#### Twenty-eighth Legislative Assembly

#### FIRST DAY

Bismarck, January 5, 1943

At the hour of twelve o'clock on the fifth day of January, 1943, it being the day and hour designated by the Constitution for convening the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, the hold-over members, and members elected to the Senate of the Twenty-eighth Legislative Assembly, assembled in the North Dakota State Capitol Building at Bismarck, North Dakota, were called to order by W. J. Trout, Secretary of the Twenty-seventh Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota.

Senator Bridston of Grand Forks County moved that the Presiding Officer appoint a Committee of Three to escort the Lieutenant Governor to the rostrum to be sworn in as President of the Senate, which motion prevailed.

will do our level best."

Former Cenator Ettestad: "Mr. President and Members of the Senate: I don't know why I happened to come in here but I always appreciate coming back and seeing the old friends. I am improved quite a bit since I was here last time and I hope I will be better in another year from now and be able to get around all right. It is a long time since I have been able to look over the Senate that is controlled by the Nonpartisan League—the original platformers. If you introduced a bill of that kind, it would receive a unanimous voteif you spring a repeal of one of those laws, you would have a unanimous vote against repealing it. The whole program has been adopted by the federal government and also recommended to the world through the Atlantic Charter, as we read about it, and I think that the whole world will find after a while that this program will have to be carried out some day. We know that some of these laws happened to be failures, not because they were the wrong idea but because we were not far enough along to realize that the time had come when the changes had to be made. For seven years of dry weather we all came down to pretty near starvation—when there was not much left for us to live on. When I was in the old country, trying to go to school and to study, especially religion—we used to learn that by heart, and in the evening we studied until we couldn't learn any more. The old folks would tell us to go to bed and we would have to get up early in the morning and study on an empty stomach—that way you learn faster; and that is the way we have been doing a good many years. Now we are learning that we can't make a success unless other people get enough to live on.

I was asked some time ago why the Senate is more quiet and dignified than the House. Well, I can't say exactly, I think it is because the Senators are older men. They are at the end of the road; they have been learning for a long time and now as they look back they have learned that they don't know anything! The House is composed of younger men—they are looking to the future; they are in the class that knows

everything and so that is the reason.

Now we have organizations: Labor organizations; farmer organizations; business and professional men's organizations; all for our own special interest and that is the trouble as long as we stand class against class we are always going to have hard times to deal with and get the mess straightened out. We need to realize that everybody ought to be working for the benefit of the other classes, in other words, 'parity for everybody'—for labor; for capital; for the farmer. Then we will commence to have a united front. As long as we are class against class, working for selfish interest, there will always be strife. We are now fighting a world war for the same thing and we are going to have to adopt a program for everybody—but as I look at it sometimes, I think that human nature has always been the same from the beginning and I don't know whether we are going to be able to change it much or not.

I don't think I had better take up much time. I might tell you a few stories—one that I heard just recently. We have just had an election and some were elected by a very close

majority, especially the Secretary of State. Puts me in mind of a story I heard: Ole asked his mother if there were no men in Heaven. She said, 'Of course there are men in Heaven.' Then little Ole said, 'How does it come I never see any pictures of angels with whiskers,' and she said, 'There are men in Heaven all right but they only get there by a close shave'

I don't know that I have very much to talk about and I am not as healthy as I might be so that it is a little hard to talk. Thank you and I want to tell you how much I appreciate meeting old friends and the opportunity to talk to you."

Senator Morgan of Walsh suggested that the Senate be at ease until three o'clock p. m. when the report of the Committee on Committees would be completed, and the President announced that the Senate would be at ease following such suggestion.

We recommend the printing of 3,500 copies of the Journal of each day's proceedings of each house and that there be assigned to the presiding officer of the House and Senate, also to each member of the respective houses, not to exceed 10 copies of the Journal to be sent only to constituents who request same; that there also be placed on the mailing list all state institutions, public libraries, the State Historical Society, all state's attorneys, two copies to the University Law School, and by request in writing to all county auditors, county and district judges; any newspaper published in the state, any secretary of a county taxpayers association, any auditor of an incorporated city, the president of the village board of an incorporated village, township clerk, high school, consolidated rural school, secretary of labor club, farmer's organization, commercial club or women's club within the state may be placed on the mailing list; that all bills and journals authorized by this joint resolution to be printed shall be delivered by the printer to the Secretary of the Publications and Printing Commission who shall receipt therefor to the printer; that there shall be printed 600 copies of the House and Senate Bills unless otherwise ordered by the Daily Journal be punched; that 500 copies of the

Re-enactment of the one-cent gas tax.
 Re-enactment of the 2% sales tax.

3. Limiting compulsory insurance of road building and

maintaining equipment.

This association accept an invitation of the county officials to be included in their restoration of salaries bill a provision that the County Commissioners compensation be restored to six dollars per day and seven cents per mile for all miles traveled to and from meetings and other necessary travel in the conduct of official business. Furthermore that the maximum compensation permissible for commissioners of counties which have specified population be increased from \$650.00 to \$900.00.

- 5. That legislation be enacted providing that title to real estate resting in husband and wife shall pass to the survivor without proceedings in court, (in absence of valid will to the contrary).
- 6. That county boards conduct the sale and leasing of tax deed lands in a manner so as to encourage longer periods of tenure, thereby affording greater security for both owner and tenant.
- 7. That present laws affecting redemption and re-purchase of tax deed lands be amended to provide that when re-purchase or redemption is made prior to the 1st day of April, the redemptioner shall be entitled to the profits of the owner for the current year, and such lands shall be immediately placed on the tax lists. When redemption is made after April 1st, the county shall retain the income for the current year and the real estate shall be placed on the tax list for the following year, in the name of the redemptioner. In either case redemption shall be made subject to existing leases.
- 8. Due to the increasing number of our citizens entering defense, military service and the operation of gas rationing, a large number of automobiles in the state will be out of active service. Therefore, we feel that the penalties provided by the present Motor Vehicle Law for failure to purchase current license plates be modified in such cases where the automobile is not being operated on our public highways.
- That the present Motor Vehicle Laws relative to trucks and the operation thereof upon our highways be not amended.

I would rather be up here with the Lieutenant Governor than back there where I sat in the last two sessions because—I will tell you why—I think that the 16th District has sent a man that is much more able to serve, and who has much more ability to fill that chair than I could, and consequently I am proud that the 16th District has sent Steve Nelson here.

"Now then, this is Saturday and all important business is held over, so I suppose the time is all mine!

"These are abnormal times and often when we have conditions like this, we are prone to embark upon reforms and economical reconstructions that are not given as much thought and consideration as they should be. I think that this session, more so than probably many of the previous ones, is going to have some very knotty problems to untangle, due to the condition of the country, as it is today.

"I have always said that you and I as citizens—we who have offered ourselves as public servants—we who have accepted that trust from our constituents, we must dedicate ourselves to that trust, though our emoluments are very meager, nevertheless the gravity and the importance of the situation make it such that we must endeavor to deliver to our posterity a democracy just as good or better than the one that we have inherited and keep this as a free nation for all free people. I thank you."

Senator Young moved that the Senate do now adjourn, which motion prevailed.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that this Association recommends to the 28th Legislative Assembly, that legislation be enacted providing for the cancellation of all penalties and interest on personal property taxes, falling due in the year of 1940 and prior years, upon payment of the original amount plus 5% of such original tax, providing that the same shall be paid in cash on or before December 31st, 1943.

not mean so much to us.

We are finding occasion to place new values upon old things that have somewhat been taken for granted. So today as you meet in this session, we find the greatest assets that we have are in our boys and girls who have left our homes and our midst and are today out all over the world to champion the cause of American idealism. Those have become of more value to us now. And the things that we accumulated in the days gone by, we are gladly and willingly throwing our money and our property into a common stock pile in order that these boys and girls who are carrying some of America into far-flung parts of the world may be safe-guarded and returned safely back to us.

The other things that is increasing in value in these times are those principles of American idealism-life, liberty and the freedom that we may worship and express ourselves as we see fit and as our consciences dictate. That, all of a sudden, has become of more value to us than we had realized. So the soul of America is awakening and being reborn with new values placed upon the assets that really make us happy; our boys and girls and the ideals of American life. We are in this struggle, and we have entered the struggle of world conflict' with no evil in our hearts towards any man or any country but with the righteous wrath for the downtrodden and enslaved and to uphold the ideals throughout the world of free people so that in our deliberations here may the Almighty Father who guides us here so that we may enter into the right spirit and that we may put upon the altar of unselfishness, the same devotion to those principles that our boys and girls are giving in the far-flung regions of the world and may the time be speeded when we shall have a righteous exaltation of victory in our hearts again.

May I thank you for this privilege and wish you the best

of luck in your deliberations. I thank you."

Senator Young: "I have a matter that I would like to bring to the attention of the Senate—perhaps it is a question that should be taken up by the Appropriation Committee or the Public Welfare but I think it is of a nature that the entire Senate should consider.

We have been passing deficiency appropriations, for state institutions.

I find in the Welfare Board report that we have on hand the sum of \$714,092.00 for old age pension or \$204,092 more than is required by law on January 1st, which is 75% on hand at that time. This amount matched with federal and county funds would mean a half a million dollars more which could have been paid to the old age pension. I wouldn't think so much of this at the present time, if in past years the amount of money that we appropriated for old age pension had always been used. There has been a large surplus—one time we had a million deficit for the Welfare debt for Poor Relief and if I remember correctly a surplus of \$200,000.00 for old age pensions. I can't find it in my heart to be niggardly in the matter of old age pensions—it has been the intent to give them more but it seems to me now that to ap-, propriate more would not do the business. If the State Welfare Director doesn't make higher payments with the added cost of living, over past years, we will have to find some other method of handling. I therefore am going to move that the President appoint a Committee of Three to investigate

this matter and if possible bring before the Senate a resolution in regard to this."

A lot has been said about him today—many flattering remarks, but we, the citizens of Fargo, feel that Art belonged to us to a certain extent. I felt humiliated because from what I had learned there is no one from the 9th district who can ever take Art Fowler's place, nor no one from any other district who can take his place.

I think he has built himself in this body a standing memorial to the services he did here."

Judge Morris: "Mr. President, Members of the Senate, Visitors: After listening to those wonderful tributes that the men of this body have just rendered to those who have gone on before it seems a little superfluous to stand here and undertake to make further remarks.

This has been an impressive and an appropriate ceremony. We commemorate, we honor the memory here today of the mén who served in this body and who have passed into the Great Beyond. We honor them, of course—first, as Senators of North Dakota but we would also honor them as citizens and servants of this great commonwealth. We would honor them, not only for the things that they did here but we would honor them for the things that they did throughout their lives in behalf of justice and good government, for their good fellowship, development of their communities and everything that marks a citizen as a 'good citizen'.

I would not stand here and attempt to discuss with you the meaning of death or the Great Beyond, even the meaning of life—I would leave that to the theologians and philosophers; men and women who have devoted years of study to those deep and unfathomable subjects, but I would for just a few minutes, remind you of the human, the manly, the earthly qualities of these men who have from time to time come here and served in this great and honorable body.

First, those men have the honor, the respect, the trust, the loyalty, the confidence of the people in their own communities. They would never have been sent to this body, had they not merited the trust of the people in their respective districts. The men and women who elected them to come down here to the capitol of North Dakota, and participate in making the laws under which we should live and then when they came here by their services, by their devotion to their duties, they endeared themselves to you. There have been many wonderful words spoken in this service today and embodied in those resolutions which were read here, there were well deserved words regarding these men who stood out in their community—who stood out in this state, as meriting the confidence of the people.

