Bismarck, December 8, 1970

At the hour of nine o'clock A.M. on the eighth day of December, 1970, being the day and hour designated by law for the convening of the organizational session of the Legislative assembly of the State of North Dakota, the members elect of the House of Representatives assembled in the House Chamber of the State Capitol building at Bismarck, North Dakota, and were called to order by the Speaker of the 1969 Legislative Session Ernest N. Johnson.

Orders can be placed directly with Mr. Phil Cunningham of Northwestern Bell in Bismarck. His number is 255-1776. The Legislative Procedure and Arrangements Committee has arranged to have incoming and outgoing calls to and from private floor phones cut off while the House is in session. Incoming calls will be received at a switchboard and messages will be taken by a telephone attendant.

Rep. Streibel moved that the House now stand in recess until 1:30 p.m., which motion prevailed.

The House reconvened at 1:30 p.m. with Acting Speaker Johnson presiding.

Cecil Crandell was declared elected. The Acting Speaker appointed Reps. Wagner and Boustead to escort Cecil Crandell to the rostrum, where he was sworn in by the Speaker.

The Acting Speaker announced that the next order of business would be the election of a Speaker.

Rep. Boustead: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the Assembly:

Rep. Wilkie: "Mr. Speaker and members of the Forty-second Legislative Session:

Rep. Howard Bier was then sworn in by Chief Justice Teigen.

Rep. Johnson: "It gives me a great deal of pleasure at this time to give to one of my colleagues for many years the gavel which he will use to keep decorum in this body. I feel that Rep. Bier is very much entitled to this high position. I know that he is a man of fairness, that he is interested in good government, and he is interested in procedure. I need not tell those of you who have served in this body for a number of years the respect and admiration that the State of North Dakota holds for this man. I only hope that this body will in its deliberations be as honest and sincere and cooperative with its new Speaker as they were to me in the 41st Session. It gives me a great deal of pleasure and honor to turn over this gavel to Rep. Bier, and may you have the success and joy of serving in this next Legislative Session. My congratulations to you, Rep. Bier."

"Mr. Speaker — Fellow Members of the House: Rep. Bier:

"I wish to express my sincere thanks to each of you for the honor you have bestowed upon me by electing me as your presiding officer for the coming session.

"As I reflect back upon the past Speakers I have known from both parties, and the traditions of fairness and justice they have all set, it is my wish and my prayer that I may follow in their footsteps in a like manner. I shall surely try. I know I will make mistakes, but I ask your indulgence for these first few days as we move into

the hard work of the session ahead of us.

There will be many times when you will be discouraged and disappointed but that will pass and you will find that the friends you make on both sides of the aisle will last a lifetime, and the sense of accomplishment will make the hard work and the frustrations fade away.

"As your Speaker I offer my friendship and help to each of you. If I can be of service, please feel free to drop in my office and see me.

"I extend my sincere thanks to Rep. Boustead and Rep. Olienyk for their kind words and to each of you who worked in my behalf. A special thanks to Rep. Wilkie for his kind motion.

"With the deepest of gratitude from the bottom of my heart, I thank you for this honor."

A committee of three from the Senate was received and advised that the Senate was organized and ready to transact business.

Speaker Bier: "For my first official act, I have the pleasure and honor of making a presentation to former Speaker Johnson. It is the gavel that he used to rap the 41st and 42nd Legislative Assemblies into session. I am sure that this gavel will be something that he will treasure all of his life, and it is with real pleasure that I present this to former Speaker Johnson."

Rep. E. Johnson: "Thank you, Rep. Bier, and all of you for those kind words. Yes, I will cherish this gavel for the rest of my life, and it will find a place in my office where I can see it every time I go in there. I invite any and all of you if you get down into my area to drop in and see me. It was through our township near Dazey that General Sibley marched through.

"In leaving, I want to say that I hope you will forget the hard and harsh raps of the gavel I made, and remember only the kind and soft ones. With this I must say thank you, and God bless you all."

Rep. Streibel moved that the House be at ease to receive the Governor and the Senate in joint session, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Streibel moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort the Lt. Governor to the rostrum, which motion prevailed, and the Speaker appointed Rep. Tweten and Senator Longmire, and the Lt. Governor Richard Larsen was escorted to the rostrum, to preside over the joint session.

Rep. Streibel moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort the Hon. William Guy, Governor of the State of North Dakota, to the rostrum, which motion prevailed. Lt. Gov. Larsen appointed Senator Just and Rep. Weber to such committee, and escorted the Governor to the rostrum, who addressed the Assembly as follows:

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE TO ORGANIZATIONAL SESSION

Forty-second Legislative Assembly

December 8, 1970

Representatives — Senators — Ladies and Gentlemen:

"There is always drama and excitement when the Legislature convenes to occupy these dramatically beautiful House and Senate Chambers.

"The air in this Chamber is charged with expectancy. You who are new at this work must be in awe of the responsibility you have won and which you will fulfill at these desks and in these halls. I know that feeling of wonderment because it was my privilege once to be a new legislator.

"Those of you who are returning have been drawn back by a renewed sense of challenge and the warm friendships of this unique fraternity which is the Legislature. I sense that friendship rekindling itself today.

"The Attorney General has ruled that the Governor, during the legislative session, is not only the Chief Executive Officer of the State, but he is also a part of the legislative process.

"I will be working closely with the Legislature in the coming months, either in a personal way with each of you, or with your elected leaders. I welcome and value your advice and counsel at any time.

"I congratulate you for winning your election race. There is great satisfaction in winning, but we must never lose sight of the fact that we represent not only those who voted for us, but also those who voted for our opponents.

"Many races were won or lost by a handful of votes. This should give us reason to pause to think out our positions and decisions carefully.

"From long observation, I have noticed time and again that it is the nature of man not to come to grips with the problems that plague him if the solutions to those problems require the agreement of the majority.

"Some might say that this tendency to avoid solving problems capable of solution is good for us. They reason that if we overcome too many of our problems, then life might lose its challenge and be less interesting. Almost always, this reasoning is done by those who do not personally have to share in the problem.

"Problem-solving in politics and government comes most easily when we stop worrying about who gets the credit or the blame. Credit and blame are transitory things and seldom live longer than yesterday's newspaper.

"We have problems facing us in North Dakota. Some of these problems have been with us a long time; and like a mole on the end of your nose, we continue to live with these problems because we have become used to having them around.

"Our session starting in January can come and go, and its record might fade quickly into obscurity. Or it can rise to the challenge and make its achievements monumental, memorable, and lasting. This session will be exactly as you and I make it.

"I have presented an Executive Budget to you. It is balanced with recommended levels of expenditures within the projected revenues from existing tax programs. This budget will continue state services pretty much as they are in the present biennium.

"Much remedial legislation can be enacted without requiring substantial funding. However, there may be other programs which would require new sources of revenue if adopted. The fact that a proposed new program is not included in the Executive Budget should not be construed as opposition to that program by me.

"Our state is one of only a few that are free of debt. Our taxpayers have wisely preferred to pay as they go. We must admit, however, that our taxpayers are making a substantial effort to support their government. North Dakota ranks eighth among states in the percent of each \$100 of personal income that goes for state and

"We must seek equity among taxpayers and we must plug loopholes, but we should think carefully before accepting the need for new taxes.

"Next month, you will return to these Chambers for the intensive sixty-day session. The extra time provided by this pre-session or-ganizational meeting, plus the excellent work of the Legislative Council this past biennium, will make you the best prepared Legislature we have had.

"My message to the 42nd Legislative Assembly on the condition of the state with recommended measures will be released in sections before we convene in January. This will give you more time for presession consideration and there will be more opportunity to receive public reaction.

"I know we will work hard together. I see no reason why we cannot look back on the 42nd Legislative Session as a long stride forward in the affairs of our state. I give you my best wishes for a smooth organizational session."

Rep. Streibel moved that the Joint Session be dissolved, which motion prevailed, and Lt. Gov. Larsen declared the joint session dissolved.



REMARKS TO THE OPENING SESSION 42nd Legislative Assembly

January 5, 1971

By Governor William L. Guy

Introduction

Ladies and gentlemen of this 42nd Legislative Assembly — officers of the Executive and Judicial branches of our state government — citizens and friends of North Dakota:

Today we begin two months of work representing the people of our various legislative districts. It is a high honor that your constituents have given you in electing each of you to positions in this Legislature.

In this assembly's membership, there is a broad spectrum of expertise in many fields, as well as years of experience. Many of you are veteran legislators who have learned how to steer the ship of state by legislation; but just as important, there are many new members in this body who bring with them the zeal and fresh approach so necessary in making our representative form of government a living thing. I respect both the wisdom of the old-timers in this assembly and the power of exciting innovation which can be expected from new members.

As a state, we are part of a federal system which includes the national government and local entities of government as well. It has been popular for some years to bemoan the growing strength of the national government in our federal system. This may be

true, but it is my observation that the states and local government have given up much of their responsibility by default.

Hopefully, our Constitutional Convention delegates and the voting public will provide us with a basic document to make it easier for North Dakota to strengthen its position within the federal system. But we need not blame our Constitution for all of the failures or omissions which have led to federal government encroachment. We must ask ourselves what can we do as a state that we are not doing to answer the needs of our people?

I am required in Section 75 of the North Dakota Constitution to communicate to the Legislative Assembly, by message, information on the condition of the state and recommend such measures as I shall deem expedient.

Much of the message, already released by sections, deals with the condition of the state, but coupled with it are some recommendations, sometimes general and sometimes specific. Occasionally over the years, I have been criticized for being too specific in proposing solutions to problems. At other times, I have been criticized for being too general and not setting forth the specific solution to a problem. The crack in the floor between these two positions is wide and deep, but I have never tried to use it as a place to hide in.

I know this Legislative Assembly will not feel confined by any recommendation that I make. I would much prefer that together we seek solutions to our problems after careful study and debate, with little regard for pride of authorship.

Our state is one of the more fortunate in not being in debt. My budget recommendations have been on the conservative side because I believe we are in a period of national economic adjustment which is difficult to project for the years ahead.

I wish to compliment Budget Director Ralph Dewing and Budget Analyst Dale Moug for their careful and intense review of the budgetary needs of all state departments and institutions. Whereas the Executive Budget may seem at first glance to be too general in setting forth recommended levels of expenditures and projected income, I know you will find Mr. Dewing and Mr. Moug very capable and willing to substantiate their findings in great detail. This is not to say that there is not room for change and differing judgments in the Executive Budget.

I must compliment the Legislative Council on their work in the interim. I believe our legislative research is excellent and would compare favorably with states which have far greater resources than we do.

Some of the recommendations in my message are the result of Legislative Council work in this biennium or in previous bienniums. Many of the recommendations in my message are the result of study and proposals of various state departments and agencies. The fact that a legislative proposal does not appear in my message is not an indication that I think it of lesser importance than those included.

I want to work closely with you in this session and I welcome your individual views at any time. However, because of the committee organization of the assembly, most of my work will bring me in contact with legislative leaders and committee chairmen.

I know that by approaching our job in a serious manner and in good faith in one another, we can eliminate or at least fully understand our differences.

We have, as our state's leaders, a very limited time in which to do those things that should be done. Our political stars shine brilliantly but for a moment and then recede into time. Our appointed time on this earth is now.

There is a tendency to procrastinate under our democratic system of government. But I firmly believe it is far better to try a partial or imperfect solution than to permit a problem to continue to plague us for lack of the perfect solution.

For many of you, these sixty days will be the most interesting sixty days in a lifetime. I am looking forward to the record that will be achieved by the 42nd Legislative Assembly.

Environmental Management and Natural Resource Conservation

There is no single concern before us today which is more important to our children and their children than conservation of our limited natural resources and the wise management of our delicate environment. It is impossible to make that statement too strongly. None of us can completely comprehend the magnitude of what we must be concerned about.

Adlai Stevenson put it well when he said, "We all travel together, passengers on a little spaceship, dependent on its vulnerable supplies of air and soil; all committed for our safety to its security and peace, preserved from annihilation only by the care, work, and I will say the love we give our fragile craft."

It is already too late in many places in our nation to recover the quality of life that once existed. But because North Dakota is a young state and because we are sparsely populated, there is yet time to take prudent action to safeguard our natural resources and wisely manage our environment.

We are now aware that there will be a continuing confrontation between the need to supply our growing population with new jobs, through development of our natural resources and the management of our environment, while at the same time we do everything possible to preserve our ecological balance and conserve limited natural resources. This will require low voices and reasoned accommodation on both sides of the confrontation.

In order to carefully examine the broad spectrum of environmental management and natural resource conservation in North Dakota, I asked the Natural Resources Council to establish task forces to make recommendations to me and to the Legislature. Eighteen task forces were established and more than one hundred North Dakotans who are authorities in their fields participated in the deliberations and recommendations of those task forces.

Some of the recommendations were for administrative change, or federal government action, or private enterprise initiative. But those major recommendations which I believe deserve your legislative support I submit to you for your consideration.

I propose that this Legislature be recorded in history as the first in our state to consider the comprehensive aspects of conservation, environment, and ecology.

Natural Resources and Environmental Management Council

Many states have established independent agencies for environmental management. This is necessary and appropriate in those states which can gracefully absorb the cost of this type of organization.

It is my recommendation that because of fund limitations and because of the nature of our state government organization, the Natural Resources Council be continued with a name change to Natural Resources and Environmental Management Council, with appropriate expansion of its mission. The Council is capable of bringing interdisciplinary study and action in most matters concerning state government in environmental management and natural resource conservation.

Conservation, Ecology, and

Environmental Management Education

There is no problem before mankind which is more profound, timeless, and important than the preservation of his life through conservation and environmental management. It follows that decisions regarding these matters will be no better than popular understanding and public acceptance permits. Understanding based on education is the key to survival.

Of all the subject matter required for education in our primary and secondary school system, nothing outranks the importance of a strong understanding of the principles involved in ecology and environmental management.

I recommend that action be taken to establish requirements in this discipline for teacher certification for teaching at all levels. This discipline should be recognized as more universally important than any present required course. It should be established as a required subject in primary and secondary education in accredited school programs.

I recommend that all new teachers, after 1971, be required to qualify in the subject of ecology and environment in order to be certified for a life certificate.

Air Pollution Control

We must be cognizant of the air pollution that has long been with us in our state, as well as that which sweeps in upon us from other regions, or from new industry which might locate within our boundaries. We know too little about the effects of air pollution upon North Dakota at the present time.

Our air pollution law established in 1969 needs time and experience to test any strengths and weaknesses it might have. I would, however, recommend that Section 48-05-02 and Section 48-05-04 of the North Dakota Century Code be repealed and that the reference to "native" be stricken from Section 48-05-03.

I also recommend consideration of income tax credits for approved devices installed to control air pollution. We should follow the lead of states who have adopted laws governing open burning such as might occur in dump grounds, farm fields, oil fields, and of manufactured waste.

While this type of pollution may not seem overpowering in North Dakota air, nonetheless it is added to the total pollution of that fragile thin layer of lifegiving air which envelopes the earth.

Land Use Planning and Zoning

Millions of Americans are suddenly becoming aware of the appalling cost of unwise use of our precious land resources. Public outcry concerning land use and abuse has reached a level that states can no longer ignore.

Without doubt, we face federal land use planning and zoning in the near future. The greatest hope for state and local determination of land use planning and zoning lies in the ability and willingness of state and local governments to get on with that responsibility before the federal government steps in. Land use planning and zoning is a big job and a continuing one, but I propose that we make a modest beginning.

We should provide for land use planning and zoning through a cooperative effort between state, county, township and city governments. Land should be zoned to prevent costly mistakes such as new construction in flood plains. We should zone to prevent destruction of agriculturally valuable top soil, to protect scenic beauty, to preserve natural forests and wetlands, as well as to provide areas that can be best developed commercially. These are only a few of the considerations in land use planning and zoning.

The public is rapidly changing its view about private owners' right to destroy or abuse our very limited land resources. More and more, public opinion is demanding that private use of land resources be consistent with proper use so as to assure preservation of this resource for the generations to come.

Water Pollution Control

Our state has been a leader in controlling water pollution. I consider the water pollution control law passed in 1967 to be sufficient at the present time.

We are in a period of adjustment with water pollution laws at the federal level and with surrounding states.

Many laws which might be enacted in other areas of environmental management might affect water pollution control. This would include land use zoning, herbicide, pesticide and commercial fertilizer use regulations, flood plain regulation, and anti-littering laws.

In order to bolster the financial resources of municipalities to constantly upgrade their water and sewage systems, I suggest legislative action to prohibit water and sewage user fees from being used for any other purpose.

I recommend that legislative action be taken to require operators of municipal waste treatment plant facilities to be trained and certified by our Department of Health.

Forest Land Management

North Dakota's forest resources are scant and very precious. Wherever possible, they should be preserved in their natural state, and ever-increasing annual tree plantings should be encouraged.

I recommend legislation to facilitate the exchange of land, as well as the acquisition of land, on which native woodlands and permanent wetlands exist.

I believe we should set a goal of at least 100,000 acres of native North Dakota woodland for preservation. This would require state zoning of these lands.

It would be appropriate to establish, through resolution, legislative direction for the preservation and protection of naturally wooded school lands under the administration of the Board of University and School Lands.

I urge you to encourage, by resolution, a federal Tree Bank Program similar to the better known Water Bank Program.

Fish and Wildlife Management

Fishing has been vastly improved through the program of the North Dakota State Game and Fish Department. Hunting of small game animals and large game animals and wild waterfowl has been excellent. But some species of upland game such as pheasants and prairie chickens have declined in numbers.

I recommend that fees charged for hunting and fishing licenses be increased. Part of these increased fees should be dedicated to the game and fish management and part should be used to establish a small departmental earmarked fund for the purchase of native woodlands. This latter action would augment that now under way in similar programs by the federal government in acquisition and leasing of North Dakota wetlands.

Water Management

North Dakota has made substantial progress in water resource management. The time is here for us to consider the feasibility of dividing the entire state into watersheds and establishing, by statute, local legal entities similar to our existing water management districts with responsibility for the development, control, utilization, and maintenance of all water and related land resources within each watershed.

The Souris-Red-Rainy River Basins Commission should complete its studies by 1972. These studies will be the foundation for projects in water resource management in the entire basin for many decades to come.

What is nearly complete in the Souris-Red-Rainy River Basin should now begin in the Missouri River Basin. I recommend that North Dakota continue its leadership in the development of basin commissions by appropriating funds in this session for participation by our state in an eventual organization of the Missouri River Basin Commission.

It is important that local and state government in each state in the Missouri Basin have as great a role in the planning of basin water resources as do the federal agencies which are already so active in water resource management.

Herbicide, Pesticide, and Commercial Fertilizer Residue Control

Because of the economic importance of the use of herbicides, pesticides, and commercial fertilizers in North Dakota, we need to move carefully in any program which might control their use. Nevertheless, we must recognize the potential for soil, food, and livestock contamination, as well as water pollution, which might be caused from these chemical products.

I recommend that you update the North Dakota Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act of 1947.

I also urge you to take under study the need to examine and license custom applicators of hazardous agricultural chemicals. There may be justification in this session to require dealers to be licensed by a state regulatory agency if they handle highly toxic and hazardous agricultural chemicals.

Spoil Bank Management

Because of the very extensive presence of commercial quantities of lignite coal lying close to the surface in our state, it is essential that we come to grips with the problem of long range spoil bank management.

There are complaints that our present spoil bank management laws are not adequate. It would be far better to strengthen them now than to try to superimpose change in later years after much mining has been done and mining companies have made their long range plans.

Soil Erosion

The slender slice of two or three inches of top soil is the well-spring of the vast majority of annual new wealth produced in our state. This thin slice takes centuries to develop; yet it can be destroyed forever in a matter of hours through water or wind erosion.

We must develop an incentive or a penalty system to induce landowners and operators to follow the best soil conserving practices known and available to us through present techniques.

The disregard of the needs of future generations to our precious top soil can no longer be overlooked. Abuse of the land by arrogance or stupidity should be prevented.

Incentive or penalty programs should be enacted to cause all lands to be protected by the most effective techniques in soil conservation. Landowners who suffer damages by inadequate conservation programs on adjoining lands must be protected under the law from such abuses as siltation and top soil drift onto their property.

Our soil conservation districts and our farmers have accomplished much in protecting precious top soil. The top soil abuse by relatively few owners and operators should no longer be tolerated.

Noise Pollution Abatement

Because of the use of machinery with high noise levels in our farming operations, North Dakota is reputed to have a higher incidence of hearing loss to its citizens than most other states.

It has been established that noise levels about 85 decibels can be permanently injurious to the human ear.

I am requesting that we pass a law that no machinery of any kind can be sold or used in North Dakota which operates at a noise level above 85 decibels after the model year of 1973. Engine manufacturers have hoodwinked the public that a high noise level is equated with power. This should no longer be acceptable in North Dakota. Our state should take the lead in bringing back that rare quality of life that comes with a reduced noise level.

Crude Oil and Non-renewable Resources

The task force on this subject reported that existing legislation appears to be adequate.

We are attempting to develop our crude oil and gas reserves with maximum conservation and anti-pollution measures in effect. By and large, I believe our crude oil industry and our extractive industry are properly concerned with conservation of non-renewable resources.

Maintenance of Scenic Values Along Our Highways

Roadside beauty contributes substantially to the quality of life enjoyed by our citizens. It is also a factor in providing a pleasant reception for our tourists.

I recommend that the Highway Corridor Control Board authority be expanded to include local roads as well as state highways. We

also need to discover some device for arousing counties to their zoning responsibilities.

I recommend that legislation be adopted to encourage the cleanup of abandoned farmsteads along our highways through a program of taxing these farmsteads as public nuisances. Their presence is not only an eyesore, but they also represent a potential health and safety hazard to those who might trespass on the premises.

Maintenance of Scenic Values Along Our Rivers and Lakes

Our scenic lands along rivers and lakes are very limited. We should make every attempt to preserve and maintain them. I recommend legislation to establish a program for protecting, through zoning, those scenic lands adjacent to rivers, lakes, and also other natural phenomena such as valleys, buttes, and wetlands.

Those lands owned or controlled by the State through such agencies as the State Land Department and the State Game and Fish Department should be required to include in leases, necessary guarantees to protect scenic areas and to make these areas available to the general public whenever possible.

Reduction of Littering and Vandalism

There is little in the activities of man that is so inexcusable as is littering or vandalism. These two human weaknesses cost government and businesses millions of dollars each year.

I recommend that penalties for vandalism and for littering be made more severe. Since much of the littering includes nondestructible cans and bottles, we should consider methods of encouraging consumers and manufacturers to follow an orderly program for disposal.

In the case of vandalism of public property, I propose that the law require confiscation of automobiles used in transporting people to sites of vandalism or weapons used in vandalism. It seems that the most precious possession of many vandals is their automobile or gun.

Environmental and Conservation Regulatory Agencies

Those control boards which have been established to regulate conservation and environment should be reviewed closely as to their number of members and the special qualifications set forth in the law for membership.

I recommend that the majority membership on all such boards be representative of the general public interest and that the minority on such boards represent the special interests who are regulated or controlled.

Regional Coordination of State Services

Regional coordination of state services has sparked great interest across our state. It will be discussed often in this session. There has developed, however, a cloud of confusion and, in some instances, distortion as to what regional coordination of state services means and what it does not mean.

It does not mean the dissolving or weakening of county, township, or municipal government. It does not mean making life on the farms or in the small towns less attractive. It means just the opposite. It means making state services more available, efficient and less costly to all people, and especially those on farms and in small towns.

We have administered some state services by regional groupings of counties or parts of counties ever since North Dakota became a state. For example, the judicial system has long been administered in six districts or regions.

We are forced to keep up with the times. Vast changes have taken place in our society and economy since our state government was first instituted. High speed highways, automobiles, and aircraft have brought us all closer together. Radio, TV, and telephones have made talking to all parts of the state as easy as it is to speak to someone in the same room.

Many new services have been gradually added to the original basic state and local government services. These include such things as the parole supervision, vocational rehabilitation, school district reorganization, mental health treatment, medicare, social services for the poor, civil defense, Hill-Burton hospital planning, highway patrolling, and on and on.

Our original horse-drawn agricultural economy has been changed drastically by technology and farm programs. People and their investments have shifted from farming to more attractive alternatives in our cities or in other states. State government does not cause these economic changes and population shifts; it only tries to adapt itself to them.

Imperceptibly, but steadily, state and local governments have been experiencing a citizen demand for increased services.

One of the frailties of state government in North Dakota is that too many of its departments have developed as independent dynasties rather than integrated parts of total state government. These independent state agencies developed their own methods of delivering services to the people. A few state services were delivered at the county or municipal level. But for many years, most state agencies organized their administrative and planning efforts by grouping counties into regions.

For example, in 1958, the Public Welfare Board began a grouping of counties to form eight regions. As far back as 1943, the Department of Health was administering and planning its many state services in county groupings making up five organized regions.

The information and data gained in the regions set up by one state agency should be applicable to the planning for state services by other state agencies. There is need to eliminate, where possible, overlap of state services at the local level. There is also need to fill some voids where some might not be receiving their share of state services.

As pressure mounts to hold down taxes and to make state services more efficient and more available to people on the local level, it becomes apparent that a much more coordinated effort needs to be made within state government.

Because some other states have successfully coordinated their state services through standard regions, I am convinced that North Dakota, too, will benefit by such organization.

We must find the best means of extending the myriad of state services that have been provoked by federal programs in recent years to every community, township, school district and county. High costs and the limited human resources in state government have made regional delivery and coordination our only hope.

After careful study and consultation between state agencies and the County Commissioners of all our counties, Executive Order No. 49 was promulgated.

I once again remind you that delivery of state services has been carried out by state agencies for too many years with little or no coordination. Executive Order No. 49 implements regional coordination of state services simply to integrate these services into a system of standard regions.

It is understandable how some confusion about the subject has developed. For example, a consulting firm hired by the Legislative Council has recommended the abolition of county welfare boards in favor of regional welfare advisory boards. Also, the Director of the Law Enforcement Council has suggested that regional delivery of some local law enforcement services such as regional jails might be an improvement. These two recommendations should not be confused as being a part of the Executive Order No. 49 directive. They must stand or fall on their own merits.

It would be simple to abolish coordinated regional planning and administration of state services and return to the former method of uncoordinated planning and administering state services which has grown up like Topsy over the years. If this were done, however, the local citizen and taxpayer would be the loser.

I recommend that this legislature give careful thought to improving the delivery of state services at local levels, with an objective of saving taxpayers' money. I do not recommend any action in this session which would force changes in township, municipal or county government unless such changes are brought about through democratic process expressed by the majority of the local citizens involved.

Water Resource Management

Potable water, like air, is an absolute essential for life. No city, no irrigation district, no industry, no county, no state, and no river basin can hope to grow beyond its available water.

North Dakota is not blessed with snowcapped mountains which

slowly release water throughout the year. Much of our state is dependent on our annual rainfall and the efficiency by which we trap and use each drop of rain or flake of snow.

In the 1930's, the United States Government attempted to claim all of the unappropriated water in North Dakota. Since then, we have been laying counterclaims by Water Commission resolution and by irrigation and municipal usage.

The grip of the federal government's claim is illustrated by the fact that Minot has had to buy water from the Bureau of Sports Fisheries and Wildlife at \$25 per acre foot because the Lake Darling Dam was constructed with an agreement to give the Bureau the water rights on the Souris River.

Unless local entities such as water management districts, drainage districts, irrigation districts, county park boards, cities, and state agencies such as the Game and Fish Department and Water Commission are able to integrate their planning to lay claim to as much available water as possible, we will find counter-claims downstream prevailing or we will find the federal government gradually assuming an ever more dominant position of control.

River Basin Commissions

The best mechanism to bring state and local entities together to integrate their plans and aspirations and to work with federal government planning without domination by them is the river basin commission.

In June of 1967, the Souris-Red-Rainy River Basins Commission was established by the National Water Resources Council as one of the first commissions authorized. Immediately, that basin commission began pioneering in the work that was scheduled for completion in five years.

The basin commission is charged with accumulating a vast amount of basic information needed in water and related land resource planning and project development. An inventory is required of all rivers, lakes, marshes, coulee systems, aquifers, land types, gradients, permiability and water retention qualities.

Data on cubic foot per second flows on mainstem rivers and tributaries at various points with high and low flow ranges is required. Ranges of lake levels and the associated average rainfall by months must be determined.

Water quality of organic and inorganic content at various points on streams, lakes, and aquifers must be determined. Pollution hazards from such sources as siltation, municipal sewage, industrial discharge and agricultural pesticides must be documented.

Aquifer reserves, drawdown, and rate of recharge must be determined. Flood frequency and potential losses at various danger points on rivers and tributaries must be projected. Drainage patterns, both natural and man-made, must be charted.

Irrigation under way and the potential for its expansion must be known. This includes land permiability, slope and drainage. Hydroelectric generation capability from the total head available on rivers must be calculated. Wild waterfowl wetlands must be mapped for preservation and enhancement.

All of this type of technical information is required for long range planning and for project development to meet the needs of our North Dakota citizens.

These needs would include flood control, municipal growth, industrial demand, pollution abatement, irrigation, river navigation, hydroelectric generation, waterfowl habitat, water recreation, drainage and reclamation, highway and bridge construction, waterrelated historic site preservation, and river bank stabilization.

The federal government agencies lend their massive support in a cooperative effort on basin commissions. Congress appropriates millions of dollars for its share of basin commission studies to every \$100,000 that state and local governments are able to appropriate.

Secretary Hickel, in February of 1970, informed the National Governors' Conference that the Nixon Administration regards the river basin commission concept as the most effective tool in maintaining or enhancing water quality in river basins.

The Souris-Red-Rainy Basins Commission is scheduled to complete its work in 1972. I recommend your continued support of that commission.

But of even greater importance to our state and the Midwest is the formation of a Missouri Basin Commission. It is essential that we move quickly if all of our ten states in the Missouri Basin are to authorize and fund their states' participation in the coming biennium. I believe the majority of states in the Missouri Basin favor the formation of a commission.

I urge you to consider this proposal intensely and appropriate the funds suggested in my budget early in the session so that North Dakota by example, can encourage the other basin states to act in order to fund the proposal in their 1971 legislative sessions.

The Missouri Basin and its tributaries in North Dakota represent one of our most valuable and renewable natural resources. Unless we can show a reasonable plan of use for these resources in the years ahead, we can expect our Missouri River water resources will be claimed or diverted by others. Unless the ten Missouri states can work in concert, they could some day find Missouri River water diverted to other river basins.

Garrison Diversion Irrigation Unit

We must also strengthen our hand in preparation for irrigation to be accomplished in the Garrison Unit. This calls for research in livestock feeding under irrigated farming conditions, as well as greater efforts in sugarbeet research.

One of the most pressing needs in water resource development, whether it be for public use or in private irrigation development, will be improved methods of finance. So urgent is this matter that I recommend Legislative Council study of what financing will be required to allow water users to fully implement the Garrison Diversion Irrigation Unit.

Weather Modification

Weather modification continues to be an intriguing possibility in our state. I suggest a resolution of support to the federal government for its efforts in studying weather modification in our arid Upper Midwest area.

Other Projects and Programs

As support for the studies and planning in water resource development, I suggest resolutions of support for such other projects or programs as the Water Bank, the In-Lieu-of-Tax Payment Program for wetland acquisition by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, the small watershed programs, and such flood control projects as the Kindred Dam, Burlington flood protective works at Minot, and Pembilier Dam.

I would also recommend a strong resolution pointing to federal responsibility for the damage accruing to the Missouri River banks because of the mainstem reservoirs and violently fluctuating water releases to satisfy hydroelectric generation requirements and navigational needs downstream.

Constitutional Revision

The voters in the 1970 Primary Election provided our state a rare opportunity to review and revise its Constitution. In the General Election which immediately followed, ninety-eight people of excep-

tional ability and stature were elected to carry out the precious mandate to hold the first Constitutional Convention since statehood.

The preparation for this convention, as well as its work and the presentation of its final product, is a very fragile process. There is an urgent need that pre-convention preparation take place in order that the convention delegates are able to make their maximum contribution at least cost to the state. Plans must be cautiously laid so that the constitutional revision be the result of bipartisan agreement and that all actions surrounding convention deliberations be documented by competent staff with a sense of history.

Because the Legislature originated the constitutional amendment setting in motion the elections resulting in the decision by the voters to hold a Constitutional Convention, I ask you to devise a method of pre-convention preparation that would be acceptable to the delegates.

I pledge my assistance in any way that might facilitate the efficient and effective launching of the Constitutional Convention in April.

We might try to profit by the experience of other states and, by legislative resolution, calling for separating the convention's final thirty days into two parts so that there would be a period of time between completion of the constitutional revision and final acceptance of the document by the convention, in order that public response might be measured.

I believe it would be in the best interest of the convention if it had its own staff rather than share any staff now employed in state government.

I also emphasize the deep historic significance of all correspondence, news articles, utterances, rough drafts, and proposals associated with this Constitutional Convention. This should be borne in mind by all who are associated directly or even indirectly with the convention. The preservation of these records should be directed by a competent archivist.

Experience in other states has shown that when the deliberations of Constitutional Convention delegates, committees, and staff are held independent of the established centers of the three branches of government, less interference and questionable influence result.

Perhaps we are fortunate to have a new Law Enforcement Training Center building due for completion about April 1, 1971. I would recommend that this facility be made available for offices for the Constitutional Convention committees and their staff. This would be for a period of only a little over a year.

For those rare instances when the full convention gathers, perhaps the nearby National Guard Armory or Bismarck Junior College facilities could be made available.

A resolution as to the use of state facilities for the Constitutional Convention delegates and staff would be in order.

Taxation

Taxation study and change will always be necessary. We must strive to bring greater equity between taxpayers, and we should simplify the taxpaying process. We must also be constantly aware that political subdivisions must depend on the Legislature to provide adequate local taxation if they are to properly carry out their legal responsibilities.

County Assessor

This Legislature should consider some major changes in our tax laws. I recommend a strong county assessor law which will strengthen the position of the present mandatory county director of tax equalization. Equity and efficiency will be served if we move from a position of more than 1700 part-time assessors to full-time professional tax assessors at the local level.

Full 100% Assessment

I believe we should, by legislative directive, move to 100% assessment of real estate as provided for, but not carried out, under present law. I would caution that if we move to 100% assessment of real estate, we should reduce mill levies in such a manner that this legislation would not, by itself, increase taxes.

One hundred percent assessment would simplify real property taxation and it would be easier for taxpayers to compare assessments between various classifications of real property.

Section 183 of our Constitution limits the indebtedness of political subdivisions, but that limit was predicated an assessment of full value of real property. The Legislature would want to set the bonded indebtedness limitations at whatever percent of full assessed value it might choose in order to restore to cities, school districts, and other political subdivisions the power to incur sufficient bonded indebtedness to carry out their responsibilities.

Income Tax

There is no excuse for our state's income tax to be so confusing and complex. I recommend that you establish the North Dakota income tax as a percentage of the federal income tax paid. This percentage could be based on a graduated table of rates designated to raise the present tax revenue. This would allow North Dakotans to fill out a postcard-size income tax return and it would save the State several hundred thousand dollars in administrative costs.

There should be built into such a tax, an authority by the Board of Equalization to adjust the state rate to achieve the collection of a specified statewide total of income tax collections in the event that Congress might adjust the federal tax rates up or down during a biennium.

Definition of Real Property

Real and personal property must be more clearly defined. I recommend that real property include land, buildings, and structures, and that any installations used only as a tool of the trade for specialized purpose be exempted as personal property, whether fixed to the land or buildings or not.

Tax Incentive for Business and Industry

The law passed by the 1969 Legislature to exempt new industry from real estate taxes and income taxes has worked well and I believe it will be beneficial to our state.

There is, however, need to more clearly define and possibly restrict tax incentives to only certain classes of business and industrial activity so that we do not have a proliferation of tax incentive applications from economic activities not contemplated or justified by the intent of the original law.

Federal Tax Sharing

We should, by resolution, encourage our Congressional Delegation and President Nixon to support legislation to appropriate federal funds for sharing with the states and their local governments. There is a wide difference in various tax sharing proposals. We need to be discerning in our support so that our strong state and local tax effort is recognized in any allocation formula.

Education

Our state continues to be a leader in education. The interesting achievements in the Grand Forks School District have received national attention. Some of the finest school plants in the nation have been built in North Dakota in recent years.

Our colleges and universities have made great forward strides and must rate at the top in quality and quantity of higher education given for each tax dollar spent.

But even with these outstanding examples of educational leadership, we must continue to explore ways of improving every school in our state because the school that our own child attends is the school that will be the influence on that child's life. We should consider ways of rewarding high school accreditation in order to gently urge such things as reorganization or greater local financial support which might be necessary to bring accreditation to more high schools.

I believe the responsibility for education is borne by all of us in this state. I, therefore, suggest that all school districts be required to belong to, or at least support, a high school district.

Our school district reorganization procedures are still not adequate when we realize that there are approximately fifty districts that operate no schools at all and there are high schools in operation with enrollments as low as a dozen students.

I believe it would be a step forward to provide regional school reorganization boards rather than the present county school reorganization boards.

I suggest that the laws which do not permit the majority of voters in a school district to increase their school bonded indebtedness or to increase their levies for general fund purposes grant too much power to a voting minority to determine the destiny of a school district.

I believe that high school students should be permitted to attend the school of their choice, and the receiving district should determine whether or not there should be a tuition charged.

I agree with those who point out that our school system has been geared to provide educations for college-bound students rather than those who would choose vocations. We must follow a program of gradual improvement in our vocational offerings at the secondary and higher education levels.

We find ourselves in a very fast-moving age. We must constantly ask ourselves if the curriculum of required subjects is really preparing our students for the life that is unfolding before them.

It was frightening to notice that our nation's political leaders were afraid to call for a tax increase to balance the war-swollen national budget at a time when this could have halted the start of inflation and climbing interest rates. These national politicians did not believe that the public would understand why the tax increase would be in their own best interests. The traditional teaching of arithmetic without applying it to relatively easy and very basic economic principles regarding federal fiscal policy has created this sad situation.

We are faced with a rapidly declining quality of life in many places in our nation and world. Our educational system, while serving brilliantly in some schools in the closely related fields of ecology, environmental management and conservation, has nevertheless failed to prepare enough of our people for the understanding necessary to demand those actions that are needed for human survival.

I believe there is vast room for new and vigorous leadership in curriculum planning at primary, secondary, and higher education levels to prepare our young people for a future that will be far different from the past.

We continue to have our teachers attracted by higher salaries, greater benefits, and better working conditions in other states. We should improve our teacher retirement program and bring it up to the level of the retirement program now available to state employees.

State aid to non-public schools will be discussed widely in this session. It is a subject that provokes considerable emotional reaction and, for that reason, is difficult to view clearly. But when we talk of schools, we should never lose sight of the child in every community in our state who must depend upon us to make it possible for him or her to have an education.

Non-public schools have operated in many communities of our state for decades. They have never been supported by tax money. Because of changes in our society, economy, and within religious organizations themselves, it is becoming increasingly difficult for non-public schools to continue without some tax money assistance.

If all non-public primary and secondary schools were suddenly to cease operating, a substantial additional educational tax burden would be thrust upon the citizens of our state, and in some communities that tax burden, as well as public school administrative and facility problems, would be very serious.

In bringing this matter before you, I do not take a stand for or against the concept of the non-public school. I bring it to you because it is apparent that if some form of state aid is not forthcoming for non-public schools, there will be a continuation of the well established trend of having them closed down.

Again we must return to the question of what is best for the individual child in every community. We should agree that a child's best interest is served by receiving an accredited education, whether in a public school or in a non-public school.

In order to safeguard the children who might be caught in the strained circumstances caused by the closure of a non-public school, I would not oppose a suitable program of minimal state aid to existing non-public schools. I would be opposed, however, to any program which would encourage the proliferation of the non-public school program in this state.

Such a state aid program should not be allowed to jeopardize the existence of any public school, for it is just as serious to deny a youngster a good education in a struggling public school as it is to deny sufficient help to maintain a non-public school.

Our Democratic Representative System

By decision of the United States Supreme Court, the principle of one man one-vote has now been firmly re-established. This principle causes this session of the Legislature to reapportion itself by recognizing changes and shifts in population as determined by the 1970 census.

When new legislative districts are drawn, the principle that calls for reapportionment also calls for the breakdown of multi-Senate seat districts into single Senate seat districts. Under the one-man one-vote principle, it is indefensible to permit one voter to cast his ballot for two, three, and even four Senators. Massive disenfranchisement is now going on in multi-Senate seat districts.

It is understandable why political parties in power seek to favorably affect their election prospects by writing advantages for themselves into the law. Many of these instances have existed for years and should be remedied.

The placement of candidate names for the State Senate on voting machines in Fargo apparently influenced the outcome of the Primary Election for that Senate seat and there was a great hue and cry over the unfairness of the situation.

This example pales to insignificance when compared to the longstanding unfairness of party column placement on the ballot. The principle of granting favoritism under the law to a party on the basis of a previous election win is indefensible. All of the huffing and puffing about our great democratic system becomes a hypocritical mockery, especially to our youth, when we continue to build into the election system, favoritism for any particular candidate or party.

The cost of campaigning for public office has become so great that it eliminates many potential candidates or it forces some candidates or some campaign organizations to accept large gifts of money with expressed or implied strings attached. This is an unwholesome and intolerable situation.

I believe that limits must be placed on the amount of money that can be spent in a campaign, and who spends it. Limits must be placed on the amount from each contributor.

Since there is obvious widespread circumvention of the laws forbidding corporate contributions to state and especially national campaigns, I believe the present law should be substantially modified.

Corporations, cooperatives, associations, labor unions, partnerships, and individuals should be permitted to contribute to the candidate or party of their choice up to a reasonable amount, provided their contribution is listed as public information on a special line on their state tax returns, and provided they have also contributed at least fifty percent as much to the opposing candidate or candidates and their parties.

This would legalize and place some control over what is now being done illegally without public disclosure. It would also provide a source of funding for opposition candidates and parties in order that the voting public would not suffer from a contest unfairly staged by a preponderance of financial support on one side.

I believe it would be appropriate for this Legislature to ask Congress to place limits on campaign spending at the national level. If this is not done, we will find North Dakota being used time and time again as a state of heavy outside campaign expenditures because of the ease of affecting election outcome for federal office with relatively less campaign expenditures here.

These heavy influxes of uncontrolled outside campaign contributions and expenditures can have an adverse effect on the quality of state and local contests in the same election.

The percentage as well as the number of youth in our population continues to increase. Our young people have shown an impatience over some of the hypocrisy and shortsightedness of our society. They are often told to work out their frustrations by seeking change through our established political system. There are indications that a growing number of them are willing to do so.

Since the Supreme Court has upheld the reduced voting age requirement for federal elections, I recommend that we do likewise for state and local elections in order to conform to the federal law. I believe that in placing greater responsibility on our young people, it will help our state maintain a youthful and inquiring attitude.

National, State and Local Government Organization National Government

Our federal system is made up of three distinct levels of government — the national level, the state level, and the local level. Much of our state and local government procedures and services are determined by national legislation, and certain national legislation in such activities as farm programming, transportation, medical services, education, and taxation affect us directly as states.

Because of this state-federal relationship, I believe we can no longer sit on the sidelines and view the government activities at the federal level as being beyond our responsibility or interest.

The administration of our federal government does not belong to the President and his aides. Rather it belongs to each one of us. The Congress of the United States does not belong to 100 men and women in the Senate and 435 Congressmen in the House of Representatives, but rather it belongs to every man, woman, and child in America, including North Dakotans. The Supreme Court of the United States is not the sole property of nine Justices, but it belongs with equal shares to every citizen in every county and township and village in this nation, and that of course includes North Dakota.

Some dramatic improvement must be made at the national level in our system of government if it is to respond to the fast moving needs of our state and our nation. Congressional reform should be at the top of the list of desperately needed changes in America.

I believe our Legislature would be strengthening a movement that has already begun in America if it would petition all of the members of Congress to bring about needed changes in the Congress of the United States.

It is incredible that Congress cannot manage its own affairs in such a way as to complete its routine work in a year-long session. Yet we saw just that happen in 1970. Something must be done to change that sorry record. Let me make some suggestions:

It is a mark against our system when the Congress can block consideration of the President's program. The people of this nation have the right to have their elected Chief Executive's program considered and either voted in or out in the session in which the program is submitted.

The seniority system in Congress is a travesty against Americans. The average age of Congressional leadership is far too old. Congress has established retirement ages for federal employees, but apparently feels that those ages are not applicable to the legislative branch.

I am not suggesting that Congressmen should be forced to follow the rules of retirement set down for federal employees, but I am strongly suggesting that Congressmen not be eligible for committee chairmanships after the age of seventy.

Once again, Congress does not belong to Congressmen or to senior Congressmen, but rather to the people. At present, committee chairmen are chosen by seniority which amounts to their physical ability to outlive their peers. The result has caused a reduction in the average energy, innovation, and imagination in Congressional leadership. Congressional chairmen should be chosen by their committee members and should be responsible to those committee members.

The seniority system has made it possible for committee chairmen to exert far more power than other committee members by being able to block legislation and to deny consideration of the President's program. To give any committee chairman that kind of power denies the one-man one-vote principle, which should give all Congressmen identical power no matter what their seniority might be or the state from which they are elected.

Congressmen should stand or fall on their record. We the people should have a right to an electronic accounting of Congressional votes, just as has been done in our State Legislature for decades. The ponderously slow, outmoded voice voting is an incredible waste of time, especially in view of the fact that Congress has not, in 1970, been able to finish its routine yearly business.

Unless the public rises up to demand Congressional reform, we will find Congress continuing the indefensible, archaic procedures which are at the heart of the frustration that youth feels in the unresponsiveness of our political system. I hope this session of the Legislature will join me in openly and firmly requesting Con-

gress to reform itself. It is in the best interest of state and local government, as well as for America.

State Government

Periodically, our state has prepared for large-scale state and local government reorganization. The first major attempt was in 1931. The crushing depression that followed made it barely possible to continue state and local government as it was, without charting any new courses.

In 1941, Governor John Moses, State Senator Milton Young, and Representative Targie Trydahl made up the North Dakota Governmental Survey Commission which authored another major attempt at state government reorganization. World War II diverted our attention from that excellent study, but many subsequent legislative sessions returned to the study to adopt some of its recommendations.

The study is still valid and I recommend it as a reference to students of government. There is still much in it which should be implemented.

There is weakness in our state and local government which has been fixed upon us by our state constitution, written more than three-quarters of a century ago. There are improvements, however, that can be made by the Legislature even under our outmoded constitution.

As a thumb rule, we should always follow legal or implied responsibility with adequate legal authority. There is a tendency to believe that many state departments and agencies are so important that they should be removed from any political influence and should be allowed to exist as small dynasties unresponsive to the direction of any election official. This type of government is uncoordinated and unresponsive. We have too much of it in North Dakota.

A Governor should have the authority and power to implement his administration soon after his election. He should not have to wait for the appointments of board and commission members and department heads to expire at some point months or even years after he has taken office.

I have recommended in the past, and I do so again, that the term of office of all members of boards and commissions, as well as major department heads, should expire with the term of Governor. In order to provide continuity, I recommend that the Governor should have to appoint a minority of members of boards and commissions from incumbents. However, he should be able to appoint a majority of all boards and commissions within the first six months if he wishes to, so that his administration can be implemented immediately.

