AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 1054

On page 1 of the engrossed bill, line 1, delete everything after the words "A BILL" and insert in lieu thereof the following: "for an Act providing an appropriation based upon school districts average daily membership and transportation mileage; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. There is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$12,000,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to the department of public instruction for the purpose of making payments to school districts during the biennium ending June 30, 1981, ir accordance with the provisions of this Act.

SECTION 2. AMOUNT OF PAYMENT. School districts shall receive an amount of money equal to eighteen cents per mile for school bus transportation based on the number of miles traveled in the 1979-80 school term. This payment shall be over and above the transportation payment provided for in section 15-40.1-16. The remainder of the \$12,000,000 appropriated by this Act shall be distributed, notwithstanding subsection 2 of section 15-40.1-06 and sections 15-40.1-07 and 15-40.1-08, to the schools based upon their pro rata share of the average daily membership for the 1979-80 school term.

SECTION 3. AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS. Within thirty days after the effective date of this Act, the superintendent of public instruction shall certify to the department of accounts and purchases the amounts each school district is entitled to, and as soon as possible thereafter, a single payment covering each of these distributions shall be mailed to each individual school district.

SECTION 4. EMERGENCY. This Act is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall be in effect from and after its passage and approval."

#### BUDGET MESSAGE

#### January 26, 1981

"Ladies and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly: Thank you for this opportunity to express my views on the budget that is before you. It is of unprecedented size and scope. It therefore deserves scrutiny, so that its consequences are fully explored.

There is a certain inevitability to government thinking that there must be a response to every request. Government then intrudes in our lives in several ways. One is to regulate our lives; to tell us what is best for us; and to impose the rules that will achieve the ends desired by government. Another intrusion is taxation, which must be judged carefully, since our lives and relationships can be restructured by taxing money away from people who worked for it, so that government can spend it for government rather than individual goals.

Increased government involvement in our lives leads to utopian thinking, which in turn leads to an "urge to splurge" that exists at all levels of government. We state officials happen to have a specific responsibility to resist such an "urge" regarding state-level spending. While we must adequately fund necessary programs, we must also act responsibly in determining the nature and extent of such funding. Perhaps the famous last words of Oscar Wilde illustrate the message I want to leave with you: While sipping champagne on his deathbed, he quipped, "I'm ending my life as I have lived my life — beyond my means."

It is my opinion that the budget before you is beyond our means, both for today and for the future. This budget can be reduced by from 70 to 100 million dollars, depending upon priorities that are established. Such reduction will allow appropriate tax relief, which I will discuss later in this message.

I have the following specific recommendations which will achieve an approximate 70 million dollar reduction in the present budget. STATE

EMPLOYMENT I have already signed the bill giving a 10 percent salary adjustment to all state employees, which will be reflected in their January 1981 paychecks. This, I believe, was a fair response to the difficulties presented by the two-year budgeting cycle and the effect of inflation. For the next biennium, I recommend a 9 percent increase for the first year and an 8 percent increase for the second year of the biennium. There are those who will say these single digit increases will fall short of the actual inflationary increase in the costs of living. My response is that government must begin to be part of the solution rather than part of the problem of inflation. In the sense that inflation is part attitude and psychology, we should not anticipate double-digit inflation.

It should be noted that the recommended increases are not intended to be applied across-the-board. Managers will have discretion as appropriate to the goals and objectives of their departments to deviate up or down from the recommended percentage increases. As Governor, I expect to enforce high management standards which will include allocating dollars according to performance and program objectives.

In addition to the salary increases I have indicated, I recommend adoption of a non-contributory retirement plan. Improvement of the retirement plan for state employees is appropriate at this time. While the total compensation package for state employees does not include everything requested, it is adequate considering all the circumstances involved.

As to new positions included and funded in the present budget, I strongly suggest they be very carefully reviewed and reduced in number. I think some 250 of these new positions can be eliminated. If so, there would be a savings of about 13 million dollars.

EDUCATION AS I have said publicly many times, I am in complete agreement with funding support of elementary and secondary education at the 70 percent level. It is important that we identify the true, full costs of elementary and secondary education so that the ratio of state aid to local effort accomplishes the intent of the initiated measure. Although I support moving to the 70 percent level, I do not support the 13.1 percent increase in the per pupil payment per year. Again, this would assume double-digit inflation, which I believe is the wrong course to follow. In my opinion, we should be consistent in our approach and reduce the 13.1 percent to the 9 percent and 8 percent schedule we are applying to state employee's salaries. This would further reduce spending by 34.2 million dollars. AID TO

POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS The continuing philosophy of making state-level general fund appropriations to political subdivisions should be reviewed. Just about everyone agrees that the quality of government is better the closer it is to the people it is supposed to serve. This principle is eroded when local government looks more and more to the state general fund for its funding. Accountability - which is so much a part of an effective governmental system - is lost when the dollars come from somewhere else. I understand the difficulties inherent in finding local dollars to fund local programs. However, the basic principles of accountability and local autonomy are so important that the continuing replacement of local with state dollars must be carefully considered.

TAXES I am opposed to new taxes. Therefore, I oppose the 3 cents a gallon increase in the gasoline tax recommended in the budget before you. On the other hand, I am convinced of the need for the revenues that would otherwise be raised by the gas tax increase. I therefore suggest that 30 million dollars be transferred from the general fund to the Highway Distribution Fund. This action should protect the integrity of our highway systems without increasing the gas tax.

NEW OR EXPANDED PROGRAMS urge you to avoid funding new programs unless the justification is so compelling that there would be unanimous support for such action. Our first responsibility is to maintain and, where required, strengthen existing programs. An example of this responsibility to strengthen might well be in the area of alcohol and chemical dependency programs for youth. Recent studies have shown an alarming level of alcohol abuse among high school age youth. This should not require funding a new program, although there may well be sufficient evidence upon which to base strengthening of existing programs.

The budget contains about 20 million dollars in identifiable program expansions. There will be a favorable consensus on some but not on others. I have no specific recommendations at this time regarding these program expansions. But, recognizing our joint interest in efficient use of public dollars, it is probable that some cuts will be made in this area of program expansions. If that occurs, then we will be able to exceed a 70 million dollar reduction in the budget you are now considering.

If we do not assume a continuing excessive rate of inflation; if we are responsible and fair to both educators and taxpayers in formulating the amount of state aid to education; if we contain the expansion of employees and programs; and if we retain a balanced tax system without increasing taxes, we will have carried out the public trust in regard to the 1981-83 budget.

While careful budgeting is the key to efficient use of public dollars, good management and improved organization of governmental functions can also benefit taxpayers. We intend to apply good management to improved organization wherever possible. In that regard, we continue to believe that the organization of land, air and water programs can be improved. And, improvements in the organization of human services programs remains an important goal of my Administration. I am pleased that legislation representing several approaches to these goals has been introduced so that all options may be considered.

Finally, I appreciate the cooperation that is evident in this legislature in achieving a budget that fairly represents the goals of North Dakotans at this time in our history. In the midst of great economic changes here and across the country, we must balance our resources with the legitimate demands of our people. I believe we are moving in the right direction in that regard.

Thank you very much."
