

In the following space note the fiscal effect in dollars of the legislative proposal. If additional space is needed, attach a supplementary sheet. (Please type)

It is assumed that the appointment of a qualified hearing examiner is on an "ad hoc" basis or on a standby basis, or in some departments it could be on a full-time basis. We are reliably informed that the appointment on an ad hoc basis would demand a rate of about \$40.00 an hour. It is very difficult to make a reliable estimate as to the cost involved. Some of the following information can serve as a basis for a guess on the number of hearings per year: Public Service Commission--100, last from one day to ten days; Workmen's Compensation Bureau--150-175, lasting one day each; Unemployment Compensation Division--1,000 hearings per year, one or more per day; Attorney General's Licensing Department--25 per year, lasting about one day each; Securities Commission--two to five hearings per year; State Banking Board--ten-fifteen per year. In addition to the foregoing, the various professional boards would have to employ an examiner to conduct the hearings for which we have no criteria to make a reliable guess. The committee can take the foregoing into account, and its guess would be as valid as any guess we could make as to the total cost involved. This type of material would require a detailed study before any reliable cost figure can be established.