Our state government is too loosely strung together. All agencies and commissions should be divisions of a closely related department. For example, the Department of Agriculture should have as divisions such agencies as the Wheat Commission, the State Seed Department, the Livestock Sanitary Board, the Poultry Improvement Board, and the Dairy Products Promotion Commission. The State Library Commission, which has been revitalized under the capable leadership of Richard Wolfert, should be placed under a department having to do with education.

I recommend that the State School at Grafton and the Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Dunseith be transferred to the Department of Health along with other agencies having to do with health such as dairy products inspection and various duties of the State Laboratories Department.

I would look favorably on the development of a Department of Transportation and a Department of Conservation to include all present state services that are related to those two fields of state endeavor.

Because of the need to integrate state planning according to state service functions, I have established a State Planning Council in the State Planning Agency to coordinate the planning of related departments and agencies. The Planning Council is a means of compensating for a lack of adequate administrative reorganization. It can proceed without additional personnel or without reorganizational legislation.

Local Government

An excess of local government continues to plague our state. The overlaying of such legal entities as counties, townships, school districts, water management districts, drainage districts, irrigation districts, park boards, zoning boards, etc., with independent levies, has created administrative problems.

I believe citizens should have the services of as much local government as they want and can afford. However, the high cost of duplication should make the people of each locality take a long, hard look at their local government.

For several sessions, I have recommended that townships be strengthened and enlarged to coincide with high school district boundaries. I still make that recommendation. I have also suggested that there may be a few counties which, because of population or valuation limitations, could strengthen their county government by joining with an adjacent county.

I emphasize in these recommendations that the determination of the changes that are made in local government should be left to the majority of voters who are affected.

Law Enforcement and the Courts

The Uniform Crime Report for 1969 issued by the Federal Bureau of Investigation shows North Dakota enjoying the distinction of having by far the lowest rate of violent crime in the nation. The report shows that North Dakota experienced 35.8 violent crimes per 100,000 residents during the year, compared to 77.4 for South Dakota, 98.3 for Montana, and 142.0 for Minnesota. North Dakota is also among the lowest in non-violent crimes.

Our low crime rate has made us a little less aware than some other states of the need for improved law enforcement and court reform.

North Dakota's Law Enforcement Council has been very active in reviewing improvements that are needed at the local and state level. I am pleased with their hard work. We are making progress in improved law enforcement as is exemplified by the Law Enforcement Training Center authorized by the last session of the Legislature and which will become operational in 1971.

Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court Warren Burger has done an excellent job of alerting the public as to the reforms that are needed in our law enforcement system and our courts especially.

Justice Burger spoke to an executive session of the National Governors' Conference at their 1970 meeting. He emphasized that there are many cases that come before the United States Supreme Court that have an impact on the states and local government. We should have an interest in United States Supreme Court reform.

But as badly as the United States Supreme Court needs reform,

But as badly as the United States Supreme Court needs reform, according to Judge Burger, the states' court system needs it even more. He recommended that our courts use modern business methods and that their operations be handled by professional court administrators such as are being trained at the Institute for Court Management in Denver, Colorado.

He pointed to the many problems that come about in a multiple judge district where one judge might be a hard working person, while a fellow judge might be the eleven o'clock in the morning until three o'clock in the afternoon, two days a week, variety.

Judge Burger stated that there is no excuse for court calendars to become overloaded and court decisions to be delayed for months or even years. He gave some hope that a report on judicial review would be out in a year or two and would point the way to state court reform. He recognized New Jersey, New York, and California as states which had done much in court reform.

Because North Dakota has a low population and because our court cases, if our crime rate is any measure, are less than many other states, it would seem to me that it should be relatively easy for North Dakota to reform its court system and be able to boast of the very best court system in the United States.

I, therefore, urge the Legislative Council to take under intense study the court system in North Dakota so that at a later session we can take advantage of that study and the recommendations in the judicial review to make our state court system more responsive to its mission in our society.

Judge Burger went on to be very critical of the nation's corrections system. He recommended to all the study of the American Bar Association on Correctional Systems by a commission headed by the former Governor of New Jersey, Richard Hughes.

The Chief Justice issued a stinging rebuke against our prison system. He said, "I hope the concern that Congress and the press show for prisons in South Vietnam can be shown also for prisons in America."

"We cannot pour millions of dollars into the process of the trial and then be miserly about the process after the trial."

He went on to say, "Most ardent advocates of prison reform are the men who run the prisons."

He may have been including North Dakota when he said, "Seventy-five percent of prison facilities in the United States are inadequate."

There is much to be done in the way of managing and rehabilitating those who must be sent to jail or to prison in our state. Many local jails can be justified for overnight safekeeping of prisoners, but certainly cannot qualify as humane places to hold people for an extended length of time.

Director of Institutions Walter Fiedler has been working with a committee on corrections and has recommendations which should be followed to improve our state prison and rehabilitation program.

I can go back to the 1941 Report of the North Dakota Governmental Survey Commission where they say, "To the Department of Public Welfare should be transferred the State Penitentiary and Training School. The administration of general laws pertaining to children, to various relief programs of the state and federal governments and to various services performed by the state for persons in need should be coordinated and unified."

Thirty years ago it was recognized that our correctional institutions needed to be brought under a department which contained staff who must be authorities in rehabilitation of individuals and families who are not able to find their way in our society.

It is even more true today. I recommend that this change be made. The State Industrial School and the State Penitentiary, as well as our parole system, should be made a division of the State Public Welfare Board.

Economic Changes and Needs

Transportation

Vast changes affecting our state and local economies are sweeping across us like enveloping tides. Because of our geographical location

and our limited political clout at the national level, we must wage an uphill battle to maintain our economic health.

We have watched our transportation system change, in some ways deteriorating and in other ways improving. The small towns in our state have already entered a crisis stage because of the abandonment of rail passenger service and less than carload lot freight service. Many branch railroad lines have eliminated depots, stockyards, and finally trains. The mails have been shifted to trucks. Branch line bus service is fast withering away.

Our exceptionally fine highway network has kept our head above water by permitting trucks and automobiles to take over as the railroad and bus service receded. But there are thousands of people in our small towns virtually stranded because they do not own or drive a car. Hundreds of small businesses are closing in small towns because they can no longer get economical delivery of the products they buy or sell.

The transportation crisis is forcing people to leave rural communities in order to live in the larger cities where they are within walking or city bus distance from the services they must have.

With each major change in rail service, we have been assured by the railroads that they were acting in the best interest of the public they served. Ten years of experience have caused us to wonder if yards and yards of wool have been pulled over our eyes.

We were told, when we protested the merger of the major eastwest rail lines, that this would provide savings in freight rates and improved service for the state. Freight rates have gone up and rail service has diminished. North Dakota is almost at the point of providing only a right-of-way for transcontinental rail movement.

Unfair rail rates continue to plague us as they have since statehood. The rate to ship barley east to market is a case in point. The twenty-five cent greater cost per bushel for shipping wheat from Williston to the West Coast compared with the rate from Fargo to the West Coast is another shocking situation. Our mid-continent geographical location makes maladjustment of freight rates especially disadvantageous to our economy.

We should join a national effort to have the Interstate Commerce Commission and its rate structure changed to provide equal opportunity for economic growth on the basis of rail rates, no matter where in the United States an industry or business might want to establish itself.

It would be timely for us to memorialize Congress in this regard. It is already late for America to establish a national policy of opportunity distribution which would in effect cause a voluntary distribution of jobs and hence population so desperately needed.

Secretary of Transportation John Volpe has submitted a rail passenger plan for the nation. It appears to have bypassed North Dakota entirely. A strong protest would be in order. The Rail Pax Plan appears to be crisis-motivated in that it seeks to move people from one congested area to another. It does nothing, in my estimation, to encourage the development of economies and populations in those regions that are best equipped to expand.

With the demise of local rail and bus service, we find that improved airline service is not capable of meeting short-haul requirements. As a matter of fact, our airline service is not adequately serving our long-haul requirements. Once again, the distribution of opportunity in America will depend on the wisdom in laying out airline routes and the application of needed subsidies.

There is a peculiar situation existing in North Dakota that is not found in very many other states. One airline virtually monopolizes our east-west transcontinental traffic movement. A recent prolonged

strike in which North Dakota citizens and their political subdivisions lost millions of dollars emphasizes our precarious position.

There is no reason under the sun why one airline should be granted a perpetual monopoly. We have other airlines flying over this state now which could be granted some of the flights held by the monopoly airline. If this were done, we might see some competition between the two airlines in building better service for North Dakota. We would also have a more flexible position anytime either of the competing airlines could not or would not serve us.

I urge strong legislative action directed toward the Civil Aeronautics Board to ask for the certification of transcontinental flights to a competing airline flying east and west in North Dakota.

Finance

Our economy can grow no faster than our ability to finance it. The Small Business Administration has been improving its service to our state. The Bank of North Dakota, whose purpose is to encourage and promote agriculture, commerce, and industry has worked vigorously to do just that. It will participate in a state development corporation with other banks in order to provide a pool of credit for industrial risks. In addition, I would recommend that \$500,000 of unappropriated profits from the Bank of North Dakota be set aside to establish a guarantee program for first mortgage loans on industrial real property.

There is no question but that the Garrison Diversion Irrigation Project will require mammonth amounts of individual farmer financing as it becomes operational. I do not believe an adequate mechanism now exists to handle the financing that would be required. I recommend a Legislative Council study on what will be needed to adequately finance the intensive farming under irrigation conditions.

Two sessions ago, we adopted the Uniform Commercial Code in order to facilitate business in our state. I now recommend that we consider the Uniform Credit Code as a means of making our state more attractive to those who would invest. I am well aware that some consumer groups oppose the Uniform Credit Code. Their objections must be weighed against probable advantages.

Labor

We are losing tens of thousands of our young North Dakotans. They leave here to seek job opportunities which seem to them to exist in other states. One of the opportunities that they find in many other states is a higher minimum wage and the protection of union representation in their work. I believe it is in the best interest of an expanded economy in our state, as well as an inducement to our young people to stay here and seek jobs, if our minimum wages were raised and if our so-called right to work law were repealed.

Agriculture

Agriculture continues to be our basic industry. The position of agriculture in the nation's economy is slipping in part because of the weakness of rural states in mustering the political leverage necessary to maintain adequate farm programs. Even in North Dakota we have not pulled together as a state in support of agriculture.

To those who shrug off the importance of farm programming, it is well to note that the annual income to North Dakota farmers from the Wheat Certificate Program alone exceeds \$100 million annually and represents a greater gross income to our state than that from all our extractive industries, including crude oil and lignite coal. Furthermore, all of the Wheat Certificate income is spread throughout all of the rural communities and none of it is shipped to investors in other states.

We must intensify our research in enterprises that will be adaptable to irrigation such as sugarbeets and livestock feeding. At the same time, we must not lose sight of the vast dryland farming base of our state. There are many crops, including feed barley, which must be constantly upgraded through plant breeding in order to keep our farmers competitive.

Population Centers

When President Nixon visited North Dakota last summer with his Cabinet officials and met with Governors of the Upper Midwest concerning population distribution, the subject of "growth centers" came up. There were those who believed that only cities above 50,000 people had the capacity to absorb the rapidly growing population and thus become growth centers.

I disagree strongly with this concept. Every city, no matter how large it might be today, started as a tiny village of a handful of people. I believe that any village or town in North Dakota has the potential to be exactly what its people want it to be. I believe that in the years ahead, certain towns in North Dakota will emerge as growth centers because of what their present citizens plan and work for.

Our state efforts and planning should be directed toward making services available to people out in the rural countryside in order that hopefully some day the movement to the cities can be stemmed and the small towns can grow.

Over-congestion creates some terrible social costs, but when over-congestion is caused by depleting the countryside of population, then the depleted countryside also suffers severe social costs. This phenomenon is man-made and man can reverse the trend if we only recognize it and plan to do so. A strong resolution to the President and to Congress supporting the concept of opportunity distribution and hence population distribution throughout the United States might be helpful.

Tourism

Our greatest potential for economic growth outside of our basic industry of agriculture is tourism. We have made fantastic advances in the business of entertaining visitors to our state. Our excellent highway system with its rest-stops is well known to the traveling public. Our growing park system can barely keep up with the surging demand from tent trailers, pickup campers and travel trailer operators.

Every historic site that we renovate becomes a subject of eager visitor interest. Every boat ramp and picnic ground established soon hums with activity. On Labor Day at the state-owned marina at Sakakawea State Park, 1800 gallons of gasoline were pumped into motor boats using the facility.

We need to continue a steady outdoor recreation development program. We need to continue to improve and expand our state park system. We must also become aware of the deep heritage that could be illustrated in the restoration of historic sites from Pembina to Medora and from Fort Buford to Fort Abercrombie.

The Old West Trail started by North Dakota in 1961 and including South Dakota, Montana, Wyoming, and Nebraska has been extremely successful in promoting tourism. North Dakota this year launched the first international tourist loop, the Explorers Highroad, in conjunction with Saskatchewan, Manitoba, and Minnesota.

Economic development calls for a climate for profitable investment in order to produce new jobs. I believe that North Dakota has, through legislation, done as much as any other state in producing that climate. I believe we will see the efforts of this legislative session and those of the recent past pay off in the years ahead.

Who Are We?

We are Americans, of course, but we are also North Dakotans. This land which is North Dakota has a rich and colorful history that goes back to those centuries when the red men fought among themselves for territory. The ebb and flow of the American Indian in the years before the first white men came is an epic in itself.

Five distinct flows of humanity have populated what is now North Dakota. The Indians were first and came over the top of the world across the Bering Strait. Centuries later, the first white men made their way into the continent's heartland by using the Great Lakes as a means of transportation. These were the adventurous French, whose intermarriage with the Indians created a whole new identifiable population known as the Metis.

The English, who were out to make money, entered the territory from the north down Hudson's Bay and the Red River. They were followed by the third wave of people who came up the Mississippi River, intent on building a new empire with their homesteads which first crept into the Red River Valley in the mid-1850's. The last distinct movement of people were those adventurers, trappers and explorers who used the Missouri River to gain entrance to what is now North Dakota.

These first ripples of settlement became great waves of immigration from the Scandinavian countries, Germany, and other northern European countries. The settlement of North Dakota and the sacrifice and privation of those early pioneers was a part of a heritage that was taking firm root in those days.

Americans are a mixture of many races, colors, and nationalities, and from this mixture we have drawn great strength. North Dakota is no different. We still take pride in the nationalities of our ancestors. But there is value in North Dakotans knowing of this state's past in order to understand their own identity.

It would be very valuable if we developed a Heritage Center which could explain, through interpretation, the events and people and technology that went into the making of our land's natural history and the history of our people. North Dakota is mature enough to build a Heritage Center that would be a credit to the memory of all those who have gone before and would be an inspiration to all those who must face the future.

The Heritage Center has been under study for nearly ten years. The brochure that was distributed to all members of the Legislature explains in a colorful manner the historical, educational, cultural, and tourist development advantages that would go with a Heritage Center, as well as furnishing a headquarters for the State Historical Society and a place where historic artifacts could be collected, studied, and distributed to community museums. We need to start laying aside funds to build a Heritage Center.

The year 1976 will be the Bicentennial of the American Revolution. Already by invitation of the President of the United States, I have appointed a North Dakota Bicentennial Commission to plan events statewide to help commemorate two centuries of freedom as Americans. I can think of nothing more appropriate than to break ground for a Heritage Center in 1976, a Center built by both public and private funds.

1976 is also the 100th Anniversary of the last march of General George Custer and his troops to an event which has become world renowned. This anniversary is a very significant event in the struggle between the Indians and the white settlers, so firmly embedded in our heritage.

We are what we think, and what we do, and how we do it. Many have cast a disparaging look at the culture of the Great Plains. Even so, we have a growing interest in such things as drama, music, and art, which are expressive and creative parts of our culture. The Commission on the Arts and Humanities has struggled along with too little encouragement. Their assistance to communities in developing cultural advantages is impressive. I recommend that their accomplishments be noted and that they be funded to continue their work.

One of the most unique cultural institutions in North Dakota is the International Peace Garden Music Camp. Here, more than 2500 young people drawn from both sides of the international boundary come each year to continue their musical training in the beautifully quiet and inspiring surroundings of the International Peace Garden. This music camp should be encouraged. In order to operate at an optimum economic level, additional dormitory space is required. I recommend that we see that this dormitory space is provided.

Each step that we take to encourage the cultural involvement of our people is a step that leads to a more satisfying life. Each new generation should be proud to know that in addition to being Americans, they are also North Dakotans.

Interstate and Regional Cooperation

More and more, we find ourselves involved with the affairs of other states in our Upper Midwest. This is good, for obviously several states working together can do many things that no one state can do alone.

There are many examples of this growing multi-state regional awareness that have come about in the last ten years. The Old West Trail in 1961 was an effective first step in organizing five of our states in a joint effort at tourist promotion. I have suggested that the Old West Trail organization broaden its mission to now become concerned with regional preservation of natural resources and historic sites. The preservation of such tourist attractions as forests, wetlands, lake shores, rivers, and wilderness areas should be an effort which concerns all of the states through which the touring public, meaning all of us, travels.

In 1970, the first effort in international regional tourist promotion has been launched with North Dakota leading the way, and joined by Minnesota, Manitoba, and Saskatchewan in the Explorers Highroad. We expect the international tourism effort to result in closer working relationships in other fields with our adjacent Canadian provinces.

Regional efforts in water resource developments are absolutely necessary for the success of any widespread planning and effective use of water. The Souris-Red-Rainy River Basins Commission is a pioneer in this field. However, we must also take note that the Garrison Diversion Irrigation Unit was designed to serve irrigators in both North Dakota and South Dakota, and is a part of a series of Missouri Basin-wide irrigation projects planned for several states.

Our interest in irrigation underlines the desirability of a Missouri Basin Commission which would help to plan not only irrigation but also all the other beneficial uses that Missouri Basin water should be serving.

The Congress of the United States has approved a \$300,000 grant to launch an Economic Development Administration regional project in the same five states as are now cooperating in the Old West Trail. If the President directs the expenditure of this money, we can find North Dakota, Montana, Wyoming, Nebraska and South Dakota working as an economic unit to do all possible to improve its economy.

This would include many, many aspects of our everyday life including such things as interstate transportation rates, truck width and weight regulations, environmental control laws, and zoning laws. The idea would be to make this region, which has a mutual concern in low population growth, do as many things as possible to make it at-

tractive to new industries and a growing population without one state attempting to lower standards in order to be more attractive to industry than its surrounding neighbors.

A resolution to President Nixon requesting release of funds to establish the five-state Economic Development Administration project which includes North Dakota would be beneficial to our state.

There are other interestate efforts which we should support. The common market for higher education between our state and Minnesota should be given every encouragement. Interstate educational television should be supported.

Interstate planning for health regions in North Dakota should extend across our state lines to include all people who are served by a regional or satellite health center, whether they are citizens of this state or not.

Our state should continue to be a member of the Compact for Education, as well as the Multi-State Tax Compact.

We have gained much from being a member of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission and we will host the annual convention of this commission in Bismarck in June of 1971. It is noteworthy that our present North Dakota oil industry laws were patterned very closely after the model code of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission.

President Nixon has emphasized the need for regional thinking by reorganizing the federal regional offices to make Denver the prime regional center for our state. The federal government has allowed its various departments and agencies over the years to set up their own combination of states into regions and it may be impossible to totally reorganize the federal government's regional dispensation of its services, to emanate from one central point. We may still find ourselves dealing with federal agencies in St. Paul, Chicago, Kansas City and Omaha, as well as Denver, for many years in the future, but the President should be encouraged in his efforts.

It was North Dakota which organized the fifteen-state Midwestern Governors' Conference in 1962. This conference was organized to be concerned with the mutual problems of midcontinent America states and to develop greater political unity in bringing about political solutions.

Other regional groups have sprung up such as the Mid-America Governors' Transportation Council. All of these organizations recognize the intense competition that has developed between various regions in the United States.

It is costly to be competitive and join in regional efforts, but I believe it is even more costly in the longrun to be parochial and uncooperative beyond our state's borders.

GOALS FOR STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT

In order for state or local government to be brought into sharper focus in order that public aspirations may be better pursued, it is well to establish goals.

I would define a goal as a direction in which we strive to move to accomplish those laudable things desired by most people. Goals are general in nature and can never be fully achieved, but we develop programs and objectives to move us in the direction of the goals we set for ourselves.

Many states are now establishing goals to help formulate policies and programs. Unfortunately, the United States of America has never established goals, so there are none on the federal level with which states can aline themselves.

As the result of meetings held with people in state and local government, I offer thirteen goals that I think deserve endorsement:

1. To manage our environment to obtain an acceptable ecological

- balance and a wholesome, healthful living condition for our people.
- 2. To preserve and conserve our natural resources for the benefit of man now and forever.
- 3. To seek to eliminate poverty and the associated hunger, malnutrition, and inadequate housing.
- To seek to overcome disease and alleviate suffering of our people.
- To seek to increase safety, security and domestic tranquility for our people.
- To expand and improve all education and make such service available to all.
- 7. To work for the dignity, respect and equality of treatment for all our people regardless of race, creed, age, or sex.
- 8. To increase both job opportunities and per capita income for our people, as well as the gross product of our state.
- 9. To support the concept of democratic process and to constantly seek to bring more efficiency, responsiveness and effectiveness to our systems of government at all levels.
- To foster cultural and spiritual enrichment for our people who seek it.
- 11. To increase the opportunities for relaxation and recreation.
- 12. To seek to build pride and esprit de corps in ourselves and our institutions, and thereby enhance optimism in our future while we foster respect and appreciation of our rich North Dakota heritage.
- 13. To work with surrounding states and Canadian provinces to achieve those benefits for our people which we as a state cannot satisfactorily achieve alone.

These goals are not chiseled in marble or hammered in bronze, and can change from time to time, both in nature and in priority.

I believe North Dakota state government should be given goals to pursue if only to document the thinking of the people of this period of time.

CONCLUSION

Morality is the degree of excellence in our practice of that which is right. Morality in our government is the basis of our claim to the finest, most sympathetic government on earth. But legality is not always consistent with morality. Morality must be the strong fiber in the fabric of all legislation.

It is very easy for those who have security to speak contempuously about the desirability of government being concerned with people's security. We must constantly try to place ourselves in the position of those we represent. This includes the disadvantaged as well as the advantaged. It includes the silent as well as the vocal. And it includes those with philosophies other than our own.

And it includes those with philosophies other than our own.

The record of the 42nd Legislative Assembly has not been written.

There is yet time to make it great.

FIRST DAY AFTER RECESS AND SECOND DAY

Bismarck, January 6, 1971

The House reconvened at 1:30 p.m., pursuant to recess taken, with Speaker Bier presiding.

Speaker Bier announced the appointment of Ernest Meidema, William DeKrey, Carl White, Ralph M. Winge and Mrs. Mushik to the Enrolling and Engrossing Committee.

Rep. Solberg moved that the remarks of Rep. Streibel and Rep. Hoffner in making the National Leadership Award of Excellence to Governor William Guy be printed in the Journal, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Streibel: "Governor Guy, Mrs. Guy, Fellow Legislators and Friends:

"Shortly after convening at 12 o'clock this noon, the House of Representatives passed a resolution which awards Governor William L. Guy the National Leadership Award of Excellence. This is an award created by Governor Guy to recognize outstanding citizens of North Dakota who have risen to a position of leadership and prominence in our nation.

"It was the thinking of some of us at the conclusion of Governor Guy's presentation to Senator Becker during a social gathering at our organizational meeting in December, it would be appropriate if our Governor be recognized because he was the Chairman of the National Governor's Conference during the years 1966-1967.

"It was my privilege the year that Governor Guy served as Chairman of the National Governors' Conference to be a part of some of the recognition that North Dakota did receive as a direct result of his position of leadership. I recall one occasion when the Telephone Companies of America commemorated the installation of the 100 millionth telephone in America, and to commemorate this occasion, they presented a gold Princess phone to each of the fifty governors, and then the fifty governors were all on a conference call with President Johnson. Some of us were in the office at the time this conference call was placed. If you don't think it gives you goose pimples to be in a room where our State Chief Executive is talking with the President of the United States on a conference call with forty-nine other Chief Executives, then guess again.

"I recall other occasions, such as National Legislative Conferences, where people from Michigan, Illinois, Maine and other states would see a badge which indicated we were from North Dakota, and they recognized us by virtue of the fact that our Governor was Chairman of the National Governor's Conference.

"Governor Guy, on behalf of the other ninety-seven members of the House and myself, who I think represent the people of North Dakota — maybe not in the one man, one vote proportion — but we do represent them nonetheless, it is a great privilege

for me to represent my fellow colleagues in the House and present you with this J. F. K. chair."

Rep. Hoffner: "I would just like to ask the Governor not to use

that chair too much in the next sixty days."

REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COMPENSATION COMMISSION TO THE FORTY-SECOND LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

House Bill No. 256 of the Forty-first Legislative Assembly created a Legislative Compensation Commission, to consist of five members appointed by the Governor to four-year terms of office. The Governor was also to appoint one of the members Chairman of the Commission.

Immediately following the effective date of the Act, the Governor appointed Mr. John Rouzie of Bowman as Chairman; and appointed Mr. Arley Bjella of Williston; Mr. Gorman King of Valley City; Dr. James Mahoney of Devils Lake; and Mr. Edward Nesemeier of Casselton as commissioners.

The Commission's prime and continuing responsibility is to determine appropriate rates of expense allowance and reimbursement to be paid to members of the Legislative Assembly during the session and for interim committee work. The rates of compensation and reimbursement were to be designed so as to permit citizens to hold legislative office without undue financial sacrifice or disadvantage. The Commission is required by law to report to each Legislative Asssembly within ten days after the convening thereof in regular session. The Commission was also authorized to solicit the assistance of the staff of the Legislative Council and such assistance has been provided throughout the biennium.

Since its creation, the Commission has held three meetings. The first meeting was held on July 9, 1969, shortly after the creation of the Commission, and was devoted primarily to organization and a discussion of the scope of the Commission's responsibilities.

The Forty-first Legislative Assembly, in addition to creating the Commission, had also proposed a constitutional amendment to section 45 of the Constitution to provide that legislative compensation should be determined by a lay commission. The Commission was aware of this latter fact throughout its deliberations and believed that any truly realistic solution to the problem of legislative compensation could not be reached until such time as the Constitution had been amended as proposed by the Legislature, or through a similar proposition by the Constitutional Convention. Therefore, the Commission's philosophy was to attempt to recommend adjustments in legislators' session and interim compensation to bring that compensation more in line with current costs, and to attempt, through the vehicle of compensation, to aid in the attraction and retention of competent and dedicated people for service in the legislature

During the course of the biennium, the Commission received valuable comments and advice from several members of the Forty-first Legislative Assembly. The scope of the Commission's responsibilities was discussed with the legislators who attended Commission meetings, and it was indicated that the Legislative Assembly would probably welcome receipt of recommendations from the Commission in other areas of the legislative process aside from those recommendations strictly dealing with compensation. The legislators who attended meetings of the Commission thought that the legislature would value the recommendations of a lay commission regarding legislative improvements. Consequently, in addition to its specific recommendations regarding legislative compensation, the Commission is also making general observational recommendations regarding other areas of the legislative process.

The Commission believes that the prime responsibility of the Legislative Assembly is to respond to the needs of the people which it represents. The Commission also believes that if the legislature is not responsive to the needs of the people, more governmental power will flow to the Federal Government and away from local and State Government. One of the most effective means of ensuring that the legislature is responsive to the needs of those represented by it is to ensure that the membership of the legislature is made up of highly motivated and competent men and women.

The Commission believes that its primary responsibility is to make recommendations regarding a scale of compensation which will aid in assuring that competent and highly motivated men and women seek to serve in the legislature. However, the Commission recognizes that compensation is only one of many factors which motivate people to seek public office, and the compensation factor should be interwoven with improvements in areas such as physical facilities available, professional staff services available, and time available to the legislator to carry out his functions.

Although there are other factors which are beyond the control of the legislature, the Commission feels that improvements made in these four areas would do much to provide incentive for even greater numbers of qualified people to seek legislative office.

In order to carry out its responsibilities, the Commission studied legislative pay structures in the other States of the Union; expense and mileage allowances paid by the Federal Government, the several States, and several private businesses; and annual salaries paid other state administrative officials throughout the United States. The Commission noted that the latest available composite figures indicate that North Dakota's average expenditure per legislator is approximately \$6,850 per year, and that North Dakota ranks 47th among the 50 States in average expenditure per legislator. In regard to the total amount expended on legislative compensation, the latest compilation figures indicate that North Dakota ranks 41st out of the 50 States in the total amount expended on legislative compensation. As of December 1968, North Dakota ranked 47th out of the 50 States in amount of realized compensation paid to an average legislator during a regular session.

The 1968 median annual compensation for a state legislator was \$3,769. While the Commission realizes that there is no job completely comparable to that of a state legislator, it is interesting to note that members of the National Legislature receive an annual salary of \$30,000. While the positions of state legislators and congressmen are certainly not completely comparable, there is some justification for a comparison. Good representation at the state level is as important as good representation on the national level. State Governments with their "police powers" can affect the life of an individual in more ways than does the National Government. However, due to the greater prestige of Congress and a sharper focus of public attention on the national level, this is seldom realized.

The current trend in legislative compensation is towards increasing it. In the 1950-51 biennium, realized legislative compensation ranged from a high of \$10,000 in Illinois to a low of \$200 in New Hampshire. In 1967-1968, California provided the highest compensation with approximately \$42,000 per biennium, and New Hampshire remained low, retaining the \$200 figure. On the whole, legislative compensation rose from a biennial average of \$2,460 to \$10,124, or an increase of 311.5 percent, during this period.

In order to be able to more thoroughly assess the feelings of North Dakota legislators regarding their present compensation and their opinions regarding what compensation should be in the future, the Commission directed the staff of the Legislative Council to prepare a questionnaire which would seek responses in the areas of legislative compensation, legislative physical facilities, temporary legislative employees, legislative professional staff personnel, and the length of legislative sessions.

This questionnaire was mailed in October of this year to the remaining 143 members of the Forty-first Legislative Assembly. Responses were received from 84 legislators, for a 59 percent response rate. A memorandum collating the results of the individual legislator's replies is available in the Commission's files located in the Legislative Council office.

SPECIFIC COMPENSATION RECOMMENDATIONS

On the basis of its interim study of numerous materials and the collation of the returns to the questionnaire, the Commission is making several specific recommendations regarding legislative compensation. The Commission has also directed the staff of the Legislative Council to draft a bill embodying most of these recommendations. This portion of the report will deal with the Commission's specific compensation recommendations in detail.

The first component of legislative compensation discussed by the Commission was the daily unvouchered expense allowance paid for each calendar day during any organizational, special, or regular session pursuant to section 54-93-20 of the Century Code. The Commission was unanimous in agreeing that the amount provided by this section, \$35 per day, was not adequate to reimburse actual expenses incurred by a legislator who was forced to maintain two places of residence and move to Bismarck for the duration of the session. The Commission's beliefs were reinforced by the results of the questionnaire which indicated that 61.9 percent of the legislators answering the questionnaire felt that the session compensation was inadequate or grossly inadequate.

However, the Commission was also of the general belief that all of its recommendations regarding specific rates of compensation must be tempered by two considerations: First, the Commission realizes that it must move toward its goal of ideal compensation in gradual steps; and second, the Commission feels that it must always be aware of the practical aspect of gaining support for any recommendations made.

In light of these factors, the Commission recommends an increase in the daily unvouchered expense allowance of \$5 per day, in order to provide a total daily unvouchered session allowance of \$40, making the total daily compensation and reimbursement during the session the amount of \$45, which figure includes the constitutional salary of \$5 per day.

The next specific item on which the Commission is making a recommendation is the monthly expense allowance which is paid throughout the biennium. This allowance is currently set at \$35 per month by section 54-03-20 of the Century Code. It is the Commission's belief that the \$35 figure was unrealistically low, since that monthly allowance was designed to cover a legislator's postage, stenographic, telephone, and uncompensated travel expenses during the interim.

The Commission felt that a reasonable figure in terms of expenses incurred in time invested during the interim would be approximately \$100 per month. However, it was also the consensus of the Commission that a suggested increase from \$35 to \$100 might not be favorably received at the next session.

The Commission members believe that they should not recommend any large or wholesale increases in either session or interim expense payments, because the Constitutional Convention will, in

all probability, be studying the question of legislative compensation in the very near future, and the Commission hopes that the Convention will take action in its constitutional recommendations to bring legislative pay more in line with reality.

Therefore, the Commission recommends to the Forty-second Legislative Assembly that the \$35 monthly expense allowance now provided by section 54-03-20 of the Century Code be increased by \$15 to \$50 per month.

The next recommendation of the Commission deals with the authorization of reimbursement for round trips to and from the Capitol during organizational and regular sessions. The Constitution and statute (section 54-03-20.1) now provide four round trips to and from the Capitol: one trip during the organizational session and three during the regular legislative session. It was the consensus of the Commission that every opportunity should be made available to members of the Legislative Assembly to communicate with their constituencies on a face-to-face basis. The Commission believes that if this line of communication fails, the constituents will take their problems to their representatives at the next highest level of government. Therefore, the Commission recommends to the Forty-second Legislative Assembly that the total number of round trips for which mileage reimbursement is authorized be increased from four to eight. **NOTE:** Commissioner Mahoney dissented on this recommendation of the Commission.

The next specific component of legislative compensation regarding which the Commission is making a recommendation is the nine cent per-mile reimbursement made for travel to and from interim meetings of Legislative Council committees. The Commission noted that the Constitution provides a mileage reimbursement of 10 cents per mile for round trips to and from the session and believes that it is inconsistent for session mileage reimbursement to be set at a different level than interim mileage reimbursement. The Commission also noted that interim mileage reimbursement is covered by a general statue (54-06-09) which applies to all state officials and employees. The Commission believes, based on its study of federal and corporate mileage reimbursements, that the present state mileage reimbursement is inadequate, and that a realistic figure probably lies in the 12 to 15 cent per-mile range. However, the Commission felt that it was beyond the scope of its responsibilities to make recommendations regarding amendment to a general state statute governing all officials and employees who travel on state business. Therefore, the Commission recommends to the Forty-second Legislative Assembly that it review the mileage reimbursement payments provided by section 54-06-09 in order to determine whether such sums are realistic in light of current automobile operational costs.

The daily "actual" expense allowance paid to legislators for interim committee work is the next component of legislative compensation concerning which the Commission is making a recommendation. This allowance is set by section 44-08-04 of the Century Code, which provides a maximum of \$9 per day for lodging and a maximum of \$6 per day for meals, for a daily total of \$15. The collation of the returns to the legislative questionnaire indicated that 53.6 percent of the legislators answering believe the present statutory limit provided by section 44-08-04 is inadequate. The Commission is particularly concerned with the portion of that statute dealing with maximum reimbursement for lodging, since it believes that, at least in the larger cities in North Dakota, it is difficult to find a decent room for \$9 per day. However, the Commission again believed that it was beyond the scope of its authorization to make recommendations regarding amendment of general statutes covering all state officials and employees. Therefore, the

Commission recommends that a review be made by the legislature or another appropriate agency of the adequacy of the "actual" expense allowance provided by section 44-08-04, with emphasis being placed on the adequacy of that allowance in relation to legislative interim work on Legislative Council committees.

In regard to the daily payment to legislators for service on interim committees of the Legislative Council, which is presently set at \$30 per day by section 54-35-10 of the Century Code, the Commission makes no recommendation for change. Fifty-six percent of the legislators answering the questionnaire considered that the rate of daily interim compensation provided a fair return for time invested and expenses incurred.

The final specific recommendations of the Commission deal with the provision of additional compensation for legislators serving in leadership positions, in order to give recognition to the increased responsibilities which must be assumed by a legislator serving in such a position, and in recognition of the additional time expended by them during periods following the legislative session. Section 54-03-10 of the Century Code, originally passed in 1893, provides historic precedent for increased compensation for legislative officers by allowing the Speaker and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate to receive \$2 per session day in addition to their regular compensation.

The Commission believes that the Majority and Minority Floor Leaders of both Houses, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the Chairmen of the substantive standing committees of each House should receive increased remuneration in recognition of their increased responsibilities. The Commission also feels that the same rationale should be used to increase the pay of the Legislative Council Chairman and interim committee Chairmen. On the other hand, the Commission believes that the title of President Pro Tempore is to a large degree an honorific, and it was the consensus of the Commission that the present provisions for additional pay for the President Pro Tempore should be deleted from the statutes.

Therefore, the Commission recommends to the Forty-second Legislative Assembly that the necessary statutes be amended to provide an increase in daily session compensation for the Majority and Minority Floor Leaders of each House of \$5 per calendar day of the session, and an increase in the compensation of substantive standing committee chairmen of \$3 per calendar day of the session. The Commission also recommends that the interim pay of the Legislative Council Chairman should be increased by \$5 per day spent in attendance at Legislative Council or interim committee meetings and business, and the compensation of interim committee Chairmen should be increased by \$3 per day for each day spent in attendance at their interim committee meetings and committee business.

GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS AND CONCLUSION

As was noted earlier in the report, the Commission felt that it would probably be proper to make general recommendations in other areas of the legislative field, because in any study of legislative compensation designed to arrive at compensation figures which will attract and retain competent people for service in the legislature, and allow a greater potential number of people to be able to serve, it is impossible not to consider other means of challenging and encouraging a citizen to serve. Further, the Commission believes that if a legislator's working conditions are deemed by him to be atrocious or if the possibility of accomplishing anything worthwhile is remote, then no amount of money will induce him to run for or continue to serve in the legislature. Therefore, the

Commission wishes to make these further general recommendations for the consideration of the Forty-second Legislative Assembly.

The Commission believes that the 60 legislative-day biennial session does not provide enough working time to allow the Legislative Assembly to adequately consider all of the legislation and problems pending before it. The Commission is aware that any drastic increase in the length of the biennial session would cause that session to run beyond the opening of the agricultural productive season, and therefore, the Commission recommends that the Forty-second Legislative Assembly and the Constitutional Convention give consideration either to adopting a recessed biennial session plan or an annual session plan, wherein the length of each annual session would not interfere with the opening of the agricultural productive season. The Commission believes that any such plan which might be adopted should provide that substantive standing committees can continue to hold hearings on introduced bills during the interim period between sessions. The Commission feels that this would permit greater use of available professional staff personnel to serve each of the standing committees, more adequate hearing time for citizen participation, and greater opportunities for reviewing alternative courses of action.

In regard to legislative physical facilities, the Commission recommends that the Legislative Asssembly consider whatever means may be necessary to provide additional legislative facilities, with special emphasis on provision of additional and more adequate committee hearing rooms, a legislative lounge, professional staff quarters, and provision for office space for standing committee Chairmen. With the exception of the House and Senate Chambers, the collation of the returns to the questionnaire indicated that almost every existing physical facility which the legislators were asked to rate was rated by the majority from "fair" to "poor".

The Commission recommends that the Forty-second Legislative Assembly also give consideration to increasing the number of professional staff personnel available to serve the legislature. The Commission feels that, in light of the responsibilities and operational workload of the present Legislative Council staff, an increase of at least two professional personnel could be considered, in order to allow more adequate attention to be given to current areas of responsibility.

Finally, the Commission wishes to recommend that the legislature, in any study wherein the question of the size of the Assembly is discussed, should not attempt to increase the membership of the body, and that long-term consideration should be given to the possibility of decreasing the size of the body while still retaining its representative character. The Commission believes that a well-planned decrease in the size of the Legislative Assembly which does not seriously detract from its representative nature would allow physical facilities and professional staff personnel to be used in a more efficient manner, and would also allow the establishment of a more realistic legislative compensation plan without greatly increasing the overall legislative appropriation.

In conclusion, the Commission wishes to state its intention to meet with the appropriate committee or committees of the Constitutional Convention, should the Convention so desire, in order to discuss the Commission's viewpoints regarding legislative compensation, personnel, and facilities with the Convention delegates. The Commission hopes that the Convention will see fit to make appropriate recommendations to ensure that legislative compensation is put on a realistic basis with a continuous review capability built-in to any constitutional compensation plan.

Rep. Streibel then moved that John Rouzie, Chairman of the Legislative Compensation Commission to the 42nd Legislative Assembly be given the privilege of addressing the assembly explaining the report, which motion prevailed.

Subject: S.B. 383 of the 41st Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota

The 41st Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota enacted Senate Bill No. 383 into law. This new law was approved on March 29, 1969. The provisions of this law are as follows:

"Study by Insurance Commissioner. The Commissioner of Insurance is hereby directed to study during the 1969-71 biennium the problems of pro-rata liability provisions, otherwise known as coordination of benefits provisions, of group and individual health insurance policies and non-profit medical and hospital service plans. The Commissioner shall report his findings and recommendations to the 42nd Legislative Assembly."

Pursuant to this directive the Commissioner's office has made a study of the subject of overinsurance generally as it pertains to both the use of pro-rata provisions applicable to individual policies and Coordination of Benefit (COB) provisions applicable to group health insurance.

Recognizing fully the importance of both the directive and its subject matter, the Commissioner's office has proceeded in a manner it deemed best suited to produce a report and recommendations that are as responsive and complete as possible. Toward this objective, the broad areas of study have included (1) a review of existing applicable insurance laws of North Dakota, (2) a review of the Department's experience with matters pertaining to the filing and approval of health policy forms, (3) a review of policyholder complaints, their merits and dispositions, (4) the status of the related existing laws of other states, (5) a review of studies made by the insurance industry, and other non-regulatory groups, (6) a review of studies made by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC), and (7) recommendations of the NAIC for uniform laws, regulations and guidelines.

Findings of Fact

Within the scope of the study the following conclusions and findings of fact were ascertained.

- Overinsurance exists when, through duplicate coverages covering the same loss, the insured is paid total benefits in an amount exceeding his total medical expenses.
- 2. The existence of overinsurance can often be determined only at the time of each individual claim.
- 3. Overinsurance is not in the best interests of the insurance buying public. It tends to increase utilization and the costs of health care services, thereby increasing health insurance premiums and deflating the value of the public's health care dollar.
- 4. Overinsurance violates the basic principles and purpose of insurance. To fulfill its social function as a means of risk sharing, insurance should make reimbursement for actual losses, and not provide benefits in the form of profits over and above the actual loss incurred.
- 5. The use of overinsurance provisions in individual health insurance policies is controlled by statute. These provisions are contained in paragraphs c through f of subsection 2 of Section 26-03A-03 of the North Dakota Century Code. Chapter 26-03A was enacted in 1953 and consists of the Uniform Individual Accident and Sickness Policy Provisions Law adopted by the NAIC in 1950. This uniform law has been enacted in all 50 states.
- 6. The uniform individual overinsurance statutes are obsolete and

- unworkable. Today, with the exception of a few policy forms, these policy provisions are not used.
- 7. The Commissioner's office has experienced no particular filing problems with regard to individual policies. The statutory overinsurance provisions are optional. If they are used, they must be in the wording prescribed by the statute, or in such other wording as may be approved by the Commissioner which is not less favorable to the insured. The use of these provisions, however, offers little or no real solution to the problems of overinsurance.
- 8. The NAIC adopted, in 1963, and recommended for legislative enactment in each state, uniform over-insurance provisions for individual policies. These uniform provisions are intended to replace obsolete existing statutes and are designed for use in all modern forms of health insurance. This model legislation has been enacted in two states (Delaware and Wyoming) and its provisions adopted by regulation in one state (New Hampshire).
- 9. There are no statutory provisions in North Dakota relating to the use of overinsurance provisions in group insurance policies. No other state has any statute prescribing the form or content of group overinsurance provisions.
- 10. Substantially all group insurance policies contain overinsurance provisions, referred to as Coordination of Benéfit Provisions (COB), developed after several years of study by the American Life Convention, the Health Insurance Association of America and the Life Insurance Association of America.
- 11. The recommended group COB provisions (finding of fact No. 10), or modifications of them have been approved by the Insurance Commissioners of all 50 states since the early 1960's.
- 12. Because of the lack of total consistency among group COB provisions currently used, administrative incompatabilities sometimes exist which impede the proper coordination of the benefits among two or more group plans. This most frequently occurs due to the use of slightly modified group COB provisions, the use of "excess" provisions, and the practice of compartmentalizing benefits in some non-profit hospitals and medical service corporation contracts.

13. The NAIC at its December 1970 meeting adopted uniform Guidelines concerning the use of group COB provisions for life insurance companies as well as non-profit hospital and medical service corporations, and recommends the adoption of these Guidelines in each state. These uniform Guidelines provide for the use of consistent provisions as well as means to promote public under-

standing of how COB provisions operate.

Conclusions and Recommendations

Based upon the above findings of fact, it is the recommendation of the Commissioner's office that some remedial legislation is needed in North Dakota through which the problems of overinsurance can be resolved and the best interests of the insurance buying public protected in a uniform, just and equitable manner. In order to achieve these goals, with regard to individual policy overinsurance, it is recommended that the uniform model provisions of the Seventh Status Report on Overinsurance, adopted by the NAIC in 1963, be enacted in lieu of paragraphs c through f of subsection 2 of Section 26-03A-03 of the North Dakota Century Code. With regard to group policy overinsurance, it is recommended that legislation be enacted authorizing the Commissioner to adopt reasonable and proper regulations for the implementation of the uniform Group COB Guidelines adopted by the NAIC in December of 1970. Information for drafting the above recommended legislation is in the hands of the Legislative Council.

"Further, I believe that the founding fathers of our nation never in their deliberations lost sight of the family unit, knowing that on this solid foundation a nation could be built.

"Later in my life — I've been around a long time — I read all I could lay my hands on concerning another ideology in which the state is supreme and can do no wrong. This form of government does work; however, it produces few men or women of caliber or note.

"In House Bill No. 1111, this confrontation shouts so loud that the balance of the bill to me is of little importance. This bill permits the state to invade the sacred premises of the home.

"Generation gap? I say to you this statement is baloney. I am the product of the generation gap. I was born of a forty-year-old mother. Could she and I communicate? She was my mother.

"Again that emotional approach. How could I talk to her on equal terms? It is impossible? Still necessary in this relationship and possible.

"Then as a parent the position was reversed, and the ties to the children of the second generation are those of fierce compassion. Without the consent or knowledge of any of this group — the parents especially, as this is their child — we will give the state the right to invade the sacred hearth, so to speak. Again I say to you, parents were made before doctors. I find the present day physician as a man to talk to about as chummy as a turtle with his head drawn in. Now then, back to religion, when I was young, head shrinkers were so few and far between, we did not even know about them. We had our clergy. If I am not mistaken, they are still around. We still are not too good or too smart not to seek counsel when the world is too much for us, Catholic and Protestant alike. Here is our relationship to our Church, our fellowmen and our God.

"If our children find it hard to communicate with us, and they do when guilt is involved, and because of this, we with them. By following the precepts of our religion, I am sure love, emotional again, within the family is there in the most trying situation, and it will prevail without the state taking over, and the end result will not be too tragic. The bill is based on the breach of one or more of the mighty "Ten', and even Christ himself did not remove justice

from the breach of these.

"So I very much oppose this bill in its present form.



SECOND READING OF HOUSE BILLS

House Bill No. 1038. A Bill for an Act to repeal sections 48-05-02 and 48-05-04 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the use of native fuel by public institutions.

Which was read.

Rep. Rundle requested that his remarks on House Bill No. 1038 be printed in the Journal:

"Mr. Speaker, Members of the North Dakota House of Representatives, Ladies and Gentlemen:

"If this bill passes, we are serving notice on the people of the world that our lignite coal is no good. It is just as simple as that. If our two largest colleges can't burn lignite, why should we expect others to?

