FIRST DAY

Bismarck, January 3, 1961

At the hour of twelve o'clock, meridian, the third day of January 1961, being the day and hour designated by law for the convening of the legislative assembly of the State of North Dakota, the members-elect of the House of Representatives assembled in the House chamber in the state capitol building at Bismarck, North Dakota, and were called to order by Gerald L. Stair, Chief Clerk of the 36th legislative assembly.

Rep. Brown moved that the Acting Chief-Clerk appoint a committee of three to escort the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court to the rostrum, which motion prevailed and the Acting Chief Clerk appointed as such committee Reps. Brown, Wolf, Link.

The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court was then escorted to the rostrum and administered the oath of office to the members present.

The Acting Chief Clerk announced that the next order of business would be the election of the Speaker.

Rep. Baldwin: "Unaccustomed as I am to public speaking, I rise to ask for a point of personal privilege to me.

All through my life I have felt it is a great privilege to speak highly of a friend and then describe in a way why I feel as I do. That is why, today, I feel particularly privileged in nominating a friend of all of us as Speaker.

It has always seemed to me you know a man best by what he has done. By what has motivated his life as he has lived it. I think all of us who serve in the legislature are people who think of our own lives and the way we wish to use them as they may affect the state and nation in which we live. In other words, as I call you friends and hope to be called so myself, I probably know you all because I am sure your services here are services for the people and not for yourselves. I am inclined to think you are underpaid, in money but not in the spirit that permits you to live comfortably with yourself and with your family.

Today we have a man whom I will nominate as Speaker. Fay Brown. Through his actions as a young man and since he has gained maturity and stature, he has shown to all of us who know him that his life is motivated by a desire to be of service to us. What he has done in his life is pretty good proof of that. For instance as a young man he became president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. It takes a leader to do that. As he graduated from the Junior Chamber of Commerce, he became a director of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce — a high honor paid to him for work well done. The Senior Chamber of Commerce of Bismarck, looking for a president chose Fay Brown, though he was too young to be president, and they had to change the constitution and by-laws to permit him to head this very active group. Again he was serving his own city.

In his own business he has been very successful. He was chosen Young Man of the Year as a brand retailer.

We have known him in the session here as a hard worker. In 1955 he was appointed as chairman of the Business Committee. In 1959 he headed the Tax and Finance Committee. All who had anything to do with those two committees know how well he handled the very difficult problems that come into those committees. Through his entire life in this body of ours, he has shown a desire to be helpful; to be friendly and to be fair. We disagreed with him on many occasions and I am sure we will disagree again but at no time have we felt that we were losing his friendship. I am sure that if we elect Fay Brown as Speaker, we are honoring ourselves — and we will assure the kind of session that we want to have and we are also honoring him.

It is a pleasure indeed to nominate R. Fay Brown as Speaker of the House."

Rep. Skaar: "I am not a public speaker either, as Mr. Baldwin said. But I have a man in mind that I have known for thirty years and being as he is a farmer, we would not have to change the constitution to get him to serve, or anything of that kind, but he is a good all around guy. I would like to place in nominations the name of Rep. Sjaastad."

Rep. Mueller: "It gives me great pleasure to be allowed to second the nomination of R. Fay Brown as our Speaker.

Mr. Baldwin has given Fay quite a buildup and I concur in all he says about Fay. It has been my pleasure to work with Fay Brown for several sessions and I have found him to be fair and honest. We haven't always agreed but you can rest assured that whatever he does, he figures that he is doing right.

I think it is a great honor to Fay and a well deserved honor, to elect him as Speaker of this House, so I would like to second the nomination of Fay Brown and wish him luck and success."

Rep. Sorlie moved that the nominations be closed and that the House proceed to ballot on candidates for Speaker, which motion prevailed.

I look out and see the dean of the North Dakota legislature, Kenneth Fitch, and Ben Wolf, the majority floor leader — and I am more conscious than ever of the work that I must do in order that I will in some small way follow in the footsteps of these men.

I want to thank Rep. Baldwin and Rep. Mueller for their very kind endorsement of my candidacy. With the Grace of God and with the help of you men, I know that on the 60th day of this session of the legislature, we can walk out of this hall holding our heads high in the thought that the people of North Dakota have been served justly through this direct representation in the government of North Dakota.

TO THE THIRTY-SEVENTH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY
 AND BIENNIAL REPORT TO THE
 PEOPLE OF NORTH DAKOTA
 INTRODUCTION

According to custom I appear before you as the retiring governor to deliver a farewell address. On this occasion there is a personal feeling of sadness and yet my spirit is filled with hope and great faith in the future of our state. One of the richest experiences in my life has been working cooperatively with the legislature on the problems and issues which mold the future destinies of our people. I urge you to work in harmony with our new governor, William Guy, in the furtherance of good legislation which will make our government better and prepare all of us for the changing times that lie ahead in the uncharted future.

Under the dynamic system of our government and life, matters are not often resolved in final terms, for times at home and abroad make changes necessary. Progress revolves on review, modification and oftentimes the adoption of new ideas for the general welfare.

I present this message to you with statements of review, proposals for change, and several new suggestions that, to me, will be beneficial to all and I hope will be of assistance to you in your future deliberations.

FISCAL POLICIES

North Dakota government is recognized nation-wide as responsible financially and yet progressive in programs of development and betterment of our schools, institutions and other services. The challenge today is to continue sound, responsibly financed government for the best interests of our people and yet within the limitations of our abilities to pay.

The report of the budget board sets forth the financial requirements of the State during the next two years. I

recommend that you study this thoroughly so all are familiar with the expenditures and anticipated income of our state government. The budget board made personal visits to all our schools, institutions, and experimental farms reviewing budgets and facility needs. It was obvious from the original budgets presented that reductions would be necessary to balance appropriations with anticipated revenues. The budget board is recommending to you a balanced budget to carry on the functions of government. It will take firmness and decisive action by you to maintain the excellent solvent position of our state, as the pressures for more funds and new projects will be great. As legislatures before you, I am confident you will give strict adherence to the cardinal principle of ending the session with a reasonable balance in the General Fund.

A factor of increased cost at several institutions is a reduction in the work week from 44 to 40 hours. This necessitates hiring more employees. Although reduced from the request, allowances were made for increased teachers' salaries and all new positions were granted without exception.

It should be our desire to strengthen these schools and permit them to improve the teaching standards and be prepared to properly handle the normal growth of student enrollments. It is my firm belief that construction of vitally needed new buildings on a gradual basis is wise, to prepare for anticipated increased enrollments as well as to relieve congested classrooms that exist today.

In fulfillment of this objective, specific recommendations for new buildings in the amount of \$3,700,000.00 have been made.

It is very reassuring to tell you there is an estimated General Fund balance July 1, 1961 of \$8,150,000.00. Estimated tax collections are calculated at \$40,600,000.00 which is \$4,600,000.00 more than two years ago. Included in the income which made possible school building recommendations is \$2,200,000.00 from special beer and cigarette taxes which expire July 1, 1961. These taxes should be re-enacted in order to carry out these proposals. The total available monies amount to \$50,950,000.00. Total recommended appropriations are \$50,148,391.00. This leaves an anticipated balance in the General Fund of \$801,609.00 on July 1, 1963, which is absolutely a bare minimum to meet the unforeseen future. Therefore, I urge any adjustments should be done by changes within the recommended budget and not by additions.

Without doubt, the one difficult problem to resolve will be the educational needs requested from the State Equalization Fund. H. B. 551 passed by the 36th Legislative Session needs review in the light of two years' experience. The obligations of the fund as presently committed are in excess of sales tax revenue creating deficits. This was further aggravated by decreased sales tax collections of more than one million dollars during the calendar year 1960. The conclusion must be that there can be too much optimism on anticipated tax collections and that adverse changes in our agricultural economy often are fast and unexpected.

At the end of this message is Appendix A which clearly illustrates the condition of the Equalization Fund and the

estimated deficit of \$4,198,140.17 on July 1, 1963, if budget requests are authorized as requested.

Because of the importance of this matter, I suggest a course of action that would be a workable solution to this dilemma. I do not favor, nor should consideration be given to, an increase in the sales tax.

It is my suggestion that these additional funds could be transferred to the Equalization Fund by legislative action. The transfer of \$1,500,000.00 from profits of the Bank of North Dakota, \$250,000.00 from the profits of the State Mill and Elevator, \$550,000.00 from the Collection and Land Department, and \$250,000.00 which can be available by transferring the balance of the real estate contracts from the Collection and Land Department to the Bank of North Dakota will make a total of \$2,550,000.00. An increase in the basic 21 mill levy of an additional 1½ mills, making a total of 22½ mills, would return an additional \$1,920,000.00 during the 1961-63 biennium. This additional amount of money amounting to \$4,470,000.00 should be adequate to cover the estimated deficit of \$4,198,140.17 at the end of the next biennium.

Realizing the heavy tax burdens carried by property in our state, I hesitate to recommend any levy increases and therefore urge you to explore other possibilities where the burden of taxes has not been so heavily imposed. The tax study of the Legislative Research Committee may have uncovered new ideas or remedies for attaining greater fairness and injustice in tax payments. Any new tax should be equitable and just among our people. Other suggestions I have heard proposed may be acceptable and alleviate the deficit problem. One of these is changes in the distribution of the oil production tax.

You should definitely consider reviewing the cost of the transportation feature of the new law. It is acknowledged this cost exceeded estimates and from experience it will continue to become larger. Reorganization has brought a trend for school bus transportation and more people being transported to a central location for their education. It seems advisable to consider reducing the rate of payment from the present one-half cent per pupil mile to 4/10 of one cent per pupil mile with an effective date of July 1, 1963. This could save \$297,000.00 a year out of the Equalization Fund.

The State Hospital at Jamestown, through the Board of Administration, will present to the legislature a request for \$303,000.00 as an emergency appropriation as an addition to the 1959-61 budget for salaries of employees. This item is not mentioned in the budget report. I recommend approval of this item out of the General Fund with the further suggestion that the fund allocated for school buildings may have to be reduced accordingly or at least be made subject to final review and approval by the budget board.

One final word on finances. I urge you to exercise care and caution before taking on new services and creating new agencies. Under mandate of the people, a labor department should be brought into being but the budget, at this time, will be small and through certain other budget adjustments will require very little additional money.

HUMAN RESOURCES

In this final report to you as Governor, I want once more to emphasize the importance I believe we want to place on the development of the human resources of North Dakota.

We must accelerate our activities in the fields of health, education and welfare, but in so doing must preserve and protect the rights of the individual.

I want to discuss briefly each of these fields with you.

North Dakota has increasingly met the needs of its people with programs wisely enacted by the legislative assembly and administered efficiently and compassionately.

The changes which have been made reflect the changes in our times. In the field of health we have, in our own generation, seen the tremendous strides made in the field of medicine which have helped eliminate many of the common diseases with which we were greatly concerned even a decade or two ago.

As an example, I cite the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Dunseith. Medicine and new methods of treatment have shortened the period of hospitalization required and have aided in drastically reducing the number of cases of this disease. As a result, a portion of the facilities of this institution are now available for patients in need of other types of care.

Today our great concern is not the once-feared communicable diseases but instead, heart disease, cancer, accidents, and mental illness.

The State Health Department has established special studies in the field of heart disease. It has developed active programs concerned with the physical, mental, and emotional health of women and children. In addition, it has carried on intensified programs in other areas where a shifting of the emphasis of the department work has been warranted.

The continuation of these programs is important.

Closely related to our activities in the field of public health are those having to do with public assistance. The most important feature of our public assistance programs continues to be the increasing cost of medical care for public assistance recipients. The increase in our life span has brought increased medical needs for old-age assistance recipients. This is true for the individual, and also because more individuals receiving assistance are making use of medical facilities.

There is a need in our public assistance programs for more trained, competent workers to adequately administer the provisions of financial aid. This must be supplemented with social services of a quantity and quality that will make the furnishing of financial assistance a means of improving an impaired social condition. Our aim should always be to establish and carry out programs that help the individual regain his self-support, maintain his self-esteem, and improve his and his family's relationship between themselves and with the community.

The recommendations and counsel which will be received from the Governor's Committee on Aging, the Governor's Committee on Children and Youth, and the Gov-

error's Committee for Employment of the Physically Handicapped warrant the continuation of these groups.

I would recommend that you consider combining these three committees under the administration of an executive director, allowing each committee to retain its identity and its own committee of lay citizens. The North Dakota Council on Education and Committee for Physical Fitness might well become a part of the Committee on Children and Youth and all of these groups, operating as a commission on human resources, would work directly under the governor and be responsible directly to him. The appointment of a director would serve to coordinate the activities of the groups and provide definite responsibility for follow-up activities of the several conferences.

This should require a minimum appropriation, much of which could undoubtedly be gained through a reduction of the cost in time and money now shared by other state departments.

I would recommend that the legislative assembly consider enlarging the initial one million dollars for the construction of nursing homes, enacted two years ago. However, in view of the present balance of the fund, the effective date of the increase might well be advanced to 1962 or 1963, which would be wise and far-sighted planning.

In considering human resources, we must also give due regard to the needs of education.

Money alone is not a "cure-all" for the needs of education. I have discussed education financing in greater detail in my remarks on the over-all financial condition of the state. Let me state here, however, that in meeting the needs of education the legislature must also give due consideration to a continuing scrutiny of our curriculum, of standards for teachers, and our over-all goals we desire to achieve in our schools, and for our young people.

NATURAL RESOURCES

Our second major area of concern in state government is in the orderly and steady development of our natural resources.

North Dakota continues to export much of its agricultural, mineral, and human resources. This situation is true in most of the states of the midwest. To rectify these conditions, we must accelerate our efforts to process more of our agricultural and mineral resources and in so doing create job opportunities. A good start has been made and it must be continued on a sound basis.

Agriculture continues to be the basic source of wealth and job opportunities in North Dakota even though, nationally, it has been a declining opportunity. We must gain all possible advantages from agriculture in new crops, improved farm practices, feeding of beef cattle, increased emphasis on dairying and other diversification, with particular effort to process our agricultural wealth within the state. A particular advantage to be gained in processing is the competitive market advantage through increasing the value of the product while at the same time reducing its weight and bulk. Certainly we are aware of the effect high transportation costs have in competing with other agricultural areas in the large marketing centers.

The need for electrical power is growing and we have the resources necessary to meet this growing demand. Our oil, gas, lignite, and water resources can provide the low-cost power which is needed by agriculture, industry, and consumers.

More and more emphasis is being placed on water. We must protect our right to our equitable share of the water that flows in the rivers and streams of our state by constructing sound water projects which will permit us to put this resource to work for North Dakota.

The Garrison Reservoir is now impounding almost eleven million acre-feet of water. We must increase our efforts to put a portion of this stored water to use through the Garrison Diversion Unit. As a consequence, I recommend that the state legislature reaffirm and up-date a concurrent resolution that will memorialize the President and the Congress to support the establishment of the Garrison Diversion Unit and to appropriate funds therefore.

Although I will be retiring from my post as governor, I pledge my continued support to this project and will appear before any hearings where my presence may in any way enhance the ability of my state to obtain this project.

As a result of the increasing interest in water resources development we have seen a greatly expanded program on the part of several agencies in government — both federal and state — in this field. I recommend that there be full coordination among agencies and that strong support be given to the clearance of all projects affecting the water resources of the state through the agency established by law as responsible for these resources, the State Water Conservation Commission.

Such cooperation has already given the state additional recreational facilities through the development of new water areas. Agencies such as the Game and Fish Department have taken part in the over-all planning.

During the term of my administration, the progress of the oil industry has been good, and it is getting progressively better. While there has been a decrease in the number of wells drilled the last one and a half years, there has been a steady increase in the market for the oil we have to sell. This is an encouraging prospect for the future, as there is increasing interest in developing new and expanded markets to the east of North Dakota.

In the nearly ten years of the oil industry in North Dakota, we have developed an industry capable of producing oil, processing it, and making it available to the citizens of our state. This is a record of which any state could well be proud and I am particularly proud of the place North Dakota has made for itself in the field of oil and gas conservation. We are copied and envied by many of the older oil-producing states because of our advanced ideas in regard to conservation practices.

As of December 12, 1960, we have 1,451 wells producing oil and gas in the state. The total number of wells drilled for oil and gas since the beginning of the search for oil is 2,824. This is a ratio of about 1 in 2 which is a very favorable one indeed. The average tax on oil and gas has amounted to \$11,393,000.00 in the time since July 1, 1953

— a very impressive contribution to our tax revenues. In addition, many millions have come to the state in the forms of royalty, bonus and lease rentals.

I feel that the future potential for the oil industry in North Dakota is excellent. The administrative staff of the Industrial Commission has indicated that we can expect to market additional quantities of oil, perhaps as much as twenty percent more, during the coming year. However, the improvement will depend, to a large extent, upon the continuation of the progressive conservation policies which have been established. I feel that the Industrial Commission has done well in promoting the growth of the oil industry in our state.

HIGHWAYS

In some way, the programs I have dwelt on thus far affect many of us. There is one other phase of state activity which affects all of us, either directly or indirectly, and that is our highway program, to which I want to give special attention.

Our approach to highway affairs has been that highways are essential to the economic and social life of every one of us and basic to our state's welfare. The reduced cost of transportation resulting from improved highways results in lower costs of all activity within the state and enables our citizens to live a better, fuller life.

Of primary importance is the fact that there are fewer accidents on improved highways; thus they prevent injuries and save lives.

The legislature and people of North Dakota have given fine support to our highway program. This has resulted in great progress and improvement in our highways and has fostered a policy of paying as we build. Money has been available to match all Federal Aid granted our state. It is estimated the department will have a working capital surplus of close to \$4.5 million on July 1, 1961.

On January 1, 1959, 4,160 miles of our state highways were hard surfaced and 2,273 were not. Today, 4,884 miles are hard surfaced, an increase of over 700 miles in two years. During 1960 we reached a point where our entire state Primary Highway System was either hard surfaced or under contract to be hard surfaced.

North Dakota is proceeding with Interstate Construction at as rapid a pace as is practicable. By the end of 1960, 129 miles were completed and open to the public, with many more miles under construction. In the past two years, 75 miles were let to contract for grading and 117 miles for surfacing on this system. Because of its importance to National Defense and over-all future welfare, the Federal Government pays 90% of the cost and the State 10%.

Outstanding progress has been made on our Primary System in the past two years. With final approval of contracts let on December 30, 1960, the two-year total for grading will be 192 miles and 441 miles of hard surface. The expenditures matched on 50% Federal-50% State ratio will approach \$19,182,000.00 let to contract in 1959 and 1960.

The State Secondary System has received a great deal of attention in the past two years. 369 miles have been

graded and 179 miles hard surfaced. With approval of the December lettings, close to \$10,244,000.00 has been let to contract in the past two years.

The 1959 Legislature authorized the Highway Department to cooperate with the Office of Civil Defense in providing for a state-wide radio system. The Highway Department has completed plans and specifications for this system and is presently awaiting their approval by the Office of Civil Defense.

When completed, the radio system will coordinate all construction, maintenance and snow removal activities of the Highway Department.

I urge this assembly, and the people of North Dakota, to continue their support for better State highways. Perhaps no single factor is more important to the success and development of our state than an adequate highway system.

OTHER LEGISLATIVE PROPOSALS

In 1961, we commemorate the Dakota Territory Centennial and, in compliance with a joint legislative resolution, the committee I appointed will submit a brief report to you for your consideration. To carry out as far as possible the recommendations, I urge you to make an emergency appropriation so plans can be activated as quickly as possible. The historical significance of this event should be recognized by our state.

The special labor study committee after many sessions and hearings will present to you a report and suggested legislation to improve the laws in the field of labor relations. I commend the committee for the effective work done and urge you to carefully review and consider the report.

Through the reports made to me after the elections this year, I feel definite action should be taken to make changes in our election laws. The cornerstone of democratic action is the ballot, but it must be exercised by fairness and complete honesty. I strongly recommend a joint hearing of the appropriate legislative committees of both houses to review this matter carefully. It appears to me a voter registration law is needed and might be considered in a manner that this be required in counties of a certain population where the population is more fluid and people are not known to one another. It is preposterous to think election officials can identify all voters in such urban areas, so registration is the proven method of preventing voting irregularities. Another point which arises is the remedy for causing a recount and review of elections when irregularities have been alleged. Some procedure should be provided in our laws for this.

CONCLUSION

In this final message, I acknowledge my grateful appreciation of other state officials and employees for working effectively and conscientiously with me in carrying out the responsibility of our state government. The legislatures have been hardworking and diligent in dealing with the problems of our people and of our state. I appreciate the cooperation you have given me and the positive action taken, to improve state functions but at the same time

maintaining a strong position on balanced finances. It is my hope that under the circumstances of this legislative session where authority is divided problems will be handled on a reasonable basis and, by exercising good judgment and good intentions so decisions are made on facts and merit, there can be so much good accomplished.

My best wishes to you in your deliberations on the democratic processes of law to build and improve this great state of ours.

**GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE TO 37TH
LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY**

Ladies and Gentlemen of this 37th Legislative Assembly, you and I share the honor and responsibility which comes with being elected to serve the people of North Dakota under our Constitutional form of government.

I congratulate each and everyone of you upon your election to this Assembly. You represent the people of a legislative district, but overriding this responsibility is the mandate to further and support legislation that will promote the welfare of the people of our state as a whole. This work that we are engaged in is the life blood of democratic government. The strength, the stature and the dignity of our government will depend on how well we are able or willing to cope with and adapt our state functions to the economic and social evolution in these fast-moving times.

I am well aware that two political philosophies are involved in this 37th Legislative Session. I respect the goal of both parties as that which seeks the best in government. There will be honorable differences between us as to the means of attaining these goals. I pledge my genuine interest in promoting a spirit of cooperation so that no necessary legislation be lost to political expediency. I invite the leaders of the Democratic-NPL and Republican parties to consult with me often so that we can reach timely understanding on proposed legislation. I welcome the personal inquiries and advice of each of you in your role as legislator.

Our North Dakota Constitution in Section 75 provides that it is the duty of the Governor to communicate to the Legislative Assembly by message, information of the condition of the state, and recommend such measures as he shall deem expedient. I appear before you in this joint session this afternoon to carry out this responsibility. I present this message to you highlighting those areas of state government which have requirements of major importance.

FISCAL POLICY

Government living, like family living, needs to be a constant adjustment to need consistent with available income. In our everyday life, we do not continue to subscribe to the diaper service when our children are in high school. We don't ask our eight-year-old daughter to mow the lawn when we have a fifteen-year old son in the house. We don't drive a Cadillac on a Chevrolet income, and so it should be in government. Some services we now perform are not needed anymore; some services could be better handled by other departments, and our state expenditures must be consistent with governmental revenue.

Expenditures of our government can be classed in two broad categories:

1. Operating expenses such as salaries and mileage
2. Investment spending such as highways and research

Investment spending can be subdivided into two more categories:

1. Those which when made have no effect on operating cost, or actually decrease operating costs such as the reduction of road maintenance by the construction of a hard surface highway; and,
2. Those investments which increase operating expense, such as the increased personnel required to man an additional building at a state institution.

Good government housekeeping requires that we constantly attempt to cut back on operating expenses by elimination of unnecessary services, or by streamlining our departments of government. It must be recognized that cuts in government costs are always accompanied by groans of agony. Veteran legislators assure us that these groans subside as the wound heals. Our citizens expect us to eliminate the unnecessary and at the same time be receptive to new innovations for greater service. Our investment spending for roads and institutional buildings should be based upon a projected program extending several bienniums into the future, in order to invest at a uniform planned rate for expansion and replacement.

Today, North Dakota's citizens pay more taxes for each \$1,000 of personal income than do the citizens of any other state except one. Even though this is true, our problem is not so much high taxes, but rather it is low personal income. It is undesirable to raise taxes at this time in view of a depressed income. There are, however, some tax loop holes, some tax evasion, and tax equalization which require our attention. Tax increases should be only the last resort.

I believe it is necessary to bring into focus serious problems of imbalance in several funds during the current biennium in which expenditures exceed receipts, causing operating reserves to be dangerously depleted.

The School Equalization Fund reserve is being depleted approximately \$4 million a biennium and, at the present rate of expenditure, will not last through the next biennium.

The welfare fund reserve is being depleted at a rate of approximately \$4 million a biennium and, at the present rate of expenditure, this reserve will be dangerously low at the end of the 1961-63 biennium.

The Highway Department's operating reserve is being depleted at a rate of \$3 million dollars per biennium and at the present rate of expenditure would place this department in an embarrassing position midway in the next biennium.

The General Fund reserve is being depleted by approximately \$6 million this biennium and at the present rate of expenditure this reserve would be virtually wiped out at the end of the 1961-63 biennium. This imbalance of expenditures over income from these funds totals approximately \$17 million for the current biennium. Our

reserves have been adequate to absorb this load in this biennium. Obviously such fiscal policy cannot continue but demands remedial action by this Assembly. The fiscal transition into the 1963-65 biennium must be considered by you in your appropriations and tax policy for the coming 1961-63 biennium.

The allocations in this biennium for the Foundation Program for primary and secondary education has made it necessary for the Department of Public Instruction to ask for a deficiency appropriation of \$2,108,684.38. Funds to cover this deficit should be allowed. The Board of Administration is asking for deficiency appropriation for the State Hospital totalling \$306,000. Funds to cover this deficit should be allowed.

The Budget Board completed its staggering task by giving moderate appropriation increases to nearly all state departments. But, in so doing, the problem of balancing appropriations with revenue has not been solved. If remedial action is not taken in this session of the legislature to correct a policy of appropriating all tax revenue plus large sums from our reserves, then the transition to the budget for the 1963-1965 biennium could spell fiscal chaos.

There are many places where appropriation cuts must be made. As an example, the Department of Public Welfare should be required to operate on 1¼ million less than allowed by the Budget Board. I would recommend a retreat to 1959 legislative appropriations for most departments and a cut in appropriations for many departments. You must be the judge of non-essential operations and the degree of justification of so-called essential services. Since the Budget Board made its report it has been determined that all bills carrying an appropriation for Old Age and Survivors Insurance System should have the OASIS request decreased by 29 percent. Our lower wage brackets for state employees are too low, but I believe that nearly all departments will have to face up to the unpopular means of raising salaries by reducing staff. Department heads now receiving favorable salaries should not ask for more. It is true that cost of living has gone up for our state employees, but it has also gone up for the taxpayer.

