FIRST DAY

Bismarck, January 3, 1967

The member I wish to nominate has served in this assembly continuously since 1957. His special talents have benefitted the legislature on many occasions. My nominee is personable, intelligent and honest. I believe he has the necessary ability to maintain harmony and to be fair to every member of this assembly.

My friend was an outstanding scholar and athlete at Fargo Central High School and the University of North Dakota later serving

as a Lieutenant (JG) in the United States Navy during World War II. My colleague is a trust officer of the First National Bank and Trust Company of Fargo.

Our candidate has a lovely and distinguished wife, Louise; three sons, Gordon, Bruce and Archie; and two daughters, Carolyn and Jane.

Fellow Representatives it is a singular honor for me to place in nomination from the 21st Legislative District for Speaker of this House, Gordon S. Aamoth.

Rep. Link: Mr. Chief Clerk: The greatest tribute that this body can bestow on one of its member is to elect that member to the office of Speaker of the House. Speaker Aamoth: Chief Justice Teigen, former Speakers — Mr. Brown, Mr. Saugstad, Mr. Link and fellow members of this the 40th Legislative Assembly. As I stand here before you today, one cannot help but reflect back ten years to the time that Ken Fitch, one of the truly outstanding legislators ever to sit in this hall, led our Cass delegation to its seats. As though it were yesterday, I remember my enthusiasm as a new member and the tremendous thrill of being a small part of the great process of this, The North Dakota State Legislature. The amazing thing about it is that today as we start another session, that some old thrilling feeling returns—that fierce determination to face up to our state's problems—that anxious desire to resolve these problems through friendly, and sometimes bitter meetings and debate—what do the next 60 days hold for us?

The answer to this question—lies with each of us as an individual, regardless of our party affiliation, our geographical backgrounds, or the number of votes that were cast behind our names at the ballot box, what really matters—is what's in our hearts and minds—our sense of duty, of fairness, and our degree of understanding and conduct—that's what will determine our actions and accomplishments during the next 60 days.

If I were to be granted two wishes at the start of this session, the first would be that each of us could free ourselves of his provincial traditions in approaching legislation and that our combined judgments would be free to make decisions on the basis of what is best for this whole State of North Dakota, and secondly would be that I be granted the moral strength and courage to make every decision a "right and fair one". My past experiences here, has made me somewhat of a realist, and I recognize that this approach to state legislative matters is just a dream to be realized by future sessions as time goes on.

Looking out over this body, let me tell you how proud I am to be counted as one with each of you, as your presiding officer I will never question your sincerity, your forcefulness, or your motives, as I know that each of you are men and women of character and integrity—I ask only of your understanding in my efforts to carry out the duties of the Speakership, recognizing the tremendous responsibilities you have given me, and also that man is subject to human errors, I promise you that any errors committed in "The Chair" will be honest errors for which I will suffer and ask your compassion.

If my memory serves me well, I feel safe in saying that no session has ever had as many new members as this one. To those of you that are here for the first time, let me say to you—you are about to embark upon one of the most rewarding experiences of your lives—service to your fellow man and service to your government. Surely, you will know frustration, defeat as well as the exhilarations of hard fought victory.

As the days fly by, and the picture comes more clearly into focus—all the disappointments are washed away and you will leave this lovely old chamber with a good solid feeling of accomplishment and thankful to your people back home for having given you the privilege to have represented and served them. To you older members, may I tactfully suggest that you go out of your way and assist and help every new member: your helpful suggestions and guidance will be appreciated and remembered.

Because of the great division in this House, it is imperative that we in the majority extend every consideration to members of the minority. In a democracy, the right of the minority is always to be heard, but in the final analysis it is always true that the majority shall rule. The Chair assures the minority that this rule

shall always be adhered to. Let us always remember that the pendulum of power continually swings under our form of government. Also, let us remember well that the people of this great state will be watching us closely during the next 60 days. With the grace of God, and with your help, may our deliberations result in legislation that is productive and fruitful for all of our people.

I thank Don Halcrow and Ken Tweten for their kind endorsement and Oscar Solberg for his motion.

With humble gratitude, from the bottom of my heart, on behalf of my family and myself, I thank you all for this honor.

So Ruth Smith was declared elected as Desk Reporter and was sworn in by the Speaker.

The Speaker announced that the next order of business would be on the election of a Sergeant-at-Arms.

Rep. Boustead: "Mr. Speaker. I would like to nominate a man who as a result of his experience and background can add a great deal to the dignity of the eminent assembly.

JOINT SESSION

Governor Guy:

"Ladies and gentlemen of this 40th Legislative Session, members of the Executive Branch of State Government, members of the Judicial Branch of State Government, ladies and gentlemen:

We are gathered again to welcome new members of our three branches of government and to begin a new legislative session.

I see many strange new faces before me this afternoon. This is not your fault, or mine; it's just that we have not been attending the same rallies.

We have great reason for pride as North Dakotans. We are fortunate for what we have. But we may be even more fortunate for what we do not have.

We do not have air pollution.

We do not have urban transportation glut.

We do not have civil disobedience in our streets or on our college campuses.

We do not have wide spread water pollution.

We do not have an environment of constant crime.

We do not have overpowering fears and counter fears of racism.

Yes, we can be glad that North Dakota has not, as of now, been infected by some of this nation's most aching problems.

But what are some of the things we do have?

We do have the most agricultural state in the nation, leading all other states in the production of hard red spring wheat, durum, rye, flaxseed, malting barley and sunflower seeds.

We do raise more wild ducks and have the finest goose shooting in this country.

We do have the finest highway network of any state.

No other state has as much national defense power located within its borders as does North Dakota's two air bases and its missile complex.

Our state makes a greater total effort in support of education than nearly all other states. We have more state-supported colleges per capita than any other state.

We have a fabulous resource in weather, history, scenery and roads to attract the traveling and vacationing public. Outdoor recreation from hunting to sailing is on the increase. Lake Sakajawea

is the largest and most interesting body of water between the Great Lakes and Puget Sound. It is an asset we have hardly recognized.

The rapid growth of large scale electric generation in four years has already established us as the electric power center of the Upper Midwest.

The resources of lignite coal, crude oil and salt are abundant component parts of the chemical industries of the future.

A bus assembly plant at Pembina, a sugar beet refinery at Drayton, a potato flaking plant at Grafton, a cheese plant at Strasburg are examples of the capabilities of our small towns to successfully support more job opportunities.

When the American Legion, the Elks, the American Medical Association, the National Stockmen's Association, and others, call upon North Dakotans to lead their national organizations, we can be confident that there is a quality of leadership present here that might not be indicated by our relatively small population.

North Dakota is moving. It is changing. But we must do more than act as elected observers of change. We need to see that North Dakota continues to move forward within the national economy. We need to keep our state and local government adapted to change. We should try to influence or lead change in the most productive and satisfying direction.

And in all that we do, we must always keep in mind that we are a part of America and we cannot isolate ourselves or ignore America's problems. Rather, we have a profound obligation to recognize the problems of this great nation and to shoulder our share of the load in solving these problems.

I hope that this session of the legislature will take its place in history as a session which will recognize our changing times. I hope you will make those changes which will strengthen our state and local government in the federal system. I propose that we do it together in a manner in which political philosophy will be used only for its highest purpose and that narrow jealousy not arise as to who gets credit for what.

We often take for granted that our system of democratic, representative government is a superior form of government and therefore will be self-perpetuating and will continue on forever. This, of course, is not necessarily going to be so. Our system of government is but a continuing precarious experiment which is never completed. Always new ingredients and new experimenters are being involved. Because we did not recognize or respond adequately to human need, we have come disastrously close to complete failure in the past, and even more serious consequences could befall American generations of the future.

Ironically, the great strength of our constitutional, representative, democratic form of government is its built-in resistance to change. Yet, it is this very strength — resistance to change — that could be our government's greatest weakness, a weakness sufficient to slowly bring it down. For every fresh soul who would prepare for the future, there are a hundred who cling blindly to the past.

Your task in this session will be fascinating. There is so much to do. But never lose sight of the fact that just as life itself should be fun and satisfying, so should the next sixty days be days of hard work liberally interspersed with great moments of fun and warm fellowship.

I need to know you better. I welcome the friendship and advice from you new legislators as well as from you veteran lawmakers who are back for this session.

You are meeting in one of the most beautiful Capitols in one of the most fortunate states of the union. Let us do our best to measure up in performance.

Today, as we meet in this 40th Legislative Session, we are making history. History is not a series of disjointed events, but the flow of activity from one minute to the next. This flow of activity in North Dakota, if measured from territorial days, could be called our heritage.

A study of our heritage is more than viewing a collection of arrowheads or frontier rifles. Our heritage is being formed at this very moment. We need to do more than simply preserve a few artifacts from the past. Our heritage must be interpreted in such a way that the student or adult or tourist can understand the cause and effect of things that have taken place to make this great state what it is. Our children need to be impressed by our North Dakota heritage.

We need to include the life of the ethnic groups who immigrated here with their colorful costumes and different customs. We need to trace the struggle of the North Dakota Indian as he fought to preserve his culture in the tide of settlement by the white man.

We need to study the development over the years of our natural resources such as crude oil, lignite coal, water and the rest. We should show the early influence of our wild west with its colorful characters such as the Marquis de Mores, General Custer, and Theodore Roosevelt. The most agricultural state in the nation should surely trace the development of this great industry from the longhorn to the fancy purebred, from the horse to the tractor.

This state needs a place to display and tell the story of the development of the arts in North Dakota.

In short, we need a Heritage Center. We need a Heritage Center that can be so designed as to be a major educational facility for students of all ages. We could incorporate those things which would attract tourists and our own adult population to come and view and better understand North Dakota as it has been affected by events of the past.

I urge you to continue the Heritage Commission. I would like to have you strengthen the mission of the Heritage Commission in seeking non-governmental revenue to construct a Heritage Center building on the Capitol grounds. An authorization by this legislature for such a building without appropriation would be very helpful. Even an appropriation for architectural design of such a building might make it easier to approach non-governmental sources of funds. I emphasize that I am not asking this session for tax revenues to build a Heritage Center.

In 1961, the Province of Manitoba helped us observe a milestone in our heritage when we celebrated the Dakota Territory Centennial at the Peace Garden. In 1967, Canada will celebrate its Canadian Centennial. I recommend that this legislature make the appropriate arrangements for us to host our Manitoba friends at an observance in the Peace Garden in the summer of 1967.

I think it is important that states and nations observe, study and honor their heritage. The inspiration that can come to each generation as it becomes aware of the accomplishments of the past would be invaluable.

I extend to you my best wishes as this session, day by day, takes its place in our state's heritage.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE TO
40TH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY 1967

Part I

Ladies and gentlemen of this 40th Legislative Assembly, officers of the administrative and judicial branches of our state government, we are met again to ponder how we as free people can most effectively govern ourselves. I am one who believes deeply that local and state government can and must be strong in our federal system of self-government.

There is a constant vacuum of human need in this country. This human need is met in many ways. It is met in part by our free enterprise economy, by private organizations, by our churches, by individuals, and by state and local government or by the federal government.

There are those who say our federal government is moving too deeply into this vacuum of human need and in so doing is displacing local and state government and private efforts.

Is it true that the federal government is encroaching upon the responsibilities of local and state government?

Has the federal government ever taken over responsibilities that the state and local governments were effectively carrying out?

Are state and local governments becoming weaker because of the federal government?

Some would say yes, but I would say no. If state and local government are becoming weaker, it is because we the people are causing them to be weaker in our federal system.

The most recent analysis of our Upper Midwest state and local government has been made by the prestigious Committee for Economic Development consisting of 200 trustees, most of them executives in major corporations, but including 20 university presidents. This non-partisan, non-political committee issued a report in July 1966 which I recommend to you.

One of the trustees of the Committee for Economic Development, John A. Perkins, President of the University of Delaware, recently spoke in St. Paul, giving facts and figures about our Upper Midwest region which should shake us from our apathy. He contends that Minnesota, Wisconsin, North Dakota, South Dakota and Montana are some of the worst culprits when it comes to too much government at a high price tag.

President Perkins cites these figures: The five-state region has less than 5% of the nation's population and less than 12% of its land area; but it has 20% of the nation's units of local government. He further states that North Dakota is exceeded by only one other state in having so many units of local government in relation to its number of people. We have 209 people for each of our 3,028 units of local government. This dubious distinction adversely affects our taxpayers' pocketbooks.

North Dakotans pay \$474 per capita for local taxes. This means that North Dakota heads all of the states in the percentage of its total per capita income paid to state and local government treasuries. We pay 17.6% compared to the national average of only 12.9%.

Perkins further observes facts that we are unwilling to admit ourselves. He says that everywhere local government jurisdictions overlap one above another so that there is no single level of local government. Instead, there are many levels competing with each other for tax dollars, preventing the creation of strong local units

with broad authority to provide general purpose government and to receive and utilize state grants or home rule.

He asks the question why we preserve archaic government when we modernize every other aspect of our lives. Dr. Perkins deplors the fact that population drains away from the great open areas steadily and persistently decade after decade. He points out that the population migration may be reversed before too long, but he doubts it will happen until the low population states update their governmental systems.

I say that President Perkins is right. The time is now to buckle down and modernize our local government through non-partisan and non-political cooperation beginning in this legislature.

STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT CAN AND MUST PLAY A STRONG ROLE IN OUR FEDERAL SYSTEM OF GOVERNMENT. I would like to use this as the central theme of my recommendations to you in this session. We need to examine at least the following major factors in this session to see where we can strengthen our state and local governments:

- *State Constitutional revision.
- *State and local government reorganization.
- *Greater freedom of action for local government.
- *Reformation of the system of government revenue.
- *Greater use of interstate and regional cooperation.
- *Comprehensive local and state planning.

STATE GOVERNMENT REORGANIZATION

In previous messages to the Legislative Assembly, I have cited the 1942 reorganization study as a valuable guide in streamlining state government in North Dakota. I recommend it again to you as a basic document for state government reorganization. The greatest gains in state government reorganization in the history of our state were provided by the last session of the legislature. There is a great opportunity to continue this progress in this session. First term legislators would find the 1942 reorganization pamphlet fascinating reading.

It is time to move toward greater economy and efficiency in state government by merging the large number of related committees, commissions, bureaus and agencies into more coordinated and responsible units of government.

All agricultural-related committees, commissions, boards and agencies should be brought together under the Department of Agriculture. Surely the missions of such agencies as the State Seed Department, the Livestock Sanitary Board, the Poultry Improvement Board, the Dairy Products Promotion Commission and the Wheat Commission should be considered as governmental functions which could be carried out as divisions under the State Department of Agriculture.

A Department of Conservation should be established, with an administrator appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Senate. Some departments which should be considered for divisions in a Department of Conservation are the Game and Fish Department, the Water Commission, the Outdoor Recreation Agency, the State Forester, the Park Service, and the Soil Conservation Committee.

The State Tax Department should be given full responsibility for collecting taxes. The tax collecting duties now in the offices of the State Auditor and the State Treasurer should be transferred to the Tax Department. The Motor Vehicle Department should be made a division of the Tax Department. These steps would result in greater efficiency through centralized data processing and elimination of overlapping staff duties.

The State School at Grafton and the Tuberculosis Sanatorium and Retarded Children's Center at San Haven should be transferred to

the Department of Health where professional guidance in matters of mental retardation and tuberculosis already exists.

A new radio communications center should be established at Fraire Barracks so that the emergency requirements of the Highway Patrol, the National Guard, Civil Defense, and other state radio systems can be coordinated. The communications requirements of state agencies have been under study this past year. This study indicates that coordination is badly needed.

I recommend that the Legislative Research Committee receive authorization to study the consolidation of the numerous state regulatory functions into a Department of Commerce and to study the establishment of a Department of Business Operations to manage the Bank of North Dakota and the North Dakota Mill and Elevator.

STATE CONSTITUTIONAL REVISION

Our state and local government can be no stronger than North Dakota's own Constitution permits it to be. North Dakota's outdated Constitution was designed to meet problems of an era long past. It does not permit our state and local government to play a role of strength in the federal system of today.

More than 77 years ago, a group of men only, for women were not allowed to vote at that time, labored for 44 days to bring forth our original Constitution. Many of those men were transplanted easterners who were-trying to apply their knowledge of eastern state government to western territorial conditions. Many of them were poorly educated and very few had any experience with state government. Certainly, there was no experience to be had in North Dakota state government because North Dakota was not yet a state.

Today we have men and women with a much higher level of education viewing our Constitution in the light of 77 years of experience as a state. Obviously, we are now in a stronger position to shape our own destiny than we have ever been in our state's history.

I commend the Constitutional Revision Committee for its work these past four years. Even though the first revised section of the Constitution was not accepted by the voters in the 1966 General Election, I recommend that the second revised section of our Constitution be reviewed in this session and that Constitutional revision proposals be submitted to the voters at the next General Election. The Constitutional Revision Committee should be continued and those revised sections defeated in the last election should be re-studied and honed down for submission to the 1969 legislature.

In order that our citizens be made aware of what changes are proposed in revising our Constitution, I recommend that an appropriation be made to support a program in which factual information can be made available to the public.

There will be talk of the possibility of establishing a Constitutional Convention. A Constitutional Convention does have certain advantages. However, a Constitutional Convention in North Dakota would have disadvantages which would outweigh the advantages.

I believe the legislature itself provides the necessary broad base of economic, social and political interest which should be applied to Constitutional revision. I believe that legislators can approach Constitutional revision in the practical manner necessary to make our Constitution an instrument of strength in guiding and backing up statutory change.

I recommend to you that the legislature continue to receive proposals from a Constitutional Committee and, in effect, act as a Constitutional Convention in reviewing and amending proposals which would ultimately be submitted to the voters.

Constitutional revision is sweeping across our nation. Most states are recognizing that their state constitutions are limiting the state from being effective in what has become a highly complex relationship between the state and the federal government. Constitutional revision could well be one of the most important legislative acts of this session.

STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANIZATION LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANIZATION

Even though North Dakota remains predominantly agricultural, we are experiencing the same problems plaguing other states in the nation resulting from shifting population patterns. While thousands of our citizens are leaving the rural areas, our cities are growing rapidly. Consequently, the demands on our 3000 political subdivisions have changed to reflect the new population picture. It is time we admitted that the governmental structure created for the horse and buggy before the turn of the century is too costly and too inefficient for the 1960's.

The traditional rectangular concept of a township, first laid out under the Northwest Ordinance of 1787, must be traded in for a new model township. Since education remains the most important service of local government, the new township should coincide with the exact size and shape of our school district, no matter how large or how small that school district may be.

A school board would operate the school and a township board would operate the township, but their duties would tend to complement each other more than is possible under the present structure. The township services, such as property assessing, road and bridge building, graveling and snow removal, would be performed to support the most important local government responsibility, that of education.

County governments should be encouraged to consolidate. Improved communications, better highways, and automobiles have made it possible to efficiently operate larger county governmental units. In fact, the increasing cost of higher quality services demands a governmental unit able to keep the costs within the limitations of present tax revenues. Recently the legislature has been reapportioned without regard to county boundaries. This has made it less justifiable to keep intact counties with low population and low assessed valuation. Unless we encourage by law the consolidation of some counties, we will be continuing excessive tax burdens on residents of those smaller counties.

Each legislative session is confronted with requests to create new taxing districts. In past years, we accumulated numerous public taxing authorities. These authorities tend to overlap and encumber the operations of local government. Instead of creating new taxing districts, we should seek ways of reducing those that we presently have. We should look at the capabilities of the existing taxing districts before creating new ones. We should also recognize the need for modernization of local government.

Modernization of local government requires a willingness on the part of the Legislative Assembly to trust the good judgment and common sense of local officials. At the present time, our political subdivisions are mired down in statutory detail, carefully written to eliminate the need for wisdom or responsibility at the local level. This is comparable in every way to much of the "red tape" in federal programs.

Just as an example, I would like to cite the scores of mill levy authorizations that have been granted through the years to counties, school districts, townships, and municipalities. Because local officials are not permitted any discretion in planning local expenditures, many low-priority programs have excess funds while other

needs go unmet. In addition, the records required of county auditors and county treasurers are complicated and cumbersome.

If we expect local government to be efficient and effective, we must permit it to be so. To deny it this opportunity is to deny it a role in our changing society.

REFORMATION OF THE SYSTEM OF GOVERNMENT REVENUE

I have presented you a balanced budget for the coming biennium. This budget contains a ten million dollar operating balance which I believe to be prudent for proper fiscal operation of state government. The budget I have submitted to you does not call for increases of traditional tax rates. I believe that North Dakota citizens now bearing their fair share of taxes to support local and state government should not be asked to pay more. I must emphasize, however, that there is a real need to plug loopholes and to bring greater equity in sacrifice between taxpayers through tax reform. I would regard tax reform to be absolutely essential in any effort which would increase tax revenues to state or local government. Even though you choose not to increase total tax revenues, tax reform is highly desirable.

Supposedly, each two years you as representatives of the people meet in legislative assembly to attune our government to the changing economic, social and political conditions of our state. Unfortunately for the integrity of our political system, the courage to tackle tax problems and bring about needed change is very rare. It is considered politically smart to avoid tax matters.

As you proceed to correct inequities, vested interests will bring powerful pressure to bear in order to protect their own personal tax advantages. Rather than admit they are protecting their favorite loopholes, these vested interests will oppose tax reform by resorting to the cries that tax change is going to create hardship on the low-income taxpayer, or that tax reform is being shoved down the taxpayer's throat. We must have the courage to represent all of the taxpayers of North Dakota and not just a powerful few.