"This and other legislatures have spent thousands of dollars in trying to promote industry to come into the state and here we have a long established, operating industry and we are doing our best to kill it.

"Lignite coal can be burned more cheaply than natural gas. Lignite coal costs 31¢ per million BTU's. Natural gas costs 65¢ and oil is 77¢.

"The engineers have testified that it costs more to install equipment to burn lignite, but I submit that much of the equipment is already there and in working order. In fact, some of it is less than six years old. When natural gas is burned, a standby fuel is necessary and in this case it would be oil, which costs even more than gas to burn. Furthermore, special equipment is required to burn oil such as huge storage tanks heated with coils, different burners and so on. The lignite industry furnishes 1,000 carloads per year. It takes about eight miners to mine the coal, 11 people to work in plants, and the work of several railroad employees to haul the coal. If this bill passes, there will be more than 30 North Dakotans out of work. Even worse, the gas to be burned would come from Canada. It is estimated that this gas would cost from between \$275,000

and \$323,400 per year. The price of this gas was recently raised 10%. It could happen again any time and North Dakota will have no control over it.

"To sum it up, we will be saying that lignite coal is no good. We will put at least 30 North Dakotans out of work. We will be sending up to \$323,400 of our taxpayers money to Canada. I don't think we can afford to do this and I sincerely urge you to vote NO on this bill.

"Thank you."

EXPLANATION OF VOTE

Rep. Jenkins asked that his remarks concerning his vote on Senate Bill No. 2071 be recorded in the Journal.

Rep. Jenkins: "I would like to explain my vote. Four years ago we had a bill in here to change our pollution laws in the State of North Dakota, and we had a committee report. With all due respect to my colleague, Mr. Hentges, I don't happen to agree with his philosophy on Mr. Nader, and I voted NO on this bill four years ago.

"We passed a pollution control act. At that time I was one of the few that voted against that bill, and the reason I voted against that bill is the same reason as now. At that time it was cautioned it would have an impact on our livestock industry in the State of North Dakota, and those of you who have taken the time to look at the new regulations promulgated by the Health Department regarding the livestock industry, I think should be concerned. Those regulations that were to help the farmer that were authorized to be set up are so stringent they could put every livestock feeder and cow on the side of a hill out of business.

"We should be careful about things that we vote on as far as federal regulations on any ecological and pollution controls are concerned.

Hon. Speaker Snedker:

"Mr. Speaker, members of the House of Representatives:

"When I arrived here last night and read one of your daily papers and looked at your calendar and estimated the workload of this Legislature, I wondered if I should even take one minute of your time because it was obvious that time was at a premium in this Assembly. However, after being taken through your Legislature this morning by one of the most wonderful men I could have in the person of your Speaker, and seeing the dispatch with which your Legislature deals with business, you will make the grade by the deadline. So with the promise to take just a few minutes, I wish to extend the very sincere greetings from the Legislature and all the peo-

ple of Saskatchewan to the House of Representatives and all the people of the State of North Dakota — our neighboring state with whom we have so much in common.

"When I received the invitation to interview your Legislature, I was reminded of a farm boy from Saskatchewan who kept company with a girl for ten years without the proposal of matrimony. The reason for delaying the proposal so long was that he was a sound and serious fellow who had certain things in mind he should achieve before he proposed. These objectives were: he should have clear title to a section of land, a line of machinery and car paid for, cattle debt free and \$1,000 in the bank. This was quite an objective to set. However, in the tenth year of striving to achieve these objectives, he sold some cattle and suddenly he had the \$1,000, the last of the objectives to achieve. He raced to the phone, called his girl, and said, 'I have clear title to a section of land, a good herd of cattle, machinery and car paid for and \$1,000 in the bank. Will you marry me?' She said, 'You're darned right I will. Who's speaking?'

"When invited to visit your Legislature, I accepted with alacrity, and to have what I thought was a good reason to get a first-hand look at the Session at work. I am pleased to see so many students in the gallery. We have an ever-increasing student load in our gallery. In 1966, I mingled very often with the students and answered many of their questions, and as a result, I decided to take another step and give a lecture program on parliamentary procedure. I conducted these lectures — fifteen minutes for lecture and fifteen minutes for questions and answers. Naturally, I find these young people very intelligent, sincere, precocious, and serious, and you are going to have to be smart on your feet to field the questions they throw at you. Very often I was asked to describe to these students the Congressional System practiced in the United States. I have no problem explaining the Parliamentary System, but when I got to the point of orally explaining the Congressional System, I found myself at a loss. While I read a good many books on this subject, I found my answers as dead and dry as the books from which I had gotten the answers. I wanted to not only give the rule but the reason for the rule, and I wanted the answer to sparkle with the warmth of human feeling which is necessary if we are to describe the Congressional System. I wanted to be able to give them a real factual explanation of both systems that are in use in our two great countries. For this reason I was extremely happy to accept the invitation of your Speaker to come to the Legislature of your state.

"I cannot speak too highly for the time and trouble that have gone into my visit to show me the manner in which you practice this system. I appreciate the manner in which my understanding has been increased, so I can give better lectures and do a better job so those young people can take their proper places in our free self-governing country. Thank you very much for your courtesy and for the wonderful welcome you have given me in the State of North Dakota."

REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Social Welfare to whom was referred House Bill No. 1062 has had the same under consideration and recommends that the same be amended as follows:

on page 1, line 1, delete all of the words following "A BILL" and insert in lieu thereof the following: "for an Act to create and enact chapter 15-20.2 and sections 50-06-15, 50-06-16, 50-06-17, 50-06-18, 50-06-19, 50-06-20, 50-06-21, 50-06-22, 50-06-23, 50-06-24, 50-06-25, and 50-06-26 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to vocational education and vocational rehabilitation; to amend and reenact section 50-06-13 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the biennial report of the state social service board; and to repeal section 4 of House Bill No. 1045 as approved by the forty-second legislative assembly, relating to vocational education and vocational rehabilitation.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1.) Chapter 15-20.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

15-20.2-01. DEFINITIONS.) In this chapter, unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires:

1. "State board" shall mean the state board of vocational education which is the state board of public school education.

- 2. "Director" shall mean the director of vocational education.
- "Regulations" shall mean regulations made by the director with the approval of the state board.

15-20.2-02. STATE BOARD OF VOCATIONAL EDUCATION — DIRECTOR OF VOCATIONAL EDUCATION — APPOINTMENT, QUALIFICATIONS, ASSISTANTS, DUTIES.) The state board of public school education shall be the state board for vocational education. The state board, acting through the office of the superintendent of public instruction, shall appoint a director and executive officer for vocational education who shall be charged with the administration, under the direction and supervision of the board, of the provisions of this chapter relating to vocational education. The state board, acting through the office of the superintendent of public instruction, shall designate such assistants to the director as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this chapter. The duties, terms of office, and compensation of the director and of his assistants shall be determined by the state board. The director shall hold as a minimum a baccalaureate degree received from a recognized college or university. He shall enforce such rules and regulations as the state board may adopt and shall prepare such reports concerning vocational education as the state board may require.

15-20.2-03. POWERS AND DUTIES OF STATE BOARD RELATING TO VOCATIONAL EDUCATION.) The state board shall have all authority necessary to cooperate with the United States office of education in the department of health, education, and welfare, or other department or agency of the United States of America in the administration of acts of Congress relating to vocational education, including the following powers and duties:

- 1. To administer any legislation enacted by the legislative assembly of this state pursuant to or in conformity with acts of Congress relating to vocational education.
- 2. To administer the funds provided by the federal government and by this state for the promotion of vocational education, and to contract with:
 - a. Any public or private institution or agency, board of trustees of any agricultural and training school, or school district of this state; or
 - Any public or private institution or agency, or political subdivision of another state.
- 3. To formulate plans for the promotion of vocational education in such subjects as are an essential and integral part of the public school system of education in this state.
- 4. To provide for the preparation of teachers.
- 5. To fix the compensation of such officers and assistants as may be necessary to administer the federal acts and the provisions of this chapter relating to vocational education and to pay the same and other necessary expenses of administration from any funds appropriated for such purpose.
- 6. To make studies and investigations relating to vocational education.
- To promote and aid in the establishment of schools, departments, or classes, and to cooperate with local communities in the maintenance of vocational schools, departments, or classes.
- 8. To prescribe the qualifications and provide for the certification of teachers, directors, and supervisors.
- 9. To cooperate with governing bodies of school districts and and with organizations and communities in the maintenance

of classes for the preparation of teachers, directors, and supervisors of vocational education, to maintain classes for such purposes under its own direction and control, and to establish and control, by general regulations, the qualifications to be possessed by persons engaged in the training of vocational teachers.

15-20.2-04. ACCEPTANCE OF BENEFITS OF FEDERAL ACTS IN VOCATIONAL EDUCATION — COOPERATION WITH FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.) The state of North Dakota hereby accepts all of the provisions and benefits of the acts of Congress to assist states to maintain, extend, and improve existing programs and develop new programs in vocational education in accordance with state statutes and policies of the state board, and the state board shall comply with such conditions as may be necessary to secure the full benefit of such acts. The state board shall cooperate pursuant to agreement with the federal government in carrying out the purposes of any federal act pertaining to vocational education, and shall adopt such methods of administration as may be found by the federal government to be necessary for the proper and efficient operation of such agreement.

15-20.2-05. CUSTODY AND PAYMENT OF VOCATIONAL EDU-CATION FUNDS.) The state board shall be charged with the duty of administering all funds that are received from federal and state sources for vocational education purposes. All such moneys received shall be placed in the custody of the state treasurer, and shall be paid by the department of accounts and purchases as directed by certificate of the state board.

15-20.2-06. REIMBURSEMENT OF SCHOOLS TEACHING SUBJECTS IN VOCATIONAL EDUCATION.) The state board shall reimburse approved public or private institutions or agencies, or political subdivisions of this state or of another state, giving instruction in vocational education from funds allocated for that purpose. The state board may prorate the sums available if funds are insufficient to reimburse at the rate established by the state board.

15-20.2-07. COOPERATION OF SCHOOL BOARDS IN VOCATIONAL EDUCATION.) The governing body of any school district and the board of trustees of any county agricultural and training school may cooperate with the state board in the establishment and maintenance of schools, departments, or classes giving instruction in vocational education as approved by the state board, and may use any moneys raised by public taxation for such purposes in the same manner as the moneys for other school purposes are used for the maintenance and support of public schools. When any school, department, or class giving instruction in vocational education has been approved by the state board, it shall be entitled to share in any federal and state funds available for vocational education.

15-20.2-08. VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS AUTHORIZED — MILL LEVY.) Any county or counties within this state may, upon resolution of the board or boards of county commissioners of such county or counties, establish and maintain a school for the purpose of providing vocational education. For the purpose of maintaining such vocational school, the county or counties may levy a tax of not to exceed three mills upon all taxable property within such county or counties. Such levy shall be in addition to any other mill levies authorized by law, if approved by a majority of those voting on the question at a countywide special, primary, or general election, and after a public hearing has been held thereon.

15-20.2-09. BOARD MEMBERSHIP — POWERS AND DUTIES.) The school board of a vocational school district shall consist of not to exceed seven members, elected from geographical districts which shall be as nearly equal in population as is practicable at the same time and for the same terms as are other county officials. The boun-

daries of the geographical districts shall be determined by the board of county commissioners or, in the case of several counties combining to form a district, by the boards of county commissioners sitting jointly. The board or boards of county commissioners, as the case may be, shall also appoint the members of the original school board who shall serve until the next regular election of county officials. The provisions of section 15-28-02 shall not apply to a school board elected or appointed in accordance with this section. Such school board shall be governed by title 15 of this Code and shall possess all of the powers granted to a public school board by section 15-29-08 or any other provision of law, insofar as such powers are consistent with the provisions of sections 15-20.2-08 through 15-20.2-11.

SPECIFIC POWERS 15-20.2-10. TUITION PAYMENTS BOND ISSUES.) The school board of a vocational school district is specifically authorized to accept on behalf of the district any real or personal property available for distribution by the United States or any of its departments or agencies, and also, to accept any federal grants which may be made available in the field of vocational education. It may accept enrollments and set the amount of tuition for students residing outside of the district, provided that the amount of tuition so set shall not exceed the difference between the average cost per student for educating a student in the district and the payment, if any, received by the district from a county equalization fund on behalf of such student. Payments from the county equalization fund of the student's county of residence on behalf of each student attending a vocational school shall be made to the vocational school of attendance at the same rate as paid for high school students. A vocational school district shall be deemed a municipality within the meaning of section 21-03-01.

15-20.2-11. CURRICULUM — GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES.) The curriculum offered students by a vocational school shall be as determined by the school board, provided that such curriculum shall be submitted annually to the state board for approval, and only an approved curriculum shall be offered.

15-20.2-12. REPORT OF STATE BOARD TO GOVERNOR AND SECRETARY OF STATE.) The state board shall make a biennial report to the governor and the secretary of state on or before the first day of October of each even-numbered year as prescribed by section 54-06-03 and subsection 6 of section 54-06-04. The state board in its report shall set forth the condition of vocational education in the state, a list of the schools to which federal and state aid for vocational education has been given, and a detailed statement of the expenditures of federal and state funds for that purpose.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT.) Section 50-06-13 of the 1969 supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

50-06-13. BIENNIAL REPORT TO GOVERNOR AND SECRETARY OF STATE.) The (((public welfare))) social service board biennially shall prepare and submit to the governor and the secretary of state a complete and full report as prescribed by section 54-06-04 which shall show:

- 1. Its activities during the perceding two years (((;))).
- 2. Such suggestions as it may deem necessary (((; and))).
- 3. The condition of vocational rehabilitation in the state.
- 4. Such other matters as it may think are for the benefit of the people of the state.

SECTION 3.) Section 50-06-15 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

50-06-15. DEFINITIONS.) In the following sections of this chapter relating to vocational rehabilitation, unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires:

- "State board" shall mean the social service board of North Dakota.
- "Division" shall mean the division of vocational rehabilitation established by this chapter.
- 3. "Executive Director" shall mean the executive director of the division of vocational rehabilitation.
- 4. "Regulations" shall mean regulations made by the executive director with the approval of the state board.

SECTION 4. Section 50-06-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

- 50-06-16. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF DIVISION OF VOCA-TIONAL REHABILITATION DUTIES RELATIONSHIP OF DIVISION TO STATE BOARD.) The social service board shall be responsible for separate divisions of social service and of vocational rehabilitation services. The board shall name an executive director of each division. The executive director of the division of vocational rehabilitation shall be appointed in accordance with established personnel standards and on the basis of his education, training, experience, and demonstrated ability. In carrying out his duties under this chapter, the executive director of vocational rehabilitation with the approval of the state board:
 - 1. Shall make regulations governing personnel standards, the protection of records and confidential information, the manner and form of filing applications, eligibility, and investigation and determination thereof, for vocational rehabilitation services, procedures for fair hearings, and other regulations as he finds necessary to carry out the purposes of this chapter relating to vocational rehabilitation.
 - 2. Shall establish appropriate subordinate administrative units within the division.
 - 3. Shall appoint personnel he deems necessary for the efficient performance of the functions of the division.
 - 4. Shall prepare and submit to the state board annual reports of activities and expenditures and, prior to each regular session of the legislature, estimates of sums required for vocational rehabilitation, and estimates of the amounts to be made available for this purpose from all sources.
 - 5. Shall make certification for disbursement, in accordance with regulations, of funds available for vocational rehabilitation purposes.
 - Shall take other action as he deems necessary or appropriate to carry out the provisions of this chapter relating to vocational rehabilitation.

SECTION 5.) Section 50-06-17 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

- 50-06-17. ADMINISTRATION OF VOCATIONAL REHABILITA-TION.) Except as otherwise provided by law, the state board shall provide vocational rehabilitation services to disabled individuals determined by the executive director to be eligible therefor. In carrying out the purposes of this chapter, the division, among other things, may:
 - Cooperate with other departments, agencies, and institutions, both public and private, in providing for the vocational rehabiliation of disabled individuals, in studying the problems involved therein, and in establishing, developing, and providing, in conformity with the purposes of this chapter relating to vocational rehabilitation, such programs, facilities, and services as may be necessary or desirable.
 - 2. Enter into reciprocal agreements with other states to provide

for the vocational rehabilitation of residents of the states concerned.

3. Conduct research and compile statistics relating to the vocational rehabilitation of disabled individuals.

SECTION 6.) Section 50-06-18 of the North Dakota Century Code

is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

50-06-18. REHABILITATION SERVICES PROVIDED TO ANY DISABLED INDIVIDUAL — ELIGIBILITY.) Vocational rehabilitation services shall be provided to any disabled individual whose vocational rehabilitation the executive director determines, after full investigation, can be satisfactorily achieved, or who is eligible under the terms of an agreement with another state or with the federal government.

SECTION 7.) Section 50-06-19 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

50-06-19. REHABILITATION SERVICES PROVIDED TO DIS-ABLED INDIVIDUALS REQUIRING FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE.) Except as may be otherwise provided by law or as may be specified in any agreement with another state or with the federal government, rehabilitation services shall be provided at public cost to disabled individuals found to require financial assistance.

SECTON 8.) Section 50-06-20 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

50-06-20. COOPERATION WITH FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.) The state board acting through the division shall cooperate, pursuant to agreements, with the federal government in carrying out the purposes of any federal statutes pertaining to vocational rehabilitation and may adopt such methods of administration as are found by the federal government to be necessary for the proper and efficient operation of such agreements or plans for vocational rehabilitation and comply with such conditions as may be necessary to secure the full benefits of such federal statutes.

SECTION 9.) Section 50-06-21 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

50-06-21. RECEIPT AND DISBURSEMENT OF VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION FUNDS.) The state treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds received from the federal government for the purpose of carrying out any federal statutes pertaining to vocational rehabilitation. The state treasurer shall make disbursements from such funds and from all state funds available for vocational rehabilitation purposes upon the requisition of the state board upon the state auditor who shall draw his warrant upon the state treasurer for the amount for which requisition is made.

SECTION 10.) Section 50-06-22 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

50-06-22. GIFTS — AUTHORIZATION TO ACCEPT AND USE.) The executive director with the approval of the state board, may accept and use gifts made unconditionally by will or otherwise for carrying out the purposes of this chapter. Gifts made under such conditions as in the judgment of the state board are proper and consistent with the provisions of the chapter may be so accepted and shall be held, invested and reinvested, and used in accordance with the conditions of the gift.

SECTION 11.) Section 50-06-23 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

50-06-23. MAINTENANCE NOT ASSIGNABLE.) The right of a disabled individual to vocational rehabilitation maintenance under this chapter shall not be transferable or assignable at law or in equity.

SECTION 12.) Section 50-06-24 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

50-06-24. HEARINGS ALLOWED TO AGGRIEVED PERSONS.) Any individual applying for or receiving vocational rehabilitation who is aggrieved by any action or inaction of the division shall be entitled, in accordance with regulations, to a fair hearing by the state board.

SECTION 13.) Section 50-06-25 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

50-06-25. MISUSE OF VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION LISTS AND RECORDS.) It shall be unlawful, except for purposes directly connected with the administration of the vocational rehabilitation program, and in accordance with regulations prescribed by the state board, for any person or persons to solicit, disclose, receive, or make use of, or authorize, knowingly permit, participate in, or acquiesce in the use of any list of, or names of, or any information concerning persons applying or receiving vocational rehabilitation, directly or indirectly derived from the records, papers, files, or communications of the state or subdivisions or agencies thereof, or acquired in the course of the performance of official duties.

SECTION 14.) Section 50-06-26 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

50-06-26. LIMITATION OF POLITICAL ACTIVITY.) No officer or employee engaged in the administration of the vocational rehabilitation program shall use his official authority or influence, or permit the use of the vocational rehabilitation program, for the purposes of interfering with an election or affecting the results thereof, or for any partisan political purposes. No such officer or employee shall take any active part in the management of political campaigns or participate in any political activity, except that he shall retain the right to vote as he may please and to express his opinion as a citizen on all subjects. No such officer or employe shall solicit or receive, nor shall any such officer or employee be obliged to contribute or render any service, assistance, subscription, assessment, or contribution for any political purpose. Any officer or employee violating this provision shall be subject to discharge or suspension.

SECTION 15. REPEAL.) Section 4 of House Bill No. 1045 as approved by the forty-second legislative assembly is hereby repealed."

Rep. W. Erickson: "Mr. Speaker: House Bill No. 1308 is a very simple bill. It is only two lines on the sheet. But, it repeals the Crop Mortgage Law. I do not know just when the law was put on the statute books of our state, but I believe in the early thirties. I also believe it was put there for a good purpose. The Legislators at that time saw what was happening to the farmer. He was struggling to make a living for his family, and was running into one adverse year after another. He would mortgage his crop to a lending agency. Then, when the fall came, the lending agency promptly took his crop and the farmer was worse off than before. I think we as farmers are getting in about the same circumstances as then. The lending agencies have money to lend, and at a very high rate of interest.

"We are receiving a lower price for our grain every year, our expenses are getting higher, the price of machinery and repairs are increasing by leaps and bounds.

"I believe that to allow crop mortgages now would only tend to hasten the day when our small farmers must leave the land. We had no testimony from farmers for this bill. Those testifying were lending agencies and banks.

"At the present time, crop mortgages are permitted only if held by the United States, the State of North Dakota or a county, or to secure the purchase price, rental costs, or improvement cost of the land.

"I would ask for a no vote on this bill."

House Concurrent Resolution No. 9. — "Memorializing the Congress

of the United States to call a convention for the sole purpose of amending the United States Constitution to provide for intergovernmental sharing of federal income tax revenues."

WHEREAS, A resolution of our Nation's myriad and diverse problems is contingent upon a viable partnership between the Federal Government and strengthened state governments; and

WHEREAS, The Federal Government, by its extensive reliance on the graduated income tax as a revenue source, has virtually preempted the use of this course from state and local governments, thereby creating a disabling fiscal imbalance between the Federal Government and state and local governments; and

WHEREAS, Increasing demands upon state and local governments for essential public services have compelled the states to rely heavily on highly regressive and inelastic consumer taxes and property taxes; and

WHEREAS, Federal revenues based predominantly on income taxes increase significantly faster than economic growth, while state and local revenues based heavily on sales and property taxes do not keep pace with economic growth; and

WHEREAS, The fiscal crisis of state and local governments is the overriding problem of intergovernment relations and of continuing a viable federal system, and the only solution to this problem is a meaningful sharing of federal income tax resources; and

WHEREAS, The Congress of the United States, despite the immediate and imperative need therefor, has failed to enact acceptable revenue sharing legislation; and

WHEREAS, In the event of such Congressional inaction, Article V of the Constitution of the United States grants to the states the right to initiate change by applications from the legislatures of two thirds of the several states to Congress, calling for a constitutional convention; and

WHEREAS, The Congress of the United States is required by the Constitution to call such a convention upon receipt of applications from the legislatures of two thirds of the several states; therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF WEST VIRGINIA:

That pursuant to Article V of the Constituion of the United States, the Legislature of the State of West Virginia does hereby make application to the Congress of the United States to call a convention for the sole purpose of proposing to the several states a constitutional amendment which shall provide that a portion of the taxes on income levied by Congress pursuant to the sixteenth amendment of the Constitution of the United States shall be made available each year to state governments and political subdivisions thereof, by means of direct allocation, tax credits, or both, without limiting directly or indirectly the use of such moneys for any purpose not inconsistent with any other provision of the Constitution of the United States; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That this application shall constitute a continuing application until the legislatures of two thirds of the states shall have made like applications and such convention shall have been called by the Congress of the United States unless previously rescinded by this Legislature; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That certified copies of this resolution be presented forthwith to the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States and to the legislature of each of the several states attesting the adoption of this resolution by the Legislature of the State of West Virginia.

The penalty provided in this section shall also

apply to installment payments, which shall become delinquent fifteen days after the date said installment was due and payable.))) due for the entire year is paid in full on or before February fifteenth, the county treasurer shall allow a five percent discount. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.) Subsection 4 of section 61-16-01 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

4. The term "project", as used in this chapter, shall mean, and include, any undertaking for water conservation, flood control, water supply, watershed improvement and drainage of surface waters, or collection, processing, and treatment of

sewage, or any combination thereof, including incidental features of any such undertaking.

SECTION 2.) Subsection 20 of section 61-16-11 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

20. To plan, locate, relocate, construct, reconstruct, modify, extend, improve, operate, maintain, and repair sanitary and storm sewer systems and water supply systems, or combinations thereof, including sewage and water treatment plants; and to contract with the United States government, or any department or agency thereof, or any private or public corporation, the government of this state, or any department, agency, or political subdivision thereof, or any municipality or person with respect to any such systems.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.) Section 61-16-12 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

61-16-12. DISTRICT BUDGET — TAX LEVY — FINANCING BY SPECIAL ASSESSMENT.) When a water management district has been created and the board of commissioners thereof has been organized, the board shall estimate the expenses of the district from the date of its establishment until the end of the ensuing fiscal year and before July first in each year thereafter shall estimate district expenses for the fiscal year ensuing. Estimates of district expenses may include costs of rights-of-way, easements, or other interest in property deemed necessary for the construction, operation, and maintenance of any (((water conservation or flood control))) projects therein. Upon completion and adoption of a budget covering necessary expenses, the board of commissioners shall send a copy of such budget or apportionment thereof to the county auditor of each county in the district. If a district is situated in more than one county, the estimates shall be apportioned to counties affected. Such county auditor shall transmit the same to the board of county commissioners of his county. The board of county commissioners of each county in which the district is situated shall either disapprove the entire budget, amend and approve the budget as amended, or approve the budget as submitted and, if approved as amended or as submitted, by resolution levy, authorize, and direct their county auditor to extend and spread upon the tax roll of his county a tax of not to exceed three mills on each dollar of taxable valuation in the district or part of district situated in the county in the same manner, and with the same effect, as general property taxes are extended and spread. The acquisition of rights-of-way, easements, and the construction, operation, and maintenance of a project in a district may, in the discretion of the board of commissioners, be financed in whole or in part by special assessments against property benefited by such project, or (((the board may provide for the payment of such expenses))) from revenues realized (((in part))) from tax collections (((and in part from such special assessments))), or from net revenues to be derived from service charges to be imposed and collected for the services of the project, or any combination of such sources.

If the project is one involving the maintenance of a drain, and it is desired to finance such project in whole or in part by means of special assessments, the levy in any year for such maintenance shall not exceed fifty cents per acre on any agricultural lands benefited by the drain. Agricultural lands which carried the highest assessment when the drain was originally established, or received the most benefits under a reassessment of benefits, may be assessed

the maximum amount of fifty cents per acre. The assessment of other agricultural lands in the district shall be based upon the proportion that the assessment of benefits at the time of construction or at the time of any reassessment of benefits bears to the assessment of the benefits of the agricultural land assessed the full fifty cents per acre. Nonagricultural property shall be assessed such sum in any one year as the ratio of the benefits under the original assessments or any reassessment bears to the assessment of agricultural lands bearing the highest assessment. In case the maximum levy of fifty cents per acre for any year will not produce an amount sufficient to cover the cost of cleaning out and repairing such drain, the board of commissioners may accumulate a fund in an amount not exceeding the sum produced by such maximum permissible levy for two years. In the event the water conservation and flood control district is dissolved, all unexpended assessments collected for the maintenance of the drain shall be returned to the owners of the assessed property by the board of commissioners on a pro rata basis in proportion with the amount originally assessed.

SECTION 4. AMENDMENT.) Section 61-16-21 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

61-16-21. FINANCING PROJECT THROUGH SPECIAL ASSESS-MENTS OR PARTLY THROUGH GENERAL TAXES AND PARTLY THROUGH SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS — APPORTIONMENT OF BENEFITS.) The board of commissioners may acquire needed interests in property and provide for the cost of construction, alteration, repair, operation, and maintenance of a (((water conservation or flood control))) project through issuance of (((special assessment))) improvement warrants or with funds raised by special assessments or a general tax or by a combination of a general property tax and special assessments. Whenever a board of commissioners shall decide to acquire property or interests in property in order to construct, operate, alter, repair, or maintain (((such))) a project with funds raised in whole or in part through special assessments, such assessments shall be apportioned to and spread upon lands or premises benefited by the project in proportion to and in accordance with benefits accruing thereto. The board shall assess the proportion of the cost of the project, or the part of the cost to be financed with funds raised through levy and collection of special assessment taxes which any lot, piece, or parcel of land shall bear in proportion to the benefits accruing thereto and any county, city, (((village))) or township which is benefited thereby.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT.) Section 61-16-22 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

61-16-22. FINANCING OF SPECIAL IMPROVEMENTS — PROCEDURE.) When it is proposed to finance in whole or in part the construction of a (((water conservation or flood control))) project by issuance of (((special assessment))) warrants or with funds raised through the collection of special assessment taxes levied against lands and premises benefited by construction and maintenance of such project, and after such project is approved by the commission as provided herein and by the board of county commissioners of each of the counties wherein the district lies, the board, by resolution, shall declare that it is necessary to construct and maintain such project therein. Such resolution shall state briefly the nature and purpose of the proposed project, and shall state the time and place within said district where the board will meet to consider any protests to the proposed project, and, under the conditions specified in section 61-16-23, shall include provision for protesting the levy of the general tax provided in section 61-16-35 to be made by the board of county commissioners. Such resolution shall be given by publication thereof once each week for two successive weeks in a

newspaper of general circulation in the district. The hearing shall be held not less than twenty days after the first publication of such resolution. If within twenty days after the first publication of such resolution, the owners of property liable to be specially assessed for the proposed improvement shall file written protest with the secretary of the board, protesting against the improvement, the board at the time set for such hearing shall determine the sufficiency thereof. If the board finds the protests to contain the names of the owners of a majority by taxable value of the land subject to assessment for construction of the proposed project, then the protests shall be a bar against proceeding further with such improvement. If the protests are found to be insufficient or invalid, the board may proceed to determine damages, if any, which will be sustained by owners of affected property and the board may proceed to contract or provide for the construction or maintenance of the project in substantially the manner and according to the forms and procedure provided in title 40 of this Code, and acts amendatory thereof, and supplemental thereto, for the construction of sewers within municipalities. When any district has entered into an agreement pursuant to the provisions of this chapter, under the terms of which the contract for such work is to be let by the United States government or by the state of North Dakota, or by both jointly, the board, after hearing protests and determining to proceed with the improvement, may dispense with the balance of the requirements of this chapter relating to plans for, bids upon, contracts for, construction of, and any other steps leading up to the construction of an improvement by the special assessment method, and the board may proceed to cause assessments to be made as in other cases provided

SECTION 6. AMENDMENT.) Section 61-16-23 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

61-16-23. RESOLUTION OF BOARD TO INCLUDE PROVISION FOR PROTESTING AND REFUSING AUTHORITY TO MAKE GENERAL TAX LEVY IN CERTAIN CASES — ELECTION TO BE HELD.) In any case in which that part of the cost of a (((water conservation or flood control))) project allocated to a county shall exceed fifty thousand dollars, the resolution of the board of commissioners provided for in section 61-16-22 shall state that any deficiency or probable deficiency in the special (((assessment))) fund for the payment of project warrants of the district shall be forestalled and the ability of the fund to pay principal and interest punctually shall be restored by a general tax levy upon the taxable property in the counties wherein the district lies, as provided in section 61-16-35 unless ten percent of the electors voting for governor in the last general election in that county, by written protest filed with the board of commissioners within twenty days after the first publication of such resolution, object to the payment of any deficiency or probable deficiency in such special assessment fund by such general tax levy.

If such written protests are found by the board of commissioners to carry a sufficient number of signatures, the board by resolution shall thereupon call a special election in the county or counties from which such protests were received for the purpose of having the electors of the county vote upon the question of whether such general tax levy shall be permitted. The date of such election shall be not less than twenty days from the date of the resolution calling for the election. The board shall cause notice of such election to be published once each week for at least two weeks prior to the date thereof in the official newspaper of the county. Such notice shall specify the date, polling hours, and the polling places of such election which shall be the same as for general elections and shall contain a copy of the resolution calling the special election and a statement of the question to be voted upon as it shall appear upon

The board shall appoint an inspector, two judges, and the ballot. two clerks of election for each polling place.

The ballot for such election shall be separate from other ballots used on the same day for other elections, and shall be printed, and shall state the question in substantially the following form:

Shall the board of county commissioners be permitted to levy a general tax on all taxable property in the county to pay any deficiency or probable deficiency that might occur in the project warrant fund of-District, (here insert the name of the water (((conservation or flood control))) management district) which fund was established by resolution of the commissioners of said district on- , (here insert date of such resolution.)

Spoiled or blank ballots cast at such election shall not be counted for or against the question voted upon.

If a majority of the votes cast at such election are "Yes" votes, authority to make such a general tax levy shall be deemed approved.

If a majority of the votes cast at such election are "No" votes, authority to make such a general tax levy shall be denied.

The election officials shall be compensated in the manner provided by law for general elections, and the costs of such election shall be borne by the district concerned.

SECTION 7. AMENDMENT.) Section 61-16-28 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

CERTIFICATION OF ASSESSMENTS TO COUNTY When a district board of commissioners has by resolution levied, or caused to be levied, special assessments to cover the cost of constructing a (((water conservation or flood control))) project, the board shall determine the rate of interest unpaid special assessments shall bear, which rate shall not exceed seven percent per annum and shall not be less than the warrant rate. Interest on unpaid special assessments shall commence on the date the assessments are finally confirmed by the board. Special assessments may be certified and made payable in equal annual installments, the last of which shall be due and payable not more than thirty years after date of the warrants to be paid. The secretary of the district shall certify to the county auditor of the county in which the district is situated, or if the district embraces lands situated in more than one county, to the county auditor of each county in which district lands subject to such special assessments are situated, the total lands subject to such special assessments are situated, the total amount levied against such lands in his county and the proportion or percentage of such amount assessed against each piece, parcel, lot, or tract of land. The secretary of the district shall also file with the county auditor of each county in which district lands lie a statement showing the cost of the project, the part thereof, if any, which will be paid out of general taxes and the part to be financed by special assessments. Funds needed to pay the cost of maintaining a (((water conservation or flood control))) project may be raised in the same manner as funds were raised to meet construction costs. the same manner as funds were raised to meet construction costs. If the project was financed in whole or in part through the use of special assessments, the board of commissioners shall prorate the costs of maintaining projects in the same proportion as were the original costs of construction or, in the event a reassessment of benefits has been adopted, the costs shall be prorated in accordance with the reassessment of benefits as authorized by section 61-16-26.1.

SECTION 8. AMENDMENT.) Section 61-16-32 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

follows:

61-16-32. WARRANTS — ISSUANCE — WHEN PAYABLE AMOUNTS — INTEREST — INTEREST COUPONS.) (((conservation and flood control))) management district may, at any time after entering into a contract for a (((water conservation or flood control))) project to be financed in whole or in part by special assessments, (((and in anticipation of the levy of such assessments and taxes, if any,))) issue temporary and definitive warrants on the project fund, created for that purpose, in the manner and subject to the limitations prescribed in section 40-24-19, and may pledge to the payment of warrants issued to finance a sewer or water project the net revenues derived from the imposition of service charges to be imposed and collected with respect thereto as provided in section 40-22-16 payable at specified times, except that the first maturity date of any such warrant shall not be less than two years from the date of issuance. The warrants shall be issued in such amounts as in the judgment of the district's board of commissioners will be necessary (((after the taxes and assessments have been levied and spread))) for such project. Such warrants shall bear interest at a rate of not to exceed seven percent per annum, payable annually or semiannually. Coupons evidencing the interest for each year or half year, as the case may be, may be attached to the warrants (((payable in whole or in part out of special assessments))). The warrants shall state upon the face thereof the purpose for which issued and the project fund from which they are payable and shall be signed by the chairman of the board of commissioners and countersigned by the secretary of the district. (((Such warrants shall be in denominations of not more than one thousand dollars each.))) Such warrants shall be payable serially in such amounts as the board shall determine, extending over a period of not more than thirty years.

SECTION 9. AMENDMENT.) Section 61-16-33 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

61-16-33. WARRANTS MAY BE USED IN MAKING PAYMENTS ON CONTRACT — WARRANTS PAYABLE OUT OF FUND ON WHICH DRAWN — MAY BE USED TO PAY SPECIAL ASSESS-MENTS.) (((Special assessment))) Improvement warrants (((, including warrants payable in whole or in part out of special assessments,))) may be used in making payments on contracts for construction of the project for which the special assessment fund was created, or may be sold for cash at not less than ninety-eight percent of par and accrued interest, and the proceeds thereof, less accrued interest, shall be credited to the construction account of such fund and shall be used exclusively to pay such contracts and construction costs. Any balance remaining in any construction account after completion of a project shall be transferred to the sinking fund account of the assessment fund. The treasurer of the district shall pay special assessment warrants and (((the)))any interest coupons attached thereto as they mature and are presented for payment out of the fund on which they are drawn and shall cancel the warrants and any coupons when paid.

SECTION 10. AMENDMENT.) Section 61-16-34 of the North Dakota Century Code is herby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

61-16-34. REFUNDING SPECIAL ASSESSMENT WARRANTS — PURPOSES FOR WHICH SUCH WARRANTS MAY BE ISSUED — PAYMENT OF WARRANTS.) Any water conservation and flood control district having outstanding special assessment warrants, payable in whole or in part out of collections from special assessments, which are past due or which are redeemable, either at the option of the district or with the consent of the warrant holders, may issue refunding special assessment warrants or bonds if there is not sufficient money in the project fund against which such warrants are

drawn to pay the same. The issuance of refunding warrants **or bonds** shall be authorized by resolution of the board of commissioners. Such resolution shall describe the warrants to be refunded and the amount and maturity thereof. Such refunding warrants may be issued for any of the following purposes:

- To extend the maturities of warrants payable in whole or in part by special assessments.
- To reduce the interest on such warrants.
- 3. To equalize the general property tax which the (((district))) county or counties may be, or may become obligated to levy in order to cover deficiencies in the fund against which warrants were issued.

Refunding warrants or bonds shall bear such date, be in such denominations, and shall mature serially within such time, not exceeding (((twenty))) thirty years from date of issue, as the board of commissioners shall determine. The average rate of interest on such warrants shall not exceed the average rate of interest on refunded warrants.

The treasurer of the district shall pay special assessment warrants, and the interest coupons attached thereto, as they mature and are presented for payment out of the fund against which they are drawn and shall cancel the warrants when paid.

Any deficiency in any fund created for the payment of district warrants payable in whole or in part out of collections of special assessment taxes shall be the obligation of the district.

SECTION 11. AMENDMENT.) Section 61-16-35 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

61-16-35. FINANCIAL REPORTS — LIABILITY FOR DEFICIENCIES.) On the first Monday of each month the district treasurer shall report to the board of commissioners in writing the amount of money in the treasury, the receipts, if any, in the preceding month and the amount and items of expenditure during that month. Such report shall be verified and filed with the secretary of the district. A verified copy of such report shall also be filed in the office of the county auditor of each county in which the district lies and shall be open to public inspection.

During the month of June of each year the board of commissioners shall prepare a complete statement of the condition of the finances of each district and shall cause the same to be filed with the county auditor of each county in which the district lies on or before July first next following. Such statement shall show separately and in detail the condition and resources of each and every assessment fund for the payment of project warrants of the district, including the amount of any anticipated deficit and the apportionment thereof. At its July meeting next following the filing of such statement of condition of any water conservation and flood control district, the county board shall examine such statement and make inquiry regarding same to determine whether or not the district has defaulted or may soon default on payment of its financial obligations as the same become due.

Whenever all special assessments, taxes, or other receipts, if any, appropriated and theretofore collected for a project are insufficient to pay the special assessment warrants issued against such project, with interest, the board of county commissioners of each of the counties wherein the district lies (((, upon the maturity of the last special assessment warrant,))) shall advance to the district project warrant fund an amount sufficient to pay the deficiency attributable to benefited property in each such county. If it appears to the county board at any time (((prior to the maturity of the last special assessment project warrant))) that a deficiency exists or is likely to occur within one year in such project warrant fund for the payment

of principal or interest due or to become due on such warrants, the board of county commissioners of each of the counties wherein the district lies in order to forestall imminent deficiency in such fund or to promptly restore the ability of such fund to pay principal and interest punctually as the same become due shall advance to such project fund the amount necessary to cover the (((deficiency or))) anticipated deficiency attributable to benefited property in such county. In order to make such advances, the board of county commissioners of each of the counties shall levy a general tax upon the taxable property in the county, and may issue certificates of indebtedness against levies so made, or shall pay such advances from its general fund. Advances made by the county or counties shall be obligations of the district to be met out of any surplus in the district project warrant fund, and future district budgets and tax levies for the district after provision has been made for necessary current expenses. No tax limitation provided by any statute of this state shall apply to tax levies made by any county for the purpose of making any advances in accordance with the provisions of this section provided that a board of county commissioners shall not levy the general tax herein provided if the electors in any county wherein the district lies have refused, pursuant to the election provided for in section 61-16-23, to permit such levy to be made."

MOTION

Rep. Streibel moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort Hon. Milton R. Young to the rostrum, which motion prevailed. Speaker Bier appointed Reps. Sandness and Dick.

Senator Young addressed the Assembly.

Senator Young:

"MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE: It is a great pleasure to be here with you again. I really began my political career as a member of this body in the session in 1933.

"I know there are many national issues and problems such as the war in Vietnam and new Federal programs of all kinds which you are greatly concerned about.

"One that has attracted more than usual interest is abolishing the seniority system. This is one I would like to discuss with you for a few minutes.

"There are a few people who seem to be quite concerned about my having too much seniority.

"Press stories advocating that no one 70 years or older be chairman of a committee of Congress haven't gone unnoted. While I am not up for election until 1974, I naturally wouldn't like to be legislated out of business before then.

"As you undoubtedly noted, there are those in Congress, and particularly in the United States Senate, who have some ideas about abolishing the seniority system. They have already had considerable success.

"This movement is being led in the Senate by an unusual combination. It includes a couple of generals who don't believe their expertise in military affairs has been properly recognized. There also are several liberals who believe they should be elevated to topmost positions almost immediately.

"The foremost Republican leader in this movement is Charles Mc-Mathias of Maryland, who claims to be a farmer. He is a leading spokesman for a farm organization that wants to abolish all price support programs. I have some reservations about him as a farmer after seeing a picture on the front page of the WASHINGTON POST of his getting kicked by a champion cow as he was trying to milk her from the wrong side.

"This strange alliance of Senators was successful in getting a rule adopted by the Republican caucus prohibiting any Senator from holding a ranking position on more than one committee.

"A similar proposal was defeated in the Democrat caucus.

"Let me give you an example of how this new seniority rule works on a committee or two. All four of the Republicans on the Rules Committee held ranking positions on other committees, so none could serve as ranking on this committee.

"To resolve this problem one of the ranking Republicans had to voluntarily get off the committee. This was Senator Carl Curtis of Nebraska.

"His leaving the committee permitted the appointment of a new member who didn't occupy a ranking position on another committee — Senator Winston Prouty of Vermont. This made it possible for him to be appointed to the ranking Republican position on the Rules Committee. He is a very fine and able Senator, but has had no experience whatever on this committee where experience is very helpful.

"I got kicked by the same horse.

"Senator George Aiken of Vermont was ranking on both Foreign Relations and Agriculture. Since he is now only eligible to serve as ranking on one committee, he took Foreign Relations and dropped his ranking position on agriculture.

"Being second on Agriculture, his choice put me in first place on both Agriculture and Appropriations. My choice then was whether to be ranking Republican on Agriculture or Appropriations. With great reluctance I took the ranking position on Appropriations. The Appropriations Committee is commonly referred to as the most powerful committee of the Senate, and I felt I should remain as ranking Republican on that all-important committee.

"This left Senator Jack Miller of Iowa, formerly the third ranking Republican on Agriculture, now in the position of being first ranking. The lineup on the Agriculture Committee now is Miller, Aiken, and me. Thus this new seniority system demoted me from second to third place after I served on this committee for 26 years.

"There is considerable difference between being third or second ranking. Oftentimes in the past only five conferees were appointed from the Agriculture Committee to meet with the conferees of the House Agriculture Committee to iron out the differences on a bill passed by the two Houses.

"A good example was the last farm bill. If only five conferees were appointed, I wouldn't have been a conferee on this important farm legislation. Fortunately, I have been assured that in the future there will be seven and not five conferees appointed, so I will continue to be a conferee with the House on all farm legislation.

"As you know, most major legislation is really written by the joint Senate-House Conference Committees. In the past more than quarter century, I have often been the only Republican or Democrat on the Senate Agriculture Committee from a major wheat-producing state.

"Senator Jack Miller, the new ranking member, is a very able Senator and does a good job for corn producers, but since his state produces very little wheat, he can't be expected to have the same interest in wheat as he does in corn.

"These seniority-busting advocates, both here in North Dakota and in the U. S. Senate, want to go further. A resolution has already been introduced which, if approved, would mean that when the 93rd Congress convenes two years from now, no committee assignments would be based on seniority. I doubt if it will pass but, if it did, I wouldn't have the chance of the proverbial snowball of serving as ranking member or chairman of the Appropriations Committee, or any other committee.

"Committee assignments, in that event, would be almost entirely on the basis of which Senator had the support of organizations or groups with the biggest political clout. Organizations or individuals who contributed large sums of money to the election of certain Senators would be in a position to exercise great influence. A Senator from a small state like North Dakota would have little chance of receiving important committee assignments.

"Despite what some are trying to say, the seniority system has been very effective. Even with its faults, and it has some, the alternative of having the chairman elected from the body as a whole would only encourage the selling of "favors" by those interested in getting the chairmanship. Under the present system the chairman and ranking member get their positions without selling their souls.

"The Constitution did attempt to protect the small states from the large. The seniority system does much to preserve this protection.

"I am aware, too, that some hopeful politicians are concerned about my age. They even carry around charts which attempt to prove that they have a much better vote-getting record than I.

"During all the years I served with the late Senator Langer, we got along very well, except in election years. This difference was understandable, as we belonged to different factions of the Republican Party.

"Once, after I had opposed his re-election and when I escorted him down the aisle to be sworn in by the Vice President, he whispered to me: "Milt, don't forget you are up for election next!" That still is pretty good political advice.

Fortunately, Senator Langer and I resolved our differences before the last time we both faced re-election. This was when the NonPartisan League split up and Senator Langer and others stayed in the Republican Party.

"I don't know whether I will be a candidate for re-election in 1974 or not. If my health is good and the people in North Dakota want me to run, I may. Senator Carl Hayden, who is now 93 and who served 56 years in Congress, still has a pretty good mind and better judgment than some politicians I know. He always had a stock answer when asked if he would be a candidate for re-election. He would say: "Why not?"

"There were a lot of things about Carl Hayden I liked.

"I will definitely state at least a year, and probably two years before my term expires, what my intentions are. Maybe this legislative body where I started 38 years ago would be a pretty good place to announce my intentions.

"While I have been away from here quite a long while, I have come back each session to visit you, and I still feel as close to you as the day I left. I have no better friends."

Rep. Halcrow: "Mr. Speaker: It may be a bit unusual for a member of the House Appropriations Committee to oppose H. B. No. 1001 on the floor this afternoon. For several weeks we have worked on this bill in an effort to be as responsible as possible to the people employed in our colleges and at the same time to express the interest and concern of the Committee in maintaining the physical plants in

good condition and repair. Many of us believed that instructional salary increases in the Governor's budget were too high. They were set at 6% and 6% while others were set at 5% and 5%, or 5% and 4%. We were not particularly concerned about each individual salary. The proposed reduction of the increase in these salaries was \$736,-259.00. The Committee felt this was necessary to inform the institutions that we wanted better curriculum control and less duplication. The reduction from 6% and 6% to 5% and 4% with a corresponding increase in building repair and maintenance was affirmed on several occasions with a majority vote in our Committee.