Because much of our state government revenue is related to basic agriculture and because agriculture is subject to the vagaries of nature, I recommend that a buffer fund be established to act as a state government revenue shock absorber to be drawn on when tax income to the various state funds falls below a three-year moving average. This fund can be instituted without raising new taxes by freezing the state's share of the crude oil gross production tax at its present level, allowing the expanding state share of the crude oil tax money to flow into a buffer fund. Stability with a biennium in fiscal affairs could be obtained in this manner.

Dedicated funds have a useful function, but their inflexibility also ties the hands of the legislature in determining fiscal policy. Dedicated funds from which appropriation is greater than income are meaningless. I would support legislation freeing some dedicated funds

thus giving the legislature more control over the state's fiscal policy.

Our State Fire and Tornado Reserve fund is now approximately \$4 million dollars. It can be raised to \$8 million dollars under present statutes. I recommend that the high cost of institutional building today be respected by legislation requiring the Insurance Commissioner to increase State Fire and Tornado Insurance rates to 70% of board rates in order to increase the State Fire and Tornado Reserve fund to \$12 million dollars.

Several departments of our state government are now the administrators of large trust funds. In order to obtain a balance between high interest return, safety, and the backing of state economic development, I urge that all of the state's special funds be invested by a Commissioner of Investment working in the Bank of North Dakota under the jurisdiction of the Industrial Commission.

TAXES

The Legislative Research Committee studied taxation this past biennium. A tremendous amount of information on taxes was gathered, and from it some constructive observations can be drawn. The land classification and productivity correlation study should be continued. The success of this study has already laid a firm foundation for a trained county assessor program. The rapid enlargement of high school districts across township and county lines and a correlation between unjustifiably low assessment and increased state aid to schools has increased the demand for a county assessor system. I strongly urge the adoption of a county assessor system on an optional basis at this time.

We have many apparent inequalities in our tax structure. There is feeling that the tax on household personal property is an unsatisfactory and costly tax to administer. There is justifiable complaint that the personal property tax on "tools of the trade" such as combines or store inventories is penalizing those who are willing to make capital investment. These criticisms of the personal property tax are justified. I recommend that the Legislative Research Committee's Sub-Committee on Taxation be made a permanent continuing committee and that this legislative body by resolution direct this committee to further study personal property taxes with the end in mind of shifting this tax burden to a more equitable source.

One of the most difficult tax problems of this biennium will involve the finance of the state's primary and secondary Foundation Educational Program in which the state is obligated to pay 60% of the average per pupil cost. In the present biennium, this obligation has been met and the previously mentioned deficit has occurred. Allocations of approximately \$4 million dollars in excess of tax income to the State School Equalization Fund have taken place in the present biennium and will take place in the next biennium unless corrected. An additional source of tax revenue totaling \$8 million dollars in the next biennium will have to be found to maintain this fund with its present allocations in a balanced position. There are

several sources of revenue which should be considered. The tax on liquor and tobacco now collected to pay off the Korean Conflict Adjusted Compensation Bonds should be re-enacted and used for the school equalization fund. The State School Equalization Fund has become a catch-all fund from which appropriations for fourteen purposes were made in this biennium. There would be merit in assigning only the three school Foundation Program appropriations from the equalization fund and considering all other eleven education appropriations in an omnibus education bill charged against the general fund. At present two types of sales taxes, the state's share of the sales tax on Special Fuels and the Use Tax, are not placed in the equalization fund. I recommend that they be placed there. The projected income from these two sources plus the income from the tax formerly levied to finance the retirement of the Korean Conflict Adjusted Compensation Bonds would balance the Foundation Program demands on the School Equalization Fund.

Another source of revenue for educational purposes to be considered would be a state flat rate income tax on adjusted gross income with stipulated credit for paid equalization levied personal property and real estate taxes. I consider this a just tax to obtain support for education from taxpayers unable to contribute equitably with real and personal property taxpayers at present. I do not favor an increase in the present sales tax rate of 2%, but I do favor greatly enlarging the sales tax enforcement division, especially for auditors stationed out of the state to help close the vast evasion of the sales tax and use tax at present. I am confident that the added cost of a larger tax audit staff would be offset many times over by collection of now evaded taxes. Enforcement of sales tax and use tax collections by our out-of-state auditors would give our own North Dakota merchants and industry a competitive position with out-of-state business making sales here. I believe these sources of new revenue mentioned are the most practical in balancing our School Equalization Fund.

In addition, I hope this legislative body will carry our historic endorsement of county and state tax equalization for education to the national level, and by resolution endorse the principle of national responsibility for education in the form of state-administered federal aid. If there is opposition to this proposal on the basis of retaining local school district autonomy, then I believe it wise to grant local school district boards more autonomy by raising the maximum legal mill levy limit for local education. In fact there is probably merit in both federal aid to education and greater local school district tax authority.

Our children in school today will be the economic and philosophical competitors of communism tomorrow. Tax savings in the field of education today could become a mocking senseless frugality in the years ahead.

GOVERNMENT RE-ORGANIZATION

The last session of this legislature, following Governor Davis's recommendation, enacted the legal and operational framework of the Department of Accounts and Purchases. This was a necessary and sound step forward in governmental efficiency. This department was begun today, and

I pledge you a gradual, careful implementation. It is estimated that several bienniums will pass before complete implementation will be accomplished.

Our State's Civil Service System known as the Merit System has been instituted in those departments in which Federal participation requires it. I urge that the merit system director be given clear cut responsibility to administer our state's merit system and that the system be enlarged this biennium to include the Department of Accounts and Purchases and the Highway Department.

There are many functions of state departments which have become unnecessary or are a duplication of effort. The present large number of field men and inspectors is an example. A centralized inspection service is desirable. Centralized State car pooling and state aircraft pooling could also save us money.

The State Board of Administration is made up of three full-time lay appointees and two elected officials who serve as ex officio members. They are charged with administering several categories of state institutions. The first category would be the health and mental health institutions such as the State Hospital, the State School for the mentally handicapped at Grafton, and the TB and Mental Hospital at Dunseith. The second category would include correctional facilities such as the Training School and the State Penitentiary. The third category would include the educational institutions for the deaf and the blind. The fourth category would include the Capitol and the Governor's home.

I believe these Board of Administration responsibilities could be more effectively and efficiently operated if the institutions in the first category were placed under the control of our Department of Health, which has the technically trained personnel in these related fields of endeavor. I believe the institutions in the second category should be administered by our State Welfare Department, because the State Training School Penitentiary involve the welfare problems of inmates' families before and after commitment. I believe the Department of Public Instruction should administer those institutions in the third category, the schools for the deaf and the blind, as a part of the Division of Special Education. The housekeeping administration of the Capitol and Governor's home could be placed under a single administrator. I believe compassionate and skilled programming at all of the institutions by trained personnel in these related State Departments is paramount over business administration consideration only.

HIGHWAYS

North Dakota can be justly proud of its highway system. Detailed projections of highway plans for Interstate, Primary and Secondary highways are available to you. We must decide in this session whether we can afford to gear our highway building plans for the coming biennium to a federal aid matching program. At present, our highway fund expenditures are at a rate of \$3 million dollars per biennium in excess of Highway Department revenue. Our rate of spending in this Department must be cut back to match income. It is absolutely necessary to maintain at

least \$3½ million in operating reserve. This session should take remedial action to bolster license fee income to our Highway Department. I believe legislation should be passed allowing the Highway Department to build necessary streets and roads at state institutions.

I believe that it is good business to appropriate money for an audit of Highway Department equipment once each biennium. This has never been done.

I believe the new built-in safety of the interstate highway system should be recognized by increasing the legal speed limits by 5 miles per hour on this system.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

There are many who view the economic future of North Dakota with misgivings. There are some who suggest we retrench and ride out the cost-price squeeze, or look to the Federal Government to solve all of our problems. I believe most of our citizens would want us to reach for our own boot straps and start pulling ourselves up.

The Economic Development Commission has made progress in its endeavors to make North Dakota more attractive to industry. Its efforts should be continued. When we really bear down on this problem of economic development in our state, we finally come to the conclusion that our greatest potential lies in the area of basic production from the soil — in agriculture, crude oil and lignite. I propose that we really get down to work in these three areas. Economic development is based primarily on research. I believe we must invest in more research in our basic products, research in production, processing and marketing. To appropriate for research would be meaningless unless such research was specifically and effectively directed. I ask that the Economic Development Commission be granted the authority to direct the use of a specific appropriation for research in basic production, and that the Commission be organized to accommodate representatives from the fields of basic production.

One of the weaknesses in economic development of farming in North Dakota is the low utilization of our own resources. We have the land, the young people, livestock and feed, but to a serious degree, we export the last three resources out of state to be combined at a profit elsewhere. We are at present losing a net of 10,000 North Dakotans per year to other states. Part of the problem which discourages young farmers from starting is intermediate or adjustment credit to adjust from low gross income cash grain farming to high gross income livestock, dairying, irrigation and specialty crops. I will propose a plan to bring a small part of the Bank of North Dakota resources to bear, along with the capital of local lending agencies, in a credit program of adjustment credit for young farmers. This plan in conjunction with the expert servicing of our agricultural experiment stations and extension service would be an effort to establish a trend among young farmers toward high gross income farming. I believe the responsibility of co-ordinating this plan should be placed in the Economic Development Commission. It will require enabling legislation to allow the Bank of North Dakota to participate. I would also support more

latitude in the ability of the Bank of North Dakota to participate in financing industrial development. The philosophy of lending of the Bank of North Dakota should reflect our faith in the potential of economic development for our own people.

EDUCATION

North Dakota has made tremendous strides in reorganizing its school districts and in raising minimum teacher requirements. However, a recent national survey leaves the impression that we do not rank up with the average of the other states in this nation in factors affecting education. The level of education in each school is determined by each community. North Dakota has some of the finest schools in the nation, but we have too many below an acceptable standard. I urge that by resolution you direct the Legislative Research Committee to make a study of "School District Organization" so that we may establish goals in planning school finance and reorganization on a sound basis. There are many needs in education such as the up-grading of facilities, teacher requirements, curriculum and special education which await information on efficient school organization. Deliberations on education must be focused on the needs of our children rather than tax rates, or development of the local business community.

HIGHER EDUCATION

The competition which attracts our instructors to colleges or industry outside of North Dakota continues unabated. In nearly every instance where salary is a factor in losing a college instructor, the replacement salary is as much or more as was asked by the teacher who was attracted out of our system. I would support a 10% increase in salaries for staff members of our institutions of higher education. I would encourage efforts to set up salary schedules for college personnel, determined by the Board of Higher Education.

We expect to reach a North Dakota college enrollment plateau in 1968 of 17,000 students. A Board of Higher Education survey team projected a building program to cover replacement and expansion needs to 1968 calling for a state expenditure of an average of \$4.3 million for each of the next four bienniums. We should make every effort to effect an orderly sound program for building expansion or replacement in this biennium at a figure approximating \$4.3 million. This does not include possible federal aid for college buildings. We need to include in our higher education appropriation bills an authorization to participate in available federal aid for building. The institutional building appropriations should be appropriated to the Board of Higher Education rather than to the specific institutions to allow flexibility and a greater return in buildings from the tax dollar.

A rising demand for student loans from the Bank of North Dakota and an increased cost of education appear to justify increasing the Student loan revolving fund in the Bank of North Dakota from its present \$1 million to \$1½ million. This action should be accompanied by the increase in the maximum size of the loan from the present \$500 to \$750.

WELFARE

North Dakota has long been a leader in the nation in its program of public welfare. Today we are a state which can step readily forward to participate in the recently authorized Federal Old Age Medical Assistance Act. We will need to enact enabling legislation involving: (1) our lien law, (2) our residence requirements, (3) our confidentiality law, and (4) our means test, to conform to Federal requirements if we wish to participate. I recommend that enabling legislation apply only to participation in the Federal program and not be made all inclusive with our other state-sponsored welfare programs.

The Governor's Committee on Aging has uncovered the need to establish programming in rehabilitation and recreation for our elderly people. The housing program for our senior citizens in North Dakota is not adequate. I recommend that the state participation in our loan program for housing for the aged be increased from its present 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ % limit to 50%, and that the maximum limit of the loan be increased from its present \$100,000 to \$150,000. I recommend that the licensing responsibilities for nursing homes and homes for the aged be placed in the State Health Department.

AGRICULTURE

North Dakota is the nation's number one cash grain state. We rank first in the production of hard red spring wheat, durum, malting barley, flax and rye. With this interest in agriculture, we should be aggressive in participating in national farm policy making.

Agricultural policy falls logically into four categories: (1) international, (2) short range domestic, (3) long range domestic and (4) North Dakota farm policy.

In international policy, we must first recognize our tremendous North Dakota stake in export trade of farm commodities and the serious consequences to our North Dakota economy from a short-sighted policy of isolationism. This legislature should join other agricultural states in resolutions to Congress to:

1. Expand food and fiber exports.
2. Tie surplus food exports to an import quota system, rather than the present flat rate tariff system.
3. Establish international grain grading standards with stiff penalties for non-performance of contract.
4. Assist farmer co-operative sales abroad to establish a yardstick for quality reputation for U. S. agricultural products.

In U. S. domestic short range policy by resolution to Congress we should stress:

1. A disapproval of whole farm unit soil banking.
2. A need to control bushel production with offsetting price supports for reduced production.
3. A cash grain program not tied to the corn belt philosophy of inexpensive feed for livestock in a domestic consumption market.

In United States domestic long range policy we should

stress in resolution to Congress a need to build up foreign consumption of United States agricultural products in:

1. Hard currency countries through trade negotiation.
2. In soft currency countries through trade, economic assistance and Public Law 480.
3. In poverty areas by outright gift plus economic assistance to build their economy.
4. Working in all foreign countries to secure a quality reputation second to none in foreign markets.

In North Dakota agricultural planning, we should through legislation and appropriation:

1. Attack the problem of agricultural credit necessary for our farmers to adjust to high gross income farming.
2. Increase research in specified projects involving nutrition, disease control, yield, rate of gain, processing, and marketing of our livestock and crop resources. Agricultural research and extension budgets should be considered separately from the North Dakota State University of Agriculture academic budget.
3. Institute research in alternate crops not now grown here but adaptable to North Dakota environment.
4. Request the relocation of the Federal Wheat quality evaluation station from Beltsville, Maryland, to North Dakota.
5. Urge an accelerated linseed oil utilization research program at the North Dakota Experiment Station and the Federal Peoria Regional laboratory.
6. Encourage farm commodity processing industry to locate in North Dakota.

The potential for agriculture in North Dakota is tremendous. The change in the national administration calls for this state to assert its leadership in national farm policy planning. Right or wrong, we should have the courage to voice our convictions.

LABOR

Today, total non-farm personal income in North Dakota greatly exceeds total farm personal income. Our state is asking for industry to come here to provide job opportunity for our youthful labor force. This state has not recognized the importance of our labor force in past years. Today industry wants a stable governmental labor legislation climate in any state in which it is planning to locate its operations.

This session of the legislature will find that the groundwork has been laid for historic labor legislation. The people of North Dakota by constitutional amendment have authorized the establishment of a separate Department of Labor. This I urge you to do.

The Governor's Committee on Labor, headed by senior statesman Ralph Beede, has painstakingly hammered out the legal framework within which labor and management can negotiate peaceably. This labor relations act may not be completely acceptable to either labor or management but it is necessary to establish a foundation for labor-management negotiations which can be refined and expanded in future sessions. North Dakota needs a labor relations act. I urge you to give it favorable attention.

Minimum wages by North Dakota law have been almost nonexistent. I believe up-to-date minimum wage legislation is urgently needed.

A priority bill relating to unemployment compensation will be placed before you immediately. This bill would amend Section 52-04-05 of the North Dakota Century Code setting the standard rate of contribution of unemployment tax to conform to requirements necessary by Federal statute if participation in the Federal Unemployment Compensation Program is to continue. We have been given until January 28, 1961, to comply. I urge that you give this matter favorable and early attention.

I recommend that maximum weekly unemployment compensation benefits be raised to at least 50% of the average weekly wage in the lower wage brackets.

Studies indicate that an unemployment disability insurance program could be instituted at a cost to employees of a flat 1% of their wages. This program could include groups not under the unemployment compensation program, but should be administered by the Unemployment Compensation Division of our State. This act would require a small initial appropriation to start it. I believe this is a sound program.

MENTAL HEALTH

The quality of treatment at our State Hospital should be greatly improved; and we are aware of the criticism leveled at the operation of the State School at Grafton as contained in the survey report of the National Institute of Mental Health given to the Legislative Research Committee. There is great need to provide professional supervision over the programming of not only these two institutions and proposed community mental health clinics, but also for coordination of all mental health, psychiatric and psychological services provided by various departments in state government. In order to place positive responsibility and make possible a balanced mental health program, I recommend the establishment of a Mental Health Authority within the Health Department. The Mental Health Authority should be a medically qualified professional administrator who would obtain maximum effective service for tax monies expended. I recommend that appropriations be made sufficient to establish the budget requirements of both a Mental Health Authority and matching funds for community mental health clinics.

WATER RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

North Dakota has benefited greatly from a sound water development program. Today water conservation and development is sweeping the nation. In this legislative session we should consider resolutions to strengthen our claim to our own water, already being eyed by downstream interests on the Missouri and even in Canada.

We should, by concurrent resolution, ask Congress to favorably treat our requests for the following:

1. The reauthorization of the Garrison Diversion unit with a construction appropriation.
2. The early approval and construction of the Pembilier Dam.

3. The early approval and construction of the Bowman-Haley Dam.
4. The stabilization of the Missouri River banks from the Garrison Dam to the upper reaches of the Oahe Reservoir.

We should, by concurrent resolution, give declaration of intent setting forth the following.

1. The withdrawal of 2,640,000 acre feet of water for future appropriation from the Missouri River.
2. Direct the State Water Commission to further protect future North Dakota water use requirements by declaring that additional Missouri River water is withdrawn for our own future appropriation.

We should, by concurrent resolution, request other interested states to:

1. Authorize their responsible agencies to cooperate with our North Dakota agencies in the pollution control and development of the Red River of the North.
2. Extend for an additional four years the time limit for the Little Missouri contract negotiations.

Our water laws have served us well but there is need for complete revision. I recommend that the Legislative Research Committee be directed to cooperate with our North Dakota State Water Conservation Commission in a study and revision of our State Water Code.

INDIANS

The problems of our Indian population need a more sincere effort to solve them. The Indians are caught between an unwillingness on the part of the Federal government and our State government to draw clear-cut and reasonable lines of jurisdiction. We need to delineate this responsibility.

Today the Federal government disposes of millions of dollars worth of surplus material. The destitution to be seen on any of our reservations is a strong argument for making useful items of surplus material such as overshoes, sheepskin coats and tools available to those Indians under Federal jurisdiction on reservations. I have asked the Chiefs of the Tribal Councils of our four Indian Reservations and the Indian Affairs Commission to meet with the appropriate committee of this legislature early in this session to discuss these problems.

OIL

Our oil industry continues its development. North Dakota has moved up to tenth position among all states in proven oil reserves. Our annual production of crude oil now greatly exceeds our own refining capacity and even exceeds the total amount of all petroleum products consumed annually in this State. Marketing of crude oil continues to be a critical factor in our oil development program. I pledge this Administration to be alert to marketing ramifications which involve the importation of foreign crude oil. Future expansion of crude oil marketing would be greatly enhanced by the construction of a pipeline to heavy consumption marketing areas. I pledge my administration to vigorously pursue this objective. Future oil expansion and conservation can best be served by the

flexibility of a minimum of regulation and restriction. The rights of the state, together with the correlative rights of all who have interests in the oil industry, must be carefully considered before new legislation is passed.

ELECTION LAWS

I respectfully quote from the 1957 message of Governor John Davis to the Thirty-Fifth Legislative Assembly: "Now that the two-party system has been restored in North Dakota politics, I believe the time has come to completely review our election laws and particularly make changes that will establish party responsibility." I endorse that statement by Governor Davis and I believe it is even more applicable in this year 1961.

Maneuvering by political parties to secure advantage under law should be eliminated. I believe if we start with the individual voting citizen and consider election laws only from the standpoint of giving that citizen maximum opportunity to secretly express his conviction at the polls, we will strengthen the definition of democratic process in government. I have not been able to secure bi-partisan consideration of election laws by political party leaders; but there is no question that the voting public believes that our election laws need revision.

I recommend your serious consideration of the following election law revisions:

1. Shifting the legal hours of voting to allow more time for voters to vote after working hours.
2. A respect for privacy of opinion by combining party primary ballots in one ballot.
3. Equalization of advantage to both major parties by providing for an alternating position of the party column on the general election ballot.
4. A shortened North Dakota residence requirement to reduce the present disenfranchisement of new residents voting for the President and Vice President of the United States in a presidential election.

The present law regarding state political party organization requires a political party to organize in August. I believe a more practical time for political party reorganization is following a general election. Political parties are for the purpose of advancing governmental philosophy, legislation and candidates. A reorganization requirement which would give a maximum time between elections to a newly reorganized party would seem the most effective means of strong political activity.

DAKOTA CENTENNIAL

This year — 1961 — marks the one hundredth anniversary of the establishment of the Dakota Territory, it is a year in which the citizens of this state and nation should pause to reflect back on the sacrifices, hardships, joys, sorrows, failures and successes which made the foundation upon which our Dakota Territory was built. Our sister state, South Dakota, is already actively observing this Centennial. Governor Davis has appointed a committee to direct North Dakota's observance of this anniversary. I recommend that this committee receive your support and also, an emergency appropriation.

RECOGNITION OF SENATOR LANGER

This past biennium saw the passing of perhaps the most colorful and controversial political figure in North Dakota history, the Honorable William Langer. No matter who Senator Langer's opponent was the voters were either for or against "Bill". And as elections came and went, more voters were for him. I propose that we appropriate funds for a lasting memorial at our State Capitol for this man, Senator William Langer, who has left a vast number of admirers in this state.

HALL OF FAME

Thoughts on the late Senator Langer point up the fact that North Dakota has no Hall of Fame. Great citizens have left lasting contributions to the honor and spirit of North Dakota. It would be fitting and proper if we gave thought to the possibility of making the great hall at the west wing of the Capitol Building not a warehouse for old files but rather a well-lighted North Dakota Hall of Fame containing the portraits and accounts of our greatest citizens from the past, such as Theodore Roosevelt and John Burke, to our present citizens of note, such as Lawrence Welk and Eric Sevareid. The need for a North Dakota Hall of Fame is indicated by the 88 great North Dakotans nominated for consideration by the committee selecting a nominee for the Statuary Hall of Fame.

CONCLUSION

I have presented to you my appraisal of the major areas of legislative activity for this session. I have offered specific suggestions and general suggestions on courses of action. The first responsibility, of course, rests with you. You will hear hours of testimony in your committee work. Some of this testimony will be articulate and well documented, other testimony will suffer by its presentation. Your skill in assimilating facts together with your depth of compassion in considering testimony will stand you in good stead in legislating for the good of all people in North Dakota. Good politics, good citizenship and good government are one and the same. We should exercise them freely.

Morality is the degree of excellence in our practice of that which is right. Morality in our government is the basis of our claim to the finest, most sympathetic government on earth. Legality has not always been consistent with morality. Morality must be the strong thread in the fabric of legislation. May God grant us the courage of our moral convictions in these days ahead.

Rep. Wolf moved that the joint session be now dissolved, which motion prevailed.

The House now stood in recess until 1:30 p.m., January 5, 1961, in accordance with the motion of Rep. Wolf.

FIRST READING OF SENATE BILLS

Rep. Aamoth: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to have my remarks printed in the Journal. I preface my remarks by saying that I recognize that this bill must be passed immediately. However, I voted against it to bring out a point to you that must be considered by the members of this Assembly. I have before me a wire to the Director of Unemployment Compensation, in which it is pointed out that by a given date these corrections must be made to the law.

Now, this is one of those propositions where the federal government is with the state government in matching funds. I do not believe we should be faced with this pressure continually. In the future this will come under federal aid to education; to welfare and to the Indians—they can tell you just what they want and they will tell you just what you have to do."

Rep. Fitch: "Mr. Speaker, I agree wholeheartedly with the remarks of Rep. Aamoth, but I nevertheless move that the rules be suspended and House Bill No. 558 be messaged to the Senate immediately."

Rep. Tescher: "Fellow Representatives: If I may have the floor for just a few minutes and if I could please have

my remarks entered in the Journal. This is not horse play nor in any way controversial or political. We have talked taxes and keep putting on more taxes as the nation progresses. We know this state is some eighty percent agriculture and as most of our tax revenue comes from agriculture — let's try to have agriculture progress. I remember two and four years ago in our Agriculture Committee and in some of the bills pertaining to weeds — and I am referring mostly to leafy spurge. Two years ago we passed a bill allowing the counties in a very feeble way, to help out, but it is not enough and some counties are badly infested with leafy spurge. Ours is a county that can give us something, but what they give is not enough. We have to stop or slow down this weed, or I don't see how we will be able to pay taxes on this land. We put on levies for swimming pools, roads, halls, parks, schools, etc. and I know they are good and very important, but will say this request is important too, if we wish to stay on the farms and get enough revenue to pay taxes on same. I have heard of several counties having the same trouble. Now, if the Representatives of these counties would please contact me and see what we could do about this and other weeds in our counties, this would have to be done at once because this being the last week to put in bills.

If you have any questions, I will try to answer them."

I have thought about the legislature all the time and I still think it is very, very important but I thought those people must just study all the time and must be very serious and study their books and they might have very big fights but I didn't think they would be so familiar as they are. I visited around this morning in the committees and with so many people of this body and they are so nice and warm hearted and I found you don't have to go

around very, very quietly, and that visitors can say anything just like me talking to you.