Many of them—perhaps most of them, might be called pioneers of this state. Men who helped wrest from the prairies, the farms, the cities, the schools, in fact a prosperous, a civilized and God-fearing community—they helped wrest from the hand of nature, the things which we need, not only to sustain human life but to build communities, to create congregations, societies, and organizations that might aspire to leading the people of our state on an upward path of thought and righteousness.

And so today, we do homage to them as pioneers. To them we would do homage just as fellow workers in the great cause of government and humanity.

I presume that no man has ever come to the state senate of North Dakota who has not come at some sacrifice to himself. Yes, it is an honor—it is a great honor to be a Senator of the State of North Dakota but it means that you must leave your business, or your farm, or your professions. You must lay aside the making of money to devote yourselves

to the welfare of this great state and that is what those men did when they came here. They came not for the money they could make. O yes, you might say 'Perhaps they came for the honor'. Well, it is true tht they perhaps like you and I, appreciate honors that are conferred upon us but still there was something more in the hearts and minds of these men that brought them here. I dare say the same thing that brings you here brought them here, and that is a devotion to a cause, a devotion to an idea, a willingness to sacrifice and an eagerness to serve, and so we honor them today as men who have sacrificed themselves and who were willing to devote a portion of their lives to the service of the people of the state and the good of North Dakota.

Yes, sometimes we may wonder after all, especially now with the momentous events that are occurring throughout the world, whether our part may not be too small in the affairs of men and I presume perhaps to their minds, and perhaps to ourselves, has occurred the suggestion as to whether or not it was really worthwhile to devote the time and the energy necessary to do a good job here in this Senate chamber. But after all, we must remember that even though the affairs of the world perhaps over-shadow us as individuals, that when the time of crisis comes it is the people of any nation who are willing to devote themselves to self sacrifice and service, who are the backbone of that nation and that carry it on through the trials and the difficulties and bring it finally to ultimate success and security-so it was with those men here. Possibly their labors on the bills. possibly their votes on bills, possibly their work on committees was not so important that it would shake the foundations of the world-no, but it had its influence just as the labor of you men today has its influence upon the affairs of the world. It is said that you cannot drop a pebble into the ocean but some effect of the ripple of that pebble passes to the shores of all far distant lands, and so it is with us who labor and with those who have labored, in behalf of the public interests. What we do in our own limited way has its effect upon the great cause of the nations, and so today I am happy to join with you men in honoring those who gave through this body, the Senate of the State of North Dakota, the best that they had in behalf of the nation, and I am sure that if their spirit hovers o'er us now that they would join with us in that great song and prayer, 'America, America, God shed His grace on Thee and crown thy good with brotherhood from sea to shining sea'.'

Senator Stucke moved that the remarks of Judge Morris be printed in the Journal, which motion prevailed.

Benediction by Rev. Stewart: "May the Lord bless you and keep you. May the Lord cause His face to shine upon you and be gracious unto you. May the Lord lift up His countenance upon you and give you peace, now and forevermore through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen."

Senator Lavik moved that the report be adopted, which motion prevailed and the report was adopted.

Senator Bridston requested that the Senate be on the eighth order of business, which request was granted.

Senator Bridston: "Two years ago in 1941 when the members of the majority faction of this body were thinking and

doing a little talking about the next presiding officer, we did so with our tongues in our cheeks. There were a lot of them anticipating a little trouble and at least some unpleasantness.

The 1941 session was organized and the Honorable Oscar Hagen was the presiding officer. Just yesterday somebody told me that he had not been brought up to the rostrum and that is why I am on my feet. The members of the majority faction agreed after the 1941 session that the Honorable Oscar Hagen was not only an efficient presiding officer but was absolutely fair. He recognized not only the minority of the senate, but the majority as well and it gives me great pleasure to move that the President appoint a Committee of Two, at this time, to escort the Honorable Oscar Hagen to the rostrum," which motion prevailed.

The President appointed as such committee: Senators Bridston and Stucke.

Former Lieutenant Governor Hagen: "Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Senate: It certainly is an honor to be escorted to the rostrum. I thought I had been around here so long during this session that I was a nuisance in trying to do a little bit of reporting—trying to get some stories to write about, some of the things you folks do here, but you have thwarted me in that attempt because you have not been doing very much to write about!

It was an honor to preside over this body last session—I enjoyed every minute of it. Every Senator was cooperative, the majority as well as the minority. The plain rule that I used in presiding over this body was that the majority must always rule—they have the right to rule in America, and the minority must always be heard—they have that right in America; and that rule will guide a presiding officer through any session.

Now I don't want to take the liberty of talking to you men about much of anything today because I have my own mind made up on most things that are before the legislature today and it would not be right for me to stand up here more or less as a lobbyist. You are meeting under wartime conditions—you are meeting under the conditions of a wave of so-called 'prosperity' which makes your job difficult in both ways. People are working all over the state for less money than they can get along with—less money than they can get elsewhere; it is up to you to see what you can do for them.

You know from experience that when good years come along and we throw our money away carelessly; when we get too enthusiastic about throwing money around, it is true that disaster will follow. So you have a problem on your hands that is worse than during the dry years. We had only one problem then—trying to get the money to carry on, because many of the things you do in this session, when the bad years come again, will be charged to you in spite of the fact that you have done the best you could under the conditions.

So I don't want to take up any more of your time. I wish you the best of luck and I know the Senate is conscientiously and honestly trying to work out the problems to the best of their ability. I thank you."

Senator Foss: "Every county has a man of ability and ideals whose fine influence is felt throughout their county.

We have a man who has given unstintingly of his time in Barnes county to all things pertaining to the welfare of the people of the county and to the development of the state. This young man (he may not seem young to some of you folks but to us in Barnes county he seems a young man) has served in the Senate for several sessions. He is with us today and I would like to have him make a few remarks to the Senate. I move that the President appoint a Committee of One to escort Former Senator Aandahl to the rostrum," which motion prevailed.

The President appointed Senator Foss as a Committee of One to escort Former Senator Aandahl to the rostrum.

Former Senator Aandahl: "Mr. President and Members of the Senate: It is needless to say that it is extremely pleasant to be here and to renew friendships with the former Senators and to meet the new Senators who have come in during the current session.

As I think of this legislative session, I feel that this legislature is probably faced with a more serious problem than is ordinarily true and probably more serious than a lot of us realize upon first thought; but we are laboring under the impact of war conditions and those conditions give a good deal of uncertainty to everything that is being done. We just don't know how the picture may be tomorrow or what the changes might be and because of that fact the members of the legislature have an extremely difficult task to perform.

I have watched the press closely. I have watched the reaction in both the House and the Senate and I still feel as I have always felt that the members of all factions are going to get their heads together—that the difficulties are going to be ironed out and that something really sound and progressive for the state will come in the form of the legislation that is going to be passed by this session. I have full confidence in what the men of the North Dakota legislature are going to do during this session and I wish to extend to you my best wishes and my hope for your success in the work that you have to do."

Senator Young: "In the absence of Senator Day, I have a proxy in which he requested that I have Former Senator Nick Nelson escorted to the rostrum. Nick has been a friend of all of us and I move that the President appoint a Committee of One to escort Former Senator Nick Nelson from Grand Forks county to the rostrum," which motion prevailed.

The President appointed Senator Young as a Committee of One to escort Former Senator Nick Nelson to the rostrum.

Former Senator Nelson: "Mr. President and Members of the Senate: It is good to look back into these good old faces that I have served with so many sessions down here in Bismarck. There is something that I have noticed—I was just over to the House—we are at war—there is a lot of sorrow in most of these families but when I look over the members of the House and the members of the Senate, the faces are a little different than they were away back ten years ago when the drouth was on and it didn't rain; when we did not have any crops and when everybody was in distress. It is a little easier to run the state government, and a little easier to run these farms even if help is scarce, when you can get some returns.

Now I overheard a conversation the other day about two fellows that came from a foreign land and they came by plane, and one of them remarked to the other, "This must be a wonderful, large farm" as they were flying over North Dakota. Sure, North Dakota is just one large farm. And when they came over the state capitol, they said 'Look at that large farmhouse—that poor farm woman must have an awful lot to tend to—look what a lot of bedrooms there are."

I had a few things in mind that I wanted to say. When the boys come back after they have done their bit, and when this war is over, what are we going to do with them? We have to find them a home. We have to find them a farm somewhere. The Governor mentioned it in his message but I don't know whether he thought of this thing or not, but talk is cheap and we have got to finance these boys some way, either through government or individual agencies, and help these youngsters buy these farms. We have too many tenants in North Dakota today—that is the trouble with North Dakota—we need more stuff like the old pioneers.

I am going to wind up by telling a little story. Way back in the seventies, we had a little town in our county by the name of Stickney-it was the end of the Great Northern railway. When my old Dad was over there one day, he saw two covered wagons go through Stickney. He stopped them and talked to them and discovered one of them was an Irish family and the other was a Norwegian, family, hitting for the west. They found out at the land office in Stickney that there was no more land in Grand Forks county so they were proceeding out to Nelson county, to Nash township. That was where the boys had squatted the year before. So the first night they camped in a beautiful coulee, north of Larimore-it was getting late and the sun was down and the oxen were tired. The Irishman drove gray oxen and the Norwegian drove red oxen. They turned the oxen out to feed and the women made supper while the men fixed up a smudge as the mosquitoes were bad. They camped that night and the next day they proceeded out to their homesteads and they got there about sunset, and they did the same thing they had done the night before—turned the oxen out to feed and camped till morning. The next morning they lifted the breaking plow out of the Norwegian's wagon and hooked up the red oxen and plowed a piece of soil, with the assistance of their wives. They worked for two days to build a little sod shack-the women helped carry sod and when that little shack was completed the Irishman and his family had to have a house to live in. the women to trim up the first sod shack and proceeded two miles further west and built a sod house for the Irishman, it took three days to build this one without the assistance of the women. They took the Irishman's oxen and hooked up to the Irishman's plow and broke sod for that house. After three days they had that sod house completed and they went back to the Norwegian's sod house and they were plenty tired. They visited and managed to have a good sleep before the next morning. Then the Irishman loaded up his family and proceeded out to the new home. He hooked the gray oxen to the plow and broke all day with good luck. The Norwegian did the same. That night the Norwegian family walked over

and visited the Irishman and found they had broken an acre and a half a piece. This was good luck. The next morning it was a little colder—it was a little chilly but the Irishman hooked up the gray oxen again to break more sod. What happened? He struck rock. That old oxen heaved into the beam on that plow and broke it. The Irishman got disgusted because that old oxen had broken the beam on the plow. He looked at the plow, looked at the country-saw rock here and a cluster of rocks there—there are a lot of rocks in those hills, and he said 'This is no country for a white man.' He got disgusted just looking at all the rocks. So he rounded up his oxen, dragged the plow up to the cabin and said, 'Mother, load up—we are going back—this is no country for us.' She said 'Don't get so disgusted and so uneasy. Let's stay another week.' 'No,' he said. That old stern Irishman said 'We are going back.' She had to load up and they loaded the wreckage of the old plow and started east. But the Irish mother said 'We can't leave without saying 'Goodbye' to those nice Norwegian people that we have traveled with all this time—you can't be that hard.' The Irishman started to drive the oxen 'Haw Jerry, Haw Billy' and the first thing they were up in front of the Norwegian's home. When the Norwegian came out he saw there was something wrong by their faces. He said 'What is the matter?' They didn't answer at first. The Irish woman had tears in her eyes and the Norwegian said 'You look disgusted.' Then the Irishman said 'We are leaving this country—it is no good.' The Norwegian said 'This is a beautiful country. Look at the beautiful sunsets—this is a good country with plenty of fresh air.' But the Irishman said they were going back. He told the Norwegian to look in the wagon at his broken plow. The Norwegian asked what happened and the Irishman told him how the oxen had broken the beam on the plow. Norwegian said 'I come from a country that is all rockjust rock on top of rock. We will go down into the ravine where we saw some oak. I will take my wagon and my red oxen and we will saw down one of those oaks and cut it into the length of a plow beam. We will whittle off several plowbeams. He talked them into doing it and they went down, taking the Norwegian's tools as he was a blacksmith by trade and they went down there and cut a piece of oak, brought it back and hewed out several plow beams. They bored holes in the wood and attached the Irishman's plow to a new beam. The Irishman put the plow in his wagon and the next morning went back. He hit a lot of rock with the oxen heaving against the beam, but he never broke one because they were made of good old North Dakota white oak.

