FIRST DAY

Bismarck, January 4, 1955

At the hour of twelve o'clock, meridian, the fourth day of January, 1955, being the day and hour designated by law for the convening of the legislative assembly of the State of North Dakota, the members-elect of the House of Representatives assembled in the House Chamber in the State Capitol Building at Bismarck, North Dakota, and were called to order by V. L. Gilbreath, Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives of the Thirty-third legislative assembly of the State of North Dakota.

The session was opened with a prayer by Rev. F. V. Tannehill of the McCabe Methodist Church, Bismarck, North Dakota

south of Fargo in Richland county and educated in the Moorhead and Fargo schools.

You may have wondered why he has such a booming voice and such control of his lungs. I just found out why he has that masterful control—he got it in his training as a bugler in World War I, when he served in France. If there are any members of any veteran's organizations who served with him, they will not be surprised by the noises they hear now.

This man first came to the legislative session in 1930, and has served continuously with the exception of the black year when the Democratic regime won out and he was left alt home. He got his early training under that veteran legislator who is known to all in the history of North Dakota, Late Twichell.

Unbeknownst to many people, this man is also an extensive farmer in the State of North Dakota. He operates over six hundred acres in the Red River Valley and where he raises prize sheep. He is also a business man; vice president of the Warner Company of Fargo. This individual is a past master at parliamentary procedure. He is tolerant, and he has never let party politics enter in where Justice should prevail. I am happy and proud to place in nomination the name of that veteran legislator, that friend of all the people of North Dakota—Ken A. Fitch.

Rep. Baldwin: Gentlemen: After Fay has spoken these knowing words concerning Ken, I don't believe I have learned a great deal that I didn't know before about Ken. I do know many things—many of them complimentary but a few are not, and he knows those same things about me so we will leave those things out! Certainly those of us who came here from Cass county are so very thoroughly imbued with the idea that Ken Fitch can do a splendid job for the State of North Dakota. We know from past experience his willingness to do a job. In the name of those from Cass county, I am happy to second the nomination of Ken A. Fitch.

Rep. Rohde: I also have the honor to place in nomination for Speaker, the name of a man whom we all know down here. A man of great ability—a man that started as a pioneer in the State of North Dakota during the pioneer days; a man that has raised a fine Christian family and also has been a substantial farmer; and a man that can serve the whole state of North Dakota, who will serve all the people of the State of North Dakota very well in the Speaker's chair. I know there were a lot of fine words in the nomination of Rep. Fitch, that I can also use for the man I am about to place in nomination for speaker. I have in mind my friend and colleague, Rep. Mollet. I wish to place his name in nomination.

Rep. Rolfsrud: Mr. Chief Clerk, I wish also to state that we have here a friend of ours who has farmed in the State of North Dakota all of his life. He has been in the House for nine sessions. He is a man who has gone through thick and thin—through good times and bad times in the State of North Dakota. He is a man who has the ability to handle the major problems facing the State of North Dakota at this time. As I see it that is MONEY, MONEY, MONEY. Where is all the money going to come from? In Mr. Mollet we have a man with the mind to understand

how to make the dollar go the farthest. We also have a man who symbolizes the good will and the hospitality of the northwest corner of the state, and the western part of the state. Without friendliness and without cooperation there can be no progress.

So it is a pleasure for me to second the nomination of Joe Mollet.

Rep. Erickson of Burke-Divide: I would like to second the nomination of a fellow member from the northwest quarter of North Dakota. I have worked with him for many years on the Finance and Taxation Committee and I have always found him to be able and fair.

It gives me the greatest of pleasure to second the nomination of Joe Mollet.

Rep. Sticka: Realizing that the candidate whose name has been submitted to this House by Rep. Brown of Burleigh County is from the other end of the state, I rise to second that nomination. I also realize that the population of the State of North Dakota is made up of people in all walks of life, and we, in the livestock and farming business, (and when I say "business", I mean that, because that is what it is), certainly welcome the opportunity to second the nomination of a livestock man from the Red River Valley. And therefore, members of this House, it gives me a great deal of pleasure to extend a cooperative hand across the State of North Dakota, from the West to the East. For that reason I am very happy to second the nomination of Mr. Fitch.

Rep. Beede: Mr. Chief Clerk, I also want to second the nomination of my old friend, Joe Mollet. We came down to the legislature, I believe, in the same year. While I have been out, he has been here continuously during each session, and each session that I have been here too, my respect for his fine qualities has increased. He is a man of ability; a man of sincerity; and a man of honesty. And I feel that it is a privilege to second his nomination.

Rep. Trydahl: It is only fitting that Grand Forks county should join in seconding the nomination of Kenneth Fitch. I have known Kenneth Fitch for a number of years. I would like to say that I think we could have found a fine speaker from Grand Forks county but I also know that Kenneth Fitch will make one of the finest speakers we have ever had. MESSAGE TO THE 34th LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY AND BIENNIAL REPORT TO THE PEOPLE OF NORTH DAKOTA

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Senators and Representatives of the 34th Legislative Assembly. Mr. Chief Justice and Justices of the Supreme Court, State officials, Ladies and Gentlemen:

INTRODUCTION

As provided in the Constitution in Section 75 it is the duty of the Governor to "communicate to the Legislative Assembly by message, information of the condition of the state, and recommend such measures as he shall deem expedient." Conforming to that mandate I appear before you today as you are assembled in joint session. To be able to serve the best interests of the state I will need your assistance and cooperation, and especially during this Legislative Session.

May I first of all congratulate you upon your election to membership in this Assembly. You were elected because the people in your districts had confidence in you and that you would represent them ably and conscientiously. You have also received a mandate that you will further and

support legislation that will promote the welfare of the state as a whole. To pass intelligently upon all legislation introduced will require much time and study. If during the next sixty days you will do your best, you will leave at the end of this session with a certain reward that you have been a good legislator.

A number of problems incident to various phases of our government will confront you in greater degree during this session than in several sessions of the past. Among these are those of an economic and a financial nature. The income of state government is always dependent upon net income of the people of the state who pay taxes.

AGRICULTURE

The production of our farms in 1953 and 1954 was a disappointment to most of the farmers and those in business who are dependent on the farm trade of our state. It is true that certain crops fared well. However, the grain crops, particularly in 1953, were seriously damaged by a virulant type of rust known as 15-B, with the result that excepting two varieties of wheat, and those had to be seeded early in the season, most of them did not produce a return which would pay the cost of harvesting. However, in both years a substantial amount of feed and forage were produced.

In 1953 there was exported out of the state thousands of tons of hay to the drought stricken states farther south. A year ago last December I was told by people in Missouri that more hay had come from the State of North Dakota into that state than from any other state. So, we were fortunate that we did not suffer the ravages of drought such as that state and other adjoining states experienced in both 1953 and 1954.

Our Agricultural Experiment Station at Fargo, realizing the seriousness of the rust damage to durum wheat in 1953, was successful in increasing the yield of one variety of durum which although not proof against 15-B rust may demonstrate itself to be of superior quality. In 1955 it is hoped that until better strains are available Sentry durum will be of some assistance in the production of a durum crop which this year and last year was far below the national consumption of that wheat.

The Experiment Station also has been doing considerable research and is working on varieties of hard spring, and durum wheat as well, that will be, we hope, proof against the ravages of serious rust damage. As a result four varieties of durum wheat have been sent to Arizona for an increase in production to the extent that in a limited way they will be available for further testing and increase here in 1955. If present indications are born out by 1956 most of the durum farmers of North Dakota will have a sufficient supply of seed provided the increased crops raised this winter in the states mentioned will produce the yields that are hoped for. In the meantime as legislators we should request the Congress to permit our durum growers at least to be freed from acreage limitations on durum wheat.

The State Emergency Commission appropriated sixty-five thousand dollars for increasing the production of what now appears to be rust resistant durum wheats. Out of its general appropriation the Station also will be able to increase the production of one or more hard wheats that appear promising at this time. It is the intention, of course, that this seed will be sold to growers and the greater part of the production distributed among farmers of the state in 1956. As heretofore this will be done on a basis which will return to the state the cost of the Emergency Fund allocations.

In the fall of 1953 with a Canadian variety of bread wheat known as Selkirk, which had been raised on the experiment seed farms in a limited way in 1953, and also from a supply received from Canada, which developed it, it was possible to distribute a sizable amount of Selkirk wheat to the farmers of North Dakota. In 1955 there will be a small distribution to representative growers all over the state of this new wheat. By 1956 it is also hoped that this variety of wheat will assure the farmers of better yields of a wheat that will be at least greatly resistant to 15-B rust. In the meantime, and as always before, our Agricultural Experiment Station and Agricultural College is doing research work on both wheat and feed grains, with the hope of securing or producing varieties of seed that will increase the yield and improve the quality of these grains.

It is noteworthy the farmers of our state who have followed the best methods in soil conservation practices, coupled with good management and adequate farm credit have and will continue to fare well in their operations. Every county in the state belongs to some Soil Conservation District. To one who has been away from the state for twenty years or more the change is more apparent than to you and to me who have lived here during these years and seen this gradual development. As long as we receive an adequate supply of moisture for our crops, our pastures and our ranges, a diversified agriculture in North Dakota in cooperation with the use of good soil conservation practices should make a fair return to the owners of the soil provided prices of agricultural production are in reasonable parity with cost of production.

As I have stated on more than one occasion, the years of drought will return, and as stated in this message we are fortunate that the drought that has visited states to the south of us in several instances now for three years or more have to a great extent not done serious damage in North Dakota except in limited areas. However, if we do not prepare for the future by the means that are at hand, or will be available to us in a few years, we may suffer again the consequences of severe drought damage.

Before years of drought return again I hope we will be far enough along in our water conservation program so that to a large area in this state, which has seriously been affected before, water will be available for at least a limited acreage of every farmers' land that can be irrigated. Thereby he may raise at least feed and forage and a small cash crop to carry him over years of serious drought.

MISSOURI SOURIS CONSERVANCY AND RECLAMATION DISTRICT AMENDMENTS

Under the Pick Sloan plan of development of the water resources of the Missouri Basin, provision was made for furnishing water for domestic supply, municipal use, irrigation and industrial development. The original plan called for diversion of water out of the Missouri River below Fort Peck. Because the land in that immediate area in North

Dakota was found to be non-irrigable, the diversion for the above purposes, and particularly for irrigation, as now proposed will be out of the Garrison reservoir immediately above Garrison Dam, through the Snake Creek Canal. Sufficient surveys and soil analyses have been made to indicate that possibly a million acres of land can be irrigated from the waters led through this canal.

At least twenty-one counties will be the direct beneficiaries eventually of this great water supply if and when utilized. The Missouri Souris Conservancy and Reclamation Act passed by the 31st Legislative Assembly, being Chapter 347 of the Session Laws of 1949, provided for fifteen counties within the conservancy district. Because of improved plans and diversion from the Garrison Reservoir, several additional counties should be included, the total being twenty-one in number. A Missouri Souris Conservancy and Reclamation Committee will have legislation to propose for changes in the 1949 act as a result.

If the State of North Dakota is going to be benefited by the waters of the Missouri River for the purposes I mentioned, it will be necessary that until irrigation districts have been formed that a portion of the overhead in connection with the building and operation of the canal and other facilities which will convey these waters shall be cared for at least in part. Thus from a maximum levy that can be made, amounting to not to exceed three mills, adequate revenue can be produced to satisfy the Congress that there is a desire on the part of the state to take advantage of the type of development that irrigation can play in North Dakota. From information I have gained in appearing before Congress and from statements made by members of Congress and of the federal government, I believe that without some assurance that we intend to avail ourselves of the irrigation potentials, it is possible that the waters that rightly we can claim under the Pick Sloan Plan for this purpose may be utilized by others downstream, and perhaps lost to us forever. I strongly urge you to support the amended conservancy act which will be submitted to you for consideration.

In this connection it may be noted that the federal agencies have requested from the federal members of the Missouri Basin Inter-Agency Committee and the states in the Basin a reappraisal of the benefits and the uses of waters in the Missouri Basin. If we are unable to show that we intend seriously to make use of these benefits, Congress very likely will not appropriate the funds needed for starting a program of irrigation.

As I have more than once stated, it is not my desire, it is not my wish that we are going to convert the dry land farmer of North Dakota into an irrigation farmer. True enough, there will be those who will want to take a comparatively small tract of land and rely entirely upon irrigated agriculture. But, in the main I believe that the greatest benefits of irrigation to the dry land farmer will be on such acreage as will give him an assurance of production so that his livestock herds can be carried over and that he can have at least some cash crop in years of severe drought.

When drought arrives, and especially as it has in states to the south of us for three or more years in succession, remember water cannot be led to those lands in a hurry. We must plan for the future. If we plan today it is not

likely that any irrigation districts to be supplied from the Garrison Reservoir diversion will receive water before the year 1961. Therefore, I deem it imperative that we at this time make a small beginning that will assure those in responsible positions in the federal government that we have an interest and will prosecute the development as far as it lies within our power and at least furnish the revenue to take care of part of the overhead until irrigation districts are developed. In this connection funds for an experimental irrigation farm should be provided by the state.

THE NEEDS OF INDUSTRY

You have heard it said more than once, I am sure, that there are some definite essentials for industrial development. To some extent they are (1) natural resources that will promote that kind of development; but aside from those there must be available to the industrialist (2) an adequate supply of water and of electric power, or the wherewithal to produce it. The third essential is that of an adequate labor supply. We will have within a very short time adequate power and adequate water in the Missouri Basin. But, industry which will employ large numbers of people will be unable to locate here in spite of the advantages of power and water. If we can keep on our farms the boys and girls who are raised here and know this land of ours and its opportunities, through a system of assured agricultural production, through the use of adequate waters brought upon the lands, we will find that an adequate labor supply can be made available for industry and a more intensified and diversified agriculture.

Of course, first of all industry will concern itself with processing our agricultural production. Related industries can and will follow.

We have a few small manufacturing plants in the state and we have, of course, one industry that is the result of a fortunate development of our natural resources, and that is coal. In my judgment the time is not too far removed when the lignite coal of North Dakota will come into its own and will employ a sizable number of men in related industries as well as in the ever increasing electric power production.

As a result of oil development we have today a sizable refinery already in operation across the river, in Mandan, which will be utilizing about thirty thousand barrels a day; and two smaller refineries, one at Williston and one at Dickinson, which together will make use of about five thousand barrels a day. Fortunately the oil development and the construction of refineries, pipelines, etc., alleviated to a great degree unemployment among our people, although at the present time many of these people are unemployed locally.

Although every week new wells are coming into production and oil leases that have been made are gradually being exploited, unfortunately adequate reserves to make possible a crude oil outlet from these fields so far have not been proven. It is hoped that new fields will be discovered which will produce those reserves before long; but until they are found, the allowable production per well will be gradually curtailed below the highest potential provided for by law or regulation.

If we didn't know it before, by now we have learned that the high cost of transportation is a deterrent to maximum oil production unless the price at the well head is substantially reduced. Hence a crude oil outlet is essential to trans-

port oil production out of the state.

In spite of handicaps since its discovery oil development has been of material assistance from an economic point of view, not only to the areas in which exploration and development has taken place, but also to the state as a whole. Any inducements that you as legislators can give to furthering this development will pay big dividends to North Dakota in the future. At this stage I do not believe that it would be in the best interests of that development to increase the severence tax on oil production as much as the state is in need of additional revenue.

TAXATION, FISCAL POLICIES AND FINANCIAL BUDGETS FOR 1955-1956

If you will read the introduction to the report of the Budget Board for the biennium beginning July 1, 1955 and ending June 30, 1957, you will find that the total of all budgets approved for the departments of government, the institutions of an educational, charitable and penal nature, in fact all the functions of state government, come within sixty-three thousand dollars approximately of the estimated income for the next biennium. Obviously this is too small a margin for a surplus in the General Fund. Note that these budgets that I have referred to are from the General Fund.

As you examine the individual budgets you will find that with minor exceptions no increase of salaries is provided; that there is very little of funds made available for new personnel; that the budgets approved for new buildings are few and comparatively speaking involve a small sum of money. Among them are a dormitory for the state school at Grafton amounting to a half million dollars for which other recommendations are made later in this message, and a new water plant at the State Hospital at Jamestown.

It is true that demands for additional appropriations by departments and institutions for personnel and salary increases, and for buildings and facilities appeared essential in many instances, but the money was not there to pay for them. The Budget Board had no recourse but to trim the requests to fit the General Fund income of the state.

To be entirely frank, I must tell you that the General Fund income of the state does not include an increase of the state levy on property beyond two mills heretofore levied. The Budget Board was of the opinion, and I agree with their conclusions, that a reserve equivalent to the proceeds from a two mill levy on property is essential. Estimated income projected two years in advance requires a substantial reserve to offset unfavorable contingencies. Besides, the July 1, 1955 General Fund surplus includes \$2,636,718.62 which may not be available under Chapter 82 of the 1953 Session Laws until two or more years later. In figures it looks like this: Budgets approved in their entirety are approximately \$28,997,000.00. Estimated income is approximately \$25,570,000.00. Taking into consideration the surplus that is estimated in the General Fund as of July 1, 1955, and amounting to about \$3,490,000.00, this will leave about \$63,000.00 at the end of the next biennium, too small a surplus for the safety of the General Fund.

The requests from special funds were approved to the extent of \$44,196,233.37.

The General Fund surplus over the years has been a

fortunate windfall. It has financed most of the State's building programs at its educational, charitable and penal institutions up to this time amounting to about 15½ million dollars. It has provided a \$5,000,000.00 soldier bonus reserve fund. It has now furnished \$16,290,000.00 for highway construction; and because of increased costs and the necessity of raising salaries and paying increased expenses of departments and institutions of the state, it has been able to care for all this quite adequately. Now, contrary to past years, the surplus in the General Fund no longer will be available for such purposes or any increase in appropriations unless new revenue is provided or the General Fund is relieved of some of its customary appropriations.

Aside from a two mill increase in the state levy, income to the General Fund for 1955-1957 is dependent upon prosperous statewide conditions in agriculture and business. Income to the fund has been decreasing the past two years, particularly the income tax, although the rates of our income tax have also been lowered in the meantime.

Further, the General Fund is called upon to bear expenditures of a local nature in the per capita cost of inmates, pupils, patients at the State Hospital, Feeble Minded School, Blind School, Deaf School and the Tubercular Sanatorium. At the State Hospital the counties pay per capita a monthly charge of \$45.00 less their prorata share of the liquor tax. The cost per patient is in excess of \$2.50 per day. An increased charge should be made to the county. Other institutions are similarly affected by increased costs.

By increasing the counties' contributions at these institutions to more nearly actual cost per individual the General Fund will be spared what is and should be a county burden.

Although not related to this subject, legislation should be passed amending the voluntary admission law to our State Hospital. At present the privilege may be abused and often results in needless expense and futile service of personnel.

HIGHWAYS

Chapter 82 of the 1953 Session Laws appropriated and transferred to the General Fund under certain conditions, subject to approval of the Industrial Commission when funds become available from the Collection and Land Department of the Bank of North Dakota, \$5,136,718.82 to be used for matching federal funds for the construction of highways. There was also appropriated \$1,500,000.00 from the undivided profits of the Bank which has been transferred. Of the former \$2,000,000.00 has been transferred. Thus there will remain from the first amount \$3,136,718.62 for future use in highway matching. Such funds cannot be available for two or more years. In a sense this is a surplus which becomes available when earned; but it must be noted that in the July 1, 1955 General Fund surplus, as noted before in this message, \$2,636,718.62 is made a part thereof.

Beginning July 1, 1955, the Bureau of Public Roads of the Federal Government will allocate to North Dakotá on a 50-50 matching basis for construction and reconstruction of state highways approximately \$15,124,000.00 for the following biennium. There will remain about \$10,500,000.00 unmatched at the end of the 1955-57 biennium unless new funds are provided. At the last General Election two measures were submitted to the people which would have provided somewhat in excess of \$5,000,000.00 annually of the funds needed to match federal aid allocations. However, these measures failed of passage and we are now where new revenue must be provided if the State is going to meet federal allocations.

A subcommittee of the Interim Legislative Research Committee has been working on this problem and will have some legislation to submit on the subject. Among these there may be a bill to extend the anticipation certificate law another two years, being Chapter 82 of the 1953 Session Laws. This could provide about \$1,500,000.00 per year. However, outstanding certificates will take most of the income for the first year of the biennium beginning July 1, 1955. Undoubtedly again \$1,500,000.00 of the undivided profits of the Bank of North Dakota could be utilized for the same purpose as was done under Chapter 82 of the 1953 Session Laws. I do not believe that any funds of any consequence will be available out of the Collection and Land Department of the Bank of North Dakota for the ensuing biennium. However, eventually there will be available \$3,136,718.62 as referred to previously in my message.

The State's greatest problem is in the improvement of twenty-four hundred miles of the secondary system. With only about \$1,650,000.00 of federal funds available for the entire state secondary system, these roads will wear out before the job is finished unless more money is made available.

People voted down the one cent non-refundable motor fuel tax on November 2nd last for building these twenty-four hundred miles of more or less local type of roads. I hope the Research Committees' recommendations will solve, in at least, the construction of these roads. A recommendation of another cent refundable tax has some merit. Tightening the tax collection of diesel fuel when used in motor vehicles is sorely needed and should add revenue.

It is possible to utilize the Equalization Fund for certain educational appropriations that otherwise will have to be paid out of the General Fund, thus releasing once again some General Fund money for matching in part the federal allocations for the construction and reconstruction of highways.

I know there may be objections to this method. However, surplus funds do not exist except for use. They are essential in tiding over the expenses of government during times of low return. However, no one can defend piling up a surplus raised by taxation when it is not to be used more or less currently. To allay the fears of those concerned, I do not believe that this Legislature or any Legislature will pass legislation to the detriment of the education of our boys and girls. If any appropriations have precedence or ever have had precedence over others it is the appropriations for educational purposes at the grade and high school level.

I hope you will give serious consideration to the recommendations of the Interim Legislative Research Committee in the matter of matching federal funds for the construction of highways, although their recommendations will not come forth with sufficient tentative revenue to match entirely the allocations available to the state.

HIGHWAY SAFETY

Closely tied in with the construction and reconstruction of highways is the matter of safety to the drivers of motor vehicles upon those highways. The design of a completed new highway if made to conform to specifications of the Bureau of Public Roads in itself will assist materially in the elimination of fatalities to people using those highways. If you will read the report of the fatalities in 1954 you will find that on U. S. No. 10 running through the state for over three hundred and fifty miles there have been eleven fatalities (December 15, 1954). This road carries more motor vehicles than any other highway in the state. On the other hand, Highway No. 2 not so well improved, had twenty-one fatalities. If you will check the location of other highway accidents and fatalities you will find comparatively short lengths of old state highways, county highways, or township roads where proportionately more accidents and more fatalities have resulted. Fatal accidents to December 15, 1954, on state highways were 61% of total; county, township and city streets were 39%. In 1953 these figures were 68% and 32% respectively. Our county roads had 41 fatalities up to December 15, 1954. Undoubtedly without safety supervision on the county level the figures indicate there will be a larger percentage of fatalities on county roads in the future.