PLUGGING INCOME TAX LOOPHOLES

Isn't it strange that some of North Dakota's wealthiest people have never paid a state income tax?

Over a million dollars in income taxes are not paid each year by a small class of North Dakota citizens who receive much of their income in the form of dividends from corporations doing business in North Dakota. When North Dakota corporations, such as banks and automobile dealerships, pay their big stockholders in dividends, this income is exempt by a special provision in the North Dakota income tax law. The vast majority of taxpayers do not have the opportunity to claim exempt income and must pay an income tax on all of their income. This loophole should be closed so that all taxpayers are treated equally.

The faithful taxpayers of our state income tax are carrying an extra burden of over \$400,000 a year simply because evaders and transient workers are able to escape the North Dakota income tax. Withholding of taxes would assure every taxpayer that those who come to our state to take North Dakota jobs are at least paying their share of North Dakota's taxes.

I still believe that most taxpayers would prefer to have the option of filing a simplified state income tax return based on the federal tax return. This type of a return would eliminate many of the confusing conflicts that presently exist between state and federal income tax rules and regulations. Not only would this make income tax filing simpler for the taxpayer but it would make auditing and detection easier for the Tax Department. Less evasion means a better break for the citizen who does pay his taxes.

SALES TAX CONSIDERATIONS

Even though the sales tax has been with us for many years, it still contains some basic inequities that deserve consideration. While it is true that almost everyone pays a sales tax on purchases for everyday living, there are many others who pay a sales tax as an "occupational" tax.

Those who use tractors, combines, bulldozers, commercial equipment, and similar items necessary for their particular industry or occupation find that the sales tax is imposed on their purchases.

Some sales are taxed while others are not . . . and probably never will be. It appears to be somewhat dangerous to impose a sales tax on the transactions of industries engaged in molding public opinion. Any effort to tax advertising will no doubt be met with the accusation that you are ramming a tax program down the taxpayer's throat. And yet, would a sales tax on advertising be any different than the sales tax now levied on the repair of machinery?

There will be some whose imagination in tax reform will extend only to raising the sales tax rate. There will be some whose enthusiasm for raising the sales tax will be in direct proportion to the special tax advantages they themselves enjoy under the present structure. There will be some who will oppose "pay as you go" withholding of income taxes while they advocate higher and higher sales taxes—never admitting that a sales tax is nothing but a flat rate withheld income tax on the low-income taxpayer.

On the basis of reliable computations, we find that a family of four with an adjusted gross income of \$2500 per year pays just about 2% of its income in sales tax under our present rate. The same family, if it had an income of \$15,000, would pay less than 1% of its income in sales tax. This should be proof enough that the impact of the sales tax should be minimized in our present tax structure if we are concerned with equality of sacrifice.

The sales tax is acceptable in this day and age only if it is adequately balanced with other sources of state revenue; if the rate is kept low; or if it replaces a more objectionable tax such as the personal property tax. If this session raises the sales tax for general fund purposes, it could be closing the door to any repeal of the personal property tax in the future.

I cannot look with favor on any proposal to continue to increase the regressivity of our total tax structure by taking the easiest and simplest route to new revenue.

PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX

The personal property tax, by its nature and its administration, is the most unfair, the most objectionable tax in our entire tax structure.

It is impossible to assess fairly. It is costly to administer and difficult to enforce. It has no relationship to ability to pay or to benefits received. It retards economic growth and discourages the investment necessary to create new jobs. In addition to all of these inequities, it is becoming more indefensible as each session grants special exemptions to special groups.

The personal property tax came in a period of history when most citizens owned property to make a living. However, as professionalism moved into the economy, we find that more and more people are blessed with prosperity without owning any property. Consequently, today the personal property tax has become a great burden to some while it does not affect others.

Some of our citizens are called upon to pay personal property taxes and use taxes on the tools and materials of their trade before they even have an income on which to pay an income tax. North Dakota penalizes the person who must invest in equipment or inventory to earn a living. North Dakota penalizes its manufacturers

and processors, thereby discouraging new industry by the personal property tax levy.

A leading commercial newspaper carried an advertisement by the State of New York recently in which that state pointed out the advantages of industry locating in New York where no personal property tax was levied. New York expressed pride in the fact that its major tax on industry was based on income.

The farmer and storekeeper are treated as second class citizens. They are required to pay personal property taxes on livestock, machinery and inventory simply because they have the courage to make capital investment in our state even though such an investment might not result in income.

The professional person, such as the teacher, the lawyer, the doctor, or the salesman, is not accorded the privilege of paying personal property taxes or use taxes because they usually don't make large investments in tangible property to obtain a livelihood.

Since a high percentage of personal property taxes goes to support local education, we find more of the tax burden for education being carried by farmers, storekeepers and manufacturers than by their professional friends.

REAL ESTATE TAX ADMINISTRATION

Over one-third of the taxes collected by the state and local governments are taxes levied on real property. We must recognize the significance of real property taxes and the large role they play in the tax structure.

A joint resolution should be considered by this session to offer a constitutional amendment repealing the 4-mill state levy authorized for general fund revenue. While the Board of Equalization has been levying only two of these four mills, the State should acknowledge that property taxation is the exclusive domain of local government.

Every knowledgeable citizen recognizes that there are numerous inequities in the assessment of real estate from township to township, from county to county. These inequities are causing many of our real property owners to carry millions of dollars in tax burdens each year which rightfully should be the responsibility of other real property owners. While some will dispute the results of three years of sales sampling under the Tax Department's sales assessment ratio studies, the studies remain the best information available to state government on the subject. The sales ratio studies clearly indicate a need for a county assessing system. We should not willingly stumble along with primitive administration of our largest single tax. Failure of the Legislative and Executive branches of government to engage in tax reform will encourage challenges of our tax system in court.

While it will require some deliberation, tax reform presents no real problem for this session. Most of this legislation has been written and requires only minor changes for enactment. Perhaps tax reform proposals should be isolated in separate bills. This would allow each tax proposal to stand or fall on its merits. While this would not permit an examination of the inter-relationship of several tax proposals combined in a reform program, it would be preferable to losing an entire tax reform program because of criticism of its individual components.

IMPROVING FEDERAL GRANT SYSTEMS

In recent months, there has been growing interest in a revenue-sharing program in which the federal government would give the states a share of its revenues. Several proposals have been under consideration. A return of a mere percentage of the federal income taxes paid by North Dakota citizens would certainly short-change North Dakota. Since the major corporations that operate in our

state have out-of-state locations, we would not get proper credit for the corporate executives and employees located in another state. The revenue-sharing proposals must recognize certain equalization factors that properly reflect the problems of population, geography, and taxing capacity. This is not possible under a flat percentage refund.

GREATHER USE OF INTERSTATE AND REGIONAL COOPERATION

There was a time when buffalo roamed these plains without regard to highways, bridges, fences, towns and private property. The Indian tribes moved away from their problems when they could and knew no boundaries in their travels. Today the surveyor's rod has set up political subdivisions to cope with problems. This has worked well for many problems, but there are problems which are so large that they are not easily solved except when political subdivisions join together to do those things which none of them can do alone.

Today the federal government looms large to fill the vacuum of human need when the individual states cannot or will not act alone. If we believe that this vacuum should be filled by state and local government rather than the federal government, we need to minimize our state boundaries and maximize our interstate and regional cooperation. Cooperation can take many forms and attack many problems.

The Board of Higher Education deserves commendation for its success in establishing the " Fargo-Moorhead Common Market for Higher Education." I suggest you invite the adjacent state legislatures to approve continuing efforts to establish reciprocity in higher education.

Educational television does not respect state lines. I urge you to encourage the Board of Higher Education and our Department of Public Instruction to cooperate with adjacent states in educational television development and refinement.

Comprehensive water resource development requires multi-state effort. We should support the formation of a Missouri Basin Commission and the Souris-Red-Rainy River Basins Commission. Basin-wide water resource planning can take place in these two major river basins using strong state participation for the first time under the river basin commission concept.

The interstate compact is a device which has long been used successfully by North Dakota. The Interstate Oil Compact is an example of a successful agreement between states. I urge you to approve several new compacts in this session.

The first is the Education Compact, which seeks to research problems in education from the states' viewpoint.

Another new proposal is the Interstate Compact on the Mentally Disordered Offender. We do not have, nor can we afford, adequate treatment facilities in North Dakota for such cases. This compact would permit us to contract with other states to care for those rare cases where psychiatric treatment of a criminal offender could be successful.

A badly needed compact which would benefit our state is the compact for taxing interstate business and industry. If we as states do not act swiftly and decisively to eliminate the tax abuse which often faces interstate businesses, we will surely find Congress taking away from the states the right to tax interstate business.

I recommend approval of a driver license compact. This would prevent the issuance of a driver license to an applicant whose driving privilege had been withdrawn in another party state.

Interstate cooperation in tourism pays dividends. We have been cooperating with Nebraska, South Dakota, Wyoming and Montana in a five-state tourist loop. This effort has been underfinanced

and only mildly successful. I believe this multi-state effort in tourism development deserves greater financial support.

In the course of executing the laws and regulations of our state, we often find that they do not coincide with the laws and regulations of our sister states. These differences often result in discrimination, undue burdens on interstate commerce and unnecessary red tape. Many of these differences can be resolved simply through a better method of communication.

To deal with present and future interstate problems with our neighbor states, I propose a Board of Interstate Relations composed of the Governor, the Secretary of State and the Attorney General. This Board should be empowered to meet with its counterpart in an adjacent state to discuss interstate difficulties which might be resolved by administrative action or future legislation. The members of this Board should have the power to name representatives in their stead or to enlarge the Board to name other state government representatives knowledgeable in the particular subject under discussion.

Agricultural problems might best be handled when the Secretary of Agriculture is asked to join as a temporary Board member. The Highway Commissioner should act as a member of the Board when truck reciprocity or highway problems are discussed between states. The Board of Interstate Relations should be one of the functions of the Governor's office. Only with the prestige of the Governor's direct or indirect participation could we hope to arrive at decisive agreements with adjacent states.

COMPREHENSIVE LOCAL AND STATE PLANNING

In a democratic society, the government responds to the pressures of its citizens in determining the course of programming and policy. The demand which our citizens place on the federal government for expanded services would not be so great if our citizens knew that timely local and state planning contemplated their needs and that these needs would eventually be met without intervention by the federal government.

Long-range planning is difficult when the nature of our representative democratic form of government causes a constant change in personnel elected to office in local and state governments. Yet, if legislatures and administrations are to make intelligent changes consistent with the changing economic, social and political conditions, they would be able to make much wiser changes if they had long-range plans from which to work. If we plan for the future, we will encourage support for state and local leadership as well as reduce the waste of our governmental resources.

I offer several examples of state and local progress that have resulted from sound planning. The development and construction of state highways and bridges has been based on constant 10-year projections in the state's highway needs. North Dakota has one of the best highway systems in the nation. The beauty of our Capitol grounds can be partly attributed to an excellent plan drawn up more than 40 years ago. Our Capitol grounds are a direct contrast to scores of Capitol grounds in other states, cluttered by numerous buildings of varying design and decor. More and more of our agencies are following development programs based on long-range planning.

Even though we have made progress, there are still too many state and local units of government moving along without reference to projected needs and resources.

We need a long-range plan for the building programs at our universities and colleges and at our charitable and penal institutions. We need a long-range plan on our park and recreation development. We need a comprehensive plan for total water resource de-

velopment. These are but a few examples of needed planning, some of which is underway at the present time.

The 1963 Legislative Session authorized a planning office within the Economic Development Commission. Since no funds were appropriated to implement the office, it wasn't until 1965 that a modest start was possible with an appropriation. This office has had the responsibility for several comprehensive plans that were required before the state could be eligible for certain federal matching programs. The state planning office has assisted several North Dakota cities in launching city planning under the so-called "701" program.

A comprehensive state plan which is underway at the present time is an attempt to look into the future to anticipate the need for services as the years unfold. Each state department has been asked to project its plans for the future. These projections will provide us with goals toward which our state government should move. Certain objectives will be set up and the accomplishment of these objectives will be sought through the years to move state government toward the goals.

As the years go by, our goals may change and new objectives may be set forth, but we will at least be able to make changes based on knowledge and wisdom rather than the expediency of the moment. We must recognize that planning is a continuing process of updating and revising basic plans year by year. Planning is never completed but must adjust to the changing tides of public demand.

Unfortunately, every planning enterprise in recent years has been handicapped by lack of personnel. No college graduates people with degrees in governmental planning. Planners can be trained only by experience and it is difficult to find enough to meet the growing demand. Even though our state's planning staff is very small, it is demonstrating ability and promise in this new field of endeavor.

At the local level, I recommend that cities and counties be given the latitude to undertake and finance any planning they may deem necessary. County and city governments need to develop comprehensive planning to include such fields as education, industrial development, transportation, recreation, zoning, care for the elderly, and any number of other local services.

At the state level, I recommend that you concur in the budget requests of state agencies for planning funds so that North Dakota can do a better job of meeting the needs of the future.

At the regional level, we are on the threshold of some exciting projects. These include the comprehensive water and land resource planning involved in the Souris-Red-Rainy River Basins Commission and the Missouri Basin Commission. There is also the area of regional educational television development which requires our interest and support.

As intelligent people, we must work for the orderly development and utilization of our resources at the state and local level through long-range planning. Not only will this give us more for our present and future tax dollar but it will also keep program development at the state level where the special needs and wants of our own citizens can direct the development of programs. I hope that this Session will lend its support to long-range planning.

GREATER FREEDOM OF ACTION FOR URBAN AREAS

In many states, reapportionment of the legislative assemblies to conform to the Supreme Court's ruling of "one man one vote" resulted in great shifts of legislative power from the rural areas to metropolitan centers. While there was apprehension among some of our citizens in North Dakota about the redrawing of legislative

district lines, it is obvious that North Dakota will not experience drastic change as a result of reapportionment. Because we are a rural state, our Legislative Assembly will continue to reflect our population patterns substantially as it did before.

Even though North Dakota continues to be a rural state, we must not neglect the growing needs of our expanding towns and cities. Our towns and cities are experiencing new problems that require new solutions. We should recognize the growing tendency for municipalities to deal directly with the federal government because state governments have shown a disinterest in municipal problems. Either we respond to the needs of our cities as a state or we will force them to go elsewhere for solutions to their problems.

The citizens of our state, by approving the "Home Rule" constitutional amendment in the November election, have expressed their support for permitting municipalities to make more decisions at home. Now it is up to the Legislative Assembly to develop model charters that will grant the powers that should be available to municipal governments. The Legislative Research Committee should be directed to study this vital area of local government during the coming biennium.

Even though we may look forward to future reports on "Home Rule" from the Legislative Research Committee, we should move to resolve as many municipal problems as possible without further delay. If we can consolidate mill levies, if we can grant more local determination on bonded indebtedness, if we can encourage greater intergovernmental cooperation, then we should do so in this session of the Legislature. There will be time enough in future sessions to refine the steps taken in this session toward greater local responsibility.

North Dakota municipalities, like urban centers throughout the nation, are faced with serious financial problems as they struggle to meet the demands for public services that result from concentrations of population.

Up to this point in our history, we have failed as a state to meet the problems of local government finance. We have forced local governments to stagger along with the property tax as its major source of revenue. We have not acted vigorously to study and develop methods of supplementing this inadequate tax structure.

Under extreme pressure, we have grudgingly compromised with piecemeal stop-gap offerings, such as the cigarette tax, a redivision of motor vehicle registration revenue, a reallocation of the estate tax, and other inadequate measures.

I suggest that the Legislative Research Committee be directed to engage professional assistance to study the problems of local government finance during the coming biennium. Not only should this study consider the development of a broader tax base for local government, but it may well analyze the fairness of our present tax-sharing systems to determine if the formulas for allocation to local government are still proper.

During the past two years, the Legislative Research Committee studied some of the laws governing the operation of municipal government. The legislation which was prepared as a result of this work is worthy of consideration. It would bring about simplification of law which is very desirable.

Our municipal officers and urban citizens have been patient through the years as they have waited for the state to allow greater local control and greater local responsibility. They appear ready and willing to assume authority for making decisions at the local level. I believe we should demonstrate our confidence in local governments by giving them the latitude they need to make municipal government a dynamic, vigorous partner in our state and local structure.

GENERAL

This message has been devoted to recommendations for strengthening state and local government in the federal system. There will be many good proposals considered by you. Some general recommendations for your attention are given here.

STATE EMPLOYEES

In recent years, state government has been losing more and more of its qualified people to private industry and to federal service. We cannot afford to make this heavy investment in training employees, only to lose them when they are achieving high performance. In order to make government employment more attractive, I recommend that we do everything we can to improve working conditions.

We have delayed too long in extending the merit system to all the agencies of state government. I recommend that state agencies be allowed to proceed with the task of classifying jobs, establishing standard wage scales and setting qualifications in anticipation of the adoption of a complete merit system including tenure.

The Executive Budget has recognized the need for improved salaries by allowing for merit increases as well as cost of living increases. In some areas, such as our institutions at Grafton, San Haven and Jamestown, and at our colleges and universities, we have recommended a higher basic salary schedule.

The state employees retirement program authorized in the last session has been successfully launched. Naturally, an undertaking of this magnitude has developed some problems that will require your attention. I recommend legislation which would allow the Bank of North Dakota to serve as a depository and as an investor of the retirement program trust fund.

STATE BUILDING CONSTRUCTION

The 1965 legislative assembly established a bonding program under which it would be possible to finance the construction of new buildings at our institutions of higher learning. The courts did not feel that the measure met the constitutional requirements and it was rendered inoperative.

With a rapidly growing college and university enrollment, we must once again give consideration to this pressing problem of buildings. I still support a bonding program for college construction to get us past the crisis projected until 1974.

SAFETY

During the year of 1966, North Dakota experienced its highest traffic death toll in history. Obviously we need to re-examine all of the factors of law and administration that affect highway safety. This includes such things as licensing, law enforcement, highway engineering and education.

We are fortunate that the Legislative Research Committee has been studying the problems of traffic safety and has prepared a series of bills for your consideration.

It is time for us to act in the field of water safety. Power boat usage on our lakes and rivers is increasing rapidly. The Game and Fish Department is given the responsibility for water safety, but it has absolutely no authority to carry out its responsibility for safety on the water.

ECONOMIC EXPANSION

When North Dakota granted a personal property tax exemption to out-of-state corporations on goods in transit, North Dakota's own corporations were denied this privilege. In the interest of both equity and economic development, I recommend that the "freeport" bill be expanded to include North Dakota corporations.

During the past year, we have conducted several conferences and one intensive professional study on the operations of the Bank of North Dakota. It is a widely accepted fact that if North Dakota is to develop its economy, it is necessary for us to keep every possible North Dakota dollar in position to work within our state. The Bank of North Dakota must be as effective as possible along with private and cooperative financial institutions in providing development funds within our state. I recommend that you review the mission and operation of the Bank of North Dakota in this session to see if its effectiveness can be increased.

We must constantly struggle for a competitive position with other areas of the nation in the transportation of agricultural commodities, manufactured products and consumer goods. Other areas of our country are constantly chipping away at transportation rates and they are achieving results which place them in a position of advantage over us.

Transportation rates have long plagued our state's economy. We need to apply far more pressure for rate equity than we are now able. I recommend that the staff of the rate division in the Public Service Commission be substantially increased. John Agre is one of the best rate experts in the nation. He should be training some of our own people to help him intensify transportation rate work. There is a long-range ray of rate equity hope in the recent federal legislation which established the new Department of Transportation. We must be ready to participate in the affairs of this new federal agency on a scale which will require more state staff.

A study has been made of the feasibility of the state's taking the lead in the development of our first large scale resort on the Garrison Reservoir. A large untapped potential for economic expansion in tourism and outdoor recreation exists in North Dakota. The Garrison resort could be a substantial step forward. Two events since the beginning of the resort study have made this proposal more difficult. The voters turned down a tax program which would have made more funds available for the development of our state. Then last December the Federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation ruled that it would no longer provide matching funds for lodge or cabin construction. I believe the Garrison resort should be built and some day will be built. But in this session in which buildings are a pressing issue, I would recommend that high priority building needs be solved before resort construction be considered.

STATEMENT OF POLICY FOR INDIAN CITIZENS

Congress has been redefining its long-range policy in charting its relationship with our Indian citizens. The voice of North Dakota needs to be heard on this matter and we owe our fellow citizens words of encouragement by adopting our own policy statement.

We should assist our Indian citizens to develop leadership, to increase citizen participation, and to assume positions of responsibility so that they can become the masters of their own destinies. By law and by administration, we should support local, state and federal programs that enable Indians to develop their communities and their economic pursuits. We must accept them as full partners in our democratic society by recognizing their problems and their particular needs.

EMERGENCY MEASURES

Crippling blizzards and wide spread floods are examples of natural disasters to public works which can throw an impossible strain on local government financing. I recommend that an emergency fund of Highway Department revenue be established to be administered by the Emergency Commission to make limited grants to political subdivisions to help alleviate natural disaster damage to bridges and highways. Only when a political subdivision is making its maximum effort under the law should state help be available.

A devastating storm last June 24, bringing wide spread road and bridge damage to west-central North Dakota, has prompted me to request special emergency financial state aid to that area on a formula which would use Highway Department funds.

LEGISLATIVE BRANCH OF GOVERNMENT

Before concluding this portion of my message, I would like to make some specific observations about the role of the legislative branch of state government.