I came over on a ship with nine hundred different students from all over Europe, who came here to live one year in the United States. We were very, very anxious to come and everybody wanted to know where everybody else was going, so we asked each other and one said, 'I am going to live in California' and they all said 'That must be wonderful'. The next one told us 'My home will be in Florida'. So My, oh, Me, we thought that must be nice. I said 'I am going to North Dakota' and usually there would be no remarks. I don't know why — maybe they don't know where it is. I don't know why they don't make any remarks. I thought this must be something special and I have found out in the five months that I have been here that North Dakota is very, very nice. I have a nice town to stay in and very wonderful parents. I think that is the main thing. When I go back I will tell the other students about being in the legislature of North Dakota and I don't think those in California or Florida will have that experience.

I am very happy being here."

Sec. 1. NORTH DAKOTA NATIONAL STATUARY HALL COMMISSION.) There is hereby established a North Dakota Statuary Hall Commission which shall consist of ten members appointed by the governor from the citizens of North Dakota who shall serve until the duties prescribed in this Act have been completed. The members shall elect from their number a chairman who shall preside at all meetings of commission. The members of the commission shall receive no compensation for their services on such commission but they shall receive mileage and actual expenses for their services in the same manner as other state officials receive mileage and expenses. It shall be the duty of the North Dakota Statuary Hall Commission to select a deserving person from the state of North Dakota whose statue shall be placed, along with other great Americans, as the representative of the state of North Dakota in the National Statuary Hall in the United States Capitol building in Washington, D. C. The state historical society shall assist the commission in carrying out the provisions of this Act if called upon to do so by the commission. The commission shall report its recommendations to the Thirty-seventh Legislative Assembly.

Sec. 2. APPROPRIATION.) There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of two thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary to the North Dakota Statuary Hall Commission for the purpose of paying expenses to the members of the commission as provided for in this Act.

REPORT

of the

**NORTH DAKOTA NATIONAL
STATUARY HALL COMMISSION**

The North Dakota National Statuary Hall Commission was created under the provisions of House Bill No. 660 of the 36th Legislative Assembly, which Act is found in chapter 366 of the Session Laws of 1959. This Act directed the Statuary Hall Commission to select from the State of North Dakota a deserving person whose statue shall be placed among the other great Americans in the National Statuary Hall in the Capitol Building at Washington, D. C., as a representative of the State of North Dakota. The sum of \$2,000 was appropriated to the Commission to carry out the provisions of this Act.

In accordance with this directive, a Commission of ten members, consisting of Representative Murray A. Baldwin, Fargo; Ralph Christensen, Minot; E. J. Franta, Langdon; Mrs. James R. Beck and Mrs. Marion J. Piper, Bismarck; Mrs. Natalie Adamson, Beach; Herman Stern, Valley City; Dr. Charles E. Scott, Dickinson; Mrs. Bernard J. Kennedy, Sentinel Butte; and Mrs. Vesper Smith Lewis, Rolette, was appointed by the Governor.

At its first meeting on December 8, 1959, the Commission organized by selecting State Representative Murray A. Baldwin as its chairman and Mrs. Marion Piper as its secretary. Five subsequent meetings were held in the State Capitol at Bismarck in the course of the Commission's work.

The Commission agreed that it should request the assistance of all interested citizens in the state in the submission of names of deserving and outstanding citizens who should be considered for selection by the Commission. An invitation to the citizens of the state to participate in the selection was issued through all newspapers and radio and television stations in the state. In addition, Commission members spent a great deal of time in the review of North Dakota history in order that each member of the Commission might select candidates for consideration by the Commission.

Thereafter, each member of the Commission submitted a list of candidates for consideration by the Commission, and the names of candidates suggested by interested citizens were added to this list. Additional publicity was given to the list of names under serious consideration by the Commission in order to obtain the opinions of as many interested citizens as possible.

The Commission prepared a brief biographical sketch of some thirty persons whose names were under serious consideration. At subsequent meetings the list was narrowed until a total of eight remained for final consideration by the Commission, and the qualifications of each of these persons were given detailed study.

Essentially, the Commission believed that no living person should be selected and that a sufficient time should have passed since the death of any person under consideration to ensure mature judgment since a man's stature cannot be truly measured until established by history. This premise was also influenced by the fact that at a later date North Dakota will have an opportunity to select another of its citizens for the National Statuary Hall.

The Commission believed that the life work of the person chosen should meet the following criteria: (1) permanent and widespread benefit to the people of the state; (2) integrity, courage, and other traits of character admired by North Dakotans; (3) long residence in the state; (4) popular acclaim as a hero of his generation. The first criterion was considered the most important.

The Commission after a great deal of consideration, unanimously selected the Honorable John Burke, former Governor and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of North Dakota and Treasurer of the United States to be the first North Dakotan to be honored through having his statue placed in the National Statuary Hall. The Commission in this brochure presents a biographical sketch of the Honorable John Burke which clearly shows the basis for his selection.

The Commission chairman wishes to take this opportunity to express his sincere appreciation for the very fine cooperation of all members of the Commission. Their dili-

gence in attendance of meetings and the preparation of research material in regard to nominees for the position is to be commended, as was the individual dedication that consistently marked the efforts of Commission members. The Commission also wishes to express its appreciation to Mr. Russell Reid, Superintendent of the State Historical Society, who acted as adviser to the Commission and assisted in many ways. In addition, the Commission wishes to acknowledge with gratitude the participation of interested citizens of the state who materially aided the Commission in its efforts, both through the submission of written material and in appearances before the Commission.

It is the recommendation of the Commission that the Legislative Assembly take action at this Session to implement the Commission's selection through the appropriation of funds for the purpose of engaging a sculptor to furnish the statue for placement in National Statuary Hall as well as to pay the expenditures involved in appropriate dedication ceremonies. In addition, such bill of appropriation should designate the person or persons whose duty it would be to select the sculptor, approve the design, and superintend placement of the statue in National Statuary Hall.

JOHN BURKE

(1859-1937)

John Burke has been called "North Dakota's Lincoln" and in many respects his life, his career and even his appearance and mannerisms bore a resemblance to those of the Emancipator.

His great accomplishment was ridding North Dakota of corrupt political control. His weapons were a gifted tongue, a brilliant mind, perseverance, courage and personal integrity and patriotism. He was willing to share credit for his achievement with the many citizens who had become outraged after years of ring rule and who joined him in the fight.

They clad him with the power of leadership represented in the governor's office and continued to support him as he waged a relentless drive during his three terms to break the chains which had degraded both state and people. For his victory in this difficult task he has a place in the hearts of North Dakotans forever.

His fellow citizens were so proud of him and so sure of his qualifications during his lifetime that they proffered him to the nation as a candidate for President and when he returned to his state after serving eight years as Treas-

urer of the United States, they crowned his career by making him a Supreme Court justice, an office he held until his death in 1937 at the age of 78.

An Iowa farm boy, he came to Dakota Territory in 1888, a graduate lawyer, virtually penniless and without a practice. His first employment was as a harvest hand in the Traill county wheat fields. When the harvest was completed he made his way to St. John in Rolette county, where he became the village schoolmaster and devoted his spare time to helping publish the town newspaper and practicing law in his small hotel room.

At this period St. John was the county seat and during the court terms at which he tried his first Dakota cases it quickly became evident that this homespun country lawyer was gifted and that he possessed an unusual love for his fellow man. He was a man without malice and possessed of an integrity which soon brought him the name of "Honest John" Burke.

He had not been long in Dakota before he learned of the sinister power wielded by the political ring which held the state's institutions and people in its grip, controlling patronage, office and legislature in the interest of the railroads and distant milling and other business enterprises. His grasp of the seriousness of the situation was strengthened when he served as state representative in 1890 and state senator in 1892.

But not until 1906 did he find himself in a position to do something about it. While he was ambitious to rise in the law, he had not envisioned himself as governor and when Democrats and a number of disillusioned insurgent Republicans asked him to become the Democratic party candidate he was taken by surprise.

He was at this time a thriving lawyer in Devils Lake, earning far more than the governorship could bring him. As he pondered his decision he realized that his candidacy might bring him sorrow and humiliation rather than glory and honor. Almost irresistible power and infinite resources were certain to be pitted against him.

Analyzing the situation, he became convinced that if the people could learn the truth about the men who made a mockery of the state and its government they would rise in wrath, join forces with him and become active in the great fight. He accepted the challenge. It was a turning point in his life and in the history of North Dakota.

Almost single-handed he roamed over the state addressing the citizens. The newspapers gave him but scant mention, but thousands listened eagerly to his speeches and rallied others to his support. He was a magnetic orator and the truths he spoke could not be challenged. Nor was there anything in his life and character which could be questioned.

His effect on his listeners was reflected emphatically in the polling booths. His election was a shock to many who had calmly accepted the status quo. It was the beginning of the end of the flagrant political corruption of those times.

Under his fearless leadership many changes were made. A list of the corrective laws would fill many pages. They included a corrupt practices act, anti-pass law, a "short-

weights" law, pure seed, food and sanitation laws, laws to control public utilities, regulating child labor, prohibiting personal lobbying except before regular legislative committees, laws creating a state tax commission, a public health laboratory and many others.

Governor Burke set an example for all state office holders by unremitting attention to the duties of his office and insisted that all others do likewise.

He restored honor, justice and self-respect to the state. To every North Dakotan he gave freedom from corruption and reinstated dignity, self-respect and courage to fight for the right. He made it possible for the people to grow and prosper and for the state to take its place in the nation as a home of free and upright people.

"Who shall say to what high destiny he has not been appointed," said a biographer in writing about him after he had been swept into office for his second term.

"He stands very close to the hearts of the people, one of the most highly regarded of North Dakotans. The force of his personality has made the people forget their dearest prejudices, racial, political and religious, to flock to his standard."

At a great memorial service in the Supreme Court chambers in Bismarck after his death, Judge George M. McKenna said:

"We need build Governor John Burke no great mausoleum. Physical monuments perish but a true and noble character perpetuates itself and endures through all future ages. His greatest monument has been erected in the hearts of his people, who have reared for him there a shrine which is the glory of the state, and which will endure so long as the name North Dakota shall continue in the annals of men."

This biographical sketch of John Burke was prepared at the request of the North Dakota Statuary Hall Commission by Roy P. Johnson, of the Fargo Forum, who served as an adviser to the Commission.

Rep. Trom moved that the Speaker of the House of Representatives on behalf of the House of Representatives, be instructed to request the Attorney General for a legal opinion on the following question:

"Senate Concurrent Resolution "M", passed by the electorate at the primary election on June 24, 1960, amended sections 26, 29, and 35 of the North Dakota Constitution relating to the reapportionment of the Legislative Assembly. These amendments, among other things, had the effect of freezing the legislative districts to their boundaries as they existed 30 days after the passage of the constitutional amendment. Section 54-03-01 passed by the 1931 Legislature provides for the boundaries of the ninth and tenth legislative district.

"You will note that the ninth legislative district shall consist of the township of Fargo and the City of Fargo. The tenth legislative district consists of various townships and villages including the townships of Reed and Barnes. Since 1931, the City of Fargo has annexed various tracts of land within the townships of Reed and Barnes.

"The question therefore arises, does the act of the City of Fargo in annexing tracts of land from Reed and Barnes townships have the effect of changing the boundary lines of legislative districts by transferring such land to the ninth district from the tenth district. The further question arises whether the legislature intended to transfer reapportionment authority to the City of Fargo through its annexation proceedings or reserved it to the Legislative Assembly, or whether under the Constitution as it existed prior to the recent amendment, the Legislative Assembly would have the constitutional authority to delegate the authority to affect reapportionment in this fashion."

The motion of Rep. Trom prevailed and the Speaker was so instructed to ask for the Attorney General's opinion.

Rep. Skaar: "I would like my remarks printed in the House Journal. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of this assembly for the memorial given me this morning, after my Mother passed away, and for House Memorial Resolution No. 2. The kindness and thoughtfulness of the members is very, very much appreciated not only by me but by all members of my family.

"At such times there is always a loss. I imagine I was closer to her than anybody else since I lived closer to her, and therefore I miss her the most.

"She came to this country as a young woman in 1902; raised a family of six children; was active all her life and lived to the age of 88 years last June the 16th.

"She was active and happy most of the time. From six children, she had 33 grandchildren, 55 great grandchildren and one great great grandchild.

"Again I want to thank you all for your kindness and thoughtfulness."

Dear Mr. Speaker:

The office of the Attorney General acknowledges receipt of your letter of January 26, 1961, in which you state that action was taken by the House of Representatives on Wednesday, January 25, instructing you as its presiding officer to request an official opinion from this office interpreting section 54-03-01 of the North Dakota Century Code, as said section affects the boundaries of the 9th and 10th Legislative Districts of the State of North Dakota.

You further state that since the year 1931 annexations of territory have been made by the city of Fargo, which an-

nexations have included a part of two townships in the 10th Legislative District. Thus, there is a question raised as to whether or not the 9th Legislative District includes this territory annexed by the City of Fargo or whether the said territory so annexed since 1931 is still a part of the 10th Legislative District.

Section 26 of the North Dakota Constitution provides that the senate shall be composed of forty-nine members. Section 29 provides that: "Each existing senatorial district as provided by law at the effective date of this amendment shall permanently constitute a senatorial district. Each senatorial district shall be represented by one senator and no more."

The amendment was voted on at the June 28, 1960 election and became effective thirty days thereafter.

Section 35 of the North Dakota Constitution provides in part:

§ "Each senatorial district shall be represented in the House of Representatives by at least one representative except that any senatorial district comprised of more than one county shall be represented in the House of Representatives by at least as many representatives as there are counties in such senatorial district. In addition the Legislative Assembly shall, at the first regular session after each federal decennial census, proceed to apportion the balance of the members of the House of Representatives to be elected from the several senatorial districts, within the limits prescribed by this Constitution, according to the population of the several senatorial districts.***"

The senatorial districts were last defined by the legislature in section 1 of chapter 7 of the 1931 Session Laws. This section is now found in section 54-03-01 of the North Dakota Century Code and provides in part:

"The senatorial districts of the state shall be formed, and the senators and representatives shall be apportioned as follows: *****

9. The ninth legislative district shall consist of the township of Fargo, and the city of Fargo, in the county of Cass, and shall be entitled to one senator and five representatives;
10. The tenth legislative district shall consist of the townships of Noble, Wiser, Harwood, Reed, Barnes, Stanley, Pleasant, Kinyon, Gardner, Berlin, Raymond, Mapleton, Warren, Normanna, Bell, Harmony, Durbin, Addison, Davenport, Casselton, and the fractional township number one hundred thirty-nine, range forty-eight, in the county of Cass, including the villages of Mapleton, Argusville, Gardner, Horace, West Fargo, Grandin, Kindred, Southwest Fargo, Davenport, and the city of Casselton, and shall be entitled to one senator and two representatives;"

The senatorial districts, as set forth in section 54-03-01 of the North Dakota Century Code, have not been changed by law since 1931. A change, if any has taken place, is only the incidental result of growth expansion, etc., resulting in annexation to the city.

We believe the question in point is whether the annexa-

tion by the city of Fargo of tracts of land in Reed and Barnes townships has the effect of changing the boundary lines of the legislative districts by transferring such land to the ninth district from the tenth district.

There is serious question whether a senatorial district can be modified, decreased or increased as the result of growth or expansion resulting in annexation or by any other method other than specific legislative action. We have been unable to find a case of a similar nature in this state. Therefore, we must rely upon statutory construction and case law of other states in reaching a conclusion.

At first glance it would appear that since additional territory was annexed to a city it would become a portion of that city for all purposes and thus become a part of the same senatorial district to which the city belongs. However, we note that this does, in effect, raise a problem of construction of our statute since subsection 10 of section 54-03-01 states that the tenth district shall consist of the townships of "Reed, Barnes, ***." Since no exception is made we presume this to mean the entire township. A township has definite boundaries and has a definite area. If a portion of that township is subsequently included within another legislative district, the district in which the township was originally located cannot be said to contain the entire township.

We also note that Section 35 of the North Dakota Constitution provides for reapportionment after each federal decennial census. There is no authority vested in the legislature to reapportion at other times. Thus if the annexation by the city of Fargo of the territory in question was deemed to be an attempt to alter the boundaries of the senatorial districts there would, in fact, be an attempt to reapportion at a time not permitted by the State Constitution. Such attempted reapportionment would be void. It is presumed that the legislature would not attempt to adopt a void act. If two constructions of a statute are possible, the one which will render the act constitutional must be adopted.

Thus, we are impressed by the holding in the case of *Dowell v. McLees*, 248 Pac. 511 (Calif. Sp. Ct. 1926) in which the court held, on a factual situation almost identical to the one at hand, that the annexation proceedings did not have the effect of changing the boundaries of the legislative assembly districts. The case involved annexation and consolidation statutes.

In that case the court said that in fixing and readjusting the boundaries of assembly districts, the legislature acts pursuant to the provisions of the constitution. Under the section of the constitution pertaining to legislative reapportionment, which they held to be mandatory and prohibitory, the courts said that the power to form legislative districts can be exercised but once during the period between one United States census and the succeeding one. The court noted that in the annexation statutes the legislature had provided that "nothing in this act contained shall alter or affect the boundaries of any senatorial or assembly district." Our North Dakota statutes apparently contain no such provision. However, the court pointed out that their Consolidation Act contained no similar pro-

visions but that such would be the law, even in the absence of a legislative declaration to that effect. See Dowell v. McLees, supra, at page 512.

The court relied to great measure upon the case of Wheeler v. Herbert, 152 Cal. 224, 92 Pac. 353, in which the court said, at page 358 of the Pacific Report, "We think the true rule deducible from reason and authority is that the legislative districts are not changed by the change in county lines, but that they will remain, as fixed by the general apportionment act of 1901, until they are again fixed by the succeeding act in 1911, ****." For other case holding that the changing of the boundary lines of counties does not alter the boundaries of existing legislative districts, see County of Bay v. Bullock, 51 Mich. 544, 16 N.W. 896.

We also note that Section 29 of the North Dakota Constitution provided prior to its amendment in 1960 as follows:

"The legislative assembly shall fix the number of senators, and divide the state into as many senatorial districts as there are senators, which districts, as nearly as may be, shall be equal to each other in the number of inhabitants entitled to representation. Each district shall be entitled to one senator and no more, and shall be composed of compact and contiguous territory; and no portion of any county shall be attached to any other county, or part thereof, so as to form a district. The districts as thus ascertained and determined shall continue until changed by law." (emphasis supplied)

The law referred to was that provided by section 35 of the North Dakota Constitution prior to its amendment in 1960. This section read as follows:

"The members of the house of representatives shall be apportioned to and elected at large from each senatorial district. The legislative assembly shall, in the year 1895, and every tenth year cause an enumeration to be made of all the inhabitants of this state, and shall at its first regular session after each such enumeration, and also after each federal census, proceed to fix by law the number of senators, which shall constitute the senate of North Dakota, and the number of representatives which shall constitute the house of representatives of North Dakota, within the limits prescribed by this constitution, and at the same session shall proceed to reapportion the state into senatorial districts as prescribed by this constitution, and to fix the number of members of the house of representatives to be elected from the several senatorial districts; provided, that the legislative assembly may, at any regular session, redistrict the state into senatorial districts and apportion the senators and representatives respectively."

This was the law in effect at the time that the 1931 Legislative Assembly enacted what is now section 54-03-01 of the North Dakota Century Code. This was also the law in effect at the time the annexations to the city of Fargo were made. Since Section 29 of the Constitution provided that the senatorial districts as established by the legislature were to remain in effect until changed by law, and the law provided that the senatorial districts could be changed in 1895, every tenth year thereafter, after federal

census and at any regular session, we believe that no change could have been attempted at any other time. It would render void a reapportionment attempted to be made effective as the boundaries of the city of Fargo were enlarged through annexation. As noted above no "changes by law" have been made since 1931.

Therefore, it is the opinion of this office that the intent of the 1931 legislature in enacting what is now section 54-03-01 (9) and (10) of the North Dakota Century Code was to adopt the then existing boundaries of the city of Fargo and the township of Fargo as the permanent boundaries of the ninth legislative district and to adopt the then existing boundaries of the tenth legislative district as set out in the 1931 act as the permanent boundaries of the tenth legislative district. We believe that the descriptions used in that section were merely convenient methods of setting forth the boundaries of these two districts and that there was no intent upon the part of the legislature to delegate their power of reapportionment to the city of Fargo through means of annexation.

Further, it is our opinion that the act of the city of Fargo in annexing tracts of land from Reed and Barnes townships does not have the effect of changing the boundary lines of legislative districts by transferring such land to the ninth district from the tenth district.

"Mr. Speaker: I would request that the following remarks be printed in the Journal.

William Langer:

The late William Langer, United States senator from North Dakota, needs no introduction to any member of this house whether he be young or old, but to refresh your memories:

William Langer was born on a farm in Everest Township, near Casselton, Cass County, North Dakota, September 30, 1886; attended a rural school and later Casselton high school; was graduated from the law department of the University of North Dakota at Grand Forks in 1906 and from Columbia University, New York, New York, in 1910; was admitted to the bar in 1911 and began practice in Mandan, North Dakota; state's attorney of Morton County, North Dakota, 1914-1916; moved to Bismarck, North Dakota, in 1916 and continued the practice of law; attorney general of North Dakota, 1916-1920; legal advisor for Council of Defense during the First World War; unsuccessful candidate for governor in 1920; elected governor in 1932 and served from January 1933 to July 17, 1934, when he was removed by the Supreme Court of North Dakota; again governor from 1937 to 1939; unsuccessful candidate for the Republican nomination for United States Senator in 1938 and also for election to the United States Senate as an independent candidate; elected as a Republican to the United States Senate in 1940; reelected in 1946, 1952, and again in 1958, and served from January 3, 1941, until his death in Washington, D. C., November 8, 1959; interment in St. Leo's Catholic cemetery, Casselton, North Dakota.

During his entire political life, William Langer was probably one of the most controversial personalities the state of North Dakota has ever known. In order to add my tribute to that of his innumerable friends, I cannot do better than quote from a memorial address given by our senior Senator Milton Young, to the Senate of the United States. And I quote: "Tributes to Bill Langer have come from near and far. They have come from rich and poor alike and from persons in every walk of life.

He was honored by all who knew him or knew of him, and by both those who agreed with him and those who disagreed with him.

Senator Langer was a liberal of the old school. Much of his thinking was influenced by three former great liberals of the United States Senate—the late Robert M. La Follette, George M. Norris, and Hiram Johnson, all of whom he greatly admired. His liberal thinking and his natural desire to help the poor and the underprivileged had a great influence on all of his long career as a public servant, which extended over nearly a half a century.

Bill Langer loved people, and they loved him. No one in the history of North Dakota had a more devoted, loyal, and dedicated following. This was due not only to the principles and ideals for which he stood, but also to his warm, captivating personality. During his 19 years in the

Senate, Bill Langer was always the champion of the underdog. No one was too poor or lowly to receive his sympathetic assistance.

Above all, he had the courage to stand alone, if need be, to vote his convictions. I believe that it was this quality of courage that endeared him above all else to those who knew him. He was a man of truly independent spirit. He was proud of being known as "Wild Bill".

His achievements in the United States Senate were outstanding in many fields of endeavor. It was here that he championed the cause of the people he was closest to—farmers, laborers, government employees, and all others whom he thought were in need of help. There is hardly a facet of American life that has not been touched by the legislative hand of Bill Langer.

We in North Dakota, as well as people throughout the nation, share the great loss suffered by his family, but take comfort in the knowledge that his dauntless courage and record of accomplishments will be remembered always." Unquote.

It gives me a great deal of pleasure and satisfaction to have had the opportunity, with the other members of the Cass County delegation, Representatives Otos, Idso, Powers, Aamoth, Baldwin, Fitch, Stockman and Boe, to sponsor House Bill No. 599 which, if approved, will appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose of acquiring a suitable bust of former Senator William Langer together with a suitable pedestal for placement in Memorial Hall of the state capitol building."

However no payment shall be made for Indian pupils in districts in which the school facilities are being provided, maintained and staffed wholly or in part by the federal government for the education of the Indian pupils. Such payments shall not be made unless four or more units of standard high school work approved by the superintendent of public instruction are offered during the current year, only certificated teachers have been employed, teachers have been paid not less than the minimum legal salaries, and the other standards prescribed by this chapter have been met. Districts that did not maintain high schools during the year of 1954-1955 shall not be eligible for payments unless they have a minimum enrollment of twenty-five pupils if four years of high school work are offered, a minimum enrollment of twenty pupils if three years of high school work are offered, a minimum enrollment of fifteen pupils if two years of high school work are offered, and a minimum enrollment of ten pupils if one year of high school work is offered. A student who lives within twenty miles of another state or in a county bordering on another state and in a school district which has no school, or which does have a high school and the attendance has been authorized in accordance with the provisions of section 15-40-17, with the approval of the county superintendent of schools, may attend a four year public high school in an adjoining state and payments from the county equalization fund shall be paid to the district in which the high school which he attends is located in the amount provided for in this section. For purposes of this chapter "average daily membership" shall mean the total days all students in a given school are in attendance plus the total days all students are absent, divided by one hundred eighty days.

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues of the 37th Legislative Assembly:

It is not my intentions to impose upon you for great length this afternoon: However, I am deeply interested in this bill. I know of no other bill introduced in this session that would be of more importance and be in accord with good Christian principles, for it would do the most for those who now have so little. I feel that we were created to live on this earth in brotherhood and to be always mindful and aware of the needs of others. I am reasonably sure that all members of this House agree with me thus far. It seems then that if such is the case, we owe it to ourselves and all society, to ask ourselves, if we are doing what is right, from a human standpoint: are we in accordance with Christian principles, to sit idly by and permit the outright exploitation of the worth and dignity of the people who are having to work for less than \$1 an hour.

Abraham Lincoln said, it is the responsibility of government to do for the people that which they cannot do for themselves. Let me suggest that even the most casual review of the past should convince you that the working people of North Dakota, by and large, have been unsuccessful in lifting themselves out of this unfortunate and undesirable predicament, and thus it is for this legislative session to take remedial steps such as passing the \$1 per hour minimum wage bill. Opposition says that we are going too far and that there is no provision for a starting wage. A gage which we will do well to measure our progress by was stated in these terms by that great man who led this nation successfully out of the darkest days the nation has known, Franklin D. Roosevelt, when he said, and I quote, The test of our progress is not whether we add more to the abundance of those who have much: it is whether we provide enough for those who have too little. Let me remind all that this is just the minimum and that you have every right to pay above the minimum for the more learned, experienced, or more productive employees. This is the base below which I feel that none should go.