During the 1953 Session legislation was passed to provide for the appointment of a Highway Safety Director. As a result of his efforts and the stepped up enforcement program of the Highway Patrol progress has been made in spite of more highway traffic than in the preceding year. However, one man and one assistant for part time cannot accomplish wonders in a hurry. And, the Highway Patrol, under-staffed as it is, cannot do the job that must be done.

Several highway safety conferences have been held in the past biennium. I believe that they have been instrumental in impressing upon the people attending and those they may influence the importance of practicing safety on the highways. The press, radio and television have been of substantial assistance in promoting the safety program as well; and the state is indebted to them for that assistance.

Safety on the highways, safety in the factory or in business establishments as well as safety on the farm requires a great deal of education. The Workmen's Compensation Bureau has been at this for some time and through its safety department has been instrumental in reducing fatalities and injuries. You can read the reports and see that that is so.

The Highway Safety Director, Mr. R. C. Hill, has been diligent in promoting the practice of safe driving, speaking to citizens, organizations, schools and in fact anyone who would listen. The attendance at these meetings has been excellent. Gradually more schools are giving a driver training course. I believe every school offering four years of high school can profit by a course in safe driving and in driver education. An increased program of highway safety will bring dividends in the reduction of fatalities. In addition, legislation based upon recommendations offered by the Automotive Safety Foundation will be submitted through a committee to this Session of the Legislature. I hope you will give serious consideration and pass such legislation as seems necessary and beneficial.

HIGHWAY PATROL

During the past biennium the Highway Patrol has stepped up its enforcement program by concentrated drives in scattered localities where the traffic appeared to warrant it. It has been done by placing additional men on designated highways, taking them away from their usual beat, particularly on weekends. At the request of the Superintendent, Clark Monroe, the Emergency Commission saw fit to appropriate from the State Contingency Fund sufficient money to care for this added expense. This, added to the educational efforts of the Safety Director, I believe has reduced excessive speeding on our state highways. Perhaps there has been a reduction in other traffic violations such as drunken driving and reckless driving, too.

This program has been accomplished not only by increased monies allotted to it, but also by more hours on duty for the patrolmen involved. There are times when these men have spent not only twelve but sixteen hours, and at times even more on duty, too long a day for anyone. Besides that they are on call at any time during the twenty-four hours. Such increased efforts on their part are more than we have a right to expect from the Highway Patrol. There is also the hazard that the services of a patrolman on his beat are needed when he is called away on these concentrated traffic enforcement drives.

Therefore, I hope that this session will not adjourn before it has increased the number of patrolmen by the minimum recommended by the subcommittee on safety.

MENTAL HEALTH

Great progress has been made in the past biennium in improving the facilities and adding to the technical personnel needed in an improved mental health program. For the most part as yet it is concentrated at the State Hospital at Jamestown. A more or less complete picture of what has been done may be of interest to you, although there is much left undone.

Since July 1, 1953, a start has been made on the new receiving and treatment center to cost \$1,080,000.00 of which \$300,000 is represented by Hill-Burton funds. The \$300,000.00 nurses' home should be ready in the late 1955. Minor facilities have been provided as well.

Much has been done in the interior of buildings, but in some respects such as modern plumbing, fire escapes, elevators, etc., in all the buildings have not been completed or installed.

The kitchen has been modernized and a cafeteria system installed for the patients. Three new passenger and two food elevators have been installed. Lastly, an up to date surgical suite has been completed—a long felt need.

Still with what has been done, an even greater amount must be done to make the State Hospital a fit place for our mentally ill.

A sorely needed ward building to replace two old structures is needed to help care for the crowded population. The Budget Board did not nor could not provide the funds for this. But, under recommendations for new buildings mention will be made of this and other needed facilities at our charitable institutions later on in this message.

Briefly, changes in trained personnel at the Hospital have been pronounced. It now has eight psychiatrically trained and experienced doctors plus one medic trained in internal medicine and surgery. The nursing staff has increased from three to seventeen. Its attendants' staff, from one hundred and

ninety to two hundred and seventy-five.

By 1956 about two hundred students per year will be given psychiatric training, instead of as at present about twenty. As a result we look forward to the time when nurses trained in mental health work will be available at our State Hospital as well as for mental health work at clinics elsewhere in the state when the time and the facilities will permit their establishment.

Yes, progress has been made; and the rate of discharge of patients has increased substantially. But, admissions have also been almost doubled during the same period. There were admitted between July 1953 to November 1954, 1,994 patients;

discharged during same period 2,065.

NEW BUILDINGS — CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS STATE HOSPITAL:

The Budget Board approved an appropriation of \$250,000.00 for a new water system at the State Hospital. As stated before, a request had been made for a new ward building costing \$1,550,000.00 to replace two old structures and to take care of more adequately the crowded conditions at the hospital.

ALCOHOLICS:

Alcoholics to the number of thirty to forty are admitted to the hospital monthly. Crowded conditions haven't permitted the institution to keep them there for such treatment as those unfortunates should have. Some good has been accomplished. There are those who have profited and have abstained from the use of liquor after they have been treated. Follow-up supervision has assisted somewhat in this regard. A small building or quarters separate and apart from other inmates at the institution should be provided. It need not be an expensive building, perhaps \$100,000.00, furnished. It would alleviate crowded conditions to the extent of the number that are admitted.

FEEBLE MINDED:

The Budget Board approved the appropriation for a hospital and ward building at the Grafton institution, because it appeared most essential. There is a waiting list for most of the age categories asking admission at that school. In the next biennium funds should be provided for classroom facilities too. There is danger that in a mental health program we forget the unfortunates at our feeble minded institution who need attention as well.

BLIND SCHOOL:
By constitutional amendment the Blind School will be moved from Bathgate to a location adjoining the University campus at Grand Forks. The preliminary estimate of about \$800,-000.00 was made for the buildings. Perhaps this figure is high but new plans and estimates will be provided.

Summarizing the requested appropriations for the buildings

at the charitable institutions are as ionow.

I recommend for your consideration using \$2,550,000.00 of the sales tax surplus credited to the Welfare Fund for the construction of these buildings, leaving \$400,000.00 to be paid out of the same surplus to the credit of the Equalization Fund.

Furthermore I would recommend using \$2,150,000.00 of Equalization surplus money for meeting appropriations of an educational nature heretofore paid out of the General Fund. However, this appropriation should be limited to the 1955-1957 biennium only.

REPORT OF GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS, INSTITUTIONS AND BOARDS

There will be made available to you numerous reports of the departments of state government, of the institutions of higher learning, of the boards that have supervision over them as well as the Board of Administration which has supervision over the charitable and penal institutions of this state. I hope that you will in your spare time, if you have any, read as much of these as you can. They contain valuable information. They will give you an excellent insight into what your state government consists of. They will also assist you in your final conclusions as to what shall be done in the matter of appropriations and other legislation.

In the Board of Administration report for the State Penitentiary you will find a complete summary of the activities of the Pardon Board for the last biennium. For all purposes it can be considered as an appendix to this message.

Other reports are worthy of your attention. Among these, because of increased attention and legislation by the Congress, is the one filed by the Indian Affairs Commission. I hope a subcommittee of this assembly will study the Indian problem in North Dakota with a view to better assist Congress in legislation which ultimately will free the Indian from the status of a government ward.

Other problems of a federal-state nature concern development of the Missouri Basin in our state. The status of Riverdale is one of these—how to make this huge development of greatest benefit to the state requires our immediate concern and attention in many respects, some of which have heretofore been enumerated in connection with the legislation for an enlarged conservancy district in North Dakota.

In order to get a complete picture of the fiscal policies of the state as provided under the Constitution and by statute every member should read the report of the Board of University and School Lands, the Workmen's Compensation Bureau, the Fire and Tornado Fund, the Bonding Department and the Hail Insurance Department because in these reports you will get a more complete picture of the finances of the departments and institutions mentioned.

The trust funds of the common schools, the institutions of higher learning, the charitable and penal institutions which received land grants at the time the state was admitted to the Union have steadily increased and these funds are invested as provided by law. The income, of course, inures to the benefit of the institutions involved. Most of the original grant lands of the common schools have been sold, it is true; but the proceeds of the sale are kept inviolate

and only the income from the money invested goes to the schools. The same condition applies to other trust funds. As a result of oil development, for example, the School and University Lands have received since the first oil well was brought into production as of December 1, 1954, \$4,098,611.30 in bonuses and delay rentals on lands, all of which is income to the schools and institutions affected. In 1954 comparatively small acreages have been leased of these lands; or other lands owned by the state under the supervision of the Bank of North Dakota. But since 1951 to 1954 there has been distributed to the common schools of the state on a per capita basis considerable more money than has ever been distributed in any like period in the history of the state. Besides \$211,910.80 of oil royalty has been added to the trust funds.

If it had not been for the income from oil development on lands acquired by the state under the rural credits law, it would not have been possible to divert as much revenue to the General Fund out of the Collection and Land Department as I have mentioned previously in this message and which has or presently will be \$2,000,000.00. Over \$1,000,000.00 of this comes from bonuses and delay rentals on oil lands.

It might be of interest to you that in the case of sale of original grant lands the state has retained 100% of the mineral rights. In the case of acquired lands as provided for by law the state has retained only 50%. Oil development in North Dakota can result in substantial increases if the promising outlook today will materialize tomorrow.

The reserves of the Workmen's Compensation Department appear adequate, are kept invested. They appear to be more than adequate for the payment of claims as exist today or as can be expected tomorow. Therefore, it appears that out of the unencumbered reserves enough money could be set aside for a building to house that department, thus releasing one complete floor of the State Capitol for other offices that need that space.

Likewise, the Bonding Department and the Fire and Tornado Fund are fully protected by levies and collections that can be made as presently provided for by law. Barring extreme losses it does not seem possible that either one of these funds will be in danger.

. HAIL INSURANCE DEPARTMENT

However, the Hail Insurance Department because of excessive losses in the last two years has reached a point where new legislation will be required to remedy what today is a serious situation. Undoubtedly not more than about half a million dollars of the reserve fund will remain after the payment of losses in 1954. At one time this fund was \$4,000,000.00. In the past we have been too optimistic in what could be done by a limited premium for hail'insurance protection. The Hail Insurance Department functions much as a mutual insurance company, and it will be necessary to conduct it as such and that all losses must be either currently paid, or within a year thereafter recouped somehow by additional levies or premiums to the extent that losses of the nature incurred in the last biennium, and even the last three years, will not completely dissipate the fund and make it insolvent. The department will be presenting legis-

lation to correct the situation and if that legislation is passed, and I hope that you will consider it favorably and improve upon it if you can, so that the reserve fund can once again be built up to adequate proportions such as once existed. It is not the intention as originally was done to build a reserve by a flat fee levied on every acre of tillable land. I believe it should be done by an increase in premiums to be collected and changes in our present law, limiting protection from hail damages to such an extent that a reserve fund can be built up again and thereafter not seriously impaired.

OTHER BUILDINGS

You will note that the Budget Board did not approve of an appropriation for an office building on the Capitol grounds. It is my judgment that the offices of the Capitol are crowded but that additional space can be provided, and in part it has already been provided. The Unemployment Insurance Department as a result of a resolution passed in the 33rd Legislative Session has moved to quarters that have been secured on a rental payment basis for less money than it would have cost to have rented suitable quarters for their use. In less than twelve years the state will own the building which will be paid for by rent from employers contributions now on deposit with the federal government at Washington in the unemployment division of the Social Security Administration.

The quarters of the Bank of North Dakota have never been entirely suitable. As time goes on they are less so. I believe that out of surplus funds in its possession a building could be built to more adequately care for this institution. On that basis a new building would meet with my approval.

I also believe that out of the unencumbered reserves of the Workmen's Compensation Department a suitable building could be built to house that department. It could be constructed in conjunction with the Bank of North Dakota on state owned land adjoining the Capitol grounds if in your judgment that seems wise, or as a separate building. If the funds needed for these buildings had to come out of the General Fund, this could not be done. I believe the time is right that it can be done now with the funds that are available to these two departments.

GOVERNOR'S MANSION

Four years ago I vetoed an appropriation for a new Governor's Mansion and my veto message I believe was applicable at the time. There is sufficient money in the Capitol Fund several times over to construct an adequate Governor's Mansion on the Capitol grounds. Preparations should be made for this by the appointment of a commission, and if you see fit also by appropriation of funds for that purpose. However, if the latter is not done I believe that this is the time to set up a non-salaried commission that could have plans drawn and adequate provision made for a new home for the Governor who will succeed me two years

CONCLUSION

The next sixty days, as I am sure you realize, will be days of hard work, concentrated study which will result in, as I hope and believe is your desire, the best that your judgment affords, all circumstances and conditions considered.

Those of you who have been members of previous legislatures realize that the problems facing this one are more acute than any that have preceded it since the beginning of World War II. I trust in your attempts to solve these problems and meet them fairly, squarely and honestly; that you will come up with decisions which will tide us over adequately in the biennium that begins next July 1.

Two years ago our country was involved in the Korean conflict. Many of our boys were sent overseas to take part in that area if not in the war itself. Fortunately there has been a cessation of hostilities although we are still living under something of an armed truce. Today peace seems closer to realization than it has been in a long time; yet clouds of war still hang over the world. If we had our way and if the type of government that we have here and that you represent in this Legislative Assembly prevailed all over the world, a solution would not be far away and peace would reign everywhere. Unfortunately we cannot control the ideologies of men who promote aggression and eventual war but as long as we do our part in supporting the principles of government, such as you and I generally have taken for granted in our lifetime, it will help. Beyond that perhaps you and I can do very little, but, after all, even that is much.

Particularly to you who are new members, may I express a wish that you will not only enjoy the deliberations that you will presently enter upon but that you will contribute something toward wise legislation which will stand the test of time. It is a new experience for you, but that doesn't mean that you cannot be of service. If you will vote according to the dictates of your best judgment arrived at honestly and conscientiously, no one can ever criticize you. Besides, you will have served your district and your state and nation very well.

In closing may I express to you all and to the state officials with whom I have been associated in the past two years my sincere appreciation for all consideration and assistance that has been given to me both as Governor and as an individual citizen of the State of North Dakota.

AT BISMARCK, JANUARY 13, 1955

Commissioner J. W. Matejcek, Walsh County, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, introduced and the read the following resolutions and moved their adoption:

 WHEREAS, the liquor tax at its inception was sufficient to absorb the entire cost of the care of patients at the State Hospital for the Insane, Jamestown, North Dakota; the North Dakota Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Dunseith, North Dakota; and the State School for the Feeble-Minded, Grafton, North Dakota; and,

WHEREAS, the State has now in operation a program for alcoholics; and,

WHEREAS, the costs incidental to the care and treatment of the patients at the three aforementioned institutions has sharply increased so that the monies resulting from the liquor tax earmarked for such care is no longer sufficient and resulting in large expenditures of money out of county funds for the care of the county's patients in the aforementioned institutions; and,

WHEREAS, it has previously been the intention that the care of patients at the aforementioned institutions be completely paid for by the State; and,

WHEREAS, it is found that 60% of the liquor tax is not sufficient, but it is believed that 100% of the liquor tax could take care of the three institutions and the program for alcoholics;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the North Dakota County Commissioners' Association here assembled, that the entire cost of the care of patients at the State Hospital for the Insane, North Dakota Tuberculosis Sanatorium, and the State School for the Feelleminded at Grafton, and of the program for alcoholics be absorbed by the State. Motion seconded, and carried.

2. WHEREAS, the present salary for the County Commissioners is restricted to \$8.00 per day, and WHEREAS, the costs for replacing the elected officials in their respective places of industry or business for

in their respective places of industry or business for the days in attendance at County Commissioners' Meetings is not in proportion and much more than the per diem salary received by the said County Commissioners, NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the North Dakota County Commissioners' Association here assembled that the said Association go on record in favor of an increase in the per diem salary of County Commissioners increasing that salary to a compensation of \$10.00 per day and that the compensation of county commissioners for expenses and as per diem allowances shall not exceed \$3,600.00 per year. Motion seconded, and carried. This resolution was passed without one dissenting vote.

WHEREAS, North Dakota is now in a period of agricultural and industrial growth; and,

WHEREAS, one phase of this development requires the location of processing plants within the State of North

Dakota;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the North Dakota County Commissioners' Association here assembled, that the proper state agencies make a study as to possible tax advantages to be given to any new processing plant to be located in North Dakota. Motion seconded. and carried.

4. WHEREAS, the laws of North Dakota now provide that the board of county commissioners shall not levy any taxes for general or special county purposes which will exceed the amount produced by a levy of eighteen mills on the dollar of the net taxable valuation of the county; and.

WHEREAS, said levy produces insufficient funds for

the efficient operation of the counties;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that said limitation shall be increased by the legislature of North Dakota by the amendment of Section 57-1506 of the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943, paragraph 1 (1953) Supplement), to read as follows:

"1. The board of county commissioners shall not levy any taxes for general or special county purposes which will exceed the amount produced by a levy of twenty mills on the dollar of the net taxable valuation of the county."

Motion seconded, and carried.

5. WHEREAS, the automotive engineers in conjunction with the State Highway Department, Legislative Research Committee, and the Bureau of Public Roads having submitted a comprehensive survey report on the primary and secondary roads in the State of North Dakota, which said report was given to the North Dakota County Commissioners' Association; and,

WHEREAS, said Association desires to commend the engineering and financial reports as competent and un-

prejudiced; and,

WHEREAS, we favor the classification of state and county highways and recommend that standards be established for each classification by the State Highway Department in cooperation with the North Dakota Association of State and County Engineers; and,

WHEREAS, we favor the establishment of a state primary system patterned after the recommendation of the engineering report or about 4200 miles, and we recommend that the balance of the present state system or about 2400 miles be retained as the State Secondary System and be maintained by the State Highway Department, except where counties may wish to integrate the mileage within their county into their highway system after proper financial arrangement with the State Highway Department. Motion seconded, and car-

6. WHEREAS, the County Commissioners' Association believes that a serious overcrowding, and also a shortage of proper educational facilities designed especially to aid and assist the mentally retarded exist at the Grafton State School, and,

WHEREAS, the County Commissioners' Association is aware that placement of mentally retarded individuals at the Grafton State School is presently all but impossible because of the long waiting list for admission which exists.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Legislature of the State of North Dakota undertake at its earliest opportunity such action as will be necessary and proper in order to insure the availability of public funds for the construction of a new three hundred (300) bed ward building and also a new school building to be added to the present facilities of the Grafton State School, as recommended by the Superintendent of said Grafton State School.

 WHEREAS, Chapter 57-15063 pertains to County Road program including Farm to Market and Federal Aid; and,

WHEREAS, the chapter provides for a five (5) mill levy only after an election is held; and,

WHEREAS, it is felt that the entire law is good except that the five (5) mill increase should be left to the discretion of the Board of County Commissioners;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it recommended that chapter 57-55063 be amended to delete all words pertaining to election and in lieu thereof, place the power of discretion in the Board of County Commissioners so that they may levy from zero (0) to five (5) mills for matching of Federal funds for road purposes and which levy shall not be subject to the county mill levy limitation.

8. WHEREAS, the Legislative Research Committee has submitted House Bills 534, 535, and 539 for the purpose of financing the roads of North Dakota; and,

WHEREAS, Bill 534 imposes an additional one cent (1¢) refundable gasoline tax; Bill 535 imposes a ten percent (10%) increase in registration fees on all passenger cars and five percent (5%) increase on trucks; and Bill 539 makes permanent the one cent gas tax presently earmarked for retirement of highway revenue anticipation certificates; and,

WHEREAS, it is well-known that some definite method of financing our road system is necessary;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this convention endorse and recommend the adoption and passage of House Bills 534, 535 and 539.

- 9. We recommend the passage of House Bill 555, recommended by the Legislative Research Committee, transferring the collection of gasoline taxes from the State Auditor's office to the State Tax Commissioner's office.
- 10. WHEREAS, it appears that there are no funds available for the twenty-four hundred (2400) miles of State Secondary Road System; and,

WHEREAS, additional funds are now needed and will be continually needed for road maintenance of the State Secondary system, NOW, THEREFORE, be it recommended that a one-half cent $(\frac{1}{2}\phi)$ a gallon non-refundable fuel tax be imposed and that the proceeds be earmarked fifty percent (50%) to the State of North Dakota and fifty percent (50%) to be distributed to the counties on an equitable basis, and the State Share to be used only for construction and maintenance of twenty-four hundred (2400) miles of State Secondary Road System.

CERTIFY:

That in sessions held by the House of Representatives and the Senate of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico the fourteen of January nineteen hundred and fifty-five, the following concurrent resolution was approved:

"CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

"To condemn the agression which is being inflicted to democracy in Costa Rica, and for other purposes.

"WHEREAS, democracy is being attacked in one of its most prominent bastions in America, the Republic of Costa Rica;

"WHEREAS, the people of Costa Rica being an exemplary expression of democratic reality, the aggression which is being perpetrated against it there must of necessity put on the alert all Americans who profess the conviction that it is on the democratic reality that the foundations of the freedom and the security of the peoples of the New World are settled;

"WHEREAS, the people of Puerto Rico firmly believe in the great virtue of democracy as well as in friendship and peace among peoples;

"WHEREAS, the Costa Rican people and the Puerto Rican people are fully identified by their common belief in the principles of democracy and by their mutual earnest desire that those principles are not impaired, so that they may contribute towards guaranteeing the subsistence and integrity of democracy in America;

"WHEREAS, any attempt at destroying by violence a government established by the free will of the governed constitutes a menace which makes it imperative, for the preservation of democracy in America, to mobilize, in a militant moral force, the conscience of the free peoples of the New World;

"WHEREAS, We Puerto Ricans firmly believe that any aggression against the democratic institutions in this hemisphere constitutes a serious danger to the integrity of these institutions in America.

"BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PUERTO RICO:

"I. To condemn, as it does hereby condemn, the aggression which is being inflicted to democracy in Costa Rica;

"2. To express the respect and admiration of the Puerto Rican people for the men who in Costa Rica uphold, with a high spirit and a profound devotion, the integrity of the democratic principles against the aggression of those who pretend to destroy by force of arms a government established by the strength of the popular will;

"3. To ratify before the democratic peoples of the world its expression of solidarity with the people of Costa Rica, exhorting them to convey that same expression of solidarity, with their faith placed in the divine justice of Almighty God:

"4. To send a copy of this Resolution to the Congress of the United States, the Parliaments of all the Republics of Latin America, the Legislative Assemblies of all the States of the United States, the United Nations Organization, the Organization of American States and to the free press of America.

