in accordance with the provisions of this Act) to use the words "credit union" in their name or title.
- Section 4. POWERS OF CREDIT UNION.) A credit union shall have the following powers:
- (a) To receive the savings of its members either as payment on shares or as deposits (including the right to conduct Christmas clubs, vacation clubs and other such thrift organizations within its membership.)
- (b) To make loans to members for provident or productive purposes.
- (c) To make loans to a co-operative society or other organization having membership in the credit union.

- (d) To deposit in state and national banks and trust companies and central credit unions authorized to receive deposits.
- (e) To invest in any investment legal for savings banks or for trust funds in the state.
  - (f) To borrow money as hereinafter indicated.

Section 5. MEMBERSHIP IN CREDIT UNIONS.) Credit union membership shall consist of the incorporators and such other persons as may be elected to membership and subscribe to at least one share, pay the initial installment thereon and the entrance fee. Organizations (incorporated or otherwise) composed for the most part of the same general group as the credit union membership may be members. Credit union organizations shall be limited to groups (of both large and small membership) having a common bond of occupation, or association or to groups within a well defined rural or urban district.

Section 6. TO BE UNDER STATE BANKING BOARD.) Credit unions shall be under the supervision of the State Banking Board. They shall report to the State Examiner at least twice annually, upon call of the State Examiner on blanks supplied by the said Examiner for that purpose. Additional reports may be required. Credit unions shall be examined at least annually by the said Examiner. For failure to file reports when due, unless excused for cause, the credit union shall pay to the treasurer of the state \$5.00 for each day of its delinquency. If the said Examiner determines that the credit union is violating the provisions of this act, or is insolvent, the said State Banking Board may serve notice on the credit union of his intention to revoke the charter. If, for a period of fifteen days after said notice, said violation continues, the said State Banking Board may revoke said charter and take possession of the business and property of said credit union and maintain possession until such time as they shall permit it to continue business or its affairs are finally liquidated. They may take similar action if said report remains in arrears for more than fifteen days.

The credit union shall pay the same fees to the State Examiner for examination as are now provided for building and loan associations.

Section 7. FISCAL YEAR. MEETINGS AND VOTING AT.) The fiscal year of all credit unions shall end December 31. General and special meetings may be held in the manner and for the purposes indicated in the by-laws, provided, however, that 30 days before any regular meeting and ten days before any special meeting written notice shall be mailed to each member and in the case of a special meeting the notice shall clearly state the purpose of the meeting and what matters will be considered thereat. At all meetings a member shall have but a single vote whatever his share holdings. There shall be no voting by proxy, provided, however, that any firm, society or corporation having a membership in the credit union may cast its vote by one person upon presenta-

tion by him of written authority of such firm, society or corporation.

- Section 8. ANNUAL MEETINGS. ELECTION OF OF-FICERS.) At the annual meeting (the organization meeting shall be the first annual meeting) the credit union shall elect a board of directors of not less than five members, a credit committee of not less than three members and a supervisory committee of three members, all to hold office for such terms respectively as the by-laws provide and until successors qualify. A record of the names and addresses of the members of the board and committees and the officers shall be filed with the State Examiner within ten days of their election, and each director shall also deposit with said Examiner one share as a qualifying requirement.
- Section 9. OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS.) At their first meeting the directors shall elect from their own number a president, vice president, treasurer and clerk, of whom the last two named may be the same individual. It shall be the duty of the directors to have general management of the affairs of the credit union, particularly:
  - (a) To act on applications for membership.
  - (b) To determine interest rates on loans and on deposits.
- (c) To fix the amount of the surety bond which shall be required of all officers and employees handling money, subject to the approval of the State Examiner.
- (d) To declare dividends, and to transmit to the members recommended amendments to the by-laws.
- (e) To fill vacancies in the board and in the credit committee until successors are chosen and qualify.
- (f) To determine the maximum individual share holdings and the maximum individual loan which can be made with and without security.
- (g) To have charge of investments other than loans to members.
- (h) To establish a schedule of fines, in the discretion of the Board, for non-payment of interest when due.

The duties of the officers shall be as determined in the by-laws, except that the treasurer shall be the general manager. No member of the board or of either committee shall, as such, be compensated, except that reasonable compensation may be paid the treasurer, to be fixed by the board.

Section 10. CREDIT COMMITTEE TO PASS ON LOANS.) The credit committees shall have the general supervision of all loans to members. Applications for loans shall be on a form, prepared by the credit committee, and all applications shall set forth the purpose for which the loan is desired, the security, if any, offered, and such other data as may be required. Within the meaning of this section an assign-

ment of shares or deposits or the endorsement of a note may be deemed security. No loan shall be made unless the obligation bears two responsible endorsers. At least a majority of the members of the credit committee shall pass on all loans and approval must be unanimous. The credit committee shall meet as often as may be necessary after due notice to each member.

Section 11. DUTIES OF SUPERVISORY COMMITTEE.) The supervisory committee shall:

- (a) Make an examination of the affairs of the credit union at least quarterly, including an audit of its books and, in the event said committee feels such action to be necessary, it shall call the members together thereafter and submit to them its report.
- (b) Make an annual audit and report and submit the same at the annual meeting of the members.
- (c) By unanimous vote, if it deem such action to be necessary to the proper conduct of the credit union, suspend any officer, director or member of committee and call the members together to act on such suspension. The members of said meeting may sustain such suspension and remove such officer permanently or may reinstate said officer.

By majority vote the supervisory committee may call a special meeting of the members to consider any matter submitted to it by said committee. The said committee shall fill vacancies in its own membership.

Section 12. CAPITAL: ENTRANCE FEE.) The capital of a credit union shall consist of the payments that have been made to it by the several members thereof on shares. The credit union shall have a lien on the shares and deposits of a member for any sum due to the credit union from said member or for any loan endorsed by him. A credit union may charge an entrance fee as may be provided by the bylaws, not to exceed 50 cents.

Section 13. WHO MAY HOLD SHARES.) Shares may be issued and deposits received in the names of a minor or in trust in such manner as the by-laws may provide. The name of the beneficiary must be disclosed to the credit union.

Section 14. INTEREST RATES.) Interest rates on loans made by a credit union shall not exceed 1 per cent a month on unpaid balances.

Section 15. MAY BORROW MONEY.) A credit union may borrow from any source in total sum which shall not exceed 25 per cent of its assets, unless the State Examiner shall authorize a larger amount.

Section 16. MAY LOAN MONEY.) A credit union may loan to members. Loans must be for a provident or productive purpose and are made subject to the conditions contained in the by-laws. A borrower may repay his loan in whole or in part any day the office of the credit union is open for business. No director, officer or member of committee may

borrow from the credit union in which he holds office beyond the amount of his holdings in it in shares and deposits, unless approved by three-fourths of the other members of the board of directors, nor may he endorse for borrowers.

Section 17. RESERVED FUNDS.) Every credit union shall maintain a reserve fund which at all times shall be kept liquid and intact and used as a reserve against bad loans and other losses and shall not be loaned to members or used to pay expenses of the credit union or otherwise distributed except in case of liquidation. All entrance fees, fines, and each year, before the declaration of a dividend ten per cent of the gross earnings shall be set aside as a reserve fund against said bad loans and other losses until such time as such fund shall equal fifteen per cent of the assets of the credit union, and thereafter there shall be added to such fund at the end of each fiscal year such per cent of the gross earnings as will be required to maintain such fund as herein provided. There shall also be established and at all times maintained a reserve of not less than five per cent of the amount of the deposits; which shall be in cash and balance due from solvent banks. Upon recommendation of the board of directors and approval of a majority of the members present at any annual meeting, a reserve fund of not more than 5 per cent of net earnings may be set aside and used for educational, cultural and general welfare purposes.

Section 18. DIVIDENDS.) On recommendation of the directors a credit union may, at the end of the fiscal year, declare a dividend from net earnings, which dividend shall be paid on all shares outstanding at the end of the fiscal year. Shares which become fully paid up during the year shall be entitled to a proportional part of said dividend calculated from the first day of the month following such payment in full.

Section 19. EXPULSION OF MEMBERS.) A member may be expelled by two-thirds vote of the members present at a special meeting called to consider the matter or at the annual meeting, but only after a hearing. Any member may withdraw from the credit union at any time but notice of withdrawal may be required. All amounts paid on shares or as deposits of an expelled or withdrawing member, with any dividends or interest accredited thereto the date thereof (shall, as funds become available and after deducting all amounts due from the member to the credit union, be paid to him. The credit union may require 60 days' notice of intention to withdraw shares and 30 days' notice of intention to withdraw deposits. Withdrawing or expelled members shall have no further right in the credit union but are not, by such expulsion or withdrawal, released from any remaining liability to the credit union.

Section 20. PROCESS OF VOLUNTARY DISSOLUTION.) The process of voluntary dissolution shall be as follows:

(a) A credit union may be voluntarily liquidated after four-fifths of the entire membership shall have voted such liquidation at a special meeting called by a majority of the

board of directors for that purpose, upon thirty days' mailed written notice to each member clearly stating the purpose of such special meeting. By a majority vote of the members present at such meeting, a committee of three members shall be elected to liquidate the credit union.

- Immediately after such meeting and before such committee shall proceed with the liquidation, the officers of the credit union shall file with the State Examiner a certified copy of the minutes of such meeting, a written statement outlining a plan of liquidation and a verified statement in writing signed by a majority of the officers consenting to such liquidation containing the names and addresses of all officers and directors of the credit union. After the State Examiner shall be proper examination determine that such credit union is solvent, he shall issue a certificate of approval of the liquidation, which certificate shall be filed with the register of deeds in the county where such credit union is located. From and after such special meeting the credit union shall cease to do business except for purposes of liquidation. Before commencing such liquidation such a committee shall execute and file with the State Examiner a bond running to the State of North Dakota for the benefit of the members and creditors of the credit union in such amount and with such sureties and in such form as shall be approved by the State Examiner conditioned for the faithful performance of all duties of its trust.
- (c) Upon filing of such certificate with the Register of Deeds, the credit union shall be deemed dissolved and its corporate existence terminated except for the purpose of discharging its debts, collecting and distributing its assets and doing all other acts required in order to liquidate. The credit union shall have a corporate existence and may sue and be sued.
- (d) If the credit union shall not be completely liquidated and its assets discharged within three years after such special meeting of the members, the State Examiner shall take possession of the books, records and assets and proceed to complete the liquidation in the manner then provided by law for the liquidation of closed banks.
- (e) Funds representing unclaimed dividends in liquidation in the hands of such liquidating committee or the State Examiner for six months after date of final dividend shall be deposited with the State Treasurer who shall within one year thereafter pay over the money so held by him to the persons respectively entitled thereto upon being furnished satisfactory evidence of their right to the same, and at the end of such year the State Treasurer shall credit all residue of such deposit to the General Fund.
- (f) Upon completion of the liquidation by such liquidating committee it shall file with the State Examiner a verified statement in writing signed by the members of such committee stating that all debts of the credit union including deposits, have been paid except unclaimed dividends, and if any such, the amount thereof, the names of the persons en

titled thereto with their last known addresses, and all books and papers of the credit union shall thereupon be deposited with the State Examiner.

Section 21. MAY CHANGE PLACE OF BUSINESS.) A credit union may change its place of business on written permission of the State Examiner.

Section 22. SHALL BE DEEMED SAVINGS BANKS FOR TAXATION PURPOSES.) A credit union shall be deemed a consumers co-operative association for purposes of taxation.

Section 23. CONFLICTING ACTS REPEALED.) All laws and parts of laws in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

At this time I take great pleasure in introducing to you the Governor of North Dakota, Walter Welford.

Mr. Scholl: Mr. President and Members of the Joint Session, I believe that we all realize, and our attention has

been called to the part that the Boy Scouts are taking in today's program in commemoration of the two hundred and third anniversary of the birthday of George Washington. This is also the twenty-fifth anniversary of the organization of the Boy Scouts of America.

In connection with this I want to offer a resolution, which I request the Secretary of the Senate to now read.

The resolution was accordingly read by the Secretary of the Senate.

#### JOINT RESOLUTION

Introduced by Representative Scholl on February 22, 1935

Today we commemorate the two hundred third anniversary of the birth of George Washington. This same month we commemorated the twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of the Boy Scouts of America.

I move, Mr. President, that this joint assembly extend hearty congratulations to the Boy Scouts of America for the quarter century of achievement in development of the citizens of tomorrow; that North Dakota welcomes these prospective citizens who are now members of the various Scout Troops of our commonwealth. I further move that the presiding officers of the Senate and House of Representatives be requested to convey these, our sentiments, to James E. West, National Scout Executive, Boy Scouts of America, in a document to be signed by the Governor, by the presiding officers of the Senate and House of Representatives and attested to by the Secretary of State.

At this time Representative L. R. Burgum delivered an address to the Joint Session, in commemoration of George Washington.

"His State Honored Him and He Honored His State" is a fitting description of the public career of Porter J. McCumber.

Farmer boy, country school teacher, law student working his way through school, country lawyer, member of the Territorial House of Representatives and Senate, State's Attorney, practitioner of law, United States Senator, member of the International Joint Boundary Commission—the history of a typical American.

Son of Orlin and Anna E. McCumber, born at Crete, Will

County, State of Illinois, on February 3, 1858, died in Washington, D. C., on May 16, 1933. His ancestry was Scotch.

He came with his parents at an early age to a farm which is the present site of the famous Mayo Brothers Clinic at Rochester, Minnesota, worked on the farm and taught country school, then worked his way through law school at the University of Michigan, graduating in the class of 1880, and in 1881 he opened his office for the practice of law in Lisbon Township, Richland County, Territory of Dakota, but in a few months he moved to the thriving frontier town of Wahpeton, where he made his permanent home until his removal to Washington in March, 1899. On May 24, 1889, he married Jenny Sohrning of Minneapolis. There are two children. He was elected to the Territorial House of Reprepresentatives, serving in the Session of 1885 and the Council for the Session of 1887. He held no other public office until 1895 when he was elected State's Attorney of Richland County, serving in 1896 and 1897. From that time until January, 1899, he practiced his profession at Wahpeton, and on January 20, 1899, he was elected United States Senator from North Dakota, as a Republican, by the State Senate as a compromise candidate. He took his seat in the Senate on March 4, 1899, virtually and actually unknown, and two decades later he was chairman of the most powerful committee in the United States-the Finance Committee of the Senate of the United States-a position which he earned and deserved through hard work and ability. Intellectual and sincere, honest and straight-forward, courageous, forceful and logical were his chief characteristics; and, while he was an eloquent orator, he always impressed one with his knowledge of the subject, and his vigorous, original presentation of his thoughts was very striking. A good, loyal, constant friend, he never dodged aside on his account or shirked the feud of a friend.

His good, cool judgment, backed by study and native ability made him respected in his many decisions on the Finance Committee and proved he was a statesman to rank with the giants of any day, in our Country's history.

Earl P. Bishop was born at Bedford, Iowa, in the year 1882. At an early age he removed with his parents to Chicago, Illinois, where he attended the public schools. Grown to manhood, he located for a time at Hastings, Minnesota. There he married Helen Carter on July 16, 1903. In 1907 he came to North Dakota, locating at Belfield in Stark County, where he operated a hardware and furniture store and a funeral home until his death, August 16, 1934. In 1920 he was selected by the electors of this state as a delegate to the Republican National Convention at Chicago. He was elected a member of the House of Representatives for the Thirty-first Legislative District, comprising Stark County, in 1928 and was reelected for another term in the year 1930. For eight years prior to his death he served his city as mayor. In 1933 he was appointed to the office of County Commissioner of Stark County, North Dakota. He was a member of the Congregational Church and was affiliated with the Odd Fellows

Lodge. Surviving him are his wife, Helen Bishop; two daughters, Ruby Josephine Bishop of Denver, Colorado, and Mrs. R. D. Eslick of Belfield, North Dakota; a granddaughter Julien Eslick; and a brother Carl A. Bishop of St. Joseph, Missouri.

WHEREAS, the Honorable Anton T. Kraabel, of Clifford, in Traill County, North Dakota, departed this life in June, 1934, after residing in this state since 1882, and

WHEREAS, During the time of his residence in North Dakota he served his state as representative from the 8th District in 1903, and as senator from the 8th District in 1907 and 1909, and served as Lieutenent Governor in 1913 and 14, and 1917 and 18, and

WHEREAS, He was a man of sterling integrity and character, serving his state faithfully and well,

NOW THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by the Senate and the House of Representatives in joint session assembled, that we do express our deep regret at his passing; and

Be It Further Resolved, That this resolution be recorded in the proceedings of this Assembly and copies thereof mailed to his family. Anton T. Kraabel was born at Guldbrandelalen, Norway, on October 16, 1862. He was educated in the common schools of Wisconsin, coming to North Dakota in 1882, and became a merchant. At the time of his death he was visiting at the home of his son, Reverend M. O. Kraabel, at Circle, Montana. He was buried at Clifford, North Dakota, on June 22, 1934.

#### ANDREW A. BRUCE

Judge Bruce was born at Nunda Drug, Neilgherry Hills in southern India, in 1866 the son of a general in the British Army, being a Scotchman by descent. With his parents he returned to Scotland from India, and there when he arrived at the age of fifteen years, his parents died. He immigrated to the United States and began his life as a farm laborer in Minnesota. He entered the University of Wisconsin and worked his way through, by manual labor and corresponding for newspapers. He graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1890 and from the law school in 1892. He served, for two years following his graduation, as secretary to the Supreme Court of Wisconsin, and then began the practice of his profession in Chicago. In 1898 he accepted a position as a member of the faculty of the law school of the University of Wisconsin. He became dean of the law school of the University of North Dakota in 1901, and in 1911 was appointed by Governor Burke to succeed Chief Justice Morgan who had resigned on account of ill health. Judge Bruce was elected to succeed himself in 1912 and was a member of our Supreme Court till January 1, 1919, when he retired to private life, having declined to be a candidate for re-election in 1918. He died in Chicago, December 6th, 1934.

Judge Bruce was the author of several legal and socialogical publications and was recognized as a specialist in municipal law, especially in matters of taxation.

After his retirement from the court he was connected with the schools of law of the University of Minnesota and Northwestern University.

Judge Bruce was a man of unswerving devotion to duty. His outstanding qualifications were honesty, industry and a love of fairness.

In the death of Judge Bruce our country has lost a just judge, a great teacher and a good citizen. Therefore, Be it Resolved that the foregoing tribute be adopted by the Legislative Assembly; printed in the Journal of the House and that an engrossed copy be forwarded to the members of Judge Bruce's family.

# BURLEIGH F. SPALDING

Born December 3, 1853. Died March 17, 1934. Lawyer. Member of Capitol Commission, 1883. Member of the State Constitutional Convention 1889. Representative in Congress 1899-1900, 1903-1904. Judge of the Supreme Court 1907-1914. Judge Spalding was born in Orleans County, Ver-

mont. He was admitted to the Bar in that state in 1880 and removed to Fargo the same year and immediately entered upon the practice of his profession which he continued till the time of his death with the interruptions due to the public offices he was chosen to fill.

Judge Spalding's life was a long and useful one. From the very beginning he met with success which was due to his own efforts. He was not only a leader in his profession but was a man of great influnce in his home community and throughout the state. His integrity and ability and untring industry made him a valuable man in every position he occupied. His influence was always on the side of right. No citizen did more to build up our state. He helped locate its capitol and afterward took a leading part in the convention which framed our state constitution and as a Judge of the Supreme Court he interpreted the laws and decided legal questions with the thought only, of justice to all. His legal opinions are to be found in fourteen volumes of the North Dakota Reports. As a man he was held in the highest esteem by a wide circle of friends and acquaintances.

After fifty-four years of useful, though arduous labor, in both public and private life, he died at the age of eighty years in the full possession of all his faculties.

It can be said of Judge Spalding that he set for himself a rigid code of duty and always lived up to it.

Be it Resolved that the foregoing memorial be adopted by the Legislative Assembly; that it be printed in the Journal of the House and that properly engrossed copies be sent to the members of Judge Spalding's family.

Mr. Aljets: Mr. President. Two years ago among the most prominent members of the House of Representatives was my good friend and colleague, Carl L. Broschat, of Cathay. Today we pay tribute, and the tribute of the state to his memory.

Carl L. Broschat was born in Germany, coming to America with his parents when he was seven years of age, settling in the Cathay community on a farm. Mr. Broschat spent most of his life on the farm. He was married in 1919 to Miss Minnie Krebs and to this union was born eight children. Mrs. Broschat and two children preceded him in death, leaving six children to mourn this great loss.

Carl Broschat was a public-minded man and from an early age was active in the affairs of the state and community. For twenty-two years he was a member of the school board and was always interested in bettering the school system and protecting the interest of the boys and girls in the schools. He was an active member of the Farmers Union and was ever ready to do his part in advancing the cause of the farmers through this organization.

Mr. Broschat was a member of the House of Representatives of the 1933 session. From the beginning of the session he was an active member, and took a definite interest in all the activities of the Legislature.

Mr. Broschat and myself were known among the members of the House as the Wells county twins. We not only worked together in the House, but were always anxious to be in each other's company. During the Session he was my roommate, and I personally was made to realize a great loss when he passed away on December 6, of last year. As a legislator the other members of the House will readily agree that he worked always industriously and efficiently for what he considered the best interest of the people and of the state. As a man he was held in highest esteem by a wide circle of friends and acquaintances. We mourn his untimely death, but rejoice in that his life work was done in North Dakota.

# Mr. Blaisdell:

James Johnson was born May 1, 1850, at Villie Jeland, Denmark, and died July 14, 1932, at Minot, North Dakota.

Mr. Johnson, a former officer in the Danish Navy, immigrated to the United States in 1872, securing employment for a time in the woods of western Minnesota. He gradually pushed westward into the Dakota Territory, remaining for a time at what is now Sanborn and for several years at Lis-

bon, North Dakota. At the last place he became acquainted with and married Ida Colton. In 1883 he and his wife drove to the junction of the Mouse and DesLacs Rivers and located at what is now Burlington, North Dakota, where in time they acquired a large farm.

Mr. Johnson was the first Postmaster in Imperial Ward County, the postoffice being located in his home near Burlington. He was later the first Territorial Clerk of the District Court and also served as Probate Judge. In 1891 Mr. Johnson was elected to the State Senate and represented Ward and McLean Counties in the Second Legislative Session. Thereafter he served as State's Attorney of Ward County for twelve years. He and the late Joseph Roach of Minot organized the Great Northern State Bank which is now the First National Bank of Minot and of which Mr. Johnson was Chairman of the Board of Directors at the time of his death.

He was a self-made man. From early youth his integrity, perseverance and sterling character endeared him to all who knew him. James Johnson was one of the hardy pioneers who played an important part in the development of Northwestern North Dakota. He was well informed on questions and issues of the day and was ever willing to promote the welfare and good of the community in which he lived. He was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. James Johnson was an exceptionally high type of American Citizen.

Senator McDonald:

James E. Robinson, Judge of the Supreme Court—1917-1922.

Judge Robinson was a native of Michigan where he grew up and received his education. He enlisted as a soldier in the Civil War and served with the Michigan troops. After his term of enlistment expired he entered the University of Michigan and was graduated from the law department with the class of 1868, with the degree of LLB. He was admitted to the Bar in Wisconsin and located in Trempleau County, where he served as district attorney for one term.

He settled in Fargo in 1882, and devoted himself assiduously to the practice of his profession. When Judge Robinson was well past three score years and ten, he was elected a Judge of the Supreme Court of this state and served one term of six years.

He advocated simplification of court procedure and that all appeals should be speedily disposed of.

Judge Robinson was a man who was possessed of a great fund of general information and while he was a great student of the common law, his reading covered a wide range of literature. He always had the courage of his convictions and in all cases that came before him as a judge, he could always justify the honesty of his decision.

After his retiment from the court he devoted himself to

his private affairs and the editing of the publications of which he was the author. He died March 23, 1933, at the Soldiers' Home in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, aged about 90 years.

After retiring from office he continued to reside in Bowbells until his death on September 8, 1934.

#### WILLIAM J. CLAPP

Born, November 11, 1857. Died, August 28, 1934. Lawyer, member of the Constitutional Convention, 1889. Superintendent of Public Instruction, 1890-1891.

Mr. Clapp was born in Wakefield, Massachusetts, but at an early age he removed to Vermont with his parents. He was educated in the public schools of Vermont, at the Academy of St. Albins and at the Seminary in Montpelier. He came west in 1882 and for a few months he resided in Minnesota, where he was admitted to the bar. In 1883 he located at Tower City, Dakota Territory, where he engaged in the practice of law until 1889, when he was elected a member of the State Constitutional Convention. He served in that body with distinction and great fidelity.

He was always deeply interested in educational matters and when a vacancy occurred in the office of County Superintendent of Schools by the election of Captain Mitchell to the office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Mr. Clapp was appointed to fill that vacancy.

In March, 1890, the death of Captain Mitchell created a vacancy in the office of Superintendent of Public Instruction. Governor Miller appointed Mr. Clapp to serve out the term of Captain Mitchell.

At the expiration of his term, Mr. Clapp located in Fargo and devoted himself exclusively to the practice of law.

Mr. Clapp was always a public-spirited man and contributed largely to the upbuilding of the community in which he lived. He served as alderman in the city of Fargo for six years. He was a member of the City Park Board and was clerk of that body from 1910 till the time of his death—twenty-four years in all. It was due to his excellent work that the city of Fargo has one of the most beautiful and extensive park systems to be found in any community its size in the United States.

Mr. Clapp was an active member of the church to which he belonged and served on its official board for forty-two years.

In all his undertakings Mr. Clapp always sought to do his best. He gave of his time and his talents to reduce human misery; to help those less fortunate than himself and to

preserve for future generations the institutions of our country and to hand them on not lessened but made greater by his efforts.

#### REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEES

The Committee on Temperance made the following report:

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Temperance to whom was referred:

House Bill No. 290. A Bill for an Act, Regulating the Importation, Transportation, Sale and Possession in Certain Cases of Liquor; Defining Liquor; Providing Certain Powers and Duties of the Beer Commissioner or Other Officer Charged With the Execution of the Duties Incidental to Regulation; Providing Certain Regulations for the Importation, Transportation, Sale and Possession of Liquor; Providing for the Revenue Therefrom, and Licenses Therefor; Providing for the Bonding for Certain Persons in Connection With the Regulation of Importation, Transportation, Sale and Possession of Liquor; Prohibiting the Transfer of Licenses; Excluding Certain Persons From the Right to Purchase Liquor; Authorizing and Requiring Governing Bodies of Municipalities to Provide and Require the Payment of a Local Tax or License, and Raise Revenue Therefrom; to Prescribe Certain Regulations, Limiting the Place and Time of Sale; Providing for the Labeling of All Liquor Containers; Providing for an Excise Tax and Regulations Thereto; for the Keeping of Certain Records by the Beer Commissioner; Providing for the Making of Certain Reports; Providing for the Confiscation of Unstamped Liquor; Providing for Money With Which to Put This Act Into Operation and Providing for the Administration of This Act; Providing for the Disposition of Liquor Revenue, and the Allotment Thereof; to School Districts of the State; Providing for the Reduction of Taxes on Real Estate to the Extent of Such Application; Providing Penalties for the Violation of the Provisions of This Act; Repealing All Acts in Conflict Therweith; Providing For a Saving Clause as to Constitutionality; Declaring an Emergency.

In the title of the printed Bill, line 2, strike out the words "in certain cases."

In the last line of the title on the first page of the printed bill strike out the word "allottment" and insert in lieu thereof "allotment" (with one "t").

The last word in the next to the last line of the title on page 2 of the printed bill should be spelled "constitutionality."

In line 10 of Section 1 of the printed bill, insert a comma after the word "which."

In line 21, Section 1, of printed bill, strike out the words, "within this State" and also the words "any platted town."

In line 4, Section 2, of printed bill, strike out the word "this," and insert in lieu thereof the word "the."

In line 6, Section 3, of printed bill, strike out the words "discression infer" and in lieu thereof insert the words "discretion transfer."

In line 10 of Section 3, printed bill, correct the spelling of the word "Regulator," to "Regulatory."

In line 16, of Section 3, of the printed bill, strike out the word "minimum" and insert in lieu thereof "maximum." In the same line and section, place a semi-colon instead of a comma following the word wholesale.