No. 2. One of the bad features of the bill does have provisions for learning trades and so forth. The other bad feature is counting on tips. Is there any distinction below salaries in the legislature? Do all legislators produce equal amounts of work and services? I need not answer that. Who in this assembly would go to work for \$1.00 per hour, to say nothing about the 50 and 60 cent an hour scale that is currently found around the state. It would seem to me that one would need a heart as cold as that of a dead Eskimo in order to oppose the minimum of one dollar an hour. My friend, Representative Karabensh, in hopes of saving this bill from getting an unfavorable report from committee, offered to amend it to seventy-five

cents an hour, but the majority party's members did not see fit to go along with that. So the only conclusion I can come to is that they want no minimum wage law at all. We who sponsored the bill had already compromised by raising the age at which it would become effective from 16 to 18, and thus feel that we have done what we could to make it an acceptable bill.

It is quite commonly known that union wage scales are far above those found in unorganized labor, and therefore you may be wondering why people in organized labor, people such as Bill Murray, Agnes Geeland, and Harold Olson of the North Dakota AFL-CIO, Larry Doyle and Dale Langford, as well as others of the Railway Labor Committee, are working in behalf of this bill as long as their people are receiving far and above what is provided for in the one dollar an hour minimum wage bill. I say to that that this is a clear indication that people in organized labor are not selfish but are interested in helping the unorganized raise their standards of living and thus be of every assistance that they can to them in order that they will receive a respectable wage and be saved from having to be put on the relief rolls. They feel strongly that when the employer fails to meet his responsibility of paying a respectable wage the purchasing power is destroyed and the entire community is affected.

Those from business who oppose the measure say it will force them to close the shop. Mr. Speaker, I can think of no groups of business or industry which has been faced with the economic tragedy that the North Dakota farmer has experienced the past 8 years. However, that great farm organization, "The North Dakota Farmers Union", which down through the history of its existence, has been the one farm organization which has consistently believed in applying the 20th century techniques to 20th century problems had their representative, Mr. Arlow Biggs, appear at the committee hearing in favor of the bill. He said, and I quote, The North Dakota Farmers Union does not believe that the farmers can pull themselves out of economic disaster over the backs of cheap labor. Unquote. Likewise, I do not feel that the sagging business on the main streets of our North Dakota towns will be able to rise out of their economic crisis if the community by which they are surrounded does not have the income to buy the merchants products. These workers who will benefit from this bill are the unorganized, some may be uneducated and unskilled, but none is unworthy, and I submit Mr. Speaker that they should not also be uncared for.

In closing, Mr. Speaker, I just want to summarize with the following remarks. "Our living standards are the highest in the world. That is true. But too many of our workers do not enjoy those standards. And the opponents of our way of life seize upon that argument to charge that we are hypocritical. We want to see the day when the proponents of slave philosophies have no shadow of an argument against us. We want to see the day when everyone in this great nation enjoys our high standard of living. I feel that every raise in minimum wages, every legislative action to broaden coverage is another nail in the coffin of communism, and an inspiration to the communist slave

nations, and to the hundreds of millions in the still uncommitted countries, just awakening to freedom, who look to us for guidance, for inspiration, and for leadership.

Thank you."

"The reason I voted 'No' against the appropriation for the State Mill and Elevator is that there are many people who believe these people are engaged in a number of businesses in which they should not be engaged. At the present time, or in the very recent past, they have been engaged in the sale of fungicides, weed spray, herbicides, insecticides, fertilizer, grass and other seeds, in direct competition with private enterprises. There is one business that is only a few blocks away. They have special privileges in running trucks, etc. They do not pay any taxes as such and my remarks are only for the purpose of pointing out that they are engaged in all these things. Their sales are quite large in fertilizer. I see no connection in these businesses, in these sales, and the operating of the State Mill and Elevator and the reason and purpose for which it was originally intended.

"Thank you."

Hagen: "I have often wondered when people refer to the profit of the State Mill and Elevator and it sounds fine, and wonderful, what it would be if they were put on the tax rolls, the same as other business. This is something to take into consideration. They are competing in many lines of business against local businessmen who are paying these taxes."

Rep. Sorlie moved that the amendments to House Bill No. 862 as recommended by the Committee on Natural Resources on page 540 of the House Journal be adopted, which motion prevailed.

SIGNING OF BILLS

The Chief Clerk announced that the Speaker was about to sign:

Senate Bill No. 186

And the Speaker signed the same in the presence of the House.

EIGHTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rep. Saugstad moved that the remarks of Sidney Goldish, the speaker on the "Newspapermen's Day" program, together with the remarks of Mr. Ray Dobson of the Minot Daily News, be printed in the House Journal, which motion prevailed, and the remarks follow:

Speaker Brown: "This is the third session of the North Dakota Legislature at which the lawmakers have paused on a February day to pay tribute to the press of the state. We thank you newspaper men and women for enabling us to make this occasion possible.

What we do here, what we say here, what we accomplish in this Legislature, is faithfully and objectively told by the newspapers of North Dakota, both daily and weekly.

When you criticize us, we respect your valid right to do so. The editorial term "we" does carry might, make no mistake about that. You are the chroniclers of daily history of your community, your state, your nation, the world. And not a man or a woman in this Legislature, I am sure, would disagree with the thought that the freedom of the press is one of the great bulwarks of liberty.

You, the newspaper folk of North Dakota, are a vital link between the North Dakota Legislature and the people of North Dakota, keeping the people, who are the taxpayers, informed of what we aim to do and the record which is written.

The leaders of both parties in the House and the Senate, and the members as well, welcome you to this joint session.

The program for today was arranged by the North Dakota Chapter Sigma Delta Chi, a national journalistic fraternity. Also cooperating was the North Dakota Press Association.

The gentleman who will address us here today, as well as the individual who will introduce him, is a member of Sigma Delta Chi. The principal objective of this fraternity is to continuously improve the standards of journalism. And may I interject a thought here that I believe the standards of journalism in North Dakota might well serve as a model for all the nation.

Regarding the man who will introduce the speaker —

He is a native of Minnesota. His newspaper career spans a total of 41 years. He got his first newspaper experience at Valley City. A resident of Minot since 1921, his acquaintanceship is statewide. He has given leadership to various civic organizations in his home community, among them the Minot Chamber of Commerce, the Minot Kiwanis Club and the Minot Country Club, being a past president of each. On the state and national scene, in connection with the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, he has held high office. In his own profession, he is a past president of the North Dakota Press Association and of the Northwest Daily Press Association, composed of 50 daily newspapers in the midwest. He has held committee posts also in the Inland Daily Press Association, an organization with a membership of more than 500 newspapers of this nation.

I have heard him say, and I know he was sincere, that he came to North Dakota because he thought there was opportunity here, he stayed because he liked the people, and that today, as four decades ago, North Dakota continues to be good earth.

I present to you, ladies and gentlemen, for the purpose of introducing the speaker, the Publisher of The Minot Daily News — — Ray Dobson."

Mr. Dobson: "What is being done here today is certainly high tribute to the weekly and daily newspapers of North Dakota.

On their behalf I thank the members of the Legislature for arranging this joint session of the two Houses.

We who have come here today to visit with you Representatives and Senators will go home, I am certain, with a better appreciation of the unselfish service you are giving to the people of North Dakota.

And perhaps, too, we will carry home with us a determination to be more worthy of the honor you have shown us.

I agree with the sentiment expressed by Speaker Brown that a free press in this state, and this nation, is a bulwark of freedom.

And also let's not forget two other precious possessions — religious freedom and freedom of speech. When you put a blindfold on any one or all of these, you're heading down the left hand path that leads to the pit. Today the American people know more of what is going on in their own country and elsewhere in the world than do the people of any other nation; and as a consequence they are made stronger in that knowledge. In a democracy, it's what you don't know that will destroy you.

And need I remind you, in speaking of freedom of the press, that this priceless privilege is not one bestowed as a divine right on American publishers and editors. It's

your right — and I emphasize those three words — it's your right. Actually, the owners, publishers and editors of newspapers possess only a trusteeship — a trusteeship of the right that belongs to the whole people, and the right of every American to know of those happenings which may affect his well-being. Anyone who prostitutes that trusteeship deserves nothing but contempt.

We in the newspaper business, most certainly would not assert that our work constitutes the one and only keystone in a democracy.

We of the press, know, as well as any group, that where there are no farmers, no laborers, no craftsmen, no merchants, no ministers, no lawyers, no doctors — the people would perish . . . that is to say, there are not people at all where the essential institutions, skills and professions are not represented. We are members, one of another, just as certainly and emphatically as men and women of this Legislature, of opposite political philosophies, are one of another in the best interests and welfare of this commonwealth and its people.

At the kind invitation of this Legislature we have brought here to be a speaker today a man whose life's roots are in this great Northwest.

He talks our language, because for 10 years he was a resident of North Dakota, and he knows us, perhaps better than we think he does.

He was born in Minnesota, educated there, and has a master's degree from the University of Minnesota.

From 1935 to 1945 he was a resident of Minot when associated with The Minot Daily News as City Editor.

This is but one of many times he has been in these Legislative chambers, on other occasions as a Legislative news writer.

Perhaps you will better appreciate his talents if I tell you that the privilege of becoming associated in stock ownership was extended him by the newspapers with which he now is associated.

Since 1945, he has been with the Minneapolis Star and Minneapolis Tribune, first as assistant news editor, now as director of research. In the interest of brevity, I mention but two of the many tasks on a national scale which occupy him — chairman of the research committee of Sigma Delta Chi and chairman of the newspaper advisory committee to the U. S. Bureau of the Census. The subject of his talk is — The Lawmaker, The Editor and Public Opinion.

Ladies and gentlemen, please meet and greet the man who now lives in Minneapolis, but who left a part of his heart in North Dakota — Mr. Sidney Goldish."

THE LAWMAKER, THE EDITOR, AND PUBLIC OPINION

An address by Sidney S. Goldish, director of research, Minneapolis Star and Tribune, at a joint session of the North Dakota Legislature in Bismarck, N. D., on the occasion of the third observance of NEWSPAPER-MAN'S DAY: 3 p.m., Friday, February 10, 1961.

I am deeply honored by the invitation of the North Dakota Legislature, and by my fellow members in Sigma Delta

Chi, the national professional journalistic society, to address you today on this, the third observance of Newspaperman's Day in the legislature.

The occasion is vested with greater than ordinary significance for me, because of the nostalgic emotions that assail me as I reflect on the fact that North Dakota for many years was home to me and my family; that for the better part of four legislative sessions, I roamed this chamber and the one across the hall, in quest of news to communicate to Northwest North Dakotans; and that some of you who presently sit as members of the assembly of this great state may still recall my endeavors — for better or for worse, but in any event, I hope, with charity.

I believe there is great merit in this biennial convocation of legislators and newspapermen, because, as you have indicated, in the concurrent resolution designating this day, you are in a very real and enduring sense engaged in "an active partnership" with the press to serve the people of North Dakota.

It is said that a people has the kind of government, and the kind of press, that it deserves; and if this is so, as I believe it to be, then North Dakotans are doubly to be congratulated. From personal observation as well as long experience, I am convinced of the excellence of the service they receive from both of you.

It is fitting that this event take place under the aegis of the North Dakota chapter of Sigma Delta Chi because the society is dedicated to the establishment and preservation of the highest ideals in journalism, and I can think of no sounder aspiration than the continuance of a close, mutually-respectful and understanding relationship between the press and the government under which we progress and develop.

Today I should like to explore with you some facets of joint concern and joint responsibility — namely, our concern with, and our responsibility to public opinion.

We need not dwell at length on the notion that our form of government, our society, our way of life, have evolved around the acceptance of two basic concepts — governmental responsibility to the public, and the responsibility of a free press to keep that public fully informed of the actions and conduct of its government.

There has always, however, been the problem of determining adequately what it is that the public thinks, and wants, and how well informed it really is.

Abraham Lincoln said, "What I want is to get done what the people desire to have done, and the question for me is how to find that out exactly."

James Bryce, in his distinguished treatise on "The American Commonwealth," wrote that "the obvious weakness of government by public opinion is the difficulty of ascertaining it." Bryce observed that a major advance in democratic government would occur "if the will of the majority of citizens were to become ascertainable at all times."

Public opinion research methods, fashioned out of the theories and techniques of the social sciences, have sought to provide the tools by which Lincoln's and Bryce's perplexities could be resolved.

Since 1935 we have had public opinion polls, employing scientific methods, in the United States, established by such pioneers as George Gallup and Elmo Roper, and, in the main, supported by newspapers.

While our country, and our leaders, have concerned themselves with public opinion and the wishes of the people from the earliest days of the republic, it is only within the last quarter-century that the application of scientific methods to the assessment of the public's mood has resulted in the development of the public opinion poll.

Since all of us here together are deeply involved in what the public thinks and says . . . whether as public officials, newspapermen, or as Mr. or Mrs. Citizen . . . I believe a silver anniversary is an appropriate occasion for stock-taking.

The role of public opinion in a free nation is well understood, even if at times the question of what to do about it, or how to cope with it, is ignored or inadequately answered.

Our Declaration of Independence would not have needed to be as lengthy a document as it is, if its authors, impelled by "a decent respect to the opinions of mankind," had not felt it necessary for them to justify to the public the course of drastic action to which the colonists were preparing to commit themselves.

Democracy — our kind of democracy — has been defined as government by public opinion. The great Edmund Burke told his fellow members of Parliament in Great Britain in the 18th century that none of the legislative rights vested in that body could be exercised "without regard to the general opinion of those who are to be governed."

Dr. Gallup says this past quarter-century has been "a unique opportunity . . . to study the views of the American people under a wide variety of conditions and to arrive at conclusions on how the common people of the land react in times of stress as well as in times of complacency."

Patterned after the national polls, a number of state and regional polls have come into being also — polls in Minnesota and Iowa, in Texas and California, in New Jersey and Florida, among them.

They have in common both method and purpose. The purpose is to gauge public opinion, at stated periods of time, on what we variously define as important issues of the day. The intent is not merely the exercise in collecting opinions; it is rather to add to the public treasury of information and knowledge.

When the Minneapolis Tribune founded the Minnesota Poll in March of 1944, it editorialized that the poll was being sponsored "as a public service, the certain result of which will be to enable Minnesotans to be better-informed citizens. An informed people is a free people . . . The Minnesota Poll will help us all not only to understand and analyze better our beliefs and attitudes, but to find out what information we lack which can lead us to the right answers." This explanation can be applied, I believe, to every systematically-conducted public opinion poll in the country.

The survey method all of us utilize is, in some respects, simpler to apply than to explain.

It begins with sampling theory, and the laws of probabilities, about which men have known for some hundreds of years. The key idea is that one need not drink the entire pot of coffee to learn whether it's good coffee or bad; nor need one subject the entire contents of a car-load of grain to laboratory analysis to establish its market grade. The first sip of coffee provides a satisfactory answer, and the results of tests of grain taken from a number of different parts of the grain car will indicate how the contents grade. The practice in both instances is one which relies on sampling.

It's one thing, of course, to sample coffee, and another thing to sample people. But if you sample people by systematic, scientific methods, you can reach valid, sound conclusions about public reactions, without needing to talk with each and every one.

Ideally, if there were, at some central place, a complete register of every person in the population to be studied — the United States, for instance, or the state of North Dakota — the researcher could go through an alphabetical roster, select names systematically but randomly, and compile a list of names of persons whose characteristics, traits, and opinions would closely match those of the entire register from which those names were drawn.

Unfortunately, no such registers exist. Even the federal census, which does make such a listing once every 10 years, as of April 1 in the census year, knows that its list goes out of date very quickly, because of births and deaths, out-migration and in-migration.

So what the statisticians have worked out is a different kind of approach — one in which geography is the determinant. You can select a number of geographic areas — cities or towns, villages or farm townships — from a map, knowing that, whatever else may happen, the geographic units are there today, and will be there tomorrow.

The researcher makes just such a selection of geographic units from the maps. They are widely dispersed units, covering the total area under study — the nation, or the state, or the city — from one end to the other. Within those areas are households, and within those households are people whose attributes are, to an amazing degree, comparable with those of their neighbors across the street or across the road in areas which are not going to be sampled.

The principle thus operates that if you interview people within the selected areas, their judgments will reflect not only their own, but those of large numbers of other people in their communities, and in other similar communities elsewhere, as well.

To those selected households, the researcher sends interviewers — people who are trained in the methods of sampling research. They know how to count off households from a given starting point, like the northeast corner of the block, or the intersection of County Roads X and Y. They know how to find the eligible respondents within the assigned households. They know how to read the prescribed questions which are provided for them to read, and how to record the answers. They know how to establish and

maintain the interviewer's interest and confidence, through an interview which may run 30 or 40 minutes to complete.

Those completed interview reports are sent to the researcher's central offices, where the varieties of answers to the many questions are categorized in meaningful ways by teams of coders, so that the information may be translated into machine punch-cards, so that, in turn, the data may be tabulated and analyses made, on which results may be reported by the researcher.

That, in the sketchiest of forms, is the process. Gallup uses it; Roper uses it; the United States Census Bureau uses it; we use it. So do most other opinion and market and consumer and communications and political science researchers who utilize the scientific sampling method.

How can we be sure that the samples whom we have interviewed do in fact faithfully and accurately reflect the larger populations they are designed and intended to reflect?

This problem of accuracy I sometimes am inclined to approach in very much the manner of the small boy who came home from school and, with considerable pride, showed his mother a book he had won for accuracy in natural history. "How did you do that?" his mother asked. "The teacher asked how many legs an ostrich has, and I said three." The mother was startled. "But an ostrich has only two legs," she said. "Well," the boy explained, "the rest of the class said four."

The accuracy of survey results sometimes is a relative matter too, but it generally can be appraised in a number of ways. For one thing, we are already armed with a large body of information about the people we study — information from census files, from the reports of governmental agencies, from the statistics which business and industry compile. We can compare certain key elements of our findings with those of independently-gathered statistics. We know, for instance, that 53.8 per cent of the Minnesotans who voted in the 1956 presidential election cast their ballots for Dwight D. Eisenhower; that comes from the election reports in the secretary of state's office. Our sample should therefore produce a comparable finding. We know that there are some 300,000 World War II veterans in Minnesota; our state veterans commissioner has such information. We know, from government studies, what proportions of Minnesota adults have had any college training. From the telephone company, we know how many households in Minnesota have phones.

These and other kinds of checks are made to establish that, in a number of major characteristics, the people whom we have interviewed do match closely the entire adult population of our state. Only then do we look to the answers people give on opinion and attitude questions. Here the tests of validity and reliability are not as readily made. Here we must place our reliance on the theory that the kinds of people whose definable traits match those of the total population under study, will respond very much as would the total population to the same questions.

We do have tests, though. Sometimes we can compare results with the findings of other surveys, made at the same time. Sometimes we can refer back to earlier studies

which we ourselves have made, for comparisons. Sometimes we analyze the data to ascertain whether what logic tells us should be the case actually is the case — for instance, that people who style themselves Democrats should react more favorably toward President Kennedy than do people who call themselves Republicans; or that people with college training should prove to be more knowledgeable on informational questions than people whose schooling stopped with the eighth grade.

No one test is adequate. But the accumulated results of a number of tests customarily offer a convincing basis on which we may treat our data as being sound measures of public opinion.

I should point out, too, that it is not nearly so much the size of the sampling made in each study that counts, as is its representativeness. The most rigorous of all tests are those which confront the public opinion polls in elections; but our analyses of the 1960 election involved only 1,000-interview studies, and yet these were able to give us very close approximations indeed of the way Minnesotans voted last November.

So the method, in brief, requires careful sampling procedures; personal interviews, and detailed analysis. And it works.

In fact, every major polling organization I know which employs such methods acquitted itself with distinction in assessing the issues and conflicts, the trends and the electorate's pre-election preferences, in the 1960 presidential race. We have come an appreciable distance, I feel, since the dark days of 1948 — for poll-takers, that is.

All of this is by way of laying the foundation for three topics I should like to turn to:

1. What useful service is properly attributable to the polling process as a means of determining public opinion?
2. How should the public official and the editor interpret the knowledge of public opinion derived from the polls?
3. To what extent is public opinion binding on us — as public officials, as newspapermen, as citizens?

I have long felt that the values of public opinion research are found primarily in studies made at other than election times — useful though I consider election studies to be.

First, by ascertaining and reporting trends and movements of public opinion on significant issues, we help to acquaint the public itself, the government, the decision-makers, with the climate of thought — reflecting hope or despair, optimism or disillusionment, tranquillity or unrest — which surrounds those issues.

It is more important, I feel, to know the state of public opinion than it is to know the state of our military preparedness or the state of the budget. And such intelligence is available from the polls with far greater frequency than are the judgments rendered by voters on referenda or on candidates at elections, because elections come with relative infrequency.

Second, public opinion studies are able not only to identify the prevalent thought patterns of the people, but also to expose the falsity of the claims of some organized pressure groups which pretend to speak for the public but which in reality represent only small minorities.

The late Dr. Samuel Stouffer of Harvard university once put it this way: "The very existence of our national and regional polling organizations is a prophylaxis against fear and intimidation which might otherwise arise out of false but unchallenged 'illusions of universality.'"

And third, I feel that the polls make a major contribution to the democratic process by their detection of "areas of ignorance" — the things about which people are uninformed or confused or misinformed — so that governmental or educational agencies and the press may take corrective action.

By this, I mean the democratic process as we understand it . . . not the way it was interpreted when an American soldier and a Russian soldier fell to talking about democracy when they met in Berlin.

"Here's what democracy means," said the American. "I can go back to the United States. I can go to Washington, D. C., our national capital. I can go to the White House, and I can shout: 'Jack Kennedy is not a good president; we must have a better president.' And nothing will happen to me."

"We have democracy, too," said the Russian soldier. "I can go back to Russia. I can go to Moscow. I can go to the Kremlin and shout, 'Jack Kennedy is not a good president; there should be a better president.' And nothing will happen to me either."

How can we, and how should we, interpret the findings of public opinion surveys?

We need to recognize the inherent limitations of the procedure.

For one thing, the poll readings are obtained in a specified and limited period of time. They reflect people's reactions to issues and problems, large or small, on the basis of what you in government and we in the press have been able to communicate effectively to them up to that point in time. But events change opinions; and a major occurrence can alter opinions radically and in short order.

There may have been appreciable differences of opinion in America on December 6, 1941, about the extent to which we should be helping the Allies in Europe or resisting Japanese moves in the Pacific; but almost solid unanimity would have been the response to our government's actions on December 8, 1941, once the fact of Pearl Harbor had become known.

So poll results are readings taken at a given time and place. Analysts may seek to venture guesses about trends, or to offer forecasts, on the basis of such findings, but the polls themselves are incapable of forecasting.

Second, the "soundness" of the opinions expressed by the public in poll studies is subject to varied interpretation. It is almost axiomatic that if your views happen to coincide with those of the public, as recorded in a poll,

your impressions of the poll — as well as of the public — are vastly different from what they are if you find yourself in disagreement with the results. Usually the first reaction then is to try to impeach the integrity and the competence of the poll-taker . . . and also to think about organizing a lynching party.

To the poll-taker, survey results are facts which deserve to be weighed and reckoned with.

The law-maker has an obligation to take note of public opinion. But he also might heed the advice of Dr. Paul Lazarsfeld, of Columbia university: "There is no contradiction between paying attention to polls and carrying through one's own conviction. If public opinion data had been available to Woodrow Wilson," Lazarsfeld went on, "one of two things would have happened: either he could have shown his opponents that the country was behind his visions of international cooperation, or, if the polls had shown him that the country did not agree with him, he certainly could have mapped his educational strategy much more effectively and might have lived to see the victory of his ideas reflected in later polls."

Third, the public is not possessed of the interest, or the capacity, to digest all the subtleties of issues which public officials and editors are accustomed to brooding on. The public's views generally reflect wide, sweeping strokes of the opinion brush. I think this is why election polls are as successful as they are; because, in the final analysis, the voter's preference for Candidate A may run a range of options extending all the way from utter adoration of the candidate, clear on over to great dislike for the candidate but utter contempt for his opponent; yet, on election day, it all comes out as an "X" in the square opposite Candidate' A's name on the ballot.

In essence, what I am saying is that the public is capable of describing policies, but not of offering the means by which such policies are best implemented.

James Bryce put it this way in his writings: "The people, who are the power entitled to say what they want, are less qualified to say how, and in what form, they are to attain it; or, in other words, public opinion can determine ends, but is less fit to examine and select the means to these ends."

Briefly stated: The voice of the people is not the voice of God.

That being the case, how binding on us is public opinion?

This problem is one that has confronted our statesmen from the very beginning of our republic; and indeed one of the most vehement criticisms of the polls from their inception has been that made by people who take issue with the idea that the polls' views are some sort of mandate for action. Let me say quickly and emphatically: The poll-taker has no such idea, and subscribes to no such notion that we are obliged, once having gauged the public's thinking, to accept it blindly.

Yet there are people whose indictment of the polls is predicated in large part on the belief that that is what is expected of public officials or decision-makers.

No one has stated the case with greater force than has Dr. Hans Morgenthau, of the University of Illinois, in his

recently-published volume, "The Purpose of American Politics."

Dr. Morgenthau is alarmed by what he perceives as a growing threat to genuine democracy in America — a threat arising out of what he terms a swing toward "majoritarian democracy," in which the will of the majority is deemed to be controlling, regardless of whether the majority is well-informed or ill-informed, or even uninformed.

He says, "The government of a majoritarian democracy needs ask itself but one question: what does the majority want?"

But, he contends, that is not the basis of our democracy or of our government; for "Liberalism," he says, "holds certain truths to be self-evident which no majority has the right to abrogate." The minority too has its rights, and its purpose, he makes clear.

The opinion researcher does not quarrel with Dr. Morgenthau. The poll-taker never has contended that a majority opinion ought to be a directive. All he says is that one who is concerned with the public's attitude must be aware of what the majority opinion is — as well as what the minority is saying. And he ought not to disregard the undecideds.