AN ACT TO PROHIBIT THE FEEDING OF RAW GARBAGE TO SWINE IN NORTH DAKOTA AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE LICENSING AND REGULATION OF GARBAGE FEEDERS AND TO PROVIDE MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR THE OPERATION OF GARBAGE FEEDING ESTABLISHMENTS.

Whereas, vesicular exanthema, a virus disease of swine foreign to North Dakota has become widespread in the United States and threatens the swine industry; and

Whereas, the feeding of raw or untreated garbage is the chief source of the spread of this disease; and

Whereas, the feeding of raw or untreated garbage is the source of other infectious diseases such as hog cholera, brucellosis, tuberculosis and parasitic diseases of animals; and

Whereas, the feeding of raw or untreated garbage endangers public health by the transmission of viral, bacterial, trichinosis and other parasitic diseases to man; and

Whereas, the symptoms of vesicular exanthema cannot be distinguished from foot and mouth disease except by laboratory and animal inovulation; and

Whereas, vesicular exanthema might mask the symptoms of foot and mouth disease and thereby jeopardize the cattle industry.

Be it Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota:

Section 1. Definitions: For the purpose of this act, the following words shall have the meanings as defined in this section:

- (a) "Garbage" means animal and vegetable waste matter resulting from the handling, preparation, cooking and consumption of foods including animal carcasses or parts thereof.
- (b) "Person" means the State, any municipality, political subdivision, institution, public or private corporation, individual, partnership, or other entity.

Section 3. Permit for Feeding Garbage to Swine:

- (a) No person shall feed garbage to swine without first securing a permit from the Livestock Sanitary Board. Such permits shall be secured within 30 days after the effective date of this Act and shall be renewed on the first of July of each year.
- (b) This order shall not apply to any person who feeds only his own household garbage.

Section 4. Application for Permit:

Any person desiring to obtain a permit to feed garbage to swine shall make written application therefor to the North Dakota Livestock Sanitary Board in accordance with the requirements of this act. Section 5. Revocation of permits:

Upon determining that any person having had a permit issued under this Act, or who has applied for a permit hereunder, has violated or failed to comply with any of the provisions of this Act, or any of the other rules or regulations of the Livestock Sanitary Board, shall have his license revoked or refuse to issue a permit to an applicant therefor.

Section 6. Cooking or Other Treatment:

All garbage, regardless of previous processing shall, before being fed to swine, be thoroughly heated to at least 212 degrees F. for at least 30 minutes.

Section 7. Inspection and Investigation; Maintenance of Records:

- (a) Any authorized representative of the North Dakota Livestock Sanitary Board shall have the power to enter at reasonable times upon any private or public property for the purpose of inspecting and investigating conditions relating to the treating of garbage to be fed to swine as required by this Act.
- (b) In addition to the inspection of the proper sterilization of the garbage by agents of the Livestock Sanitary Board, the garbage feeding plant must be kept in a reasonably sanitary condition and any animals which may die and all garbage which is not consumed must be cleaned up and the place kept in as sanitary condition as is possible under the circumstances so as not to become a public nuisance.
- (c) Any authorized representative of the North Dakota Livestock Sanitary Board may examine any records pertaining to the feeding of garbage to swine and the Livestock Sanitary Board can require maintenance of records relating to the operation of equipment for and procedure of treating garbage to be fed to swine. Such copies to be submitted to the North Dakota Livestock Sanitary Board.

Section 8. Enforcement of the Act:

The Livestock Sanitary Board is hereby charged with the administration and enforcement of the provisions of this Act. The State Veterinarian, by and with the consent of the Livestock Sanitary Board, shall have full power to cooperate with the United States Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Research Service, in the control and eradication of vesicular exanthema.

The State Veterinarian, by and with the consent of the Livestock Board, shall have full power to promulgate and enforce such rules and regulations that may hereafter be necessary to carry out the provisions of this Act.

Section 9. Penalties:

Any person, firm or corporation who shall knowingly violate any provision set forth in this Act or any rule or reglation duly established by the Livestock Sanitary Board, or any officer or inspector who shall wilfully fail to comply with any provisions of this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined or imprisoned, or both, in the discretion of the court.

The Speaker announced that House Bill No. 542 would be considered in the sixth order of business on the next legislative day.

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Transportation to whom was referred House Bill No. 543, have had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

Line 88: Delete the period after "39-1109" and insert a semicolon in lieu thereof and add the following: "provided that any motor vehicle may be equipped with not to exceed two fog lamps mounted on the front at a height not less than 12 inches nor more than 30 inches above the level surface upon which the vehicle stands and so aimed that when the vehicle is not loaded none of the high-intensity portion of the light to the left of the center of the vehicle shall at a distance of 25 feet ahead project higher than a level of 4 inches below the level of the center of the lamp from which it comes."

After SECTION 15 and after line 226, add the following: "SECTION 16. CERTAIN VEHICLES TO CARRY FLARES OR OTHER WARNING DEVICES.

- No person shall operate any motor truck, passenger bus or truck tractor upon any highway outside the corporate limits of municipalities at any time from a half hour after sunset to a half hour before sunrise unless there shall be carried in such vehicle the following equipment except as provided in paragraph 2.
 - a. At least three flares or three red electric lanterns or three portable red emergency reflectors, each of which shall be capable of being seen and distinguished at a distance of not less than 600 feet under normal atmospheric conditions at nighttime. No flare, fusee, electric lantern or cloth warning flag shall be used for the purpose of compliance with the requirements of this section unless such equipment is of a type which has been submitted to the registrar and approved by him. No portable reflector unit shall be used for the purpose of compliance with the requirements of this section unless it is so designed and constructed as to include two reflecting elements one above the other, each of which shall be capable of reflecting red light clearly visible from all distances within 600 feet to 100 feet under normal atmospheric conditions at night when directly in front of lawful upper beams of headlamps, and unless it is of a type which has been submitted to the registrar and approved by him.
 - At least three red-burning fusees unless red electric lanterns or red portable emergency reflectors are carried.

- c. At least two red-cloth flags, not less than 12 inches square, with standards to support such flags.
- 2. No person shall operate at the time and under conditions stated in paragraph (a) any motor vehicle used for the transportation of explosives, any cargo tank truck used for the transportation of flammable liquids or compressed gases, or any motor vehicle using compressed gas as a fuel unless there shall be carried in such vehicle three red electric lanterns or three portable red emergency reflectors meeting the requirements of paragraph (a) of this section, and there shall not be carried in any said vehicle any flares, fusees or signal produced by flame.

SECTION 17. DISPLAY OF WARNING DEVICES WHEN VEHICLE DISABLED.

- 1. Whenever any motor truck, passenger bus, truck tractor, trailer, semitrailer or poletrailer is disabled upon the traveled portion of any highway or the shoulder thereof outside of any municipality at any time when lighted lamps are required on vehicles the driver of such vehicle shall display the following warning devices upon the highway during the time the vehicle is so disabled on the highway except as provided in paragraph (b):
 - a. A lighted fusee, a lighted red electric lantern or a portable red emergency reflector shall be immediately placed at the traffic side of the vehicle in the direction of the nearest approaching traffic.
 - b. As soon thereafter as possible but in any event burning period of the fusee (15 minutes), the driver shall place three liquid-burning flares (pot torches), or three lighted red electric lanterns or three portable red emergency reflectors on the traveled portion of the highway in the following order:
 - (A) One, approximately 100 feet from the disabled vehicle in the center of the lane occupied by such vehicle and toward traffic approaching in that lane.
 - (B) One, approximately 100 feet in the opposite direction from the disabled vehicle and in the center of the traffic lane occupied by such vehicle.
 - (C) One at the traffic side of the disabled vehicle not less than 10 feet rearward or forward thereof in the direction of the nearest approaching traffic. If a lighted red electric lantern or a red portable emergency reflector has been placed at the traffic side of the vehicle in accordance with paragraph 1 of this section, it may be used for this purpose.
- 2. Whenever any vehicle referred to in this section is disabled within 500 feet of a curve, hillcrest, or other obstruction to view, the warning signal in that direction shall be so placed as to afford ample warning to other users of the highway, but in no case less than 500 feet from the disabled vehicle.
- 3. Whenever any vehicle of a type referred to in this section is disabled upon any roadway of a divided highway during the time that lights are required, the

appropriate warning devices prescribed in paragraph 2 of this section shall be placed as follows:

One at a distance of approximately 200 feet from the vehicle in the center of the lane occupied by the stopped vehicle and in the direction of traffic approaching in that lane; one at a distance of approximately 100 feet from the vehicle, in the center of the lane occupied by the vehicle and in the direction of traffic approaching in that lane; one at the traffic side of the vehicle and approximately 10 feet from the vehicle in the direction of the nearest approaching traffic.

- 4. Whenever any vehicle of a type referred to in this section is disabled upon the traveled portion of a highway or the shoulder thereof outside of any municipality at any time when the display of fusees, flares, red electric lanterns or portable red emergency reflectors is not required, the driver of the vehicle shall display two red flags upon the roadway in the lane of traffic occupied by the disabled vehicle, one at a distance of approximately 100 feet in advance of the vehicle, and one at a distance of approximately 100 feet to the rear of the vehicle.
- 5. Whenever any motor vehicle used in the transportation of explosives of any cargo tank truck used for the transportation of any flammable liquid or compressed flammable gas, or any motor vehicle using compressed gas as a fuel, is disabled upon a highway of this state at any time or place mentioned in paragraph (a) of this section, the driver of such vehicle shall immediately display the following warning devices; one red electric lantern or portable red emergency reflector placed on the roadway at the traffic side of the vehicle, and two red electric lanterns or portable red reflectors, one placed approximately 100 feet to the front and one placed approximately 100 feet to the rear of the disabled vehicle in the center of the traffic lane occupied by such vehicle. Flares, fusees, or signals produced by flame shall not be used as warning devices for disabled vehicles of the type mentioned in this paragraph.
- The flares, fusees, red electric lanterns, portable red emergency reflectors and flags to be displayed as required in this section shall conform with the requirements of section 157 applicable thereto.

I am not going to take much of your time. I am not an orator and I haven't any advice for you and I am not going to tell you how to run your business. That is the job of you people—to make your own record and to answer to your people.

I just want to bring one thing—one little thing—to your attention that my people are talking about in my county, in every walk of life up there, and that is that they want to know where you are going to get that we read in the newspapers that you advocating that you will spend. thought I would like to bring that item to your attention.

This is a celebration for me. It was just twenty years ago that the legislature used the new capitol for the first time. I sat right up here. It was pretty hot at that time because you know there never was a minute that that balcony was not full at least an hour before time for session to begin. There was always a crowd and as Ben Fedje from Ray, in Williams county, used to say "The moment is tense around here". It was tense all the time. I didn't have the pleasure of Ken Fitch that year—he was not here. I don't know what kind of a job I did that time. But I found out afterwards that if Ken had been sitting down there with Late Twichell, they would have really kept me busy. I am sure he would have liked to have been here though, at that time. And I would like to be sitting in the House to help Ken, or maybe bottle him up a little!

Ken has been a wonderful fellow to work with always and I am happy to be here today. Now I am not going to take up any more of your time as you are down here to do your job and make your record so you can answer to your own people.

I thank you very, very kindly for this opportunity to appear before you.

Thank you."

And when so corrected recommends that the same be approved.

Rep. Baker moved that the amendments to House Bill No. 531, as recommended by the Committee on Appropriations and printed on page 289 of the House Journal, be adopted, which motion prevailed.

Speaker Fitch resumed the Chair.

Rep. Sticka moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort a former member of the House who is also a former Lieutenant Governor, Ray Schnell of Dickinson, to the rostrum, which motion prevailed and the Speaker appointed as such committee, Reps. Sticka and Gress.

Mr. Schnell addressed the House.

Rep. Schmalenberger moved that the remarks of Mr. Schnell be printed in the House Journal, which motion prevailed.

Mr. Schnell: Thank you, Speaker Fitch, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House of Representatives: It is really a pleasure to be here after a several weeks trip over six southwestern states, and to again look at the members, the good people that have been elected to the House of Representatives here in North Dakota. It is good to look into your faces, and especially so after taking in some of the sessions in other states for a short time and it was really a pleasure to be there also.

I know that just a lot of good people in the State of North Dakota don't realize their blessings and the privileges that we have in the State of North Dakota, and in living here in a state that has a proper amount of rainfall; that has hay crops; that has livestock industry that is really worthwhile compared to some of the states that I have just passed through that have had no rain and no feed crops for as long as six or seven years.

I heard of a fellow that made a tour through one of those states and he could not for the life of him see a spear of grass that would support a jackrabbit on a section of land. He wondered how people could live in such a dry country. He finally asked different ones but he couldn't get any satisfaction. They were so used to those conditions that they took them for granted. But finally he met a fellow—an old, old man that sat in front of a store, just whittling on a stick and he asked him if it wasn't getting pretty dry there. The old fellow agreed that it was dry. He asked if they had had any rain in the last few years and the old man said they hadn't. The man asked him if they ever had any rain and the old fellow said "Oh, yes,—you have heard about the time when they had to load all the animals into the ark and it rained for forty days and forty nights?" The man said that he had heard of that and the old fellow said, "Well, we got an inch and a half of that".

We don't really know how lucky we are in this state of North Dakota where we can raise hay and where we have such a variety of new grasses that have been developed in the last five years with the new methods of farming and the new seed varieties. We are really on top of the world. I don't know whether even two or three drouth years would hurt us now. With all the crested wheat we have increased our capacity about three times in the State of North Dakota. I think it is coming to a place where over-production of wheat all over the world will make this a greater livestock state than ever before. The income from livestock amounts to several hundred million dollars a year.

Now, I want you to know I am not here as a candidate for the Board of Higher Education. Not that I wouldn't have the degrees that are necessary for a position of that kind. I feel I have quite a number of degrees. You know in 1935 when I served my first session in the House of Representatives, (that was the first session held in this new capitol building and there is only one of you here now that was here at that time and that is George Saumur—I am pretty sure I am right about that)—Well, anyway, I was new at this kind of procedure of politics and the legislative transactions and it was so necessary to raise the scale of pay for the state employees and of county employees; and school teachers that were badly underpaid, so before I left, in order to familiarize myself with some of the things necessary I went to see some of the people higher up in the educational field. I sat down with one of the instructors at the Dickinson State Teachers College and I wanted to know the different things that were required of a man to get into the higher brackets of their field. I asked one of them "What do you mean by some of the letters back of the names of these college men? Here is B.S. but you can skip that because I have been in the livestock business all of my life—born and raised in the business. But here is onother one 'MS' back of this man's name—what does that mean?" He said "More of the same".

Then I said "Well, here is 'PHD' what does that mean?" He said 'Piled on higher and deeper."

I am really proud of my assignment and selection by some of the foremost cattlemen and people up there in the high brackets in the State of North Dakota, and other states, as a trustee to the National Cowboy Hall of Fame. I really appreciate the honor. This is an organization that will, after a site has been selected in one of the seventeen states of the organization, honor the memory of the cattle men and the cowboys and other people in other walks of life that have been instrumental in promoting and building the livestock industry in the United States of America. There are some great men that have passed away who will be honored and also those people still living, like your Speaker, Ken Fitch. He is a lover of good horses, raises Dalmatian dogs, is a sheep man, so one of these days you will see a monument in that Cowboy Hall of Fame, of Ken Fitch, and also a lot of others that I can think of that will be honored in such a place.

This Cowboy Hall of Fame is on the same basis as the baseball Hall of Fame in New York state. Millions and millions of dollars will be contributed in addition to the memberships sold. They have decided on a three dollar membership in all states where the income amounts to more than a million dollars and it will be just one of those things to honor the people that built the West. They are men who should be honored.

All over the land today you see young lads wearing cowboy boots and they have little guns strapped on them and wearing cowboy jeans and hats. They want to be like Casey Tibbs or Bill Linderman. It is not more than twenty-five or thirty years when some of the top ranchers in North Dakota would come to town wearing a little church hat but today this is altogether different. What a thing it is for a city to be advertised as a "western" city—that is glamor. It is the tradition of the West and it will be carried on.

Now on this committee, Brooks Keogh is also a trustee of this national committee from seventeen western states. Brooks is the president of the North Dakota Stockmen's Association. Governor Brunsdale and every governor of those seventeen states, will be ex-officio members. I have been selected as chairman of the location committee and if Fargo wants the Hall of Fame and the museum, they had better get busy. The borderline of these seventeen states is right on the eastern edge of North Dakota, South Dakota, Kansas, Nebraska and the other states in that line.

This will give you a little idea of what is being done about the Cowboy Hall of Fame. Most of the trustees are big cattlemen. Some of them are even presidents of railroad companies but all of them have been instrumental in promoting the livestock business and helping livestock men, and helping the West to make it colorful as it is today.

I want to thank you folks for the honor of being asked to come up here and say a few words to you. I know that you are doing a very grand job here. You have some very capable men here. It is a pleasure for me to renew old acquaintances and meet new members and I want to thank you a lot for the honor of being asked to come up here."

Rep. Nygaard moved that any person who has literature to be placed on the desks of the members of the House, must first get permission to do so from the Chief Clerk in order that the members may know the source of the material. The motion prevailed.

REPORT OF SELECT COMMITTEE

Mr. Speaker: Your Select Committee on grain mill storage has made an investigation of the grain storage situation in North Dakota, and has the following report to make:

Toward the end of the 33rd Legislative Assembly, House Resolution Number 9 was introduced by your committee. This resolution provided for a study by an interim committee of the grain storage situation in the State of North Dakota.

Your committee in undertaking this job, did so without knowing exactly what it was looking for, although many stories and rumors had been told your committee members and others of alleged malpractice in the handling of grain in the state.

Chief among these rumors was that the practice of sending grain into so-called mill storage was very widespread, and that it was working a hardship on the farmer. Your committee therefore entered into this study with the idea of finding out exactly what the truth is in regard to mill storage, and to use this information to make recommendations to this session of the legislature to correct any faults, which might be found. Your committee believes that in the process of investigation it found out much—much that had hitherto only been half-understood, and half-known. Your committee also wishes to state here and now that we have not attempted to hurt any individual or organization by our investigation. We have merely attempted to ascertain the facts and to use this information for the good of all the people of the state.

With these few words we will conclude our introduction, and recommend to you the substance of our report.

In order that everyone may be acquainted with exactly what we are referring to in this report, we feel that a definition of terms should be the first order of business.

MILL STORAGE

Your committee is mostly concerned here with the practice called Mill Storage. Mill storage is the practice by which the local elevator ships grain directly to the processor (flour mill). This grain is not sold on the public market. It is also not sold at the time of delivery to the flour mill or flax crusher, since when the elevator ships it out, no bill of sale is made out. The only agreement between elevator and mill is one on what is called "future pricing." That is, the local elevator and the mill agree on the grade of the grain—whether it is number 1, or number 4, etc., and on the amount—so many thousand bushels. The local elevator keeps a record of this, and when the grain is ordered sold, the price which is paid is that of the current market.

Perhaps it would be easier to understand if we were to trace the course of a bushel of grain from the farm to its destination.

When the farmer drives into the elevator he either sells his grain or puts it in storage. We here are concerned with the grain placed in storage at such public elevators.

After the grain is placed in storage it is put into the elevator and the farmer is given a receipt showing the number of bushels, the grade and other information. He goes home confident that his grain is safe in the elevator.

However, your committee has found out that this is not always true.

A little later the elevator operator may be pressed for space, so he decides to ship this stored grain into "mill storage."

The grain is loaded into a car and shipped, not to the open, competitive market, but directly to a flour mill. The agreement between the elevator and the flour mill is that the mill will not pay for the grain on the day it is received. The mill will pay later—whenever the farmer orders it sold.

There are two things which make this practice extremely bad, in the opinion of your committe. First, the elevator operator is in effect selling something which does not belong to him. Second, this flow of "free" grain directly to the mill tends to cause the price of all grain on the market to stay low.

It took your committee quite a while to get the definition of mill storage down to where it is understandable by the average person. Once arrived at, however, the committee began with its investigation to find out just how bad the situation really was.

Your committee soon found out that literally millions of bushels of grain each year was finding its way into "mill storage." This in spite of the fact that the only way mills store grain is in the same manner that you store grain in the hopper of a feed mill. It is just there temporarily until it is ground up.

The effect of this is that the mills do not have to go into the open, competitive market and buy grain. They had, until your committee began its investigations, an almost unlimited supply of grain to use in their day-to-day milling operations. This ability to stay off the market, makes for a lack of competitive bidding and drives the price down. It wasn't long before your committee was convinced that millions of dollars have been lost yearly to North Dakota grain farmers because of this nefarious practice.

Let us state here and now that the practice of shipping grain to mill storage is now, and has been for many years strictly illegal.

COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

In these next pages, your committee will give you a chronological description of events as they happened during the two years since the 33rd Legislative Session. We feel that this is the best way to present this material, since your committee were "babes in the woods" to begin with and thus we can sort of take you along with us in our explorations of the jungle of mill storage.

As the first step, your committee contacted a grain commission firm in Minneapolis regarding the practice of mill storage. This contact was made because your committee

had not been given funds with which to carry on the investigation, and it was thought that by contacting such a firm informally, much information could be gained at little cost. This proved to be the case.

This particular commission firm was sympathetic to your committee and admitted freely that such a practice was common in the grain trade. They stated, categorically, that they shipped over one million bushels a year into mill storage themselves. However, understandably, they refused to open their records to the committee or to make a formal statement. Your committee feels that the information gathered here was very valuable, even though it was not possible to get formal, written evidence of the type presented in court. This was so because it was not possible to subpoena their records or personnel because they were from out of the state.

Let us point out that this same problem plagued the committee all through its investigations. The fact that virtually all the grain trading is done in Minnesota made it impossible to subpoena records of commission firms and others doing business with many local elevators. The only alternative was to attempt to get the same information by contacting local elevators. This was more cumbersome and expensive, but in the end the same results were obtained.

In order to make such an investigation, it was necessary to hire competent personnel to do the work. To this end, a chartered accountant under \$50,000.00 bond was hired by your committee members to make a search of the records of several country elevators to find out if the practice was as common as the commission firm stated.

Mr. Cowell made the examination of several local elevator's books, and his findings and conclusions are put forth in this letter to your committee.

Valley City, North Dakota March 3, 1954

The Honorable Mr. T. L. Snortland, Sharon, North Dakota.

Dear Sir:

As per our agreement in our telephone conversation, I am reporting to you on an investigation of the so-called Mill-Storage situation involving four elevators — which is as follows:

Elevator No. 1—

In February, 1953, they had 100,000 bushels of flax on Terminal Storage, of which 50,000 bushels were converted into Mill-Storage. The remaining 50,000 bushels were held back for protection on purchasing agreements.

