Senate Bill No. 2356. — A Bill for an Act to rename the department of accounts and purchases as the office of management and budget; to create and enact a new section to chapter 54-07 and a new section to chapter 54-44 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the designation of the office of management and budget as the agency to administer nonstatutorily assigned governmental functions; and to amend and reenact sections 54-27.1-01 and 54-44-01 and subsection 1 of section 54-44-11 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the federal aid coordinator office, the responsibilities of the office of management and budget, and the state purchasing operating fund.

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Senator Redlin: I rise on a point of personal privilege and request that my remarks be printed in the Journal.

Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I want to express to the members of the Senate that I am grateful for having had the opportunity to attend the inauguration ceremonies of the President and Vice President of the United States. I have brought back some mementos of this occasion and you may see them at my desk if you wish. The arrangements made by the Legislative Council were excellent including the hotel, the Bellevue, which is very close to the Capitol.

The rates were very reasonable and it was a comfortable place to stay. We had the help and cooperation of Senator Burdick, Senator Andrews and Congressman Dorgan. Senator Burdick provided us with tickets for the Inaugural festivities. We were seated on the west lawn of the Capitol for the inauguration. Senator Andrews provided us with a fine lunch after the inaugural ceremony and tickets to the parade in stands near the White House. We attended the Vice President's reception at the American Museum and were fortunate to be very close

to the parade to see President Reagan and his wife and Vice President Bush and his wife passing very close. It was very interesting to see the number of American flags in the audience which everyone was waving.

I think the point I would like to make, being a member of the Minority party, was the way I was impressed with the way in which the transition of power occurs in America. It was done in peace and with respect. To those who would downgrade our system and ridicule our politicians, I can only say to them we are way ahead of whoever is in second place. Whoever is in power, all of us have the freedom to be heard. If our case is good, it may even prevail.

It was a great deal of relief, of course, when the announcement came that the hostages had been released. At National Airport, the entire control tower was surrounded by a yellow ribbon band. I am sure those who attended this affair and witnessed these events saw another demonstration of the unity of purpose that exists among all our people.

Senator Nething moved that the remarks of Senator Mutch be printed in the Journal, which motion prevailed.

Senator Mutch: Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, Senator Redlin's remarks were well taken. It was a distinct pleasure for me to be chosen as a representative of the North Dakota state senate on the majority side. Words can't express the greatness of this affair and particularly the great deal of enthusiasm expressed by so many people from all over the United States. It is impossible to tell you all the feeling that so many people had and the enthusiasm about the new beginning of our government.

I had the privilege of being invited to attend a meeting of the National Press Club. I was invited by a friend of mine who is secretary of the club. It was a noon luncheon on Wednesday. We listened to the new director of the office of management and budget, a Congressman Stockman from Michigan.

He told us what we would have to face up to in the next few months and portrayed an image of confidence that we could accomplish a balanced budget eventually.

Once again, thank you very much and I certainly appreciated attending. I hope I turned out to be an asset to the senate body.

The functions at the inaugural ball — you may have heard a lot of conflicting news stories about the mixup in handling tickets etc. As also mentioned by Senator Redlin, the Vice President's reception which was held on Monday afternoon was anticipated to be attended by 6,000 people and there were actually more than 18,000 attending. There were 40,000 people in attendance at the 9 or 10 inaugural balls that were held in the various hotels. We were invited to the Washington Sheraton. There was quite a problem there. The ballroom normally accommodates 3,000 people and there were some 8,000 people trying to get in. Maybe the Republicans were guilty of selling too many tickets but in reading the news evaluation in the Washington Star, they said the Republicans were spending a lot of money on this affair. There was some 10 million dollars spent and the inaugural committee actually took in over 10 3/4 million dollars in revenue, thus showing a 3/4 million dollar profit on this inaugural event so that is in the spirit of true Republican thinking. If we keep that sort of thing up for 4 years, we may end up with a balanced budget.

You may want to ask me questions individually about the inaugural balls. We had Harry James for our dancing music. It would seem like Hollywood had moved out enmasse to take part in the inaugural affair.

I thought Harry James was dead 20 years ago but he can blow a trumpet just as good as he did years ago. His orchestra is well organized and they gave a terrific concert.

We had Wayne Newton, more of a contemporary type entertainer and his orchestra and they entertained for a half hour and he displayed his talent on various musical instruments. Mike Connors was the MC. You might remember him as Mannix on TV. Frankie Laine sang a few numbers reminiscent of the past. Maybe the old past is coming back again or is being resurrected again with a change in administration.

They also had the Mills Brothers with only three of them living now. Their first inaugural performance was in 1929 when Hoover was inaugurated President. We certainly had a wonderful time and once again, I want to thank you.