Now these two old pioneers, they fared well after that. They have wonderful farm homes. They have helped build up their communities with schools and churches. They have helped make this state prosperous for you fellows, and for me to be here today.

If you want me to tell you who the Irishman was, I can do that. If you want me to tell you who the Norwegian was, I can do that. The Irishman that I have reference to is Senator William Watt, and the Norwegian was the late Senator Finger Gronvold. I thank you."

Senator Nelson of Dickey moved that the remarks of Former Lieutenant Governor Oscar Hagen and Former Senators Aandahl and Nelson be printed in the Journal, which motion prevailed.

#### Bismarck

TO THE HONORABLE HENRY HOLT, PRESIDENT, AND TO SENATORS OF THE TWENTY-EIGHTH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 265 of the Session Laws of 1941, I have filed with the Secretary of State the report submitted to me by A. J. Klaudt, as Special Examining Commissioner, and herewith transmit to the members of the Legislative Assembly copies of such report for their consideration.

The facts presented by this report indicate the need for certain corrective legislation, and I would urge your consideration of the following proposals:

Ι

That legislation be enacted to restrain arbitrary action upon the part of the management of the Fire and Tornado Fund in the matter of fixing insurance valuations and also in the matter of declining to carry the full amount of insurance on public buildings which the statutes authorize.

п

That legislation be enacted to regulate the placing of reinsurance to the end that the State institutions and political subdivisions may obtain insurance at the lowest possible cost and that the business may be equitably distributed.

#### TIT

That the coverage to be carried by the Fire and Tornado Fund be clarified to the end that it shall function as an insurance Fund and not as a brokerage agency.

That additional safeguards be provided to insure the safeguarding of elections and the exercise by the people of the right of initiative and referendum to the end that the enforcement of the laws may not be impeded nor unnecessary expense entailed through the filing of fraudulent petitions.

That all employees of the State, including those of the Insurance Department, be brought within the provisions of the budget laws to the end that there may be an effective check upon the expenditure of public funds, whether obtained through the enforcement of regulatory laws or otherwise.

That the provisions of Chapter 109 of the Session Laws of 1941 be clarified.

With reference to the remarks contained herein dealing with the State Fire and Tornado Fund, a careful study of the report of the Special Examining Commissioner convinces me that unless the Legislature takes effective action, the purposes for which the entire state insurance program was established is in danger of being circumvented. The insurance program has proved beneficial to the people of North Dakota. I am a firm believer in the principle of State Hail Insurance, State Fire and Tornado Insurance, and State Workmen's Compensation. The insurance program in North Dakota has been of great benefit to the taxpayers of the state. These benefits should not be dissipated.

Of late, we are hearing once again the cry that was so prevalent in the State a few years ago, the cry that the state should not engage in the insurance business, and that the writing of fire, tornado, and hail insurance, as well as Workmen's Compensation insurance, should be returned to private companies. No stronger argument for the return of insurance to private companies can be advanced than the inescapable conclusions to be drawn from the Special Examining Commissioner's report.

I quote to you from a statement made in the 1940 annual report of the Insurance Department wherein it is said that the fund was established because "it was held that the number of public buildings subject to insurance in North Dakota was so large and so scattered as to warrant the State in conducting its business on the same basis as some big private corporations which have found it profitable to carry their own fire protection."

Unless the Legislature, now, takes effective and affirmative action to prevent the practices which have been prevalent in the Department for the past several years, I fear that the high aims which were the guiding star of those who sponsored the insurance legislation many years ago will be frustrated, and the people of the state will demand the abolishment of the entire program. Let the Legislature now face the facts and take appropriate, decisive, action.

Senator Nelson of Dickey moved that the absent Senators be excused, which motion prevailed.

"I move that the President of the North Senator Bridston: Dakota Senate appoint a Committee of three members to cooperate with a committee from the standing Insurance Committee of the House, if such a committee is appointed, or any House committee that may be appointed to investigate facts, figures and charges contained in the report of A. J. Klaudt, Special Investigating Commissioner, as they relate to the departments under the supervision of Oscar E. Erickson, Commissioner of Insurance. If no House Committee is appointed, or if such a committee should refuse to cooperate, this Senate Committee is authorized to proceed independently and make whatever investigations it deems necessary. It is further authorized to call before it any and all officials and employees of all the departments under the supervision of the Commissioner of Insurance, the State Examiner and the Special Investigating Commissioner and have at its disposal all records in these various departments," which motion prevailed.

And the President appointed as such committee Senators Bridston, Page and Solberg.

Statement by Senator Bridston, which Senator Bridston requested be printed in the Journal:

"Yesterday Mr. Otto Vold, Manager of the State Fire and Tornado Fund and Mr. C. J. Myers, Manager of the Hail Department, addressed letters to Representative Peter-son, Chairman of the House Insurance Committee, demanding a sweeping investigation of charges contained in the report of Mr. A. J. Klaudt, Special Investigating Commissioner. These letters will be found in the House Journal. I charge that these demands were not made in good faith. Mr. Peterson is a member of the same political faction as the officials of the Insurance Department and is considered personally friendly to these department heads. The House Insurance

Committee is apparently controlled by members considered politically and personally friendly to the Insurance Department heads. Mr. Vold and Mr. Myers were careful not to make their investigating demands on the House of Representatives as a whole. They made no such demands on the Senate Insurance Committee or on the Senate as a whole. Mr. President, they were very careful to direct their demands so that any investigation would be conducted by personal and political friends. The whole affair reeks of the kind of politics that we are becoming accustomed to from the 8th floor of the State Capitol."

Senator Greiser requested that he be permitted to present an answer to the remarks of Senator Bridston, to be printed in the Journal and which would be presented to the Senate tomorrow.

Senator Morgan of Walsh moved that Senator Greiser's request be granted, which motion prevailed.

Senator Young requested that the Senate be on the eighth order of business, which request was granted.

Senator Young: "Mr. President: I have a motion to make but I would first like to make a few remarks.

"We have the rare privilege this afternoon of having as a guest, Captain Francis C. Rockey who has been on Guadalcanal for a considerable time and is back because of a malaria infection. He would like to see a democracy at work at home. With him will be the Adjutant General Heber L. Edwards.

"Captain Rockey is a long ways from well. He would like to have the remarks made by him in the form of questions and answers.

"Mr. President, I move that the rules be suspended and that Captain Rockey and Adjutant General Edwards be permitted to make a few remarks before the Senate and that a Committee of Two be appointed to escort them to the rostrum," which motion prevailed.

The President appointed as such committee Senators Young and Braun.

Lieutenant Governor Holt: "General Edwards, I understand that you desire to present a few questions to Captain Rockey."

General Edwards: "While Captain Rockey is not very much afraid of the Japs and that sort of things, he did confess to me that he was a little timid in appearing before Senators. I told him that I had long been that way myself and I understood how he felt.

"Before asking Captain Rockey some question I would like to show you the pamphlet I have here in my hand. At the top of it it states 'Restricted.' It reads 'Fighting on Guadalcanal.' It is an official document which is issued by the War Department and although it is marked 'Restricted,' it will receive general distribution, in the armed forces. In

fact it will be a text book. Now in all the years that I have been connected with the armed forces this is the first time that I have run across instructional material to actual soldiers on how to do it. They say there is nothing new under the sun but I still think this is new. In this pamphlet are quoted excerpts of testimony of officers and men that you gentlemen all know—they are from your home communities and they are in the 164th Infantry. General Marshall has said that soldiers and officers alike should read these notes and seek to apply their lessons; to cash in on the experiences which these and other brave men have paid for in blood.

"Captain Rockey is typical of these officers and men who gave General Marshall's special representative this information. He left here commanding 'A' company on February 10th, 1941, and as he was a soldier who had come up from the ranks, he knew the needs of the soldiers and has done a very excellent job. I have prevailed upon Captain Rockey to say a few words and to answer a few questions.

"Captain Rockey, when did your outfit embark from San Francisco?"

Captain Rockey: "March 18th."

General Edwards: "As I understand it you fellows were in Australia a week before going to New Caledonia. Could you tell us something about Australia?"

Captain Rockey: "We were in Australia a very short time. Our ship went in there and we took in quite a bit of supplies for the air corps in Australia. At the time we went in we understood that Australia was to be our base but after a few days our orders were changed and we were sent to Caledonia."

General Edwards: "Did the entire regiment go in?"

Captain Rockey: "Yes, it did."

General Edwards: "Will you describe your landing on Guadalcanal? Was Henderson Field already taken over by the marines at that time?"

Captain Rockey: "Yes, Henderson Field had been taken over by the marines. They had a defense line set up entirely surrounding the field and portions of the beach. They had a beach head established and therefore we had control of Henderson Field and a small area surrounding it."

General Edwards: "When you come on there were you immediately under fire or did you have a little time to prepare?"

Captain Rockey: "We were told just prior to going in that we would come in under fire but we came in just after daylight. We were supposed to get in at daybreak but our time schedule was a little off so we didn't get in until it was fairly light. We could see the shore line. A grove of trees along the shore made it look quite dark. We proceeded to unload without any incidents taking place—part of the regiment got on the shore and helped the rest as they came ashore. Other parts of the regiment stayed on the ship and unloaded supplies. It seemed peaceful. The area didn't look as though it had been fought over just shortly before we arrived."

General Edwards: "Would you care to say a few words about the Japs—their weapons, their ability to camouflage themselves and as to their methods of fighting?"

Captain Rockey: "The Japs should never be underestimated—we found that out. We knew before we fought them that it would be fatal to underestimate them but of course we had to be shown! We hadn't been there very long though before we discovered that it would not be very smart to underestimate the Jap. Their equipment is very good and their actions are such that you can't tell ahead just what to expect of them."

General Edwards: "I have heard that the Japs use a chant when they come into battle."

Captain Rockey: "Yes, that is right. The Japs seem to need a little bolstering up when they start into battle. It starts in the rear troops that are attacking and as they continue it gets louder and they do an awful lot of hollering and chanting, just as though they figured that by making a lot of noise they would scare their opponents away before they got to them."

General Edwards: "You would say that the methods of dealing with Japs are similar to Indian fighting—the tedious waiting in ambush?"

Captain Rockey: "Yes very much so. They are past masters of it—camouflaging and moving through jungles. They do a very good job of concealing themselves, are very apt in their manner of getting up in trees; tieing themselves in trees; keeping very quiet; letting us go by and then making themselves known from the rear."

General Edwards: "How successful have we been getting up food supplies?"