If the legislative branch of government is to give maximum service to the people, it must be equipped and organized to be effective. Even though the constitutional revision that would have moved toward this objective was defeated, I urge you to do everything you can by statutory action to make service in the legislature more meaningful. To be specific, I support increased remuneration for members of the legislature. Willingness and ability to make a substantial financial sacrifice should not be a determining qualification for those who would like to run for the legislature.

Recent criticism of the Legislative Research Committee should not deter you from broadening the scope of this committee so that legislators can be as informed as possible on state problems. Our problems are becoming more complex. It is necessary to intensify the work of the LRC rather than eliminate the agency.

CONCLUSION

Section 75 of our North Dakota Constitution requires me to "communicate to the legislative assembly by message, information on the condition of the state and recommend such measures as I shall deem expedient."

It is difficult to write a message that is short enough to be read, yet long enough to include major state legislative needs. It is a challenge to be specific about proposals and yet be general enough to encourage great flexibility in approaching the problems.

I have released this message, beginning with the proposed state budget, as each section was completed. It has been my hope that in so doing you will have a longer period to think about my proposals and seek public reaction. If this pre-session release of my message has set the stage for greater early legislative activity in this session, it will have been worthwhile.

We have a situation in this session where the Republican Party heavily dominates both houses. I fully understand the need for a constant flow of communication between the majority and minority leadership in this session and myself. Certainly many differences which might arise between us can be resolved before positions become so set that an impasse develops.

I need your help and advice no matter what your political persuasion might be. I hope you will seek mine. You are always welcome in my office.

The Speaker announced that the House would be on the 5th order of business.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Rules to whom was referred Rules for the 40th Legislative Assembly, has had the same under consideration and recommends that the rules as adopted by the Thirty-ninth Legislative Assembly be amended as follows and thereafter be adopted as the rules for the Fortieth Legislative Assembly:

SECTION 1.) House Rules 9, 10, 38, 40, 41, 42, 43, 63, and 81, are hereby amended to read as follows:

9. DUTIES OF SERGEANT-AT-ARMS

The Sergeant-at-Arms of the House, under the direction of the presiding officer, shall be the executive officer of the body for the enforcement of all rules adopted by the House for the regulation of the House. The House floor shall be at all times under his immediate supervision, and he shall see that the ((various subordinate officers))) deputy Sergeant-at-Arms and assistant Sergeants-at-Arms perform the duties to which they are especially assigned and perform all other services and duties pertaining to his office and as directed by the Speaker of the House.

10. CALL OF HOUSE

((Thirty-six))) Thirty-two members of the House may order a call of the House and cause absent members to be sent for, but a call must not be made while a vote is being taken. The call being moved, the Speaker shall require those desiring the call to rise, and if ((thirty-six))) thirty-two or more members shall rise, the call shall be ordered. The call being ordered, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall close the door and allow no members to leave the room. The clerk shall then call the roll and furnish the Sergeant-at-Arms with a list of those members absent without leave, and that officer must proceed forthwith to find and bring in such absentees. While the House is under call, no business can be transacted except to receive and act upon the report of the Sergeant-at-Arms and no motion is in order except a motion to suspend further proceedings under the call, and said motion shall not be adopted unless a majority of all members-elect vote in favor thereof. Upon a report of the Sergeant-at-Arms, showing that all members who were absent without leave, naming them, are present, the call shall be at an end, and the door shall be opened, and the House shall proceed with the business pending at the time the call was made.

38. BILLS REFERRED

Upon the first reading of a bill or joint resolution, the Speaker shall refer it to its appropriate committee, unless the House upon motion decides to refer the same to a select or other standing committee, or to the committee of the whole House; if the committee of the whole House, then it shall come up for consideration under the general order of the next day, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

Upon the first reading of any resolution asking for study of any matter by the Legislative Research Committee the Speaker shall refer such resolution to the appropriate committee, which committee shall return such resolution to the House with their recommendations; if favorable, the resolution shall, upon the approval of the committee report by the House, be re-referred to the Legislative Research Resolution Committee unless otherwise ordered by the House.

40. STANDING COMMITTEES

Standing committees, classified in accordance with the usual amount of work and concerned with matters in the fields as indicated, shall be appointed as follows:

In all cases a majority of the committee shall constitute a quorum. The Committee Chairman or such person who is duly appointed to act as Chairman shall insure that minutes of each Committee meeting be kept. Such minutes shall include the names of all Committee members present; the bills or resolutions discussed by number, and a short phrase explaining what such bill or resolution relates to; the names of all persons and their addresses who appear in relation to any certain bill or resolution. The minutes shall also include a record of recommended amendments to bills and resolutions, and the total aye and nay vote of the Committee on all bills and resolutions referred out of the Committee. Upon final adjournment of the Legislative Session the minutes of all Committee meetings shall be delivered to the Legislative Research Committee and retained by such Committee for a period of thirty days following such adjournment.

41. LIMITATIONS ON COMMITTEE MEMBERSHIP

((A member of the Committee on Appropriations shall not be appointed to any other committee in Group A. No other member shall have more than two appointments to the remaining committees in Group A.)) No member shall be appointed to serve on more than four standing committees. No member of the house of representatives shall be appointed to more than one committee in each of the Groups A-1 and A-2. A member of the Committee on Appropriations shall not be appointed to any committee in Groups A-1 or A-2.

The ((Minority and Majority)) Speaker and the Majority and Minority floor leaders shall not be appointed to any standing committees but shall be permitted to participate in all ((A and B Committees)) standing committees but shall not be permitted to vote therein ((unless they are duly appointed members of said committee)).

42. MEETINGS OF COMMITTEES

((Four week days shall be reserved for meetings of Group A Committees, and two week days for Group B Committees.)) The Appropriations committee shall meet on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of each week from 9:00 o'clock a.m. to 12:00 o'clock noon. The other committees of Group A-1 shall meet on Monday and Tuesday of each week from 9:00 o'clock a.m. to 12:00 o'clock noon. Group A-2 committees shall meet on Wednesday and Thursday of each week from 9:00 o'clock a.m. to 12:00 o'clock noon. Group A-3 committees shall meet on Friday of each week from 9:00 o'clock a.m. to 12:00 o'clock noon. ((Group C Committees)) Procedural committees shall meet as necessity may require. All standing committees may meet at other times in addition to the times stated herein as circumstances require.

43. MEETINGS OF CHAIRMEN

There shall be a meeting of committee chairmen of ((Groups A and B)) the standing committees and the Speaker each week

on Thursday subject to the call of the chairman, or at such other time as the majority of chairmen may agree. They shall select their own chairman. At such meeting they shall arrange the schedule of committee hearings to the end of the following week, and so far as possible the bills to be considered at such hearing.

63. WHO MAY MOVE RECONSIDERATION

Any member who votes on the ((majority)) prevailing side of a question, or who did not vote on the question, may move a reconsideration of the same, which motion shall be decided by a majority vote. In case of a bill, joint resolution, or amendment to the Constitution, such motion if made after the end of the next legislative day, shall require a two-thirds vote of the members elect. No such action may be taken unless the measure is in possession of the House.

81. ((U. S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES)) RULES

((The rules of parliamentary practice adopted by the House of Representatives of the United States)) Mason's Manual on Legislative Procedure shall govern the House in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the House, and the joint rules ((and orders)) of the Senate and House of Representatives.

SECTION 2.) House Rule No. 86 is hereby created to read as follows:

The employee positions of Group D shall be allocated to the majority and minority parties in proportion to each party's percentage of the total number of the members-elect and each party shall appoint the persons to the positions allocated to them, acting by and through the committee on employment except, however, that in allocating the positions of stenographers and typists the minority party shall be allocated not less than one of each of these positions. The majority party shall have the first right to select those positions of this Group until their allocation is filled. The Chief in charge of Journal Room and Bill Room Clerks shall be appointed alternately by the Senate and House of Representatives.

The powers, duties, and qualifications for each officer or employee shall be as specifically provided by law, these rules, and as provided in the Legislative Employees' Handbook for such positions.

SECTION 3.) Joint Rule No. 15 is hereby created to read as follows:

15. JOINT APPROPRIATION COMMITTEE HEARINGS

For greater utilization of members' time, for the convenience of representatives of institutions and agencies, and for the information of members, appropriation committees may meet upon mutual agreement of the chairmen of the appropriation committees in the House and Senate, for joint session budget hearings. The chairman shall be the chairman of the committee of the house before which the bill under consideration is pending. A report shall be made by the committee of the house before which the bill is pending.

Honorable John E. Davis: Lieutenant Governor, distinguished members of this great State Legislature, my fellow North Dakotans—I know that I may have the opportunity over the next several months to speak with as many as 15 or 20 state legislative bodies, but little did I dream that I would have the privilege of a sort of a second homecoming as National Commander of The American Legion by having this audience today in these halls I know so well. I'm delighted that this turns out to be my first legislative appearance in my present capacity.

As you know, I have occupied a seat in these chambers as a state senator and have appeared here as your Governor. I have listened to many a cause pleaded here.

I'm certain you know how much I appreciate this opportunity to speak with you briefly this afternoon, and on behalf of The American Legion of North Dakota and all Legionnaires everywhere, I thank you, not just for the privilege of being here, but for your many considerate acts on behalf of the veterans of North Dakota, and for your dedicated service to all of the people of our great state.

All of us, I'm sure, whether we be Legionnaires, legislators, or both, must find it strange for the Legion and the Legislature to be gathered here in the same room without the presence of one very near and dear to us. I refer, of course, to Mr. American Legion of North Dakota—a fine man who has won the esteem of both the Legion and his state government—our good friend Jack Williams.

As you know, Jack is confined to the Veterans Administration Hospital in Fargo, and has been hospitalized since he was stricken in Indianapolis last October. Knowing of the high regard in which he is held by all in this assembly, I'm sure that the prayers and best wishes of all of us are with him.

Each of you, I know, is totally occupied with the burdens and the problems of state government, which is as it should be while this legislature is in session. You have little need for the injection of new problems into your deliberations, but I believe the two matters which I would like to discuss with you today warrant the serious consideration of all thinking Americans. If these problems are not given the attention which they demand, we may see the day when further legislative deliberation may be but an empty gesture.

I would talk with you for a few minutes about what I consider to be the number one interational problem of the United States and

of the entire world today—Vietnam—and of the major domestic problem of this country—namely a spiraling crime rate and growing disrespect for duly constituted authority and our established institutions of government.

In late November and early December of last year, I was privileged to tour the Far East on behalf of The American Legion, and to spend eight days in South Vietnam for briefings by both military and diplomatic personnel, and visits to the fighting areas to talk with our officers and men who carry the burden of daily combat.

Now we have heard, too loudly and for too long, the voices of dissent here at home—the voices of those who would have us get out of Vietnam, no matter how, just so we get out. These people have a perfect right to dissent, but do they have the right, morally or otherwise, to advocate that we abandon more than seventeen million South Vietnamese to the communist aggressor?

We have had unsolicited free advice from allied governments suggesting that we are wrong and that we should get out of Vietnam. The support we are receiving from our allies in Vietnam is from those close enough to the scene of action to know they are going to be directly and adversely affected by a red victory in South Vietnam.

We have heard the question argued from the standpoint of reality, legality, and morality, and I believe the dissenters have little, if anything, going for them in any of these areas.

The American Legion believes we had better start living with the fact that we are there, that we are there in fulfillment of a commitment, and that we might better expend our energies and talents figuring a way to bring this thing to a more rapid and successful conclusion, rather than trying to figure out whether or not we should be there.

This is not an easy situation to deal with—no armed conflict ever was—and this one probably presents more problems than any in which the United States has ever been involved.

Not only must we provide an umbrella of military protection to the South Vietnamese, but we must provide essential services to the victims of war, and at the same time work with the government of South Vietnam to help bring a greater measure of stability to the country so that it will grow increasingly more capable of self-defense.

Our troops in Vietnam are tremendous. Our commanders there say they are the finest soldiers our country has ever put in the field. I believe it. Their spirit is great, and I am confident they can do whatever is required of them, and do it well.

I think there are measures that can be taken to help speed this thing to a conclusion, and here are at least three things The American Legion believes can and should be done to help achieve the objective.

1. We should firmly advise the governments of Laos and Cambodia that we will no longer permit the enemy sanctuary when he flees across the borders from South Vietnam. We should follow up that advice with action up to and including hot pursuit if necessary.

2. We should give our military commanders in the field the prerogative of military target selection in North Vietnam. The American Legion believes military judgment and not political judgment should prevail here. There has been a great deal of discussion regarding the bombing of populous civilian areas of Hanoi and Haiphong. The American Legion has a high regard for human life, but we recognize that in warfare there can be no absolute

guarantee of civilian safety, and certainly no effort is being made by the Viet Cong or the North Vietnamese to avoid civilian casualties in South Vietnam. Actually, the opposite is true for the Viet Cong sustain their campaign of terror through bombings of public places, political assassinations and mass murders.

3. We can deny use of the port of Haiphong to military traffic and close the infiltration and supply routes from North to South Vietnam. There are numerous methods whereby these things can be accomplished. Again, we believe military judgment should decide, and it is a certainty that these actions will help reduce American battle casualties and probably help to shorten the war.

We believe that where American military might is brought to bear that it should be used as effectively as possible. We believe it should be used so as to accomplish the assigned mission in the shortest possible time, and with minimum losses.

These are some of the principal observations which we brought back with us from Vietnam, and these are based on the things we saw, the conversations which we had with military and civilian leaders, and on the official position of The American Legion as mandated by our National Convention.

So much for our prime international problem, the solution of which will amount to nothing unless we come to grips with, and solve, this very serious domestic problem of increasing crime rates and a growing disrespect for law and our institutions of government.

I have said on previous occasions that success in battle will be meaningless if, through public apathy and indifference on the home front, we should permit the fruits of victory to be dissipated.

Each of us recognizes that the success and perpetuation of our system of government by law depends upon a respect for the law by all of our people and the exercise of responsible citizenship on the part of all people.

We cannot tolerate mob rule, and there is no place in our system for civil disobedience or the philosophy adopted by some people that they may select those laws which they don't mind obeying, and obey them, while ignoring those laws which don't suit their fancy. That philosophy is completely alien to our way of life.

The American Legion recognizes this as an increasingly serious problem and I have chosen to place principal emphasis on a nationwide program to help restore and revitalize a respect for the forces of law and order.

We want everyone to become involved in this project from school children to community leaders and other civic and service organizations of the community.

We have planned a poster coloring contest for the children carrying an elementary message on respect for law and order. As a focal point for local community observances, we are asking local Posts, in cooperation with proper local authorities to select an outstanding officer to receive an American Legion certificate of achievement. We are confident that many Posts will exercise the initiative, again in cooperation with local authorities, to plan and sponsor such programs as may best suit the needs of the community. It is our hope that the net result of this nationwide project may be a reversal of the trend toward lawlessness and disrespect for the law.

I am certain that this project will have the support of leaders of government at all levels, for as responsible citizens—as local, state and national leaders, we know that you and we have a common concern for the future of this great land and that we will lend our

best efforts to insure that the American dream will become reality not only for us, but for our children and for generations yet unborn."

Senator Longmire moved the joint session adjourn, which motion prevailed.

EIGHTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rep. Link moved that the remarks of Floyd E. Dominy, Commissioner of Reclamation of the Department of the Interior made before a joint session on January 16, 1967, be printed in the House Journal, which motion prevailed.

Remarks of Floyd E. Dominy, Commissioner of Reclamation, Department of the Interior, before the joint session of the North Dakota Legislature, Bismarck, North Dakota, January 16, 1967:

The opportunity to speak before a joint session of the legislature of North Dakota is an honor and a real pleasure. In meeting with you today, I would certainly be remiss if, in my opening remarks, I failed to congratulate this legislative body for its many years of intense concern regarding the water problems and needs of this State and Nation. This assembly has done much more than talk emotionally about the growing list of issues associated with water. The actions you have taken not only go hand-in-hand with the progress of our times, but also retain the stability and security found in blue-chip investments.

Your Governor, Bill Guy; Senator Milton Young; Senator Quentin Burdick; and Congressman Mark Andrews are to be congratulated for the wisdom they have displayed and the leadership they have provided in the unified effort that has taken place for conserving and utilizing the State's land and water resources. North Dakota has been a leader — not only in facing up to the issues in the proper conservation of their water resources, but in meeting the challenge of the future. The willingness of the people of this State to accept and resolve the problems inherent in water development is an assurance that North Dakota won't be trapped because of shortsightedness or laxity.

North Dakota has always been near the top among the western states in the matter of providing adequate legislation in the field of water resource development. Many actions have established patterns that provide goals for states that have lagged in this critical area of responsibility for State legislators. Past accomplishments are serving to urge states with archaic and ineffective measures on their books to institute corrective statutes in order to adequately meet today's requirements. For example, the design and establishment of the unique and highly effective Garrison Diversion Conservancy District serve as a model for the advancement of water resource development for many of our western areas to follow.

Our work for the authorization and start of construction on the Garrison Diversion Unit is concluded. Just this week I issued orders to move forward with construction, and invitations will be issued next month to bid for the manufacture of the pumps and motors that are part of the Snake Creek Pumping Plant. Specifications for the plant itself will be disseminated in May, and it is expected that award of the construction contract will take place in late summer. I have also put the machinery in motion to initiate action for purchasing rights-of-way for parts of the canal sections of the unit. It is my hope that we can conduct a groundbreaking ceremony marking the start of construction during September of this year. The promises held by the Garrison Diversion Unit have begun to materialize, and it appears there are no further hazards blocking the social and economic progress to be garnered through this development — that is there are no hazards that you, the people of North Dakota, are unable to prepare for.

A strong and close partnership between North Dakota and the Bureau of Reclamation has been developed during the long struggle for the Garrison Diversion Unit. Now that the word is "go" and construction is underway, there can be no letdown in our efforts or breakdown in this cooperative spirit. Our concern and endeavors must not only be directed toward the successful development of the project, but we must heed the continually growing need for water associated with all areas of our country. There can be no slackening of pace allowed to develop if we are going to do our share in creating a bright national water supply and development picture. It is certainly clearcut that all of our water resources must be developed to the fullest extent permitted by good conservation and preservation practices if we are to achieve success. It makes no difference whether we are speaking of water for agricultural, industrial, or municipal purposes — our attack on the problems facing us must take place on a comprehensive and coordinated basis.

There is a water crisis in the world. Water and where it is going to come from is one of the greatest concerns confronting our Nation today. This isn't a revelation — it is a well-known fact. All of the studies concerning water use and development conducted during recent years have resulted in the conclusion that the situation is urgent and critical. The scarcity of water on a national scale makes it imperative that you do all possible to conserve, develop, and utilize your surface and underground water resources. Now, I don't mean to imply that North Dakota itself is undergoing a crisis — much to the contrary, in this State a crucial situation is being avoided because you have been moving in the right direction to withstand and conquer the challenges presented in the national water dilemma we are faced with. The highly commendable action of the North Dakota Water Commission in embarking on an inventory of the State's surface and ground-water supplies is typical of your awareness to the pressing requirements of our society on water.

As demands continue to soar upward, so has the pitch of the battle tempo for a bigger share in the available water supply increased. In relating North Dakota's position to other parts of our western United States, you are in an enviable spot. This is due in part to your ample water resources — but when you look at other areas, even those that are not in short supply, you can see the big dissimilarity lies in the fact that while others bicker, fight, and move in confusion, you people confidently and enthusiastically move forward. You have displayed complete disregard for political differences and conquered selfish interests in the formation of a united front when it comes to making use of your water.

In some areas interbasin diversion, transbasin diversion, and a host of schemes to solve the problem are in various stages of dis-

cussion — but again, in North Dakota you are way out in front — you have already experienced success in this area. The Garrison Diversion Unit itself is a transbasin diversion of water — moving a huge supply from the Missouri River through a tremendous canal system to put it into the basin of the Red River of the North.

Most of you know there are studies being made concerning possible diversion of water from the Mississippi River system to the high plains of Texas. You are apprehensive concerning this subject—but let me assure you that, even though national needs have outgrown state and regional boundaries, there will be substantial study and discussion before such diversion takes place. Even then, I am certain the Congress of the United States would never allow one drop of water being put to beneficial use in the Missouri Basin to be exported to another major river basin. If diversion did transpire, it would only be that water surplus to the needs of the basin. Furthermore, I have enough faith in mankind to believe that no area — including the water hungry Southwest — covets water that is necessary to the social and economic progress of the Missouri River Basin. What North Dakota has to do is to continue to strive for wise utilization in order to reap the greatest good for the State and the Nation.

During the planning and legislative periods leading up to authorization of the Garrison Diversion Unit, the people of this State established an enviable record of imaginative cooperation and assistance. Your farsightedness and perseverance, which prompted you to pursue and obtain this unit of the Missouri River Basin Project, are constantly being reenacted. Just the other day, State and Federal agencies and private interests met in Carrington, North Dakota, for the purpose of forming an irrigation development council for coordinating the efforts of all entities involved in construction and development of the unit. This type of continued action will bring about an orderly, efficient, and successful transition to irrigated agriculture and will assure the fruits of prosperity for your future and for succeeding generations.

It is going to take a lot of planning and hard work to prepare for the expansion that will accompany the State's progress in irrigated agriculture. In addition to the increase in commercial and industrial processing plants that are going to be needed, you will also require schools, roads, and a host of other public accommodations and services. A measure of the impact of irrigation upon an economy is reflected in a recent study conducted on the Columbia Basin Project in Washington. When an area of 10,000 acres irrigated through the facilities of that project was compared with 10,000 acres of dryland farm operations, a 17 to 1 ratio, not only in population density, but in business establishments, postal receipts, retail sales, tax collection, and Federal income tax payments existed.