"The college lobby is the most powerful special interest group in this capitol. At least two legislators have more than a passing interest in college legislation and budgets, and this situation approaches the area of conflict of interest. Further, the county containing the largest of our institutions has two members on the house appropriations committee. Contrast that with the fact that there are only two members, (1-Republican, 1-Democrat) from west of the Missouri River.

"There is a bill floating around that provides for a Hockey Arena for half million dollars too.

"Total college operational budgets have grown from 19 million in 1959 to 68 million for 1971-73. We must conclude that North Dakota, with a declining population, and a depression in its major industry cannot stand continuing budget increases of such magnitude. Financial doomsday for North Dakota Education is approaching unless the system and the legislature find alternatives to ever increasing budgets. I oppose H. B. No. 1001 as now constituted. I respectfully request that this body now defeat this bill. Let us then reconsider our action, send the bill back to committee and reduce instructional salary increases from 6% and 6% to 5% and 4% for a total decrease of \$736,259.00. Unless such action is taken I must continue to oppose the bill, and other special budget requests for higher education."



Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Industry, Business and Labor to whom was referred House Bill No. 1168 has had the same under consideration and recommends that the same be amended as follows:

On page 1, line 23, after the word "farmer" and before the ";" insert the following language: ". No provision of this Act shall be construed to mean that an employee of the State of North Dakota, or the political subdivisions thereof, shall be accorded the right to engage in a strike"

And renumber the pages and lines accordingly.

And when so amended recommends the same do pass.

REP. BUNKER, Chairman

Rep. Gerl moved that the report be adopted, which motion prevailed and the report was adopted.

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Judiciary to whom was referred House Bill No. 1217 has had the same under consideration and recommends that the same do pass.

REP. ATKINSON, Chairman

Rep. Kieffer moved that the report be adopted, which motion prevailed and the report was adopted.

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Industry, Business and Labor to whom was referred House Bill No. 1250 has had the same under consideration and recommends that the same be amended as follows:

On page 1, line 1, delete everything following the word "for" and insert the following language in lieu thereof: the registration of subdivided lands situated outside North Dakota which are offered or disposed of in North Dakota and providing requirements for such registration; defining certain terms; naming the state real estate commission to administer this Act; providing for certain exemptions from the registration requirements; providing for full disclosure of material facts concerning subdivided lands offered or disposed of; providing for a public offering statement; providing for an inquiry and examination; providing for the payment of registration and renewal fees; providing for annual reports by registered subdividers; providing general powers and duties in the administration of this Act; defining fraudulent practices; providing for investigations and proceedings; providing for cease and desist orders for certain violations of this Act; providing grounds for the revocation of registra-tion; providing for judicial review of administrative decisions; providing for the licensure of real estate brokers, salesman, and mortgage brokers in connection with the offer or disposition of subdivided lands; providing a civil remedy for dispositions made in violation of this Act; providing for jurisdiction of causes of action arising under this Act; providing for extradition; providing for service of process; providing for certain evidentiary matters; and providing penalties for violations of this Act.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. TITLE.) This Act shall be known and may be cited as the "Subdivided Lands Disposition Act".

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS.) When used in this Act, unless the context otherwise requires,

- 1. "Commission" means the state real estate commission;
- "Disposition" includes sale, lease, assignment, award by lottery, or any other transaction concerning a subdivision, if undertaken for gain or profit;
- 3. "Offer" includes any inducement, solicitation, or attempt to encourage a person to acquire an interest in land, if undertaken for gain or profit;
- 4. "Person" means an individual, corporation, government, or governmental subdivision or agency, business trust, estate, trust, partnership, unincorporated association, two or more of any of the foregoing having a joint or common interest, or any other legal or commercial entity;
- 5. "Purchaser" means a person who acquires or attempts to acquire or succeeds to an interest in land;
- "Subdivider" means any owner of subdivided land who offers it for disposition or the principal agent of an inactive owner; and
- 7. "Subdivision" and "subdivided lands" means any land situated outside the state of North Dakota which is divided or is proposed to be divided for the purpose of disposition into five or more lots, parcels, units, or interests and also includes any land, whether contiguous or not, if five or more lots, parcels, units, or interests are offered as a part of a common promotional plan of advertising and sale.

SECTION 3. ADMINISTRATION OF ACT.) This Act shall be administered by the state real estate commission.

SECTION 4. PROHIBITIONS ON DISPOSITIONS OF INTERESTS IN SUBDIVISIONS.) Unless the subdivided lands or the transaction is exempt under section 5, it shall be unlawful for any person in this state

- To offer or to dispose of any interest in subdivided lands located without this state prior to the time that the subdivided lands are registered in accordance with this Act;
- 2. To dipose of any interest in subdivided lands unless a current public offering statement is delivered to the purchaser and the purchaser is afforded a reasonable opportunity to examine the public offering statement prior to the disposition.

SECTION 5. EXEMPTIONS.)

- 1. Unless the method of disposition is adopted for the purpose of evasion of this Act, the registration provisions of this Act do not apply to offers or dispositions of an interest in land
 - a. By a purchaser of subdivided lands for his own account in a single or isolated transaction;
 - If fewer than five separate lots, parcels, units, or interests in subdivided lands are offered by a person in a period of twelve months;
 - c. To persons who are engaged in the business of construction of buildings for resale or to persons who acquire an interest in subdivided lands for the purpose of engaging, and do engage, in the business of construction of buildings for resale;
 - d. Pursuant to court order;
 - e. By any government or government agency; or
 - f. As cemetery lots or interests.
- 2. Unless the method of disposition is adopted for the purpose of evasion of this Act, the registration provisions of this Act do not apply to

- a. Offers and dispositions of securities currently registered with the North Dakota commissioner of securities;
- A subdivision as to which the plan of disposition is to dispose to ten or fewer persons; or
- A subdivision as to which the commission has granted an exemption as provided in section 11.

SECTION 6. APPLICATION FOR REGISTRATION.)

- 1. The application for registration of subdivided lands shall be filed as prescribed by the commission and shall contain the following documents and information:
 - a. An irrevocable appointment of the commission to receive service of any lawful process in any non-criminal proceeding arising under this Act against the applicant or his personal representative;
 - b. A legal description of the subdivided lands offered for registration, together with a map showing the division proposed or made, the dimensions of the lots, parcels, units, or interests, and the relation of the subdivided lands to existing streets, roads, waterways, schools, churches, shopping centers, public transportation facilities, and other offsite improvements;
 - c. The states or jurisdictions in which an application for registration or similar document has been filed, and any adverse order, judgment, or decree entered in connection with the subdivided lands by the regulatory authorities in each jurisdiction or by any court;
 - d. The applicant's name, address, and the form, date, and jurisdiction of organization; and the address of each of its offices in this state;
 - e. The name, address, and principal occupation for the past five years of every director and officer of the applicant or person occupying a similar status or performing similar functions; the extent and nature of his interest in the applicant or the subdivided lands as of a specified date within thirty days of the filing of the application;
 - f. A Statement, in a form acceptable to the commission, of the condition of the title to the subdivided lands including encumbrances as of a specified date within thirty days of the date of application by a title opinion of a licensed attorney, not a salaried employee, officer, or director of the applicant or owner, or by other evidence of title acceptable to the commission:
 - g. Copies of the instruments which will be delivered to a purchaser to evidence his interest in the subdivided lands and of the contracts and other agreements which a purchaser will be required to agree to or sign;
 - h. Copies of the instruments by which the interest in the subdivided lands was acquired and a statement of any lien or encumbrance upon the title and copies of the instruments creating the lien or encumbrance, if any, with data as to recording;
 - If there is a lien or encumbrance affecting more than one lot, parcel, unit, or interest, a statement of the consequences for a purchaser of failure to discharge the lien or encumbrance and the steps, if any, taken to protect the purchaser in case of this eventuality;
 - j. Copies of instruments creating easements, restrictions, or other encumbrances affecting the subdivided lands;
 - k. A statement of the zoning and other governmental regulations affecting the use of the subdivided lands and also

- of any existing tax and existing or proposed special taxes or assessments which affect the subdivided lands;
- A statement of the existing provisions for legal and physical access or, if none exists, a statement to that effect; a statement of the existing or proposed provisions for sewage disposal, water, and other public utilities in the subdivision; a statement of the improvements to be installed, the schedule for their completion, and a statement as to the provisions for improvement maintenance;
- m. A narrative description of the promotional plan for the disposition of the subdivided lands, including the range of selling prices or rents at which it is proposed to dispose of the lots in the subdivision, together with copies of all advertising material which has been prepared for public distribution by any means of communication;
- n. A copy of its articles of incorporation, with all amendments thereto, if the subdivider is a corporation; copies of all instruments by which the trust is created or declared, if the subdivider is a trust; copies of its articles of partnership or association and all other papers pertaining to its organization, if the subdivider is a partnership, unincorporated association, or any other legal or commercial entity; and if the purported holder of legal title is a person other than the subdivider, copies of the above documents for such person;
- o. The proposed public offering statement;
- p. Such current financial statements, certified or otherwise, as the commission may require; and
- q. Such other information and such other documents and certifications as the commission may require as being reasonably necessary or appropriate for the protection of purchasers.
- 2. If the subdivider registers additional subdivided lands to be offered for disposition, he may consolidate the subsequent registration with any earlier registration offering subdivided lands for disposition under the same promotional plan.
- 3. The subdivider shall immediately report any material changes in the information contained in an application for registration.

SECTION 7. PUBLIC OFFERING STATEMENT.)

- A public offering statement shall disclose fully and accurately
 the physical characteristics of the subdivided lands offered
 and shall make known to prospective purchasers all unusual
 and material circumstances or features affecting the subdivided
 lands. The proposed public offering statement submitted to
 the commission shall be in a form prescribed by it and shall
 include the following:
 - a. The name and principal address of the subdivider;
 - b. A general description of the subdivided lands stating the total number of lots, parcels, units, or interests in the offering;
 - c. The significant terms of any encumbrances, easements, liens, and restrictions, including zoning and other regulations, affecting the subdivided lands and each unit or lot, and a statement of all existing taxes and existing or proposed special taxes or assessments which affect the subdivided lands;
 - d. A statement of the use for which the property is offered;
 - e. Information concerning improvements, including streets, water supply, levees, drainage control systems, irrigation systems, sewage disposal facilities, and customary utilities,

- and the estimated cost, date of completion, and responsibility for construction and maintenance of existing and proposed improvements which are referred to in connection with the offering or disposition of any interest in subdivided lands; and
- f. Such of the information contained in the application for registration, and any amendments thereto, and such other information as the commission may require as being necessary or appropriate in the public interest or for the protection of purchasers.
- 2. The public offering statement shall not be used for any promotional purposes before registration of the subdivided lands and afterwards only if it is used in its entirety. No person may advertise or represent that the commission approves or recommends the subdivided lands or disposition thereof. No portion of the public offering statement may be underscored, italicized, or printed in larger or heavier or different color type than the remainder of the statement unless the commission requires it.
- 3. The commission may require the subdivider to alter or amend the proposed public offering statement in order to assure full and fair disclosure to prospective purchasers, and no change in the substance of the promotional plan or plan of disposition or development of the subdivision may be made after registration without notifying the commission and without making appropriate amendment of the public offering statement. A public offering statement is not current unless all amendments are incorporated.

SECTION 8. INQUIRY AND EXAMINATION.) Upon receipt of an application for registration in proper form, the commission shall forthwith initiate an examination to determine that

- 1. The subdivider can convey or cause to be conveyed the interest in subdivided lands offered for disposition if the purchaser complies with the terms of the offer, and, when appropriate, that release clauses, conveyances in trust, escrow and impoundage provisions, and other safeguards have been provided;
- 2. There is reasonable assurance that all proposed improvements will be completed as represented;
- 3. The advertising material and the general promotional plan are not false or misleading and comply with the standards prescribed by the commission in its rules and regulations and afford full and fair disclosure;
- 4. The subdivider has not, or if a corporation, its officers, directors, and principals have not been convicted of a crime involving land dispositions or any aspect of the land sales business in this state, the United States, or any other state or foreign country within the past ten years and has not been subject to any injunction or administrative order within the past ten years restraining a false or misleading promotional plan involving land dispositions;
- 5. There is no evidence which would reasonably lead the commission to believe that the subdivider, or if a corporation, its officers, directors, or principals are contemplating a fraudulent or misleading sales promotion; and
- 6. The public offering statement requirements of this Act have been satisfied.

SECTION 9. NOTICE OF FILING; REGISTRATION; FEES.)

1. Upon receipt of the application for registration in proper form and of a registration fee of one hundred dollars, the commission shall issue a notice of filing to the applicant. Within ninety days from the date of the notice of filing, the

commission shall enter an order registering the subdivided lands or rejecting the registration. If no order of rejection is entered within ninety days from the date of notice of filing, the land shall be deemed registered unless the applicant has consented in writing to a delay.

- 2. If the commission affirmatively determines, upon inquiry and examination, that the requirements of section 8 have been met, it shall enter an order registering the subdivided lands and shall designate the form of the public offering statement.
- 3. If the commission determines, upon inquiry and examination, that any of the requirements of section 8 has not been met, the commission shall notify the applicant that the application for registration must be corrected in the particulars specified within ten days. If the requirements are not met within the time allowed, the commission shall enter an order rejecting the registration which shall include the findings of fact upon which the order is based. The order rejecting the registration shall not become effective for twenty days during which time the applicant may petition for reconsideration and shall be entitled to a hearing.
- 4. Registration under this Act shall be effective for a period of one year and may be renewed for additional periods of one year by filing, not later than fifteen days prior to the expiration of a registration, a renewal application in such form and containing such information as the commission shall prescribe, together with the payment of a renewal fee of one hundred dollars. The initial registration and any renewal fees shall not be returned or refunded for any reason.

SECTION 10. ANNUAL REPORT.)

- 1. Within thirty days after each annual anniversary date of an order registering subdivided lands, the subdivider shall file a report in the form prescribed by the commission. The report shall reflect any material changes in information contained in the original application for registration.
- 2. The commission, at its option, may permit the filing of annual reports within thirty days after the anniversary date of the consolidated registration in lieu of the anniversary date of the original registration.

SECTION 11. GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES.)

- 1. The commission shall have the authority to promulgate, to amend, and to repeal reasonable rules and regulations for the administration and enforcement of this Act. Such rules and regulations shall include, but not be limited to, provisions for advertising standards to assure full and fair disclosure; provisions for escrow or trust agreements or other means to assure that all improvements referred to in the application for registration and advertising will be completed and that purchasers will receive the interest in land for which they contracted; provisions for operating procedures; and such other rules and regulations as are necessary or proper to accomplish the purposes of this Act.
- All advertising material of any nature whatsoever prepared for use in connection with the offer and disposition of any interests in subdivided lands registered under this Act shall be submitted to and approved by the commission prior to its use.
- 3. As a condition precedent to the registration of any subdivided lands, the commission shall require that the subdivider file an indemnity bond running to the state of North Dakota for the use, benefit, and protection of any person and conditioned for the faithful compliance by the subdivider, his agents,

and his employees with all of the provisions of this Act, as amended, and with all rules, regulations, and orders made pursuant thereto and for the faithful performance and payment of all obligations of the subdivider, his agents, and his employees in connection with the registration. The indemnity bond shall be of such type and in such form as shall be prescribed by the commission and shall be in such amount as the commission shall deem necessary to protect purchasers when the volume of business of the subdivider and other relevant factors are taken into consideration, but in no event less than twenty-five thousand dollars. Any such bond shall have as surety thereon a surety company authorized to do business in this state.

- 4. Whenever it appears that a person has engaged or is about to engage in acts or practices which constitute or will constitute a violation of the provisions of this Act or of a rule or regulation or order hereunder, the commission, with or without prior administrative proceedings, may bring an action in any district court to enjoin the acts or practices and to enforce compliance with this Act or any rule or regulation or order hereunder. Upon a proper showing, a permanent or temporary injunction or restraining order shall be granted without bond.
- 5. The commission may intervene in a suit involving subdivided lands. In any suit by or against a subdivider involving subdivided lands, the subdivider promptly shall furnish the commission notice of the suit and copies of all pleadings.

6. The commission may

- a. Accept registrations filed in other states or with the federal government;
- b. Contract with similar agencies in this state or other jurisdictions to perform investigative functions; and
- c. Accept grants-in-aid from any source.
- 7. The commission shall cooperate with similar agencies in other jurisdictions to establish uniform filing procedures and forms, uniform public offering statements, advertising standards, rules and regulations, and common administrative practices.
- 8. The commission may exempt a subdivision of ten or fewer lots, parcels, units, or interests from the provisions of this Act if it determines that the plan of promotion and disposition is primarily directed to persons in the local community in which the subdivision is located.

SECTION 12. FRAUDULENT PRACTICES.) It shall be a fraudulent practice, and it shall be unlawful

- 1. For any person knowingly to subscribe to or make or cause to be made any material false statement or representation in any application, financial statement, or other document or statement required to be filed under any provision of this Act, or to omit to state any material statement or fact in any such document or statement which is necessary in order to make the statements made, in the light of the circumstances under which they are made, not misleading;
- 2. For any person, in connection with the offer, disposition, or purchase of subdivided lands, directly or indirectly, to employ any device, scheme, or artifice to defraud;
- 3. For any person, in connection with the offer, disposition, or purchase of subdivided lands, directly or indirectly, to make any untrue statement of a material fact or to omit to state a material fact necessary in order to make the statements made, in the light of the circumstances under which they are made, not misleading; or

4. For any person, in connection with the offer, disposition, or purchase of subdivided lands, directly or indirectly, to engage in any act, practice, or course of business which operates or would operate as a fraud or deception upon purchasers or the public.

SECTION 13. INVESTIGATIONS AND PROCEEDINGS.)

- The commission shall investigate any subdivision offered for disposition in this state and may
 - a. Rely upon any relevant information concerning a subdivision obtained from the Federal Housing Administration, the United States Veterans Administration, or any other federal agency having comparable duties in relation to subdivisions;
 - b. Require the applicant to submit reports prepared by competent engineers as to any hazard to which any subdivision offered for disposition is subject or any factor which affects the utility of interests within the subdivision, and require evidence of compliance in removing or minimizing all hazards reflected in engineering reports;
 - c. Require an on-site inspection of the subdivision by a person or persons designated by it. All expenses incurred in connection with an on-site inspection shall be defrayed by the applicant, and the commission shall require a deposit sufficient to defray such expenses in advance;
 - d. Make public or private investigations within or outside this state to determine whether any person has violated or is about to violate this Act or any rule, regulation, or order hereunder, or to aid in the enforcement of this Act or in prescribing rules and regulations and forms hereunder; and
 - e. Require or permit any person to file a statement in writing, under oath or otherwise as the commission determines, as to all the facts and circumstances concerning the matter to be investigated.
- 2. For the purpose of any investigation or proceeding under this Act, the commission or any person designated by it may administer oaths or affirmations, and upon its own motion or upon the request of any party shall subpoena witnesses, compel their attendance, take evidence, and require the production of any matter which is relevant to the investigation, including the existence, description, nature, custody, condition, and location of any books, documents, or other tangible things and the identity and location of persons having knowledge of relevant facts or any other matter reasonably calculated to lead to the discovery of material evidence.
- 3. Upon failure to obey a subpoena or to answer questions propounded by the investigator and upon reasonable notice to all persons affected thereby, the agency may apply to the district court for an order compelling compliance.
- 4. The commission may permit a person registered with the commission whose conduct or actions may be under investigation to waive formal proceedings and enter into a consent proceeding whereby orders, rules, or letters of censure or warning, whether formal or informal, may be entered against said person.
- 5. Except as otherwise provided in this Act, all proceedings under this Act shall be in accordance with chapter 28-32.

SECTION 14. CEASE AND DESIST ORDERS.)

1. If the commission determines after notice and hearing that a person has

- a. Violated any provisions of this Act;
- b. Directly or through an agent or employee knowingly engaged in any false, deceptive, or misleading advertising, promotional, or sales methods to offer or dispose of an interest in subdivided lands:
- Made any substantial change in the plan of disposition and development of the subdivided lands subsequent to the order of registration without obtaining prior written approval from the commission;
- d. Disposed of any subdivided lands which have not been registered with the commission; or
- e. Violated any lawful order or rule or regulation of the commission; it may issue an order requiring the person to cease and desist from the unlawful practice and to take such affirmative action as in the judgment of the commission will carry out the purposes of this Act.
- 2. If the commission makes a finding of fact in writing that the public interest will be irreparably harmed by delay in issuing an order, it may issue a temporary cease and desist order. Prior to issuing the temporary cease and desist order, the commission, whenever possible, by telephone or otherwise shall give notice of the proposal to issue a temporary cease and desist order to the person. Every temporary cease and desist order shall include in its terms a provision that upon request a hearing will be held promptly to determine whether or not it becomes permanent.

SECTION 15. REVOCATION.)

- A registration may be revoked after notice and hearing upon a written finding of fact that the subdivider has
 a. Failed to comply with the terms of a cease and desist

 - b. Been convicted or found liable in any court subsequent to the filing of the application for registration of a crime or tort involving fraud, deception, false pretenses, misrepresentation, false advertising, or dishonest dealing in real estate transactions:
 - c. Disposed of, concealed, or diverted any funds or assets of any person so as to defeat the rights of subdivision purchasers:
 - d. Failed faithfully to perform any stipulation or agreement made with the commission as an inducement to grant any registration, to reinstate any registration, or to approve any promotional plan or public offering statement; or
 - e. Made intentional misrepresentations or concealed material facts in an application for registration. Findings of fact, if set forth in statutory language, shall be accompanied by a concise and explicit statement of the underlying facts supporting the findings.
- 2. If the commission finds after notice and hearing that the sub-divider has been guilty of a violation for which revocation could be ordered, it may issue a cease and desist order instead.

SECTION 16. JUDICIAL REVIEW.) A person who has exhausted all administrative remedies available within the commission and who is aggrieved by an order pertaining to registration, a cease and desist order, an order of renovation, or any other final decision of the commission is entitled to judicial review in accordance with chapter 28-32.

SECTION 17. REAL ESTATE LICENSE REQUIRED.) No real estate broker, salesman, or mortgage broker shall offer or dispose of subdivided lands within or from this state, except in dispositions and transactions exempt under section 5, unless said real estate broker, salesman, or mortgage broker is licensed pursuant to chapter 43-23.

SECTION 18. CIVIL REMEDY.)

- 1. Every disposition made in violation of any of the provisions of this Act, or of any order issued by the commission under any of the provisions of this Act, shall be voidable at the election of the purchaser. The person making such disposition, and every director, officer, salesman, or agent of or for such person who shall have participated or aided in any way in making such disposition, shall be jointly and severally liable to such purchaser in any action at law in any court of competent jurisdiction for the consideration paid for the lot, parcel, unit, or interest, together with interest at the rate of six percent per year from the date of payment, property taxes and assessments paid, court costs, and reasonable attorney's fees, less the amount of any income received from the subdivided lands, upon tender of appropriate instruments of reconveyance made at any time before the entry of judgment. If the purchaser no longer owns the lot, parcel, unit, or interest in subdivided lands, he may recover the amount that would be recoverable upon a tender of a reconveyance less the value of the land when disposed of and less interest at the rate of six percent per year on that amount from the date of disposition.
- 2. No action shall be brought under this section for the recovery of the consideration paid after five years from the date of such disposition nor more than three years after the purchaser has received information as to matter or matters upon which the proposed recovery is based, whichever occurs first.
- 3. Any stipulation or provision purporting to bind any person acquiring subdivided lands to waive compliance with this Act or any rule or regulation or order under it is void.
- 4. The rights and remedies provided by this Act shall be in addition to any and all other rights and remedies that may exist at law or in equity.

SECTION 19. JURISDICTION.) Dispositions of subdivided lands are subject to this Act, and the district courts of this state have jurisdiction in claims or causes of action arising under this Act if

- 1. The subdivider's principal office is located in this state; or
- 2. Any offer or disposition of subdivided lands is made in this state, whether or not the offeror or offeree is then present in this state, if the offer originates within this state or is directed by the offeror to a person or place in this state and received by the person or at the place to which it is directed.

SECTION 20. EXTRADITION.) In proceedings for extradition of a person charged with a crime under this Act, it need not be shown that the person whose surrender is demanded has fled from justice or at the time of the commission of the crime was in the demanding or other state.

SECTION 21. SERVICE OF PROCESS.)

- 1. In addition to the methods of service provided for in the North Dakota Rules of Civil Procedure and statutes, service may be made by delivering a copy of the process to the office of the commission, but it is not effective unless the plaintiff (which may be the commission in a proceeding instituted by it)
 - a. Forthwith sends a copy of the process and of the pleading by certified or registered mail to the defendant or respondent at his last known address, and

- b. The plaintiff's affidavit of compliance with this section is filed in the case on or before the return day of the process, if any, or within such further time as the court allows.
- 2. If any person, including any nonresident of this state, engages in conduct prohibited by this Act or any rule or regulation or order hereunder, and has not filed a consent to service of process and personal jurisdiction over him cannot otherwise be obtained in this state, that conduct authorizes the commission to receive service of process in any noncriminal proceeding against him or his successor which grows out of that conduct and which is brought under this Act or any rule or regulation or order hereunder, with the same force and validity as if served on him personally. Notice shall be given as provided in subsection 1.

SECTION 22. EVIDENTIARY MATTERS.)

- 1. In any action, civil or criminal, where a defense is based upon any exemption provided for in this Act, the burden of proving the existence of such exemption shall be upon the party raising such defense.
- In any action, civil or criminal, a certificate signed and sealed by the commission stating compliance or noncompliance with the provisions of this Act shall be admissible in any such action.

SECTION 23. PENALTIES.) Any person who shall willfully violate any provision of this Act or who willfully violates any rule or regulation or order of the commission made pursuant to the provisions of this Act, or who shall engage in any act, practice, or transaction declared by any provision of this Act to be unlawful shall upon conviction thereof be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than five thousand dollars or to imprisonment in the penitentiary for not more than five years or to both such fine and imprisonment.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Rep. Hilleboe: "Mr. Speaker: I would like to bring to the attention of this House the fact that I asked to have House Bill No. 1098 placed on the calendar. I would like to draw this House's attention to Section 50-01-08 of the Century Code which states that any person under the age of twenty-one years who consumes an alcoholic beverage, which includes beer, is guilty of a misdemeanor, and Section 50-01-09 states that any person who provides to any person under the age of twenty-one years an alcoholic beverage, which includes beer, is guilty of a misdemeanor.

"I would also like to bring to your attention Section 50-02-10, which provides that anyone having information concerning anyone providing beer to a person under the age of twenty-one may bring this fact to the attention of the State's Attorney for prosecution. I expect every member of this Assembly whose son, grandson, or nephew who is under the age of twenty-one who comes home from Viet Nam with his battle stars and ribbons and is served a beer would be prosecuted. And if any member of this Assembly who has a son or daughter who might come home with a child or from college and is under the age of twenty-one, you abide by this section of the statute, and turn these people in if they drink a beer. Turn them over to the State's Attorney for prosecution. This includes the battle veterans of nineteen and twenty — turn them over and get them into jail where they belong — if this is what the law says. If you served him the beer, you go with him.

"These statutes are on the books, and they will remain on the books because we have put a clincher on it. I don't know how many members of the Legislature don't know what the law was, but you must now go home and not allow any person in your community whom you know has been drinking beer under the age of twenty-one to go unpunished. You cannot let this person or youngster get away with it any more — including your son or daughter who might come off the fields, dusty, dirty and dry after plowing, who might only be twenty years of age with a wife and child. If you catch him or her having a beer, turn them in, and if you gave the beer to them, you go with them."

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.) Section 65-09-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

65-09-01. LIABILITY OF UNINSURED EMPLOYER FOR INJURY TO EMPLOYEES — COMMON-LAW DEFENSES NOT AVAILABLE — EXCEPTION — PENALTY.) Any employer subject to the provisions of this title who fails to comply with the provisions of chapter 65-04, shall not be entitled to the benefits of this title during the period of such noncompliance, but shall be liable to his employees for damages suffered by reason of injuries sustained in the course of employment, and also shall be liable to the personal representatives of such employees where death results from such injuries. The employer shall not avail himself in such action of the following common-law defenses:

- 1. The defense of the fellow-servant rule:
- 2. The defense of the assumption of risk; or
- The defense of contributory negligence.

The employer shall be liable for the premiums provided for in this title. Provided, however, that the provisions of this section shall not apply in the case of injuries occurring to agricultural employees between January 1, 1972, and January 1, 1974. Agricultural employers who fail to comply with the provisions of chapter 65-04 during such period shall be entitled to the benefits of this title but shall be liable for any premiums due plus a penalty of two hundred dollars and twenty-five percent of all wages subject to such premiums which are due. Such penalties for agricultural employers shall be in lieu of any other penalties provided by law and may be reduced within the absolute discretion of the bureau, provided that the bureau shall not reduce the amount due from any agricultural employer to an amount which is less than the actual cost of the injury to the bureau.

SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE.) The provisions of this Act shall be effective on or after January 1, 1972."

SECOND READING OF A HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

House Concurrent Resolution No. 3073. A Concurrent Resolution expressing concern for prisoners of war and men missing in action in Southeast Asia, and urging the Congress and the Governor to proclaim the week of March 21-27 as a special week of concern and March 21 as a special day of prayer for the prisoners and men missing in action.

Was read the second time.

Rep. Raymond requested that his remarks in regard to House Concurrent Resolution No. 3073 be printed in the Journal.

Rep. Raymond: "Mr. Speaker: When the bell of freedom peals across this land, our men held captive in Indo-China do not hear;

"When you and I celebrated Thanksgiving, there was no Thanksgiving in the stark prison camps of North Vietnam;

"When many in the world arose in joy on Christmas Day, joy was not a gift which these prisoners were able to cherish;

"When the New Year dawned bright and clear with a new hope for us, hope was but a word without meaning to our men.

"Hanoi, the Viet Cong and Pathet Lao have blatantly disregarded humane treatment of Americans held prisoner. The enemy has said there is no war and these men are criminals. They have refused to abide by International Red Cross rules and they have totally disregarded the Geneva Accords.

"All men of war rate their own contribution to war by their exposure to danger; by their degree of isolation; by their exposure to physical discomfort, and by the length of their separation from loved ones.

"By any or all of these standards, the 1,500 American men missing in action or held prisoner have given beyond that measure which we call sacrifice.

"This nation owes them a debt of gratitude of such magnitude that we shall never repay it. But we can try. When the world counts those who stood on behalf of our men, let them count us as standing with them. And standing with them, we owe them more than gratitude. Gratitude alone cannot repay their wives and their children or their widows and orphans, as the case may be. We must here dedicate ourselves to a unified effort to bring them back.

"We ask that this body join in pending national legislation to set aside the week of March 21-26 as the "Week of Concern" for our fighting men missing or held prisoner in Southeast Asia war action. But more than that we ask the President of the United States and the Governor of the State of North Dakota to set aside Sunday, March 21, as a Day of Prayer when as a God-believing nation we shall gather each in his own way, to pray for the safety and release of these men

"The words of Air Force Capt. Cliff Cushman seem to be especially fitting at this time. Cushman, from Grand Forks, was shot down in Vietnam action in 1966. He is listed as missing in action and believed a prisoner of war. He was one of the greatest athletes to come out of Grand Forks. He won a silver medal in the 1960 Olympic hurdles. In try outs for the 1964 team, his foot hit the fifth hurdle and he sprawled ingloriously to the track. In the aftermath of that fall, he wrote a letter to the youth of Grand Forks. The words stand like sermons in stone:

"'Do not feel sorry for me. I feel sorry for some of you. I would much rather fail knowing I had put forth an honest effort than never to have tried at all. Unless your reach exceeds your grasp, how can you be sure what you can attain? I know I may never make it. The odds are against me but I have something in my favor—desire and faith.

"'I dare you to look up to the stars, not down at the mud, and set your sights on one that, up to now, you thought was unattainable. Who knows? You may be surprised at what you can achieve with sincere effort. I dare you." Cliff Cushman.

"So: For Capt. Loren Torkelson and for Major Keith Hall, prisoners of war, we ask your support of this resolution. We ask your support for men listed as missing in action: Capt. Clifford Cushman, Major Martin Stern, Lt. J.G. Bill Christianson, Lt. Glen Belcher, Lt.

William Potter and others whose names have not come to our attention.

"The resolution explains our stand. We ask you to stand with us."

The question being on the final adoption of the resolution.

LEGISLATIVE FINDING.) The legislature was "SECTION 2. cognizant and has taken into consideration the methods and procedures employed by the census bureau in taking the census and the creation of enumeration districts, which do not necessarily coincide with the geographic boundaries of political subdivisions such as townships and smaller cities. The legislature in numerous instances was required to interpolate and intercalate the population in rural areas, including townships and small cities, on information available. It is also known that many persons maintained a dual residence, one for voting purposes and one where they physically resided. It has been common practice for many persons (farmers) upon reaching semiretirement age or upon retiring, to locate in a city, but retain their residence on the farm. However, for census purposes, they were listed in the city's population. Because of these items, mathematical exactness or precision in population is impossible, and because of the cost and effort to produce the necessary information to accomplish this, it is impractical.

SECTION 3. NUMBERING LEGISLATIVE DISTRICTS—CLASSES OF SENATORS TO PROVIDE STAGGERED TERMS.) Senators shall be divided into two classes; those elected in legislative districts designated by even numbers shall constitute one class, and those elected in legislative districts designated by odd numbers shall constitute the other class. The senators of one class elected in the year 1972 shall hold their office for two years, those of the other class shall hold their office four years, and the determination of which class shall be elected for four years and which class shall be elected for two years shall be by lot. The president of the senate shall perform the lot in the presence of the majority and minority floor leaders of the senate and shall certify in writing the results of such lots to the secretary of state within thirty days after the effective date of this Act.

SECTION 4. LEGISLATIVE SUBDISTRICTING — METHODS.) Upon a petition accompanied by a map showing the boundaries of the proposed subdistricts and accompanied by a written description thereof filed with the secretary of state containing the signatures of at least that number of qualified electors of the legislative district equal to ten percent of the electors of the legislative district that voted for the office of governor at the most recent general election at which such office was voted upon, asking that such legislative district be subdistricted into single-member representative districts or, in legislative districts with more than one senator, to be subdistricted into single-member senatorial districts, or both, the secretary of state shall determine and count the number of signatures and if such petitions contain the required number of signatures, such petition shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the district for their approval or rejection at the next special, primary or general election held in such district.

SECTION 5. ELECTION ON PETITION — BALLOT FORM — VOTE REQUIRED.) The ballots used for submitting the question of subdistricting legislative districts in all cases wherein an election is required shall be substantially the following form:

If there shall be more than one petition for subdistricting of the same legislative district, each different description of the subdistrict shall be placed upon such ballot and the ballot shall be marked "VOTE FOR ONE ONLY".

If one of the subdistricting descriptions as presented on the ballot shall receive a majority of the legal votes cast at such election, the secretary of state shall issue a proclamation stating such legislative district to be subdistricted pursuant to such description. Thereafter, senators or representatives shall reside in and be eleted from such subdistricts as set forth in the approved petition for subdistricting.

Congressman Link addressed the Assembly.

Congressman Link: "Mr. Speaker,

"I think this is indicative of the close association that develops after many years of working together in a body such as this. Mr. Majority Floor Leader, Minority Floor Leader, Bryce and Buckshot, your assistants, Rep. Strinden and Rep. Weber, I know the tremendous job that you are playing in conducting the affairs of this body. Perhaps one of the greater rewards of going away from home at any time is the opportunity to come back, and truly perhaps one of the most welcome reminders of this body is that beautiful board of red and green lights. How we miss it!

"I think it would be most fitting on this day that we recall again those who are departed, and we are at this time saddened by the death of a former member of this body and one who started in the Legislature here, the former Representative and then Senator, Senator Lowe who has departed, and I share with you in remembering former Representative Lowe, a very good and conscientious member of the State Legislature.

"You know, after twenty-four years and being in the majority only once in this body, I thought there ought to be another way to become a member of the majority party. Since that was accomplished, there are constant reminders the Republicans are very much in evidence. On the floor where my office is located in the Longworth Building, there are only two Congressional offices in this corridor — the one that belongs to me, and the other that belongs to freshman Congressman Bill Archer, Republican from Texas. Then around the next corridor, there are no Congressional offices, but on the doors of three of these offices are signs that read like this, 'Republican Policy Committee,' 'House Republican Conference', and 'Republican Research Committee.'

"Whenever one mentions that he is from North Dakota, the people in the East and South constantly remind us of the fact we are supposed to have inclement weather. I must say that not only the weather we are experiencing now surpasses anything we have had in Washington up to this time, but the warmth and cheeriness in this chamber surpasses any we have had up to this time. Not the least in these chambers — as in the past sessions — you have continued the tradition of the flowers at the Stations of the Roses in the Assembly, and they truly brighten up your Assembly. To those Representatives for remembering our fair members, congratulations.

"While you might expect me to discuss legislation, bills before Congress, major issues of concern to all of us, I have chosen a slightly different topic, but one not foreign to those of you in this Legislative Assembly. I have chosen this topic deliberately because I hope I will indicate to you before I get through, it is in my opinion one of the most important concerns that legislative bodies should have at every level, and I think in the great debate before those bodies, it perhaps receives the least attention. So perhaps of greater difference than any climatic weather conditions, the thing that impresses me most is the difference of the climate in the national House of Representatives. Even though this did not come to pass until January 22, when the 92nd Congress convened.

"As most of you know, my former exposure to the Legislative process was obtained in the North Dakota House of Representatives, beginning in 1947. I can clearly recall the method of oral roll call, where the Chief Clerk of the House read off in rapid succession the 113 names which was the membership of our House at that time. However, that was the last session of oral roll call in the North Dakota House. Depending on the speed of the clerk, the call of the roll would take from five to ten minutes. For more than twenty years now, we have utilized the electric roll call and tabulating system.

"To be sure, I knew the National Congress had not yet recognized the need for conserving countless hours of time and still proceeded to call the roll of its members, which in the House totals 435, by voice. This takes almost thirty minutes. The very first call was for attendance of the new Congress, and I felt no impatience, for after all, a new group of Congressmen were again convening — some new, most former, but all, I am sure, with a new resolve to tackle once again the problems unfinished from the 91st Congress and the new ones of the 92nd. And, after all, wasn't it important to know that they were all present? However, attempts to get on with adoption of rules ran into controversy necessitating two quorum calls and a roll call. All together, four full oral calls in succession were taken. The afternoon was gone, and little had been accomplished, but to determine the new Congress was in session.

"Certainly, it was pleasant to visit with the many fine men and women and learn to find one's way around. So time did not lag, but the slowness of this method in contrast to our own State Legislature had by that time made its full impact on me.

"In response to inquiry of a former member, I was told the matter of electronic roll call was under consideration. Research by a member of my staff discloses that while no immediate steps are before Congress, we do have a letter indicating the system is being considered. So more than twenty years after our State Legislature with 113 members, now 98, has used the electric roll call system, the National Congress with 435 House members is considering it.

"What would you think if the chairmen of the standing committees of our State Legislature were chosen solely on the basis of seniority?

"What would you think if the chairman and ranking minority member of each committee were ex officio members of each subcommittee with a right to vote thereon? While we have few subcommittees at the State Legislature, I doubt this practice would be acceptable. We grant the majority and minority leaders full committee participation on all committees but deny them the right of vote in the committee.

"Sub-committees are an important legislative process at the national level. For instance, the committee on Agriculture of which I am a member has ten sub-committees.

"What would you say if proxy voting were permitted in committee at the State Legislature? Very recently in Congress, it was possible for the chairman or another committee member to carry the proxies of a number of absent members who had not heard the testimony and vote them, thus determining the final decision of a committee, contrary to the decision of the majority present.

"While proxy voting continues to be used, it is now required that the member who plans to be absent at a vote sign a statement, showing in whose favor the proxy is given, the bill or resolution it is to be used on and how he intends to vote.

"What would you think if after the Education Committee or the Social Welfare Committee or any other standing committee of our State Legislature after having completed hearings and made its recommendation on a bill could not report the bill out for action by the House until an all-powerful Rules Committee said it could be reported out? Now there are some logical reasons for the orderly processing of legislation, and within limits can be justified.

"To minimize undue delay, this session of Congress attempted to adopt the 21-day rule and for a time it seemed we may succeed. It would have given the Speaker, after 21 days, authority to call a bill out of committee if he felt it should be reported. We succeeded in a majority caucus, and were defeated by the entire House.

"Last Wednesday the District of Columbia Committee, upon which I will serve, held its organizational meeting. Following a concerted effort by former members who saw the need for reform of the rules of the D. C. Committee, we were successful in providing categorical designation of four sub-committees, such as Health and Safety, Education, etc. The Chairman will now be required to refer bills to their

proper committee. Heretofore, he had his sub-committees numbered 1, 2, 3, 4 and directed bills at will to committees of his choice. This former method could deny members who had interest and expertise in special areas from considering bills related to their chosen field. And this is the committee that governs our nation's capital city — a city with a population greater than the State of North Dakota — 880,000.

"Lest you think I am going to spend all my time and energy opposing the 'establishment', let me say I have given considerable forethought to discussing these issues with the citizens of North Dakota. My decision to do so is based on several reasons.

"First, with State Legislative experience, I believe the deficiencies at the Congressional level are more apparent to me than if I had not had such experience, and therefore I have a responsibility to point them out.

"Second, it is a human and somewhat natural tendency to give in, or as some have said, 'If you want to get along, better learn to go along.'

"Ladies and gentlemen, if the Congress of the United States goes along without meaningful, responsive reform and continues to lag in assuming its rightful, responsible place in our government, there won't be anything to go along with.

"We will have lost the race which is ever increasing in speed and intensity, a race of coming to grips with the problems before the problems grip the nation with a paralysis from which we cannot recover.

"So, I have decided to speak out, and while you as individuals may feel unable to assist in this effort, only an informed and concerned citizenry can at times bring about difficult and important change.

"No power is stronger in the political arena than the power of public opinion.

"The astute politician unknowingly will find himself in the position of an ancient chieftain who said, 'I must follow my people, for, after all, am I not their leader?'

"Abraham Lincoln said, 'Public opinion is everything. With it, nothing can fail. Without it, nothing can succeed.'

"The message I want to leave with you this afternoon is threefold. First, though we can take a degree of pride and satisfaction in the knowledge that our North Dakota Legislature ranks 22nd among all states in the nation, we cannot rest on our laurels. Where would you be today with the volume of bills again before you if no electric roll call were used and few, if any, of the other numerous reforms of procedure had not been adopted? Continue your Legislative procedure and arrangements.

"Second, each of us has a responsibility to expect our National Congress to take the necessary steps to improve and reform its methods of procedure in keeping with the needs of our times. Members of the Congress should assume responsibility for necessary reform. They alone can make the changes and should make their positions known on this vital issue.

"Third, the most important legislation cannot become law without the necessary orderly procedure to transform an idea into a working reality. Whether on the state or national level, this premise holds true.

"Best wishes for a successful session, and come visit us in Washington when you can."

property because of legislative or judicial action, the county auditor of the county in which the property is located shall forthwith certify to the tax commissioner the amount of real estate taxes or personal property taxes that was levied on all such property by each taxing district in the year 1968 and in any other year thereafter that the tax commissioner may request. The tax commissioner, in determining the amount to be certified to the state treasurer for payment to the county pursuant to this section, shall adjust the amounts of taxes certified by the county auditor as levied on real property and on personal property in 1968 and in any other year as may be necessary by adding to or subtracting from each such amount the taxes on the reclassified property so that the distribution by the state to the county will be determined as though such property had been taxed in 1968 and all later years in the classification into which it was reclassified.

Congressman Andrews addressed the Assembly.

Congressman Andrews: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House:

"It is a privilege to be here. Coming down the aisle with Hank Weber and Art Bunker, I thought maybe we were making up the North Dakota beef trust. It is good protection when you are coming to a chamber.

"Really, I am proud to be here because members of the Legislature have a unique rapport one with the other. I am also proud because so many faces are the faces I have come to know through my travels around North Dakota. Some of you actually got me started in politics. I can remember Brynhild Haugland's encouragement when I

needed a lot of encouragement, and no one can give you better advice — she is really the dean of your House. You notice how she always sits close to the rail, close to the people.

"North Dakota has several unique problems. In the begining we were worried about how to secure equity for our farmers. We are still facing the same problem. Here in the Legislature, you have another challenge because you have to understand the people. Not too long ago I was privileged to serve as a mission for the State Department to Southeast Asia, and I saw a unique example of how our commercial competition in that area understands the people. In New Zealand, in one of the largest meat packing firms in the world, they process 12,000 sheep and 1,500 a day. Here, over spotless stainless steel, runs corned beef, which is deliberately packed in tins bearing old paper labels, on which is a picture of a red spotted cow and a couple of white sheep, and carries the word 'Bullamacow', and in this way they are catering to what the people understand, what they need and what they want.

"Actually our state has a big challenge in understanding our problems, because North Dakota is unique. Not too long ago I was the commencement speaker at the Wahpeton State School of Science with some 800 students. Fifty years before there were 40 graduates, an increase of twenty-fold. All of our institutions have had the same rapid growth, but today we have fewer people in North Dakota.

"Our commercial and industrial property in North Dakota accounts for only 11% of our assessed valuation. The average for the nation is 25% — and is 38% of assessed valuation in the State of New York. When you buy a combine from Illinois, you are contributing to the education of Illinois children. When you buy a car from Michigan, you are contributing to the education of Michigan children. Sixty-three percent of our assessed valuation comes from agricultural land. You can see the problems we face in this.

"The entire principal of representative government is the concept of those privileged to serve as representatives . . . as you do here in the legislature . . . having the deep understanding of the people who honored you by sending you here.

"Along this line, I was interested to see a headline in this morning's paper: "Guy Charges Andrews Misunderstanding Him." You know, he's right.

"Since what I had to say Monday night dealt with North Dakota and its future, perhaps it's important here to review the whole matter.

"I was talking about revenue sharing with an effort factor and how important it is to North Dakota's future. I also stressed how we're in a neck-and-neck battle to have it enacted in Congress. Revenue sharing's chief rival — federal take-over of state and local welfare payments — has a 50-50 chance of replacing it.

"I said Monday it was unfortunate that the Governor — who says he supports revenue sharing — also supports the proposal advanced as its chief substitute.

"Agile though he may be, you can't ride two horses at once, particularly when they're as mismatched a pair as this.

"The evolution of revenue sharing has been a long process. It has been talked about much during the last decade and I have personally introduced revenue sharing bills in the last three Congresses.

"As with any new concept, those who disagree begin to promote their own approach. The opposition comes from those who do not feel local city, county and state government can be responsible or reliable.

"Two or three years ago, most of the opposition began promoting federal payment of state and local welfare as the substitute to keep control of the money and programs in Washington.

"Mistrust of local government is bad enough, but also it would mean less than half the dollars North Dakota can expect under revenue sharing.

"As this approach began to gain support, imagine my surprise when I saw Governor Guy's statement.

"Shortly thereafter I pointed out in a newsletter that the Governor's position wasn't supported by the people of North Dakota.

"I got an answer from Walt Christensen, one of the Governor's chief apologists, stating that this proposal was really Governor Rockefeller's . . . and Bill Guy was wholeheartedly in support of it.