Captain Rockey: "We have no particular trouble in getting supplies up to the men. There was quite a supply on the island. We brought in a lot also and at no time have we had a shortage of food. When we were on the offensive it was quite a problem getting any hot food up to the men on the line but we managed to get a hot meal up to the men every day. Of course every man carries emergency rations which consist of six small cans of food and then he has one chocolate bar that is equal to a day's ration."

General Edwards: "How did the 164th Infantry like the marines? May I say—what do you think of them as fighters?"

Captain Rockey: "Marines are very good fighters. There is no doubt about that. We were curious about them when we first went in there as to what manner of people they were. We had heard quite a bit about marines and their acts before we went in there with them, but we were still wondering just what manner of fighters they were. We found them excellent fighters and can do the business, and we hadn't been there very long before they discovered that we were excellent fighters and knew our business!"

General Edwards: "Could you tell the Senate something about the terrain and the animals that you might encounter in the jungles?"

Captain Rockey: "The terrain is very mountainous and there is quite a little jungle. Inland it was not all jungle—as probably most people think. There is quite a bit of grazing space and the grass is real tall. In fact, it is taller than a man's head. A man can get lost in the grass. We didn't like

the grass as well as the jungle. We couldn't see where we were going in the grass and in the jungle you had a chance of seeing a little bit. There were quite a few cocoanut plantations right along the shore line and our clear-out had been well taken care of before the war started.

We saw very little of any animal life—the only thing was horses. We didn't run across any wild animals at all. There may have been some there but back in the hills."

General Edwards: "How about the tin cans on the barbed wire that you told about?"

Captain Rockey: "There are a few monkeys and a lot of birds—parrakeets, parrots and several kinds of birds that we didn't know what they were.

The climate is real hot most of the time. The air is quite damp. It rains just about every night and sometimes during the day. Even though we were in the shade of the trees, our clothes were always damp. As soon as we got out into the hot sun, it would dry our clothes out of course to a certain extent but water ran off just the same and the sun was so hot it just scorched."

Senator Nordhougen: "I understand, Captain Rockey, that you took charge of the 164th Infantry. I would like to ask if you had charge of the Rugby boys."

Captain Rockey: "Yes, I was in command of the Rugby organization for about a month and a half."

Senator Nordhougen: "I live at Leeds and we had fifteen boys in that company—the Holmes boys and the Myhre boys, and I just can't think of all of them."

Captain Rockey: "I remember the Holmes boys quite well." Senator Nordhougen: "Squire Holmes"

Captain Rockey: "I knew him very well. He is doing a very fine job."

Senator Nordhougen: "I am glad to hear about that. Do you remember the Myhre boys, Clifford and Raymond?"

Captain Rockey: "The names are familiar but I can't quite remember them."

Senator Nordhougen: "Just yesterday morning I received a telephone call from their father. I was asked to contact you while you are at home and inquire concerning the boys.

Naturally I have been much interested in the remarks made before the Senate, and I am sure they were very much appreciated by all, especially those of us who are interested in the boys of whom you had charge. I am very happy to have heard your report."

Captain Rockey: "I will say that I was only in command about a month and a half. I got to know quite a few of the boys but even in a month and a half I didn't get to know them all well. That was a fine organization. It was a privilege to work with them. It didn't seem like there was any work, no matter how hard, that they were not willing to tackle and carry through to completion."

Senator Young: "I would like to ask how the boys on Guadalcanal feel about the people back home. Do they think we are serious enough?"

Captain Rockey: "This is rather a hard question to answer. It depends a lot on the mail service. If the mail came

through and they heard from the folks at home, they felt as though everyone was doing his share at home, but if something would take place that our mail was delayed for some time, they would wonder if people at home knew a war was on. That was the trend of the talk too. I think they fully realized that everyone at home was doing all he could. They of course had no way of knowing what was going on at home except through their letter from home and some of the papers that they received. It wasn't possible to get the news over the radio very often. We had only one radio that we would pick up short wave with and that was the regimental radio. Usually that would be taken over the regimental radio and then called out to all organizations over the telephone. We had telephone connections. There was guite a bit of the time we couldn't pick up radio news because the Japs are very handy at jamming the air so that it was impossible to pick up news, but when we could get it that news was promptly sent out to all organizations so that they were kept pretty well informed as to what was going on at home and in the rest of the world."

Lieutenant Governor Holt: "Captain Rockey, I am sure I express the sentiment of the entire Senate when I say 'Thank you' for coming here and we are mighty proud of the North Dakota boys and all Americans that are standing

back of you."

Captain Rockey: "It was certainly a privilege to be here."

Lieutenant Governor Holt: "Thank you, General Edwards,

for bringing Captain Rockey over."

Senator Young moved that the above remarks be printed in the Journal, which motion prevailed.

Senator Watt: "I would like to explain a little about this department and have my remarks recorded in the Journal.

We have a number of special funds and business enterprises in North Dakota. The appropriation for this seed department is from a special fund derived from fees for inspecting potatoes and fields of grain so as to have certified seed.

This department collects fees and is sustained by fees collected.

We have another seed department called the 'regular' for which we appropriated \$15,000, where they give service to people for having seed tested. The other one we find in Senate Bill No. 2. This department here contributes some funds to keeping up the 'regular' department so that the appropriation won't go over \$15,000.

Now we have the Seed Department; we have the Mill and Elevator; the Bank of North Dakota; the Poultry Improvement Board; the Attorney General Licensing Board, (and which yesterday turned over a surplus which had been accumulating of \$87,000 and which was transferred to the General Fund); the Hail Insurance; the Fire and Tornado Fund; the State Bonding Fund; the Workmen's Compensation Bureau; the State Twine Plant; the State Tag Plant; the Coffin Plant; the Motor Vehicle Registrar; the State Highway Department; the Game and Fish Department; the Teachers' Insurance and Retirement Fund; the Public Welfare and the Equalization—none of those appropriations come out of the General Fund, but come out of special funds.

Now before we had the 'jackpot' law, the Mill and Elevator, the Bank of North Dakota and all of those funds did not have to come in before the Appropriations Committee. They conducted their businesses as they saw fit, without any supervision except the Auditing Department, so I think that while the 'jackpot' law may not be one hundred per cent

perfect, there is one thing that I have been contending for twenty years and that is that all those departments should submit a budget to the legislature; even if we have no supervision over them, we can at least know something of what they are doing and how they are spending their money.

There was some question came up the other day about the Twine Plant and in regard to a loan from the Bank of North Dakota of \$300,000. That wasn't a loan but permitting them to make a loan if they found it necessary to buy that much material to run the Twine Plant at this time.

For the benefit of the Senators, I think they should bear in mind that these appropriations do not come under the General Fund, but come under special funds in those departments."

Mr. President: Your Committee on State Affairs to whom was referred Senate Bill No. 1, have had the same under consideration—and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Strike out everything after the words "A Bill" and insert

the following in lieu thereof:

For an Act extending the time for filing income tax returns, extending the time for the payment of income, personal property and real property taxes, eliminating interest and penalty on taxes, exempting military income from the income tax to members of the armed forces and of the merchant marine during the present War, and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. MILITARY INCOME EXEMPT FROM THE INCOME TAX.) That all persons actively serving in the armed forces or in the United States Merchant Marine, shall be exempt from the payment of the income tax on all income received from such services, (1) for a period ending on the 15th day of the sixth month after the cessation of hostilities in the present war with Germany, Japan and Italy, or (2) for a period ending on the 15th of the sixth month after discharge from active service; or (3) in case of death of a person while in such active service, for a period ending on the 15th day of the sixth month after an executor or administrator has been appointed for his estate, which ever of the above three periods shall end first.

SECTION 2. EXTENSION OF TIME FOR PAYMENT OF INCOME TAX.) A taxpayer actively serving in the armed forces or United States Merchant Marine may elect to postpone the payment of income tax on all non-military income until the 15th day of the sixth month after cessation of hostilities, or until the 15th day of the sixth month after discharge from such service or in the case of death of a taxpayer before cessation of hostilities, on the 15th day of the sixth month after the appointment of an administrator or executor for his estate, without payment of any penalty of interest.

SECTION 3. EXTENSION OF TIME.FOR FILING INCOME TAX RETURNS.) A taxpayer, who is actively serving in the armed forces of the United States Merchant Marine, outside of the boundaries of the United States, may defer the filing of an income tax return until:

(a) The fifteenth day of the third month after his return

to the United States; or

(b) The fifteenth day of the third month after his discharge from the military service or the United States Merchant Marine, if he remains, after discharge, outside the boundaries of the United States; or

(c) The fifteenth day of the third month after the cessa-

tion of hostilities if the taxpayer remains outside the boundaries of the United States; or

(d) The fifteenth day of the third month after an administrator or executor has been appointed for the estate of the taxpayer, whichever of said dates shall first occur.

SECTION 4. PAYMENT IN INSTALLMENTS.) Any income tax postponed under the provisions of this act may be paid in quarterly installments; the first installment shall be payable on the 15th day of the sixth month after cessation of hostilities and each successive installment at three month intervals thereafter.

SECTION 5. POSTPONEMENT OF REAL AND PERSONAL TAXES.) Any person actively serving in the armed forces or merchant marine of the United States, may elect to postpone the payment of all or part of any taxes levied and assessed against real and personal property owned by him, until six months after the cessation of hostilities without the payment of interest or penalty; provided, if the tax-payer is discharged from said service before hostilities cease, then said taxes shall become due and payable six months after such discharge and provided further, if the taxpayer dies during the present war, then said taxes shall become due and payable six months after an executor or administrator has been appointed for his estate.

SECTION 6. TAX DELINQUENCY.) No real or personal property taxes levied and assessed on property owned by a person actively serving in the armed forces or merchant marine of the United States, shall become delinquent until six months after the owners discharge from the armed forces or in the event the said owner shall die during the present war, until six months after the appointment of an administrator or executor for his estate.

SECTION 7. TAXES POSTPONED AND EXEMPTED.) - The provisions of this act shall apply to all taxes which became due or shall become due on or after January 1st, 1942. SECTION 8. DEFINITION.) The term Cessation of Hos-

3. That the printer's affidavit of publication of the Notice of Mortgage foreclosure Sale in connection with such foreclosure was made by an employee of the newspaper printing the notice other than the printer, publisher, foreman, clerk or bookkeeper of such newspaper.

That no Power of Attorney, or Attorney's affidavit

was filed or recorded as provided by law.

Section 2. That after January 1st, 1944, all proceedings for and preliminary to the foreclosure of real estate mortgages where sales were had prior to January 1st, 1943, shall be deemed valid and sufficient notwithstanding the defects enumerated in Section One hereof.

Under Section 1 in line 18, strike out the figures \$200.00 and insert the figures \$300.00 in lieu thereof.

A BILL

For an act to amend and re-enact Sections 3, 4, 7, 8, 9 and 10 of Chapter 229, of the Session Laws of 1941, relating to the North Dakota State Farm, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

Section 1. AMENDMENT.) That Section 3, of Chapter 229, of the 1941 Session Laws is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

Section 3. So far as it may be possible to so do, such buildings and equipment shall be utilized for the establishment and operation of said Farm. The board shall have authority to make such use and disposal of such buildings and equipment as they find necessary to facilitate the operation of said farm, and the employment of persons who have been or may be committed thereto; and to that end the board may cause such buildings and equipment to be moved to other locations on lands under the control of said board and used in the operation of said farm, or in the farming operations of the Penitentiary. The board may utilize any of such buildings or any of such equipment, that is not needed and cannot be used profitably in the establishment and operation of such farm, at the Penitentiary or at the State Training School, and generally make such disposal and use of such buildings and equipment as shall prevent loss and waste, and result in public benefit.