Elevator No. 2-

In August, 1952, they had 10 cars of wheat in Mill Storage, and in a three month period in 1952, they converted 12 cars of flax into Mill-Storage.

Elevator No. 3-

On February 27, 1952, one car of wheat went into Mill-Storage. In March, 1952, 5 carloads of wheat went into Mill-Storage to be settled for on a basis of 7c over current future.

Elevator No. 4-

This elevator had 10 carloads of wheat go into Mill-Storage from August 5 to September 22, 1952.

This is the same information that I presented to the Public Service Commission at the hearing in Bismarck on February 27, 1954.

I am enclosing a supplementary sheet on the information obtained in regard to the State Mill & Elevator in Grand Forks.

I hope that this is the information you desire. I trust that you will keep it confidential, as far as the names and locations of the private elevators are concerned.

You will notice that the information gained by Mr. Cowell verifies the fact that the practice of shipping grain to mill storage is extremely common.

With this information in hand, it was thought proper to contact the Public Service Commission regarding the matter. We were attempting here to find out just how much supervision the elevators in the state were getting from the Public Service Commission.

By way of further explanation, we should state that the Public Service Commission is charged with enforcing the laws regarding grain handling in the state.

To this end, a meeting was held with the Public Service Commission in Bismarck on February 27, 1954.

At that meeting, the Commissioners denied any knowledge of the practice of mill storage. They made this denial in spite of the fact that the Public Service Commission's own report to the governor in June, 1952, stated, a large percentage of grain is shipped to Minneapolis, Duluth and Superior for restorage, and a big percentage of grain is also going in to the mills for free storage."

Needless to say your committee was surprised to see this difference between what the commissioners said and their formal report.

During this meeting, the commissioners said that if your committee would bring to their attention, any particular violation of the statutes they would be most happy to prosecute and try to get a conviction.

In reply to this, Mr. Cowell who has had 20 years experience in auditing and is a chartered accountant, and who operates under a \$50,000.00 bond, stated that if the commission would place him on its payroll, he could easily obtain information which would convict almost any given number of elevator operators the Commission wished to prosecute. To your committee's knowledge, Mr. Cowell was never placed on the payroll.

At this point it might be well to explain why the the committee refused to divulge the names of the elevators which were reported in violation of the law by Mr. Cowell.

In hiring Mr. Cowell the committee had agreed that the information obtained would be used only for the legislature. Because of this Mr. Cowell checked only accounts with which he was familiar. This enabled him to do the job very quickly and at a minimum of expense to the committee members who were paying the expenses out of their own pockets.

Also, it was felt that the violation of the law regarding mill storage was so widespread that to prosecute any one elevator operator would amount to persecution. It was also felt that this practice had been allowed to flourish by the Public Service Commission, in spite of the fact they were charged with enforcing laws forbidding it.

In addition, it was felt by your committee members that the Public Service Commission had two alternatives open to it: 1—It could hire Mr. Cowell to make another investigation and obtain this information. 2—It could use its own personnel to make such an investigation. Your committee felt that either alternative would bring to light many flagrant violations of the law very quickly.

The result of this hearing was that your committee felt that the problem had been whitewashed. Press coverage was impartial but the tenor of the hearing was such that it tended to indicate that mill storage was not a real problem in the state.

One other thing resulted from this meeting, also. That was the realization that more than just the farmer was being affected. Your committee began to slowly form the opinion that the whole price support structure of the federal government was being undermined.

As any farmer can tell you, the federal loan value was always the effective price ceiling. The price of grain always fluctuated below this level, and seldom rose above loan value. What was the reason for this?

Your committee came to the conclusion that the reason was the removal of a good number of the millers from the open, competitive market. These millers were getting free grain in a quantity large enough to supply most of their needs from "Mill Storage". Therefore, they did not need to go into the grain market and buy grain. This depressed the price of grain to the point where it never rose above parity.

We might disgress for a moment here and point out that since your committee has started its investigation the price of grain has risen to be above parity for the first time in many years—as a result of the removal of free mill stored grain from the hands of the millers.

Because your committee had no appropriation to carry on the work, it was thought that possibly help in this matter might be gained by contacting the federal government through the PMA (now ASC) state committee. The thought of your committee was twofold, here; first that the committee might have information which would shed more light on the problem; second, that the ASC might be able to help on the investigation level.

Therefore, on April 4, 1954, a meeting was held with the state ASC committee in Fargo. After an explanation of the practice of mill storage, the ASC committee said that it had very little information on the matter and referred us to the district ASC office in Minneapolis. We are inserting here the letter written for this purpose:

Dear Mr. Cole:

Yesterday our State Committee had the pleasure of meeting with Mr. Thomas Snortland and hearing of his work in connection with the investigation of the practice that is carried on among some of the grain trade of converting warehouse-stored grain to so called "mill storage."

After hearing his explanation of the practice, even though it is possible that no CCC loans are involved, we do believe it may to a large degree offset the benefits of the price support program if the practice is carried to excess.

Mr. Snortland indicated he would plan to call on you soon to discuss the problems and we encouraged him to do so, as we feel the matter is important and should be of concern to all of us. If the practice is general and widespread enough it could possibly warrant a more detailed investigation by the proper authorities.

As a result of this letter, a meeting was arranged with Mr. James A. Cole, Commodity Credit Corporation Director on April 9. Mr. Cole, after a discussion on Mill Storage, said that they were unaware of the practice. We should state here that your committee had previously contacted Senator Milton R. Young, and he had graciously sent a representative along to be present at this meeting.

Mr. Cole told your committee and the Senator's representative that he would send a grain accountant into North Dakota to make an investigation.

In addition he promised to alert all CCC field men and in turn have them keep an eye on the situation regarding mill storage and discuss it with elevator operators and others in the grain trade. According to testimony given later on in our investigation, this was done.

Your committee left the meeting with Mr. Cole feeling that something concrete had been accomplished.

On April 14, 1954, Mr. Martin A. Ryan from the Compliance and Investigation Branch of the Department of Agriculture arrived in Valley City and met with your Committee there. Also present at the meeting was your committee's auditor Vaugh Cowell.

Mr. Ryan, Mr. Cowell and your committee then talked over the situation, going over very carefully Mr. Cowell's findings. Mr. Cowell also outlined to Mr. Ryan of the USDA. just how he had gone about finding his figures.

USDA, just how he had gone about finding his figures.
Mr. Ryan, after some discussion, said that while he was very interested, he took the position that it was of no particular interest to the Federal Government unless it could be proved that grain under CCC loan was involved. He said the CCC would not be interested in any investigation regardless of the fact that this illegal practice was widespread in North Dakota.

Mr. Ryan, therefore never entered into any investigation to see if CCC grain was affected—that is your committee has no reason to believe that he ever did, since no report of his activities in this matter was ever received.

Up until this time, most of the information gathered by your committee with the exception of Mr. Cowell's findings, had been of a rather informal nature. That is, there was actually no sworn testimony on record relating to the practice of mill storage. For this reason, the committee, using funds donated by its members, retained an attorney and a court reporter and subpoenaed four witnesses.

We found the testimony to be most revealing.

Your committee will not here reproduce in full the wordby-word testimony of these witnesses as taken down by the reporter, although this document is in your committee's files. However, suffice it to say that a summation of the testimony reveals that mill storage was a common practice in the grain trade.

One commission house employee admitted recommending the practice to elevators with which he did business. This testimony reveals, in the estimation of your committee, that there can be no possible doubt as to the prevalence of this deplorable practice.

Of the four witnesses subpoenaed, one was an elevator manager, and the other three were commission house employees.

The elevator manager readily admitted that he had shipped grain into so-called mill storage. Your committee here feels that it has the nub of the whole matter. The fact that an elevator operator chosen at random would admit to this fact.

The first commission house man ran out on the subpoena. He excused himself to make a phone call and never returned to testify before this committee.

The second commission house representative was more or less a public relations man and did not know enough about the matter to offer any direct testimony.

The third commission house employee was experienced in the grain trade. He testified under oath that in his opinion it was good business for the elevator to ship grain into mill storage. He stated that it was a wonderful way to hedge on grain and that he had recommended it to his customers. Certainly this is a very revealing bit of testimony which we hope this legislature will take into account in any action it may wish to take regarding this matter.

After receiving the transcript of the testimony just outlined, your committee thought that perhaps it would serve

as a further stimulus to the Federal government in investigating and helping to stop mill storage.

Therefore, your committee again approached Mr. James Cole, Commodity Credit Corporation Director in Minneapolis. We presented him with a copy of the transcript which he read in our presence.

After he finished reading this sworn testimony, which your committee cannot help but feel absolutely proved that the practice of mill storage was not only taking place but that it was actually common, Mr. Cole again promised to send a grain accountant to North Dakota to try to verify the facts and figures which your committee's auditor, Vaugh Cowell, had presented.

Subsequently, such an accountant appeared in Valley City and contact was made between him, your committee and Mr. Cowell. Mr. Cowell again explained how he had gone about checking elevator accounts and how he had found grain shipped to mill storage. This was done in order to give the federal accountant some insight into your committee's methods.

At the close of this conference your committee went home feeling that perhaps the federal government would now make an investigation which would ascertain some pertinent facts.

However, this hope was doomed to failure.

The next morning, the federal accountant contacted your committee and said that he had been ordered back to Minneapolis. As far as your committee knows, no attempt was ever made to check up on the illegal practices found by Mr. Cowell. No report, written or verbal has ever been received from Mr. Cole on this matter. It is presumed that the investigation was dropped before it ever got started. What the reasons are for this is not known to your committee.

Your Committee, here would like to again state that it cannot understand how the federal government can know without any investigation, whether or not CCC grain is being shipped into mill storage.

Although this may not be the place, we might suggest that the federal auditing system is far from complete and foolproof. This was pinpointed by the fact that the federal government auditors were not aware of the embezzelment at Barney, North Dakota, until it was too late. Surely this indicates a weakness in their system.

The activity of your committee in its investigations then ceased since it was felt that enough facts had been learned to enable us to draw conclusions and make recommendations to this legislature.

However, there was one additional hearing held which we believe sheds even more light on this matter.

On December 15, 1954, some six weeks ago, a hearing was held before the Public Service Commission in Bismarck regarding the practice of Mill Storage. The hearing was called by the Commission after an investigation by Commission employees.

The commission took testimony from six witnesses and statements from others including your committee. In your

committee's opinion three things stand out in connection with this hearing:

First, it amounted to an admission by the Public Service Commission that the practice of mill storage was and is still going on in North Dakota. The commission auditor, while he did not go into the matter in the same way your committee would have done, was forced to admit that some mill storage existed.

Let us also point out that the commission study of the records was made after your committee started work so we believe that much of the practice that had existed prior to this time had been stopped. However, even at that, substantial overshipment of grain was found.

Second, the federal government auditors and grain supervisors are either grossly incompetent or are attempting to hide the fact that they have allowed this practice to flourish

unheeded.

As we have explained before, the federal government was contacted and advised of your committee's findings, yet they did nothing to help dig into the problem. Their only concrete action was to warn elevators against doing it any longer.

Your committee was easily able to find instances of large use of mill storage, yet the federal government witnesses maintain that this is impossible and that it is all news to them. Can it be possible that the administration of the federal grain program is so sloppy and ill-managed as to not be able to find this sort of evidence, especially when they have full-time auditors and accountants on their payrolls?

If your committee can go out and in just a few days find instances after instance of shipment of orain to mill storage—does it seem possible that full time auditors and accountants cannot be aware of what is going on?

While your committee is not concerned with what the federal government does, we here would like to say as farmers and citizens that it certainly can bear looking into by responsible people in the federal government.

Third, let us say that we are literally amazed at the attitude of the grain trade as expressed by one of their representatives at this hearing.

He stated that it is all right to take another man's property, give it to the mills and allow it to be converted into manufactured goods without his knowledge provided—and let us emphasize this—provided it is covered by bond. Your committee will touch on this attitude again further on in its report.

We will not go into this hearing any further, but instead will recommend it for a study by the legislature—or at least a committee of the legislature should this matter be referred to a committee. It is Docket No. 5137 of the Public Service Commission.

RADIO AND PRESS COVERAGE

During the time that your committee was actively in operation, the press and radio were very interested in this problem. They realized its implications to the North Dakota farmer and gave it widespread and thorough coverage.

This committee wants to go on record as saying that it wished no personal publicity for any of its members because of this investigation, but that it wishes to heartily commend the press for its excellent coverage and subsequent dissemination of much valuable information to the public.

In the eyes of your committee, the many stories in the newspapers, over the radio and on TV focused the attention of the farmer on this illegal practice of mill storage. The committee has received letters from enough farmers to know that this was so. Many farmers realized for the first time that their property (grain) was being sold without their knowledge and consent. They realized that there was a steady flow of "free" grain to the mills which continually tended to depress the price of grain.

Because of the publicity given the practice many elevators became cautious. Many elevator men realized for the first time that it was an illegal thing. May we point out here that among the questions we asked elevator operators was if they had ever received any pamphlet, paper or list of rules from the Public Service Commission, or if they had ever been visited by a representative of the Commission. All replied that as far as they knew the Commission had never contacted them except in the matter of routine reports.

It is this fact that leads your committee to believe that many elevator operators were dupes of commission firms and others in the grain trade regarding this illegal practice. Many elevator operators did not honestly know that it was illegal, and while this is no excuse in the eyes of the law, we feel that the Public Service Commission has a moral obligation to see to it that elevator operators are informed on such matters. Such lax administration of the law is to be deplored.

It was because of the publicity attendant to the investigation of your committee that many elevators slowed or completely stopped shipping grain into mill storage. For this reason the shipment of "free" grain into Minneapolis was considerably lessened. With the supply of free grain drying up, the mills were forced to go into the public markets and buy grain as they never had in years past. This had its effect on price at once.

Thus the excellent coverage by the press and radio was of immeasurable help to your committee and has already saved the farmers millions of dollars in cash money because of the general rise in grain prices in Minneapolis. This is the first time in many years that the price of wheat has risen as high above the loan value.

Your committee has no doubt that the above statement will be challenged by the grain trade who will have many other reasons to offer why the price of grain should be high this year. However, we think that any reasonable man, looking at all the factors, will agree that the removal of "free" mill storage grain from the millers control has had its beneficial effect.

We hope that the legislature will carry on the good work of the press and radio by taking steps to see that there is no return to the system which puts the farmer's grain to work against him. This concludes the portion of this report detailing the actions of your committee. We hope that they will shed light on the problem.

In our next section of this report we would like to draw some conclusions from the mass of evidences, testimony and positive action with which your committee came into contact. We feel that without this portion this committee will not have finished its job.

CONCLUSIONS:

We must first conclude that the practice of shipping the farmers grain to mill storage was common in the near past. In fact, it was so common that your committee labored under some difficulty because of this. Let us explain:

First, we could not recommend any elevator or elevator operator to the authorities for prosecution because it would have meant virtual persecution.

Second, while it was very easy to get commission men, elevator operators and others concerned with the grain trade to admit openly in informal conversations that the practice was common, it was another matter to get sworn testimony and also your committee had no appropriated funds with which to hire an attorney and retain a stenographer to get such testimony. However, even if funds were available the committee would have hesitated to put anyone on the spot. This, because in effect he would be testifying against himself.

Another conclusion of your committee is this: No one should be under the false impression that because of the widespread publicity the practice of shipping grain illegally to mill storage has stopped. We must conclude that it has slowed down considerably.

Testimony given at the Public Service Commission hearing showed that one elevator alone had, within recent months, shipped 39,000 bushels of grain into mill storage.

The conclusion which your committee has come to regarding this, is that the practice has been slowed down, but not stopped, and that if nothing is done by this legislature, it will start up again very quickly. Your committee will, in its recommendations, deal with this problem further.

Now, let us point out another conclusion:

Elevator men have in the past regarded the practice of shipping grain which does not belong to them into mill storage as shipping to "free storage." That is, they have had to pay nothing at all for this so-called storage. For this reason they have tended to favor the practice. They now say that they cannot make money in handling grain. It may be that they are right. Your committee will deal with this problem, also in the recommendations section of this report.

Another conclusion is this:

Your committee is of the opinion (which is based on observations and comments from the grain trade) that the practice of using mill storage is widespread, not only in North Dakota, but in other states. Minnesota and South Dakota are also involved in this illegal and harmful practice. Your committee has stated that the removal of much mill stored grain from circulation has increased the price of

grain. How has this been possible if the practice is widespread in Minnesota and South Dakota? Would not enough grain come through from these states to allow the mills to stay off the open market regardless of what North Dakota may do?

The answer to this lies in the fact that your committee has pointed out the problem to the federal government. Commodity Credit Corporation field personnel have visited elevators in other states and warned against the practice. This has had a good effect.

Let us here point out that U. S. Senators William Langer and Milton Young have both done the farmers of the state good service in intervening with the federal government in this matter.

Even though the federal government has refused to investigate or verify your committee's findings, we know that they have gone out into the field and warned elevator operators about mill storage in all grain producing states in this area. This has stopped a certain amount of free grain from flowing to the mills and has forced millers to go into the open market for their grain—thus reinforcing the principle of free, open, competative marketing.

Your committee would like to point out one other startling conclusion regarding the grain trade; These people do not believe that it is illegal to sell another man's property without his knowledge or consert. This, provided that they are under bond for the amount sold. Your committee deplores this attitude on two specific counts.

1—the practice of shipping to mill storage is illegal in the letter and spirit of the law. No amount of self-justification is going to get around this point. It is illegal and those who do it are in violation of the law.

2—when grain is shipped to mill storage it does one thing which is unbelievably bad. It uses a man's property to deprive him of part of his income. In other words the flow of free grain to the mills by-passes the marketplace. It is never up for bid. It is never subject to the law of supply and demand. On the contrary, it is free grain which millers can use without going into the market. It is grain which keeps them out of the market place. Perhaps an example would make this clear.

Suppose that you manufactured automobiles. However, the price on cars was a little too low in the fall and you were reasonably certain that after a few months the price would go up. So you go to a man who runs a public warehouse and ask him to store your cars for you. He agrees to do this and they are driven into the warehouse. However, a little while later, the warehouseman decides that he wants the room the cars are taking up to store something else—perhaps furniture.

So he goes to various people and tells them, "I'll let you take these cars out of the warehouse and drive them around. But you don't have to pay me for them yet. We'll see what the manufacturer wants for them next spring and then you can pay me.

The next spring the manufacturer comes around and looks at the price of cars. It is still low. He doesn't know that all his cars are out on the road being driven around—

and that this is the reason no one wants to buy a new car. So finally he decides to sell. When he does the warehouseman goes out and gets in touch with the buyers and collects the money, which he immediately turns over to the manufacturer.

However, before the manufacturer gets out the door the warehouseman stops him with one of those little envelopes with a window in it. It's a bill. The manufacturer has to pay storage on all those cars, even though furniture was being stored in the warehouse most of the time. He paid for storage he never got on cars which were out in circulation, thereby preventing a rise in car prices.

If this sort of thing were done with automobiles the warehouseman would be in jail in no time. Yet it is just exactly this sort of thing which grain men say is not illegal—if you are covered by a bond. Your committee does not agree with this foolish reasoning.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

Your committee is going to make several recommendations in this last section of our report. We hope that they will be used as guideposts to righting a situation which is costing farmers in the state literally millions of dollars yearly.

We sincerely hope that this legislature will act on this matter, because if nothing is done, mill storage will again become the accepted way to handle grain, regardless of the fact that it is illegal.

The following are our recommendations to you:

1—The Public Service Commission is charged with the responsibility of enforcing the grain laws. We believe that a very bad situation exists in the Commission in regard to salaries. Each of the three commissioners receives only \$5,000 a year for his full time work. At present there are seven employees working for the commission who receive more money than the commissioners. Some get as much as \$7,200 yearly of \$2200 more than their bosses.

What is the reason for this? The salary of the commissioners is set by law. The salary of the employees of the commission is set by what is a going wage in industry. You cannot hire experienced lawyers, engineers and other technical personnel for \$5000.00 a year. If they are any good at all they can get more from private industry. Therefore the commission must pay the going wage if it is to have competent people. We believe, and we hope the legislature will agree, that the functions of the Public Service Commission are too vital to have a pinch-penny policy in effect on such technical personnel.

The Commission is one place where the people cannot afford to have incompetance.

But to return to the Commissioners' salary.

Can you imagine a situation where the hired man can make more than the boss? Certainly this makes for poor morale and a certain lack of interest in the work on the part of the boss.

Your committee is not excusing the actions of the Public Service Commission on these grounds. But we believe, that in the interest of good government, the commissioners should make more than those they employ.

This would amount to only a small amount of money relatively speaking when you realize that the commissioners sup-

ervise business activities running into the hundreds of millions of dollars, and that they must rule on questions which involve millions of dollars in one decision alone.

2—We feel that the legislature itself must take part of the blame for the mill storage situation. At present the funds for supervision of elevators allow for only two employees. We recommend that the legislature appropriate enough money to put two full time field personnel on the road, plus an able administrator.

Let us give one illustration. The elevator at Barney, N. Dak., was involved in a case of embezzelment. The citizens who have done business with this elevator—assuming that it was under correct supervision by the Public Service Commission—stand to lose thousands upon thousands of dollars.

The money lost here would pay for adequate supervision of elevators in the whole state for quite a long time. We think that this is no place for a penny-wise, pound-foolish attitude, and respectfully hope that this legislature will agree.

- 3—The exact letter of the law is not clear. Part of the law concerning mill storage is contained in rules set up by the Public Service Commission. The Commission then chose, or was forced to, ignore its own rules. We recommend that a thorough study be made of these laws and rules at once, and that this legislature do whatever is necessary to strengthen the law and to put teeth into it.
- 4—Because this practice is widespread in the grain producing area of this nation, we recommend that the Legislative Research Committee or some other special committee be detailed to make a study of corrective legislation in conjunction with other states in this area. This Committee could contact similar bodies in Minnesota, South Dakota and Montana in an effort to arrive at a solution to the problem which would fit all states. We recommend especially, that this Committee look into Montana grain laws which are better in some ways than those in this state especially as regards grading of grain.
- 5—This committee feels that the grain people are not entirely at fault in this matter. We believe that for every such atcion as this, there must be a cause. As nearly as we can determine, it has not been profitable to store grain for the past 10 to 15 years. There are several reasons for this:

First among them is the cost of building elevator space. Building costs have skyrocketed since, and just before World War II. Yet, elevators are forced, by law, to charge storage at the same rate they charged in the late 1930's. This seems to your committee to be unfair. Let us also take note that no radical change has been made in the methods of handling grain in the past ten years, to offset the rise in building and maintenance costs.

Elevator men have told your committee that they cannot make money storing and handling grain. Therefore they must seek a way to get "free" storage by shipping the farmer's grain to the mills.

