Dear Ms. Christensen:

Pursuant to your request, enclosed please find the amended fiscal note for House Bill No. 1262, the severance tax bill which was enacted by the 1977 North Dakota Legislative Assembly.

The first column reflects the State Tax Department's estimates of the revenues and the distribution which would have been realized had the 1977 Session reenacted the 1975 Coal Severance Tax Law. The 1975 law provided for a 50 cent-per-ton tax plus a one cent-per-ton increase for every three point increase in the wholesale price increase.

The second column reflects the State Tax Department's estimates of revenues and the distribution of the moneys projected from the Coal Severance Tax Law passed this year. That law provides for a severance tax of 65 cents per ton plus a one cent-per-ton increase for every one point increase in the wholesale price index.