In line 17, Section 3, of the printed bill, strike out the words "in booklet form."

In line 32, Section 3, of the printed bill, insert the word "to" immediately preceding the word "enforce"; and in the same line and section, strike out the word "retailer," and insert in lieu thereof "retailers."

In Section 3, line 40, of printed bill, place a comma before the word "are."

In line 5, Section 4, of the printed bill, strike out the word "obtained," and insert in lieu thereof "obtaining."

In line 7, Section 4, strike out the word "fermentation," and insert in lieu thereof "fermenting."

In line 2, Section 5 of the printed bill, strike out the word "license" and insert in lieu thereof the word "licenses."

In line 10, Section 5, strike out the words "or contemplates engaging."

In line 11, Section 5, remove the comma after the word "in."

In line 1, Section 6, strike out the word "Licenses" and insert in lieu thereof the word "License."

In line 8, Section 6, correct the spelling of the word "businesss" to "business."

In line 15, Section 6, strike out the word "It" and insert in lieu thereof the word "There."

In line 17 and beginning the line 18, Section 6, strike out the word "organized" and insert in lieu thereof "incorporated," and in line 18 of the same Section (6) insert the word "organized" following the word "and."

In line 24, Section 6, strike out the words "shall have" and insert in lieu thereof "has."

# FORTY-SIXTH DAY AFTER RECESS AND THE FORTY-SEVENTH DAY

House of Representatives, Bismarck, North Dakota, February 23, 1935

The House convened at 12:30 P. M. pursuant to recess, Speaker Crockett presiding.

At this time the rules were suspended for the purpose of the consideration of General Orders.

#### GENERAL ORDERS

Mr. Scholl moved that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of general orders; which motion prevailed.

House Bill No. 172. A Bill for an Act Providing for the Establishment of Voting Precincts in All Independent and Special School Districts; Requiring Establishment of Polling Places for Each 3000 Inhabitants; Providing for Appointment of Election Officials, Fixing Their Powers, Duties and Compensation and Repealing All Acts or Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In the heading of the bill strike out the words "AND INDE-PENDENT."

In the title of the printed Bill, strike out the words, in lines 1 and 2, "in all Independent."

In line 3 of the title strike out the figures 3000 and insert in lieu thereof the figures 5000.

In Section 1, line 1 after the word "special" strike out the words "and Independent."

In line 3 after the word "Special" strike out the words "or Independent."

In line 5 substitute the figures "5000" in place of "3000."

"For an Act providing for the protection of the public health and prevention of fraud and deception by prohibiting the purchase of cream or milk unfit for buttermaking purposes; establishing grades for cream and providing for the purchase of cream on the basis of grade; providing for the necessary licensing, regulating the maintenance and operation of creameries and cream stations, and for other purposes; repealing all Acts in conflict herewith and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakot:a

Section 1. That the following Act shall be cited as "The Cream Grading Law."

Section 2. DEFINITION OF TERMS.) As used in this Act, unless the context otherwise indicates.

- (a) The term "person" includes individual, partnership, corporation or association.
- (b) The term "cream station" means any place other than a creamery, where deliveries of milk or cream are weighed, sampled or tested for purchase on a butterfat basis.
- (c) The term "Creamery" means any place where milk or cream, delivered by two or more persons, is churned into butter for commercial purposes.
- (d) The term "Babcock test" means the official Babcock test for milk and for cream as set forth in the latest edition or supplement thereto of the "Methods of Analysis" of the Association of Official Agricultural Chemists."
- (e) Term of "sweet cream grade" means cream that is sweet in taste, clean and sound, free from undesirable flavor or odor, and free from extraneous matter which makes it unfit for human consumption. It contains not less than 25% butterfat and its acidity does not exceed 0.25% calculated as lactic acid.
- (f) The term "grade 1 cream" means cream that is clean to the taste and smell; its acidity does not exceed 0.7% calculated as lactic acid; it contains less than 25% butterfat and is free from lumps, mold, dirt and other foreign matter, which makes it unfit for human consumption.
- (g) The term "grade 2 cream" is cream that will produce butter which will score not less than 88, as determined by the

official scoring method for butter adopted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It may have an undesirable flavor or odor but is free from mold, dirt or other foreign matter which makes it unfit for human consumption.

- (h) The term "unlawful or reject cream" means cream which contains any dirt, filth, mold or other foreign matter, or is stale, rancid, putrid, decomposed or actively foaming, in any amount or degree that makes it unfit for human consumption.
- Section 3. GRADE PURCHASE: PRICE DIFFERENTIALS: WHEN.) All purchases or receipts of cream for buttermaking purposes shall be on the basis of the following grades: (a) sweet cream, (b) grade one, (c) grade two. Providing that nothing herein centained shall require a person to purchase other than the grade or grades desired and provided further, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as prohibiting any person from purchasing sweet cream at grade one price. Every person buying or receiving cream shall maintain a price differential between contiguous grades of not less than 1c per pound butterfat, and shall post in a prominent place in each cream station or creamery controlled, owned, or operated by him, the grades upon which he is buying cream and the current prices paid for butterfat, and the price differential shall apply only to the grades so posted.
- LICENSED BUYERS.) A licensed cream Section 4. buyer, duly qualified to grade and test cream, shall be maintained in each creamery and in each station where cream is purchased for buttermaking purposes. A grading li-cense shall be issued by the Dairy Department to such person who shall have passed a satisfactory examination in person and shall have proven by actual demonstration before an inspector or authorized agent of the Department that he is competent and qualified to grade cream and that he is fully conversant with all the requirements of this Act. Every such license, unless revoked, shall be valid for one year after date of issue and shall not be transferable. The fee for such annual license shall be three dollars (\$3.00) and shall be paid to the Dairy Department or its agent before such license or renewal thereof is issued. The examination which a buyer must pass in order to obtain a grading license shall cover (a) ability to grade cream, (b) knowledge of sanitary regulations, (c) knowledge of records required, tagging requirements and reports to Dairy Commissioner, and (d) such further subjects not inconsistent with this Act as shall be determined by the Dairy Commissioner and approved by the head of the Department of Dairying of the Agricultural College.
- Section 5. DUTIES OF CREAM GRADER.) Each licensed grader shall promptly grade each lot of cream delivered to or received by him. Wherever cream is graded, whether at the cream station or creamery, the cream grader shall keep a true record of each lot of cream received and graded. The record shall show the name of the producer

or owner of the cream, the date of delivery, the quantity delivered, the grade or grades assigned and the price paid. As soon as the cream is graded it shall be placed in clean containers or shipping cans. Each shipping can containing graded cream must have a label or tag firmly attached which shall designate the grade of the cream contained and the name and address of the cream station or creamery where it was received. All licensed cream buyers shall affix to the container of unlawful or rejected cream, tags provided by the State Dairy Department at cost. These tags must be in triplicate, one to be affixed to the container of unlawful or rejected cream, one to be mailed to the Dairy Department, and one to be retained by the buyer for inspection by the Dairy or Food Inspectors.

These tags must contain the following information: Date of rejection, name and address of owner, name and address of buyer, and reasons for rejection. The Dairy Department shall keep a complete record of all rejection tags issued, and rejections reported.

Section 6. REVOCATION OF LICENSE.) The Dairy Commissioner shall have authority to revoke any license issued under the provisions of Section 5. Evidence that the licensee has violated any of the provisions of this Act shall be sufficient cause for such revocation. The Dairy Commissioner shall notify the licensee that his license is to be revoked and shall give such licensee an opportunity to appear before the Dairy Commissioner or his authorized agent within five days, at a time and place designated by the Dairy Commissioner, to show cause why such license should not be cancelled. The licensee may appear in person or be represented by an attorney or other person, or may submit a statement in writing. If licensee fails to show cause on or before the date of the hearing, why the license should not be revoked, the Dairy Commissioner shall notify licensee that the revocation of the license will become effective at the expiration of ten days from date of such notice.

SANITATION OF CREAMERY AND CREAM Section 7. No creamery or cream station shall be permit-STATION.) ted to be operated in unclean, insanitary or disorderly surroundings. Every licensed creamery or cream station shall maintain a separate room or rooms to be exclusively for the handling and sorting of cream or dairy products. Walls and ceilings must be tight and kept clean and free from dust. The floor shall be tight, frequently scrubbed and kept clean The room shall be well lighted, adequately at all times. ventilated and of suitable size to properly handle the volume of business done, and all windows, doors and other openings shall be properly screened. Every creamery or cream station shall have an adequate supply of hot and cold water. Suitable can racks shall be maintained inside the creamery or cream station on which cream cans, when empty, shall be kept inverted with lids removed at all times and all cans shall be thoroughly washed before being used for milk or cream. All empty cans shall be thoroughly washed and sterilized and shall be thoroughly dry before lids are affixed. There shall be no windows, doors or other openings into other rooms unless to a room kept in a clean and sanitary condition. The station must have cooling facilities of sufficient capacity for all cream received in one day's business; and adequate facilities for heating plenty of water.

Section 8. VIOLATIONS.) The following Acts are hereby prohibited:

- (1) The purchase or receipt of cream for butter making purposes except on the basis of grades as provided in Section 3.
- (2) The failure to maintain a price differential between cream grades or the failure to post in a cream station or creamery the current prices paid for butter fat.
- (3) The grading of any lot of cream by an unlicensed grader.
- (4) The improper or incorrect grading of any lot of cream by a licensed grader.
- (5) The acceptance, purchase or possession by any creamery or cream station of unlawful or reject cream.
- (6) The failure on the part of any licensed cream grader to keep such records as are required in Section 5.
- (7) The possession by a cream station or creamery of any graded cream unlabeled or falsely labeled as to grade, or the shipment or delivery or consignment for shipment or delivery by any licensed buyer of graded cream unlabeled or falsely labeled as to grade.
- (8) The maintenance of any cream station or creamery in violation of Section 7 or in an insanitary condition or the conduct of such cream station or creamery in a manner whereby milk, cream or butter may be contaminated within the meaning of this Act.
- (9) The wilful obstruction or hindrance to any official inspection.
- Section 9. ENFORCEMENT.) In the enforcement of this Act the Dairy Department shall be charged with the educational work necessary for a proper knowledge and appreciation among buyers and producers of the grading features of this law; the examining of applicants for license and the promoting, improving and advancing the interests of the dairy industry in the State and is authorized to otherwise enforce this Act. The State Food Commissioner and Chemist shall be charged with the sanitary inspection of all establishments concerned; analysis of dairy products and enforcement of grading provisions.
- Section 10. DISPOSITION OF FEES.) All revenues derived under the authority of this Act and all other license fees collected by the Dairy Department shall be used in the enforcement of this Act and the dairy laws of the State.

Thus, all license moneys collected by the Dairy Department shall be forwarded to the State Treasurer who shall credit not less than 60% to the Dairy Department and place it in a special revolving fund to be known as the "Dairy Department Fund" and credit the remaining 40%, but not to exceed \$6000.00 per year, to the "State Regulatory Fund," out of which funds all bills and expense of whatever nature incurred in the enforcement of this Act shall by said Treasurer be paid after audit and approval by the State Auditing Board.

Section 11. PENALTIES.) Any violation of any of the provisions of this Act is hereby declared to be a misdemeanor, and any person, whether individually, or as a member of a partnership, or as an agent or officer of a corporation, who shall be convicted of such violation either on his own behalf or in the interest of any other individual or corporation, association or partnership, shall be fined not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and such person's license may be suspended for 30 days and permanently revoked on second offense.

Section 12. ACTS IN CONFLICT.) All Acts or parts of Acts in conflict or inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

Section 13. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE.) If any section, subdivision, sentence or clause of this Act shall, for any reason, be held void or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of any other portion of this Act.

Section 14. EMERGENCY.) Whereas, an emergency exists, this Act shall be in full force and effect from and after June 1, 1935, but the giving of examinations and grading license and issuance thereof is authorized after the passage and approval of this Act, and in advance of that date."

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be indefinitely postponed.

The Committee on Public Health made the following report:

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Public Health to whom was referred:

House Bill No. 324. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Re-enact Section 2547, 2548 and 2565 of the Compiled Laws of 1913, Relating to Care of the Insane.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Strike out everything after the words "A Bill," and insert the following:

For an Act to Amend and Re-enact Section 2547, 2548, and 2553 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, and Section 2565 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, as Amended by Chapter 109 of the 1929 Session Laws Relating to the Care of Insane Persons and to Their Commitment to the State Hospital for the Insane at Jamestown, North Dakota.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. AMENDMENT.) That Section 2547 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, be amended and reenacted to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 2547. APPOINTMENT OF COMMISSIONERS OF INSANITY.) There is hereby established in each organized county of this state, a Board of Commissioners of Insanity, composed of three members. The county judge and the states attorney shall be members of said board and in counties where a county physician has been appointed on an annual salary, the county physician shall be such third member. Where no county physician has been appointed on an annual salary, the third member of such Board shall be a reputable practicing physician, appointed by the Board of County Commissioners and such appointment shall be made of a physician as near as may be to the county seat. In case of appointment such commissioner shall be appointed for two years and until his successor is appointed and qualified. The county judge shall act as chairman of the board. In case of temporary absence of the states attorney or the physician, who are members of this Board from the county as provided above, or their inability to act, the county judge shall call to his aid a reputable physician or attorney, who, after qualifying, may act in the same capacity as such absentees. In case of the temporary absence from the county of the county judge or his inability to act, the states attorney shall act in his place instead, as chairman of the said board and shall have full authority to issue subpoenas and commitments, and to do all and any necessary acts as such chairman. The records in such cases must show the fact of all absences.

Section 2. AMENDMENT.) That Section 2548 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, be amended and reenacted to read as follows, to-wit:

OATH OF COMMISSIONERS. Section 2548. IZATION AND MEETINGS.) Before entering upon the duties of their offices, the members of such Board whether they be members by reason of their office or by appointment, shall take and subscribe an oath to support the constitution of the United States and the constitution of the State of North Dakota, and to faithfully discharge their duties as such commissioner according to law, which oath shall be filed with the county judge, who shall enter a memorandum thereof on the records. On organizing the members of the Board shall choose one of their number to act as Clerk of the Board. They shall hold their meetings at the office of the county judge, unless for good reason they shall fix some other place for such meetings. If it shall be deemed necessary, the members of the board may hold session at such regular times as they may determine. The board shall also meet at the call of the chairman of the said board.

Section 3. AMENDMENT.) That Section 2553 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, be amended and reenacted to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 2553. HOW PATIENTS SHALL BE SENT TO HOSPITAL.) On the return of the physician's certificate the Commissioners shall as soon as practicable conclude their investigations and if they, or a majority of them, are of the opinion that the person under investigation is not insane as alleged in the application made as provided in Section 2551 C. L., then an order shall immediately be made and entered by the county judge dismissing the application and releasing, if in custody, the person therein named. If a majority of the Commissioners are at the conclusion of their investigation of the opinion that the person under investigation is insane, then an order shall be made and entered by the county judge finding that such person should be sent to the Hospital for the Insane at Jamestown, North Dakota, for further investigation by the Superintendent of that hospital, but such order shall contain no finding as to the alleged insanity and shall not declare such person The Commissioners shall forthwith issue their warrant and a duplicate thereof, stating such finding, with the residence of the person if ascertained; and if not ascertained, their information, if any, in regard thereto, authorizing the Superintendent of the Hospital to receive and keep such person at said hospital for further investigation and until final committment or release as hereinafter provided. Such warrant and duplicate with the finding and certificate of the physician shall be delivered to the sheriff of the county, who shall execute the same by conveying such person to the hospital and delivering him with such duplicate and physician's certificate, and finding to the superintendent The superintendent over his official signature shall acknowledge such delivevry on the original warrant, which the sheriff shall return to the county judge with his fees and expenses indorsed thereon. If neither the sheriff nor his deputy is at hand, or if both are otherwise engaged. the commissioners may appoint some other suitable person to execute the warrant in his stead, who shall take and subscribe an oath faithfully to discharge his duty, and shall be entitled to the same fees as the sheriff. The sheriff or any other person so appointed may take to his aid such assistance as he may need to execute such warrant; but no female shall thus be taken to the hospital without the attendance of some other female, or some relative of such person. The superintendent in his acknowledgment of delivevry must state whether there was any such person in attendance, and give the name, if any. If any relative or intimate friend of the patient, who is a suitable person, shall so request, he shall have the privilege of taking and executing such warrant in preference to the sheriff or any other person, and without taking such oath, and for so doing he shall be entitled to his necessary expenses, but no fees.

Upon receipt of the above warrant from the Commissioners, the Superintendent shall make such investigation and submit the person therein named to such treatment as may be deemed necessary by him to finally determine whether or not such person is insane. If at the conclusion of such investigation and treatment, the said Superintendent is of the opinion that said person is insane, then the Superintendent shall immediately certify to the county judge who issued the warrant his conclusion and the said county judge shall thereupon enter in his office a final order declaring and finding such person insane; otherwise the said person shall be by the Superintendent released from custody, and the Superintendent shall certify that release to the county judge, and appropriate order shall be entered by the county judge in his office dismissing all proceedings had before the Commissioners of Insanity in the matter of the allaged in-

The provisions of this section shall apply to all cases of alleged insanity brought before the Commissioners of Insanity of this State and in no case shall said Commissioners of Insanity enter any final order declaring a person insane unless and until the Superintendent of the Hospital for the Insane at Jamestown, North Dakota, has after investigation as herein provided, certify to the county judge that such person is insane; provided, however, that if for any reason the alleged insane person cannot be sent to the Hospital for the Insane at Jamestown, North Dakota, for further investigation and treatment as herein provided, then the Commissioners of Insanity may make such orders as may be necessary for the care and custody and restraint from liberty of that person within the purview and intent of and to fully carry out other provisions of Article 4 of Chapter 38 of the Political Code of North Dakota, but in no case shall a final order declaring a person insane be entered by the Superintendent of the Hospital for the Insane at Jamestown, North Dakota, certified to him as insane in the manner hereinbefore provided.

Section 4. AMENDMENT.) That Section 2565 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, as amended by Chapter 109 of the 1929 Session Laws be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 2565. SALARIES AND FEES, BY WHOM PAID.) The Commissioners of Insanity shall, by reason of their being county officials and receiving an annual salary from the county, serve as a board of Commissioners of Insanity as herein provided without additional salary. In case of appointed members who are not receiving an annual salary from the county, such member shall be allowed the sum of Three Dollars (\$3.00) for each case examined and mileage at the rate of five cents (5c) per mile. The sheriff shall be allowed for services other than conveying the patient to the hospital and returning therefrom, the same fees as for like services in other cases. Witnesses shall be entitled to the same fees as witnesses in the district court. The compensation and expenses provided for above shall be allowed and paid out of the county treasury in the usual manner, except the fees and expenses of the sheriff for conveying the patient to the hospital for the insane, or to the authorities of another state, which shall be paid out of the state treasury in the usual manner.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

CARL ANFINSON, Chairman. Mr. Anfinson moved that the report be adopted, which motion prevailed and the report was adopted:

The Committee on Appropriations made the following report:

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Appropriations to whom was referred:

House Bill No. 338. A Bill for an Act Creating a State Board of Public Welfare, Defining its Powers and Duties, Making an Appropriation Therefor, Repealing All Acts and Parts in Conflict with the Provisions of This Act, and Declaring an Emergency.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Strike out everything after the words "A Bill" and insert in lieu thereof the following:

For an Act Creating a State Board of Public Welfare, Defining its Powers and Duties; Permitting Appointment of Executive Director; Hold Office at Pleasure of Board; Establishing the State Welfare Fund; Making an Appropriation Therefor; Repealing All Acts and Parts of Acts in Conflict with the Provisions of This Act, and Declaring an Emergency.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

The Governor, Attorney General and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court shall within thirty (30) days after the passage and approval of this Act appoint a board to consist of seven (7) members, at least one (1) of whom shall be a World War Veteran, and such board shall be known as the Public Welfare Board of North Dakota, hereinafter referred to as the Board. Three (3) members of the board shall be appointed for a term of two (2) years, two for a term of four years, and two for a term of six years. The term of office of each of the successors of the original board shall be six years. Any member appointed to fill a vacancy on the Board shall serve only during the unexpired term wherein the vacancy occurred; but members of the Board shall serve until their successors have been appointed and have qualified. All members of the public welfare board of North Dakota shall be appointed by the Governor, the Attorney General and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, acting jointly. A member of the Public Welfare Board of North Dakota may be removed by the Governor for cause.

Section 2. ORGANIZATION MEETING.) Within sixty days after this act takes effect the Governor shall call the members thus appointed to meet at the state capitol at Bismarck, North Dakota, and the board shall organize by the election of a president, a vice president, a secretary and such other officers and employees as the board shall determine. The board shall hold meetings at least quarterly and when-

ever called in session by the president or by a majority of the members of the board.

Section 3. COMPENSATION. APPOINTMENT OF EX-ECUTIVE DIRECTOR.) (a) All members of the board shall receive no compensation for their services but shall be paid their actual expenses incurred in attending meetings of the board and while engaged in the performance of the duties prescribed in this act; such expense shall be audited and paid in the same manner as the expenses of state officers are audited and paid. (b) The board shall appoint an executive director, whose salary shall not exceed \$2,400.00 a year, and who shall devote entire time to the duties of office. executive director shall be a person who has professional qualifications, wide experience, education and training, in the administration of public and/or private welfare institutions, agencies or activities, and shall be a resident of the State of North Dakota for at least five years preceding his appointment, and shall hold office at the pleasure of the Board. Before entering upon the duties of office the executive director shall take the official oath prescribed by law for the state officials and shall file with the Secretary of State such oath of office and a surety bond to be approved by the attorney general in the penal sum of \$10,000.00 conditioned for the faithful performance of official duties and the delivery to successor of all public property in the possession or under the control of the executive director. The compensation of clerks, stenographers and other necessary employees shall be determined by the Board.

Section 4. OFFICE AND OFFICE EQUIPMENT.) The Board shall be provided with suitable offices in the state capitol, and is authorized to purchase out of the funds herein appropriated such necessary furniture, office and filing equipment, office supplies, stationery and postage as may be needed for the efficient conduct of its business.

Section 5. FUNDS TO BE PAID INTO THE STATE TREASURY.) All moneys received under the provisions of this Act from appropriations by the state legislature shall. be paid into the state treasury to be kept by the state treasurer in a fund known as the State Public Welfare Fund, and all expenditures made under the provisions of this Act shall be paid by the State Treasurer upon warrants drawn by the State Auditor; such expenditure to be supported by itemized vouchers to be signed by the executive director of the board or by such other officers and /or assistants as the board may designate and certified to the state auditor. Any funds received from federal agencies shall be deposited and disbursed in the manner provided by act of congress or by the regulations of the federal agencies from whom the funds were received.

Section 6. DUTIES OF THE BOARD.) The board shall have the following powers and duties, to-wit:

1. To act as the official agency of the State of North Dakota in any social welfare activity initiated by the Fed-

eral Government and to administer, allocate and distibute any state and federal funds that may be made available for the following purposes, to-wit:

- (a) The relief of destitute or necessitious persons;
- (b) Mother's aid;
- (c) Old age assistance;
- (d) Aid to dependent children;
- (e) Maternal and child health;
- (f) Care of crippled children;
- (g) Aid to child welfare service; and
- (h) Public health service.
- 2. To study the subjects of non-employment, poverty, vagrancy, housing conditions, crime, juvenile delinquency, public amusements, care and treatment of prisoners, divorce and wife desertion, child welfare, the social and kindred subjects and their causes, treatment and prevention and the prevention of any hurtful conditions.
- 3. To make available to the several counties, municipalities and eligible public or private institutions in the state, at such times and in such amounts as are needed, funds supplied to the board by the state and federal governments for the relief of destitution and for the purposes enumerated in the subdivisions one (1) of section six (6) of this act; and for the purchase of supplies and materials to be used for work-relief projects.
- 4. To provide for the study and promote the welfare of the dependent, delinquent, and neglected child, and to provide for the placing and supervision of dependent, delinquent and defective children, subject to the control of any court having jurisdiction and control of any such child.
- (5) To recommend to the legislature social legislation and the creation of necessary institutions.
- (6) To cooperate with and advise and assist the various county welfare boards in every way possible.
- (7) To issue bulletins and have the same printed and in other ways to inform the public as to social conditions and the proper remedy of social life.
- (8) To secure, hold and administer for the purpose for which it is organized any property and any funds donated to it, either by will or deed, or otherwise and to administer said funds or property in accordance with the instructions in the instrument creating them.
- (9) To provide for surveys and make reports on child caring institutions, homes for the aged, maternity homes,

and persons or organizations receiving and placing children, and to require such institutions, persons and organizations to submit such annual reports and information as the board may determine.

- (10) No general survey shall be undertaken or conducted except on the specific order of the state board of public welfare.
- (11) To issue subpoenas, administer oaths, and compel attendance of witnesses and production of documents or papers whenever the board deems it necessary in making the investigations provided for herein or in the discharge of its other duties, and to give such publicity to its investigations and findings as it may deam best for the public welfare, provided, however, that no subpoena shall be issued to compel the production of documents or papers relating to any private child caring and/or child placing agency or maternity hospital or to compel the attendance as a witness of any officer or employee of such institutions except upon the order of a Judge of the District court of the Judicial district in which the institution is located.
- Section 7. BIENNIAL REPORT TO GOVERNOR AND LEGISLATURE. The board shall biennially prepare and submit to the governor and legislative assembly a complete and full report of its activities during the preceding two years with such suggestions as it may deem necessary and shall report such other matters as it may think are for the benefit of the people of the state.
- Section 8. APPROPRIATION. There is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,-000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this Act.
- Section 9. It is not the intention of this Act to abolish any state agencies, bureaus or departments now in operation, nor is it the intention that the State Board of Public Welfare shall excercise control or supervision over appropriations or grants specifically made by the legislative assembly and/or by any department or agency of the federal government for or to any specific state agency, bureau, office, department or institution; nor is it the intention of this act to repeal or set aside any appropriations heretofore made or which this legislative assembly may make hereafter to any such stage, agency, bureau, office, institution or department, or for child caring or child placing agencies or maternity hospitals.
- Section 10. REPEAL) All Acts and parts of Acts in conflict with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.
- Section 11. EMERGENCY) Whereas, the creation of a state board of public welfare is necessary in order to qualify the state to receive grants of funds from the federal government for the promotion of public welfare, now, therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this act shall be

in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction shall be charged with the duty of investigating and inquiring into the general subject of elementary school costs and needs of financially distressed districts within the state. It shall be his duty to prepare the necessary application blanks and forms upon which the information required by him shall be certified to such school authorities as may be designated by him. From the information so acquired the State Superintendent of Public Instruction shall from month to month determine the minimum amount of money required to operate each of the various classes of elementary schools.
- (b) STATE SUPERINTENDENT TO MAKE MONTH-LY CERTIFICATE TO STATE AUDITOR OF SCHOOLS IN NEED. From the information obtained as provided in the preceding subdivision, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction shall monthly certifiy to the State Auditor a list of school districts of the state which are unable to pay for the operation of their schools the minimum amount determined in the manner hereinbefore set forth, after having made the maximum final effort to do so, together with a statement of the amount of the money required by such districts to meet such minimum standards.
  - (c) MAXIMUM FINANCIAL EFFORT DEFINED. In

determining whether or not a school district has made the maximum financial effort mentioned above, it must appear: (1) That the district shall have levied for the fiscal year the normal maximum tax rate as fixed by law, (2) That revenues from local taxes, and from state and county sources have been exhausted, and (3) That such district, under the law cannot issue additional warrants or sell certificates of indebtedness, or, if the same could be issued, that because of the financial condition of the school district such obligations of the district would be greatly depreciated in value to the extent that they would not be acceptable as commercial instruments.

- (d) SCHOOLS TO RECEIVE AID FOR SEVEN MONTH TERM ONLY. School districts shall receive aid as in this Section provided for the purpose of keeping their schools open for a seven month term only, and after the seventh month of any school term has expired, no further aid shall be granted under this Section.
- (e) STATE AUDITOR. The State Auditor shall issue his warrants monthly, in accordance with the certificates of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, payable to the several school districts in the amounts so directed by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, to the County Superintendents of Schools, in case the available money for distribution on the basis of need shall not be available in any month, the State Auditor shall pro-rate the available funds among the districts in proportion to the amounts so certified to him.