From the very beginning we must enter into development of the Garrison Diversion Unit in an orderly fashion. Costly duplication and uneconomic operations must be avoided. We must be able to provide the technical assistance the farmers will require, and we must have these answers as the project unfolds. Only then will we fully realize the gains to the State and the Nation — not only from the irrigation that will develop, but from the expanding benefits as our project matures.

The research and preparatory work being done by the Carrington Experiment Station in the field of irrigated agriculture is an example of State action that will lead to a successful project. You have—to a great degree—been pioneers in providing leadership for water resources legislation. If we are to reap the social and economic benefits possible in the years ahead, more trailblazing work will be in order. The people of North Dakota must be provided

the technical assistance and the know-how gained through research and an adequate examination of all facets of development. If the transition from dryland farms to a well-settled, abundantly productive region is to be achieved, then the advantage of good leadership in the form of knowledge, planning, and guidance must be established. Effective State agencies financially and competently equipped by their legislators can get the job done. Actions of today will be the basis of success on the Garrison Diversion Unit tomorrow.

At this time I am going to take the liberty of strongly endorsing three items of legislation that are now being urged by water resource agencies. The first of these will permit the Garrison Diversion Conservancy District to administer State lands beneath navigable waters within its boundaries. This will allow the Conservancy District to make the contributions to recreation and fish and wildlife developments which are contemplated by the Federal Water Project Recreation Act of 1965. It will thus assure the optimum development of this potential in North Dakota's portion of the Missouri River Basin Project.

The second item is legislation which will permit counties and townships to exercise State authority in relocation and vacation of their roads. Authorization will assure accommodation of the Garrison Diversion Unit canals and waterways to your fine system of highways. Future problems of conflict between the highway and the waterway rights-of-way will also be prevented. This is of critical importance to resource development in North Dakota.

Perhaps of less immediate urgency is item three—but nevertheless, it is legislation which will soon be required. This proposal will permit irrigation district directors to redivision their areas. A number of North Dakota districts have been organized to include all the lands to be served under the ultimate plan for development of the one-million-acre Garrison Diversion Unit. However, under the initial 250,000-acre stage of the unit authorization, one or more of the areas will not be served at first. Under existing laws, directors must be elected, notwithstanding the fact that there will be no irrigated or assessable acreage within such divisions in the beginning. This circumstance creates an awkward and unworkable situation. Correction can easily be accomplished by authorizing the irrigation and district directors to reshape the district divisions periodically, so that each one shall cover a certain area of irrigated and assessable land. Such legislation is strongly endorsed.

At the last session of your legislature, a bill was introduced which was intended to limit the time within which claims may be made against irrigation districts. Similar legislation is in effect in other Reclamation states, and it may be that you wish to reconsider this action in North Dakota. Without it, a district may not be appraised of a condition which could deteriorate into liability, until long after such a problem develops. If the claim and notice are not filed until a considerable time following damage, a determination of the cause and the cure becomes extremely difficult. Physical solution may become infeasible, and financing to handle such claims becomes difficult to program. Therefore — in the interest of sound irrigation management — I strongly endorse legislation which would require the prompt filing of claims.

North Dakota has put forth superior efforts in providing adequate legislation and State support in the field of water resources. Even so, there are areas that should be improved. In this case, I refer to the safety of dams.

The State Water Commission does provide printed regulations and requires a license for all dams above 12½ acre-feet. It also

requires approval of the plans and specifications for new dams and inspection and approval of the completed structure before it is put to use. The State reports about 2,500 dams under its jurisdiction. Under the present law, design by a registered professional engineer is not necessary, and no onsite inspection by the State is required during construction. Furthermore, there is no provision for routine periodic inspections. Under these conditions it is very possible many of the dams which are old could be unsafe without detection. A rigid campaign to inspect all dams by experts for safety, such as California is undertaking, would be in order. Dams that are old, have inadequate spillways, or show other signs of distress should be reconstructed or removed from service.

Before closing I want to say that the Bureau of Reclamation and the State of North Dakota have had a long and productive relationship. The impact of the Reclamation program upon the State has had far-reaching effect. Developments such as the Lower Yellowstone Project; Dickinson, Heart Butte, and Jamestown Dams; and the substations and more than 2,000 miles of transmission line carrying Missouri River Basin power to the people of North Dakota have all made their mark in lasting benefits. The future also holds promise. In addition to Garrison, we plan to initiate surveys to determine requirements for recreation facilities at various installations in the State. We will also install additional transformer and associated equipment at the Jamestown substation and make additions to the Watford City installation. A contract will be initiated on the 141-mile Jamestown-Forman-Summit 115-kv transmission line.

The Garrison Diversion Unit is a new resource for the entire State, but the future is not limited to this alone. Over in the eastern part of the State the Federal Water Resources Council has recommended establishment of a basin commission. This means a comprehensive study of the Red-Souris-Rainy River Basins should be underway in the near future. Pumping from the Missouri River holds promise for additional irrigation development in western North Dakota. About 50,000 acres in this area lends itself quite favorably to future development. There are other potentials — such as Broncho Dam and Reservoir on the Knife River, and Mott Dam on the Cannonball River — that might someday become feasible as the value of water increases. Great economic assets are locked in the vast coal deposits and the water supply in this western area. The key to opening an industrial future may lie in the proven imaginative talents of North Dakotans. If so, then the costs of developing multipurpose water projects that are now infeasible because of the high costs involved in developing storage for only limited use can be shared and paid in part through the sale of industrial water.

There is a need for everyone — the individual — the State — the Federal Government — working together to obtain maximum accomplishment. I pledge myself and my staff to carry out this objective to the highest degree permissible.

Rep. Bauer and myself, as legislators from McLean County, are in full accord with the intent of and statements made in House Concurrent Resolution "J". We are pleased that Garrison Diver-

sion has been authorized and that bid letting and construction is in the near future. We are pleased to note the economical impact irrigation farming has on a community in comparison to dry land farming as noted in Mr. Dominy's speech. We are looking forward with excitement and anticipation to the future beneficial impact Garrison Diversion will have on North Dakota.

However, as legislators from McLean County, we feel it our duty to point out to you members that all phases of this great project have not been beneficial to all people and areas of North Dakota. We in McLean County lost about 130,000 acres of land to the Garrison reservoir with over 102,000 acres taxable land. It was necessary for many people to move from the bottom lands, and a great many could not be relocated in our county, so they had to seek land elsewhere.

The coming construction of the large canal from Snake Creek pumping station will make it necessary for a few more families to be forced from their land. The McClusky Canal is estimated to take 1,000 acres in McLean County. The flooding of seven small lakes in the Turtle Lake - Mercer area will take about another 7,000 acres (estimated). The canal will divide our county by a substantial stream of water necessitating bridges and often dividing farms and communities.

Rep. Bauer and I take this means to inform the members of the House, some of the sacrifices made by the people of McLean County on behalf of the Garrison Diversion Project. We want these facts in the record, so when future legislators from our county request help in developing recreation areas, they will receive favorable consideration.

We also want the record to show we support the Garrison Diversion Project, but merely point out local problems.

Statement of the Purpose of the Amendment:

After Line 27: The Committee was informed that a gift to the University for the construction of an engineering building of \$400,000.00 was available if the state would provide \$125,000.00 to match this gift, during this legislative session.

Insertion of Medical Center: The appropriation for funds needed in addition to the amount from the 1 mill levy to support the University of North Dakota Medical Center was approved by the Committee in order to provide for the operation and maintenance of the Medical Center at their present operational level through the next biennium. It was recognized by the Committee that the 1 mill levy which previously was sufficient to support the Medical Center will not provide sufficient funds to do so during the next biennium.

EIGHTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rep. Brown moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort Congressman Tom Kleppe to the rostrum and that Mr. Kleppe be asked to make a few remarks, which motion prevailed and the Speaker appointed as such committee Reps. Brown and Boustead.

Rep. Link moved the remarks of Congressman Kleppe be printed in the House Journal, which motion prevailed.
Congressman Kleppe:

"Mr. Speaker, Gentlewomen, Gentlemen, of the House of Representatives of the State of North Dakota, Friends in the gallery, State Officials and others:

"The last time I came before a good many of you, I improperly forgot to acknowledge the Speaker. I am surely glad that I didn't forget Gordie, today. This is a very distinct and signal honor for me to look at you from this position and to say a few words to you.

"You know Adlai Stevenson told the story about a new congressman, who was moving to Washington with his family. The night before they left for Washington, — everything had been packed to go, everyone was getting ready for bed. They had a little four-year-old girl who was saying her prayers. She said 'Please God, bless Mother, Daddy, Sister, Brother' — and all the rest of the family — then said 'Goodbye God, because we are going to Washington.' I haven't found it quite that way but there is a maze of geography, departments and people to get around and through down there, but somehow or other we will find out how it works and get some things done. I want to make a specific observation to you members of the legislature. This has been very obvious to me for a long time but it has come home to me more in the last three weeks than at any time in my life before. I want to clearly state at the outset that this suggestion, or observation that I want to make has no reference to any individual, — President, Governor, or otherwise. This observation is specific under the constitution of our United States and under the constitution of our state. We have three departments of government — we have the legislative, the judicial and the executive. Well, it doesn't take a very observing eye to note that the power of the executive branch has become the most potent weapon of the government — in every field, the power and pressure of the executive branch of the government has gotten so strong that I have a feeling that too many times it has over-ridden the legislative branch of the government. I think that this is a responsibility that you and I have. We are the representatives of the people, subject to their whims and their desires in most decisions. In all instances, you are here every two years and may it ever be so because I think we should always give the people a chance to express themselves on how the affairs of their government are going.

"So here comes the responsibility, and you have to exert the strength of the legislative department of government, which was given to our people by the constitutions—federal or state. The executive orders in the case of our federal government, that are passed on down, are lots of times done with serious coercive efforts that are connected with them, are matters that you and I, as legislators, must be on the watch for, and so this, to me, is a challenging responsibility that is going in the wrong direction in my opinion. When you see the bricks and mortar of the departments and see the hundreds of thousands doing the work of the United States federal government in the executive branch, you wonder how the bodies of the House and Senate carry on their proper functions for legislating, and representing, the needs, desires and wishes — and the necessities of their people.

"Before I quit, I would like to make an observation about Adam Clayton Powell. I think all of you here have heard of this gentleman and know a little bit about the status of this gentleman at the present time. I want to pass on an observation there, if I could. At this point of time we have voted — 364 to 64 to keep this man from taking his seat. You can see this was very much a bipartisan vote. There is an investigating Committee that had five weeks to decide whether or not they would seat him. The Democratic caucus deprived him of his seniority and the chairmanship of the powerful House Education Committee. I have a strange feeling that the House will again preclude him from taking his seat. I want to say this is how I am going to vote again. I do not believe that we can have, or need, this kind of a man as a Representative in our Congress. You can rightfully say that the three or four or five hundred people he represents from Harlem in New York City, should have a representative — but it doesn't stop there. Every citizen has a right to a voice in this decision because he has mis-handled and misappropriated public funds. This is where we sit — in spite of the fact that this is not a race issue, it has been made a race issue unfortunately and if we preclude him from taking his seat he will again run in a special election in Harlem and get 80% of the vote and will come back as a Representative — he may even come back as a Republican. He can win on any ballot he runs on. This will be another problem for us to work on and exercise our opinions at that time. I think that the integrity of Congress is at stake and I want to say that I have never met a more arrogant or defiant man than this man Adam Powell. As an example, he was given 4½ minutes of an hour on the debate. It was my opinion there was enough emotion that if he had been humble and asked forgiveness, he could have captured another 50 or 75 votes but his last three statements were: "My conscience is clear." — "May God help you." — "I hope you sleep well tonight." That is putting it on the line. In Washington the thing they say is that there are 11 commandments — the 11th commandment is "don't get caught"—he got caught.

All of you friends in the balcony, this is a great privilege and honor for me and I am most appreciative of it.

Mr. Speaker, I am very glad to see all of you again. Where I can do something for you, let me know and don't be concerned about partisanship. You are North Dakotans—we are one and the same people and I want to be helpful. I want to know how you think so I can help you. In your deliberations you are going to be serious. Mine are more serious. May I say for you to look at them strongly from the standpoint of responsibility as legislators.

May God bless you in these deliberations."

Statement of the Purpose of the Amendment:

The Forester, Wild Life and Veterinarian Specialist positions which were listed in the Governor's budget were deleted by the Committee because they felt that the work these people were doing was a duplication of other agencies, therefore, the Sugar Beet Specialist and the Potato Specialist were employed for reasons that these industries are growing and these people are being asked by the industry on a half and half cost basis with North Dakota and Minnesota.

The greenhouses are old and they are in need of replacement both due to poor conditions of buildings and additional space. The recent discovery of hybrid wheat techniques makes it quite essential to enlarge the present plant breeding program. Hybrid barley is also a possibility. These greenhouses must be abandoned as they can no longer be repaired and maintained at a reasonable cost. Thus, this project is essential to maintain the present program in wheat, barley, and flax breeding.

The Field Crops Research Laboratory was allowed by the Committee in recognition of the fact that the old seedhouse is going to be razed as it is located on the land site where phase 2 of the North Dakota State University biology building will be built and that this facility will have to be replaced. In addition to this the Committee also recognized the need for expanded facilities for additional research. In consideration of the need for more storage space and additional research facilities the Committee approved the request for a new Field Crops Research Laboratory.

Line 75: The Committee recognized the need for an agricultural engineer at the Carrington station to work with the irrigation program.

Maintenance Facility: Due to the increased activity at the experiment station the Committee approved the appropriation of \$10,000.00 for a maintenance facility.

Lines 83 through 88: In order to allow greater flexibility in the expenditure of funds at the North Dakota State University Experiment Station the new language was inserted in lieu of the old language.

After line 102: At the present time the North Dakota State University of Agriculture and Applied Science experiment station cannot construct any type of building without legislative approval and that the Committee felt that the experiment station should be able to construct buildings from non-state sources in amounts of up to \$18,000.00 without specific legislative approval for each building.

The county treasurer shall allow a twenty percent discount to all taxpayers who pay, prior to the delinquency date of March first, personal property taxes levied on any item of personal property not assessed by the state board of equalization, excluding improvements on leased sites, commencing with such personal property taxes first becoming due and payable on or after January 1, 1968.

SECTION 4. COUNTY TREASURER CERTIFIES AMOUNT OF TAXES — DISTRIBUTION BY TAX COMMISSIONER TO COUNTIES.) 1. On or before March 15, 1968, and each year thereafter, the county treasurer of each county shall certify to the state tax commissioner the total amount of discounts allowed under the provisions of section 57-20-09.1 upon personal property taxes paid prior to March first. On or before April 15, 1968, and each year thereafter, the state tax commissioner shall pay to each county in the state the amount of personal property discounts allowed in each county on personal property taxes collected prior to March first of such year. Such payments shall be made by warrant-check prepared by the department of accounts and purchases after the submission of vouchers approved by the state auditing board. The county treasurer of each county, upon receipt of the moneys remitted by the state tax commissioner, shall allocate and pay to each political subdivision of the county levying taxes upon personal property, the amount of revenue they would have received had the full amount of personal property taxes levied been collected and not subject to discount.

2. On or before March 15, 1969, the county treasurer of each county shall certify to the state tax commissioner the total amount of taxes collected for the county, cities, villages, school districts, and townships of such county on the items of personal property exempt under the provisions of subsection 23 of section 57-02-08 in the year 1967. On or before April 15, 1969, and each year thereafter, the state tax commissioner shall pay to each county in the state an amount equal to the revenue collected in the year 1967 for the political subdivisions herein mentioned on the items of personal property exempt from the personal property tax under the provisions of subsection 23 of section 57-02-08. The county treasurer shall allocate and remit to the county, cities, villages, school districts, and townships, that amount of revenue collected in the year 1967 from the personal property taxation of the items exempt under subsection 23 of section 57-02-08.

SECTION 5. APPROPRIATION.) There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$9,160,000.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary, to the state tax commissioner for the purpose of remitting funds to counties of this state and their political subdivisions as provided by this Act, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1967, and ending June 30, 1969.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.) The provisions of section 3 of this Act, providing for the discount of personal property taxes

upon personal property not assessed by the state board of equalization, and the provisions of subsection 1 of section 4 of this Act, shall terminate and be of no further effect on June 30, 1969, and thereafter such personal property taxes due shall not be subject to a twenty percent discount.

SECTION 7. REPEAL.) Sections 18-03-09 and 37-01-27, subsections 9, 10, and 11 of section 57-02-05, and section 57-15-23 of the North Dakota Century Code are hereby repealed."

If the electors shall disapprove continuing such excess mill levy, the same shall be terminated, except that taxes levied prior to such termination shall be collected."

EXPLANATION OF VOTE

Rep. Backes: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to have my remarks printed in the Journal.

"House Bill No. 728 is more than a proposal to establish a committee to study the repeal of the personal property tax. It is a proposal to avoid making any serious decisions in this session of the Legislature.

"House Bill No. 728 is unnecessary because it will not come forward in 1969 with a new formula for courage or a replacement for determination. Two more years of rearranging the problems in-

volved in repealing the personal property tax is not going to make the problems go away.

"The inequity of the personal property tax has been recognized since statehood. As early as 1920, tax commissioners were throwing their hands up in disgust with the administrative problems involved in assessing and equalizing.

"We have had studies on personal property taxes as far back as I can remember. I have served on three of the L.R.C. studies on this subject. We have had experts from the State University helping us. We have had organizations and citizens bring their suggestions to us. I frankly don't believe that appointing another committee and spending another \$35,000 is going to answer the problems in repealing the personal property tax. We already have all of the answers we're going to get. Now it's time to make a few decisions.

"For those people who aren't saddled with this inequitable tax, study committees sound just fine. It just means a few more years that the inequitable tax is being carried by the other taxpayer.

"I'm ready to repeal the personal property tax in this session of the legislature.

"Once we cross this hurdle, we can begin to refine the new tax structure on the basis of actual experience instead of imaginary fears. I am sure that we will encounter problems but none of them will compare to the inequities we now have under personal property tax. And, I don't think we should be so vain as to think that we are the last legislative assembly that will be able to solve problems.

"When we get the report from House Bill No. 728, it is going to be too late to repeal the personal property tax. It will be like shutting the barn door after the horse has been stolen. The revenue is all being spent in this session and there won't be anything left to finance a repeal in 1969.

"I think it is time we accepted the responsibility of making a few decisions in this session. Either we should decide to repeal the personal property tax or we should decide to quit kidding those thousands of taxpayers who expect us to do something."

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Finance and Taxation to whom was referred House Bill No. 711 has had the same under consideration and recommend that the same be amended as follows:

consideration and recommend that the same be indefinitely postponed.

REP. BROWN, Chairman

Rep. Dawson moved that the report be adopted.

Rep. Link moved a substitute motion that House Bill No. 918 be placed on the calendar.

Rep. Link: "I am moving to place House Bill No. 918 on the calendar, knowing full well that it may not succeed. However, I believe that the membership here should have an opportunity to register their votes as there was joint sponsorship for this reform in state government. The basic question here is whether or not there will be state reform in 1967. We are in court now — shall we start now on this reform, or shall we further procrastinate?"

I request a recorded roll call vote on my motion."

Rep. Streibel: "For the record, I wish to review the basic facts which brought about the bi-partisan sponsorship of House Bills 918, 919, 920, 921, 922, and 923, and the resulting facts contributing toward the Majority Party's decision to recommend them for indefinite postponement.

"The Majority Caucus on January 19, originally decided not to co-sponsor these measures, on January 23rd, the date of the deadline for introduction of bills. My office was appraised of the fact that both state departments of government directly involved were in full accord with the intent of the aforementioned measures. These measures deal primarily in the realignment of state governmental responsibility in the State Auditor and State Tax Commissioner's offices, wherein tax collecting responsibility would be transferred to the Tax Commissioner's Office instead of the State Auditor's Office as is presently being done.

"Other measures more especially Senate Bill No. 311, transfers auditing responsibility from other governmental departments to the State Auditor's Office.

"On January 23, while Representative Link and Senator Lips were in my office, I called the State Auditor to confirm his approval of this realignment of inter-departments responsibility. He assured me that he was in full accord with the respective transfers.

"It was then agreed by the leadership of the Majority and Minority of the House to sponsor these measures on a bi-partisan basis.

"Immediately following recess January 23, I was informed by the State Auditor that he misunderstood the intent of the measures, and could not support them. He further related that the same could be accomplished in Senate Bill No. 311.

"At a Majority Caucus on January 30th the State Auditor appeared and requested that the Majority indefinitely postpone the transfer measures. The only basic difference between Senate Bill No. 311 and House Bill 918 through and including 923 is the effective date. The effective date in the House measures being July 1, 1967 and the effective date in Senate Bill No. 311 being July 1, 1969.

"As Majority Floor Leader I am asking for support of the motion to indefinitely postpone these measures, as this is the wish of my membership.

"As an individual legislator, I can see nothing that can be accomplished in stalling the effective date. Should we wait until proper political climate prevails in each respective department involved, should we procrastinate until the advantageous political climate prevails in the legislature, we might forever forestall any advancement in the realignment of state department responsibility.

"We only have to point to the report of the North Dakota Governmental Survey Commission, dated December 1, 1942, to confirm our apprehensions.

"In summary let me say that it is my sincere hope that good governmental business practices should have a priority over existing political stage settings."