It is the belief of your committee that the millers and other interests in the Twin Cities are never going to encourage the raising of storage rates. In fact, they will discourage it at every turn because this stimulates the flow of free grain into the hoppers of the mills. This makes for lower grain prices and higher profits for the millers.

Along this line let us also point out that the large terminal elevators will never recommend higher storage rates either. The truth is that they do not want adequate country elevator storage. They want North Dakota grain to be shipped and stored in Minnesota as soon as possible after harvest. Your committee sees no reason why this should be the case. We believe that adequate country elevator storage plus on-the-farm storage is the best protection the farmer has, for the reason that it leaves the grain nearer to home where it is best controlled.

Therefore it is the recommendation of your committee that the legislature study the problem of grain handling and the present price structure for this service with the view toward allowing an adjustment to give country elevator men a fair price.

On the surface this may look like an additional cost to the farmers, but actually it will save him money in the long run. If he pays a slight amount more for storage and can get several cents more for his grain, certainly the farmer is the winner.

In closing your committee earnestly and sincerely recommends to the legislature a thorough exploration of this problem which is so vital to all of our citizens. Agriculture is still our main source of revenue in this state and we certainly must do everything in our power to safeguard it, or else we fail in our job as the representatives of the people. With these closing words we submit this report to you for your consideration and action.

Rep. Wilk: "Members of the House, and Mr. Speaker: I served in this House for two terms but I do not remember another time when I was called to the Speaker's rostrum and you don't know how grateful I am to you, Mr. Speaker, for this opportunity. It would be an understatement to say that this is not a great pleasure to be here. This is something like attending a college or family reunion as I feel at home here. Your cordial welcome helps me along in that attitude.

If I may be permitted to speak of a personal experience in this body, when I was newly enrolled in this school of higher learning, the veteran legislator from the 9th district, who is now your Speaker, told me to sponsor a certain bill that was sure to pass. Then my name would go down indelibly as a leader in North Dakota—sort of an immortality was offered to me. The bill was not very controversial there were no great moral issues involved; no expenditures or appropriations. The bill related that the treasurer of the Agricultural College at Fargo could receive the annual grant provided by the Morrell Act passed in 1895. I watched the progress of that bill as a mother does a growing infant. It passed the House and went to the Senate where it was The House concurred with the Senate amended slightly. and the bill became a law. Now I thought my name was on the books for keeps. To my surprise and chagrin when the record was sent to me, I found that the bill was credited to Mr. Joe Welk, who spells his name with an "e" and I spell mine with an "i". So immortality was denied me, Mr. Speaker.

Now in a more serious vein I know the problems you are facing and I know that forty-six other legislatures are facing the same problems—that of providing funds to carry on the necessary operation of government in the state. The two exceptions are Kentucky and Virginia, which meet in the even numbered years. I presume you are going to take all non-segregated funds you can find, and create some new taxes if you think you can bring in some revenue, and if you still fail to find a sufficient amount you can use the credit of the State of North Dakota. As a business man, the 3% bonds issued by the State of North Dakota, would be very safe, in my opinion.

I sat in this House for two sessions and frequently wondered as I think many of you do about the tediousness and the formula and such things and it is a little disappointing at times to many, many people as it was to me. The only solace in this—Can you think of any type of government other than this representative type that that would be as adequate as this? I am thinking of the general voter having to vote on every bill that you have to vote on. We would have about four hundred initiated bills. If you are thinking of government from above by a commissar or a colonial governor to take care of the affairs of state in North Dakota, I am sure you would not find that a very happy solution.

Mr. Speaker, again I want to thank you for the privilege given me and to wish the membership good health and the satisfaction of doing a worthwhile job."

at the primary election held in the State of North Dakota on the 29th day of June, 1954, and identified as No. 2 on the said ballot, prohibiting members of the Legislative Assembly and their spouses, and partnerships, corporations, and associations in which such members or spouses have a specified interest, from doing business with the State of North Dakota or its subdivisions under certain conditions, and providing penalties.

#### EIGHTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rep. Nygaard moved that the courtesy of the floor be extended to Hon. M. R. Young, U. S. Senator, and that a committee of two be appointed to escort him to the rostrum, which motion prevailed and the Speaker appointed as such committee Reps. Rickford and Knudsen.

Rep. Nygaard moved that the remarks of Senator Young be printed in the House Journal, which motion prevailed. Senator Young:

"Thank you, Speaker Fitch and Members of the State House of Representatives. It is always a pleasure to come back here. I think I got more education and benefit from serving in the legislature than the people of LaMoure county got. Once I was co-sponsor of a bill to cut down the membership of the House and Senate. The late Senator Bill Watt very effectively opposed it on the ground that the legislature was the best institution of higher learning in the State of North Dakota and he was not for cutting it down.

I am glad to see my friend Joe Wicks here as a member of the House. He writes me letters quite often telling me what to do and what not to do and he has been trying to trade horses with me for twenty years. I have never been so foolish as to try that yet.

I am especially glad to see my friend Ruth Smith back here. We have been associated in politics since 1932—I believe it was even before then. I note that she too always likes to come back to the state House of Representatives.

I first served in the House in 1933 and went to the state senate in 1935. Those were terrible times. The average price of a bushel of wheat in 1933 was  $39\phi$  a bushel and in 1938, it was  $38\phi$  a bushel. The counties in the state and every political subdivision were broke. That is proof that no one can be prosperous in North Dakota or in the nation unless we maintain a fair price for agricultural commodities. At that time Senator Martin from Morton County introduced a resolution calling for North Dakota to secede from the union. That got an awful lot of national attention and a lot of bad publicity but Senator Martin had a good motive back of his resolution. He wanted to call the attention of the rest of the nation to the problems that we in North Dakota were facing at that time. He did a very effective job even though the publicity was not so good.

Ever since that time we have had a problem with agriculture. For a long period of time most people recognized that there could be no prosperity without a good agricultural price. We can get good prices when we are faced with a shortage and that is something that I would like to spend a few minutes talking about. We have lost many of our foreign exports. Last year Congress passed Public Law No. 480 permitting spending nearly two million dollars to assist in disposing of our surpluses. There was seven hundred million dollars allocated to the disposal of surpluses and for currency of the foreign countries for purchases of food in the United States and to authorize barter bills where we could trade wheat for industrial diamonds and such. The state department set a ceiling of \$443,000,000.00, as I recall it. The most that could be spent this year to dispose of agricultural surpluses despite the fact that many nations in

the world indicated their desire to get agricultural commodities. The decision was not chargeable so much to the Secretary of State as to the thousands and thousands of career employees of the Department of State. I think the Civil Service law, in many respects, is very good. It works in the postal service where there are no policies to be made, but when you get in the Department of State where you have fifty-seven thousand employees, a large part of them making important decisions and it is almost impossible to get rid of them when a new administration comes into power no matter how unwise their policies are, you run into real problems. Most of the career diplomats are from Harvard, Yale or some college like that. They come out as young men and go into the State department, and they go to a tougher school than the one that they come out of. They are indoctrinated with the policy that the United States has unlimited wealth and everything should be for the betterment of other countries and nothing done for our own welfare. Brazil expressed a desire right away, as an example, to purchase two hundred thousand tons of wheat under the new legislation. Our ambassador, Mr. Kemper of Chicago who was formerly treasurer for the Republican National Committee, approved of it, but the State Department said "No". They said we could only sell Brazil one hundred thousands tons. Someone tipped off Canada and they got the business right away—they got one hundred thousand tons and we got one hundred thousand tons, and we loaned Brazil the money to pay Canada.

They have adopted a policy, for example, with respect to dairy commodities. We have not been an exporter of dairy commodities so they say we can't export any dairy commodities without first getting the approval of Denmark, Holland and New Zealand. So when we want to sell any of these commodities to any foreign country, no matter how badly they want them, we can't do it without getting the approval of those countries. In the Far East, we can't export rice without getting the approval of the other countries over there. There is no requirement that other countries with surpluses, have to get the approval of the United States.

Well, may I say that when we get these currencies from these countries for exchange of our surpluses, we use them in lieu of dollars, as is true of every foreign country where we have given military assistance so it represents no loss to this country.

Japan wanted to purchase one hundred million dollars worth of surpluses but the state department said that we can only export sixty million. They finally compromised at eighty-five million. Italy wanted sixty million—the state department said they could only have thirty or thirty-five million, but through the intervention of our ambassador, Clare Booth Luce, they finally compromised so that we could send them forty million dollars in agricultural commodities.

The Senate Agricultural Committee is going into that right away. Last week there was a subcommittee appointed with Senator Eastland of Mississippi as Chairman; Senator Holland of Florida is the second ranking Democrat. Senators Schoefel, Scott and myself are the other members. We are having a closed hearing this Thursday, where Ambassador Kemper will appear and give us information with respect to

Brazil. He is completely on our side, as is the Department of Agriculture but we can't get by the State Department. That is one of the problems that agriculture had has over the years. It is a struggle for existence, and may I say that one of the happiest duties I have in Washington is dealing with the agricultural problem. I know every member of this House is just as interested as I am. If I could spend all my time dealing with those subjects on agriculture, I would be very happy.

Now, my good friend, Ken Fitch, I am glad to see that at last Imperial Cass has been recognized, and I know you have a very good Speaker. He was here when I came in 1933 and George Saumur is the only other member that was here before then.

Ken mentioned something about the international situation. I have talked with most members of the United States senate on the foreign situation and no one has the answer any more than you people out here. No one knows what mad gangsters may do but the feeling is that if we approach them from a position of strength rather than weakness, that they would not attack us, but I don't think that anything will happen. It is awfully bad to underrate the military power of any nation but we have vastly overrated the military strength of China because we had a situation in Korea and by our own action so circumscribed our military forces that they could not win. They fought to a stalemate. So we think China in particular is awfully tough. I don't think they are half as strong as they are played up to be and as the stories make out.

It is always a real pleasure to come back here and visit with you folks and I assure you that so long as I live I will make this trip back every two years. I wish I could visit with every one of you personally. Thank you."

# MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR State of North Dakota OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR

Bismarck, February 9, 1955

Members of the House of Representatives Thirty-fourth Legislative Assembly House Chambers Bismarck, North Dakota

# Greetings:

Because requests for additional appropriations and increases in the appropriations beyond totals approved by the Budget Board have been and are being made to appropriation committees by representatives of state departments and institutions, I deem is appropriate to explain more fully the probable future status of the General Fund during the 1955-57 biennium. Fortunately there will be a sizeable saving in the World War II veterans' adjusted compensation bond standing appropriation of \$2,600,000.00.

Many of the pertinent figures mentioned herein can be found on page 3 and 4 of the Budget Board report and on page 10 and 18 of the Governor's Message. Starting from the General Fund cash balance of January 1, 1955, as per

From the above you will note no provision has been made for increasing the state mill levy for General Fund purposes.

*There will have to be provided from the General Fund an item of about \$520,000.00 toward the retirement of interest and principal on World War II adjusted compensation bonds. The standing appropriation, which is a part of the \$28,997,000.00 above, for this purpose was \$3,120,000.00; hence, the saving of \$2,600,000.00.

Generally the low point in the General Fund is at the end of January. At times it has been several million dollars less than on July 1. I believe that the balance of \$943,000.00 is too dangerously close to a probable deficit if our estimates are wrong. 'Tis true the cash balance may be somewhat in excess of that figure, but very likely it would be possible that the General Fund would be close to depletion as far as the cash balance is concerned on January 31, 1957, if these figures prove to be correct.

As long as surplus money exists in other funds I do not believe that this is the time to impose increased taxes. Sufficient money is available in the sales tax fund. Its surplus as of December 31, 1954, was approximately \$23,000,000.00. By taking \$5,000,000.00 out of the sales tax surplus money —\$3,000,000.00 for the General Fund out of which \$2,500,000 will come from the share belonging to Equalization and \$500,000.00 from the share belonging to the Welfare Department, there will remain \$2,000,000.00 for buildings as noted below from Welfare funds.

This transfer of \$5,000,000.00 from the Equalization and Welfare part of the sales tax surplus will leave that fund with a balance of approximately \$18,000,000.00. Legislation which will place a ceiling on the surplus for these two funds at \$18,000,000,00 I would recommend for your consideration.

It appears that an amount not to exceed \$10,000.000.00 maximum for Equalization and one of \$8,000,000.00 maximum for Welfare would appear adequate to cover contingencies. Furthermore, I do not believe that any surplus much less than these two figures should be considered.

Thus the General Fund will be relieved by appropriating the following amounts from the sales tax surplus resulting in a satisfactory balance in the General Fund on July 1, 1957. Besides, these transfers will permit modest increases and additions in appropriations for departments and institutions, depending upon the judgment of the appropriations committees and the members of this Legislature.

This figure of \$3,993,000.00 then will represent an estimated unencumbered balance in the General Fund July 1, 1957. From it must, of course, be deducted all increases and additions to General Fund appropriations which were not approved by the Budget Board and which have or will be passed by this session of the Legislature. As of this date appropriations amounting to \$31,309,000.00 have been introduced in both Houses. This figure includes amendments for increases and additions that have been adopted. It also includes an appropriation of \$3,344,000.00 for highway construction. It does not include a standing appropriation of \$3,120,000.00 referred to above for payment on World War II bonus bonds. Generally speaking, the figure does not include any increases or additions on appropriations for the institutions of higher learning, other institutions under the Board of Administration and the state departments of government. However, the Budget Board approved figures are a part of this total.

Other appropriations from Welfare's share of sales tax surplus have been recommended in my message substantially as follows:

*Because of negotiations with South Dakota this building may not be needed or may not be built in coming biennium. In that event the money could be used for a school building at the Feeble Minded School which is almost as essential as the ward building at that institution.

Numerous requests for buildings will be made beyond those mentioned above, and particularly at our institutions of higher learning. It is my recommendation if any of these are passed that they be on condition that Budget Board approval is secured before any contracts are let—this not to include architects fees, plans, etc. for such buildings.

Likewise, appropriations from the General Fund for highway construction, except from specific revenues or income therein, should be made conditional upon the approval of the Budget Board before the transfers are made. If the funds were available, under Chapter 82 of the 1953 Session Laws, \$3,136,718.62 can be spent on highway construction. Undoubtedly this amount will not be available except perhaps in part during the coming biennium.

My best wishes to you for a successful solution of our General Fund problems. I shall be pleased if you arrive at a better solution than the one presented herewith.

# LINCOLN DAY ADDRESS Leslie R. Burgum, Attorney General

Introduction by Lieutenant Governor C. P. Dahl

Attorney General Burgum:

"Governor Brunsdale, President Dahl, Speaker Fitch, Members of this Legislative Assembly, Boy Scouts, and fellow citizens:

It is indeed appropriate that this legislature should meet in joint session to observe the birthday of Abraham Lincoln for this great American was one of the miracles of all history. His life is stranger than fiction, and in our nation his name is above every name. He was born in a three-sided log cabin in the State of Kentucky; moving with his parents at an early age to the still newer state of Indiana; and then at about the age of twenty-one, going over into the pioneer state of Illinois. He was truly a product of the frontier.

We have had this demonstration by the Boy Scouts today and we are all somewhat familiar with their work. Lincoln of course, lived in the out-of-doors. He was near to Nature's heart in all of his boyhood and young life. It was given to him by Divine Providence, not only to lead a race out of bondage but in the critical hour of this national life to actually preserve this republic for posterity. It is indeed a miracle which causes us to believe in a Divine spirit that human clay could thus be employed for the benefit of all mankind.

Now in the year 1833 we find Abraham Lincoln in the frontier hamlet of New Salem, Illinois. That village has been restored. A year ago last November I was in that village of New Salem which is about twenty miles northwest of Springfield. I had been there previously in 1938. At that time I was fortunate to be in the company of Harry Pratt, Secretary of the Lincoln Historical Society and now the State Historian for the State of Illinois. That village had entirely disappeared, of course. It has practically disappeared before the Civil War but the State of Illinois and the federal government have restored it and the old log log cabin where Lincoln lived is standing there as it was in his day, with the same furniture, Lincoln's store is there, the postoffice and the Rutledge tavern, and the mill down on the Saganon River. The village is standing there and it was in that village that Lincoln lived. It was there he came in contact with Mr. Graham, a schoolteacher, who was a great factor in his life and he taught Lincoln many things and encouraged him in his study of the law. It is interesting to note and particularly to members of this assembly, that Lincoln early became interested in politics.

In 1832 at the age of twenty-three he was a candidate for He was defeated in that election the State Legislature. but two years later he was elected and served four terms in the State Legislature of Illinois. He became somewhat prominent in that body, the Lower house, and in 1839 was a candidate for Speaker. He served as acting Floor Leader through one session. It was there he met John T. Stewart, who was also a member, and was the actual floor leader in one session. He was a lawyer from Springfield, and together with the help of some others they succeeded in moving the capitol from Vandalia to Springfield, and his acquaint-ance with John Stewart resulted in Lincoln following up the study of law. In 1837 he went to Springfield to practice with Stewart. Of course, Springfield is in the same legislative district so that did not disturb his candidacy, and his position as a legislator from that district. After leaving the legislature his last session would have been in 1841. Five years later he became a candidate for Congress and by a strange coincidence his opponent—he was a candidate of the Whig Party—and his opponent was a Democrat, Peter Cartwright. Mr. Cartwright was a presiding Elder in his church and the man who had defeated Lincoln for the Legislature in 1832. The story is told that in the fall of that year, as they were both out campaigning, Cartwright was preaching and Lincoln came in. Lincoln sat in back and in concluding a powerful message—which Cartwright was canable of giving—he tried to see what impression he had made upon his hearers. He endeavored to get them to make an expression of their faith and so he said, "All of those who want to go to Heaven, please stand." Everybody stood except Lincoln. When they sat down Cartwright said, "Mr. Lincoln, where do you expect to go?" There seemed to be but one alternative, but Lincoln stood up to his full height and said, "Brother Cartwright, I expect to go to Congress." And to Congress he went.

But Lincoln's term in Congress was not very productive. In fact, he incurred the animosity of his constituents by being against the Mexican War which was then in progress. He did not seek re-election but returned to Springfield and apparently was through with politics. He so stated, and he began the active practice of law.

Lincoln's first partner was this same John T. Stewart. Lincoln was the junior partner, as he was with Judge Logan. In 1844 he took into partnership a man about ten years younger than himself, known around Springfield as Billy Herndon, who played a large part in the life of Lincoln. They were partners until Lincoln's death more than twenty years later.

I was in Lincoln's law office in Springfield—the old law office—when I was back there a year ago last November. I got quite a thrill out of climbing the narrow stairway to the third story of that building, which I suppose is one of the very, very few which remain from the pre-Civil War days. On the way up I passed by a law office on the second floor and a young lady stenographer said, "If you go up to the third story you will find the law office of Lincoln, and a man who can tell you about Lincoln." Sure enough, there was an architect, a man a little older than myself, who had grown up in Springfield, and whose grandfather at one

time had been a partner of this same Billy Herndon, who had been Lincoln's partner—that was at a later date after Lincoln's death. I enjoyed spending an hour or so with that man, who gave me something of the viewpoints concerning Lincoln, as Springfield of that early day, knew him. Lincoln, as a lawyer, of course, developed considerable prominence in the state of Illinois. There was a time when I had the impression that Lincoln, after all, was not too much of a lawyer, but that is not true. He became a very well known and active practitioner. I think it is fair to say that Lincoln never cared too much about the office work of a lawyer. His strong point was in the trial of cases, and in particular, his address—his summation to the jury. That was his strongest point—getting to the jury. Lincoln carried to the Supreme Court, either by himself or in conjunction with some other attorneys, some 175 cases, out of which he succeeded in obtaining decisions in his favor in 96 of those cases, so he did a lot of work as an appelate lawyer. He appeared in Federal Court in that district a great many times.

You have doubtless heard of his appearance for the Illinois-Central Railway in which he and Herndon obtained a fee of \$5,000.00. It was a lot of money in those days and I don't think most lawyers today would entirely disregard it. Lincoln obtained prominence as an attorney and as I sat in those rooms and talked with that man who was a product of Springfield, I felt a thrill to think of the fact that within those walls back there from 1844 to the days of the beginning of the Civil War when Lincoln became President, he was there in the active practice of law, travelling over that circuit, or district as we call it, travelling probably half the time on the trial of cases in the thirteen counties that composed that judicial district, assisting attorneys in the county seats and engaged in the active practice of law.

This architect was an interesting character. He told me many people came to visit him and to talk about Abraham Lincoln. He said one day a very attractive lady came in. She appeared to be well educated and cultured and wanted to talk to him about Lincoln, especially Mrs. Lincoln, and the domestic life of Lincoln. A great deal has been written about his romance with Ann Rutledge, and there was a Mary Owens in his life before Mary Todd came along. Lincoln was past thirty years of age when he was married. Much has been said about Mrs. Lincoln but my friend Mr. Haynes, the architect, had the answer for this lady. He said, "I know just the kind of a woman Mary Todd Lincoln was. She was an excellent housekeeper, a splendid cook, a wonderful mother, and awfully hard to live with. I know that because my wife is just the same kind of a woman." Well, that would have been all right, but to his amazement and chagrin, about three months later one of the leading magazines came out with a story written by the same lady in which he was quoted directly as comparing Mary Todd Lincoln with his own wife. Unfortunately, his wife got hold of the magazine before he did but he consoled her by saying, "You ought to be proud of being compared with Mary Todd Lincoln."

Across the street is the Sangamon County Court House, which was the State House in Lincoln's time. I went across there and went into the court room where the District Court

was in session—the circuit court, they call it there. A case was being tried before a jury and I sat down and tried to visualize Abraham Lincoln standing there. The room was arranged about like this, in circular fashion. It was not as large, of course, but in Lincoln's day it had a balcony just as this room has a balcony. That has since been taken down. I tried to visualize Lincoln as he stood there as a very young man in 1858, when he made his famous "house divided against itself" speech, which won for him recognition that I think started him on the way to the presidency. It was on the eve of the Republican State Convention in the state of Illinois. You will bear in mind that the Republican Party had just been founded four years before that. In 1856 the first convention was held in Philadelphia. By the way, it is interesting to note that at that convention Lincoln obtained 110 votes for the vice-presidency. He was not nominated but it indicated he had growing prestige and was known somewhat in those western states of Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin, and others.

Lincoln stood there, and in a great statement, which I suppose in a sense was a reply to Stephen A. Douglas, Senator from Illinois-they had been political antagonists since way back in the early days of Springfield when Douglas, too, was a lawyer there, but Douglas sprang into great prominence and was known everywhere throughout the land, but Lincoln made that statement, "a house divided against itself cannot stand", and he took a positive attitude against the institu-tion of slavery and its further spread in the nation. The compromise of 1850 had been repealed. The Kansas-Nebraska bill known as the "Popular Sovereignty Measure", had been introduced and carried into effect and it appeared that the institution of slavery could not be contained. Lincoln had a Douglas had no great moral conviction upon that issue. conviction about the morality or immorality of slavery-it meant nothing except as it had political aspects. had a deep, abiding conviction as to the iniquity of that institution and asserted it in his "house divided against itself" speech. Then followed his nomination by the Republican Party for the United States Senate, and that fall the Lincoln-Douglas debates brought him into great prominence and made for his nomination in Chicago in 1860.