Section 2. AMENDMENT.) That Section 4 of Chapter 229, of the 1941 Session Laws is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

Section 4. The said Board shall have charge and control of said Farm, and of all property which said Board has received or acquired, or may hereafter receive or acquire, incident to or for the establishment and operation of said Farm. For administrative and operational purposes the said Farm shall be deemed a facility of the State Penitentiary, and shall be operated in connection therewith. The Warden of the Penitentiary shall be the superintendent or chief administrative officer of the Farm. Machinery, equipment, livestock and other property of the Penitentiary and of the Farm may be used interchangeably. The Board may employ such help as may be necessary, and as available funds will permit, and prescribe their duties and fix their compensation. The Board may assign to said farm in any capacity, persons employed in connection with the operation of the State Penitentiary. Such person or persons may be assigned either for full time or part time work, and, in the judgment of the Board, the compensation of such persons may be continued to be paid and charged as it was before they were assigned to work at said State Farm. Until the said Farm has been put into operation, all properties that have been received and acquired by the said Board for the establishment and operation of said Farm may be utilized in carrying on the operations of the State Penitentiary.

Section 3. AMENDMENT.) That Section 7 of Chapter 229 of the 1941 Session Laws is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

Section 7. The cost of transporting persons committed to the State Farm shall be paid as the costs of transporting persons committed to the State's Penitentiary are paid. The cost of care and keep of persons who are committed to the State Farm for the commission of a crime for which they might have been sentenced to the Penitentiary shall be paid by the State out of the funds appropriated for such purpose for persons committed to the State Penitentiary, or out of the funds appropriated in this act. The cost of care and keep of persons committed to said farm for the commission of a crime for which they might have been sentenced to a county jail, but, might not have been sentenced to the State Penitentiary, shall be paid by the county from which such person is committed at the rate of \$1.00 per day per person.

The Board shall have authority to enter into an arrangement or agreement with the proper authorities of the Federal Government, whereby persons convicted of a crime in the Federal Court of this State may be committed to said Farm. Provided, however, that persons convicted in the Federal Court shall be committed and admissible to the said Farm only if the term of sentence is not less than 30 days nor more than one year.

Section 4. AMENDMENT.) That Section 8 of Chapter 229 of the 1941 Session Laws be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:—

Section 8. Whenever such Farm shall have been equipped with facilities sufficient to be put into operation, the Board shall notify the judges of the district court and of the county courts with increased jurisdiction that such Farm is ready to receive prisoners. Thereafter, the judges of the district courts, and of the county courts with increased jurisdiction, may commit thereto, so far as the capacity of the Farm shall permit, all male persons who otherwise would be committed to the County Jail or to the State Penitentiary for violation of any criminal law of this state, where the sentence is not less than thirty (30) days nor more than one year. A person committed to the State Work Farm shall not be deemed to have been convicted of a felony, but shall be deemed to have been convicted of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT.) That Section 9 of Chapter 229 of the 1941 Session Laws be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:—

SECTION 9. The laws relating to compensation, the merit system, good time and extra good time, and the imposition of penalties for misconduct provided by law for persons imprisoned in the State Penitentiary, shall be applicable to persons committed to the State Work Farm, except in so far as they may be inconsistent with the provisions of this Act. Where a person who has been committed to the Farm conducts himself in such manner as to interfere with the operation of the farm, or with the welfare or safety of others, and where in the judgment of the board the best interests of such person or the best interests and welfare of other persons committed to the farm so require, the board may direct that such person be removed from the farm and

placed in the State Penitentiary. The board, may, also, direct that persons who have been sentenced to the penitentiary be transferred to the Farm, when such action seems desirable and in the best interest of the person so transferred, and in no manner detrimental to the welfare of other persons that have been committed to the said Farm.

The board may cause persons committed to the said Farm to be assigned for work incident to the operations of the penitentiary, or of any other institution under the control of the

said Board.

Section 6. AMENDMENT.) That Section 10 of Chapter 229, of the 1941 Session Laws, be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

Section 10. There is hereby appropriated the sum of \$50,000.00 out of the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay for the establishment, and operation of said Farm, and the maintenance of the persons committed thereto, for the biennium beginning July 1st, 1943, and ending June 30th, 1945. There is, also, hereby appropriated for the same purposes all moneys received from counties and from the Federal Government under Section 3 of this Act, during said biennium.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

Every Wholesaler licensed to do business in this State, shall on or before the 15th of each month, make an exact return to the State Tax Commissioner of the amount of beer bought by him within or without the State during the previous month in the manner and form as shall be prescribed by the State Tax Commissioner and the State Tax Commissioner shall have the right at any time to make an examination of the said Wholesaler's books and of his premises, and otherwise check the accuracy of such return. Any Wholesaler who fails to make the return to the State Tax Commissioner shall be liable to a penalty of not less than Fifty dollars (\$50.00) per day for each day of delay. Any Wholesaler who refuses to allow such examination, or fails to make an accurate return according to the manner prescribed, shall be guilty of an offense and shall be liable to a fine not exceeding One Thousand dollars (\$1,000.00). With such return, the said Wholesaler shall pay to the State Tax Commissioner the amount of tax upon all beer which shall have been bought by him during the previous month, less leakers and breakage in transit and tax exempt Government sales. Provided, that the tax on all beer transferred or resold by one Wholesaler to another for sale within the State shall be paid by the Wholesaler receiving such shipment in the same manner as though received direct from a Brewery and the Wholesaler making such transfer shall be credited with the tax thereon and provided further that Wholesalers licensed in this State and also operating in adjoining States who receive beer from Breweries or any other source and which beer is sold outside the State, shall receive proper credit for the tax thereon. Any penalties or fines collected under the provisions of this Section shall be paid over to the State Treasurer in the same manner as the license fees are remitted.

They are officered by our own WAAC officers and are taking over the non-combatant jobs of the army. General Eisenhower has stated that every man released by a WAAC will go forward directly into the front line of the war, where the fighting is going on —that is one of the main purposes of the WAAC's—to release non-combatant jobs to send men to the front.

Two weeks ago, the figures officially released by Mrs. Hobby show that we now have thirty-one thousand WAAC's. We are recruiting four thousand women a week throughout the United States and we expect to reach our authorized strength of one hundred fifty thousand by the end of 1943.

If you know of any young ladies eligible to join the WAAC's, I wish you would encourage them. We need them. The army must have them. Where they have gone, they have proven their worth and we are sure that we are going to make everybody who has voted for us, very proud of us—we are doing a good job. Men are now going forward into combat duty who have been released by the WAAC's. You all know that the only way to win a war is to put man against man, plane against plane and tank against tank, and our WAAC workers are helping. We are extremely proud of our sex in being able to do something in this war effort and it is a grand opportunity for anyone who is able to join. I thank you for listening."

Senator Brunsdale arose to a point of personal privilege. Senator Brunsdale: "I would like to ask the unanimous consent of the Senate to make a statement regarding the action taken yesterday with regard to Rule No. 31.

Yesterday by our vote, which was a majority vote, we excluded the remarks of a Senator from the Journal. This conflicted, in the opinion of many of the Senators, with Rule No. 31, which states that: 'and upon request a member may have his remarks upon any question taken and extended on the record.'

Now it is not my purpose, Mr. President, to debate this issue all over again—in fact I never did debate it, but my purpose is to inquire as to what the Senate wishes to do: Do they wish at this time, to interpret Rule No. 31 by the action taken yesterday or have a new rule adopted?"

Senator Stucke moved that the above matter be referred to the Committee on Rules, to clarify it, which motion prevailed.

After the word "Officer" in line 2 of the printed bill insert the following: "on information obtained in cooperation with local officers and boards," In line 6 strike out the period and the remainder of the section and insert the following:

"and the City Auditor of all cities having a population in excess of 15,000 persons. Each County Auditor and City Auditor must place the matter before the governing board of the county and or city at their next regular meeting, and the governing board must by resolution either adopt or reject the plan at the same or the first subsequent meeting.

If resolutions are adopted by the governing boards of the cities and counties as hereinbefore provided, adopting the health district plan, all laws and parts of laws in conflict herewith shall automatically become inoperative throughout the territory embraced within the district, and particularly the laws relative to city, village, township and county boards of health; provided, that if the board or boards of county commissioners, or the city council or city commission of any city, reject the plan, it may submit the question of adoption of the provisions of this act to the electors of the county or city at the next ensuing general or special election to be held in said county or city. In all elections held under the provisions of this act the vote cast in cities having a population in excess of 15,000 inhabitants shall be considered separate and apart from the vote cast in the balance of the county, and the participation in the health district by cities shall be governed by the votes cast in the city as distinguished from the vote cast in the balance of the county. If a majority of the electors vote in favor of the adoption of the provisions hereof, the board of county commissioners shall, within ten (10) days after the canvass of said election, adopt such resolution, and, upon the adoption of such resolution such county or counties, together with the cities voting in favor of the plan, shall be considered a district health unit or health district. On a petition filed with the County Auditor containing names of electors of the county equal to ten percent of the votes cast for Governor at the last general election, an election on the question of forming a health district shall be held as heretofore provided. The health districts shall follow county lines, and in case the district as outlined by the State Health Officer includes more than one county, and the plan is adopted in any of said counties or cities, and rejected in any one or more of the other counties or cities, it shall become effective in the county or counties and city or cities adopting the plan, if in the exercise of his discretion the State Health Officer deems the same operative, provided, however, that district or State health officers shall not resort to or be allowed to resort to compulsory vaccination or inoculation.

In line 53 after the comma strike out the words "one of whom shall be a physician, one a dentist, one a business or professional man, one a farmer, and one a womah, who shall be appointed for terms as follows:" and insert in lieu thereof the following words: "all of whom shall be appointed for terms as follows:"

In section 4 line 72 after the comma insert the following: "subject to removal for cause by the District Board of Health, and"

In line 76 after the comma insert the following: "or has the recommendation of the State Health Officer,"

In line 121 of Section 6 after the word OFFICER. All expenses actually and necessarily incurred by the District Board of Health in carrying out the provisions of this act, shall be audited and approved by the President and Secretary of the Board and certified to the County Commissioners of the County in which such fund is retained, and shall be paid the same as other county expenses are paid."

"SECTION 12. DISSOLUTION.) After a District Health Unit as provided in this Act has been in operation for two years the same may be dissolved in the following manner: On a petition filed with the County Auditor containing names of electors of the County equal to ten percent of the votes cast for Governor at the last general election, an election on the question of dissolution shall be presented to the people at the next general or special election held in the county. If a majority of the votes cast favor dissolution, the health unit shall be dissolved on July 1st following the election. Every person trespassing in violation of this section, shall, in addition to any penalty hereinafter provided, be liable to pay to the owner or tenant in possession of the land upon which the trespassing occurred, liquidating damage in the sum of \$25.00 for trespassing, to be

The State Seed Commissioner shall within one year make such tests as he shall consider necessary and if he finds as a result of such tests that such seed or plant is of a new variety distinct from any variety of such seed known theretofore, and that the name proposed therefor will properly distinguish said seed from any and all other varieties thereof, he shall issue to the person applying therefor a permit to designate such seed by said name.

Senate Bill No. 167. A Bill for an Act to Amend and Reenact Section 4, Chapter 291, of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the Year 1941, Relating to Unfair Trade Practices

Which had been read.