"I know why Governor Rockefeller likes the idea of federal government taking over welfare payments. New York . . . along with California and Massachusetts would get over 50% of the total funds under such an arrangement. Under the plan, North Dakota's share would be \$9 million . . \$11 million less than under revenue sharing and this would perpetuate our economic disadvantage.

"Bill Guy may say I don't understand his thinking.

"I don't.

"I do understand revenue sharing and what the effects of his action can be on our chances for enacting this vital legislation.

"This is what concerns me because it concerns the future of North Dakota.

"Maybe I have spoken too plainly here today. I think we in North Dakota can disagree without being disagreeable, and the place to talk about issues, facts and figures is where we are together, whether Democrats or Republican. We are all for building a better North Dakota, and we must keep some of the money from slipping away from us and get an even break for North Dakota.

"The problems you face here, and I face and other farmers face trying to pay their real estate taxes on the farm and support our schools, etc., are going to grow worse rather than become resolved. This is why the time has come for us to do some straight thinking and plain talking about where we are going.

"I realize you are putting in long days and longer weeks, trying to find a way to build a stronger North Dakota, and I salute you for the job you are doing.

"Thank you very much."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. DECLARATION OF POLICY.) The business or activity of constructing water wells is declared to be an industry affecting the public welfare, health, and safety of all the people of North Dakota and requires the exercise of the sovereign powers of the state for a public purpose, and it hereby is declared necessary that a state board of water well contractors be established, which in the exercise of its powers shall be deemed to be an administrative agency within the purview of chapter 28-32.

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS.) As used in this Act, unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires:

- "Board" shall mean the North Dakota board of water well contractors.
- 2. "Water well contractor" shall mean any person who is certified to conduct the business of well drilling under the provisions of this Act.
- 3. "Drilling" shall mean making any opening in the earth's surface by drilling, boring, or otherwise, and shall include inserting any object into any part of the earth's surface for the purpose of obtaining an underground water supply except drainage titles or similar devices designed primarily to improve land by removing excess water.
- 4. "Constructing" a well includes boring, digging, drilling, or excavating and installing casings, well screens, and other appurtenances.
- 5. "Well" shall mean any artificial opening or artificially altered natural opening, however made, by which ground water is sought or through which ground water flows under natural pressure or is artificially withdrawn, provided that this definition shall not include a natural spring, stock ponds, or holes drilled for the purpose of exploration for production of oil, gas, gravel, or other minerals.

SECTION 3. STATE BOARD OF WATER WELL CONTRACTORS — MEMBERS' APPOINTMENT — QUALIFICATION.) The state board of water well contractors shall consist of the state engineer and the state health officer, or their duly authorized designees, and two water well contractors appointed by the governor from a list of five names submitted by the North Dakota well drillers association, and one member appointed at large by the governor.

SECTION 4. APPOINTIVE MEMBERS TO QUALIFY — TERMS OF OFFICE — FILLING VACANCY.) Each appointive member to the board shall qualify by taking the oath of office required of civil officers and shall hold office for a term of four years or until a successor is appointed and qualified, except that the initial appointments shall be for terms of two and four years, respectively, and shall expire on June thirtieth of the respective years. A vacancy on the board shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner as was the member whose office is vacant.

SECTION 5. OFFICERS — OFFICE.) The members of the board shall meet annually on the second Monday in July at a time and place designated by the president, except that the first meeting shall be

held in the office of the state engineer at ten o'clock a.m., to select from their number a president, vice president, and a secretary-treasurer. The secretary-treasurer need not be a member of the board. Additional board meetings may be provided for in the bylaws or rules and regulations adopted by the board.

SECTION 6. SECRETARY - TREASURER BOND.) Promptly upon assuming the office, the secretary-treasurer shall furnish a bond satisfactory to the board for the faithful performance and discharge of his duties, as civil officers generally are bonded, in such amount as may be prescribed by the board, the premium therefor to be paid from board funds.

SECTION 7. COMPENSATION AND REIMBURSEMENT OF EXPENSES.) Each appointive member of the board shall receive fifteen dollars per day for the actual services rendered, and in addition thereto, each member shall receive the necessary and actual expenses incurred by him in the discharge of his duties. The mileage and travel expenses allowed shall not exceed the amount provided for in section 54-06-09.

SECTION 8. OFFICE, ADMINISTRATIVE, AND TECHNICAL PERSONNEL — COMPENSATION.) The board may employ such office, administrative, and technical personnel as it deems necessary and shall fix their compensation and prescribe their duties. It may retain legal counsel and incur such other expenses as and when deemed necessary to carry out the provisions of this Act.

SECTION 9. DEPOSIT OF FEES — USE AND APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS.) All fees received by the treasurer under this Act shall be deposited to the credit of the board in the Bank of North Dakota and disbursed only on order of the president and secretary-treasurer. Funds collected for certifying and inspections may be expended in such manner as the board deems necessary to best carry out the provisions of this Act. All funds accruing to the credit of the state board of water well contractors are hereby permanently appropriated to the board for the purpose of this Act.

SECTION 10. POWERS AND DUTIES OF BOARD.) The board shall have the power and it shall be its duty:

- 1. To effectively administer and carry out the provisions of this Act.
- 2. To adopt bylaws, rules, and regulations for the conduct of the business affairs of the board and administration of its functions.

SECTION 11. CERTIFICATE REQUIRED.) After the first day of January 1972 no person, partnership, firm, or corporation shall engage in the business of water well contracting unless certified to do so by the board of water well contractors.

SECTION 12. EXAMINATION — WHEN HELD — NOTICE.) The board shall hold meetings at such times and such places as it shall designate for the purpose of administering an examination to those persons desiring to become certified as water well contractors. The board shall give no less than ten days' written notice to each applicant of the time and place of such examination.

SECTION 13. CERTIFICATE — HOW OBTAINED — FEE — BOND.) Any person desiring to take the examination to become a certified water well contractor shall make application to the board and pay to the board treasurer a nonrefundable examination fee in the amount of ten dollars. If upon examination the applicant is found to be qualified as a water well contractor, the board shall issue to him a certificate upon the applicant's executing and filing with the board a bond as required in this Act. Such certificate shall not be transferable.

SECTION 14. BOND REQUIRED.) Before receiving a certificate as a water well contractor, a qualified applicant shall execute and

deposit with the board a surety bond in the amount of one thousand dollars conditioned for the faithful performance of all water well contracts undertaken by him and the strict compliance with the provisions of this Act.

SECTION 15. CERTIFICATION OF PERSONS ENGAGED IN CONTRACTING AT EFFECTIVE DATE OF ACT.) Upon application and sworn affidavit and the payment of a registration fee in the amount of twenty dollars, the board shall issue a certificate, without an examination, to any person who has been engaged in the business of a water well contractor as an occupation for at least one year prior to the effective date of this Act.

SECTION 16. DISPLAY OF CERTIFICATION.) The board shall furnish each certified contractor a decal for each drill rig the contractor owns or leases. Such decal shall be displayed in a conspicuous place on the drill rig.

SECTION 17. RENEWAL OF CERTIFICATE.) A certificate issued under the provisions of this Act shall be valid for one year and shall expire on the thirty-first day of December in the year it was issued. The certificate may be renewed by the board upon application accompanied by a fee in the amount of twenty dollars and the furnishing of a bond as provided in section 14 of this Act.

SECTION 18. FIRM ENGAGED IN WATER WELL WORK TO EMPLOY CERTIFIED WATER WELL CONTRACTOR — EXCEPTION.) No person, partnership, association, or corporation shall engage in the business of constructing a water well in this state unless at all times a certified water well contractor, who is responsible for the proper construction or alteration thereof, is in charge; provided, however, that nothing in this Act shall be construed so as to prohibit any person from constructing any water well on his own premises for his own use.

SECTION 19. STANDARDS FOR WELL DRILLING — RE-PORTS REQUIRED.) All construction of water wells shall comply with the rules and regulations promulgated by the state health department. Each water well contractor shall furnish to the board on forms provided by the board within thirty days after the completion of each well, such information as the health department shall require, including a log of formations penetrated, well depth, and casing size and weight. A copy of each report shall also be furnished to the customer. All information submitted shall remain the property of the board.

SECTION 20. REVOCATION OR SUSPENSION OF CERTIFICATE — GROUNDS FOR — HOW REINSTATED.) The board may suspend or revoke any certificate issued under the provisions of this Act if the holder is found guilty by the board of any violation of the rules and regulations established and promulgated by the health department after a hearing duly held substantially in conformance with the provisions of chapter 28-32. Six months after any certificate has been revoked, an application may be made for another certificate in the same manner as a new certificate is obtained.

SECTION 21. CERTIFICATION TO NONRESIDENTS — RECIPROCITY.) To the extent that other states which provide for the certification of water well contractors provide for similar action, the state board of water well contractors may grant certification to water well contractors certified by other states, upon payment by the applicant of the required fee and the furnishing of a bond as provided by section 14 of this Act, after being furnished with proof that the qualifications of the applicant are equal to the qualifications of holders of such certificates in this state.

SECTION 22. CONTRACTING FOR WELL CONSTRUCTION WITHOUT CERTIFICATION — PENALTY.) Any person contracting for water well drilling without being certified in accordance with the provisions of this Act or otherwise willfully violating the

provisions thereof shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment."

SPEAKER'S ANNOUNCEMENT CONCERNING RULING ON HOUSE BILL No. 1299

House Bill No. 1299 was before the House for action on February 15th and received a vote of 52-41-5 and was declared lost. The chair ruled the bill required a two-thirds vote to carry due to two sections contained therein that had been voted on by the people.

Discussion on the Chair's ruling developed and the question was submitted to the Attorney General's office for an opinion.

Yesterday the opinion was received. The opinion is that —

- 1. House Bill No. 1299 passed with a majority vote except for that portion of the bill which amended section 6-09-12 and that portion of the bill which would have repealed chapter 13-03.
- 2. It is the Attorney General's opinion that the failure of the portion which amended section 6-09-12 is not of any particular importance to the bill.
- 3. It is the Attorney General's opinion that the failure of the portion which would have repealed chapter 13-03 may cause some confusion as to the exact state of the law relating to small loans (assuming House Bill No. 1299 passes and becomes law) but that this is not of major consequence and could be reconciled without too much difficulty.
- 4. The Attorney General's opinion is based on the view that a bill which has many parts, some of which require a twothirds vote, passes on a majority vote unless the parts which fail are so integral to the bill that the bill is almost meaningless without them.

Therefore, the chair is changing its former ruling and in accordance with the Attorney General's opinion is now ruling that House Bill No. 1299 passed by a vote of 52 ayes, 41 nays, 5 absent or not voting except for that portion of the bill which amended section 6-09-12 and that portion of the bill which repealed chapter 13-03. The emergency clause failed.

Rep. Rundle moved that the House over-rule the decision of the Speaker concerning House Bill No. 1299, which motion was then withdrawn.

Rep. Rundle moved that the House reconsider the action by which House Bill No. 1299 was lost, which motion was ruled out of order.

Rep. Raymond: "Mr. Speaker: I rise on a point of personal privilege. This was my bill. I felt it was a very necessary bill. I do go along with the action of the Appropriations Committee. I rise go along with the action of the Appropriations Committee. I rise on a point of personal privilege to point out to you that you keep in mind what is happening at our institutions of higher education in the next two years. The whole impact of growth has a different pattern and is a different picture than when we were in school. Now there are more graduate students and more married students on our campuses. This is a matter of requiring a different type of housing, and this is where these institutions are hurt. By 1980, the University of North Dakota will have 10,728 students, the State University will have 9,310, the School of Science 4,364 (our fastest growing institution): Dickinson will have 1.706. growing institution); Dickinson will have 1,706.

"I would like to tell you that of these numbers of students, in Grand Forks 3,390 do not live in Grand Forks or their homes are not in Grand Forks, and they have to live off-campus; in Fargo, 2291 students are forced to find rooms off-campus. In Wahpeton there are 876, and in Dickinson 411. I cannot speak for the town of Fargo, nor the town of Wahpeton, nor the town of Dickinson, but I do know what the conditions are in Grand Forks. I happen to live in that area. I own my own home, and at the beginning of school each fall, married students and single students and faculty are beating the streets looking for housing. When faculty members leave on a sabbatical or to study elsewhere, they do not give up their housing units, but sub-lease them. Housing is a critical factor in these towns.

"I appreciate the need for money, but I ask you to remember these things two years from now."

On page 1, line 1, delete everything after the words "A BILL" and insert in lieu thereof the following: "for an Act to provide a method for determining the assessed valuation of agricultural land for tax purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. ASSESSMENT OF AGRICULTURAL LAND.) In determining the true and full value in money of agricultural lands, the value of all land, both tilled and untilled, which has been used primarily for agricultural purposes for at least five successive years immediately preceding the tax year for which an assessment is to be made shall be based upon a consideration of the following factors: The capacity of the land to produce agricultural products as hereinafter defined; soil, terrain, and topographical conditions of the property; the present market value of such property as agricultural land; and the character of the area or place in which such property is located, and such other agricultural factors as may from time to time become applicable.

The capacity of land in agricultural use to produce agricultural products shall be based on average yields under natural conditions, in the case of land producing crops or plants, and on the average "acres per animal unit", in the case of grazing land. This average shall affect each operating unit and shall be based on the ten-year period immediately preceding the tax year in issue. In determining such capacity to produce, the assessor, the county director of tax equalization, or the county board of equalization shall take into consideration yields or carrying capacity, as determined by the soil conservation service, the agricultural stabilization and conservation service, the extension service, federal land bank, and private lend-

ing agencies dealing with land production capacities.

Any land or improvements to land within an operating unit which is not used incident to an agricultural pursuit shall be separately listed and assessed, and the income therefrom shall not be used in

determining the values for the purposes of this Act.'

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. MATCHING FUNDS TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS.) The director of the department of accounts and purchases shall transfer quarterly to the credit of the teachers' fund for retirement an amount of money equal to the sum remitted to the state treasurer by the public school districts as required by section 15-39.1-09. Such transfers shall be made out of moneys appropriated by the legislative assembly therefor, as provided in this Act. In the event that the moneys appropriated for this Act should prove to be insufficient to make all payments, the payments made shall be prorated by the

director of the department of accounts and purchases on a fractional basis. Such prorated payments made pursuant to this section shall constitute payment in full.

SECTION 2. APPROPRIATION.) There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, a sum not to exceed \$2,400,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to the director of the department of accounts and purchases for the purpose of transferring funds in accordance with the provisions of this Act, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1971, and ending June 30, 1973.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.) Section 15-39.1-09 of the North Dakota Century Code, as contained in House Bill No. 1517, as approved by the forty-second legislative assembly, is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

15-39.1-09. MEMBERSHIP IN FUND AND ASSESSMENTS.) Every teacher shall be a member of the fund and shall be assessed upon his salary four percent per annum, which shall be deducted monthly and paid to the state treasurer by the disbursing official of the governmental body by which the teacher is employed. Every governmental body employing a teacher shall pay to the state treasurer a sum equal to (((four))) **two** percent per annum of the salary of each teacher employed by it, but not to exceed a matching payment in excess of five hundred dollars annually. All such sums shall be paid quarterly to the state treasurer who shall set the same aside in the teachers' fund for retirement."

In line 1 of page 1, delete everything after the words "A BILL" and insert in lieu thereof the following: "for an Act to create a new system of retirement benefits for teachers, providing for assessments, and creating Chapter 15-39.1 of the North Dakota Century Code; and repealing Chapter 15-39 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to teachers' insurance and retirement fund.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1.) Chapter 15-39.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby created and enacted to read as follows:

15-39.1-01. TEACHERS FUND FOR RETIREMENT CREATED.) There is hereby created the teachers fund for retirement, which, upon the effective date of this act shall consist of the following:

1. All monies contained in the teachers insurance and retirement

fund accumulated pursuant to Chapter 15-39 of the North Dakota Century Code; and

2. All monies thereafter received by the state treasurer under the provisions of this chapter.

15-39.1-02. PRIOR FUND TERMINATED.) The teachers insurance and retirement fund shall, on the effective date of this act, cease to exist and the board administering said fund shall no longer function. All obligations of the teachers insurance and retirement fund shall be assumed by the newly-created fund.

15-39.1-03. RIGHTS UNDER PRIOR ACT PRESERVED.) No person shall be caused to be deprived of rights vested under the chapter superceded hereby. Any such person may elect to claim his retirement benefits according to the provisions of the retirement program for teachers in effect prior to the effective date of this Act.

15-39.1-04. DEFINITIONS.) For purposes of this chapter, unless the contest or subject matter otherwise requires:

- 1. "Teacher" shall include:
 - a. All persons employed in teaching in any state institution or by any school board or other governing body of any school district of this state, including superintendents, assistant superintendents, business managers, principals, assistant principals and special teachers employed in any state institution or in the school system of any school district in this state, except that the superintendent and assistant superintendent of the Grafton state school may be brought within this definition at their option.
 - b. The superintendent of public instruction, assistant superintendents of public instruction, county superintendents, assistant superintendents, supervisors of instruction, state school supervisors and inspectors, every person engaged as president, dean, school librarian or registrar of any state institution, the secretary of the North Dakota Education Association, all assistant secretaries and professional staff of such association, and the commissioner of higher education.
 - c. Any person who serves in the capacity of substitute or parttime teacher and earns more than the maximum allowed by the Federal Social Security Act for the receipt of full social security benefits in any one school year.
- 2. "State institution" shall include all state colleges and universities, the school of forestry, the school of science, the school for the blind, the school for the deaf and dumb, the Grafton state school and the state training school.
- 3. "Fund" shall mean the teachers fund for retirement.
- 4. "Board" shall mean the board of trustees of the teachers fund for retirement.

The term "teacher" shall not include persons connected with any professional school or college of any state institution as lecturers who are engaged in the practice of their respective professions and with whom teaching is merely an avocation.

15-39.1-05. MANAGEMENT OF FUND.) The fund shall be managed by a board of trustees, which shall consist of the state treasurer, the superintendent of public instruction and three persons to be appointed by the governor. One of the appointees shall be a woman and a majority of the board shall at all times consist of persons who are members of the fund. The term of the office of the appointees shall be three years with said terms fixed to terminate on June 30th of alternate years. The term of each appointee shall commence on July 1st next succeeding his appointment.

July 1st next succeeding his appointment.
15-39.1-06. ORGANIZATION OF BOARD.) The board may hold meetings as may be necessary for the transaction of business and a meeting may be called by the president or any two members of the

board upon reasonable notice to the other members of the board. The president for the ensuing year shall be elected at the first meeting following July 1st of each year. The state treasurer shall act ex officio as treasurer and the board shall be empowered to employ a secretary, who need not be a member of the board and who shall perform such duties as the board may prescribe.

15-39.1-07. VACANCIES — RULE MAKING POWER.) Vacancies which may occur among the appointed members of the board shall be filled by the governor and the appointee shall complete the term for which the original member was selected. The board may adopt such rules as may be necessary to fulfill the responsibilities of the board.

15-39.1-08. COMPENSATION OF MEMBERS.) Members of the board, excluding ex officio members, shall be compensated for attendance at meetings from the fund at the rate of fifty dollars per day, plus actual expenses of travel, food and lodging.

15-39.1-09. MEMBERSHIP IN FUND AND ASSESSMENTS.) Every teacher shall be a member of the fund and shall be assessed upon his salary four per cent per annum, which shall be deducted monthly and paid to the state treasurer by the disbursing official of the governmental body by which the teacher is employed. Every governmental body employing a teacher shall pay to the state treasurer a sum equal to four per cent per annum of the salary of each teacher employed by it, but not to exceed a matching payment in excess of five hundred dollars annually. All such sums shall be paid quarterly to the state treasurer who shall set the same aside in the teachers fund for retirement.

15-39.1-10. ELIGIBILITY TO BENEFITS.) Any teacher having ten yeras of teaching credit in the fund and who has attained the age of sixty-five years, or who attained the age of sixty-five years and completed his final year of teaching in 1971, shall be entitled to receive monthly benefits from the fund, until death, in an amount equal to the following:

- One per cent of the monthly salary of the teacher for the school year next preceding the effective date of this act for each year of service of said teacher prior to the effective date of the act; and
- 2. One and one-half per cent of the monthly salary of the teacher for each year subsequent to the effective date of the act.

Monthly salary within the meaning of this provision shall be deemed to be an amount equal to one-twelfth of the annual salary of the teacher. If for any reason the earnings of the teacher for the year next preceding the effective date of this act are shown to have been non-representative of his typical earnings, the board shall readjust the credit to be allowed for past years of service to the last year of typical earnings.

15-39.1-11. RIGHTS VESTED WHEN.) When any teacher has paid assessments for a period of ten years, he shall have a vested right to a retirement annuity but he shall receive no payments hereunder until he attains the age of sixty-five years unless he shall elect to claim an early retirement as hereinafter set forth.

15-39.1-12. EARLY RETIREMENT.) Any teacher who has acquired a vested right to a retirement annuity as set forth insection 11 of this act may retire at any time prior to the normal retirement age as set forth herein but the benefits to which he shall then be entitled shall be reduced to the actuarial equivalent of the benefit credits earned to the date of early retirement.

15-39.1-13. ANNUITIES EXEMPT FROM LEGAL PROCESS.) The annuities payable under the provisions of this chapter shall not be subject to attachment, garnishment, execution or other seizure or process, nor shall they be subject to sale, assignment, pledge, mortgage or other alienation.

15-39.1-14. RETIREMENT NOT MANDATORY — WHEN RETIREMENT OCCURS.) Nothing in this act shall be construed as requiring retirement at any specific age. If the teacher elects to teach beyond age sixty-five and is permitted to do so by the body for whom he works, he shall continue to earn credits at the same rate as prior to the age of sixty-five. Retirement shall be deemed to have occurred and benefits shall be payable from the date of last teaching prior to the filing of a written application for retirement benefits, except in the case of a teacher whose rights in the fund have become vested but who chooses not to retire prior to age 65, in which case the benefits shall be paid from the date such teacher attains the age of sixty-five.

15-39.1-15. WITHDRAWAL FROM FUND — RETURN TO TEACHING.) Any teacher who has withdrawn from the fund as set forth in this chapter may, upon returning to teaching in this state, regain credit for prior teaching by repaying to the fund, with interest, at a rate to be set by the board, the amount which was returned to him on withdrawal.

15-39.1-16. OPTION OF TEACHERS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE ANNUITIES.) At any time after his retirement under the circumstances provided in this chapter and before the first annuity payment shall become due, a teacher may elect to receive the actuarial equivalent, at that time, of the regular retirement allowance for life, in the form of a reduced retirement allowance payable throughout his life with either, but not both of the following additional provisions;

Option one. Upon the death of the teacher, the reduced retirement allowance shall be continued throughout the life of, and paid to, such person as the teacher shall have nominated by written designation filed with the board at the time of retirement; or

Option two. Upon the death of the teacher, one-half of the reduced retirement allowance shall be continued throughout the life of, and paid to, such person as the teacher shall have nominated by written designation filed with the board at the time of retirement.

The amount of the reduced retirement allowance payable upon the exercise of either of such options shall be computed upon an actuarial basis through the use of standard actuarial tables and based upon the ages of the teacher and his designated beneficiary.

15-39.1-17. DEATH OF MEMBER.) If the death of a member who has not acquired a vested interest should occur prior to retirement, a refund of his assessments accumulated with interest shall be made to such beneficiary as he may designate, or, if no beneficiary is designated, the same shall be paid to his estate. His assessments shall earn interest from the July 1 following the date the assessment is made with the interest credit each year determined at the current rate for one-year certificates then being paid by the Bank of North Dakota.

If the death of a member who has acquired a vested interest should occur prior to retirement, then his beneficiary may apply for a refund of his assessments accumulated with interest as described in the above paragraph. In lieu of such refund, the beneficiary may elect to receive a monthly annuity in accordance with option one as set forth in section 16 of this act, with the amount of such annuity being determined as though the deceased member had retired under the option on the first day of the month in which his death occurred. If any applicant for an annuity under this section has not paid into the fund assessments equal to the amounts required to be paid under section 15-39.1-09, he shall pay any deficiency into the fund before receiving the annuity.

15-39.1-18. DISABILITY RETIREMENTS.) Any teacher as defined in this chapter may also retire and receive a disability annuity

if after a period aggregating fifteen years of service as a teacher in this state, such teacher suffers from total disability. Such total disability to be determined by the board after an examination of such teacher has been made by two physicians appointed by the board. The fees of such physicians shall be paid by the applicant.

The amount of the disability annuity shall be equal to the retirement benefit credits which the member has earned to the date of disablement. The disability annuity shall continue until the death or prior recovery of the disabled annuitant. The board shall ascertain by examinations annually or as often as necessary to determine the continued disability status of a disabled annuitant.

If a disabled annuitant recovers and returns to active teaching, he shall retain the retirement benefit credits which he earned prior to the time of disablement and the credits which he earned after his return to active teaching shall be added to those earned prior to his disablement.

15-39.1-19. ANNUITIES DISCONTINUED ON RESUMPTION OF TEACHING.) Any person who has retired from teaching under the provisions of this chapter may become a teacher again in a public school or state institution and thereupon his annuity payments shall be discontinued during the time he continues to teach. Payment of the annuity shall be resumed upon his further retirement.

15-39.1-20. WITHDRAWAL FROM FUND.) When a member of the fund ceases to be eligible under the terms of this chapter to participate in the fund, he may withdraw from the fund and shall be then entitled to receive a refund of assessments accumulated with interest credited for each year as determined at the current rate for one-year certificates then being paid by the Bank of North Dakota. Such refund shall be in lieu of any other benefits to which the member may be entitled under the terms of this chapter.

15-39.1-21. EFFECT ON EXISTING OBLIGATIONS.) Nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect existing retirement benefits and all obligations of the teachers insurance and retirement fund existing on July 1, 1971, shall be assumed and paid from the teachers' fund for retirement. Amounts which persons retired on July 1, 1971, are receiving shall be frozen as of that date and shall not be deemed increased by this chapter.

15-39.1-22. ANNUAL REPORT OF BOARD.) On or before the first day of October of each year, the board shall report for the fiscal year ending the thirtieth day of June preceding. A copy of the report shall be submitted at the annual meeting of the members, which shall be at the time and place of the annual meeting of the North Dakota education association, and a copy of the report shall be included in the biennial report of the superintendent of public instruction to the governor.

15-39.1-23. FAILURE TO ACCOUNT AND REPORT DEPRIVES DISTRICT OF RIGHT TO PARTICIPATE IN STATE PAYMENTS.) No school district shall share in the apportionment of any money from the state for any year unless the school board, or an officer thereof, has made the reports required by the board as permitted by this chapter and has paid over for credit to the fund the amounts required to be paid by this chapter.

15-39.1-24. TEACHER ENTITLED TO ADDITIONAL CREDIT.) A teacher may receive additional credit for teaching toward retirement in the following instances and manner:

1. Any teacher who comes from a school or educational institution supported by public taxation out of North Dakota and who becomes a teacher within the meaning of this chapter may elect to have any or all years of out-of-state teaching credited hereunder, which credit may be claimed at any time prior to retirement and provided that interest shall be paid on all payments required under this subsection at a rate equal to

the rate being paid on one-year certificates by the Bank of North Dakota. Every such teacher shall be advised of the provisions of this section by the school board in writing at the time of employment, and a copy of such notice with written acknowledgement thereof, shall be filed with the board. Before receiving any retirement annuity, such teacher shall pay into the fund an amount equal to the amount of assessments for the number of years of out-of-state teaching that he elects based upon his first annual salary in North Dakota, which shall also be the basis of the retirement benefits to which he shall be entitled to receive. He shall also pay the full amount which the employing body would have had to pay as matching funds for the years to be credited.

- 2. Any teacher who, within twenty-four months of entering the military service of the United States of America, was engaged in the occupation of teaching in the State of North Dakota, and who received an honorable discharge from such service, shall be entitled to have the time of such service credited under the terms of this chapter upon his return to teaching and the payment of the assessments, including the matching funds of the employing body, based upon his first annual salary on return to teaching in the state. Any teacher who has made such back payments for military service may elect prior to retirement, to receive the return of such payments, with interest at the rate being paid by the Bank of North Dakota on one-year certificates of deposit, and reject the military service credit and the board shall forthwith refund said amounts. The teacher, at retirement, may again elect to claim the benefits of this section. The same rights shall be available to a teacher who has been engaged in teaching in North Dakota prior to such time but was attending an institution of higher learning for the purpose of improving himself in such profession within twenty-four months of the time of entry into the armed services. All payments required under this subsection shall be made with interest at the rate being paid on one-year certificates by the Bank of North Dakota.
- 3. A teacher who attends a college, university, or other recognized school during periods other than summer sessions, for the purpose of improving his qualifications in the teaching profession shall be entitled to have such periods while in attendance at such college, university, or school credited as teaching service under the provisions of this chapter upon the the payment of the assessments which would have been collected from him if he had continued as a teacher during the time of such college, university, or school attendance, plus the payment by him of the amount that would have been paid to the fund in his behalf from the school district or state institution where he was employed. Such back assessments must be paid prior to or at the time of retirement under this chapter, provided that:
 - a. The teacher must have taught at least one full school year in North Dakota immediately preceding his entrance into the college, university, or school and that immediately following such training he shall have taught not less than one full school year in a public school or state institution of this state; and
 - The period of college, university, or school attendance that may be credited as teaching service shall not exceed three full academic years, exclusive of summer schools; and
 - c. Payments on back assessments shall be based on the salary received by the teacher during the first year of teaching following the college, university, or school attendance, together with simple interest at a rate equal to the rate being

paid on one-year certificates of deposit by the Bank of North Dakota, except that no interest shall be charged on assessments for the period while actually in attendance at the college, university, or school.

CERTAIN RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS FIXED.) Notwithstanding any other provisions of law, the laws pertaining to the teachers' fund for retirement, as contained in chapter 15-39.1, shall apply to teachers, superintendents, assistant superintendents, principals, assistant principals, special teachers, supervisors of instruction and other supervisors, presidents, deans, school librarians, and registrars employed by any state institution under the supervision and control of the board of higher education and the commissioner of higher education, only in the form and substance as chapter 15-39 existed as of July 1, 1967, and all such persons shall have only such rights, benefits, and privileges as provided in chapter 15-39 as it existed on July 1, 1967. Such persons shall be responsible or liable for only those costs or assessments provided for in chapter 15-39 as such laws and chapter existed on July 1, 1967. The board of higher education or any institution under the supervision or control of the board of higher education shall not be liable for any costs, assessments, or payments under the provisions of chapter 15-39 in excess of that provided or required under the provisions of chapter 15-39 as such laws and chapter existed on July 1, 1967. It is hereby declared to be the intent of the legislative assembly to freeze the rights, benefits, privileges, assessments, payments, and obligations of the persons, offices, and institutions specified in this section to those rights, benefits, privileges, assessments, payments, and obliga-tions as they existed under the provisions of chapter 15-39 as such laws and chapter existed in form and substance as of July 1, 1967, and that all legislative enactments subsequent to such date shall not affect or apply to those persons, offices, and institutions specified in this section or their rights, benefits, privileges, assessments, payments, and obligations as fixed by this section.

15-39.1-26. INVESTMENT OF MONEYS IN FUND.) Investment of the fund shall be under the supervision of the state investment board in accordance with chapter 21-10, except that the state investment board shall have the authority to contract with insurance companies, trust banks, or other financial institutions to hold and invest fund moneys, provided that the total amount of all moneys so placed shall not exceed an amount equal to twenty percent of the total moneys of the fund. Such moneys shall be placed for investment only with a firm or firms whose primary endeavor is money management, and only after a trust agreement or contract has been executed. Such moneys may be expended by the state investment board by the preparation of an appropriate voucher and submitting such voucher to the department of accounts and purchases.

15-39.1-27. "YEAR" DEFINED — COMPUTING FOR PART-TIME TEACHERS.) In computing the terms of service of a teacher under the provisions of this chapter, a year shall be a legal school year at the time and place where such service was rendered. Where the service was rendered in schools not included within the provisions of this chapter, a time less than a legal school year in this state shall not be included as a full year but only as such proportion of a year as the number of teaching weeks in each year taught in such excluded school bears to the number of weeks required at such time to constitute a legal year in this state.

At least four hours per day for twenty days per month shall constitute a month's teaching credit toward a retirement annuity for part-time teachers.

SECTION 2. REPEAL.) Chapter 15-39 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby repealed, provided that reference thereto may be made to fix rights of persons arising prior to the enactment of this act.

REP. DICK, Chairman

Rep. Weber moved that the report be adopted, which motion prevailed and the report was adopted.

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Finance and Taxation to whom was referred House Bill No. 1536 has had the same under consideration and recommends that the same be indefinitely postponed.

REP. DORNACKER, Chairman

Rep. Boyum moved that the report be adopted.

Rep. Dornacker requested his remarks in regard to House Bill No. 1536 be printed in the Journal.

Rep. Dornacker: "Mr. Speaker: As a legislator we have an obligation to seek solutions. The 21 mill levy has been a problem. Many of us here and at home have told us to try to eliminate the 21 mill levy so the State would fund all of the Foundation program.

"This now falls on real property, the other two choices are Sales or Income Tax.

"House Bill No. 1536 was introduced to take a look at using the income method. I had the bill drafted on the principle of the Social Security tax method.

"The bill placed a tax on the employee of one percent of the first \$3,000; two percent from \$3,000 to \$5,000; the maximum tax would be \$35.00. The employer would match the employee's tax. The bill in the amendment excluded the first \$1,200.00 on people over 65. It also excluded the first \$600.00 on those under 21. Both the employer and employee would pay the tax on April 15th, when other income tax was due.

"To the self-employed we place a different rate, as does Social Security. This was one percent up to \$5,000.00, with a maximum of \$50.00.

"The 21 mill levy produces 15 million on state property; personal property pay back is three million. Thus real property produces 12 million.

"The bill said the educational tax was to go to a dedicated fund and upon July 1 the State Board of Equalization would reduce the 21 mill levy by the amount in the fund.

"The bill excluded the employer:

- (1) In case of state or political subdivisions.
- (2) Federal Government.
- (3) Churches or nonprofit religious organizations.

We did this because these employers paid nothing to the 21 mill levy fund.

"We did not exclude the employees of these agencies.

"The bill would have taken in eight million, and thus the 21 mill levy would be reduced from 21 to four mills.

"In most cases the reduction in taxes to the employer would have helped offset his contribution for the employees.

"In case of the employee if he owned property, his real property tax would be reduced by 17 mills likewise.

"In the hearing we had much opposition from the employers but very little from the employees.

"It all goes back to the eternal problem of tax reform. It is reform if it taxes somebody else.

"This bill had a good hearing. The committee felt it had merit, and both myself, as sponsor, and the committee felt we had exposed the public to this method and they did not like it, or at least they must prefer property taxes for education instead of income taxes.

"I feel that next session the exposure of this bill will result in the elimination of the 21 mill levy, possibly by a one percent increase in sales tax.

"We asked for indefinite postponement."

The question was on the motion of Rep. Boyum to adopt the Committee Report on House Bill No. 1536, which motion prevailed. House Bill No. 1536 was indefinitely postponed.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEE

Mr. Speaker: Your Committee on Education to whom was referred House Bill No. 1545 has had the same under consideration and recommends that the same be amended as follows:

"SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.) Section 15-53.1-11 of the North Dakota Century Code, as contained in section 9 of House Bill No. 1045, as approved by the forty-second legislative assembly, is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

15-53.1-11. COUNTY COMMITTEE — SIZE, COMPENSATION, VACANCIES, TERM.)

1. In each county in this state there shall be a county committee which shall be formed by the selection of one resident from each of the county commissioner districts within the county. Each member shall receive the actual and necessary expenses incurred by him in the performance of his official duties in accordance with the schedule for state officers and employees. In addition thereto, each member may also receive five dollars as compensation for each meeting of the committee actually attended by him. All payments for compensation and expenses shall be made upon warrant by the department of accounts and purchases as directed by the department of public instruction from moneys appropriated for that purpose.

The term of each county committee member shall be three years, staggered so that one term shall expire each year. Members of the county committee shall be selected by appointment by the county superintendent of schools with the approval of the board of county commissioners. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner for the unexpired portion of the term. In the event a committee member shall fail, refuse, or be unable to perform his duties as a member of such committee, the county superintendent of schools, upon petition of a majority of the school boards having territory in whole or

in part within the district which such committee member was appointed to represent, shall declare the position of such member upon the committee to be vacant, and shall immediately appoint a new member to the committee from that district.

2. In the event that the county is redistricted and as a consequence two or more members of the county committee are placed in the same county commissioner district, a new member shall be appointed who is a resident of the new unrepresented district or districts, and as between the two or more members currently serving on the county committee who are residents in the other district, that member shall serve whose term expires latest in point of time, and if all the terms shall expire at the same time, the two or more members shall decide who shall serve by lot. In the event that the county, through redistricting, thereafter elects its county commissioners at large, members of the county committee shall continue to be selected from those commissioner districts established by the districting plan in effect at the time the county is districted at large."

On page 5, line 9, after the word "election" place triple parentheses before and after the comma and insert in lieu thereof a period and add the following new language: "Should such reorganization plan be approved at the election."

And renumber the lines and sections accordingly.

And when so amended recommends the same do pass.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. There is hereby created a division of corrections which shall be a division under the public welfare board. A director of corrections shall be appointed by the public welfare board and

be professionally qualified by training and experience in the field of corrections.

SECTION 2. POWERS AND DUTIES OF DIRECTOR.) The director of corrections shall have the following powers and duties:

- To supervise the operation of the pentitentiary, state farm, industrial school, state youth authority and parole and probation officers:
- To provide programs and facilities for the custody and treatment of persons committed to him or agencies under his control so that such persons may be prepared for lawful community living.
- 3. To establish or participate in programs designed to reduce the net cost to the state of services rendered by the division and to allow for the gainful employment of inmates, Inmates who are employed in such programs shall be compensated at a rate established by the director.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-46-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-46-03. OFFICERS OF THE STATE TRAINING SCHOOL.) The officers of the state training school shall be a superintendent and such teachers and assistants as may be deemed necessary and recommended by the superintendent and approved by the director of corrections. (((board of administration.)))

SECTION 4. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-46-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-46-04. APPOINTMENT AND REMOVAL OF OFFICERS—TERM OF OFFICE.) The (((board of administration))) director of corrections shall appoint the superintendent, and he shall hold his office for a term of four years and until his successor is appointed and qualified, unless he is sooner removed (((by the board))). He may be removed (((by the board))) for misconduct, neglect of duty, incompetency, or other proper cause showing his inability or refusal properly to perform the duties of his office, but such removal shall be had only after an opportunity is given to him to be heard before (((such))) the public welfare board upon preferred written charges. Such removal when made, however, shall be final. All other officers and employees shall be appointed by the superintendent, subject to the approval of the (((board))) director of corrections, and shall hold office at the pleasure of the superintendent. The superintendent shall show in the record of any officer or employee who is discharged by him the reason therefor.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-46-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-46-06. SALARY OF SUPERINTENDENT, OFFICERS, AND EMPLOYEES.) The superintendent and all other officers and employees shall receive a salary to be fixed by the (((board of administration))) director of corrections within the limits of legislative appropriations therefor.

SECTION 6. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-46-07 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-46-07. (((MEMBERS OF BOARD))) DIRECTOR OF CORRECTIONS AND OFFICERS OF INSTITUTIONS NOT TO BE INTERESTED IN CERTAIN CONTRACTS.) (((No member of the board of administration shall))) The director of corrections shall not be interested either directly or indirectly in any contract for the purchase of building materials, supplies, or other articles for the use of the state (((training))) industrial school, and no officer of such institution shall be interested either directly or indirectly in any con-

tract for the purchase of building materials, supplies, or other articles for the use of the institution of which he is an officer. A violation of this section shall constitute a misdemeanor.

SECTION 7. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-46-09 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-46-09. SUPERINTENDENT MAY MAKE RULES.) The superintendent subject to the approval of the **director of corrections** (((board of administration)), shall make rules and regulations not in conflict with the laws of this state:

- 1. For the admission of visitors.
- 2. For the government of officers and employees of the state (((training))) industrial school; and
- 3. For the conduct of inmates therein.

A printed copy of the rules and regulations shall be furnished to each person committed to the state (((training))) **industrial** school at the time he is received and to each officer or employee thereof at the time he is appointed. Ten copies of such rules shall be furnished to the state law library for the use of the state officials and the public.

SECTION 8. Section 12-46-10 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-46-10. RECORDS OF INSTITUTIONAL TRANSACTIONS, COMPLAINTS, AND RULE INFRACTIONS.) The superintendent shall cause to be kept a correct record of all the transactions of his office and a correct account of all his doings. He shall cause to be kept a memorandum of every complaint of cruel and unjust treatment of any officer or other person or of the want of proper clothing or food made by any inmate, and also of any infraction of the rules and regulations of the school by any of the persons committed thereto, naming him, and specifying the offense and the punishment, if any, inflicted therefor. (((; and such record and memorandum shall be laid before the board of administration upon its request.)))

SECTION 9. Section 12-46-10.1 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-46-10.1. DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE — MEMBERS — DUTIES.) The disciplinary committee shall consist of the director of treatment or his representative, as chairman, a member of the medical staff, and the director of cottage life or his representative. The committee shall advise the superintendent of the North Dakota industrial school on all disciplinary policies; review all cases involving serious breaches of discipline before punitive action is taken thereon and advise the superintendent in regard to such specific cases; and maintain written records of charges against students for disciplinary violations together with their recommendations thereon. These records shall be subject to review by the (((board of administration))) director of corrections, the attorney general, or any legislative committee at their request. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent the superintendent from placing a child under close supervision immediately after that child commits a serious breach of discipline.

SECTION 10. Section 12-46-17 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-46-17. INCORRIGIBLE INMATE RETURNED TO SHERIFF — ORIGINAL PROCEEDINGS CONTINUED.) If any person who has been convicted of a felony and committed to the state (((training))) industrial school shall be or become incorrigible and manifestly or persistently dangerous to the good order, government, and welfare of such school or the students thereof, the (((board of administration))) director of corrections must order such person returned and

delivered to the sheriff of the county from which he was committed, and the proceedings against such person thereafter shall be resumed and continued as though no order or warrant of commitment to the state (((training))) industrial school had been made.

SECTION 11. Section 12-46-18 of the North Dakota Century Code

is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-46-18. EMPLOYMENT AND COMPENSATION OF PERSONS COMMITTED.) Every person committed to the state (((training))) industrial school shall receive for work done in the institution and industries conducted therein not less than five cents per day and not more than fifteen cents per day, the amount to be determined by the (((board of administration))) director of corrections within the limits of appropriations made by the legislative assembly for such purpose.

SECTION 12. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-47-05 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as

follows:

12-47-05. OFFICERS OF PENITENTIARY.) The officers of the penitentiary shall be: one warden, who shall be its general superintendent; at least one deputy warden, who shall be chief turnkey; one bookkeeper; one or in the discretion of the (((board of administration))) director of corrections and warden, two chaplains; and such other officers, guards, oversers, agents, and employees as may be necessary. The warden and deputy warden shall reside at the penitentiary.

SECTION 13. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-47-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-47-06. APPOINTMENT OF OFFICERS — TERM OF OFFICE.) The (((board of administration))) director of corrections shall appoint the warden, and he shall hold his office for a term of two years and until his successor is appointed and qualified, unless he is sooner removed (((by the board))). He may be removed (((by the board))) for misconduct, neglect of duty, incompetency, or other proper cause showing his inability or refusal properly to perform the duties of his office, but such removal shall be had only after an opportunity is given to him to be heard before (((such))) the public welfare board upon preferred written charges. Such removal when made, however, shall be final. All other officers and employees shall be appointed by the warden, subject to the approval of the (((board))) director of corrections, and shall hold office at the pleasure of the warden. The warden shall show in the record of any officer or employee who is discharged by him the reason therefor.

SECTION 14. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-47-08 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-47-08. SALARY OF WARDEN AND OTHER OFFICERS.) The warden shall receive a salary to be fixed by the (((board of administration))) director of corrections within the limits of the legislative appropriation. All other officers and employees of the penitentiary shall receive such amounts as the (((board of administration))) director of corrections from time to time may determine and establish.

SECTION 15. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-47-11 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows.

12-47-11. POWERS AND DUTIES OF WARDEN.) The warden, under the direction of the (((board of administration))) director of corrections, shall have the charge, custody, and control of the penitentiary and the persons committed thereto, together with all lands, buildings, furniture, tools, implements, stock, provisions, and every other species of property pertaining thereto or within the premises

thereof. He shall superintend and be responsible for the policing of the penitentiary and the discipline of the inmates.

SECTION 16. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-47-12 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

- 12-47-12. WARDEN TO MAKE RULES AND REGULATIONS.) The warden, subject to the approval of the (((board of administration))) director of corrections, shall make rules and regulations not in conflict with the laws of this state:
 - For the admission of visitors, but admission of visitors shall not be limited to less than two days in each week;
 - 2. For the government of officers and employees of the penitentiary; and
- 3. For the conduct of prisoners therein, and shall prescribe penalties for the violation thereof.

A printed copy of the rules and regulations shall be furnished to each person committed to the penitentiary at the time he is received and to each official or employee thereof at the time he is appointed. Ten copies of such rules shall be furnished to the state law library for the use of the state officials and the public. Such rules shall be explained to each prisoner in his native language if he cannot read English.

SECTION 17. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-47-13 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-47-13. WARDEN TO KEEP RECORDS.) The warden shall keep a correct record of all transactions of his office and a correct account of all his doings. He shall keep a daily journal of the proceedings of the penitentiary in which he shall note all infractions of the rules and regulations thereof by any officer or employee, and shall enter in such journal a memorandum of every complaint made by any inmate of cruel or unjust treatment by any officer or other person, or a want of proper clothing or food, and also any infraction of the rules and regulations of the penitentiary by any of the inmates, naming him and specifying the offense and the punishment, if any, inflicted therefor, and said journal and memorandum shall be laid before the (((board of administration))) director of corrections upon request.

SECTION 18. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-47-15 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-47-15. ABSENCE OF WARDEN AND DEPUTY WARDENS.) The warden and the deputy wardens shall not be absent from the penitentiary at the same time except by permission of the ((board of administration))) director of corrections. When the warden and the deputy wardens are absent, the board shall designate one of its members to act as warden.

SECTION 19. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-47-32 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-47-32. CASH PAYMENTS — STATE AUDITOR MAY ISSUE WARRANT.) The state auditor may issue his warrant on the state treasurer, payable to the treasurer of the penitentiary, for the payment of cash advanced to discharged inmates for transportation and temporary aid or for such items as it is necessary for the warden or the (((board of administration))) director of corrections to pay in cash. The warden shall file with the state auditor an affidavit stating that certain specific sums are necessary to pay cash advanced to discharged inmates for transportation and temporary aid or other incidental items.

SECTION 20. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-47-34 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-47-34. ESCAPES FROM PENITENTIARY — WARDEN MAY OFFER REWARD FOR RECAPTURE — PAYMENT OF REWARD.) The warden with the approval of the (((board of administration))) director of corrections, may adopt any measures he may deem proper to aid in the detection and capture of persons escaping from the penitentiary. When an inmate escapes, the warden shall use every means at his command for the apprehension of such person, and for that purpose he may offer a reward of not to exceed one hundred dollars and not less than twenty-five dollars for information leading to such apprehension. If the escape was made possible by the negligence of the warden or any officer under him, the reward thus offered shall be paid by the warden, and the (((board of administration))) director of corrections is empowered to determine the liability of the warden for such reward, and (((its))) his determination shall be final.