## FORTY-SEVENTH DAY AFTER RECESS AND THE FORTY-NINTH DAY

House of Representatives, Bismarck, North Dakota, February 25, 1935.

The House convened at 10:00 a.m., Speaker Crockett presiding.

#### GENERAL ORDERS

Mr. Wolf moved that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of general orders; which motion prevailed.

The Speaker called Mr. Wolf to the chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

The Speaker resumed the chair.

When the Committee arose it submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker: The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

House Bill No. 106. A Bill for An Act Providing and Permitting the Purchase of Gasoline to be Used Solely for Agricultural Purposes Without Payment of Gasoline Tax on Purchase Thereof; Licensing Purchasers and Sellers Thereof; Providing Penalty; Repeal.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Strike out all of lines 5 and 6 and all of line 7, Section 4, to and including the word "therefor"; insert in lieu thereof the following: "an annual license therefor, payment to the state auditor of annual license fee of two dollars and fifty cents, and issuance of license therefor; sell gasoline, tax free, for agricultural purposes solely, as herein provided."

In line 9, Section 4, strike out the word "permit" and insert in lieu thereof the word "license."

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Also,

House Bill No. 323. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Re-enact Subdivision 1 of Section 20, Subdivision (3) of Section 32, and Section 40 of Chapter 148 of the Session Laws of 1931 Relating to Game and Fish, the Propagation, Conservation, Protection and Preservation of Wild Birds, Wild Animals, and Fish; Providing for Open Season for Killing or Taking Said Game Birds, Game Animals, Fur Bearing Animals, Fish and Deer; Authorizing the Governor Upon Recommendation of the Game and Fish Commissioner to Open Central or Extended Seasons for Taking or Killing Wild Birds and Wild Animals; Providing for Search and Seizure and Providing for Resident and Non-resident Licenses; Defining Duties of Officers and Game Refuges, and Providing for Penalties and Violation Thereof and Amplifying the Provisions of the Section Hereby Amended; Prohiting the Use of Dogs, Horses, Mules or Other Animals in the Hunting of Deer or Antelope; Making Unlawful the Possession of Certain Implements, Guns, Snares and Artificial Lights in Certain Territories at Certain Times and During Certain Hours.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In line one of the printed bill, strike out the word "sub-division" and in lieu thereof insert the word "sub-section."

Strike out all of Section 2 of the original bill.

Renumber Section '3" to read Section "2."

In line one of the title of the original bill, strike out the word "sub-division" and in lieu thereof insert the word "sub-section."

In line 2, of the title of the original bill, strike out the words and figures "sub-division (3) of Section 32."

In line 3, of the title of the original bill, strike out the comma after the word "Fish" and in lieu thereof insert a period. Strike out the balance of the title.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Also.

House Bill No. 195. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Re-enact Section 6 of the Initiated Measure Entitled, "An Act to Impose a Tax Upon the Sale of Motor Vehicle Fuel; Providing for the Collection of Said Tax, for Reports of Sales of Such Motor Fuels and for the Disposition of the Revenue Derived Therefrom; Providing for the Licensing and Bonding of Dealers in Motor Vehicle Fuels and the Revocation of Such License; Regulating the Sale of Such Fuels and Fixing Penalties for the Violation of This Act, Repealing All Acts or Parts of Acts in Conflict With the Provisions of This Act," and Approved at a State Wide Election Held June 30, 1926.

And recommend the following amendments:

Strike out everything after the word "measure," in the title of the bill and add the following:

Approved by the People June 30, 1926, Imposing a Tax Upon the Sale of Motor Vehicle Fuel, as Last Amended by Chapter 189 of the 1931 Session Laws, Providing for the Refund in Certain Cases of the Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax Paid and Procedure to be Followed to Obtain Such Refund; Limiting Time Within Which Application for Refund May be Made and Allowed; and Declaring and Emergency.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. AMENDMENT.) That Section 6 of that Certain Initiated measure approved by the people June 30, 1926, as last amended by Chapter 189 of the 1931 Session Laws be amended and re-enacted to read as follows, to-wit:

That any person or persons, firm or corpora-Section 6. tion who shall buy or use any motor vehicle fuel as defined in this Act, for the purpose of operating and propelling stationary gas engines, tractors used for agricultural purposes, motor boats, airplanes or aircraft, or who shall purchase or use any of such fuel for lighting, heating, cleaning or dyeing or other commercial use of the same, except motor vehicles operated or intended to be operated, in whole or in part upon any of the public highways in the State of North Dakota, on which motor fuel tax imposed by this Act has been paid, shall be reimbursed and repaid the amount of such tax paid by him, on presentation to the State Tax Commissioner, on a form prescribed by the State Tax Commissioner, of a sworn statement setting forth the total amount of such fuel purchased and used by such consumer, other than in motor vehicles operated or intended to be operated upon any of the public highways in the State of North Dakota, and the purpose for which said motor fuel upon which he claims exemption from said tax was used, and such other information as the State Tax Commissioner shall require, and the State Tax Commissioner, upon the presentation of such sworn statement, together with the invoice or ticket hereinbefore provided for and marked paid, shall audit such claims for refunds and prepare, in duplicate, an abstract showing the claim number, the name, address and amount due each claimant, and shall certify to the State Auditor within fifteen days all claims entitled to approval; and the Auditor shall pay the same Upon such certification the State Auditor immediately. shall issue his check, payable to each consumer as shown by such certified abstract, from the taxes collected on motor fuels, the said taxes on fuels purchased or used for other than motor vehicles as aforesaid, and shall deliver, for mailing, said checks to the State Tax Commissioner; provided that no refund or repayment shall be made unless such claimant thereof shall make application therefor within twelve months from and after the purchase of such motor vehicle fuel. Applications for refunds or repayments shall not be made oftener than at the beginning of the quarter of each calendar year. The State Auditor shall furnish the

Tax Commissioner with the information relating to the collection of the motor vehicle fuel tax and the Tax Commissioner shall withhold approval of any refund or repayment until the tax upon such motor vehicle fuel, on which refund or repayment is claimed, shall have been paid.

"The Tax Commissioner shall have the power to formulate rules and regulations for the administration of this provision and shall require the assistance of the tax supervisors in the enforcement thereof."

Provided, however, that no refund shall be permitted or made upon any motor vehicle fuel used in the construction or reconstruction of any highway within this state.

Section 2. EMERGENCY.) This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage and approval.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Also,

House Bill No. 105. A Bill for an Act Regulating All Benevolent Corporations, Associations or Societies Operating on the Voluntary or Involuntary Assessment or Contribution Plan, and Repealing Chapter 160 of the Session Laws of 1931, and All Acts or Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Amendments are to the engrossed bill.

In Section 1, subdivision (f) line 3, strike out the word "three" and insert in lieu thereof the word "two."

In Section 1, subdivision (i) line 3, strike out the numeral "\$5.00" and insert in lieu thereof the numeral "\$3.00."

In Section 1, subdivision (j) line 7, strike out the numeral "\$10.00" and insert in lieu thereof the numeral "\$5.00."

And recommend that House Bill No. 105 be indefinitely postponed.

Also.

House Bill No. 118. A Bill for an Act Providing for the Protection of the Public Health and Prevention of Fraud and Desception by Prohibiting the Purchase of Cream or Milk Unfit for Buttermaking Purposes; Establishing Grades for Cream and Providing for the Purchase of Cream on the Basis of Grade; Providing for the Necessary Licensing; Regulating the Purchase of Milk or Cream on a Butterfat Basis, Regulating the Maintenance and Operation of Creameries and Cream Stations, and for Other Purposes.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

On page 1 of the printed bill, strike out everything after the words, "A Bill," and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"For an Act providing for the protection of the public health and prevention of fraud and deception by prohibiting the purchase of cream or milk unfit for buttermaking purposes; establishing grades for cream and providing for the purchase of cream on the basis of grade; providing for the necessary licensing, regulating the maintenance and operation of creameries and cream stations, and for other purposes; repealing all Acts in conflict herewith and declaring an emergency.

- Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:
- Section 1. That the following Act shall be cited as "The Cream Grading Law."
- Section 2. DEFINITION OF TERMS.) As used in this Act, unless the context otherwise indicates.
- (a) The term "person" includes individual, partnership, corporation or association."
- (b) The term "cream station" means any place other than a creamery, where deliveries of milk or cream are weighed, sampled or tested for purchase on a butterfat basis.
- (c) The term "Creamery" means any place where milk or cream, delivered by two or more persons, is churned into butter for commercial purposes.
- (d) The term "Babcock test" means the official Babcock test for milk and for cream as set forth in the latest edition or supplement thereto of the "Methods of Analysis" of the Association of Official Agricultural Chemists."
- (e) Term of "sweet cream grade" means cream that is sweet in taste, clean and sound, free from undesirable flavor or odor, and free from extraneous matter which makes it unfit for human consumption. It contains not less than 25% butterfat and its acidity does not exceed 0.25% calculated as lactic acid.
- (f) The term "grade 1 cream" means cream that is clean to the taste and smell; its acidity does not exceed 0.7% calculated as lactic acid; it contains less than 25% butterfat and is free from lumps, mold, dirt and other foreign matter, which makes it unfit for human consumption.
- (g) The term "grade 2 cream" is cream that will produce butter which will score not less than 88, as determined by the official scoring method for butter adopted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It may have an undesirable flavor or odor but is free from mold, dirt or other foreign matter which makes it unfit for human consumption.
- (h) The term "unlawful or reject cream" means cream which contains any dirt, filth, mold or other foreign matter, or is stale, rancid, putrid, decomposed or actively foaming, in any amount or degree that makes it unfit for human consumption.

GRADE PURCHASE: PRICE DIFFEREN-Section 3. WHEN.) All purchases or receipts of cream for buttermaking purposes shall be on the basis of the following grades: (a) sweet cream, (b) grade one, (c) grade Providing that nothing herein contained shall require a person to purchase other than the grade or grades desired and provided, further, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as prohibiting any person from purchasing sweet cream at grade one price. Every person buying or receiving cream shall maintain a price differential between contiguous grades of not less than 1c per pound butterfat, and shall post in a prominent place in each cream station or creamery controlled, owned, or operated by him, the grades upon which he is buying cream and the current prices paid for butterfat, and the price differential shall apply only to the grades so posted.

Section 4. LICENSED BUYERS.) A licensed cream buyer, duly qualified to grade and test cream, shall be maintained in each creamery and in each station where cream is purchased for buttermaking purposes. A grading license shall be issued by the Dairy Department to such person who shall have passed satisfactory examination in person and shall have proven by actual demonstration before an inspector or authorized agent of the Department that he is competent and qualified to grade cream and that he is fully conversant with all the requirements of this Act. Every such license, unless revoked, shall be valid for one year after date of issue and shall not be transferable. The fee for such annual license shall be three dollars (\$3.00) and shall be paid to the Dairy Department or its agent before such license or renewal thereof is issued. The examination which a buyer must pass in order to obtain a grading license shall cover (a) ability to grade cream, (b) knowledge of sanitary regulations, (c) knowledge of records required, tagging requirements and reports to Dairy Commissioner, and (d) such further subjects not inconsistent with this Act as shall be determined by the Dairy Commissioner and approved by the head of the Department of Dairying of the Agricultural College.

Section 5. DUTIES OF CREAM GRADER.) censed grader shall promptly grade each lot of cream delivered to or received by him. Wherever cream is graded. whether at the cream station or creamery, the cream grader shall keep a true record of each lot of cream received and graded. The record shall show the name of the producer or owner of the cream, the date of delivery, the quantity delivered, the grade or grades assigned and the price paid. As soon as the cream is graded it shall be placed in clean containers or shipping cans. Each shipping can containing graded cream must have a label or tag firmly attached which shall designate the grade of the cream contained and the name and address of the cream station or creamery where it was received. All licensed cream buyers shall affix to the container of unlawful or rejected cream, tags provided by the State Dairy Department at cost. These tags must be in triplicate, one to be affixed to the container of unlawful or rejected cream, one to be mailed to the Dairy Department, and one to be retained by the buyer for inspection by the Dairy or Food Inspectors.

These tags must contain the following information: Date of rejection, name and address of owner, name and address of buyer, and reasons for rejection. The Dairy Department shall keep a complete record of all rejection tags issued, and rejections reported.

REVOCATION OF LICENSE.) The Dairy Commissioner shall have authority to revoke any license issued under the provisions of Section 5. Evidence that the licensee has violated any of the provisions of this Act shall be sufficient cause for such revocation. The Dairy Commissioner shall notify the licensee that his license is to be revoked and shall give such licensee an opportunity to appear before the Dairy Commissioner or his authorized agent within five days, at a time and place designated by the Dairy Commissioner, to show cause why such license should not be cancelled. The licensee may appear in person or be represented by an attorney or other person, or may submit a statement in writing. If licensee fails to show cause on or before the date of the hearing, why the license should not be revoked, the Dairy Commissioner shall notify licensee that the revocation of the license will become effective at the expiration of ten days from date of such notice.

Section 7. SANITATION OF CREAMERY AND CREAM STATION.) No creamery or cream station shall be permitted to be operated in unclean, insanitary or disorderly surroundings. Every licensed creamery or cream station shall maintain a separate room or rooms to be exclusively for the handling and sorting of cream or dairy products. Walls and ceilings must be tight and kept clean and free from dust. The floor shall be tight, frequently scrubbed and kept clean The room shall be well lighted, adequately at all times. ventilated and of suitable size to properly handle the volume of business done, and all windows, doors and other openings shall be properly screened. Every creamery or cream station shall have an adequate supply of hot and cold water. Suitable can racks shall be maintained inside the creamery or cream station on which cream cans, when empty, shall be kept inverted with lids removed at all times and all cans shall be thoroughly washed before being used for milk or All empty cans shall be thoroughly washed and sterilized and shall be thoroughly dry before lids are affixed.

There shall be no windows, doors or other openings into other rooms unless to a room kept in clean and sanitary condition. The station must have cooling facilities of sufficient capacity for all cream received in one day's business; and adequate facilities for heating plenty of water.

Section 8. VIOLATIONS.) The following Acts are hereby prohibited:

(1) The purchase or receipt of cream for butter making

purposes except on this basis of grades as provided in Section 3.

- (2) The failure to maintain a price differential between cream grades or the failure to post in a cream station or creamery the current prices paid for butter fat.
- (3) The grading of any lot of cream by an unlicensed grader.
- (4) The improper or incorrect grading of any lot of cream by a licensed grader.
- (5) The acceptance, purchase or possession by any creamery or cream station of unlawful or reject cream.
- (6) The failure on the part of any licensed cream grader to keep such records as are required in Section 5.
- (7) The possession by a cream station or creamery of any graded cream unlabeled or falsely labeled as to grade, or the shipment or delivery or consignment for shipment or delivery by any licensed buyer of graded cream unlabeled or falsely labeled as to grade.
- (8) The maintenance of any cream station or creamery in violation of Section 7 or in an insanitary condition or the conduct of such cream station or creamery in a manner whereby milk, cream or butter may be contaminated within the meaning of this Act.
- (9) The wilful obstruction or hindrance to any official inspection.
- Section 9. ENFORCEMENT.) In the enforcement of this Act the Dairy Department shall be charged with the educational work necessary for a proper knowledge and appreciation among buyers and producers of the grading features of this law; the examining of applicants for license and the promoting, improving and advancing the interests of the dairy industry in the State and is authorized to otherwise enforce this Act. The State Food Commissioner and Chemist shall be charged with the sanitary inspection of all establishments concerned; analysis of dairy products and enforcement of grading provisions.
- Section 10. DISPOSITION OF FEES.) All revenues derived under the authority of this Act and all other license fees collected by the Dairy Department shall be used in the enforcement of this Act and the dairy laws of the State. Thus, all license moneys collected by the Dairy Department shall be forwarded to the State Treasurer who shall credit not less than 60% to the Dairy Department and place it in a special revolving fund to be known as the "Dairy Department Fund" and credit the remaining 40%, but not to exceed \$6,000.00 per year, to the "State Regulatory Fund," out of which funds all bills and expense of whatever nature incurred in the enforcement of this Act shall by said Treasurer be paid after audit and approval by the State Auditing Board.

Section 11. PENALTIES.) Any violation of any of the provisions of this Act is hereby declared to be a misdemeanor, and any person, whether individually, or as a member of a partnership, or as an agent or officer of a corporation, who shall be convicted of such violation either on his own behalf or in the interest of any other individual or corporation, association or partnership, shall be fined not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and such person's license may be suspended for 30 days and permanently revoked on second offense.

Section 12. ACTS IN CONFLICT.) All Acts or parts of Acts in conflict or inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

Section 13. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE.) If any section, subdivision, sentence or clause of this Act shall, for any reason, be held void or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of any other portion of this Act.

Section 14. EMERGENCY.) Whereas, an emergency exists, this Act shall be in full force and effect from and after June 1, 1935, but the giving of examinations and grading license and issuance thereof is authorized after the passage and approval of this Act, and in advance of that date."

And the further amendment:

In House Journal of February 23, page 11, Section 2. Subsection f, line 3, insert the word "not," between the word "contains" and the word "less."

And when so further amended recommend the same do pass.

House Bill No. 245. A Bill for an Act Providing That County Commissioners Shall Employ Local Physicians, Chiropractors or Osteopaths When Practicable in Treatment of Indigent Persons and Relating to Compensation Therefor.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In line 6, strike out the letter "a" following the word "by," and insert in lieu thereof "any particular."

In line 7, after the word "osteopath," insert the following: "whether he resides in the county or out of the county."

In line 7, following the word "provided," insert in lieu thereof the following: "if the same can be reasonably done."

And recommend that House Bill No. 245 be indefinitely postponed.

Also,

House Bill No. 284. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Re-enact Section 2618, Compiled Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1913, and Chapter 140 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1919, Relating to the Herd Law and How the Same May Be Established and Suspended and Providing That All Herd Laws Heretofore Established Shall Be Suspended.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Page 2, line 20, immediately following the word "declare," and before the word "resolution," strike out the letter "a," and insert in lieu thereof the word "by."

Page 2, line 26, strike out the word "state," and insert in lieu thereof the word "date."

And recommend that House Bill No. 284 be indefinitely postponed.

Also,

House Bill No. 292. A Bill for an Act Authorizing and Empowering Cities and Villages to Issue Bonds for the Purpose of Purchasing Outstanding Special Improvement Warrants, and Declaring an Emergency.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments:

In Section one following the word "purchased" on page one, line eight, strike out the period and insert a semi-colon (;) and insert the following: "provided, further, that said bonds shall not be sold for less than par value thereof and the accrued interest thereon."

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Also.

House Bill No. 301. A Bill for an Act Requiring Certain Buses and Trucks to Carry Certain Emergency Light Equipment and Red Flags to Be Used in Emergencies, Providing the Manner of Use, Declaring Any Violations as Misdemeanor, Fixing Penalties Therefor, Repealing All Acts in Conflict Therewith, and Declaring an Emergency.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments:

Page 2, line 14, strike out the word "twenty" and place in lieu thereof the word "ten."

Page 2, line 15, strike out the words "Public Utilities Commission and insert in lieu thereof the words "Board of Railroad Commissioners."

Page 3, Section 3, line 2, correct the spelling of the word "Became" and change to "become."

Page 3, Section 3, line 5, correct spelling of the word "track."

And recommend that House Bill No. 301 be indefinitely postponed.

Also,

House Bill No. 324. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Re-enact Section 2547, 2548 and 2565 of the Compiled Laws of 1913, Relating to Care of the Insane.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Strike out everything after the words "A Bill," and insert the following:

For an Act to Amend and Re-enact Section 2547, 2548, and 2553 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, and Section 2565 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, as Amended by Chapter 109 of the 1929 Session Laws Relating to the Care of Insane Persons and to Their Commitment to the State Hospital for the Insane at Jamestown, North Dakota.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. AMENDMENT.) That Section 2547 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, be amended and reenacted to read as follows, to-wit::

APPOINTMENT OF COMMISSIONERS Section 2547. OF INSANITY.) There is hereby declared in each organized county of this state, a Board of Commissioners of Insanity, composed of three members. The county judge and the states attorney shall be members of said board and in counties where a county physician has been appointed on an annual salary, the county physician shall be such third member. Where no county physician has been appointed on an annual salary, the third member of such Board shall be a reputable practicing physician, appointed by the Board of County Commissioners and such appointment shall be made of a physician as near as may be to the county seat. In case of appointment such commissioner shall be appointed for two years and until his successor is appointed and qualified. The county judge shall act as chairman of the board. In case of temporary absence of the states attorney or the physician, who are members of this Board from the county as provided above, or their inability to act, the county judge shall call to his aid a reputable physician or attorney, who, after qualifying, may act in the same capacity as such absentees. In case of the temporary absence from the county of the county judge or his inability to act, the states attorney shall act in his place instead, as chairman of the said board and shall have full authority to issue subpoenas and commitments, and to do all and any necessary acts as such chairman. The records in such cases must show the fact of all absences.

Section 2. AMENDMENT.) That Section 2548 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, be amended and reenacted to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 2548. OATH OF COMMISSIONERS. ORGANIZATION AND MEETINGS.) Before entering upon the duties of their offices, the members of such Board whether

they be members by reason of their office or by appointment, shall take and subscribe an oath to support the constitution of the United States and the constitution of the State of North Dakota, and to faithfully discharge their duies as such commissioner according to law, which oath shall be filed with the county judge, who shall enter a memorandum therefor on the records. On organizing the members of the Board shall choose one of their number to act as Clerk of the Board. They shall hold their meetings at the office of the county judge, unless for good reason they shall fix some other place for such meetings. If it shall be deemed necessary, the members of the board may hold session at such regular times as they may determine. The board shall also meet at the call of the chairman of the said board.

Section 3. AMENDMENT.) That Section 2553 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, be amended and reenacted to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 2553. HOW PATIENTS SHALL BE SENT TO HOSPITAL.) On the return of the physician's certificate the Commissioners shall as soon as practicable conclude their investigations and if they, or a majority of them, are of the opinion that the person under investigation is not insane as alleged in the application made as provided in Section 2551 C. L., then an order shall immediately be made and entered by the county judge dismissing the application and releasing, if in custody, the person therein named. If a majority of the Commissioners are at the conclusion of their investigation of the opinion that the person under investigation is insane, then an order shall be made and entered by the county judge finding that such person should be sent to the Hospital for the Insane at Jamestown, North Dakota, for further investigation by the Superintendent of that hospital, but such order shall contain no finding as to the alleged insanity and shall not declare such person The Commissioners shall forthwith issue their warrant and a duplicate thereof, stating such finding, with the residence of the person if ascertained; and if not ascertained, their information, if any, in regard thereto, authorizing the Superintendent of the Hospital to receive and keep such person at said hospital for further investigation and until final committment or release as hereinafter provided. Such warrant and duplicate with the finding and certificate of the physician shall be delivered to the sheriff of the county, who shall execute the same by conveying such person to the hospital and delivering him with such duplicate and physician's certificate, and finding to the superintendent thereof. The superintendent over his official signature shall acknowledge such delivery on the original warrant, which the sheriff shall return to the county judge with his fees and expenses indorsed thereon. If neither the sheriff nor his deputy is at hand, or if both are otherwise engaged. the commissioners may appoint some other suitable person to execute the warrant in his stead, who shall take and subscribe an oath faithfully to discharge his duty, and shall be entitled to the same fees as the sheriff. The sheriff or any other person so appointed may take to his aid such assistance as he may need to execute such warrant; but no female shall thus be taken to the hospital without the attendance of some other female, or some relative of such person. The superintendent in his acknowledgment of delivery must state whether there was any such person in attendance, and give the name, if any. If any relative or intimate friend of the patient, who is a suitable person, shall so request, he shall have the privilege of taking and executing such warrant in preference to the sheriff or any other person, and without taking such oath, and for so doing he shall be entitled to his necessary expenses, but no fees.

Upon receipt of the above warrant from the Commissioners, the Superintendent shall make such investigation and submit the person therein named to such treatment as may be deemed necessary by him to finally determine whether or not such person is insane. If at the conclusion of such investigation and treatment, the said Superintendent is of the opinion that said person is insane, then the Superintendent shall immediately certify to the county judge who issued the warrant his conclusion and the said county judge shall thereupon enter in his office a final order declaring and finding such person insane; otherwise the said person shall be by the Superintendent released from custody, and the Superintendent shall certify that release to the county judge, and appropriate order shall be entered by the county judge in his office dismissing all proceedings had before the Commissioners of Insanity in the matter of the alleged insanity.

The provisions of this section shall apply to all cases of alleged insanity brought before the Commissioners of Insanity of this State and in on case shall said Commissioners of Insanity enter any final order declaring a person insane unless and until the Superintendent of the Hospital for the Insane at Jamestown, North Dakota, has after investigation as herein provided, certify to the county judge that such person is insane; provided, however, that if for any reason the alleged insane person cannot be sent to the Hospital for the Insane at Jamestown, North Dakota, for further investigation and treatment as herein provided, then the Commissioners of Insanity may make such orders as may be necessary for the care and custody and restraint from liberty of that person within the purview and intent of and to fully carry out other provisions of Article 4 of Chapter 38 of the Political Code of North Dakota, but in no case shall a final order declaring a person insane be entered by the county judge unless and until that person has been by the Superintendent of the Hospital for the Insane at Jamestowns, North Dakota, certified to him as insane in the manner hereinbefore provided.

Section 4. AMENDMENT.) That Section 2565 of the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, as amended by Chapter 109 of the 1929 Session Laws be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 2565. SALARIES AND FEES, BY WHOM PAID.)
The Commissioners of Insanity shall, by reason of their

being county officials and receiving an annual salary from the county, serve as a board of Commissioners of Insanity as herein provided without additional salary. In case of appointed members who are not receiving an annual salary from the county, such member shall be allowed the sum of Three Dollars (\$3.00) for each case examined and mileage at the rate of five cents (5c) per mile. The sheriff shall be allowed for services other than conveying the patient to the hospital and returning therefrom, the same fees as for like services in other cases. Witnesses shall be entitled to the same fees as witnesses in the district court. The compensation and expenses provided for above shall be allowed and paid out of the county treasury in the usual manner, except for fees and expenses of the sheriff for conveying the patient to the hospital for the insane, or to the authorities of another state, which shall be paid out of the state treasury in the usual manner.

And recommend that House Bill No. 324 be indefinitely postponed.

Also,

House Bill No. 338. A Bill for an Act Creating a State Board of Public Welfare, Defining its Powers and Duties, Making an Appropriation Therefor, Repealing All Acts and Parts in Conflict with the Provisions of This Act, and Declaring an Emergency.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Strike out everything after the words "A Bill" and insert in lieu thereof the following:

For an Act Creating a State Board of Public Welfare, Defining its Powers and Duties; Permitting Appointment of Executive Director; Hold Office at Pleasure of Board; Establishing the State Welfare Fund; Making an Appropriation Therefor; Repealing All Acts and Parts of Acts the Conflict with the Provisions of This Act, and Declaring an Emergency.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. The Governor, Attorney General and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court shall within thirty (30 days after the passage and approval of this Act appoint a board to consist of seven (7) members, at least one (1) of whom shall be a World War Veteran, and such board shall be known as the Public Welfare Board of North Dakota, hereinafter referred to as the Board. Three (3) members of the board shall be appointed for a term of two (2) years, two for a term of four years, and two for a term of six years. The term of office of each of the successors of the original board shall be six years. Any member appointed to fill a vacancy on the Board shall serve only during the unexpired term wherein the vacancy occurred; but members

of the Board shall serve until their successors have been appointed and have qualified. All members of the public welfare board of North Dakota shall be appointed by the Governor, the Attorney General and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, acting jointly. A member of the Public Welfare Board of North Dakota may be removed by the Governor for cause.

Section 2. ORGANIZATION MEETING.) Within sixty days after this act takes effect the Governor shall call the members thus appointed to meet at the state capitol at Bismarck, North Dakota, and the board shall organize by the election of a president, a vice president, a secretary and such other officers and employees as the board shall determine. The board shall hold meetings at least quarterly and whenever called in session by the president or by a majority of the members of the board.