Remarks by Louis W. Menk, President
Northern Pacific Railway Company
St. Paul, Minnesota

Before the joint session of the North Dakota Legislature
Bismarck, North Dakota — February 2, 1967

Lt. Governor Tighe, Distinguished Guests and Members of the 40th Legislative Assembly:

Needless to say, it is a great pleasure and an honor for me to meet with you today. I feel, in fact, like the two cows looking over the pasture fence, watching a milk truck going to town. On the side of the gleaming white vehicle, it said, "Pure Milk — Pasteurized — Homogenized — with Vitamin D Added." One cow said to the other, "It makes one feel very inadequate, doesn't it?"

Believe me, facing a distinguished group like this makes me feel inadequate. But remember, that the truck would not be going to town if it were not for the cows, and I sincerely believe that this country can't "go to town" without people like you and me. Government and business — hand in hand — on the firing line, dedicating ourselves to the improvement of our states and our nation.

Thinking perhaps that you may be politically orientated, I thought it would be well if I told you of my politics. I suppose

I would be typified as a "renegade Republican," being the son of parents who are life-long and staunch Democrats. I made some inquiry as to the make up of your Legislative bodies and found the House composed of 83 Republicans and 15 Democrats, and the Senate of 44 Republicans and 5 Democrats — to me this typifies the two-party system at its best.

Seriously though, I know the successful legislators in this Assembly down through the years have been those who didn't hesitate to respect the right of the other fellow to have a different point of view.

After I arrived in Bismarck and as I approached this magnificent capitol building this afternoon, the thought came to my mind that Abraham Lincoln commenced his political career as a state representative. He was elected to the Illinois House of Representatives in 1834.

When Lincoln campaigned, there was no television or radio and Abe talked to many people.

He talked to them about roads — the roads in Illinois were very bad. Abe said that if he was elected Representative, he would vote for better roads. There were no public schools in Illinois — Abe said every child should have a chance to go to school. He said he would vote for public schools. Taxes were high, and Abe said he would propose and vote for tax reform.

The people liked what Abe said and he was elected to four successive terms in the Illinois Legislature.

Many of our country's great statesmen and political leaders have come from state legislatures such as yours, and over the years, the fundamental problems have not changed a great deal. The problems that face you today are strikingly similar to those that faced young Abe Lincoln in the 1830's — the difference is in degree.

North Dakota, like all states, has some problems, but they can be resolved and they will be resolved by you gentlemen, just as Lincoln and his colleagues solved them — by the application of old-fashioned common sense. I happen to believe very deeply that the kind of state and the kind of America we shall live in tomorrow depend primarily on the kind of a job we do today.

North Dakota is a great state. It is the country's leading producer of spring wheat as well as durum and flax. It has one of the largest deposits of sub-bituminous coal in the United States. It is a leader in the production of sugar beets and potatoes. It has substantial oil deposits, and new industries are mushrooming in its metropolitan areas — and it is served by four fine railroads — the Northern Pacific, Great Northern, the Soo Line and the Milwaukee.

The destinies of North Dakota and these railroads are closely interwoven. Their main and branch lines are the arteries which carry the products of your farms and factories to distant markets. Freight rates are constantly being adjusted so that your products can compete with similar products from other areas.

A graphic example of how freight rates can open new markets is the substantial reduction of westbound export grain rates which were put into effect by the railroads in June, 1965. These lower rates opened markets for spring wheat in the Orient. Prior to the publication of the rate reduction, there was virtually no westbound movement of spring wheat. From June 1965 through December 1966, however, 33,900,000 million bushels were shipped to the Pacific Northwest ports, most of it North Dakota wheat. Opening Far East markets, and other factors, improved the market to the extent that the cash price of wheat was about 16¢ per bushel over 1965, adding approximately \$16,306,000 extra to the economy.

The future of North Dakota agriculture is bright and when the farmer prospers, the whole state benefits, as the products of agriculture constitute approximately 75 per cent of the state's total gross income.

I am sure that most of you know that in May and August, 1966, the Secretary of Agriculture announced increases totalling 32 per cent in wheat acreage allotments and in December, all acreage controls on sugar beets were lifted for the 1967 crop. This action by the Secretary certainly should give added optimism to your 1967 economic outlook.

The estimates of our Agricultural Department now indicate that North Dakota farmers will increase their wheat acreage by 21 per cent this year and the acreage planted to beets can well be expected to be increased substantially.

To process the beets, your state has three efficient and conveniently located factories. The latest is the new \$24,000,000 American Crystal sugar beet factory at Drayton. The building of this plant is a shining example of meeting the challenge of today's economic needs by a forward-looking group who joined together and combined their thinking, their money, and their energies to establish a major industry for their community.

The plant which last year produced an average of 4,500 tons of beets per day is increasing production this year to 5,000 tons per day as a direct result of the removal of restrictions on sugar beet acreage.

It is a source of pride to Northern Pacific to have been active in the project and we worked closely with American Sugar on the details of transportation and necessary trackage to serve the new plant and provide facilities for the movement of both the raw material and the finished product.

There are other bright spots in the agricultural picture. The recent interest in the cultivation of sunflowers in eastern North Dakota and the increased acreage planted to high-sugar-content hybrid corn are two examples that come to mind. Sunflower seeds have long been known to contain edible oils and for many years have been a major crop in Russia and other parts of Europe. We predict that a processing plant to extract these oils is a definite possibility for eastern North Dakota.

The Lake Agassiz Sugar Corporation has perfected plans to erect a \$900,000 processing plant at Mapleton, to process the high-sugar corn. This plant will produce a liquid form of sugar which will be sent to the Waseca plant for further refining. The new plant will utilize corn from over 6,000 acres of land.

In the past few years, there has been an unusually rapid increase in the volume of potatoes which are frozen and prepared ready for instant use. Carloads of frozen french fries and flaked potatoes move over Northern Pacific daily from processing plants established on our line in the Columbia Basin area of the State of Washington. The fine potatoes in your Red River Valley are closer to the volume market and our Industrial Development people confidently predict the establishment of additional potato processing plants in eastern North Dakota in the immediate future.

Construction of the Garrison Diversion Irrigation Project is now assured. It will provide irrigation for roughly 250,000 acres of land, and, further, it will supply municipal and industrial water for 14 towns and cities and for four large industrial areas. Construction of this project alone will pour millions of dollars into the local economy.

I know that many of you gentlemen here have worked hard and long to promote and obtain appropriations for the completion of this project. You must have a feeling of satisfaction, and de-

servedly so, in seeing this most necessary development coming closer to reality.

The Northern Pacific and the other North Dakota railroads are proud to have been active partners with you in the agricultural development of your state, and we intend to continue to contribute our thinking and our resources to promote the future prosperity of North Dakota.

Industrial development is another area in which the railroads have been increasing their efforts.

Each railroad has its own Industrial Development Department, manned by alert and efficient personnel. Their responsibility is to promote industrial growth, principally in the urban centers, and to establish additional industries on their lines in North Dakota.

This area of industrial development calls for the closest cooperation between the railroads and the communities concerned. Here, again, we are partners with the businessmen of North Dakota and our "togetherness" results in bringing industries into the state and supplying additional traffic for the railroads.

In connection with future industrial development, let me turn for a few moments to the potential of North Dakota's massive deposits of lignite. These deposits are now being used principally as a source of energy for steam-electric generating plants.

In September of this year, Northern Pacific began the first unit coal train operation west of the Mississippi River. The 42-car coal train initiating this operation delivers lignite coal from North American Coal Corporation's Indianhead Mine near Zap to the United Power Association's steam electric generating plant near Stanton. The cars used in this train are unloaded automatically while in motion and the 42 cars, each carrying 100 tons of coal, can be unloaded in approximately 12 minutes.

Research designed to produce petro-chemicals, gas and even 100 octane gasoline from coal is progressing favorably. There is a distinct possibility that within the next decade you will see the erection and operation of huge plants in North Dakota which will convert lignite into gasoline which will be pumped to Chicago and other populous centers in the Midwest through a network of pipelines. Needless to say, such a development would bring great prosperity to your state.

I have talked to you in rather glowing terms about the future, but because we are living in the present, you might very well ask, "— but what about the present and what have the railroads done for us lately?"

Well — one thing we have done for you lately is to make great strides in alleviating the freight car shortage which has been so frustrating during periods of peak grain movements.

The North Dakota railroads assumed leadership nationally by actively lobbying for the "Incentive Per Diem Bill" which was passed by the last Congress and which should result in the purchase of more freight cars by Eastern Railroads, which will ease the shortage in the West.

By any yardstick, we have purchased more than our proportionate share of freight cars. Northern Pacific spent \$19,433,600 for freight cars in 1966. In addition, it leased 300 box cars and purchased 16 new diesels for \$3,915,000. While I do not have the figures for the Great Northern, Soo Line and Milwaukee, I know that they have bought their share.

Each year the North Dakota railroads have acquired additional numbers of 100-ton trough-hatched covered hopper cars for the transportation of grain. In addition, other specialized cars have been put into service; such as, air-slide cars for sugar and 85-foot Pig Palace cars which have a capacity of 335 hogs per car.

While we may have occasional car shortages, hopefully we are over the hump insofar as periodic car shortages are concerned.

We have all learned over the past few years that you can't make a profit on the business you turn away, and if we don't supply the cars, we can't handle the business.

Another area in which the railroads have been active "lately" is by paying ever-increasing taxes.

How to raise enough money fairly and equitably to pay for education, roads, welfare and many other necessary functions of state government is an ever-present problem which, candidly, I am glad is your problem and not mine. I make no suggestion as to how it should be solved, except to candidly suggest that the railroads are now overtaxed and should not be asked to bear a further burden.

In 1965, the railroads paid in North Dakota approximately \$5,000,000 in property taxes, of which about \$3,000,000 was for support of your elementary and secondary schools. Another \$650,000 was allocated for roads, and \$1,300,000 for support of other local governmental units. The Northern Pacific alone paid approximately \$1,500,000.

We do not begrudge the payment of these taxes. We accept them as one of the burdens of good citizenship, although from time to time we do complain, as some of you do, that they are too high. In the matter of taxes, the railroads are at a disadvantage with their principal competitors because of our ownership of our rights-of-way and terminal facilities. The truck lines operate over highways paid for by the tax funds to which we have contributed and the airlines are guided by radar and radio beams installed and paid for by the Federal Government.

Next, let me refer briefly to rail freight rates on the national level. Since 1958, the cost of almost everything we buy has risen appreciably, except rail freight rates. They have gone down an average of 15 per cent in the same period of time.

Today, the nation's railroads are faced with ever-increasing costs.

In the area of labor and taxes, it is estimated that the boost in labor costs in 1967 will amount to approximately \$300,000,000 over 1966. The possibility of a Federal income tax increase is not to be discounted. Increases in the cost of payroll taxes as a result of recently negotiated supplemental annuities for railroad employees will tack an additional \$27,000,000 on the 1967 tab.

Costs this year will be increased by another \$34,000,000 - \$35,000,000 because of increases in the Railroad Retirement Tax and for health insurance.

Because of these increased expenses, serious consideration must be given to an increase in freight rates. I am one of those who holds the view that a horizontal freight rate increase is not the answer. I believe our past experience fully documents this position.

Certainly some increases are indicated, but these should be made selectively, after thorough appraisal as to whether or not the transportation price on this particular commodity is compatible with the railroad's revenue requirements.

An area in which the railroads have consistently lost money is in the transportation of less-than-carload shipments. These consist of small items weighing from two to three pounds to several hundred pounds.

Northern Pacific has conceived a plan to lessen the loss sustained in this part of its business by transferring it to its motor carrier subsidiary.

The Interstate Commerce Commission has approved Northern Pacific Transport to move intrastate traffic over the highway must

highway-for-rail service on freight shipments in Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota and eastern Montana.

The approval granted by the Interstate Commerce Commission applies only to interstate shipments. It does not apply to intrastate shipments in North Dakota — those originating within the state for destinations within the state. Authority for Northern Pacific Transport to move intrastate traffic over the highway must come from the North Dakota Public Service Commission.

We want to accord to North Dakota intrastate shippers the same service improvements which Railway plans to offer interstate shippers by use of substituted high-for-rail service.

Northern Pacific Transport Company is applying to the North Dakota Public Service Commission for authority to carry intrastate traffic. We are hopeful that this will be granted in order to complete our program for providing significantly improved service, particularly to the rural and small communities along our line within your state.

Of decided interest to each of you are several bills which have been introduced by the representatives of the Railroad Brotherhoods. They would provide for certain sanitary facilities on locomotives; prohibit the use of certain alerter devices, and require the Public Service Commission to prescribe a series of unnecessary regulations covering motor vehicles used by railroads to carry employees to and from work. When I was President of the Frisco and of the Burlington, we sat down with our employees and worked out these differences. In my judgment, they are problems which you should not be bothered with, and they should not be enacted into law.

I am sure that the North Dakota railroads can settle these matters with their employees by negotiation.

I cannot leave you today without saying something about the proposed merger of the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Burlington lines.

Most of you know that this merger was supported by your Public Service Commission and by many of the businessmen and farm organizations in your state.

Soundly conceived railroad mergers are in the public interest. The merger of the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Burlington will be good for North Dakota. It will improve your car supply, give you faster freight service, provide wider routing and transit privileges, and supply capital for modernization and improvement of the physical rail facilities.

Our merger is important to you in order to keep North Dakota competitive.

Recently, the Milwaukee filed an application to merge with the Chicago and North Western Railway. This merger will substantially strengthen both of these roads.

Hearings are now in progress on the Union Pacific - Rock Island merger, which, if consummated, will give the Union Pacific entrance into Chicago and a single-line route from the Pacific Coast to the Twin Cities.

If these mergers become a reality, the Northern Lines will be at a distinct disadvantage unless they, too, are permitted to combine their properties.

North Dakota needs strong and efficient railroads, and in the light of the whole merger picture, approval of our merger is important to the continued prosperity of your state.

The Interstate Commerce Commission has reopened our case, and hearings on a limited basis will begin in Washington, D. C., on

March 6. We are hopeful that these new hearings will result in a favorable order from the Commission.

Gentlemen, I have gone on at some length, touching on things past and things to come, on present economic conditions and prospects for the future. If we can count, in the future, upon the same kind of cooperation, help and friendship that you have given us in the past — and I am sure we can — I promise you that we shall never meet a problem that the railroads and the citizens of North Dakota cannot lick together.

In closing, may I ask you to continue your enthusiasm — You are the representatives of the people of a Great State, and nobody has ever made a dime by selling North Dakota short!

EXPLANATION OF VOTE ON HOUSE BILL NO. 722

Rep. T. McDonald, 21st Dist.: "When House Bill No. 722 was voted on Thursday I voted against this bill. My feeling was that the bill would jeopardize the West Fargo educational system in that there was a clear opportunity for the City of Fargo to annex a tract of land which constitutes better than 10% of the West Fargo tax base.

"Since voting on the bill this matter has been resolved to my satisfaction. At a meeting at the Biltmore Motel the night of February 4, which was attended by four members of the Fargo City Commission (Lashkowitz, Oakey, Korsmo, and Johnson) and members of the SW Fargo City Commission (Clayton Ladon, Al Depple, and Jake Gust), Mr. Berger, Superintendent of the Schools in West Fargo, and Richard Twitchell, City Attorney of West Fargo, and others, it was clearly brought out that the main property owners in the area affected on West Main have petitioned the City of Fargo to supply them with sewer and water. The contract which will be signed between these individuals and the City of Fargo guarantees that the City of Fargo will not initiate the annexation of the property of these individuals for a period of ten years.

"Based on these contracts and the statements of the commissioners in attendance from the City of Fargo I have decided that I will support this bill. It is clearly understood that my change in attitude is based on the faith in the statements presented at that meeting between the commissioners of the City of Fargo and the City of SW Fargo."

EXPLANATION OF VOTE ON HOUSE BILL No. 727

Rep. Backes: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to have permission to print my remarks in the Journal.

"House Bill No. 727 is an attempt to fool the taxpayers of this state.

"It is clear to me that the majority party has not agreed to a policy of eliminating the personal property tax and that a good number of the majority party are against repealing personal property taxes.

"If House Bill No. 727 is passed by the Senate and becomes law, we will have such a confused personal property tax system that nobody will be able to make heads or tails out of it. It repeals the household goods and miscellaneous farm machinery permanently and gives 20% off on the other personal property for the years 1968 and 1969.

"I want to be on record in predicting that the 1969 legislative session will be forced to let the personal property tax go back on everything except the household goods and miscellaneous farm machinery.

"The livestock owners, the farmers, and the businessmen are going to be stuck with personal property taxes forever. The only items that will escape personal property tax will be the household goods and miscellaneous farm machinery.

"Here's why I believe that personal property taxes will not be completely repealed if this bill passes.

"There isn't going to be any place to go for the replacement revenue.

"Who do you suppose is going to support a 4% sales tax?

"Do you think you can raise it all with an income tax, that will more than double the income tax."

"Who is going to share in the replacement revenue when thousands of people who pay only on household goods will no longer be paying a personal property tax?

"Do you think that householders will favor increasing the sales tax or the income tax for somebody else's personal property taxes?

"I believe that there are some freshmen members of the majority party who honestly want to repeal the personal property tax. I want to tell them that a study commission will produce nothing but more delays.

"Finally House Bill No. 727 is going to go down in history as the 'Australian tax package'.

"After considering all of the provisions of this bill, I have called it that because it has a 'boomerang' provision. This is the provision where the taxpayer thinks he is throwing away the personal property tax and in 1969 he will get it right back on the head."

Rep. Halcrow: Mr. Speaker and Members of this Assembly:

"I move a substitute motion that House Bill 746 be placed on the calendar. This bill says that in tort actions where an award is made in a court of law in favor of the plaintiff, the court may increase the award by an amount not to exceed 33 1/3% for attorney fees and costs. In actual practice, with few exceptions, automobile insurance policies for liability and property damage cannot be purchased that provide full coverage, although this is not mentioned when the purchase is made. Reasonable settlements are difficult to obtain unless attorneys are employed. If you hire an attorney, the damaged party will generally get 75% of the settlement. If the matter goes to trial, the plaintiff, if successful, will usually get 66 2/3% of the award; and if the case must be tried in another state, the aggrieved party will usually get 50% of the award.

"The purpose of House Bill 746 is to modify only the advantages accruing to the insurance carrier in playing what may be accurately called the Waiting Game.

"The Waiting Game has several profitable advantages to the carrier:

1. The rightful claimant may die, move away, or give up in disgust, in which case the carrier pays nothing.
2. The insurance company has the settlement money for a period of time, and the longer this continues, the more profitable.
3. The Statute of Limitation may run out, and no action is possible.
4. The carrier may settle the matter for a few cents on the dollar when the rightful claimant cannot afford to wait any longer, or has to settle for other reasons.
5. There can be no increase to the insurance company if, through their delay or refusal of reasonable settlement, the case does in fact go to court. Neither of the parties to an action in court can reveal whether or not insurance has been carried.

"House Bill 746 has been recommended to me by several responsible attorneys as the most logical action that can be taken to correct the widespread abuses that are occurring in the settlement of claims arising out of motor vehicle accidents. The Waiting Game is a very serious problem, and if we do nothing to solve it, we may well be inviting its solution by the Federal Government. The Waiting Game is not peculiar to North Dakota but is prevalent across most of the United States.

"The citizens of North Dakota are paying out huge sums for motor vehicle insurance to protect themselves and their neighbors in case of accident. They believe they are fully covered, but find only to the contrary after they have been involved in an accident. Merchants who sell motor vehicle insurance are usually honest, hard working, reliable people. They do not make the policies and usually have little to do with settlements of any sizeable claims.

"The Legislature has the responsibility of protecting our citizens from questionable practices in any economic area of activity. If we fail to serve the people by proper action, the only relief possible is in the Initiative Petition by the people themselves.

"I ask for your support for the substitute motion."

Rep. Halcrow's substitute motion that House Bill No. 746 be placed on the calendar, prevailed on a division vote and Speaker Aamoth announced that House Bill No. 746 would now be placed on the calendar.

This section shall not apply:

1. Where the named insured has failed to discharge when due any of his obligations in connection with the payment of premiums for the policy, or the renewal thereof, or any installment payments therefor, whether payable directly to the insurer or its agent or indirectly under any premium finance plan or extension of credit; provided that, notwithstanding the failure of an insurer to comply with this section, the policy shall terminate on the effective date of any other automobile liability insurance policy procured by the insured, with respect to any automobile designated in both policies.

EXPLANATION OF VOTE ON HOUSE BILL NO. 818

Rep. Solberg of the 9th Dist.:

"House Bill No. 818 is an act providing for an interstate compact to provide a better understanding and exchange of ideas on the state and national levels. Originally the idea of Dr. Conant, a famous educator, it provides a nation wide commission where leaders in the political and educational field could sit down and discuss ways of improving education in the various states.

"Each state selects its own committee of seven members. The chairman is the governor who selects four leading educators to serve on the committee and two legislative members chosen from the House and Senate and named by the presiding officer.

"The full committee meets once a year. It was my privilege to attend last year's meeting with Supt. M. F. Peterson. It was a new and rewarding experience to see governors, legislators and educators attending this meeting in open and frank discussion of the many problems in the field of education.

"The act provides for a steering committee consisting of eight governors, eight legislators and sixteen educators to carry out the recommendation that may be made by the full commission. At present there are 38 states that are members of the commission.

"The commission could strengthen the role of the states in the field of education. It could tend to eliminate duplication by federal programs and discourage programs that tend to circumvent state departments of education.

There is a fee for membership in the commission that ranges from \$7,500 a year for small states like ours to \$22,000 a year for larger states. While this may seem large, when compared to what is spent for education in this state, in state and federal funds it is very small.