Senator Braun moved that Senate Bill No. 167 be amended as follows: After line 21, insert the following:

"Provided further, that if any prices established in conformity with the terms of this Act shall be higher than the "ceiling prices" now in effect or which may hereafter be established by the Office of Price Administration during the war now in progress, then the prices thus established under authority of the Federal Government shall be the highest that may be charged by any person, firm or corporation doing business in the State of North Dakota;

The term "prices" shall be deemed to cover what is known as "ceiling prices" and also any limitation that may be established by Federal Law affecting what is known as "the mark-up" allowable over wholesale cost of merchandise as defined in Chapter 291 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for 1941 as amended hereby", which motion prevailed.

Senator Braun moved that the rules be suspended and that Senate Bill No. 167 be considered properly re-engrossed and placed on Second Reading and Final Passage, as amended, which motion prevailed.

## REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Mr. President: Your Committee on Insurance to whom was referred Senate Bill No. 127, have had the same under under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

In the title of the Bill strike out the word "permit" and substitute therefor the word "require".

Strike out all the matter following the words "Section 1" and substitute therefor the following:

"From and after the first day of August, 1943, the Commissioner of Insurance is directed and required to procure and he shall keep in force a policy or policies of excess Catastrophe Insurance against the hazards of fire and windstorm on all property insured in the State Fire & Tornado Insurance Fund. Such Catastrophe Insurance shall insure the said Fund against any loss in excess of \$100,000.00 arising from any single catastrophe, as that term is defined in the usual policies of Catastrophe Insurance, against the hazards of fire and windstorm, except in the case of so-called fire proof buildings in protected areas, rated by the Fire Underwriters Inspection Bureau as Class "A" or "AX" risks, and as to such risks, such protection shall be afforded as to the hazard of windstorm only."

"Section 2. On or before the second Monday in July of 1943, and of each odd numbered year thereafter, the Commissioner of Insurance shall publish in the official newspaper of Burleigh County, North Dakota, a notice that on the last Monday in July the Insurance Commissioner will accept bids for such Catastrophe Insurance at his office in the City of Bismarck. A copy of such notice shall also be posted at the office of the Fire and Tornado Fund. A schedule of all properties insured by the State Fire and Tornado Fund shall be made available by the Insurance Commissioner to any person, firm or corporation who may request the same. On said last Monday in July of each odd numbered year, the Commissioner of Insurance shall contract for such excess Catastrophe Insurance from the Company or group of Companies submitting the lowest, responsible and qualified bid therefor for the two-year period commencing on the ensuing first day of August."

"Section 3. If, for any reason, it is found impossible to secure Catastrophe Insurance exactly according to the stipulations in Section 1 of this Act, the Commissioner of Insurance may make whatever changes are necessary in these stipulations in order to secure catastrophe bids from insurance companies. Provided, however, that no loss shall be covered by such Catastrophe Insurance below \$100,000.00. Provided, further, that if the Commissioner of Insurance should find that insurance companies would not include the State Mill and Elevator, the twine and cordage plant or any other extraordinary risks of like nature owned by the State of North Dakota or any of its political sub-divisions, he may secure re-insurance on such risks, over \$100,000.00, through separate bids in similar manner to that provided in Section 2 above."

"Section 4. No company shall be permitted to assume a share of such Catastrophe Insurance risk in excess of the amount permitted by law based upon the assets and liabilities of said company.

"Section 5. All Acts or parts of Acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed."

And when so amended recommend the same do pass. FRANKLIN PAGE, Chairman.

Senator Page moved that the report of the Committee on Insurance on Senate Bill No. 127 be adopted and be printed in the journal without reading, which motion prevailed.

Prayer for the deceased members by Rev. Laten E. Teare, Church of Nazarene, Bismarck, North Dakota.

Senator Flatt moved the adoption of the Joint Memorial Resolution in memory of the following former Senators: Late Senator Albert Garnett; Late Senator McArthur; Late Senator C. W. I. Morkrid, Late Senator Robert J. Gardiner, Late Senator F. T. Gronvold,

Late Senator Arthur W. Fowler, and the late George A. Matthews who represented the territorial Council, which motion prevailed.

Representative Aker moved the adoption of a Joint Memorial Resolution in memory of the deceased House members, which motion prevailed.

Governor Moses was then introduced by Lieutenant Governor Holt, and called upon for a few remarks.

Governor Moses: "Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Members of the 28th legislative assembly of the State of North Dakota: Frankly, Mr. President, I did not expect to be called upon when coming in here today. I have no particular message to give except that I feel that we today who are meeting to do honor to the memories of the men who have served the State of North Dakota in the legislativee forum, the men who have given in years gone by so freely of their time to serve the state that it is a most fitting and a most proper thing that the members of this legislature, busy as you are during these closing days of the session, that you meet here as citizens of the state to offer a prayer in the memory of men who have served in the past, many of whom were your close friends and comrades. I am very happy, Mr. President, to be afforded an opportunity to be with you during this memorable service. I thank you."

The memorial address was given by Rev. Stewart of Mandan.

Rev. Stewart: "Governor Moses, Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Members of the Senate and the House, Ladies and Gentlemen: Over the entrance of one of our great educational institutions in Washington, D. C., you will find inscribed these words: 'What we have done for ourselves alone, dies with us—what we have done for others and the world remains, and is immortal'—and so this afternoon as we pause for a brief period to honor the memory of those who have gone before, it is well for us to consider those who have made their contributions for their nation, their state, their communities and for others who have left their footprints on the sands of time.

National holidays, such as the two that we observe in the month of February, are commemorating the anniversary of the birthday of George Washington, the 'Father of our country', and Abraham Lincoln, the Great Emancipator. These national holidays, as I say, remind us of the marvelous story of the inauguration of our great America—the marvelous story of the preservation of our country during the dangerous days since America was given to us.

One hundred and sixty-six years after our great country was given to us, the world was plunged into a terrific war and we are today striving to maintain the ideals and the principles laid down by these great men: Washington, Jefferson; and their compatriots in the days that have gone.

Some one has said that George Washington and those who were associated with him, in giving to us what we have today, were the most selfish, the most greedy men that we can find in any record in the annals of history. They wanted the best of everything for themselves.—They wanted liberty

and freedom and justice, not only for themselves but for posterity.

These men who founded our great country, believed that there existed both right and wrong, but that righteousness was supreme. These men who founded our nation believed that some things were true and some things were not true. They believed not in the material things alone. As we sing—it is true that they loved the 'rocks and the rills' of our great country, still they believed in the intangible things that would preserve and perpetuate our country. They believed that mankind was greater than institutions. They believed that the ideals and the principles as laid down by the Master of men when he said 'All things whatsoever Ye would that men should do to you, do Ye even so to them'. These were the principles and the ideals upon which our great nation was founded.

John Adams, I think it was, who said as he spoke to the generations that were yet to come, 'You do not know the suffering and the sorrows that we have endured in giving to you and to posterity the freedom that we have'. And he said: 'I will repent before High Heaven if you do not make good use of these immortal services upon which America was founded'.

Our forefathers not only believed in the great principles and ideals but they believed in great achievements. They crossed rivers, they went over mountains and plains, they organized immigration and with their faces toward the setting sun, the Star of Empire rolled on until it reached the Pacific Ocean. These men, and these women, who pioneered our great country had many hardships to overcome. Many obstacles were in their way-savages and savage beasts and many other things were on their trail but they went on with these same principles in their heart. And as they came westward, one by one, they planted another star in the red, white and blue, and one day in the year 1889, (over fffty years ago) North Dakota took her place in the great commonwealth and the brotherhood of the states and we joined with the other states of the Union in a great and glorious conquest of liberty and of justice and of truth.

These men who came into our state and made it possible for us to enjoy what we have today, were men just like the forefathers, just like George Washington and Abraham Lincoln, they wanted to establish a state 'of the people, for the people, and by the people' so that every man regardless of his station in life, whether rich or poor, high or low—regardless of his material possessions could enjoy the blessings of America and of North Dakota and it is to the memory of these men, who founded our great state, who came across these prairies. who upturned the virgin soil, who blazed the trails, who built churches and schoolhouses and who gave to us the heritage that we have—these are the men whose memory we honor. They gave freely of thir time and of thir talents for the best interests of our state. They found within this state, some of the most fertile soil in the whole United States. They developed the resources of our coal and of our clay. They established institutions of learning for our children and churches for the moral and spiritual upbringing of the citizens. We, in North Dakota, have all

these blessing and these privileges because these men who have gone before us, who have endured the hardships, have given to us these great legacies of freedom and of justice and of liberty. As I said, just a little while ago, we would always honor the memory of those who today are on the battlefronts of the world and some of our boys, some of our husbands and sons and brothers have made the supreme sacrifice. How gallant they are in the battle. How devoted they are to the principles that our forefathers laid down and they stand before us today as the supreme example of patriotism. May we honor their memories today as we pause in the midst of our lawmaking and as we think of what others have done for us and may this brief hour that we have spent here together be an hour that we will long remember because we have paid to these who have gone before and who are fighting for the principles that we love so well. May we continue to accept the challenge of those who would take away from us all that we have fought for and all that we have espoused and may we carry on the work and the burdens of today. I thank you."

The license shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in which the license is issued unless revoked as provided by this chapter. The license shall be in book form and shall contain the license number, the name and address of the licensee, and shall provide space to be filled in by the dealer for the date of purchase of motor fuel, and from whom, and the number of gallons purchased.

Prior to the expiration of a license to purchase tax exempt motor fuel, the licensee shall file with the state auditor a statement made under oath of the amount of tax exempt motor fuel purchased, the date of purchase, and the price paid. There also shall be attached to such affidavit the dealer's receipt with a detailed statement of all other motor fuel purchased during the period covered by the license subject to a motor fuel tax and delivered in bulk by the dealer to the place of residence of such purchaser.

## REPORT OF SELECT COMMITTEE

REPORT TO 1943 LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE JOINT HOUSE AND SENATE COMMITTEE AP- POINTED TO INVESTIGATE THE METHODS OF THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE OLD AGE ASSISTANCE LAWS

In 1935, the Legislature passed an Act for the appointment of a Public Welfare Board consisting of seven members to be appointed by the Governor, Attorney General and Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor, and in turn provided for the appointment of County Welfare Boards to be jointly appointed by the State Welfare Board and the Board of County Commissioners of each county. The provisions of this Act can be found in Chapter 221 of the 1935 Session Laws.

In 1937, the Legislature passed an Old Age Assistance Act, being Chapter 211, providing for the granting of old age assistance on a basis of need in the sum of \$30.00 per month, one-half of such amount being furnished by the federal government.

In 1938, an initiated measure was passed by the people providing for a minimum of old age assistance on a need basis of \$40.00 per month. This is found in Chapter 257 of the 1939 Session Laws.

This measure also provides that the amount of ASSIST-ANCE SHALL BE SUFFICIENT WHEN ADDED TO ALL OTHER INCOME OF THE RECIPIENT TO PROVIDE SUCH PERSON WITH A REASONABLE SUBSISTENCE COMPATIBLE WITH DECENCY AND HEALTH, BUT SHALL NOT BE LESS THAN A MINIMUM OF FORTY WHERE PERMONTH THERE ONE RECIPIENT, AND THIRTY DOLLARS PER MONTH FOR EACH RECIPIENT WHERE THERE IS MORE ONE RECIPIENT IN A FAMILY. STATE AND COUNTY FUNDS UP TO THIS TIME. HAVE NOT AVAILABLE TO PAY MORE THAN AN AVERAGE OF ABOUT \$20.00 PER MONTH PER PERSON.