Section 3. COMPENSATION. APPOINTMENT OF EX-ECUTIVE DIRECTOR.) (a) All members of the board shall receive no compensation for their services but shall be paid their actual expenses incurred in attending meetings of the board and while engaged in the preformance of the duties prescribed in this Act; such expense shall be audited and paid in the same manner as the expenses of state officers are audited and paid. (b) The board shall appoint an executive director, whose salary shall not exceed \$2,400.00 a year, and who shall devote entire time to the duties of office. executive director shall be a person who has professional qualifications, wide experience, education and training, in the administration of public and/or private welfare institutions, agencies or activities, and shall be a resident of the State of North Dakota for at least five years preceding his appointment, and shall hold office at the pleasure of the Board. Before entering upon the duties of office the executive director shall take the official oath prescribed by law for the state officials and shall file with the Secretary of State such oath of office and a surety bond to be approved by the attorney general in the penal sum of \$10,000.00 conditioned for the faithful performance of official duties and the delivery to successor of all public property in the pos-session or under the control of the executive director. The compensation of clerks, stenographers and other necessary employees shall be determined by the Board.

Section 4. OFFICE AND OFFICE EQUIPMENT.) The Board shall be provided with suitable offices in the state capitol, and is authorized to purchase out of the funds herein appropriated such necessary furniture, office and filing equipment, office supplies, stationery and postage as may be needed for the efficient conduct of its business.

Section 5. FUNDS TO BE PAID INTO THE STATE TREASURY.) All moneys received under the provisions of this Act from appropriations by the state legislature shall be paid into the state treasury to be kept by the state treasurer in a fund known as the State Public Welfare Fund, and all expenditures made under the provisions of this Act shall be paid by the State Treasurer upon warrants drawn by the

State Auditor; such expenditure to be supported by itemized vouchers to be signed by the executive director of the board or by such other officers and/or assistants as the board may designate and certified to the state auditor. Any funds received from federal agencies shall be deposited and disbursed in the manner provided by act of congress or by the regulations of the federal agencies from whom the funds were received.

Section 6. DUTIES OF THE BOARD.) The board shall have the following powers and duties, to-wit:

- 1. To act as the official agency of the State of North Dakota in any social welfare activity: initiated by the Federal Government and to administer, allocate and distribute any state and federal funds that may be made available for the followin purposes, to-wit:
  - (a) The relief of destitute or necessitious persons;
  - (b) Mother's aid;
  - (c) Old age assistance;
  - (d) Aid to dependent children;
  - (e) Maternal and child health;
  - (f) Care of crippled children;
  - (g) And to child welfare service; and
  - (h) Public health service.
- 2. To study the subjects of non-employment, poverty, vagrancy, housing conditions, crime, juvenile delinquency; public amusements, care and treatment of prisoners, divorce and wife desertion, child welfare, the social and kindred subjects and their causes, treatment and prevention and the prevention of any hurtful conditions.
- 3. To make available to the several counties, municipalities and eligible public or private institutions in the state, at such times and in such amounts as are needed, funds supplied to the board by the state and federal governments for the relief of destitution and for the purposes enumerated in the subdivisions one (1) of section six (6) of this act; and for the purchase of supplies and materials to be used for work-relief projects.
- 4. To provide for the study and promote the welfare of the dependent, delinquent, and neglected child, and to provide for the placing and supervision of dependent, delinquent and defective children, subject to the control of any court having jurisdiction and control of any such child.
- (5) To recommend to the legislature social legislation and the creation of necessary institutions.
- (6) To co-operate with and advise and assist the various county welfare boards in every way possible.

- (7) To issue bulletins and have the same printed and in other ways to inform the public as to social conditions and the proper remedy of social life.
- (8) To secure, hold and administer for the purpose for which it is organized any property and any funds donated to it, either by will or deed, or otherwise and to administer said funds or property in accordance with the instructions in the instrument creating them.
- (9) To provide for surveys and make reports on child caring institutions, homes for the aged, maternity homes, and persons or organizations receiving and placing children, and to require such institutions, persons and organizations to submit such annual reports and information as the board may determine.
- (10) No general survey shall be undertaken or conducted except on the specific order of the state board of public welfare.
- (11) To issue subpoenas, administer oaths, and compel attendance of witnesses and production of documents or papers whenever the board deems it necessary in making the investigations provided for herein or in the discharge of its other duties, and to give such publicity to its investigations and findings as it may deem best for the public welfare, provided, however, that no subpoena shall be issued to compel the production of documents or papers relating to any private child caring and /or child placing agency or maternity hospital or to compel the attendance as a witness of any officer or employee of such institutions except upon the order of a Judge of the District court of the Judicial district in which the institution is located.
- Section 7. BIENNIAL REPORT TO GOVERNOR AND LEGISLATURE. The board shall biennially prepare and submit to the governor and legislative assembly a complete and full report of its activities during the preceding two years with such suggestions as it may deem necessary and shall report such other matters as it may think are for the benefit of the people of the state.
- Section 8. APPROPRIATION. There is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this Act.
- Section 9. It is not the intention of this Act to abolish any state agencies, bureaus or departments now in operation, nor is it the intention that the State Board of Public Welfare shall exercise control or supervision over appropriations or grants specifically made by the legislative assembly and /or by any department or agency of the federal government for or to any specific state agency, bureau, office, department or institution; nor is it the intention of this act to repeal or set aside any appropriations heretofore made or which this legislative assembly may make hereafter to any such

state, agency, bureau, office, institution or department, or for child caring or child placing agencies, or maternity hospitals.

Section 10. REPEAL.) All Acts and parts of Acts in conflict with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed. Section 11. EMERGENCY.) Whereas, the creation of a state board of public welfare is necessary in order to qualify the state to receive grants of funds from the federal government for the promotion of public welfare, now, therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Act shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval.

In Section 5, line 8, strike out the word "two dollars," and insert in lieu thereof the words "five dollars."

In Section 5, line 10, strike out the word "five dollars," and insert in lieu thereof "ten dollars."

In Section 5, line 12, strike out the words "ten dollars," and insert in lieu thereof "fifteen dollars."

In Section 5, line 21, strike out the words "one hundred dollars," and insert in lieu thereof "forty-five dollars."

In Section 5, line 23, strike out the words "two hundred dollars," and insert in lieu thereof "seventy-five dollars."

In Section 5, line 25, strike out the words "two hundred and fifty dollars," and insert in lieu thereof "one hundred and twenty-five dollars."

And the further amendments:

In line 2, Section 8, page 5, insert the words "bank or banks," between the words "any," and the word "store."

In line 6, Section 10, page 5, following the word "be,"

strike out the remainder of the line and all of line 7, and insert the words "covered into the State Equilization fund."

"For an Act to Amend and Re-enact Chapter 254 of the Session Laws of 1933 Relating to the Old Age Pensions, Creating an Old Age Pension Fund, Providing for the Levy of Any Annual Tax Therefor, Prescribing Persons to be Pensioned Thereunder, and Penalties for the Violation Thereof.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. AMENDMENT.) That Sections 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 21, 23, 24 and 25, of Chapter 254, the Session Laws of the Year 1933, be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 1. There shall be levied and collected in each year, beginning with the Year 1935, an annual tax of seventenths of one mill for each taxable dollar of the total equalized assessed valuation, of all taxable property in the State of North Dakota, for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Old Age Pension Fund, the proceeds of which levy shall be set apart as a fund for the payment of relief and in assistance of aged persons, as hereinafter provided, such tax shall be collected in the same manner as is now provided for the collection of other taxes and when collected shall be paid into the state treasury to the credit of the Old Age Pension Fund. The fund shall be cumulative and any surplus for any year shall be available for disbursement according to law for any succeeding year. If the funds provided for herein are not sufficient to pay all pensions to become payable in any year, the Board of Administration shall scale all such pensions so that the pension fund may be distributed, uniformly among those granted pension may receive the same percentage of the pension granted. There shall also be converted into said fund and disposed of in accordance with this Act any other or further sums levied or appropriated or otherwise made available for Old Age Pensions.

Section 2. An allowance from said fund of not to exceed the sum of Two Hundred and Forty Dollars (\$240.00) per annum, shall be granted to any person of the age of sixtyeight years and over, regardless of age, who

a. Is without adequate means of support and who,

b. Is a citizen of the United States and has resided in this State for at least twenty (20) years immediately preceding the date application, provided, continuous residence in the State shall not be deemed to have been interrupted on account of absence therefrom if the total period does not exceed two years; and also provided that temporary absence from the State or absence from the State while in the service of the State or nation shall not be deemed to interrupt residence in the state, if a domicile be not acquired outside the State. The total age pension paid to residents of any county in any year, shall not exceed 125% of the amount of taxes levied and collected for such county, and paid into such fund, in such year.

Section 3e. Those who have a yearly income of more than two hundred and forty (\$240.00) dollars.

Section 5. Every person claiming to be entitled to a pension under this Act shall, in the manner and form pre-

scribed by the Board hereby created, deliver a claim therefor to the Board of County Commissioners of the county wherein the claimant resides, which claim shall be verified by the oath or affirmation of the claimant that the contents of his or her pension claim are true and correct in every The County Commissioners shall thereupon material part. number and docket the claim in the manner prescribed by the Board and shall forthwith transmit a true copy of the claim to said Board. At the said time said County Commissioners shall ascertain on what date the claim may be investigated, and shall notify the claimant of a date on which he or she may attend to support the claim on the date so fixed, or on the first convenient date thereafter, the County Commissioners shall proceed to fully investigate the claim for the purpose of ascertaining whether the claimant is entitled to a pension, and if so, for what amount the first year, and for this purpose the said County Commissioners shall be empowered to swear witnesses and take evidence in a summary manner in said proceedings.

Section 6. In investigating any claim for a pension the County Commissioners shall not be bound by the strict rules of evidence but shall investigate and determine the matter by such means and in such manner as they think fit. The County Commissioners may admit the pension claims as originally made, or as modified as the result of their investigations, or may postpone it for further evidence, or reject it as they deem equitable; and their findings and decisions shall be forwarded to the State Pension Board for its approval or rejection.

Section 10. As soon as the pension claim is established, and the rate of the first year's pension is fixed, the Board of County Commissioners shall, in the prescribed manner, certify the same to the State Pension Board, who shall, in the prescribed manner and form, issue to the claimant a certificate (elsewhere throughout this act called a "pension certificate") in respect of the first year's pension.

Section 11. Except as herein provided, the amount of the pension shall not exceed Two Hundred and Forty Dollars (\$240.00) per year.

Section 12. In the order allowing the pension, the State Pension Board shall determine the amount to which said pension shall be reduced by reason of an income less than Two Hundred and Forty Dollars (\$240.00) per year which a claimant is receiving, and shall issue to such pensioner a certificate showing the amount of such penson. The pension shall be payable on the first days of May and November of each and every year, and shall continue during the life of such pensioner, so long as he or she shall remain out of any home or institution officially maintained by any county or by this state or by the United States, subject to concellation, modification and change of amount, according to the changing income of such pensioner. Any such cancellation, modification, or change to be made only upon notice to the

pensioner and upon hearing before the Board of County Commissioners.

Section 13. All persons possessing such pension certificate and drawing a pension under the provisions of this Act, shall annually and not later than February 1st, of each year, make and file with the State Pension Board a statement showing the income of such pensioner for the preceding calendar year. The Secretary of Agriculture and Labor shall have the right to investigate or cause to be investigated the truth of any and all statements contained in such annual report of income, and shall have the power and authority to grade and rate succeeding pension payments to cause them to accord with the facts found and determined upon such investigation.

Section 14. No pension, claim or allowance of a pension by the State Pension Board shall be assignable or subject to lien, attachment, execution or garnishment, or be held liable in any way for any lien, debt, penalty or damages.

Section 15. If at any time the Board of County Commissioners have reason to believe that any pension certificate has been improperly obtained, it shall cause special inquiry to be made before them, and shall suspend payment of any and all installments pending such inquiry. If on inquiry it appears that the pension certificate was improperly obtained, it shall be cancelled by the Board of County Commissioners, and the State Pension Board... but if it appears that the certificate was properly obtained, the suspended installments shall be payable in due course.

Section 16. If on the death of any pensioner, or of the wife or husband of a pensioner, it is found that he, or either of them, was possessed of property and assets which were not assigned and conveyed to the State Pension Board as required by this Act, including insurance policies, double the amount of the pension at any time paid may be recovered as a debt due to the state from the estate so found; provided, that, where the husband and wife were at the time of such death living apart pursuant to decree, or order, of separation, this section shall apply only in the case of the pensioner.

Section 21. The State Pension Board, which Board shall be composed of the Secretary of Agriculture and Labor, the Attorney General, and the Chairman of the Board of Administration, under the name and style of the State Pension Board, shall have the power and it shall be its duty to administer the fund hereby created, to hear and decide all questions applied from or suggested by such Board of County Commissioners, to make payments and disbursements from said fund in accordance with the provisions of this Act, and to make reasonable provisions for Secretary or clerical assistance and postage required by said Board for the proper performance of its duties; provided, however, that the expense for the carrying out of the provisions of this Act shall not exceed more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) in any one year; and from time to time to make and establish such rules for the administration of said fund.

Section 23. The State Pension Board may from time to time make regulations under this act relating to any of the following purposes or matters in addition to those specifically granted herein.

- (a) The procedure in all hearings (other than judicial proceedings) under this act.
- (b) The recording or registration of pension claims, pension certificates and all other matters and proceedings in relation to pensions under this Act.

Section 24. The State Pension Board, shall, within thirty days after the close of each calendar year, make a report to the Governor and showing for such year:

- (a) The total amount paid under this act.
- (b) The total amount paid under this act in respect of other than pensions.
  - (c) The total number of pensioners.
  - (d) The total number of forfeited installments; and
  - (e) Such other particulars as they may deem advisable.

Section 25. Of said Chapter 254. REPEAL.) And all other Acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

There shall be levied and collected in each year, beginning with the year 1935, an annual tax of seventenths of one mill for each taxable dollar of the total equalized assessed valuation, of all taxable property in the State of North Dakota, for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Old Age Pension Fund, the proceeds of which levy shall be set apart as a fund for the payment of relief and in assistance of aged persons, as hereinafter provided, such tax shall be collected in the same manner as is now provided for the collection of other taxes and when collected shall be paid into the state treasury to the credit of the Old Age Pension Fund. The fund shall be cumulative and any surplus for any year shall be available for disbursement according to law for any succeeding year. If the funds provided for herein are not sufficient to pay all pensions to become payable in any year, the Board of Administration shall scale all such pensions so that the pension fund may be distributed, uniformly among those granted pensions hereunder and that each person granted such pension may receive the same percentage of the pension granted. There shall also be converted into said fund and disposed of in accordance with this Act any other of further sums levied or appropriated or otherwise made available for Old Age Pensions.

Section 2. An allowance from said fund of not to exceed the sum of Two Hundred and Forty Dollars (\$240.00) per annum, shall be granted to any person of the age of sixtyeight years and over, who

- (a) Is without adequate means of support, and who
- (b) Is a citizen of the United States and has resided in this State for at least twenty (20) years immediately preceding the date of application, provided, continuous residence in the State shall not be deemed to have been interrupted on account of absence therefrom if the total period does not exceed two years; and also provided that temporary absence from the state or absence from the state while in the service of the State or nation shall not be deemed to interrupt residence in the state, if a domicile be not acquired outside the state. The total age pension paid to residents of any county in any year shall not exceed 125% of the amount of taxes levied and collected for such county, and paid into such fund, in such year.

Section 3e. Those who have a yearly income of more than two hundred and forty dollars (\$240.00).

Section 5. Every person claiming to be entitled to a pension under this Act shall, in the manner and form prescribed by the Board hereby created, deliver a claim therefor to the Board of County Commissioners of the county wherein the claimant resides, which claim shall be verified by the oath or affirmation of the claimant that the contents of his or her pension claim are true and correct in every material part. The County Commissioners shall thereupon number

and docket the claim in the manner prescribed by the Board and shall forthwith transmit a true copy of the claim to said Board. At the said time said County Commissioners shall ascertain on what date the claim may be investigated, and shall notify the claimant of a date on which he or she may attend to support the claim on the date so fixed, or on the first convenient date thereafter, the County Commissioners shall proceed to fully investigate the claim for the purpose of ascertaining whether the claimant is entitled to a pension, and if so, for what amount the first year, and for this purpose the said County Commissioners shall be empowered to swear witnesses and take evidence in a summary manner in said proceedings.

Section 6. In investigating any claim for a pension the County Commissioners shall not be bound by the strict rules of evidence but shall investigate and determine the matter by such means and in such manner as they think fit. The County Commissioners may admit the pension claims as originally made, or as modified as the result of their investigations, or may postpone it for further evidence, or reject it as they deem equitable; and their findings and decisions shall be forwarded to the State Pension Board for its approval or rejection.

Section 10. As soon as the pension claim is established, and the rate of the first year's pension is fixed, the Board of County Commissioners shall, in the prescribed manner, certify the same to the State Pension Board, who shall, in the prescribed manner and form, issue to the claimant a certificate (elsewhere throughout this Act called a "pension certificate") in respect of the first year's pension.

Section 11. Except as herein provided, the amount of the pension shall not exceed two hundred and forty dollars (\$240.00) per year.

Section 12. In the order allowing the pension, the State Pension Board shall determine the amount to which said pension shall be reduced by reason of an income less than two hundred and forty dollars (\$240.00) per year which a claimant is receiving, and shall issue to such pensioner a certificate showing the amount of such pension. The pension shall be payable on the first days of May and November of each and every year, and shall continue during the life of such pensioner, so long as he or she shall remain out of any home or institution officially maintained by any county or by this state or by the United States, subject to cancellation, modification and change of amount, according to the changing income of such pensioner. Any such cancellation, modification, or change to be made only upon notice to the pensioner and upon hearing before the Board of County Commissioners.

Section 13. All persons possessing such pension certificate and drawing a pension under the provisions of this Act, shall annually and not later than February 1st, of each year, make and file with the State Pension Board a statement showing the income of such pensioner for the preceding calendar

year. The Secretary of Agriculture and Labor shall have the right to investigate or cause to be investigated the truth of any and all statements contained in such annual report of income, and shall have the power and authority to grade and rate succeeding pension payments to cause them to accord with the facts found and determined upon such investigation.

Section 14. No pension, claim or allowance of a pension by the State Pension Board shall be assignable or subject to lein, attachment, execution or garnishment, or be held liable in any way for any lien, debt, penalty or damages.

Section 15. If at any time the Board of County Commissioners have reason to believe that any pension certificate has been improperly obtained, it shall cause special inquiry to be made before them, and shall suspend payment of any and all installments pending such inquiry. If on inquiry it appears that the pension certificate was improperly obtained, it shall be cancelled by the Board of County Commissioners, and the State Pension Board; but if it appears that the certificate was properly obtained, the suspended installments shall be payable in due course.

Section 16. If on the death of any pensioner, or of the wife or husband of a pensioner, it is found that he, or either of them, was possessed of property or assets which were not assigned or conveyed to the State Pension Board as required by this Act, including insurance policies, double the amount of the pension at any time paid may be recovered as a debt due to the state from the estate so found; provided, that where the husband and wife were at the time of such death living apart pursuant to decree, or order, of separation, this Section shall apply only in the case of the pensioner.

Section 21. The State Pension Board, which board shall be composed of the Secretary of Agriculture and Labor, the Attorney General, and the Chairman of the Board of Administration, under the name and style of the State Pension Board, shall have the power and it shall be its duty to administer the fund hereby created, to hear and decide all questions applied from or suggested by such Board of County Commissioners, to make payments and disbursements from said fund in accordance with the provisions of this Act, and to make reasonable provisions for secretary or clerical assistance and postage required by said Board for the proper performance of its duties; provided, however, that the expense for the carrying out of the provisions of this Act shall not exceed more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) in any one year; and from time to time to make and establish such rules for the administration of said fund.

Section 23. The State Pension Board may from time to time make regulations under this Act relating to any of the following purposes or matters in addition to those specifically granted herein.

(a) The procedure in all hearings (other than judicial proceedings) under this Act.

(b) The recording or registration of pension claims, pension certificates and all other matters and proceedings in relation to pensions under this Act.

Section 24. The State Pension Board shall, within thirty days after the close of each calendar year, make a report to the Governor and showing for such year:

- (a) The total amount paid under this Act.
- (b) The total amount paid under this Act in respect of other than pensions.
  - (c) The total number of pensioners.
  - (d) The total amount of forfeited installments; and
  - (e) Such other particulars as they may deem advisable.

Section 25. Of said Chapter 254 repeal; and all other Acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Also,

House Bill No. 363. A Bill for an Act Directing the Board of Administration of the State of North Dakota to Sell, at Public Auction or Private Sale, all Automobiles and Automobile Equipment Purchased by the Beer Commissioner of the State of North Dakota; Authorizing Said Board to Demand, Receive and Take Possession of all Such Property; Directing Attorney General to Institute Suits or Proceedings at Request of Board of Administration; Permitting Deduction of Costs and Expenses Connected with Said Sale; Providing for Disposition of Balance of the Receipts and Requiring Report to Governor; Repealing Acts in Conflict and Declaring an Emergency.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Section 1, page 1, line 6 of the original bill, after the (,) comma, following the word "commissioner," and before the word "and," insert the following:: "the use of which is not required by the State Regulatory Department in the enforcement of the provisions of the initiated measure hereinbefore referred to."

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Also,

House Bill No. 336. A Bill for an Act Amending Section 5192a15 of the 1925 Supplement to the Compiled Laws of North Dakota, 1913, Being "The Bank of North Dakota Act," Giving That Bank Additional Powers and Permitting it in Certain Cases to Purchase Assets of Closed and Unliquidated Domestic Banking and Trust Corporations, and to Act and Qualify as Receiver of Such Corporations; and Declaring an Emergency.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

Commencing with line 13, page 2, of the typewritten bill (line 39, page 3, of the printed bill) strike out the balance of Section 1.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

House Bill No. 340. A Bill for an Act Providing for the Regulation of Dealers in Livestock and Poultry, and Defining who Are Dealers; Act Not Applicable, to Whom; License and Bond Required; Powers and Duties of Railroad Commission; Records Required of Dealer; Feeding, Watering and Weighing; Acts of Deceit, Fraud and Dishonesty and Appropriating Fees Collected to the Use of the Board of Railroad Commissioners for the Administration and Enforcement of the Act; Penalty for Violation of Act; and, Repealing All of Chapter 7 of the Session Laws of the State of North Dakota for the Year 1933; and Repealing All Acts in Conflict Herewith; and Making the Act an Emergency Measure.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In Section 2, of the printed bill, strike out all of lines 27 to 38, inclusive, and in lieu thereof insert the following: "Each applicant shall file with his application a surety company bond to be approved as to amount, form and sufficiency and surety by the Commission in the sum of not less than \$1,500.00 for principal's bond and that the amount of said bond be increased not less than \$1,500.00 dollars for each applicant appointed by the dealer and licensed by the Commission, in which the Commissioners shall be the obligee but which shall be for the benefit and purpose of protecting any person dealing with the dealer in livestock from loss by reason of acts of deceit, fraud, dishonesty, forgery, and theft on the part of the principal or his agent, provided, however, that a separate bond for each agent appointed and licensed, may be given in the sum of not less than \$1,500.00 in lieu of the additional amount on principal bond; provided further, that the Commission may demand at any time additional bond for either principal or agent when in the discretion and judgment of the Commission the volume of the business of the principal or any agent named by such principal warrants it.

In line 8, of Section 6, of the printed bill, following the period after the word "Act," strike out the rest of that section.

Section 8. Penalty for Violation of the Act. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined by a fine not exceeding \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period not to exceed thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Every person, who, having been con-

victed of a violation of this Act, who shall after such conviction, violate any of the provisions of this Act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be fined by a fine of not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$500.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than thirty days nor more than one year, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Change number of Section 8 of printed bill to Section 9, and Section 9 in the printed bill to Section 10.

In line 2, of the new Section 10, insert the word "measure," following the word "emergency," and at the end of line 2 in Section 10 strike out the comma after the word "April," and insert the word or the numeral "first," with a comma.

And recommend that House Bill No. 340 be indefinitely postponed.

Also,

House Bill No. 351. WHEREAS: It Has Come to the Attention of the Members of the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota, That Certain State, County, City, Township, School and Other Officers Have Destroyed a Great Amount of Printed Stationery Belonging to the Various Offices and Departments, and WHEREAS: The Above Has Been Brought About Through the Fact That the Names of the Elected Officers and Their Several Deputies are Usually Printed Upon Such Stationery:

And recommend that House Bill No. 351 be indefinitely postponed.

Also,

House Bill No. 227. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 7 of Chapter 235, Session Laws of 1929, as Amended by Chapter 252, Session Laws of 1931, and Section 2 of Chapter 297, Session Laws of 1931, Relating to the Tax Levy Limitations of School Districts.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In line 4 of title of bill after the word "districts," strike out the period and insert a "," and add the following: "Repealing Section 7 of Chapter 235, Session Laws of 1929, as amended by Chapter 252, Session Laws of 1921, and Section 2 of Chapter 297, Session Laws of 1931, and all Acts or parts of Acts in conflict herewith."

Page 2, line 23, strike out the word and numeral "seven (7)" and insert in lieu thereof the following: "nine (9),"

Page 2, line 26, strike out the word and numeral "nine (9)" and insert in lieu thereof "eleven (11)."

Page 2, line 28, strike out the word and numeral "eleven (11)" and insert in lieu thereof "thirteen (13)."

Page 2, line 30, strike out the word and numeral "nine (9)" and insert in lieu thereof "eleven (11)."

Page 3, line 53, change the word "sink" to "sinking."

Page 4, line 63, after the word "the" end of the line and before the word "school" line 64, insert the following: "school district upon the order of the."

Page 5, lines 100 and 101, strike out the words "the standards of a third class rural school" and insert in lieu thereof "a standard school as defined by the Superintendent of Public Instruction."

A Bill for an Act to Require the County Auditor of Each County to Levy an Annual Tax of One Dollar Upon Each Elector in the County and a Tax of Four Mills Upon Each Dollar of the Assessed Valuation of Property in the County for the Support of the Public Schools Within the County, and to Provide for the Apportionment Thereof Among the Schools by the County Superintendent of Schools on the Basis of Enrollment.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In line 7, title of bill, strike out the period and insert a (,) and add the following: "and repealing Section 1224 of the 1925 Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913, and Section 1225 of the Compiled Laws of 1913, and all acts or parts of acts in conflict herewith."

Section 1, line 2, after the word "taxes" and before the letter "a," insert the word "levy."

Section 2, page 2, line 5, after the word "superintendent" and before the word "shall," insert the words "of schools"

Section 2, page 2, line 10, after the word "superintendent" and before the letter "a," insert the words "of schools."

Section 2, line 14, page 2, after the word "superintendent" and before the word "shall," insert the words "of schools."

In line 20, Section 2, of printed bill, strike out the period after the word "paid," and insert in lieu thereof semi-colon and the following: "And provided, further, that the tax moneys raised by virtue of said tax, or any part thereof, shall not be appropriated or apportioned for the purposes or in the manner provided in Chapter 207 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for 1929."

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction shall be charged with the duty of investigating and inquiring into the general subject of elementary school costs and needs of financially distressed districts within the state. It shall be his duty to prepare the necessary application blanks and forms upon which the information required by him shall be certified to such school authorities as may be designated by him. From the information so acquired the State Superintendent of Public

Instruction shall from month to month determine the minimum amount of money required to operate each of the various classes of elementary schools.