"In the matter of federal funds, Dr. Conant, who is the father of the Interstate Commission, has said, and I quote "The consequence of failure of the states to act together — and together with Federal authorities — will be confusion doubly compounded.

"The vast increase in federal funds for education, which I heartily welcome, is too likely to result in a tangled mess that no one can straighten out unless the states take new and energetic action. And they can only plan together if they can obtain and share information. In short, without some device as an International Planning

Commission I do not see how a nationwide policy can be shaped and made effective." End of quote.

"To those of us who served on the budget committee in the past biennium it seemed that this state of "tangled mess" is already with us. I don't know if this is the answer but I would certainly like to see it given a try.

"I want to state that this bill has the support of Supt. Peterson, superintendent of public instruction and Commissioner Raschke of higher education who both appeared in the Education Committee in support of this bill."

"I will readily agree, the minority has a perfect right to express and be heard, but when unrealistic, fantastic and ridiculous proposals are offered purely for political propaganda, I apprehend that it is time to point out that we, the majority, with the burden of responsibility at this time, make it clear and loud that we accept our responsibility.

"We will make no attempt to disillusion the citizens of our great state with lures of false tax relief for the sake of political expediency.

"If I am not mistaken, the voters twice voted down proposals for complete repeal of all personal property, for want of a sound, responsible replacement program.

"Zealous, self-centered, and I hasten to add, (an overburdened segment of our business community) appears to have abandoned a tempered, moderate approach to an orderly, realistic elimination of the inequities of the problem. As Plutarch is quoted in his analogies, Page 688, "Perseverance is more prevailing than violence; and many things which cannot be overcome when they are together, yield themselves up when taken little by little", unquote.

"I imagine it to be so. We in the legislature and those involved daily, with governmental problems, have a tendency to adhere to basic formulas, stagnated by experience. It has been my experience in dealing with those who have all the proposals but side-step the answers by saying "that is your job", to formulate a plan to assign them, "in an official capacity" to the "decision-making body". Our government, being that "of the people, for the people and by the people" — it would appear that they should participate and assume responsibility in shaping the destiny of "permanent elimination of personal property taxation" and a sound program of "replacement taxation".

"To conceive this end result, the majority party, as a result of a special tax information committee, after 2½ weeks of "hearing out" special interest groups, individuals and Professor Tom Osteson, studying Dr. Konker's scholarly Report on Taxation, came to the conclusion that the best interest of all could be served by the commission proposed in House Bill No. 728.

"In the life of a man, two years is a minute period of time. The future of our economy, the stability of our financing and the welfare of our citizenry, I should think, is entitled to this orderly and sane approach.

"Your vote of confidence for this proposal will be recorded in the annals of history, that the Fortieth Session of the Legislature upheld the trust of our sovereign democracy, a government of the people, by the people and for the people."

2. Sick Leave. — Each such employee shall be entitled to sick leave with full pay on the basis of one working day for each complete month of service; provided, that one-half day of sick leave may at the discretion of the employment unit be granted for service comprising fifty percent or more of the working hours during any calendar month. Sick leave shall be accumulated for not more than one hundred twenty working days; provided further, that eighteen working days of sick leave may, upon the approval of the head of the employment unit, be taken in advance of the accumulation thereof. EIGHTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rep. Streibel moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort Hon. Mark Andrews to the rostrum, which motion prevailed.

Speaker Aamoth appointed Reps. Eagles and Erickson, 26th Dist.
Congressman Andrews addressed the Assembly.

Congressman Andrews:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the North Dakota House. It is indeed a privilege to be here with you today. It is also very gratifying to look out over this group and find such an increase in the numbers of a certain political party represented here as compared to the time I visited you two years ago.

"I suspect that part of my good luck in the last election was due to the fact that many of those of you who are seated here today brought out a few extra votes in the column I benefited from.

"Seriously, the House of Representatives in Washington has not gotten under way in any great volume of work as yet. We've got some 70 new members and it's taking a certain amount of time to get used to each other. Something like the honeymoon where you learn to get along together before you settle down to business. In all reality though our problems on the national legislative scene are almost identical with those of yours on the State Legislative scene.

"The main action in the House of Representatives, as you know, is the action to refuse to seat a member of the House, Adam Clayton Powell. While this has been given much headlines as it applies to one individual, I think really it's a much broader subject than just one individual since in our Republic confidence in government and those who represent the people must be present or that government simply fails to function. Frankly speaking, the danger of Adam Clayton Powell is the danger that our nation is getting to be a "get-by" society where individuals feel that since people in positions of responsibility and trust, even in leadership in government feel that whatever they can get by with is all right.

"Just two weeks ago we were shocked to read in the newspapers the stories of the tragic snowstorm that hit the great metropolitan area of Chicago, and with it, and the lack of police protection, came break-ins, lootings and riots, even to the death of one 10 year old child caught in police gun fire.

"The professional handwringers said that this was due to pockets of poverty. I dispute this quite definitely since nowhere was there more poverty than in North Dakota during the 30's. Those of us who were here during the 30's know how desperate everyone became with a drought, low farm prices and little, if any money. But that desperation didn't turn to acts of terror or acts of theft and looting. Those few people who could afford automobiles could park them any place in North Dakota without having the hubcaps stolen from them.

"So the Adam Clayton Powell incident, I think, typifies in a sense how far we have come from the philosophy of Lincoln, Jeffer-

son, Jackson, Washington and other great American leaders. Today we are in an era of great technological advancement. Our missiles are faster, our atomic weaponry is more devastating, our astronauts generally succeed in orbit but the fundamental and basic morality that must accompany a representative form of government is in the public mind sometimes not prevalent. This abuse of governmental privilege is taking place in a very small fraction of 1 percent of those in positions of trust. Yet it is incumbent on the rest of us to make sure that this does not get by. This is why it is important that the Adam Clayton Powells, the Bobby Bakers and the rest are punished. This is why it is important that those of us who are privileged to represent people in legislatures make sure that our actions day by day are completely above reproach. This is why I salute you members of the North Dakota Legislature who are doing such a great job giving of yourself in long hours of service you put in to build a greater and a stronger and a more responsive state for all of us.

"It has been a privilege to be with you here today and I sincerely hope that if there is any way I can cooperate with you from Washington, you will let me know."

Rep. Streibel moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort Hon. Milton R. Young to the rostrum, which motion prevailed.

Speaker Aamoth appointed Reps. Dick and Bullis as such committee.

Senator Young addressed the Assembly.

Senator Milton R. Young:

"Mr. Speaker, and members of the House of Representatives:

"It is wonderful to be back with you again. I note that there is only one member of either House who was here when I left twenty-two years ago. That member is our delightful farmer friend and able legislator, Miss Haugland of Ward. From all indications, she is going to be around here for quite some time yet. I hope so.

"I am deeply appreciative of the nice resolution you recently passed in my behalf which was initiated by this House and approved by both bodies. This is something that I will always treasure greatly.

"I note you are wrestling with some of the same problems that we had 34 years ago when I first came here — such as raising enough money to operate the state.

"Your salary and expenses, while still meager, are a little improvement over my time. We had a few advantages, though. The best room in town only cost about \$2.50 a day. Food was cheap and even though refreshments were sometimes hard to get, they were cheaper and tax free!

"You have probably noted that the seniority system in the United States Senate has finally caught up with me. I have now attained the position of ranking Republican on the Senate Appropriations Committee. This has presented some new problems and difficult decisions.

"For the past 18 years I have been the ranking Republican on the Subcommittee on Agriculture Appropriations, and Chairman when the Republicans were in control. Because of our tremendous defense expenditures, I feel it incumbent upon me now to take over the ranking position on the Defense Subcommittee. I will still retain the second ranking position on the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee. This assures that I will be a conferee on all these appropriations bills with the House.

"Leaving the ranking Republican position on Agriculture Appropriations is a most difficult decision.

"We have just completed hearings on two military appropriations bills totalling over \$83 billion. This is a huge amount of money, but it must have high priority if we are to maintain our military supremacy over the Soviet Union, and support our men fighting the war in Viet Nam.

"On no other committee of Congress does a member deal with so many top secret programs such as the development of new and secret weapons of war, as well as top secret operations of our various intelligence-gathering agencies such as C.I.A., D.I.A., N.S.A., and others. While the cost of operating these various intelligence agencies is over \$1 billion a year, I don't know of anything more important than to have the fullest possible knowledge at all times as to what is going on inside Communist nations, what new weapons of war they are developing, what their intentions may be, and what plans they may have that would affect our national security.

"We are developing innumerable new and highly sophisticated weapons of war. All the information concerning them is usually top secret until they are deployed or shortly before. I sometimes think that we go much too far in keeping such information classified.

"We have a good example here in North Dakota. Last fall the Air Force failed in three attempts to fire a Minuteman II missile from a silo in the Grand Forks area. I have known for three months what the problem was, but have been trying ever since then to get Air Force officials to give me a statement that would be meaningful and answer some of the questions regarding these failures. Long ago I could have given what I believe would have been a satisfactory answer, but didn't do so because of the possibility of breaking security regulations.

"You would be very much interested in the letter I just received last week from Secretary of the Air Force Harold Brown. He goes into considerable detail as to the reliability and effectiveness of these weapons — all of which I agree with. In speaking of the Grand Forks' tests, he states: Quote.

"The first launch was delayed due to a maintenance problem disclosed by checks that are routine. In the second case, "the launch could have been accomplished by alternate means but it was not our purpose in this case to test the alternate launch system. The third launch brought to light an additional sub-standard component that is being replaced." End of Quote.

"In short, they are saying that there was something wrong with some of these missiles, but it has been corrected, and that in 31 live firings from Cape Kennedy and Vandenberg Air Force Base there was only one failure.

"These Minuteman missiles are now our first line of defense. They are highly effective and the newer versions will be even more so. The Minuteman I's at Minot, as you know, are now being replaced with Minuteman II's. In a matter of about two years the Minuteman II at both bases will be replaced with the even more effective and destructive Minuteman III.

"The cost of deploying the original Minuteman wings at Grand Forks and Minot was approximately \$1 billion for each wing. The cost of replacing them is less, but still runs into a sizable amount of money. The cost of these and our other military bases all over the world give some idea what price we must pay for national security.

"It has been wonderful being with you again. I enjoyed every minute of it, and I hope I will get a chance to visit with all of you before leaving."

Dear Senator Young:

This letter relates to our previous discussion on the reliability of MINUTEMAN II.

As I mentioned to you, the best possible measure of reliability lies in our experience with actual full scale firings of the MINUTEMAN. In thirty-one live firings from Cape Kennedy and Vandenberg AFB we have had but one failure. While these launches have been in the development program, the missiles are identical to those installed in North Dakota except that they are equipped with telemetry for the collection of a variety of launch data. This factor would, if anything, tend to reduce the probability of success in such launches. Therefore, I have high confidence in the reliability of MINUTEMAN II. As a note of further confidence, three of the thirty-one test firings were successfully accomplished after the Long Life aborts in October 1966.

The Long Life II missile was first scheduled for launching at Grand Forks on October 12, 1966. A malfunction in a downstage nozzle control unit discovered on a routine check four days prior to the planned launch date caused us to reschedule the test. Obviously, we delayed the launch and conducted additional checks to assure that the valuable components would not be expended in a launch providing questionable test data.

The launch was rescheduled for October 19, 1966. On this date the missile was not launched due to a malfunction in the power supply equipment attributable to a sub-standard resistor. After a complete check of the MINUTEMAN II component involved, both in the sites and in the maintenance shops, thirty-three resistors of this type were replaced. In this instance an alternate method for launching would have been available operationally; however, it was not authorized under the test environment. The test was rescheduled for October 29, 1966. This attempted launch was aborted when it failed to complete terminal countdown due to the failure of a miniaturized capacitor in the Guidance and Control unit amplifier. This capacitor is being replaced by a more dependable unit.

At this time, it is our intention to reschedule the Long Life test next summer or fall when permissive inflight weather conditions prevail, and when programmed system updating would provide more pertinent data.

From the outset of the project, we did not plan to attempt the test launch unless all sub-systems checked out perfectly in the countdown sequence. While successful launches are possible with some degradation of sub-systems we must adopt this policy to assure the maximum return for the money invested in such a test program.

In summary, the first launch was delayed due to a maintenance problem disclosed by checks that are routine. In the second case, the launch could have been accomplished by alternate means but it was not our purpose in this case to test the alternate launch system. The third launch brought to light an additional sub-standard component that is being replaced. Thus, three attempts failed under this test environment, which is oriented to the collection of all possible data rather than to launching the missile. However, an analysis of the facts involved in these attempts does not reduce our confidence in MINUTEMAN II reliability developed from the live full range firings.

Knowledge and experience gained through exercises such as Project Long Life are used to identify system problems and to im-

prove the effectiveness of the MINUTEMAN forces. Exercises with the same goal in mind are also used to demonstrate the effectiveness of our aircraft, guns, air-to-air missiles and other systems. Failures do occur; however, by the very nature of the test program, we are in a position to identify fixes in minimum time. Through these continuing efforts we are able to insure the operational reliability of all of our weapons.

The question was now on the original motion of Rep. Bier that the report of the Committee on General Affairs on House Concurrent Resolution "Y-1" be adopted, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Kent: "I rise in opposition to the indefinite postponement of House Concurrent Resolution "Y-1".

"Mr. Speaker and Members of the North Dakota Legislative Assembly:

"Recently the Grand Forks Herald published a Washington (AP) story which stated that Secretary of the Treasury Henry H. Fowler has asked Congress to raise the national debt ceiling by \$7 billion to a new level of \$337 billion.

"Fowler said that unless Congress acts, the Treasury will have to start 'holding some payments' up within a month. He said that among the payments that would be in jeopardy about March 1 unless the debt limit is raised are social security and disability benefits, veterans pensions, and military and civilian retirements.

"I hope you realize that one man, a member of the cabinet, is threatening all of our senior citizens if the budget is not raised. Also the pay of military and civilian retirement recipients would be reduced. Of course, this last statement is pure conjecture and as long as we have a government, this certainly comes under its 'implied powers'.

"I am aware of the fact that some Republicans were elected to office on the 'Statement of Principles' adopted as the North Dakota Republican platform. I also recall that some candidates who advocated 'family security' were elected. I think that the 'Statement of Principles' is excellent; a statement to which I can subscribe and uphold. Can you? I believe that it behooves every legislator to seriously re-read, study, and uphold the 'Statement of Principles' again.

"The Liberty Amendment RESOLUTION is before our North Dakota Legislature. You will recall that the RESOLUTION passed the 1961 House. A large number of North Dakota citizens expected both Houses to pass the Liberty Amendment RESOLUTION during this session. Please realize that this is only a RESOLUTION. You are merely being asked to give your constituents an opportunity to be heard. The voice of the people was distinctly and clearly expressed at the polls last November 8th. The voters said among other things that the present 'spendthrift' government must STOP! I hope that you heard this 'voice' and therefore will bring common sense, respectability, and morality back into our state and national governments. With the passage of the Liberty Amendment RESOLUTION you will have taken the initial step of putting our Social Security system into the protection of our private enterprise system. Surely North Dakota legislators have faith in a system that made America great. Therefore, I must conclude that you are not afraid of our private enterprise, or, must I ask the question, are you afraid of private enterprise?"

"Recently another news article indicated that a young man entering the work force now and making payments (deductions) into the SS system until retirement will have to pay \$25,000.00 into the fund which would annute to him upon retirement. What kind of security does this man have under our present system? NONE! It just keeps raising the national debt or keeps cutting the Social Security payment. Our present system is nearly broke; it is operating from our deductions that are paid in weekly, bi-monthly, or monthly amounts to make this socialistic system operate.

"When our senior citizens wake up and feel the first cut and when our retired military and retired civilians are threatened, it will be a terrible situation for them.

"I am pleading with you to listen to those who are asking you to support the Liberty Amendment RESOLUTION.

"Records show that 80% of the personal income tax comes from wage earners who are in the \$10,000.00 bracket or less. Eliminating the personal federal income tax would mean a 20% pay hike for the average wage earner. To my knowledge, this is more than any Democrat or Republican has ever before offered a wage earner. Putting the Social Security system on sound ground would be comparable to a retirement program with one of America's foremost life insurance companies and then with no threats from a U. S. cabinet officer!

"I am sincerely requesting and I am urging that you pass the Liberty Amendment RESOLUTION during this session.

"Yours for a sound government and a better America. Thank you.

"I now yield to Rep. Bilden."

Rep. Bilden:

"Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I rise in opposition to the motion for indefinite postponement and wish to have my remarks recorded in the Journal.

"You have before you for consideration today House Concurrent Resolution "Y-1", The Liberty Amendment. Very briefly, what is the purpose of the Liberty Amendment?

"The purpose of The Liberty Amendment is to renew personal freedom, the ability of individuals to exercise God-given rights with a minimum of dependence on and interference from, the federal government. This purpose may be stated in another way. To restore to ourselves and to future generations, which we inherited from our forefathers. Advantages which made us the most blessed, and greatest nation on earth.

"In short, one certain way to roll back the socialist revolution imposed by our federal government, and, covering our states more each year, is to adopt the Liberty Amendment, introduced in Congress by U. S. Representative, James B. Utt, Republican of California, as House Joint Resolution 23.

"Identical Liberty Amendment Resolutions have now been approved, by the State Legislatures of Wyoming, Texas, Nevada, Louisiana, Georgia, South Carolina and the latest, Mississippi, passed in 1964. Identical resolutions are now considered for passage in 26 state legislative sessions with six more to be introduced in the coming few days.

"The Liberty Amendment will do nothing to change the original Constitution in any way whatever. Instead, it will compel the federal government to abide by the terms of the contract between the federal government and we, the people. When this is done, there will be no need for the billions of tax dollars now being collected from the federal taxes on personal incomes, inheritances and gifts.

"This amendment would repeal the 16th (income tax) amendment, specify that treaties cannot override our Constitution, and prohibit the federal government from engaging in any enterprise except as authorized by the Constitution. Passing this resolution does NOT make the Liberty Amendment into law. It only asks Congress to send the amendment back to the state legislatures for future consideration and ratification.

"Article 5 of the Constitution provides for amendments. To bring action, either Congress must act, or two-thirds of the states must

pass identical resolutions requiring Congress to act. Final ratification of the Amendment itself would be needed by three-fourths of the State Legislatures. In the interim of time, calm, rational, and factual, deliberation could take place. This resolution merely puts the issue before the people officially for consideration. And the people have this right to be heard. Are we going to deny them this right. I say no. I, for one, must vote yes on the Liberty Amendment Resolution.

"House Concurrent Resolutions "R", "P" and "M" seem to indicate the desires of this body may be, that, small steps could be taken against, the usurpation of power away from North Dakota.

"The Liberty Amendment, will accomplish all of these things and many more.

"I must repeat therefore, this resolution merely asks Congress to act. In the interim between now and ratification, objective consideration should be given to the people. The people have this right to be heard. Are we going to deny them this right? Again, I say NO. I must vote yes on the Liberty Amendment Resolution "Y-1".

"Therefore I urge this body to defeat the motion for indefinite postponement. And, Mr. Speaker, I would request a recorded roll call vote."

Rep. Streibel read into the record the following remarks as prepared by Rep. Reimers who is currently confined to a hospital.

"House Bill No. 896 was the first time a bill has been introduced to have farmers directly support agricultural research. I recognize it has serious inequities and must apologize for those.

"I am sure that most of the members of the Legislative Assembly feel they have adequately supported agricultural research through the years. Most farmers apparently feel this is true. It is not true!

"Compared with the efforts of our friends in Manitoba, our expenditures would approximate 1/5 of their efforts. The same can be said for the state of Washington where 100 bushels of wheat to the acre is common. In the southern states new sorghum varieties average 3,000 pounds per acre and compete with North Dakota barley averaging 1/2 of that. The same can be said for the large corn states where they have increased yields from 40 bushels to 150 bushels. North Dakota could afford a lot of things if we had this kind of yields.

"The research efforts in North Dakota are commendable and everyone should know that we have received \$20 back for every \$1 invested in agricultural research. North Dakota's best bet for the future still lies in the Agricultural Experiment Station as the most economical kind of unit to bring together the talents and facilities for crops research.

"I believe that a system has to be devised—and soon—so the farmers contribute directly to agricultural research programs and contribute whatever is necessary to sustain a progressive agriculture. Many new things are on the horizon for North Dakota agriculture with no way to finance them; hybrid wheat, barley, and flax not to mention several new crops not heretofore grown in North Dakota.

"Adequate financing for agricultural research in North Dakota can no longer be totally at the mercy of the Legislature where so many other needs have to be considered.

"Let me conclude by saying that I hope I have attentioned you to the seriousness of this matter. If we are to prosper on a competitive basis in the free market with other agricultural producing states, we must finance this program accordingly."

If an installment is not paid in full on or before the date fixed for its payment the whole amount of the unpaid tax shall be paid upon notice and demand from the tax commissioner, and penalty and interest, as provided in sections 57-38-43 and 57-38-45, shall attach, from and after the time of the failure to make such timely payment, to the whole amount of the unpaid tax."

REPORT OF A SELECT COMMITTEE

REPORT OF THE STATE MILL SPECIAL COMMITTEE
PURSUANT TO HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 1 AS AMENDED

Mr. Speaker and members of the North Dakota House of Representatives, your Special State Mill Committee formed pursuant to House Resolution No. 1 as amended, met on February 13 at the Prince Hotel and on several other occasions. Those present in addition to the committee were Messrs. P. R. Fossen, Manager of the State Mill and Elevator, Ben Hennessy, Chief Mill Accountant, Howard Berg, Mill Credit Manager, and Thomas Clifford of the auditing firm of Koppenhaver, Kulas and Clifford of Grand Forks, North Dakota; the said accounting firm having been hired on July 1 on order of the State Auditor.