That would be an interesting story but our time is spent. I return to this proposition that in the providence of the Eternal, this man who came from the backwoods, from the frontier of this country of ours, who never had the benefit of schools, who never had the culture of college training, who studied law by the light of the log fire in New Salem, who made his way from the prairies to the presidency—that this man was strangely used by a Divine Power to preserve the republic and to liberate a people from human slavery. It is no wonder that Edwin Markham wrote those lines, "So came the captain with the mighty heart."

I stood within the tomb of Abraham Lincoln on two occasions. I talked with the caretaker there back in November of 1953 as I had talked with him in 1938. He told me where the residue of this great martyred president rested, but as I left that tomb, I knew the spirit of Lincoln was not there. The spirit of Lincoln is not limited to Springfield, it is abroad in the land. In a body like this, the spirit of Lincoln moves in the hearts of these Boy Scouts. The spirit of Lincoln is where courage and daring is needed by the men who defend

this flag of ours upon the beach-heads of the world. The spirit of Lincoln is in our churches where people are taught that to do justly, and love mercy and walk humbly with God is the great requisite of any self governing people. The spirit of Lincoln is in the home where a mother at eventide teaches her children to pray and kisses them smilingly into sleep. The spirit of Lincoln is abroad in the land today in our atmosphere spirit of Lincoln is abroad in the land today in our struggle in this testing time as he said at Gettysburg, "to determine if a government by the people, of the people, and for the people may not perish from the earth."

It is indeed fitting that the State Legislature of North Dakota, and of every state, should contemplate this remarkable anomaly of a man who moved from the prairies of that frontier state to the highest position within the gift of the people, and by his own life demonstrated for all mankind the

value and the virtue, and the genius of democracy.

With said sample there must be a statement of facts of the appeal and a final test in duplicate shall be made by such laboratory. The certificate of such laboratory of said test shall be final and binding

upon both parties in establishing the basis of the price paid by the warehouseman. A fee for each protein test may be made, to be deducted and paid at the time of final settlement; provided, however, upon written request of owner, no protein test need be made upon said owner's wheat."

#### REPORT OF SELECT COMMITTEE

Mr. Speaker: Your Subcommittee on Transportation to whom was referred the Highway Users Conference on State Reciprocity has the following report to submit:

On February 11, 1955 a meeting on Reciprocity was held in Des Moines, Iowa to discuss the various problems arising on this subject. This was one of a series of meetings called by the Highway Users Conference to attempt to formulate a uniform agreement and law for presentation to legislators for the purpose of having uniform reciprocal privileges. At this particular meeting members of the various state governments were invited to attend. Representatives of the Highway Users from Iowa, Illinois, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, Wisconsin, South Dakota, and North Dakota were present. Representatives of the State government from Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota and Wisconsin were in attendance. North Dakota was represented by Senator Leier, Representative Roen, and C. J. Crawford of the State Highway Department.

A discussion of the difficulties of attempting to have uniform reciprocity laws was discussed and representatives of State government were very much in agreement on the fact that while such conditions were desirable for the highway user, it was at this time not practicable from the state's level. One of the main obstacles was the present variation in basic methods of truck taxation that has become a policy in each of the states. The second main point of difficulty was caused by the fact that in several instances there was a marked difference in the vehicle miles of use obtained by foreign vehicles within a state as compared to the miles of travel out of state made by residents from that state.

As far as solving the overall problems of reciprocity this meeting was not very productive, however, continued efforts toward finding a solution must be made. It was the consensus of opinion of the state officials present that an equitable solution of this problem must be found and presented by the highway users, and if they were unable to make such a determination, they then could expect the states to take whatever action they individually found necessary to protect their interests.

In individual discussions, our North Dakota group and Mr. Boyles, Representative from Nebraska, agreed to a free movement of North Dakota vehicles in Nebraska upon the payment of a mile tax similar to that imposed on Nebraska vehicles in North Dakota. By doing this North Dakota vehicles would be relieved of the Nebraska requirement of buying license. They must, however, when entering Neb-

raska enter through one of their ports of entry. The ports of entry, at the present time, are located at Chadron, Yankton, and Sioux City. Additional ports are expected to be opened at Valentine and Mariman. These ports of entry will be publicized in North Dakota. It was also agreed that North Dakota vehicles carrying North Dakota dealers plates could be operated in Nebraska on an intransit base and the same privileges would be extended to similarly licensed Nebraska vehicles operating in North Dakota, without the imposition of any fee by either State.

In these discussions it was also brought out that Nebraska has an impounding law similar to the one imposed in North Dakota. The Nebraska law requires that the safety of perishable loads that may be involved in these impoundments remain with the driver and owner.

Representative Roen was very much interested in discussing the problems that exist with South Dakota, however, officials from that State failed to attend the meeting.

Rep. Gefreh moved that the remarks of Governor Brunsdale be printed in the House Journal, which motion prevailed. Governor Brunsdale:

I am sure you all agree with me that we are most fortunate to have with us today one of America's great men. one who has been on the forefront of many events which have taken place since the beginning of World War II in particular; and which since the end of the war has brought the destiny of America so closely tied in with the destiny of so many nations of the world, and particularly, as far as our distinguished guest is concerned, that of Europe.

General Alfred M. Gruenther, our Supreme Allied Commander in Europe, was born and raised in the Middlewest,

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eastern Nebraska, in the town of Platte Center. Its population, I am sure, compares favorably with most of the cities and villages you members of this Legislative Assembly come from. Perhaps because of that fact and his mother is still living down there, in part it has something to do with the fortunate arrangement whereby he could come here to address this joint Legislative Session.

In this connection I wish to pay tribute to Mr. Floyd Boutrous, who on a tour on behalf of the Crusade for Freedom in Europe last summer was privileged to have a visit with General Gruenther in the course of which he invited him to come to North Dakota. It was a pleasure for me to extend that invitation and I was happy to receive the reply which has culminated in his presence here. Representatives of our North Dakota Crusade for Freedom in North Dakota are present here today.

I am not going to burden you with a lot of statistics concerning the military career of General Gruenther, but because it is so significant in many respects I believe a brief mention of it would be entirely appropriate.

As a boy he attended Prep School at St. Thomas Military Academy. There are representatives of St. Thomas College here from the Bismarck vicinity and elsewhere, including the President of the College, Very Reverend Vincent J. Flynn. From there he went to West Point through an appointment from Senator Hitchcock, a man most of you will remember from his long years of service in the United States Congress. After finishing West Point, by the way, fourth in his class, in November 1 of 1918, not much over the age of 19 years, he served in various capacities as an instructor and assistant professor at the U. S. Military Academy for eight years, the last tour about three years ending in 1941.

I do not know whether this is significant, but I think it is unusual that he served as Deputy Chief of Staff or Chief of Staff under four outstanding generals, Lieutenant General Walter Krueger, who commanded the Third Army; Deputy Chief of Staff, Allied Force Headquarters under General Eisenhower in London; later on at Algiers and in North Africa. Then in January, 1943, he was named Chief of Staff of General Mark W. Clark's Fifth Army in North Africa and in Italy. In 1944, December, he was transferred to the Fifteenth Army group as Chief of Staff with General Clark again as Commander. This group was the field command containing all the combat units of Italy. It included American, British, French, Indian, Polish, New Zealand and Italian units. Anyone who could successfully associate himself with all these nationalities I am sure would fit in as Suprme Allied Commander in Europe. He also served in Austria with General Clark.

In 1947 he was back in Washington as the first Director of the Joint Staff which serves the staff for the Joint Chiefs of Staff; Deputy Chief of Plans for the United States Army in 1949.

He became General Eisenhower's Chief of Staff when the Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers was organized in Paris in '51. In that capacity he continued on with General Eisenhower's successor, General Matthew B. Ridgeway. Then since 1953, and it brings us up to date, General Alfred M. Gruenther became Supreme Allied Commander in Europe, and in that capacity he is with us here today. I am certainly pleased and honored to have the opportunity to present him to you. I am sure that when he is through talking we will have a better understanding of the defense of Europe under NATO than we have ever had before. General Gruenther.

# General Gruenther:

Governor Brunsdale, Mr. President, Members of the Legislative Assembly, Distinguished Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen:

When Nebraska was very much in swaddling clothes, it was the custom of the people there to wear pistols when they came to an assembly such as this one. On one particular occasion they had a visitor who started out very glibly with his prepared talk. Out of the corner of his eye, he happened to see some of the representatives reaching for their back pockets, and out came a series of pistols, all pointed in his direction. He kept that in mind and continued to talk, but pretty soon he saw the same motion on the other side, out came another series of pistols all pointed in his direction. He knew he was in trouble and he had great difficulty in continuing his talk. Finally one pistoltoting Nebraskan said, "Don't mind us, young fellow; it is not you that we have it in for but the fellow who invited you here." I would like to make it clear that when you point your pistols, don't point them at Governor Brunsdale because the real culprit in this case is Mr. Boutrous. He hornswoggled the Governor into issuing the invitation.

I am deeply honored to be here. It is interesting that a month ago today, at almost this same hour — three o'clock — I was at Copenhagen in Denmark, meeting with a group of eighty members of the Danish parliament, the cabinet, and other officials, on this same subject. There is a certain relation between the two areas though they are 5600 miles apart, because they are both agricultural communities—both areas are wondering about, and sadly troubled by, the security situation in the world today.

The Danes are particularly disturbed because when you notice their position on the map it is obvious that they are very close to the area occupied by the Soviet forces in Eastern Germany. Specifically, they are thirteen minutes away, from the nearest Soviet base. However, the fate of Denmark, and the fate of North Dakota and the whole Free World are bound up inextricably together. It was to solve that

problem that the North Atlantic Treaty Organization was formed, almost six years ago.

General Eisenhower came to Europe four years ago, in the early part of January 1951, to set up the defense of Europe. General Eisenhower's mission was the defense of Europe from the northern tip of Norway clear out to the eastern border of Turkey, a distance of some four thousand miles.

When General Eisenhower arrived, he found the state of the Free World in a very depressed condition. Mind you, this was in January, 1951. We had just suffered a series of reverses in Korea, and it was only a matter of weeks until it seemed we were going to be ejected from that peninsula. In Europe itself the hope that there would be a new and better world had given way to the realization that Soviet imperialism was again on the march. You had such incidents as the coup d'etat in Prague, the Berlin Air Lift, and there was practically no strength to meet them.

General Eisenhower took a trip around the area three days after he arrived and he found that first of all, we had virtually no forces to defend successfully against acts of aggression. Even if we did have the forces, there were no means of communication to implement our overall strategy.

Eisenhower's headquarters were set up in Paris and became known as SHAPE, which stands for the Supreme Headquarters of the Allied Powers in Europe. From this headquarters in January 1951 I attempted to call Oslo. I was told by the operator to bear in mind that the telephone line went through the Soviet zone, and we would have the assistance of the Soviet officials in putting the call through. The operator said it would take eight hours but it actually took twelve hours. Whether this was because of Soviet help we didn't know. Now, four years later, we can get our calls through promptly. I left Paris Friday evening; that afternoon I called to Oslo and we got through in three minutes, and I am sure, without Soviet assistance.

We now have a going setup — not that we have a complete answer to the problems — but we have a functioning organization. We have divided our perimeter into sectors, with headquarters at Oslo to handle Norway and Denmark; a headquarters at Fontainebleau to defend the critical central area; a headquarters at Naples to defend Italy, Greece and Turkey; and a headquarters at Malta to handle the Mediterranean sea lines of communication.

All of those headquarters have what we call emergency plans. They know exactly what to do if an act of aggression developed today. Whether we would be successful or not is another question and depends largely on what the enemy brought against us, but we do have well prepared plans. All forces know what to do. We could, I assure you, put up an excellent defense. Our forces, numerically, are from three to four times as strong as they were when General Eisenhower arrived in Europe, and from the standpoint of effectiveness the improvement is greater still. How well we would do depends on the capabilities of the potential enemy.

In military jargon the term "capabilities" means what the enemy could do. It does not indicate he has any intention of doing anything. Intentions in the Soviet Union are determined by a very few people at the top. Up until three weeks ago, we thought they were determined by three people. We are not so sure now how many are involved. It is very difficult to gage intentions, so our military planning has to be based on capabilities — what the potential enemy could do if he decided to launch a major aggression.

What are the forces of the Soviet Union today? Taking the land forces first, the Soviets have the largest land army in the world. They demobilized only slightly at the end of the war. They now have more than two and a half million men—well led. We can get very slight consolation by saying the forces on our side, division for division, are superior, because that is not true.

They have an air force of approximately 20,000 operational planes. However, those planes quality-wise do not have an advantage over ours. In fact, the reverse is correct: We have an advantage over them quality-wise, but they make this up by their superiority in numbers. The Soviets are improving the quality of their air forces. It will take them some time, however, plane for plane, and pilot for pilot to be the equal of ours.

On the naval side, they are concentrating in the field of submarines. Also they are building certain surface craft, cruisers and destroyers. However, the cream of the crop, from the standpoint of personnel, is in the submarine field. They now have a total of about 350 submarines of all classes. So that you may have an idea of what 350 submarines mean, I should tell you that when the Germans started the last war they had fewer than 75. That doesn't mean the Soviets are five times as good as the Germans. They do not have the same know-how as the Germans. But it does indicate a trend, a focus of attention that is receiving very careful consideration by the Soviet high command.

Numerically, then — except in the case of the Navy — the Soviet forces are about the same now as when General Eisenhower came to Europe; quality-wise, they are much better. Take one category, the fighter plane; they had 10,000 and nearly all were piston-driven planes. They still have 10,000 but they are jet-propelled. That means the effectiveness of that air force has increased greatly.

I have not said anything about the satellites. Their forces are increasing considerably. When General Eisenhower came to Europe, there were about fifty satellite divisions; now there are about eighty. Those are in addition to the Soviet divisions I mentioned earlier. The air forces of the satellite nations contain between two and three thousand planes.

Neither of these forces, the satellite air forces or the satellite ground forces are first class units yet. It takes a long time to produce first class units — especially first class air forces — but the Soviets are concentrating on them and their strength is growing constantly.

All of this gives a picture of an increase in the power of the Soviet Bloc — for what reason again I say we do not attempt to evaluate. Our plans consider only what the capabilities are if a decision should be made to attack. Against these capabilities we developed an emergency war plan. You will recall that I said earlier that our commands at Oslo,

Fontainebleau, Naples and Malta, know exactly what to do if an aggression should develop today. By that I mean February 22, 1955.

It would be nothing short of a miracle, however, considering the fact that the Soviet forces were never demobilized, and that the forces under our command were at a very low level in January, 1951, if we had enough power now to be certain of resisting successfully an all-out Soviet aggression. We are not that good yet. We would give an excellent account but it requires more force. That is why we have recommended to our political superiors that additional forces be provided.

In developing our strength in Allied Command Europe, it was inevitable, then, that we should consider the strategic importance of Western Germany. The more we studied this problem at SHAPE, the more we became convinced of the difficulties of defending Europe without German participation. You will recall that the Paris accords provided for the admission of Western Germany into NATO as the fifteenth member.

When those accords have been ratified, Western Germany, as a partner in the alliance, will contribute for the defense of Europe some 18 to 20 tactical air wings, 12 divisions, and a naval element with a mission chiefly in the Baltic.

Because of the limited strength available to us without Western Germany, it is not possible to defend far enough to the east in Central Europe. This is an unsatisfactory strategy. We must have depth in our position in order to counter the striking power of mechanized armies and to fight off modern jet aircraft. We should, therefore, try to hold as far to the east as possible. Such a defense will be feasible when the German contribution becomes an effective one.

The question is sometimes asked: "What good are twelve German divisions in an atomic era?" The twelve German divisions, along with the German air and naval contribution, make the difference between a second choice strategy and a much more desirable forward strategy. This is true not in spite of the atomic age, but because of it. We must have a sufficient shield of allied ground and air forces to prevent the enemy from advancing in widely dispersed formation. That shield must be strong enough to force an attacking enemy to concentrate in his effort to break through. Those concentrations would be extremely vulnerable to attacks by our new weapons.

For this reason we are concentrating our attention at SHAPE on the development of a defense plan which we will use when the German forces are ready. The German units will then be an integral part of the allied shield side by side with their NATO partners.

As you know, under our SHAPE arrangements, the contingents of the participating nations cannot act on their own, but rather each national force contribution is used as a part of a whole under a unified command for the common good. When we have this essential German addition, and with the capability of all weapons in our NATO arsenal, we will then be able to plan realistically on a forward strategy which will defend Western Germany.

The prospect of a rearmed Germany is a matter of concern to some nations of Western Europe who have suffered

much from the misuse of German power. That anxiety is quite understandable. The plans for the rearmament of Western Germany are also causing much anxiety in the minds of many Germans. This very attitude on their part is evidence of the determination of the people of Western Germany to avoid the mistakes of the past. They have a stake in the continued freedom of the West and the right and the responsibility to aid in its defense.

The admission of Western Germany to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization will provide that military strength essential not only to the present members of NATO, but to the German people themselves. It will constitute a significant contribution to the unity of Western Europe.

A brief summary of our military situation is this: We have increased our military potential very considerably. It probably is still not strong enough to resist an all-out act of aggression today, but the prospects for the future are good when we get the German contribution.

I have been discussing only the military side. You will recall that Clemenceau, many years ago, as a wise-crack said, "War is much too important to be entrusted to the military." Although he was being a bit cynical at that time, the developments since then have proven him to be correct. Not only do we have the military side but we have the political, the psychological, and the economic side. I would like for a moment to discuss the psychological factor.

At the end of the war it was my pleasure to serve under General Clark in Vienna, and in that position I came in contact with the Russians. That was in July 1945. The war was over in Europe, but not elsewhere in the world. It was a honeymoon period. There was never going to be any trouble again. We were very close friends with the Russians. I was the No. 2 man on the United States side, and the No. 2 man on the Russian side was a man I saw very often. He was a four-star general, age 42, one of the ablest men I had ever met. He was a dedicated communist. He believed in it with all his heart and soul. He and I discussed communism at that time, and his philosophy went something like this:

"You come from a country that prides itself on freedom. You and your associates don't realize that freedom as you practice it, is really devisive. You should have a group of strong people as we do at the top who will tell the people what to do. Under your system, you are requiring them to take action on subjects of which they have absolutely no understanding. You might as well be having them vote on the correctness of the Einstein theory. What do they know about it? They will have politically a black side and a white side and you will be lucky if you get a gray answer; most frequently you won't get any answer. We, in our system, get a correct answer because we have wise, dedicated men at the top and we tell the people what to do."

His second thesis related to religion. He said, "You belong to a country, a civilization that sponsors religion, and well you should, because you are trying to exploit the masses, and naturally you want them to wait until they go to heaven in order to get their reward. You don't want to give them what they are entitled to on this earth; that's the reason your

capitalism is suffering. You have even devised a commandment 'Thou shalt not steal,' just to make certain they don't get what they are entitled to on this earth."

His third premise went something like this: "In any government and especially one like ours, the education of the young is of prime importance, because they must recognize the contribution that they are to make to the state. They must have political indoctrination — political education — right from the beginning."

It is interesting that a little over a year ago this man was given just that job for the Soviet Union. He is now almost ten years older but he is still a very able man. He has been appointed as the head of the Main Political Directorate of the Soviet Union. He has two bosses: Mr. Khrushchev is one and Marshal Zhukov is the other. He has the job of educating or indoctrinating the young men of the armed forces. There is a turn-over of about two million each year. He is assisted by some two thousand university graduates. They are engaged in the Soviet forces, down to the smaller units, in educating these people in the tenets of communism. They are not trying to enlist them necessarily in the communist party, for that is a very exclusive party; there are only seven million out of 213 million people. To be able to have them in the proper frame of mind is the job of this general I knew, and knowing his devotion to the cause I know he is doing an efficient job.

I bring that to your attention because I think it represents a problem for us. We are very good at being "anti," but Mr. Khrushchev and his associates and the people in the Soviet Union who are directing policies are more than anti—they are "for," and for a sinister doctrine. Certainly Khrushchev believes in it. That challenge is the one that is before us now, where we are against a totalitarian dictatorship, extending from East Germany seven thousand miles to the east, the strongest aggregation of power in the history of the world that ostensibly operates under the control of a very few men. We, with our conception of democracy and freedom, face great difficulties. We face the question of dedication, of service, service to our country and service to the cause of freedom. How we are going to solve it is not yet clear to me. I think we are doing better, but we are not doing it with the zeal that these people are. The United States by reason of the power position it has assumed has fallen heir to the mantle of leadership in the world, and our responsibility is very, very heavy.

You hear from time to time that in Europe there is a great deal of anti-Americanism. There is some, but that isn't so much what you have in Europe as it is skepto-Americanism. They are not sure that we have the wisdom to lead the world through a cold war struggle which may last for a long, long time. The British were in a similar position of leadership from the year 1814 to the year 1914. But their whole educational system was gaged to produce leaders, to produce the know-how that would understand the elements of world power in the type of world existing then. We have still, I feel, to perfect such a system to assist us in discharging the responsibility we now have. I need only point to the fact that the United States, which has become the most powerful country in the world, has become so

largely through impatience. If we have to move a hill and it takes fifty bulldozers, we would get fifty bulldozers and an extra hundred for good measure, and the hill would disappear. Some of us have the concept that in the world of ideas the same bulldozer tactics work. Unfortunately that is not true. It is a question of forging an alliance which is going to last for years and years and years under very frustrating and very irritating conditions. All allies are not going to do what you want them to do. The only perfect allies, we feel, are ourselves; all the rest, we think, make mistakes, and it is natural that we evaluate our own capabilities, our own intentions, and our own virtues very highly.

I recognize that having said that, you will say, "What do you want us to do about it?" I can only give a very general answer to that question by telling you the story of Will Rogers. Many years ago he was talking about the submarine menace. He said he had the answer to that problem. All we had to do was bring the ocean to a boil; that would force the submarines to the top. When you got them to the top, knock them off. Someone said to Will, "How do you get the ocean to boil?" He said, "Now just a second. I have only been outlining the general principles, and it is up to you to work out the details." I fall very much into that same trap in presenting the problem to a distinguished audience like this without a specific answer. But I am making the plea that more and more in our educational system, more and more in our daily lives, we become more keenly aware of the importance of our position in this world, and of the necessity for wisdom — and I mean wisdom, rather than know-how. In the words of President Eisenhower, we must be a "good partner." That is a very difficult proposition. I leave the problem unsolved. But we are going to have to find an answer if we are going to be able to keep up this struggle — cold war — peaceful coexistence — whatever it is — and to be able to come out on the winning side, or at least avoid being pushed back into another Korea. There is no evidence the Soviets are softening. There is every indication they have made it the No. 1 objective of their foreign policy to separate the United States from its allies. Every time they can drive in a dividing wedge, they do just that.