SECTION 21. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-51-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows.

12-51-02. PURPOSE OF STATE FARM.) It shall be the purpose of the state farm to employ in manual labor the prisoners committed or transferred thereto. Said farm shall be administered as a work farm for the purpose of assisting in the rehabilitation of the prisoners committed thereto, and with the purpose of furnishing to them labor, instruction, and supervision that will accomplish the purpose sought in this chapter. The (((board of administration))) director of corrections may provide for such labor, instruction, and supervision for the persons committed to the state farm.

SECTION 22. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-51-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-51-03. LOCATION OF NORTH DAKOTA STATE FARM — USE OF BUILDINGS.) The (((board of administration))) director of corrections shall take over the buildings and equipment of the camp for transients which was established by the federal emergency relief administration near the city of Bismarck, and which has been transferred by said administration to the state of North Dakota. So far as it may be possible so to do, such buildings and equipment shall be utilized for the establishment and operation of said farm. The (((board))) director may make such use and disposal of such buildings and equipment as (((it))) he finds necessary to facilitate the operation of said farm, and the employment of persons who have been or may be committed thereto; and to that end the (((board))) director may cause such buildings and equipment to be moved to other locations on lands under the control of said (((board))) director and used in the operation of said farm, or in the farming operations of the penitentiary. The (((board))) director may utilize any of such buildings or any of such equipment if not needed, or if the same cannot be used profitably in the establishment and operation of such farm, at the penitentiary or at the state training school, and generally may make such disposal and use of such buildings and equipment as shall prevent loss and waste and result in public benefit.

SECTION 23. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-51-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-51-04. FARM OPERATED WITH PENITENTIARY — WARD-EN TO BE SUPERINTENDENT — EMPLOYMENT OF HELP.) The (((board of administration))) director of corrections shall have charge and control of the state farm, and all property which said

(((board))) director has received or acquired, or hereafter may receive or acquire, in connection with the establishment and operation of said farm. For administrative and operational purposes the said farm shall be deemed a facility of the state penitentiary and shall be operated in connection therewith. The warden of the penitentiary shall be the superintendent or chief administrative officer of the farm. Machinery, equipment, livestock, and other property of the penitentiary and of the farm may be used interchangeably. The (((board))) director may employ such employees as may be necessary and as available funds will permit, and may prescribe their duties and fix their compensation. The (((board))) director may assign to said farm, in any capacity, persons employed in connection with the operation of the penitentiary. Such persons may be assigned either for full time or part time work, and, in the judgment of the (((board))) director, the compensation of such persons may be continued to be paid and charged as before they were assigned to work at said state farm. Until the said farm has been put into operation, all properties that have been received and acquired by the (((said board))) director for the establishment and operation of said farm may be utilized in carrying on the operations of the state penitentiary.

SECTION 24. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-51-05 of the North 'Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-51-05. LAWS GOVERNING MANAGEMENT OF STATE FARM.) The laws relating to the government and management of the penitentiary, so far as the same may be applicable and not inconsistent with the provisions of this chapter, in all respects shall apply to the government and management of the state farm as to the duties and authority of the (((board))) director and its employees used at said state farm.

SECTION 25. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-51-06 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-51-06. (((BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION))) **DIRECTOR OF CORRECTIONS** TO ESTABLISH RULES FOR CONTROL OF STATE FARM AND PRISONERS COMMITTED THERETO.) The (((board of administration))) **director of corrections** may establish, adopt and enforce proper rules and regulations consistent with the provisions of this chapter for the control and administration of the state farm and the prisoners committed thereto.

SECTION 26. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-51-08 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-51-08. COST OF TRANSPORTATION AND CARE OF PERSONS COMMITTED TO STATE FARM — HOW PAID — FEDERAL PRISONER.) The cost of transporting persons committed to the state farm shall be paid as the costs of transporting persons committed to the penitentiary are paid. The cost of care and keep of persons who are committed to the state farm for the commission of a crime for which they might have been sentenced to the penitentiary shall be paid by the state out of the funds appropriated for such purpose for persons committed to the penitentiary, or out of the funds appropriated for that purpose. The cost of care and keep of any person committed to said farm for the commission of a crime for which he might have been sentenced to a county jail, but not to the penitentiary, shall be paid by the county from which such person is committed at the rate of three dollars per day per person, except however, when the offense is committed in any county within an area, where there is in process of construction any federal project of such magnitude as to attract to such area a large number of people from outside the locality, then any person convicted of an offense for which he might have been sentenced to a county jail,

and who is not, in the opinion of the court, permanently residing in said area, the cost of care and keep shall be paid by the state out of funds appropriated for that purpose. Provided further that whenever the state farm is filled to capacity and there are no longer adequate facilities for additional inmates, the (((board of administration))) director of corrections shall notify the courts of such facts and after such notice no further commitments shall be made to said institution until facilities have been provided. The (((board))) director shall have authority to enter into an arrangement or agreement with the proper authorities of the federal government whereby persons convicted of a crime in the federal court of this state may be committed to said farm, but persons convicted in federal court shall be admissible to the said farm only if the term of the sentence is not less than thirty days nor more than one year.

SECTION 27. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-51-09 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows.

(((BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION))) DIRECTOR OF 12-51-09. CORRECTIONS MAY TRANSFER PERSONS FROM STATE FARM TO PENITENTIARY OR FROM PENITENTIARY TO STATE When the (((board of administration))) director of corrections, either at the time of commitment or at any time thereafter. shall determine that for purposes of safety of other inmates or of the general public or for the purpose of discipline it is necessary or proper that any person committed to the state farm should be transferred to the state penitentiary, such transfer may be made for such period as the (((board))) director may deem proper. Where a person who has been committed to the state farm conducts himself in such manner as to interfere with the operation of the farm, or with the welfare or safety of others, and where in the judgment of the (((board of administration))) director the best interests of such person or the best interests and welfare of other persons committed to the farm so require, the (((board))) director may direct that such person be removed from the farm and placed in the penitentiary. The (((board))) director also may direct that persons who have been sentenced to the penitentiary be transferred to the farm, when such action seems desirable and for the best interest of the person so transferred and in no manner detrimental to the welfare of other persons who have been committed to said farm. The (((board))) director may cause persons committed to the said farm to be assigned for work incident to the operations of the penitentiary or of any other institutions under the control of the said (((board))) director.

SECTION 28. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-52-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-52-01. (((BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION))) **DIRECTOR OF CORRECTIONS** MAY GRANT PAROLES.) The (((board of administration))) **director of corrections** may parole persons committed to the state (((training))) **industrial** school and may establish rules and regulations under which such persons may go upon parole.

SECTION 29. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-52-02 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows.

12-52-02. PAROLE ON RECOMMENDATION OF SUPERINTENDENT.) No parole shall be granted to any person committed to the North Dakota industrial school or placed under the guardianship, control and custody of the superintendent thereof unless of superintendent recommends the parole to the (((board of administration))) director of corrections and some suitable person will receive the person paroled under such conditions as may be approved by the superintendent of the school. Nothing in this chapter shall prevent the parole of any person into his own home or into a licensed foster

home under one of the welfare programs administered by the public welfare board of North Dakota.

SECTION 30. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-52-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-52-03. RECOMMITMENT TO THE STATE (((TRAINING))) INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR PAROLE VIOLATION.) A person paroled from the state (((training))) industrial school shall be under the guardianship and control of the (((board of administration))) director of corrections and subject at any time, until the expiration of the time for which he was committed, to be taken into actual custody and returned to the state (((training))) industrial school. The (((board of administration))) director of corrections may enforce the rules and regulations made by it for the paroling of the inmates of the state (((training))) industrial school, and when satisfied that a person out on parole has violated any of its rules and regulations, may order such person taken into actual custody and returned to the state (((training))) industrial school and detained therein until the expiration of the time for which he was committed, or until he is again paroled. The (((board))) director shall enter in the record of (((its))) proceedings any such order, and a copy thereof (((certified by the secretary of the board))) may be delivered to any sheriff, other peace officer of the state, or any officer of the state (((training))) industrial school, for service and return. It shall be the duty of any such officer to receive the order and to apprehend and immediately to return and deliver the person named in the order to the superintendent of the state (((training))) industrial school.

SECTION 31. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-52-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-52-04. OFFICER'S RETURN ON ORDER OF RECOMMITMENT.) The officer executing an order of the (((board of administration))) director of corrections for the apprehension and return of a person to the state (((training))) industrial school shall endorse on the order a return of his doings thereunder and deliver the same, together with the person named therein, to the superintendent of the school. The superintendent shall give to the officer a certificate acknowledging the receipt of the person, order, and return.

SECTION 32. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-52-05 of the North Dakota Century Code is herby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-52-05. OFFICER'S FEE ON RECOMMITMENT.) The fee of any officer executing an order of the (((board of administration))) director of corrections for the apprehension and return of a person to the state (((training))) industrial school shall be the same as that for like service in criminal actions.

SECTION 33. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-52-07 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-52-07. DISCHARGE FOR GOOD CONDUCT.) The (((board of administration))) director of corrections may discharge any student from the state (((training))) industrial school at any time upon satisfactory evidence of reformation and as a reward for good conduct and diligence in study. If such student has no parent, guardian, or other person to whom to return, the (((board))) director shall arrange for and procure some suitable person to receive, employ, and care for the person so discharged, without charge to the state.

SECTION 34. AMENDMENT.) Section 12-55-07 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

12-55-07. PAROLE OFFICERS — APPOINTMENT — DUTIES.) The (((ex-officio members of the board of pardons))) director of corrections shall appoint one or more parole officers, one of whom may be the clerk of the board of pardons and of the parole board, whose duties shall be:

- To have supervision over and to look after the welfare of persons who have been paroled from the penitentiary and of persons who have received suspended sentences and have been placed upon probation after having been convicted of a felony;
- 2. To keep a complete record of all persons under their supervision and to make such reports relating to such persons as the board of pardons or the parole board shall require;
- 3. To make such investigations and perform such other duties in connection with applications and petitions for pardon, commutation of sentence, or parole as may be prescribed by the board of pardons or the parole board; or
- 4. To perform such other duties as the board of pardons or the parole board may assign to them.

SECTION 35. AMENDMENT.) Section 54-23-01 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

54-23-01. INSTITUTIONS UNDER CONTROL OF (((BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION))) DIRECTOR OF INSTITUTIONS.) The (((board of administration))) director of institutions shall have full power to manage, control, and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in this chapter and in title 25, (((the penitentiary,))) the school for the blind, the school for the deaf, the Grafton state school, (((the North Dakota industrial school))) and the state tuberculosis sanatorium. The (((board))) director shall not have the power to manage, control, and govern the soldiers' home. The term "board" as used in this chapter shall mean the (((board of administration))) director of institutions.

SECTION 36. AMENDMENT.) Section 27-21-01 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows.

27-21-01. CREATION OF STATE YOUTH AUTHORITY — DIRECTOR.) A state youth authority is hereby created and established with such powers and duties as are prescribed by this chapter. The state youth authority shall be (((created))) within the (((public welfare board))) division of corrections, and its chief administrative officer shall be the (((executive director of the public welfare board))) director of corrections, or his designee.

SECTION 37. REPEAL.) Chapters 12-48 and 12-49 of the North Dakota Century Code are hereby repealed and section 54-23-22 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby repealed."

And renumber sections, lines and pages accordingly.

And when so amended recommends the same do pass.

EXPLANATION OF VOTE

Rep. Atkinson: "Mr. Speaker: This afternoon we heard Rep. James Peterson explain an appropriations measure and he consistently referred to the position that the State of North Dakota holds in the pay scales comparing the various positions in the Highway Department in relation to the rest of the nation, and they ranged between 29th and 36th, although our population places us in a far lower category than that.

"What we have done is to show the pay of our elected officials to be \$16,000 per year, except for the Governor, Attorney General, Superintendent of Public Instruction and Tax Commissioner. As of December 31, 1969, there were forty-four persons in our State Highway Department who at that time were then receiving more than \$16,000 per year.

"By our vote today, we apparently made clear the fact that there is a tremendous disadvantage to being an elected state official in the State of North Dakota. If you seek an equitable salary — and I believe the salary sets the quality of the men it will attract — you don't want to get into an elected position. You had better seek an appointive one."

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Rep. Boustead: "Mr. Speaker: I rise on a point of personal privilege.

Speaker Bier: "On Friday, Rep. Hoffner requested a further ruling on the decision of the Chair that House Bill No. 1507 was lost for want of a two-thirds majority. The Chair referred the matter to the Attorney General's Office for an opinion, which we have received. The opinion states that the sections of the bill are so inter-related that portions of it cannot stand alone. Therefore, the decision of the Chair that House Bill No. 1507 was lost due to lack of a two-thirds vote is sustained.

Rep. Hoffner requested that his remarks in regard to House Bill No. 1507 be printed in the Journal.

Rep. Hoffner: "Mr. Speaker: I feel that the portion of House Bill No. 1507 would have set up a Department of Correction and could stand with the Probation and the Parole Office and the State Youth Authority, and would still be a meaningful and a worthwhile division. I would like at this time to refer back to House Bill No. 1299, and the decision made there. For the record, I feel that we are setting a precedent that could be followed by future legislative sessions

"I feel that no bill can be amended except by unanimous consent of the House, or a Committee of the Whole, or by Committee action.

"I also feel that the question was divided after the vote was called, and according to the rules of the House, this is not proper. I feel that the total membership should have an opportunity to vote on the divided question. On the question of House Bill No. 1299, it is very possible that when the interest rate portions were taken out, the bill might only have received forty-eight votes, and it is also possible that it would have received seventy or eighty votes, but the total membership did not have a right to vote on the divid-

ed question, and I would like to have the record show that we have set a new precedent, and I don't know how it can be changed now, but I hope in the future, this will not be a precedent which is followed.

ATTORNEY GENERAL Bismarck, North Dakota 58501 February 24, 1971

"The Honorable Myron H. Atkinson, Jr. House of Representatives, District 32 State Capitol Bismarck, North Dakota

"Dear Mr. Atkinson:

"We have received your inquiry as to the constitutionality of Senate Bill No. 2067.

"This bill relates to regulations governing initiative and referendum petitions.

"This bill among other things proposes to require the Secretary of State to mail questionnaires or contact a certain percentage of the signers to a petition to verify their signature. It also provides that all signatures on each copy of a petition to which a false affidavit is attached shall be invalid. It requires a printed, typed list of all persons who signed a petition to be attached to each affidavit.

"Only the Supreme Court of this State has authority to declare a law unconstitutional, and we can only render opinions thereon. We further realize that if this bill passes and is signed into law by the Governor, we may have to defend its constitutionality. However, in view of the fact that inquiry has been made, we would be less than candid if we do not give the legislature our views on the matter.

"Section 25 of the Constitution provides in part as follows:

***This section shall be self executing and all of its provisions treated as mandatory. Laws may be enacted to fa-

cilitate its operation, but no laws shall be enacted to hamper, restrict or impair the exercise of the rights herein reserved to the people.'

"In view of this language, we have grave doubts that Senate Bill 2067 could withstand a constitutional test as it seems to us it does more then facilitate the operation of Section 25 of our Constitution.

"We trust this will be of some assistance to you.

"At this point, I would call your attention to the name of the sponsor of this legislation, Senator Lowe. A few days ago we stood here in a minute of silent tribute to his memory as his funeral was in progress.

"It took the alert and compassionate mind of our departed Senator to focus our attention so that we might correct a matter that most of us took for granted. Might I add that in checking the records, this was the last legislative contribution made by our departed Senator during the brief time he spent with us in this 42nd Session of the North Dakota Legislature.

"I recognize that as legislators, we consider all legislation on its merits and vote accordingly. In this case, I hope I have convinced you that this legislation is not only desirable, but necessary, and when you support this bill you will support not only your Social Welfare Committee, who gave this unanimous approval, but you will also create a memorial to a benevolent fellow legislator."

The committees so appointed shall meet at such hour and place as shall be agreed on by the Chairmen; and shall state to each other, verbally, or in writing, as either may choose, the reasons of their respective Houses, and confer (((freely))) thereon; and they shall be authorized to report, in the manner set out below, to their respective Houses (((such modifications as they think advisable))) regarding the manner in which they recommend that the difference between the two Houses should be resolved. Conference committees appointed pursuant to this rule shall confine their conferences and recommendations to consideration of the stated difference which gave rise to the appointment of the committees. The conference committee report shall first be submitted to the House having possession of the bill over which the difference has arisen, where it shall be acted upon and notice of such action transmitted to the other House. When the other House shall have also acted upon the report, it shall notify the House having possession of the bill, which House shall, if appropriate, proceed to take action on the bill and transmit it to the other House for appropriate action.

It may buy and sell federal funds, or excess reserves, bankers acceptances, participation loans, and all securities issued by the United States government or its instrumentalities. It may invest its funds in bonds, notes, or debentures of any corporation duly incorporated under the laws of any state of the United States rated at "A" or higher by a nationally recognized rating service approved by the industrial commission, provided that such investments shall not be made to exceed (((forty))) for any one corporation, ten percent of the combined capital, and surplus (((and undivided profit))) of the Bank. It may make loans, to holders of Bank of North Dakota certificates of deposit and savings accounts, up to ninety percent of the value of the certificates and savings accounts offered as security. It shall not otherwise make loans or give its credit to any individual, association, or private corporation, except that it may make loans to actual farmers who are residents of this state, if such loans are secured by duly recorded first mortgages on real estate in the state of North Dakota in amounts not to exceed one-half the value of the security and except United States insured and guaranteed loans as specifically authorized by law. The Bank, however, shall not loan more than thirty percent of its capital, nor in addition thereto, more than twenty percent of its deposits on real estate security.'

House Bill 1136 was introduced in order to provide a method of replacing legislative Emergency Commission members in case of death or resignation. This is desirable legislation.

However, the bill unnecessarily changes the make-up of the membership on the Emergency Commission without any resulting benefit to the conduct of its affairs.

I, therefore, veto House Bill 1136 in hopes that it can be re-introduced to carry out the intent of the original legislation without changing the membership on the Commission.

Dear Mr. Speaker:

In any large business organization or in large government organization, such as we have at the state level, there needs to be a clearly defined flow of responsibility to the chief executive. With that clearly defined flow of responsibility must also be clearly defined authority. House Bill 1081 disrupts the flow of responsibility and the flow of authority to and from the office of the chief executive.

It removes from the State Auditing Board the director of Accounts and Purchases who represents the Governor. It then retains other state officials who may act on the State Auditing Board or designate others to act for them. The director of Accounts and Purchases is maintained as secretary of the Auditing Board and his clearly defined responsibility under present law then becomes vague and undefined in House Bill 1081.

House Bill 1081 was originally submitted to abolish the State Auditing Board functions except in appeals. Such a proposal would have had considerable merit. However, the original intent of the bill was entirely eliminated and the resulting product weakens rather than strengthens the executive branch of government.

Therefore, I veto House Bill 1081.

SECOND READING OF A SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4019. A Concurrent Resolution urging the appropriate federal agencies to undertake a feasibility study relative to the development and improvement of the Missouri River for the purpose of utilizing that waterway for barge traffic and other navigational purposes.

Was read the second time.

The question being on the final adoption of the resolution. So the Senate Concurrent Resolution was declared adopted on a voice vote.

Rep. Reimers requested that his remarks regarding Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4019 be printed in the Journal.

Rep. Reimers:

"Mr. Speaker: There appears to be no question that the marketing system in the upper great plains as it particularly applies to agricultural products is in serious need for study and evaluation. In North Dakota, this really boils down to a close look at our distribution system because the life of the agricultural marketing plant in our state is highly dependent upon a responsible transportation network. This examination can take one or both of two directions (1) to examine ways to improve the existing system and (2) to take a hard look at alternatives to the existing system (water transportation being one of those alternative systems).

"Just how dependent is our major industry — agriculture — upon transportation? Research shows that in 1969 railroads and commercial trucks hauled slightly more than 11 million tons of grains, livestock, milk and cream, potatoes, and sugar beets. Farmers re-

ceived about \$630 million from the market (not including government payments of several kinds) for selling it and railroads and motor carriers received slightly more than \$90 million to haul it. In other words, about 13% of the value of the North Dakota product delivered someplace else is composed of a transportation cost.

"We are primarily an exporting state and are highly dependent upon the transportation industry to survive and grow. It seems like survival and growth of North Dakota would be of paramount interest to the transportation industry and particularly the railroads that serve us. Obviously, our growth eventually becomes their growth through increased business.

"Let's briefly examine the status of this major industry of ours — agriculture — with regards to railroads. First we can pretty much ignore the livestock industry as far as railroads are concerned. Trucks haul about 96 percent of all livestock to market.

"Let's look at our major product — crops. Income from marketing crops 1965 through 1969 increased from \$438 million to \$476 million (plus \$38 million) an increase of 8.6 percent. In the meantime the cost of living was increasing by 17.8 percent (twice as fast as income from North Dakota's income from crops), so that North Dakota farmers had less purchasing power in 1969 than in 1965!

"If that is not convincing evidence of the trouble in agriculture—how about this? From 1963 through 1970 the rail transportation costs per acre for barley increased about 40 percent while the growing revenue per acre declined slightly more than eight percent. The transportation costs per acre for wheat 1963 through 1970 increased about 33 percent while revenue per acre (including certificates) was increasing a little less than nine percent. Most of us are familiar with the fact that railroads had rate increases amounting to about 30 plus percent since 1960. Obviously, railroads fared much better in the economy than farmers did!

"In testimony for rate increases, they stated "Some of the most hard pressed carriers in the west are heavily dependent upon revenue from grain and grain products. This includes the Milwaukee Road, the Rock Island, and the Northwestern." In 1969 only 7.8 percent of Western Rail Carriers gross revenues were from hauling grains. How can they be so 'heavily dependent' on revenue from grain and grain products? Further, the rail testimony on grain and grain products never mentions the problems of the railroads that serve North Dakota. How can they (the BN and the Soo) use the troubles of the Milwaukee, Northwestern, and Rock Island as an excuse for raising their rates on grain?

"Let's ask another question. What are North Dakota railroads doing for the North Dakota Grain farmer? The first obvious question is 'Have they reduced any rates?' The answer is no! Why not? Because they don't have to! Why? Because there isn't sufficient competition to merit rate reductions! In many other parts of the country rates on grain are reduced significantly when trucks and barges demonstrate an effective ability to take traffic away from railroads. Railroads have historically reduced rates in the face of barge competition and truck competition. The Southern railroad reduced rates drastically in the face of both kinds of competition several years ago by simply introducing more efficiency into their operations (the high capacity covered hopper car — known as 'Big John' — was introduced by the Southern as a basis for reducing rates). The Illinois Central reduced rates substantially by simply increasing the utilization of the hopper car (turning it around faster or loading it more times per year) through the unit train concept. Other railroads have since followed suit. Railroads serving the lower great than our railroads have.

"Research recently completed at Nebraska shows that rail rates on wheat from North Dakota contributed a greater margin of return to railroad overhead costs than wheat rates from any other wheat producing state. In other words, rates paid by North Dakota shippers provide more net profit for North Dakota railroads than do the rates paid by shippers from other states.

"In the face of this, have the railroads solved the boxcar shortage problem? That question hardly needs answering. We have all seen rail service deteriorate and the boxcar shortage story is and has been a perennial and increasing problem for many years. As early as 1907 the ICC held extensive hearings on freight car shortages. One thing we know for certain is that the proportion of the total capacity of the rail car fleet available for grain hauling has declined from 47 percent in 1902 to about 25 percent today. Obviously the decision over the years to reduce the grain carrying capacity of the fleet was a decision made by railroad management with the help of the ICC, not by grain farmers. Furthermore, the fact that boxcars are loaded fewer times per year now than in 1956 which increases the cost of handling the car is not the fault of grain farmers (more than likely the result of providing less and less available service. And yet the ICC concluded in a study it made of the boxcar situation between January 1968 and January 1969 that for every car ordered by shippers in the midwest there were three boxcars and covered hopper cars available someplace in the midwest. There really wasn't a shortage, but rather there was gross maldistribution! Further, they stated, "even in regions where the supplying of a type of car to fill shippers requests involved the greatest delay, availability in general was at least "twice the current orders."

"In other words, there really wasn't a shortage, but there was a great deal of 'bad management.' And yet, rail testimony on the need for increased rail rates on grain in 1970 said '. . railroads must improve their equipment supply to handle the traffic presently being offered.' I submit to you, that the interstate commerce commission is a tool of the railroads, and not of the people.

"I'm not sure the railroads need the additional capital in any case. There is evidence that in several cases, stockholders equity has been increasing while operating reserves are being depleted. The testimony of one opponent to the recent rail rate increase suggested that there appears good evidence that many railroads were plowing retained earnings into stockholders dividends instead of into maintenance and technology. The request for rate increases then were merely to ask shippers to supply low — zero cost capital — for railroad investment purposes through higher freight rates. It's an interesting argument!

"Have we earned this treatment? Hardly! The railroads as a whole received about 182 million acres in land grants from federal and state government to help defray the costs of construction. The Northern Pacific Railway (now part of the BN) received the largest grant — 41 million acres.

"In several cases, the sale of this land to settlers, etc., did not cover the cost of construction. But, however, it has been estimated that the cost of construction of Northen Pacific was about \$67 million. Receipt from sale of lands up to December 31, 1927, by the NP amounted to \$138 million or about 2.7 times what it cost to build the railroad and then they didn't sell all the land!

"How do we treat them taxwise? In terms of property taxes, railroads in North Dakota rank about 40th in the nation relative to the amount paid per mile of railroad in the state. Surely that cannot be considered ill treatment! A study made at North Dakota State University by the transportation institute shows that in 16 north-central North Dakota counties, the total taxable value of all rail branch lines in 1968 was 1.64 percent of the total taxable value of all property. In no case are railroads overburdened with a heavy tax load for support of local services.

"What of the future? Well, there are some population experts

who are saying we may be 100 million more people in this country by the year 2000. This of course, will mean great pressures on the farmers of the country to produce more food and the transportation systems to get it to the urban centers they will be living in. There is no doubt that the farmers of North Dakota are capable of producing a great deal more food than we are now doing. But are the railroads and trucks capable of hauling more? It appears that railroads are having a difficult time managing their problems in 1970. Are they capable of handling additional pressure? At this stage it doesn't seem likely. Although motor carriers have so far done a commendable job in taking up the slack, it is doubtful that they can absorb North Dakota's share of the food production of 100 million more people. We must look to alternatives such as water transportation if we are going to continue as a major supplier of high quality food products."

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Rep. Weber requested his remarks be printed in the Journal regarding a point of personal privilege.

Rep. Weber: "Mr. Speaker:

"When Legislators are confronted with a tough issue it is often too easy to postpone decisions. Yesterday, after this legislature killed both plans for simplifying our income tax laws, a representative of this House graciously stood up and called for a study of our income taxes during the next two years.

"Distortions, inaccuracies and general lack of understanding, often kill good legislation, but seldom have these elements been combined so effectively on one issue.

"A statement read into the House Journal yesterday was full of distortions and will apparently be pointed to in the months ahead by a number of legislators as justification for voting against this legislation.

"A complete discussion of the technical parts of the income tax proposal would be a waste of time at this point, however, I think several comments about the provisions of these bills are in order:

- The right to use federal income tax paid was being abolished under the simplified income tax plan but the rate in all tax brackets was being reduced accordingly.
- There is not now and has never been adequate justification for taxing a man who earns \$10,000.00 to pay over twice as much as a family who has the same \$10,000 income but is able to split that income between husband and wife.
- The domestic dividends exemptions have outlived their use-3) fulness as an incentive for North Dakota economic develop-ment. We now have a law in North Dakota to grant a complete five year exemption, upon application, for all property taxes and income taxes for a new business in this state.

"The average North Dakotan wants simple, fair tax laws which do not hide exemptions, deductions, exclusions, and benefits that accrue to only a few privileged citizens.

"I feel I must comment on the call for another study of our income taxes. Just three months ago the Legislative Council received the final report of a study of North Dakota's income taxes conducted by Dr. Libera and the Bureau of Business and Economic Research at the University of North Dakota. This study cost North Dakotans over \$25,000.

"Is the majority of this body willing to waste thousands of dollars of taxpayer's money to conduct another study? A thousand studies will not solve the conscience of those who can't make decisions on tough issues.

"North Dakotans sent us to Bismarck to make decisions, not to postpone them."

"In the paper today, there was a statement made by Ralph Dewing allegating that a change in the auditing board was political juggling. This auditing board change bill came out of my committee, and I

submit we did long and hard work on it. It was later vetoed by the Governor. We had two sub-committees out with both Republicans and Democrats on the sub-committees, the committee was accused of having put the State Treasurer on the Board for political The State Treasurer was asked to appear before the Com-She stated she did not want to be on the auditing board. She did not want to be on the auditing board because it was to be an appeal board. This same committee then put the same State Treasurer, regardless of politics, on the emergency commission, and removed a present member who is a Republican, and the Governor vetoed that.

"Now Mr. Dewing has stated this is political juggling. He did this on his own. My committee consists of Republicans and Democrats. The floor of this House consists of Republicans and Democrats. The vote was 93 ayes, 0 nays, and 5 absent and not voting.

"He later criticized Representative Stone on a question of semantics on the word Auditing. The auditing board may be a misnomer. What Representative Stone undoubtedly meant to say was that the Director of Accounts and Purchases originally approves the voucher and has the voucher submitted to an auditing board of which he is a member, so he has an opportunity to audit his own original approval of the vouchers.

"I submit to you that a State Employee who makes a charge of political juggling or chicanery is very much out of order. He announced this to the paper. He as much as accused this committee and its members by some devious means of replacing him because of party affiliation. This was not the case. The Democrat members of the committee agreed. The Democrat members of this House agreed.

"All of the time Mr. Dewing was consulted by the sub-committee, and he had no major objections. It is stated in the minutes of the sub-committee he did not wish to appear, and he stated it was not necessary.

"I object to a State Employee who uses some format to accuse a standing committee of political juggling. This replacement was suggested strictly on the position. Mr. Dewing is a competent man. His office and staff are competent. We did not replace him because of his political affiliation. We replaced him with an elected official to review vouchers submitted through his office."

All meetings and records of the convention shall be open to the public. The convention shall keep a journal of its proceedings and shall keep an abstract of the proceedings of its committees, and a record of its debates, and shall provide for the collection, storage, and publication thereof. The convention may also provide for the collection storage, and publication of any other of its documents and reports. The convention shall employ a qualified historian, archivist, librarian, or a person of similar training, as its chief records clerk. This clerk shall see that the proper journals and records of the convention and its committees are kept. He shall also see to the preservation and collection of all proposals, reports, records, books, correspondence, documents, reference material, and other similar papers of the convention and its committees. The chief records clerk shall see that all of the materials under his care and supervision are deposited with the state library for preservation, cataloging, and safekeeping. chief records clerk shall also urge all convention delegates and staff, as well as any other state officials, private individuals, or groups that have any type of correspondence or other material pertaining to the convention, to give this material to him for deposit with the state library. Copies of the convention journals and all revisions, alterations, or amendments to the Constitution, agreed to and adopted by the convention, shall also be recorded and filed with the secretary of state. All provisions of chapter 54-05 of the North Dakota Century Code concerning lobbying shall apply to the constitutional convention and its committees.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.) Section 12 of chapter 462 of the 1969 Session Laws is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

Section 12.) The convention may submit a new Constitution as one proposal to be voted on by the people, and it may submit proposed parts or alternative parts of a new Constitution. The proposals of the convention shall be submitted to the electors of this state for adoption or rejection at a special election held next following adjournment sine die called by the governor not less than (((ninety)) sixty days nor more than one hundred fifty days next succeeding the date of adjournment of the constitutional convention. The returns

of such issue at such special election shall be made, canvassed, and the results thereof declared in the same manner as provided by law for the initiated and referred measures. If a majority of the electors of the state voting thereon at such special election shall vote for the proposed new Constitution, the same shall become effective on the date and in the manner provided in the proposed Constitution, or if no effective date shall be provided in the proposed new Constitution, the same shall become effective as now provided by law with reference to initiated measures. If a majority of the electors of the state voting thereon at such special election shall vote against the proposed new Constitution, the same shall be deemed rejected by the electors, and the existing Constitution of this state, as amended, shall continue to be the Constitution of this state. If proposed parts or alternative parts of the new Constitution are submitted separately, and the people shall vote against any part, such part shall be deemed rejected and shall be of no force and effect, but any proposed part or alternative part which receives a majority of the votes of the qualified electors voting thereon shall become effective on the date and in the manner provided for in such proposed part, or if no effective date is provided, such proposed part shall become effective as now provided by law with reference to initiated measures.

SECTION 4. STATE AGENCIES TO ASSIST CONSTITUTION-AL CONVENTION. Each department, office, agency, and institution of the state of North Dakota shall provide such reasonable aid, information, and assistance to the North Dakota constitutional convention as such convention may request, and shall make such reasonable arrangements for the reimbursement of such direct cost as may result from such aid or assistance as may be mutually agreeable. The director of institutions shall make available without cost to the constitutional convention the chamber of the house of representatives and such other space as the convention shall need.

SECTION 5. EMERGENCY.) This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval."

The increase of \$12,000 to the parole office budget is to provide matching funds for hiring two additional parole officers. The estimated income for \$50,000 was added to radio communications to provide federal funds. It is the intent of the Legislative Assembly that the increased obligation provided in this Act shall be used as matching funds for purposes of compliance with the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act. Upon employment, the business administrator shall be assigned by the director of instituions to major areas of administrative responsibility within the institution."

Rep. Dotzenrod: "Mr. Speaker:

"Yesterday we had a discussion of the merits of Senate Bill No. 2180. Today, I would like to add a few comments on why this bill is needed.

"We sit here in the Assembly in the latter half of the 20th Century and can look back on hardly more than a hundred years since our land was virgin sod — a very brief period of history. This land, this earth that sustains our civilization and on which we are but temporary custodians and beneficiaries, is the product of the vast ages in time. We have a duty and obligation during our brief tenancy to pass on to future generations the life sustaining crust of this earth in at least as good condition as we found it. But, what is happening in North Dakota? At the present time we have surrendered 500,000 acres of the land to leafy spurge alone. We are continuing to surrender 5,000 acres a year to these weeds. This

must be stopped or we will fail ourselves and fail those who follow us.

"This bill, the work of many dedicated and forward-looking men and organizations, can set up the machinery for a unified effort through control and cooperation, working with all interested departments and services, to reverse this trend. We are in a war on weeds, and we should face this war as we should face any war, with decisive action. War is not the place for the timid and timorous souls that resist change, and see dragons in every shadow.

"Our present weed laws are a hodge-podge of amendments and unworkable statutes. This bill can work because it provides the mechanics to make it work.

"I am reminded of an article I read recently about a writer visiting the late President Eisenhower at his Gettysburg Farm. The writer said, 'Mr. Eisenhower, would you tell me why after all your achievements you chose to settle down on this farm?' Mr. Eisenhower replied, 'It's true I have had many honors in my lifetime. Having served as Supreme Commander of the Allied Forces we won one of the most decisive wars in history; then being honored to serve as President of this great country. But, you know, all through my life I had always wanted the satisfaction of some day owning a piece of land, and when I die to know that I have left it in better shape than I found it!"

"Mr. Speaker, and members of this Assembly, this bill can be a step in that direction. This is the kind of motivation we need for the farmers of North Dakota from the members of this Assembly.

"There is not a farm organization in the state which has opposed this bill.

"If we fail to pass this bill, we will have let down ourselves, the farm organizations of this state, and worst of all, the generations of the future."

his physical handicap))) in the opinion of a qualified psychologist, a medical doctor, and the district superintendent is unable to attend the public schools in the district because of a physical handicap or because of a learning disability, such school district shall contract with any accredited private nonsectarian nonprofit corporation within or without the state which has proper facilities for the education of or without the state which has proper facilities for the education of such student, if there are no public schools in the state with the necessary facilities which will accept such student. (((Prior to the time any))) No school district (((enters))) shall enter into a contract with any private nonsectarian nonprofit corporation for the education of any (((physically handicapped))) student having a physical handicap or learning disability, unless the curriculum provided by such school and the contract (((shall be))) has been approved in advance by the superintendent of public instruction. The contract shall provide that such school district agrees to pay to the private shall provide that such school district agrees to pay to the private nonsectarian nonprofit corporation as part of the cost of educating such student an amount for the school year equal to three times the (((county))) state average per-pupil elementary or high school cost, depending on whether the enrollment would be in a grade or high school department, (((in the county in which the contracting district is located))) provided that such payment shall not exceed the actual per-pupil cost incurred by such private, nonsectarian nonprofit corporation. The district of the student's residence shall be reimbursed from funds appropriated by the legislative assembly for the foundation aid program, in an amount equal to sixty percent of the payment made to such private, nonsectarian nonprofit corporation. If the attendance of such student at such school is (((operated))) for less than a school year, then the contract shall provide for such lesser amount prorated on a monthly basis. (((For the purpose of this section, any student contracted for to attend a school as herein provided shall be considered as enrolled in the contracting district and the district shall be entitled to the per-pupil payment out of the county equalization fund the same as other regularly enrolled students in the district))) The reimbursement herein provided to the contracting district from the foundation aid program shall be in lieu of any other foundation aid to which the district might otherwise be entitled.

As used in this section, the term "learning disability" shall mean a disorder in one or more of the basic psychological processes involved in understanding or in using spoken or written languages, and which may be manifested in disorders of listening, thinking, talking, reading, writing, spelling, or arithmetic. WHEREAS, as a part of the Missouri River Basin Development Project, dams and large reservoirs have been constructed by the Federal Government which occupy all the reaches of the Missouri River extending from Gavins Point Dam in South Dakota to Williston, North Dakota, with the lone exception of a seventy-mile stretch between the Oahe and Garrison Reservoirs in North Dakota; and

WHEREAS, the remaining channel between the Oahe Reservoir and Garrison Dam no longer performs its function as a natural river but is now acting as a regulated channel for the conveyance of water needed to meet the requirements of flood control, irrigation, navigation, power generation, municipal and industrial water supplies, pollution control, recreation, and wildlife purposes; and

WHEREAS, the stored water in the Garrison reservoir is released in such manner as to accommodate the downstream beneficiaries as

evidenced by the following facts:

- 1. The water is virtually silt-free when it enters the channel and has tremendous ability to pick up its former bedload in the form of silt;
- 2. The releases are fluctuated to accommodate the hydro-electric generation demand with variations from four thousand to thirty-two thousand cubic feet per second, thereby causing surging conditions which aggravate any existing erosion prob-lem and cause an annual loss of approximately six hundred forty acres of valuable agricultural bottom lands; and

WHEREAS, a portion of this threatened land is now being irrigated or has an irrigation potential which is of great economic value to the adjacent localities and to the State of North Dakota; and

WHEREAS, Federal lands, public parks, and historic sites of national prominence are a part of the area affected; and

WHEREAS, industries that desire to locate adjacent to the river are being forced to seek more distant sites because of the uncertainty of maintaining their plants at a permanent location; and

for an Act to amend and reenact subsection 2 of section 11-10-10 and sections 11-16-02 and 11-16-05 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to providing that the position of states attorney in a county of over 35,000 population be a full-time position, the employment of assistant states attorneys, the restrictions on the powers of states attorneys, increasing the salaries of county officials, and to create and enact a section to provide for an effective date thereof.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.) Subsection 2 of section 11-10-10 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

- 2. The county auditor, county treasurer, (((sheriff, county superintendent of schools,))) register of deeds, county judge, states attorney, and clerk of the district court each shall receive the following annual salary, payable monthly, for official services rendered:
 - a. (((Five))) Six thousand six hundred dollars in counties having a population not exceeding eight thousand (((;))).
 - b. (((Five)))Six thousand eight hundred dollars in counties having a population exceeding eight thousand population plus additional compensation of one hundred dollars per year for each one thousand additional population or major fraction thereof, but not to exceed the total sum of (((seven))) nine thousand dollars, and provided, however, that in counties where the population consists of more than twenty-five percent Indians who have not severed tribal relations, the county commissioners may adjust the salaries provided for herein within the limitations contained in this subdivision (((;))).
 - c. In counties having a population in excess of thirty thousand the sum of (((eight))) nine thousand five hundred dollars, except that the states attorneys in counties having a population exceeding thirty-five thousand shall receive a salary of from fourteen thousand to twenty thousand dollars, to be determined by resolution of the board of county commissioners.
 - d. The salary of the county superintendent of schools shall be determined by the county commissioners. However, the salary of the county superintendent of schools shall not be less than it was on July 1, 1968.

In counties having a county court of increased jurisdiction, the salaries of the judges of county courts of increased jurisdiction shall be as set out in section 27-08-08. The county superintendent of schools shall receive for any trips necessarily made within his county in the performance of school district reorganization duties the same mileage as he receives under the provisions of section 11-10-15. The board of county commissioners of any county may, by resolution, increase the salary of any full-time county official by an amount not to exceed ten percent above the salary provided in this section or section 27-08-08, if, in the judgment of such board, by reason of duties performed, the official merits the increase. Any county official performing duties on less than a full-time basis may be paid a salary set by the board of county commissioners in any amount up to ten percent less than the salary provided for that official in this section. However, no salary shall be less than it was on July 1, 1968.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT.) Section 11-16-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

11-16-02. ASSISTANT — APPOINTMENT — DUTIES.) The states attorney may appoint an assistant states attorney within his county, who, when he has qualified by filing his oath of office, shall have the same powers as, and shall perform any and all duties required of, the states attorney. The states attorney shall be responsible, under his official bond, for any and all acts of such assistant.

- Present a claim, account, or other demand for allowance against the county, except for his own services, nor in any way advocate the relief asked for by the claim or demand of another (((;))).
- 2. Be eligible to or hold any judicial office except that of United States commissioner (((;))).
- 3. Receive a fee or reward from or on behalf of a prosecutor or other individual for services in any prosecution or business to which it is his official duty to attend (((; or))).
- 4. Be concerned as attorney or counsel for any party, other than the state or county, in any civil action depending upon, or arising out of, a state of facts upon which a pending and undetermined criminal prosecution depends.
- 5. Be concerned as attorney or counsel for any party, other than the state or county, in any action or proceeding whatsoever when employed by a county having a population exceeding thirty-five thousand.

A violation of any provision of this section shall constitute a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than one hundred dollars and not more than five hundred dollars, and the offender may be removed from office.

SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE.) The provisions of this Act with respect to states attorneys in counties having a population in excess of thirty-five thousand shall not be mandatory until January 6, 1975, except that such states attorneys affected by this Act may elect to be subject to its provisions on July 1, 1971.

If the classification of any property for taxation purposes is changed from real to personal property or from personal to real property because of legislative or judicial action, the county auditor of the county in which the property is located shall forthwith certify to the tax commissioner the amount of real estate taxes or personal property taxes that was levied on all such property by each taxing district in the year 1968 and in any other year thereafter that the tax commissioner may request. The tax commissioner, in determining the amount to be certified to the state treasurer for payment to the county pursuant to this section, shall adjust the amounts of taxes certified by the county auditor as levied on real property and on personal property in 1968 and in any other year as may be necessary by adding to or substracting from each such amount the taxes on the reclassified property so that the distribution by the state to the county will be determined as though such property had been taxed in 1968 and all later years in the classification into which it was reclassified."

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR

STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA EXECUTIVE OFFICE Bismarck

Dear Mr. Speaker:

House Bill 1299 seeks to bring uniformity between our state and some other states in the application of consumer credit rates and practices. Generally speaking, it is advantageous for states to adopt uniform codes so that the complexity of the burgeoning volume of law can be minimized.

We must voice our gratitude to the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws for the substantial progress they are making to strengthen state government in the federal system by strengthening, through uniformity, the laws of the various states.

In my Message to the Legislature, I asked you to give serious consideration to the Uniform Consumer Credit Code. I recommended to its sponsors that it be introduced in this session, but with an adjustment in the Code's interest rates to existing North Dakota legal interest rate ceilings. There was an understandable reluctance to tamper with the Code, for in so doing its major feature, that of uniformity, would be breached.

House Bill 1299 is easily the most discussed piece of legislation in this session. It has generated by far the most communications to my office. The overwhelming reaction as reflected by communications to my office has been in opposition to the Uniform Consumer Credit Code. I do not believe all of the opposition is justified, for there seems to be misunderstanding and suspicion of what the Code would do.

There is a defensible point of view that the Code should be enacted and given a trial period to see if it would have beneficial application in North Dakota.

I called Governor Calvin Rampton of Utah to have his appraisal of the operation of the Uniform Consumer Credit Code in that state these past two years. Governor Rampton reported that the Code was implemented smoothly and that he knew of no problems or adverse reactions in its use.

The Code has been defended on the one hand and challenged on the other hand by many deep thinking individuals whose judgment I respect.

It has been very difficult to arrive at a decision in this legislation. I am, however, mindful that the North Dakota Attorney General's Office has advised the Speaker of the House that there is a strong legal possibility that the present North Dakota Small Loans Act was not repealed by the passage of House Bill 1299 because the Small Loans Act was enacted in 1960 by a vote of the people and would require a two-thirds vote of the Legislature to amend or repeal. A two-thirds vote was not obtained on House Bill 1299.

This leaves grave confusion as to the application of the interest rate section of House Bill 1299 as it applies to small loans and as it conflicts with the present North Dakota Small Loans Act. The interest rate section appears to be an all important part of House Bill 1299 and was of sufficient importance to the entire bill that its sponsors refused to amend it.

If House Bill 1299 had been in effect two years ago instead of the North Dakota Small Loans Act, it probably would have had a significant impact in higher interest rates for people in an income bracket who can least afford higher interest rates.

In the last fiscal year, there were 25,408 small loans made in North Dakota, for a total of \$15,725,212.66. The dollar interest cost of these loans in that year was \$2,358,786.88. Had the Uniform Consumer Credit Code been in effect in that year and had interest rates been at the ceiling as is usual under this Code, the interest rates paid by low income borrowers would have been \$2,692,168.24. This would have been an increase in interest costs for that year to low income borrowers of \$333,381.36.

It is obvious to me that the interest rates on small loans in the Uniform Consumer Credit Code, if implemented by legal opinion or decision, would work a substantial hardship on small loan borrowers, and while possibly justified in other areas, they do not appear to be justified in North Dakota.

But of even more importance in terms of total dollars involved is the increase in the maximum interest rates permissible on revolving charge accounts from $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ per month under present North Dakota law to 2% per month under the Uniform Consumer Credit Code.

There is no source to which we can turn in this state or in the nation to accurately judge the volume of revolving charge accounts or the cost of revolving charge account interest payments, but all indications are that the amount of money is very, very substantial.

Since thousands of retailers would be making the interest rate decision on revolving charge accounts under the Uniform Consumer Credit Code, it would be fair to assume that many, if not all, would move their interest charges to the maximum permissible. There are indications that many major retailers already regard the 1½% per month ceiling on revolving charge accounts as a lucrative source of income which has caused them to encourage wherever possible the use of deferred payment rather than cash purchase. Revolving charge account interest rates under the Code could be exorbitant to thousands of North Dakotans if allowed to rise to the 2% per month ceiling.

Aside from interest rates, there may be some very defensible provisions of House Bill 1299 which have to do with consumer protection.

However, North Dakota is not as deficient in consumer protection as are some other states.

I have been informed that the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws will submit a Uniform Consumer Protection Code to state legislatures within a year or two. It would appear to me that it would be advisable to wait until such consumer protection legislation is available as a companion measure to consider with the Uniform Consumer Credit Code.