Available for the committee's study was the annual audit prepared by the said accounting firm for the year ending June 30, 1966. A detailed schedule of all charged off accounts and delinquent accounts was furnished by the State Mill management for our study.

According to the testimony of Mr. Clifford, the delinquent accounts as well as all current accounts had been tested by the auditing firm with a good return. It was stated the test covered all departments of the Mill and that it revealed doubtful accounts of about \$89,000 for fiscal '66, for which a reserve was established. This amount of \$89,000 was largely a remainder from turkey feed accounts particularly of the year 1961 which proved to be a difficult one on the turkey industry. It was noted that most of these accounts were secured by various types of mortgages or liens. The turkey accounts at the end of 1961 had been over one-quarter million dollars. About 60 turkey growers are now served by the Mill and Elevator in North Dakota and Minnesota, the total turkey feed business fiscal '66 having amounted to about \$500,000. A six percent interest charge applies on turkey contracts financed by the Mill. It should be pointed out that the State Mill and Elevator over 20 years ago was instrumental in establishing the turkey feeding business. In all fairness it should be stated that this phase of the Mill's business serves only a small area of the state.

With respect to charged-off accounts, it was pointed out that these were carried somewhat longer than a corporation would do since there is no tax advantage to the Mill and Elevator in writing them off. It was stated that many of these accounts are recovered in the course of collection policies carried on by attorneys and collection agencies.

A 15 year study on charged-off accounts has been made by the Mill and Elevator and for our committee a 10 year summary was offered, which study revealed the following:

The accounts receivable status as of the end of fiscal 1966 was shown to be \$538,000 over 90 days delinquent, of which one account was \$439,000. This delinquent balance has been converted to a note receivable bearing 6¼ percent interest, drawing \$8,000 a month on principal plus \$2,300 per month interest. It was shown that not all of these monthly checks have been collected. It was further pointed out that the interest charge was begun in October of 1965. This single account purchases approximately \$30,000 worth of flour per month, approximately \$400,000 of flour per year, said account using flour from the Mill and Elevator 100 percent.

This committee looked into the suggested 30 day credit limitation suggested in House Resolution "B-1". The Mill management stated that if this resolution were to go into effect that six of the largest buyers would probably cease purchasing at once; that these six and many other purchasers are asking for and are receiving 45 to 60 day terms and that many of the New York accounts ask for and receive from other suppliers 60 day dating after delivery. Delivery from Grand Forks by rail takes from 8 to 10 days. The management of the Mill pointed out that the Semolina accounts using durum all get 60 day terms. It is the feeling of the committee that the matter of terms should, therefore, be left up to the Mill management in order to meet competition.

In regard to the fertilizer business engaged in by the State Mill and Elevator, Mr. Fossen stated that said business was a small percentage of the total volume; that the Mill did not manufacture fertilizers but was in fact a distributor selling to dealers. It was stated that the Mill over the years has promoted the use of fertilizers and that the sale thereof was a logical extension of the mill's business and they would like to continue it.

In summary the committee wishes to state that in view of the extremely limited time available to members of the committee, that it was unable to give more than a cursory examination into the matter directed to its attention by House Resolution No. 1. The charged-off accounts, as exhibited to the committee by the Mill management, would reflect an extremely low rate of loss for the 10 years previous. It appeared to the committee that the delinquent accounts were being handled in a reasonable manner and that the one exceptional account seems to be following a pattern of liquidation. It should be pointed out that the conclusions of the committee as to charged-off and delinquent accounts are substantially the same as those reached by the Special Panel of the Industrial Commission which studied the matter in December of 1965.

The majority of your Special Mill Committee recommends that at some time a professionally guided study in depth should be made of the State Mill and Elevator with the purpose of analyzing its role in our state government, what directions it should take and what suggested changes in policy and enterprises should transpire, if any. It is suggested that if undertaken such a study should be done by experts in the fields of grain handling, transportation, accounting, business management, brokering and agriculture manufacturing. Your committee points out as did the earlier study mentioned, that such a professionally guided study should be carried out in such a way that the State Mill and Elevator would be permitted to continue its functions in a business-like manner.

The State Mill and Elevator has been with us for some 46 years. Since its inception some North Dakotans have been its staunch supporters and some have not. Yet over the years, facts are that the Mill and Elevator has turned over about \$4½ million to various

state agencies and to the general fund. The operation of the State Mill and Elevator is a very complex enterprise and one which is being carried on in a way which is worthy of some praise for the management's skill in handling a difficult assignment in a highly competitive market.

Your committee suggests that perhaps for the present the Industrial Commission might well consider appointing a permanent citizens advisory board to consult with the Mill management from time to time in the interests of good public relations and a better understanding with the citizens of North Dakota as well as to give counsel and advice to the Mill management.

Your Special Mill Committee has appreciated the opportunity of attempting to be of service to the 40th Session of the Legislature, all too well realizing that the press of time because of legislative duties, made the investigation at best only a superficial one.

b. give notice of the auction personally or by registered or certified mail at least ten days before it occurs to all persons shown on the list of creditors and to all other persons who are known to him to hold or assert claims against the transferor; and

c. assure that the net proceeds of the auction are applied as provided in this chapter (section 41-06-06).

4. Failure of the auctioneer to perform any of these duties does affect the validity of the sale or the title of the purchasers, but if the auctioneer knows that the auction constitutes a bulk transfer such failure renders the auctioneer liable to the creditors of the transferor as a class for the sums owing to them from the transferor up to but not exceeding the net proceeds of the auction. If the auctioneer consists of several persons their liability is joint and several.))"

Dear Speaker Aamoth:

House Bill No. 591 was introduced at the request of the State Treasurer to clarify confusing language in existing law relating to the distribution of motor vehicle use taxes to counties and the State General Fund. I emphasize that it was designed to clarify problems relating to motor vehicle use taxes, but not to the distribution of motor vehicle registration funds. It merely amended Section 39-04-39 of the North Dakota Century Code to agree with an official interpretation of this Section by the Attorney General.

House Bill No. 591 would be desirable if House Bill No. 580 were not also in the legislative process. House Bill No. 580 not only takes care of the problem of distribution of motor vehicle use taxes, but it goes even further and solves problems involving the distribution of motor vehicle registration funds.

If House Bill No. 580 is passed and becomes law, House Bill No. 591 would be unnecessary. If House Bill 580 does not pass and become law, the State Treasurer can continue to make motor vehicle use tax distributions according to the Attorney General's ruling, just as he has done in the past. A future legislative session could then resolve any remaining problems in the distribution of motor vehicle use taxes to counties and the State General Fund.

In the interest of maintaining clarity in our state law, I veto House Bill No. 591.

Dear Speaker Aamoth:

I am sure that the sponsors of House Bill No. 782, which would repeal the law preventing corporation farming in our state, are sincere in their belief that the North Dakota family farmer should enjoy the same privileges of incorporation as are now enjoyed by non-farm people.

We do not know how many farm families in North Dakota would benefit by incorporating their farms, but even the most enthusiastic advocates of corporation farming admit that the number would be small.

We should try to put corporation farming in its proper perspective. Historically, this state has benefited from and has been harmed by corporation farming that was permitted prior to the passage of the law you seek to repeal. We have ample history as to the effects of corporation farming as it existed in North Dakota nearly 35 years ago.

Today, our North Dakota farm economy is based almost entirely on individual farm ownership. The strength of our nation's free enterprise, competitive economic system is based on the broad base of individual private ownership of land. The more people who can enjoy direct ownership of property, including farm land, the

stronger and broader is the base that undergirds our American economic system.

It is easy to see the tragic effects of land ownership in relatively few hands as it exists in Central American countries. It took a land reform program instituted by the United States to strengthen the Japanese society and economy following World War II.

Our country has historically encouraged small unit, private land ownership from the Homestead Act days right up to the present time when 160-acre limits are placed on federal government-financed irrigation unit contracts.

We are despairing over the constant decrease in the number of North Dakota farms which has been taking place for years and will continue to take place under the economic cost-price squeeze in agriculture. We have witnessed the fantastic development of gigantic farm machinery over the last 30 years. We stand almost helplessly watching machines replace people at an alarming rate in our rural communities.

It has been said that there is little evidence that corporation farming in other states has swallowed up small individual farms in its path. But where is the evidence? One thing stands out in the discussions about corporation farming in this session. That is the lack of facts and data as to what corporation farming is doing or is not doing in other states.

There are those who bravely say that corporation farming in North Dakota could be confined to a tightly-knit family operation and thus there would not be created the huge enterprises that could de-populate entire communities. Yet, we have seen in our lifetime that the corporation device has been used as the mechanism for snuffing out many small businesses which used to exist in the manufacture of breakfast food, automobiles, newspapers, and on and on.

There are many who would point to the advantages that our economy has achieved from large corporation development, and I would be quick to agree. But in farming in our state, any action that hastens the de-population of rural communities works a hardship on main street and such necessary institutions as schools and churches.

To those who minimize what corporation farming might do in this state, we need to look at what has apparently happened in agricultural production in other states. It appears that the corporation device has practically eliminated small farm poultry operations in many areas. We are seeing the corporation device rapidly moving in to monopolize the feeding of cattle. Evidence is clear that food canning corporations are monopolizing truck gardening, fruit and nut businesses in valleys that were once the homes of many small farmers. Corporation farming and food processing and retailing are tightly interlocked in many states. Pending federal legislation points out this fact.

Would the type of agriculture in North Dakota be conducive to a rapid build-up in corporation farming if it were permitted? I think the answer is obviously "yes."

Our broad prairies with their huge fields and cash grain crops are ideally suited for out-of-state ownership and large scale machinery which could make a summertime project of cereal grain production, after which the corporation activities could move to southern states to continue the winter season farming operation. This type of an operation would make maximum use of large machinery and limited personnel.

Perhaps I am being an alarmist by suggesting that what has already happened in other industries and in some phases of the farming business in other states could happen to North Dakota

farmers under corporation farming. Perhaps I am being unfair when I suggest that our economy is stronger through direct ownership of land by many people than it would be if that ownership in land and property were filtered through corporate stock.

Perhaps I am dwelling too much on the possible hazards of opening the corporation farming door and not dwelling enough on the advantages that accrue to small family type farm corporations.

I wish I could be as sure as the sponsors of this legislation are that the small family farm operation would be the only ones who would wish to obtain the benefits in taxation, financing and the passing of property from one generation to another, and that large non-family corporations could never result.

However, I say that we do not have enough compelling reason to repeal our anti-corporation farm law at this time. Rather, I think the evidence would support a belief that opening the door to even limited corporation farming would bring more problems than it could solve.

I therefore veto House Bill No. 782.

House Bill 941 is a companion measure to Senate Bill 403. House Bill 941 imposes a $\frac{3}{4}$ of 1% motor vehicle excise tax in the same manner Senate Bill 403 imposes a $\frac{3}{4}$ of 1% sales tax on stated sales.

I have vetoed Senate Bill 403. In order to provide the consistency necessary in our tax structure, I also veto this bill, which in effect raises the motor vehicle excise tax from $2\frac{1}{4}$ % to 3%.

The objections that I have to House Bill 941 are the same objections which have been stated to you in my veto message on Senate Bill 403.

Dear Mr. Speaker:

House Bill 615 seeks to abolish the State Hail Insurance Department. This institution has served the farmers of this state for 55 years.

The Hail Insurance Department, since its founding in 1911, has had an interesting and beneficial career. In the desperate days of 1935, \$1,037,000 was borrowed from the State Hail Insurance Department claim reserve fund in order that the state might meet its general government obligations. This loan without interest was finally repaid when more than \$900,000 was placed back in the claim reserve fund in 1947.

In 1960, the Hail Insurance Department had to become a borrower itself and borrowed \$1,000,000 from the State Bonding Fund without interest. Today, the State Hail Insurance Department is only \$167,848.75 short of being able to repay that emergency \$1,000,000 loan made in 1960.

It could truthfully be said that had more frugal management been available through the years, the State Hail Insurance Department reserve funds would be in a strong position today.

In 1965, newly-elected State Insurance Commissioner K. O. Nygaard took office. He immediately released 17 employees of the State Hail Insurance Department, including its manager. Four employees were kept on and he hired a new manager. This action to reduce the number of State Hail Insurance Department employees brought about a savings in salary and overhead of more than \$100,000 per biennium.

In judging efficiency of the State Hail Insurance Department in the past with what it is now, we need to compare two years.

In the summer of 1964, before Insurance Commissioner Nygaard came into office, this department employed 25 full-time employees and 25 part-time employees. One year later, after Commissioner Nygaard had reorganized the department, five full-time employees and five part-time employees were carrying out the department's business. In other words, 10 people were doing almost as much business as 50 people had done the year before.

Mythical travel by Insurance Department personnel, charged against the various Insurance Department divisions, including the State Hail Insurance Department, during those years, has already been adequately publicized. There is little wonder that the State Hail Insurance Department has been viewed by many with a critical eye over the years.

In 1965, the legislature did permit the Insurance Commissioner to set rates by townships beginning in the 1966 crop season. Because almost unbelievably there was no history of losses kept in 55 years of existence, the new Insurance Commissioner had to set rates closely aligned with those set by commercial companies. With these rates comparable to nearly all commercial companies, and with little incentive by way of commissions to assessors and county auditors to sell state hail insurance, the number of policyholders fell to a low of 1,438 in 1966.

Perhaps the most significant reason for this drop in 1966 was the entrance of a large private insurance company into the hail risk writing business with rates at about 60% of those posted by other private companies and the State Hail Insurance Department. This company has now gone out of the crop hail business and will not write in this state in 1967.

It is my feeling that a need exists to continue the State Hail Insurance Department. If this department is abolished, there is evidence that some townships in our state will receive only partial coverage by private insurance companies and on some crops will receive no coverage at all.

I think we must ask ourselves: Who would benefit by the abolition of the State Hail Insurance Department? Would the farmers who would like to insure with the State Hail Insurance Depart-

ment benefit? No, they would not. As a matter of fact, there might be some farmers whose crops would have to go uninsured.

Would the insurance companies benefit by abolishing the State Hail Insurance Department? No, they would not.

The state is writing only about 2½% of the coverage in North Dakota at the present time and the evidence shows that private companies are reluctant to move into high risk areas which have traditionally been insured by the State Hail Insurance Department. Since about 45 companies now write hail insurance in North Dakota, the 2½% share to the State State Hail Insurance Department is a normal share of the business, but a share of the business carried out in high risk counties.

Will the private companies give full coverage in all counties? The evidence is that they will not. At the present time, townships in 13 western North Dakota counties are denied full hail insurance coverage on certain crops. There is nothing in the law which forces private companies to give hail insurance coverage to all counties on an equal basis.

Would the taxpayers benefit if this department is abolished? There is no evidence to indicate that they would. The department has been self-sufficient from its premiums over the years and has not drawn upon taxpayer money.

Under the frugal and imaginative management of Insurance Commissioner Nygaard, there is no question but what this department will operate on a much more sound and serviceable basis than ever before.

Rather than to abolish this department at this time, I recommend that you give it your legislative help to improve its services.

In a sincere hope that you will reconsider your action to abolish the State Hail Insurance Department, I veto House Bill 615.

Dear Mr. Speaker:

Two years ago, this state's personal property tax on inventories, machinery, equipment, livestock and household goods was completely wiped from the books. Mr. McCarney, with help from other quarters, succeeded in bringing the personal property tax back on the books through the referral of the tax program passed in the last legislative session.

Now, in this session, House Bill 727 seeks partial removal of personal property in the form of exemption of household goods, musical instruments, miscellaneous farm machinery and young calves. This bill was very hastily drawn and floated to the surface late in this session.

I must fault this bill from two standpoints:

- 1.) It is philosophically wrong and detrimental to our state.
- 2.) It is so incompletely thought out that glaring deficiencies exist, making it mechanically unacceptable to administer.

To those who say we cannot do away with the personal property tax completely, I say that we did do away with the personal property tax completely in the 1965 session. We could do it in this session if there were the desire.

The next most acceptable alternative would be to do away with the personal property tax on inventories, machinery, equipment and livestock. This is the portion of the personal property tax which weighs so heavily on our economy. This is the portion that retards economic growth in our state. This is the portion of the personal property tax which discourages investment in new enterprises and in new jobs for North Dakotans. This is the one disadvantage which the North Dakota economy has which could be treated by legislation for total personal property tax removal.

This is the most vicious, unfair part of the personal property tax, for it taxes a man for having to own personal property in order to make a living. It levies a tax on a certain class of people before any income is made. In many instances, the personal property tax on inventories, equipment, machinery and livestock eats up a substantial portion of all of the net profit that could have been made in a given year.

The test for paying taxes should be the ability to pay taxes and the services rendered for those taxes. The man who can earn his income without owning personal property should not have a position of tax advantage over the man who must own personal property to earn that living.

A second alternative to what you propose in House Bill 727 would be to take a percentage reduction in all classes of personal property.

The alternative that you have chosen to eliminate personal property taxes on household goods, miscellaneous farm machinery and young calves is not acceptable to me. If there is any fairness in the personal property tax, it would probably be in that part of the tax on household goods which you propose to eliminate because this tax has some relationship, though not a perfect relationship, to the taxpayer's ability to pay taxes.

I believe if you eliminate the personal property tax on household goods, you will eliminate most of the support for total personal property tax elimination and the most unfair and undesirable part of the tax will remain forever.

I must fault this hastily drawn bill for not having an adequate mechanism for replacing to local political subdivisions the funds that would be lost. The farm-back provision favors those counties which are assessing property above the state average at present and penalizes those counties which are assessing property at less than the state average. The farm-back formula falls short by one and one-half million dollars per year of replacing the revenue lost by the elimination of this portion of the personal property tax. The failure to provide sufficient replacement funds and the inequity in the valuations between counties on which farmed-back funds would be based could not help but throw some severe strains causing higher taxes on real estate and that large

and important part of personal property which you have not chosen to repeal.

It is rather pathetic that this legislature should be desperately casting around for a makeshift personal property tax repeal program along with a program for replacing personal property tax revenues that would be lost to the political subdivisions.

House Bill 728 sets up a commission to study the personal property tax in the coming biennium. Quite often, a study proposal is a thinly veiled excuse for doing nothing. How much study has already gone into personal property tax repeal without noticeable results?

I can supply you with copies of a 1920 report of the North Dakota Tax Commissioner who adequately demonstrated 47 years ago that the personal property tax should be eliminated. The Tax Commissioner in 1920 in his report refers to a 1910 resolution of the National Tax Association and a 1916 report of the Wisconsin Tax Commission concluding that personal property taxes should be eliminated.

The North Dakota Legislative Research Committee in 1957, in 1959, in 1961, in 1964, in 1965, and in 1967 have published reports containing a substantial amount of hand-wringing about the need for personal property tax repeal and reform. The 1965 LRC recommended a resolution directing the Legislative Research Committee to continue to study the subject. The 1965 legislative session did direct such a study, but the study didn't amount to much.

A 1967 report states: "The committee was directed to study and review problems of replacement of personal property tax revenues. Although the committee did not find the opportunity to study replacement revenues in detail, it did study etc. etc." (a subject known as the Canadian business tax).

I hope that House Bill 728 will establish a committee which is interested in complete elimination of the personal property tax rather than a study to find out all of the reasons why the personal property tax should not or cannot be repealed.

I think there is as much danger in this committee's distorting its mission in order to prove that personal property taxes cannot be eliminated as there is that they will accept the mission to try to find replacement revenue for the elimination of personal property taxes. However, since I can see no reason to challenge the effectiveness of such a committee without knowing its composition, I will sign into law House Bill No. 728.

However, since House Bill 727 is not in the best interests of the taxpayers of North Dakota, falls so short of the mark, and contains such serious mechanical weaknesses, I hereby disapprove it by veto.

House Bill 714 would, for the first time since 1919, permit the state and political subdivisions to insure government buildings with private insurance companies rather than the State Fire and Tornado Fund. This bill marks the beginning of the end of the State Fire and Tornado Fund in favor of the private insurance companies.

The State Fire and Tornado Fund has been of tremendous benefit to school districts, cities and villages, and the state government itself over the years. It has always charged a lower premium than could be obtained from private sources. The State Fire and Tornado Fund has never been in competition with private insurance companies because it does not go out and insure private risks. It insures only government buildings.

To those who believe as I do that government at all levels should be run frugally as a business for the benefit of the public and not private interests, the Fire and Tornado Fund has shown outstanding success. Government at all levels must be run as a business. Government should not exercise favoritism causing a loss to the tax payer any more than a large corporation should exercise favoritism causing a loss to corporation stockholders. The use of the Fire and Tornado Fund has made it impossible for favoritism to creep in when granting insurance contracts on public buildings.

In the desperate days of the early 1930's, the Fire and Tornado Fund accepted school warrants at full value at a time when private insurers would have had to have cash.

So successful has this Fund been that there was a period of years from 1935 to 1943 when absolutely no annual premiums were charged on buildings which had been insured for five years or more.

The reserve funds at that time were, under the law, declared adequate to furnish protection. During this 12-year period, \$1,686,000 in premiums was not charged by the Fund.

The rate charged to local political subdivisions since 1943 has remained at 50% of the rates established by the Fire Underwriters Inspection Bureau, except for one term of two years when it was set at 60%.

Today, approximately 5,500 buildings are insured in all counties in North Dakota. The value of buildings covered today by the Fire and Tornado Fund is approximately \$350 million. A reserve of \$6.7 million is set aside to take care of losses. Since its inception in 1919, the Fund has incurred losses totalling \$6,444,776.41, which is less than the present reserves.