- (b) STATE SUPERINTENDENT TO MAKE MONTH-LY CERTIFICATE TO STATE AUDITOR OF SCHOOLS IN NEED. From the information obtained as provided in the preceding subdivision, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction shall monthly certify to the State Auditor a list of school districts of the state which are unable to pay for the operation of their schools the minimum amount determined in the manner hereinbefore set forth, after having made the maximum final effort to do so, together with a statement of the amount of the money required by such districts to meet such minimum standards.
- (c) MAXIMUM FINANCIAL EFFORT DEFINED. In determining whether or not a school district has made the maximum financial effort mentioned above, it must appear: (1) That the district shall have levied for the fiscal year the normal maximum tax rate as fixed by law, (2) That revenues from local taxes, and from state and county sources have been exhausted, and (3) That such district, under the law cannot issue additional warrants or sell certificates of indebtedness, or, if the same could be issued, that because of the financial condition of the school district such obligations of the district would be greatly depreciated in value to the extent that they would not be acceptable as commercial instruments.
- (d) SCHOOLS TO RECEIVE AID FOR SEVEN MONTH TERM ONLY. School districts shall receive aid as in this Section provided for the purpose of keeping their schools open for a seven month term only, and after the seventh month of any school term has expired, no further aid shall be granted under this Section.
- (e) STATE AUDITOR. The State Auditor shall issue his warrants monthly, in accordance with the certificates of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, payable to the several school districts in the amounts so directed by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, to the County Superintendents of Schools, in case the available money for distribution on the basis of need shall not be available in any month, the State Auditor shall pro-rate the available funds among the districts in proportion to the amounts so certified to him.
- (f) ADMINISTRATION. (reading the same as subdivision (d) of the printed bill.)

House Bill No. 341. Mr. Anderson of Divide: I cannot vote for the establishment of the curse of the American saloon, the hoary devil of times gone by. No institution has ever done more harm to the American people than this. For the sake of the young people of the state of North Dakota I wish to register a protest against a system so vicious. I vote "no" Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Burgum: I am opposed to this attempt to create a legal sanction for a social evil. I am opposed to the state entering into partnership with and accepting the benefits from the greatest menace which has ever beset the human race. Therefore, I vote "no."

Mr. Burke: When this bill first came in I thought I was going to vote for it; but one of the greatest evils of the old saloon was constant meddling in politics. This bill brings a constant political wet and dry issue before the people of North Dakota in every election. Therefore I vote "no."

Mr. Erickson, McKenzie: I vote "no" on House Bill No. 290 for the reason that it provides for privately owned liquor stores. If this was a state-controlled store I would vote "aye," but cannot on this Bill. I vote "no."

Mr. Gilbertson: I don't believe in the old saloon. This is a very serious proposition, and I feel that the vote we are taking here tonight, by 113 members of this body, by passing this bill and making it a law, by passing it by a two-thirds

majority, by reason of the fact the people have several times voted overwhelmingly against liquor, I cannot support it; so I vote "no." I cannot but respect the many communications that have come in from the many people over the state condemning the liquor bill.

Mr. Godwin: I vote "aye" on House Bill No. 290, in addition to the many other reasons expressed by myself and others from the floor of this House, for the further reason that in the light of the condition of our people I oppose every time a bottle of liquor is drunk in North Dakota donating seven cents to the taxes of Minnesota in view of the distress which exists among the people of our state. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I vote "aye."

Mr. Hewitt: I realize that the State of North Dakota needs a liquor bill, but I believe a more moderate bill should be offered at this time. I have studied these bills for the last couple days, and after studying Senate Bill No. 175 I have come to the conclusion it is a much safer bill. House Bill No. 290 won't last long. I vote "no."

Mr. Holey: I cannot vote for the establishment of the curse of the American Saloon the hoard Devil of the times gone by. No institution has ever done more harm to the American people than this. For the sake of the young people of the state of North Dakota I wish to register a protest against a system so vicious. Also the revenue is only a fraction of the cost of production. I wish my reasons entered in the House Journal. I vote "no," Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Kapaun: I vote "aye" in this, because I have lived in a state where saloons were legalized, and I never saw conditions there such as exist in the State of North Dakota today.

Mr. Langford: I vote "no" on this bill because I don't believe in the old saloon. I don't believe it will have any tendency to stop blindpigging. As soon as people are going to pay a high rate for their liquor they are not going to stop blindpigging.

Mr. Marks: I agree heartily with my friend, Anderson, in his statement he made here, if that were only true; but Mr. Anderson knows that the State of North Dakota is polluted with bootlegging. I am voting "aye" on this bill for the reason it is the best thing we have at this time; and while I know it doesn't agree with many of my friends I can't do any different. I vote "aye."

Mr. Moore: I vote "aye" on this bill because we have liquor on all sides of North Dakota. I would like to know where to go and find our liquor and tax it. I vote "aye" on this bill.

Mr. Morgan: I am voting "no," because I remember last fall how the men and women voters of this state flocked to the polls and knocked out hard liquor. I don't believe in any kind of liquor house, and I can't legalize this curse. I vote "no."

Mr. Niewoehner: I vote "aye" because I realize that we have the liquor evil and our only hope lies in strict regulation.

Mr. Noben: If I were voting on whether we were going to have liquor or not, it would certainly be not to have liquor; but the issue is whether it is going to be legal or illegal. My county gave a majority of three hundred to the wet Democrats. Therefore, I vote "aye."

Mr. Oglesby: I didn't take any time with the rest of them in the argument, but I wish a little time to explain my vote. Two years ago I voted "no," and two years ago it was the same as today. The issue was if they would give us beer, and we would have regulation. We have no more regulation today than two years ago. Our bars will be let down just as much with this license as it was with prohibition. I don't care whether it is a Senate Bill or a House Bill, I vote "no."

Mr. Olson of Hettinger: It is time the people of North Dakota knew what they want. At the last election they went on record as voting "no" on the hard liquor proposition. Therefore, I vote "no."

Mr. Olson of Mountrail: You can never control liquor by high license. It has never been done. The people of my county voted dry, and as a father of 5 sons and 3 daughters, I vote "no."

Mr. Schantz: I vote "aye" for the reason it is impossible to regulate an outlawed practice. It cannot be regulated until such is realized. I vote "aye."

Mr. Schnell: I vote "aye" on this bill, for the reason I am tired of the singing of fellows drinking this twenty-five cent stuff Ole Stray was speaking about.

Mr. Stray: I vote "aye" for the reason I believe it will be an improvement over the conditions we have today. I vote "aye."

Mr. Traynor: I vote "no" because I believe the liquor store bill which has just passed the Senate, and which I intend to support, is a much better bill.

Mr. Thoreson: I vote "aye" on this bill for the reason that I think under strict regulation it will be better than the evils we are up against now.

Mr. Adam: Can I make a few remarks as a special privilege? If these men would vote as they drink, they would vote wet. You can protect yourself against robbers and thieves. You can lock your doors, but you cannot protect yourself against liars and hypocrites.

# FIFTY-FIRST DAY AFTER RECESS AND THE FIFTY-SECOND DAY

House of Representatives, Bismarck, North Dakota, February 28, 1935.

The House convened at 12:45 P. M., Speaker Crockett presiding.

#### GENERAL ORDERS

Mr. Blaisdell moved that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of general orders; which motion prevailed.

The Speaker called Mr. Blaisdell to the chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

The Speaker resumed the chair.

When the Committee arose it submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker: The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

Senate Bill No. 74. A Bill for an Act to Provide for the Payment of the Expense of Auditing and Examining the Affairs of the North Dakota Mill and Elevator Association for the State Mill and Elevator at Grand Forks, the Bank of North Dakota, Including the Farm Loan Department, the State Hail Insurance Department, the Workmen's Compensation Bureau of the State of North Dakota, the Office of the Beer Commissioner of the State of North Dakota, the North Dakota State Regulatory Department, and the North Dakota Teachers Insurance and Retirement Fund, by the State Board of Auditors Pursuant to Section 369-b of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for 1913, as Amended by Chapter 186 of the Laws of 1933, Designating and Appropriating the Funds From Which Such Payment Shall Be Made; Providing for the Procedure for Such Payment; Providing for the Repeal of Any Acts in Conflict Herewith; and Declaring an Emergency.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In line 9, in the title of the bill, on page 4, of the Senate Journal of February the 11th, strike out the word "and," and in line 10, after the apostrophe and before the word "by" insert the following language, "Highway Department and Motor Vehicle Registration Department" and Game and Fish Department.

On page 5, Section 1, line 13, strike out the word and, and in line 14, after the apostrophe and before the word, immediately, insert the following language, "Highway Department and Motor Vehicle Registration Department" and Game and Fish Department.

At the bottom of Section 1, add the following lines and figures: "The Highway Department and Motor Vehicle Department \$3,500.00; The Game and Fish Department \$750.00."

And the further amendments:

Amend the amendments of the standing committee which are made on the engrossed bill by striking from the amendments the words: "and Motor Vehicle Registration Department" wherever they occur in the amendments.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Also,

Senate Bill No. 88. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Subdivision (e) of Section 1 of Chapter 161, Session Laws of 1933, Relating to Taxation and Licensing of Motor Vehicles, and Declaring an Emergency.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In sub-division (e) of the engrossed bill as received from the Senate, in line 10, after the word "done," cross out the word "by," and substitute the word "for," and after the word "farmer," strike out the following: "for their neighbors in transporting agricultural products to or from market, and substitute the following: "in transporting agricultural products to or from the local railroad station."

In line 19, Sub-division "e" of the engrossed bill, as received from the Senate, cross out the period following the word "farmer" and insert a comma and add the following: "nor to any one not licensed as a commercial freighter hauling native or lignite coal from the mine to the consumer, provided, that he does not haul to exceed 15 miles from the point of production, nor to farmers hauling lignite coal regardless of the distance hauled, provided such hauling is done for other farmers and in exchange for work and not for cash."

And recommend Senate Bill No. 88 back to the House wtihout action.

Also,

Senate Bill No. 156. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Subdivision (d) of Section 1 of Chapter 188 of the Session Laws of 1931, Relating to Regulations of Motor Vehicle Transportation, and Declaring an Emergency.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In sub-division "d" of the engrossed bill, as received from the Senate, at line 25, after the word "to," insert the following: "or from the local railroad station," and in line 26, cross out the following: "the market by the producer or producers in exchange of labor."

At the end of Section "d" cross out the period and insert a semi-colon and insert the following: "nor to any one not licensed as an auto transportation company hauling native or lignite coal from the mine to the consumer, provided that he does not haul to exceed 15 miles from the point of production; nor to farmers hauling lignite coal regardless of the distance hauled, provided such hauling is done for other farmers and in exchange for work and not for cash."

And recommend that Senate Bill No. 156 be indefinitely postponed.

Also,

Senate Bill No. 177. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Subdivision (c) of Section 25 of Chapter 186, Session Laws of 1931, as Amended by Chapter 160 of the Session Laws of 1933, Relating to Taxation and Licensing of Motor Vehicles and Declaring an Emergency.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

In Section 2 ,of the original Bill, strike out everything after the word "emergency," and insert the following in lieu thereof: "this act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval."

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

# BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTA-

### TIVES OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA THAT.

WHEREAS, There recently occurred at Fargo, North Dakota, a disturbance which involved the alleged constitutional rights of citizens of this state and also involved the question of the legality of the acts of certain peace officers, and other officers, of the State and County of Cass;

WHEREAS: A large number of citizens were arrested and not brought to trial;

WHEREAS, The said disturbance and the prosecutions resulting therefrom is a matter of concern to the people of the State of North Dakota; and

WHEREAS, The complained of acts of the officers were done under the alleged authority and power given by the legislative acts of the legislature of the State of North Dakota; and

WHEREAS, the large number of the arrests made, and other facts, raises a question as to whether or not the present law of this State giving the States Attorney the power to bring citizens to a criminal trial by simply filing a criminal information, instead of requiring the action of a Grand Jury and the finding of an indictment by such Grand Juries is wise; and

WHEREAS, This House adopted a Resolution condemning the officials involved in such disturbance without making a thorough investigation of the facts;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, In order no injustice shall be done to any citizen of the State of North Dakota, that a committee of five members of this House be appointed by the Speaker to inquire into, and investigate, the facts concerning said disturbance, and the arrests that followed, with power to subpoena persons, books and papers, including officials of the State or any County or municipality, and with the power to employ counsel and to take such testimony as may be deemed necessary by the committee of five members or the sub-committee, which committee or sub-committee may sit for such purpose at any place within the state cenvenient to such committee for the purpose of taking such testimony, to sit during the term of the present legislative session and to report back to this House, its findings, its recommendations as to what action if any should be enacted.

Federal Emergency Relief Administration Investigation.

WHEREAS: Discontent is rampant throughout the State of North Dakota with administration of Federal Emergency Relief funds; and

WHEREAS: It is claimed that many out-of-state residents have been brought into the state to administer and work in the various state and county relief offices to the detriment of the North Dakota employment situation; and

WHEREAS: It is apparent that the present relief set-up in North Dakota is not only top-heavy and unwieldy but because of its complicated structure is conducive to waste of public funds; and

WHEREAS: It is evident that favoritism has been displayed in the issuance of relief orders in many counties; and

WHEREAS: Salaries being paid certain department heads in the state offices in Bismarck are out of proportion to salaries being paid to state employees, college professors, and professional men; and

WHEREAS: Mis-management is apparent in the state offices as evidenced by the many months it takes for persons doing business with the administration to obtain compensation for services rendered; and

WHEREAS: Livestock feed supplies purchased by the FERA at low prices are being doled out at exorbitant prices in comparison to their original value; and

WHEREAS: There is much unnecessary duplication of work between state and county offices to the detriment of our poor; and

WHEREAS: It is apparent that administration of relief should be lodged in the counties where the proper authorities are in a position to administer relief at much less cost to the taxpayer and with much more fairness to the recipient; and

WHEREAS: It is freely charged that the FERA is shot through with politics and that politics controls the allocation of positions in the various relief offices; and

WHEREAS: The character and morale of our people have been weakened rather than strengthened by the way relief has been administered in this state; and

WHEREAS: Administration of such a vast system requires business leadership more than an ephemeral social service training; and

WHEREAS: Our wage earners and farmers have been exploited by a cumbersome system whose administrative costs are excessive for the results accomplished; and

WHEREAS: The relief system is undermining our democratic form of government by spreading the seed of socialization which already has adversely affected and harmed not only our farmers and various business enterprises but also the various professions;

THEREFORE: BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF NORTH DA-KOTA: THE SENATE CONCURRING:

That this deplorable condition be brought to the attention of the President of the United States, the Congress of the United States and Mr. Harry L. Hopkins, national administrator of Federal Emergency Relief funds; and they be urged to take immediate steps to investigate the administration of relief in North Dakota and that where mis-management and inefficiency is found that the persons responsible for such work be immediately dismissed; and

That if any evidence is discovered of graft, fraud, misfeasance or malfeasance, embezzlement or other crimes against the government that such persons or persons responsible be punished to the full extent of the law; and

Be It Further Resolved: That the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate be authorized to appoint a committee of three members of their respective chambers to act as a joint committee to investigate any state or private agencies set up through federal funds allocated by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration and report their findings to the legislative assembly at the proper time and place; and

Be It Further Resolved: That authenticated copies thereof be mailed to President Franklin D. Roosevelt, The Speaker of the National House of Representatives, the President of the U. S. Senate, Mr. Harry L. Hopkins, The North Dakota Senators and Representatives in Congress; Gov. Walter Welford and the local relief administrator.

Introduced by Representatives Burke, Smith, Blaisdell, Downey and Clarke.

WHEREAS, the several departments of government of the State of North Dakota have made requests to the 24th Legislative Assembly for appropriations in excess of One Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$150,000.00) Dollars to cover deficits incurred in such departments during the past biennium, and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Section 640a1 of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of 1913 it is made a misdemeanor for any state official or state board or the head of any state institution to spend more money than is appropriated by the State Legislature for the biennium, and

WHEREAS, all indebtedness incurred by such officials for their respective departments in excess of such appropriations is by law declared to be absolutely void and,

WHEREAS, the 24th Legislative Assembly due to unusual contingencies and emergencies has seen fit to make deficit appropriations and to honor debts incurred in excess of the appropriations for the past biennium; and

WHEREAS, This House does not wish its actions in this respect to be interpreted as creating a precedent with regard to deficit appropriations nor as condoning the acts of such state officials in violating the statutes of this state and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of this House, that the public be fully informed as to the laws applicable to this situation to the end that all persons may know when they enter into any contract with any state officer, state board or the head of any state institution, calling for the expenditure of money in excess of the appropriation for such state office, board or institution that as to such excess the contract is absolutely void:

In line 5, Section 1, of the engrossed bill, after the word "hogs," strike out the word "and," and insert a comma; and after the word "sheep," in the same line insert the words "and poultry," and strike out the comma after the word "sheep."

In Section 1, page 2, line 6 from the top of the engrossed bill, following the word "than," strike out the word "fifty," and insert in lieu thereof the words "twenty-five."

In line 12, from the top of page 2, of the engrossed bill, following the word "machinery," strike out the balance of Section 1 and insert in lieu thereof the following: "provided that any person, co-partnership, association or corporation licensed for the year 1935 under the provision of Chapter 7 of the Session Laws for the year 1933 at the time of the taking effect of this act shall not be required to qualify hereunder until the year "1936."

In Section 2, page 3, of the engrossed bill, line 19 from the top, strike out the entire paragraph, beginning with the words "Each applicant shall * * * *" to and including line 6, from the top of the page on page 4 and in lieu therof insert the following paragraph:

"Each applicant shall file with his application a surety company bond to be approved as to amount, form and sufficiency and surety by the Commission in the sum of not less than \$1500.00 for principal's bond and that the amount of said bond be increased not less than \$500.00 for each applicant appointed by the dealer and licensed by the Commission, in which the Commissioners shall be the obligee but which shall be for the benefit and purpose of protecting any person dealing with the dealer in livestock from loss by reason of acts of deceit, fraud, dishonesty, forgery, and theft on the part of the principal or his agent provided however, that a separate bond for each agent appointed and licensed, may be given in the sum of \$1500.00, in lieu of the additional amount on the principal bond; provided further that the Commission may demand at any time additional bond for either principal or agent when in the discretion and judgment of the Commission the volume of business of the principal or any agent named by such principal warrants it."

In Section 5, of the engrossed bill, line 9, strike out the words "The dealer," and insert in lieu thereof the words: "All dealers, at any concentration point,"

Strike out all of Section 7; and then renumber all Sections after Section 6.

In the engrossed bill, line 4, Section 16, strike out \$5.00" and insert in lieu thereof "\$2.50."

At the end of Section 17, strike out the period and insert in lieu thereof a comma, and insert the following words: "except that this specifically repeals Section 2 of Chapter 106 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the year 1927."

## Station WCAU PHA:

Congress sometime ago passed a bill authorizing a sixty mlilion dollar program for farmers crop production seed loans. That action constituted merely an authorization and is nothing more than a gesture until an appropriation is made available to the Farm Credit Administration so that actual money may be loaned to the needy farmers. Under the Agricultural Adjustment Act seed stocks were purchased during the past months and located strategically in warehouses where such supplies will be needed under the seed loan program. Farm Credit Association dare not print forms and instructions until the appropriation is available to it. Off the record information states that the administration wants to take this sixty million dollars out of the big relief bill and it is one of the clubs being used to force favorable action by the Senate on that big bill. It is a tragic situation where the government has purchased the seed and the authorization is passed, and yet the farmers in the areas where planting must be started within the next three weeks are likely to suffer great hardships because

of this political impasse. In the spring wheat area seeding must be begun in about three weeks. There is a lot of red tape in translating any appropriation in Washington down through the different agencies until the farmer finally gets it. If the farmer does not receive his seed for real planting time he often suffers a total loss of crop for having planted too late. Most farmers who are required to borrow under a seed loan program will be on the government for another year if they fail to get a crop again; politics compounds misery. There is a delegation of ten representatives of the farm organization and co-operatives from the spring wheat area at work in Washington trying to get relief from this situation. They are here supported by a fund raised through contribution of farm families co-operative institutions and the townspeople from the areas whence they have come. This committee being here under such circumstances suggests that the rural people have begun to realize the necessity for sending their own folks to Washington to see what makes the wheels go around. Surely you have the contacts in Washington to verify all the statements which I have made about matters here. Several hundred thousand farm families will be grateful to you if your voice will aid us in this distressing situation. I am chairman of the Northwest Farmers Union Legislative Committee to which I have referred and am a big wheat farmer from McCone County, Montana. You may use my name and anything else in this wire which you choose in speaking over the radio.

Sincere thanks for any help you see fit to extend.

Copy of the North Dakota House Concurrent Resolution A-1 regarding the federal program of seed distribution has been referred to the Seed Conservation Committee for consideration.

Attached hereto is a statement concerning the distribution of seed grains conserved for the drought area issued December 3 and also a further statement issued February 8. Crders for seed from the supplies conserved by the Government may be placed with the county drought committee of counties where seed supplies are deficient due to the drought. No provision was made, in carrying out the program as authorized by Congress, to make loans payable in kind. All agricultural loans are administered through the Farm Credit Administration.

The crop production loan of \$60,000,000 has been passed by Congress and signed by the President. Farmers who need financing in order to purchase seed, either from the Government supply or elsewhere, may apply for crop production loans through their County Crop Production Loan Committee of the Farm Credit Administration.

# AAA HAS COMPLETED SEED CONSERVATION PURCHASES

Having conserved practically the total supply of adopted seed grains meeting its standards, which are not held commercially for seed purposes, and with funds appropriated for seed conservation nearly exhausted, the Agricultural Adjustment Administration announced today that seed conservation purchases of wheat, oats, barley, and flax were completed.

Emphasis in the government program to alleviate seed shortage due to drought has now shifted to plans for rapidly completing distribution of the stocks of conserved seeds to farmers in areas of the officially designated drought territory where a seed-deficit exists, and to methods for providing information when requested concerning available supplies of adapted seed grain in private or commercial hands. The ending of conservation purchases, however, does not discontinue the optional purchase of seed quality corn under seal as security for corn-loans, as this plan will proceed in states of the drought region until completed.

Using the \$25,000,000 made available under the emergency appropriations act for seed conservation, the Administration has acquired large stocks of adapted and superior varieties of grain-seeds to prevent the dissipation through feeding.

processing or mixing. Such Government stocks, as of February 5, were as follows: Wheat (hard spring) 5,590,804 bushels; durum wheat, 876,140 bushels; oats, 10,586,098 bushels; barley, 1,889,886; flax, 421,050; and sorghums, 591,050 pounds.

With the purchase activities completed, the Administration's seed stocks committee is devoting its efforts to rapid distribution of its stocks to areas in which there is a deficiency of adapted seeds. Under the distribution plan, the county drought committees have made surveys to determine locally available seed supplies and have submitted consolidated orders for seed that cannot be supplied from local sources. Surveys have indicated deficiencies of adapted seeds in North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Minnesota, Kansas, Nebraska, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri and Oklahoma.

The conserved seeds are being distributed to producers in officially designated drought areas, where seed deficits have been shown to exist, at flat prices based on actual cost of the seed as grain, plus handling, cleaning and storage charges.

Local elevators and seed houses approved by the county drought committees and placed under proper bond, are distributing the government-held seed to producers on a service-charge basis and handling the receipts from sales. Over 1,500 local grain elevators in the drought territory are now under bond to act as agents for the Administration in the distribution program. Movements to final distribution points are based on allocations made to drought counties on the basis of needs as reported by county committees, with the exception of shipments to certain areas in which planting may be useless if weather conditions remain so unfavorably dry. In such cases shipments are being held up until needs can be more closely determined. All seed stocks have been carefully cleaned and graded under the supervision of the Seed Stock Committee. The large quantity of screenings resulting from the cleaning operations are being ground and sold for feed to meet the demand for feed for livestock in the drought region.

There have been many requests that these screenings be used as feed for wild birds and game in the upland areas of the Northwestern states. Administration officials have given these requests careful consideration, but find such use of the screenings inadvisable as the screenings carry a high percentage of noxious weed seeds, such as creeping jenny (bindweed), Canadian Thistle, quack grass and other highly dangerous weeds. As game conservation officials have pointed out, grinding the screenings, which would kill the weed seeds, makes them unsuitable for wild birds. No other practical way, say officials, has been found to treat weed seeds to make them safe for distribution for wild-life feed.

In connection with the program, information has been collected regarding available supplies of seed grain adapted to the drought region held privately or commercially. Thus the distribution agency is so organized that it can act as

a clearing house for inquiries regarding car lot demands for seed grain adapted to the drought territory and can furnish information in regard to supplies of seed grain obtainable through regular commercial channels. Such inquiries should be addressed to the Federal Seed Procurement Service and Seed Stock Committee, 500 Flour Exchange Building, Minneapolis, Minn.

The plan for the optional purchase of quantities of seed corn, to be selected from corn sealed on farms under Commodity Credit Corporation loans, in states of the drought territory, is anticipated to conserve several hundred thousand bushels of seed corn chiefly of the 1933 crop. Reports show that optioning of cribs is well advanced in Kansas, where 23,000 bushels has been certified as being seed quality and placed under option, and in Missouri, where 34,000 bushels has been certified and optioned. In Iowa, Nebraska, and Minnesota deep snow and cold weather have delayed inspection of cribs.

Under this plan, producers having seed quality corn under seal as security for a 55-cent per bushel corn loan from the Commodity Credit Corporation, are eligible to option such corn for sale to the Government, at \$1.25 per bushel on or before May 1, 1935. Owners are being advanced 20 cents per bushel, in addition to the loan received from the Commodity Credit Corporation, in return for the option. The plan was inaugurated to encourage growers in states where seed corn is deficient, due to the drought, to hold sufficient quantities of seed quality corn for seed uses in the local community.

# ANNOUNCE PRICE POLICY FOR SALE OF CONSERVED SEEDS

Supplemental seed stocks of adapted and superior varieties of grain held by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration as a seed conservation measure, will be distributed to producers in officially designated drouth areas where seed deficits exist, at flat prices based on actual cost of the seed as grain, plus handling, cleaning and storage charges, it was announced today.

In accordance with this policy, the Administration announced the following sale prices to the farmer, for seed grain available to farmers from distributing agencies in counties during December and January:

As a result of the program of the Department for the drouth area to prevent the dissipation of specially adapted varieties of grain seeds through processing, mixing, and feeding, the Administration has acquired the following supplies of seeds: Spring Wheat, 5,050,000 bushels; Durum Wheat, 1,150,000 bushels; Malting Barley, 1,000,000 bushels; Feed Barley, 700,000 bushels; White and Yellow Oats, 8,000,000 bushels; Red Oats, 1,500,000 bushels; Flax, 400,000 bushels. In purchasing seed stocks, rigid standards have been applied in order to secure seed grains that are superior to ordinary commercial grain, and that are best adapted to the deficit areas. All seed stocks have been inspected by the Bureau of Plant Industry and have been cleaned and graded under supervision of that bureau.

For sales made after the last day of each month following January, one cent per bushel per month will be added to cover storage charges. Otherwise the price schedule will hold, and the prices quoted will be standard throughout the entire deficit area for Administration seed supplies.

Under the distribution plan, first announced on October 6, the county drouth committees are now making surveys in drouth areas to determine locally available seed stocks, and to obtain orders from farmers for their seed requirements. Orders for seed that cannot be supplied from local sources are being consolidated in the offices of the various county drouth relief directors. When Government-owned seeds are desired to supplement local supplies, the county director will submit a consolidated county list of requirements to the Procurement Officer, Commodities Purchase Section, 500 Flour Exchange, Minneapolis, Minnesota. The procurement officer will take action to place in the county and within reach of all applicants, the seed which has been applied for. Careful surveys have indicated deficiencies of adapted seed grain in North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Minnesota, Kansas, Nebraska, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, and Oklahoma.

The seed stocks are now largely held in elevators in primary country distributing points throughout deficit areas, and movement of the stocks to final points of distribution will start as soon as allocations to drouth counties have been made on the basis of needs as reported through consolidated orders and surveys of supplies made by county committees. It was pointed out by officials that shipments within allocations would be made only on definite evidence of a shortage of adapted seeds, and only after orders from grain producers for such seeds have been recorded by county committees.

Officials in charge of the seed conservation program emphasized the fact that the total amount of seed held by the Administration is small in comparison to the total requirements of the drouth areas, probably not accounting for more than 50 per cent of the deficit. The primary purpose of the program is to protect superior varieties that have been developed over a period of years, from extinction through feeding, mixing, or processing. However, in addition, the distribution agency is so organized that it can act as a

clearing house for information to expedite the distribution of privately held seed supplies, and can notify the seed trade and seed handlers of the need for seeds, in order to encourage supplying of a material part of the deficit through regular commercial channels.