At the present time, the federal government provides one-half of the amount granted to each person. The State furnishes 42.5 per cent of the whole, and the counties furnish the balance of 7.5 per cent.

As of October, 1942, there were 9,391 people receiving old age assistance, with an average payment per person per month of \$18.88. As of January, this number had decreased to 9,177 persons, and the average payment per person had increased to \$19.30 per month.

The lowest average paid by any county was Hettinger

County with \$12.72 per month. The highest average paid by any county was Barnes with \$23.80 per month, leaving a spread of \$11.08.

On November 11, 1940, a North Dakota plan for a low-cost diet was sent to the County Welfare Boards by the Director which provided for a budget of food amounting to \$5.19 per month, or approximately 17 cents a day.

On November 21, 1941, this budget was revised and provided for \$6.51 a month, or 22 cents a day. On October 10, 1942, notice was sent out to increase the food budget 17 per cent above the budget of \$6.51 a month. This continued until the commencement of the present investigation. Since that time, a notice has been sent out increasing the food budget about fifty per cent.

All of the County Welfare Boards were asked to appear before your Investigating Committee. All of them did come except four or five. Your Committee has been impressed with the hearty response received from the County Welfare Board members, who appeared before us to answer our questions and gave us the information we were seeking. The people who serve on these Boards are performing a duty imposed upon them as citizens of this State, and we believe those who have been performing that duty should be commended.

From statements made by them, much confusion appeared to exist on the part of the local Welfare Boards in the administration of the Public Welfare law. Some of them have the understanding that the budget and instructions sent out from the State Welfare office were mandatory, and that the federal government would not approve anything higher. Some disregarded the budget instructions and were suffered so to do. The result is the disparity in old age assistance grants between the different counties.

This condition should not be permitted to exist and must not be permitted to continue. In the State of Nebraska, the disparity between the counties is in the neighborhood of only about \$5.00 per month. A. E. Poe, Social Security Board Regional Representative of Minneapolis, appeared before your Committee and made it clear that the disparity between the counties in North Dakota should not exceed five or six dollars per month.

It also appears that there has been no uniform policy of giving the information to those requesting old age assistance, advising them if their applications are denied or if they are dissatisfied with the amount of the grants made that they may appeal to the State Welfare Board from the decision of the local Welfare Board.

In 1941, the federal board made out an Administrative Review Report for the State of North Dakota growing out of its investigation of the counties of McLean, Burleigh, Stark, Adams, Ward and Grand Forks. This report covered the methods employed by the county in taking and handling applications for old age assistance under rules and regulations promulgated by the State Welfare Board, as well as the methods of supervising the duties, authority and actions of County Welfare Boards as regards fair hearings for those requiring old age assistance, notices of the right of appeal and the activities of the district supervisors sent out by the

State Welfare Board to supervise the County Welfare Boards.

This Administrative Review Report contained many sug-

This Administrative Review Report contained many suggestions for improvement for bringing home to the applicant the fact of his right to appeal in all instances and to make the procedure in his behalf more workable.

Such report was submitted to E. A. Willson and his staff in the month of May, 1941, and was also discussed with them by the representatives of the federal government.

Representatives of the federal government appeared at the meeting of the State Welfare Board held in May, 1942, and learned that the Administrative Review Report had not been submitted to the Board for its consideration and action.

The members of the State Public Welfare Board receive no compensation for their services. Only their actual expenses in attending the meeting of their Board are paid. They have been in the habit of meeting approximately once a month, and at each meeting are in session on the average of about one day. The Board has under its supervision the administration of a volume of business approximating the amount of three and one-half million dollars per year. One member of the Board has not attended the sessions for the last several meetings. One member of the Board resigned several months ago, and the vacancy has not been filled. It is apparent that the absent members could not have been conscious of their responsibilities in the matter of the administration of the Public Welfare law. Short sessions necessarily give the inference that it has been impossible for them to give the necessary consideration to the various matters concerning assistance to the needy aged, and the adoption of such methods of administration as are found to be necessary for the efficient administration of the law for such assistance and guarantee suitable standards and the procedure to insure uniform and equitable treatment of all applicants for old age assistance.

It appears that in the month of December, 1942, the State Welfare Board made a readjustment of salaries, including raising the salary of the Executive Director to \$400.00 per month, and increased the salaries of the others about fifteen per cent, whereas no other department of the State government was able to make so sweeping salary adjustments under their appropriations.

This shows that the State Welfare Board should more closely supervise the problem of reducing their expenditures. No suggestions were made by E. A. Willson, the Director, for reducing the administrative costs although the commodity stamps are to be abolished within the next month, as are also the National Youth Administration and the Works Projects Administration, thus doing away with three departments.

At the present time, the financial affairs of the County Welfare Boards are examined about every ninety days by an auditor employed by the State Welfare Board. No provision is made for the county executive secretaries to give receipts for the funds collected back from relief clients or other sources.

This method of examination should be changed and put under the jurisdiction of the State Bank Examiner, who examines all of the county offices. Chapter 244 of the 1941 Session Laws defines the duties of the State Welfare Board. That Chapter makes it a mandatory duty of such Board:

- (a) To take such action and make such rules and regulations as may become necessary to entitle the State to receive aid from the federal government for assistance to the needy aged in North Dakota.
- (b) To supervise the administration of assistance to the needy aged throughout the State of North Dakota.
- (c) To take such actions, give such directions and promulgate such rules and regulations as may be necessary or desirable to carry out the provisions of the law, including the adoption and application of suitable standards and procedures to insure uniform and equitable treatment of all applicants for old age assistance.
- (d) To prescribe the form of and print and supply to the county agencies blanks for applications, reports and such other forms as it may deem necessary and advisable.

Chapter 221 of the 1935 Session Laws provides that the State Welfare Board shall appoint an Executive Director who shall devote his entire time to the duties of his office.

The Social Security Act makes the Executive Director responsible for the preparation of budget estimates, plans for operation, and reports to the State Public Welfare Board, and to keep such Board informed as to trends in the operation of the programs and problems arising.

In advance of the recommendations of the Committee to be hereinafter made, reference may be made to the fact that A. E. Poe stated that any budget for food, clothing or other matters adopted by the State Welfare Board could be filed with the Department at Minneapolis, and if such budgets were followed by the State Board, its action would be entirely agreeable to the federal government whether the budgets be higher or lower than those in force at the present time, with the proviso that the federal government would not pay to exceed fifty per cent of a forty-dollar monthly grant.

In 1941, there was appropriated by the Legislature for old age assistance from July 1, 1941, to July 1, 1943, approximately \$2,193,000. There was included in this, county funds to the amount of \$153,000.00.

On July 1, 1943, there will be available approximately \$500,000 of Federal, State and County funds which could have been used during the preceding period in the increase of grants to old age recipients and which can be used during the balance of the biennium ending on July 1, 1943, in the increasing of such grants.

An Appropriation bill has been adopted by the Senate during the present 1943 Session appropriating approximately \$3,000,000 for old age assistance for the biennium beginning on July 1, 1943, and this amount, if approved by the House of Representatives and signed by the Governor, plus the contributions from the county and federal governments will

make a total approximate sum of \$6,450,000 available for old age assistance during the two years beginning July first next. This amount will furnish an average minimum grant to the old age recipients of some \$30.00 per month in the place of the present average of \$19.00 per month, and will give to many \$40.00 per month where there is need.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

Your Committee recommends:

- 1. That the State Welfare Board immediately convene and formulate instructions and orders to the County Welfare Boards, ordering each County Welfare Board immediately to have the cases of the old age recipients under its jurisdiction forthwith re-examined, and that it immediately upon the completion of such examination raise the average monthly grants to its old age recipients in maximum sums consistent with the appropriations made and to be made, as based upon need; nor should any old age recipient be penalized for working at part-time jobs, nor is it a violation of federal regulations, as was so stated by A. E. Poe.
- 2. That the State Welfare Board perform the duties imposed upon it by Chapter 244 of the 1941 Session Laws, as well as any amendments thereto that may be adopted by the 1943 Session of the Legislature.
- 3. That any member of the State Welfare Board who fails to attend three meetings in succession should resign.
- 4. That the Governor, Attorney General and Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor should immediately fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Jack Patterson, and each subsequent vacancy as it occurs, so that each meeting may be attended by a full membership of the Board.
- 5. That the Executive Director perform the duties imposed upon him by law in such manner as to carry out the spirit of such law, act as the Secretary of the State Welfare Board and execute the orders and directions of such Board.
- 6. That if the Executive Director or any deputy who may be appointed to assist him fails or neglects to perform the duties of his office, then the State Welfare Board should immediately remove him from office and fill the vacancy.
- 7. That the State Welfare Board should direct and order the secretaries of the County Welfare Boards to act in a kind and courteous manner toward and in handling the cases and troubles of old age recipients and applicants.
- 8. That the State Welfare Board should direct and order each County Welfare Board, in the case of its secretary failing to act in the capacity of secretary of such Board or in performing the duties of his office and acting with a spirit of kindness toward old age recipients, to remove such secretary from office and fill the vacancy with one who will comply with these recommendations.
- 9. That the State Welfare Board cause the Executive Director to include a mimeograph copy of this report to each old age recipient with the next check, so that each individual may have actual knowledge of the findings and recommendations made by your Committee.

10. That a mimeograph copy of this report and recommendations be immediately mailed to each member of each County Welfare Board in the State.

Former Senator Skarvold: "Mr. President and Members of the Senate: Or is it a cemetery? You have heard the story about the little boy who was visiting his father over in the House who said, 'Let's go over to the cemetery.' He meant the Senate. But it is not that dead or quiet over here. At least today, I have been impressed with your activity.

We should try to cultivate a sweetness in life. It helps to take some of the sting out of our existence. We should try to see the cheery side more than the gloomy and one of my sweetest memories dates back to the time when I was a member of this body. I like to think of the friendships that I made here and the interesting incidents connected with the legislature. Some of us at times, were in a painful condition of a hopeless minority but it is a consolation to know that the minority is quite often right, while the majority is often wrong. Ibsen says that 'the majority is always wrong,' which I don't believe. But he says also that the strongest man is the one who is able to stand mostly by himself, which I believe. Emerson has also expressed the same sentiment when he says that 'it is the easiest thing in the world to live according to the opinion of the world and it is easy in solitude to live according to your own opinion but a great man is one who with perfect sweetness in the crowd, can keep the independence of solitude,' and I believe he is right. I find in world history, a great deal of the time that the majority has been wrong. That is why we have so many errors repeating themselves. We don't seem to learn from history and that is why history repeats itself. Now when I talk about Emerson, he always said that we should live according to our own opinion. This may not suit the politicians—but you are not politicians, you are statesmen, so of course I don't offend anybody here by referring to that statement of Emerson's.

We are today facing one of the most crucial periods in world history and it has cast a gloom over most of our American homes. We have some difficult problems ahead of us to solve. It is a question of democracy and if we are going to win this war, and there is no question but what we will win this war—and I hope we will win it soon, it means that every one must sacrifice and it means that we must

have less profiteering and less racketeering, and I wish to say that the racketeer—the profiteer, the scheming diplomat and the crafty politician has no place in our war program and he should have no place at the peace table after the war is over. There is more to winning the war than simply sending our boys to the front and fighting on a battlefield. We perhaps, have been overlooking the fact that it is just as necessary to do our share at home in the line of production of food. This is very essential in winning the war. If we are going to fight, we have got to eat and in order to eat, we have to produce, and in order to produce we must have the manpower and we must have the machinery and I think it is a good idea as has been started in Congress that we ought to try to get some of our boys back on the farm for a furlough so that they could help in our agricultural pursuits during the coming summer.