I believe this state would benefit by observing the experiences in the next two years of such states as Utah and Indiana as they conduct credit business under the UCCC.

I, therefore, believe it is in the best interest of the public not to approve this legislation. Therefore, I veto House Bill 1299.

SECTION 2. LEGISLATIVE FINDING.) The legislature was cognizant and has taken into consideration the methods and procedures employed by the census bureau in taking the census and the creation of enumeration districts, which do not necessarily coincide with the geographic boundaries of political subdivisions such as townships and smaller cities. The legislature in numerous instances was required to interpolate and intercalate the population in rural areas, including townships and small cities, on information available. It is also known that many persons maintained a dual residence, one for voting purposes and one where they physically resided. It has been common practice for many persons (farmers) upon reaching semiretirement age or upon retiring, to locate in a city, but retain their residence on the farm. However, for census purposes, they were listed in the city's population. Because of these items, mathematical exactness or precision in population is impossible, and because of the cost and effort to produce the necessary information to accomplish this, it is impractical.

SECTION 3. NUMBERING LEGISLATIVE DISTRICTS—CLASSES OF SENATORS TO PROVIDE STAGGERED TERMS.) Senators shall be divided into two classes; those elected in legislative districts designated by even numbers shall constitute one class, and those elected in legislative districts designated by odd numbers shall constitute the other class. The senators of one class elected in the year 1972 shall hold their office for two years, those of the other class shall hold their office four years, and the determination of which class shall be elected for four years and which class shall be elected for two years shall be by lot. The president of the senate shall perform the lot in the presence of the majority and minority floor leaders of the senate and shall certify in writing the results of such lot to the secretary of state within thirty days after the effective date of this Act.

SECTION 4. LEGISLATIVE SUBDISTRICTING — METHODS.) Upon a petition accompanied by a map showing the boundaries of the proposed subdistricts and accompanied by a written description thereof filed with the secretary of state containing the signatures of at least that number of qualified electors of the legislative district equal to ten percent of the electors of the legislative district voted for the office of governor at the most recent general election at which such office was voted upon, asking that such legislative district be subdistricted into single-member representative districts or, in legislative districts with more than one senator, to be subdistricted into single-member senatorial districts, or both, the secretary of state shall determine and count the number of signatures and if such petitions contain the required number of signatures, such petition shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the district for their approval or rejection at the next special, primary, or general election held in such district.

SECTION 5. ELECTION ON PETITION — BALLOT FORM — VOTE REQUIRED.) The ballots used for submitting the question of subdistricting legislative districts in all cases wherein an election is required shall be in substantially the following form:

"Shall the (number of legislative district) legislative district be subdivided into (senatorial or representative districts or both) described as follows: (here insert description of subdistrict as described in the petition)

If there shall be more than one petition for subdistricting of the same legislative district, each different description of the subdistricts shall be placed upon such ballot and the ballot shall be marked "VOTE FOR ONE ONLY"

If one of the subdistricting descriptions as presented on the ballot shall receive a majority of the legal votes cast at such election, the secretary of state shall issue a proclamation stating such legislative district to be subdistricted pursuant to such description. Thereafter, senators or representatives shall reside in and be elected from such subdistricts as set forth in the approved petition for subdistricting. The question of subdistricting a legislative district shall not be voted upon more than once every two years.

- 6. The sixth district shall consist of Bottineau County and Willow Creek, Mouse River, Meadow, Deep River, Pratt, Normal, Bantry, Layton, Little Deep, Grilley, Wager, Gilmore, Saline,

- Deering, Riga, Egg Creek, Kottke Valley, Granville, and Norwich townships, including the cities of Upham, Bantry, Deering, and Granville, and the unorganized territory designated as townships 157-75, 157-76, and 158-76 in McHenry County.
- The seventh district shall consist of Pierce County and all of McHenry County, except that portion contained in the sixth district.
- 8. The eighth district shall consist of McLean County.
- 9. The ninth district shall consist of Rolette County.
- The tenth district shall consist of Cavalier and Towner Counties.
- 11. The eleventh district shall consist of Pembina County.
- The twelfth district shall consist of Benson and Eddy Counties.
- 13. The thirteenth district shall consist of the tenth, eleventh, twelfth, fourteenth, and fifteenth precincts in the city of Fargo, and Barnes and Reed townships, including the cities of West Fargo and West Fargo Industrial Park, in Cass County.

- 16. The sixteenth district shall consist of St. Andrews, Martin, Farmington, Glenwood, Acton, Oakwood, Grafton, Fertile, Kensington, Pulaski, Harriston, Walshville, and Ardoch townships, including the cities of Hoople, Grafton, Park River, Minto, and Ardoch, in Walsh County.

- 18. The eighteenth district shall consist of the city of Grand Forks and Grand Forks township in Grand Forks County, and shall be entitled to three senators and six representatives.
- The nineteenth district shall consist of all of Grand Forks County, except that portion contained in the eighteenth district
- 20. The twentieth district shall consist of Traill County and Noble, Kinyon, Bell, Hunter, Wiser, Gardner, Gunkel, and Arthur townships, including the cities of Grandin, Hunter, Gardner, and Arthur, in Cass County.
- 21. The twenty-first district shall consist of all of the city of Fargo, except that portion contained in the thirteenth district, and Fargo Township in Cass County, and shall be entitled to four senators and eight representatives.
- 22. The twenty-second district shall consist of all of Cass County, except those portions contained in the thirteenth, twentieth, and twenty-first districts.
- 23. The twenty-third district shall consist of Griggs and Steele Counties and all of Barnes County, except that portion contained in the twenty-fourth district.
- 24. - 31. The thirty-first district shall consist of Sheridan and Kidder Counties and all of Burleigh County, except that portion contained in the thirty-second district.
- 32. The thirty-second district shall consist of the city of Bismarck and Hay Creek township and the unorganized territory designated as Lincoln and Fort Rice precincts in Burleigh County, and shall be entitled to three senators and six representatives.
- 33. The thirty-third district shall consist of Mercer and Oliver Counties and all of Morton County, except those portions contained in the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth districts.
- 34. The thirty-fourth district shall consist of the city of Mandan and the unorganized territory designated as Crown Butte, Bindewald, Sweetbriar, Custer, and Highland precincts in Morton County.
- 35. The thirty-fifth district shall consist of Grant and Sioux Counties and the unorganized territory designated as Wenger, Rural, Albrecht, Columbia, Sims, Doll, Olin, Faust, Hermes, Buchli, Huff, Little Heart, Fallon, Stone, Fort Rice, Odense, and New Hope precincts, and Harmon township, including the cities of Almont and Flasher, in Morton County.
- 36. The thirty-sixth district shall consist of Dunn and McKenzie Counties.
- 37. The thirty-seventh district shall consist of the city of Dickinson and the unorganized territory designated as Pleasant Valley precinct in Stark County.
- 38. The thirty-eighth district shall consist of Adams and Hettinger Counties and all of Stark County, except those portions contained in the thirty-seventh and thirty-ninth districts.
- 39. The thirty-ninth district shall consist of Billings, Golden Valley, Slope, and Bowman Counties and the unorganized territory designated as Interstate, Fertile Valley, Gaylord, Little Badlands, Grand Meadow, Wild Rose, and Simpson precincts, and Slope, Ash Coulee, and South Heart townships, including the city of Belfield, in Stark County.

SECTION 2. LEGISLATIVE FINDING.) The legislature was cognizant and has taken into consideration the methods and procedures employed by the census bureau in taking the census and the creation of enumeration districts, which do not necessarily coincide with the geographic boundaries of political subdivisions such as townships and smaller cities. The legislature in numerous instances was required to interpolate and calculate the population in rural areas, including townships and small cities, on information available. It is also known that many persons maintained a dual residence, one for voting purposes and one where they physically resided. It has been common practice for many persons upon reaching semiretirement

age or upon retiring, to locate in a city, but retain their residence on a farm. However, for census purposes, they were listed in the city's population. Because of these items, mathematical exactness or precision in population is impossible, and because of the cost and effort to produce the necessary information to accomplish this, it is impractical.

SECTION 3. NUMBERING LEGISLATIVE DISTRICTS — CLASSES OF SENATORS TO PROVIDE STAGGERED TERMS.) Senators shall be divided into two classes; those elected in legislative districts designated by even numbers shall constitute one class, and those elected in legislative districts designated by odd numbers shall constitute the other class. The senators of one class elected in the year 1972 shall hold their office for two years, those of the other class shall hold their office for four years, and the determination of which class shall be elected for four years and which class shall be elected for two years shall be by lot. The president of the senate shall perform the lot in the presence of the majority and minority floor leaders of the senate and shall certify in writing the results of such lot to the secretary of state within thirty days after the effective date of this Act.

SECTION 4. LEGISLATIVE SUBDISTRICTING — METHODS.) Any legislative district which is represented by more than one senator may be subdistricted as provided in this Act to provide for all or portions of such district to be divided into single senatorial districts. Such legislative districts shall be subdistricted on the basis, of voting precincts. Upon the filing of a petition with the secretary of state for such subdistricting, together with a map showing the voting precincts to be included within the boundary of the proposed subdistrict or subdistricts and accompanied by a written description thereof, containing the signatures of at least ten percent of the number of qualified electors of each voting precinct included within the subdistrict or subdistricts that voted for the office of governor at the most recent general election at which such office was voted upon, the secretary of state shall determine and count the number of signatures on the petition. If the petition contains the required number of signatures, it shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the proposed subdistrict or subdistricts for their approval or rejection at the next special, primary, or general election held in such subdistrict or subdistricts. Each proposed subdistricting plan prepared and submitted in accordance with this section must provide that each proposed subdistrict or subdistricts shall be compact and contiguous and all voting precincts contained within the plan shall be adjacent to at least one other precinct in the subdistrict. No proposed subdivision or subdivisions shall contain a population which is either greater or lesser than the population of any single senatorial legislative district contained in section 1 of this Act, as calculated by reference to the 1970 federal decennial census.

SECTION 5. ELECTION ON PETITION — BALLOT FORM — VOTE REQUIRED.) The ballots used for submitting the question of subdistricting legislative districts in all cases wherein an election is required shall be in substantially the following form:

"Shall the (number of legislative district) legislative district be subdivided into (senatorial or representative districts or both) described as follows: (here insert description of subdistrict as described in the petition)

YES NO

If there shall be more than one petition for subdistricting of the same legislative district, each different description of the subdistricts shall be placed upon such ballot and the ballot shall be marked "VOTE FOR ONE ONLY".

If one of the subdistricting descriptions as presented on the ballot shall receive a majority of the legal votes cast at such election, the secretary of state shall issue a proclamation stating such legislative district to be subdistricted pursuant to such description. Thereafter, senators or representatives shall reside in and be elected from such subdistricts as set forth in the approved petition for subdistricting. The question of subdistricting a legislative district shall not be voted upon more than once every two years.

SECTION 6. REPEAL.) Sections 54-03-01, 54-03-01.1, 54-03-01.2, 54-03-01.3, and 54-03-01.4 of the 1965 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code, and chapter 338 of the 1965 North Dakota Session Laws are hereby repealed."

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

A RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, for the past six years, in order to move toward uniformity and equity in real property assessment, the State Board of Equalization has arbitrarily established 25% level of assessment on real property as a goal; and

WHEREAS, the State Board of Equalization on May 5, 1970, reaffirmed the 25% of real and true value as the average state assessment goal on all classifications of property; and

WHEREAS, the new 1970 sales ratio study published in December 1970 shows that the inflationary pressures in our economy have driven the true and full value of property upward and as a result the statewide average level of assessment on real property has dropped to 21.1%; and

WHEREAS, the State Board of Equalization recognizes that because of certain conditions surrounding local political subdivision mill levy limitations and because some local officials do not voluntarily lower mill levies when the tax base is broadened or assessed valuations are raised, and that general increases in the levels of real property assessment to reach the goal of a 25% level of assessment would automatically increase taxes; and

WHEREAS, the objective of the State Board of Equalization is to equalize levels of assessments and not to increase taxes;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the State Board of Equalization will equalize the line property levels of assessment in the various counties to the state average of approximately 21%, and, the State Board of Equalization in considering the increases or decreases in levels of assessment necessary to reach the average, as a general guideline will accept a 2% point difference above and below the state average as a reasonable tolerance.

Dear Senator Redlin:

This is in reply to your letter of March 3, 1971, relative to House Bill 1001 as amended by the House on pages 545 through 547 of the House Journal. You note the several pieces of legislation, both bills and resolutions, which have been introduced into the 42nd Legislative Assembly affecting the status of the institution of higher education at Ellendale. You note the effect of the legislation presently contained in House Bill 1001, as amended by the House, would require that UND — Ellendale Branch cease operation as an educa-

tional facility and that expenditures at the institution, for the period of July 1, 1971, to June 30, 1973, be limited to \$102,500 — consisting of an estimated income of \$70,000 and general fund monies of \$32,500 — with the funds to be used only for routine maintenance and custodial care. You then state the following question:

"Can the Forty-second Legislative Assembly, or for that matter, any legislative assembly, disregard the mandate of the North Dakota Constitution, in this case, section 216, by refusing to appropriate monies for the operation of a constitutionally established institution? Or, to put it another way, does not the existence of the institution in compliance with section 216 imply that the Legislative Assembly must appropriate funds for its operation in the manner and for the purpose for which it was established, specifically, higher education?"

Section 216 of the North Dakota Constitution provides in part: "The following named public institutions are hereby permanently located as hereinafter provided, each to have so much of the remaining grant of one hundred seventy thousand acres of land made by the United States for 'other educational and charitable institutions' as is allocated by law, namely:

Third: An industrial school and school for manual training or such other educational or charitable institution as the legislative assembly may provide at the town of Ellendale, in the county of Dickey, with a grant of forty thousand acres.

Seventh: (a) a state normal school at the city of Dickinson, the county of Stark. (b) a state hospital for the insane at such place within this state as shall be selected by the legislative assembly, provided, that no other institution of a character similar to any one of those located by this article shall be established or maintained without a revision of this constitution. (As amended by Articles 21 and 22 of the amendments to the constitution, both approved and ratified on November 7, 1916 S.L. 1913, cc. 96 and 99; S.L. 1915, cc. 84 and 85; S.L. 1917, pp. 407 and 408.)"

We note, in the first instance, that the institution at Ellendale need not under the Constitution necessarily be an institution of higher education. The above quoted constitutional provision specifies that it will be an industrial school and school for manual training or such other educational or charitable institution as the Legislative Assembly may provide. Thus the Legislature has permitted the institution to be made a branch of the University of North Dakota. See Section 15-11-02 of the North Dakota Century Code which permits the State Board of Higher Education to unite with the University of North Dakota, any college in the state and make such college a branch thereof. The Legislature could, if it so desired, prescribe that some other educational or charitable institution be situated at Ellendale. In reply to that portion of your question which indicates that the Legislature must appropriate money for the operation of an institution of higher education at Ellendale, it is our opinion that the Legislature could prescribe some other educational or charitable institution for that location without violating the provisions of the Constitution.

However, the Legislature has not, to our knowledge, prescribed any institution other than an institution of higher education for Ellendale. Therefore, we must consider that portion of your question which refers to the obligation of the Legislature to appropriate moneys for the institution established at Ellendale, i.e., a branch of the University of North Dakota.

With respect to this question, we have no judicial precedents in this state which are directly in point and to which we can look for guidance. To our knowledge this is, insofar as the legal question is concerned, a question of first impression.

As to the proposition whether or not there is a mandate by the Constitution, Section 21 states that the provisions of this Constitution are mandatory and prohibitory unless by express words they are declared to be otherwise. This taken in itself indicates that the Constitution probably did contain a mandate to the Legislature to carry out the provisions of Section 216 of the North Dakota Constitution. Even though this is a mandate or can be considered as a mandate, Section 216 is not a self-executing provision of the Constitution and requires implementation by the Legislature. We must recognize a distinction between a self-executing provision of the Constitution and a provision which requires implementation by the Legislature. As an example, the North Dakota Supreme Court with reference to a provision contained in Section 25 of the North Dakota Constitution, relating to the publishing of the publicity pamphlet said that this provision was self-executing and needed no implementation by the Legislature. In State ex rel. Byrne vs. Baker, 65 ND 190, 262 NW 183, it was specifically recognized that Section 25 contained the following provision: "This section shall be self-executing and all of its provisions treated as mandatory." We do not have a similar provision in Section 216 of the North Dakota Constitution.

It might be argued with some success that the legislators are bound to follow the Constitution and have taken an oath to support the Constitution, but the ultimate question is what body in our three branches of government can compel the Legislature to act in a certain manner? We are satisfied that the courts may not issue a mandate to the Legislature because both are separate co-equal, coordinated branches of government. Therefore, even if the argument could be validly made that the Legislature should follow the dictates of the Constitution, there are no means available of enforcing the taking of certain action as distinguished from declaring action taken by the Legislature as being invalid or unconstitutional. It would appear in the final analysis that there is no way of compelling the Legislature to act.

We note that the constitutional provision above quoted does not refer to appropriations made by the Legislature. It provides that certain institutions, among them the one at Ellendale, are permanently located at the places named and grants to such institution a specified amount of grant lands for their support. Thus, it could be argued that the constitution only requires the location of a specific institution at the sites named and does not necessarily require that such institutions be operated or that moneys be appropriated for the actual operation of such institutions. While such a conclusion may be derived from a literal reading of the constitutional provision, we believe that such result would be impractical and therefore favor the position that the constitutional provision indicated that an operating institution would be situated at the sites named. One such institution had actually become operative.

Whether such a conclusion can be sustained legally may be subject to question. While we believe it is the most practical construction to give the constitutional provision, we must note there is authority for a contrary view. The Supreme Court of North Dakota in construing this provision (but with respect to a different question) stated: "There is still another principle bearing directly upon this question. It may be thus stated: When the legislative assembly repeatedly construes or interprets a constitutional provision, such construction or interpretation should be followed by the courts, when

it can be followed without doing violence to the fair meaning of the words used, in order to support the legislative action and give effect thereto, if the language construed admits of such construction." See State vs. Taylor, 133 NW 1046, 1051 (ND 1911).

In this respect we find there is precedent for this kind of action. The 1895 and 1897 sessions of the Legislative Assembly appropriated funds for the institutions of higher learning prescribed in the Constitution. The 1895 Session Laws indicate the only moneys appropriated were for janitor salary and maintenance of buildings. See e.g., Chapter 18 of the 1895 Session Laws with respect to the appropriation for the University of North Dakota. In fact, however, the Legislature had appropriated more funds including funds for salaries, etc., but such funds were vetoed by the Governor. In 1897 the funds for the operation of the institutions of higher learning were also vetoed, but the Legislature overrode the Governor's veto. See e.g., Chapter 8 of the 1897 Session Laws. Therefore, the institutions received no state support for actual operating costs in the biennium of 1895 to 1897. The institutions, such as the University of North Dakota, did operate through donations, etc. See Geiger, University of Northern Plains, University of North Dakota Press, 1958.

In 1923 the Governor vetoed the operating appropriation for the Forestry State Normal School at Bottineau leaving only the appropriations for maintenance of grounds, general repairs and dormitory maintenance, in the total amount of \$950 for the biennium in effect. See Chapter 58, 1923 Session Laws.

To our knowledge, these vetoes, which had the effect of denying the institutions the means with which to operate, were never challenged in the courts of this state. Whether such veto would have been sustained in the courts may be open to question in view of the decision of the North Dakota Supreme Court in **State ex rel.**Dahl vs. Dewing, 131 NW 2d 434 (ND 1964) in which the court held the Governor had no power to veto a line item appropriation for the salary of the director of the State Laboratory Commission, as the veto would have the effect of making an initiated measure ineffective in violation of Section 25 of the North Dakota Constitution providing that an initiated or referred measure may be amended or repealed only by vote of two-thirds of the Legislative Assembly. we are to construe the provisions of the Constitution concerning the we are to construe the provisions of the Constitution concerning the institutions of higher learning as requiring their actual operation rather than merely the location of same, the decision in the Dahl case, supra, would appear to be applicable with regard to the exercise of a veto of an operating appropriation by the Governor. If, on the other hand, the constitutional provision is merely considered to be a statement requiring the location of a specific institution at a specific site, then the decision would not appear to be applicable. As noted above, the exercise of the Governor's veto in 1895 and 1923 removing all operating funds from some of the institutions of higher learning was not challenged in the courts. The Governor's veto is a part of the legislative process. It may, therefore, be argued the construction of this constitutional provision by the Legislature in effect requires the location of a specific institution at a given location only and does not require the actual operation of such institution. This argument would apparently bring the question within the ruling of the North Dakota Supreme Court in **State vs. Taylor**, supra, and the Court, if this question were presented to them, could conceivably hold that Section 216 of the Constitution requires the location of the institutions at a specific site only and not the actual operation of such institutions, that being a matter for legislative determination.

The issue in the Taylor case concerned an amendment to the Constitution establishing a state normal school at Minot and involved the question of whether the provision in the Constitution that no other institution of a character similar to any one of those located

by Article XIX could be established or maintained without a revision of the Constitution (see Subdivision Seven of Section 216 of the North Dakota Constitution quoted above) meant the Constitution must be revised by Constitutional Convention or whether it could be done by amendment presented to the electorate by the Legislature. The Court also considered whether an appropriation for the school was valid insofar as it was based on a provision that it should become available only if the citizens of Minot should donate a suitable location of not less than sixty acres for the institution. The Court in this regard stated, Page 1052 of the reported case:

"The state contends that this is not a valid appropriation because not effective except upon the action of the citizens of Minot. It appears to us that this point is not well taken. The Legislature, in effect, said: 'It will require \$200,000 to put this school into operation during the next two years, and in addition to that, sufficient to procure a suitable site. The school is located by the Constitution at Minot, but it is discretionary with the legislative assembly when to provide an appropriation and to determine the amount necessary to set the school in operation. We have not sufficient money available for the purpose at this time. If the citizens of Minot are enough interested in the subject to furnish the site, and thereby relieve the state from that burden, we will make an appropriation of so much money as is available; the amount named to be subject to use if and when the site is furnished.' "We see no reason why this is not a valid exercise of legislative power, under circumstances like these.***" (emphasis ours)

Such statement does lend weight to the argument that the Constitutional provision only specifies the location of a given institution and does not necessarily require the actual operation of such institution. The provision does prohibit the operation of a similar institution at any other location without an amendment to the Constitution. In addition we have no doubt that the income from the forty thousand acres of grant land for the institution at Ellendale can be used for no other purpose. We assume the seventy thousand dollars appropriated for the maintenance of the institution at Ellendale is derived from that income although we have no specific evidence of that fact.

We further note that the 1889 Constitutional Debates also contain some statements indicating that the location of the institutions was directory and the Legislature would have the discretion as to when and how to operate same. See e.g., Page 483 of the 1889 Constitutional Debates. While these statements are not conclusive, they are indicative of the intent of the Constitutional Convention in adopting this provision of the Constitution.

Whatever the theoretical decision might be with regard to this entire question, i.e., whether the Constitution requires the location and actual operation of an institution at a given location, or whether the Constitution does not require the actual operation but only prescribes the location of a given institution and prohibits a similar institution to be situated anywhere else without a constitutional amendment, there is another aspect of the question which cannot be overlooked. Even if it is determined that the Constitution requires the actual operation of an institution, thus requiring the Legislature to appropriate funds for such operation, this does not answer the question of how the Legislature can be forced to appropriate funds, as a matter of law, for any given institution or the amount which is to be appropriated. Thus, if we were to hold the Constitution required the Legislature to maintain an operating institution at Ellendale and to appropriate the necessary funds therefore, we would be able to provide no answer to the question of how the Legislature could be forced to do so. We deem this observation

appropriate in this discussion since the question presented involves an appropriation measure.

In summary, we favor a view that once the Legislature has, in accordance with the Constitution, established an operating institution they have an obligation to continue that institution until such time as the Constitution might be amended. This view is based on the practical consideration which has been given the constitutional provisions in the past. However, as noted above, we realize the matter is by no means free from doubt and that there is considerable collateral precedent which supports a contrary view. In this respect should the Legislature enact the appropriation bill in its present form, we assume the Court, if the matter is presented to them, would, in view of the rules of constitutional construction, resolve every possible doubt in favor of the constitutionality of the bill. We must therefore candidly admit there is a good possibility the courts would construe the bill in its present form as constitutional.

Dear Mr. Speaker:

The 1969 Legislature created the five-member Advisory Board to the Bank of North Dakota. The members of the Board are appointed by the Governor for terms of from one to four years. The Governor appoints a chairman, vice chairman, and secretary of the board.

The present law gives the Advisory Board the duty of formulating recommendations to the Industrial Commission relative to the operation of the Bank of North Dakota.

The Advisory Board to the Bank of North Dakota is made up of highly qualified and prestigious people in several fields of finance. It has been a very productive board and its influence is reflected in many policies now followed by the Industrial Commission as that Commission directs the activities of the Bank of North Dakota.

There may have been some advantages to be gained in amending the legal responsibility of the Advisory Board as the law relates it to the creation of a \$100 million capital pool. This directive in the law was pursued by the Advisory Board in the past year and it was not found feasible to create such a capital pool.

House Bill 1115 does nothing to improve the operation of the Advisory Board to the Bank of North Dakota. In fact, it weakens the activity of the Advisory Board and is another case of diluting the necessary line of responsibility and authority between the Governor and departments and agencies in his Administration.

House Bill 1115 unnecessarily enlarges the membership on the Advisory Board to the Bank of North Dakota from five to seven.

In the process, it includes the President of the Bank of North Dakota as an ex officio member and the Board's secretary.

Since the Advisory Board, in its studies, must remain independent from influence by the management of the Bank of North Dakota, the inclusion of the President as an ex officio Board member weakens the ability of the Advisory Board to approach bank policy, practices and personnel in a candid and frank manner.

The President of the Bank of North Dakota is further instructed

by this legislation to furnish personal services and information if the majority of the Board so request. The term "personal service" is very vague and questionable, but even more serious the law permits the Bank of North Dakota President to vote and thereby contribute to a majority decision as to whether or not he should furnish "personal services" and information. This is a ponderous arrangement which further underlines the inadvisability of the President of the Bank of North Dakota's being a member of the Advisory Board.

House Bill 1115 takes away the authority of the Governor to appoint Advisory Board members and places this authority in the three-member Industrial Commission.

There seems to be a constant effort by the Legislature to erode the authority of the Chief Executive of our state. Sometimes I believe laws regarding the Chief Executive are considered on the basis of the person holding the position rather than on the basis of long-range effect on state government.

The authority of the Chief Executive and his Administration should be made stronger and not weaker, and this authority should not be diluted or completely eliminated by spreading it over other elected or appointed officials.

It should be obvious to those who observe the operation of partisan politics within the Legislature that the same condition exists in the Executive Branch of government when some elected officials may differ in their political party and governmental philosophy from that of the Governor.

A Governor is expected to form an Administration and assume the responsibility and authority for that Administration. To dilute or diminish his authority is not in the public interest, nor is it consistent with responsible state government.

Of a minor nature, but still significant, is the requirement in HB 1115 that the Advisory Board meet once a month. This requirement presupposes that there will be enough work to warrant meeting once a month, and that the members have the time to devote to a meeting once a month. Neither of these suppositions is necessarily valid, and to include what should be administrative decision as a requirement fixed in law is not good legislation.

Because this legislation does nothing to strengthen an already productive Advisory Board to the Bank of North Dakota, I veto House Bill 1115.

The resolution goes on to state that the Secretary recently pointed out, that agricultural income is at a very low ebb or at the lowest percentage of income ever, and that the farmer does not have an adequate share of the economy. I do not believe that the Secretary is sincere in worrying about the farmers income.

"Within the last 2 years, he has lowered the loan rates of oats, barley, rye, and flax. If we take the average yield in these 4 commodities for the last 3 years, times the lowered loan rate, we will have a net loss of \$29,470,000.00 in 1971. This loss of gross income for the North Dakota farmer comes right off the top. This is a severe blow to agriculture of our state. The loan rate sets the bottom price of grain. This loss of income to our state will be reflected in the farmer's net income and will affect the reserve balance of our state.

"We worry about bringing in new industries, and there has been nothing done in this legislature so far, to bring to the attention of anyone what this 20 million loss means. Furthermore, when the Secretary called in our 1967-68 wheat, this decision lowered the price of wheat in North Dakota from 10¢ to 15¢ bushel, this call in of this

grain in early winter, had a disastrous effect on our grain market and is contributing to the final disposal of many more farmers and the destruction of our small towns and communities. The Secretary has not been friendly to North Dakota Agriculture. I therefore, cannot support this resolution."

Rep. Atkinson requested that his remarks in regard to the Governor's veto of Senate Bill No. 2066 be printed in the Journal. "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House:

"In a few moments we will vote on the Governor's veto of Senate Bill 2066. As the Governor has chosen to make this a matter of partisan politics it seems likely that the House vote will not overturn the veto. However, it would not be fair to the people of North Dakota to let the misstatements of the veto message stand alone in

the Journal of this House. That is why I ask that these remarks be recorded.

"Senate Bill 2066 deals with the Corrupt Practices Act of North Dakota. This is the law which regulates the conduct of political candidates and their supporters. It has been in effect for many years for the purpose of defining what is improper and illegal conduct in political activities.

"Until the Governor's veto, this bill has not been a partisan issue. It was introduced with the unanimous support of the Judiciary Committee of the Legislative Council. It passed the Senate by a vote of 48 to 0. In the House the bill was approved by a vote of 66 to 13, a vote which clearly indicated support by members of both political parties.

"The bill was heard by the House Judiciary Committee on February 8. It was presented and explained by Mr. Paul Sand, the first assistant attorney general. Mr. Sand is an attorney who receives, and is entitled to have, the respect of all members of this legislature for his knowledge and legal abilities, and his neutral position regarding legislation, particularly so far as it might have any political implications.

"It has never been a secret that the need for this bill grew out of the Minot bank scandal, and certain court rulings which followed the grand jury investigation. It has never been seriously disputed that bank depositors' funds were being used in connection with political purposes including substantial contributions to candidates and political party activities.

"Following the grand jury investigation criminal charges were issued against a number of persons. These charges were later dismissed because of what the court viewed as a technical defect in the Corrupt Practices Act. Because of this dismissal no trial was ever held to determine the guilt or innocence of the persons who had been charged. The innocent had no trial to allow their names to be publicly cleared. The guilty, if some were found to be such, had no trial to assure justice for their offenses. The people of North Dakota were denied a public trial so as to understand the extent of involvement by public officials.

"The purpose of Senate Bill 2066 is to correct this technical defect. It is intended to assure that the intent of the Corrupt Practices Act is followed and that proper investigations of violations can be carried out. The bill would allow bringing to trial those who have been found by grand jury investigations to have possibly violated the law.

"The Governor, by his veto, has prevented effective enforcement of the Corrupt Practices Act and investigation by grand jury proceedings. By his veto he has attempted to assure protection to his political friends from further inquiry into the Minot bank scandal.

"Of even greater concern is the fact that by his veto the Governor of North Dakota has chosen to publicly associate himself with the Minot bank scandal and the events surrounding it. Every citizen of North Dakota will be expecting a full explanation from their Governor as to the meaning and full implications of this association."

Rep. Backes: "Mr. Speaker:

"I request that my remarks be printed in the Journal.

"There is a saying that let those with no sin cast the first stone, and I think it really applies here.

"I don't consider the Attorney General's office of North Dakota having been anointed or their pronouncements as being infallible, and just because they stood up and said this was needed in order to try certain individuals in a bank case, I don't think it is proper procedure on this floor. Everyone standing on this floor knows what he says here is protected by immunity, and we are going to try and repeal a statute of immunity that has been on the books for fifty or

sixty years. Is this within the meaning of justice? Or is this an attempt at vindication of the Attorney General of North Dakota and the Ward County States Attorney for their incompetence?

"What do we do when we repeal this immunity statute? It is like when you take a child and bring him to you and say you are going to whip him if he tells you what he did, and you are also going to whip him if he doesn't tell you. We would be saying that the Grand Jury is not useable with the immunity statute, and is even less useable when the immunity statute is removed.

"I think some of you do not understand what happens in a grand jury. I didn't know when I went before the grand jury. That was the first one I had been before, and I believe the last grand jury in the state was in 1937. You have the prosecutor in the room. Your attorney is not with you. There is no judge in the room, and your attorney has no voice in the selection of the jurors. If the prosecutor there doesn't like you, he brings the evidence to that jury that he wants to have before that jury. That is a case of railroading in a jury.

"I think that if we are going to talk about what happened up there, you should look at my own election. People in my home town didn't think I was guilty. They elected me by a margin of four to one. They know me better than the grand jury. If we are going to talk about who should be investigated, we should look at the \$21 million spent for President Nixon's campaign. He didn't raise that at bake sales. That came from somewhere other than dollar donations and bake sales. No one is perfect.

"There was an insinuation there is a scandal. Who makes it a scandal? The person who says it is. Can you say it is a scandal? Not me. I don't buy that. I think that if you want to eliminate the one thing that makes a grand jury workable, you are wrong. I introduced a bill this session to make a grand jury more workable. It would have allowed an attorney to be appointed by both political parties when we go into political fishing expeditions.

"If a grand jury is useless with the statute, then it is more useless without the immunity provision."

Rep. Atkinson: "Mr. Speaker:

"I have a great personal regard for my colleague Rep. Backes, and my remarks were not directed toward him.

"I believe the question remains unanswered and will remain unanswered until Governor Guy makes a public explanation of his veto of Senate Bill No. 2066. In support of that, I would like to refer to a copy of the criminal judgment dated September 24, 1970, and the criminal indictment dated December 8, 1969.

"I would like to make these a part of the Journal of this House.

- Count 15 The Defendant shall pay a fine of \$1000.00 and costs of \$1000.00.

"INDICTMENT

"Indictment under Section 16-20-08 of the North Dakota Century Code, as amended, making unlawful political contributions by a corporation in the years of 1966 and 1968, in which State-wide elections were held.

I.

The Grand Jury of the County of Ward, in the Fifith Judical District, State of North Dakota, duly and legally impaneled, charged and sworn according to law in open Court at the special October term of the District Court in the year 1969, in and for the said County and State, in the name and by the authority of the State of North Dakota, does hereby charge that at different times in the years of 1966 and 1968, up to May 19, 1969, the First Western State Bank at Minot, North Dakota, a corporation organized and incorporated under the laws of the State of North Dakota, and doing business in this State, did directly or indirectly pay, use, offer, consent, or agree to pay or use, any money, property or anything of value to aid a political party, committee or organization, or to aid a corporation or association organized or maintained for political purposes, or to aid candidates for political office, which political contributions were in violation of the provisions of Section 16-20-08 of the North Dakota Century Code, as amended, and were made, wholly or substantially, by one or more of the following methods, or combinations thereof:

A. The said corporation acquired control of a license agency on or about October 9, 1967, and employed deceptive, circuitous methods in making political contributions by and through such license agency so as to make it appear that such contributions and secretarial services for political purposes came from the earnings of the license agency, whereas, in fact, the political contributions substantially exceeded the earnings of said license agency and consisted of funds of the First Western State Bank which were made available by allowing overdrafts on the License Agency's checking account, making available to said License Agency and allowing it to use proceeds of loans from said bank on notes executed by Jeannie Quick, with the oral

understanding and agreement that no demand or collection will be enforced by said bank against Jeannie Quick for such notes, by fictitious loans made by said bank on notes executed in the names of Leonard and Alfred Pietsch, the proceeds of which were used to remove from the bank records loans made by said Jeannie Quick and overdrafts of the License Agency, by using funds of said bank to pay the salary of Jeannie Quick while she was managing the License Agency and not performing any services for said bank.

- B. The First Western State Bank encouraged the activation of and financed the North Dakota Secretarial Service the successor to the Ward County Research and Development Company, to perform stenographic and clerical services for political candidates or organizations which, as of May 19, 1969, had not paid for such services, but the costs were financed from the proceeds of a loan made by the First Western State Bank on a note executed by Glory Ann Dickinson with the oral understanding that no demand or collection will be enforced against said Glory Ann Dickinson on said note, and from proceeds of a loan on a note executed by the First Western Management Company in favor of Leonard Pietsch, for which a real estate loan with said bank by Leonard Pietsch was reduced in the amount of the Glory Ann Dickinson note, which was later removed from the records of the said bank from the proceeds of fictitious notes of Leonard and Alfred Pietsch, and in this manner the said First Western State Bank made political contributions in violation of law by and through such North Dakota Secretarial Service.
- C. The said bank also expended its funds in making available for political purposes goods, materials, and typing equipment without charging or being reimbursed for same;
- D. The said bank paid from its funds salaries, fees or wages to certain persons for performing political services; and
- E. The said bank in certain instances allowed overdrafts on checking accounts, which accounts were known by said bank to be used solely or primarily for political purposes and activities.

The specific violations are, to wit:

COUNT 1.

That said First Western State Bank, as stated and charged in Paragraph I. above, did in the year of 1968 make political contributions in violation of Section 16-20-08 of the North Dakota Century Code to the campaign activities of Hubert H. Humphrey, the Democrat candidate for United States President, in the manner set forth in Paragraph A. above, by making a payment from the License Agency on June 22, 1968, in the amount of \$420.00 to the United Democrats for Humphrey.

COUNT 5.

That said First Western State Bank, as stated and charged in Paragraph I. above, did at different times in the year of 1968, make political contributions in violation of Section 16-20-08 of the NDCC to the campaign activities of William L. Guy, the Democrat-NPL candidate for Governor of the State of North Dakota, by paying the salary and expenses of Robert Larson as Chairman of "The Dakotans for Guy", from the funds of said bank through the License Agency as described in Paragraph A. and from funds described in Paragraph D. above.

COUNT 15.

That said First Western State Bank, as stated and charged in Paragraph I. above, did make political contributions in violation of Section 16-20-08 of the NDCC to the campaign activities of Douglas Sutter, a candidate for Alderman of the Fifth Ward of the City of Minot, in a special election originally scheduled to be held April 15, 1969, but which was actually held on June 17, 1969, by permitting the account entitled "Sutter Campaign Fund" to be created

by an overdraft on March 19, 1969, and continued to be overdrawn to July 16, 1969, in the amount of \$1,656.73, which amount has been charged off as a loss.

CONTRARY to the form of the statute in such case made and provided, and against the peace and dignity of the State of North Dakota.

Rep. Wagner moved that the Assembly go into a special order of business, and that Rep. Dick be asked to preside, which motion prevailed.

Rep. Dick came to the rostrum to preside.

Rep. Dick called Rep. Boustead to the rostrum.

Rep. Boustead: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the Assembly:

"I am most pleased to have been granted the opportunity to participate in this event. Particularly so because of the man to whom I am to make not one, but two, presentations. He is a good friend of both yours and mine. Politics is not unlike salesmanship, both professions are most exciting and dear to me. It is the science and art of dealing with people, of convincing them that your views are right and in the public interest, and of persuading them that it is to their advantage to join with you in getting your proposals accepted. We, as legislators, are of course familiar with the function of government — particularly state government, county government and city government. However, we have in our midst, a gentleman, one who, through dogged determination, has made each and every one of us cognizant of the importance to him of the function and place of township government within the entire scheme of government.

"It is perhaps not exactly necessary to call him by name but would Hank Weber please step forward to the rostrum?

"Hank, on behalf of the Finance and Taxation Committee and the Transportation Committee of the 42nd Legislative Assembly, who have heard you expound on the merits of township government, we are most pleased to present you this little token.

"Now, Mr. Speaker and Members of the Assembly, I would like to be dead serious for a few moments.

"The basic responsibility of a self-governing people is to cast intelligent votes in the hope of electing thoughtful and hard working men and women to our State Legislature. This is exactly what happened when the citizens of rural Cass County, the 22nd District, elected Hank Weber. By the same token, such a basic responsibility exists when in our caucuses we cast intelligent votes in electing thoughtful and hard working men to provide the leadership necessary to cause their party to function properly and smoothly during the session. This was accomplished by the minority party when they elected Hank Weber to the position of Assistant Minority Floor Leader.

"I say, Mr. Speaker, a more outstanding characteristic is his friendship with so many, his friendly smile, firm handshake, manly bearing, and his sincerity reveals his strong character and leaves no doubt that he is a leader among men — an outstanding legislator."

Rep. Weber: "Rep. Boustead, Mr. Speaker, and Members of this Assembly:

"With all these fine words that have been said, I just can't believe they are true. Thank you very much."

Rep. Dick called Rep. Fleming to the rostrum.

Rep. Fleming:

"Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Assembly:

"As the session draws to a close, it is appropriate that we reecognize the extra efforts required of the leadership of this House. The task which they have been assigned is indeed a difficult one. Their responsibilities are great. Their selection to leadership positions indicates the faith of the membership in their abilities.

"I have had the privilege to serve on the Political Subdivisions Committee with the Assistant Majority Leader. Certainly the discussion at times in that committee has been heated. More often than not, Rep. Strinden and I have been on opposite sides of the major issues coming before that committee. Rep. Strinden has not been timid in making his opinions known in those deliberations, nor have I. It is in this healthy atmosphere that the legislative process churns, hopefully producing the finest product that will benefit the people of our state.

"As Assistant Majority Leader, Rep. Strinden has on occasion cracked the whip in an effort to seek unity amongst the membership of the majority party on various issues. Even the most casual observer of this assembly recognizes that that task is a very difficult one. As a partisan of the opposite party, I would point out that he too often has been successful in those endeavors. But no man, regardless of his political persuasion, cannot help but respect and admire an individual who understands his job, accepts responsibilities, and makes a dedicated effort to meet those responsibilities. Rep. Strinden has certainly met that criteria.

"Certainly the memories of this session, Rep. Strinden, will remain with you throughout your lifetime. But to add to those memories, I am happy to present this gift to you on behalf of the entire membership of this assembly for your efforts as Assistant Majority Leader during this session."

Rep. Strinden:

"Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the 42nd Assembly:

"A special tribute to Floor Leader Hoffner and Assistant Minority Floor Leader Weber. These gentlemen have served their party and this Legislature in a most responsible manner. Political bickering has been kept to a minimum. We have worked together in the best

interests of the citizens of North Dakota.

"As we near the time for the sine die motion, all of us welcome the chance to return home and getting back to normal life. Yet, I am sure we all feel a tinge of sadness with the end of this 42nd Assembly. We are part of a great fraternity; friendships made here will be cherished and continued for a lifetime. It has been a real honor to serve with each and every one of you.

"Good luck. Best wishes to each of you.

"Thank you again for the privilege of being a colleague in the 42nd Assembly."

Rep. Dick called Rep. Hilleboe to the rostrum.

Rep. Hilleboe:

"Mr. Dick, Members of the Assembly:

"Members of the Assembly I have had a few problems when attending this Session — not while in the capitol, but in the City of Bismarck. There is one member of this Assembly who seems to bear a resemblance to me. His hair is quite long and he has sideburns. Well, it seems that this particular member has been covering certain watering spots in town and there are some people who have gotten the two of us mixed up. I hold in my hand a card I received in this chamber, a mash card addressed to me and signed by the name Virginia. I don't know anyone named Virginia. So, at this time, I should like to present a gift from the members of this Assembly and return the card that must belong to my good friend Slingshot Hoffman, and request that he reads the card to the members of this Assembly."

Rep. Hoffner:

"Thank you for those kind words, Pete."

"I want to thank the members of this Assembly for recognizing me as a leader. I want to thank the caucus for electing me as their leader. I don't know what is in this gift, but I will cherish it very

much, you can be sure.

"Rep. Strinden mentioned that we have had a good session, and I would like to say, and I am sure I am speaking for all the Minority members, that we have been treated very fairly by the Speaker, by the Majority Floor Leader, Rep. Strinden and by all the Chairmen of all the Committees, and this is very important in making a democratic legislative process work. You know, when men and women can sit in the same Chamber — the reason I mention women is because we have started to treat these ladies like fellow legislators; and this noon at our luncheon, Rep. Mushik was pleased that we didn't treat her as a female legislator, and I told her we were disappointed she didn't turn her charms more often and try to tease us. It is amazing that legislators can move from document to document and be opposed to an individual across the aisle on one and then shift and be with him on the next bill. I can remember the session when we used to have some real political knifing, and some

days the Minority and Majority members couldn't talk to each other for three and four days.

"I have gotten to sort of enjoy this session when I can sit over there and oppose a big man like Art Bunker on the Uniform Commercial Credit Code, and then look up at him in the aisle, shudder and be friendly. I think you have conducted yourselves as real statesmen, and I mean that in all sincerity.

"People often like to criticize legislators, county commissioners, council supervisors, and this is natural for the people. If we don't do anything else when we leave here, I hope we all go back and defend the projects we have supported in this legislative process. I think we should all go back and be leaders. I am your leader and Rep. Streibel is your leader, and we are all leaders, and when you go home you must exert your leadership.

"I want to thank you everyone, the staff at the desk, the Speaker, and if everything would go right we could be going home in a few hours. If not, we can sit here and take a swing or two at the Senate.

"Thank you very much."

Rep. Dick called Rep. Lundene to the rostrum.

Rep. Lundene:

"I am really pleased to be selected to be part of this program today. It reminds me of the time I was invited to say something at a Labor Day exercise. I was informed that the program would include a talk by the Mayor, a recitation by a student, my remarks, and then the firing squad.

"Mr. Speaker, Members of the Assembly. This Assembly is made up of 98 persons, both sexes, both parties, several religious faiths, a number of nationalities, and a wide variance of ages and philosophies.

"It became the obligation of one of the majority party acting as their floor leader to assume the leadership and management of this entire Assembly. This is as it should be. Keeping these 98 persons, each one an individual in his own right, working toward a common goal for completion of an enormous work load in the sixty legislative days alloted to us, was part of his assignment.

"The Republican party, which is the majority party in this 42nd Legislature, chose this leader, and they chose well.

"Bryce Streibel, your ability to guide this maze of legislation through this House and within the framework of a set of complicated set of rules, has not gone unnoticed. I, for one, have marveled on how you have been able to keep every parliamentary situation at your fingertips.

"Ladies and Gentlemen of this Assembly, it was my privilege to watch the elder Streibel in operation on the Senate floor, and it wouldn't surprise me if Bryce cut his teeth on a legislative rule book, or Roberts Rules of Order."

"Majority Floor Leader Streibel, we of the minority recognize in you a man of fairness, and we want you to know that though we may differ on some questions, you have earned our respect and everlasting friendship.

"In behalf of the entire Assembly, it gives me a great deal of satisfaction to be able to give you this expression of our esteem in which you are held by this House of Representatives."

Rep. Streibel:

"As we approach the twilight hours of the 42nd Assembly we are prone to reminisce rather than to project. In this special order of business we exchange verbal bouquets and it's only fitting and proper that we should do this.

"I am indebted to each one of you for your unfailing attitude of cooperation which allowed us to expedite the work of the House

in an orderly and business-like manner. To Representative Hoffner and our 39 colleagues of the Minority, let me say that I consider our working relationship to be one of the highlights of this or any other Session. To my 57 colleagues of the Majority, my thanks for your loyalty and for overlooking my many shortcomings. I want to pay special tribute to Earl Strinden whose ability, capacity for work and dedication provided invaluable assistance to my office. To our Speaker, Howard, for your fairness, diligence and cooperation, a personal thanks.

"In the 14 years I have served in this House we have seen much change and most of it has been good. We have seen responsive refinement on every level. We have been a part of improved efficiency that has allowed for the processing of work loads that have doubled. We have been pleased by the minimization of political bickering. We have observed the application of more and more

business management guidelines in state government.