Local elevators and seed houses approved by the county drouth committees and placed under proper bond, will distribute the Government-held seed to producers and will handle the receipts from sales. Seed ordered will be held in the local designated seed house or elevator subject to call of the farmers applying for seed, until 30 days before the regular planting season for each locality and each class of grain. After that date it will be considered released and subject to sale to any other applicant, if not called for by the original applicant. The final date for holding seed for applicants for each class of grain for each locality will be announced to county directors by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

Blank forms for handling the distribution of Government seed stocks are being prepared. Requests for these forms should be made to the Procurement Officer, Agricultural Adjustment Administration, Minneapolis, Minn.

# State of North Dakota OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR Bismarck

#### TO THE HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE TWENTY-FOURTH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

Facts developed through study of plans for our state government during the next two years has revealed that a very undesirable condition will confront the citizens of the state unless immediate steps are taken to remedy the developing situation.

I am constrained to call your attention to the vast appropriation items present in proposed laws that were passed between the houses of the legislature by the 50th day of this assembly. A summary of these bills indicates that the sundry items total to an amount approximately as follows:

Senate	\$3,738,584.84
House of Representatives	
Totals	\$6,000,748,10

Under existing conditions I believe the totals above described cannot be justified, and must by all means be reduced. It is your duty to limit the total to a much smaller amount. Two years ago the total for all purposes of state government, after vetoes by the governor, was left at approximately \$4,500,000. The reduction of the appropriations to that amount, it afterwards developed, was too severe. Necessary expenses required that deficits be contracted which boosted the amount required to operate the government to the point that a figure of \$5,000,000 would not be an unreasonable total.

We should not go beyond that figure except as necessary for the education of our children and in the care of our indigent, our mental and physical defectives and for our unemployed. To appropriate larger sums will be useless as the funds to pay cannot properly be raised when you consider general demands for money for needs other than strict governmental functions.

It is called to our attention that it is necessary for the

duration of the present emergency for the state itself to take over the matter of educational financing to the end that our rural schools may be kept open and operated for the education of our children. This is unfortunate, and, because the plan presented for successful continuance indicates that \$1,929,125.00 per year is necessary, there are those interested in destructive propaganda who have striven to demonstrate that reckless extravagance is planned. You must safeguard against duplication of levy and provide that any special levies you may determine upon may only be a replacement. I recommend that funds collected for school purposes be distributed under the direction of the State Board of Equalization, a state-wide board which will apportion the state's money discreetly to those schools entitled to receive it.

A very thorough study has been made by your committees to determine the requirements for school aid through the equalization fund. I am willing to accept the recommendation of the committee as being representative of the final requirement. The Superintendent of Public Instruction also concurs in the recommendation of the educational committee, and states that it is his opinion that the amounts as detailed hereunder are necessary to give proper care to the schools.

This will make a biennial requirement for the school maintenance of \$3,859,850.00

As a means of raising the revenue necessary to meet the requirement of the rural schools of \$1,929,125.00 per year. it is believed that some form of transaction tax must be resorted to. I know that the adoption of some form of this tax has been in your mind and under consideration for some time. Already there has been an enormous amount of pressure brought upon you to endeavor to induce you to refrain from enacting legislation to make a turn-over tax effective. This pressure is being brought solely for the purpose of embarrassing yourselves and the administration. I am convinced that no other form of tax will produce the revenue necessary for our schools. With a safeguard against a duplication of levy by also requiring the reduction of the district school levies, you have removed all possible objection that there can be to the manner of taxing. Experience in the nineteen states having a retail sales tax in 1933 indicates that while these retail sales taxes were unpopular in the beginning, they have become more popular and the revenues raised have justified the use of the tax. There is nothing improper or irregular in the levy of a sales tax. It is the only means now available to permit our entire citizenry to

participate in the support of their government. This opportunity to participate in the support is provided in direct proportion to the amount of money available to the person. Every patriotic citizen should be interested in the maintenance of our schools and should welcome an opportunity to contribute to the education of the youth of this state. I recommend that provision be made that revenues received from a turn-over or sales tax in excess of the amount required by the rural schools, be provided to be used for the support of our other educational or charitable institutions. I do not believe there is anyone who can justifiably criticise you for resorting to a sales tax to maintain our A 2% sales tax should yield approximately schools. \$2,000,000 per year. Consideration might be given to a provision for the levy of a 3% tax the first year, reduced to 2% the second year; additional funds derived possibly being used to provide additional construction required by the institutions provided for the care of the defectives. The immediate needs for schools have already been met by the transfer of the \$1,000,000 from the hail surplus fund.

Your are also confronted with the fact that through the Bank of North Dakota the state government, acting either under direct mandate of the people or through legislative enactment, that had the approval of the people, has followed certain well defined policies and has contracted specific and continuing obligations. The people have always wanted their selected policies continued until they direct otherwise, and they want their obligations liquidated and carried out in an orderly manner. I am proceeding on this assumption and, therefore, ask that adequate means be provided to protect the integrity of the State's obligations. Two years ago provision was made for an amount of \$1,100,000 to be set aside from the Motor Vehicle Fund annually for three years, to care for the demand of the Bank of North Dakota Bond interest fund. The requirement for this fund for the next biennium it is estimated will be \$1,500,000 or \$700,000 less than for the past biennium. To allow the motor vehicle fund to be transferred for the third year and to divert \$400,000 of the money derived from the tax on the sale of beer for one year will meet the requirement for the biennium. It is believed this should be done in the interest of the State.

With the concerted drive which has been made by predatory interests on our State Bonds and the mass attack on the financial integrity of the State, it is more incumbent upon you to continue the Bond Stabilization program.

If it is found that the expense of the maintenance of the normal functions of the government can be kept within the figure of \$5,000,000, we can assume that amount as a budgetary requirement. To meet this requirement we have the following anticipated income:

Funds on hand July 1st	\$ 627,146.17

The above, therefore, reveals an apparent deficit for general requirements of approximately \$1,000,000. This amount must be realized from taxes levied against incomes or commodities not now especially contributing to the government. In any event, the million dollars must be raised. Some states have legalized the sale of liquor as a means of assisting in the maintenance of government. It is not known what steps your body might take in this line and I will not attempt to influence you therein.

Special levies that more closely follow and are assessed against the lines which have revealed most profits during the present emergency, should produce sufficient revenue to meet our needed requirements. I do not believe that it is fair to single out one industry to the exclusion of others and to make this industry our agent for the collection of needed revenues.

Gasoline consumption is too closely identified with agriculture production to make it desirable to add any increased burden. The normal sales tax ratio could be raised from 2% to 5% or more on some special items, and you would thereby have more nearly provided the revenue to meet the budgetary requirements.

The State is also confronted this year with a requirement not previously presented in budgetary needs, or rather not previously presented to the Legislature as something requiring additional funds. This is unemployment compensation, old age pension and general welfare. For the time being it is estimated that at least Two Million dollars will be required for the biennium. A condition is confronting us that must be met and the means for raising funds must be provided by this legislature.

Proposed Federal legislation dealing with the subject provides in general that states must share in contributions to relief funds of various natures. Eventually some system of control and unemployment compensation must be provided. We should give the worker work and through insurance give protection against unemployment, old age, sickness, disability and dependency. Unemployment reserves can be built up which will take care of seasonable or other variations in cyclical unemployment. Until Federal legislation has been enacted, however, which will furnish the guide for state participation, it is impracticable to enact State legislation and we must, therefore, continue through making grants where necessary. To do this will require the Two Million dollars above specified.

While I am opposed to the diversion of funds to uses other than that which were contemplated in the enacting laws, yet in an emergency we must make provision for diversion in cases where the funds can be better used for new purposes and where they are not absolutely necessary to our government in their present use.

There is a constitutional provision authorizing the issuance of 2,000,000 general obligation bonds. I believe the Legisla-

ture should authorize the sale of these for relief activities, should it be shown later to be necessary. This action might satisfactorily care for all necessary provisions over the biennium in the event conditions do not improve. There is much talk of a special session and many members have been heard to remark that no constructive acts have come out of the legislature this year. I do not agree. A survey of the situation right now does not indicate to me that any special session will be needed. Ample time remains to clear the calendars of meritorious legislation if attention is directed to those bills which cover subjects necessarily related to our present administration.

Much time in committees and on the floor has been wasted in argument over preferential or personal legislation. You must enact your revenue legislation without regard to the plea of the special interests—you will be burdened for time and you must act accordingly. Some bills are in your possession which are designed to allow broader participation in Federal Government activities and to permit more extensive Federal works. Please scan closely all of these measures that you may not kill meritorious and needed authorities without knowledge thereof.

I believe that bills now left in committees or on the calendar should be studied closely, sorted and classified so that first priority will be given to needed corrective legislation, revenue bills, and appropriations. Other matters can follow but please do not allow the revenue measures and appropriations to become involved in last-minute squeezes.

At the first election for the organization of a new school district there shall be elected at large for such school district three directors, one to serve until the first annual election, one to serve until the second annual election thereafter and one to serve until the third annual election thereafter, and a school treasurer to serve until the annual election in the next even numbered year and until his successor is elected and qualified.

Section 2. AMENDMENT.) That Section 1154 of the 1913 Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 1154. HOURS POLLS OPEN.) At the time and place fixed by the school board for holding the annual school election, the Board shall at one o'clock P. M. of said day hear the reports of the clerk and treasurer for the preceding year and shall have and conduct such discussions or hearing thereon as may be desirable for those present at said meeting. All interested persons may participate and such report shall be open for inspection. At two o'clock P. M., the transaction of all other business shall suspend and the polls shall be open and remain open until five o'clock P. M., for the election of district school officers.

"Section 2. OTHER FUNDS—DUTIES OF BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION.) The Board of Administration may also enter into any agreement relative to any funds which may be obtained from the Federal Government or any of its agencies, for the purpose of assisting in the construction of such new building, which funds may then be added to the appropriation hereby made therefor, such agreement to conform with the rules and regulations of the Federal Government or its agencies incident to obtaining such funds, and in case such funds shall be procured, then the total cost of said building may, in the discretion of the Board, exceed the amount hereby appropriated therefor; provided, however, that the total disbursements to be made out of state moneys in the construction and equipment of said new building shall in no case exceed the amount hereby appropriated therefor.

A Bill for an Act Creating a State Highway Patrol for the State of North Dakota; Authorizing the Attorney General to Appoint a State Highway Patrol Superintendent, an Assistant State Highway Patrol Superintendent, and Highway Police; Designating Powers and Qualifications of Such Police; Amending Chapter 102 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1933 Relating to Bureau of Criminal Identification; Fixing Compensation and Providing for Disposition of Fines Collected; and Declaring an Emergency.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

After the word "A Bill," strike out everything and insert in lieu thereof, the following:

For an Act Creating a State Highway Patrol for the State of North Dakota; Authorizing the Regulatory Department to Appoint a State Highway Patrol Superintendent, an Assistant State Highway Patrol Superintendent, and Highway Police; Designating Powers and Qualifications of Such Police; Fixing Compensation and Providing for Disposition of Fines Collected; and Declaring an Emergency.

# BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

Section 1. ESTABLISHMENT OF POLICE PATROL.) There is hereby created a State Highway Patrol, and the Regulatory Officer with the consent of the Governor, is authorized and empowered to appoint a State Highway Patrol Superintendent and an Assistant Highway Patrol Superintendent; said superintendent and assistant superintendent shall hold office during the pleasure of the Regulatory Officer, and it shall be their duty to enforce the provisions of the laws of the State of North Dakota relating to the protection and use of the public highways in this state, and the operation of motor and other vehicles upon said highways.

Section 2. APPOINTMENT OF POLICE.) The State Highway Patrol Superintendent is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint not more than ten persons, who shall constitute such State Highway Patrol, and who shall be known as "Highway Police" who shall hold office during the pleasure of the Superintendent and whose duty it shall be to enforce the provisions of the laws of the State of North Dakota relating to the protection and use of the public highways in the State, and the operation of motor and other vehicles upon said highways; said persons so appointed shall be invested with all the powers and perform all the duties now held and performed by peace officers in

the State of North Dakota, the jurisdiction of said officers shall extend throughout the state, provided, however, that such powers and duties shall apply only to the enforcement of laws, rules and regulations relating to highways.

Section 3. OATH AND BOND.) Every person appointed as State Highway Patrol Superintendent, or assistant State Highway Patrol Superintendent, or as a Highway Police, shall, before entering upon his duties, subscribe to an oath, and sign and file a bond with the Regulatory Department, the bond to run to the State of North Dakota; said oath and bond to be in such form and in such amounts as shall be prescribed by the Regulatory Department.

Section 4. PAYMENT OF EXPENSES.) All salaries, wages and other expenses of this department shall be paid by the State Auditor and State Treasurer out of the "Police Patrol Fund" hereinafter provided, upon vouchers as now required by law for the payment of all state expenses, duly approved by the Regulatory Officer and the superintendent, and audited and allowed by the State Auditing Board.

Section 5. SALARIES.) The salary of the State Highway Patrol Superintendent appointed under the provisions of this Act shall not exceed \$2,200 per annum, and the salary of the Assistant State Highway Patrol Superintendent appointed under the provisions of the Act, shall not exceed \$1,800 per annum; the salary of each Highway Police Superintendent appointed under the provisions of this Act shall be fixed by the State Highway Patrol Superintendent at not to exceed \$135 per month to each of said Highway Police, and shall be paid monthly out of any funds in the State Highway Patrol Fund, provided total expenditures of Department shall not exceed \$45,000 per annum.

Section 6. SPECIAL DUTIES.) The State Highway police appointed under the provisions of this Act, are particularly required to check and discover all violations of State Highway Laws and regulations and to make a special effort to see that all laws and regulations relating to highways in this state are complied with.

Section 7. MEMBERS OF POLICE PATROL.) All members of the Police Patrol shall be not less than twenty-five years old on the date of their appointment. They shall, before being qualified to appointment, be required to pass such physicial examination and such other qualification test as may be determined by the Superintendent, be of good moral character and of temperate habits, have been citizens of the United States and of the State of North Dakota for not less than two years prior to their appointment. For appointment, preference shall be given at all times to honorably discharged soldiers of the World War, and all appointments shall be made without regard to any political party affiliation of the applicant. All appointments shall be made by the Regulatory Officer from the list of qualified applicants certified to him by the Superintendent.

Section 8. POLICE PATROL FUND. APPROPRIATION.) There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the State

Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Five Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$5,000.00), to be deposited in the fund to be hereafter designated as the "Police Patrol Fund." and said appropriation shall be, if possible, reimbursed and refunded to the general fund of this state in the manner hereinafter provided. All moneys collected from the collections of drivers license fees as now provided by law shall be deposited in the "Police Patrol Fund," and the moneys accumulated in that fund shall be expended to meet the salaries and expenses of this Department and shall be paid out as hereinbefore directed. The moneys so deposited in that fund from the proceeds of collections of drivers license fees and all moneys that may rightfully become a part of that fund under the provisions of this Act are hereby appropriated for the purpose and for the payment of the expenses of this department. When sufficient moneys have accumulated in that fund that the Regulatory Department is of the opinion that the five thousand dollar appropriation hereby made out of the general revenue of this state may be reimbursed and refunded to the state, leaving enough therein to carry out the purpose of this Act, the Regulatory Department may withdraw therefrom the said sum of five thousand dollars so hereby appropriated, or so much thereof as may have been used, and revert the same to the general fund of the state as a reimbusment of said special appropriation. The balance in the "Police Patrol Fund" herein mentioned which may remain unexpended at the end of any biennium period shall not be at that time converted into the general fund of the state but shall remain in said "Police Patrol Fund" to be later expended as a part thereof until otherwise directed by the Legislature.

Section 9. REPEAL.) All Acts or parts of Acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 10. EMERGENCY.) It appears that there is now no adequate method for enforcing highway laws and regulations, and that great danger is being done to the State of North Dakota, and its highways by reason thereof, therefore, this Act is declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

I vote "no."

Mr. Burke: I wish to say that in the June Primary when that particular initiated bill was up, I voted "no." In the fall election when that particular measure was up I voted "no." But I don't consider the voice on either one of those two measures is to be accepted in voting on this bill. I vote "no."

Mr. Fedje: As the blindpiggers are here and our children are here it is our duty to protect them through some instrumental law; and in order to do that, in my opinion, it is my duty to vote "aye" on this bill.

Mr. Holey: I cannot vote for this bill for the following reasons:

- (1) It is against my moral conviction.
- (2) I would not betray the people who have asked, begged and pleaded with the Legislature not to vote for legalizing hard liquor.
- (3) It will be a curse upon the people of the State of North Dakota.

(4) It will undermine the moral conviction of our coming generations.

Mr. Speaker, I wish this entered in the Journal of the House. I vote "no."

Mr. Keidel: I feel that if the hail tax can be collected from a drouth stricken state, I see no reason why this tax could not be collected. I vote "aye."

Mr. Marks: I vote "aye" on this bill, not because I love the black demon, but because I believe it will be a step nearer toward dragging him out of the alleys of hell.

Mr. Moore: I vote "no" on this measure for the simple reason the rural communities have nothing to derive from this, and nothing to say as to its dispensing.

Mr. Morgan: I want to vote to protect the homes, the churches and the youth, and I cannot vote to bring this curse on our people. Therefore, I vote "no."

Mr. O'Brien: I vote aye on this bill not because I ignore the voice of the people at recent election but because I believe thousands of voters are not aware of conditions as they now exist in our towns and cities.

Mr. Williams: Men and women of this House, I don't know what the liquor question means to you, but it is a serious proposition. The parties that drew this bill up didn't like it. They didn't mention the old saloon.

Mr. Williams: —they called it the "liquor house." Think of it! Getting by with a "liquor house."

The Speaker: You are out of order, Mr. Williams, explain your vote.

Mr. Williams: This has been voted down three times by the men and women of the State of North Dakota. Are we coming up here as individuals and passing something over their heads that is going to damn the next generation? That is up to us.

The Speaker: Mr. Williams, you are out of order, you must explain your vote and not make a speech.

Mr. Williams: Can't I have a few minutes? The other fellows did.

The Speaker: You must explain your vote,—not make a speech.

Mr. Williams: This is up to us. This liquor has come down through the ages and has been a curse. I vote "No."

Mr. Godwin: We had an opportunity with the regulation that was provided for in House Bill No. 290 to, as far as possible, regulate the sale and distribution of intoxicating liquor in a manner that would come near to a possibility of enforcement and thus combine our public duty of raising revenue with our duty of directing the moral influences of our state in the proper direction. However, that bill was killed and in this bill we entirely subrogate the moral direction, to our desire for public revenue. We have still left the business of the drink distribution to the Capones and his successors. It does, however, raise some revenue and in accomplishing that purpose, I vote aye.

For an Act to Reimburse the General Fund of the State for the Expense of Auditing and Examining the Affairs of the North Dakota Mill and Elevator Association for the State Mill and Elevator at Grand Forks, the Bank of North Dakota, Including the Farm Loan Department, the State Hail Insurance Department, the Workmen's Compensation Bureau of the State of North Dakota, the Office of the Beer Commissioner of the State of North Dakota, The North Dakota State Regulatory Department, the North Dakota Teachers Insurance and Retirement Fund, Highway Department and Motor Vehicle Registration Department and Game and Fish Department, by the State Board of Auditors Pursuant to Section 369-b of the Supplement to the Compiled Laws of North Dakota for 1913, as Amended by Chapter 186 of the Laws of 1933; Designating and Appropriating the Funds from Which Such Payment Shall be Made; Providing for the Procedure for Such Payment; Providing for the Repeal of Any Acts in Conflict Herewith; and Declaring and Emergency.

Be It Enacted By the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

On the Second Tuesday of July of each year there shall be elected one school director for the term of three years and on the second Tuesday in July of each even numbered year a school treasurer for the term of two years. Such officers shall hold their respective offices from the third Tuesday in July following their election for the number of years respectively for which they were elected, and until their successors are elected and qualified. At the first election for the organization of a new school district there shall be elected at large for such school district three directors, one to serve until the first annual election, one to serve until the second annual election thereafter, and a school treasurer to serve until the annual election in the next even numbered year and until his successor is elected and qualified.

Section 2. AMENDMENT.) That Section 1154 of the 1913 Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 1154. HOURS POLLS OPEN.) At the time and place fixed by the school board for holding the annual school election, the Board shall at one o'clock P. M. of said day hear the reports of the clerk and treasurer for the precding year and shall have and conduct such discussions or hearing thereon as may be desirable for those present at said meeting. All interested persons may participate and such report shall be open for inspection. At two o'clock P. M., the transaction of all other business shall suspend and the polls shall be open and remain open until five o'clock P. M., for the election of district school officers.

Section 3. AMENDMENT.) That Section 1155 of the 1913 Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 1155. NOTICE OF ANNUAL ELECTION.) At least fourteen days before the second Tuesday of July of

each year the district school board of each school district shall designate one voting place as convenient as possible to the voters of such district at which such annual election shall be held, and shall cause notice of such election to be posted in at least three of the most public and conspicuous places within the district. Such notice shall be signed by the clerk or in his absence by the president of the district school board, and shall state the time and place of holding such election, and the officers to be elected and their terms of office, and shall be substantially in the following form:

Section 4. AMENDMENT.) That Section 1158 of the 1913 Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 1158. CERTIFICATE OF ELECTION.) The clerk of the schol district shall within five days after such election furnish each person elected to any district office, a written notice of his election and of his duty to take the oath of office as such officer, on or before the third Tuesday in July following such election. He shall also forward to the county superintendent within ten days after such election a certified list of all the officers elected thereat.

Section 5. AMENDMENT.) That Section 1160 of the 1913 Compiled Laws be and the same is hereby an ended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 1160. ORGANIZATION, CLERK.) The school board shall meet annually on the second Tuesday in July at ten o'clock, a. m., at the place designated for the holding of the annual election, at which time and place the board shall proceed to transact such business as may be necessary to close the books for the fiscal year. On the third Tuesday in July succeeding the annual election the school board shall meet and organize by choosing one of the members president, and a competent person, not a member of the board, clerk, who shall hold office during the pleasure of the board. At the same time the budget and levy for the ensuing year shall be made and such other business transacted as may properly come before the board.

Section 6. REPEAL.) All Acts and parts of Acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 7. EMERGENCY.) This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency meaure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval."

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SENATE BILL NO. 313

Strike out all of Section 25 and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 25. ALLOCATION OF REVENUES.) All monies collected and received under this Act shall be credited by the State Treasurer into a special fund to be known as "The Retail Sales Tax Fund." Out of this fund the state treasurer shall first pay the expenses of administering this Act and the payment of refunds allowed under this Act.

The net amount of monies remaining in said "Retail Sales Tax Fund" shall be allocated and distributed as follows:

- (a) The State Board of Equalization is authorized, directed and empowered, at any regular or special meeting, from time to time, to transfer to the "State Public Welfare Fund" created and established by House Bill No. 338 pending in this legislative session a sum not to exceed one million (\$1,000,000.00) Dollars per annum, or so much thereof, as in the opinion of said State Board of Equalization may be necessary to carry out the provisions of said House Bill No. 338, or any Acts amendatory thereto. Provided, however, that the amount so transferred shall in no event and at no time exceed one half of the amount collected and received under this Act after the expenses of administering this Act and the payment of refunds allowed hereunder have been deducted.
- (b) The State Board of Equalization is hereby directed at any regular or special meeting, from time to time, to transfer the balance of all monies remaining in said "The Retail Sales Tax Fund" to the "State Equalization Fund" as established by Chapter 229 of the Session Laws of 1933, or Acts amendatory thereof, and when said sum is allocated to the various counties thru said State Equalization Fund, such monies shall be deducted from the property taxes levied in each of such school districts in the manner hereinafter set out.

On the first day of November of each year the County Treasurer shall certify to the county auditor as to the total amount of moneys received by him for the credit of the various school districts in his county under the provisions of this section during the preceding twelve month period; whereupon the county auditor shall reduce the levy which would otherwise be spread on the taxable real property in each such school districts for the current year, as certified to him by the proper authorities of such districts under the provisions of Chapter 235 of the Session Laws of 1929 and Acts amendatory thereto, in the amount which the county Treasurer certified to him as having received under the provisions of this Section for the credit of each school districts.

A Bill for an Act Creating a State Highway Patrol for the State of North Dakota; Authorizing the Attorney General to Appoint a State Highway Patrol Superintendent, an Assistant State Highway Patrol Superintendent, and Highway Police; Designating Powers and Qualifications of Such Police; Amending Chapter 102 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1933 Relating to Bureau of Criminal Identification; Fixing Compensation and Providing for Disposition of Fines Collected; and Declaring an Emergency.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

After the word "A Bill," strike out everything and insert in lieu thereof, the following:

For an Act Creating a State Highway Patrol for the State of North Dakota; Authorizing the Regulatory Department to Appoint a State Highway Patrol Superintendent, an Assistant State Highway Patrol Superintendent, and Highway Police; Designating Powers and Qualifications of Such Police; Fixing Compensation and Providing for Disposition of Fines Collected; and Declaring an Emergency.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. ESTABLISHMENT OF POLICE PATROL.) There is hereby created a State Highway Patrol, and the Regulatory Officer with the consent of the Governor, is authorized and empowered to appoint a State Highway Patrol Superintendent and an Assistant Highway Patrol Superintendent; said superintendent and assistant superintendent shall hold office during the pleasure of the Regulatory Officer, and it shall be their duty to enforce the provisions of the laws of the State of North Dakota, relating to the protection and use of the public highways in this state, and the operation of motor and other vehicles upon said highways.

Section 2. APPOINTMENT OF POLICE.) The State Highway Patrol Superintendent is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint not more than ten persons, who shall constitute such State Highway Patrol, and who shall be known as "Highway Police" who shall hold office during the pleasure of the Superintendent and whose duty it shall be to enforce the provisions of the laws of the State of North Dakota relating to the protection and use of the public highways in the State, and the operation of motor and other vehicles upon said highways; said persons so appointed shall be invested with all the powers and perform all the duties now held and performed by peace officers in the State of North Dakota, the jurisdiction of said officers shall extend throughout the state, provided, however, that such powers and duties shall apply only to the enforcement of laws, rules and regulations relating to highways.

Section 3. OATH AND BOND.) Every person appointed as State Highway Patrol Superintendent, or assistant State Highway Patrol Superintendent, or as a Highway Police, shall, before entering upon his duties, subscribe to an oath, and sign and file a bond with the Regulatory Department, the bond to run to the State of North Dakota; said oath and bond to be in such form and in such amounts as shall be prescribed by the Regulatory Department.

Section 4. PAYMENT OF EXPENSES.) All salaries, wages and other expenses of this department shall be paid by the State Auditor and State Treasurer out of the "Police Patrol Fund" hereinafter provided, upon vouchers as now required by law for the payment of all state expenses, duly approved by the Regulatory Officer and the superintendent, and audited and allowed by the State Auditing Board.

Section 5. SALARIES.) The salary of the State Highway Patrol Superintendent appointed under the provisions of this Act shall not exceed \$2,200 per annum, and the salary of the Assistant State Highway Patrol Superintendent appointed under the provisions of the Act, shall not exceed \$1,800 per annum; the salary of each Highway Police Superintendent appointed under the provisions of this Act shall be fixed by the State Highway Patrol Superintendent at not to exceed \$135 per month to each of said Highway Police,

and shall be paid monthly out of any funds in the State Highway Patrol Fund, provided total expenditures of Department shall not exceed \$45,000 per annum.

Section 6. SPECIAL DUTIES.) The State Highway police appointed under the provisions of this Act, are particularly required to check and discover all violations of State Highway Laws and regulations and to make a special effort to see that all laws and regulations relating to highways in this state are complied with.

Section 7. MEMBERS OF POLICE PATROL.) All members of the Police Patrol shall be not less than twenty-five years old on the date of their appointment. They shall, before being qualified to appointment, be required to pass such physical examination and such other qualification test as may be determined by the Superintendent, be of good moral character and of temperate habits, have been citizens of the United States and of the State of North Dakota for not less than two years prior to their appointment. For appointment, preference shall be given at all times to honorably discharged soldiers of the World War, and all appointments shall be made without regard to any political party affiliation of the applicant. All appointments shall be made by the Regulatory Officer from the list of qualified applicants certified to him by the Superintendent.