Now I did not come here to make a speech and I know you are busy and I am not going to take up much of your time. It has been said that we live in an age of hypnotism—that we are hypnotized by words—that we have a greater flood of words than any other period in the history of the world. We have a flood of words that come from the press and over the radio; and we are misled by these words. We have a great deal of false propaganda and it is no wonder there is a great deal of confusion, and I am not going to add to the

flood of verbiage that we already have.

I am very pleased to have been with you—to meet the old members, though there are some faces missing that I used to see here and that I would like to meet again. I thank you."

- (d) Record of performance breeders; annual license fee, \$10.00 plus 5¢ per pullet candidate over 100 birds entered in R. O. P. Work.
- (e) Poultry and/or turkey feed manufacturers, whole-salers and retailers; annual license fee \$1.00, plus 50¢ per ton for all'mixed poultry feeds produced or sold in the State of North Dakota. Provided, that the Poultry Improvement Board shall collect license from only one source, and if the fee is paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler, it shall not be collected from the retailer. A person shall be deemed a retailer who sells poultry and/or turkey feed to the ultimate consumer.

The objections raised by Mr. Kelsch speak for themselves. It occurs to me that possibly there is yet time for the Legislature to correct the apparent errors in this bill so as to meet the objections raised by the Assistant Attorney Gen-

eral.

For that reason I return the bill to you, in the hope that the necessary corrective steps can still be taken.

## COMMENT:

I have disapproved House Bill No. 84 as to form and validity for the reasons:

- 1. That the title only pertains to the salary of clerical help.
- 2. That Section 4 of Chapter 168, S. L. 1919, as amended in the body of the act, also covers the salary of the Coal Mine Inspector, while the title is silent with reference to the salary of such inspector.
- 3. That the body of the act is broader than its title in that it also fixes the salary of the Coal Mine Inspector and not only the salary of clerical help.
- 4. That it is elementary that an act, the body of which is broader than its title, is void insofar as it transcends its title (Divet v. Richland County, 8 N. D. 65).

I would therefor advise that this bill be returned to the Speaker of the House and that the title of the act be amended so as to read "pertaining to the salary of the Coal Mine Inspector and his clerical help."

Such licensed weight shall be stenciled on both sides of the truck or tractor truck, as the case may be, in letters and figures not less than one inch in height, as follows: N. D. Legal Gross Wt. (here follows figures designating the licensed weight in pounds). The tare, or unloaded weight, of each truck, tractor truck, semitrailer or full trailer, shall be stenciled upon both side of each unit in letters and figures not less than one inch in height.

Section 2. AMENDMENT.) That Sub-section (e) (1) of

Section 2 of Chapter 194 of the Session Laws of North Dakota for the year 1941, is amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

(e) (1) Motor vehicles which are used by the owner of such vehicle for the transportation of farm or agricultural products of such owner from the farm where such products are produced or grown to the market, or the transportation of goods of the owner of such vehicle from the market, or from the nearest livestock market to the farm of such owner; and motor vehicles which are used for the transportation of any and all property between the farms and the usual local trading places and between the farms and the nearest livestock market of the person for whom such transportation is performed or between farms locally; and motor vehicles which operate exclusively within the corporate limits of any city or village, or within two miles thereof; and motor vehicles of six thousand pounds registered gross weight or less, shall pay the registration fees provided for in Schedule B herein. provided that any such motor vehicle, except a motor vehicle used for the transportation of farm or agricultural products or a motor vehicle operated exclusively within the corporate limits of any city or village or within two miles thereof shall receive the license plate provided for vehicles registered under Schedule A. Trucks used by star and rural mail under Schedule A. Trucks used by star and rural mail carriers in the course of their duties in the delivery of mail and equipped with special auxiliary equipment for use in snow and mud and equipment used exclusively for well drilling and house moving shall be charged a license fee of Three Dollars (\$3.00) per annum. All other trucks, including commercial and non-commercial trucks, except vehicles used for the transportation of passengers, shall pay the license fees provided for in Schedule A.

Section 3. EMERGENCY.) This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

# MESSAGE TO THE SENATE

Senator Flatt: "Mr. President: Last evening Senator Watt was honored at a dinner and presented with a traveling bag-some very becoming remarks were made at that time to remind him of this Senate body, and this afternoon we presented the Lieutenant Governor with a lifetime pen and pencil set, and he took the plane to Minneapolis. Now tonight, Senators, we have just an ordinary sort of people around-people who deserve some recognition.

As we sit on this side of the Senate Chamber we have a good view of that section on the other side of the chamber. I don't know what they call themselves but we on this side are proud of being the 'renegade section'. In the middle of that section over there sits Dr. Stucke. We always look upon Dr. Stucke as the wheelhorse of that section, but we have looked to him in that capacity for so long we are no longer interested. As he told me the other night, he doesn't care for any more publicity—he gets so much while he has been down here that it takes him all summer to get it out of his system! But we have one Senator over there who is always in his seat. 97½ times we vote on opposite sides. He told me the other night the only trouble with me is that I am ignorant—he votes right all the time! But nevertheless to-night, it is my pleasure, in behalf of the Senate body and the employees, to present Senator Streibel with a little present."

Senator Streibel: "Mr. President: Having worked in this body for four years, I am satisfied that my colleagues will not think too badly of me if I open this gift before saying 'Thank you'!

I am taken unaware and I don't know what to say, especially having to speak extemporaneously. I want you to know I am very appreciative. I don't know why they picked on me, unless it is because I always voted wrong, but after all I think this is about all I can say—Thank you!"

Senator Morgan of Walsh: "Mr. President: It has always been the custom of this body, I think, to present the President Pro Tem with a little gift and to say a few kind words about him. I am here tonight to perform that very pleasant duty. Not because it is the custom, but because I think I speak the sentiment of every man in this body when I say that it has been a long time since the Senate of the State of North Dakota have had a more able, a more conscientious, or a fairer President Pro Tem than we have had this year. There is not a man in this body who has not, at some time this session, gone to the President Pro Tem for counsel and advice and whether he be of the other political faction or of the faction to which the President Pro Tem belongs, I believe that advise has always been fair and kind; and Senator Brunsdale, on behalf of the forty-eight Senators before you, I present this little token of our esteem and affection."

President Pro Tem Brunsdale: I have been in the Senate several sessions and strange as it may seem, I don't recall that the President Pro Tem was ever presented with any kind of a material tribute. I did have an idea that something like this was in the wind some time ago when Senator Raschko came around and wanted to know if I would not contribute a dollar towards getting a gift for some of those who were holding positions in the Senate. And as a surprise to him, I flashed a ten dollar bill and he couldn't change it, so he didn't get the dollar. Later he told me that he had made a mistake—he was not supposed to collect from the President Pro Tem. So I was not entirely surprised when this was brought up to me but I feel grateful to the Senate body for the gift given me and for the word you have expressed thru one of your members, Senator Morgan of Walsh.

I assure you that it has always been my aim to be fair and to deal justly with all men regardless of political factions or my feelings towards them and especially when I am acting in some official capacity. I know for example that one or two men came to me and asked if a suspension of rules requires a two-thirds vote and I said that I was sure it did. I was not at all alarmed when he used that rule against me—he was entitled to that and he had a perfect right to use it.

Speaking of the minority, in a democratic form of government, we must have it. If we didn't have a minority we would have no democratic form of government. That is illustrated in several countries of the world today. You see it in Germany under Hitler; you see it in Norway under Quisling, who is under Hitler—these countries have no minority, only a majority—they have no democracy. The same thing might happen in a legislative assembly. If we over-ride the minority in any way we are destroying the foundation of the minority, so I have not done anything that was not my duty when in every way I was willing to show fairness to both sides and I hope that I have done that. If I haven't, in any way it was not intentional, whether with the majority or the minority.

I didn't know anything about parliamentary law. I had never presided at any session of this kind. When I have been in the legislature before I was never asked to come up

here and I don't know what kind of a mess I have made. I felt as long as it was your wish that I be President Pro Tem I had better learn something about parliamentary law and fundamentals of parliamentary law.

I assure you that I am very appreciative of the sentiments you have expressed. I thank you."

Senator Thatcher: "Mr. President: This may be a little out of the customary but I think that speaking for the minority faction here, I have a right to say that the minority faction of this Senate joins heartly in the expressions that Senator Morgan of Walsh gave relative to our President Pro Tem. We feel the same way as the majority does that he has been fair and honest in all his rulings."

Senator Stucke: "The members of the Senate and employees have delegated to me the most agreeable privilege of presenting to you, Milt Young, this gift. It is very easy and pleasant to throw bouquets of roses to our friends who have honestly and sincerely differed from us. You, Senator Young, not only during this session, but ever since you became a member of this body have proven yourself able, courteous and fair. What better attributes would endear one to his associates in this body. This has been a rather peaceful session, coming at a time when the world is in chaos. The decorum that has been observed here is, in a measure, due to your sense of fairness and leadership. Let us hope that by the time we meet again that peace and good will shall have come to this world, and you, Senator Young, we wish you God speed and good luck."

Senator Young: Mr. President and members of the Senate: I wish to thank you from the bottom of my heart for this present. I find it impossible to find words to properly express my appreciation, especially as it comes from the Senate as a whole, from the majority, the minority and the employees—and the kind remarks of Senator Stucke of the minority.

I think the minority has contributed more than any session since I have been here, to good legislation. They have been honest and fair and their criticism has been constructive. The years that I have been here have contributed much more to me than I have contributed to the Senate. It has given me a liberal education and a better understanding of men, and the best friends that I have ever known. It is not easy for me to go home after session and readjust myself. Although I don't have a chance to visit with all of you as often as I would like, there is the feeling that you are here and when I want to visit with you, I can.

I doubt if I would have taken this job of majority floor leader if I had not known of the ability in the Senate. I know of no other time when the chairmen of the Senate committees have had as much ability, and the membership on the various committees. It was no task for me to perform my duties as floor leader. And you haven't seen me on my feet very often. The decisions of every one has been exactly as he believed and not influenced by anyone else. Again I thank you and I shall keep this gift always in memory of you."

Senator Flatt: "Ruth Smith and I were named a Committee of Two to pick out these gifts. We didn't have much money—not as much as in some former years but it is not

the intrinsic value of the gifts, but the thought behind the gifts that counts. As Dr. Stucke would say "The gift without the giver is bare", but he can quote Shakespeare and I can't. I hope you receive these gifts, not in dollars and cents but in the spirit given."

said what I wanted to without offending anyone. I have enjoyed the work. It takes me away from home where I would like to be but we can't have everything. If I stayed at home, I couldn't enjoy the benefit and pleasure from the associations that I have made here.

As I look around the Senate I don't see many here that were here the first years I came. There are only four or five, that were here when I first came. Senator Watt was a member; Senator Porter was here the first year and then dropped out but he is back again. He stays young so he will be here for many years. I am getting older so I will have to ouit some time.

Anyway, as I said before, my greatest reward is the companionship and fellowship that I have enjoyed since I came here. I don't know how to express myself any further but I think that an old story about a minister fits the case. One of his parishioners presented him with a large jar of pickles which she had put down in wine. He said that he valued the pickles very highly but it was the spirit in which they were given that he valued the most. I want you to know that it is the spirit which you have shown me since I came here that I have enjoyed—it is certainly an honor to be selected for the office of President Pro Tem by the Senators from the various counties. I thank you."