Certainly our legislators in Minnesota are under no illusions about the so-called mandate from the people. We would have had state income tax withholding procedures in operation six years ago, if they had felt constrained to abide by majority preferences; because it was that long ago that a majority of Minnesota adults said, in one of our surveys, that they would approve of the establishment of a tax withholding plan in our state. Yet it remains one of the highly controversial issues of our 1961 legislative session.

We would have had much stricter traffic and driver licensing regulations in Minnesota years ago, if our lawmakers had felt obliged to abide by the majority opinion; in that regard, the public has been well ahead of the legislators in a readiness to accept laws designed to reduce highway fatalities.

The point is that it depends on the issue, it depends on the public's knowledge — as contrasted with the legislator's knowledge — of the issue, it depends on a host of related factors which the public may not appreciate.

The function of the public opinion poll is only to serve as a yardstick of opinion — a more accurate yardstick than heretofore has been available. This has merit, for, as political scientist John C. Ranney once wrote, "the absence of scientific methods for measuring opinion . . . has never prevented politicians from trying to guess what it is . . ."

Therein lies both the utility, and the challenge, of the public opinion poll. Professor Ranney wrote: "Legislation cannot be separated from the practical problem of administration and enforcement; and it is of fundamental importance, in framing and administering laws with intelligence, to understand, as one of the vital factors in the situation, the state of public feeling . . . Statesmen, whether legislators or administrators, are unlikely to have direct personal knowledge of those feelings . . ."

Here, therefore, if anywhere, the polls, far from being a menace to democracy, give substance and meaning to what has always, in theory, been one of its outstanding advantages."

James Madison once declared, "A popular government without popular information or the means of acquiring it is but a prologue to a farce or a tragedy, or perhaps both."

The public opinion poll does provide government with the means of acquiring that information. In the state of Washington, some years ago, the state legislature appropriated funds to establish a public opinion research operation, based on the University of Washington and Washington State College. Our U. S. state department for years has used the results of nationwide and regional polls to gain insights into public reaction to important foreign policy issues. And a number of newspapers, as part of their machinery to collect and impart information of public concern and importance, have employed polling methods to augment that flow of information.

None of us expects the state of North Dakota to go into polling operations tomorrow — though I think some agencies of government in North Dakota might profitably consider how, and under what circumstances, they can avail themselves of the research brains and know-how centered on the campuses of your colleges and universities, to come closer to grips with the people and their judgments about vital problems affecting all of you.

My intention is only to acquaint you with a few of the developments that the past quarter-century has brought about, in this complex business of diagnosing the public's opinion.

The newly-issued report of the President's Commission on the National Goals says, "The democratic process functions only when the individual accepts his full responsibility as a citizen by forming considered opinions on public policy and by active participation in the choice of public representatives . . . Improvement of the democratic process requires a constantly better-informed public . . ."

Toward that goal, the newspaperman is committed by professional considerations. You who are public officials share that interest and concern, I am confident. And we who are poll-takers will seek to continue to aid both of you in your respective fields of endeavor."

"Ladies and gentlemen, in concluding this joint meeting of the Legislature, and sincerely thanking Mr. Goldish for his thought provoking and scholarly address, I invite you to share with me these sentiments —

So long in this nation, and in this state, as men shall dare to think and write and speak — or it shall be their prerogative to think and write and speak — as you newspaper folk do, of things that are important to all the aspects of man's days, his years and his centuries; and of his timeless and eternal dreams — so long as that is true, then all of us will remain free and be proud of our communities, this state and this country of yours and mine."

Speaker Brown announced that the House would be on the eighth order of business.

Rep. Fraase asked to have his remarks on House Bill No. 758 printed in the House Journal, which request was granted.

Rep. Fraase:

“Mr. Speaker:

On February 11, 1961 this assembly, while in session, witnessed statements relating to House Bill 758 by a member of this House who used the terms “evil legislation and socialism.”

Now under certain circumstances, these terms might be appropriate and could properly be applied. It is imperative, however, that we as a nation be continually on guard so as to detect bad and socialistic legislation at its very inception. If we do not, we will face an internal threat to our country of the most serious consequence.

However, we must also be on guard against another danger of which every citizen of this country is potentially capable of doing. It is simply that we must be careful not to call “Wolf, when there is no wolf”, we must be careful not to yell fire when there is no fire and at least wait until we see smoke. We must be careful so as not to panic or stampede in either case. If we do, the act of avoidance could be more dangerous than the very cause.

The attack on House Bill 758 was very likely made due to misunderstanding and misinformation. It is hardly necessary to state that misconceptions are likewise a serious threat to government even though the motivating factor is good intentions. I trust every member of this legislature will carefully read the bill in question and evaluate it on an individual basis, even though the same was indefinitely postponed and I accept the judgment of this assembly.

The false and fantastic labels used might properly be termed as vicious except that the intent, I am sure, was lacking. This bill was copied from existing Minnesota law and I am certain that this attack was not indirectly intended

to accuse the Minnesota Legislature of having passed evil and socialistic legislation or knowingly done to question the wisdom and judgment of our sister state.

Let us not legislate by innuendo.

Rep. Johnston moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort Congressman Hjalmer Nygaard to the rostrum, which motion prevailed and the Speaker appointed as such committee Reps. Dagman and Dick.

Rep. Johnston moved that the remarks of Congressmen Short and Nygaard be printed in the House Journal, which motion prevailed.

Speaker Brown introduced Congressmen Short and Nygaard to the Assembly.

Congressman Short: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Ladies and Gentlemen: This is an honor, Mr. Speaker and all of you, that I am sure most of you realize I never expected to be accorded to me when I served in this House in 1957. I consider it a very high honor to have this opportunity to greet you. It is always a great pleasure for me to come back to North Dakota, and especially at this time in this sunshine and warm weather that you enjoy here in North Dakota that a lot of people around the world and even in the United States don't realize we have.

"I had a peculiar experience back in December. Maybe I shouldn't mention this — but I have junketed just a little bit!

I had the opportunity as a member of the House Agriculture Committee to take a trip to South America. When I was in Lima, Peru I bought a copy of the Miami, Florida, Herald, and Lo and Behold, I saw this American newspaper on the counter of my hotel and on the front page was quite a blown-up picture of a blizzard raging in Fargo. I wrote back to the editor of the Fargo Forum, and I said that I recognized and conceded that we could not do much about the weather in North Dakota, but probably we could do something about the publicity. I haven't seen any pictures shown around the country of the weather conditions, or publicity about the temperature, in North Dakota, in the last few days, and last few weeks, which are considerably above the temperatures in Washington. We have had almost two feet of snow on the ground. The snow in my driveway was 5 feet high when we left and I understand they have more since we left.

"Mr. Speaker, I question whether there are any pearls of wisdom that I might try to throw out to the people today. I wish that I had the answer to some of the questions that you people are facing. I wish I had the answer to some of the questions that we will inevitably be dealing with in the near future in Washington. We have been doing a lot of maneuvering around in the last few weeks. That is all over and the committees are appointed, just in the past week. There is no further excuse in delaying the consideration of legislation. I understand from my office that the Agriculture Committee has scheduled five meetings in the next 4 or 5 days. If this is a criterion of what

the committees are going to do, I think we are really getting into the harness and getting down to work.

"I want to thank you all for this opportunity. I like to come back and renew acquaintances and I bring you greetings from Washington. I don't know whether I am the proper official representative to bring you greetings from Washington, but I am going to assume that privilege and bring you those greetings, not only to the members of this House but to all people in North Dakota and Mr. Speaker, I believe as a former member of this House, I should observe the 5 minute rule and I will yield back any balance of time."

Congressman Nygaard: "It feels like coming home to be here before you people again, and to be among you people after these many years — You don't shed that cloak that we have been wearing all these years. I watch the newspapers of North Dakota, very diligently, every day to know what is taking place here. I find that many of the problems that we wrestled with in past sessions are here to plague you again. Apparently we didn't find the correct solutions in those 12 years that I served here. Possibly you people can finally resolve these problems so that they will not plague you again two years hence.

"You people have honored me with various positions during the time that I served here. Presently I am honored by serving as your representative in Washington. I wonder as an ordinary citizen how much honor should be extended to one man. Maybe I have received more honor than should be extended to one individual. I certainly want to say that I appreciate these honors extended to me.

"I worked among you on various matters and I attempted during that time to come up with the answers as I saw them and I intend to continue in the same manner in the position I now hold. I am now confronted with problems which are different than those here in many instances, and in others there is a close relationship in many of the problems and you people have been discussing some of the problems that we are going to discuss down there. You people have been having night sessions and are cramming for the end. We have not been having night sessions but are cramming for a beginning, so you see how far apart we are in operations. I know your limitations here are great. Your problems are great and I know from the past you people are giving due consideration to them. The lengthy hearings which are sometimes tedious to you but are a prerogative that you give to your citizenry in having an opportunity of expressing their feelings to you that you may better judge the solutions to your problems.

"It is more difficult for the ordinary citizen to travel the distance between here and Washington to be heard on various matters that concern them. However, you people have the same invitation to come to Washington and express your feelings as has the citizenry of North Dakota to come in here before you.

"I know you have a good-sized calendar before you; that you have a tremendous volume of work and I know that you are striving toward another deadline with which I am very familiar — and I know Ben and Art are cracking the whip to have you boys get these bills out of the way —

and that they are doing the same over in the Senate — cracking the whip in the same way.

"I am not going to try to express any great words of wisdom because you people know just how wise I am! I am going to let you go back to your work, and let you get your work done because I know about having to spend eight days over-time with no pay.

"I would like to say I am appreciative of visiting with you here this afternoon, and I will enjoy the balance of today and tomorrow to greet each of you individually if I have that opportunity.

"Thank you."

I am doing it because I don't want to argue the merits or issues of this bill but this is the point at which I can explain my vote and protest to what I believe is a political decision, whether our party leaders want to call it that or not.

"Republicans have, by this move, taken the position and following the conclusion of the caucus that they do not support the establishing of this department of labor at this time. I feel that by this decision of the Republicans and I want to protest that I don't think it is true that all the Republicans are of that notion and attitude. I feel that we have taken the position of an ostrich and have placed the party in the position of an ostrich with its head in the sand; refusing to recognize the issues and problems and facts at hand.

"The people have spoken to us with three measures in the last election. One was the change in the name of the Agricultural College — changing it to the "North Dakota State University". Another was to change the third brakeman law, and I think almost all of the Republican majority think the voters were very brilliant in those decisions. And then we come to the decision that establishes the Department of Labor. Our Republican people feel that the voters don't know what they are talking about, then, and they are following the thoughts of a lawyer who has a very weak case when he is leaning on technicalities and he makes a great to-do over 'nays'

and 'shalls' . . . They are doing this in the name of 'saving money' and possibly the fear of unionism. They are ignoring the people who make up the voters in our state. The fourth measure that is facing us will be the problem of reapportionment."

Speaker Brown: "Keep your remarks on the question before the body."

Rep. Stockman: "This is the thought I wanted to say — Can we ignore these people? The greatest number of people who are voting for the Republicans, in my opinion, are people from the cities and towns. They are laboring people — working people. I think that this Department of Labor is a symbol to them just as the Department of Agriculture is to the farmers, and the veterans - - -"

Speaker Brown: "Rep. Stockman, do you want to explain your vote or make a political speech?"

Rep. Stockman: "I want to explain my vote."

Speaker Brown: "Explain your vote, or I will rule you out of order."

Rep. Stockman: "I think I have explained it."

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Agriculture to whom was referred House Bill No. 735 has had the same under consideration and recommends that the same be amended as follows:

Rep. Bratcher moved that the remarks of Mr. Chris Hilleboe, who is a former member of the House from Cass County, be printed in the Journal, which motion prevailed:

Rep. Goebel moved that the courtesy of the floor be extended to all former Speakers in the House who are in attendance today, which motion prevailed.

Speaker Brown announced all former Speakers would have their pictures taken on the rostrum after the program.

Speaker Brown:

"Traditionally on the 12th day of February, this Joint Assembly pays honor and respect to one of the greatest Presidents of these United States and the greatest defender of the dignity of man.

This year, your joint committee on arrangements saw fit to invite a former member of this legislative body.

He not only is a devoted American but a discerning student of the life of Abraham Lincoln.

Our guest speaker, in his humble way, has a most charitable concern for the welfare of his fellow man.

Because of his devoted service, as a Representative from the 9th District, in the 1957 and 1959 legislative assemblies his ability was recognized by the federal government and early last year he was named as the Federal Housing Administrator for the State of North Dakota.

I could go on for an hour extolling the virtues of this distinguished North Dakotan but at his insistence I have been asked to make this introduction as brief as possible.

I consider it a privilege and honor to present to this body former Representative Chris Hilleboe of the 9th District of Cass County — Mr. Chris Hilleboe of Fargo — who will speak on Abraham Lincoln."

Mr. Hilleboe: "We are met today to pay homage to a man whose creed, taken from the Declaration of Independence, was that all men are created equal. We also commemorate the 25th anniversary of the first meeting of the legislative assembly in this monument of government. Even as you are today, Lincoln was a proud member of a state legislature.

A nine year old cousin, looking at the scrawny, wrinkled, new born Lincoln for the first time said: "Well, he won't amount to much."

It is interesting to read that Smith Stimmel, a Fargo man, was a member of Lincoln's body guard. Mr. Stimmel came to Casselton and then to Fargo in 1882. He lived on 11th Street South and practiced law in Fargo. He died in Fargo in 1935. He was a member of the first territorial legislature. Stories of his three years as a member of Lincoln's body guard are told in the collections of the State Historical Society of North Dakota. The body guard, which was 100 strong, was getting restless with nothing to do. One evening as Lincoln was strolling near the men's tents one of the soldiers took it upon himself to tell him that they were not needed here, but that there was great need for their services at the front. Lincoln said: "My boy, that reminds me of an old farmer friend of mine who used to say that he could never understand why the Lord put a curl on a pig's

tail because it was neither useful nor ornamental. But he guessed the Lord knew what he was doing." Lincoln went on to say: "I do not see the need of having soldiers traipsing around wherever I go, but Stanton knows a great deal more about these things than I do." Then with a twinkle in his eye he said he reckoned it was not quite as dangerous here as at the front.

Lincoln was asked how he felt after his defeat by Douglas and he replied that he was like the boy who stubbed his toe — it hurt too much to laugh and he was too big to cry.

A great many stories about Lincoln came from the pen of William Herndon, his close associate of 20 years. Herndon idolized Lincoln, yet in telling his story he told the truth unsparingly. He knew that truth could never injure the fame of Lincoln. Herndon tells us that a great deal of Lincoln's periods of despondency and melancholy were due to physical causes. That Lincoln had a bad liver and suffered constantly from biliousness. That he constantly used blue massive pills which was the treatment of that day. That he suffered from severe nightmares.

He was a great bowling enthusiast and while he was a very poor bowler many came to watch him bowl because of his wit.

When he was postmaster of Salem he was very careless about leaving the office and not bothering to lock the door. He likewise paid little attention to mail with postage due.

There was one event in Lincoln's life that he seemed most anxious to forget. James Shields, a gallant, hot-headed bachelor, and a man of inordinate vanity had been elected auditor of the state. Lincoln was very upset at Mr. Shields because the state would not accept state bank paper in payment of taxes. Taking Mary Todd and her friend Julia Jayne into his confidence he hit upon an idea to puncture Mr. Shields. He published an article in the Journal under an assumed name. The letter was purported to come from a poor widow whose pockets were full of state bank paper and she was still unable to obtain a coveted receipt for taxes. The letter, a very lengthy one, castigated Mr. Shields to a point of embarrassment. It was addressed to Mr. Printer and signed "Rebecca". Mr. Shields was able to track down the author of the letter — perhaps Lincoln should not have confided in the fairer sex — and the red-faced Lincoln admitted authorship of the letter. Mr. Shields — his honor at stake — challenged Lincoln to a duel. Lincoln accepted the challenge on the condition that he choose the weapons and the distance. Mr. Shields was a short man and Lincoln did not want to be too close to him for the duel. He chose broadswords thinking he had a better chance than with pistols, and for all he knew Mr. Shields might be an expert at firearms. They met the next morning with their seconds ready for the duel. The duel was called off as neither one of the principals wanted to fight in the first place. It did, however, take Lincoln a long time to live down the letter incident. It seems that Mary Todd Lincoln had somewhat of an explosive temper at times.

A neighbor of the Lincoln's called on Mrs. Lincoln to find out why his niece had been discharged by her. Mrs. Lincoln let go on one of her tirades and the man left in a hurry. He went downtown to see Lincoln and found him, as usual, in the store telling stories. He demanded an apology from Lincoln for the incident. Lincoln said in all candor: "My good man, you certainly should be able to listen to, for a few moments, what I have been listening to for 15 years."

Lincoln, accompanied by Mrs. Lincoln, made a trip to Chicago to visit with Hannibal Hamlin. A lady called at their hotel to take Mrs. Lincoln for a drive. Because Mrs. Lincoln did not appear Lincoln made a hurried trip upstairs to find out the reason for her delay. He returned downstairs with the report that Mrs. Lincoln would be down as soon as she had finished putting on her trotting harness.

Lincoln felt very confident about the strength of our nation, for in 1837 he made this remark: "All of the armies of Europe, Asia, and Africa combined, with all the treasures of the earth in their military chest, with Bonaparte for a commander, could not by force take a drink out of the Ohio or make a track on the Blue Ridge in a trial of a thousand years."

Writing to his good friend Joshua Speed — and there are a great many "Dear Mr. Speed" letters from Lincoln — he stated that our country was degenerating. Lincoln said: "As a nation we began by declaring that all men are created equal. We now practically read it that all men are created equal except Negroes. We will next read it that all men are created equal except Negroes, foreigners and Catholics". He continued in his letter that "When it comes to this I should prefer emigrating to some country where they make no pretense of loving liberty."

Were Lincoln living today he would see the beginning of 1960, he would have seen a nation coming of age with bigotry cast aside by a tolerant nation.

Were Lincoln living today he would see the beginning of equality of all races in our nation.

Were Lincoln living today his great heart would throb with joy when he visited our veteran's hospitals for his greatest sorrow was for the wounded soldier. How proud he would be of our nation and the care that is given to disabled veterans. For it was Lincoln who said in his second inaugural address that we must "strive to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow, and for his orphan." Would that every man, woman and child in our nation visit a veteran's hospital.

Were Lincoln living today he would have grave concern over the problem of our fast growing elderly population. In Lincoln's day a person started to get old at 45. Today a person is young at 70. However, every day in the year 3,500 people in our nation reach the age of 65. We have made great strides in providing housing for the elderly and it is but the beginning of far greater things to come under the leadership of our brilliant president.

Perhaps we should repeat again the oft told story of Lincoln's Gettysburg address as best told by Mary Shipman

Andrews. The silver tongued orator of the day, Edward Everett had just finished his two hour oration when the President arose to give his address. When Lincoln had finished not a hand was lifted in applause. There was no sign of approval, but only a long sigh that ran like the ripple on the ocean, rank after rank. His address, as he feared, had been a failure. As Everett came upon Lincoln he heard him say half aloud: "It must have been pretty poor stuff and I thought it was a fair little composition."

As Everett started to congratulate him, Lincoln said: "We'll manage not to talk about my speech, Mr. Everett" "But Mr. President," Everett said, "I should be glad if I could flatter myself that I came as near the central occasion in two hours as you did in two minutes."

Lincoln was haunted by the event of the day. He had made many successful speeches. He had many times carried the audience by storm. Yet in his Gettysburg address he remembered sadly that, even for the President, no hand, no voice had been lifted by applause.

But Lincoln was to find out from a soldier, in the Confederate army, a Captain Carter Blair, why he received no applause from his Gettysburg Address.

Captain Blair was on his death bed in a prison hospital and he needed a lawyer to draw up his last will. Lincoln avowing that he used to practice law in a small way said he would be glad to draw the will. When asked by the captain what his name was he simply said: "My name is Lincoln." When asked if he was a Northerner, Lincoln said he was on that side of the fence and he said to the captain: "You can call me a Yankee, if you wish."

When Lincoln rose to go the captain asked him to stay awhile as he wanted to talk to him about his namesake, President Lincoln. "Mr. Lincoln," the captain said, "You know that namesake of yours, the President, is a remarkable man. He is regarded as a red devil by most of us down home but I have admired him right along. He's inspired by principle and not by animosity." He went on to say to the President: "By Jove, have you read his speech in yesterday's paper?" Lincoln replied that he had not read the speech.

"By the way," said the captain, "This great man isn't any relation of yours is he Mr. Lincoln?" "Yes", replied Lincoln. "He's kind of a connection through my grandfather, but I know the kind of a fellow the President is and you can say what you want."

He was taken aback when told that yesterday's speech was one of the greatest in history. The captain went on to say that he knew what he was talking about, "My father was a speaker, all my uncles and my grandfather were speakers, and I've been brought up in oratory and I know what a great speech is when I see it."

He continued, "And when my sister Nellie brought in the paper this morning I told her at once that in six times since history began has a speech been made that was its equal." "You know Mr. Lincoln, that my cousin Senator Warrington — He's on the Yankee side — was at Gettysburg with the President's party."

"He told my sister that the speech so went home to the hearts of those thousands of people that when it ended it was as if the whole audience held its breath. There was not a hand lifted in applause." "There was a minute of reverent silence—not a sound from the great throng." "My cousin, the Senator, told me that applauding that speech would be like applauding the Lord's prayer. It would have been a sacrilege."

This southern soldier, breathing his last, whispered that if he had a last wish it would be to hold the hand of Abraham Lincoln. And Lincoln, holding Captain Blair's hand, found out from this soldier in a prison hospital camp that his Gettysburg Address was not a failure.

Many great tributes, written about Lincoln, have come from the pen of editorial writers. On Lincoln's birthday last year the Fargo Forum carried a fine editorial written by Earl Bitzing, a member of the staff. The editorial states in part: "The American people read every new volume concerning Lincoln. They read of him with love and affection. It was once said that with a democracy's instinctive wisdom Americans have always known that Lincoln lived and died as the embodiment of a people's government. Lincoln believed in our constitutional system. The preservation of it was fundamental to him. He had the quality that enabled him to hold the United States together in the hour of great need—he had integrity of character."

And this final quotation is from the editorial, Lincoln, Man and Miracle, which appeared in the Ohio State Journal and written by Karl B. Pauly. "Today, throughout the world is being commemorated the anniversary of his birth in a backwoods log cabin. He was unique in a wholly unspectacular way. The times helped make him. There was an element of political luck in his career which other great men would have asked only a mild portion of in their times.

It was as if providence took a hand, marked the man and exalted him that our nation might be preserved and exalted.

He was a humble man.

He once said: "I never had a policy. I have simply tried to do what seemed best each day as every day came."

He was a man without malice.

He was a man of charity.

He was patient and compassionate.

Yet he stood like a rock when the storms of national life and personal sorrow beat around him.

As that rock he will stand as long as America lives.

Let us so live as to deserve him.

The world has need that we do.

Thank you."

Rep. Neukircher requested a point of personal privilege.

Rep. Neukircher: "I want to rise to a point of personal privilege for the first time since I have been in the legislature. Something has been going on about which I cannot help but comment.

"I have here a paper lying on my desk with headlines — 'Garaas Believes House Run By Mob!'

"First of all the man says he has never been in the House Chamber since 1957 until he was here a short time the other night, and he then observed this House being run by a 'mob action'.

"When somebody comes in and spends 20 minutes and knows exactly how to correct — or how to do things differently reminds me of the story about the young fellow who spent half an hour in New York, then called the Mayor of the city and told him how to run the city.

"This man says the House members seem to take the word of the sponsors of the bills. He doesn't know we have committee meetings and that committee recommendations are involved.

"He also says out of 113 members in the House, only 5 or 6 participate in the discussions in some sessions.

"He picked on a bill that was in my committee and was sponsored by a Democrat."

"Down further he says Mrs. Ann Powers made the major speech on that bill! That was the bill he decided he was going to criticize and say we have 'mob action'."

"Also this Senator has before commented about the committee of which I happen to be chairman."

"He had a bill scheduled for Monday and he knew what was going to happen in that committee. I didn't, but he did. He also said that it pertained to the repeal of the income tax. We have not scheduled this but he knows about it."

"I think I know the purpose. This man has decided to run for state office. He takes pains to try and get his name in the paper every day. If he intends to continue I suggest he buy a political ad."

Rep. Fitch: "I want to read the definition of 'mob' from Webster's dictionary. It says: 'Mob—the moveable common people. 1. Populace; the masses. 2. The, or a disorderly element of the populace; the rabble; hence, a promiscuous collection of people; a crowd. 3. Slang, a criminal gang.'"

"Now, all our visitors, this is what we are according to the gentleman from McKenzie County, and I would urge you Democrats not to forget you were included in this congregation called a 'mob.'"

Rep. Wolf: "I want to say that I am really proud of this working group—both Democrats and Republicans alike."

"We have been working hard and I believe each and every member in this House has something to do with the results and in stating their views—Democrats and Republicans, alike."

"I can take a little criticism and around in the aisles I have been criticizing some Senators but when it comes to big headlines like this, it makes me feel bad about the whole deal for each and every member of this group."

"I would like to inform Friend Garaas, if somebody will bring it to him, that these bills are worked out by hard working committee members—as early as six o'clock in the morning until eight o'clock at night."

"Here is what I have found out in the Senate. I am not ready to criticize all the Senators—but they are running around the capitol, trying to find a quorum to transact business. I can understand that they have to have their bills explained on the floor but our bills are worked over in committee—worked over and worked over and when they come out there is no use of 113 members talking. We have no candidates for Governor, and over there they have a bunch of them and that is the only reason for it."

338 tion of proceedings herein provided for. Notice shall
339 be served upon the interested party personally, or by
340 registered or certified mail, at least twenty days
341 before the time specified for hearing thereof, unless
342 the service of such order is waived by the party
343 proceeded against, or unless the parties agree upon a
344 definite time and place for hearing thereof. If no
345 hearing is requested by interested parties and none is
346 ordered by the commissioner, the order will remain in
347 effect until it is modified or vacated by the
347a commissioner.
348 If a hearing is requested or ordered, the commissioner,
349 after notice of and opportunity for hearing to all
350 interested persons, may modify or vacate the order or
351 extend it until final determination.