Section 8. POLICE PATROL FUND. APPROPRIATION.) There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Five Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$5,000.00), to be deposited in the fund to be hereafter designated as the "Police Patrol Fund," and said appropriation shall be, if possible, reimbursed and refunded to the general fund of this state in the manner hereinafter provided. All moneys collected from the collections of drivers license fees as now provided by law shall be deposited in the "Police Patrol Fund," and the moneys accumulated in that fund shall be expended to meet the salaries and expenses of this Department and shall be paid out as hereinbefore directed. The moneys so deposited in that fund from the proceeds of collections of drivers license fees and all moneys that may rightfully become a part of that fund under the provisions of this Act are hereby appropriated for the purpose and for the payment of the expenses of this department. When sufficient moneys have accumulated in that fund that the Regulatory Department is of the opinion that the five thousand dollar appropriation hereby made out of the general revenue of this state may be reimbursed and refunded to the state, leaving enough therein to carry out the purpose of this Act, the Regulatory Department may with-draw therefrom the said sum of five thousand dollars so hereby appropriated, or so much thereof as may have been used, and revert the same to the general fund of the state as a reimbursement of said special appropriation. The balance in the "Police Patrol Fund" herein mentioned which may remain unexpended at the end of any biennium period shall not be at that time converted into the general fund of the state but shall remain in said "Police Patrol Fund" to be later

expended as a part thereof until otherwise directed by the Legislature.

Section 9. REPEAL.) All Acts or parts of Acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 10. EMERGENCY.) It appears that there is now no adequate method for enforcing highway laws and regulations, and that great danger is being done to the State of North Dakota, and its highways by reason thereof, therefore, this Act is declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

A Bill for an Act Providing for the Nomination of Candidates for the Offices of Presidential Electors; for the Election of Party Precinct Committeemen; Delegates to the National Party Conventions and National Party Committeemen and National Party Committeewomen; for the Organization of Party County and State Committees; and to Repeal All Acts or Parts of Acts in Conflict Herewith, Including Sections 910-916, Inclusive, Compiled Laws 1913 and Chapter 137 of the Session Laws of the Year 1927 and Chapter 123 of the Session Laws of the Year 1929.

Out of this fund the state treasurer shall first pay the expenses of administering this Act and the payment of refunds allowed under this Act. The net amount of monies remaining in said "Retail Sales Tax Fund" shall be allocated and distributed as follows:
- (a) The State Board of Equalization is authorized, directed and empowered, at any regular or special meeting, from time to time, to transfer to the "State Public Welfare Fund" created and established by House Bill 338 pending in this legislative session a sum not to exceed one millon (\$1,000,000.00) Dollars per annum, or so much thereof, as in the opinion of said State Board of Equalization may be necessary to carry out the provisions of said House Bill No. 338, or any Acts amendatory thereto. Provided, however, that the amount so transferred shall in no event and at no time exceed one half of the amount collected and received under this Act after the expenses of administering this Act and the payment of refunds allowed hereunder have been deducted.
- (b) The State Board of Equalization is hereby directed at any regular or special meeting, from time to time, to transfer the balance of all monies remaining in said "The Retail Sales Tax Fund" to the "State Equalization Fund" as established by Chapter 229 of the Session Laws of 1933, or Acts amendatory thereof, and when said sum is allocated to the various counties through said State Equalization Fund, such monies shall be deducted from the property taxes levied in each of such school districts in the manner hereinafter set out.

On the first day of November of each year the County Treasurer shall certify to the County Auditor as to the total amount of moneys received by him for the credit of the various school districts in his county under the provisions of this section during the preceding twelve month period; whereupon the County Auditor shall reduce the levy which would otherwise be spread on the taxable real property in each such school districts for the current year, as certified to him by the proper authorities of such districts under the provisions of Chapter 235 of the Session Laws of 1929 and Acts amandatory thereto, in the amount which the County Treasurer certified to him as having received under the provisions of this Section for the credit of each such school district.

#### REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEES

The Committee on State Affairs made the following report:

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on State Affairs to whom was referred:

Senate Bill No. 264. A Bill for an Act Relating to Licensing of Motor Vehicle Operators and Chauffeurs and to the Liability of Certain Persons for Negligence in the Operation Thereof on Public Highways; Fixing Fee to be Paid; Providing for Examination of Applicant; Providing for Suspension or Revocation of License; Making Disposition of Fees Collected; Providing for Penalty for Violating Act; Repealing All Acts in Conflict Herewith, and Declaring an Emergency.

Have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

The following amendments are offered to Senate Bill No. 264; amendments being to the engrossed bill as it came from the Senate:

Amend the title by adding at the end thereof "Appropriation."

Strike out everything after the enacting clause and add in place thereof the following:

Section 1. DEFINITIONS.) The following words: "Motor Vehicle," "Farm Tractor," "Owner," "Operator," "Nonresident," "Public Highway," as used in this Act shall be interpreted to have the meanings usually ascribed to them, except in those instances where the contest clearly indicates a different meaning.

Section 2. DRIVER'S LICENSES.) Except as provided by Section 3 of this Act, no person 16 years of age or over shall on and after this measure shall be in force and effect, operate any motor vehicle upon the public highways of this State unless such person shall have made application for and secured a driver's license from the State Highway Commissioner for which he shall pay to the Commissioner the sum of 25 cents, payable at the time of making such application. Provided, however, that when the license fee of 25 cents is paid by the head of a family, or household, licenses may be issued, upon application therefor, to each of the members of the immediate family of the head of the said family, or household, on the payment of an additional fee of 10 cents for each such license. For the purpose of this Act, the term 'immediate family,' is hereby defined to mean all persons bound together by the ties of relationship and parents and children living together as members of one household under one head. Such application shall be made upon a form approved by the Commissioner.

Provided, that no driver's license shall be issued to a resident of North Dakota who has purchased a Motor Vehicle after the taking effect of Senate Bill No. 313 of the 24th Legis-

lative Assembly of the State of North Dakota (the sales tax act), unless such applicant shall produce satisfactory proof to the Commissioner that the North Dakota sales tax has been paid upon the purchase of such motor vehicle owned and operated by such North Dakota resident. In the event such tax has not been paid by such applicant, the license may be issued by the Commissioner only upon such applicant paying in addition to the license fee hereinbefore required the sales tax in such amount as is provided in the sales tax law of the State of North Dakota. The Commissioner shall remit such sales tax payment to the proper officer of the State who is charged with the duty of collecting the sales tax and such officer shall credit such sum in the same manner as are other collections of sales tax under the laws of the State of North Dakota.

Every applicant shall state his name, age, sex, and resident address, and what experience he has had in operating a motor vehicle; that he is competent to operate a motor vehicle upon the public highways of the State; that he knows of no physical impairment or defect or any other act which would render him an improper and unsafe person to operate a motor vehicle. Every applicant shall also state whether or not he has been heretofore licensed, and if so, by what State, and whether or not the license has ever been suspended or revoked and if so, the date and reason for such suspension or revocation, together with such other facts pertaining to the qualifications of the applicant and his ability to operate a motor vehicle with safety, as may be required by the Commissioner. Thereupon license shall issue as of course.

To every person granted a license the Commissioner shall issue a certificate of license which shall bear thereon the distinguishing number assigned to the license and shall contain the name, age, sex and residence address, and a space where such person shall write his usual signature with pen and ink.

Section 3. EXEMPTIONS.) Every person driving or operating a road roller, road machinery, or any farm tractor or implement of husbandry temporarily drawn or moved upon the highways, and every person in the service of the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States when furnished a driver's permit and operating an official motor vehicle in such service, shall be exempted from license under this Act.

Section 4. STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER TO ADMINISTER ACT.) The State Highway Commissioner shall be charged with the responsibility for the administration and execution of this Act.

Section 5. CLERK OF COURT MAY RECEIVE APPLICATIONS.) Any applicant for a license may file his application with the Clerk of the District Court or the sheriff of the county in which he resides and such clerk or sheriff is hereby authorized to receive and accept the same upon the payment by the applicant to such clerk or sheriff of an additional fee of ten cents for such service. The clerk or

sheriff shall then immediately forward such application to the Commissioner, together with the fee of 25 cents.

Section 6. PERSONS UNDER SIXTEEN YEARS OF AGE NOT TO BE LICENSED.) No operator's license shall be granted to any person under the age of sixteen years except that upon a written request of a parent or guardian a minor's license may be issued to any person between the ages of 14 and 16 years. But only upon the recommendation of the official to whom the application for license shall be made.

Section 7. NON-RESIDENTS NEED NOT HAVE LICENSES.) During the period within which a motor vehicle of a non-resident may be operated in this State in accordance with law, such motor vehicle may be operated by its owner or a member of his family without a license, provided such owner and members of his family have fully complied with the laws of the State of their residence regarding the operation of motor vehicles. Such motor vehicles shall at all times display the license number plates issued therefor at the home state or county of the owner.

Section MUST CARRY CERTIFICATE.) licensee shall have his certificate of license in his possession while operating a motor vehicle upon the public highways of this state. Said certificate of license shall be subject to examination upon demand by any peace officer or by any officer authorized by law to enforce the laws relating to the operation of motor vehicles on the highways, and the licensee shall, upon request of any such officer, write his name in the presence of such officer in order that the identity of the licensee may be determined. It shall be a complete defense to any charge under this section that the person so charged produce in court an operator's certificate of license theretofore issued to such person and valid, or produce evidence that he had made application therefor; that he had not received his certificate; but same had not been denied, at the time of his arrest. If a certificate of license issued under the provisions of this Act shall be lost or destroyed, the person to whom the same was issued may obtain a duplicate or substitute therefor upon furnishing satisfactory proof that such license has been lost or destroyed, and upon the payment of a fee of 25 cents.

Section 9. COURTS TO CERTIFY CONVICTIONS TO COMMISSIONER.) Every Court having jurisdiction of offenses committed under this Act or any law of this State regulating the operation of motor vehicles on public highways shall certify to the Commissioner a record of the conviction of any person in said court for a violation of any of said laws, and may recommend the suspension of the license of any person so convited. The Commissioner acting upon such recommendation may suspend such license, but such suspension shall not be for a period of more than one year. Upon suspending the license the Commissioner shall require that the certificate of license be surrendered to him. At the end of the period of suspension the certificate of license shall be returned to the licensee.

- Section 10. COMMISSIONER TO REVOKE LICENSE.)
  (a) The Commissioner shall forthwith revoke the license of any person and require that the certificate of license be returned to him, upon receiving a record of the conviction of such person of any of the following offenses:
- (1) Manslaughter resulting from the operation of a motor vehicle.
- (2) Driving a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drug.
- (3) Any crime punishable as a felony under the motor vehicle laws of this State or any other felony in the commission of which a motor yehicle is used.
- (4) Conviction of forfeiture of bail upon two charges of reckless driving all within the preceding twelve months.
- (5) A conviction of a driver of a motor vehicle, involved in an accident resulting in the death or injury of another person, upon a charge of failing to stop and disclose his identity at the scene of the accident.
- (6) The Commissioner upon receiving a record of the conviction of any person upon a charge of operating a motor vehicle while the license of such person is suspended, shall immediately extend the period of such first suspension for an additional like period.
- Section 11. COMMISSIONER MAY SUSPEND LICENSE.)
  (a) The Commissioner may immediately suspend the license of any person for a period of ninety days without hearing and without receiving a record of conviction of such person of crime, whenever he has reasons to believe:
- (1) That such person has committed any offense for which mandatory revocation of license is provided in Section 10.
- (2) That such person has, by reckless or unlawful operation of a motor vehicle, caused or contributed to an accident resulting in death or injury or serious property damage.
- (3) That such person is incompetent to drive a motor vehicle or is afflicted with mental or physical infirmities or disabilities rendering it unsafe for such person to drive a motor vehicle upon the highways. Provided, that deafness in itself shall not be deemed to be physical infirmity or disability in a driver.
- (4) That such person is an habitual reckless or negligent driver of a motor vehicle or has committed a violation of the laws of this State relating to the operation of motor vehicles.
- Section 12. MUST NOTIFY LICENSEE.) (a) Whenever the Commissioner suspends the license pursuant to the provisions of Section 11 hereof, he shall immediately notify the licensee and afford him an opportunity of a hearing in the county wherein the licensee resides, or in the case of a non-resident, in the county in which such non-resident may be temporarily residing, and upon such hearing the Com-

missioner shall either rescind his temporary order of suspension or, good cause appearing therefor, may continue such suspension in effect for a period not exceeding 90 days.

- (b) The Commissioner is hereby authorized to suspend or revoke the license of any resident of this State upon receiving a record of the conviction of such person in another state of an offense therein committed which, if committed in this State, would be grounds for the suspension or revocation of the license of the operator. The Commissioner is further authorized upon receiving a record of the conviction in this state of a non-resident driver of a motor vehicle of any offense under the motor vehicle laws of this State, to forward a certified copy of such record to the motor vehicle administrator in the State wherein the person so convicted is a resident.
- (c) The Commissioner shall not suspend a license for a period of more than one year and upon suspending or revoking any license shall require that such license, so suspended or revoked, shall be surrendered except that at the end of the period of suspension, such license shall be returned to the licensee.
- Section 13. SUSPENDED LICENSEE MAY APPEAL TO COURT.) Any person whose license has been suspended by the Commissioner, may file a petition within thirty days thereafter for a hearing in the matter in the District Court in the county wherein such person shall reside, and in the case of a non-resident, in the District Court in any county, and such court is hereby vested with jurisdiction, and it shall be its duty to set the matter for hearing upon ten days' written notice to the Commissioner and thereupon to take testimony and examine into the facts of the case to determine whether the petitioner is entitled to a license or is subject to suspension of license under the provisions of this Act and shall render judgment accordingly.
- Section 14. MAY APPLY FOR NEW LICENSE AFTER ONE YEAR.) Any person whose license has been revoked under the provisions of Section 10 hereof may, after one year from the date of such revocation, petition the district court of the county wherein he resides, or, in case of a non-resident, the district court of any county, for an order directing the Commissioner to issue a certificate of license to him. The district court is hereby vested with jurisdiction and it shall be its duty to set the matter for hearing upon 10 days' written notice to the Commissioner. At the hearing the court shall take testimony and examine into the facts of the case to determine whether the petitioner is entitled to a license and shall make its order, granting or denying the petition. If the petition is granted, the Commissioner, upon receipt of a certified copy of the order of the court, shall issue such license. If the petition is denied, no renewal thereof shall be made during the period of one year from the date of the order of the court.

Section 15. MISDEMEANOR TO OPERATE MOTOR VEHICLE AFTER SUSPENSION OF LICENSE.) Any per-

son whose operator's license has been suspended or revoked as provided by this Act, and who shall drive any motor vehicle upon the highways of this State while such license is suspended or revoked or who shall violate any of the other provisions of this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

FEES TO BE PAID INTO THE STATE Section 16. APPROPRIATED DISTRIB-TREASURY: HOWANDUTED.) All moneys received under the provisions of this Act shall be monthly paid by the State Highway Commissioner into the State Treasury and the same is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to the following purposes; the first Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars collected annually, is hereby appropriated into a fund to be known the "Special Drivers' License Fund" to be used by the State Highway Commissioner in carrying out the provisions of this Act. The next Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars collected annually, is hereby appropriated into a special fund to be used by the Superintendent of Criminal Identification, as a special fund, hereby created as the "Criminal Identification Fund" for use in paying salaries and operating expense of the work of Criminal Identification, as provided by Chapter 116 of the Session Laws of 1929; and Acts amendatory thereof; the balance of such moneys so received shall be and is hereby appropriated to the General Fund of the State.

Section 17. STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER MAY APPOINT AGENT.) Any duties required of, or powers conferred on the State Highway Commissioner under the provisions of this Act may be done and performed or exercised by any of his duly authorized agents.

Section 18. PROVISIONS SEPARABLE.) If any part or parts of this Act shall be held to be unconstitutional, such unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity of the remaining parts of this Act.

Section 19. INCONSISTENT ACTS REPEALED.) All Acts or parts of Acts inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

Section 20. EMERGENCY.) This Act is declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

Mr. Schantz: I wish to explain my vote and have my remarks recorded in the Journal.

I have observed that this House has consistently voted in favor of appropriation measures and has consistently opposed revenue measures. A few days ago we saw fit to pass a bill to transfer from the Hail Department so-called "surplus" funds to the rural school districts of the State. In the time of stress we tapped one of the few remaining resources of the State and before this emergency passes it is my opinion that we must tap again, therefore, we should repay the Hail Department. Normally I do not believe in com-

pulsory hail insurance, but under prevailing conditions it will not make the tax situation much worse and if, after two years, the measure is unsatisfactory, it may be repealed and some legislator will undoubtedly have the usual presence of mind to introduce a bill to cancel the unpaid taxes. I vote "aye" on the Bill.

Mr. O'Brien: I voted against this bill Tuesday because I was not convinced either as to its wisdom or necessity. I have not changed this opinion. However, in checking over the vote I note that practically all of the 58 members who voted for Senate Bill No. 96 are farmers, while at least half of those opposing it are businessmen or professional men. It is evident that a majority of the dirt-farmers of this legislature want this bill. This being so I will not further oppose it. I vote "aye."

Mr. Beggs: It seems to me that it is a sorry day for the boys and girls of our rural communities when they are denied the customary and correct facilities of education. As long as we pamper and support such institutions that make such conditions necessary this institution will continue to grow worse and worse. Therefore, I vote "no."

Mr. Bettenhausen: We have five normal schools, and we have the A. C. and the University. I think that is enough for anybody. I don't believe in this correspondence course. I vote "no."

Mr. Burke: The records of the correspondence schools now in existence show not over five per cent of the people who enroll in those schools complete their courses. Therefore, I vote "no."

Mr. Clarke: I feel that I should vote against this bill as I am sure that it is visionary and impractical. My teaching experience leads me to believe that High School students are too immature for a correspondence course. They need the almost constant attention of a trained High School teacher.

I feel that we are asking our state to grant credit to these young people who will have less knowledge than is required of our regular High School students; but I am willing to try it for two years, in the hope that it may help some poor boy or girl. I vote "aye."

Mr. Dahl of Emmons: I was for this bill up until this morning when we finished the appropriations for the University and we ran across so many thousand dollars for courses at the University; and if we have to have a University and Agricultural College and five normal schools scattered widely around the state which are costing the taxpayers thousands of dollars to maintain, I don't think there is any reason for trying to make the boys and girls learn by correspondence. Therefore I vote "no."

Mr. Downey: Having faith in the local public school teachers of the state, and as this bill provides that the students must study their correspondence lessons under the supervision of their local public school teachers, I vote "aye."

Mr. Godwin: I vote "aye" on this bill because I believe as long as this body can sit here and appropriate money to sustain the five normal schools of the state of North Dakota while states of four times the population can get by with one, we certainly can't withhold from the people who are not able to attend those institutions the learning which they seek, if their ambition directs them to an attempt at education. Therefore, I vote "aye."

Mr. Holey: I am very much interested in education, but as far as to correspondence courses in this state and with reference to the University at Grand Forks, I can see no need in duplication. Therefore I vote "no."

Mr. Myers: This bill has been asked for by the Farmers' Union and several other organizations over the state, to give the children that are financially unable to attend high school the ability to secure an education. But as practically every other bill that has been introduced in this House to benefit the people of this state has been killed, I vote "aye."

Mr. Niewoehner: I consider this plan an unworkable and impractical duplication. Therefore, I vote "no."

Mr. Solberg: For the reason that any other correspondence course that might be offered would be paid for by the child, and no matter how poor a correspondence school education might be, it is better than no education at all. I vote "aye."

Mr. Thoreson: I vote "aye" on this bill because I feel it will be of some help to the boy or girl out in the country who can't afford to go to an institution of higher learning. I vote "aye."

Mr. Burke requested unanimous consent of the House to permit him to move to amend Senate Bill No. 322.

Report of the Investigating Committee of the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota, of the Twenty-fourth Legislative Assembly Duly and Regularly Appointed by Resolution Adopted in the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota, Which Said Resolution Was Duly Adopted on the 28th Day of February, 1935.

TO THE HONORABLE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA.

## HONORABLE SIR:

The Special Committee appointed by the House of Repre-

sentatives of the twenty-fourth legislative assembly for the purpose of investigating the situation and conditions occuring at Fargo, in Cass County, North Dakota, during the latter part of January, 1935, in connection with a certain "Truck Drivers Strike," and the action of the authorities in connection therewith, do hereby respectfully present its report and findings, as follows:

This Committee was constituted by virtue of a resolution, a copy of which resolution is attached to this report and made a part hereof, and which resolution is designated as House Resolution "M."

In accordance with said resolution the Speaker of the House of Representatives appointed a committee, as follows:

Representative E. D. Symington, Chairman,

Representative Matt Dahl.

Representative Howard Parkinson,

Dr. F. D. Hurd,

Representative J. C. Blaisdell.

#### MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE COMMITTEE

The Committee met at the call of Chairman Symington shortly after 7:30 on the evening of March 1, 1935, and arranged to employ F. E. McCurdy of Bismarck, North Dakota, as counsel, and to have rules of procedure prepared, and discussed various matters of detail in connection with the hearings.

It was agreed that Reporters be employed, a transcript taken of the testimony, and that the hearings be had at Fargo, North Dakota, and that the committee work at high pressure in an endeavor to finish the hearing, and have their report made in time to submit it to the Legislative Assembly so that appropriate action might be had if such action was deemed best.

The following day the committee adopted rules of procedure, unanimously, all members being present.

# RULES OF PROCEDURE

- Rule 1: The Chairman shall preside at all sessions of the Committee.
- Rule 2: The hearings shall be had at the Court Room at Fargo, or at some other suitable room.
- Rule 3: The witnesses which the committee desire to hear shall be called on subpoena by the committee. The Chairman is authorized to sign such subpoena on behalf of the committee.
  - Rule 4: In addition to counsel for the committee, other

counsel representing any persons or organizations which wish to be represented, may participate under such rules as the Committee may see fit to prescribe from time to time.

- Rule 5: The Chairman is authorized to administer the oath of the witness to each witness when they are called.
- Rule 6: The Chairman shall rule upon the question of admission or rejection of evidence, and the ruling shall be final, unless some member of the committee disagrees, and in that event the majority wish of the committee shall govern.
- Rule 7: The Committee reserves the right to recess and retire temporarily to discuss matters and make decisions if the committee so desires.
- Rule 8: The testimony given by each witness shall be reduced to writing—transcribed—and included in the report.
- Rule 9: It is the purpose of this committee to make such an examination as will develop the true facts and give a complete picture of the situation, and at the same time eliminate irrelevant and immaterial matter, and to obtain that information as speedily as possible, and to that end the persons participating are requested to co-operate and to limit the examination to the essentials.
- Rule 10: These rules are flexable and may be changed or modified at any time by a majority of the committee, as may appear to the committee to be necessary to facilitate the hearing.

F. E. McCurdy on Saturday, March 2, 1935, arranged with counsel for the Labor Union Local No. 173, under the auspices of whom the strike mentioned in the resolution was conducted, and with A. R. Bergeson, State's Attorney of Cass County, for an early hearing, and arranged to have witnesses produced by both sides.

The Members of the Committee, and F. E. McCurdy, the attorney, went to Fargo on Sunday, March 3rd, and went into session at 1:30 P. M., March 3rd, at a room in the Powers Hotel.

The Committee employed R. P. Carney, a qualified Court Reporter, to take and transcribe the testimony.

At that time Attorney U. L. Burdick, Jr., appeared for the Labor Union Local No. 173, under whose auspices the strike had been conducted, and made a statement in detail of the facts which it was expected the evidence would disclose. A. R. Bergesen, State's Attorney of Cass County, appeared representing the officers of the City of Fargo and of Cass County, and made a detailed statement of the facts which it was expected by the officers that the evidence would disclose.

Those statements were lengthy and in detail, occupying a large part of the afternoon.

After the statements had been made the committee met, canvassed the situation, and determined to accept as facts the statements made by the two attorneys in all respects in which the two attorneys agreed without dispute.

The committee met in the evening at 7:30 P. M. in a room in the Powers Hotel at Fargo and examined several witnesses. The Committee adjourned to meet in the Court House of Cass County on Monday Morning, the 4th day of March. At that time the committee in order to permit a transcript of the testimony to be made, left Mr. Carney made a transcript of the testimony taken the previous day and employed Clara Mason, a duly qualified Court Reporter to take and transcribe testimony.

At that time the taking of testimony was continued. A recess was taken for lunch. The committee reconvened after lunch, and the taking of testimony was continued until six o'clock.

It was deemed best at that time that still another Court Reporter be employed to take testimony to the end that a transcript might be obtained, and I. Staples, a duly qualified Court Reporter, was employed to take testimony.

Taking of testimony was resumed at 7:30 P. M., Mr. Staples reporting. After a portion of the testimony had been taken by Mr. Staples it was found that he would not have time to make a transcript of extended testimony, and so Mrs. F. C. Robinson, another competent Court Reporter was retained to take testimony during the remainder of the evening session. The taking of testimony was then resumed and continued until Mid-night. The committee recessed until 9:30 A. M., Tuesday morning, the 5th day of February.

Taking of testimony was then resumed with Mr. Carney acting as reporter, and continued until one o'clock, A. M., without a recess, at which time testimony had all been heard.

During the taking of testimony your committee requested Mr. Burdick to present the witnesses whom the Labor Union Local No. 173 wished to have heard, and to give the inquisitor, F. E. McCurdy, a brief outline of what they could testify to. The witnesses were interrogated by Mr. F. E. McCurdy, and then both sides were permitted to, and did suggest questiments.

tions in addition to be propounded, and the committee itself asked numerous questions, and in many instances limited examination by counsel for either or both sides was permitted to the end that the facts be fully developed, while at the same time limiting the testimony as nearly as possible to matters in controversy.

In taking this testimony the committee allowed considerable latitude to the end that the facts be developed in such a manner that the committee could get a complete and true picture of the circumstances and conditions surrounding the happenings under investigation.

At noon of Monday, the 4th day of March, Mr. U. L. Burdick, Jr., was unable to be present from that time on, and Attorney ______ Brooks of Fargo appeared representing the Labor Union Local No. 173.

As soon as possible after the completion of the taking of testimony the committee returned to Bismarck, leaving orders with the reporters to transcribe the testimony at once and transmit it to the Chairman of the Committee. Requests were also made of counsel for both sides to submit briefs, providing the same were received not later than Wednesday evening. A written memorandum brief was received from A. R. Bergesen, State's Attorney of Cass County, but no brief was received from counsel for the Labor Union Local No. 173.

In connection with the appearance at this hearing, all members of the committee were present at all of the sessions held on the 3rd day of March, and all members had the advantage of hearing the statements made by counsel for both sides, but on Monday, the 4th day of March, the members, Messrs. Matt Dahl and Dr. E. F. Hurd, felt it their duty to return to Bismarck, leaving the remaining three members of the committee to hear and take the rest of the testimony in this matter. Attorney F. E. McCurdy was present and participated in all hearings and examined all witnesses.

Upon returning to Bismarck the committee had some informal conferences, and then had a formal meeting on the 6th day of March, 1935, in the committee room in the Capitol Building, and at that time informally agreed upon a report and made arrangements to have the report written substantially as outlined at the committee meeting, and submitted to the members for correction and final approval or amendment or rejection, as the members should determine.

## ULTIMATE FACTS

Upon careful consideration of the testimony taken, and all the documentary evidence submitted, your committee finds as ultimate facts:

1. That on or about the 22nd day of January, 1935, Labor Union Local No. 173, consisting of truck drivers and others, declared a truck drivers strike in the City of Fargo in Cass County, North Dakota. At that time nearly all, if not all, truck drivers, members of this Union ceased work.