"State governments are unquestionably on trial today! The States form the keystone in the arch of the federal system — the bridge between local governments concerned with community problems and a central government dealing with nationwide issues. Our three-level federalism leaves the National government with the money, local governments with the problems, and the States with the legal powers. If States do not adopt modern structural frameworks to replace archaic constitutions, if State Legislators do not become responsive to the needs and desires of people, if weak executive branches of government are not substituted for strong chief executive structures, if uncoordinated court systems are not rationalized to allow for more orderly process of caseloads, then State government's role in the federal system will continue to diminish and the urban-federal partnership will strengthen.

"To those of you who will return, let me caution you of this: If we are not willing to pay the price, if we cannot change where change is required, then we have only one recourse. And that is to prepare for an orderly transfer of our remaining responsibilities to the federal government.

"If we are willing to pay the price, if we do bring about change where change is required then we will truly live our role as Lincoln defined it when he said, and I quote, 'I like to see a man proud of the place in which he lives; and so live that the place will be proud of him.'"

Rep. Dick called Rep. Bunker to the rostrum.

Rep. Bunker:

"It is indeed my pleasure to present a token of our esteem and recognition to the Majority Party Caucus Chairman, and I speak for everyone when I say I don't know of anyone who conducts a caucus on a more fair basis when it is fair for Burleigh County than Vern Wagner does.

"I think you have heard this expression once in your life at least, Vern. This is a gavel for the Chairman, 'Walk softly, but carry a big stick.'"

Rep. Wagner:

"It seems strange that they would pick such a large man to make this presentation. Because of my height over the years, I have had a special stool built for a Speaker's platform, but one of the responses I must always give is that people are measured from the shoulders up.

"Thank you very much for this gift. I am sure that I will remember it for many years.

"And to the Minority, I will also say that this has been one of the finest sessions to work in and the accomplishments have been great. I appreciate the cooperation of the Majority in the office of caucus chairman, and before the Majority Leader says, 'Unless we get out of here and get busy, we will be here another two weeks,' I shall now depart. Thank you."

Rep. Dick called Rep. Winge to the rostrum.

Rep. Winge: "I have had the opportunity of being up here a few times, and I really appreciate after serving about the first ten days of the session the leadership we have up here in our Speaker, the leadership we have sitting here in the middle aisle in the Majority and Minority Floor Leaders and their assistants. This really holds true when it comes down to your caucus chairman because so many of the decisions made on the floor come from information we get while in caucus, and this is what makes the caucus so important.

"When I was asked to make a presentation here a few minutes ago, I thought I would be making the presentation to Vern Wagner, and I was wondering at the time about the difference in our size—and then I was replaced with Art Bunker. It was a good choice.

"You know, the Democratic Minority here has been having a caucus at noon every day, and we prefer to call it the informational caucus because in most cases it doesn't really make much difference what we do down there. We can come back up here and vote, and the information we have gained has been very helpful in determining that vote, especially for the new members, and this is why we really appreciate the people of the Majority who have made it so easy for so many of us.

"The statement has been made let's hurry up and get this over so we can start campaigning again. One thing we have to do is let the people know us just well enough to vote for us, but not so well they won't vote for us.

"In just summarizing this Legislative Session and after having five others for experience, I felt that with my agricultural background, I would like to liken this Session to the tractor standing in the yard idling as beautifully as it can, and with the tractor idling we haven't worn out the plow. We have made a lot of decisions, and they were made a lot easier by our caucus chairman, and he has had several sessions' experiences at it. In fact, he has been with us since 1961, and he was Chairman of Finance and Taxation during the 1965 Session. You may have noticed that both parties have picked out some pretty sturdy characters for caucus chairmen. Our caucus chairman has done a wonderful job as far as caucus is concerned, and now as a little bit of appreciation to Dick Backes, we would like to present him with a gift.

Rep. Backes: "Thank you. I hope I am here two years from now and my caucus is this size. I am not going to make a speech. I think I got scared out when I first started in politics. The local editor at home wrote up a rally where both Rep. Backes and Rep. Glaspey attended, and a couple days following, it was reported that after we talked, we were followed by two good speeches.

"I want to thank the group very much for this, and at this stage in the session, I can let out a few secrets. Reimers wants to know what we do at noon, and he doesn't believe we are really meeting down there, but only do this to have the exclusive lunch cart so we would have something besides gooseliver sandwiches.

"Thank you very much."

Rep. Dick called Rep. Solberg to the rostrum.

Rep. Solberg: "Mr. Chairman and Members of the Assembly: "It becomes my pleasant task to honor a man with whom I have

"It becomes my pleasant task to honor a man with whom I have served in the House of Representatives for many sessions. Serving in the Legislature develops a special kind of friendship that transcends party lines. There is a special kind of respect and fellowship that is unlike any other fraternity.

It has been my privilege to serve many sessions in this beautiful chamber. Every session is different and every session somehow

takes on, in part, the character of the man who presides as Mr. Speaker.

"This session has been pleasant with a minimum of dissention and political bickering. No freshman legislator was made to feel uncomfortable by a rigid adherance to rules and, if mistakes were made, the Speaker was always willing to start all over again to get in the proper parliamentary motions.

"The honor to serve as Speaker of the House comes to relatively few individuals. To obtain this position one must first have gained the confidence and respect of his own party. After he is selected, and elected, he has the added responsibility of working with the minority who are always apprehensive of their considerance and fairness in rule interpretation. As a member of the minority, I have heard nothing but praise for you as an individual and as a presiding officer.

"In a few hours we will be adjourning sine die and will be on the way to our homes and families. This historical and stately chamber which has been so full of activity for the past sixty days will become once more a quiet empty room with clean desks and neatly But the friendships that have developed here will placed chairs. serve as a bond that will remain intact throughout the years.

"And so Mr. Speaker, I wish to present you with this traditional speaker's watch as a momento of the respect and admiration that your fellow Legislators have for you. And as you cherish this gift through the years, I hope it will bring back memories of your days of service as Speaker of the House in the forty-second Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota.

"Mr. Speaker, I congratulate you on a job well done."

Speaker Bier:

"Repersentative Dick, Fellow House Members, My Friends: Thank you Representative Solberg for your very kind words.

"Serving the past 60 days as your Speaker has been one of the nicest and most enjoyable experiences of my life. It has been an enjoyable experience because of the actions and wishes of each and every one of you. We have, without exception, always been courteous, friendly, and very cooperative. You have always had a cheery "Hello," a ready smile and a friendly word. You, members of the House, deserve the credit for making this a most harmonious session.

"I want to thank you again for selecting me your Speaker. I have tried to be fair, and if I failed at times, it was because of human weakness and I ask your forgiveness.

"To Rep. Streibel and Rep. Strinden, my heartfelt thanks for their ready assistance and support at all times. Their counsel and guidance helped me weather many a parliamentary storm. To Rep. Hoffner and Rep. Weber, the leaders of the "loyal opposition," who I am sure passed up opportunities to confuse and confound the Speaker, I am deeply grateful. I appreciate so much the wonderful cooperation you gave me.

"To the desk force, Barbara, Roy, Buck and Del, I am so grateful. None of you can realize how utterly dependent the Speaker is on these wonderful people. They are without equal in efficiency, cooperation and good humor.

"To Cecil, our genial and efficient sergeant-at-arms, and his crew of assistants and bill book clerks, to Clara and all the pages, to the committee clerks and stenographers and to the many other loyal employees, may I say many thanks for a job well done.
"To my secretary, Dorothy, who is always asking if there isn't more she can do to help, my sincerest thanks.

"I will always treasure this gift you have given me. Few of us are so lucky to receive it. I will always remember my years in the North Dakota Legislature. The friends I have made here will last a lifetime.

"From the bottom of my heart my most grateful thanks for the honor of being your Speaker.

"My best wishes for the future to each and every one of you."

Rep. Dick called Rep. DeKrey to the rostrum.

Rep. DeKrey:

"Speaker Bier, I am your legislative partner. You will remember when we met on July 1, 1966, when we decided to campaign together. I can't tell you you are a good fellow because you know that. I can't tell you that I have enjoyed campaigning, but this I am sure is mutual. I could remind you of two years when we sat together. We were together for two terms, and we would talk over the several bills, and decide that this is a good bill or that it is a bad bill, and we would vote accordingly. Now I sit out yonder and you are in this position of authority, and when I push that red button, invariably you would push the green.

"All fooling aside, on behalf of this same District No. 31, on behalf of your fellow legislator, our county chairman, part of the desk force, and all of the people of District No. 31, may I present you with this plaque?"

Speaker Bier:

"Thank you so very much, Rep. DeKrey."

Rep. Weber:

"May I have a few comments, Members of the Legislature. When I received the Gill Township sweatshirt I was just a little bit shook.

"This has really been an experience for me as Assistant Minority Floor Leader. I wish that all the people in North Dakota could have some part or be a member of this Legislative Body or be an employee. I am sure that they would have a greater and better understanding of what goes on. There are so many in our state that have not been in this capitol, let alone attend a Legislative Session. I think the ones who have been here are awed by what goes on and have a much greater appreciation when they do go back home.

"Mr. Speaker, Rep. Hoffner, the Minority Party and I want to congratulate you, and we appreciate the fairness of the Majority Party and Rep. Streibel and Rep. Strinden. You have been good to us as far as the rules go, and we really appreciate that, and this is shown, I recall, by one particular example when Rep. Gerl introduced that resolution, and he was allowed to take it back. We really appreciate it. I also think we accomplished a whole lot by the harmony between the Minority Floor Leaders and the Majority Floor Leaders. I think because of this we accomplished a whole lot more than if it had been the other way. I also want to offer my thanks to all the people, to the Speaker who has been honest and fair, to all the legislative employees, and to everyone who made this 42nd Legislative Session possible. I also want to thank the Legislative Council — without their help and dedication and long hours, it would have been very difficult to accomplish what we have. They do a good job.

"Thank you very much. It has been good to be a member of the 42nd Legislative Session."

 - 2. For hatcheries, the annual license fee shall (((not exceed))) be one dollar (((plus fifty cents per thousand eggs, or fraction thereof, based upon manufacturer's rated incubating capacity;))).
 - 3. For baby chick and turkey poult jobbers and salesmen, the annual license fee shall (((not exceed))) be one dollar (((plus fifty cents per thousand chicks and poults, or fraction thereof sold;
 - 4. For record of performance breeders, the annual license fee shall not exceed ten dollars plus five cents per pullet candidate over one hundred birds entered in record of performance work; and
 - 5. For poultry and turkey feed manufacturers, whole-salers, and retailers, the annual license fee shall not exceed one dollar plus fifty cents per ton for all mixed poultry feeds produced or sold in this state. The poultry improvement board shall collect a license fee from only one source, and if the fee is paid by the manufacturer or wholesaler, it shall not be col-

lected from the retailer. A person shall be deemed to be a retailer who sells poultry or turkey feed to the ultimate consumer.

The foregoing schedule of license charges and fees shall constitute The foregoing schedule of license charges and fees shall constitute the maximum to be charged and collected, but the North Dakota poultry improvement board, if it determines that any or all such fees or charges are excessive or unduly burdensome, or that a lesser schedule of fees will produce all income necessary for carrying on the work of the board, may reduce the license charges and fees of any or all of such occupations))). The annual license fees for the ensuing year (((, plus all other fees previously accrued,))) must be paid before any license is issued (((, and all accrued fees other than license fees must be remitted at the time of making the reports bereinafter required)). Failure to pay any (((fee or))) license hereinafter required))). Failure to pay any (((fee or))) license charge within ten days after the same shall become due shall constitute a violation of this chapter.

The fund shall constitute the sole source of revenue for carrying out the provisions of this chapter, and the fund and the affairs of the board shall be audited in the same manner and by the same officer as other similar public funds and boards of the state are audited))).

SECTION 8. AMENDMENT.) Section 4-13-14 of the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

4-13-14. PENALTY.) A violation of this chapter or the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder shall constitute a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of not more than fifty dollars for each offense, and as additional or alternative penalties, the board may revoke any license issued and may restrain by injunction the continuance of any operations covered by this chapter.

to pressures, in their issues prior to election they publish the issues concerning them and our voting records. Of course, this is not political. This is just information for their people, but we should be denied from stating our position and placing on the desks of our fellow colleagues views expressed at caucuses.

"The democratic process is in jeopardy if we yield to that procedure. I applaud people who stand up and resist. We do not have a monthly publication with colored photos and beautiful covers in which to editorialize and castigate and condemn and ridicule. We which to editorialize and castigate and contemn and relictife. We do have the forum of the Assembly, and I excuse myself for using it today. Since 1957, when I sat in the chair now occupied by Rep. Winge, I can remember those people leaning across that brass rail and telling me 'You had better vote this way or else!' This type of pressure does not enhance the democratic type of government one bit. It does not strengthen their cause, and if they don't change their states their government ill seen he formular!" their tactics, their cause will soon be forsaken."

(((WHAT WAGES EXEMPT FROM))) RESTRICTION ON GARNISHMENT OF EARNINGS.) (((The wages or salary of any person who is not a head of a family but is a resident of this state, to the amount of thirty-five dollars per week, shall be exempt from garnishment. The wages of any person who is head of a family and a resident of this state shall be exempt to the amount of thirty-five dollars per week, shall be exempt to the amount of thirty-five dollars per week plant five dollars per week depends of fifty dollars per week plus five dollars per week for each dependent but not more than twenty-five dollars. Every employer shall pay to such person such exempt wages or salary, not to exceed the amounts exempted by this section, of each week's wages earned by him when due. Upon such wage earner's making and delivering to such employer his affidavit that he is a head of a family and specifying the number of his dependents residing with the family in this state, he shall be entitled to additional exemptions for dependents, notwithstanding the service of a garnishee summons, and the surplus only of his wages above the exemptions shall be held by the employer to abide the event of the garnishment suit.)))

- 1. As used in this chapter:
 - a. The term "earnings" means compensation paid or payable for personal services, whether denominated as wages, salary, commission, bonus, or otherwise, and includes periodic payments pursuant to a pension or retirement program; and
 - b. The term "disposable earnings" means that part of the earnings of any individual remaining after the deduction from those earnings of any amounts required by other law to be withheld.
- 2. The maximum part of the aggregate disposable earnings of an individual for any workweek which is subject to garnishment may not exceed the lesser of:
 - a. Twenty-five percent of his disposable earnings for that week; or
 - b. The amount by which his disposable earnings for that week exceed forty times the federal minimum hourly wage prescribed by section 6 (a) (1) of the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 or any equivalent multiple thereof prescribed by regulation by the secretary of labor in case of earnings for any pay period other than a week, in effect at the time the earnings are payable.
 - 3. The restrictions of subsection 2 do not apply in the case of:
 - a. Any order of any court for the support of any person;
 - b. Any order of any court of bankruptcy under chapter XIII of the Bankruptcy Act; or
 - c. Any debt due for any state or federal tax.
 - 4. No court of this state may make, execute, or enforce any order or process in violation of this section.

SECTION 1. DESIGNATION OF BONDS.) Bonds to be issued under the provisions of this Act shall be known as state of North Dakota general obligation bonds, Vietnam conflict adjusted compensation series.

SECTION 2. AUTHORITY FOR ISSUING BONDS OF NORTH DAKOTA VIETNAM CONFLICT ADJUSTED COMPENSATION SERIES — PURPOSE OF ISSUE.) An issue of not to exceed fifteen million dollars general obligation bonds of the state of North Dakota is hereby authorized and directed under the conditions, in the manner, and for the purpose stated in the amendment to the Constitution of North Dakota, adopted by the forty-first legislative assembly of the state of North Dakota as Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 17 and approved by the people at the primary election held in September 1970, and the generally applicable provisions of the Constitution and the statutes of the state of North Dakota. The preparation, handling, issuance, sale, and delivery of such issue of bonds shall be under the supervision and control of the industrial commission of North Dakota, which commission is hereby authorized and directed to negotiate a satisfactory sale of such issue of bonds as soon after the effective date of this Act as may be necessary to provide funds for the payment of adjusted compensation to veterans of the Vietnam conflict. Such issue of bonds is authorized for the purpose of providing funds to be used in payment of adjusted compensation to North Dakota veterans of the Vietnam conflict and the administrative expenses resulting therefrom and such funds are hereby appropriated for such purpose.

SECTION 3. PREPARATION OF BONDS.) Bonds issued under this Act shall be executed by the governor and by the state treasurer under the great seal of the state of North Dakota and shall be attested by the secretary of state. The state auditor and secretary of state shall endorse and sign, on each bond issued, a certificate showing that such bond is issued pursuant to law and is within the state debt limit. The manner and form of execution shall be determined by the industrial commission. The issue of bonds under this Act shall be of serial maturities, and the industrial commission shall fix the maximum rate of interest they shall bear. The first installment of principal of bonds sold at any one time shall fall due not more than two years from the date of the bonds, and the last installment shall fall due not more than fifteen years after the date of first issue. Annual installments of principal shall be such that the increase thereof from year to year approximately shall equal the decrease from year to year of the amount of interest on unpaid bonds, so that the aggregate of principal and interest shall be approximately equal year by year. All bonds issued under this Act shall be in denominations of not more than ten thousand dollars

each and shall be fully negotiable with semiannual interest coupons attached, except that the first interest payment shall be one year from and after the date of issuance of the bonds. Bonds issued under this Act from and after the year 1972 until the year 1981, inclusive, shall not be callable prior to maturity. Bonds issued under this Act from and after the year 1982 may be called prior to maturity, in inverse numerical order. All bonds issued under this Act shall contain a provision that interest thereon shall cease at maturity unless the holder thereof shall present the same for payment and payment is refused. The principal and interest of bonds issued under this Act shall be payable at the office of the state treasurer in Bismarck, North Dakota, or at the Bank of North Dakota, or at a bank or trust company in the city of Chicago or New York, as the industrial commission may determine.

SECTION 4. SALE AND DELIVERY OF BONDS BY INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION — DEPOSIT OF PROCEEDS.) The industrial commission shall act as agent of the state for the negotiation, sale, and delivery of all bonds issued under this Act. Such bonds shall be sold in whole or in part from time to time for cash at not less than par and accrued interest to the best advantage of the state. In offering such bonds for sale, the industrial commission shall reserve the right to reject any or all bids therefor. Purchasers and holders of such bonds may have ownership registered in the office of the state treasurer. All of the proceeds of such bonds shall be received by the industrial commission and by it placed in a separate fund in the state treasury in the custody of the state treasurer to be used only for the purpose for which such bonds are issued.

SECTION 5. BONDS TAX EXEMPT.) All bonds issued under the provisions of this Act and interest thereon shall be exempt from all state, county, and municipal taxes.

SECTION 6. BONDS A GENERAL OBLIGATION OF STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA.) Upon receipt of payment therefor, the industrial commission shall deliver to each purchaser of bonds issued under this Act, the bonds purchased by him, and upon the delivery of such bonds the full faith and credit and unlimited taxing resources of the state of North Dakota shall stand pledged for the punctual payment of each and all of such bonds and the interest thereon to the lawful holder and owner thereof as the same become due and are presented for payment.

SECTION 7. SINKING FUND.) The sinking fund for the payment of bonds issued under this Act and interest thereon shall be established and maintained in the office of the state treasurer who shall be custodian of such fund and shall at all times maintain adequate records thereof. The state treasurer shall make reports of the condition of such sinking fund to the industrial commission on request. All sums appropriated and transferred for the payment of bonds issued under this Act shall be deposited in the sinking fund therefor and shall be disbursed by the state treasurer in payment of such bonds and interest thereon directly or through a paying agent to be designated by the industrial commission. On request of the industrial commission, the state treasurer shall supply any deficiency of such sinking fund out of any available monies of the state in his custody, provided that all monies so used shall be returned at the earliest practicable opportunity.

SECTION 8. TRANSFER OF BALANCE.) Upon the retirement of all bonds provided for in this Act, together with the interest thereon, any balance remaining in the sinking fund shall be transferred by the treasurer to the general fund.

SECTION 9. INVESTMENT OF SINKING FUND.) Monies in the sinking fund for bonds issued under this Act shall be deposited in the Bank of North Dakota. The Bank of North Dakota shall pay interest thereon as directed by the industrial commission, which in-

terest shall be credited to the sinking fund and shall be used for the payment of the principal of the bonds or interest thereon.

SECTION 10. PROTECTION OF PURCHASER.) The purchaser of any bonds issued under this Act shall not be obliged to see to the application of the purchase price thereof but shall be protected fully in paying for such bonds by the receipt of the industrial commission

or of its agent delivering such bonds as herein provided.

SECTION 11. LIMITATION OF ACTION.) No action shall be brought or maintained in any court in this state questioning the validity of any bonds issued under this Act unless such action shall have been commenced within sixty days after the adoption of the resolution of the industrial commission awarding the sale of such bonds.

SECTION 12. IRREPEALABLE.) All appropriations and transfers provided to pay bonds issued under the provisions of this Act and interest thereon shall not be repealed until such bonds and

interest are fully paid.

SECTION 13. APPROPRIATION.) There is hereby appropriated out of any monies in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$4,500,000.00, or such lesser amount as may be necessary for transfer upon order of the director of accounts and purchases to the Vietnam veterans' bonus adjusted compensation fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 1971, and ending June 30, 1973, for use in making bonus payments to Vietnam veterans as provided by law.

In the event the cash balance in the general fund as of the close of business on the previous thirtieth day of June shall exceed \$15,000,000.00, the director of accounts and purchases shall direct the state treasurer to transfer to the college building fund an amount which shall not exceed \$2,000,000.00, or the amount in excess of \$15,000,000.00 in the general fund, whichever is the lesser. Such funds shall be expended by the board of higher education for the construction, reconstruction, and equipping of buildings at state-operated institutions of higher learning in accordance with specific appropriations to be made by the legislative assembly. The amount in the college building fund on July 1, 1971, shall remain in the college building fund and be considered a part of the \$5,643,551.00 authorized hereunder.

SECTION 2. APPROPRIATIONS.) There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the college building fund the sum of \$5,643,551.00, or so much thereof as may be available in such fund, and from federal and private sources the sum of \$1,069,695.00 for the construction, reconstruction, and equipping of buildings and facilities at state-operated institutions of higher learning for purposes as follows and within the limitations of the costs hereafter stated:

"House Republican Majority Leader Streibel and his assistant, Representative Strinden, have objected to statements made in an editorial that appeared in the March, 1971 Rural Electric Cooperative magazine and to the magazine's policy of publishing voting records.

"The two Republican leaders maintained they had not made the consideration of the REC's Consumer Power District Bill No. 1377 a political issue, although Representative Strinden admitted he was responsible for having placed on all Republican House member's desks, a few minutes before consideration of the committee report to indefinitely postpone the bill, the following memorandum:

"ATTENTION ALL REPUBLICAN HOUSE MEMBERS

HOUSE BILL No. 1377

ON THE 5th ORDER

Moved by the Committee on Business, Industry and Labor for indefinite postponement by a vote of 9 - 6. Although this bill has crossed political lines to an extent, the Republican leadership anticipates a solid Democrat vote against the Committee recommendation for indefinite postponement. House bill No. 1377 is a far reaching proposal that could lead to a state power system. The leadership urges support for an indefinite postponement!

"I submit to the members of this House that the very language used in the above memorandum does at least attempt to place the consideration of House Bill No. 1377 along party lines and not on the merits of the bill. The final vote on the committee report certainly indicates that this attempt was quite successful, as only four Republican House members chose to not follow their leader's request, and voted for the bill. The other 54 members of the Republican majority voted to indefinitely postpone the bill, along with 5 members of the Democratic party.

"House Bill No. 1377 was a bill to allow people to form consumer power districts if they wished. Upon formation of a power district, the district would become a political entity and would have power to issue revenue bonds for funding of generation plants and trans-mission lines. The low interest Federal funding has been declining and is not expected to meet the financial needs for power develop-ment in the near future. The consumer power district revenue bonds would be the next cheapest funding and we should prepare for it now. It takes about seven years to plan, design, and con-struct a power generation plant. Also, the power needs double about every seven years, so the need is here.

"I was disappointed and surprised to hear the two Republican floor leaders say they objected to the R.E.C. magazine publishing editorials and voting records of legislators I feel the R.E.C.'s have just as much right to editorialize and publish voting records as any other paper or publication. If the patron members feel the

leadership of the R.E.C. is not reflecting the views af the majority of the patrons, then it is the patron's duty to go to their annual meetings and elect new directors.

"It is obvious to me that most of the Republican House members and the Republican party feel they have an obligation to the in-vestor owned utilities and they recognized their obligation in defeating the Consumer Power District bill."

"Mr. Speaker: This session several pieces of so-called labor legislation were introduced. In looking up the meaning of the word 'labor' in Rep. Hentges' dictionary, I found two definitions that fit the situation. One is 'to work for wages,' and the other is the 'physical effort of child birth.' Perhaps it is needless to say that the pregnant ideas regarding labor legislation had an abortion performed on them. But this labor legislation was introduced for the purpose of effecting some social economic change for the working men and women in the state. The wage structure and working conditions of many North Dakotans are deplorable. This is true in much of the private sector as well as the public.

"Now I'm not going to expound on the virtue of labor. But why do so many in this Assembly fear labor and labor unions? Is it because of the big headlines given to people like the Dave Becks and unlawful strikes? I heard it so often in committee — some would quote verbatim certain headlines such as 'Cops on Strike.' 'Claim Blue Flu' or 'Teachers Strike in Chicago — 16,000 Children Out of School.'

"These are facts and they were reported as such, but too many people say 'All I know is what I read in the paper.' Well, there is a lot more to knowledge than just what we read in the paper.

"I hope that when most of you return to this Assembly in 1973, you will have made a small objective study in the labor area. And, when you read a paper or listen to the news where some union activity is involved, please look and listen objectively.

"When labor laws are concerned, North Dakota is in the Dark Ages. We have all but gone on witch hunts. I think that all of us are cognizant of the fact that some change is needed in our labor laws. Yesterday we heard some good advice from the majority floor leader when he used phrases such as 'government that is responsive to the needs of the people' and 'government must change where change is required.'

"I submit to you that if these needs are not met and our restrictive laws are not changed, we will continue to lose our most valuable assets — not wheat, lignite or electrical power — but our youth, who were educated and trained in North Dakota.

"Mr. Speaker and members of this Assembly, I wish to express my thanks for the friendship that all of you have extended to me. I only wish that it would have also extended to some of my bills."



54-04-01. (((BIDS FOR ENROLLING OR ENGROSSING BILLS — NOTICE.) The department of accounts and purchases, not less than sixty nor more than seventy-five days before the meeting of the legislative assembly in regular session, shall give notice by advertising for three successive weeks, in a newspaper at the seat of government, that sealed bids will be received for the engrossing and enrolling of all bills passed by each house of the legislative assembly.)))

ENROLLING AND ENGROSSING BILLS, ARRANGEMENT FOR — ADVERTISEMENTS.) The President of the Senate and the majority leaders of the House and Senate at the organizational meeting shall constitute a negotiating committee and shall make all necessary arrangements for the engrossing and enrolling of bills and resolutions passed by each house of the Legislative Assembly. The negotiating committee may negotiate with any person or persons and may enter into and execute contracts to perform the necessary engrossing and enrolling bills and resolutions. The President of the Senate shall advertise that, on the first day of the legislative organizational meeting in December, the committee will receive written proposals for engrossing and enrolling of bills and resolutions and invite persons who are interested to submit proposals. The advertisement shall be published in a newspaper at the seat of government at least once each week for two successive weeks commencing on the first Wednesday in October of the year preceding the regular session of the Legislative Assembly. The negotiating committee, however, shall not be limited to written proposals received. After examining and reviewing proposals submitted, it may award the contract to any person or persons on a negotiated basis.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT.) Section 54-04-03 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

54-04-03. (((BID ACCOMPANIED BY CERTIFIED CHECK — BIDDER MUST BE RESIDENT.) No bids for the engrossing and enrolling of bills passed by either house of the legislative assembly shall be considered if from a person not a bona fide resident of the state, nor unless accompanied by a certified check in a sum to be named by the department of accounts and purchases. Such check shall be security that the successful bidder shall enter into a contract and give a bond with sureties to be approved by the department.))) SURETY FOR PERFORMANCE — CONTRACT MUST BE WITH RESIDENT.) The negotiating committee shall require a surety bond for the performance of the work in awarding the contract for enrolling and engrossing bills and resolutions of the Legislative Assembly. The amount of the surety bond shall be commensurate with the amount of work to be performed and shall be set by the negotiating committee. Such contract may be awarded only to a bona fide resident of this state.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.) Section 54-04-04 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

54-04-04. (((OPENING OF BIDS — AWARDING CONTRACT.)

Upon the day set in the advertisement for the opening of bids, which shall not be less than thirty days before the meeting of the legislative assembly, the bids shall be opened by the department of accounts and purchases. The department shall award the contract to the lowest responsible bidder and shall enter into a contract with him for the performance of the work, subject to the conditions set forth in this chapter. Nothing in this chapter shall prevent the awarding of separate contracts for the engrossing and enrolling, if deemed advantageous to the state.))) CONTENTS OF CONTRACT

— FORM, STYLE, AND MECHANICS OF ENROLLING AND ENGROSSING.) The Legislative Council shall determine the form and style of the engrossed and enrolled bills and resolutions and shall determine the mechanical or other methods by which the engrossing or enrolling is to be done. The negotiating committee shall determine the charges to be made, which shall be set forth in the contract. The negotiating committee may also determine the number of employees to be employed by the person with whom it has contracted or will contract to enroll and engross bills and resolutions. The negotiating committee may also require and provide in the contract for specific provisions which will expedite, improve and facilitate enrolling and engrossing services to the Legislative Assembly.

This year I was given three bills on the last day for bill introduction, House Bills Nos. 1485, 1501 and 1517. I do not approve of this nor do I feel this is good lobbying. On behalf of the teachers of North Dakota, I express my thanks to you for passing this bill."

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.) Section 57-58-01 of the 1969 Supplement to the North Dakota Century Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:

57-58-01. DISTRIBUTION TO COUNTIES AND LOCAL SUB-DIVISIONS.) 1. It is hereby provided that any political subdivision which has an existing bonded indebtedness for which a tax levy must be made in 1970 or any year thereafter, shall reduce its levy in each such year for current operating purposes by the amount which its tax levy on taxable property in that year for retirement of the bonded indebtedness is increased because of the exemption of personal property by subsection 25 of section 57.02.08 On or of personal property by subsection 25 of section 57-02-08. On or before (((March 15))) February 1, 1971, the county auditor of each county shall certify to the state tax commissioner the total amount of taxes levied in the year 1968 for the state, county, cities, park boards, school districts, airport authorities, townships, and all other units of government having the authority to levy taxes, and levies voted by the people, new or present levies increased by legislative action of such county on those items of personal property exempt under the provisions of section 57-02-08, and, in addition, the total valuation of real estate and taxes levied on real estate for the year 1968. On or before (((May))) March 1, 1971 and each year thereafter the state tax commissioner shall certify for payment to the state treasurer and the department of accounts and purchases an amount for payment by the state treasurer to each county equal to amount for payment by the state treasurer to each county equal to fifty percent of the amount determined to be due such county based upon the personal property taxes levied in the year 1968 for the political subdivisions herein mentioned on the items of personal property exempt from the personal property tax under the provisions property exempt from the personal property tax under the provisions of section 57-02-08, the per capita school tax under the provisions of section 57-15-23, and the grain tax under the provisions of chapter 57-03, together with any adjustments to be made according to the manner hereinafter provided. The remaining fifty percent due each county shall be paid on or before (((June))) May 1, 1971, and each year thereafter. Within (((sixty))) fifteen days after the receipt of the revenue as provided by this section, the county treasurer shall allocate and remit to the county, cities, park boards, school districts, airport authorities, townships, and all other units of government having the authority to levy taxes that amount of revenue which is received from the state in the same ratio as he would have is received from the state in the same ratio as he would have distributed the revenue from the personal property tax, adjusting such amount by any increase or decrease in real property taxes as levied by each taxing authority according to the formula hereinafter provided. Any amount that would be apportioned and credited to the retirement of a bonded indebtedness existing in 1970 for which a tax levy was made in 1970 and in any year thereafter, shall be credited to the general fund of the political subdivision. (((In the years after 1971, payments to the counties under this section shall be made based upon such payment for 1971 together with a growth factor which shall be based upon the dollar amount of increase or decrease in real property taxes levied within each county. For each four-dollar increase in real property taxation within a county, the state shall contribute an additional one dollar over that amount which was remitted in the base year. For each four-dollar decrease in real property taxation within a county, the state shall contribute one dollar less than that amount which was remitted in the base year.)))

2. It is the intent of the legislative assembly to provide in the years after 1971 personal property tax replacement funds out of the state treasury for a county and the political subdivisions in it an annual amount that will be substantially the same as would have been levied in the county for the per capita school tax and grain tax and on locally assessed personal property in the county if the personal property tax repeal and revenue replacement act of 1969 had not been enacted, provided, however, that such annual amount shall not be less for any county and the political subdivisions in it, except under the conditions set out in subsection 3 of this section, then was distributed for that county and the political subdivisions in it in 1971.

The legislative assembly hereby finds that the amount of all ad valorem property taxes that would have been levied in 1970 and each year thereafter on locally assessed personal property in any county would have increased or decreased from the preceding year at approximately the average annual rate that it increased or decreased in that county during the ten year period of 1960 through 1969.

The legislative assembly further finds that the average annual rate of increase or decrease in all ad valorem taxes levied on annually rate of increase or decrease in all ad valorem taxes levied on locally assessed personal property in each county during the 1960-1969 period is as shown in the following schedule:

It is hereby provided that the amount to be distributed out of the state treasury in 1972 for each county, and the political subdivisions in it, for which a percentage increase is shown in the preceding schedule shall be one hundred two and one-quarter percent of the sum of the following:

- a. The total amount paid out of the state treasury in 1971 to that county for per capita school taxes, grain taxes and ad valorem taxes on locally assessed personal property that were levied in that county by all political subdivisions in 1968, as adjusted, if necessary, pursuant to subsection 3 of this section; and
- b. An amount that is computed by multiplying the total amount specified in subdivision a of this subsection by three times the percentage increase shown in the above schedule for that county.

It is further provided that the amount to be distributed out of the state treasury in 1972 for each county, and the political subdivisions in it, for which a percentage decrease is shown in the preceding schedule shall be one hundred two and one-quarter percent of the amount distributed for that county and the political subdivisions in it in 1971 as adjusted, if necessary, pursuant to subsection 3 of this section.

The amount to be paid to a county in 1973 and in each year thereafter shall be computed in the same way as the amount paid to it in 1972 except that for any county for which a percentage increase is shown in the above schedule the percentage shown for that county shall be multiplied by four for the year 1973, by five for the year 1974, and so forth.

Upon receipt of a payment from the state treasurer, the county treasurer shall within fifteen days allocate and distribute it as follows: the amount received for replacement of the per capita school tax shall be credited to the county equalization fund for distribution as provided in section 15-40-02; the amount received for replacement of the grain tax and ad valorem personal projerty taxes shall be allocated and distributed to each political subdivision in the county, including the county, in the proportion that taxes levied on real estate in the county by each such political subdivision in the

preceding year bears to the total taxes levied on real estate in the county by all political subdivisions in that year.

The annual amount allocated and distributed by the county treasurer to each political subdivision for replacement of grain taxes and ad valorem personal property taxes shall be allocated to the various funds of the political subdivision in the ratio that the real estate taxes levied by the political subdivision in the preceding year for each such fund bears to the total of all real estate taxes levied in the preceding year by the political subdivision for all funds, except that the amount of replacement revenue received by the political subdivision for retirement of a bonded indebtedness shall be credited to the general fund of the political subdivision.

3. On or before (((May))) March 1, 1971, and each year thereafter, the state tax commissioner shall certify to the state treasurer and the department of accounts and purchases the amount determined to be due to the state based upon the personal property taxes levied in the year 1968 for the North Dakota state medical center. In the years after 1971 the amount so certified shall be computed in accordance with the formula provided in this section for computing the amounts to be certified and paid to the counties. REPORT OF CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

Mr. Speaker: Your Conference Committee to whom was referred House Bill No. 1492 has had the same under consideration and recommends that the Senate recede from its amendments and that House Bill No. 1492 be amended as follows:

Delete everything after the words "A BILL" and insert in lieu thereof the following: "for an Act to provide and appropriate funds for the payment of adjusted compensation payments to North Dakota veterans of the Vietnam conflict and to the industrial commission for the issuance of bonds; providing for the issuance, sale, and delivery of general obligation bonds; creating a sinking fund; and providing for a surtax and fund transfers for the servicing and retirement of such bonds; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. DESIGNATION OF BONDS.) Bonds to be issued under the provisions of this Act shall be known as state of North Dakota general obligation bonds, Vietnam conflict adjusted compensation series.

SECTION 2. AUTHORITY FOR ISSUING BONDS OF NORTH DAKOTA VIETNAM CONFLICT ADJUSTED COMPENSATION SERIES — PURPOSE OF ISSUE.) An issue of not to exceed fifteen million dollars general obligation bonds of the state of North Dakota is hereby authorized and directed under the conditions, in the manner, and for the purpose stated in the amendment to the Constitution of North Dakota, adopted by the forty-first legislative assembly of the state of North Dakota as Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 17 and approved by the people at the primary election held in September 1970, and the generally applicable provisions of the Constitution and the statutes of the state of North Dakota. The preparation, handling, issuance, sale, and delivery of such issue of bonds shall be under the supervision and control of the industrial commission of North Dakota, which commission is hereby authorized and directed to negotiate a satisfactory sale of such issue of bonds as soon after the effective date of this Act as may be necessary to provide funds for the payment of adjusted compensation to veterans of the Vietnam conflict. Such issue of bonds is authorized for the purpose of providing funds to be used in payment of adjusted compensation to North Dakota veterans of the Vietnam conflict and the administrative expenses resulting therefrom and such funds are hereby appropriated for such purpose.

SECTION 3. PREPARATION OF BONDS.) Bonds issued under this Act shall be executed by the governor and by the state treasurer under the great seal of the state of North Dakota and shall be attested by the secretary of state. The state auditor and secretary of state shall endorse and sign, on each bond issued, a certificate showing that such bond is issued pursuant to law and is within the state debt limit. The manner and form of execution shall be determined by the industrial commission. The issue of bonds under this Act shall be of serial maturities, and the industrial commission shall fix the maximum rate of interest they shall bear. The first installment of principal of bonds sold at any one time shall fall due not more than two years from the date of the bonds, and the last installment shall fall due not more than fifteen years after the date of first issue. Annual installments of principal shall be such that the increase thereof from year to year approximately shall equal the decrease from year to year of the amount of interest on unpaid bonds, so that the aggregate of principal and interest shall be approximately equal year by year. All bonds issued under this Act shall be in denominations of not more than ten thousand dollars each and shall be fully negotiable with semiannual interest coupons attached, except that the first interest payment shall be one year from and after the date of issuance of the bonds. Bonds issued under this Act from

and after the year 1972 until the year 1981, inclusive, shall not be callable prior to maturity. Bonds issued under this Act from and after the year 1982 may be called prior to maturity, in inverse numerical order. All bonds issued under this Act shall contain a provision that interest thereon shall cease at maturity unless the holder thereof shall present the same for payment and payment is refused. The principal and interest of bonds issued under this Act shall be payable at the office of the state treasurer in Bismarck, North Dakota, or at the Bank of North Dakota, or at a bank or trust company in the city of Chicago or New York, as the industrial commission may determine.

SECTION 4. SALE AND DELIVERY OF BONDS BY INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION — DEPOSIT OF PROCEEDS.) The industrial commission shall act as agent of the state for the negotiation, sale, and delivery of all bonds issued under this Act. Such bonds shall be sold in whole or in part from time to time for cash at not less than par and accrued interest to the best advantage of the state. In offering such bonds for sale, the industrial commission shall reserve the right to reject any or all bids therefor. Purchasers and holders of such bonds may have ownership registered in the office of the state treasurer. All of the proceeds of such bonds shall be received by the industrial commission and by it placed in a separate fund in the state treasury in the custody of the state treasurer to be used only for the purpose for which such bonds are issued.

SECTION 5. BONDS TAX EXEMPT.) All bonds issued under the provisions of this Act and interest thereon shall be exempt from all state, county, and municipal taxes.

SECTION 6. BONDS A GENERAL OBLIGATION OF STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA.) Upon receipt of payment therefor, the industrial commission shall deliver to each purchaser of bonds issued under this Act, the bonds purchased by him, and upon the delivery of such bonds the full faith and credit and unlimited taxing resources of the state of North Dakota shall stand pledged for the punctual payment of each and all of such bonds and the interest thereon to the lawful holder and owner thereof as the same become due and are presented for payment.

SECTION 7. SURTAX ON INCOME.) An additional tax, or surtax, is hereby imposed on the income of every individual, estate, trust, and corporation that is required to file an income tax return pursuant to the provisions of chapter 57-38. This surtax shall be placed on the state income tax return as a separate line item entitled "Vietnam bonus surtax", shall be paid annually by each such tax-payer, and shall be computed as follows:

- 1. For an individual, estate, or trust the tax shall be computed at the rate of one percent of the taxable income of such individual, estate, or trust as determined pursuant to the provisions of chapter 57-38, but shall not be less than two dollars and fifty cents nor more than twelve dollars and fifty cents.
- 2. For a corporation the tax shall be computed at the rate of one percent of the taxable income of the corporation as determined pursuant to the provisions of chapter 57-38, provided that the amount of tax shall not be less than ten dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars.

For purposes of administering the provisions of this section, the provisions of chapter 57-38, pertaining to the administration of income tax, including but not limited to the withholding of income taxes, the payment of income taxes and interest and penalties thereon, refunds, attachment of liens for failure to pay such taxes and interest and penalties thereon, and civil and criminal penalties for failure to comply with the provisions of chapter 57-38, shall

govern the administration of the surtax levied in this section. All of the proceeds of this surtax, including penalties and interest thereon, collected and received by the tax commissioner shall be paid by him into the sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued under this Act. When the director of the department of accounts and purchases shall determine, inconsultation with the industrial commission, that sufficient funds are available in the sinking fund for the payment of Vietnam veterans' bonus bonds to retire all bonds outstanding with interest thereon, he shall certify the same to the tax commissioner, whereupon the surtax imposed by this section shall terminate and the last taxable year of each taxpayer that ends before such certification shall be the last taxable year for which the tax shall be imposed on and collected from such taxpaver.

The provisions of this section shall be effective for all taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1972.

The sinking fund for the pay-SINKING FUND.) SECTION 8. ment of bonds issued under this Act and interest thereon shall be established and maintained in the office of the state treasurer who shall be custodian of such fund and shall at all times maintain adequate records thereof. The state treasurer shall make reports of the condition of such sinking fund to the industrial commission on request. All taxes levied and all sums appropriated and transferred for the payment of bonds issued under this Act shall be deposited in the sinking fund therefor and shall be disbursed by the state treasurer in payment of such bonds and interest thereon directly or through a paying agent to be designated by the industrial commission. On request of the industrial commission, the state treasurer shall supply any deficiency of such sinking fund out of any available monies of the state in his custody, provided that all monies so used shall be returned at the earliest practicable opportunity.

SECTION 9. TRANSFER OF BALANCE.) Upon the retirement of all bonds provided for in this Act, together with the interest thereon, any balance remaining in the sinking fund shall be trans-ferred by the treasurer to the general fund.

INVESTMENT OF SINKING FUND.) Monies in SECTION 10. the sinking fund for bonds issued under this Act shall be deposited in the Bank of North Dakota. The Bank of North Dakota shall pay interest thereon as directed by the industrial commission, which interest shall be credited to the sinking fund and shall be used for the payment of the principal of the bonds or interest thereon.

SECTION 11. PROTECTION OF PURCHASER.) The purchaser of any bonds issued under this Act shall not be obliged to see to the application of the purchase price thereof but shall be protected fully in paying for such bonds by the receipt of the industrial commission or of its agent delivering such bonds as herein provided.

SECTION 12. LIMITATION OF ACTION.) No action shall be brought or maintained in any court in this state questioning the validity of any bonds issued under this Act, or of any tax levied under this Act, unless such action shall have been commenced within sixty days after the adoption of the resolution of the industrial commission awarding the sale of such bonds.

SECTION 13. TAXES IRREPEALABLE.) All taxes levied, appropriations, and transfers provided to pay bonds issued under the provisions of this Act and interest thereon shall not be repealed TAXES IRREPEALABLE.)

until such bonds and interest are fully paid.

SECTION 14. APPROPRIATION.) There is hereby appropriated out of any monies in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$2 million for transfer upon order of the director of the department of accounts and purchases to the sinking fund for the payment of Vietnam veterans' bonus bonds during the biennium beginning July 1, 1971, and ending June 30, 1973.

SECTION 15. APPROPRIATION TO INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION.) There is hereby appropriated out of any monies in the Vietnam veterans' bonus adjusted compensation fund, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$50,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to the industrial commission for administrative and legal expenses for the issuance of bonds authorized by this Act, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1971, and ending June 30, 1973.

SECTION 16. APPROPRIATION FOR BONDS.) There is hereby appropriated the funds required for the payment of interest and

principal of all bonds issued and sold under this Act.

SECTION 17. EMERGENCY. This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT.)
WHEREAS, recent decisions of the North Dakota supreme court, the United States supreme court, and the federal district court for the North Dakota district have clearly espoused the principle that representatives of the people elected to state legislature must be elected on the "one man-one vote" principle so that as nearly as practicable, the vote of each elector is equal in weight to the vote of each other elector; and

WHEREAS, the forty-second legislative assembly has strived diligently to adopt a plan which would redistrict the state of North Dakota into legislative districts that would meet guidelines established by the courts, but has found the task to be impossible in the time available; and

WHEREAS, the forty-second legislative assembly is aware of the provisions of section 35 of the Constitution of this state which would require that in the event any legislative assembly shall fail to redistrict itself at the session following any federal decennial census, the same shall be performed by a board consisting of certain officials of the state and of the house of representatives; and

WHEREAS, this section has been declared unconstitutional by the federal district court for the North Dakota district in Paulson v. Meier, 232 Federal Supplement 183, and it appears that the North Dakota supreme court, in the recent case of Stockman v. Anderson has supported this ruling by finding that since the people voted on the amendments to section 35 of the North Dakota Constitution, among other sections, as a "package", the entire contents of this section were declared unconstitutional by the federal district court and are null and void and of no force and effect; and

WHEREAS, it is therefore clear to the forty-second legislative assembly that the portion of section 35 of the North Dakota Constitution requiring redistricting by a board consisting of officials of the state and of the house of representatives is rendered inoperative, ineffectual, and unconstitutional, and such board cannot be required or permitted to redistrict the state into legislative districts, nor is it the intent of the legislative assembly and the people of this state that the board perform such redistricting; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that the state be redistricted into legislative districts meeting constitutional requirements set by the North Dakota supreme court, the United States supreme court, and the federal district court for the North Dakota district.

SECTION 2. REDISTRICTING PLAN TO BE PREPARED BY LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.) The legislative council is hereby directed to study and develop a plan for redistricting the legislative districts of the state, such plan to be developed in accordance with the "one man-one vote" principle and to be free from obvious constitutional deficiencies. The plan shall be presented to the forty-third legislative assembly, together with such legislation as may be necessary to enact such plan into law, and in the event any court shall assume jurisdiction for the purpose of legislative redistricting and reapportionment, the legislative council shall make such plan available to such court."