 367 10-04-10 or by each such dealer filing in the office of
 368 the commissioner a written announcement of inten-

 369 trade in the securities, which announcement may be
 369a given
 370 by telegram sent to the commissioner by the dealer,
 371 containing the following:
 372 a. Name of issuer and location of the headquarters
 373 or principal office;
 374 b. A brief description of the security, including
 375 price and current earnings;
 376 c. A statement that the securities have been out-
 377 standing and in the hands of the public not

 387 of the security, unless advised to the contrary within
 388 forty-eight hours or advised to furnish additional
 389 information, and such dealer shall pay to the com-

 390 a filing fee of ten dollars within thirty-six hours after
 391 the time of such filing. Upon registration, such
 392 securities may be sold in this state for a period of one

- 785 1. A copy of its articles.
 - 786 2. Certificate showing authorization to transact
 787 business.
- 788 The commissioner may also require such additional
 789 information as to the previous history, record, or
 790 association of the applicant, its officers, directors,
 791 employees, members, partners, managers, or trustees,
 792 as he may deem necessary to establish whether or not
 793 the applicant should be registered as an investment
 794 counsel under the provisions of this chapter.
- 795 The commissioner may also require such additional
 796 information as to the previous history, record, or
 797 association of the applicant, its officers, directors,
 798 employees, members, partners, managers, or trustees,
 799 as he may deem necessary to establish whether or not
 800 the applicant should be registered as an investment

 808 shall be returned if registration is refused, and
 - 809 c. A financial statement or balance sheet, prepared
 810 in accordance with standard accounting practice
 811 showing the financial condition of the applicant as
 812 of the most recent practicable date prior to the
 813 date of such application, such financial statement
 814 or balance sheet to be certified to by an inde-
 814a pendent
 815 certified public accountant or by a responsible
 816 officer or member of said applicant.
- 817 When an applicant has fully complied with the pro-
 818 visions of this subsection the commissioner may
 818a register
 819 such applicant as an investment counsel unless he
 819a shall
 820 find that the applicant is not of good business rep-
 821 utation, or is not solvent.
- 822 No investment counsel may be granted a dealer's or
 823 salesman's registration.
- 824 An investment counsel shall not take, hold or
 825 exercise any power of attorney on behalf of its clients,
 826 either to purchase or sell securities, or to collect
 827 or pay any consideration for securities of its clients.
- 828 An investment counsel shall not receive or hold
 829 any securities of its clients or receive or hold any
 830 consideration for such securities of its clients. He
 831 shall be limited to giving advice to buy or sell
 832 securities, but shall take no part, directly or in-

833 directly, in consummating the purchase or sale of
834 securities of its clients. A registrant as investment
835 counsel shall notify the commissioner of any change
835a of
836 address.

837 4. Refusal of registration. If, after affording
838 an applicant a hearing or an opportunity for a hearing
839 as provided in section 10-04-12, the commissioner finds
840 that there is sufficient ground to refuse to register
841 such applicant as provided in this section, he shall
842 enter an order refusing to register such applicant.

842a Such
843 order shall state specifically the grounds for its
844 issuance. A copy of such order shall be mailed to the

867 may be renewed each year, at any time not less than

873 certified public accountant or by a responsible officer

875 dealer as of the most recent practicable date. Upon
876 any change in the proprietors, partners, officers,

877a counsel,
878 such registered dealer or investment counsel shall
879 promptly notify the commissioner in writing of such
880 changes. The commissioner shall record such changes,
881 without fee, in the register of dealers, salesmen, and

House Bill No. 687. A Bill for an Act to repeal subsection 10 of section 57-38-22 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the income tax deductibility of dividends paid by cooperatives.

Rep. Lynch asked to have his remarks on House Bill No. 687 printed in the House Journal.

"Deductibility of Dividends Paid by Co-ops:

"In 1920 we had an organization in North Dakota known as the 'Producers Alliance.' A short time later the Farmers Union took over this Alliance and I became a member of the Farmers Union. At the annual meeting of the Farmers Union Co-op Oil Co. at Crosby, the speaker from the St. Paul Exchange, made this statement. 'That if the members did not take hold of their organization, that in the near future they would not have any co-op organization.' Prior to 1955, the Co-op paid taxes on certificates of Earning they received. A court decision in 1955 changed that and I will read it to you.

"Internal Revenue Commissioner vs. Carpenter 219, Federal Reporter on page 635, March 2, 1955. Before a cash loss taxpayer may be charged with receipt of income, for income tax purpose he must receive cash or property

having a fair market value, or such or property must be unqualified by subject to his demand.

"The Internal Revenue Bureau advises as follows in reference to those certificates, as follows:

"The amount to be included in your income in respect of such dividends is measured by the amount of cash received plus the fair market value of any other property received. However, if the dividends are in document form, such as certificates of indebtedness, revolving fund certificates or stock certificates, which have no fair market value and over which you have no control as to their amount or their time of redemption in cash or other property, they are not included in your income until they become subject to payment on your demand — regardless of your accounting method.

"The Attorney and the Officers of the Farmers Union do not appear to have very much information in this law in appearing before the Committee on Finance and Taxation.

"I want to make a few remarks about our system of Government. In 1948, Mr. Truman, our President, said we were operating under a controlled economy. Mr. Cabot Lodge in explaining of Government to Khrushchev made about the same statement.

"The American people do not like the word 'Socialism'. If I should make \$100,000 in North Dakota in one year and was single, Uncle Sam will tap in for \$70,000 and the State of North Dakota will take \$12,000. That is not a Capital System of Government, then we must be taking from the rich and giving to the poor through our income taxing system. In one of our cities there is two corporations. I will name them A and B. Mr. A is a Farmers Union Co-op member. He testified before the Committees on Finance and Taxation that his company did a gross business of \$600,000. His net was \$70,000 per year and that every ten years he paid one years earnings which left him a revolving fund of some \$700,000, and it appears no taxes or interest were paid.

"Comments by Mr. Holton, Mgr. Farmers Union Co-op, Jamestown. Stated their company does about \$600,000 business per year. Net earnings of \$70,000 last year. Tax on that \$70,000 is the issue here today. Explained how their company operates: We make a detailed accounting of everyone's purchases, less sales tax and less gas tax on the petroleum products. Total it up and divide the \$70,000 into it . . . and set up dividend. The Board of Directors then decides how the dividend should be paid. We pay out on a revolving basis — 10 years of stock is withheld and then pay the oldest year in cash and hold the newest year. The 10 year represents the working capital. Checks are written and dividend withdrawn from the stock of the individual. We are required to send in a form similar to W-2 to the Federal Government, indicating the dividend amount. At that point, the company does not have any earnings any more — it belongs to the individual. Any one can operate as we do — we give the money back and the opposition doesn't want to.

"Mr. B, across the street, had the same income and his

tax each year would be approximately to the Federal \$39,000 and to the State \$2,086. What system is Mr. A operating under, Capital or Socialist? The province of Saskatchewan in Canada, some years ago came up with a party called the Co-op Commonwealth Federation. Some years later they amended their by-laws stating that they would have to have a free enterprise plank in their platform.

"The English and Australian Labor parties have come out for free enterprise. The Farmers Union have a lot of planks and splinter planks in their by-laws but I have been unable to find one where they endorse free enterprise.

"In 1951 I retired from farming and held \$1,000.00 in said certificates on which I have received no payment. I wrote the St. Paul office as to when payment would be made. They wrote that according to section so-and-so by-laws I would receive payment just as soon as I died.

"What benefit does a member of a farmers co-op receive when the president of said co-op goes on the air and tells him who to vote for and to donate to a certain political party and if he has no money to go to the bank and borrow?

"I am supporting 687 as I believe in tax equity and our free enterprise system."

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE TO THE LEGISLATURE

February 17, 1961

Governor Guy: "We are well advanced into the Thirty-seventh session of our North Dakota Legislature. I was privileged to address you at your opening to present you a program for serious consideration. Perhaps there are some who think my appearing before you now is precedent-breaking. My appearance is not precedent-breaking, but the division of control between a Democratic-Non-Partisan League Governor and a Republican controlled Legislature is unique in recent years. This situation naturally brings on more political maneuvering in the Legislature than in an instance where the political alignment of the Governor and the Legislative Assembly is the same.

"Some political maneuvering is beneficial to the public in that it serves to highlight variation in our liberal and conservative philosophies. Excessive political maneuvering can be damaging to North Dakota in that the essential reason for being here in this session — that of serving all the people of our state — may be relegated to an insignificant role. I feel that we could be approaching this point.

"I have presented to you by message, and by legislation introduced by minority House and Senate members, an overall comprehensive program. This program was designed to be sound, constructive and with innovation to bring our state government up to a greater level of effi-

ciency and service to the people. I have expected the majority party to accept this program or submit an alternate program to accomplish the same goal. It is necessary that I be made aware of a contemplated program as each piece of legislation passed by you must come across my desk. Without an overall picture of the majority program, it is difficult for me to give each newly-passed bill consideration in its logical perspective.

"I have attempted to obtain the Republican program on fiscal policy but our meetings, while amiable, have not been productive in that regard. Once again let me urge you of the Republican Party as I did in my opening message to feel free to contact me or the minority Floor Leaders to discuss or disclose any part or all of the majority party legislative program.

"I feel that it is absolutely necessary that I as Governor and you as legislators come to an early understanding regarding the axis upon which the entire state service revolves — that of fiscal policy.

"What we do in the next 15 days of this legislative session whether in wisdom or in expedience will affect every man, woman and child in North Dakota for the next two years.

"I am concerned because fiscal policy cannot be a hand to mouth affair, but must be projected beyond the coming biennium.

"There are at least two theories concerning state budgeting. One theory suggests that we find out what our biennial state government revenue is, and tailor our state services costs to fit within that income. The second theory is that we establish what are essential state services and their cost and then tailor our state income to fit this cost.

"Obviously the second theory is most desirable from the standpoint of the majority of the people served in the state. However, in this year 1961 we may have to revert to the first theory of cutting some essential state services since our tax load ratio to income is already oppressive to the point of making us the second ranking state in the entire nation in this respect. I believe we need to review fiscal policy of the past biennium and compare it with what appears to be happening in this biennium.

"North Dakota, like every other state, is beset with problems of government finance. I think we need to admit to ourselves that state government finance is plagued by inflating costs just the same as any household or business is, today. And the future does not suggest otherwise.

"I know that you will agree that some reserve monies are desirable, and that there is no everflowing fountain of hidden income replenishing these reserves.

"I may not get agreement from you as to the exact dollar of excess spending over income in the present biennium, but the figure will hover very closely around \$18,317,788.38.

"The total projected spending over income proposed by you in this biennium as of this morning and including institutional buildings is \$23,931,940.10 in excess of income. This imbalance will be lowered only approximately \$3 million by transfers of profits from the Bank of North Dakota and the State Mill and Elevator and some idle accounts into the General Fund.

"Much has been said in an academic manner about how conservative we are in estimating income to the General

Fund for the next biennium. The truth is that we have boosted this estimate over last estimate by \$6.8 million over the estimate for the past biennium, for the past biennium budget board estimate included the income from the beer and liquor tax. There will be honest differences over the correctness of figures obtained from the Department of Public Instruction, but these differences are not significant in the overall problem of drain on the equalization fund. The dull aching fact remains that in the next biennium as in the present biennium a severely unbalanced budget is in the offing. I suggest a close check on unessential services as a tiny means of attempting to relieve this imbalance. I asked the Welfare Department to cut their budget requests by 1¼ million. They have complied. I point out as an example that the State Laboratories is busily testing petroleum products. These petroleum products have already been tested by the Federal Government at higher specifications than are required by our state law.

"It is interesting to note that even under the imbalanced spending program of the present biennium the state equalization board was not able to levy the full 4 mill state levy, but only 1.75 mills in 1959 and 1.75 in 1960 because of a legal restriction which barred a higher levy when the General Fund Reserve was greater than 20% of appropriations. Yet, at the same time, appropriations from the equalization fund and welfare funds that could and should have been made from the General Fund were depleting the equalization and welfare funds rapidly. I urge that this legislature not fall into this pitfall again which would restrict the equalization board from acting in the interest of sound state finance.

"This is an important point, for already appropriations are proposed out of equalization and welfare funds which should come from the General Fund. Already sources of revenue are being earmarked for the General Fund which should be earmarked for the equalization or welfare funds.

"I believe it is absolutely necessary that the equalization fund be placed on an income equal to outgo basis. To solve this by cutting back the state's support of education in the Foundation program would be a mythical solution as it would only remove part of the equalization principle of school support and would shift the tax burden back to the county. To solve the drain on the equalization fund by closing out all or part of the 5 million dollar school construction fund and placing this money in the equalization fund would mean the tragic death of a necessary school construction program. It would only provide a stop-gap source of revenue which would be an evasion of the real solution rather than a solution itself.

"I have suggested that the equalization fund be bolstered by the reenactment of the beer and liquor tax no longer needed to pay back the Korean Adjusted Compensation Bonds. This would yield \$2.2 million.

"I have suggested that the income from the sales tax known as the Use Tax be placed in the equalization fund. This would yield approximately \$2.8 million.

"I have been willing to make the politically unpopular suggestion that a 1½% income tax be levied for the equalization fund. This income tax would be levied on

net income after all deductions, and would allow credit to the taxpayer for his support of education through the 21 mill levy on personal property. The North Dakota tax department estimates the yield of this tax at approximately \$4 million. I consider this a just tax allowing those who benefit to the greatest extent from this economy of ours and who are presently unable to contribute to education through personal property taxes, a chance to share in supporting education.

"I have suggested making the Foundation Education Program, special Education and Basis of Need the only appropriations from the equalization fund. This would relieve the drain on the equalization fund by 1½ million dollars. The other educational programs now appropriated from the equalization fund should be appropriated from the general fund. The general fund income from the 4 mill statewide levy is the only mid-biennium point of flexibility in our tax program. This flexibility cannot operate if total drain of other fund reserves is not reflected in the general fund reserve.

"I have suggested you support a request for federal aid to education. But curiously this proposal has been rejected by those who are severely critical of even a slight cutback in state matching funds for federal aid for our highways and federal aid for our cattle in the Brucellosis Control Program. I ask you, which should come first in our concern, highways, cows or children? If you reject the necessity of supporting federal aid for education, I suggest you support the amendment to House Bill No. 539 to permit local school districts to increase their tax levies to allow adequate improvement in their local level of education.

"The above suggestions in various combinations would solve the most serious fiscal problem we now face — the continued support and upgrading of our primary and secondary educational system.

"Our highway fund is a dedicated fund which today is in the strongest position of all state funds. The Highway Department operating fund was drained by \$3 million in excess of income in this biennium. We will find ourselves with only a minimum acceptable reserve of \$4 million on July 1, 1961. It is the administration's intention not to engage in a deficit highway spending program in the coming biennium. It should be made clear that cutting back on state matching funds, does not necessarily mean cutting back in the 90% federal matching funds for the interstate highway system.

"I have suggested placing driver license fees in the highway fund and taking the Highway Patrol appropriation out of the highway fund. This is a logical method of removing one-half million dollars pressure on the general fund and taking the one-half million dollars from the one fund which is in the strongest position today, the highway fund. I am a supporter of federal aid for highways, but we can ill afford to let the lure of the federal matching program lead us away from the necessary state services of less glamour which involves the daily living of people. We must be a compassionate government which places moral responsibility above asphalt and cement.

"A curious thing happened when I suggested that a

fraction of the cost of the new Bangs or Brucellosis control program for cattle be born by those gaining the largest benefit. This Bangs control program will cost the state one-half million dollars in a matching program in which the federal government supplies 50% of the cost. This proposal was defeated under the guise of it being a necessary state health responsibility measure. Any hogman, sheepman or poultryman could also lay claim to a free vaccination service under the same justification. I wholeheartedly join cattlemen in endorsing the necessity of the Brucellosis control program, and I do not believe cattlemen would object to the 25c per cow tax necessary to recover the state part of the Bangs program. I believe cattlemen consider the federal subsidy of \$500,000 would far offset their 25c per head contribution. This proposal to relieve the general fund of one-half million dollars pressure is not politically pleasant for me to advocate, but I do it without reservation because I feel this is a necessary program which can be born by those of us in the cattle business benefiting directly.

"I stated that state revenue can be increased either by increased taxes or increased economic activity which automatically increases state revenue. I much prefer the latter method.

"What are you going to do in this session in the interest of increased economic activity for North Dakota? Economic Development does not mean brick and mortar, or stocks or bonds, it means people. To have as a noble objective the providing jobs for our youth does not mean that all of our youth will become stockholders, business owners or a part of management. The vast majority of our youth opportunity will come in the form of positions in the labor force. The purchasing power of working people is the broad base in this state and nation of consumer demand.

"What are you doing in this session to improve the lot of working people? What are we doing to attract those large industries which need and seek out industrial locations in a state which has the stability of a legal framework for management — labor negotiations? We need a labor relations act. Is there any person in this chamber who can honestly say that North Dakota has an adequate labor department, at this time? This is 1961 not 1920. I suggest amendments to Senate Bill 293 to strengthen this department in the manner recommended by the voters and by the special labor committee appointed by former Governor Davis. You are groping for ways of increasing economic activity in North Dakota, but exhibit a strange timidity in preparing for it. If a new labor department is justified for 1963, why is it not justified now? Working people do not understand why political expediency supercedes the welfare of our human resources. I suggest you amend the House bill which increases maximum unemployment rates to also include increased unemployment benefits from \$32.00 to \$38.43 per week. Labor is an important facet of economic development in North Dakota.

"Agriculture in North Dakota is paramount even alongside our quest for heavy and light industry. I've offered a suggestion for a pilot plant credit program for research into adjustment credit for young farmers. It was a sin-

cere attempt to assist in a necessary program of shifting from our cash grain economy to an intensified farming economy. Some bankers say this is not a necessary program. Perhaps it is not for them, but I think we need to ask the young farmer. What does he think? I don't suggest this is the complete answer to North Dakota's farming ills, but I ask you in the majority for your solutions. Please be aware that the Bank of North Dakota is using less than 4% of its resources in the support of agricultural credit. It is not serving the agricultural development in this state in the manner for which it was founded.

"I believe the state of North Dakota, the most agricultural state in the nation, should speak through its legislature on agricultural programming. I urge you to approve resolutions on national farm policy planning submitted by the minority. If you do not choose to approve, these minority resolutions, I solicit the recommendations of the majority.

"Let us make a careful appraisal of all bills submitted to this legislature relative to farmers and farming. Are we accomplishing anything for our basic industry or are there a preponderance of bills designed to cut the economic ground out from under individual farmers? The latter appears to be the case.

"We were thrilled at the announcement of a 200 kilowatt electric generating plant soon to be established over our lignite beds. This proposal came about after more than \$200,000 of research on the project. The state was not able to help financially in this research because our Economic Development Commission is designed mainly as a promotional agency. There are several other industrial development research projects pending. If Economic Development Commission is to rise to its maximum effectiveness, it must have research funds available. To keep it a promotional agency is to ask it to be a front for an activity it is unable to perform. Economic development is a bi-partisan affair. It will never be non-political, however. Let's get together. There is no philosophical political difference involved.

"In direct contrast to the optimism and enthusiasm for raising our state's economic activity are the thousands of North Dakotans who live from day to day in the various degrees of mental incapacity. I proposed that we unify our efforts on the mental health and mental treatment front. I asked that the community mental health service units be established to begin to bring private medicine in our local communities to bear on the problem along with the socialized state hospital program.

"It is a fact that a private mental health institute and hospital is in the planning stage here in North Dakota. This institute would bring people into this state for training in the mental health field. These trainees would furnish tremendous help in manning our state hospital and Grafton State School for the mentally handicapped.

"Our present state mental program is not well enough co-ordinated or adequately staffed to be able to furnish the attraction for the establishment of a private neuro-psychiatric institute. I have suggested a mental health authority as a post occupied by a qualified psychi-

atrist to bring about the upgrading of our mental health program. The watered down version of the mental health authority in Senate Bill No. 49 does not provide for the administration of the state hospital and the Grafton School under the mental health authority. This watered down legislation provides for a big man to occupy a small job. I suggest amendments to SB 49, bringing the State Hospital and Grafton School out from under present Board of Administration and under the mental health authority, to give a man large in his field the positive responsibility of a large and important program.

"As we contemplate the end of this session, we must ask ourselves. 'What have we contributed in a positive way?' After we leave these exciting chambers in the months ahead we will have a feeling of satisfaction in accomplishment, or we will have the aching realization that we somehow lost our sense of values. Great strides have been made for people in past legislatures, in these chambers. Such legislation as the School Foundation Program and the Department of Accounts and Purchases deemed impossible by some in the last session did become milestones in political reality. These were positive accomplishments. If I thought that a political division between the legislature and my administration would stymie constructive legislation, then the race would not have been worth the running for me.

"We can still accomplish much. I propose we work together and let the chips in the next election fall where they may. People put you there and me here. I propose we think about those people.

"North Dakota has tremendous potential in the development of our human and natural resources. Our development of these potentials in the future insofar as government can be effective will depend upon bi-partisan effort. If we as legislators and administrators fail there will be others to replace us. "It has been a privilege and a pleasure for me to appear before this legislative assembly today. Thank you."

Dear Mr. Speaker:

This office acknowledges receipt of your letter of February 4, 1961, in which you enclosed House Resolution No. 5, a house resolution requesting an opinion from the attorney general in regard to elections held in the Ninth and Tenth Legislative Districts for the election of members of the Legislative Assembly.

Insofar as the question of the election of the members of the House of Representatives from the Ninth and Tenth Districts is concerned, the House has already pointed out in their resolution that under Section 47 of the North Dakota Constitution, "Each house shall be the judge of the election returns and qualifications of its own members." In view of this constitutional provision there is little that this office or for that matter any court can say or do with regard to the election of members who have already been seated in the house.

Our Supreme Court discussed and emphasized this unambiguous constitutional provision in *State v. District Court of Sixth Judicial District*, 67 ND 196, 271 NW 137. The case leaves little doubt but that a determination of a contested seat in the House of Representatives rests with that body. See also 81 CJS 943, States section 34; 49 Am. Jur. 251, STATES, Section 34.

This being the case there is no authority or precedent in this state by which we may be guided in the present situation. Furthermore the constitutions of most, if not all, of the states contain provisions to the effect that each house of the state legislature shall be the judge of the election and qualifications of its own members. Thus a question such as the one at hand has not, to our knowledge, been discussed by the courts. If such a case is brought before the courts they progress no further than to discuss the constitutional provisions and declare that questions of qualifications of members of the legislature must be decided by the legislature. Therefore, seldom, if ever, have the courts discussed the merits of a situation such as the one presented to this office by the House of Representatives. I believe that in view of these facts it would be presumptuous of us to attempt to advise the House of Representatives on such a question. Such advice would serve no useful purpose.

It should be noted, however, that the election of the representatives in question would appear to be valid until decided otherwise to the satisfaction of the House. In addition, the question of whether a person is entitled to represent a certain district in the legislature, because of a dispute as to the boundaries of the legislative district, should be raised at the time such persons seek election. At such a time the courts may take jurisdiction of these questions and resolve them prior to the time that the election is held and the names of the victorious certified according to law.

It should also be noted that the election was apparently presumed valid by all concerned since no question as to its validity has been raised prior to this time. The members of the House of Representatives affected by this situation appear to be true choices of the people they presently represent in the legislature. There was apparently no intent on the part of any person to thwart any provision of our election statutes.

I may say that a representative of this office went to Fargo and interviewed the states attorney of Cass County and the deputy county auditor of said county and both officials stated that there never had been filed a single complaint with regard to the general election of 1960.

There is absolutely no evidence of fraud or collusion there with regard to the election of these representatives and the present situation has arisen because of a mistaken notion as to the boundary line between the two districts. This all came to light after the legislature was well under way and while this office stands all unequivocally on the opinion which it rendered relative to the matter, it must be borne in mind that it has never been adjudicated by any court.

39-18-05. WIDTH, LENGTH AND HEIGHT OF MOBILE HOMES, OPERATED IN THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA — OVERSIZE PERMITS.) It shall be unlawful for any person to operate or tow a mobile home upon the highways of the state of North Dakota, the length of which mobile home shall be over ((fifty)) sixty feet, or which shall have a body width of over eight feet, and a height of over twelve and one-half feet, except as otherwise provided in this section. Mobile homes moved in the interest of merchandising or relocation of a man's home shall be considered "good cause."

1. For good cause shown, therefore, the state highway department may, at their discretion, issue single trip permits for movement of a mobile home exceeding statutory size to persons or firms having adequate towing vehicle and insurance coverage. The state highway department shall have authority to establish reasonable permit conditions and regulations in the interest of safety, public interest and adverse weather conditions. The state highway department shall have authority to revoke permits when such holder violates or abuses the privilege or conditions of permit.
2. For good cause shown, therefore, the state highway department may, in their ordinary course of business, issue annual permits for movement of mobile homes exceeding statutory size, to mobile home manufacturers, dealers or transport companies; providing, however, that the towing vehicle shall consist of a three-fourths ton or larger truck with dual wheels, and that no annual permits shall be issued for movement of mobile homes exceeding over-all dimensions of one hundred and twenty inches wide, plus safety equipment, if required.

3. No oversize permits shall be valid during period of sunset to sunrise or during period of twelve o'clock noon Saturday to sunrise Monday or on holidays of New Year's, Memorial, Independence, Labor, Thanksgiving and Christmas days.
4. For each permit issued there shall be charged a fee of five dollars, except that on annual permits each movement shall be charged a transit fee of five dollars. Further, no mobile home having a width in excess of eight feet shall be moved at a speed in excess of ((thirty-five)) fifty miles per hour. No mobile home shall be moved unless such movement is covered by liability insurance in the amount of at least one hundred thousand dollars for bodily injury liability for one person, at least three hundred thousand dollars for bodily injury liability for one accident, and at least twenty thousand dollars property damage liability.

Provided, however, that the limitations as to width, length and height of mobile homes herein provided for, shall not apply to mobile homes which are now in use in North Dakota which exceed these limitations and which have heretofore been licensed by the state of North Dakota.

GIANTS IN THE EARTH

Dr. Knutson: "Governor Guy, state officials, representatives, and senators and American citizens all:—

I count it a high privilege to address you on the occasion of this memorial service which is inspired by the celebration of the birthday of the Father of our country and our first President.