- 2. The needs for coal in Fargo under normal conditions is about fifteen hundred (1500) tons per day, and the weather at that time was from zero to approximately thirty below zero, and the coal demands during this period were much greater than normal. There were many families in places with but a very limited supply of coal. The Coal Dealers undertook to man their trucks with other men, and to make their deliveries of coal.
- 3. In many of these coal trucks manned by non-union drivers, were stopped on the streets and at places where they were unloading coal, turned back, the drivers threatened, and in several instances actual violence inflicted upon the drivers of coal trucks. In one or two instances the drivers were able to identify assailants who were identified with the Union, but in most instances the drivers were unable to identify their assailants in any way, and were unable to state whether the violence offed them, and interference with their work was caused by members of the Union, or not. However, the headquarters of this Local No. 173, was located in a hall known as Union Hall, and there is some evidence to show that there were many union men as well as some others about the union hall, and that on some occasions several men would leave Union Hall sometimes with trucks, and later on return, but there is no evidence to show that any truck loads of union men actually went and interferred with any person driving a load of coal. There was some damage done to the property of Coal Dealers during the strike period, but no one could testify that it was done by union men, and the property damaged was located close to the Railroad Tracks.
- When the situation became acute in the sense that coal deliveries were hampered, and there was serious danger of actual suffering on the part of the public, the State's Attorney of Cass County went to the Union Hall and there informed those present, including the President, Financial Agent, and Secretary, that he was not interested in the strike or the outcome of the strike, but that he was interested in seeing that the public were protected and were able to get coal, and that if coal deliveries were interferred with that he would arrest and prosecute not only those who actually stopped the coal trucks, but also the officers of the Union whom he claimed were instigating the stoppage of coal. He arranged a meeting between the coal truck drivers and the coal dealers, at which meeting he made substantially the same statements as to his proposed course of conduct. Adjutant General Sarles was also called in, and an arrangement was entered into where by there was to be no interference with deliveries of coal or other trucks for a rather indefinite period, and this arrangement for non-interference was in itself rather indefinite, but by some was termed a "truce." In the meantime a bulletin had been issued under the auspices of the Labor Union in which they stated that no trucks should move in the City of Fargo. A copy of this bulletin was filed with the committee, and identified.
  - 5. There was two or three days when there was very

little, if any, interference with coal deliveries, or with truck drivers, but on Sunday, during the absence of the State's Attorney from the city, he being at Fergus Falls, a group of between fifty and seventy-five men, many of them armed with clubs, gas pipe, hose, went down to the Red River where an Ice Company was harvesting ice, loading trucks, and hauling the ice from the river, employing non-strikers as truck drivers. There was some disturbance there, and a special police call was issued by a whistle sounded, which was a signal for between 250 and 300 special policemen who had been sworn in, to report for duty. The regular police and some of the special police went down to the river where there was actual trouble between these fifty to seventy-five men, and those working on the ice. When the police came the 50 or 75 men dispersed, but some of them were arrested and taken back to headquarters and to the county jail.

6. After the dispersing of the men at the river some of them, at least, came back to the Union Hall, and on telephone orders from the State's Attorney, A. R. Bergesen, from Fergus Falls, after he had been made acquainted with the situation, the Assistant State's Attorney made a complaint, filed it with the County Judge of the County Court of Increased Jurisdiction, and upon said complaint a warrant was issued for the arrest of the President, Secretary and Rusiness Agent of the Local Union and thirty, two others and Business Agent of the Local Union, and thirty-two others whose names were at that time unknown. This warrant was placed in the hands of the Police Department for service. The Chief of Police turned the warrant over to one of his oldest employees to serve. This Policeman with some others went to the Union Hall for the purpose of serving the warrant. He was denied admission to the hall at the door, and states that he talked through a wicket to someone whom he did not know, inquiring for Mr. Cruden, the President of the Local Union, for Mr. Swalde, the Secretary of the Local Union, and for Mr. Miles Dunn, the Business Agent, on a charge of rioting, and that he informed the parties to whom he talked that he had a warrant for the arrest of those three men just named; that he was denied admission to the hall, and informed that Mr. Cruden was not there, that Mr. Dunn was not there, and that a man who stated that he was Mr. Swalde came and talked to the policeman through the wicket, and the policeman states he informed him he had this warrant for the arrest of these men, and then he was denied admission, and shouts came from the hall, "come in and get them," and other shouts of defiance. That the policeman then returned to Police Headquarters and reported the situation. He further reported that he believed the men in the hall to be armed with clubs and loaded hose and gas pipe, and if enterance was forceably made into the hall that numerous people would be hurt and possibly somebody killed. The Sheriff of Cass County, Mayor of the City of Fargo, The Chief of Police of the City of Fargo, and Assistant State's Attorney, went into a conference at that time to determine what was best to be done under the circumstances. After what appears to be careful deliberation they concluded that if the door was broken that there would be a fight in which there would be people hurt, and possibly

someone killed, so they decided that it would be best to use "Tear-gas," and to that end their tear-gas equipment was taken to the hall and again this same policeman states that he went to the door and was again denied admission, and that he begged them to surrender the men for arrest, and was refused, and that he then asked them to have the women and children who were in the hall to leave the hall, and promised that the women and children would not be arrested, and they would be given a safe escort. Again this was refused. In the mean time another policeman testified that while on guard watching the hall during the absence of the first policeman mentioned, that he had gone to the wicket and talked with the men inside, and pleaded with them to surrender the men for whom they had a warrant, and permit the arrest to be made without violence, and that this was refused. The policemen state they gave careful warning to those inside that gas was about to be used, and requested them to come out without requiring that necessity, but that all their requests were refused.

6a. Numerous witnesses who were at the hall at that time testified they were there and they heard no request from the outside for anybody to come out; that they heard no statement that the police had a warrant for anybody. Mr. Swalde, the Secretary, admitted that he talked with the policeman at the door, but stated he was not informed that they had a warrant, but that he was informed that the policeman wanted Mr. Cruden, and he went in the hall to see if Mr. Cruden was there and didn't see him, and came and informed the policeman that he couldn't find Mr. Cruden. Mr. Swalde, however, admitted that from the large number of policemen who were there, that he did not admit the policemen, although he states that the policemen did not ask to be admitted, and that after the policemen came that most of the men in the hall got a piece of lumber or a stick to defend themselves if necessary from the police, and Mr. Swalde also stated that the policemen "had no reason to come up there we knew of, so if they came down there with clubs we certainly had a right to have clubs if it was necessary, yes." Mr. Swalde also states that he asked the women and children if they wanted to go out, but they did not want to go. Mr. Swalde was asked this question: "But when the men up there saw the policemen, they, or at least a lot of them, gathered up sticks and boards, whatever happened to be at hand, and had them in readiness, did they not?" Mr. Swalde answered "yes, they did." And in response to another question stated, that this was for the purpose of defending themselves if necessary from the policemen because they had a right to stay in the hall if they wanted to as long as we hadn't done anything, there was no reason why they didn't have the right to stay there.

7. This Committee therefore finds that a short time after the happening on the ice, that a large number of men were in the Union Hall armed with sticks and clubs for the purpose of keeping out the policemen, and this committee believes that those men were prepared to use those sticks and clubs, and there is no evidence to the contrary, and all the evidence so indicates.

- 8. After having twice been refused admission, and after having warned the inmates of the hall that gas was about to be used, the police did shoot four tear-gas bombs into the hall, and almost immediately the inmates of the hall broke out the windows to get air, and came out the door, and as they came out the door, the men were taken in custody and taken over to the County Jail and charged with resisting an officer in the performance of his duty. There were between 90 and 100 men taken into custody. None of the women and children were taken into custody, and all the women and children were carefully escorted from the stairway and from the hall. No violence was done, and no person injured, except one little child had a bruise which its mother claimed was received from a gas bomb, but the physician who attended the child testified in his opinion there was no burn. There was what appeared to be a little bruise of a trivial character, and some little foreign substance like a cinder was removed from its eye.
- 9. This occurred late in the afternoon and as fast as possible the State's Attorney interviewed the men, and released many of them at once, released many of them on their own recognizance, and released some of them on bail. No bail higher than \$500.00 was required of any of them, and those who were also arrested from the hall on the charge of rioting on the warrant originally issued, were later on tried on a charge of rioting, and sixteen of them convicted by a jury. After the jury convicted this number on a charge of rioting it appeared there was almost no further violence to truck drivers on streets, and the charges of resisting an officer were dismissed.
- 10. The tear-gas used, as appeared from the evidence of a physician and from the evidence of a salesman who sold the gas, and who had himself taken the gas on numerous occasions, appears to be a gas which stimulates the tear ducts and salivary glands, so that the person taking the gas is practically blinded by tears and suffers excessive flow of saliva, and that the effects are temporary, lasting only a few minutes after they are in the open air, and that no harmful results follow, and that the gas is harmless as far as permanent results are concerned, and from fifteen to twenty minutes after the person has reached the open air all sensation and effects have passed away, leaving no disability or injury.

# CONCLUSIONS

T

Your committee concludes that there was no violation of constitutional rights of any of these people by the officers. It is true some of these people were retained in jail for various lengths of time before being brought to trial, but it also appeared that this was an occasion when there was a great number of people arrested, and the officers with due deligence worked as rapidly as possible to take care of them, and that this delay was caused by the length of time required

to work out a situation, and that there is no lack of deligence nor dilitory tactics on the part of the officers.

TT

Your Committee further finds that this strike was called at a time when there was an acute public necessity to have fuel delivered, and it was the duty of the officers to protect coal deliveries during this period, and this Committee is not prepared to say that the officers over-stepped their authority, or abused their descretion. The action of the police in using gas was taken after a conference to determine ways and means how best to avoid any injury to the people, and to avoid bloodshed.

#### HI

Your Committee believes that the activities of the strikers, either by themselves or sympathizers, in stopping trucks loaded with coal for delivery, and threatening and beating the drivers in some instances, was an interference with the constitutional right of those truck drivers to work and earn their livelihood, and that such activity extended beyond a "peaceful picket."

#### IV

Your Committee is in fair sympathy with men who are striking to better their working conditions, and realize that sometimes allowances must be made under such conditions.

#### V

However, your Committee also realizes that it is undisputed in this instance in this strike there was no dispute or dissatisfaction with wages or hours or working conditions; that the sole matter of dispute between the striker and employers was that the strikers demanded that their union be recognized, and that that was the sole purpose of calling the strike.

# RECOMMENDATIONS

T

Your Committee recommends that Section 10563 of the Compiled Laws of 1913 be re-enacted to read as follows:

Sec. 10563. Warrant must be shown. If the person making the arrest is acting under the authority of a warrant, he must so inform the defendant, and he must show the warrant, if requested by the defendant.

II

Your Committee recommends that the use of tear-gas in making arrests be made unlawful, except in cases where the arrest is for the commission of a felony, or where a felony is being committed.

#### GENERAL ORDERS

Mr. Symington moved that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the consideration of General Orders.

Which motion prevailed.

The Speaker called Mr. Symington to the chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

The Speaker resumed the chair.

When the Committee arose it submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker: The Committee of the Whole have had under consideration:

Senate Bill No. 264. A Bill for an Act Relating to Licensing of Motor Vehicle Operators and Chauffeurs and to the Liability of Certain Persons for Negligence in the Operation Thereof on Public Highways; Fixing Fee to be Paid; Providing for Examination of Applicant; Providing for Suspension or Revocation of License; Making Disposition of Fees Collected; Providing for Penalty for Violating Act; Repealing All Acts in Conflict Herewith, and Declaring an Emergency.

And recommend the adoption of the Standing Committee's amendments as follows:

The following amendments are offered to Senate Bill No. 264; amendments being on the engrossed bill as it came from the Senate:

Amend the title by adding at the end thereof "Appropriation."

Strike out everything after the enacting clause and add in place thereof the following:

Section 1. DEFINITIONS.) The following words: "Motor Vehicle," "Farm Tractor," "Owner," "Operator," "Non-resident," "Public Highway, as used in this Act shall be interpreted to have the meanings usually ascribed to them, except in those instances where the context clearly indicates a different meaning.

Section 2. DRIVERS LICENSES.) Except as provided by Section 3 of this Act, no person 16 years of age or over shall on and after this measure shall be in force and effect, operate any motor vehicle upon the public highways of this State unless such person shall have made application for and secured a driver's license from the State Highway Commissioner for which he shall pay to the Commissioner the sum of 25 cents, payable at the time of making such application. Provided, however, that when the license fee of 25 cents is paid by the head of a family, or household, licenses may be issued, upon application therefor, to each of the members of the immediate family of the head of the said family, or household, on the payment of an additional fee of

10 cents for each such license. For the purpose of this Act, the term "immediate family," is hereby defined to mean all persons bound together by the ties of relationship and parents and children living together as members of one household under one head. Such application shall be made upon a form approved by the Commissioner.

Provided, that no driver's license shall be issued to a resident of North Dakota who has purchased a Motor Vehicle after the taking effect of Senate Bill No. 313 of the 24th Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota (the sales tax act), unless such applicant shall produce satisfactory proof to the Commissioner that the North Dakota sales tax has been paid upon the purchase of such motor vehicle owned and operated by such North Dakota resident. In the event such tax has not been paid by such applicant, the license may be issued by the Commissioner only upon such applicant paying in addition to the license fee hereinbefore required the sales tax in such amount as is provided in the sales tax law of the State of North Dakota. The Commissioner shall remit such sales tax payment to the proper officer of the State who is charged with the duty of collecting the sales tax and such officer shall credit such sum in the same manner as are other collections of sales tax under the laws of the State of North Dakota.

Every applicant shall state his name, age, sex, and resident address, and what experience he has had in operating a motor vehicle; that he is competent to operate a motor vehicle upon the public highways of the State; that he knows of no physical impairment or defect or any other act which would render him an improper and unsafe person to operate a motor vehicle. Every applicant shall also state whether or not he has been heretofore licensed, and if so, by what State, and whether or not the license has ever been suspended or revoked and if so, the date and reason for such suspension or revocation, together with such other facts pertaining to the qualifications of the applicant and his ability to operate a motor vehicle with safety, as may be required by the Commissioner. Thereupon license shall issue as of course.

To every person granted a license the Commissioner shall issue a certificate of license which shall bear thereon the distinguishing number assigned to the license and shall contain the name, age, sex, and residence address, and a space where such person shall write his usual signature with pen and ink.

Section 3. EXEMPTIONS.) Every person driving or operating a road roller, road machinery, or any farm tractor or implement of husbandry temporarily drawn or moved upon the highways, and every person in the service of the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States when furnished a driver's permit and operating an official motor vehicle in such service, shall be exempted from license under this Act.

Section 4. STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER TO

ADMINISTER ACT.) The State Highway Commissioner shall be charged with the responsibility for the administration and execution of this Act.

Section 5. CLERK OF COURT MAY RECEIVE APPLICATIONS.) Any applicant for a license may file his application with the Clerk of the District Court or the sheriff of the county in which he resides and such clerk or sheriff is hereby authorized to receive and accept the same upon the payment by the applicant to such clerk or sheriff of an additional fee of ten cents for such service. The clerk or sheriff shall then immediately forward such application to the Commissioner, together with the fee of 25 cents.

Section 6. PERSONS UNDER SIXTEEN YEARS OF AGE NOT TO BE LICENSED.) No operator's license shall be granted to any person under the age of sixteen years except that upon a written request of a parent or guardian a minor's license may be issued to any person between the ages of 14 and 16 years. But only upon the recommendation of the official to whom the application for license shall be made.

Section 7. NON-RESIDENTS NEED NOT HAVE LICENSES.) During the period within which a motor vehicle of a non-resident may be operated in this State in accordance with law, such motor vehicle may be operated by its owner or a member of his family without a license, provided such owner and members of his family have fully complied with the laws of the State of their residence regarding the operation of motor vehicles. Such motor vehicles shall at all times display the license number plates issued therefor at the home state or county of the owner.

MUST CERTIFICATE.) CARRY licensee shall have his certificate of license in his possession while operating a motor vehicle upon the public highways of this state. Said certificate of license shall be subject to examination upon demand by any peace officer or by any officer authorized by law to enforce the laws relating to the operation of motor vehicles on the highways, and the licensee shall, upon request of any such officer, write his name in the presence of such officer in order that the identity of the licensee may be determined. It shall be a complete defense to any charge under this section that the person so charged produce in court an operator's certificate of license theretofore issued to such person and valid, or produce evidence that he had made application therefor; that he had not received his certificate; but same had not been denied, at the time of his arrest. If a certificate of license issued under the provisions of this Act shall be lost or destroyed, the person to whom the same was issued may obtain a duplicate or substitute therefor upon furnishing satisfactory proof that such license has been lost or destroyed, and upon the payment of a fee of 25 cents.

Section 9. COURTS TO CERTIFY CONVICTIONS TO COMMISSIONER.) Every Court having jurisdiction of offenses committed under this Act or any law of this State

regulating the operation of motor vehicles on public highways shall certify to the Commissioner a record of the conviction of any person in said court for a violation of any of said laws, and may recommend the suspension of the license of any person so convicted. The Commissioner acting upon such recommendation may suspend such license, but such suspension shall not be for a period of more than one year. Upon suspending the license the Commissioner shall require that the certificate of license be surrendered to him. At the end of the period of suspension the certificate of license shall be returned to the licensee.

- Section 10. COMMISSIONER TO REVOKE LICENSE.)
  (a) The Commissioner shall forthwith revoke the license of any person and require that the certificate of license be returned to him, upon receiving a record of the conviction of such person of any of the following offenses:
- (1) Manslaughter resulting from the operation of a motor vehicle.
- (2) Driving a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drug.
- (3) Any crime punishable as a felony under the motor vehicle laws of this State or any other felony in the commission of which a motor vehicle is used.
- (4) Conviction of forfeiture of bail upon two charges of reckless driving all within the preceding twelve months.
- (5) A conviction of a driver of a motor vehicle, involved in an accident resulting in the death or injury of another person, upon a charge of failing to stop and disclose his identity at the scene of the accident.
- (6) The Commissioner upon receiving a record of the conviction of any person upon a charge of operating a motor vehicle while the license of such person is suspended, shall immediately extend the period of such first suspension for an additional like period.

# Section 11. COMMISSIONER MAY SUSPEND LICENSE.)

- (a) The Commissioner may immediately suspend the license of any person for a period of ninety days without hearing and without receiving a record of conviction of such person of crime, whenever he has reasons to believe:
- (1) That such person has committeed any offense for which mandatory revocation of license is provided in Section 10.
- (2) That such person has, by reckless or unlawful operation of a motor vehicle, caused or contributed to an accident resulting in death or injury or serious property damage.
- (3 That such person is incompetent to drive a motor vehicle or is afflicted with mental or physical infirmities or disabilities rendering it unsafe for such person to drive a

motor vehicle upon the highways. Provided, that deafness in itself shall not be deemed to be physical infirmity or disability in a driver.

- (4) That such person is an habitual reckless or negligent driver of a motor vehicle or has committed a violation of the laws of this State relating to the operation of motor vehicles.
- Section 12. MUST NOTIFY LICENSEE. (a) Whenever the Commissioner suspends the license pursuant to the provisions of Section 11 hereof, he shall immediately notify the licensee and afford him an opportunity of a hearing in the county wherein the licensee resides, or in the case of a non-resident, in the county in which such non-resident may be temporarily residing, and upon such hearing the Commissioner shall either rescind his temporary order of suspension or, good cause appearing therefor, may continue such suspension in effect for a period not exceeding 90 days.
- (b) The Commissioner is hereby authorized to suspend or revoke the license of any resident of this State upon receiving a record of the conviction of such person in another state of an offense therein committed which, if committed in this State, would be grounds for the suspension or revocation of the license of the operator. The Commissioner is further authorized upon receiving a record of the convicition in this state of a non-resident driver of a motor vehicle of any offense under the motor vehicle laws of this State, to forward a certified copy of such record to the motor vehicle administrator in the State wherein the persons so convicted is a resident.
- (c) The Commissioner shall not suspend a license for a period of more than one year and upon suspending or revoking any license shall require that such license, so suspended or revoked, shall be surrendered except that at the end of the period of suspension, such license shall be returned to the licensee.
- Section 13. SUSPENDED LICENSEE MAY APPEAL TO COURT.) Any person whose license has been suspended by the Commissioner, may file a petition within thirty days thereafter for a hearing in the matter in the District Court in the county wherein such person shall reside, and in the case of a non-resident, in the District Court in any county, and such court is hereby vested with jurisdiction, and it shall be its duty to set the matter for hearing upon ten days' written notice to the Commissioner and thereupon to take testimony and examine into the facts of the case to determine whether the petitioner is entitled to a license or is subject to suspension of license under the provisions of this Act and shall render judgment accordingly.
- Section 14. MAY APPLY FOR NEW LICENSE AFTER ONE YEAR.) Any person whose license has been revoked under the provisions of Section 10 hereof may, after one year from the date of such revocation, petition the district court of the county wherein he resides, or, in case of a non-resident, the district court of any county, for an order directing

the Commissioner to issue a certificate of license to him. The district court is hereby vested with jurisdiction and it shall be its duty to set the matter for hearing up on 10 days' written notice to the Commissioner. At the hearing the court shall take testimony and examine into the facts of the case to determine whether the petitioner is entitled to a license and shall make its order, granting or denying the petition. If the petition is granted, the Commissioner, upon receipt of a certified copy of the order of the court, shall issue such license. If the petition is denied, no renewal thereof shall be made during the period of one year from the date of the order of the court.

Section 15. MISDEMEANOR TO OPERATE MOTOR VEHICLE AFTER SUSPENSION OF LICENSE.) Any person whose operator's license has been suspended or revoked as provided by this Act, and who shall drive any motor vehicle upon the highways of this State while such license is suspended or revoked or who shall violate any of the other provisions of this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

FEES TO BE PAID INTO THE STATE HOW APPROPRIATED AND DISTRIB-Section 16. TREASURY: All moneys received under the provisions of this Act shall be monthly paid by the State Highway Commissioner into the State Treasury and the same is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to the following purposes: the first Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars collected annually, is hereby appropriated into a fund to be known the "Special Drivers' License Fund" to be used by the State Highway Commissioner in carrying out the provisions of this Act. The next Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars collected annually, is hereby appropriated into a special fund to be used by the Superintendent of Criminal Identification, as a special fund, hereby created as the "Criminal Identification Fund" for use in paying salaries and operating expenses of the work of Criminal Identification, as provided by Chapter 116 of the Session Laws of 1929; and Acts amendatory thereof; the balance of such moneys so received shall be and is hereby appropriated to the General Fund of the State.

Section 17. STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSIONER MAY APPOINT AGENT.) Any duties required of, or powers conferred on the State Highway Commissioner under the provisions of this Act may be done and performed or exercised by any of his duly authorized agents.

Section 18. PROVISONS SEPARABLE.) If any part or parts of this Act shall be held to be unconstitutional, such unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity of the remaining parts of this Act.

Section 19. INCONSISTENT ACTS REPEALED.) All Acts or parts of Acts inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

Section 20. EMERGENCY.) This Act is declared to be an

emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

#### MR. SPEAKER:

Your select committee appointed as per House Resolution "E" to investigate the feasibility, desirability and practicability of erecting a state-owned radio broadcasting station has inquired into the matter and begs to submit the following report under the following heads: Feasibility, desirability, practicability; estimate of cost of construction and operation; management and control.

As to feasibility, practicability and desirability we wish to say the following: A state-owned and operated radio transmitting station would be of great value; inasmuch as a radio receiver is in practically every home and business place in the state, a state-owned radio transmitter would provide an ever available means of communication which would serve to more closely bind and inform our populace in all ways. Police work would be greatly aided and law and order would be more easily had. It is an instaneous means of communication which is recognized as our best means and we can see no reason why such service should not be in command of the public and available to the public at all times.

# ESTIMATE OF COST OF CONSTRUCTION AND OPERATIONS

(These are estimates and will vary somewhat; however, we believe the amounts as set out below to be reasonably placed.)

# MANAGEMENT AND CONTROL

Responsibility for management must be fixed on a very reliable basis. A separate commission could be provided for or management could be vested in the Board of Administration; however, the management must be on an absolutely non-political basis and the business must be conducted in a business-like way in every respect. Regardless of the method of management, at least one person who aids in management

of the transmitter service should be conversant and reliably informed as to the approved practices and methods employed in the management of such equipment and business.

The committee has been informed that if the station can be located in the proximity of Fargo, the engineering department at the Agricultural College would assume responsibility for technical operation for the reason that it would aid in instruction in subjects pertaining to the technical operation, and if such arrangements would be made a material saving in cost of operation personnel could be affected.

In conclusion it is the opinion of the committee that a state-owned radio transmission station would be of inestimable value to everyone and that as an advertising medium for the people as a whole much can be realized from the standpoint of their individual interests and the standpoint of advertising the state of North Dakota to the neighboring territory.

Our natural resources such as coal, gas, pottery, mineral deposits and pleasure resorts need to be brought to the attention of ourselves as well as our neighbors and we know of no other way to so thoroughly cover the subject of advertising as the means of radio transmission affords.

The rates for broadcast service could be materially reduced thereby allowing those who now are prevented from using the service to make use of facilities which are becoming universally considered as a necessity.

In closing we ask your favorable consideration in the adoption of the report.

# HOUSE RESOLUTION S

Introduced by Representatives Erickson of McLean, Anderson of Divide and Marks

WHEREAS, By Act of Congress cattle have been added to the list of basic commodities and thus subjected to adjustment price benefits; and

WHEREAS, The United States Government has acquired title to approximately a million head of North Dakota cattle under the drouth cattle buying program; and

WHEREAS, The producers of said cattle received about 25% of the cost of producing same; and

WHEREAS, Such producers are entitled to cost of production, or a parity price under the Agricultural Adjustment Act; and

WHEREAS, Cattle producers of North Dakota, under the Agricultural Adjustment Act, are entitled to adjustment benefit payments in the amount of about \$40,000,000.00 if they are to receive parity prices for the cattle disposed of; and

WHEREAS, About 90% of said cattle were mortgaged for more than was paid for them; and

WHEREAS, Cattle producers are unable to meet the obligations secured by the cattle so disposed of and unless the producers receive just compensation for their cattle, it is going to work a hardship on Banks, Credit Companies and other mortgage holders in this and other states largely supported with Government money; and

WHEREAS, We are informed that the Agricultural Adjustment Administration has not started to work out a program which will regulate cattle production;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That we urge upon the Agricultural Adjustment Administration to work out a cattle program as soon as possible and provide for adjustment benefits to the end that parity prices may be obtained for cattle, and the producers of cattle enabled to re-establish their almost depleted estates;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Secretary of Agriculture at Washington, D. C., and to our Senators and Congressmen in Washington urging them to do all in their power to help get an equitable cattle program started.

Dear Mr. Crockett:

It is desired to invite your attention to the fact that under existing laws there is considerable laxity in the provisions for enforcement. The power granted for the issuance and revocation of license is not believed to be specific enough to make it possible to secure the degree of enforcement desired. It is our belief that in the interests of law enforcement and of the administration and control of the sale and distribution of beer, that some additional legislation should be provided.

Senate Bill No. 195, which has been before you and which I believe is now indefinitely postponed, should be passed in order to permit a better enforcement of the beer laws.

Will you kindly give this matter your attention.

WHEREAS: Through the honest, efficient and business-like methods adopted by the Board of Administration, and the people employed by said Board in the supervision of completion of the erection of said building, the building has been fully completed, and in addition to the building as originally planned the Board has found it possible to install such extras as floor coverings for the entire building, installation of steam in the Memorial Building, carpets in many of the main offices, chairs, desks and other furniture for both legislative chambers, shades, draperies and blinds, book stacks for the Supreme Court and Attorney General's Library, electric light bulbs throughout the building, sewer and water connections; some paving and side walks, gravel for drive ways and many other items, all at a cost of one hundred twenty-four thousand dollars, and all of which has been done and furnished within the original appropriation of \$2,000,000.00, and

WHEREAS: A total of fifteen law suits were threatened in connection with changes made in certain of said contracts, and other matters growing out of said matter, all of which were disposed of without the bringing of a single lawsuit, and without expense to the state; and

WHEREAS: The State of North Dakota now owns one of the most complete and beautiful Capitol Buildings in the entire nation, a building of which her people are justly proud, and which will serve the needs of the state for many years;

THEREFORE: In recognition of the honest, intelligent, painstaking and efficient service rendered by the various members of the Board of Administration, the Attorney General and members of his official staff, and state officials and employees, and all other persons, and in special recognition of the untiring efforts of Mr. R. M. Rishworth, President, Frank L. Anders, former Secretary, and Ed. Nelson, Superintendent and later Secretary, of the Board of Administration, the Architects and various Contractors engaged in the erection of said structure, the people of the State of North Dakota do, by adoption of this Resolution, make public record of their gratitude and sincere thanks.

If you do carry this story back there will be more consideration shown for everyone, as we must all continue to live together and stick together. If we only reach an understanding our problems will be solved and we will be happy together again.