Just as large corporations whose plant or store facilities are scattered all over the United States carry their own internal insurance, so the state and local units of government with their buildings located all over North Dakota have carried their own internal insurance in the Fire and Tornado Fund at great savings to the taxpayer.

The premium now assessed for fire and extended coverage insurance on nearly 5,500 buildings in North Dakota amounts to approximately \$1.2 million every two years. This premium is based

on 50% of the rates established by the Fire Underwriters Inspection Bureau. Savings of approximately \$1 million are realized every two years by the taxpayers of North Dakota because of this low rate.

House Bill 714 will in effect destroy the Fire and Tornado Fund and destroy the businesslike savings that annually accrue to all political subdivisions in the state which own buildings, including the state itself.

House Bill 714 goes against the very thing my administration has been striving for these past six years, and that is to eliminate favoritism, patronage and unnecessary cost. This bill opens up the field for favoritism and patronage in the granting of insurance contracts. This bill could nearly double the cost of public building insurance to the taxpayer over what is now available from the Fire and Tornado Fund.

This bill opens up the pressures that will be upon school boards, county commissioners, township boards, and city commissions to grant insurance contracts to selected companies.

We have already seen too much of this in other insurance contracts formerly let without bid by the state. This bill states that a governing body may, at its option, call for competitive sealed bids. This bill would permit governing bodies to grant contracts without competitive sealed bids. This bill states that the governing body may reject any or all such bids. Obviously, the field has been opened wide to eliminate bidding entirely.

We have seen examples of what happens when private insurance moves into a field which has been serviced by a public agency. The public buildings which will be sought after by private insurance companies will be those structures which are in areas of good fire protection. They will be those structures which are in good condition. They will be the buildings which are new. They will be the buildings which are considered to be of low risk. The present law will make it possible for the State Fire and Tornado coverage to be crowded back to only those risks not wanted by private insurance companies because of the hazard involved.

A lower number of risks would then be insured under the Fire and Tornado Fund. Those risks which remained with it because of their hazardous nature would cause a rising loss history to the Fire and Tornado Fund. This would result in higher rates by the Fund to cover these losses. The cry would then go up that because the Fire and Tornado rates have been forced up to comparable rates with the private insurers, this was ample evidence that the Fire and Tornado Fund was not needed and should be phased out completely. When the Fire and Tornado Fund has been phased out completely and the private insurers have taken over its hazardous risks, the private insurance companies' rates will then rise on these risks.

I can see no legitimate philosophical, political or economical reason why the private insurance industry should lay claim to the insurance of state buildings, particularly when such a claim will eventually result in a cost of at least one-half million dollars more annually to North Dakota taxpayers.

So successful has the Fire and Tornado Fund been in the last 45 years that it cannot be slated for destruction because of any deficiencies in its record. I can find no shortcomings in the Fire and Tornado Fund coverage which could not be adequately remedied by legislative action. I think House Bill 714 is a bad bill. It is definitely not in the interests of the taxpayers.

I therefore veto House Bill 714.

Rep. Ferguson:

"Mr. Speaker. I would like to explain my vote on Senate Bill No. 8, and request that these remarks be printed in the House Journal.

"Line 13 of Senate Bill No. 8 is an appropriation for an Adolescent Treatment Center to be built on the grounds of the State Hospital in Jamestown. This appears to be a new institution to be built in connection with the State Hospital — it is a major development in the treatment of one phase of mental illness in the state of North Dakota. I believe this should have been brought in as a separate bill for a full hearing in a committee of the House of Representatives.

"As matters stand now, only the Appropriations Committees of the House and the Senate have heard testimony regarding the Adolescent Center.

"There are two points I would like to bring to your attention.

1. There is ample evidence to support the premise that the Adolescent Center should not be located at the State Hospital.
2. We have no information regarding this institution.

Does this appropriation refer to the Adolescent Center complete, equipped, and ready to use? Or does it refer to just the building? How many beds are proposed? What kind of an annual operating budget can we expect? What auxiliary services will the state be called upon to render?

"Looking at the development of this field in other states I find that South Dakota contracts this work to the state of Nebraska. Kansas (and Kansas with the Meninger Foundation is a leader in this field) and Iowa contracts with small private institutions within

their borders. New York has thirteen small state institutions. The State of Illinois has a 150-bed Adolescent Center — one of the largest in the United States. I have been informed that the state of Michigan, ten years ago started an Adolescent Center with a capacity of 150 beds. They started with 60 patients in a state of 7 million population. Today in the state of Michigan they do have 150 patients (of whom 94 attend a special school within the hospital) and they have 1,000 children on out-patient treatment. The cost per year in salaries, let me repeat — Michigan's cost per year in salaries alone is \$2,400,000.

"Psychiatric care and treatment is highly specialized. The operating cost for this type of hospital can run \$10,000 per bed per year. Can North Dakota afford this type of treatment at this time?"

"There have been no open hearings, there has been no discussion. Ladies and Gentlemen, I submit to you the fact that in my opinion this is not responsible legislation. As legislators we are responsible for finding the best solution for both those who need the care and for those who must provide the care.

"For this reason, and this reason alone, I will vote "no" on Senate Bill No. 8."

Rep. Rundle:

"Mr. Speaker: I have long been a student of history and local history especially has intrigued me in recent years. I wrote quite a few newspaper articles for newspapers and historical stories, etc., I feel I know how to research history.

"I think I know quite a bit about Custer and his ill-fated expedition. We have quite a library on Custer and Teddy Roosevelt and I yield on these subjects only to the opinion of my wife. Our only surviving son is a graduate of West Point Military Academy and we visited Custer's grave when we attended his graduation. So for reasons apparent only to a woman, my wife refuses to admit that Custer had made even a tiny tactical error in the Battle of the Little Big Horn.

"Now this Bill 281 is a real clear cut bill and I am proud to report to you, therefore, no money is involved as far as I am concerned. The appropriation is in one place or another. It is already there.

"Originally the bill would transfer five historical sites from the Park Board to the State Historical Board. The Senate amended out, I am very sorry to say, Ft. Lincoln, south of Mandan, which is one of the top historical spots in the state.

"Now, we have the amendment to abolish this site so now there are three left — Ft. Buford, Whitestone Battlefield and Fort Rice. This issue is really simple and clear cut: Do you want to preserve a little bit of North Dakota history, where you will have a historical site, or a camping area site where there are only beer cans? Both have their place. The historical aspects should be taken into consideration as in a small way these things disappear and they are hard to find as there are only foundations from old buildings to mark the site after camps have been there for 20 years.

"I am not knocking the Park Board. I want to assure you they cannot work together. They are two separate entities and should be as such. What this bill does is put these three sites under the jurisdiction of the State Historical Board. They have never had much money to work with in the past but would have done more if they had the money and I urge the passage of this bill."

Senate Bill No. 281. A Bill for an Act to transfer certain historical sites now under the control of the state park service to the state historical board, and making an appropriation.

This is in response to your letter in which you ask the question: "****can one house through action on a conference committee report kill the bill when it is on second reading while the bill is in the possession of the house of its origin, in this case the Senate?"

The particular question refers to Senate Bill No. 337 on which the conference committee report called for the House to recede from its amendments to the bill. The House adopted said report. The bill while in the possession of the Senate was placed on second and final passage in the House, and on roll call was defeated 29 - 66 - 3.

It is an elementary rule in parliamentary procedure that the subject matter upon which action is being taken must be under the control or possession of the body acting upon the subject matter. This conclusion is supported by Mason's Rules of Order, Section 241, which in part states as follows:

"****On substantive questions a point of order, such as that the amendments now in the bill are not germane, may be raised so long as the bill or proposition is within the control of the body. When the question relates to a violation of the constitution or statutes, such as a requirement of three readings of bills, the question can be raised so long as the measure is within the control of the body."

Section 454 of Mason's Rules of Order states that:

"A measure may not be reconsidered unless it is in the possession of the body. In a bicameral legislative body a measure which has been sent to the other house must be returned before a reconsideration can be effective."

Section 459, Subsection 3 of Mason's Rules of Order states:

"3. Where a bill has been passed by both houses and returned to the house of its origin the other house cannot reconsider its vote passing the bill unless the bill is first returned to its control, as it has no possession or control over the bill, and if the house of origin refuses to return it, the vote to reconsider will not impair the validity of the act."

Thus, while not finding any specific rule governing the instant situation, from other rules and from the necessary implications derived from such rules and the basic concept of parliamentary procedure, it is my interpretation that the house in the instance you recited did not have control or possession of the bill in question (Senate Bill No. 337) and, consequently, any action on the bill would have a nullity.

And for the eleventh time I again experience, as each of you will before we leave, a desire to conclude and get home, yet not without nostalgic emotions somewhat like the last day of school.

"As we started we recognized the magnitude of our task, we attacked the problems with energy, determination, courage and confidence. As we depart each will assess our accomplishments in the light of the degree of attainment as we see it. But all of us to some extent must conclude that in relation to the complexity of and the desire to further correct and solve the many problems, the total job is little more than started.

"If, in the course of debate or controversy, patience seemed to wear thin or words may have been spoken that would better have

gone unsaid let us remind ourselves that its the things we remember that hurt us and those about us. In this respect I am very fortunate in that I forget very easily.

"Of the eleven sessions, I have been in the Minority nine sessions so I have had an opportunity to work with many leaders of the Majority party. While we won few important votes, I must truthfully say that even though the Legislative pace was very fast at no time did the majority deny our right to be heard on the floor of the House.

"In the true spirit of unbridled debate in the greatest of all debating societies, the Legislative Halls of our nation, we must never lose sight of that motto — 'I may disagree unto death with what you say but I will defend unto death your right to say it.'

"Whether I know you real well or only casually, I regard each of you as a personal friend. For we have here together for sixty fleeting, busy and exciting days been members of the greatest fraternity in the land, the State Legislature.

"For this fine gift, your kindness, your consideration, your co-operation and your many generous acts of courtesy to me personally and the members of the Minority let me say 'Thank you, one and all'."

Rep. Williamson:

"Mr. Chairman, Mr. Speaker and Fellow Members of this Legislative Assembly:

"It is indeed appropriate that as we come to the close of this session, we pause for a few minutes to pay special tribute to those who have had the responsibilities as leaders of this assembly. In this arena of ideas we have men infinitely cross related, bound by ties of interest, hope, affection, opinion, passions and desires to do what is best for his fellow man. It is often a process of disillusionment but it disheartens no soundly made man. We have observed these past days that the assistant majority leader is one who is not disheartened by defeat nor smug in victory. So it is with a great deal of pleasure that on behalf of all of the members of this assembly, I present this token of appreciation for a job well done."

Rep. Reimers.

"Thank you for the gift. I'm sure it has been more of a pleasure for me to work with you than for you to work with me.

"I consider it an honor and privilege to have worked with each and every one of you in the capacity I have served."

Rep. Winge made a special presentation to Rep. Rundle of a plaque.

Rep. Winge:

"Mr. Speaker and members of this Assembly. Since, according to the calendar up until this morning, we have killed about two hundred and twenty-five bills in one manner or another it seems very appropriate that we have a very distinguished farmer and former undertaker as our Majority Floor Leader. Those bills he can't properly bury before spring's work, he can plow under.

"We, in the Minority, appreciate his problems even more this particular Session since the tribulations of the 1965 Session are fresh in our minds. We did have a distinct advantage in process in that none of our members this Session were freshmen.

"Our Majority Floor Leader, Rep. Streibel, has been a tough taskmaster and with forty-seven new members learning the Legislative process we must appreciate the time and effort that has been expended by Rep. Streibel to expedite this Legislative Session. He has shown great knowledge of intricate procedure and has judi-

ciously used it with the goal in mind of finishing this Session in the allotted time.

"Mr. Speaker and members of the Assembly, I am most happy to present to Rep. Streibel a gift so appropriate that it should have been presented two months ago.

"Rep. Streibel, best wishes for the future, may you always be on time with this beautiful desk clock."

Rep. Streibel:

"As we approach the twilight hours of this session, and review its accomplishments, I want to direct my attention very briefly to an area entirely divergent from issues.

"There were two very basic highlights that emerged, in my opinion, these past 60 days. One highlight was the minimizing of partisan politics and the other was the dedication on the part of each one of you to give of your best to our state.

"To our employees, never have I seen a more dedicated and capable Third House. Your contribution to this session was an outstanding one.

"To Art (Representative Link) and your 'loyal opposition', please accept my admiration and appreciation for your many kindnesses extended to me. Your attitude of cooperation left nothing to be desired.

"To my 82 Republican colleagues who individually and collectively gave their best, who tolerated my many shortcomings and whose loyalty never faltered, please accept my heartfelt thanks.

"To Gordy, you have been an outstanding Speaker of the House, and your leadership, punctuality and tolerance have been appreciated by all.

"In closing I want to pay my personal respects and appreciation to one man who has been more than just my assistant. He has been an outstanding stabilizing influence, a tower of strength in the area of compromising with good judgment and a "behind the scene" influence, second to none, that I have ever witnessed in my legislative experience. Bob (Representative Reimers) to you goes my unqualified vote as the most effective and influential legislator of this session.

"For this gift I am deeply appreciative, but overshadowing the tangible by far is your tolerance and friendship."

Rep. Solberg:

"Mr. Chairman, Honored Leaders and Members of the Assembly:

"The greatest honor the House of Representatives can bestow on one of its members is to elect that person Speaker. This is almost a standard phrase when nominating a man for Speaker of the House.

"But greater honor yet is due the individual who can preside over the House for sixty grueling days and still retain the respect, friendship and even affection of every member of the legislative assembly.

"The Fortieth Legislative Assembly has been fortunate to have had this kind of presiding officer.

"Speaker Aamoth, we of the House have appreciated your fairness, patience, and your ever keen sense of humor. The long days that we have worked during this session have tired everyone. The work of trying to consider and deal intelligently with the great number of bills in our limited time of sixty days is a frustrating experience for all of us. Tempers often show when partisan matters are considered. Yet you have shown patience and courtesy and a concern that every member should have his full share of time in dealing with matters that he or she is interested in. Many times in a strict adherence to rules you could have ruled other-

wise-but this you did not choose to do. Your sense of humor and occasional quip have helped relieve the tension and monotony of long legislative days. Your frequent consulting of the rule book is an indication of your determination to rule fairly and impartially.

"In a few hours the motion will be made to adjourn sine die and we will all be returning to our communities and our families. We will leave this beautiful and exciting chamber and the Fortieth Legislative Assembly will become part of North Dakota's history.

"You, Mr. Speaker, will become one of the relatively small group that has had the honor to have served as 'Speaker of the House'. But before we go we wish to present you with a token of appreciation for the many courtesies you have extended to all of us. It is an honor for me to present to you the traditional Speaker's watch bearing the inscription of the Fortieth Legislative Assembly. This, I trust, will become one of the most treasured mementos of your life, and since TIME has received such a great deal of consideration this Session, I guarantee this timepiece will perform on both standard and daylight saving time.

"Mr. Speaker, I congratulate you on a job well done!"

Speaker Aamoth:

"Former Speakers, thank you so much for those kind remarks Rep. Solberg.

"Fellow members of this, the Fortieth Legislative Assembly: just fifty-nine days ago, you honored me with the responsibilities of serving as your Speaker — this honor is one that I will always remember, and to each of you goes my heartfelt thanks for having given me this wonderful experience and opportunity. In accepting the honor of the position of Speaker, I made the statement that my wish would be "that each of us could free ourselves of his provincial traditions in approaching legislation and that our combined judgments would be free to make decisions on the basis of what was best for the whole of North Dakota" and further "That I have your understanding in carrying out the duties of the Speakership." It is indeed satisfying to be able to say — that to a man, you granted me these considerations. Oh, it's true that for the first fifty days the question of this provincialism presented real problems to your leadership, but when the chips were down, you came through beautifully — and you did what had to be done and resisted your personal and local demands.

"This early finish of the session, with no evening meetings didn't just happen — it took the combined efforts of your leadership and the cooperation, patience and determination of each man and woman in this House along with a tremendous effort by the employee staff. My personal thanks go to Rep. Streibel, Rep. Reimers, Rep. Link and Rep. Giffey as floor leaders for their many courtesies and great help in some rather difficult situations.

"To those of you who have served in the 'Chair' and to the few of you who will have the opportunity to do so in the future, I am sure that you will understand my next remarks well. The manner and conduct in which the business of the House is carried out is not the result of a good or bad "Chair", but rather is measured by the efficiency and dedication of the "desk force". To that lovely and gracious lady, Ruth Smith, our desk reporter, goes my everlasting gratitude. Without her constant help and guidance, we'd have been in serious trouble as the rest of us were all new. Her attitude and stability made my job one of pleasure and fun. To ElaNor Weber, Ruth's assistant, my sincere thanks. Roy Gilbreath, in his first session, proved to be one of the true delights of my job; his ability — his grasp of situations — and his even temperament continually amazed me. To Bob Miller, Buck Tough

and Wilbur Tracy, our audio board operator, go my sincere thanks.

"And a special tribute to my most efficient secretary, Ellen Davis, who has proven to be the most faithful helper in running the office of the Speaker.

"Special mention must be made of Col. Ernest Benser, who has performed the duties of Sergeant-at-Arms in a manner never before accomplished. The dignity of the House has been maintained at all times through his surveillance and attention to his position.

"I am sure that each of you have noticed two things about our staff, the information desk attendants, bill clerks, the pages, and floor clerks, the committee clerks and stenographers, along with the other employees and attendants — their dedication to their work and getting the job done, and their uniform attitude of pleasantness and good cheer. It is a matter of great personal satisfaction to me, to be able to say that I cannot remember one situation during the whole session where I was not greeted courteously and with sincere good cheer by the employees. A word must be in order for the tremendous job done by the custodians, who have worked long hours, in keeping the chambers and offices in such beautiful order. The whole operation has been one of successful team work and we thank you.

"To Governor Guy and his delightful wife, Jean, go our thanks for their charming hospitality. Mention should also be made of our appreciation to the personnel and elected officials in the various departments of the capitol for their generous cooperation with us in affairs and matters before the legislature.

"To the people of Bismarck and Mandan, we say thank you for your sincere and genuine reception of our members and their families. Their friendly acceptance makes service in the session a truly pleasant experience.

"As the time comes for the session to draw to a close, and we disperse to our homes, families and respective communities, let us forget the personal failures and hold our heads high — for each of us have shared in a truly wonderful process that only too few of our citizens will experience. This legislative process offers untold opportunities for each of us in development of our personalities, our abilities, and our philosophies. I'm sure that each of us has grown as a person through our experiences here. The give and take of our daily discussions, no matter how seemingly bitter, are all a necessary part of that privilege we take so lightly — the right to be free and govern ourselves.

"As we are about to conclude this, the Fortieth Legislative Session, and the debate is over, win or lose, let us all resolve to leave the capitol with each other's respect and affection, for no matter how serious the loss of legislation you may have been personally interested in may seem now, time has a way of taking care of these matters, and I feel confident that each of you will count your service here as one of the most enriching experiences of your lives.

"It's been great serving with each of you, and may our work here and the decisions which have been made here prove to be beneficial to the people and the State of North Dakota. Thanks again for your every consideration and this beautiful gift."

Speaker Aamoth presented the Speaker of the Thirty-Ninth Legislative Session, Arthur Link, with the gavel used in that session.

SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION AND STUDY OF LEGISLATIVE FACILITIES.) There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the capitol building fund, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$30,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to the capitol grounds planning commission for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the commission and carrying out its duties during the biennium beginning July 1, 1967, and ending June 30, 1969. 2. Household goods except any item of household furniture, household appliances or musical instruments with an original purchase price to the owner of one hundred dollars or more;

3. Farm machinery ten years old and older intended for use for agricultural production;

4. Any farm tool or item of farm equipment with an original purchase price to the owner of one hundred dollars or less; and

5. Livestock, poultry, and other animals except cattle, horses, sheep, and hogs over six months old.

Each classification of cattle, horses, sheep, and hogs required to be listed for assessment and taxation purposes shall be assessed on the basis of the statewide average monthly market value for that classification for the thirty-six months previous to the assessment date as determined by the state tax commissioner. The state tax commissioner shall establish by rule and regulation a reasonable depreciation schedule for the assessment of all household furniture, household appliances, and musical instruments required to be listed on personal property listing blanks for assessment and taxation purposes. As to an item of personal property acquired by gift, grant, or bequest, the original cost to the owner shall mean the value at the time of acquisition by the owner. All property included in items numbered 1 through 5 above, when included as a part of a stock of goods or merchandise held for resale, shall be listed and assessed as are other stocks of goods and merchandise.

SECTION 13. LIMITATION OF TAX LEVIES.) A county or a taxing district in such county shall not, after the effective date of this Act and until July 1, 1969, be permitted to levy taxes expressed in dollars and cents in excess of the amount determined as follows:

1. Not more than ten percent over and above the amount which could have been levied by the application of the maximum mill levy permitted by law to fifty percent of the final assessed valuation of the year 1967 plus,

2. An amount equal to the sum determined by the application of any additional mill levy authorized by law or vote of the people to fifty percent of the final assessed valuation of the year 1967 plus,

3. An amount equal to the sum determined by the application of the permitted mill levies provided in subsections 1 and 2 of this section to fifty percent of the final assessed valuation of any taxable improvements to real property not assessed the year 1967 and of taxable personal property becoming taxable in years subsequent to 1967, or not included in the assessment rolls in 1967. For the purpose of this subsection, an increase in stocks of goods for resale shall not be considered as newly taxable property.