Veneration of the past will always be the mark of the thoughtful, educated person. The purpose of history is to teach us why we are as we are and enable us to utilize the knowledge and experience of the past so as to avoid the mistakes which have slowed the wheels of progress and hindered individuals and institutions from performing their maximum service.

While it is true that no individual or nation can live on past history, it is also correct to say that one cannot afford to overlook it. The real tragedy of history is that men and peoples continue to commit the sins and perpetuate the mistakes of past generations. We search the pages of history so as to avert a tragedy of this nature.

This being the case, a memorial service is not only proper but a very necessary activity. We are the recipients of a great heritage, and for some reason Providence has seen fit to make America the most fortunate of all nations in the annals of history. For this blessing we can take no personal credit. Rather, we must ask with the Apostle Paul, "What do we have that has not been received from others?" Also, we must recognize the importance of our Lord's word that "others have labored, and we have entered into their labors."

History is a dangerous subject, for there is always a tendency to either disregard it or use it as a shackle. Men are constantly saying that we are not to be bound by the past in any way, but that our sole objective is to be pioneers who are blazing new trails through the wilderness of ignorance and want and weakness. Everyone of us has had experience with people who have thwarted the progress of our communities and institutions because they have insisted that procedures should follow in the exact pattern of the fathers. The tension between a disregard of history and the use of history as a shackle is resolved by recognizing that there are some absolutes, principles, and virtues which hold true for all time and in every kind of circumstance. Therefore, the word of the Lord to Jeremiah is apropos to our day also: "Stand ye in the ways and see, and ask for the old paths where is the good way; and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls."

As is the case with many of you, I happen to be of Norwegian background; and I was also born in North Dakota. In the twenties Ole Rolvaag, a Norwegian-American novelist, wrote a novel on pioneer life, which in the judgment of many literary experts is still the best in the field. He took the title for his novel from a statement made in the book of Genesis concerning the period before

the time of Noah: "There were giants in the earth in those days." I do not believe a better title has ever been thought of with which to pay tribute to our leaders and forebearers, whose influence and labors still ungird, inspire, and bless us today.

Carlyle interpreted history through the lives of great men. Many criticize this view as being too narrow and naive, but there is nevertheless an element of truth in it. Some philosophers even argue that men are governed more by strong personalities than by laws and institutions.

In our Revolutionary period there were some real giants in the earth, and George Washington was one of them. George Washington was a giant not because he was unusually intelligent. In respect to mental powers, he was just average. His formal education would not compare with that of an eighth grader today. He never did learn how to spell. He was not interested in abstract ideas and problems. He possessed a small library; but the books were all of a practical nature, which instructed him how to farm better, make more money, and utilize tools and machinery.

It was fortunate for the emerging republic that Washington had some compatriots who knew how to think and communicate. The intellectual heroes of the Revolution were Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Paine, Thomas Jefferson, and Alexander Hamilton. There were ghost writers in that day, too; and while Washington, for example, prepared the rough draft of his farewell address, it was Mr. Hamilton who put it into the living prose which has caused it to be immortal.

Most historians and military experts do not even credit George Washington with being a great military strategist. He had very little imagination and was not the type who could use the opportunity and the available means for the best advantage. The Americans were the finest sharpshooters and guerrilla fighters in the world at that time, and the consensus of opinion seems to be that General Washington should have employed a type of warfare more suitable to the colonists than the rigid deployment of troops according to the European pattern.

It would be nice, especially for an ordained minister, to say that George was great because of his saintliness; but we can't say even this. Washington did belong to the Anglican Church and attended services occasionally; but along with some of the other leaders of the Revolution, his Anglican faith had been much modified by the philosophy of deism. This philosophy more or less depersonalized God while leaving intact a strict moral code and the inexorable guidance of Providence. Before the Revolution, the enlightenment had come to full power in Europe; and its influence was bound to flow out, even to the New World.

Washington was a giant because of two principal virtues. He had a sense of dedication that held him unswervingly to a purpose and a practical sense of values that made him a good organizer, and he knew how to use men.

There is no time to recite the many dark incidents of the Revolutionary War, in which Washington would have been more than justified in raising the white flag of surrender. Washington was tenacious because he had been

given a job to do, and he believed in the cause it was to effect.

While Washington was no idea-man, he was a thing-man. If he did not enjoy good literature and was unable to write with facility, he could count and keep records. We know more about General Washington than most great men because he painstakingly kept a daily journal, which was accompanied by a minute detail recording of all assets and expenditures.

Some of us are much concerned about preserving what is commonly called the American way of life. We believe in the principles of individual initiative and free enterprise. We look upon Government as an umpire, whose function is to see to it that business and all other activities of life are carried on under just and equitable rules. It is interesting to note in this connection that the Revolutionary War and the Declaration of Independence were caused by the greed and unscrupulousness of the business leaders of England. The colonists up until about five years before the war did not even dream about separating from England. Even in 1775 several of the states passed resolutions protesting any move to declare the thirteen states independent from the mother land. The business leaders of England set up a system of mercantilism, which they influenced the king and Parliament to strengthen by a series of laws which demanded that all colonial goods had to be carried on English vessels and that certain crops such as tobacco and cotton could be sold only to England. Manufacturing was forbidden in the colonies. The English barons purchased the raw material from the colonists at their own price and in turn sold the manufactured goods to the colonists at their price. When the colonists protested these measures, the business interests of England influenced the king and Parliament to draw up even stronger regulations and provided for their ruthless enforcement even to the extent of quartering English soldiers in the homes of the colonists and forcing the colonists to provide their salaries and food.

George Washington had suffered as much as any from mercantilism. He discontinued the raising of tobacco because he was being duped by the factors in England to whom he had to sell his tobacco. Instead, he raised wheat and other products which he could sell directly to the French Islands. Even though Washington had suffered from the abuse of unscrupulous business leaders, he was not blinded to the necessity of maintaining a vigorous competitive economic order. As was pointed out before, he knew how to count and keep records. He knew that ledgers had to balance or the people would suffer. He saw clearly that the power to tax is also a power that can destroy. Some cynic might say that Washington kept conservative economic views because he was a rich man. He was not wealthy to begin with; but by his early twenties, he had already secured considerable holdings through his own efforts. He inherited Mount Vernon and some other property from his brother Lawrence; and when he married, his bride was a widow who was the wealthiest person in the state of Virginia, Martha Custis. Of course, there have been people who have claimed that Washington was such

a practical man that he even married for money. Well, someone has said that you might just as well marry for both love and money as to marry for love alone. There is no doubt that Washington had a wonderfully happy married life, and Martha Washington is still a symbol of what the First Lady of the land should be.

It is unjust to say that Washington believed in certain economic principles just because he was rich. No man sacrificed more for the cause of independence than he, and no one was more concerned about the political, economic, and social structure on which the nation should be built.

Always when some one contends for sound economic principles and practices, a cynic's voice is raised telling about the robber barons of the nineteenth century and using this as a justification for the socialization of our natural resources and the means of production. But if anyone wants to do this, he does not need to go back to the nineteenth century. We can tell the stories of how big business almost stole North Dakota blind or we can point to the present case of some giant corporations going out to other industries and municipalities with an agreement that here corporation A has the low bid and corporation B has the high bid. But over there, corporation B has the low bid and corporation A the high bid. Anti-trust laws do deal with situations of this kind, and they should be enforced rigidly and the guilty should be punished. Just because the water is dirty, it isn't necessary to throw the baby out with the bath water. Our "baby" is a good one: the finest basic documents ever drawn up by human beings, the most effective institutions for democratic action that society has ever seen, and the highest degree of opportunity, prosperity, and happiness that the children of men have ever enjoyed. As Lincoln warned, "It must needs be that offenses come, but woe unto that man by whom the offense cometh. It would be far better for him that a millstone be hung around his neck and he be cast into the depths of the sea."

Washington did not say that America should never be engaged in entangling alliances with foreign powers. Here his farewell address has been misquoted. He did say, "The great rule of conduct for us in regard to foreign nations is, in extending our commercial relations to have with them as little political connection as possible. So far as we have already formed engagements, let them be fulfilled with perfect good faith. Here let us stop." I do not believe that Washington would have been blind to the necessity of an organization such as NATO, but I do believe that he would have been opposed to any kind of give-away program. A Concordia professor, on returning from Europe, told of visiting with some prominent European businessmen who laughed at America for being so naive. They believed that it was wonderful that America had helped nations after the war to rebuild and recover their strength but that this help should have been strictly on a loan basis with a program of amortization set up even if it spanned a half century. For years America has subsidized the Cuban economy to the detriment of the Red River Valley farmer, and what thanks is there now for the gift of 3 cents a pound for all the hundreds of thousands of tons of

sugar the United States has purchased from Cuba? Charity can be a dangerous thing, which instead of making a friend converts a friend into an enemy because his self-respect has been destroyed.

Washington never used these exact words, but we can put these words into the mouth of Washington that economic freedom is the basis of political freedom.

I hope it isn't just the natural pessimism of a preacher which causes me to say that our present generation has been slipping morally. Our crime rate has been going up at a fantastic percentage. Embezzlement is more and more a common thing. Despite the superior biological knowledge which this generation possesses and undoubtedly uses, the number of illegitimate births is steadily mounting. What does our giant George Washington have to say of a situation of this kind? When he was agitating for the ratification of the Constitution, he wrote to Lafayette concerning the charter "that these powers are so distributed among the legislative, executive, and judicial branches, into which the general government is arranged, that it can never be in danger of degenerating into a monarchy, an oligarchy, an aristocracy, or any other despotic or oppressive form, so long as there shall remain any virtue in the body of the people."

You have heard it said, "It can't happen to us." Despite our system of checks and balances, it can happen to us if there is not a high moral sense among our citizens. Washington reminds us again today: "Of all the dispositions and habits which lead to political prosperity, religion, and morality are indispensable supports. Let it simply be asked, Where is the security for property, for reputation, for life, if the sense of religious obligation desert the oaths which are the instruments of investigation in courts of justice? And let us with caution indulge the supposition that morality can be maintained without religion. Whatever may be conceded to the influence of refined education on minds of peculiar structure, reason and experience both forbid us to expect that national morality can prevail in exclusion of religious principle."

Thank God in colonial America there were giants in the earth. In the settlement and founding of Dakota Territory, whose centennial we soon observe, there were giants in the earth. But the verb must change back to the present tense. It behooves all of us today to stand up and be counted as men of God, loyal American citizens, and men "who have the strength of ten because their hearts are pure."

There are giants in the earth today, also."

The participation by the credit union in any unemployment insurance funds, or social security fund, or old age fund, shall not be deemed a waiver of the tax immunities hereby granted.

57-38-22.1. DEDUCTIONS — (((OPTIONAL STAND-ARD —))) INDIVIDUALS.) In computing taxable income of individuals, there shall be deducted from net income the amount of federal income taxes, but not social security and self employment taxes, plus income taxes of foreign countries, paid or accrued as the case may be, during the ap-

plicable tax year, adjusted by any federal or foreign tax refunds, to the extent that they were paid or accrued upon income which becomes a part of the North Dakota taxable income against which the North Dakota income tax rates are applied; plus (except as otherwise required by subsection 3 of this section) the larger of the amounts defined in subsections 1 and 2 of this section as follows:

1. (((An optional))) A standard deduction of five per centum of the net income after the deduction of federal income taxes (((,))) and income taxes of foreign countries, (((but not social security and self employment taxes,))) not to exceed five hundred dollars, or
2. The total of (1) contributions, interest, taxes, child care expense, losses and miscellaneous expenses deductible for federal income tax purposes under the United States Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, and (2) all expenses paid during the income year, not compensated for by insurance or otherwise, for medical care, as defined for federal income tax purposes under the United States Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, of the taxpayer, his spouse, or a dependent, with (((adjustments as follows:))) the following adjustment:
 - a. Subtract from said total the deduction for North Dakota income taxes.
 - (((b. Add to said total the amount of federal income taxes, but not social security and self-employment taxes paid or accrued, as the case may be, during the applicable tax year, adjusted by any federal tax refunds. Provided, however, that where married persons who have filed a joint federal income tax return file separately, such total of deductions under this subsection shall be divided between them according to law; and provided further that where a taxpayer has used an optional standard deduction on his federal return, he shall use the optional standard deduction provided in this section.
 - c. Add to said total any dividends or income received from stock or interest in any corporation and included in the adjusted gross income as computed for federal income tax purposes where the income of such corporation has been assessed and tax paid by the corporation under this chapter and such dividends or income were received by the taxpayer as income during the income year if such corporation has reported the name and address of each person owning stock and the amount of dividends or income paid each such person during the year; when only part of the income of any corporation shall have been assessed and corporation income tax paid thereon under this chapter, only a corresponding part of the dividends or income received therefrom and included in federal adjusted gross income shall be deducted.)))
3. Where married persons filed a joint federal income tax return but separate North Dakota income tax returns, the total of the deductions under subsection 2 of this section shall be divided between them accord-

ing to law; and where a taxpayer has used an optional standard deduction on his federal return, he shall use the standard deduction provided in this section on his North Dakota return. Where married persons file separate North Dakota income tax returns, both must use the ((optional)) standard deduction if either elects to use it.

4. A taxpayer affected by income allocation provisions of this chapter applicable to persons other than corporations shall, if the ((optional)) standard deduction is not used, be permitted to deduct only such portion of the ((total)) deductions referred to in ((subsection 2 of)) this section as is fairly and equitably allocable to North Dakota under rules and regulations prescribed by the state tax commissioner.

House Concurrent Resolution "N-1". A concurrent resolution requesting the Congress of the United States to propose to the people an amendment to the Constitution expressing prohibiting the government of the United States from engaging in enterprise in competition with its citizens, establishing the United States Constitution as the supreme law of the land, and repealing the 16th amendment.

Which had been read.

Speaker Brown called Rep. Johnston to the Chair to preside.

Speaker Brown returned to the Chair to preside after he had spoken on House Concurrent Resolution "N-1".

Rep. Maragos requested that the remarks of Rep. Bratcher be printed in the House Journal, which request was granted.

Speaker Brown called Rep. Boe to the Chair to preside.

Speaker Brown returned to the Chair to preside.

Rep. Bratcher: "Mr. Speaker and Members of this Assembly: I think this is a very serious time and I only wish I was capable of getting up here and address you as I really feel.

"After hearing all these remarks and much on the mechanics of this House Resolution "N-1", I am not going to take up any time on that part of it. I would like to review the troubles of the United States, and principally all of our troubles at home and everywhere else. They all derive from some part of money or finances like when a young man goes out with a young lady and finds he is a little short of money, and many times it is the same way in the home and in our married lives. You start out lovely and you get to a hard place and you are not able to get over these hard places without a quarrel because of finances. There is either not enough money, or too much. And I think most of our troubles are over too much money, beginning at one central point, rather than not enough, and that has a bearing on this resolution which we have here. Back in 1913 when the 16th amendment was put into effect and brought about the graduated income tax — then is when the trouble started. There is more money flowing into Washington all the time and the more money they have, the more they spend.

"What happened in North Dakota in 1951 when they discovered oil? A million dollars poured into the treasury. And what happened? It is all gone. If they hadn't had that, they wouldn't have spent so much. If you give a child five or ten dollars now, he comes home with it all

gone. It makes me think of former Governor John Burke. He told his daughter he was going to quit giving her money if she couldn't show some sort of bookkeeping. So he gave her ten dollars and when she wanted more he asked her for an account of the ten dollars, and she showed him her account book. On one page she showed where he had given her ten dollars and on the other page it said "All gone."

"It don't make any difference how much we get — it is never enough. They put on a sales tax and now that isn't enough. Money is the root of all evil. Money is powerful. If it wasn't for the power of money, we wouldn't have all this trouble. We would not have trouble with all these other countries. In 1913, the United States was in debt about \$2,000,000,000. In 1929, \$16,000,000,000. In 1939, \$40,000,000,000 and in 1959, it was \$285,000,000,000.

"A nation with \$285 billion interest bearing debt. Possibly total individual and national debt near one trillion dollars. Why did our government loan our money printing press to Russia, several plane loads of special paper and ink? No one knows how much money was printed by communist government. United States Government guarantees payment of this money. No wonder a Russian Soldier in east Germany could pay \$14,000 in U. S. money to an American Soldier for a \$29.75 wrist watch. From 1939 to 1945 we witnessed our Government, lend-lease to Russia \$13,000 billion dollars. "Money talks", "Money is Power". January 18, 1956 Congress passed House Resolution No. 6376 by voice vote authorizing Congress to build a \$12½ million dollar Mental Hospital, on a 1½ million acre tract of land in, Alaska. What for? Is this to be some sort of Slave Camp for us Americans that dare to speak out against the Communistic wishes of those in this nation, that would destroy our home, our schools, tear children from their parents and parents from their children? Are we to be led to destruction by those planners? Those planning behind all forms of free Government? Do we want to lose our free way of Life as we have known it? Of course not. But do we realize that slowly but surely that horrid monster is creeping on us? Why — May I ask? Because we are disregarding our responsibilities. We feel we owe our government nothing, that government owes us everything. We are no longer able or capable of caring for ourselves. We wish to saddle all responsibilities for our very existence on our government. With what results? Money and more money? Higher taxes of every form? No. That of government so large it is beyond any human conception to handle a national budget of \$80 or \$90 billion dollars?

"Just recently, in a small town it was, a bank employee had, over a period of a few years, taken over \$2,000,000 of bank funds. Last year a young man in the treasury of the United States walked off with \$160,000 in \$20.00 bills. Where billions of dollars are involved, we know not what amount has been stolen, and squandered, from income tax money. Money is power. Shall we spend ourselves insolvent and fall into the jaws of socialism and communism? Are we to live to see this government crushed to dust? Children of this age to live under the iron heel of some form of 'ism' government?

"This income tax law — Until 1913 the American citizen walked with unsurpassed dignity, with rights, humility and faith in God, country, family, and home. Are we maintaining those principles? Are we preserving this nation as it was given to us? Do we have the courage, faith, and confidence in ourselves to our country and to our God?"

"If this nation is to be saved and our form of government preserved something drastic will have to happen to awaken the people of this nation. Why not this 23rd amendment? Something must be done. Passage of House Concurrent Resolution "N-1" might give the needed effect."

Hon. Calvin J. Johnson is one of America's outstanding contemporary speakers.

In the course of his public life, he has addressed hundreds of business, civic and fraternal organizations and has stimulated the thinking of many Americans to a new hope in the future of our country.

He began early his career in the public's service. A resident of Belleville, Illinois, he served as a member of the School and Park Boards of his community; four years as a member of St. Clair (Illinois) County Board of Supervisors; six years as a member of Illinois General Assembly.

As a member of the St. Clair County Board of Supervisors, he brought about the disclosures of large scale tax graft.

As a member of the Illinois General Assembly he organized the drive to break the Loan Shark and Collection Agency Rackets of Southern Illinois. Appointed to the Woodward Commission he exposed relief racketeering and brought about legislation to stop the exploiting of people on relief.

He was the sponsor of the "Johnson Work or Don't Eat Law" which forced every able-bodied man on relief to work and earn the amount of his budget.

Elected to the United States Congress in 1942, he continued his fight for the American people. He exposed and forced the abandonment of the program whereby the American taxpayers money was used to pay farmers of Peru not to raise cotton. He disclosed and forced the abandonment of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration's European Farm Machinery Program, under which one-half million pieces of farm equipment were scheduled to be shipped to European countries, many of which are behind the Iron Curtain today.

His concern for the traditional American Ideals of Freedom is inherited from his ancestors who landed at Jamestown in the early 1600's. Born near Fordsville, Ky., Mr. Johnson is a descendant of the famous pioneer Kentucky surgeon Ephriham McDowell, whose likeness stands in Statuary Hall in the Nation's Capitol. His family later moved to Illinois where he received his major education. He is often referred to as the Twentieth Century Lincoln.

His deep understanding of the "problems" and "issues" of our times is reflected in the constructive program he advocates.

His knowledge, his directness, his humor, his modesty, his tact, all enter into his capacity to inspire confidence. Few men in public life today can match him for his ability to impart to the people the principles of the American Way of Life.

Mr. Johnson was introduced by Speaker Brown.

"This Assembly is composed of the outstanding citizens of our state and naturally the divergency of their personal lives puts them in constant contact, on a nationwide basis, with outstanding individuals.

"Fortunate are we that Representative Goebel of Logan-McIntosh has been most interested and dedicated in the preservation of our free way of life and it is through his continuing interest that we are privileged to have our distinguished speaker today.

"Our speaker is a direct descendant of those courageous pilgrims who landed at Jamestown in the early 1600's, who with a determination dedicated their very existence to providing for future generations their God given right of freedom of choice.

"Mr. Johnson is a descendant of the famous pioneer Kentucky surgeon Ephriam McDowell, whose likeness stands in Statuary Hall in the Nation's Capitol.

"He, like the great emancipator president, Abraham Lincoln, was born in a log cabin in Kentucky. His deceased mother is buried 30 miles from Abraham Lincoln.

"Without going into detail and I refer you to the brochure on your desks, this man is one who has dedicated his entire life to the principles of our republic and a perpetual concern for honesty in government.

"Like all of us, he was a member of the Illinois General Assembly and later was elected to the United States Congress in 1942.

House Concurrent Resolution "T". A concurrent resolution memorializing Congress to call a convention for the purpose of considering an amendment to the Constitution of the United States relative to taxes on income, inheritance and gifts.

Speaker Brown: "For one of the rare occasions, in my legislative career, I am making a request to have my remarks put in the record. This request is for permanent record and future reference, so that there can be no misquotes or garbling of interest.

"We have before us today House Concurrent Resolution "T", a positive and definite directive to the Congress of the United States, that we the people, overburdened with taxation, demand a halt to the monstrous give-away program that is selling our freedom down the road to socialism and the eventual fulfillment of Marx's prediction, that communism need never bear arms against the capitalist world, but that we would destroy ourselves by taxation from within.

"In the beginning of this great Republic of ours and up to 1913 United States Senators were elected by the state legislatures. This was to insure the state governments representation at the national level. In the true sense of the word, the national government was comprised of representatives of the several state governments. However, with passage of the 17th Amendment — that most powerful body in the whole world — the United States Senate — divorced its allegiance to the sovereignty of the individual states. Just last week we had a perfect example when in this very assembly, a letter was read, that fringed on blackmail, in an attempt to intimidate the decision of this body. Thank God, the majority of this House could not be swayed by this underhanded approach.

"Unfortunately, the body across the hall was coerced and the fundamental and basic right of a free America was denied and I do mean a floor discussion and debate on House Concurrent Resolution "N-1".

"We have reached a low ebb in representative government of the people, when one Senator can dictate his terms to one house of the legislature and have them respond like puppets on a string.

"Too long has the consideration of the individual been ignored — our great republic is succumbing to the pressure of minorities.

"What is needed is a rebirth of the Spirit of 1776, yes, Paul Revere and the minutemen. The hour is getting late — but not too late — Members of this Assembly, let us all exert the intestinal fortitude and courage that gave birth to this, the most envied nation in the world's history — by your overwhelming vote in favor of House Concurrent Resolution "T".

"Thank you!"

To qualify as an insured worker an individual must have been paid wages for insured work in his base period totaling not less than the amount in column C of the table in subsection 1 of this section on the line on which, in column B, there appears his weekly benefit amount, and such wages must have been paid in at least two quarters of his base period; however, if an individual during his base period has not been paid such an amount but has been paid wages totaling not less than the amount appearing in column C on the line immediately above he can qualify as an insured worker and his weekly benefit amount shall be the amount appearing in column B on such line.

However, the wage credits of an individual earned during the period commencing with the end of the prior base period and ending on the date on which he filed a valid claim shall not be available for benefit purposes in a subsequent benefit year unless, in addition thereto, such individual has subsequently earned wages for insured work in an amount equal to at least ten times his current weekly benefit amount.

Rep. Lynch requested his remarks on Senate Bill No. 217 be printed in the House Journal.

Rep. Lynch: "I am talking on Senate Bill 217.

"When you want to talk about insurance, you have to find an actuary. When you want some information about Social Security and Income Taxes, you look for someone who has some tax experience. We have the ad valorem tax. This tax is applied to all real and personal property by mill levy. We also have the special taxes; sales, use, excise, gas, etc. Sales tax collection in 1960 was \$15,666,-800.80. Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Montana have no sales tax. If North Dakota did not have a sales tax, you would have a levy of 21 mills on all real property. Apply this levy to your farm value and see what your tax would be.

I really shed tears about this poor Equalization Fund and no matter how much money it takes for this fund, the opinion appears to be that it has to come out of special funds. It has been my experience in this legislature that we are very bad off financially and our budget is in terrible shape. Do you know that the State Board of Equalization has the authority to levy 2 or 3 mills each year for the general fund. One mill of said levy would be about \$630,000.00, and do you know why this levy is not made? The law provides when there is too much money in the general fund, this levy shall not be made.

"Take 1960 estimated general fund of \$40,000,000.00, 20% of said amount or \$8,000,000.00 was in this General Fund on July 1st, 1960. This has been the same situation every session that I have been here. Now would it not be a good plan to transfer some of this surplus money out of the General Fund into the Equalization Fund and make this levy that covers all the real property in the state, including absentee landowners and corporations. The present levy by State Board of Equalization 17.6 mills brought net of \$1,179,500.00.

"Now we will take Senate Bill No. 217. Some party handy with crossword puzzles must have figured this plan. That levies a special tax on a special group of taxpayers.

"Mr. "A" lives in town. He may be a laboring man, teacher or Minister. His salary is \$6000.00. His 1960 State Income Tax is \$39.00. His 1961 State Income Tax under this bill would be \$86.73.

"Mr. "B" is a farmer with a net income of \$6000.00. His 1960 State Income tax is \$39.00. He has quite a lot of personal property. His tax under this bill \$49.73.

"I am not talking about this excise tax as a Republican or Democrat. I believe all taxes levied should apply to all taxpayers alike, and if the income tax should be raised, it should be raised all across the board.

"May I call your attention to one more of our problems.