You can prove that an organization such as ours with fourteen countries where you have to have unanimity is a very cumbersome one. It certainly is. I will give you an illustration, a type of frustration that we had: In the Satellite countries to our East, there are a good many Soviet airfields. When General Eisenhower came to Europe, recognizing the importance of air power which is the dominating factor if war should take place, we decided we had to build airfields. We only had fifteen, and none would take jets. But that didn't matter much, because we had no jets to put on them. We knew we would get them though, and so we had to build fields for them. It was simple enough to do the building itself, but where were we going to get the money? How would you solve this problem? What should Norway pay for an airfield in Turkey? What should Italy pay for an airfield in France? What should the United States pay? Would it be based on national income, the gross national products? The number of red-headed women? What should the answer be? For eighteen months the countries

discussed it. Nobody got angry, but when the collection box was passed nothing was put in it.

The Soviets would have solved it in a few days. They would have said: "You pay five percent, you pay seven percent, and shut up." But that isn't the way we do business in an alliance. However, in spite of the frustrations, we have solved that problem. Instead of the fifteen NATO airfields we had in January 1951 when General Eisenhower came, we now have 130 in the European area being financed by NATO. In other words, we found a solution to this problem. It probably wasn't completely logical; it didn't conform to the national income; it was a guess; it was a try, but the fact is we have the airfields now; they will take jets, and we have the jets to put on them. So you can get answers to these problems with the right kind of leadership, and the right kind of determination to cooperate.

I am personally very much convinced that if the people of NATO — and there are 400 million of them — understand the problems, if they realize what the issues are, if they recognize the organization is a defensive one, and has as its number one objective trying to prevent a war, I am certain we can solve this question of collective security. It is going to take much education and understanding in order to develop that wisdom.

On the question of the Crusade for Freedom, it tackles another problem, which is the matter of reaching the people behind the Iron Curtain. I have been addressing my remarks to getting unity on the part of the people we see every day, our friends. The problem of getting behind the Iron Curtain is a different one, and that is the one to which the Crusade for Freedom has addressed itself. We in Europe have seen results of its programs and we think they are doing a magnificent job.

It will be interesting for you to know that the Soviets spend more money trying to jam the programs, such as the Crusade for Freedom, than the entire Free World spends in the field of propaganda. In other words, the Soviets recognize what a potent weapon propaganda is. Here we are a country that sells soap in terms so attractive you can almost taste it; yet we have trouble in developing propaganda that will appeal to the mind. I am sure you all agree with me that the Crusade for Freedom should be supported. It is an enterprise that is going to take a long time to develop the necessary know-how, but I am certain we can do it. I am soberly optimistic that we shall make good progress in this field.

Having told you of some of the capabilities of the Russians, I want also to tell you we know our own problems. We tend to focus on our own difficulties perhaps unduly, without recognizing the other fellow has many pains also. When the Supreme Soviet met two weeks ago today, some of those problems were exposed to the world. Just what that change meant is not clear to us now, but it is certain they are having trouble. Every night I pray the troubles will multiply. But they will probably multiply whether I pray or not.

I will give you an illustration of one specific kind of trouble that the Soviets have not begun to tackle yet. I told you we had a large number of airfields. We found out that having created those airfields for the jet planes, we needed a great deal of fuel for them. How would we get the fuel up there? When we studied the problem, we found that the truck and tank capacity in Europe wasn't enough to get the fuel to the fields. It was clear that if transportation facilities were knocked out as the result of enemy action, we were going to be in a very bad fix. So we have worked out a pipeline project. A whole network of pipelines are already financed in Western Europe and are under construction. In two years we will have that problem solved. The Soviets haven't even started on one in their area. They will learn the Lord does not deliver fuel oil to airfields either in war or peace — you have to get it there by human means.

I bring it up because there is a tendency to feel that every communist is a very smart fellow and never makes any mistakes, and are all six feet tall. But there are some dumb ones and there are some runts, and they make serious mistakes. For example, I think world history will show that they made a major error when they allowed the Korean attack to develop. The Free World nations had dropped their forces to practically zero and were very ineffective. If the Korean attack had not come along, it would have taken much time to make the people realize the dangers of Soviet imperialism.

The year before the Korean war, the continental countries had a military budget of four billion dollars. Last year, not including England, they had a budget of eleven and a half billion dollars. Take Denmark alone that year: it had a budget of 350 million kroners — there are seven kroners to a dollar — and probably for some time to come they will have a military budget of a billion kroner. The major mistake on the part of the Soviets was allowing the Korean enterprise to get under way. So I reiterate that they are not always as wise or powerful as we give them credit for.

not always as wise or powerful as we give them credit for. You all know the agricultural problem, and you know what Mr. Khrushchev has undertaken. He has nine million acres of corn now. He says by 1960 he will have 70 million acres of corn. All of this is virgin land and most of it is in a latitude considerably north of that of North Dakota. That is a difficult problem. He says he is going to solve it. Maybe he will, but I am from Missouri and I am sure you are too.

They have other problems in the agricultural field. For example: The number of cattle in the Soviet Union now is nine million less than in 1928. Meanwhile the population has grown from 152 million to 213 million. As you know, these are very difficult problems, which even their so-called state planning system cannot solve easily. They are finding out there is only so much blood in a turnip. If you put your effort into heavy industry, you are not going to be able to put it into consumer goods or agriculture. In spite of their strength — and I don't want to underplay that strength, because it is tremendous — they have internal weaknesses, many of them.

You may say I am an optimist. I think I will have to plead guilty to that charge. But I like to feel that I am more than optimistic. I like to feel that I have faith, faith in our civilization and all that it stands for with its matchless spiritual strength and its dedication to the dignity and freedom of the individual. I am absolutely convinced that

we who have inherited freedom have not forgotten the value of that heritage nor lost the will to defend it.

It has been a great honor for me to come here today to discuss the Defense of Europe with you. As the Governor told you, I come from this part of the country. It has never been my pleasure to be in North Dakota before, but I have enjoyed this visit. I have complete confidence in the common sense of the people of North Dakota, and of the American people generally, to be able to meet this problem and to be able to find the answer to the challenge which is before us.

Our job is to prevent a third world war from taking place. I am certain that if we are able to show the unity, the wisdom, and the perseverance to keep this alliance together in spite of the frustrations which exist, we shall achieve that objective. For free men there is no other way to survival.

I thank you very much.

SECTION 12.) When any motor truck, truck-tractor, or trailer is operated upon the public highways of this state carrying a load in excess of the maximum prescribed under the provisions of sections 39-1203 and 39-1205 of the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943, as amended, or other maximum weight limitations prescribed by law, the load shall be reduced or shifted to within such maximum limitations before being permitted to operate on any public highway of this state; provided, however, that any such vehicle carrying a load of livestock shall be exempt from the limitations prescribed in section 39-1205 of the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943, as amended, relating to the carrying capacity of any wheel, tire, axle, or group of axles when excessive weight is caused by a shifting of the weight of the livestock. All material unloaded as required by this section shall be cared for by the owner or operator of such vehicle at the risk of such owner or operator.

SECTION 13. EMERGENCY.) This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval."

#### EIGHTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rep. Beede moved that a committee of three be appointed to escort the Senior United States Senator from North Dakota, Senator Langer, to the rostrum to speak a few words to the assembly. Rep. Beede's motion prevailed and the Speaker appointed as such committee Reps. Wicks, Gumeringer and Rose.

Rep. Rohde moved that the remarks of Senator Langer be

printed in the journal, which motion prevailed.

Senator Langer:

"Mr. Speaker and Members—This is quite a change for me in my coming here today. I remember a few years ago I used to be followed by the sheriff and the United States Marshal—but you know today they had a police escort for me and for once they didn't want to arrest me.

I am delighted to be here and bring a message from the North Dakota delegation in Washington—Senator Young,

Congressmen Burdick and Krueger.

We have had quite a time with this Indian problem that ou are face to face with here in our state. We had four you are face to face with here in our state. days of hearings by the Senate Juvenile Delinquency Committee and the situation we found is not a good one. We found, for example, in Rolette County, as many as twelve people living in one room. Down there at Fort Yates, the situation is no better and the jail was a disgrace as you people know who live in that neighborhood. Because of the Supreme Court decision the other day, which held that the State of North Dakota had no obligation to these Indians, we are faced with the question of 'Who is going to take care of them?'

So Senator Young, Congressmen Burdick, Krueger and I met with Glenn Emmons, the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and decided that I should come out here and lay before you the exact situation and that is what I wish to do.

Mr. Emmons, the Indian Commissioner, stated that in view of the decision of the Supreme Court, that if the North Dakota legislature would pass a resoltuion bringing about a constitutional amendment for the people to vote on at the next election-if they would do that as an evidence of good faith, he would recommend to the Congress and the Secretary of the Interior, Mr. McKay, that the federal government appropriate a very large sum of money to take care of this Indian problem here. Well, now, it appears to me that North Dakota, ought not to contribute very much. The reason for that is that these Indians originally did not come from North Dakota. True, we had a few of them up at Fort Totten, but most of them were brought in here from Wisconsin, from South Dakota, from Minnesota, and today up there on the Fort Totten Indian reservation, and to some extent on other reservations, these Indians are the descendants of the Indians that the United States government forced upon the people of this state. I do think however, it might be well just to show good faith on the part of North Dakota, if this legislature pass some kind of a resolution permitting the constitution to be amended in accordance with the decision of the Supreme Court. Then it will be up to the people of North Dakota to decide what they want to do.

I have delivered this message and when I go back to see Senator Young, Congressman Burdick and Congressman Krueger, I am going to tell them of the very, very fine reception that I had here, and I know the duly constituted officers will, in due course, let us know what action has been taken by this distinguished assembly.

In closing I want to say to you, my friends, I was very, very much distressed when I came to the airport and found that Joe Wicks had two escaped convicts from the state penitentiary with him. I don't know where he got hold of them, but Joe said that all the convicts in North Dakota are in his charge. So I want to congratulate Joe, wherever he may be in here—I want to congratulate him in taking charge of the penitentiary in North Dakota. And I want to congratulate you on the investigation that you are having because it just happens that I am Chairman of the Commission on National Penitentiaries and have been for some eight or nine years, or I was until a few weeks ago. The penitentiaries all over the United States are overcrowded. We have nineteen hundred more inmates in the penitentiaries of this country than there is room for, today. That is not the worst of it—the amount of money appropriated for taking care of them has steadily decreased—and that is not the worst of it because you know when Mr. Benson and the Department of Agriculture cut down on the amount of land you could farm and raise food products on, they also cut down on the land owned and operated by the penitentiaries of the United States of America. We have nineteen hundred of them, but since we organized that commission—organized by the senior

senator from North Dakota some ten years ago—there has not been a riot in a single federal penitentiary, owned and operated by the United States of America. At the same time there have been many, many riots in some state penitentiaries. I mention that only to show that when Joe Wicks looked over that jail down there at Fort Yates, which is a federal prison, operated by the Indian Bureau, and which is a disgrace to civilization—the worst hole that I have ever been in, and I have seen most of the penitentiaries now in the United States belonging to the federal government, I can only say that I think Joe Wicks did a good job when he offered the resolution and I certainly think this assembly did a marvelous job in authorizing the investigation.

I want to say that if any problems come up in the State of North Dakota, Young, Burdick, Krueger and I meet very often—we alternate in the House or Senate private offices of each of us, and then we take up the problems involving the federal government and the State of North Dakota, jointly.

Therefore, I want to thank your distinguished Speaker for being so kind as to send me each day, a copy of your daily proceedings. I have read them with a great deal of interest and I am satisfied that the legislators of North Dakota, with so many difficult problems to meet, are doing a very fine job.

I thank you very much."

At the first general election after the adoption 10 11 of this amendment, and every two years thereafter, 11a there shall 12 be elected in each county, organized under the 12a provision of 13 section 172 of the Constitution of the state of North 13a Dakota. a register of deeds, county auditor, treasurer, sheriff, state's attorney, county judge and a clerk of the district court, who shall be electors in the county in which they 14 15 16 16a are 17 elected and who shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified; provided in counties having fifteen 18 thousand population or less, the county judge shall also be

thousand population or less, the county judge shall also be clerk of the district court; provided further that in counties having a population of six thousand or less, the

register of deeds shall also be clerk of the district court and county judge. The legislative assembly shall enact appropriate legislation to make this amendment effective 24 at

25 their first session after its adoption.

#### REPORT OF SELECT COMMITTEE

Your select committee appointed pursuant to House Resolution No. 8 of the 34th Legislative Assembly herewith makes its report upon its investigation of the gasoline tax refund system in the State Auditor's office.

In the course of its work the committee has studied the procedures used by the State Auditor's office in processing refund claims beginning with the time mail is opened until warrants are finally issued in payment of the refund claims. In addition, the committee selected fifty refund applications at random for specific study.

In checking the fifty selected applications, it was found that the highest request for refund was upon the basis of eleven gallons per acre, while the low was one and one-half gallons per acre. The average claim for refund of the fifty claims picked was 6.88 gallons per acre. Approximately 60% of the refund applications showed no deductions in gasoline

used in cars and trucks, while 40% showed some deductions in varying amounts.

Approximately 43% of all refund applications have some omissions or defects which necessitate correspondence with the refund applicant. In addition, there is apparently a substantial amount of correspondence necessitated by the misplacement of warrants by applicants after the claim is paid. It is the opinion of the committee that all claims are very thoroughly checked for mathematical errors in the refund form.

In order to properly process the refund claims and to carry on the correspondence necessary in relation thereto, a substantially large clerical force is employed. There is one field auditor who is assigned to the auditing of gasoline dealers to make sure that all gasoline received and sold is accounted for for tax purposes. This inspector apparently does very little field auditing of actual refund applicants.

The State Auditor and the administrator of the Gasoline Tax Refund Division were questioned as to enforcement procedures that were used. The State Auditor stated that the rule-making power for enforcement purposes is not used upon the grounds that if the State Legislature desires certain procedures used for enforcement and administration, it should prescribe them by law and that the State Auditor's office did not feel it desired to promulgate rules and regulations. It does appear that the procedures made mandatory under the law are followed in the administration of this Division even though discretionary powers conferred are apparently not used.

In the interest of enforcing the gasoline tax laws, the State Auditor does not automatically pay refund claims which show an excessive gallonage used per acre over and above what is more normally used in that area. In these instances a letter is written the refund applicant to ask for an explanation of why a higher number of gallons was used. When this information is supplied by the refund applicant the claim is then paid. In addition, when defaced, altered, or forged invoices are found among the invoices filed by the applicant to support his refund claim, the forged invoices are deducted from the refund claim and a letter is sent to the applicant who has altered or forged the invoices that such action is unlawful and that no refund will be allowed on the altered or forged invoices. Apparently, however, refunds upon the balance of valid unforged invoices are then paid.

The committee recommends that the State Auditor make use of the rule-making powers conferred upon that office by law as an aid to enforcement of our gasoline tax and refund laws. Among such rules that the committee believes should be promulgated by the State Auditor are the following:

- 1. A requirement that the total amount of fuel purchased by the refund applicant for all purposes, itemized separately for each type of fuel, be required before a refund claim is paid;
- That all motor propelled vehicles be listed and the type of fuel used in each vehicle be given before a refund claim is paid;

3. That the total gallonage of fuels used in cars and trucks from all sources be listed before a refund claim is paid:

That prosecutions be instituted when cases of deliberate

fraud in refund applications are found.

The committee further recommends that the State Auditor make more use of the investigating power provided in section 57-5004 of the 1953 Supplement to the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943 in field investigations and audits of

the records of refund claim applicants.

It is the belief of the committee that the above recommendations should be initiated by the State Auditor on the basis of rule-making authority and other powers conferred by existing law, without further action by this Legislature, since it is impossible for this Legislature to introduce and pass such measures to make these regirements mandatory at this late date in the legislative session.

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on the Investigation of the North Dakota State Penitentiary has completed its investigation and has the following report to submit:

# IN THE MATTER OF INVESTIGATION OF THE CONDITIONS OF THE NORTH DAKOTA STATE PENITENTIARY

The above entitled investigation, having been inquired into, pursuant to House Resolution No. 4, on February 4, 5, 8, 11 and 23, 1955, at the State Capitol, City of Bismarck, State of North Dakota, before the Committee appointed purstate of North Dakota, before the Committee appointed pursuant to House Resolution No. 4, comprised of Representatives Gefreh as chairman, and Mueller, Saumur, Wicks and Hofstrand; and appearing in person before said Committee were Oscar J. Nygaard, Warden; J. Arthur Vandal; State Parole Officer; Warren L. Smith, former prison Psychologist; Dr. Arnold M. Thompson, State Penitentiary Physician; three other State Penitentiary employees and one private citizen; and the Committee members having made a personal visit to the State Penitentiary. visit to the State Penitentiary;

NOW, THEREFORE, Upon the evidence adduced at said hearings, and from personal observations as a result of the 'committee's visit to the State Penitentiary, the Committee does hereby make and file its FINDINGS OF FACT. AND RECOMMENDATIONS as follows:

## FINDINGS OF FACT

That the medical facilities in general are adequate, but that the dental and optical care of inmates is inadequate in that no financial provision is made by law to authorize proper dental and optical care, and that such lack of proper dental and optical care tends to cause an undesirable effect upon the morale of the prison inmates.

#### II.

That the food and other maintenance of the prison inmates has been generally good.

#### III.

That new construction projects at the prison during the last four years have caused considerable disturbances at the prison among the inmates and custodial personnel and to a great extent have disrupted normal prison routine.

#### IV.

That custodial personnel wages are too low to attract men qualified for the positions, which positions of necessity require a high degree of responsibility; that present wages for guards are fixed at a minimum of \$200.00 per month.

#### ν.

That the present wages paid to the custodial personnel do not make any provisions for increases in pay so as to recognize length of service; that the present pension and retirement provisions are inadequate in that the qualification requirements are too restrictive.

#### $\mathbf{v}\mathbf{r}$

That there are no segregation facilities at the prison to permit any segregation of inmates as to classes of crimes, ages or otherwise.

#### VII.

That there is a lack of proper understanding of duties and responsibilities among some of the custodial personnel.

#### VIII.

That there have been some instances where the regulations governing the conduct of prison inmates have not been firmly and strictly enforced by some of the custodial personnel.

#### IX.

That testimony adduced at the hearings established the fact that "home brewed" intoxicating beverages can be made by inmates from ingredients such as prune juice, stewed fruits, sugar and yeast, clandestinely taken from the dining hall or kitchen; that there have been instances where inmates were found with such "home brew" in their possession; that such "home brew" is a common problem in penal institutions.

#### v

That the duties of the State Parole Officer cannot be properly and adequately performed by one officer, especially since it has became an accepted practice by judges over the State to defer the imposition of sentences in an increasing number of cases and to have such persons placed in the custody of the State Parole Officer as permitted by law, which law has been further liberalized by the 34th Legislative Assembly.

NOW, THEREFORE, Based upon the foregoing Finds, the Committee makes the following:

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

#### I.

That the North Dakota State Legislature make an adequate appropriation for proper dental and optical care of inmates at the State Penitentiary.

#### TT.

That the wages of the custodial personnel should be increased with provisions for periodic increases in pay for length of service in same position.

#### III.

That the pension and retirement plan be improved to permit employees with twenty-five years or more of service, or at the age of sixty-five to retire.

#### IV.

That arrangements be made by the Warden to provide periodic conferences with his immediate staff and guard personnel to discuss duties, disciplinary problems and recommendations.

#### V.

That some segregation facilities should be provided at the prison for the segregation of various classes of inmates.

#### VT.

That some personnel changes will be necessary in order to maintain the prison discipline at a suitable standard.

#### VII.

That proper legislation be enacted to provide for one or more additional State Parole Officers in order that more suitable supervision may be accorded to persons recommended to the custody of the State Parole Officer all over the State.

#### VIII.

That the recommendations herein made be presented to the Board of Administration for study to determine means of effecting such recommendations.

#### IX.

That such additional funds as may be required to carry out these recommendations be provided.

65-0102; and sections 65-0109, 65-0201, 65-0205, 65-0425, 65-0427, 65-0505, 65-0511, 65-0512, 65-0513, 65-0517, 65-0801, 65-0518, 65-1001, and 65-1103 of the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943 as amended; and to repeal section 10 of chapter 344 of the North Dakota Session Laws of 1951 relating to Workmen's Compensation." in lieu thereof on the engrossed Bill.

Delete lines 65 through 70 inclusive of the engrossed bill and insert the following in lieu thereof:

"SECTION 4. AMENDMENT.) Section 65-0518 of the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

65-0518. PROVISIONS OF SECTION 65-0517 RETRO-ACTIVE.) The provisions of section 65-0517 as amended establishing a minimum weekly wage of thirty dollars shall be retroactive as of July 1, 1953, and the bureau, upon application or upon its own motion, (((may))) shall adjust compensation (((previously awarded, or if compensation has been refused, it may award compensation, in accordance with the terms of this chapter))) paid or payable since that date in accordance with this section."

In line 90 of the engrossed bill delete the figure "32" and remove the beginning and end parentheses from the figure "28-32".

Following line 96 of the engrossed Bill, insert the following:

SECTION 6. AMENDMENT.) Paragraph 3 of subdivision b and subdivision c of subsection 5; and subsection 6 of section 65-0102 of the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943, as amended, are hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

- 5b3. Any executive officer of a business concern [who receive a salary of more than twenty-four hundred dollars per year] "Executive officer" shall mean only the president, vice presidents, secretary, or treasurer of a business corporation whose duties are solely those of such executive office, and if an executive officer also performs duties of a kind generally performed by an employee, such employment is not exempt:
  - 5c. Persons employed by sub-contractor, or by an independent contractor operating under an agreement with the general contractor, for the purpose of this chapter shall be deemed to be employees of the general contractor [until such time as the sub-contractor or independant contractor has complied with the provisions of this title] who shall be liable and responsible for the payments of premiums for the coverage of these employees until the sub-contractor or independent contractor has secured the necessary coverage and paid the premium therefor. This sub-division shall not be construed as imposing any liability upon a general contractor other than liability to the bureau for the payment of premiums which are not paid by a sub-contractor or independent contractor;
  - [6. "Executive officer" shall mean only the president, vice president, secretaries, and treasurers of a busi-

ness corporation whose duties are solely those of such executive office, and if an executive officer also performs duties of a kind generally performed by an employee, such employment is not exempt;]

Section 7. AMENDMENT.) Section 65-0109 of the 1953 Supplement to the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

65-0109. INJURY THROUGH NEGLIGENCE OF THIRD PERSON:

OPTION OF EMPLOYEE; FUND SUBROGATED WHEN CLAIM FILED.)