"The 1950 census listed North Dakota population as 619,636. 1960 population 632,446, said increase of 12,810. The parties who work on census figures, advise our population increased 2% each year. This would give us an increase of 122,400. We had an increase of 12,810, this gives us a loss of 109,500 or 10,900 each year over a ten year period.

"I am of the opinion we should be very careful of the amount of taxes we take off real property and place on special taxes. Let's see what the tax report says about the sales tax. Tax Report says: "The marked regressivity of the sales tax was demonstrated in connection with a recent consumers expenditure survey which indicates that families in the three lowest income brackets pay two to three times as much sales tax relative to income as do families in the two highest income brackets. The selective sales taxes on tobacco and alcoholic beverages are also regressive and the rates in North Dakota are already higher than in most other states.

"The 1951 legislature directed the Legislative Research Committee to make a study of tax, gas and oil. I was a member of said committee; about the same time there

was an organization in the state promoting a graduated land tax. If you owned 1¼, 3¼ or 10¼ you paid a different tax. The committee done some research work in this proposal and the opinion was said tax could not be levied now. We have a similar tax plan now.

"Mr. "A", a farmer--his net income is \$6,000.00. He has personal property. His tax is not raised. Mr. "B", a farmer, same income. He operates his farm as a partnership. He has no personal property and his tax about twice what it was in 1960. Mr. "C" works in town, same net income. He has no cows or hogs. The law will not permit those animals in town. His 1961 state income tax is twice his 1960, and there is some question as to what is real and what is personal property.

"In checking with the tax department and the Legislative Research Committee, I find four states out of 50 have a surtax. Levied on all taxpayers. Colorado has a surtax and a sales tax.

"Kentucky, Massachusetts and Minnesota -- These states have a surtax and no sales tax.

"Minnesota surtax is 10% on all net tax. If your tax was \$100.00 you would pay \$110.00.

"I am opposed to this tax or any tax that would tax any special group."

Rep. Lynch moved that the report of the majority be adopted.

"In any event, I repeat that I interpreted his statement as 'a threat', even though this lobbyist apologized and stated it was not intended. The question remains, why then his statement?

"I believe this lobbyist was opposed to my position and pleased that the proposed amendments failed. I think it is proper to ask, was the vote too close for his comfort? What was his real concern since had the amendments been adopted and had Senate Bill No. 43 been passed there still would have been no appropriation of money to appoint a director for oil and gas purposes.

"Mr. Speaker, I hope that this will be sufficient to serve notice that we as legislators will not tolerate in any way, this type of conduct or pressure."

In compliance with House Resolution No. 7 approved by the Thirty-Sixth Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota, we hereby submit the following recommendations concerning the utilization of the former governor's mansion.

At the present time the dwelling is being utilized as the headquarters for the State Psychiatric Clinic. There are ten rooms on the first two floors and one large room on the third floor which are now being utilized as offices and consultation rooms. The Psychiatric Clinic has made no basic changes in the dwelling and no basic changes are contemplated in the foreseeable future.

It is recommended that original furniture and fixtures still remaining in the dwelling and not needed by the Clinic be transferred to the State Historical Society for safekeeping. It is also recommended that draperies, lighting fixtures and similar features, if replaced, be saved for possible restoration use.

The management of the Psychiatric Clinic is in complete sympathy with the plan of preserving the former governor's mansion with as little change as possible and has agreed to save all of the original equipment which may be removed.

It is believed that the Psychiatric Clinic is making excellent use of the former governor's mansion and at the same time preserving its original character.

It is therefore recommended that the purpose for which it is now being used be continued and that the dwelling be permanently retained by the State of North Dakota and utilized as a historic house museum at some future date if the Psychiatric Clinic is assigned new quarters.

EIGHTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rep. Johnston: "Mr. Speaker, I rise to a point of personal privilege.

"Every citizen in the state of North Dakota concerned about the serious personal injuries and loss of human life occurring with disturbing regularity on our highway is alarmed, I am certain, by the sudden unexpected summary dismissal of A. J. Klaudt, Director of Safety Responsibility Division of the State Highway Department.

"A. J. Klaudt has been a dedicated employee of the people of this state since 1934. His administration of our Safety Responsibility Division has been so enviable that his advice has been solicited by people engaged in highway safety work in many other states as well as foreign nations. His reputation for impartial discharge of his responsibilities was earned by conscientious diligence. Many outstanding citizens of this state that have been on the receiving end of his suspensory orders will so testify.

"Changes in personnel usually follow a change of administration, particularly when a change from one political party to another is involved. But the sudden dismissal of Mr. Klaudt, after he had been led to believe that he would be retained in recognition of his competence is particularly distasteful in this case. It is the result of political wire pulling by a careless youngster seeking revenge.

"The driving record of Scott Anderson, Executive Director of the Democratic party, reveals that he was utterly unimpressed by a conviction for careless driving. Had he been a mature individual, his record would not show, since this conviction and since May of 1958, four warnings for speeding and two more convictions for speeding. A lot of good the repeated warnings accomplished. These three convictions for speeding and four warnings for speeding brought about this suspension of his driver's license, not A. J. Klaudt. As Executive Director of the Democratic party he convinced Mr. Klaudt that driving was essential to his job and he was granted an occupational driving permit just a week ago Monday.

"Governor Guy says he only knew that Klaudt's dismissal was being discussed — apparently with his blessing. The Highway Commission states that the firing was non-political. Do these immature politicians honestly think that the citizens of North Dakota are so naive as to believe this?

"Scott Anderson, you will recall, was at one time interested in the ministry. One would think that he would have a greater appreciation than most for the truth expressed in the Golden Rule. Instead of acknowledging that his driving privileges were restricted for his own safety and that of others on the highway, he exerted his political influence on the new personnel director of the Highway Department. This is another of the inexperienced young men with which the Governor has surrounded himself. After some discussion and the wire pulling of Scott Anderson, A. J. Klaudt was fired. Fired, if you please, for doing

his job as the great majority of the people of this state would insist.

"This example is an open invitation to habitual traffic violators; a proper donation to the Democrat party might save your driving privileges.

"The Republican party, had the necessity appeared in time, would have placed safety on our highways beyond the reach of the Governor's political friends. The rules under which the legislature operate, however, preclude this. These rules, too, must be respected.

"May the people of this state take note of the poor judgment that deprives us of the services of A. J. Klaudt. We predict that during the next two years more and more evidence of the inadequacies of the Governor's administration will be placed before the people of this state."

Rep. Link moved that the Speaker and the majority floor leader of this House proceed immediately to call a hearing and require that the statements that have been submitted here today and leveled against those people mentioned in Rep. Johnston's remarks are submitted then and that all parties concerned be sworn and his testimony taken under oath.

Rep. Wolf moved a substitute motion that a committee of two be appointed to escort the individual named be brought to the rostrum to answer any questions, which motion was ruled out of order.

Speaker Brown asked as a point of personal privilege that the House be at ease for a short time, and that Rep. Wolf, majority floor leader, and Rep. Link, minority floor leader, meet with him in his office.

Rep. Loder moved that a committee of three be appointed to notify the Senate that the House has completed its business and was about to adjourn sine die, which motion prevailed, and the Speaker appointed as such committee Reps. Loder, Maragos, Haugen.

Rep. Powers announced that the committee to notify the Governor that the House was about to adjourn sine die, reported that they had completed their business and asked to be discharged, which request was granted.

Rep. Loder announced that the committee to notify the Senate that the House had completed its business and was about to adjourn sine die reported that they had completed their business and asked that they be discharged, which request was granted.

Speaker Brown announced that he would appoint Rep. Fitch to make the sine die motion.

Rep. Fitch: "Mr. Speaker, I desire to yield that privilege to that distinguished legislator from McIntosh county, Mr. Ben Wolf."

Rep. Wolf: "Mr. Speaker, I did not expect this honor to be bestowed upon me but because this is my last session, I do appreciate this honor."

Rep. Wolf moved that the House be on the fifteenth and sixteenth orders of business and that upon the completion of that work, the House adjourn sine die, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Neukircher suggested that the Burleigh County legislators express the appreciation of the legislators to the City of Bismarck.

SPECIAL ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rep. Johnston moved that the House be on a Special Order of Business and that Rep. Fitch preside over the Special Order of Business, which motion prevailed and Rep. Fitch took the Chair.

Rep. Sorlie moved that the remarks during the special order of business be printed in the House Journal, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Fitch: "The House will come to order.

"Members of the House, we have come to that point in the session where we are nearly at the end. During the session we have had our different opinions. We have fought our battles on the things we thought were right and what we thought were wrong, but now we come here to express our appreciation for the things that our leaders have done and to exemplify that situation, I am going to recognize Mr. Neukircher who will speak for the employees of this House. Mr. Neukircher."

Rep. Neukircher: "Mr. Chairman, Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

"This is the time in the Session we have all been waiting for. I have the honor at this time to recognize the Employment Committee and their Chairman, who happens to be the co-legislator from Stutsman County, Representative Lindberg. By sitting beside him during the Session, particularly during the early part of the Session, I fully realize what this committee and their chairman went through to pick this outstanding group of employees who were with us during the Session.

"I sometimes feel many of us take these employees for granted, but I am aware of the tremendous amount of work that has been done and the responsibility that goes with the work that is assigned to them. I feel that we have a very loyal group of employees and the Employment Committee is to be complimented for this selection.

"I would now like to ask that the employees come forward so they may help me in presenting these tokens of appreciation from the employees to you people here.

"Representative Lindberg, Chairman of the Employment Committee, Chairman of the Veterans and Military Affairs Committee, and a member of the Appropriations Committee, I fully realize how busy you have been these past 59 days. I personally want to congratulate you along with

the rest of the legislators for the outstanding job you have done as Chairman of the Employment Committee, and in behalf of the employees here we present you with this remembrance for this outstanding job.

"The Vice Chairman of the Employment Committee is better known as '6 a.m. Schuler'. I think we had heard more grumbling from the legislators on this committee for calling the early hour meetings. But seriously, though, the employees as well as the legislators here always enjoy your smiling face and your easy happy-go-lucky attitude. On behalf of the employees I present to you this package as a token of appreciation for your wonderful understanding and cooperation during this session.

"Representative Trom, our eastern legislator, in his usual serious kind of way has taken this assignment, as all his others, with accepting full responsibility. I know you too, along with the rest of the members on this committee, have had considerable pressure from some of us to hire this or that employee. You have weathered the storm and have come out as the rest doing a commendable job. We all know the serious work that was facing this committee when we first started, and on behalf of the employees I present to you now this package to remember them by.

"Representative Karabensh, I personally have served with you on several committees and have gotten to respect and admire your ability. You are a serious, conscientious legislator. If you conducted yourself in the same manner on this committee as you have on other committees that had the privilege of serving with you, you will certainly deserve this package from the employees in recognition of your work.

"Representative Stallman — last, but not least by far on the Employment Committee, is one legislator that I could always feel free to consult and talk over legislation before this House or other problems. Your kind consideration and willingness to help, I am sure helped the Employment Committee in solving some of the many problems before them. It is with a great deal of pleasure that I now present to you this package on behalf of the employees for a job well done.

"Jerry Stair, our Chief Clerk that we have been facing for fifty-nine days with his good humor and easy smile, has certainly made our stay here more pleasant. I did not realize all the work that a Chief Clerk does until I was temporary speaker and had a chance to watch you in action. I can sincerely say for every legislator in this Assembly that our work would be much harder and we would be here longer if we would not have the efficient Chief Clerk that we do. I hesitate to think how we would operate if you should decide some day not to want to return to this job. In my conversation around the halls I have heard many fine things said about you, and I concur in everyone of them. The employees, also recognizing the fine job that you have done, have asked me to present to

you this package so that you may remember this 37th Legislative Session, and as things draw to a close we will hurriedly go back to our homes and our thoughts will return many times to the work that we have done here and the work that you have done here.

"Floyd Ettestad, our Superintendent of Employees, has certainly done a remarkable job in personnel supervision. I fully realize how hard it must be to have a new group of employees every session come in here, all strangers to each other, to you and me, and all of a sudden to work together as wonderfully as they have through your excellent supervision. The Assembly here and the employees recognize this; and so on behalf of the employees I give to you this token of appreciation for a job well done."

Rep. Fitch: "The Chair will recognize the representative from Williams County, Rep. Burk."

Rep. Burk: "On behalf of the members of the House, both minority and majority, I wish to bring this gift to you on behalf of all of us, for the services that you have performed in this session of the legislature. You have done your job well. And I do not wish you any bad luck, but I hope in the '63 session, we can recognize you as the minority floor leader."

Rep. Wolf: "Thank you, Walter. Mr. Chairman, fellow legislators, friends. This is my 11th session. As I have stated before, I don't think I have ever worked with a harder working group of legislators than we have had this session. I mean this in all sincerity — both Democrats and Republicans. We have all worked like a bunch of beavers for the welfare of the state and for our constituents back home. I have always felt that it is the duty of every legislator, wherever you come from, that your district and your own area, comes first — the state as a whole comes second, and the nation, third.

"Your responsibility is first to the people back home. That is why I sometimes can't understand why we can't go down the line on most of those issues. This year we have 72 Republicans, and 42 Democrats, but I assure you all of us have different problems back home and they come first. If you check the Journal of the House ever since I have been here, you will see that most of these issues are not settled on party lines. I think about 2% — but most of the issues are decided for the good of our people back home, and for the State of North Dakota. Everybody has a different problem.

"Now, I respect each and every one of you for what you gave to me. In my eleven sessions I have made a lot of friends here, and for the benefit of the young members who are here for their first session, try to leave here without a chip on your shoulder or hating anyone. Sure — we have our differences. I differ with my friend, Walter, and most everybody else among the Democrats — I work along that line — but when we leave this Chamber, we should all be friends. We are all here for the welfare of the State of North Dakota and its people.

"Just because we disagree here once in a while, that is no sign we should have any feelings that are personal. You should never let personalities enter in. I admit I did feel hurt here last week, when I, in my humble way, tried to reapportion the State of North Dakota on a basis of the people for the benefit of the people that I represent. It failed in the Senate without discussion. But I assure you that I am not mad at any Senator. I will never try to dictate the policy from one House to the other—that is their privilege and if that is the way they felt, that is their business. And I hope each and every one of you feel that way after this session is over. Sure you have had hurts. You are not going to get your way all of the time. We have got 162 members in the House and Senate, and some times I wonder if we can ever adjourn sine die, when we have so many different ideas. It goes to prove that these people who are sent here are men with open minds. They can compromise and that is how we eventually wind up the session.

"Now the last statement that I am going to make is one of the hardest that I have ever had to make but there comes a time in a man's life when he must make a change, so I'm saying to everyone here—this is going to be my last session. I mean that in all sincerity. I have enjoyed the 22 years that I have been up here and I know I am going to miss it but there comes a time when a man has to step out of public life—and this is my decision. I am sincere—a lot of people thought I was kidding but this is a final decision and I assure you, that whatever this gift may be, I will remember each and every one that it will be my last gift from you. I believe this is the fourth gift I have received as assistant minority floor leader, Speaker of the House, and majority floor leader. I have felt these were great responsibilities and I have done the best I could in my humble way and I assure each and every one of you that I have no enmity on my conscience. If you want to hate me, that is your privilege but I have no hatred for any of you. I thank you."

Rep. Goebel: "We in the 36th district comprising Logan and McIntosh Counties in the State of North Dakota are deeply concerned about the statement just made by our majority floor leader, Rep. Ben J. Wolf.

"This comes as a shock to us as much as to you, and certainly was not inspired by the citizens of our district.

"We in the 36th have been fortunate indeed to have such an honest, fair, capable, and dedicated individual represent us.

"The legislative body of the last three sessions has recognized the abilities of this wonderful humanitarian, and he has brought more honor to our district than any other individual representing us in the past or will represent us in the future as well. Words can't express our heartfelt thanks to you Ben, for a job well done in the North Dakota House of Representatives, and I hope this can be our expression or inspiration to you to continue serving people which you can do so well.

"God bless you, Ben, we love you all."

Rep. Fitch: "Now we will recognize the distinguished gentleman from Traill County, Rep. Sorlie, who will recognize the minority floor leader, Rep. Link."

Rep. Sorlie: "I have been asked to say a few words in behalf of the members of this House for your distinguished ability and statesmanship as minority floor leader. If it weren't for men like you with experience and background, I don't know what we would do in this legislature. So on behalf of the members of this House, I wish to extend this gift and also extend our best wishes for the future years."

Rep. Link: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, Ruth, and other friends: We are not legislators now — we are friends. And after this touching episode and the recognizing of our faith in our majority floor leader, what is there left to say?

"If I might be pardoned for reaching back into the past and for this occasion, borrow a word from that immortal, Abraham Lincoln, it would be this: 'With charity to all and malice toward none'.

"Truly, friends, that is the way I feel this evening.

"The majority floor leader so aptly expressed the attitude that we all must have at this time of the session, and as he so well put it—that when the chips are down we recognize each other for his different views and respect him for them, and honor him for his right to speak them. The Third House put on a show that in some respects, when it is analyzed, went further than a comedy. They showed Ben Wolf and I coming down this aisle and going up the other aisle with boxing gloves on and then winding up embracing one another—well, that is the way it should be in the spirit that each and every one holds toward each other in the entire assembly. Why is that so important? It is because each and every one of us here is an American and because we believe in the democracy that we so much cherish and because we do so we believe in that democracy and we are here to battle out our differences, and iron out the wrinkles—then go home solidly united for this great state of ours—the State of North Dakota.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for every courtesy. Thank you, Mr. Wolf, for your many gestures of assistance. I would not be fair if I sat down without mentioning the many times during the session when I had questions to ask of Mr. Wolf and he would always come forward and with a word straight from the shoulder, help me out, straighten me out in a parliamentary situation. For that, I thank you, Mr. Wolf, most sincerely."

Rep. Fitch: "The Chair will recognize Mr. Winge from Barnes County for the purpose of recognizing Mr. Saugstad, assistant majority floor leader."

Rep. Winge: "Mr. Chairman and members of this House: We have come to the point where we are recognizing the ability of the men that have been in the position of leadership during this session. I, and many others, have had the pleasure of serving in the House during the '59 session and now during this sixtieth of serving with Rep. Saugstad.

"He has served here, I believe, five sessions, and served in various positions. He has always done a good job in his leadership, all the way through.

"I think we must recognize that most of the words coming from that particular seat during the '59 session were words that we did not have to pull out our pocket dictionary to understand. I think we all appreciate that.

"Now, on behalf of everyone here, Rep. Saugstad, I would like to present you with this gift."

Rep. Saugstad: "Thank you, Rep. Winge.

"Mr. Chairman, and members. You have my heartfelt gratitude for this opportunity of being able to serve in this 1961 session with you. I thank you from the bottom of my heart."

Rep. Fitch: "The Chair recognizes the representative from the Number One county — the distinguished Rep. Halcrow from Pembina County — for the purpose of recognizing the services of the assistant minority floor leader, Rep. Solberg."

Rep. Halcrow. "Mr. Chairman, members of this Assembly and friends:

"It is indeed an honor and a privilege that I have this evening to have the opportunity of presenting this gift to Rep. Oscar Solberg.

"Oscar has served in this House, as I understand, for eleven sessions — since 1949. Oscar is about the same age as I am. His biography says he graduated from the Bisbee High School.

"I don't know any member of this assembly who deserves recognition more than Oscar. Not only for himself but for the manner in which he has served. He has done an excellent job.

"I had the privilege of serving on a sub-committee on which Rep. Solberg was the Chairman. His work was outstanding. One of the things about Oscar is that he is a man of few words. But what words he does say and I think everybody is impressed when he does speak.

"So again I say it is an honor and privilege for me to present this gift to you, Oscar, as a token of appreciation from all of us in this assembly to you."

Rep. Solberg: "Mr. Speaker and members of this Assembly.

"This little ceremony means one thing, that our session has only a few hours left to run and we will soon adjourn sine die and be on our way home. At this time, I am sure, there will be many thoughts running through our minds and our hearts. We are all anxious to get home to our family and to the friends in our home community. But I think we are also reluctant to break the ties of friendship that have been formed in these sixty days that we have served here. Then there is also a sobering thought that this is perhaps the last time we will be together so at this time I want to offer thanks to you all for this gift and also offer thanks to those who have so ably conducted this session.

"First I want to give thanks to Mr. Speaker for your kindness and consideration. You have run this House in a businesslike way that goes to making this a successful session.

"Next, I want to thank my neighbor from the north, Jerry Stair, Ruth Smith and the rest of the desk force and all the employees for making this session a pleasant one.

"I want to thank the majority leaders, Ben Wolf and Stanley Saugstad, for their fairness and consideration. There have been many occasions when you could have used your numerical superiority to embarrass the minority but you have not done so.

"To the members of this Assembly, I leave here with nothing but friendship in my heart for you. I wish you well and I wish you a safe journey home and most of all, I hope our paths will cross again. I thank you all from the bottom of my heart for this wonderful gift."

Rep. Fitch: "Now the Chair will recognize the distinguished gentleman from Morton County — the man that knows where he is going and is on his way — Mr. Karabensh, to recognize the services of our distinguished Speaker of this House."

Rep. Karabensh: "Mr. Chairman, Mr. Speaker, members of this Assembly:

"First, let me thank you, Mr. Chairman, for that fine introduction.

"Mr. Speaker, sixty days ago when you were selected as Speaker of this Assembly, you knew there was a lot of hard work connected with it. You accepted that. You have had a lot of difficult decisions to make and you have done that very well.

"Sometimes before that the Speaker had an easy job — just to sit here and rule me out of order, sometimes, but as time went on, I found-out that you were very fair — you were just. You have done a good job.

"So after considering all of that, I found you really didn't have such an easy job!

"I want to say to the members of this Assembly who selected you as our Speaker and leader during this session, that you certainly have proven to them that they can feel justly proud of their decision that they made. I think we all want to take part in that — myself and all the minority group.

"We appreciate all your efforts in putting up with all of us during this session and we have a little token that we hope you will enjoy for many years to come.

"Another thing that I would like to say here, is that with your experience and your leadership that you have proven to the House here that this is the kind of leadership that makes the State of North Dakota, and our country, so great. I hope you will continue in your leadership."

Speaker Brown: "Mr. Chairman, Mr. Karabensh and my fellow members: Only in a country such as this could we have such a meeting as is going on here, where men have a free choice and a free will to decide to recognize their fellow man.

"It isn't often that I am at a loss for words but I will tell you of a remark made to me by our majority floor leader the night my party selected me as the Speaker for this session. Ben Wolf, who is a very sincere and humble individual—and he said he wanted to admonish me with this thought—that with each honor comes heavy responsibility. As we approach the end of this 37th legislative session more and more do I realize the full impact of those words of wisdom from our good friend, Ben Wolf, because as I have sat up here looking down upon this body of Americans, more and more do I realize the full responsibility that each of us as American citizens, must assume if we are going to continue in our free way of life.

"This is one time when the Speaker usurps the prerogative of the members to speak. And I might inject a little humor here. The first day when I was coming up here to preside, a Bismarck lady stopped me and said, 'Mr. Brown, you had better take good care of your voice because you are going to do a lot of speaking now.'

"I hoped I could stay down on the floor for this occasion, and to make these remarks there because that is where I enjoyed my legislative experience so much—rubbing shoulders with each of you individuals who come here as direct representatives of your constituents—the American people—to meet in this legislative body under parliamentary procedure and to come to the conclusions that will give to the people of North Dakota the very best type of government, in order that we may preserve our freedom.

"First, I would like to pay particular respect to the minority party in this legislative session. I have had the privilege of serving with many of the minority, particularly the leaders, in the five sessions that I have been here. The minority party can be a terrific nuisance, but to these gentlemen, and one lady, I certainly want to compliment them for the solid, sane and respectable approach that they have used in this session of the legislature. We have had very many emotional problems come before this House and I can say that not once in the 59 days have I ever had to call anyone to task, or rule anyone out of order, for misconduct. I can truthfully say to the minority that their word has been as good as their bond. No emphasis is placed on anyone of you—you members of the minority may all go home and all leave that in your will.

"To the majority members who are my colleagues, you have given me the highest honor that can come to any member of this body. I am very grateful for the respect, for the confidence and trust that you have placed in me. I sincerely hope as we adjourn sine die that you will leave this chamber feeling safe in your thoughts that the trust and confidence you placed in me was well placed. And in my heart will go, with a prayer to God Almighty, that I can always deserve this trust and confidence from every member of this House.

In conclusion there is one thought given to me when I was a member of the basketball team that won 22 games and lost the championship game. I was feeling very bad

and my old gray-haired American History teacher said to me 'Fay, remember this — when the one great scorer comes to write against you, he writes not whether you won or lost but how you played the game.'

"To each of you — God bless you and my great thanks to you for this remembrance.

"I would like to pay respect to the desk force now.

"I don't know whether any of you realize the great responsibility of the Chief Clerk. In a sense the Chief Clerk is the operation between the Speaker and the floor. This Jerry Stair is a terrific individual. He is a most sincere, conscientious, hard-working person and I am happy to call him my friend.

"To Ruth Smith — the veteran of the North Dakota legislature — Ruth misses nothing. She knows the cares of each member and their family and the heartaches of each one. To you, Ruth — God bless you and may God reward you with the greatest blessings."

"I want to pay my respects to my desk force.

"And one other person — my secretary, Florence Nemer, who has been secretary to the last five speakers. To tell you how efficient Florence is she even called me at 11:00 the other night to be sure I would be at a meeting the next day.

"There is another lady who has been a wonderful assistance to me and that is Shirley Lee. She is the messenger to the Governor and when Florence was absent, she took over — To Florence and Shirley, my heartfelt thanks. Unfortunately as Speaker you don't have the contacts with all the other employees, such as with the ones I have mentioned.

"But I could stand up here for the next half hour and pay compliments to the stenographers, the committee clerks, the pages, the floor clerks, the superintendent of employees, the doorkeepers and the people in the mailing room and that unfortunate clerk who I am sure, no one knows, who is behind the door and sends out the journals.

"To all of you employees — may I say that you are the best force that I have ever seen — from the bottom of my heart, I appreciate it."

Rep. Fitch: "Now, members of the House, we come to that point in the program that reminds me of my daughter at Christmas time — after the packages had been distributed, she would say 'Daddy, what did you get?'"

"So now let's open the packages and see what you got."