When an injury or death for which compensation is payable under provisions of this title shall have been sustained under circumstances creating in some person other than the fund a legal liability to pay damages in respect thereto, the injured employee, or his dependents may claim com-pensation under this title and proceed at law to recover damages against such other person. The fund shall be subrogated to pro tanto to the rights of the injured employee of his dependents to the extent of the amount of compensation paid or to be paid and the action against such other person may be brought by the injured employee, or his dependents in the event of his death, in his or in his dependents' own right and name and as trustee for the workmen's compensation bureau for what it has paid or what is to be paid on such claim [, or such action may be brought by the bureau upon ninety days notice to the employee or to the dependents of a deceased employee. Expenses and costs of such litigation shall be prorated between claimant and bureau, should any damages be awarded, over and above claimants award by bureau plus cost of such litigation. If no damages are awarded, the cost of litigation shall be no damages are awarded, the cost of litigation shall be paid by the party instituting the action. The injured employee, or the dependents of a deceased employee, may by instrument in writing waive the notice required by this section, in which case the bureau shall be authorized to proceed at once in the institution of a suit against such third person]. Such action may be brought by the claimant or his dependents within sixty days after date of injury. Failure or neglect to bring the action within the prescribed sixty days will entitle the bureau to bring the action in its way name and as trustee for the claimant or his dependents own name and as trustee for the claimant or his dependents. If the action is brought by the claimant or his dependents, the actual cost of such litigation shall be prorated between the claimant and the bureau should any damages be awarded and no fees shall be allowed for any recovery made for the bureau without first obtaining the bureau's approval thereon. If no damages are awarded the cost of litigation shall be paid by the party instituting the action.

SECTION 8. AMENDMENT.) Section 65-0201 of the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

65-0201. WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION BUREAU; MEMBERSHIP; TERMS OF OFFICE.) The North Dakota workmen's compensation bureau shall be maintained for the administration of the provisions of this title. Such bureau shall consist of three workmen's compensation commissioners who shall be appointed by the Governor. The

terms of the commissioners shall be six years, and shall be arranged so that the term of one commissioner, and of only one, shall expire on the tenth day of [January] July in each odd-numbered year. One of the commissioners shall be a representative of labor, one shall be a representative of the public, and one shall be a representative of the employers. The commissioners shall devote their entire time to the duties of the bureau, and each commissioner shall serve until his successor has been appointed and qualified. Any commissioner may be removed by the governor for cause.

SECTION 9. AMENDMENT.) Section 65-0425 of the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

65-0425. SERVICE OF NONRESIDENT EMPLOYER IN SUIT FOR PREMIUM OR IN SUIT AGAINST AN UNINSURED EMPLOYER.) If the [defendent] employer in an action to collect delinquent premiums or for injuries sustained in his employment for which he did not carry the required insurance is a nonresident of this state, or a foreign corporation doing business in this state, service of the summons may be made upon any agent, representative, or foreman of said [defendent] employer in this state, and where there is no agent, representative, or foreman upon whom service can be made service upon the secretary of state shall constitute personal service upon such nonresident employer who has either failed to secure the necessary coverage or who is delinquent in his premiums, or service may be made in any other manner designated by law.

SECTION 10. AMENDMENT.) Section 65-0505 of the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

65-0505. PAYMENTS MADE TO INSURED EMPLOYEES INJURED IN COURSE OF EMPLOYMENT AND TO THEIR DEPENDENTS.) The bureau shall disburse the fund for the payment of compensation and other benefits as provided in this chapter to employees, or to their dependents in case death has ensued, who:

- 1. Are subject to the provisions of this title;
- 2. Are employed by employers who [have paid into the fund the premiums applicable to the classes to which they belong in accordance with the provisions of chapter 4 of this title] are subject to this title; and
- Have been injured in the course of their employment.

Where the injury is sustained outside the state of North Dakota and compensation is claimed and received through some other state act no compensation shall be allowed under this title.

SECTION 11. AMENDMENT.) Section 65-0511 of the 1953 Supplement to the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

65-0511. MAXIMUM AND MINIMUM COMPENSATION ALLOWANCES; TOTAL AND PARTIAL DISABILITY.) The weekly compensation for total disability shall not be more than thirty-one dollars and fifty cents,

except where an allowance for dependents is made in compliance with section 65-0509, nor less than fifteen dollars. [This provision shall be applicable to all permanent total disability awards from the effective date of this Act.] The weekly compensation for partial disability shall not be more than thirty-one dollars and fifty cents. If the injured person, at the time of the injury, was a minor or was employed in a learner's capacity, and was not physically or mentally defective, the bureau from time to time shall determine the probable increase in weekly earning capacity of such person if such injury had not occurred, and shall base its award for compensation upon such probable weekly wage-earning capacity.

In section 5 of the engrossed bill on line 71 thereof delete the numerals "65-1011" and insert in lieu thereof the numerals "65-1001".

Following section 11 insert the following:

SECTION 12. AMENDMENT.) Section 65-0512 of the 1953 Supplement to the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

65-0512. PERMANENT PARTIAL DISABILITY; WEEK-LY COMPENSATION; TIME PAID.) If the injury causes permanent partial disability, the percentage which such disability bears to total disability shall be determined, and the fund shall pay to the disabled employee a weekly compensation in the sum of (((twenty-two dollars))) thirty-one dollars and fifty cents per week for the following periods:

For a one percent disability	5	weeks;
For a ten percent disability	50	weeks;
For a twenty percent disability	100	weeks;
For a thirty percent disability	150	weeks;
For a forty percent disability	200	weeks;
For a fifty percent disability	250	weeks;
For a sixty percent disability	300	weeks;

For an eighty percent disability	400	weeks;
For a ninety percent disability	450	weeks;

Provided, however, that where an injured employee is earning a salary which at sixty-six and two-thirds percent of said salary did not produce an award of (((twenty-two dollars))) thirty-one dollars and fifty cents per week the difference between (((twenty-two dollars))) thirty-one dollars and fifty cents per week and sixty-six and two-thirds percents of the actual salary be charged to the general fund, and not to the risk of the employer. This proviso shall also apply to payments made under 65-0513.

SECTION 13. AMENDMENT.) Section 65-0513 of the 1953 Supplement to the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

65-0513. SCHEDULED INJURIES; PERMANENT LOSS OF MEMBER; WEEKLY COMPENSATION; TIME COMPENSATION PAYABLE.) If the injury causes the loss of a member, the fund shall pay to the disabled employee a weekly compensation equal to (((twenty-two dollars))) thirty-one dollars and fifty cents per week for the following periods:

The amount paid for the loss of more than one finger of one hand shall not exceed the amount provided in this schedule for the loss of a hand. For the loss of the metacarpal bone, of the palm, together with the corresponding thumb or finger ten weeks shall be added to the number of weeks of payment. The permanent loss of use of a thumb, finger, toe, arm, hand, foot, leg, or eye shall be considered as the equivalent of the loss of such thumb, finger, toe, arm, hand, foot, leg or eye, and compensation for partial loss of use of said parts shall be allowed on a percentage basis. Twenty-five percent additional shall be allowed as compensation for the loss of use of the master hand or any member or members thereof. The loss of use on a percentage basis of the master hand or any member or members thereof. The loss of any part of a phalange shall be considered equal to the loss of

the entire phalange. If any employees dies from some independent cause, the right of any compensation payable under section 65-0512 of this section, unpaid at the date of his death shall survive and pass to his dependent spouse, minor children, [or] parents, or his estate and in that order named.

SECTION 14. AMENDMENT.) Section 65-0517 of the 1953 Supplement to the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

65-0517. WEEKLY COMPENSATION FOR DEATH.) If death results from an injury under the conditions specified in section 65-0516, the fund shall pay to the following persons, for the periods specified, a weekly compensation equal to the following percentages of the deceased employee's weekly wages:

- To the widow, if there is no child, forty-five percent, and such compensation shall be paid until her death or remarriage;
- 2. To the widower, if there is no child, forty-five percent if he was wholly dependent upon the support of the deceased employee at the time of her death, and such compensation shall be paid until his death or remarriage;
- 3. To the widow or widower, if there is a child, the compensation payable under subsections 1 or 2, and in addition thereto, ten percent for each child. Such compensation, however, shall not exceed a total of seventy-five percent for the widow or widower and the children. The compensation payable on account of any child shall cease when such child dies, marries, or reaches the age of eighteen years, or, if over eighteen years of age and incapable of self-support, becomes capable of self-support;
- 4. To the children, if there is no widow or widower, twenty-five percent for one child and ten percent additional for each additional child, not exceeding, however, a total of seventy-five percent. The compensation hereunder shall not be for the specific children but shall be divided share and share alike. Compensation for each child shall be paid until such child dies, marries, or reaches the age of eighteen years, or if over eighteen years of age and incapable of self-support, becomes capable of self-support. Compensation for a child under legal age shall be paid to its guardian;
- 5. To the parent, if one is wholly dependent for support upon the deceased employee at the time of his death and the other is not dependent to any extent, twenty-five percent; if both are wholly dependent, twenty percent to each; if one or both are partially dependent, a proportionate amount in the discretion of the bureau. The foregoing percentages shall be paid only if there is a widow, widower, or child. If there is a widow, widower, or child, there shall be paid only such part of the foregoing percentages that, when added to the total of the percentages payable to the widow, widower, and children, the sum shall not exceed the total of seventy-five percent. The compensation of each such beneficiary may continue until

such parent dies, remarries or ceases to be a de-

pendent.

To a brother, sister, grandparent, or grandchild who is wholly dependent upon the deceased employee for support at the time of his death, twenty percent; if no more than one are wholly dependent, thirty percent divided among such dependents, share and share alike; if none of them are wholly dependent but one or more are partly dependent, ten percent divided among such dependents, share and share alike. The foregoing percentages shall be paid only if there is no widow, widower, child or dependent parent. If there is a widow, widower, child or dependent parent, there shall be paid only such part of the foregoing percentages that, when added to the total percentage payable to the widow, widower, children, and dependent parents, the sum shall not The comexceed a total of seventy-five percent. pensation of each such beneficiary shall be paid for a period of eight years from the time of the death of the employee unless before that time, he, if a grandparent, dies, remarries, or ceases to be dependent, or if a brother, sister, or grandchild, dies, marries, or reaches the age of eighteen years, or if over eighteen years of age and incapable of selfsupport, becomes capable of self-support. The compensation of a brother, sister, or grandchild under legal age shall be paid to his guardian.

The weekly wages of the deceased employee shall be considered to have been not more than forty dollars, and not less than thirty dollars. [The increase in payments resulting from the enlargement of the salary base shall be payable to all pensioners and dependents but only from and after the taking effect of this Act.]

In addition to the awards made to a pensioner herein the commissioners shall make an award in the sum of three hundred dollars to the widow of the deceased and one hundred dollars to each dependent child, the total amount of such additional award not to exceed six hundred dollars, and such additional award shall be charged to the general fund. This paragraph shall apply to claims filed from and after the taking effect of this Act.

SECTION 15. AMENDMENT.) Section 65-1103 of the 1953 Supplement to the North Dakota Revised Code of 1943 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

65-1103. SALARY OF SAFETY ENGINEER.) The salary of the safety engineer shall be [not more than five thousand dollars per annum] the sum appropriated for that purpose by the legislative assembly, plus necessary travel expenses.

SECTION 16. REPEAL.) Section 10 of chapter 344 of the North Dakota Session Laws of 1951 is hereby repealed. Renumber the lines accordingly.

And when so amended recommend the same do pass.

3. Enabling legislation is being provided by this legislative assembly whereby public employee systems may qualify for Federal social security coverage. In the event that the public employees elect, by referendum, coverage under the Federal social security system and the next legislative assembly concurs, then it must be kept in mind that the area of coverage under OASIS after institution of the Federal system will necessarily have to be limited and set out by the next legislative assembly, taking into consideration the financial condition of the state and the results of the actuarial study which we are authorizing at this time.

I will always have a warm spot in my heart for the Legislative Branch of our government. My four sessions here was one of the finest experiences of my life-time.

The legislature has always been reluctant to change its procedures or better its lot. I am thinking of the fights to get the electric roll call, to change method of printing bills, reduce the number of committees, to pass the bill creating the Legislative Research Committee, etc.

This is the first session since the Research Committee was adopted that there hasn't been a bill introduced to kill it. I notice, at this session, so many problems are being referred to it that there is grave doubt if it can do all the work assigned to it.

Two year ago, it was my good fortune along with Rep. Beede and Mr. Murry to attend a regional meeting of the council of state government on legislative services. I am happy to report that our set-up compares favorably with most states. I attended this meeting as a representative of the Bar Association to study the setups of Code Revision in the various states. I am very happy that you have added that legislative service to the Research Committee.

I learned of many new legislative aids and services which are being used with great success in other states. Particularly in the field of appropriations and fiscal policies. Both in establishing budgets and in following up appropriations to check if properly used.

I would strongly urge that you have a good representation at future meetings on Legislative Services and that you seriously consider adopting additional legislative services that have been tried and proven in other states. It will enable you to do a better job and to improve this all important branch of our Government.

I have appreciated the opportunity of being here and visiting with you. I wish you the best of luck and hope that you will be able to finish on time. Thank you."

Rep. Anderson of Richland moved that Reps. Nygaard, Gefreh, Beede, Erickson of Burke-Divide and Langseth be seated on the rostrum, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Anderson of Richland moved that Reps. Wolf, Brown, Sorlie and Paulson also be seated on the rostrum, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Sticka: "Members of the House of Representatives and Employees: It is customary that when we arrive at this particular point in the session, that we take inventory-inventory of what has transpired here in the previous sixty days. We recognize the fact at the end of this session that we have progressed here in a rather harmonious fashion. I am sure that you new members of the House are imbued with that spirit. However, in any undertaking that we may have found ourselves in, in our private lives, and much more so here in this House, we recognize the fact that it is team work that brings success, whether it is an athletic team or whether it is in this House, it takes team work and a good coach. And in football it is the coach and let me say that we here have had a wonderful head coach. We have had several assistant coaches and then we have had those on the sidelines. But I do not wish to take away from any one of the members who has been called up here this afternoon, any of the time of those members. At this time the Chair will recognize Rep. Paulson, who will address his remarks to the assistant floor leaders of the minority.'

Rep. Paulson: "We are on a very special order of business and it is important. On this special order of business we are at this moment going to show our appreciation to the two members who at the beginning of this session accepted an additional amount of work so that we would be better able to finish this session with better legislation. Many times in the past sixty days we have heard these men explain to the extent of the bills before us and the effect that they will have on the people of North Dakota. Therefore it is important before the close of this session that we take time to honor these men for their services to us and the State of North Dakota.

I will now ask the two assistants to the minority floor leader, Reps. Erickson of Burke-Divide and Langseth of Eddy-Foster to step forward.

Rep. Erickson and Rep. Langseth, to each of you from all of us, to show our deep appreciation, we extend to you, these gifts, to that in the many years ahead it will remind you of our appreciation and cause you to continue to work for the good of the State of North Dakota, and its people."

Rep. Erickson of Burke-Divide: "Members of the House, I certainly want to thank you for this fine gift. I have enjoyed working as the assistant floor leader. I am sure you all realize that under Mr. Beede, we have a very effective and very fine minority floor leader, and I have enjoyed working under him and under the majority floor leader, who has been very fair with us and also under Ken Fitch, who has been very fair to the members of both factions. Thank you very much."

Rep. Langseth: "I will just say 'Members of the House' and we will save a few minutes if I don't have to start off with "Representative, Acting Speaker, and ex-Speaker Sticka, etc. I do want to thank you. I agree with what Rep. Erickson said and I can add but very little. However I do want to state in my own words that it has been such a pleasure to work with everyone of you here and specially do I appreciate our Speaker. I want to thank you not only for the gift but for the very nice words of Rep. Paulson."

Rep. Sticka: At this time the Chair will recognize Rep. Link.

Rep. Link: "Rep. Sticka, Speaker Fitch, The House Majority and Minority Floor Leaders and Assistants, and Members: am sure that all of us recognize the very desirable feature of the system of having two parties functioning in government—to have two parties functioning in a legislature. It is always recognized that in having two parties, we, of necessity, have a minority and a majority faction. It is the aim of every organization, and especially political organization, to become the majority. With the majority goes the ability to put across those parts of their program which that majority believes should be put across. However, with the majority in a politirecognize that in the legislature that responsibility falls squarely and with considerable weight, and impact, upon the majority, and especially upon the majority floor leader and his assistants. Rep. Sorlie: "Chairman Sticka, Fellow Members of the House—It give me a great deal of pleasure to make this presentation to Rep. Beede in behalf of the members of the House. Ralph, you have spent a good many years in the legislative branch of our state government and we, as members of the 34th legislative assembly of the State of North Dakota, greatly appreciate having you as our minority floor leader. We know that it is not good to have too much harmony in some of our legislation and when you got to your feet and called our attention to the good and bad points of some of our bills, we have greatly appreciated it.

We know, Ralph, that you are going to spend a good many more years for the State of North Dakota but on behalf of what you have done this last sixty days, I wish to present you with this gift from all of the members of the House and with it our everlasting friendship and admiration."

Rep. Beede: "Rep. Sticka and Friends: I really would like to make a speech because you know I like to make speeches. But let me say at the outset that it is hard for me to make or give compliments. I do appreciate from the bottom of my heart the gift that I have just received from you and especially the meaning that goes with it.

This has been an enjoyable session. I have had fine assistance from both Rep. Langseth and Rep. Erickson, and if I may say it, in the work back and forth—the necessary work of the opposition that was upon us, I met with the finest of cooperation from Rep. Nygaard, and from Rep. Gefreh.

Perhaps I failed sometimes in not presenting more points in opposition but of course sometimes I felt that when I

arose in opposition that made it certain that the measure would pass.

I feel that in many ways this coordinate branch of our government has not had the best of public relations that it might have had and should have, with the people at large. You know we talk about the expense of a legislature. Why, my goodness, the total expense of the complete legislature is not as much as one medium sized building at some state institution. It is not more than one mile of this expanded military highway that we hear about, would cost, and it is not more than five or six miles of the highways that we now have, so why should the expenses of our legislative system—this coordinate branch of government—be held up as being too expensive. With the right kind of work, such as we do here, many times we have saved our citizens many, many times over the money that the expense of a legislature calls for.

Now, before I sit down I do want to say one more thing. Perhaps I may not be here to speak to you again but I want to give you this message from me. That is, that I believe that each and every one of us regardless of how far apart we may think we are in our views, we are at heart conservatives. By using the word 'conservative' I mean that we believe in conserving values—not necessarily property values but those values that have come down to us such as freedom, liberty and the dignity of the individual—and the only way that we differ, and of course we must differ—the only way that we differ is in how those values should be adjusted to meet changing times and conditions.

Now you will pardon me I hope, in becoming just a little serious but I felt that this is something that I would like to pass on to you.

Again in closing, let me say that I appreciate so very very much this gift that I have received from you. Thank you just an awfully lot."

Rep. Sticka: "The Chair will recognize Rep. Wolf."

Rep. Wolf: "Mr. Chairman Sticka, Members of the 34th Legislative Assembly: I believe we are coming to a close—we may not know just when, but we should be finishing up soon now.

Now I hope that a lot of the new members realize why we are having this special order of business. All our older members know what our leaders here in the House have done and that we have this special order of business to honor both sides for the worthwhile work they have done. Now, I have served for eight terms and I have had quite a little experience as to what that leadership means — I believe it was in 1949 that I assisted one of the floor leaders when we happened to be in the majority and I assure you it is quite a responsibility if you represent the majority. The minority can lean back and let the other fellows roll the ball. If you have the needling type of people in the minority group they can make it awful miserable. We can all agree that at this session we have not had that kind of needling. The minority leadership and the minority group tried to fight for the things that we were sincerely interested in. They were not just needling the majority. I have always admired a leader that stands up for the welfare of the people but you have a class of politicians at times that just try to seek the headlines and needle the other

fellows. We can appreciate the work that Nygaard and Gefreh have done in their majority group. It is quite a job to follow things—to follow the procedure—it is not an easy task and I hope that each and every one of us realize what it means to be a leader. It is nice to sit back on the sidelines and laugh when they are out of order instead of assisting them and giving them a little advise to help build a better and more harmonious session.

I believe this is one of the best sessions we have ever had and I must say for Ken Fitch, as the Speaker, that he did a marvelous job up here. He recognized everybody and he has been fair to the minority group as well as the majority. He has left an awfully good feeling.

Now I am not going to take the privilege or honor away from another who is to make that presentation to our Speaker, but at this time I want to make this presentation to Rep. Nygaard—it is a token from each and every member of the House, to be presented by me, as a remembrance to him. I consider it an honor to hand you this token from the members of the House."

Rep. Nygaard: "Rep. Sticka, Speaker Fitch, Rep. Wolf, Members of this Assembly. It is nice to hear these fine words spoken when we have come to this portion of our work. Out here before me are some of the finest friends that I have ever known in this world, and they are going to be lasting friendships for me as the years go by, whether or not I reappear here as a member of this body. It is always going to be a great pleasure to me whenever I see these faces that are before me, once again.

It has certainly been a distinct pleasure to me, during this session, to work in the capacity of floor leader where I was placed at the beginning of the session. I knew there was a big job, and a hard job, cut out for me, but I did not, at the time I accepted it, know for sure who the person across the aisle was going to be. I breathed a sigh of relief when I learned that that man was to be Ralph Beede. He has been of great assistance to me, as well as great assistance to my assistant, Mr. Gefreh. And each of you members here have been of great assistance in carrying out this work and I hope we all go home, get in a more relaxed mood than we are in these closing moments of this session, and look back and say 'We have done something that is for the good of the State of North Dakota and for the welfare of its people, and that we can feel that what has been done here is the task that we set out to do and that we can feel that the accomplishment of that task has been done to our credit.'

Rep. Brown: "Mr. Chairman, Mr. Speaker, Honored Statesmen, and Fellow Legislators: I deem it an extreme privilege to have been called upon to participate in this program—this special order of business that we are now assembled for.

It is one of the greatest pleasures and experiences of my life to have been able to serve in a body that has been directed by such an able general. I know I speak the sentiment of every member of this House when I say that we will leave this assembly hall with a deep down feeling in our hearts for a man whom it was my pleasure at the opening of this session to get up and state that he was one of the greatest humanitarians that I have ever known.

Now, I am going to ask the Speaker to step forward, please. Mr. Speaker, as we go along in this materialistic world, we usually think of rewarding our friends with material gifts. Every member of this House has the same feeling that I do—there is nothing in the world of materialistic value that could express the deep affection that we have for you, Mr. Speaker, for the fair and unbiased way that you have presided and of the consideration that you have given to everyone.
